ing a donation of 60 ventilators to care for critically ill patients. This assistance has provided life-saving treatments, strengthened clinical care, and mobilized critical supplies to bolster the response and help the country recover.

In Pakistan, this flight

will bring 1,200 pulse oximeters, and 340,000 pieces of personal protective equipment for healthcare professionals. The United States and Pakistan have worked together closely to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, and this donation is being made at the Government of Pakistan's request. Prior to this flight, the U.S. Government allocated \$40 million to Pakistan for COVID-19 response assistance, including a donation of 200 ventilators to care for COVID-19 patients.

Minister for Privatization Muhammad MianSoomro also participated the meeting along with Special Assistant to Prime Minister (SAPM) on Finance and Revenue, DrWagar Masood; Governor State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) Dr Reza Bagir and senior officials of the Ministry of Finance, Privatization Commission and State Bank of Pakistan.

The commission informed the meeting participant that the PC Board had also completed initial discussion/ consultations with the shortlisted bidders to facilitate them in the completion of their due diligence process. The Privatization Commission also informed the Finance Minister of the equity requirement of the SME Bank on which the minister directed SAPM on Revenue to assess the requirements and prepare a proposal for strengthening the balance sheet of the SME Bank.

The Minister for Privatization also informed the meeting that they were constantly in touch with the potential investors and would keep updating the Finance Ministry, SBP and all the other relevant stakeholders of the new developments.

FAISALABAD: The next Polio Eradication Campaign in Faisalabad district would continue from 7th to 11 June and in the district 1.327 million children up to the age of five years would be administered polio drops and 3549 teams would perform duty and all necessary arrangements had been made finalized in this regard. No vaccination, no salaries, Sindh CM warns govt employees

KARACHI: Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah on Thursday declared coronavirus vaccination mandatory for every citizen of the province and ordered that the salaries of non-vaccinated government officials should be stopped from July. He stated this while residing over a meeting of the Provincial Task Force on coronavirus at CM House. "We have to secure our citizens by taking some dras-

tic measures," he said and directed the health department to establish vaccination coverage facilities in every nook and corner of the province. "I want at least 300 basic units to be declared as vaccination centers in the rural areas with a target of vaccinating 30,000 people per dav." he said. Murad Ali Shah, giving another target to the health department, said that five mobile vaccination teams should be established on every taluka level. "We have 605 talukas/tehsils and they must vaccinate at least 60,000 people per day," he ordered. The CM also directed the health department to give a target of 10,000 vaccination to 90 private hospitals already allowed to vaccinate people. He directed the health minister to register more private hospitals for vaccination. Taking a policy decision, Murad Ali Shah directed the Chief Secretary to give a month of June to all the govt/semi govt/ local govt employees for getting themselves vaccinated and stop salaries of those officials who fail to get themselves vaccinated by the end of this month.

The petitioner was sole proprietor of M/s Al-Ubaid Enterprises and he availed illegal sales tax refund on fake invoices which caused huge loss of Government exchequer.

During the course of proceedings, Advocate Shahab Sarki counsel for the accused said that his client got pay orders amounting Rs 25 million. He said that the accused also submitted a plea bargain application before the NAB. Justice Bandial asked what NAB decided on the plea bargain application. The Additional Prosecutor General NAB replied that the plea bargain application was not in accordance with the law. The accused wanted to bargain by paying Rs 25 million and the actual amount was many times more. Justice Bandial observed that the NAB should treat businessmen different ly from other suspects. The court had stated at the last hearing that the plea bargain application would be filed, he added. He said that the NAF should have decided the case even if it rejected the application after review.

12,824 more persons get anti-COVID jabs

RAWALPINDI: The total district tally of coronavirus vaccination Thursday reached 397,397 with the inoculation of 12,824 more persons against the deadly virus during the last 24 hours. According to fresh data released by the District Health Authority, 26,198 health workers while 371,199 other people including senior citizens have received their dose so far.

The report said that the district health authority has registered 33 new infections during the last 24 hours including 31 of Rawalpindi and two from outside the district while three people lost their battle of life.

It updated that patients reported during the last 24 hours included 8 belonged to Rawal Town, 3 Potohar town, 8 Rawalpindi Cantt, 9 Kahutta, and two each from Islamabad and Gujjar Khan. "Presently 62 confirmed patients were admitted to various facilities of the city including 17 in Holy Family Hospital,14 in Benazir Bhutto Hospital,18 in Institute of Urology, 9 in Fauji Foundation Hospital,3 in Bilal hospital and one in Hearts International ", he added.

The report elaborated that 3 patients were on the vent in critical condition, 23 on oxygen and 36 in stable condition.

Controlling the media

AKISTAN has very often been right at the edge of - and some would argue even smack in the middle of - an authoritarian information order. Over the years, varying governments have tried varying repression tactics to stem whatever little freedom journalism has managed to carve out for itself in the country. Now, though, the chokehold on journalists may just become a legally sanctioned reality. A read-through of the proposed draft of the Pakistan Media Development Authority Ordinance, which has been doing the rounds on social media, shows a state insistent on controlling the entirety of the media industry - no matter principles of fairness or right to know or freedom of expression.

The proposed law essentially sets up a new body called the Pakistan Media Development Authority. This 'Authority' is to take the place of most other media regulation by repealing and taking the place of laws such as: the Press Council Ordinance, 2002; the Press, Newspaper, News Agencies and Books Registration Ordinance, 2002; the Newspaper Employees (Conditions of Service) Act 1973; the Pakistan Electronic Media Ordinance 2002 as amended by the Pemra Amendment Act 2007; and the Motion Pictures Ordinance 1979. Other details aside, what is most disturbing is the extent of its authority.

It appears that what our government wants is a silent state. If this draconian ordinance gets approved as is - and without major changes, not minor tweaks - no journalist or media professional, or even a common person uploading something on social media, will be far from an iron clutch ready to grasp the neck of the dissenter. And let us not forget that where we stand today a dissenter can be anyone who raises a critical voice from any platform. The desire to impose a uniform narrative has already badly damaged our educational system, and now the media seems to be in the production line. At a time when the media stands as one of the most important and necessary requisites for democracy, justice and an open society, it is disappointing to see such an openly regressive attempt to curb free speech and the right to know. Running roughshod over an institution indispensable to a functioning democracy will only hurt the country and strengthen the largely-held view that this is not a government willing to tolerate any kind of freedom of thought or speech or expression.

Shifting timelines

EPORTS have recently been in circulation that the US D could withdraw all its forces from Afghanistan by July 4, <u>\</u> well ahead of the September 11, 2021 deadline set by President Joe Biden last month. This potential shift in the timeline once again illustrates that the US has not thought through this exit, which only adds to the uncertainty and challenges facing the Afghan government.

Questions will rightly be raised regarding the rationale of this preponement; the chances of a political settlement being agreed upon by September appeared slim, so one wonders what breakthrough the US hopes to engineer by July. Unless of course, the US itself has given up on the idea that a lasting power sharing agreement can be achieved between Kabul and the Taliban.

Though the Taliban have agreed to participate in the upcoming intra-Afghan talks in Istanbul, it looks to be increasingly unlikely that the talks will make any substantial headway with regards to contentious issues. The Taliban have stated as a condition that the agenda of the conference should not include decision-making on critical issues, and that they will be sending a low-level delegation to participate in the talks. With a delegation that lacks decision making authority and critical issues being sidelined, the conference will only further the optics of international actors and the US being committed to the "process".

In the absence of any talks between the two parties and a surge in violence, it is increasingly likely that a civil war is on the cards. Over the past few weeks, the Taliban have captured several key districts after overrunning a number of military bases. On Tuesday, three bomb attacks in Kabul claimed the lives of at least 10 people. This worsening situation is of particular concern to Pakistan. Violence has already started to spill over into its territory, as was illustrated by the multiple attacks that have taken place in Balochistan and North Waziristan during the last two days.

The further intensification of this civil war in the absence of a political settlement could lead to a security nightmare for Pakistan. Groups such as the TTP which have sanctuaries across the border are being emboldened by the departure of foreign forces and the dominance being exerted by the Taliban on the battlefield. It is imperative that we take this threat seriously and pay special attention to our traditional border and territorial security.

Will Israel be held accountable for war crimes?

IKE tens of thousands of people in Gaza, Aymen al-Djaroucha had to flee his home with his family last month during the 11 days of fighting between the Israeli military and Palestinian armed groups, mainly Hamas, which controls the blockaded enclave.

Birds sing outside the window of his office as the father of three explains what it feels like to leave the place where you've spent the last 12 years - without any of your belongings. "You have all your memories there, it's where our children grew up, where we spent time with each other and shared happy moments and difficult moments. All my life was there.'

But, he had to leave. The Israeli military phoned the apartment block's caretaker on May 14 to warn families to evacuate. They bombed it less than an hour later, destroying several flats and causing a fire that ripped through the building.

He has since been back to assess the scale of the damage and to "try to return to my normal life", he says.

"The flats above the eighth floor were badly destroyed by the fire and it was very hard for the civil defence to extinguish it. We have a lot of repairs to do inside and on the stairwell and a lot of cleaning.'

Israel's prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, accused Hamas of using civilians as "human shields". But, addressing the United Nations Human Rights Council last week, the UN human rights chief, Michelle Bachelet, said they have not seen evidence to support Israel's claims that the buildings they bombed in Gaza were "hosting armed groups or being used for military purposes". Even before the recent eruption of violence, the International Criminal Court (ICC) had opened an investigation into previous bouts of the continuing conflict, and last month the ICC's chief prosecutor said she was closely monitoring what was happening on the ground. Both sides have been accused of committing war crimes; Hamas for firing rockets indiscriminately into civilian areas in Israel - although out of more than 2,000 rockets, about 640 fell short into the Gaza Strip and 90 percent that crossed the border were intercepted by Israel's Iron Dome missile defence system - and Israel for repeatedly bombing densely populated civilian areas within Gaza.

The lack of enforcement mechanisms within international humanitarian law is a problem, she adds. "So states can violate the basic norms of international law and nothing will happen.

Unforgiving siege Eric Goldstein, acting executive director for the Middle East and North Africa at Human Rights Watch, says there has been a shift in international awareness and willingness to look at Israeli war crimes

The UN Human Rights Council's recent decision to launch a continuing inquiry into human rights abuses in Israel and Palestine is a "welcome step", which he urged Israel to cooperate with.

"We're going to push hard at the ICC so that they look at war crimes committed by all parties," Goldstein says. But, long-term peace will not be possible unless the "underlying root causes are addressed", the main one being that Gaza is viewed as the largest open-air prison in the world - the enclave has been under an unforgiving siege imposed by Israel for more than 14 years, ever since Hamas took control of Gaza.

"That leaves people there with no future, with no hope and with their rights being violated almost on a daily basis," says Stein, adding the international community needs to put pressure on Israel to stop this.

It was one of several high-rise buildings in Gaza City targeted by Israeli air strikes, including the al-Jalaa building that housed several media organisations, such as Al Jazeera and The Associated Press bureaus.

The skyline of the metropolis - home to almost 600,000 people - has been significantly altered since May 10 when hostilities escalated.

Along with at least 2,000 housing units destroyed and more than 15,000 other units damaged, Gaza's already run-down infrastructure was also badly hit.

The United Nations reported that six hospitals, nine healthcare centres and a water desalination plant were damaged during the fighting. Al-Djaroucha, who works as the project coordinator in Gaza for Doctors Without Borders (Médecins Sans Fronti res, or MSF), says their burns and trauma clinic was damaged by an air strike. A legal attack?

At this stage, information is still being gathered, but Yael Stein, research director at B'Tselem, the Israeli Information Center for Human Rights in the Occupied Territories, believes that Israel's bombardment of civilian structures within Gaza violates international law. "In order for an attack to be legal, it has to be both directed at a military target and be proportionate," she explains.

For a building to be a military target, the destruction of it should give a military advantage to Israel. To be proportionate, you have to judge whether the military advantage you anticipate to receive from the bombing is higher than the loss to the civilian population.

Stein adds even when civilians were given some warning about when to evacuate, which saved lives, civilian property was still demolished and that "is still part of the calculation". "I think that the past proves that the Israeli army is interpreting this principle in a much wider way that the drafters of international law never expected, and that it is far from what can be considered to be proportionate," she says. Netanyahu has accused the ICC of "pure anti-Semitism" for investigating attacks and has said Israel does not accept the ICC's jurisdiction, however, it does not have to. Stein says the court can work without Israel's acceptance.

But, it will be a long time until anybody - whether Hamas leaders and/or Israeli officials - will be held accountable for their actions by the ICC.

"We're just starting the procedure which will take vears until the investigation will actually take place and then more years until somebody will be charged and then more years until somebody will be in jail," she says.

"You have to treat those people as human beings, as equal people that deserve the same rights as every other people in the territory under Israeli control."

Goldstein adds the oppression of Palestinians, which "amounts to a situation of apartheid", feeds into the conflict and gives Hamas "certain political support". The United States, in particular, needs to "take a harder look at its unconditional support for Israel", and parties helping Hamas "commit their war crimes, logistically or providing material" should stop, he says.

Both Israel and Hamas announced victories at the end of the 11 days of fighting, with Israel saying they killed nearly 30 senior Hamas commanders and destroyed 340 of their rocket launchers, as well as 130km (60 miles) of underground tunnels.

The number of Palestinians killed last month in Gaza stands at 256, including 66 children. In Israel, 13 people were killed, including two children.

The Palestinian Human Rights Centre's Sourani, who has lived through the previous three wars, says he has never experienced anything like this latest period of violence. "I'm honestly telling you that for 11 days I never thought dawn would come and I would see the sun rise again." Every family in Gaza has been affected: many loved ones lost, livelihoods destroyed and homes reduced to rubble, Sourani says.

"What did the al-Hadidi family do [to deserve this]?" he asks, referring to the family that lost 10 members in an Israeli air strike - only the father and baby boy survived. Accountability, he says as the call to prayer echoes in the background, "means that this will not be repeated once again".

Empowering Women: an inevitable segment of society

ACK in early 1990s, under Literacy and Mass Education Commission (LAMEC) my mother went D from village to village, as Supervisor Quranic Literacy Project (1992-94) to open community-based schools for women. Records reveal that even before 1990s there were decades of planning and policy making towards women education and skill building. It is heartening to see that the struggle towards educating women and establishing them on stable economic footings was continued for years. And to date, many baby-steps have been taken by both the government and Non-governmental Organizations (NGO) for uplifting and empowering the women. Although, there were several projects and programmes working to achieve outcomes that could make a difference, but, such a huge funding allocated specifically for the vulnerable segment could still not create a much greater impact, to bring a significant change in the overall picture.

For instance, only in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa(KPK) there are different departments and NGOs working in the education, health, social sector, skill development, infrastructure etc. it still calls into question the performance of these organizations and the outcomes achieved. Now let us take some of the departments in KPK province for a clear understanding of the scenario. One such example is the revolutionary governance model that the government has embarked upon, entitled as Community Driven Local Development (CDLD). CDLD is a policy of the government of KPK, rather an aspiration of the citizens to improve their lives and livelihood.

This programme undertakes a broad range of projects in various major sectors such as health, education, sports, roads, agriculture, social works etc. Under the CDLD program government of KPK is committed to advancing equality between males and females, therefore, about 20% of its annual budget is allocated for women specific projects. Here one may ask, is this twenty percent fund serving the right purpose i.e. 'to improve the lives and livelihood'. Are the women specific schemes targeted at generating income and achieving financial stability?

Unfortunately, these questions cannot be answered in ideas to engage women in businesses. Also, alongside affirmative because majority of the projects approved serve other basic necessities which are not entirely targeting the females but the whole community.

Besides this, CDLD approves projects incorporated in Village Council Development Plan (VCDP), but, it is pertinent here to inquire if women do have a say in these development plans or not.

In most of the cases the livelihood projects specifically for women are not even included. Even though, there are many schemes completed under CDLD particularly in health and education sector, but, livelihood and income generation remain a far cry.

Similarly, there is Social Welfare department with a special focus on Women Empowerment Institutions such as Women Crisis Centers, Vocational Training Centers and Working Women Hostels in different districts of the province. The total beneficiaries of vocational centers alone for the year 2016-17 was eleven thousand three hundred and six (11,306) as reported by Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Commission on the Status of Women (KPCSW). Though, the beneficiaries are in huge numbers, yet these centers demand innovation. Innovation can be brought in the vocational training centers by introducing technology and use of modern entrepreneurial skills, something that can deviate from the monotony of ages. Another challenge this department faces is paying rents for the buildings they use; the buildings are usually rented which if owned publicly can save a valuable amount that could be invested more effectively. Unlike CDLD, Social Welfare does not have enough budget to invest in infrastructure. Instead the rental charges for the said centers during 2016-17were Rs. 958,300 per month as reported by KPCSW. That's how the meager funds of department allocated for women, hardly serve the purpose to the deemed extent.

Thirdly, departments like SMEDA which are operating in KPK with a mission to assist in employment generation and value addition to the national income. SMEDA unlike Social Welfare hasintroduced many innovative innovation, SMEDA focusses on empowering women to the level that the role of middleman is reduced if not fully over. Yet again SMEDAalso faces challenges which if surmounted can result in a significant change.One bigger concern as highlighted by the Director Policy& Planning Dr. Nadia Jahangir Seth is the infrastructure constraint which if resolved by engaging a local partneror by other interventions of policy, has a huge potential to grow and innovate.

In the light of these few examples and the limitations they are facing, it can be realized that there is a dire needof creating a conducive policy environment to identify the issues whether they are related to technology, funding, infrastructure, human resource development or skill building. Despite governmental commitment to reduce gender disparities, nothing has been done to evolve a suitable action plan to elevate women socio-economic status. The Women Parliamentary Caucus (WPC) is also made with the same objective i.e. to strengthen the voice of the women legislators, but, the Chairperson WPC Dr. Sumera Shams is also of the opinion that, 'there is a lot being done still we feel the need to do more for empowering women.³

In furtherance, the programs and policies highlighted above are all visionary however, their impact on the grass root level isyet to be achieved.Nonetheless, the solution lies in partnering to get collective outputs on the similar aims and objectives.

This can only be achieved by gathering representatives from all departments on one platform to consult each other's problems and suggest best possible assistance. Such a collaboration can fill in the gaps and can endeavor to facilitate creating a colossal impact.

Meanwhile, WPC can play a vital role in bringing a monumental change by providing a sound support to this joint move leading to women empowerment in the true sense of the word.

This support has benefited more than 2.5 million Pakistanis across the country, providing life-saving treatments, strengthening case-finding and surveillance, and mobilizing inno vative financing to bolster emergency preparedness. In Sri Lanka, this assistance includes 880,000 vital pieces of personal protective equipment and 1,200 pulse oximeters to support frontline healthcare workers and others most affected by the current outbreak.

The United States and Sri Lanka have worked closely together to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic since its outset, and USAID's assistance has benefited millions of people in all 25 districts and nine provinces across the country, providing life-saving treatments, strengthening clinical care and mobilizing critical supplies to bolster the response.

NEW YORK: The United Nations Special Rapporteur on minority issues, Fernand de Varennes, announced in a report that assaults on Palestinian citizens, carried out by right-wing and armed gangs, sometimes come with the support of elements from Israeli security forces. He called on Israeli authorities to provide full and equal protection to all living inside the occupied territories without any discrimination.

De Varennes then slammed the violence practiced by "farright" groups and excessive use of force by Israeli security officials and forces during protests in recent weeks, describing them as the worst cases of

violence against Palestinians. He added that "the Palestinian minority in Israel is still paying a heavy price after long decades of exclusion and discrimination," complaining about "lack of availability of shelters and safe areas in Palestinian villages located in Negev [desert]. The senior UN official highlight-

ed that "extremist groups use various means of communication to spread hatred, incite violence, and encourage use of weapons in attacks against Palestinians." He finally called on the Israeli administration "to condemn all man-

ifestations of violence, hatred and discrimination against Palestinians," stressing that Israeli authorities must immediately rein in extremist settlers for such attacks, and to ensure the protection of all

those living in occupied territories

from discrimination. On May 13, Amnesty International called upon Israeli authorities to "take action against platforms that allow incitement to hate crimes, such as groups on social networks and messaging applications" after a host of screenshots of hate-mongering messages were shared online.

"The commission of violent and even deadly hate crimes justified seeing them as platforms of incitement to be monitored and closed," Amnesty wrote in a letter, saying this could reduce the horrific lynchings.

"We turned to the police several times already ... and we reported on the plentiful and concrete evidence of organization of retaliatory actions against

Arabs," the letter added.

Amnesty's letter also urged Israeli officials to classify Lehava group, whose followers have instigated recent violence in the occupied territories, as a terrorist organization. Spiraling levels of crime and violence against the Palestinian communities as well as the Israeli police's inaction to curb violence have outraged Palestinian citizens of Israel, prompting tens of thousands of them to stage mass demonstrations.

Protesters took to the streets in the city of Umm al-Fahm northwest of Jenin on March 5 in what some reporters described as the largest rally against violence and organized crime in the Israeli-occupied territories since the 1980s. The demonstrators carried Palestinian flags and placards condemn-

Pakistan, China and Afghanistan were located in a region which had immense opportunities for fostering mutually beneficial economic and development cooperation. Our three geographically linked countries straddle historical routes traversing east-west and north-south, he added.

'robust' global efforts to fight corruption

NEW YORK: The President of UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), Pakistani Ambassador Munir Akram, Wednesday called for strengthening international cooperation to fight corruption, which leads to massive outflows of illicit finance out of developing countries and is one of the main reasons for their economic under-performance. "Immediate and robust national and international action is needed to stop the bleeding of developing countries," he told a special session of the UN General Assembly against corruption. Stressing that corruption stifles opportunities for the poor, condemning them to a life of misery and inequity, Ambassador Akram said an estimated \$2.6 trillion, or 5 per cent of global gross domestic product (GDP), was lost annually to such behaviour, and developing countries lost \$1.26 trillion, nine times all official development assistance (ODA). Noting that the pandemic had pushed millions into extreme poverty, resulting in the loss of 250 million jobs, the ECOSOC chief said, "Allowing corruption and illicit financial slows to continue in these circumstances is nothing short of criminal." Robust national and international action was needed to stop the bleeding of developing countries, he added. Emphasizing that corruption must be addressed by the perpetrators, as well as the enablers, he said the establishment of global beneficial ownership registry would help identify perpetrators. While corruption must be tackled at the national level, he said it was equally important to impose penalties on the lawyers, accountants and all those enabling such behaviour, with global standards agreed and imposed to ensure this end. The absence of effective mechanisms to secure the return of stolen assets also had created a sense of impunity, he continued, and led to the parking of \$7 trillion in safe havens. Going forward, Ambassador Akram said the secrecy jurisdictions must be eradicated, and new legal instruments agreed to facilitate the obligatory return of stolen assets. - APP

BEIRUT: Judges at a United Nations tribunal for Lebanon have scrapped a new trial against the man convicted of the 2005 assassination of former Prime Minister Rafik Hariri, because they expect the court to run out of money and be forced to shut down before it can finish. Last year the tribunal, located near The Hague, convicted Salim Jamil Ayyash, a former member of the Shia movement, Hezbollah, in absentia for the bombing that killed veteran Sunni Muslim politician Hariri and 21 others. That ruling is being appealed. A second case was meant to begin on June 16, prosecuting Ayyash for another assassination and other attacks on Lebanese politicians between 2004 and 2005. But in a decision published on Thursday on the court's website, the judges wrote they had cancelled the case, "considering it is futile to start a trial in June which is highly likely to be terminated in July due to lack of funds".

LESBOS: Greece is launching a mass vaccination campaign for refugees, months after the first shots were rolled out to the wider population in early January. Starting Thursday, vaccinations will be offered to people living in refugee camps on the islands of Lesbos, Chios and Samos. Those on the remaining island camps and the mainland will be offered the shots next week. Athens plans to inoculate more than 11,000 people living in refugee camps on the Greek islands against the coronavirus. According to the UNHCR. there are 91,945 recognised refugees in the country. More than five million first shots have been administered across Greece, which has a population of approximately 10.7 million people. The single-shot vaccine

produced by Johnson & Johnson will be used, with staff from the Hellenic National Public Health Organ-

isation (EODY) responsible for administering the jabs. Stephan Oberreit, head of Greece's Doctors Without Borders (MSF) mission, told Al Jazeera:

"The vaccination of refugees and asylum seekers residing on the Greek islands against COVID-19 has been long-awaited. "We have been urging the Greek authorities to include this population in every step of the fight against COVID-19, so the vaccination is a very positive step. "MSF on Lesbos, in coordination with other medical actors and the national public health organisation. will be participating in the health promotion campaign taking place in Kara Tepe camp in the next few weeks."

According to officials, only about 15 percent of asylum seekers living in Greece have expressed interest in receiving the vaccine.

Regarding concerns over possible vaccine hesitancy, Manos Logothetis, the head of Reception of Asylum

Seekers at the migration and asylum ministry, said he believes the uptake rate will grow when the campaign gets under way. "They have shown interest, while many have acquired immunity because they tested positive for the coronavirus. Most were asymptomatic," he said. "As soon as the vaccination starts, as it did in the general population, these trends will increase." Abdul*, a 20-year-old refu-

gee from Afghanistan who has been living on Lesbos for nearly two years, said he was worried about getting the vaccine but would still take it. "I don't feel good [about it] and also my friends don't feel good but we have to be vaccinated," he told Al Jazeera. Greece started relaxing

Vaccination certificates after first jab

ISLAMABAD: Citizens who have received the first dose of the coronavirus vaccine and are aspiring to travel abroad can now get the coronavirus vaccination certificate. The National Command and Operations Center (NCOC) on Thursday approved issuing certificates for partial vaccination - and now the people seeking to travel out of the country can obtain them. The certificate will be issued through National Database and Registration Authority's (NADRA) online system, while the national health ministry is authorised to make changes to the certificate as it may seem fit, the NCOC said. Meanwhile, during a meeting of the NCOC, with Federal Minister for Planning, Development, and Special Initiatives Asad Umar in the chair, the forum reviewed the implementation of standard operating procedures (SOPs) across the country. "The forum expressed concerns over the downtrend on non-compliance of SOPs and decided to take all possible steps to ensure implementation of SOPs along with pursuing the mass vaccination campaign," a statement said. The NCOC, in this regard, has directed all federating units to keep a check on the growing trend of non-implementation of SOPs to mitigate the possible spread of the disease in the country.

However, he added that the city authorities needed to further pace up vaccination and expressed hope that vaccination would also be sped up in other cities of Pakistan. The minister also tweeted about the government investing in the acceleration of the vaccination drive. A day earlier, the NCOC had announced a campaign to vaccinate 70 million people in the country by the end of current year. The campaign is aimed at reducing adverse effects of the viral disease to provide substantial flexibility to the business fraternity, enabling them to continue their businesses with min-

imum restrictions. Meanwhile, Pakistan's COVID-19 related death toll rose to 21,022 with 92 more deaths from the pandemic recorded on Wednesday, the National Command and Operation Center (NCOC) said on Thursday.

According to the NCOC data, the eastern Punprovince recorded iab the highest number of deaths from the coronavirus epidemic at 10,132, followed by the southern Sindh province and the northwestern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province reporting 5,073 and 4,113 deaths, respectively.

The country on Wednesday also found 2,028 new confirmed cases of COV-ID-19, marking a 3.94 percent test positivity rate, said the NCOC, adding the total tally rose to 926,695, including 852,574 recoveries and 53,099 active cases. There are 3,630 patients who are currently in critical condition, according to the NCOC.

Indian SC criticises vaccination drive

NEW DELHI: India's Supreme Court has sharply criticised the federal government over its coronavirus vaccination programme. The judges asked the government to explain why it was mandatory to register on an app for getting a jab. The court said this would hamper vaccinations across rural India where internet access is difficult.

The judges also questioned whether federal policy was making individual states compete against each other for vaccines.

India has administered more than 220 million doses since it began vaccinating in mid-January, but so far only 3% of the population has been fully vaccinated.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government has opened up vaccinations for some 960 million eligible Indians without having anything close to the required supply. The shortage came amid a deadly second Covid wave and warnings of an impending third wave. The wave has since slowed - the number of daily infections has fallen from the peak of over 400,000 last month to 132,788 cases that were recorded in the past 24 hours. The Supreme Court said that asking people between 18-44 years to pay for their jabs was "arbitrary and irrational".

Myanmar jails two journalists

YANGON: A court in military-ruled Myanmar has jailed two journalists under a colonial-era law that was recently revised to make spreading "false news" a crime, as part of a continuing crackdown on reporting in the troubled country. A military court in southern Myeik on Wednesday sennced Aung Kyaw Democratic Voice of Burma (DVB) and Zaw Zaw, a freelance reporter for Mizzima News, to two years in prison over their reporting of the anti-coup protests that have swept Myanmar since the generals under Min Aung Hlaing seized power on February 1, the two publications said Aung Kyaw, who live streamed his arrest, is the third DVB journalist to be jailed since the coup triggered a wave of protests and calls for the restoration of the elected government of Aung San Suu Kyi. The security forces have responded with force, and the Assistance Association for Political Prisoners, which has been tracking arrests and deaths says 841 people have killed in the violence.

WASHINGTON: The United States and Saudi Arabia have discussed the kingdom's protracted war on neighboring Yemen, as the Yemeni army steps up gains on the bat-

tlefield and retaliatory raids against the kingdom's soil. US Defense Secretary

Lloyd Austin spoke with Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman (MBS) on Wednesday and they discussed regional security and the war in Yemen.

Austin and MBS held talks on the "ongoing bilateral efforts to improve Saudi Arabia's defenses," Pentagon spokesman John Kirby said in a statement.

Austin noted what he called Saudi Arabia's "recent successes in defeating Houthi (the Ansarullah movement) attacks on the Kingdom" and thanked bin Salman for working with US special envoy for Yemen Tim Lenderking to end the Yemen war, Kirby said. In recent months, the Ansarullah movement, which runs the Sana'a government, has ramped up its military operations against Saudi Arabia, warning that it will continue to target Saudi positions, including airports and air bases, as long as the Saudi-led coalition is waging war and imposing a blockade against Yemen.

Backed by Western powers, the Saudi-led war was launched in March 2015 and has so far killed hundreds of thousands of Yemeni civilians, including women and children, and destroyed the country's vital infrastructure, leading to what the UN calls the worst humanitarian crisis in the world.

Elizabeth to meet Biden on June 13

LONDON: Britain's Queen Elizabeth II will meet US President Joe Biden in London on June 13, the Buckingham Palace announced Thursday. "The Queen will meet the President of the Inited States of America and First Lady Jill Biden at Windsor Castle on Sunday, 13th June 2021," the Royal Family official account tweeted. The meeting will be the queen's first high-level meeting with a foreign leader after the death of her husband Prince Philip in April this year and Biden's first overseas trip since his election victory last year. Biden will come to the UK for the G7 summit, which is due on June 11-13 ahead of a NATO summit in Brussels on the 14th. In Brussels, he is expected to meet the leaders of NATO member countries, including Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. The US president is also expected to meet Russian President Vladimir Putin in Brussels, according to an announcement from the White House.

EU puts forward e-wallet proposal

BRUSSELS: EU citizens could soon store all their identity documents digitally, to be used with the wave of a smartphone or online, under a proposal unveiled Thursday by the European Commission. The European Digital Identity wallets would be used to store digital copies of passports, drivers' licences, bank state ments, university degrees and other important papers, to be called on whenever an EU citizen needs to prove their identity. Users would have control over how much of that data is shared in each interaction. Importantly, the EU commissioner for digital matters Margrethe Vestager told a news conference, the e-wallets could be used as a safer, ad-free alternative when logging onto websites offering services.

"So you do not use your plat form-specific account - like your Google account or your Facebook account - but that you can use your own identity. And because of that, you can decide how much data you

Bill Gates to build next-generation nuclear facility

CALIFORNIA: Microsoft co-founder Bill Gates will build a next-generation nuclear plant at a soon-to-be-retired coalfired power plant in Wyoming in the next several years, business and government officials have said.

The plant will feature a sodium reactor and molten salt energy storage system and will perform better, be safer and cost less than traditional nuclear power, Gates said. Bellevue-based TerraPower, of which Gates is chairman of the board, and the PacifiCorp company, which is owned by Warren Buffet's Berkshire Hathaway is working with Rocky Mountain Power, an electric utility serving Wyoming and other Western states, to put the Natrium reactor at one of four of the utility's power plants in Wyoming, with the location to be decided later this year.

"We think Natrium will be a game-changer for the energy industry," Gates said by video link to a news conference hosted by Wyoming's Republican Governor Mark Gordon on Wednesday. - Web Desk

Russia, Belarus agree to counter West

MOSCOW: The security services of Russia and Belarus said Thursday that they will cooperate more closely to counter what they said were the West's "aggressive policies". Russia's foreign intelligence service, the SVR, and the Belarusian Committee for State Security, known as the KGB, made the announcement in identical statements after their heads met in Belarus. "In the spirit of traditional brotherly ties, Russia's SVR and Belarus's KGB agreed to conduct joint work to counter the destructive activity of the West aimed at destabilising the political and socio-economic situation across the Union State," the statements said. SVR chief Sergei Naryshkin and KGB head Ivan Tertel stressed the "importance of consolidating efforts" to respond to global challenges and new threats, the security services said. Russia and Belarus are part of a "union state" that links their economies and militaries. The countries have been discussing a closer integration as both of their ties with the West go from bad to worse. Belarus strongman Alexander Lukashenko has for years had a volatile relationship with Moscow, playing it off against the West and ruling out outright unification

with Russia. - APP

Jaishankar, his Palestinian counterpart Riad Malki stated that India's abstention during the vote on May 27 "stifles the important work of Human Rights Council at advancing human rights for all peoples, including those of the Palestinian people. India was among 14 countries that abstained from voting on a resolution at the UN Human Rights Council to launch an investigation into alleged violations and crimes during the 11-day conflict between Israel and Hamas in Gaza. The resolution was adopted as 24 countries voted in favour of it while nine opposed it at the end of an all-day special session of the 47-member UN body at its headquarters in Geneva on Thursday. India abstained from voting together with 13 other member nations of the grouping. China and Russia were among those voting in favour.

700 PIA employees possessing fake degrees
