CAA allows Omani airline to operate

ISLAMABAD: The Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) on Friday granted permission to Oman-based airline Salam Air, to operate six repatriation flights from Muscat to Pakistan.

A spokesperson for the CAA said that the decision has been taken so that the stranded Pakistanis in Mus cat could celebrate Eidul Azha with their families. The airline has been allowed to operate six flights from Muscat to giv cities of Pakistar from July 26 to August 2.

"The permission is subject to the condition that no disembarkation of flight crew shall be permitted from the aircraft upon arrival at Karachi, Lahore, Sialkot, Multan and Islamabad airports," read a permit issued to the airline. Earlier on July 14, the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) had allowed the country's private airline, SereneAir, to operate special repatriation flights to

Sharjah from July 15. Pak keen to cement defence ties with Italy

Italian Ambassador to Pakistan Andreas Ferrarese meets defence minister; discusses bilateral relations

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Minister for Defence Pervez Khattak has said that Pakistan attaches great importance to its relations with the Republic of Italy and wants to further enhance defence collaboration in different fields. In a meeting with the Italian Ambassador to Pakistan Andreas Ferrarese in Islamabad, the minister mentioned that exchanged military training can be mutually beneficial as being part of NATO the Italian armed forces have valuable military exposure while Pakistan's armed forces, who are fighting the war on terror, have rich experience in counter-terrorism operations. Pervez Khattak conveyed gratitude for facilitating the provision of military equipment to Pakistan Air Force (PAF).

Farogh said opposition parties had not held consultation before bringing ordinances when they were in power as it was not a requirement.

Pakistan-China business avenues still untapped

BEIJING: Besides extensive collaborations in energy, infrastructure, industrial and socio-economic spectrum, Pakistan and China have another business avenue to tap to further promote their socio-economic partnership.

China, which has gained mastery in the field of reclaiming lands from deserts through afforestation, has already channelized its own business fortunes by giving robust impetus to sand economy. This ecological industry has not only unleashed monetary gains but also help catalyze jobs especially for rural areas in China.

Pakistan, desperately, needs the sand economy which is also called green economy to

usher in era of afforestation to transform ill-fate into lucrative business. Being a home of five deserts including Cholistan desert, Thal desert, Indus Valley Desert, Thar Desert and Kharan desert. Pakistan's economy may get a booster if the PTI government engages with China to establish ecological industry, . The report says, Pakistan should take inspiration from the example of China's success story showcased in Kubuqi desert. Elion, a private ecology and investment enterprise, invested approximately RMB 38 billion (\$5.82 billion) in the Kubuqi desert-greening project since 1988, helping to lift more than 102,000 local farmers and herdsmen out of poverty.

If Pakistani economic wizards exploit the scenario, deserts will transform into fertile land to

help grow Chinese herbal plants in great number. By exporting them that are in high demand in China, Pakistani may amplify its exports base in China.

Environmentalist Dr Javed Iqbal said that Pakistan should welcome Elion Resources Group and its investment proposal in deserts of country. ERG has planted the seed of industrialization of desertification control in people's mind, he adds.

Kubuqi project generated over 5000 employment opportunities for local peasants and herdsmen, while free professional training has also been provided to make them the new-generation ecological construction workers, tourist service staff and skilled workers of intensive breeding and planting. The ecological industry in desert has increased the income of natives

by over RMB 300 million per year. The per capita net income of herdsmen has increased from RMB 2,000 in the past to RMB 30,000 at present. All five deserts in Pakistan

have been confronting the same worst conditions like once Kabuqi desert in China suffered 32 years ago. Cholistan desert sprawling over 10,200 sq mile is stripped off all civic facilities with scanty water and vegetation.

Agriculturist Dr. Humayun Faisal says that Pakistan governments, in past, launched some projects to increase the prospects of irrigation and cultivation in the Thal desert by unveiling Greater Thal Canal project (phase I and Phase II) costing Rs. 30 billion in 2001 but unfortunately project stands incomplete so far.

Rabies vaccine available in all districts: **Dr Yasmin**

LAHORE: Provincial Min-ister for Health Dr Yasmin Rashid on Thursday said that rabies vaccine was available in all district hospitals and the government had 25,000 vaccines in store. Responding to the queries by lawmakers during the Punjab Assembly session, she said another 50,000 rabies vaccine would be made available by the end of this month and there was nothing to panic.

Earlier, Punjab Assembly session started two hours behind its scheduled time of 2 p.m. with Panel of Chairman Mian Shafi Muhammad in the chair. The day's agenda pertained to questions relating to Primary and Secondary Health department. Provincial Health Minister Dr. Yasmin Rashid responded to the questions by the lawmakers.

To a supplementary question by the Opposition MPA Shazia Abid, the Health Minister said specialist doctors were usually reluctant to serve in the rural areas and the government faced difficulty in this regard. However, doctors were posted against 70 seats out of 84 and the rest of the 14 posts would be filled by the end of July, she added. – **APP**

Ismail Rahu rules out wheat shortage

KARACHI: Sindh Agriculture Minister Ismail Rahu on Friday ruled out any shortage of wheat in the province. There is no shortage of wheat in Sindh as 12,50000 tons of wheat is stored with the province, Ismail Rahu said in his statement issued here from Karachi.

The minister said flour mills in Sindh are also having wheat stock and added that cide about release of wheat to the flour mills.Rahu also alleged the federal government responsible for short-

age of wheat in Punjab. On July 20, Flour Mills Association in the Sindh province hiked prices of flour after they claimed an increase in prices of wheat province-wide. The mill owners had raised the prices of flour No. 2.5 by Rs 3 per kilogram (Kg), fine flour by Rs 1.5 per kg, and Chakki flour by Rs 2 per kg.

Govt imposes complete ban on tourism on Eid

SWAT: In view of the directives of the provincial government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and the situation of Coronavirus in the country, there was a complete ban on tourism in the Malakand division including Swat, so people should avoid coming here at any time, especially on the occasion of Eid-ul Adha, said an official hand out issued here on Friday. All those who are not permanent residents of Swat are advised to refrain from coming to Swat for tourism purposes otherwise they will face difficulties. Law en forcement agencies across the district Officials have been directed to take steps to implement the ban on tourism in view of the pandemic situation.

SPI inflation increases 0.21%

ISLAMABAD: The Sensitive Price Indicator (SPI) based weekly inflation for the week ended on July 23, for the combined consumption group, witnessed an increase of 0.21 percent as compared to the previous week. The SPI for the week under review in the above mentioned group was recorded at 133.89 points against 133.61 points registered in the previous week. according to the latest data of Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). As compared to the corresponding week of last year, the SPI for the combined consumption group in the week under review witnessed an increase of 10.50 percent. – APP

Islamabad High Court directs PTA to lift ban on PUBG

The court has ordered the PTA to unblock the game immediately and explain their reasoning behind banning the game

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Friday lifted ban on online game PlayerUnknown's Battleground (PUBG). Justice Aamer Farooq announced the verdict on Friday. The Islamabad High Court has ordered the PTA to unblock online game Players' Unknown Battle Ground (PUBG) while approving a petition filed against the Authority's decision to ban the game in Pakistan. It was earlier reserved on July 14.

The court will soon issue a detailed verdict, directing the PTA to make any future decisions on bans after listening to all stakeholders. The court has ordered the PTA to unblock the game immediately and explain their reasoning behind banning the game.

The decision was taken after a company controlling PUBG in Pakistan challenged PTA's move to ban the game due to mental and physical health concerns of its users. During the last hearing, the judge had remarked that the PTA should have taken the advice from

a psychiatrist before taking the extreme decision.

The PTA's lawyer adopted the stance that the game had been banned after the department had witnessed some anti-Islam material on it. PTA had issued a statement in this regard, saying that numerous complaints were received by the authority against the game, calling it addictive, a waste of time and dangerous for the physical and psychological health of young, impressionable children involved in playing it. Earlier, the Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) on

Friday made it clear that ban to remain enforced on online game PlayerUnknown's Battleground (PUBG), one of the most famous global online games, in the country. According to a declaration issued by the PTA, the administration of the PUBG game failed to give desired information including sessions of the game, number of users and details about its controls. Therefore the ban over PUBG to continue, PTA said. It may be noted that earlier this

month, PTA has decided to temporarily ban online game PUBG in the country. A PTA spokesman had said that a decision to permanently ban the PUBG would be made after consultations. "We have received many complaints regarding the game," he said adding that complaints termed the game as a waste of time and further claimed that it was causing a negative impact on the children.

The PTA action came in the backdrop of a complaint at the Lahore High Court (LHC) by parents of two children who committed suicide in Lahore after they were denied permission to play the game.

World's longest cable car project in KP

The meeting granted permission for a detailed feasibility study and engineering design. The 14-km long project will connect the Kumrat valley to Lower Chitral's Madaklasht valley. Global recognition for PM's smart lockdown strategy

ISLAMABAD: With a steep decline from around 6,800 COVID-19 patients a day in mid June to 1,209 during last 24 hours across Pakistan, the world is growingly acknowledging Prime Minister Imran Khan's smart lockdown strategy, mainly focusing balance between lives and livelihood. On June 13, Pakistan had

reported 6,825 coronavirus cases out of 29,546 tests the highest score so far in the country. During last 24 hours, only 1,206 persons tested positive of total 22,006 tests. Out of 1,821,296 tests, the country has so far reported 270,399 confirmed cases, with 219,783 recoveries and 5.769 deaths.

However, courtesy of the minister's undeterred opposition to the blanket lockdown, the country ebbed away the feared economic disaster as faced by the countries in the region and in the developed world. "The only solution as the world has discovered is a smart lockdown, which allows for economic activity with SOPs. We are amongst the pioneers of this approach," the prime minister said on Twitter.

While welcoming the participants, Sheikh Sultan Rehman Vice President FPCCI stated that there was a historical referendum in UK in 2016 wherein the people of UK voted against remaining in EU which created a wave of shock and caused loss of US\$ 2 trillion in a day. He added that UK plays a key role in economic and social development of Pakistan.



At present, the balance of trade between Pakistan and UK is in favor of Pakistan. In his remarks, TDAP GSP Plus Advisor Kamal Shahrvar stated that the negotiation between Pakistan and UK is continuing for getting the similar facility which Pakistan is enjoying under EU GSP Plus. He stated that UK has not shared conditionalities of new trade agreement but in principle agreed for similar level of facilities. During the period from July-June this year, imports of Synthetic fiber reduced by 26.99% worth \$427,394 thousand as compared the imports valuing \$585,367 thousand of same period of last year, it added.

Meanwhile, synthetic & artificial silk yarn imports decreased by 26.98%, worth \$503,571 thousand as compared the imports of valuing \$689,668 thousand of the corresponding period of last year.

During the period under review, buses, Worn clothing imports also came down by 6.79%, valuing \$168,751 thousand imported as compared the imports worth \$181,042 thousand of same period of last year. – APP



Pakistan's AIDS problem

HILE the latest UNAID report shows that the global AIDS epidemic is decreasing in parts of Asia and the Pacific, it mentions Pakistan as a country where new infections and mortalities are both on the increase. The report focuses on global inequalities which influence progress in tackling AIDS and especially in expanding access to drugs which can keep the disease in control. The report states that this highlights the need for countries to act urgently to reach the millions who have still not been able to benefit from the latest developments.

The report notes an especially sharp increase in HIV/AIDS in Pakistan and the Philippines. It also highlights the difficulty for most countries in reaching targets and says that in Afghanistan, Pakistan and the Philippines late diagnosis and poor adherence to treatment are major factors in pushing forward transmissions and AIDS-related deaths. About half of the key populations living with HIV are not aware of their status and there is a need to improve the rate of diagnosis. The report also notes that the goal of reducing AIDS-related death to fewer than 500,000 will not be met this year, especially with the Covid-19 pandemic drawing attention away from other diseases. HIV infections according to the report are rising more sharply among young people aged 15 to 25 years. This is a major concern for Pakistan, with the majority of its population falling in this category or very close to it. UNAIDS states that ending punitive laws and policies and tackling rising stigma can help make progress in dealing with AIDS. T

he countries which offer needles/syringe programmes and moderate coverage of narcotics substitution therapy have fared well in reducing AIDS. These are all factors Pakistan needs to consider. Discriminatory laws and the stigma attached to AIDS are still high in the country today. This is also true of Afghanistan. These factors could help explain why the rate continues to rise in these nations while others including Cambodia, Vietnam, Myanmar and Thailand have been able to control it. We must reconsider policies and also put in place large-scale awareness campaigns to give people accurate knowledge about the AIDS issue and the fact that the disease can be successfully treated if it is diagnosed early and proper therapies begun. So far, we have not been able to do this. As a result, people who suspect they may be living with HIV do not seek treatment while the lack of diagnostic facilities also hinders them. Overcoming these challenges is vital to our future and to our success in pushing down the HIV/AIDS rates in our country.

Pangs of pain

NCE again acute food insecurity is expected to rise sharply in war-torn Yemen with the problem exacerbated by the coronavirus, states a report by several UN agencies. Hunger in Yemen has been a problem we have seen grow rapidly since the war in the country broke out in 2014 when Houthi rebels took over the capital and displaced the government.

The war escalated in March 2015 when the Saudi-led military coalition intervened against the rebels. Despite the fighting, the issue of hunger had begun to come under control in 2019 as the world recognized the scale of the issue. The new UN report, which covers only seven parts of Yemen, forecasts that people facing hunger will increase from 2 million at the start of this year to 3.2 million in the period between July and December. This figure makes up 40 percent of the population of the districts which have been covered.

Alongside fighting economic shocks, floods, locust swarms and the coronavirus pandemic have created a dangerous background for the sharp rise in food insecurity. The World Food Programme and Unicef as well as other partners have called the increase "alarming". The WFP country director has said Yemen is facing a crisis on multiple fronts. It has previously warned that over 20 million people all over Yemen are food insecure and nearly 10 million are facing acute shortages. The population of Yemen is around 27 million. While the UN describes the situation in the country as the world's worst humanitarian crisis, not enough nations or their leaders are listening. These include the wealthy countries that surround Yemen, but which have done little to solve the crisis. While international aid and funding over a long period of time is required, it is also necessary that the conflict in the country be brought to a stop.

The war in Yemen is essentially a proxy war between Saudi Arabia and Iran. As such, the allies of both countries need to play a role in bringing about some kind of settlement. Given the acrimony that exists, this may not be easy.

But the humanitarian toll on Yemen should be a factor in persuading all those who are able to help to step up their efforts and persuade both countries to agree at the very least to a ceasefire which will allow time and space for a more permanent solution to be chalked out between the various parties involved in the fighting that has now already continued for well over half a decade.

Geology of Uzbekistan after Covid-19

HE Republic of Uzbekistan is blessed with rich natural resources including precious, rare and non-ferrous metals, various organic fuel such as oil, natural and condensed gas, different types of coal, shale oil, uranium and many more. The country firmly holds fourth position in stock of gold and seventh in gold mining, eighth in uranium reserve and eleventh in uranium mining. There are more than 2025 mining fields around the country: construction materials - 867, groundwater - 649, hydrocarbons (oil, condensed and natural gas) - 244, precious metals - 97 (gold, silver), non-ferrous and rare metals - 12, radioactive metals - 38, raw materials mines - 37, chemicals - 32, gemstone - 30, coal and oil shale - 7, ferrous metals - 5.

Uzbekistan secures leading positions in the world in confirmed stocks of such minerals as gold, uranium, copper, natural gas, tungsten, potassium salts, phosphorite, and kaolin. Not only do the rich stocks of minerals provide the existing mining complexes with a long perspective, but they also allow for increasing facilities and re-organization of the extraction of the most important minerals such as gold, uranium, copper, lead, silver, lithium, phosphorites, potassium salts, agrochemical ores, and other. According to estimates of Boston Consulting Group, over the next ten years, the country's investment potential will amount to \$ 65 billion, of which more than 45 billion falls to the raw materials industries.

On April 2020 the country has developed after pandemic measures to mitigate the adverse effects of pandemic. The conceptual measures tangled different aspects of sector including investment, structural changes, regulatory framework, scientific and innovation potential as well as modernization programs. In particular, measures chase objectives such as increasing the reserves of gold, silver, copper and eight types of non-metallic minerals, the volume of mineral extraction by at least 1.5 times in the framework of ongoing investment projects. Country is devoted to allocation of funds for the modernization of the industry and the digits are only growing over years. In 2017 - 2019 in consecutive three years 6.5, 23 and 18.2 million US dollars were allocated respectively in the framework of modernization program. In this period, a third of the technology and equipment in the industry has been renewed. In 2020, about 53 million US dollars are expected to be allocated to modernize drilling, mining, laboratory, geophysical, energy equipment, special equipment, auxiliary and other types of equipment.

The use of modern equipment allows not only to gain access to facilities previously inaccessible due to technical capabilities, but also to improve the pace and quality of well drilling at previous facilities by reducing time previously stent on repairing. Moreover, the use of modern equipment can reduce the time of work at all stages, reduce the negative impact on the environment and drill wells of complex design. It is estimated that by employing modern equipment will increase the drilling depth from 800 meters to 1200 and productivity by 1.7 times. By July over 100 units of special equipment are expected to be

renewed with funds allocated from the State Budget. Attractiveness of the industry for investment

Given the big potential of the sector, for the successful implementation of the investment attractiveness of the industry (namely, foreign investment), it is necessary to switch to international standards of reporting. Among the widely recognized international standards is the JORC Code, which sets standards, recommendations and principles for applying public reporting on mineral exploration results and ore reserves. The main principles of the code are transparency, materiality and competence. Further measures include reaching an agreement with the World Bank on attracting investors to the Kyzylturuk (gold) and Sangruntov (oil shale) mines, as well as with the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development to the Oktepa (silver) and Jetimtov (phosphorite) mines. It is planned to negotiate with international financial institutions on attracting investors to the remaining 16 fields until November 1, 2020. Attracting foreign investors will directly serve to transfer new technologies, to accelerate enriching stocks, and ultimately stimulate regional economic activity, increase employment and tax revenues.

Organizational improvement: State Committee on Geology and Mineral Resources

As was mentioned earlier, conceptual measures tangled structural changes. A number of regulatory acts have been adopted to strengthen the functional potential and expand the activities of the State Committee on Geology and Mineral Resources.

Regulatory framework.

Regarding the regulatory framework of the after-pandemic development program revised version of the Law "On mineral wealth" is to be adopted. The current law was adopted in 2002 and government believes it should be revised based on industry development trends and best foreign practices in the field. Working group at the State Committee on Geology and Mineral Resources is to develop a new version of the law based on study of the legislation of Turkey, Chile, China, Canada, Germany, the Russian Federation, Kazakhstan and Australia. One of the recommendations for the upcoming revision of the current law is that the rules and requirements in the new draft law will be direct in nature and will regulate the rights of foreign investors in more detail. At the same time, it is expected that the principles of competition for the transfer of subsoil use rights directly in the norms of the draft law will be reflected. At the same time, the rights of mineral users will be strengthened, and the conditions for government and local authorities to intervene in the activities of subsoil users will be determined in detail.

Groundwater resources
The study of groundwater is among the most important areas in geological science. It aims to solve land reclamation problems and to create an optimal water regime on agricultural lands, as well as for hydrogeological substantiation of construction works. Organizational structuring has also been tackled in the program. To

ensure efficient management of groundwater resources in the country State Unitary Enterprise "Uzbekhydrogeology" as a separate authorized body is now assigned to carry unified policy in this area.

Moreover, by the end of the year the country will introduce a system for online monitoring of water consumption in 200 new wells (also at 400 groundwater level wells). The extension of this measure will include development of interactive groundwater maps.

Potential for scientific and innovation
In recent years, Earth Remote Sensing (ERS) has become an indispensable tool for the study and management of mineral resources. The observation is carried out by aircraft and spacecraft equipped with special multichannel tools that record electromagnetic radiation in different ranges. There are different methods for studying the earth using remote sensing technology - a surface survey using satellite imagery, as well as processing Airborne geophysical surveys data that reflect the properties of the rock at depth.

Important features of airborne geophysical technologies are high productivity (up to 30,000 linear kilometers per month with one aircraft) and the absence of anthropogenic load on the studied territories. As a rule of thumb, the use of traditional methods (seismic exploration and drilling) has difficulties associated with logistics, which leads to a significant increase in the cost of project. Application of airborne geophysics methods in these conditions allows obtaining huge data about the geological structure of the study area in a short time by optimizing the planning and implementation of heavy geological and geophysical work due to the reasonable positioning of prospecting wells.

Also, in order to support research activities in the field of geology, as part of comprehensive measures, the Ministry of Innovative Development has announced call for application for applied and innovative projects. The purpose of the competition is the generating high-tech products and innovative technologies aimed at solving urgent problems, real needs and regional problems of geology development. According to the resolution, the University of Geological Sciences was established, specializing in the integration of education, research and practice in the field of geology. The University is a specialized higher education and research institute of the republic for the training of qualified personnel in the field of geology and the implementation of research work for the State Committee on Geology and Mineral Resources, mining companies and other sectors of the economy.

The adoption of this decision will serve to implement the results of research in geology, the widespread use of modern teaching methods, radically improve the system of training highly qualified personnel in geology, as well as strengthen the material and technical base of education on the basis of advanced foreign technologies.

COVID-19's effects on mental health to last years

A breaking point is coming if there are not wider efforts to reverse the growing purgatorial landscape. But few are comfortable managing the pandemic's mental health aftermath, whether in themselves or in others, because of the nascent sense of identifying self in an act of ultimate selfishness

HERE is no doubt that the clear and present danger of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) epidemic has yet to fully hit many countries around the world. In those countries with a failed response to the epidemic to date, mental wellness issues are becoming more

Schools and other institutions in certain countries are only now announcing that they will be closed through to the end of the year - an action they should have announced and acted on months ago. The scientific evidence is there to prove that the lack of action against the pathogen in January and February cost the US its ability to contain and mitigate the disease. There is really no excuse for the illusionary thinking that COVID-19 will just magically go away or is some type of hoax. This episode in American history is one of fools. Americans rarely experience a real catastrophe or crisis like other places around the world, where warfare, famine and other acts of violence affect daily lives in highly disruptive ways. The result is that, in America, "Karen and Ken" don't understand the big picture of real-world trauma and violence.

Having to deal with the anxiety caused by the current toxic mix of geopolitics and disease is a completely abnormal environment. Emotions are beginning to fray across many sociocultural fractures that have occurred during the COVID-19 epidemic. Six months-plus into the contagion — with more than a year to go — and the report card is dismal. Some societies may be able to withstand the pathogen spread, others not so much.

Mental wellness may even be applied to those who froth at the mouth across the political spectrum. "Revolutionaries" may be seen as suffering from "bloodlust" due to the opportunities of the moment to achieve what may be impossible during non-pandemic normalcy. Questions about behav-

ior and message are increasingly intertwined to produce a Tower of Babel effect, whereby people are simply speaking in tongues, adding to the mental pressure and potential physical side-effects.

As analysts have argued, the COVID-19 pandemic and resulting economic downturn are negatively affecting many people's mental health and creating new barriers for people already suffering from

mental illness and substance abuse disorders. As the pandemic continues into 2021, it is likely the mental health burden will increase, as measures taken to slow the spread of the virus — such as social distancing, business and school closures, and shelter-in-place orders — lead to greater isolation and potential financial distress. Though necessary to prevent loss of life due to COVID-19, these public health measures expose many people to situations that result in poor mental health outcomes, such as social isolation and redundancy. Feelings of anxiety are increasingly common, as people are fearful of themselves or loved ones falling ill, and are uncertain of the repercussions

of the pandemic. After anxiety comes rage: A rage that is beginning to turn discussions into more violent confrontations. For the US, the psychological damage from how the country is changing under the Trump administration is creating a toxic narrative that is damaging to both mental and physical health. The pandemic is likely to have both long and short-term implications for mental health and substance use. Those with existing disorders and those who are newly affected will both likely require an expansion of mental health and substance abuse services in the coming years.

Domestic violence is another factor that is increasing dramatically because of the pathogen and its mental health impact. The World Health Organization reported a 60 percent increase in domestic vi-

are effectively creating a double pandemic.

Suicide is also a major and increasingly troublesome issue based on the pandemic's damage to society. Researchers have estimated there could be as many as 3,235 to 8,164 excess suicides in the US in the wake of the coronavirus, as a result of economic shocks, social distancing and what is described as an "unprecedented assault on mental health." Importantly, suicide prevention services are subject to "burnout" and, given the pandemic's longevity and viciousness, COVID-19 magnifies many of these challenges and is taxing any new resources that become available.

The full mental wellness impact of the coronavirus will take years to decipher, and only then can truly helpful and necessary remedies be applied. Whole communities are at stake, so the post-COVID-19 future must be clearly understood.

Slovakia's PM **survives no**confidence vote

PRAGUE: Slovakia's Prime Minister Igor Matovic has survived a parliamentary no-confidence vote over allegations of plagiarism. Only 47 of the 125 present lawmakers in the 150-seat Parliament on Friday voted against Matovic, whose dismissal would mean the end of his coalition government. The result was expected because the coalition led by Matovic has a comfortable majority.

The motion was requested by the opposition after a newspaper published allegations that Matovic plagiarised most of his thesis on the impact of the tax system on businesses at Bratislava's Comenius University in 1998. The 47-year-old Matovic said he was not aware of any wrongdoing. He acknowledged he did not pay much attention to his studies at the faculty of management in the final two years because he already focused on his publishing business.

Bellingham receives racist comment

DORTMUND: Jude Bellingham, a promising 17-yearold English footballer who signed with top German club Borussia Dortmund this week, has called the racist comment he received on Twitter following his move to the Bundesliga team "disgusting." Bellingham posted a screengrab of the now-deleted message on Twitter which called him an "overrated talent" and said "Black people only think about money.'

In a statement, West Mercia Police said officers were investigating racist comments made on social media towards a 17-year-old from North Worcestershire, England. Inspector Lee Page said officers are "thoroughly investigating these abhorrent comments" and added that the police had contacted the victim and the victim's family.

WASHINGTON: The Wash ington Nationals and New York Yankees kneeled in a gesture of solidarity with the Black Lives Matter movement on Thursday as Major League Baseball's coronavirus-delayed season got under way. Before eerily empty stands at Nationals Park, players from both teams dropped to one knee and together lifted a giant black strip of fabric.

After kneeling for around 20 seconds, players got to their feet and stood in unison for a rendition of the US national anthem, "The Star-Spangled Banner." The United States has been convulsed by nationwide protests against racism and police brutality after the May 25 death of unarmed Afri can-American man George Floyd in Minneapolis at the

Bolivia delays election until October

LA PAZ: Bolivia postponed its general elections for a second time because of the coronavirus pandemic, putting it off until October 18, officials said.

The poll was originally supposed to be held in May but had been rescheduled to September 6 after the country went into lockdown following the virus outbreak.

The latest postponement comes just two weeks after interim president Jeanine Anez tested positive for the COVID-19. Four cabinet members have also contracted the virus.

Salvador Romero, who heads the country's electoral court, said the decision to delay the elections again came after medical experts warned that COV-ID-19 infections would peak in Bolivia in late August or early September. – **APP**

Millions of children affected by flooding in South Asia: UNICEF

"Immediate support, more resources and innovative programmes are urgently needed to address the challenges that these threats represent to the region's children" the spread of disease, food

ISLAMABAD: Millions of children affected by devastating flooding in South Asia, with many more at risk as COVID-19 brings further challenges.

Weeks of torrential monsoon rains, widespread flooding and deadly landslides in Bangladesh, Bhutan, India and Nepal affected millions of children and families, UNICEF said.

Over 4 million children are currently estimated to be impacted and in urgent need of life-saving support, risk, a Press release said.

"Even for a region that is all-too-familiar with the devastating impact of extreme weather, the recent heavy monsoon rains, rising floods and continued landslides are creating a perfect storm for children and families affected," said Jean Gough, UNICEF Regional Director for South Asia

"The COVID-19 pandemic and containment and prevention measures add an additional complication to the

US admits to 'intercepting' Iranian plane

WASHINGTON: The US Central Command has claimed responsibility for engaging with an Iranian passenger plane in Syrian airspace. Iranian officials have threatened to take legal and political action over the incident. US Central Command on Thursday confirmed that one of its warplanes had intercepted an Iranian passenger plane in Syrian airspace.

The F-15 "conducted a standard visual inspection of a Mahan Air passenger airliner at a safe distance of about 1,000 meters (3,280 feet) from the airliner this evening," said Captain Bill Urban, a senior spokesman for US Central Command. "The professional intercept was conducted in accord-

ance with international standards," Urban added. During the interaction, the pilot of the Iranian passenger plane conducted a safety maneuver and dropped the aircraft several hundred feet before stabilizing its altitude. As a result of the maneuver, several passengers received minor injuries, according to Iranian state media. US officials said the F-15 had maintained about 1,000 meters distance between the aircraft.

"The visual inspection occurred to ensure the safety of coalition personnel at At Tanf garrison," Urban said, referring to a strategic US ground presence in Syria. "Once the F-15 pilot identified the aircraft as a Mahan Air passenger plane, the F-15 safely opened distance from the aircraft." - DNA

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump announced Thursday that he was scrapping next month's Republican Party nominating convention in Jacksonville, Florida, because of the coronavirus outbreak.

Trump, speaking at a White House press conference, said it was not the right time to do a "big, crowded convention.

"The timing for this event is not right, it's just not right with what's happened recently," he said.

The convention had been scheduled to be held in Tacksonville from August 24-27. Florida has recently experienced a surge in COVID-19 cases, which topped four million in the United States on Thursday. - APP

Global stocks tumble as US-China tensions escalate

WEB DESK HONG KONG: Global stock

markets are sliding Friday as tensions between the United States and China reach new highs, and as more evidence emerges that the US economy is struggling to recover from the coronavirus pandemic. Markets in mainland China and Hong Kong tumbled into the close after Beijing ordered Washington to shut down its consulate in the city of Chengdu. That came days after US authorities forced the Chinese consulate in Houston to cease operations.

The Shanghai Composite Index (SHCOMP) closed down 3.9%, while Hong Kong's Hang Seng (HSI) was last down more than 2%.

Asian markets were already struggling to start the day. Momentum on Wall Street has fizzled out as investors digest what is expected to be one of the worst earnings

seasons in history. And the US Department of Labor on Thursday reported an increase in first-time claims for unemployment benefits for the first time in 16 weeks. Adding to the fears: Airline traffic is once again falling, restaurant reservations are slip ping and movie theaters remain shut.

European stocks fell sharply in early trading Friday, following the poor showing in Asia and Wall Street's weak close. Germany's DAX (DAX) dropped more than 2%, while France's CAC 40 (CAC40) shed 2%. The FTSE 100 (UKX) in London was off 1.7%

Russia accused of testing anti-satellite weapon

WASHINGTON: The United States accused Russia on Friday of test-firing an anti-satellite weapon in space, warning that the threat against Washington's systems was "real, serious and increasing.

US Space Command "has evidence" that Moscow "conducted a non-destructive test of a space-based anti-satellite weapon" on July 15, it said in a statement. "Last week's test is another example that the threats to US and Allied space systems are real, serious and increasing," the statement continued.

"Clearly this is unacceptable," tweeted US nuclear disarmament negotiator Marshall Billingslea, adding that it would be a "major issue" discussed next week in Vienna, where he is in talks on a successor to the New START treaty.

The treaty caps the nuclear warheads of the US and Russia - the two Cold Warera superpowers.

On Thursday, President Donald Trump told his Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin that he hopes to avoid an "expensive" arms race with Russia and China The system used to conduct last week's test is the same one that Space Command raised concerns about earlier this year when it maneuvered near a US government satellite, said General Jay Raymond, head of US Space Command. - APP

Turkey: Friday prayers in Hagia Sophia for first time in 86 years

Turkish president joins hundreds of worshippers after iconic Istanbul landmark's controversial reconversion into mosque

ISTANBUL: The iconic Hagia Sophia in Istanbul has opened for Muslim prayers for the first time in 86 years after its reconversion into a mosque earlier this month. President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on July 10 controversially declared the nearly 1,500-year-old monument open to Muslim worship after a top court ruled the building's conversion to a museum by modern Turkey's founding statesman in the mid-1930s was illegal.

The UNESCO World Heritage Site was built as a cathedral during the reign of Byzantine emperor Justinian I in 537 but converted into a mosque after the Ottoman conquest of Constantinople in 1453.It was designated a museum in a key reform of the post-Ottoman authorities under the modern republic's founder Mustafa Kemal Ataturk. Erdogan, who joined hundreds of worshippers inside Hagia Sophia on Friday, said last year it had been a "very big mistake" to convert it into a museum.Critics however accuse Erdogan, who has been in power for 17 years, of playing to his nationalistic base, with sup-



port eroding amid a global economic downtown caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

Towering over Istanbul's skyline, its breathtaking domes seemingly afloat, it is also one of Turkey's most popular tourist attractions, with 3.7 million visitors in 2019. Intricate mosaics of the Virgin Mary, baby Jesus and other Christian symbols will be veiled by curtains at prayer time.

In the sprawling square outside, separate areas will be set up for men and women to worship, according to the Anadolu state news agency. Koseoglu said Erdogan was expected to deliver a short speech after the prayer.

"This is a very historical moment for Turkey, especially the conservatives pro-Islamist electorate who have [long wanted] to pray inside.

On Friday, most roads to the venue will be blocked and public transport curtailed. Istanbul Governor Ali Yerlikaya asked for people to bring four items - "masks. prayer mats, patience and understanding".

Some 736 health personnel, 101 ambulances and a helicopter ambulance will also be available.

China steps up testing in major port city

BEIJING: A Chinese city of nearly six million people will introduce a wave of coronavirus testing to stamp out a small cluster of cases, authorities said Friday, with state media reporting communities will be locked down.

Since the virus first surfaced in the central city of Wuhan late last year, the country's official number of infections has been restricted to a trickle, mainly among arrivals from abroad. All mass lockdowns have been lifted.

But recent domestic outbreaks have proved the difficulty of stamping out the contagion entirely.

The port city of Dalian in Liaoning province has reported three cases in recent days after going nearly four months without any.

The fresh outbreak has been linked to a seafood processing company that deals with imported products.

On Friday, the Dalian health commission said the city had to "quickly enter wartime mode, go all-out, mobilise all people and resolutely curb the spread of the epidemic". - APP



"Our foundation has given more money to buy vaccines to save lives than any group," Gates said, referring to his epony-

US arrests three Chinese over visa fraud

SAN FRANCISCO: The US has charged four Chinese nationals with visa fraud for allegedly lying about their membership of China's armed forces

Three are under arrest while the FBI is seeking to arrest the fourth, who is said to be in China's San Francisco consulate. FBI agents have also interviewed people in 25 US cities who have an "undeclared affiliation" with China's military. Prosecutors say it is part of a Chinese plan to send army scientists to the US.

Members of the People's Liberation Army (PLA) applied for research visas while hiding their "true affiliation" with the military, US justice department attorney John C Demers said in a press release.

"This is another part of the Chinese Communist Party's plan to take advantage of our open society and exploit academic institutions." The arrests come after the US announced a Chinese scientist had taken shelter in the San Francisco consulate, and the day after US officials ordered the closure of China's mission in Houston, saying it was involved in stealing intellectual property. – DNA

EU calls on US to lift tariffs 'immediately'

BRUSSELS: The European Union has called on the United States to lift tariffs imposed in a long-running dispute over aircraft subsidies after Airbus said it had brought itself into compliance with the World Trade Organization rulings.

Airbus said on Friday it had reached an agreement with the French and Spanish governments that raises the interest rates on funds provided to help develop its long-haul A350 jet to levels the WTO considers appropriate.

The European Commission said this removes any grounds for the US to maintain tariffs imposed on EU exports under WTO rulings as well as making a strong case for a rapid settlement of the dispute.

"Unjustified tariffs on European products are not acceptable and, arising from the compliance in the Airbus case, we insist that the United States lifts these unjustified tariffs immediately," Phil Hogan, the EU trade commissioner, said in a statement.A legal battle between Airbus and

Boeing at the WTO began in 2004 when Washington accused the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Spain of providing illegal subsidies and grants to support the production of a range of Airbus products.

A year later, the EU alleged that Boeing had received \$19.1bn worth of prohibited subsidies from 1989 to 2006 from various branches of the US government.

tural and construction sector. Every year, construction activities are becoming more widespread in Uzbekistan. The process of urbanization in the regions is in progress. Construction work is also underway in rural areas.

This requires improving industry standards, ensuring transparency and developing mortgage market based on new requirements. About 40 Presidential acts on these issues have been adopted over the past three years.

As a consistent continuation of this work, the Presidential Decree of March 13, 2020 identified measures to further deepen reforms in the construction sector, eliminate bureaucratic barriers, enapply innovative developments and advanced information technologies.

The Ministry of Construction is tasked with updating 60 out of 337 urban planning rules and regulations this year. At the beginning of the year, the Ministry organized a Center for Technical Regulation in Construction, which attracted 15 qualified specialists. Currently, 33 new norms and rules of urban development have been developed.

At the meeting, an instruction was given to attract a foreign company with advanced experience to accelerate work in this direction.

The President criticized the corruption and "shadow economy" in the sphere and noted the need for digitalizing the process of conducting tenders for construction and selecting contractors. There are 32 thousand construction

organizations operating in the country.

The Malaysian Civil Aviation Authority had written to Pakistan after the matter of fake licenses of pilots in the country was raised.

It wanted Pakistan to check the credibility of the licences of the pilots working in Malaysia. After it was confirmed that the licences were credible, the country reinstated all the pilots grounded there.

Airlines in 10 countries had demanded proof of valid flying licences for their Pakistani pilots after it emerged that about a third of Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) aviators were holding "bogus or suspicious" licences. The announcement came a month after a PIA plane crashed into houses in Kara-

LAHORE: Punjab reported 294 new cases of the novel coronavirus in the last 24 hours, taking the province's total number of confirmed infections to 91,423.

According to the Primary and Secondary Healthcare Department, five more people died from the virus during the period, due to which the death toll in the province rose to 2,105. As many as 68,349 patients have recovered while overall 678,010 tests have been conducted so far.

According to a district-wise breakdown of fresh coronavirus cases, Lahore reported 100 cases, six in Sheikhupura, 12 in Rawalpindi, Jhelum 16, Attock 1, Chakwal, 1 and 17 cases were reported in Gujranwala. Seven new COV-ID-19 cases were reported in Sialkot, 2 in Narowal, 31 in Gujrat, 15 in Multan, 15 in Faisalabad, Toba Tek Singh 10 and 12 cases were reported in Rahim Yar Khan

According to the recent figures by the country's health department, Pakistan has 269,190 confirmed cases and it registered over 5,700 deaths across the country, the report added.

China orders US consulate closure in tit-for-tat move

BEIJING: China has ordered the closure of the US consulate in the south-western city of Chengdu, in a tit-for-tat escalation between the two countries. China said the move was a "necessary response" to the US, which ordered China to close its consulate in Houston earlier this week. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said the US decision was taken because China was "stealing" intellectual property. Tensions have been rising between the US and China over several key issues. President Donald Trump's administration has clashed repeatedly with Beijing over trade and the coronavirus pandemic, as well as China's imposition of a controversial new security law in Hong Kong.

China's move came hours after Mr Pompeo hardened his tone further in a speech on Thursday at the library of former President Richard Nixon, whose 1972 China visit heralded a period of improved relations. "Today, China is increasingly authoritarian at home, and more aggressive in its hostility to freedom everywhere else," Mr Pompeo said."The free world must triumph over this new tyranny." China's foreign ministry said the closure was a "legitimate and necessary response to the unreasonable actions taken by the United States". "The current situation between China and the United States is something China does not want to see, and the US bears all responsibility for that." China gave the US till Monday to close the consulate in Chengdu, according to the editor of China's Global Times. - DNA

Pakistanis oppose ban on Chinese video Tik Tok'

ISLAMA-BAD: A vast the Pakistanis are against any restric-

tion or ban Tik Tok on Chinese video social media giant Til-Tok which they enjoy on a daily basis, says a report published by Gwadar Pro on Friday. Pakistan's telecommunications regulator earlier banned video streaming platform Bigo and issued a final notice to TikTok over concerns that they are

encouraging "immoral, obscene and vulgar content". The Pakistan Telecommunications Authority (PTA) said that it had earlier raised the allegations with both companies and had received responses that were "not satisfactory".

"Therefore, PTA has decided to immediately block Bigo and issue final warning to TikTok to put in place a comprehensive mechanism to control obscenity, vulgarity and immorality through its social media application", said a government statement.

But Pakistanis who are fans of the Tik Tok maintain the government should not follow India who banned it. "We are friends of China. We should not ban Tik Tok," said Mohammed Ismail, a university student who was among many interviewed on the issue.

He said Tik Tok was a great way of spending time and the government should not make allegations against it. Arif Khan, a government employee said he spent his leisure time using Tik Tok. "I am shocked with the news. PTA should think twice before acting against

Restructuring PIA, not privatising it: Ghulam Sarwar

ISLAMABAD: Aviation Minister Ghulam Sarwar Khan says the government is looking to take action against PIA pilots with fake licences and restructure the airline. "We are not going to privatise PIA, but restructure it," he said while addressing the Senate session Friday. He said Pakistan had sent the licences of 176 PIA pilots working internationally, of whom 10 had licences suspected to be fake.

He accused the former governments of recruiting employees in the Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) on dubious and fake degrees. The minister said that the European Union and the United Kingdom had

imposed ban on PIA for six months and added that the national flag carrier can challenge the ban in two months. In the past, PIA employees have been hired through nepotism, but we want to ensure transparency and appointments on merit, he added. The minister said he wasn't blaming anyone but only working to avoid any mishaps in future. "We've had four plane crashed in the last few months. We are not pointing fin-

gers...just inquiring into matters," he said. "The inquiry we conducted found that 28 of 260 PIA pilots had fake licences and they were later canceled." He told the house that 17 pilots and 96 technical stall had been dismissed from service over possession dubious degrees.
