They vowed to work together especially at the United Nations in jointly mobilizing the international community to help stop these attacks. The leaders also agreed that the two

ISLAMABAD: The national tally on Wednesday of total active COVID-19 cases recorded 76,536 with 2,869 more people tested positive for the deadly virus and 5,200 people recovered from the disease during the last 24 hours. One hundred and four corona patients have died during past 24 hours, 89 of whom were under treatment in hospital and 15 out of the hospital in their respective quarantines or homes, according to the latest update issued by the National command and Operation Centre (NCOC). During the past 24 hours,

most of the deaths have occurred in the Punjab followed by Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Out of the total 104 deaths occurred in the last 24 hours 49 of them had died who were under treatment on ventilators. The National Covid positivity ratio during past 24 hours was recorded 7.42 percent.

Israel must be held accountable for war crimes

PNC indicates that the Israeli occupation air force bombed civilian targets in Gaza

RAMALLAH: Palestine National Council (PNC) said that Israel's military aggression against Palestinian civilians in Gaza Strip and the rest of the occupied West Bank cities, including the occupied city of Jerusalem, is a crime to be added to its criminal record against the

Palestinian people. In a statement issued this evening PNC indicated that the Israeli occupation air force bombed civilian

targets in Gaza. PNC pointed out that these crimes violate the

text of Article 53 of the Fourth Geneva Convention, which prohibits the occupying power from destroying any movable or immovable private property, and according to Rome Statute, launching deliberate attacks against the civilian population is a war crime for which Israel must be pursued and held

accountable. International humanitarian law provided general and special protection for civilians and civil objects, which is clearly evident in both the Fourth Geneva Convention of 1949 and Additional Protocols I and II to the Ge56 killed as Israeli air strikes intensify

GAZA: Israeli airstrikes have now killed 56 people including 14 children in Gaza, according to the enclave's health authority, as the first soldier has been killed in another day of escalating violence. Sergeant Omer Tabib "was killed as a result of anti-tank missile fire" fired by Hamas on Wednesday morning, the Israeli military said. The 21 year old is the first Israeli soldier to die in the current fighting. The announcement of Tabib's death came shortly after Hamas confirmed that its Gaza City command er, Bassem Issa, was killed in an Israeli airstrike on Wednesday. Meanwhile, the Israeli prime minister has declared an emergency in the town of Lod, following what police called "wide-scale riots" by supporters of the Palestinians.

Coronavirus claims 24 more lives in KPK

PESHAWAR: Coronavirus claimed 24 more lives in the last 24 hours in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and the death toll in the province from coronavirus reached to 2668, an official of the health department said here on Wednesday.

Talking to media during daily briefing, he said that 413 more people infected with coronavirus in 24 hours and the number of active cases in the province has dropped to 9,018 while the total number of coronavirus in the province has reached

However, he said, it was very encouraging that another 1037 people recovered from Corona in 24 hours in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and the number of patients recovering from Corona in the province has reached 112,706. He said the health depart-

ment across the province has conducted 6,602 diagnostic tests in one day in the province and the total number of so far tests conducted has reached 1671731.

In the last 24 hours, 171 new cases were reported in Peshawar, 43 in Mardan, 28 in Swat and 25 in Haripur, the health department said. – APP

9 arrested for selling fresh currency notes

KARACHI: Police have arrested nine people for selling fresh currency notes ahead of Eid ul Fitr in Karachi's Kharadar neighbourhood in a crackdown against the illegal currency market. According to a report, fresh notes were sold in Kharadar area of the city with sellers seeking extra money to provide the notes, usually used as Eidi on the festive occa-

This year, the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) has announced not to issue new currency notes ahead of Eid ul Fitr over concerns that it could lead to a virus spread due to transmission through notes and congregation at banks for getting the money. The State Bank had also not issued fresh currency notes last year when the country was reeling under the first wave of Covid-19 infections. The police carried out a raid in the neighbourhood and arrested nine people selling the fresh notes.

SSP Sarfaraz Nawaz said that those arrested were found illegally selling currency notes. "Action will be taken against some of the cops seen in the video," he

Eleven die of coronavirus in Faisalabad

FAISALABAD: Eleven patients died of COVID-19 while 88 people tested positive during the last 24 hours in Faisalabad.

A spokesperson for the Health department said on Wednesday that 693 coronavirus tests were conducted in public and private sector labs during the period. He said that total active cases in Faisalabad were 1,886 while 17,273 patients had so far recovered from the disease.

He said that 334 beds were allocated at the Allied Hospital, 133 at the DHQ Hospital and 150 at Government General Hospital Ghulam Muhammad Abad for COVID-19 patients. At present, 215 patients were under treatment at the Allied Hospital, 92 at DHQ Hospital and 60 were admitted to General Hospital. He further said that 1,072 confirmed patients were isolated at their homes in

Governor Sawar condemns Israeli terrorism

LAHORE: Punjab Governor Chaudhry Muhammad Sarwar has said that the silence and indifference of the United Nations and international bodies on Israeli aggression and violation of international laws is criminal and condemnable.

He urged them to take prompt action immediately.

In a statement issued here on Wednesday, he said the Islamic countries should not only condemn Israeli terrorism but also take prompt action to halt Israeli crimes. He said: "It breaks my heart to see innocent Palestinians suffering at the hands of Israeli forces.'

Governor Sarwar said the killing of more than 48 Palestinians was the worst Israeli terrorism, adding that the time had come for Islamic countries to unite in condemnation of Israeli terrorism and take prompt action in order to protect their Palestinian brothers and sis-

Khan said.

Thr governor said unfortunately, all international bodies, including the United Nations, had become silent spectators on Israeli terrorism and if they want peace and stability in the world then Israel should be stopped from terrorism immediately and the Palestinian people should be given their basic human rights and their just right to freedom, he added.

Sarwar mentioned that under the leadership of Prime Minister Imran Khan, Pakistan stands with its Palestinian brothers and sisters and would raise their voice all over the world for their freedom. The atrocities of Israel would have

to an end and the sun of freedom would rise in Palestine, he asserted. The world could no longer be indifferent to the violence and human rights abuses committed by Israel and Israel must be held accountable for its crimes, he added. Days of heavy bombardment on

the Gaza Strip intensified on Wednesday, with Israeli fighter jets bombing sites belonging to Palestinian armed groups, as well as police buildings and apartment blocks.

Since the offensive began late on Monday, Gaza's health ministry says at least 53 people have been killed, including 14 children. More than 300 others have been wound-

rockets have been fired from Gaza towards various locations in Israel, killing at least six Israelis. The escalation is the most intense

Anger has been growing over the forced expulsion of Palestinian families from the occupied East Jerusalem neighbourhood of Sheikh Jarrah, who have been facing multiple court cases filed against them by several pro-settler organisations since 1972.

These organisations claim that land the families live on was originally under Jewish ownership, but Palestinians see this as an extension of an official Israeli policy to displace as many Palestinians from Jerusalem in order to retain a majority Jewish identity in the

The United Nations has warned planned expulsions could

amount to "war crimes". Protests and scuffles between Palestinians, Israeli settlers and Israeli police have steadily increased since the end of April. The Israeli court in October 2020 ruled that four Palestinian families should vacate their homes, and gave May 2 as the date for their forcible eviction. However, the court date has since been postponed twice.

Recently, there have been confrontations as Palestinians gathered for iftar meals - the breaking of Ramadan fasts - at the homes of those being evicted. The families have since appealed to Israel's Supreme Court. On Thursday night, at least 30 people were wounded and 15 arrested.

On Friday, tens of thousands of Muslim worshippers filled the Al-Aqsa Mosque compound - Islam's third holiest site - to pray on the final Friday of Ramadan, with many staying on to protest against the expulsions. - APP

SOPs checked at airport

FAISALABAD: Assistant Commissioner (AC) Sadar Umar Maqbool checked implementation of anti-corona SOPs at Faisalabad International Airport and got tested 121 air passengers for coronavirus.

A spokesman of local administration said on Wednesday that AC Sadar along with his team reached Faisalabad International Airport at 3 a.m. and checked implementation of corona SOPs. The team also conducted rapid corona test for 121 air passengers travelled from Dubai to Faisalabad through flight FZ-343-DXB. However, tests of all passengers were negative.

S expected, tensions between Israel and Palestine are bubbling over once again in the aftermath of the raid of mosque Al-Aqsa. Allegedly, militant groups fired rockets into Israel which prompted it to embark upon a campaign of destructive air strikes in Gaza. One can only imagine the kind of devastation this will cause in addition to the damage already done by Israel's genocidal policies towards the Palestinians. Being a witness to the dire consequences of a disputed territory conflict-i.e. Kashmir-Pakistan must elicit further support against the barbaric approach being taken by the Israeli government.

Make NAB self accountability effective!

The general reputation of the NAB is that of a good institution, its chairman IavedIgbalis a retired Supreme Court adjudicator who speaks of impartial accountability and strives for it. US-NATO troops' drawdown to provoke re-Talibanization

The chosen policy is to bait re-talibanisation in order to roll back 20 years' worth of human sacrifice, capital and investment. And, then, who will take the lead in belling the Taliban cat? The US has washed its hands of the entire Afghan quagmire, including reconstruction and rehabilitation, despite experts warning of geopolitical chaos

HE unilateral decision to drawdown US and NATO troops from Afghanistan was not entirely anticipated by other parties and stakeholders to the decades-old conflict. Even more disconcerting is that this process began on May 1 when the US vacated Kandahar Airfield (KAF), the primary target of Taliban attacks since 2001; sparking clashes between Afghan forces and the Talban that left 100 militants dead. That the military base was the first to be 'handed over' to the Afghan government was perhaps an exercise to test both Kabul and the Taliban. It appears that the latter lost this round.

Since then, however, there has been no letup in violence. Last week alone saw the targeted killing of well-known television journalist Newat Rawan, just a day after the Taliban warned the Afghan media against "biased reporting". This was followed by fresh carnage over the weekend when bombs were planted outside a girls' school in a Kabul suburb that is largely populated by the Shia Hazara community, leaving 68 dead and 165 injured.

The Taliban denied involvement in the attack. The Hazara had also been routinely attacked by ISIS. Elsewhere, a bus was bombed in the country's southern Zabul province. Pakistan also suffered a spillover effect when four soldiers were killed and six wounded in Balochistan while fencing part of the border the border with Afghanistan.

Thus, in the space of a single week all ene-

mies of peace have been let out of the bag. (Belt and Road Initiative), as well as bilat-This should come as no surprise since the US and NATO were unable to defeat militants despite spending two decades on the Afghan battlefield. International forces only managed to dismantle some of their own strategic assets, including Bin Laden. The troop pullout is therefore viewed as an American plan to intentionally dent the region. This is reinforced by President Biden stressing that the region should take remedial responsibility for the conflicts in its backyard, including Afghanistan. All this despite the fact that the US and NATO created this regional discord for their own vested interests.

Afghanistan has been caught in the crosshairs for four decades. This war without end has consumed an enormous chunk of the world's resources. Untold lives have been lost and billions of dollars' worth of infrastructure have been damaged or destroyed. In addition, prolonged military offensives have gifted the world the worst ever global economic crunch and massive migration; thereby negatively impacting global poverty indexes. The biggest beneficiaries remain weapon manufacturers and their patrons while the Muslim world has suffered the most.

This looks set to continue. Indeed, the carefully crafted fallout of the US exit from Afghanistan will be the loosening of the militant noose across the region with a view to undermining regional security, the peaceful infrastructural growth of BRI

eral and multilateral cooperation.

The ever-expanding US-India strategic alliance against China, Iran and Russia is resulting in the development and strengthening of Cold War strategies. It remains unclear as to whether this would be sufficient to curtail the economic growth of China. Yet, seemingly, the chosen policy is to bait re-talibanisation in order to roll back 20 years' worth of human sacrifice, capital and investment. Certainly, economically weak Pakistan has more to lose in the event of increased militancy, particularly, along its border areas with Afghanistan. It is most unfortunate, both for this country and the whole region, that the US could not even secure the Doha peace talks and effectively lost the game to the Taliban - despite all facilitation and support from abandoned ally Pakistan. History has shown that the US can neither win wars on the battlefield nor at the negotiating table. It is time that the US learned this lesson.

Japan to vaccinate Olympic athletes

TOKYO: Japan plans to vaccinate its Olympic athletes before the Tokyo Games domestic media reported Wednesday, a move that would place them ahead of the general population as the government faces pressure over a slow rollout.

There was no immediate comment from Olympic organisers or Japan's Olympic Committee on the reports in the Nikkei and Yomiuri Shimbun dailies, which did not name their sources.

newspapers around 2,500 people including athletes and coaches would be included, with Japanese sports federations in charge of administering the jabs. Japan's government had previously denied it was considering a plan to vaccinate athletes ahead of the general population.

Earlier this month, US drug giant Pfizer and its German partner BioNTech announced a deal with the International Olympic Committee to provide vaccines for competitors and staff at the Tokyo Games.

They said initial doses for participating delegations would begin at the end of May, without specifying which teams would be involved. Japan has so far only approved the Pfizer jab and the government has faced pressure over the comparatively slow rollout of its inoculation campaign as Tokyo and other areas battle new virus emergencies. For now, only medical workers and the elderly are eligible for jabs, with no timeline yet set for the general population to receive them. - APP

"We can raise our voices individually [but] the issue will be noted when all 57 OIC members voice their support. A lone Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Turkey, Malaysia and Indonesia can't do anything," he said.

During press conference the foreign minister also provided details on the premier's recent visit to Saudi Arabia. "A direction for the future was set," he said.



US approves its biggest offshore wind farm yet

WASHINGTON: The US announced on Tuesday that it had granted final approval for its biggest wind power project yet, which will be located off the coast of the eastern state of Massachu-

The "Vineyard Wind" project calls for up to 84 wind turbines to be built 12 nautical miles off Martha's Vinevard and Nantucket, two islands off the Massachusetts coast.

The administration of President Joe Biden has set a goal of generating 30 gigawatts of energy from offshore wind by 2030.

The 800-megawatt Vineyard Wind project would provide enough power for 400,000 homes and businesses, the Interior Department said in a statement.

"A clean energy future is within our grasp in the United States," Interior Secretary Deb Haaland said. "The approval of this project is an important step toward advancing the administration's goals to create good-paying union jobs while combatting climate change and power ing our nation.'

The United States currently relies very little on wind power, with only small wind farms located off the coasts of Virginia and Rhode Island. - APP

Two killed in Sudan rally over 2019 protests

KHARTOUM: Two people were killed and dozens wounded as Sudanese security forces dispersed a rally demanding justice for protesters killed during anti-government demonstrations two years ago, the army said Wednes-

Prime Minister Abdalla Hamdok said he was "shocked" by the killings, calling it a "crime to use live bullets against peaceful protesters".

Hundreds gathered on Tuesday evening outside the army Khartoum, at the site where thousands gathered in 2019 initially demanding the ouster of president Omar al-Bashir and urging a transfer to civil-

ian rule. The demonstration on Tuesday started shortly before iftar, the evening meal which breaks the fast during the holy month of Ramadan.

It marked two years since the bloody dispersal of the mass encampment outside the army headquarters.

"As they (the protesters) left the site, unfortunate events occurred resulting in the killing of two people and the wounding of others," the armed forces said in a statement, adding that an investigation had been launched.

The army said they were "fully prepared to bring to justice, whoever is proven to be involved". In the protests on Tuesday, young demonstrators were seen carrying banners and photos of the people killed during the crackdown on the 2019 sit-in, according to an AFP correspondent.

"Retribution for the martyrs," many chanted as they waved Sudanese flags.

Egypt discovers 250 tombs, 4,200 years old

CAIRO: Egyptian archaeologists have discovered around 250 tombs in the country's southern province of Sohag, dating back about 4,200 years, the antiquities ministry said Tuesday.

The graves "include some with a well or several burial wells and other cemeteries with a sloping corridor that ends with a burial room," the ministry said in a state-

They range in age "from the end of the Old Kingdom to the end of the Ptolemaic period," it added. The Old Kingdom, spanning around 500 years, ended in 2200 BC, while Egypt's Ptolemaic dynasty lasted for 300 years an ended with the death of Cleopatra in 30 BC. Mostafa Waziri, head of the Supreme Council of Antiquities, said one tomb dating back to the Old Kingdom had faint remains of hieroglyphic inscriptions and a chamber for "sacrifices". - APP

23 prisoners in IIOJK are COVID positive

ISLAMABAD: Around 23 prisoners are COVID positive and 219 inmates are under quarantine across prisons in Indian illegally occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIOJK).

According to Kashmir Media Service, an official handout released by the authorities reads that 4,572 inmates are lodged in 13 jails of the territory. It said that of these, 23 in-

mates (21 from Kathua jail, one from Kot Bhalwal jail and one from Jammu jail) are COVID positive.

It further stated that 219 inmates are under quarantine in prisons across the territory.

The handout says that at present, 635 inmates including 27 women are lodged in Srinagar Central Jail and there is no COVID positive case in the jail.

However, relatives of the detainees have said that many inmates have shown symptoms of COVID-19 and in the absence of proper testing facilities at the prisons, the number of the affected prisoners may be much higher than the figure claimed by the authorities. – APP

UK economy in recovery mode

LONDON: Britain's economic recovery began to recover strongly at the end of the first quarter despite lockdown restrictions. official data revealed on Wednesday.

Gross domestic product jumped 2.1 percent in March, the Office for National Statistics said, although by not enough for the UK economy to avoid contracting overall in the first quarter.

GDP shrank by 1.5 percent overall in the first three months of 2021 compared with the final quarter last year, the ONS said.

The UK is meanwhile currently exiting lockdown at a gradual pace, allowing the economy to further recover from pandemic fallout.

"As we cautiously reopen the economy, I will continue to take all the steps necessary to support our recovery," finance minister Rishi Sunak said in reaction to the

Darren Morgan, ONS director of economic statistics, said the strong recovery seen in March was led by retail and school reopenings, offsetting weakness in the services sector.

He added that construction grew strongly over the quarter and stood above its pre-pandemic level in March. Morgan also noted that manufacturing recovered robustly in both February and March.

Meanwhile, "exports of goods to the EU continued to increase in March and are now almost back to their December level" before Brexit took place, he added. "However, imports from Europe remain sluggish in the first three months of the year, being outstripped by non-EU imports for the first time on record."

Britain formally exited the European Union at the start of the year.

The growth recovery tallies with the Bank of England's outlook. - APP

ISLAMABAD: An agreement on a renovation project of a waste heat recovery power plant was signed between China Sinoma Energy Conservation Limited (Sinoma EC) and Lucky Cement, according to a report published by the Gwadar Pro on Wednesday.

Under the agreement, the generating capacity of the two power stations utilising waste heat is expected to increase by about 4MW after the transformation. The agreement came into ef-

fect after a contract entered between the two sides on a 7500t/d supporting power station project with waste heat of cement in late March

Sinoma EC, a patent-holding company specialised in energy-saving and emission-reduction, started cooperation with Lucky Cement in 2008. Since then, it has undertake en several projects, including the Pezu Lines AB and CD waste heat recovery power plant with a generating capacity of 10 MW respectively, the 15 MW Karachi Line EFG power plant with waste heat, Karachi Line H waste heat boiler extension, etc. Waste thermal energy is one

of the largest sources of inexpensive and clean energy available. Waste heat power generation, or Waste Heat to Power (WHP), is the process of recovering waste heat and using it to generate power with no combustion and no

In cement plants, heat generated through rotary kiln preheater (PH) and AQC exhaust hot gases are used to generate steam in steam generator (Boiler) which is further used to generate electricity/power through steam turbo generator (STG).

UN extends peace monitoring mission

Death toll from Colombia

NEW YORK: The UN Security Council unanimously adopted a resolution Tuesday extending its mission to monitor Colombia's peace process until the end of October, and to broaden its mandate. The decision will strengthen the Special Jurisdiction of Peace (JEP), a tribunal that was created in 2017 to try the worst crimes committed by combatants during more than six decades of armed conflict, after the UN expressed concern in February about attacks by pro-government forces against the court. A diplomatic source said that the mandate had only been extended until October, rather than for a whole year, to avoid the next renewal from occurring just before presidential elections slated for May 2022.

More than a half dozen leaders of the main disbanded guerrilla group, the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC), who have been indicted by the JEP admitted in April to their part in more than 21,000 kidnappings. – APP

Economic recovery under threat: UN

UNITED NATIONS: While the global growth outlook has improved, led by robust rebound in China and the United States, surging coronavirus infections and inadequate vaccination progress in many countries threaten a broad-based recovery of the world economy, according to the latest United Nations (UN) forecast.

According to the World Economic Situation and Prospects (WESP) mid-2021 report, following a sharp contraction of 3.6 per cent in 2020, the global economy is now projected to expand by 5.4 per cent in 2021, reflecting an upward revision from the UN forecasts re-

leased in January. Amid rapid vaccinations and continued fiscal and monetary support measures, China and the United States - the two largest economies- are on the path to recovery.

In contrast, the growth outlook in several countries in South Asia, sub-Saharan Africa, and Latin America and the Caribbean, remains fragile and uncertain. For many countries, economic output is only projected to return to pre-pandemic levels in 2022 or 2023.

AS regards South Asia, the report said that the crisis in the region, one of the hardest hit in the world, will last well into 2021. "While a few smaller coun-

tries in the region have managed to roll out vaccinations, the largest economies continue to struggle to contain the increasing waves of infections," citing India, which has been been particularly affected by a brutal second wave.

"South Asia's regional economic growth in 2021 will still be insufficient to undo last year's 6.7 per cent loss in GDP per capita," the report said, noting that many of the region's households that have fallen into extreme poverty will thus remain trapped in their precarious condition.

"Risks are furthermore exceptionally high for the region. The region was already lagging in economic performance before the pandemic, with regional economic growth as low as 3.1 per cent in 2019. – **APP**

Sindh govt for holding Eid prayers at open places

NAZIR SIYAL

KARACHI: Sindh Minister for Information Syed Nasir Hussain Shah on Wednesday said that the Eid prayers should be held at open places and with complete adherence to SOPs to avoid COVID spread on the festive occasion.

"Eid prayers should be held at open places and more and more open places should be utilized for the purpose," he said while briefing media on decisions taken during a meeting of the COVID task force.

The minister said that he had visited parts of the city to review implementation on COVID SOPs. "There should be no hugging or handshake during Eid greeting and the public should greet each other while keeping a safe distance," Nasir Shah said.

He further shared that the government has allowed restaurants to operate takeaway services while adopting SOPs. "Strict action will be taken in case of violation," he warned.

He said that they respect the business community and sympathize with them over the ongoing COVID-related curbs, however, they had to take strict decisions in order to safeguard public interests. Further commenting on the NAB letter seeking details of officers' appointment in urban Sindh, Nasir Shah said that the letter was unconstitutional and the government has rejected it.

PEMRA to regulate Youtubers, web channels

ISLAMABAD: In a bid to rein in Youtubers and web TV channels, Pakistan Electronic Media Regulatory Authority (PEMRA) has prepared recommendations for including these channels in the broadcast media category.

According to a private television channel report, PEMRA has already sent the working paper bearing these recommendations to its members for their approval. PEMRA has recommended making possession of licences mandatory for Youtubers and web TV channels' owners.

The Authority has further recommended making it compulsory for the owners of these channels to pay a registration fee as well as other

Similarly, it has been suggested that these channels be run under the PEMRA laws of Similarly, it has also been recommended to make these channels comply with a code of conduct just like mainstream TV channels.

Furthermore, it has been suggested that initially these channels would be put in the broadcast media category followed by the making of special laws to deal with them. The members would either approve or reject these recommendations after deliberations at its next meeting.

Fawad urges people to follow SOPs

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Information and Broadcasting Chaudhry Fawad Hussain Wednesday urged the people to cooperate with the government and follow the standard operating procedures (SOPs) to stay safe from coronavirus pandemic. In a video message, he warned that if people would not comply with the SOPs, Pakistan could also face a situation similar to neighbouring India.

He, therefore, asked the people to adopt 'stay home and stay safe' policy during the Eid-ul-Fitr holidays.

He said instead of visiting the relatives on the occasion of Eid, they should use the means of internet and phone for communication with them as this was important for the safety of everyone. Fawad said the government had also imposed ban on intra-city transport to limit the mobility during Eid holidays.

255 Afghan civilians killed during Ramadan

KABUL: The Ministry of Interior Affairs has said that 15 suicide attacks and dozens of other attacks have been carried out "by the Taliban" since the start of Ramadan on April 13. The ministry said that 500 more civilians were wounded in the attacks during this period. The Interior Ministry said that the Taliban were responsible for 200 blasts and 15 suicide bombings during Ramadan. The Taliban has denied the government's claims that the group has a big hand in civilian deaths. The first day of Ramadan on April 13 witnessed

63 passengers test positive at Pak airports

ISLAMABAD: National Command and Operation Centre (NCOC) have asked the foreign ministry to ensure that those traveling to Pakistan from abroad should have undergone tests from reputed laboratories as 63 passengers have tested positive for COVID-19 at nationwide airports.

According to a letter written from the NCOC to the foreign ministry, passengers traveling from Gulf countries have been arriving with negative COVID reports, however, after undergoing rapid testing at the airports, as many as 63 of them have tested positive in the last five

Those arriving from Gulf countries should be asked to undergo tests from reputed laboratories, the letter said while asking the foreign ministry to take measures in this regard. It has been further conveyed that the national and foreign airlines should be bound to accept COVID test reports from designated labs. On May 01, National Command Operation Centre (NCOC) on Saturday devised new protocols for the inbound passengers, imposing a condition of COVID testing at Pakistan airports. Under the guidelines, the passengers will undergo rapid COVID testing at the Pakistani airports and would stay in quarantine for 10 days at

their homes. In case of testing positive, the passengers will have to shift to a quarantine facility, where they would be re-tested for COVID 19 on the eight-day. The guidelines stated that the passenger would bear the expense of the isolation facility and in case of testing positive for the second time, the passenger would be shifted to a

GENEVA: The World Health Organization said Wednesday that a variant of Covid-19 behind the acceleration of India's explosive outbreak has been found in dozens of countries all over the world.

The UN health agency said the B.1.617 variant of Covid-19, first found in India in October, had been detected in more than 4,500 samples uploaded to an open-access database "from 44 countries in all six WHO regions".

"And WHO has received reports of

detections from five additional countries," it said in its weekly epidemiological update on the pandemic. Outside of India, it said that Britain had reported the largest number of Covid cases caused by the variant. Earlier this week, the WHO declared B.1.617 - which counts three so-called sub-lineages with slightly different mutations and characteristics - as a "variant of concern". It was therefore added to the list
