RAWALPINDI: Chief of Army Staff (COAS) General Qamar Javed Bajwa on Thursday met the Afghan ambassador Najibullah Alikhil to discuss defence and security cooperation, among other issues. "The army chief welcomed the Afghanistan ambassador and expressed the hope that his services will help optimize Pakistan- Afghanistan bilateral relations," said a statement by the ISPR.

"Regional security situation, the ongoing Afghan Peace Process, border management and defence and security cooperation were discussed [during the meeting as well],"

read the ISPR statement. Separately, the army chief and Azad Kash-

mir Prime Minister Raja Farooq Haider also met to discuss the situation along the Line of Control (LoC) and in the Indian occupied Kashmir.

It may be mentioned here that the Afghan ambassador has recently arrived in Pakistan. He presented his credentials last week.

The previous Afghan ambassador Atif Mashal had left Pakistan few months ago after completing his term. During his term he tried to promote bilateral ties. However due to COVID situation he could not do more. The new ambassador is likely to pick of threads from where his predecessor left.

"Whenever the government takes notice of a commodity, its prices shoot up," she said.

KARACHI: Former Chairman Standing Committee on Agriculture of the Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry, Ahmad Jawad on Thursday asked the government to prioritise agriculture sector in its economic planning to avert shortages of essential goods. We have been experimenting with different ideas like rapid industrialization and private sector investments in the services sector in an attempt to give the economy a boost, and for it to function beyond the sphere of agricultural influence, however, the situation remained economically precarious. "We have to understand that it is only a preponderate agriculture sector that would guarantee a prosperous future for country". Food security and to increase yields have been the top priorities for all developed countries. They have been exploring new avenues to achieve their targets of food self-sufficiency. Whereas we are still banking upon the primitive and antiquated ways of research at NARC and PARC. The budget allocation for the agriculture sector had been slashed by 48 per cent in the current fiscal.

Farman takes notice of harassment

Govt urged to take action on health levy bill

This amount can take care of over one third of the total health burden being borne by Pakistan

ISLAMABAD: In the wake of current Covid 19 pandemic, poverty is on the rise in low and middle income countries, especially Pakistan. The current financial crunch has dented the economic prosperity in these countries. Azhar Saleem, CEO Human Development Foundation (HDF) stated that effective strategy for generating revenues from multiple sources can be a win for the government. One of these sources is the Health Levy Bill on cigarettes and sugary drinks. If the government implements this bill, it can open up a new avenue for revenues generation.

The Health Levy Bill was approved by the Cabinet of Pakistan in 2019 and forwarded to Federal Board of Revenue and relevant departments for further processing. In this bill, a surcharge of Rs. 10 was proposed on a pack of 20 cigarettes and Rs 1 per 250 ml of sugary drinks. As a result, up to Rs. 50 to 55 billion could be generated. This amount can take care of over one third of the total

health burden being borne by Pakistan. A representative of Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, Malik Imran, stated that last

year the federal cabinet had approved the health levy on cigarettes and sugary beverages. 'However, it could not be included in the finance bills of last year and the current year. As per our calculations, the exchequer has faced a loss of at least Rs40 billion from July 2019 to June 2020, he said.

Mr. Imran said that one of the partners had contacted the federal ombudsman for the implementation of the decision of the federal cabinet but during a hearing held on Oct 27 the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) claimed that it had no objection over the health levy and cited the cause for no implementation a delay on part of the Ministry of National Health Services (NHS) in providing the draft bill. The Ministry of Health will be presenting its explanation at a next hearing with Federal Ombudsman.

Anti-tobacco activists urged the government to take serious notice of the delay in implementation of health levy bill. This revenue can be channelized for mitigating the overall health burden as well as the wellbeing of youth and nutrition of undernourished children. This way the economic burden can be reduced and a healthy society, free of tobacco addiction, be ensured.



President for collective efforts to curb drug use

He emphasised the role of media in creating awareness about the consequences of drug usage. He said that law enforcement agencies are playing an active role in dealing with the issue, yet there is a need for direct engagement with the youth

ISLAMABAD: President of Pakistan Dr. Arif Alvi has stressed the need for collective efforts to root out the growing menace of drug addiction in university campuses, and to extend all-out facilitation to differently-abled students. He was addressing on Thursday an online meeting with the Vice Chancellors of all public and private sector universities on issues regarding differently-abled students as well as drug addiction. The meeting was also attended by Federal Minister for Education Shafqat Mahmood, Federal Minister for Narcotics Control Mr. Muhammad Azam Khan Swati, Federal Minister for Human Rights Dr. Shireen M. Mazari, Chairman HEC Tariq Banuri, and Director General Anti-Narcotics Force Major General Muhammad Arif Malik. During the first session on proliferation of drug use on campuses, the meeting deliberated on measures to curtail drug use through student counselling services, creation of a hotline, formation of a whistler-blower mechanism, penalization of elements involved in use and supply of drugs, constitution of parent-teacher coordination bodies, student counselling, creation of a hotline, and coordination with rehabilitation facilities. Steps necessary for supply reduction, demand reduction, progress review,



and de-stigmitization of institutions were also brought under consideration.

Mr. Azam Swati briefed the meeting about various initiatives for drug control taken by his Ministry, and the Ministry's desire to work in close coordination with the universities to curb this increasing menace. He suggested a number of steps to be taken and implemented by the universities.

It was decided that all the relevant stakeholders will coordinate and come up with a concrete policy on curtailing use of drugs on campuses, latest by March. The President directed HEC to develop appropriate policy guidelines, in consultation with all the stakeholders, to support universities

address this issue in an effective manner. Dr. Alvi stressed that universities must take every step necessary to make their campuses safe from drugs. "This is not only a moral imperative. Universities have a legal responsibility to implement all relevant national laws." He noted that environment of many universities around the world is threatened today by the proliferation of drugs.

He emphasised the role of media in creating awareness about the consequences of drug usage. He said that law enforcement agencies are playing an active role in dealing with the issue, yet there is a need for direct engagement with the youth. He informed that the Ministry of Health has been tasked

to develop a broader helpline to deal with health-related issues, particularly illicit use of drugs. He said that the academia must utilize the services of psychologists and psychiatrists, social workers, and non-government organizations in issues pertaining to drug usage. Vice Chancellors of Punjab University, Peshawar University, Haripur University, BUITEMS Quetta and SZABIST Karachi along with others shared how they are dealing with this challenge at present and gave suggestions to strengthen these efforts with coordination of all the stakeholders.

During the second session on differently abled students, the participants pondered upon measures to bring such students to mainstream and facilitate them in every possible manner. Different suggestions by participants included age relaxation for differently-abled students, wheelchair friendly buildings, scholarship and fee waivers, and special transport facility within campuses. Minister Dr. Mazari informed the gathering that ICT Rights of Persons with Disability Act 2020 has already been passed. She said it extends to the whole of ICT territory and so is also binding on universities in this area. She added that other provinces may adopt this Act through passage of resolution from the respective constituent assemblies. She asked HEC to review its existing policy for differently abled students in light of this Act.

held following directions of Inspector General of Police (IGP) Islamabad Muhammad Aamir Zulfigar khan and Deputy Inspector General of Police (Operations) Waqar Uddin Syed and was attended by Sub-Divisional Police Officers (SDPOs) and Station House Officers (SHOs) of police stations falling in Saddar Zone.

The SP Sarfaraz Ahmed Virk directed all police officials to launch crackdown against proclaimed offenders and constitute special teams for arrest of proclaimed offenders and court absconders

as well. It was directed to ensure proper security arrangements at religious or worship places and to review the prevailing security arrangements there for further improvement. The police officials were directed to complete investigation of all pending cases registered before June 30, 2020. For enhanced security measures in the Saddar Zone, police officials were asked to revise patrolling plan in order to prevent street crime.

It was directed deploy policemen at markets and other business areas to avoid snatching incidents. The checking at police pickets in the area should be improved while drug peddling activities to be curbed, he maintained. The SP (Saddar) said cops per-

forming duties at police pickets should be briefed about effective security measures and bullet proof jackets and masks to be provided to them. He said that special pickets should be erected in those areas where crime rate is being reported high and special vigilance to be maintained for protection to the lives and property of the citizens. He also asked for taking effective

steps to check bike and car theft cases and keep vigilance eye on suspected vehicles and persons. As per vision of IGP Islamabad Muhammad Aamir Zulfiqar khan, he said that decent attitude and policy of `Phele Salam - Phir Kalam' should be adopted during interaction with citizens. The SP (Saddar) reviewed the performance of all police officials related to tasks assigned to them in previous meeting. He died on September 2, 2002, leaving behind a glowing trail of over 1,900 unforgettable melodies and around 260 film scripts.

ISLAMABAD: The Prime Minister during his visit to Balochistan tomorrow will be briefed about the nation-wide rollout of Ehsaas' Taleemi-wazaef for primary school going children under Waseela-e-Taleem program. The PM will join the children and their parents to witness new enrolments of deserving children in Waseela-e-Taleem. Following a briefing on the recent deep-rooted reforms introduced in Waseela e Taleem under the umbrella of Ehsaas, Prime Minister will oversee details of a girl child being entered in the end-to-end digital system. At the site, he will also witness the payment being made to the child's mother. Pakistan has been running an Education Conditional Cash Transfer for primary school going children called Waseela-e-Taleem since 2012 in selected districts. Now, this program is being expanded nationwide, representing a major quantum change.

In the past, the program encountered a number of challenges namely high administrative cost, weak compliance monitoring system, low stipend amount and high error and fraud due to a paper-based approach. Over the last year and a half, a comprehensive and deep-rooted reform was designed and deployed as a result of which far reaching changes have been made in the program. There are four key pillars of reform:

First, end-to-end digitization of a number of processes, which were previously managed manually. Apps have been developed which are used by staff to register children and monitor compliance.

Secondly, cost-effective changes

Gren and monitor compliance. Secondly, cost-effective changes institutional infrastructure was developed to expand this program nationwide and reliance on NGOs was eliminated. Because of this, operational cost has been reduced from 8% to 3%. Third, the stipend given to children has been modified as per Ehsaas' new Stipend policy. Children of poorest families will now be provided condi-



tional cash grants of Rs. 1,500 for boy child and Rs. 2,000 per quarter for girl child on attainment of 70% attendance in school. Finally, and most importantly, the

program is being expanded to all districts of the country.

Education Conditional Cash

Education Conditional Cash Transfers are an important pillar of Ehsaas and are included in the Ehsaas framework as Policy #73 'Education Conditional Cash Transfers'. Education Conditional Cash Transfers serve the dual purpose of socially assisting vulnerable households and at the same time reduce the number of out of school children, which is an important outcome for Pakistan

given that there are 19.1 million out-of-school children in the country. Overall budget this year is 8 billion. Overall, in the Ehsaas umbrella, there are many enhancements for South Balochistan districts of Washuk, Kharan, Chagai, Khuzdar, Mastung, Lasbela, Awaran, Panjgur, Turbat, Gwadar. Two new Panagahs will be opened in two districts, one in Lasbela Industrial Zone and the other in Gwadar Economic Zone by January 31, 2021. Two new orphanages will be set up in Kharan and Turbat by December 31, 2020. In Ehsaas Amdan, two new districts of South Balochistan, Lasbela and Gwadar are being added. Under Ehsaas interest free loans program, 4 new districts. Gwadar. Panigur. Awaran and Kech are being added. In Ehsaas Kafaalat, the number of beneficiaries in South Balochistan are projected to increase from currently 38,604 to 62,152 beneficiaries over the next 4 months. Ehsaas Nashonuma program is being introduced in Kharan and Khuzdar. Total 6,625 beneficiaries

will be registered under Nashonuma in these two districts and will get specialized nutritious food to prevent stunting in children along with cash stipend (Rs. 2000 for girl child and Rs. 1,500 for boy child per quarter). Under Ehsaas Undergrad Scholarship program, around 3,000 scholarships have been awarded to deserving and talented students of Balochistan in the year 2019-20. Steps to ensure safe trade stressed

ISLAMABAD: The experts at a workshop stressed the need for taking practical measures to ensure trade and food safety amid COVID-19 so that the pandemic might not impact the lives of common man. The online workshop titled: 'Safe Trade and Food Safety amid COVID-19' was organized by Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) in collaboration with Pakistan Institute of Trade and Development (PITAD), said a press release issued here Thursday. The experts mainly discussed as to how the improved federal provincial coordination on food safety can increase the likelihood of Pakistan's food exports being preferred abroad. They were of the view that coordination is required between product standard authorities and Ministry of National Food Security and Research to avert delays due to approvals and permits that harm the timeliness of Pakistan's trade consignments. They called upon the government to conduct a regulatory impact assessment to see how such costs which hurt the competitiveness of exporters can be reduced. In this regard, they said, the authorities

concerned may also look towards the progressive practices adopted by peer economies in the Asia-Pacific region. Speaking on the occasion, PITAD Director-General Raheela Tajwar said after the first wave of COVID-19, appropriate



biosecurity arrangements in trade has become imperative and good hygiene practice now needs to be evolved by all involved in the logistics. Dr Ali Abbas Qazilbash, an expert in trade sector, said that the COVID-19 has seen an increase in non-tariff barriers, and it is impacting the global supply chain in agriculture as well. He said the world needs to achive food safety compliance. Freight forwarders and transporters need to implement the controls and human contact needs to be minimized by ensuring electronic certification, he said, adding that many organizations are now dealing with Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS) measures, whereas a single authority as a focal point should be made available on SPS agreement.

Who is minding CPEC?

N August last year, Prime Minister Imran Khan announced that his government was forming a 'China-Pakistan Economic Corridor Authority' (CPECA) to ensure timely completion of the Corridor's projects. Two months later the Authority was created through a Presidential Ordinance. In November retired Lt Gen Asim Saleem Bajwa was appointed chairman of the CPE-CA) for a period of four years. Last month, when General Bajwa stepped down as SAPM on Information and Broadcasting, he made it clear that he would continue to work as chairman of CPECA. Reassuring statements throughout this year from Mr Khan down to the KP CM had led one to believe that as far as the CPEC was concerned, everything was proceeding according to schedule. In July Mr Khan said the Corridor would be completed at all costs. In September, addressing a ceremony to inaugurate Rashakai Economic Zone, he maintained that the project had now entered the industrialization phase. The same month, speaking to departing Chinese Ambassador Yao Jing, Mr Khan assured him that CPEC would play a key role in regional economic growth and prosperity. Earlier this year, the KP CM had told media that the Rashaki industrial zone, which is a CPEC project, would provide jobs to 250, 000 people.


The Ordinance that led to the establishment of the CPEC Authority lapsed six months back but the government didn't bother to bring a law before Parliament immediately, which reflects on its commitment to the project. Finally on Wednesday, when a bill was sent to the related National Assembly Standing Committee for discussion prior to its presentation before the whole House, members questioned the legal status and functioning of the CPEC Authority after the expiry of its ordinance to which the government had no satisfactory answer. When asked who was chairing the CPEC Authority, the answer was "no one." There was no convincing answer to the question about the law under which the incumbent was working. The Planning and Development Secretary, representing the government, assured the committee of briefing it in the next meeting on the issues raised. Compared to the fast completion of the CPEC projects under the previous government, these move at a snail's pace under a defunct CPEC Authority, showing either lack of enthusiasm or lack of capacity, or both.

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Sindh IG report

HE army chief has delivered on his promise to issue a report on the alleged abduction of the Sindh IG. This in itself is a welcome step. The report has ordered the removal from their current assignments of the ISI and Pakistan Rangers officials said to be involved in the 'Karachi incident'; they are to be sent for further departmental proceedings and disposal at the GHQ. The ISPR report has termed the officers 'overzealous' action a result of 'increasing public pressure'.

So the report is out and, as expected, the reactions to it are in as well. While Bilawal Bhutto Zardari, who had sought the report in the first place, has welcomed it and its contents, Nawaz Sharif has said that the report is 'rejected' (in a throwback to another infamous' rejection'), and that the real culprits in the matter should be detected. Beyond this there is also the question of how this affects the government. Prime Minister Imran Khan had declared the whole matter a comedy. The ISPR report has made it obvious it does not consider the matter to be comical, and is ready to take action against those it has held responsible. While it does sound odd that junior officers would act on their own in such an 'overzealous' fashion, that an inquiry was indeed conducted and a report written is somewhat of a positive.

In a strange twist, the federal government has asked the Sindh government to look into the issue of why so many police officials asked to go on leave after the Karachi issue, putting the matter of security in jeopardy. This is odd more so since the police personnel had cited low morale as a result of the 'Karachi incident'. Of more importance, though, is the ability of the civilian structure to handle things without intervention. There is, after all, a functional policing and administrative system in place, which should be able to run cases and arrive at the truth. The case against Capt Safdar has in itself become farcical given that the main witness was later found by the police to never have been at the Quaid's mausoleum. Beyond the immediate is the larger picture of how relations stand between our key institutions and how the political structure can remedy itself so that there's less conflict between political parties, greater willingness to stick to the truth and to follow the rules, so that ridiculous situations of the kind we have seen do not develop.

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Cultural diplomacy is a key pillar in foreign policy

N 2011, I was among a group of culture enthusiasts from different parts of the world selected by the British Council to take part in a cultural leadership international program. The program promised activities aimed at nurturing individuals who could spearhead cultural policies, strengthen diplomatic relations, instigate effective economic and social change, and promote intercultural understanding. As a first step, we were invited to attend a week-long training workshop in Istanbul. It was October and the evenings were crisp, with autumn leaves covering the streets and this vibrant city enchanting us with its timeless atmosphere. On the opening night, the guest speaker was renowned British journalist Michael Binyon, who talked about the importance of international cultural relations, and culture's use as a tool for soft power and public diplomacy.

Over the next four days, our training venue was the SALT Galata, a former headquarters of the central bank during the Ottoman empire and now a cultural center. International speakers shared valuable lessons on policies to promote the creative industries, the ways in which culture can address social or political issues, and the role of aesthetics in fostering mutual understanding between nations.

Between sessions, we were taken on tours of museums, artisan workshops, mosques, cultural centers, the Old Town and the Grand Bazaar. The whole experience offered an understanding and appreciation of culture on both a local and global level.

Today, many governments consider cultural diplomacy an important pillar in their foreign policies. The US political scientist and author Milton Cummings Jr. defines cultural diplomacy as "the exchange of ideas, information, values, systems, traditions, beliefs, and other aspects of culture, with the intention of fostering mutual understanding." In an increasingly interdependent, technologically connected and globalized era, cultural diplomacy is becoming critical in spearheading a peaceful, respectful and informed dialogue between the world's citizens. With its soft power, such a tool can be used to construct a positive perception of other countries' cultures, values and policies, as well as preventing or mitigating conflicts, driving trade and tourism, and fostering greater cooperation on a number of platforms.

Furthermore, the creative arts can help shape our identities. That is why we learn a foreign language, are so enamored with notions of freedom or wellbeing in certain countries, or travel as tourists to places with rich cultural offerings.

Creative initiatives adopted in this arena include translating essential books and establishing libraries abroad with popular national works; hosting art exhibitions, film festivals, concerts and theater productions; organizing traveling museums showcasing national artefacts; broadcasting cultural programs or TV shows; and managing cultural exchange

The Fulbright Program, for example, was established in 1946 by the US to sponsor students, scholars, teachers, artists and scientists, enabling them to study, teach, research, share ideas and help formulate solutions to global challenges. Through this unique exchange program, Fulbright scholars are exposed to different cultures, allowing them to

foster a global network of leaders in different countries. Alumni have gone on to make great strides in their fields, and includes 60 Nobel prize-winners, 88 Pulitzer prize-winners, and 38 individuals who have served as heads of state or government.

Many governments have established dedicated agencies with the aim of exporting their local cultures and fostering international relations. The Japan Foundation, established in 1972, is responsible for disseminating Japanese culture to the world, in addition to offering Japanese language courses, promoting collaborative projects to help solve global issues, and funding global research on Japanese studies. The foundation's Wochi Kochi magazine – meaning "the future and the present" in Japanese - includes articles and feature stories celebrating Japanese culture locally and abroad.

Similarly, Alliance Francaise, established 135 years ago and considered the first non-governmental cultural organization, promotes French culture and language abroad. Today, its 834 local centers in 133 countries promise "a multicultural experience in French," and foster core values of cultural openness, conviviality, togetherness and diversity. Signature programs include language study holidays, art exhibitions by French artists, screenings of French films, book clubs, and cultural experiences covering fashion, gastronomy, art, film, literature and history.

It is becoming evident that cultural diplomacy can be a powerful tool in fostering multilateral partnerships, in addition to elevating our human experience and working together toward a common, universal good.

Russia promises sanctions on France, Germany

MOSCOW: Russia said Thursday it will soon introduce retaliatory sanctions on German and French officials over the poisoning of Russian opposition figure Alexei Navalny. The 44-year-old anti-graft campaigner collapsed on a flight in Russia in August and was transported to Germany where experts concluded he was poisoned with the Soviet-designed agent Novichok.

Union European slapped sanctions on several Russian officials in October saying the attack could not have been carried out without the complicity of Moscow's security service es. Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said Thursday the Kremlin had confirmed sanctions in response and that they would soon be announced to Germany and France. "Since Germany was the driving force behind the European Union's sanctions connected to Navalny, since these sanctions directly concern senior staff of the presidential administration of the Russian Federation, our response sanctions will mirror them," Lavrov said. Navalny has said he believes Russian President Vladimir Putin approved the poisoning, while the Kremlin has strenuously denied involvement and accused Germany of refusing to cooperate in an investigation. Lavrov on Thursday added without providing evidence that Moscow had "reason to believe" the nerve agent could have entered Navalny's system during the flight to Berlin's Charite hospital or while he was in Germany. - APP

6 mln Afghan refugees return home since 2002

ISLAMABAD: As many as six million Afghan refugees have returned home since 2002, including 5.3 million with support of United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) with the hope of rebuilding their

country. Some 2.7 million Afghan refugees still live outside the Afghistan while another 2.6 million were displaced within Afghanistan, said UNHCR recent report.

Since 2012, Afghanistan, Pakistan and Iran have pursued a regional approach the Solutions Strategy for Afghan Refugees to build an environment conducive to voluntary repatriation and sustainable reintegration in Afghanistan while also easing pressure on host communities, the report added. The majority of refugees in the Pakistan and Iran cite several main obstacles to their return and sustainable reintegration in Afghanistan. These include a lack of access to livelihoods, land, shelter and basic services, as well as continued insecurity in the country.

The report further stated that, Inside Afghanistan, glaring gaps need to be addressed in the provision of education and nearly half of the Afghan population of some 37 million is under 15. The initiative was seeking strategic investments to expand education opportunities, skills training, youth empowerment and developing public infrastructure, including schools. - APP

BAKU: The Azerbaijani Foreign Ministry has expressed regret over the Canadian foreign minister's unilateral pro-Armenian position on the cessation of military operations between Armenia and Azerbaijan. "The one-sided statement made by the Canadian foreign minister on the cessation of military operations between Armenia and Azerbaijan, in which pro-Armenian sentiments are openly expressed, is regrettable," ministry said on its website on November 12. The ministry later added: "It seems that the Canadian foreign minister, who failed to make any statement condemning the occupation of Azerbaijani territories for nearly 30 years and the violation of human rights of hundreds of thousands of Azerbaijanis, and supporting the implementation of the UN Security Council's relevant resolutions, started to engage in the settlement [of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict] now." No state, particularly those located far from this territory cannot be more

interested in regional peace and security than the regional countries, the ministry said. "If Canada is really interested in ensuring lasting regional peace, then it should behave in line with principles of international law and the UN Security Council resolutions. The opposite of this is nothing than undermining a political solution to the conflict and the establishment of regional peace," the statement said. On November 10, 2020, Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev, Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan and Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a joint declaration to stop hostilities between Armenia and Azerbaijan. Under the deal, Russian peacekeepers are deployed in the region to patrol frontlines. Turkey also takes part in the peacekeeping process. Turkey and Russia signed a deal on creating a Turkish-Russian joint ceasefire monitoring centre.

The clashes between Armenia and Azerbaijan resumed after Armenia launched large-scale attacks on Azerbaijani forces and civilians on September 27. Five Azerbaijani civilians were killed on the first day of

the Armenian attacks. Nine ty-three Azerbaijani civilians were killed in Armenian's indiscriminate attacks on Azerbaijani civilians. Azerbaijan launched counter-offensive operations that ended in the liberation of over 300 settlements, villages. Azerbaijan also liberated five city centres and the historic Shusha city. The 44 days of war ended with the Russian-brokered peace deal signed on November 9 by the Azerbaijani, Russian and Armenian leaders. The peace agreement entered force on November 10 and envisages the de-occupation of Azerbaijan's Kalbajar, Aghdam and Lachin regions by December 1 as well as the return of Azerbaijani IDPs to Azerbaijan's Nagorno-Karabakh and the seven adjacent regions under the control of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. The peace agreement ended the 30-years-old conflict between Baku and Yerevan over Azerbaijan's Nagorno-Karabakh region that along with the seven adjacent districts came under the occupation of Armenian armed forces in the war

Emirates posts first loss in 30 years

DUBAI: Dubai-based Emirates airline on Thursday posted its first loss in more than three decades, saying it had been badly hit by the coronavirus lockdown that brought air transport to "a literal standstill".

The Middle East's largest carrier said it suffered a \$3.4 billion loss in the six months to September, forcing it to slash its workforce. "In this unprecedented situation for the aviation and travel industry, the Emirates Group recorded a half-year loss for the first time in over 30 years," the airline's chairman and chief executive, Sheikh Ahmed bin Saeed Al Maktoum said in a statement. "No one can predict the future, but we expect a steep recovery in travel demand once a Covid-19 vaccine is available, and we are readving ourselves to serve that rebound." The airline, which had to temporarily suspend operations earlier this year before building back its vast network, saw revenue fall 75 percent to \$3.2 billion.

Over the half-year to September, it carried just 1.5 million passengers, down 95 percent from the same period last vear. The carrier said that its bottom line found some support with a "strong cargo business" as it repurposed its fleet to accommodate the need for supplies around the globe, including medical equipment. - APP

Libyan parties agree to hold elections

TUNIS: Libva's warring sides agreed Wednesday to hold elections within 18 months. according to the head of the UN Support Mission in the country. The decision came during the UN-sponsored Libyan Political Dialogue Forum (LPDF) which began Monday in Tunisia between representatives of the internationally recognized Libyan government and warlord Khalifa Haftar. The participants reached a preliminary agreement to end the transition period and hold transparent elections, Stephanie Turco Williams told reporters. Williams said the agreement is a version of the Suheyrat Agreement, which envisions a political process in Libya. The new roadmap specifically addresses the problems of displaced people in the country, she said, adding it outlines the steps needed to be taken for a unified governance framework and to initiate a reconciliation. The scope and authority of the government and Presidential Council, which will manage the transition process, were also discussed during the meeting, Williams said. The LPDF is a fully inclusive intra-Libyan political dialogue established by the Berlin Conference Outcomes, which were endorsed by UN Securi-

ty Council Resolutions 2510 (2020) and 2542 (2020). Participants invited to the forum are drawn from different constituencies based on the principles of inclusivity and fair geographic, ethnic, political, tribal and social representation. The meeting came at a time when an overwhelming sense of hope has emerged in Libya after the signing of a permanent countrywide cease-fire agreement between the Libyan parties on Oct. 23 in Geneva. Williams announced on Oct. 23 the signing of a "permanent" and immediate cease-fire agreement between military delegations from Libva's warring parties, calling it "an important turning point towards peace and stability in Libya.

Sino-India clashes: regional implications

This bad relationship could not be easily and nor quickly reversed. As a result of this. India's existing competition with China in South Asia and the broader Indian Ocean Region was likely to sharpen into what he described as possible contestation in the defense and security domain. However, he opined that while India's engagement in the QUAD was also going to increase, its focus would be broader than just defense and security. Mr Rov-Chaudhury noted that the increasing emphasis on defense policy

was not risk-free for India. Therefore, it would 'need to be imaginatively and sensitively applied by New Delhi, if it was to result in political and diplomatic dividends for the South Block', he concluded. Dr Tong Zhao, Senior Fellow, Carnegie-Tsinghua Center for Global Policy, Beijing, highlighted that there was a serious perception gap between China and India. From the Chinese perspective, India was trying to change the status quo across the region, especially given the 5 August 2019 revocation of the special status of Jammu and Kashmir and the public statement by Indian Home Minister Amit Shah who had declared in Lok Sabha last year that Aksai Chin was an integral and inseparable part of Jammu and Kashmir. Dr Zhao said such actions had triggered the Chi-

nese military to show its resolve to protect the country's national security. In contrast, India perceives that China has been changing the status quo across the border region. Both parties believe that their policies are purely defensive. 10 years jail for cutting Saudi trees

RIYADH: Authorities in Saudi Arabia have announced stringent measures to combat environmental vandalism, with fines of up to 30 million riyals (nearly \$8m) and 10 years in jail, a report by The New Arab website said on Wednesday. "Cutting down trees, shrubs, herbs, or plans [and] uprooting, moving, stripping them of their bark, leaves or any part, or moving their soil" could land offenders with the maximum fine and jail time. the Saudi public prosecution said in a tweet this week.

The announcement is a part of Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 development plan to achieve environmental sustainabili-ty by the end of the decade, the report said. Environment Minister Abdulrahman al-Fadley last month announced the launch of "Let's Make it Green" - a plan that seeks to plant 10 million trees across the kingdom by April 2021. Economic and social reforms have gained momentum since de facto ruler, Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, announced his ambitious plan in 2016 to reduce the country's

heavy dependence on oil. "We will seek to safeguard our environment by increasing the efficiency of waste management, establishing comprehensive recycling projects, reducing all types of pollution and fighting desertification," reads Vision 2030's mission statement.

Russia reports 21,608 new corona cases

MOSCOW: Russia confirmed 21,608 COVID-19 cases in the past 24 hours, with 439 deaths, the highest number of coronavirus deaths in one day since the start of the pandemic, the nation's COVID-19 response center said in a statement on Thursday.

Moscow recorded the majority of the new coronavirus infections with a daily increase of 5,997, pushing the total number of cases in the capital to 491,542. It was reported that 1,388,168 patients have recovered so far, with 18,811 of those in the past 24 hours Russia's total caseload is equal to 1,858,568, while the country's death toll currently stands at 32,032. Over 66.7 million COVID-19 tests have been conducted across the

country as of Thursday. On Tuesday, Moscow's Mayor Sergei Sobyanin introduced a new set of restrictions in the capital to control the spread of the virus. The mayor imposed a night-time curfew on food and entertainment facilities, and ordered university students to switch to distance learning. Large-scale public gatherings for cultural and entertainment events have also been banned. - APP

India's capital sees surge in COVID-19

WEB DESK NEW DELHI: India's capital

has seen a surge in COVID-19 infections as pollution levels have soared to dangerous levels at the onset of winter. The capital reported 8,593 new COVID-19 infections on

Wednesday, its highest daily tally yet. The country of 1.3 billion people is second worst-hit behind the US.

The average pollution reading was 299 on Thursday on a scale of 500, where any number above 300 is classified as very poor and can cause respiratory illnesses. Delhi resident Varun Kaushik's 92-year old grandmother started coughing and her blood oxygen levels plummeted on Wednesday. He took her to two top private hospitals in New Delhi on Monday. Nei ther took her in, even after one of them found that she tested positive for COVID-19. Kaushik said several other hospitals told him and his family on the phone that they had beds available, but not in the intensive care unit (ICU) his grandmother needed. He finally admitted her to a non-ICU COVID bed in a government hospital, 10 hours after leaving home. Her condition was stable as of Thursday, ac-

cording to Kaushik. The family's ordeal is a warning sign for a city where infections are surging even though they are dropping elsewhere in the country. Delhi's 20 million residents celebrate their biggest festival. Deepavali or Diwali, this weekend. In his blog 'Why EU-Pakistan relations are so important', the EU Foreign Minister took a stock of the issues discussed during the Pak-EU Dialogue, mainly EU General Scheme

"Pakistan possesses nuclear weapons and plays a central role in a critical region involving China, India, Iran and Afghanistan. appoint a special investigator to determine whether to prosecute members of the country's military for alleged war crimes committed in Afghanistan, Prime Minister Scott Morrison said on Thursday, as the country prepared for the release of a four-year inquiry into the allegations.

The inspector-general of the Australian Defence Forces began the inquiry into the conduct of its elite special forces in 2016 after local media reported on allegations that unarmed men and children had been killed between 2005 and 2016.

While Morrison did not reveal details of the inquiry, which is set to be released next week, he said it would contain "difficult and hard news for Australians".

"Given the likely allegations of serious and possibly criminal misconduct, the matters raised in the inquiry must be assessed investigated and, where allegations are substantiated, prosecuted in court," Morrison told reporters in Canberra.

The new measures, which take effect on Friday, came a day after California and several states across the Midwest tightened restrictions on residents to try to curb the rapid spread of the virus. UN again warns of famine in Yemen

NEW YORK: The United Nations has once again warned of millions of men, women and children in war-torn Yemen are facing famine as it issued yet another appeal for more money to prevent it.

"We are on a countdown right now to a catastrophe," UN World Food Programme (WFP) Executive Director David Beasley told the UN Security Council on

Wednesday.

"We have been here before ... We did almost the same dog-and-pony show. We sounded the alarm then," the head of the Nobel Peace Prize-winning UN body said.

The UN describes Yemen as the world's largest humanitarian crisis, with 80 percent of the country's 30 million people in

need of help. "If we choose to look away, there's no doubt in my mind Yemen will be plunged into a devastating famine within a few short months," Beasley told the 15-member council.

A Saudi Arabia-led military coalition intervened in Yemen in 2015, backing government forces fighting the Iran-allied Houthi group, which had captured the capital Sanaa a year earlier.

Since then, more than 100,000 people - fighters and civilians - have been killed.

UN officials are trying to revive peace talks to end the war as the country's suffering has also been worsened by an economic and currency collapse and the COVID-19 pandemic.

'Armenia to pay price if violates cease-fire'

A memorandum of understanding (MoU) setting up a joint Turkish-Russian center to monitor the peace deal - which has ended weeks of armed conflict between Azerbaijan and Armenia - was signed on Wednesday morning, according to Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan

ANKARA: Armenia will "pay price" if it violates the latest peace deal and cease-fire agreement with Azerbaijan on the Upper Karabakh conflict, Turkey's top diplomat said Thursday. "They [Armenian forces] should either leave the territory voluntarily by abiding the agreement, or the heroic Azerbaijani army will take those lands back as it did so far. There is no other choice," Mevlut Cavusoglu said in a news conference in Baku, Azerbaijan's capital. Azerbaijan is not "keen to shed blood" and was very patient for solving the conflict in peace, he said, adding: "After that, the choice is on Armenia [to shed blood or solve it in peacel.'

"Whatever solution Azerbaijan prefers for the occupied territories and Karabakh issue, we will stand by Azerbaijan," he said.

"The conflict can be solved only by handing over all occupied lands to Azerbaijan," Cavusoglu said, adding that works on the status of Karabakh will continue in the upcoming period. He underlined that the "only goal" of the peace deal was the return of the occupied lands to Azerbaijan. "So far, the heroic Azerbaijani army has done what is required on the field, and now, through diplomacy, work is underway to return the occupied lands based on schedule.' Cavusoglu also stressed that

France - a co-chair along with Russia and the US of the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) Minsk Group formed in 1992 to find a peaceful solution to the conflict - has no "objective and balanced" stance on the Upper Karabakh issue.



"The Minsk trio must take a lesson from this process, especially France. Biased statements are being made even after the cease-fire [agreement]," he said.

Speaking on the establishment of the peacemaking center to oversee the cease-fire on the Upper Karabakh territory, Cavusoglu said Turkey's role will be exactly the same as Russia's on the joint monitoring. A memorandum of understanding (MoU) setting up a joint Turkish-Russian center to monitor the peace deal - which has ended weeks of armed conflict between Azerbaijan and Armenia - was signed on Wednesday morning, according to Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. "We respect the role Russia plays here. They [Russian side] made initiatives for both sides. The dialogue continued and this agreement was signed, with the consent of both sides. The important thing is the next steps to be taken," Cavusoglu said.

He went on to say that in accordance with the fifth article of the deal, Turkey agreed with Russia to launch a joint observation and monitoring center, adding that the

details will be discussed with a delegation coming from Russia on Friday. "The control and surveillance center will be in the territory of Azerbaijan and in places Azerbaijan deems appropriate," he said. Cavusoglu said the center will perform "important functions", including detection of actions that violate the deal, monitoring of the area through detection and observation with unmanned aerial vehicles and other elements, examination of complaints and violations, and prevention of cease-fire violations. "The joint working group will determine the formation and working principles of this. But here, most importantly, the authority given

by the host country [Azerbaijan], areas identified, and other details will be determined by the brotherly

Azerbaijan," he said.

Indian diplomat summoned

ISLAMABAD: A senior Indian diplomat was summoned to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs today to register Pakistan's strong protest over ceasefire violations by the Indian occupation forces along the Line of Control (LoC) on 11th November 2020, resulting in serious injuries to one innocent civilian.


Remittances remain above \$2b

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Pfizer's CEO cashed out 60% of his stock

WASHINGTON: Pfizer CEO Albert Bourla sold 62% of his stock on the same day the company announced its experimental COVID-19 vaccine succeeded in clinical trials. The vaccine announcement sent Pfizer's shares soaring almost 15% on the day. Bourla sold 132,508 shares in the company at an average price of \$41.94 a share, or \$5.6 million total, according to filings registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. The 52-week high for Pfizer's stock is \$41.99, meaning Bourla sold his stock at almost its high est value in the past year.

His stock sale was carried out through a routine Rule 10b5-1, a predetermined trading plan that allows company staff members to sell their stock in line with insider-trading laws. Bourla's sale was part of a plan adopted August 19, the

filing showed. He continues to own 81,812 Pfizer shares. Pfizer confirmed that Bourla's stock sales were part of a plan that allows major shareholders and insiders of exchange-listed corporations to trade a predetermined number of shares at an agreed time.

"Through our stock plan administrator, Dr. Bourla authorized the sale of these shares on August 19, 2020, provided the stock was at

The vaccine, which involves two doses administered three weeks apart, won't be distributed immediately, as it still needs to be evaluated and approved by the US Food and Drug Administration.
