10-year-old girl raped in Charsadda

CHARSADDA: A 10-year-old girl was raped by her brother-in-law in Charsadda district's Parang area on Tuesday (January 5), it surfaced on Thursday. The police have registered a first information report (FIR) and apprehended the culprit.

The FIR, registered on the complaint of the victim's mother, stated that the accused Saleem, a resident of Charsadda, is her son-in-law and married to her eldest daughter for the last four years. She relayed that two days ago, Saleem visited her house and took her 10-year-old daughter along with him. She states in the FIR that on January 6, the health of her child suddenly deteriorated and upon inquiry, her daughter informed that her brother-in-law Saleem had raped her at his residence and ever since her condition was not good. The 38-year-old accused is expected to be presented in court soon, whereas the child has been sent for a medical examination and hospitalised.

Speaking to The Express Tribune, child rights activist Imran Takkar said, "It is unfortunate that we often talk about the lack of government's interest in things in our country but the ground reality is different. "Yes, the government is not interested in these things due to the lack of resources but it is also true that parents also lack awareness. "It is the responsibility of the parents to protect their children and not trust anyone, including close relatives."

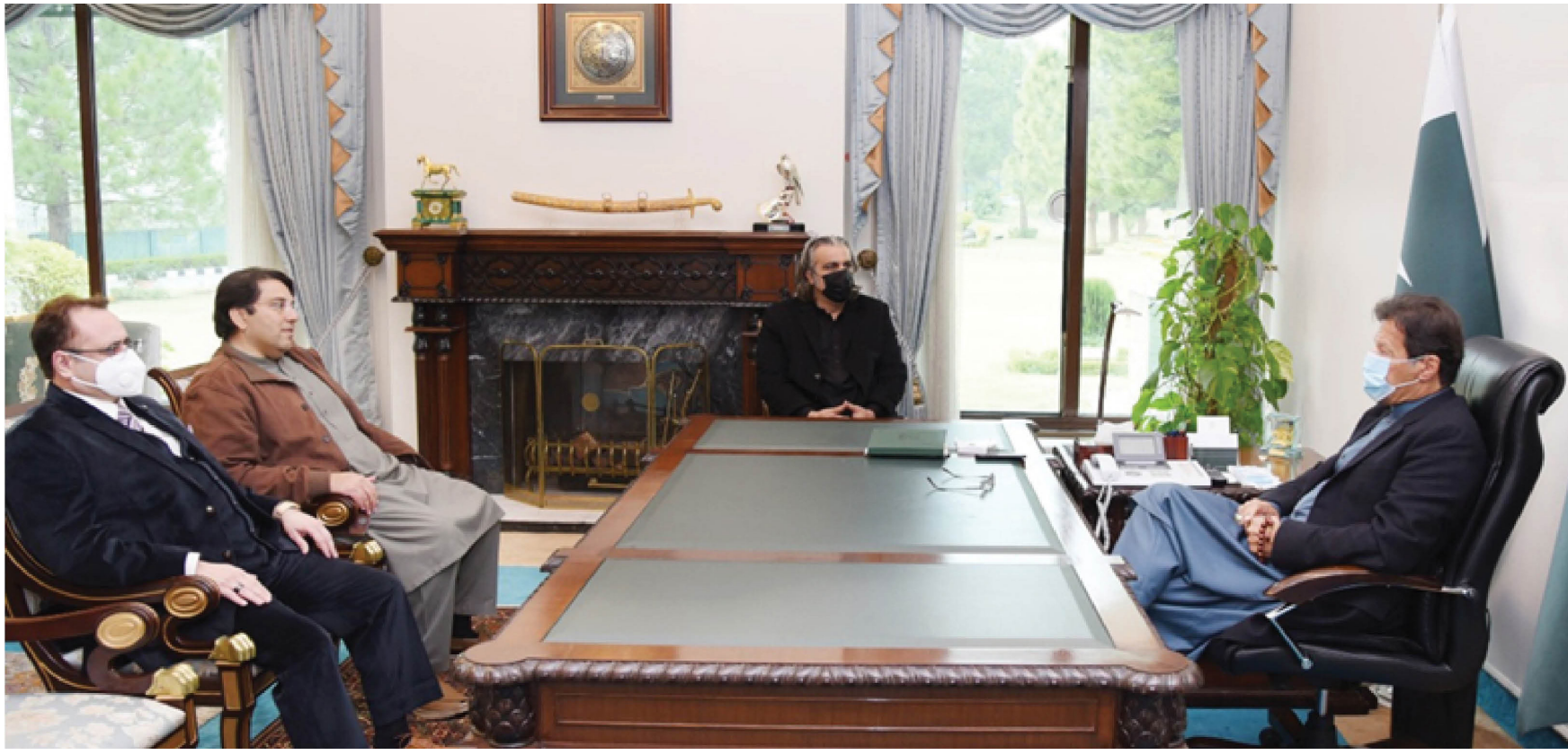

NADRA help sought to identify Karak temple attackers

ISLAMABAD: The police authorities in Karak has requested the National Database and Registration Authority (NADRA) to help establish the identity of the people visible in the temple attack videos collected by investigation teams. "We have sought the help of NADRA to arrest all the accused involved in the incident and we are also mobilising human intelligence teams as approximately

300 people have been charged in the FIR," said DIG Kohat Tayyab Hafiz Cheema while speaking to The Express Tribune, adding that around 109 suspects had already been arrested and efforts are being made to apprehend the rest. On the other hand, a local namely Abdul Shah has also been arrested by police. He is the man who moved the the local court against the renovation and extension of the temple two months ago. Local residents informed that in order to expand the building, the Hindu community collected mon-

ey and started paying triple the market price for the houses and shops located adjacent to it. "Abdullah Shah is a local resident who is an opportunist in nature. He witnessed the entire process and then purchased two shops in order to resell it to the Hindu community and make some money," they claimed. "By that time the Hindu community had largely acquired the land for the temple and despite Abdullah Shah's best efforts, they refused to buy more of it." This prompted Shah to play the religious card and he moved

the civil court against the renovation and extension plan because his financial stakes were directly involved. "Another local cleric Faizullah is also one of the masterminds of the attack. It is said that he was a Khatib in Pakistan Air Force (PAF) but during the Musharraf government he was court martialled and arrested," the locals added. "Then he came to Terri village and started working as a cleric and joined JUIF too."

Sources familiar with the incident said Faizullah is well known for his hawkish stance on all religious

matters and because of this he lost his government job in the past. "Faizullah has been on the run ever since the attack and police has been conducting raid to apprehend him," DPO Karak Irfanullah Marwat said, adding that Abdullah has already been arrested by police. On the other hand, locals also claimed that other clerics were instigating hatred and openly threatening an attack at the Hindu temple. Police, however, refuted any such reports. "We have no report of any hate speech by a local cleric," said DIG Cheema.

Orphan student takes NADRA to court for defying order

KARACHI: A Matriculation student approached on Friday the Sindh High Court (SHC) seeking contempt of court proceedings against NADRA for defying its order regarding issuance of a B-form. The orphan girl moved an application in the SHC, stating that NADRA is not issuing her B-form despite the court directives. Though the court had ordered for issuance of B-form on the basis of her maternal aunt's CNIC, NADRA has been asking her to bring her parents for the purpose, she lamented. Earlier, the SHC

had ordered NADRA to issue B-form to the Matriculation student on the basis of her maternal aunt's CNIC within ten days. During the hearing, the court asked a lawyer representing the Board of Secondary Education Karachi to explain why a B-form was necessary for issuance of an admit card for exams, to which he replied that it was necessary for a student's identification. Petitioner Maham Rahman stated before the court that the board refused to issue her an admit card for exam because she didn't have a B-form that NADRA issues on the basis of parents' CNICs.

CAA directed to share info about passengers

CAA as a regulator, cannot absolve itself from its responsibility of sharing rights of passengers by merely putting information about their rights on its web site, at some obscure corner, which is not easily accessible to the citizen, the Commission observed

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Information Commission has directed the Civil Aviation Authority to prominently display passengers' rights at airports, airlines counters, and on websites. According to details, on an appeal of a citizen the commission has issued a detail verdict and directed the Civil Aviation Authority to ensure information about the rights of passengers is prominently displayed at airports, on its web site and that passengers are apprised about their responsibilities as well as their rights through Public Ad-

dress Systems. Moreover, airlines should also make sure this information available on their web sites, electronic and printed tickets and at airline counters.

CAA as a regulator, cannot absolve itself from its responsibility of sharing rights of passengers by merely putting information about their rights on its web site, at some obscure corner, which is not easily accessible to the citizen, the Commission observed. A citizen, Abu Ahmed Akif had lodged an appeal against a private airline in which he had maintained that he was informed by its call center about the cancellation of the flight, (both

through text message and voice call) but he was not informed about his right to be endorsed on other airlines. He appealed with the commission that "While the airline has settled this case by providing additional tickets, the issue of dissemination of passenger rights on tickets and by call centers remains unresolved - and hence citizens continue to suffer both financial and other losses". The commission maintained that the Appellant has raised a pertinent point that "a commercial organization cannot be expected to act against its interests by giving full information on rights which hurts its commercial interests". The commission in its order has

observed that "it is responsibility of CAA, as a regulator, to ensure that both the commercial interests of airlines and the rights of passengers are protected". The twelve pages verdict of PIC states that the Right of Access to Information Act 2017 requires that citizens not only have 'improved access' to information but that the information should be made 'accessible' to all citizens, including citizens with low-literacy level and those with different disabilities. PIC order states, it would be stating the obvious that passengers should not be treated as a homogenous group of people while disseminating information

about their rights as passengers. Passengers also include those with different disabilities i.e., low-vision, blindness, speech, hearing and physical impairments. The ability to exercise the right of access to information by passengers with different disabilities is dictated by the nature of their different disabilities. As such, it is responsibility of the CAA to ensure that both the content and the design of the web sites of CAA and those of airlines is accessible and that information about rights of passengers should be provided catering to the special needs of passengers with different disabilities.

Karachi: Five motorcycles set ablaze

KARACHI: At least five motorcycles were set ablaze on Friday reportedly after commuters clashed with Shia community protestors near Drigh Road, Sharea Faisal in Karachi. The countrywide protests that began three days ago, to express solidarity with families of 11 Hazara community miners in Machh, Balochistan last week, have spread to over 15 different spots in Karachi. Road blocks put in place owing to the protests have resulted in gridlocks across the city at peak hours. However, traffic is being diverted from affected roads to alternative routes. The Shia Ulema Council, Majlis Wahdat-e-Muslimeen, Imamia Students Organisation along with other members of Shia community, have been staging sit-ins at multiple spots across Karachi, to express solidarity with the miners' families.

The sit-ins are being held at Numais Chowrang, Nipa Chowrang, University Road near Safari Park, Abul Hassan Isphani Road, Kamran Chowrang, Natha Khan Bridge, Qaidabad, Shah Faisal Colony, Power House Chowrang, Khuda ki Basti, Nazimabad no.1 and other locations.

Long queues of traffic choked University Road, MA Jinnah Road, Sharea Faisal and the National Highway. Both tracks of Abul Hassan Isphani Road also remained closed for traffic.

"Their [the miners' families] only demand is that Prime Minister Imran Khan visit them, condole the deaths of their beloved family members and give assurance that the perpetrators of the attack would be caught and punished at the earliest," said one of the protesters.

Parliamentary delegation visits Chaman border

Twenty Five lawbreakers including two gamblers netted

RAWALPINDI: Rawalpindi police in their crackdown against anti-social elements have arrested 25 outlaws including 14 for possessing liquor, drugs and weapons, three kite sellers, two gamblers, two proclaimed offenders, two drug peddlers and three for fireworks besides recovering 1430 kites, 18 kite flying string rolls, fireworks and other items from their possession. Waris Khan police held two namely Hamza Aziz and Arbab Safdar allegedly involved in betting while playing cards. Police also recovered cash stake money Rs 5000, three mobile phones, a rifle, a 30 bore pistol and other items from their possession. Police also arrested two kite sellers namely Noshawan, Abdullah and Usama Khursheed and recovered 1430 kites and 18 kite flying string rolls. - APP

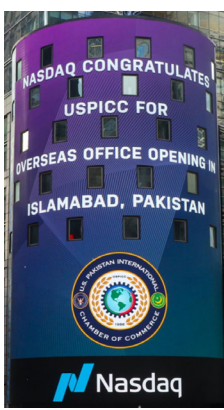
Nasdaq welcomes opening of USPICC office in Islamabad

Govt establishes Corona vaccination centre in Islamabad

ISLAMABAD: The ministry of National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination on Friday established first Corona vaccination centre in the federal capital at Tarlai as substantial progress is likely for early vaccine availability and deployment in country. According to an official of the ministry, the vaccination centre was equipped with latest facilities to maintain quality of vaccine while citizens have been asked to register themselves through helpline 1166. He said that the ministry has also started training of vaccination staff on Corona vaccine in the centre. He said that strict preventive measures were adopted to avoid further spread of Coronavirus in the country related with the closure of educational institutions besides fully implementation of Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs). He added the government had tried its level best to ensure adopting safety measures to protect citizens in order to contain the disease like imposing ban on public gatherings, marriages halls and restaurants and restriction on use of dining places of restaurants that resulted decrease in number of corona cases. He said that the government had adopted effective strategy to combat COVID-19 for reduction in corona cases in the country. He said that the government had also taken strict measures for prompt response to the disease. He added team at National Command and Operation Centre (NCOC) was doing efficient work against the disease. He said that the main focus of the strategy was to control the disease on one hand and maintaining business activities on the other hand. He said that all concerned federal, provincial, public and private institutions were playing remarkable role under NCOC against the disease. He said that all possible measures would be adopted to control COVID-19 to avoid further load on already burdened health system of the country. - DNA

AIOU spending billions on strengthening its network

AIOU is the only university of Pakistan which has established its own endowment fund and from current fiscal year all payments of pension would be made from its interest

ISLAMABAD: Allama Iqbal Open University (AIOU) was spending in billions on faculty development program, to strengthen IT infrastructure, expansion of regional network to the remotest and underdeveloped areas of the country as well as on providing financial assistance to deserving students. This was said by AIOU Vice Chancellor Prof Dr Zia Ul-Qayyum while addressing education beat reporters of Rawalpindi and Islamabad yesterday. He, further, added that uni-

versity has taken special measures to strengthen its financial sustainability and consequently university is managing all expenditures on the faculty development program, enhancement of university infrastructure as well as financial support of the students from its own resources. AIOU is the only university of Pakistan which has established its own endowment fund and from current fiscal year all payments of pension would be made from its interest. Within the limited time

period of two years, university has established 10 regional offices in the country. This network is being further expanded as the projects of establishing regional offices in Ziarat, Kashmir, Liyya, Khuzdar, Wana and Meran Shah are in the pipeline. Moreover, foundation stones have been laid in Mithi and Moro recently.

Similarly, he said, university is negotiating with the provincial governments and district administrations for acquiring government land to establish new regional centers in the remotest and underdeveloped areas of Sindh, Baluchistan, KPK, GB and AJK. In collaboration with Oracle Corporation, AIOU will have a state-of-the-art

automated application system to automate all academic, administrative and financial processes of the university by June 2021 making it the only university of Asia which would be fully transformed to automation, he added. While discussing AIOU's contributions in providing educational facilities to the underprivileged and marginalized segments of the society, Dr Zia Ul-Qayyum said that university offers free of cost education up to matriculation level to the people of Baluchistan and

former FATA besides transgender, prisoners and special children and from spring 2021 semester, this service would be provided to the people of GB as well. University would also initiate revision of curriculum at all levels from the next semester, he said. He concluded the media briefing while expressing the hope that media will support AIOU in its cause of providing education to the masses of Pakistan through its objective critique aimed at bringing reforms in the system. - APP

3 sentenced to death in blasphemous content case

ISLAMABAD: An Anti Terrorism Court (ATC) here Friday sentenced three accused to death involved in uploading of blasphemous content at social media. The court also announced ten-year imprisonment sentence and Rs100,000 fine to another accused on charges of disrespecting the religion. ATC Judge Raja Jawad Abbas Hassan announced the decision which was reserved earlier after listening the two sides at large. The court announced the sentence to the accused under sections A-295, C-295 and anti terrorism act's section G-7 after the charges proved against them. The three accused who were awarded death sentence included Nasir Ahmed, Abdul Waheed and Rana Noman while Professor Anwar Ahmed was awarded ten years imprisonment along fine. The accused were produced before the ATC from Adiala Jail amid foolproof security arrangements in place. It may be mentioned here that the Islamabad Police had registered first information report (FIR) against the four accused on directives of Islamabad High Court (IHC)'s Justice Shaukat Aziz Saddiqi on March 19, 2017 on the complaint of Hafiz Ahtisham. The court had reserved its judgment on December 15, 2020 after conclusion of arguments from both sides at large. The court had also declared other accused including Tayyab Sardar, Rao Qaiser Shahzad, Fazl Perwaiz and Pervaiz Iqbal as absconder and had issued their non-bailable arrest warrants. - APP

Police held 2 kite sellers; recover 1280 kites

RAWALPINDI: Rawalpindi police in their crackdown against kite sellers and kite flyers conducted raid and seized their stock of 1280 kites, 18 chemical strings rolls here on Friday. A police spokesman informed that Airport Police intercepted a vehicle and held Noshawan and Abdullah involved in kite selling illegally and recovered 1280 kites with 18 chemical string rolls from his possession. All the recovered kites and material has been taken into custody by police while accused have been sent behind the bar, spokesman said. He said, Police on the directives of City Police Officer (CPO) Rawalpindi Muhammad Ahsan Younas were conducting raids against the kite flying ban violators and taking action in accordance with the law. - APP

NADRA to inform about vaccination centers

ISLAMABAD: The government has completed preparations for vaccination against coronavirus. Health department staff has been trained under the supervision of NCOC and NADRA will provide patients with PIN codes and information about their respective vaccination centers through SMS. According to details, NADRA and Health Department have laid out their joint strategy as per the directive of NCOC. In the first phase, paramedical staff and doctors will be vaccinated. The Ministry of Health has set up centers in Tarlai and Benazir Bhutto Hospital Rawalpindi, while the NCOC also plans to set up vaccination centers across the country.

Worker's remittances surge 16.2% in December

ISLAMABAD: The workers' remittances sent by the overseas Pakistanis surged by 16.2 percent to 2.44 billion in December 2020 against same month of last year when the remittances inflow was recorded at \$2.1 billion. "Remittances from overseas Pakistanis rose further to \$2.4 bln in December compared to December 2019 and 4.2 percent over November 2020," said State Bank of Pakistan said in its official twitter account. For the first six months of this fiscal year, remittances reached \$14.2 billion and have risen 24.9 percent over last fiscal year. Efforts under the Pakistan Remittances Initiative (PRI) and the gradual re-opening of major host destinations such as Middle East, Europe and United States contributed to the sustained increase in workers' remittances. The details show that in December, the worker's inflow from USA increased from \$159.2 million last year to \$203.2 million in the same month of 2020, whereas from United Kingdom the inflow also surged to \$326.9 million from \$229 million in December 2019. Similarly from Saudi Arabia the workers' remittances also rose from \$577 million to 624.8 million while that from Dubai, Abu Dhabi, Sharjah, Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar, and Oman, the workers' inflow also rose to \$456.6 million, \$51 million, \$5.5 million, \$40 million, \$64 million and \$89 million respectively. The workers' remittances from European countries also jumped to \$246 million in December 2020 compared to the inflow worth of \$150 million in December 2019 and \$219 million in November 2020.

ATC sentences two times life RI in firing case

RAWALPINDI: An Anti Terrorist Court here Friday sentenced two times life Rigorous Imprisonment (RI) and a fine of Rs 3 million to an accused Danish Kiani in a case of firing on police officials while two co-accused Sajjad Shah and Ikram were awarded 22 years RI. The three accused were found guilty of firing on police officials at a check post in Airport Police station area in 2019 in which constable Waheed Iqbal was seriously injured. ATC Judge Shaukat Kamal Dar announced the verdict after recording evidence of the witnesses and final arguments by both sides.

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Ombudsman Friday submitted its 8th implementation report in the Supreme Court (SC) regarding miserable conditions of women in jails. In the report submitted by Secretary Wafaqi Mohtasib Secretariat (WMS), Dr Jamal Nasir through Hafiz Ahsan Khokhar, stated that all the Provinces had been directed to constitute two Committees including a District Oversight Committees and Welfare Committees for Improvement of life of prisoners in Jails especially for Children, Women and Destitute / Resource-less Prisoners. Ensuring that District Oversight Committees are constituted to monitor the implementation of Orders of Supreme Court in their respective Districts and to submit deficiencies, if any, to the respective Home Department / IG Prisons, it added. The report stated that these

committees should consist of members from the Civil Society, Bars, Education and Health Sectors, who had proven track record of significant contributions for improvement of life of the prisoners. The report stated that the Ministry of Interior and Provincial Home / Prison Departments had been directed to appoint Senior Officers to act as a Focal Person to enable surprise visits of the above said Committees. The Committees would submit a comprehensive schedule of visits to the respective Focal Persons, it added. According to the report, the Law & Justice Commission together with Advocates General and Provincial Ombudsmen to review and submit proposals for significant expansion of probation / parole facilities to reduce pressure on accommodation facilities in jails. The Probation and Parole

system also needed to be revisited and made more effective to deal not only with overcrowding but also for reformation of convicts, juvenile and first-time offenders, it added. The report suggested provincial governments to build jails in every district headquarter, and the Federal Government in Islamabad. Every jail should have separate and independent portion for women and juvenile prisoners, with sleeping space for every prisoner with adequate toilet and hygiene facilities, it proposed. The report suggested that there was a need to link Biometric system in jails with courts for maintaining the record of prisoners. Peshi roaster and jail record / registers should also be computerized / automated, it added. It suggested that the Provincial governments should be directed

to proceed accordingly and ensure development of an interface between jails, courts and NADRA for monitoring and verification of the prisoners' record. Drug users and mentally insane prisoners to be kept outside the premises of the jail in drug clinics/homes for mentally retarded prisoners and provided medical treatment, it stated and added that the hardcore/high profile criminals such as murderers, terrorist, extortionists should be kept separate from the ordinary or under trial prisoners who are not involved in such heinous crimes. It stated that the prisoners with HIV, Hepatitis, T.B. and drug addicts should be segregated and kept apart from other prisoners and strict surveillance should be done in jails for protecting the prisoners from physical and sexual assaults. It recommended that the Higher

Education Commission of Pakistan, the University falling in respective territorial area of jail, Allama Iqbal Open University, and other good reputed Government institutions/ organizations should be directed to assist in improving educational and skill training facilities including missing facilities / payment of fines to deserving prisoners. It stated that the concerned Ministries at Federal and Provincial level should be directed to allocate necessary funds and resources for improvement in jails and establishment of Prisoners Voluntary Donations Fund at provincial level be ensured. The report suggested that Pakistan Bar Council and Provincial Bar Councils should be advised to provide free legal aid to prisoners and especially, to the Under-Trial Prisoners and for appeal purpose. – APP

Osama Satti's family demands Judicial Inquiry Commission

ISLAMABAD: The family of young Osama Satti, who was brutally killed by Islamabad Police in the federal capital Islamabad, staged a protest rally from National Press Club Islamabad to D-Chowk on Friday along with civil society. Rally was attended by thousands of citizens from Murree, Kotli Satyan and the twin cities. The participants held banners and placards in their hands for a transparent investigation of Osama Sati murder case. On this occasion, the Joint Action Committee in the Osama murder case and the father of Osama Satti demand from the government to set up a Judicial Inquiry Commission for a transparent investigation of the case. They further said that the police was showing impartiality in the investigation of the case and our protest would continue till the killers of Osama were convicted. Upon reaching D-Chowk, protestors announced a sit-in till the demands are approved. A delegation of the administration led by Chairman Parliamentary Committee on Interior, Raja Khurram Nawaz and Deputy Commissioner Islamabad Hamza Shafiq held talks with the

sit-in committee. On the demand of committee, the District Magistrate wrote the Chief Commissioner Islamabad to request the Registrar Islamabad High Court to set up a Judicial Commission. After which the end of the sit-in was announced. Earlier five policemen arrested over their involvement in the murder of 22-year-old Osama Satti in an alleged staged shootout were axed from service. The cops, identified as sub-inspector Ifukhar Ahmed and constables Muhammad Mustafa, Shakeel Ahmed, Mudassar Mukhtiar, and Saeed, are currently in police custody on physical remand. They have been dismissed from service for "failing to handle the situation in professional manner and directly firing on the vehicle", thereby "bringing a bad name to the department." "Keeping in view of whole episode and his unprofessional approach towards official duties which has resulted [in] such unpleasant incident, the undersigned reached to the conclusion that his attitude towards official tasks is unbefitting and his further retention in the disciplined force like Islamabad Police is not justified," read a dismissal letter issued to one of the personnel.

Capital records 155 fresh corona cases

ISLAMABAD: The COVID-19 cases continued to surge in the federal capital as 155 new corona cases were reported from the city during the last 24 hours, National Command and Operation Center (NCOC) said on Friday. According to an official of NCOC, as many as 156 cases were reported on Thursday while 136 cases were reported on Wednesday. He said so far 38,842 cases were reported from the federal capital while 436 deaths were reported from Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT). He added 36,231 patients had been recovered completely. Meanwhile, on the direction of Ministry of National Health Services, the district administration of Islamabad had continued smart lockdown in different streets of the capital to reduce transmission of the infection in the selected streets and other sectors. They also started taking actions on violation of standard operating procedures (SOPs) related with the corona while visiting marriage halls, markets and petrol pumps by its inspection teams. The administration also sealed schools, shops, workshop and restaurants on violation of SOPs. The inspection teams also issued notices to marriage halls besides imposing fines on owners of different shops. Commenting on the situation, an official of Ministry of National Health Services said that several local level administrative decisions were made to control the disease. He advised the citizens to continue following the social distancing, use of mask and other precautionary measures to stop increasing local transmission of COVID-19 in the city. He said the government had adopted effective strategy to combat COVID-19 that resulted reduction in corona cases in the country.

Man held for refilling gas illegally

RAWALPINDI: Ganjmandi Police have arrested a man for illegally refilling gas cylinders here on Thursday, informed police spokesman. During course of action, police have also confiscated material and instruments from his possession. The arrested accused was identified as Pir Muhammad. Police have registered a case against him. City Police Officer Muhammad Ahsan Younas appreciated the performance of the police adding that strict action must be taken against the perpetrators who were involved in endangering the lives of the other people. – APP

Exports increase 5% in H1

ISLAMABAD: The exports from the country increased by 4.98 percent during the first half (H1) of the current fiscal year (2020-21) as compared to the corresponding period of last year, Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported. The exports from the country during July-December (2020-21) were recorded at \$12.098 billion against the exports of \$11.524 billion during July-December (2019-20), according to the latest PBS data. The imports into the country during the period under review also increased by 5.72 percent by growing from \$23.195 billion last year to \$24.521 billion during the first half of current fiscal year. Based on the figures, the country's trade deficit increased by 6.44 percent during the first half compared to the corresponding period of last year. The trade deficit during the first six months of the current fiscal year was recorded at \$12.423 billion against the deficit of \$11.671 billion last year. Meanwhile, on year-on-year basis, the exports from the country increased by 18.31 percent during the month of December 2020 as compared to the exports of December 2019. The exports during December 2020 were recorded at \$2.352 billion against the exports of \$1.988 billion in December 2019, the data revealed. The imports into the country also increased from \$4.020 billion in December 2019 to \$5.035 billion in December 2020, showing growth of 25.25 percent. On month-on-month basis, the exports from the country increased by 8.19 percent during December 2020 when compared to the exports of \$2.174 billion in November 2020. – APP

Chaos at the Capitol

The scene at the US Capitol in Washington DC resembled more a site of a parliament overtaken by civil war rather than a semblance of democracy on Wednesday. Hundreds of US President Donald Trump's supporters stormed the meeting place of the US Congress in an unprecedented attempt to overturn his election defeat, leading to a confrontation with the police in the hallways, smashing windows and infrastructure, ultimately leading to one death and several injured. The attack was eventually controlled after more than three hours of struggle, the Police declared the building secure, and both houses of Congress resumed their work on certifying Biden's Electoral College win but under heavy guard. However, the eventual control of the invasion should not take away from just how serious this event was—it was an assault on US democracy the likes of which were not seen in the last 200 years. The invasion has shocked Republicans and Democrats alike—it had been thought inconceivable that the strife between the two factions of the country would boil over to a riot onto the US Capitol. There is a lesson for all countries here. Taking advantage of and furthering cultural clashes might seem politically beneficial in the short-term—but those can have a butterfly effect, leaving behind division that could take centuries to undo. Fanning the flames of bigotry towards segments of a country's own population may win votes for the meantime, but the impact it can have on the country's political stability and institutions can be highly dangerous and volatile. Improving relations between political divides and believing in unity and civility, despite differences, is vital for a country's preservation. The government and the opposition in Pakistan should take note—while it may be tempting to see the US situation as irrelevant, it should serve as a reminder to us what extreme rhetoric can culminate into.

Rising pensions

According to the State Bank of Pakistan, public sector pension spending has gone up exponentially within Fiscal Year (FY) 2021—accounting for 18.7 percent share of the total tax revenue. This is a problem that could affect the country negatively in the long term, as such high spending creates an unstable economic structure that disables the government to cater to other expenses of the state.

The pension payment system of Pakistan is one that is proving to be a massive burden on the economy primarily because it is unfunded in nature. We follow a pay-as-you-go (PAYG) system through which retirement benefits are guaranteed to even those employees who fail to make personal contributions from their salaries. Furthermore, an increase in life expectancy rates entails that pensions are paid out for a longer period of time, thereby exaggerating the problem. Even the fact that investment returns have been lower than expected is also likely to lead towards a shortfall that takes away from other valuable ventures of the government.

If we do not address this issue and brush it under the rug, we may as well see our economic decline worsen in an already tough economic climate. Already, according to the World Bank, civil service pensions are set to overtake overall wage expenses by the years 2023 and 2028 in Punjab and Sindh. This would be catastrophic as the country would be paying its unproductive workers more than its productive ones.

As such, what we need right now is to come up with a sustainable strategy that carries the weight of the expense and emphasises the importance of reinvesting pensions and provident funds into government campaigns so as to keep the momentum flowing. This is a sure-fire way through which the government can ensure income generation all the while allowing for the masses to enjoy retirement benefits.

Rumi: Compassion beyond all faiths

I reflected on how Rumi's message of love and peace offers a life of love and purity while the faiths that enforce violence in the name of religion only to spread terror, have nothing to offer other than hate and fear. Through my reflection I have come to realize the power of words in uniting or dividing the humankind and commit to doing the former. One of the most beautiful expressions of love that I found in Turkey was the plantation of trees by the Turkish government at the Kecioren Park memorial site in Kartaltepe

We all possess a centered place of wisdom, affection and stability within us but the truth is that we all swing away from that place, from time to time. In life it is essential that we acquire a path adjusting device for our balance that can guide us back to our purpose. There are many models of faith, beliefs and

convictions who offer different experiences in life and then there is the way of a man who has love for his Creator, and everything created by Him. He finds everything around him to be an expression of that love and compassion. One such model is the great mystic poet, Maulana Rumi, whose six-volume "Masnavi" is a collection of inspirational verses and one of the most influential works of mysticism. The world is familiar with Rumi and his works. I would like to share my own experience of being one of those who keenly wished to visit his city. I remember visiting his tomb as a child while living in Turkey, but at that time I had no idea of what the religion of love and compassion was really about. It wasn't till I grew up and started exploring life's real purpose, that I realized the power of living with compassion. Life will definitely have an impact on you if you are in search of truth and its experience flows through you like the light of knowledge. Every time I read about great thinkers and their works, I would think of the time I had gone to Maulana's mausoleum as a child, and wanted to experience that once again, but this time fully aware of my presence at this respectable place. Reading through his poetry has always been like walking with a navigation of verses to guide us. This time while visiting Turkey, I planned to visit Konya, too, and I was glad that life had given me this opportunity to pay homage to this great poet that I admire so much. I heard that once you visit the Maulana's tomb in Konya, you are bound to go there seven times or as people say that Rumi calls you seven times if you go to visit him once. Well, that's

definitely a fun saying made by his followers or something my brother makes sure everyone abides by, but I really enjoyed it because I would love to go there again and experience the presence of love and affection.

Standing there I felt like it is not only the city that is dedicated to him, but you can see his influence throughout the country where the people are the politest and respectful. I had lived in Turkey as a child and still love going there due to the love and respect that people have, which is only a strong conviction of the fact that "the religion of love and unity is beyond all faiths." Rumi died on December 17, 1273. He had been a devout Muslim for all his life, praying five times and keeping all the required fasts while writing about belief in a "religion of love" that crosses over traditional boundaries of the faith system.

I reflected on how Rumi's message of love and peace offers a life of love and purity while the faiths that enforce violence in the name of religion only to spread terror, have nothing to offer other than hate and fear. Through my reflection I have come to realize the power of words in uniting or dividing the humankind and commit to doing the former. One of the most beautiful expressions of love that I found in Turkey was the plantation of trees by the Turkish government at the Kecioren Park memorial site in Kartaltepe. Trees are planted to honour the martyrs of Peshawar School (16th December 2014 terrorist act). I feel compelled to share this because it is merely unfortunate that there is no mention of this worthy forest on Google or any other social network. At least not one that I could

find easily while every other tiny jiff can be googled easily.

Rumi gave his followers instructions to treat the night of his death like a joyous night of union. For Rumi, the presence of the performers specified that the deceased was both a Muslim and a lover of his Creator. But there were also Jewish rabbis reciting psalms, and Christian priests reading from the Gospels at Rumi's funeral. It was clear that Rumi had become a well-respected figure within other holy communities. Rumi's poetry that is largely tolerant of all people and other faiths still continues to touch hearts across the world. "When we are dead, seek not our tomb in the earth, but find it in the hearts of men." Allama Iqbal is not only our national poet but one of my favourites, too, and the inspiration that Iqbal derived from Rumi is mirrored in his work 'Pir-o-Mureed' (1935). It is a dialogue between Iqbal and Rumi written in both Urdu and Persian, and in one of the verses, Iqbal (mureed) says to Rumi (pir), "You, the leader of the lovers of God; I do remember your exalted words." The earnest form of love for Rumi, as a mystic, involves escape from the self-centered whims of the ego. His inspiring words remind us how poetry can be a nourishing part of everyday life.

For me Rumi's divine literature is a strong testimony of the powerful impact that words and poetry can have in our lives and on our souls. So, we need to share a purposeful life with your friends and family to create unity and awareness.

The day Trump finally lost it

They did so roundly and laid siege to the Capitol Building, then stormed it and wreaked havoc in its halls. The dramatic images from the crime scene were truly shocking and until yesterday, thoroughly unimaginable, except in a sensational Hollywood movie. Some of the rioters, dressed up to look tough, seemed more like cosplay partygoers plucked out of a Halloween event. The last time Congress was ransacked was by the British more than two centuries ago. Trump's populist attack on the electoral process and his determination to disrupt the Senate certifying the election results was condemned as "a coup attempt", "an insurrection", and a case of "domestic terrorism". This is indeed a bit exaggerated. But guess what – these condemnations were voiced not by Democrats or Liberals, but by prominent Republicans, who have grown fed up with the president's increasingly dangerous shenanigans. It seems Trump finally overplayed his hand and alienated many of his own allies. This time, he did not merely assault a member of Congress, a federal branch or a cabinet secretary, but he actually launched an attack on the constitution, the Congress and American democracy as a whole – all to remain in office. Trump has shown he cares for power and power only, that he does not really care for the Republicans or the American people, let alone for making America great again. Worse, he has demonstrated the will and willingness to bring the GOP

and the country down with him.

And he almost did. He almost turned America into a truly "s***hole country". He just could not help himself after his loss. He would not shut up about it and accept the results after the courts threw out his fabricated cases alleging election tampering. Instead, he went on to undermine the certification of the election results by any means possible. And it backfired.

Trump has been such an egotistical narcissist, that he has used what is left of his star power to undermine his own populist movement, demanding it does all to reverse the election results.

He pressured Republican state and national leaders to reject the results. Some have acquiesced; others refrained from doing his dirty work for him. They not only failed to stop Congress from certifying Joe Biden's win but will also pay the price of undermining the people's will.

By revealing his true colours, his naked ambition, Trump is now losing the sympathies and trust of many of the 74 million Americans who voted for him. These people were loyal enough to cast their ballot to re-elect him, despite his incompetence and his mismanagement of the coronavirus pandemic that led to the death of more than 360,000 Americans. No more.

White nationalists and conservative evangelists, who make up the backbone of today's Republican Party, may still anoint him king of America, but fewer and fewer Republicans and Americans, in general, will go along after the January 6 carnage.

Trump's populist agenda has taken such a beating that it may be too toxic for Republican leaders to maintain and may end up splitting the party. It is all too

possible that Trumpism will go down with Trump after January 20.

This is quite significant and should be celebrated not just in the US but also abroad. But the signs of Trumpism's downward trajectory were evident even before the storming of Capitol Hill. In the January 5 runoffs in Georgia, a Confederate state and traditionally a Republican stronghold, Trump's utter obsession with his own loss cost the Republicans two Senate seats and ultimately their majority in the Senate. This would certainly facilitate Biden's pursuit of implementing his agenda which partly will be about the undoing of Trump's agenda. But will Biden stop there or will he hold Trump responsible for what Democrats consider treasonous violations of democracy and the rule of law?

Generally, US presidents have refrained from pursuing their predecessors legally or otherwise, mainly for fear of establishing dangerous precedents, allowing their successors to prosecute them as well.

So just as President Barack Obama turned the page on the George Bush presidency, so will Biden turn the page on the Trump era, leaving state prosecutors to chase after him.

Some are still wondering if Trump will use his last two weeks in office to embark on a foreign military venture, say, against Iran.

This may have been possible throughout the past two months, but the debacle on Capitol Hill crippled him politically and disabled his policy adventurism.

January 6 may have been a dark moment in US history, but it may well pave the way for a new day in America.

you should be ashamed of yourself," she added. The PML-N vice president was referring to the prime minister's statement from earlier in the day when he said that making the burial [of the dead] conditional on the prime minister's visit was not appropriate.

"This is akin to blackmailing the prime minister," he had said. The Hazaras have refused to bury 11 slain coal miners who were shot dead in cold blood last week at Machh by unidentified assailants. Protest sit-ins have taken place in various parts of the country over the tragedy. Maryam lamented that the Hazaras were sitting out in the open, in the freezing temperature, with the bodies of their loved ones and the prime minister had yet not visited the area.

"They are asking you to come and place your hand over their heads," she said, referring to the bereaved families. "They are asking for some guarantees [from PM Imran Khan] and will bury the dead after that," added the PML-N leader.

Maryam said that visiting the grieving families was the prime minister's obligation and "he will have to do this". "You have time to meet Turkish dramas and meet actors," she said in reference to the prime minister's meeting with the founding team of the Turkish hit TV series Ertugrul from the previous day. "You have time to play with your dogs but not place your hand over the heads of the oppressed," she added.

S Africa announce test squad for Pak tour

ISLAMABAD: Fast bowler Daryn Dupavillon and medium-pacer Othniel Baartman have received maiden call ups to South Africa's Test squad for Pakistan. They are part of a 21-member group that will travel to Pakistan for a two-Test series starting on January 26, website Espncricinfo.com. reported on Friday. The pair replace Glenton Stuurman and Migael Pretorius, who were part of the squad that played against Sri Lanka but both suffered injuries in training and have not recovered in time to travel. Top-order batsman Raynard van Tonder also misses out after fracturing his finger. The series will be South Africa's first in Pakistan since 2007. South Africa have included three spinners in their squad - Keshav Maharaj, George Linde and Tabraiz Shamsi - and as many as nine pace-bowling options. Both Kagiso Rabada and Dwaine Pretorius have been cleared to play after missing the Sri Lanka series while recovering from groin and hamstring injuries respectively. "Considering that the conditions that will be faced are largely unknown to the South African team, we wanted to strengthen the attack with the skill sets that Tabraiz Shamsi and George Linde have to offer, while giving players like Daryn Dupavillon and Othniel Baartman an opportunity after making strong cases for themselves in recent seasons," Victor Mpitsang, South Africa's convener of selectors, said.

EU chief warns members cannot negotiate separate vaccine deals

That move allows EU governments to double their orders from Pfizer to 600 million doses, as the bloc races to inoculate its 450 million people

BRUSSELS: European Union member states will not be permitted to negotiate separate vaccine deals with pharmaceutical companies, in parallel to the bloc's efforts as a whole, European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen said on Friday. She told reporters at the EU's headquarters in Brussels that the 27-member bloc would continue to work as one to secure vaccine doses from suppliers. "The only framework we are negotiating in is as 27," she said. "We do this together and no member state on this legal binding basis is allowed to negotiate in parallel or to have a contract in parallel."

Von der Leyen's comments came amid reports that some EU countries have tried to secure separate deals with vaccine manufacturers and as she announced the European Commission - the EU's executive branch - had reached a deal with Pfizer and BioNTech for 300 million additional doses of their COVID-19 vaccine. That move allows EU governments to double their orders from Pfizer to 600 million doses, as the bloc races to inoculate its 450 million people. Combined with a contract with Moderna for its vaccine, the EU now has the capacity to vaccinate 380 million people, von der Leyen said, more than 80 percent of the EU's population. The EU commission later said in a statement it offered to member states to buy an

additional 200 million doses of the vaccine, with the option to acquire another 100 million doses. "This would enable the EU to purchase up to 600 million doses of this vaccine, which is already being used across the EU. The additional doses will be delivered starting in the second quarter of 2021," the EU said. Von der Leyen said 75 million of the extra doses would be available during the second quarter, with the rest being delivered throughout 2021. Doses are usually shared among EU states in proportion to their population, but it is unclear whether all governments will make orders based on the new contract. The European Commission negotiates vaccine contracts on behalf of EU member states and

as of Friday, had sealed contracts for more than two billion doses with Moderna, AstraZeneca, Sanofi-GSK, Janssen Pharmaceutica NV, Pfizer-BioNTech and CureVac. Only the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna vaccines have been approved for use so far in the bloc. But there has been growing criticism, in Germany for instance, about the decision to let the commission handle vaccine purchases for all EU members. Germany said on Monday it had agreed with BioNTech to supply 30 million additional doses in a side deal, although the timing of the delivery is unclear. The German move agreed in September - but revealed only this week as the government faced pressures at home - appeared to be in contrast with EU rules. But Ger-

many has said its agreement with BioNTech does not affect contracts between the company and the EU. Meanwhile, the health minister of Portugal, which holds the six-month EU presidency, said separately on Friday any side deals for COVID-19 vaccines by EU countries cannot undermine the bloc's joint orders. Health Minister Marta Temido told reporters the EU should strive for as much of a joint approach to combating the coronavirus pandemic - including on vaccine purchases - as possible. That did not rule out member states taking further steps on their own if they deem them necessary, she said, but stressed that any vaccine side deals "couldn't run any risk" to what was already agreed under joint purchases.

US reports over 4,000 deaths for first time

WASHINGTON: The United States has reported more than 4,000 coronavirus deaths in one day for the first time since the outbreak of the coronavirus pandemic in December 2019, as health systems struggle to cope with the number of sick and dying patients. A total of 4,033 people died in connection with the disease within 24 hours, according to the COVID Tracking Project. The country has seen a total of 365,000 deaths linked to the coronavirus so far, according to data from the Johns Hopkins University, out of a population of 330 million people. On Thursday, more than 266,000 new cases were re-

ported, bringing the total tally to more than 21.6 million cases. Case numbers are particularly high in the state of California, especially in Los Angeles County, where more than 20 percent test results are coming back positive. Parts of California issued fresh lockdown orders and the governor said on Thursday that the state could run out of intensive care unit capacity within weeks. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) forecast on Thursday that 12,900 to 24,900 deaths "will likely be reported" in the week ending January 30. By that date, the CDC projected the country's overall death toll would be in the range of 405,000 to 438,000.

BAKU: President Ilham Aliyev has warned the Armenian authorities and foreign citizens against making illegal visits to Azerbaijan's internationally-recognized territories, describing such visits as a provocation. Addressing an online government meeting on the results of 2020 that was held on January 6, Aliyev said that the Armenian foreign minister's recent visit to Khankandi was in contradiction to the trilateral peace deal signed by the Azerbaijani, Russian and Armenian leaders on November 10. "These visits must stop. We warn them if such provocative steps continue to be taken, Armenia will regret it even more... If a similar step is repeated, our response will be very harsh. We first warned them through the Foreign Ministry. Further warnings will be given differently," he added. Aliyev questioned such provocative

visits against the background of steps that are now being taken to normalize relations between Azerbaijan and Armenia. "Russia has offered its mediation opportunities to the parties. A delegation of Russian government officials recently visited Armenia and Azerbaijan and mainly discussed these issues. After all, if relations normalize, then what is the need for such provocative 'visits'? What are they trying to show? Are they trying to irritate us again? Let them not forget that such steps cost them dearly. Therefore, all visits must stop," he said. The president added that no foreign citizen can enter that area without Azerbaijan's permission. "No international organization except for the Red Cross can go there. This is our territory. The whole world recognizes this territory as an integral part of Azerbaijan... No one should have any business in our territory," he said. Aliyev underlined that Azerbaijan



previously conveyed its concern to Russian peacekeepers deployed in the region that no foreign citizen could visit Nagorno-Karabakh without Baku's permission. "Representatives of the parliaments of different countries used to go there, but let's see how they will go there now. A delegation went there from France, members of their parliament. Unfortunately, the peacekeepers gave them this permission. "We are turning a blind eye to that, so to speak. Why? Because we understand that people live there, we understand that winter has come and the weather is cold. Some work must be done there so that this winter does not create problems for the Armenians living there. This is why we have created this opportunity. Most of the cargo goes there through Azerbaijan now. We gave them this opportunity. Cargoes go to Barda by rail and then are taken to Nagorno-Karabakh by automobiles." The president spoke about vandalism and destruction carried out in Azerbaijan's lands that used to under the Armenian occupation for

three decades. Aliyev stressed that despite the fact that Armenia cut off Azerbaijan's water for 30 years and left 100,000 hectares of land without water even though both Sarsang and Sugovushan reservoirs were built at national leader Heydar Aliyev's initiative, Baku will not take the path of Yerevan. "The people living in Nagorno-Karabakh today are our citizens. As I have said, they will see that they will live better under Azerbaijan's leadership. This is why we have created these opportunities for them. Otherwise, it is very difficult to transport cargo there via the Lachin corridor. We have taken other steps to carry out humanitarian work there. Let me reiterate that although the document signed on November 10 does not stipulate this, we have created these opportunities," he said. Aliyev noted that the trilateral statement should be the basis for future activities as no other document had been signed apart from that.

country's first Special Technology Zones Authority (STZA), Prime Minister Imran Khan inaugurated a technology park in the federal capital Islamabad. While addressing the event, PM Khan said that the establishment of STZs will generate employment in the country, whereas, overseas Pakistanis could also get benefits of the STZ authority. He said that the government will provide maximum assistance to resolve issues being faced by the special technology zones authority. Earlier, PM Imran Khan chaired the first session of the Special Technology Zones Authority (STZA) of which the premier is himself heading its board of governors. During the session, the authority approved the plan for laying a network of technology zones across the country. Amer Ahmed Hashmi said in a statement that the premier is launching a game-changer project as a target was set up for expanding country's IT exports to \$15 billion. He added that the government will bring top information technology (IT) companies to the country.

Hashmi detailed that the government had granted tax incentives to IT companies for a period of 10 years besides deciding to establish mini-tech cities. It may be noted that Amer Ahmed Hashmi had been appointed as the chairperson of the Special Technology Zones Authority (STZA) which was formed after the promulgation of an ordinance by President Arif Alvi in December last year.

Earlier on December 9, Prime Minister Imran Khan had inaugurated the country's first National Science and Technology Park at National University of Sciences & Technology (NUST). Pakistan's first National Science and Technology Park was established in the vicinity of NUST and being hailed as the country's largest innovation and research ecosystem.

The high-tech IT Park houses more than forty companies, including start-ups, Small Medium Enterprises (SMEs), and tech giants. The park will serve as a launchpad for the country's leading researchers, innovators, and entrepreneurs.

Pfizer likely effective against UK variant

NEW YORK: Pfizer Inc and BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine appeared to work against a key mutation in the highly transmissible new variants of the coronavirus discovered in the United Kingdom and South Africa, according to a laboratory study conducted by the US drugmaker. The study, yet to be peer-reviewed by Pfizer researchers and scientists from the University of Texas Medical Branch, indicated the vaccine was effective in neutralising virus with the so-called N501Y mutation of the spike protein. The mutation could be responsible for greater transmissibility and there had been concern it could also make the virus escape antibody neutralisation elicited by the vaccine, said Phil Dormitzer, one of Pfizer's top viral vaccine scientists.

The study was conducted on blood taken from people who had been given the vaccine. Its findings are limited because it does not look at the full set of mutations found in either of the new variants of the rapidly spreading virus. Dormitzer said it was encouraging that the vaccine appears effective against the mutation, as well as 15 other mutations the company has previously tested against. "So we've now tested 16 different mutations, and none of them have really had any significant impact. That's the good news," he said. "That doesn't mean that the 17th won't." Dormitzer noted another mutation found in the South African variant, called the E484K mutation, is also concerning. The researchers plan to run similar tests to see if the vaccine is effective against other mutations found in the UK and South African variants and hope to have more data within weeks. Scientists have expressed concern that vaccines being rolled out may not be able to protect against the new variants, particularly the one that emerged in South Africa.

Pakistan urges UN to act against fake NGOs

NEW YORK: Pakistan has urged United Nations committee to act against NGOs involved in massive disinformation campaign to damage the reputation and hurt the interests of a member state. In a letter to Chairman of the Committee on NGOs, Mohamed Sallam Adam, Ambassador Munir Akram drew his attention to the "startling revelations" made by EU DisinfoLab, a Brussels-based independent and NGO, about the blatant abuse by at least 10 NGOs of their consultative status with the Economic and Social Council. Pakistani envoy said that NGO Committee is mandated to regulate the United Nations' relationship with non-governmental organizations. He also wrote that it is equally important that the committee undertake comprehensive review of its working methods with a view to prevent such abuse by fake NGOs in the future. - Agencies

Beggars suspected to be using abducted children

KARACHI: Police have detained dozens of beggars in the metropolis after suspecting that children seen with them may have been abducted. The police are also planning to carry out DNA tests of the arrested individuals as well as the children to verify their suspicion. The police, in collaboration with 10 agencies, have initiated a joint investigation to launch a crackdown on the beggar mafia in the city. Speaking to a private news channel, Karachi police chief Ghulam Nabi Memon said that some important decisions have been taken in this regard. "The Sindh government's Social Welfare Department, the Child Protection Authority, Roshni Helpline, Saylani Welfare Trust, the Anti-Violent Crime Cell, Traffic Police, and other organisations are collaborating with the police," he said. According to Ghulam Nabi Memon, there is growing evidence that Karachi beggars are involved in several criminal activities, including drug trafficking. "Most of these beggars do not belong to the native population of the city. They either speak Seraiki and have been involved in the begging 'profession' for many generations, or belong to the Bengali or Burmese ethnic groups," the police chief said, adding that many of them are also foreign citizens, with a large number of them being Afghans. "During our meeting with different organisations, we raised our suspicion about the children accompanied by these beggars and have decided to carry out DNA tests to find out if the children have been abducted," he said. - APP

Saudi Arabia to allow all Intl flights from March 31

Democrats mull second Trump impeachment

Trump released a video in which he denounced the violence that saw one person shot dead by police

WASHINGTON: Congressional Democrats were moving closer to a historic step on Friday as they weighed impeaching US President Donald Trump for a second time, two days after his false claims of election fraud helped encourage a mob that breached the US Capitol. Top Democratic leaders, including House of Representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, called for immediate impeachment proceedings if Vice President Mike Pence and Trump's cabinet refused to take steps to remove Trump from power. "The president's dangerous and seditious acts necessitate his immediate removal from office," they said in a statement on Thursday evening, accusing Trump of inciting an "insurrection". As calls for his ouster mounted on Thursday, Trump released a video

in which he denounced the violence that saw one person shot dead by police and three die from medical emergencies. The Republican president came the closest yet to conceding his loss in the Nov 3 presidential election, promising to ensure a smooth transition to a "new administration". President-elect Joe Biden, a Democrat, is set to be sworn in on Jan 20. Trump's words were in stark contrast to his speech on Wednesday, when he exhorted a crowd of thousands to descend upon the Capitol as Congress met to certify Biden's election victory. Rioters stormed the building, overwhelming police and forcing authorities to transport lawmakers to secure locations for their own safety. A Capitol police officer died from injuries sustained in the assault, the force said late on Thursday, bringing to five the number of related deaths. With less than two weeks left in Trump's term, it was not clear whether enough time remained to complete the impeachment process. Pelosi has not announced a decision, though she made clear at a news conference that rank-and-file Democrats in her caucus were clamouring for action in the wake of Wednesday's siege.



If impeached in the House, Trump would theoretically face trial in the Republican-controlled Senate, which is scheduled to be in recess until Jan 19. Aides to Mitch McConnell, the majority leader, have not said what he would do if the House approves articles of impeachment. The Democratic-led House impeached Trump in December 2019 for pressuring the president of Ukraine to investigate Biden, but the Republican-led Senate acquitted him in February 2020. Only two other presidents in history have been impeached, and none has ever been impeached twice. Democrats will control the Senate after sweeping two runoff elections in Georgia on Tuesday, but the new senators, Jon Ossoff and Raphael Warnock, will not be sworn in until the state certifies the results. The state deadline to do so is Jan 22, though it could come sooner.

'Govt not to hinder opposition's protest'

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Interior Sheikh Rasheed Ahmed on Friday said the government would not create any hindrance in the opposition's protests. The minister said that his ministry was in efforts to improve law and order situation in the country. He said that the facility of online visas had been introduced while 100,000 Computerized National Identity Cards will be issued on daily basis. The Interior Ministry will also set up a media center for the journalists, he said.

She informed that China, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh held the first anti-epidemic cooperation and poverty reduction cooperation on January 6. Over 2400 virus cases reported

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has reported 48 deaths in the last 24 hours by novel coronavirus as the number of positive cases has surged to 497,510. The nationwide tally of fatalities has jumped to 10,558 on Friday. According to the latest figures by the National Command and Operation Center (NCOC), 2,435 persons tested positive for COVID-19 in the past 24 hours. Sindh remains the worst-hit province by the pandemic in terms of cases followed by Punjab, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Balochistan. Punjab has overtaken Sindh in most number of casualties. Till now 222,999 coronavirus cases have been confirmed in Sindh, 143,511 in Punjab, 60,536 in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, 18,314 in Balochistan, 38,842 in Islamabad, 8,430 in Azad Kashmir and 4,878 in Gilgit-Baltistan. Furthermore 4,221 individuals have lost their lives to the epidemic in Punjab, 3,670 in Sindh, 1,710 in KP, 186 in Balochistan, 436 in Islamabad, 234 in Azad Kashmir and 101 in GB.

Hazara protest continues for sixth day

QUETTA: Thousands of Hazara community members along with families and relatives of ten slain miners, who were shot dead in Machh area of Kachhi district on Sunday, continue their sit-in on Quetta's Western Bypass with dead bodies on the sixth consecutive day (Friday), media reported. The latest round of negotiations between government representatives and organisers of sit-in protests also remained unsuccessful. The sit-in protesters are still awaiting Prime Minister Imran Khan's arrival in Quetta to meet the bereaved families of victims of Machh coalmine massacre. Earlier on Wednesday, leaders of various political parties reached Quetta to express solidarity with the families and relatives of ten slain miners who were shot dead in Machh area of Kachhi district on Sunday. Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) vice-president Maryam Nawaz, Pakistan People's Party chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari and Jamiat Ulema-i-Islam-Fazl (JUI-F) leader Maulana Abdul Ghafoor Haideri reached Quetta to express solidarity with the bereaved families. Meanwhile, one of the organizers of sit-in protest Syed Raza Ali has appealed to Prime Minister Imran Khan to come to Quetta to meet with and reassure the bereaved families of the victims.
