2,885 new Coronavirus cases reported in Pakistan

ISLAMABAD: The total active COVID-19 cases in Pakistan on Tuesday were recorded 44,241 as 2,885 more people tested positive for the deadly virus during the last 24 hours. Eightynine corona patients, 85 of whom were under treatment in hospital and four out of the hospital died on Monday, according to the latest update issued by the National command and

Noting that Covid-19 has had a disproportionate impact on the most vulnerable, the Pakistani envoy said it was evident from the sharp spike in domestic violence and abuse against women and girls during lockdowns.

Pakistan is following a whole of government approach to ensure that women and girls have necessary protections available to them against violence, harassment and abuse, he said, adding its recovery response remains focused on the well-being and protection of women. "Our Minister for Human Rights, Dr Shireen Mazari, has led the way to protect the rights of women

Punjab cabinet okays NOCs for 5 cement plants

LAHORE: The Punjab cabinet on Tuesday approved issuing no-objection certificates (NOCs) for establishment of five new cement plants in the province.

This was announced by Chief Minister Usman Buzdar in a post on his official Twitter handle. He said there were only twelve cement plants in the province till recently but the cabinet, with persistent efforts of his team, approved NOCs for five more plants.

These new plants will bring a collective investment of Rs150 billion to Rs200 billion to the province in addition to creating employment opportunities for hundreds of thousands of people, the CM said. Earlier, Adviser to the Prime Minister on Commerce and Investment Abdul Razak Dawood had said cement sector registered the "highest-ever" monthly sale of 5.735 tonnes in October growing by 15.83 per cent as comparing to last year's corresponding period. He tweeted it is even more encouraging to note that cement export grew by 19 per cent in October, 2020, fetching US\$32.86 million as compared to US\$27.62 million worth of exports last year. Overall cement exports grew by 10.8 per cent to US\$ 105.18 million during July-October 2020 from US\$ 94.97 worth of exports recorded during corresponding period of

IHC unhappy with CAA on damaging PIA pilots' image

ISLAMABAD: Chief Justice Islamabad High Court (IHC) Justice Athar Minallah on Tuesday observed that the procedure of Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) for pilots' licensing had made the whole method as suspicious.

The chief justice noted that now it had cleared that the information pertaining to alleged fake licenses of 262 pilots was wrong. Accountability was necessary and anyone had to be set responsible for this negligence, Justice Minallah said, adding that the image of national

airline, Pakistani nation and its pilots was badly damaged internationally. The court asked that under what law the secretary CAA had formed board of inquiry. Was there monarchy, it questioned, adding that the whole matter started from this. He gave these remarks during hearing a petition filed by a pilot Syed Saglain Akhter challenging cancelation of his license and termination from job. Addressing to the counsel of CAA, the chief justice asked that if this country was run under the

law or the wishes of someone. Additional Attorney General Tariq Khokhar submitted the notification of appointment of DG to the court to this the chief justice appreciated the step of federal government. The petitioner's counsel pleaded that the appointment of DG CAA was against the orders of the court. The Chief Justice said that it was the job of the federal government. It was not legally clear in law that how a DG would be appointed, no matter who appoints the DG.

The petitioner's lawyer prayed the bench to declare the suspension of his client pilot's license as illegal act. At this, the court asked that who would decide the suspension or restoration of the pilot license, whether any disciplinary inquiry was started against the pilot. The court asked the petitioner's lawver not to hurry. The petitioner's lawyer said show cause notice was issued to his client twice and we submitted reply. The Board of Inquiry Commission was formed under chair of secretary CAA, he said.

The court asked that under what law this commission was formed and who were the people involved in it? The whole issue started with this Board of Inquiry, Justice Minallah noted. The petitioner's counsel said that the report of the Board of Inquiry was never received. The bench said that where it was written in the law that the federal government could temporarily appoint someone as DG or secretary, the Lahore High Court did not order the secretary to is-

ISLAMABAD: Corruption, a serious crime, undermines social, economic norms of societies and affects the countries around the world, said National Accountability Bureau (NAB) Chairman Justice (r) Javed Iqbal said Tuesday. In his Anti-Corruption Day being observed on today, to highlight its devastating impact on socio-economic development of the member countries and to create awareness against it. He said fighting against corruption is a global concern. Corruption is a social malice

that can be seen anywhere

and is like a tumor, aggressively spreading in public life. It breeds injustice, which ultimately results in collapse of a nation and society if not cured.

Thus, the significance of this day is increasing over time as the general public is getting more and more mindful of its repercussions. NAB being the focal agency of Pakistan under United Nations Convention against Corruption (UNCAC) is determined to weed out this scourge of corruption and to make Pakistan Corruption free. However, corruption is a complicated social phenomenon, which cannot be fought by employing a narrow singular approach of enforcement as it would fail to yield any results.

Similarly, it would be impractical to expect a single agency to do the job on its own without complete support of society.

So NAB being the apex anti-corrutpion agency and mandated to eliminate corruption, corrupt practices, is operating through a three pronged strategy of Awareness, Prevention and Enforcement.

CTD arrests terrorists involved in sectarian killings

KARACHI: The Sindh Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) Tuesday claimed to have arrested two suspected militants allegedly affiliated with proscribed Sipah-e-Muhammad's Agha Hassan Group and got trained from a neighbouring country.

According to CTD DIG Omar Shahid Hamid, the arrested militants identified as Karar Hussain alias Pathan and Kamran Haider alias Kami had received militancy training from neighbouring country. They were trained for using arms, ammunition, suicide jackets, Improvised Explosive Devices (IED), Vehicular Borne IED (VBIED), anti-aircraft gun and counter surveillance training.

The CTD also recovered a 30 bore pistol and a 9MM pistol with 9 live rounds from the possession of arrested accused. AG unearths irregularities in Daanish **Schools**

LAHORE: The Auditor General of Pakistan (AGP) has unearthed financial irregularities and fraud worth Rs11.39 billion in Punjab's Daanish Schools and recommended the provincial authorities to immediately remove the responsible officers. The top auditor exposed the corruption worth over Rs11 billion in its three-year special audit report 2019-20, regarding the Punjab government-run Daanish schools. The report has been handed over to the Punjab government.

The report stated that violations of Public Procurement Regulatory Authority (PPRA) rules and the usage of substandard material in the development projects have been detected, whereas, serious financial irregularities worth over Rs5.74 billion in 73 cases were also unearthed during the audit.

administration of Daanish Schools had been found involved in financial fraud worth Rs5.1 million. It emerged that the administration awarded the contract for meal and transportation of the admitted schoolchildren approximately 3 per cent more than its actual cost. Moreover, Daanish Schools' former managing director (MD) Zahoor Hussain had neglected PPRA rules and merit during his tenure.

IAG lauds Pak efforts against Polio

ISLAMABAD: The Islamic Advisory Group for Polio Eradication (IAG) on Tuesday appreciating the efforts of Pakistan in fight against polio has assured its full support for complete elimination of this crippling disease from the country.

In its 7th annual meeting held at OIC Secretariat at Jeddah, the IAG called upon religious leaders and influential community leaders in Pakistan and Afghanistan to fully support ongoing polio eradication efforts and mobilize parents and caregivers to regularly vaccinate their children against polio and other vaccine-preventable diseases. This year's IAG meeting, which was held virtually, and organized by the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), discussed the persistence of polio virus transmission and protecting children from the crippling disease of polio, says a fax message received here from Jeddah. Addressing the meeting, Coordinator of the National Emergency Operations Centre, Polio Eradication Initiative (PEI), Dr Rana Muhammad Safdar said that Pakistan was successfully running its anti-polio drives to protect children from the disease.

He said "The government is committed to make Pakistan Polio-free. We are determined to close the immunity gap in children which had unfortunately widened because of disruption of essential services due to COVID-19 pandemic." He said, "Ensuring timely and repeated vaccination of children is critical for us to reduce the immunity gap and protect them against polio. I am confident, together we will achieve our target of making a safer. healthier and polio-free Pakistan for our children." – \boldsymbol{APP}

Police registered separate cases against all of them and started investigation.

PHP registers 135 cases against violators

Travel restrictions most effective way to control Covid

ISLAMABAD: International travel restrictions may only be effective at controlling the spread of Covid-19 when applied in a targeted way, according to research published in The Lancet Public Health journal. The new study also suggests that travel restrictions can be effective in countries close to a tipping point for exponential growth but not in those where it is already spreading rapidly among the population, Medical Daily reported. "We recognise that these measures carry a high economic and social cost, so it's important that governments use travel restrictions in a targeted way," said from Mark Jit from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Med icine in the UK.

"Before introducing restrictions, they should take into account local infection figures, epidemic growth rates, and the volume of travellers arriving from countries heavily-affected by the virus," Jit added.

The authors used detailed flight data to compare the number of expected Covid-19 cases arriving from international flights (assuming no travel restrictions) with the number of infections arising from transmission within individual countries. They produced estimates of international travellers in May and September 2020 based on two scenarios. - APP

COVID vaccine drive needs antidote to conspiracy theories

ISLAMABAD: Helping to lead a mass trial for a Chinese-made COVID-19 vaccine in Pakistan, a country where anti-vax sentiment can turn lethal and conspiracy theories are endemic, Dr. Mohsin Ali has heard all kind of questions from anxious, prospective volunteers.
"Is this going to take away my

reproductive ability? Is this going to kill me? Is there any 5G chip in this? And, is there a conspiracy to control people en masse?" he said, recounting the sometimes bizarre doubts clouding people's minds.

"I get many questions like this," he told Reuters at Islamabad s Shifa International Hospital, before adding "I try to answer them with logic and on the level of the individual asking them.

Some still refuse."

The hospital is one of a number in Pakistan where phase III trials are underway for Chinese vaccine developer CanSino Biologics Ad5-nCoV candidate. The government last week announced it had begun the vaccine procurement process, though it has not said whether it will purchase CanSino s candidate or an alternative.

Worryingly, a Gallup Pakistan poll conducted last month showed 37% of Pakistanis would not get a vaccine once one became available.

"Given the history of vaccine resistance this is an alarming number and not just for Pakistan but also for world, which depends on universal vaccine coverage to control spread," Bilal Gilani, the pollster s executive director, said. Countering anti-vax sentiments

is a worldwide problem, but in Pakistan it is more dangerous than almost anywhere else.

Dozens of people have been killed in attacks on polio vaccination teams over the years, and the fear and mistrust that spawns such violence has made Pakistan one of two countries. including neighbouring Afghanistan, where the crippling disease has still to be eradicated.

Several times every year, polio vaccination drives aim to inoculate millions of children, but in some areas they are often met with refusals from parents who believe conspiracy theories about the vaccine.

In more volatile parts of the country, militancy played a role in attacks on polio immunization teams, notably after a doctor was accused of running a fake vaccination campaign to help the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency

track down Osama bin Laden in Pakistan in 2011.

Yet the dangers of polio have been well known for decades. whereas COVID-19 is a new disease, and authorities have struggled to communicate the urgent need to stamp it out.

"Many people still don't believe it is a real disease," said Tauqeer Hussain Mallhi, an Assistant Professor at Al-Jawf University, in Sakakah, Saudi Arabia, who studies vaccine effectiveness in Pakistan.

A national lockdown was quick ly abandoned a few weeks into the virus spread as too many of Pakistan s more than 207 million people were economically vulnerable, and social distancing remained difficult as the public continued to gather in markets and mosques.

Infection numbers have continued their morbid ascent with 2,885 new cases and 89 deaths reported on Monday - taking the total infections to over 423,000 and fatalities close to 8,500. Experts say Pakistan is only doing a fraction of the testing it should be doing. Cleric Qibla Ayaz, the head of

the Council of Islamic Ideology. which advises the government on social and legal issues, said many of the conspiracy theories about COVID-19 are coming from Western countries, spread by social media.

"For now the majority of scholars have said the vaccine and other treatments are important... but there are always extremists as there are with polio." Avaz told Reuters. "Given the kind of Westpho-

bia we have in Pakistan, it might be better to obtain a vaccine from Russia or China, instead of the U.S. or UK.

They have been identified as Khuram Masih, Saleem and Ameer Rehman while further investigation was underway from them after registering cases.

DIG (Operations) has appreciated this performance and directed all police officials to remain vigilant in their respective areas and ensure arrest of those involved in ugly business of drug pushing.

SC adjourns Daniel Pearl murder case

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court (SC) on Tuesday adjourned hearing of a case against acquittal of accused by the Sindh High Court (SHC) in American journalist Daniel Pearl murder case till Wednesday.

A three-member special bench of the apex court, headed by Justice Mushir Alam and comprising Justice Sardar Tariq Masood and Justice Yahya Afridi, heard the appeals filed by the Sindh government and Pearl's parents challenging the acquittal of the previously convicted men by the Sindh High Court (SHC). The petitioners challenged the April 02 high court verdict that overturned the sentences of four convicts in the case. During the course of proceedings, Justice Sardar Tariq asked the prosecution to answer two questions related to the confession statement of the accused. He asked why did Fahad make the statement that he was making a statement to save himself? He asked what was the purpose of this statement? The accused was also saying that he was beaten, he added. Advocate Farooq H Naek, counsel for the Sindh government said that there were two separate state-

ments of the accused. Justice Tariq asked the counsel why he was saving the statement before the iudge was an extra-iudicial statement. Farooq H Naek said that the media report was attached with the case and no one asked the accused any question as he gave verbal statement himself. He said that all the accused were in touch with each other from the meetings in the hotel.

Heightening tensions

VEN those with the rudimentary knowledge of subcontinental history are aware of the tensions that have existed between Pakistan and India since 1947. The issue of Kashmir lies at the centre of these tensions, and has resulted in two major wars, fought in 1948 and 1965 and a more minor skirmish in 1999. In 2003, a ceasefire agreement along the Line of Control was reached. This marked a period of some peace. But since then, there has been a gradual return to violence, creating fears around the world that South Asia could become a nuclear flashpoint with both Pakistan and India possessing a sizable arsenal of nuclear weapons. The situation has worsened since the election of the BJP government, led by right-wing hardliner Narendra Modi in 2014, with repeated fighting over the Line of Control, and continued belligerence by India. The situation reached its worst after the Pulwama attack in February 2019, which was followed by aircraft incursion by India into Pakistan. The revocation of Article 370 of the Indian constitution in August last year - ending independent status for Jammu and Kashmir - added to tensions and led to even more Indian violence against Kashmiris. Since then, we have seen no improvement in relations between Pakistan and India.

Pakistan has now put forward a dossier of papers and presented it to the UN stating that is shows irrefutable evidence of Indian-sponsored terrorism in Pakistan. Pakistan holds that the evidence points to the involvement of Indian consulates and embassies located in neighbouring countries playing a role in running terrorism operations in Pakistan with the support of local elements. In turn, India has accused Pakistan of sending in freedom fighters from foreign countries such as Syria into Jammu and Kashmir. Pakistan has dismissed the charges as baseless with a Foreign Office spokesperson stating that there is no truth behind them at all. Let us not forget that till now Pakistan has been disappointed over the lack of international response to its complaints about Indian intervention inside Pakistani territory, with constant urging to 'show proof'. Now that it has provided a dossier, there is expectation that something will be done about this. At the same time, it is essential for the two countries to sit down and talk. A failure to do so could lead to further crisis and a more disturbing situation for the entire region.

The High Commissioner for Human Rights, as the main United Nations official and his office plays a major role in coordinating efforts for the yearly observation of Human Rights. Every year a theme is given the latest being "Stand up for the Human Rights". In its proclamation on 10th December 1948, of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), The General Assembly enunciated the Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations, to the end that every individual and every organ of society, keeping this Declaration constantly in mind, shall strive by teaching and education to promote respect for these rights and freedoms and by progressive measures, national and international, to secure their universal and effective recognition and observance, both among the peoples of Member States themselves and among the peoples of territories under their jurisdiction.

We are celebrating this day for the second year Rights. A functional body which has been made dysfunctional. Perhaps with a design. The future of Saudi-US ties in the Biden era

AUDI Arabia and the US have shared a long strategic alliance, ever since President Franklin D. Roosevelt met with the founder of the modern Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, King Abdul Aziz, in 1945. Saudi-US relations have continued to evolve in a way that serves the interests of both countries. Although ties have sometimes cooled and experienced tensions, as is always the case with political relations between countries, the relationship between the two has not fundamentally changed. It has pivoted on strong strategic cooperation in the region and the world.

Some analysts, however, are expecting a potentially significant shift in Saudi-US relations during the term of President-elect Joe Biden. According to their viewpoint, relations between Washington and Riyadh will deteriorate, perhaps surpassing the decline in relations witnessed during the term of former President Barack Obama. This is because Biden worked in the Obama administration and contributed to its foreign policy positions at the time. This is in addition to his close relationship with Obama, who played a big role in urging US voters to vote for Biden, and the president-elect's decision to appoint a handful of prominent Obama-era officials to his administration.

While this viewpoint has gained traction in media circles, one can boldly and definitively say that Saudi-US relations will not, during the Biden administration, achieve the same highs as witnessed during Donald Trump's term. This is for several reasons. Saudi Arabia was President Trump's first foreign destination after taking office and, on his watch, Saudi-US relations witnessed great harmony in terms of several economic, security, political and geopolitical issues. This level of harmony may be described as exceptional, even in the framework of the strong relations that exist between the two countries. Nevertheless, if we take a wider and more comprehensive view of the history of relations and common interests between Rivadh and Washington, over more than seven decades, we will find that the Biden administration is unlikely to be

an exceptional case. This is because Saudi Arabia is neither a banana republic nor a marginal state. Rather, it has great global economic and political weight. It is also the most prominent exporter of energy and the holder of the largest oil reserves in the world, while the spiritual status of the Kingdom, with it embracing the Two Holy Mosques, gives it a hefty and unique position. In addition, Riyadh is a distinguished international partner in combating terrorism, countering it intellectually and stifling it financially, and is the largest contributor to the UN Office of Counter-Terrorism.

Furthermore, Washington recognizes the influence of Saudi Arabia on global energy prices. A recent and good example in relation to this is the letter written by US shale oil companies to Trump asking him to discuss with Saudi officials the possibility of raising energy prices to a level that serves the interests of both countries. The fact that the cost of extracting shale oil is double that of conventional oil illustrates the importance of Saudi Arabia to the US domestic economy.

Besides, Middle Eastern experts who witnessed the significant developments in the region that took place during the Obama administration - including the so-called Arab Spring protests, the support provided to political Islamist groups such as the Muslim Brotherhood, and the developments in Arab-Israeli relations – know that it will be almost impossible to turn back the clock. In fact, many controversial issues and topics from that period have become much clearer to the Arab public, particularly Saudi society.

At the Saudi domestic level, Riyadh has introduced significant reforms at all levels over the past five years and many of the allegations that the Democrats hurled at Riyadh are now redundant. Historically, the US Democrats and the left have focused on specific issues like human rights. They have also pushed for regional negotiations and political settlements without offering firm solutions to regional problems. Rather, they have primarily wanted to leave a legacy. This is a mistake that the Obama administration made and hopefully the next US administration will learn from in order to refrain from pushing the region into further conflict.

In brief, Riyadh has sufficient capacity to defend its national interests and build good relations with the incoming US administration, as has always been the case with previous US administrations, while enjoying privileged relations with other international actors, such as China, Russia and the EU. Biden's four-year term will not lead to a big shift in the long-standing Saudi-US relations. Rather, the Biden administration is expected to be busy with domestic issues, the consequences of the coronavirus pandemic, and rebuilding Washington's strained relations with Europe.

In relation to Iran, the Biden administration might seek a new nuclear agreement. However, this agreement will be preceded by consultations with Washington's Gulf allies, particularly Saudi Arabia, as Biden's position on Iran's hostile behavior and missile program is in line with Saudi Arabia's.

In addition, Biden is expected to be tougher on Turkey in relation to Recep Tayyip Erdogan's projects on both the European and Libyan fronts. This is also in line with Saudi Arabia's position. Contrary to reports in the media, I do not rule out positive developments in Saudi-US relations and the signing of major deals between the two allies.

Lastly, we must keep in mind that the statements made during election campaigns should not be taken too seriously, as they are primarily projected to persuade voters. The comparison of Trump's statements against Saudi Arabia during his election campaign with his positions after his arrival in the White House provides a telling example. In fact, this sort of rhetoric is a regular feature of every election campaign. Perhaps former Saudi Ambassador to the US Prince Bandar bin Sultan's description of the election campaign period as "silly season" is apt in this regard.

NZ Health officials clear **Pakistan** squad

CHRISTCHURCH: Zealand public health officials have cleared almost the entire Pakistan cricket squad to leave their managed isolation facilities later on Tuesday. New Zealand Cricket had said on Monday that the squad, which has been tested for COVID-19 five times since arriving two weeks ago, was scheduled to leave isolation on Tues day pending final approval

from local health officials. "After extensive testing and completion of their time in managed isolation in Christchurch, the Canterbury DHB medical officer of health is satisfied these people pose a very low risk to the community," the Health Ministry said in a statement. One unidentified member of the 53-strong squad, however, would stay in the facility after he tested positive on day six of their mandatory 14-day isolation. One member of the squad also repeatedly tested negative in isolation but had been in quarantine in Auckland after showing signs of infection when they arrived. Six tested positive for COV-ID-19 upon arrival while four others were identified as positive during their isolation, although those cases were considered "historical", the Ministry said.

The squad are scheduled to fly to Queenstown later on Tuesday for an intra-squad game before the first of three T20I matches on December 18. The team will then play a two-test series from December 26.

Australia wins to stop **India series** sweep

SYDNEY: CAustralia held on for a thrilling 12-run victory in a dead-rubber final T20-international against India Tuesday despite an imperious knock of 85 from Virat Kohli. Once the Indian skinner was out 11 halls from the finish, his team's hopes diminished and they failed to sweep the series after wins in the opening two games. Matthew Wade hit his highest T20 score of 80, while an eventful Glenn Maxwell half-century lifted Australia to 186 for five after India won the toss.

S. Korea inks deal to vaccinate 44M people

ASEOUL: South Korea has secured early access of COVID-19 vaccines developed by four pharmaceutical companies and from a global vaccine project for 44 million people, the health ministry said Tuesday

Welfare said it has preordered 64 million doses of vaccines by four drugmakers - AstraZeneca Inc. Pfizer, Johnson & Johnson's Janssen and Moderna - for 34 million people.

The Ministry of Health and

The World Health Organization's global vaccine project, known as COVAX, will supply the vaccine of Astra-Zeneca, Pfizer and Sanopi

for 10 million people. The government will each purchase 20 million doses from AstraZeneca, Pfizer and Moderna, which requires two shots, and buy 4 million doses from Johnson & Johnson's Janssen, which requires one shot. The ministry said it has already signed a deal with AstraZeneca and will ink contracts with three other companies later this month. adding it has set aside 1.3 trillion won (US\$1.2 billion) of its budget for the vaccine purchase. The preordered vaccines, enough to cover 88 percent of the nation's population, will be shipped as early as February, but the ministry said it has not yet decided when to kickstart the vaccination program. "As developments of vaccines are not yet completed, and there are still concerns over their safety and efficacy, we will flexibly decide the vaccination schedule considering various factors," Health Minister Park Neung hoo said in a briefing. – **APP**

'Long way apart' from EU on Brexit talk, says Johnson

LONDON: Prime Minister Boris Johnson said on Tuesday that Britain and the European Union remain far apart, as he prepares to head to Brussels to try to salvage a post-Brexit trade deal.

"I am always hopeful, but I have to be honest with you, the situation at the moment is tricky," he said, touring a hospital in London for Britain's historic rollout of a coronavirus vaccine. "Our friends have to understand the UK has left the EU to exercise democratic control. We are a long way apart still," he added, ahead of face-toface talks with EU commission chief Ursula von der Leven lat-

er this week. "It is looking very difficult at the moment. We will do our level best. I would say to everybody there are great options ahead for our country." Asked if he would try to do a deal right up until the wire, Johnson said: "Yeah, of course." "We're always hopeful but you know there may come a moment when we have to acknowledge that it's time to draw stumps and that's just the way it is," said Johnson, referring to a cricketing term for the end of play. "We will prosper mightily under any version and if we have to go for an Australian solution then that's fine too." After the negotiating teams' latest session in Brussels - and with just over

three weeks until Britain leaves



the EU's single market on December 31 - Johnson held a phone call with von der Leven late on Monday and secured an invitation to

"We agreed that the conditions for finalising an agreement are not there due to the remaining significant differences on three critical issues: level playing field, govern-

ance and fisheries," the pair said in a joint statement. "We asked our chief negotiators and their teams to prepare an overview of the remaining differences to be discussed in a physical meeting in Brussels in the coming days."

It was not immediately clear whether Johnson's visit would be a separate event, or whether he might be slotted in before an EU summit on Thursday, with the 27 EU leaders meeting in person.

The announcement of Johnson's trip came after a pessimistic day of talks, during which EU negotiator Michel Barnier told sceptical members of the European Parliament that Wednesday was the effective deadline for a solution ahead of the summit.

Barnier and UK counterpart David Frost were due to hold another session on Tuesday in Brussels, to review their progress and draw up a report for their leaders.

"Both sides will undertake additional efforts to reach a deal," Germany's Europe minister Michael Roth said. "We want to reach a deal, but not at any price. What we need is political will in London. "Let me be very clear: our future relationship is based on trust and confidence. It is precisely this confidence which is at stake in our negotiations right now." In one olive branch, the UK government said it was ready to revoke clauses in Brexit legislation that have provoked legal action by the EU and

undermined trust in London. Lukashenko slams olympic ban amid protests MINSK: Belarusian President Alexander Lukashenko on Tuesday threatened to take the International Olympic Committee (IOC) to court for banning him from Olympic events over athlete discrimination. Olympic chiefs on Monday cracked down on the Belarus

National Olympic Committee, headed by Lukashenko, for discriminating against its athletes for their political views. Since Lukashenko's controversial re-election to a sixth term in August Belarus has been in

the throes of its worst political crisis in modern history, with protesters taking to the streets and authorities cracking down hard on the opposition.

A number of prominent Belarusian athletes have supported Lukashenko's critics and demanded an end to

the crackdown. Speaking on Tuesday, Lukashenko threatened to sue IOC President Thomas Bach and other top officials. "We need to go to court. Let Bach and the gang explain what my fault is," Lukashenko said in remarks released by his office. "I haven't taken part in these events for 25 years and will survive in the future. But have you gathered all the countries and made a decision? Ok I will survive, but why are you involving children?". Lukashenko's son Viktor, 45, is the first vice-president of the NOC. In October, the IOC launched an investigation into claims by Belarusian athletes who said they were being discriminated by the country's authorities due to their political views. – APP

UN declares Dec. 27 int'l epidemic preparedness Day

WASHINGTON: The UN on Monday declared Dec. 27 as the "International Day of Epidemic Preparedness" as the coronavirus has taken over a million lives since emerging nearly a year ago.

The General Assembly proclaimed the day "to highlight the importance of the prevention of, preparedness for and partnerships against epidemics," said the UN in a statement. The adoption came days after hundreds of world leaders took part in a virtual special session of the international body in response to COVID-19. They demanded urgent action to guarantee equitable distribution of coronavirus vaccines during their addresses Thursday and Friday. Vietnam's UN Ambassador Dang Dinh Quy introduced the text, saying COVID 19 is not the first pandemic, nor will it be the last. "The pandemic caught us off guard, but it also has served as a wake up call for improving our preparedness,' he said in the statement.

Worldwide, the death toll from COVID-19 has surpassed 1.5 million since the virus was first detected in Wuhan, China in December last year.

The number of infections totals more than 67.5 million and recoveries over 43 million, according to the latest figures from US-based Johns Hopkins

Operation Centre (NCOC). No COVID affected person was on ventilator in Balochistan and Gilgit Baltistan (GB) while 336 ventilators were occupied elsewhere in Pakistan, out of 1,765 allocated for COVID-19 patients. Some 33,610 tests were conducted across the country on Monday, including 12,442 in Sindh, 10,735 in Punjab, 4,159 in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP), 5,019 in Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT), 403 in Balochistan, 504 in GB, and 348 in AJK. Around 370,451 people have recovered from the disease so far across Pakistan making it a significant count with over 86 percent recovery ratio of the affected patients. Since the pandemic outbreak, a total of 423,179 cases were detected so far, including AJK 7,390, Balochistan 17,501, GB 4,746, ICT 33,061, KP 50,078, Punjab 124,191 and Sindh 186,212.

Japan begins space capsule analysis

TOKYO: Scientists in Japan on Tuesday began analysing a capsule sent back to Earth by a probe, hoping to find asteroid material that could offer clues on how the uni-

verse was formed. Officials from Japan's space agency said they were jubilant about the successful return of the capsule, which landed in Australia on Sunday after separating from the Hayabusa-2 probe.

"I'm genuinely appreciative of the fact that the capsule came back, after a 5.24 billion-kilometre round-trip,' project manager Yuichi Tsuda told reporters.

Scientists hope it will yield

up to 0.1 grams of material

collected from the asteroid Ryugu some 300 million kilometres from Earth though they won't know for sure until they look inside. 'I'm really looking forward to seeing (the samples) with my own eves," Tsuda said. But that isn't expected to happen before at least next week, with a series of steps required first to ensure the material is not contaminated.

For now, the capsule is "in a secure location" at a space centre in Sagamihara, south of Tokyo, agency director general Hitoshi Kuninaka said. "Now we move to the matter-analysis phase," he said. The samples - collected last year - are hoped to include both surface dust and pristine material stirred up when Hayabusa-2 fired an "impactor" into Ryugu, Scientists hope they can shed light on how the formation of the universe unfolded, as well as on the origins of life on Earth.

The space agency has begun carefully processing the capsule, beginning by collecting gas inside. It will be opened later under strict conditions, including a nitrogen-filled box for the capsule. – APP

EU delegation visits Gaza amid virus outbreak

GAZA CITY: A European Union delegation arrived in the Gaza Strip on Tuesday to assess the health situation in the Palestinian territory amid a coronavirus outbreak. The delegation visited the European Hospital in Gaza for treatment of COVID-19 patients as part of his tour in the strip. It will also visit EU-funded projects in Gaza and meet representatives of the territory's civil society.

The EU said in a statement on Monday that the visit aims to show solidarity with the residents of Gaza and to review the health situation in the Palestinian enclave. Gaza has been struggling to curb the coronavirus outbreak amid a shortage of medicines and medical supplies due to the 13-year Israeli blockade. Health authorities in Gaza have reported around 25,500 virus infections, including 149 deaths, since March.

Australia pushes plan to force tech firms to pay for news

CANBERRA: Australia finalised plans on Tuesday to make Facebook Inc and Alphabet Inc's Google pay its media outlets for news content, a world-first move aimed at protecting independent journalism that has been strongly opposed by the internet giants.

Under laws to go to parliament this week. Treasurer Josh Frydenberg said the Big Tech firms must negotiate with local publishers and broadcasters how much they pay for content that appears on their platforms. If they cannot strike a deal, a government-appointed arbitrator will decide for them.

"This is a huge reform, this is a world first and the world is watching what happens berg told reporters in the capital, Canberra.

"Our legislation will help ensure that the rules of the digital world mirror the rules of the physical world ... and ultimately sustain our media landscape." The law amounts to the strongest check of the tech giants' market power globally, and follows three years of inquiry and consultation, ultimately spilling into a public brawl in August when the US companies warned it

may stop them from offering their services in Australia. Facebook Australia managing director Will Easton said on Tuesday the company would review the legislation and "engage through the upcoming parliamentary process with the goal of landing on a workable framework to support Australia's news ecosystem". A representative for Google declined to comment on Tuesday, saying the company had yet to see the final version of the proposed law.

UN resolution urges Russia to withdraw from Crimea

NEW YORK: The UN General Assembly on Tuesday adopted a resolution calling on Russia to end its occupation of Crimea and to with

draw from Ukraine. "It urges the Russian Federation, as the occupying Power, to immediately, completely and unconditionally withdraw its military force es from Crimea and end its temporary occupation of the territory of Ukraine without delay," the UN said in a statement on the nonbinding resolution. The representative of Ukraine who introduced the related text said that by occupying Crimea. Russia is violating international law, and threatening "peace and security well beyond the Black Sea region." In the meantime, the Russian side called the text "politicized" and added that Crimean people had decided their future via a referendum. Russia and Ukraine have been at loggerheads since 2014 when Russia annexed Crimea after a controversial referendum.

Turkey as well as the UN General Assembly viewed the annexation as illegal.

Jacinda Ardern apologizes for mosque attacks 'failings'

WELLINGTON: New Zealand's prime minister on Tuesday apologized for failings in the lead-up to the 2019 Christchurch terrorist attacks, as a royal commission made recommendations to prevent such attacks in the future. Brenton Tarrant, an Australian white supremacist, killed 51 people and injured 40 more at the Al Noor Mosque and Linwood Islamic Centre on March 15, 2019. He was sentenced to life in prison this August without the possibility of a parole.

The findings of a royal commission inquiry, which was formed to find out whether the attack could have been



prevented, were presented in parliament. The 792-page report, which took about 18 months to compile, has identified deficiencies in the firearms licensing system, as well as "inappropriate concentration of resources" on the part of security agencies. It has made a list of recommendations, including changes to how firearms are

managed, establishing a new national intelligence and security agency and a proposal for the police to better identify and respond to hate crimes. "The commission made no findings that these issues would have stopped the attack. But these were failings nonetheless and for that I apologize," Jacinda Ardern said after the release of the report. She said that in order to ensure all New Zealanders are safer, the government has agreed in principle with all 44 recommendations contained in the report.

"Muslim New Zealanders should be safe. Anyone who calls New Zealand home. regardless of race, religion, sex or sexual orientation should be safe.'

Indonesia reports 5,292 cases, 133 deaths

JAKARTA: The COVID-19 cases in Indonesia rose by 5,292 within one day to 586,842, with the death toll adding by 133 to 18,000, the Health Ministry said on Tuesday. According to the ministry, 4,295 more people were discharged from hospitals, bringing the total number of recovered patients to 483,497. The virus has spread to all the country's 34 provinces. Specifically, within the past 24 hours, Jakarta recorded 1,194 new cases, Central Java 768, West Java 731, East Java 542 and East Kalimantan 256. No more new positive cases were found in Maluku province. - APP

Sao Paolo sets first date to start vaccinations

SAO PAULO: Brazil's most populous and affluent state will start vaccinating its 46 million residents on Jan. 25, in the first concrete announcement of its kind in Latin America.

Shots of the Chinese developed CoronaVac will first be given to healthcare professionals, people over 60 years old and the indigenous population, Governor Joao Doria said at a press conference on Monday. The priority groups, which make up about 9 million people, will start getting the shots on Jan. 25 - the anniversary of the state's capital city - with the the second dose coming on Feb. 15. Vaccinations of the elderly population will go until late March, with dates varying depending on age. Sao Paulo, which recorded the first case of the virus in Latin America and has been the epicenter of the pandemic in Brazil, is leading the region when it comes to obtaining a vaccine. The local government closed an agreement with China's Sinovac Biotech Ltd. to import ready-made vaccines and produce more locally in partnership with Instituto Butantan.In the rest of the country, a national immunization plan is in the final stages of preparation, Health Minister Eduardo Pazuello said last week. The first batches of Astra-Zeneca Plc's shot should begin to arrive in January or February, he said.

While the Sao Paulo government has said the shot is safe and effective, results from a phase 3 trial are still not ready. State health officials expect to file paperwork with the nation's health regulator Anvisa by Dec. 15, later than the initial timeline of the first week of December.

103 healthcare workers died of coronavirus

ISLAMABAD: As many as healthcare workers have lost their lives while battling the deadly outbreak of novel coronavirus in the country, Health Ministry reported Tuesday.

According to statistics provided released by the Health Ministry, so far 10,925 healthcare workers have contracted the COVID-19, including 6.791 doctors and 1,360 nurses and 2,774 staff of the hospitals.

Overall 10,038 healthcare workers have recovered their health from the virus while 666 are under isolation after testing positive for COVID-19.

As per the province-wise break, in Punjab, 1,600 doctors, 400 nurses and 638 healthcare staff contracted

the coronavirus. In KP, 1,260 doctors, 409 nurses and 1,153 health staff were diagnosed with

the pandemic. Similarly, 2,221 doctors, 407 nurses and 519 health staff tested COVID-19 posi-

tive, the report said.

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan for the first time has become one of the five countries in the world with the most investment in the first half-year of 2020, a World Bank report said.

"Pakistan had the fourth highest investment commitments-a new entrant to the top five countries this year-with US\$1.9 billion investment commitments, accounting for 0.69 percent of GDP," the Private Participation in Infrastructure (PPI) 2020 Half Yearly Report said.

The report had termed the current year's Private Participation in Infrastructure as unprecedented

because of COVID-19 which has brought many sectors, including infrastructure, to a near standstill. Since the beginning of 2020, existing infrastructure projects were delayed or canceled due to supply chain disruptions, travel and shipping restrictions, and other obstacles. Total commitments in the first half of 2020 stood at US\$21.9 billion across 128 projects in 34 countries, a decline of 56 percent from the same period in 2019. COVID-19 has significantly decreased financial closures of investment projects across the

the world to reach financial closure in the first half-year of 2020. he coal power project was developed under the umbrella of the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC). It is part of an effort by the Government of Pakistan to improve energy security and reduce the average cost of power generation by transitioning from oil to coal.

The report added that the South Asian Region (SAR) was the region with the second highest H1 2020 investment level (US\$4.9 billion), driven by Pakistan (US\$1.9 billion), India (US\$1.8 billion), and Bangladesh (US\$1.2 billion). In the past few years, China has been an active infrastructure sponsor, speeding up slow progress on major infrastructure projects in South Asia,

especially in Pakistan and Bangladesh. Nevertheless, investment levels saw a 33 percent dip from the first half-year of 2019 levels.

In the first half of 2020, the energy sector outpaced the transport sector, attracting US\$15.1 billion across 73 projects. This accounted for 69 percent of global PPI investments. The transport sector received US\$4.5 billion across 17 projects, accounting for 20 percent of investment commitments in the first half of 2020.

The water sector attracted US\$1.3 billion over 21 projects, and the municipal solid waste sector received US\$889 million across 17 projects. No information and communication technology (ICT) projects were recorded

Renewable energy continued to play a significant role in new energy-generation projects. Of US\$9.3 billion worth of electricity-generation projects, 67 percent (US\$6.2 billion) of investments were in renewables. The most popular renewable technology in the first half of 2020 was solar, thanks to a strong renewable-energy program in Vietnam. Next most popular was onshore wind technology, mainly due to high investments in Brazil. Investment appeared to be largely debt driven, based on available financing information. Interestingly, institutional investors played a large role, with 28 percent of total investment coming from institutional sources, especially in a nat-

Pak, China trade increases over US \$ 3570 mln

ISLAMABAD: China topped the list of countries from where Pakistan imported different products during the first four months of the current financial year (2020-21), followed by United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Singapore. The total imports from China during July-October (2020-21) were recorded at US \$ 3570.360 million against the US \$ 3145.098 million during July-October (2019-21), showing an increase of 13.52 percent during the period, according to State Bank of Pakistan (SBP).

This was followed by UAE, where from Pakistan imported goods worth US \$ 2188.122 million against the imports of US \$ 2468.414 million last year, showing negative growth of 11.35 percent. Singapore was the at third top country from where Pakistan imported products worth US \$ 871.086 million against the imports of US \$ 727.840 million last year, showing growth of 19.74 percent, SBP data revealed.

Among other countries, Pakistani imports from Saudi Arabia stood at US \$ 634.207 million against US \$ 505.339 million during last year, showing growth of 25.50 percent while the imports from United State of America (USA) were recorded at US \$ 573.501 million against US \$ 523.520 million last year, showing increase of 9.54 percent, the data revealed. The imports from Kuwait were recorded at US \$ 376.881 million against US \$ 365.169 million where as the imports from South Korea were recorded at US \$ 338.495 million against US \$ 235.196 million last year. - DNA
