Govt offers relief to industries

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Imran Khan on Tuesday announced a package under which small and medium enterprises as well as the industrial sector in general will be able to benefit from reduced energy costs. The prime minister said that starting November 1, the additional electricity used by SMEs up to June 30, 2021, will be sold at 50% lower the cost. "So whatever amount of electricity they use in addition to the level that they used last November, it will cost [half] of what it did previously," he explained. "For example electricity that cost Rs16 per unit will now cost Rs8.

He said that these rates will then be revised beyond the aforementioned date. The prime minister also said that industries in general, even the large scale ones, will pay reduced electricity costs at all times, and the concept of "off-peak hours" will be redundant. "It will be as if its all off-peak hours."

He said that after the coronavirus lockdown period, record-high cement sales have been recorded, as well as high levels of automobile sales. "Our construction industry is

also booming." The prime minister lamented that the service industry was severely impacted during the lockdown period and it was now imperative that our industrial sector be propped up and perform well.

ISLAMABAD: In view of the growing number of COVID-19 cases, the federal government has called a meeting of all provincial education ministers on Thursday, November 5, to discuss the possibility of school closures and winter vacations. According to sources, the Minister for Education Shafqat Mahmood will preside over the meeting, while ministers from all the four provinces, along with representatives from Azad Kashmir and Gilgit-Baltistan (G-B), will be in attendance.

With a continuous rise in the number of coronavirus cases across Pakistan, parents have become increasingly concerned about sending their children to school. Sources said the ministers will review the situation in educational institutes and take the next steps accordingly.

Stocks record highest surge in 6 months

KARACHI: Pakistan stocks rebounded sharply on Tuesday, with the benchmark KSE 100 index gaining more than 1,300 points (3.5%) by the close of trading. "Shrugging off concerns of rising COVID cases, the market recovered sharply today from yesterday's sell-off to close the day at 1,368.70 level (up 3.50%),' Topline Securities analyst Haris Khan said in a note.

"This was the highest single day increase for the past six months," he reported. "A lower than expected CPI [inflation] announcement also buoyed sentiment at the bourse." "Towards the end of the session, PM Imran Khan made an announcement of reduction in electricity tariff on additional consumption, which also provided further impetus," he added.

Rickshaws, cabs' ban on BRT route

PESHAWAR: The Peshawar High Court (PHC) on Tuesday heard petition of a rickshaw driver against ban on plying rickshaws and cabs along the BRT route.

A bench of the high court (PHC) consisting of Justice Qaiser Rashid Khan and Justice Nasir Mahfooz summoned CEO of the TransPeshawar company and D.G. Peshawar Development Authority (PDA) in the hearing of the case on Wednesday.

Justice Qaiser Rashid in his remarks said that Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) buses come to halt due to some falt after few days. "Every person not owns a vehicle," the judge said. Justice Rashid also questioned keeping the BRT buses under the open sky. TransPeshawar company's representative, who was present during the hearing, said that these buses could resist the weather's impact. "Will you keep the buses parked in the open sky if they are resistant to the weather's impact," the Judge asked the company's representative. "If these buses have been gifted to you or purchased with public tax money," Justice Qaiser Rashid retorted. The bench summoned CEO of the TransPeshawar and D.G. PDA in further hearing of the case on Wednesday. Earlier, the lawyer for the petitioner said that the government issued a notification restricting route permits for rickshaws and cabs and banning their plying on the BRT route. He said the BRT route was spread over around 30 kilometers and passed through all main areas of the provincial capital. The lawyer said rickshaws or cabs were mostly used by patients, elderly people and students, so banning them on main roads would cause inconvenience to commuters.

'Govt providing relief through Sahulat Bazars'

LAHORE: Punjab Health Minister Dr. Yasmin Rashid has said that provincial government is providing relief to public through Sahulat Bazars. As per details, Yasmin Rashid chaired meeting of Price Control Committee to review government action against profiteers and hoarders. Concerned district officials briefed the meeting about arrangements of 31 Sahulat Bazars. During the meeting, provincial health minister said that essential commodities including flour and sugar are available in ample quantity in government established markets. She further said that arrangements of Sahulat Bazars are being monitored daily by government.

Bailable arrest warrant against Safdar issued

LAHORE: Local court in Lahore on Tuesday has issued a bailable arrest warrant against Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) leader Captain (r) Safdar in a case pertaining to clash outside the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) Lahore office on the appearance of party vice president Maryam Nawaz. According to details, the court conducted hearing on a plea submitted by police officers against PML-N leaders at Islampura police station. It is to be mentioned here that Anti-Terrorism Court (ATC) had already confirmed interim bail of 30 suspects including PML-N senior leaders Rana Sanaullah and Captain (r) Safdar. In September 2020, a clash erupted between outraged PML-N workers and police as Maryam Nawaz reached the NAB office in a case pertaining to illegal transfer of 180 acres of land in Raiwind.

PML-N workers - who accompanied Maryam Nawaz from Jati Umrah to the NAB office in a convoy - pelted stones at police officials and tried to break the barriers outside the anti-corruption watchdog's office. In retaliation, the police resorting to aerial firing, shelling and baton charge to disperse the infuriated crowd. Several protesters including women were arrested. - APP

Lahore Chamber seeks FBR help over taxation issues

LCCI President said that FBR has started imposing heavy fines on retailers/chain stores on non-implementation of POS system. The government must take the private sector into confidence before taking such measures

LAHORE: The Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry (LCCI) Tuesday called for an early resolution of tax related issues. In a letter sent to Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) Chairman Muhammad Javaid Ghani, LCCI President Mian Tariq Misbah said that there are a number of taxation issues which are hitting the economy hard therefore these issues should be tackled on priority. He said that FBR has started imposing heavy fines on retailers/chain stores on non-implementation of POS system. The government must take the private sector into confidence before taking such measures and address their apprehensions. LCCI Senior Vice President Nasir Hameed Khan, Vice President Tahir Manzoor Chaudhry and Executive Committee expressed their

deep concern over these issues

take up these issues with FBR for an early resolution.

Mian Tariq said that in the post-Covid economic scenario when the taxpayers are facing severe liquidity issues, the number of Audits should be decreased considerably. The FBR should follow the policy of only risk-based audits. He added that business community is facing a lot of issues regarding the CNIC condition. The condition of disclosing CNIC for sale to unregistered persons should be abolished in the larger interest of small businesses in the country in this difficult time.

He said taxation system should be made simpler in such a way so that no harassment is created by the tax officials among the businesses. FBR has granted special tax exemptions to the manufacturers based in Free Zones like Federal/ and asked the LCCI President to Provincial Administered Tribal

Areas (FATA/PATA) and others. These exemptions should only be provided to the export oriented industries as they affect the competitiveness of industries located in other parts of the country. The stakeholders should also be taken into confidence in this regard.

While talking about the rate of duties for commercial importers and industry, he said that the rate of duties for both must be same so that any misuse of raw materials imported for Industry can be discouraged. Moreover, the government must eliminate the regulatory duties on those raw materials which are not manufactured locally. In this regard, the SRO culture should not be misused. Due to the carriers, the genuine importers who are importing through legal process are facing immense difficulties. This matter needs immediate attention. Mian Tariq

Misbah said that duties on raw materials of pharmaceutical industry should be reduced in order to enhance its competitiveness in both local and international markets. Molded glass vials are a very important raw material of the pharmaceutical industry which is not being manufactured locally but still facing a high rate of Regulatory Duty. This anomaly needs to be rectified.

Mian Tariq Misbah stressed upon the FBR that the pending Sales Tax and Income Tax Refunds should be cleared immediately. To facilitate the businesses, the self-assessment scheme should be again introduced so that the inspector's regime can be abolished. He added that the Withholding Tax is being deducted on different stages from the commercial importers. This amount is refundable but is not being paid back to the

commercial importers. He urged the FBR to clear the refunds of the commercial importers at the earliest. The commercial importers pay their Withholding Tax at the import stage which has been converted into Minimum Tax. He requested the FBR to restore the Final Tax Regime for the commercial importers. In order to bring down the food inflation, President LCCI suggested the duties on agriculture inputs including pesticides and agro-chemicals should be reduced. He said that the import duty on used mobiles is very high and needs to be reduced to facilitate the general public. The Lahore Directorate of Valuation should be empowered like Karachi Office to hold meet ings of valuation committees since a heavy percentage of importers are from Lahore and up-country areas. - APP

Yasir Gillani said the step was taken to cope with environmental challenges, adding that the PHA would enhance the number of urban forest in the city. He elaborated that the PHA had planted around 35 types of plants, including Java Plum, Mango, 0Bauhinia tree (Kachnar), white and black mulberry, bamboo tree. He was of the view that trees and plants were vital for life. PHA Director Jawad Qureshi said Mivawaki forest was very effective to reduce smoke from air, adding that around 52 more forest would also be established in various parts of the provincial capital to enhance beauty of the city. PRA makes record revenue

LAHORE: The Punjab Revenue Authority (PRA) has collected an unprecendited revenue of Rs.9.4 billion in the last month. The revenue collection during the same month in 2019 was Rs.7.6 billion which was an increase of 24 per cent. The PRA spokesperson men-

tioned here Tuesday that during the period of July-Oct this year PRA witnessed a revenue collection of Rs 35.46 billion showing a growth of 9.74% per cent over the same period last year which stood at Rs 32.29 billion. She added that this growth in revenue collection in the current year had been achieved admist the negative impact of Covid-19 on the economy. She said the Punjab Revenue Authority had achieved this by creating awareness and ensuring compliance through tax payer involvement and education. The spokesperson said the government of Punjab during FY 2019-20 last quarter reduced the rate of tax for over 20 services from 16 per cent to 5 per cent.

S elections for Gilgit-Baltistan approach, the ruling party has ramped up its campaigning efforts to secure a victory that was seized last time by the federal government of the PML-N and before that the PPP, showing that the party at the center has a better chance of winning in the region. GB has been largely neglected by Pakistan since partition in 1947. The people of GB have had pro-Pakistani statements since the Gilgit rebellion during the First Kashmir war in 1948, wanting to be merged into the country as a fifth province. This proposal was rejected by Pakistan on the basis that any such move would compromise its chances at the United Nations (UN) for a larger chunk of disputed Kashmir.

This slow progression over the status of GB in Pakistan has led to the region being deprived of its basic democratic rights. The region has been run for the most part as an agency, getting its first functioning court in 2005 and a legislative assembly in 2009, granting the region self-rule. Opposition parties, especially the PML-N, are claiming that the PTI is violating election rules by announcing development projects in GB, but what it is conveniently forgetting is that their victory in the previous elections was on the back of China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), that has resulted in perhaps the most consequential infrastructure upgrade in the region. The PTI is perhaps also facing some pressure from Chinese to clear up the mess that India has started to create over GB by upgrading its status to a province so that China's investment is relatively more secure. A win for PTI in the upcoming election followed by GB somehow becoming a fifth province would automatically increase its seats in parliament. The creation of a fifth province will of course require a constitutional amendment for which the PTI will need a clear two-thirds majority that it simply does not have. With a non-existent relationship with the opposition, this will be a near impossible task for the ruling party. The motivation therefore, to grant GB provisional provincial status has little to do with the uplift of an aborted part of the country and more to do with solidifying political power.

Disturbing discourse

NCE again, India and its hysterical media seems to have led to the setting of political discourse in Pakistan. This time an admittedly irresponsible statement, regarding Indian Wing Commander Abhinandan, by former NA speaker Ayaz Sadiq was picked up by the Indian media and twisted and distorted and amped up in its usual manner. As an experienced politician, there is no doubt that Ayaz Sadiq should have been more cautious in the language he chose to use for his remarks, which in the first place seemed rather pointless in any case. An issue that has long been done and dusted being dredged up makes little sense.

That said, both the PML-N and Ayaz Sadiq himself have said that this was a personal statement and not the party line. They have also said that the Indian media has played its usual gimmicks and given different twists to the statement, essentially making it sound worse than it was. And, while the statement was unnecessary, the calls for treason cases and labels of disloyalty being handed down to Ayaz Sadiq are hardly mature or in any way helpful. In fact, with posters likening him to Abhinandan and with ministers openly linking opposition members with India and Israel, the situation has become much more disturbing than it ought to have been. We repeat, as we have before, that this unfortunate tradition of handing out loyalty and disloyalty certificates to politicians has to end. If it's one party on the receiving end one day, it can easily be another party another day.

This unfortunate situation has also come to pass in such a glaring manner due to the extreme polarisation we see in Pakistani politics these days. The way the ruling party and opposition parties are having a go at each other almost at every forum has now resulted in discourse descending to a level where saying this is 'political point-scoring' would be an extreme understatement. A word of caution: if every Pakistani government starts taking the hysterical and rabble-rousing Indian media seriously, we will lose whatever sanity (if any) is left in the political sphere. It's time for everyone to step back, take a deep breath and seriously rethink which way politics is headed.

Lockdown 2.0: Europe enters a long, uncertain winter

FTER a summer of hope, Europe looks set for a tragic winter. The dream of keeping the pandemic in check with limited sacrifices is gone. Governments are readying themselves for a new round of tough containment measures. England faces a month of nationwide lockdown restrictions from Thursday after Boris Johnson detailed new plans in a bid to combat coronavirus. Pubs, restaurants, gyms and non-essential shops will close, but schools, colleges and universities can stay open.

Ireland paved the way a week and a half ago, imposing a national lockdown while keeping schools and essential stores open. France has similarly ordered a shutdown, just a few months after president Emmanuel Macron categorically ruled one out. In Germany, chancellor Angela Merkel has spearheaded a partial lockdown for the month of November, one that will put a stop to leisure activities. Italy has imposed a 6pm curfew for bars and restaurants but could opt for more draconian rules.

As new curbs on personal freedom loom, it's worth asking: Are Europeansgoing to accept them as they did during the first wave of the virus? From Italy to Spain, many are already taking to the streets to protest the impact of restrictions on their financial security. Politicians must find ways to address their concerns or risk a collapse of social cohesion.

As I argued in August, more lockdowns were never off the table. Although leaders vowed to tackle a second wave through

tracking, tracing and "smart," localised lockdowns, the rising number of deaths and hospitalisation is giving them no choice but to impose stricter measures. Even Sweden, which opted for a relatively light-touch strategy during the first wave, is now enforcing more restrictions, at least in some areas.

The current approach across Europe differs, however, from that taken during the spring. Governments appear desperate to keep open as much of their economies as possible, as they fear a spike in bankruptcies, unemployment and ever larger budget deficits. Spain and Italy are resisting the blanket bans on non-essential activities they had previously adopted. Politicians also want to keep schools open, even though this likely contributes to propagating contagion. Italy has reverted to distant learning for high school kids, but elsewhere on the continent we are not seeing the same widespread school closures we had in the first half of 2020.

Still, any lockdown is going to require collaboration from the population. Most European countries benefited from exceptional levels of compliance to stay-at-home orders in the spring. Now, as protests in cities such as Rome and Barcelona show, people's frustration and rage are growing. To some extent, this is the natural consequence of earlier policies. Generalised lockdowns were always an imperfect longterm containment strategy for the virus, as the economic shock hits citizens hard. It also hits the same people again and again, from waiters to ballet dancers.

But European governments have themselves to blame for this wave of discontent. During the spring, they could be excused for being caught off guard. This line of defence no longer holds. As Europeans continue to face shortages of tests and hospital beds, many are asking what exactly politicians did to prepare for the colder season. There is also anger that businesses were forced to invest in sanitisers and other health precautions only to then be shut down again. Policymakers should have been more honest about the long-term uncertainty linked to the pandemic, rather than raising expectations of a swift return to normality.

World's biggest pink diamond mine closes

SYDNEY: The world's large est pink diamond mine has shut its doors after exhausting its reserves of the expensive gems, global mining giant Rio Tinto said Tuesday. The Argyle mine, in the remote Kimberley region of Western Australia, churned out more than 90 percent of the world's pink diamonds - sought after for their incredible rarity. The seam was discovered in 1979 and the Anglo-Australian firm began mining operations there four years later. It has since produced more than 865 million carats of rough diamonds, including a small but steady stream of prized pink stones, according to Rio Tinto. Argyle employees and indigenous landowners attended a ceremony at the shuttered mine to mark the end of operations. The company expects efforts to decommission and dismantle the 37-yearold site will take around five years. "A new chapter will now begin as we start the process of respectfully closing the Argyle mine and rehabilitating the land, to be handed back to its traditional custodians," mine manager Andrew Wilson said.

Over the past two decades, the value of pink diamonds has risen by 500 percent, Rio Tinto's Sinead Kaufman told public broadcaster ABC. The end of operations at Argyle is likely to push the price of the diamonds even higher, jewellers say. At current rates, the gems can fetch up to \$3 million per carat. Diamonds are typically clear, but jewels such as those mined at Argyle become pink through extreme heat and pressure during their creation. Those conditions warp their crystal lattices and alter the reflection of light as it passes through the body of the diamond.

Relations between Armenia and Azerbaijan have been tense since 1991 when the Armenian military occupied Upper Karabakh, or Nagorno-Karabakh, an internationally recognized territory of Azerbaijan, and seven adjacent regions. Four UN Security Council resolutions and two from

the UN General Assembly as well as international organizations demand the "immediate, complete and unconditional withdrawal of the occupying forces" from the occupied Azerbaijani territory.

About 20% of Azerbaijan's territory - including Nagorno-Karabakh and seven adjacent regions - has been under illegal Armenian occupation for nearly three decades. A cease-fire, however, was agreed to in 1994. World powers including Russia, France and the US have called for a sustainable cease-fire. Turkey, meanwhile, has supported Baku's right to self-defense and demanded the withdrawal of Armenia's occupying forces.

Argentina to buy 25 mln doses of Russian vaccine

BUENOS AIRES: Argentina could obtain 25 million doses of the Russian Covid-19 vaccine "Sputnik V" between December 2020 and January 2021, President Alberto Fernandez told Russian media. "They would be in a position to give us 10 million of each of the two doses (required). We can have them here in December, and in the first days of January we could have, they tell me, 15 million more doses," Fernandez said in an interview with Russian news

agency Sputnik. "By December we could begin vaccination," a development he described as "very important, because it would allow us to vaccinate vulnerable sectors in Argentina." Local media said the agreement with Russia was finalized after Argentine authorities visited Moscow.

The Sputnik V vaccine is being developed by Moscow's Gamaleya Research Institute and marketed by the Russian Direct Investment Fund (RDIF). - APP

LONDON: Seventy-two countries at the United Nations on Monday offered their "unwavering support" for the International Criminal Court (ICC) after Washington imposed sanctions on two of the court's key officials. "We reconfirm our unwavering support for the Court as an independent and impartial judicial Institution," read a joint declaration signed by countries that included Australia, Canada, the United Kingdom and France, the United States' traditional allies. The signatories, all from countries that signed the Rome Statute that established the ICC in 2002,

vowed "to preserve its be used against those reintegrity and independence undeterred by any measures or threats against the Court, its officials and those cooperating with it". Washington has refused to recognise the ICC, which is based in The Hague and was founded to try cases of genocide, war crimes and crimes against humanity. On September 2, the administration of US President Donald Trump took the unprecedented step of sanctioning chief ICC prosecutor Fatou Bensouda, along with another senior ICC official, Phakiso Mochochoko. The two are investigating alleged war crimes involving US troops in Afghanistan. The joint declaration said sanctions were "a tool to

Athens finally gets a mosque

ATHENS: The first mosque in the Greek capital, Athens, has opened after 14 years of wrangling and bureaucratic delays, local media reported. The mosque's inaugural prayers were held on Monday evening under physical distancing measures due to the rising number of COV-ID-19 cases in Greece, as in much of Europe. Only a handful of people were able to attend. With the opening, Athens shakes off its status as the only European Union capital to lack a mosque, Anadolu Agency reported.

The mosque's first imam is Zaki Mohammed, 49, a Greek citizen of Moroccan origin, Greek daily Ekathimerini said. The opening of the mosque "sends a clear message ... of democracy, religious freedom and respect," the government secretary for religious issues. Giorgos Kalantzis, was quoted by Kathimerini newspaper as saying. Opposition from the Greek Orthodox Church had delayed the opening of the mosque since 1979. It took years even after the government gave the go-ahead in 2006. The 2006 decision to build a mosque with a budget of \$1.04m was held up by bureaucratic hurdles, protests by far-right groups, and legal challenges. The vast majority of Greeks, 97 percent, are Orthodox Christians. However, there is a Muslim

minority concentrated along the land border with Turkey, and tens of thousands of Muslim workers and refugees live in the country. Turkey has long decried Greek violations of the rights of its Muslim and Turkish minority, from closing down mosques to letting historic mosques fall into disrepair. These measures violate the 1923 Treaty of Lausanne as well as European Court of Human Rights (ECHR) ver-

Ayda, the 107th survivor to be rescued, was taken to hospital for treatment.

The young survivor was seen to be conscious and looking at her surroundings when being transported to

Ege University Hospital. Speaking at a news conference, Environment and Urbanization Minister Murat Kurum said by all indications, Ayda's health is stable and good, a view echoed by the deputy health minister. Deputy Health Minister Muhammet Guven told reporters that Ayda remains conscious, healthy and is able to respond. He also confirmed that she displays no problems in her vital signs. He added that search and rescue efforts in four buildings continue while efforts in 13 buildings have been completed in the city, which is Turkey's third largest. On Twitter, Mehmet Gulluoglu, the head of Turkey's Disaster and Emergency Management Authority (AFAD), expressed happiness at the little girl's rescue. On Twitter, President Recep Tayyip Erdogan expressed happiness at the little girl's rescue and shared photos of her from the hospital.

GENEVA: The UN rights chief said Monday that indiscriminate attacks on civilian settlements amid fighting between Armenia and Azerbaijan over the disputed Nagorno-Karabakh region could amount to war crimes.

"The parties to the conflict are obliged to effectively, promptly, thoroughly and impartially investigate such violations and to prosecute those alleged to have committed them," said United Nations High Commissioner for

Human Rights Michelle Bachelet. Bachelet said the attacks carried out indiscriminately against densely populated areas in and around the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict zone are against international humanitarian law.

"International humanitarian law cannot be clearer," she added. Since clashes broke out on Sept. 27, Armenia has repeatedly attacked Azerbaijani civilians and forces, even violating three humanitarian cease-fire agreements since Oct. 10. To date, at least 91 civilians, including 11 children and 27 women, have been killed in Armenia's attacks.

ANKARA: The death toll from last week's powerful earthquake in Turand demanded the withdrawal of key's Aegean region now stands at 107, authorities said on Tuesday. Turkey is among the world's most seismically active zones, and has suffered devastating earthquakes in the past, including the 7.6-magnitude Marmara quake in 1999.

SL rescues 120 whales after mass stranding

'Critical moment' as Europe, N Africa see COVID-19 surge: WHO

YORK: Governments face another "critical moment for action' coronavirus cases surge in parts of Europe and North Africa, Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, the director-general of the World Health Organization (WHO), said in his latest briefing on the pandemic. Germany, France, Italy and the United Kingdom are among countries in Europe turning, once again,


to lockdowns to try and get the disease under control, while the health crisis in the United States is also deepening. Nearly 47 million people around the world have been diagnosed with the coronavirus around the world and 1.2 million people have died, according to data from Johns Hopkins University. In a briefing on Monday night, Ghebreyesus said leaders needed to "step un" while people had to "come together" to tackle the virus.

"We all have a role to play in suppressing transmission and we have seen across the world that it's possible," the WHO chief said. "In some countries, we're seeing cases go up exponentially and hospitals reach capacity, which poses a risk to patients and health workers alike. "We need countries to again invest in the basics so that measures can be lifted safely and governments can hopefully avoid having to take these measures again."

Ghebreyesus, who is himself in quarantine after a contact tested positive for COVID-19, stressed a "whole-of-government, whole-of-society proach" was necessary and urged governments to learn from each other to better tackle the

outbreak. "Public health is more than medicine and science and it is bigger than any individual," he said. There has been resistance to some coronavirus mitigation measures, such as mask-wear-

ing in some countries, particularly the United States, where President Donald Trump has sought to downplay the risk from the virus, but the renewed lockdowns in Europe have also triggered protests among people concerned about economic hardship. The WHO said Ghebreyesus, who said on Monday he was symptom-free and feeling well, had not been tested for the virus. He will continue to work from home.

Assembly secretariat closed over positive cases

ISLAMABAD: The National Assembly Secretariat has been closed for three days after five of the employees tested positive for the novel coronavirus.

Following the development, the scheduled meetings of the standing committees have also been called off, while all the offices in the NA secretariat have been shut down, sources said.

Furthermore, the employees have been directed not to come to the secretariat for their dues for three days, as the secretariat would be disinfected to ensure the safety of the staff.

On Monday, as many as 20 employees of the Senate Secretariat were also diagnosed with the coronavirus. Pakistan has reported 1,167 new infections and 14 more deaths due to novel coronavirus during the last 24 hours. The total count of COVID-19 deaths has reached up to 6,849, whereas, the tally of active cases reached up to 13,965 in Pakistan, according to the statistics of the National Command and Operation Centre (NCOC).

CAA issues list of seven tests equivalent to PCR

KARACHI: The Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) has modified its standard operating procedures (SOPs) for international passengers and flights in light of instructions given by health authorities which declared seven laboratory tests equivalent to PCR-based test of COVID-19.

aviation authority stated in its notification obtained by a private channel that seven tests will be considered as equivalent to PCR testing for detection of COVID-19. It read the updated version of SOPs related to international passengers, chartered and private aircraft flights. Passengers holding negative reports of any of the seven tests will be considered as fulfilling the requirements of RT-PCR testing in accordance with

the defined regulations. The seven tests are listed below: Real Time RT-PCR for Covid-19, Real Time RT-PCR for SARS-Cov-2, RT-PCR for COVID-19, RT-PCR for SARS-Cov-2, PCR for COV-ID-19, PCR for SARS-Cov-2, Xpert Xpress SARS-Cov-2 or SARS-Cov-2 GeneXpert. The new version of SOPs was sent to airlines, operators, ground handling agents, authorized flights permission agents and directed to inform passengers who are willing to travel to Pakistan.

Punjab sees highest singleday surge

LAHORE: Punjab on Tuesday reported as many as 340 new cases of the coronavirus, which is the highest single-day surge since July 21. The number of confirmed infections thus far reported across the province has risen to 104,894. According to the Primary and Secondary Health Department, seven more people died due to the coronavirus, lifting the death toll from the disease in the province to 2,372.

Of the total fresh cases, 148 surfaced in Lahore, followed by Rawalpindi reporting 59 cases, Multan 48, and Gujrat 20. The number of people recovering from the disease stands at 97,498. On November 2, provincial authorities had sealed several areas in a move under the micro-smart lockdown.

The Punjab government has sealed 830 places across the province after spike in COV-ID-19 cases, officials said. In these areas 1416 cases of novel coronavirus were reported. The micro-smart lockdown has been imposed in 435 spots in Lahore, which is maximum number of areas sealed in the province, sources said. Micro-smart lockdown clamped in 37 hotspots in Bahawalpur, 35 places in Bhakkar, 17 spots in Dera Ghazi Khan, 34 places in Faisalabad and 14 spots in Guiranwala district.

Munir Akram urges to assist covidhit countries

1167 cases, 14 deaths reported

Fourteen corona patients, 12 of whom were under treatment died in hospital and two died out of hospital on Monday, according to the latest update issued by the NCOC.

No COVID-19 affected person was on ventilator in Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) and Balochistan, while 129 ventilators elsewhere in the country, out of 1,884 allocated for COVID-19 patients, were occupied. Around 315,446 people have recovered from the disease so far across the country making it a significant recovery ratio of the affected patients. - APP
