ISLMABAD: Countries having better social protection systems are in a better position to deal with COVID -19 pandemic, therefore, flexible budgeting should be introduced in Pakistan on a war footing by diverting funds from other areas for creating strong social protection systems.

This was the crux of an online dialogue titled: 'Macroeconomic Policy Responses to COVID-19' organized by Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) here on Wednesday.

Speaking on the occasion, economic experts from Pakistan and abroad agreed that the government needs to be more transparent regarding its financial measures and reassure that its people are its priority above anything else.

Dr Hamza Ali Malik, Director Macroeconomic Policy and Financing for Development Division at UNESCAP, said irrespective of their fiscal positions,

all the countries, including Pakistan, should go ahead with health and social protection expenditures, "We all understand there is a confluence of multiple shocks from both the demand and supply side, however it is expected that demand side shocks will dominate the supply side considerations." Contractions in economy will be of a much more concern than inflation, he said, adding that fiscal policy will have to take lead here and monetary measures will have to be there, but will essentially be complementing the lead by fiscal authorities.

Regarding interest rate, he said, it was lowered to boost businessmen confidence or acquire fiscal space rather it is a consequence of the measures that the global system has enforced such as massive and substantial liquidity injections all over the world. In Pakistan, he said, it is a natural consequence, as how the balance sheets work. "Central banks have to step in and make sure that their actions are consistent in

terms of prevailing market interest rates and they have to lower interest rates." He said the decision will be primarily driven by how much liquidity and credit support is needed to run the system.

Dr Malik said that the UN is trying to promote regional co-operation towards the creation of a global emergency health fund. Debt relief or debt deferral mechanisms need to be negotiated with global lenders in particular, he said, adding that the UN system wants to engage all the countries so that governments commit that they will have tangible improvements in the areas, which are beyond pure economic considerations. "Moreover, it is evident that there is less pollution due to a decline in economic activity, this should be taken as an opportunity to support and prioritize low carbon footprint industries and businesses, to make economies more sustainable over time. The digital divide also

has to be addressed. Internet should

be accessible to all as education and other activities now depend on it, he maintained

Mr. Malik noted that the IMF will be very receptive this time regarding the lowering of targets, and an emergency meeting of Monetary and Fiscal Coordination Board (MFCB) should have been called which is the existing mechanism for consultations to feed its advice to the National Economic Council (NEC).

Dr Vaqar Ahmed, SDPI Joint Executive Director, said central banks across the world were quick to respond while treasuries were slow to respond, so this calls for treasuries to change the way they operate in distressed times. Fiscal policy response should be clear, quick and transparent. "We need to revive our trust in rule based fiscal policy, as the confidence of the treasury to act will also be boosted by this. A rule based fiscal policy will not only help in managing the crisis phase but also the post crisis phase." Moreover, he said, greater participatory democracy in decision-making is needed, as the stimulus package that was announced without participation and consultation from the business community created great resentment among them. Finally, he underlined the importance of the consultative process which is necessary as the government has approached the IMF for the Rapid Finance Instrument. Now, it's time to integrate databases, as currently there is no integration between FBR and Ministry of Commerce or FBR and Ministry of Finance. He said at least 13 tax departments across the country are also not linked. "Moreover, cursory analysis reveals the policies adopted by the each of the provinces has overlaps because systems and data were never integrated." This compromises the efficiency of public spending and especially when donors start supporting Pakistan in the post crisis phase, he said, concluding that these overlaps need to be avoided.

Pakistan's exports to USA grew 4.64%

AKISTAN'S exports of goods and services to United State Of America (USA) grew by 4.64 percent during the first seven months of financial year (2019-20)compared to the corresponding period of last year, State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) reported.

The overall exports to USA were recorded at US \$3494.345 million during July-January (2019-20) against exports of US \$3339.206 million during July-January (2018-19), PBS data revealed.

On the other hand, the imports from USA into the country during the period were recorded at US \$1932.144 million against US \$1853.087 million last year, showing growth of 4.26 percent in first seven months of this year.

Based on the trade figures, the trade of goods and services with USA witnessed increase of 5.11 percent in surplus during first seven months of ongoing fiscal year

as compared to the corresponding period of last year. The surplus during the period under review was recorded at \$1562.201 million against \$1486.119 million during same period of last year, the data revealed.

The commodities that contributed positively growth in exports included rice exports of which grew from \$16.084 million last year to \$30.475 million during the current fiscal year, showing growth of 89.47 percent.

The exports of tobacco and its refuse also increased by 6250 percent, from \$0.050 million to \$3.175 million whereas the exports of furnishing articles of textile material increased by 41.47 percent, from \$15.856 million to \$22.433 million.

The exports of medical, surgical and dental instruments grew by 14.60 percent, from \$67.352 million to \$77.192 million while the exports of articles of apparel and accessories of leather increased by 8.46 percent, from \$67.132 million last year to \$72.817 million, the data revealed. The exports of maintenance and repair services increased by 28.47 percent, from \$0.764 million to \$1.417 million whereas the exports telecommunication, computer and information services increased by 28.08 percent, from \$336.769 million to \$431.291 million.

Meanwhile, the commodities that contributed positively growth in imports included special transaction NES imports of which grew from \$48.706 million last year to \$85.080 million during the current year, showing increase of 74.68 percent.

The imports of milk and cream concentrated or sweetened also increased by 10.84 percent, from \$9.609 million to \$10.651 million whereas the imports of air or vacuum pump, compressors and fans increased by 126.92 percent, from \$6.350 million

The imports of ferrous waste and scrap also increased by 66.74 percent, from \$63.962 million to \$106.656 million whereas the imports of cotton, not carded or combed increased by 54.43 percent, from \$141.022 million to \$217.784 million, the data revealed.

Limiting the spread of COVID 19

HERE containment of the spread of Covid-19 is concerned, it is essential that decisions at the top are taken with prudence and firmness. Any dithering or lack of direction can result in the situation getting out of control with an explosion of cases. Considering our creaking healthcare system, this is not a risk Pakistan can afford to take. Where mismanagement of the crisis is concerned, mistakes were quite obviously made while handling the zaireen returning from Iran, which has been ravaged by the virus. The pilgrims were housed in inadequate conditions in Taftan, and the lack of proper facilities to screen and accommodate them is said to have led to the spread of the contagion in this country. However, another major administrative lapse that has affected the battle against Covid-19 has been the Punjab government's handling of the Tableeghi Jamaat's grand ijtima in Raiwind held in the middle of March, when coronavirus cases had already been reported in Pakistan.

The Tableeghi Jamaat's ijtima is no small event. Figures in the media say around 250,000 people had gathered in Raiwind. At a time when 'social distancing' and 'lockdowns' are buzzwords in the effort to stop the spread of the contagion, the congregation was a recipe for disaster. The Punjab government had asked the Tableeghi Jamaat to postpone the event, but the request was ignored. It took heavy showers in the area for the Jamaat's hierarchy to cancel the event after it had begun, but by then the damage had already been done. Cases connected to its members have been reported across Pakistan, as well as other parts of the world. In fact, it is believed that Covid-19 was carried to Gaza by two preachers who had been to Raiwind.

There are lessons that can be learnt from this fiasco. Firstly, where matters of public health are concerned, the state must be gentle but firm. The Punjab government should have clearly communicated to the Tableeghi leadership that letting the ijtima go ahead would create a health crisis on a national scale. Therefore, overzealous clerics must not be allowed to challenge the writ of the state, and the Covid-19 crisis should be prevented from snowballing further; the ban on congregational prayers must be enforced by the centre as well as all provincial administrations as long as the crisis lasts. - Courtesy DAWN

Kazakhstan 2030 & Economic Sustainability: an overview

By implementing the Strategy 2030, Kazakhstan achieved the privatization of its macro-economy, institutionalization of a world class banking system and started to generate its own economic elite. Resultantly, Kazakhstan's priority shifted from a strategy of economic stabilization to one of economic growth during 1997

O achieve certain socio-economic goals the government of Kazakhstan announced "Strategy 2030". It outlined a comprehensive road map to transform Kazakhstan's national economy, civility, society, and governance. It was indeed a giant step to achieve the optimal utility of various ongoing socio-economic reforms.

Being prominent regional expert of Kazakhstan I would like to examine the different salient features of Kazakhstan Strategy 2030 along with its success rate. The long-term development strategy "Kazakhstan 2030: Prosperity, Security and Ever Growing Welfare of All the

Kazakhstanis" was adopted in 1997. The former President Nursultan Nazarbayev outlined the major principle of the country's development and termed economic development precedence over political development.

The 2030 Strategy pinpointed seven long-term priorities i.e. national security; domestic stability and consolidation of the society; economic growth based on an open market economy; health, education, and welfare; effectively utilizing energy resources; transport and communication infrastructure; and the professionalization of public administration. It considers the government's policies to achieve each of the priorities. It also touches upon the process of policy implementation, looking at both successes and failures.

By implementing the Strategy 2030, Kazakhstan achieved the privatization of its macro-economy, institutionalization of a world class banking system and started to generate vn economic elite. Resultantly, Kazakhstan's priority shifted from a strategy of economic stabilization to one of economic growth during 1997. Its economic system was stable enough to make it possible to instigate reforms elsewhere, i.e. in social welfare, healthcare, education, transport, and other sectors in late 1990s.

A strong and stable country is entitled to achieve its socio-economic goals. Better national security shield payes the way of economic liberalization, sustainable development, robust industrialization, diversification of economy and productive channels. Strategy 2030 guaranteed Kazakhstan's territorial integrity. It emphasized to achieve a strong state while maintaining friendly relations with all its neighbouring countries. Kazakhstan sought to further deepen and strengthen trust and equitable relations with its nearest neighbours.

It also outlined foreign policy priorities i.e. greater socio-economic integration with all the CIS, nurturing relations with the Middle East Region, and further strengthening of cooperation with the major democracies and industrialized countries of the west the USA in particular. To achieve further financial self-reliance it stated that Kazakhstan welcomes assistance and cooperation initiatives from international institutions and forums such as the UN, the IMF, the World Bank, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the Islamic Development Bank, and the Asian Development Bank. Internal stability and the consolidation of the people were defined as the second priority. Afterward, to achieve the goals of Strategy 2030, a wide range of measures were introduced to prevent ethnic and religious tension and promoted the spirit of unity within the population of the country, based on the principle of equal opportunities

for all citizens of Kazakhstan.

Establishment of an open market economy with high levels of foreign direct investment and domestic savings were defined as the third priority. It encouraged the substantial state's role in economic affairs. It established the legal basis for an economy in which private enterprise was the main actor/contributor. The government was tasked with making Kazakhstan more appealing for foreign investors in order to attract investments into major sectors of Kazakhstani industry. High inflows of FDIs were sought in agriculture, forestry and wood-using industries, light industry and food processing, tourism, building construction, and infrastructure. Development of these industries instrumental to encourage structural changes in its macro-economy which ultimately, created jobs and reduced poverty levels in the country.

The successful implementation of Strategy 2030 has now information campaigns to promote healthy living, nutrition, hygiene, and sanitation. It stressed government willingness to pursue a more active policy in demography and family welfare as the economy grows. In the ongoing global COV-ID-19, the concrete response of Kazakhstan government has been highly appreciated by the WHO which reaffirms its superior health care system among the CIS.

The Strategy 2030 identified five points for the energy resources utilization strategy i.e. execution of long-term contracts with major international oil companies for obtaining technologies and know-how and attract major companies to ensure that the natural resources of the country are effectively exploited, diversification of oil & gas resources by building a pipeline system for oil and gas exports; attracting high inflows of investments from the USA, Russia, China, Japan, and Western Europe in Kazakhstan's oil and gas sector; maintaining self-sufficiency and competitive independence of domestic energy infrastructure through foreign investments and last sensible spending of future revenues. Energy resources have been one of the key elements of its foreign policy through which Kazakhstan revolutionized its economy, society and of course governance. It aimed to make its domestic transport and communication complex competitive on the world market and increase trade flows through its territory. The government sought to develop domestic rail, air, and water transport infrastructures as well as the national road network. Special attention was given to the development of telecommunications. Kazakhstan planned to build its own effective, independent telecommunications system, which gradually increased its competitiveness with other countries' systems.

It ensured to build an efficient, modern public administration that pledged/promised good governance in a market economy. It created a comprehensive nationwide system of public administration with effective staff training both in the country and abroad. It encouraged establishing a fair conditions for career promotion, a standardized information system, and a solid social protection system based on a spirit of appreciation of the contribution of a government's key resource.

It was a strategic giant leap towards further socio-economic transformation, economic sustainability, diversification of energy resources and productive channels. further improvement in education and health sectors, improvement in human development and above all seeking more and more inflows of Foreign Direct Investments (FDIs) in the country. Due to successful implementation of Strategy 2030, Kazakhstan has been attracting the biggest ratios of FDIs in the CIS for so many years.

Being prominent regional expert of Kazakhstan and CIS it is suggested that Kazakhstan must further diversify its macro-economy and rigorously follow export oriented policies to maintain a sustainable economic growth/pattern in the country. Further diversification of oil & gas resources (demand & supply) will increase GDP & GNP. The further development of non-oil sector is the need of the hour which will also stimulate further consolidation of strategy 2030.

The Kazakhstan-2030 Strategy emphasized the importance of defining new international markets where Kazakhstan can become a leading global competitor and thereby generate future sources of economic growth. It encouraged promoting national diversification through innovation, cluster projects, and niche development.

To conclude, improving the quality of Kazakhstan's human resources through enhanced education and training will also be important because humans are real strategic assets of Kazakhstan which has now announced new economic course to achieve the remaining goals of the Strategic 2030.

Strategy 2030 was meant to revolutionized Kazakhstan and achieved a new Kazakhstan, which have been consistently building together starting from the first day of independence, is now confidently moving ahead, finding its unique way of development and winning recognition and prestige in the international community year by year. It was announced and implemented to make Kazakhstan a truly integral and dynamic part of the world markets for goods, services, labour resources, capital, modern innovations and technologies and it is now mov-

Iraq's feuding politicians impervious to emerging calamity

WO weeks ago, Iraqi President Barham Salih nominated Adnan Al-Zurfi as prime ministerdesignate and tasked him with forming a Cabinet to be approved by parliament. This was the president's latest effort to form a government after Adel Abdul Mahdi stepped down in November last year in the face of widespread public criticisms of his

government's failure to provide services to the people. Al-Zurfi faces a daunting challenge. A former governor of Najaf province, he has dual US-Iraqi citizenship and has been associated with Iraq's politics since the US invasion in 2003. He took a tough stand against the militia of Muqtada Al-Sadr in 2004. He is the head of the Nasr parliamentary grouping that includes former Prime Minister Haider Abadi.

While Al-Zurfi enjoys the backing of several Shiite, Sunni and Kurdish groups in parliament, he is being opposed by the Fatah Alliance that is closely linked to Iran and by several militias that together make up the Iran-affiliated Popular Mobilization Units. He is viewed by them as being pro-US and thus a threat to continued Iranian influence in Iraq. Kata'ib Hezbollah has been particularly vociferous in criticizing Al-Zurfi's nomination, with its spokesman even saying that it is a "declaration of war against the Iraqi people that will burn what remains of Iraq."

Though he backs the street protests, Al-Zurfi is also being opposed by the young demonstrators who have been agitating for wide-ranging reform since October last year. They have been demanding an end to Iraq's "spoils" system in parliament, which is based on sectarian and ethnic affiliations, and have been insisting on a prime minister who has no links to Iraq's earlier politics or with foreign entities - Al-Zurfi fails to fulfill both of

Iraq's political system is experiencing paralysis at a time when the country is facing several challenges both economic and military - which have been complicated by the onset of the coronavirus pandemic. The virus outbreak has dealt a body blow to the national

economy by slowing down domestic economic activity and retarding Iraq's trade ties with its principal partners, Iran, Turkey and China, which are fighting their

own battles against the virus. What has worsened the situation is the collapse in oil prices. Oil exports provide more than 90 percent of the revenue for Iraq's annual budget. The budget for 2020, not yet approved by parliament, provides for an outlay of \$135 billion, with most of the expenditure going toward paying the salaries of 7 million government officials. The budget was based on assumed oil prices of \$56 per barrel. Now that oil prices have fallen to less than half this figure, the government will struggle to meet its obligations to public servants, while also paying for its local and foreign debt, providing urgently needed public services and investing in national development projects. Amid these economic concerns and popular discontent, Iraq remains the main theater of contention between Iran and the US. Throughout March, Iran-affiliated militants targeted American bases with rockets, at times killing and wounding armed forces personnel. These attacks have led to strong US responses, generating fears that the conflict could expand across the country. Occasionally, the US attacks have hit civilian targets, such as the airport at Karbala, leading to widespread condemnation from Iran's allies and even government sources. In the face of these rocket attacks, the US announced the closure of its bases in three areas - the Qayyarah base in Nineveh province, Al-Qaim base on the Syria-Iraq border, and the K1 base in Kirkuk province. US officials have denied that these closures are due to the attacks,

saying that they were planned last year. The American

presence was meant to fight Daesh, but Iraqi forces are

now well equipped to handle this responsibility. The withdrawal from Al-Qaim is particularly significant. This border town was wrested from Daesh more than two years ago and, across the border in Syria, there are Iran-backed militias as well as US-sponsored Syrian Democratic Forces, largely made up of Kurdish fighters. There are concerns that Al-Qaim could see the penetration of pro-Iran militants, possibly from Kata'ib Hezbollah, rather than elements from the Iraqi army.

Iraq's political system is experiencing paralysis at a time when the country is facing several challenges.

This period of uncertainty and tension has encouraged rumor-mongering in Iraq. Toward the end of March, Baghdad was awash with talk (perhaps from pro-Iranian sources) of a US-sponsored coup in the country to get rid of the present leaders, end the stalemate and usher in a new order. People were encouraged to stay at home and stockpile as much food as possible.

US sources also might have encouraged these fears. The New York Times reported that Defense Secretary Mark Esper had called for the planning of a "new campaign" inside Iraq and that "secret plans" were being developed to fight the Iran-backed militias. The closure of US bases is being seen as reducing targets for the militants.

Alongside the expanding scourge of the coronavirus pandemic, Iraq is confronting a multiplicity of crises. But its avaricious and feuding politicians appear impervious to the emerging calamity. Not surprisingly, the slogans of the demonstrators include: "Corruption is the real virus," and "politicians are the real virus." - Courtesy Arab News

US corona death toll tops 5,000

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Imran Khan Thursday hoped that the country would overcome the coronavirus outbreak using the available resources as the current trajectory of the growth in Pakistan was relatively slower than that of the western countries.

"By the grace of Allah, Pakistan does not have the trajectory like other

countries. We will overcome the coronavirus considering the current pace of its growth," the prime minister said addressing a ceremony of distribution of Rs 100 billion refunds among the businessmen.

Mr. Ilham Aliyev, and the First Vice-President, Mrs. Mehriban Aliyeva. To this day, our state has always been next to its citizens and showed attention to

As part of the fight against the spread of the coronavirus infection, our state is mobilizing all its efforts and taking serious measures to protect the health of its citizens both in Azerbaijan proper and abroad.

In particular, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the diplomatic missions of our country abroad continue to operate in a special mode.

Our main objectives are to obtain complete information about our citizens temporarilv located abroad (working, studying or traveling for other reasons), to respond to their requests, provide sound advice and coordination at a time



when different countries have introduced a quarantine or a state of emergency, restricted and in many cases completely canceled overland and air trans-

As is known, the Operational Headquarters has been set up under the Cabinet of Ministers to combat the coronavirus, and this headquarters regularly updates the population about the measures being taken.

There is an operational headquarters under the Foreign Ministry too, which provides responses to the queries and questions sent to Foreign Ministry's 24/7 "hotline" and

In parallel, there are active "hotlines" of all our diplomatic missions. We recommend that our citizens abroad contact these "hotlines" if they have any queries in the current sit-

uation.

The hotlines receive hundreds of calls every day. Numerous emails are sent to our email boxes and every single one of them is answered.

First of all, the appeal is recorded, contact details of the caller are noted, and then the appeal is forwarded to a relevant diplomatic mission and answered. At the same time, this information is forwarded to the Operational Headquarters under the Cabinet of Ministers.

This process takes 24 hours. Most of the appeals are made by our citizens temporarily located abroad to receive education or for various other reasons.

People mainly seek advice on how to behave in the current situation and how they can return to the country. I t is known that the government

has so far organized special charter flights to return about 10,000 of our citizens to Azerbaijan, conducted the necessary checkups and placed them under quarantine.

It is also known that in the current circumstances it is very important to prepare quarantine places and hospitals with special regimes and provide them with the necessary logistics to enable the return of our citizens to the country.

After all, we must understand that quarantine places are also limited.

From this point of view, it is very important for our citizens to support the state and show understanding in this matter.

NAB arrests fake officer

ISLAMABAD: The National Accountability Bureau (NAB) has arrested a fraudster Arsalan,posing himself as NAB officer, on the allegations of collecting funds from people in the name of corona (relief fund) and handed over him to police for further legal action.

According to a press release, NAB was strictly adhering to anti corruption policy of chairman NAB, who pledged strict action against corrupt elements and eradication of corruption immediately after taking the charge of the bureau.
