ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Imran Khan has formed a special, high-level cell to probe the Pandora Papers exposé, Minister for Information Fawad Chaudhry said Monday, hours after the two-year investigation came to light. A huge tranche of leaked data on offshore companies - larger in size and scope than the Panama Papers - hit the global headlines Sunday night, laying bare the financial secrets of the global rich and powerful.

The investigation revealed that the prime minister's cabinet members, financiers, retired generals, media owners, and businessmen have offshore companies. "The prime minister has set up a high-level cell under the Prime Minister's Inspection Commission to investigate the Pandora leaks, which will present the facts before the nation," the information minister said. The development comes after PM Imran Khan held a meeting to discuss the leaks and the overall country's political situation, with senior PTI leaders and federal ministers in attendance, sources said.

An initial report related to the matter was presented to the premier after which the participants of the meeting briefed him on the actions that are being considered against the Pakistanis named in the Pandora Papers leak, sources said. Taliban announce forces destroy cell of IS militants Zabihullah Mujahid says fighters carried out operation in the north of Kabul

KABUL: The Taliban said on Monday they had destroyed a cell of the militant Islamic State (IS) group in the Afghan capital, hours after a suspected IS attack on a mosque killed five people. The Taliban overran Kabul seven weeks ago and have set up an interim Afghan government, but still face attacks from the regional branch of IS. The Taliban's chief spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid said fighters carried out

the operation in the north of Kabul on Sunday evening. "As a result of the operation, which was very decisive and successful, the IS centre was completely destroyed and all the IS members in it were killed," Mu-



jahid said on Twitter. Witnesses and AFP journalists heard blasts and gunfire in the capital at the time of the raid, and images posted to social media showed a large explosion and a fire at the scene. Kabul resident and government employee Abdul Rahaman told AFP that a "large number" of Taliban special forces attacked at least three houses in his neighbourhood. "The fighting continued for

within hours of a deadly attack targeting a prayer ceremony at the Eid Gah mosque in memory of Taliban spokesman Mujahid's mother, who died last week A government cultural commission official, who asked not to be named, told AFP that five people died and 11 were wounded, adding the casualties included both civilians and Taliban members. "We have also arrested three people in connection with the blast," he said.

China flies 56 aircraft near Taiwan

TAIPEI: China has flown 56 fighter planes towards Taiwan in the largest show of force on record, continuing three days of sustained military harassment against the self-governed island.

The first sortie on Monday of 52 planes included 34 J-16 fighter jets and 12 H-6 bombers, among other aircraft, according to Taiwan's Ministry of National Defence. Later, four more Chinese J-16s flew towards the southwestern part of Taiwan's air defence identification zone a buffer outside a country's airspace.

The Taiwanese Air Force scrambled its fighter planes and monitored the movement of the Chinese warplanes on its Air Defence System, the Ministry said.

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Imran Khan Monday launched ambitious Kamyab Pakistan Programme (KPP) worth Rs1400 billion in Islamabad to facilitate the vulnerable segments of the society. Addressing the inaugural ceremony of Kamyab Pakistan Programme in the federal capital, PM Imran Khan said that the project should have

been launched 74 years ago. The prime minister termed the KPP a landmark initiative and said that it will bring improvement in the living standards of the common man. "Our system is made to facilitate the elite class," the prime minister said, adding that the state of Madina was a role model for him. Lashing out at the previous governments, the prime minister said the flawed policies of the past left far behind our marginal-

ized segments of the society. "Inequality is the basis of the downfall of any society," PM Imran added. He maintained that no government worked on the uniform syllabus in the country.

Referring to China's progress, the prime minister said that Beijing

took measures to facilitate the vulnerable segments of the society and became a developed country within 35 years. PM Imran, while talking about petrol prices, said, "In Pakistan, prices of petroleum products are less as compared to other countries of the region.

"We have also tried to absorb the maximum pressure of international increase in the prices of commodities. There has been 100% increase in the prices of petroleum products over the last few months but we only increased their prices by 22%," said the prime minister.

He maintained that his government reduced sales tax and levy on petrol to facilitate the masses. It is pertinent to mention here that under the flagship programme, the government will provide Rs1.4 trillion micro-loans to 3.7 million households across the country.

The KPP will be rolled out in phases. During the first phase, the loans will be provided to the deserving families in Gilgit-Baltistan, AJK, Balochistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and the underprivileged areas of Punjab and Sindh. In line with the vision of the prime minister to empower the masses, the government has taken multiple initiatives, which are targeted towards poverty alleviation, employment generation and provision of affordable housing for the people.

234 more dengue cases reported in 24 hours

LAHORE: Punjab Primary and Secondary Healthcare Department (PP&SHD) Secretary Imran Sikandar Baloch Monday said that 234 new dengue patients were reported across Punjab during the last 24 hours.

Talking to media here, he said that 153 dengue patients were reported from Lahore, 52 from Rawalpindi, five each from Attock and Multan, three each from Gujranwala and Muzafargarh, two each from Sheikhupura, Sargodha and Nankana whereas respectively, a patient was reported each from Kasur. Sialkot, Dera Ghazi Khan, Jhang, Mianwali, Pakpattan and Layyah.

During the current year, he said so far 2,423 confirmed cases of dengue had been reported from all the hospitals of Punjab, and out of all confirmed patients,1,887 patients had been reported from Lahore. At present a total of 341 patients were admitted across Punjab, out of which, 182 patients were admitted in Lahore's hospitals.

The secretary mentioned that during the last 24 hours, 284,061 indoor and 66,476 outdoor locations were checked across Punjab, while larvae were destroyed from 1,989 locations. – APP

FAISALABAD: Despite being an agricultural country, imports of essential items have crossed Rs 10 billion while production of major crops are facing stagnation for the last two decades. For which, the agricultural scientists, and experts will have to formulate strategies.

These views were expressed by experts while addressing the participants of a workshop on Agriculture Sector: SWOT Analysis organized by the University of Agriculture Faisalabad (UAF). The workshop was chaired by Vice Chancellor Sindh Agriculture University Tandojam Prof Dr Fateh Muhammad Marri, while UAF Vice Chancellor Prof Dr. Iqrar Ahmad Khan, Agricultural University Multan Vice Chancellor Prof. Dr. Asif Ali, Islamia University Bahawalpur Vice Chancellor Prof.

Dr. Athar Mehboob, Cholistan Veterinary University Prof. Dr. Muhammad Sajjad, DG Extension Puniab Anium Ali Butter and UVAS Lahore Vice Chancellor Dr Nasim Ahmad also addressed the gathering.

Prof. Dr. Fateh Muhammad Marri said that poverty alleviation was directly linked to agriculture sector. He said if the agriculture sector contribution to GDP grows by 6 percent every year, it would reduce poverty by 50 percent. He said that loans to small farmers, and ensuring agricultural inputs to the small farmers will help combat low productivity. He said that it was imperative to persuade the private sector to invest in agriculture. He urged the extension workers to go to the villages and make every effort for the farmers to get aware of the agricultural recommendations and technologies. He said that more than half

of the population of Pakistan is suffering from malnutrition

Prof. Dr. Iqrar Ahmad Khan said that agriculture was facing challenges like low productivity, climate change, post-harvest losses, rural development, water scarcity, and uncertified seeds etc. He said that increase in productivity and value addition were essential to make agriculture attractive and profitable. He said that more than 40 percent of crops are wasted in the post-harvest process. He said that Pakistan is one of the countries which were suffering water scarcity challenges. A campaign should be launched to ensure the rational usage of water. He said that chemically contaminated water of the industry was polluting the groundwater. He said a house plan in Australia does not approve unless it was fitted with a rainwater storage tank.

"Despite huge potential, we have

limited agriculture to only five crops. However, in order to make agriculture profitable, high value crops should be promoted.

He was of the view that climate changes had started playing havoc with the agriculture sector, resulting in low productivity and breaking out of new diseases for which new varieties would have to be introduced .

He said that Okara was having good production of potato. Same model of other crops can be formulated in other districts.

Prof. Dr. Asif Ali said that the goal of poverty alleviation could not be achieved without ensuring rural development. He said that provision of best seeds to the farmers would not only increase the productivity of the country but also make the farmers economically prosperous. He said that India is far ahead in the production of cheese and it is used as an every-

day food but we are still lagging behind in the preparation of cheese. He said that efforts should be made to curb the irrational use of water. He said that there is a big difference between the agricultural productivity of the progressive and traditional farmer for which the journey of development can be ensured by equipping the traditional farmer with modern trends. Prof. Dr. Muhammad Sajjad Khan said that we have to work to increase the productivity of livestock instead of the number of animals so that the economic condition of the farmer can be improved. He said that the majority of the population of Pakistan is engaged in agriculture. He emphasized on value addition in agriculture. Dr. Anjum Bhutter said that the Punjab government was using all its resources to solve the problems of the farmers for agricultur-

al development.

'We need to strengthen coordination between Primary and Secondary healthcare Department and the Specialized Healthcare & Medical Education Department to boost the capacity of blood banks" she said and added that the objective of these measures were to ensure safe blood transfusion system in the province. – APP

ination. He said Pakistan and Turkey have always stood side by side with people in distress. 1072 persons get provisional plots in G-14

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Government Employees Housing Authority (FGE-HA) has provisionally handed over as many as 1,072 plots of different categories to the allottees of sub-sectors G-14/2 and 3.

The FGEHA has allotted around 387 plots in G-14/2 and 685 plots in G-14/3 of different categories, official sources in the Ministry of Housing and Works told APP on Monday. The officer said, over 78 allottees has taken final possession letter and 17 allottees has applied for issuance of No Objection Certificate (NoC) for the approval of building plans.

The sources said, more than 29 allottees has started construction of houses in sub-sectors G-14/2 and G-14/3. The Housing Scheme Phase-IV of the FGEHA was launched in 2004 in sub-sectors G-14/1, 2 and 3 Islamabad. About 4,820 kanals of land was acquired through land acquisition collection under the Land Acquisition Act, 1894 in March, 2004, they added.

They said the consent award for sub-sectors G-14/1, 2 and 3 was announced in 2005 at the rate of Rs590,000 per kanal for total land 4,820 kanals and the infrastructure development work was taken up by the authority.

The sources said, the development of sub-sector G-14/4 had been completed, while 90 percent rehabilitation work had been completed and infrastructure development work of sub-sectors G-14/2, 3 was in progress.

OGDCL carries out 3D surveys

ISLAMABAD: Oil and Gas Development Company Limited (OGDCL) has carried out 2,539 L-KM 2D and 600Sq. KM 3D seismic surveys in its various operational areas during the fiscal year 2020-21 aimed at expediting hydrocarbon exploration activities and making the country self-reliant in the energy sector.

"Moreover, around 5,365 Line Kilometer (L-KM) of 2D and 2,946 Square Kilometer (Sq. KM) of 3D seismic data has also processed/ reprocessed using in-house resources," according to the company's annual financial report available with APP.

The company said its acquired seismic data represented 79 percent and 69 percent of total 2D and 3D seismic data acquisition in the country respectively.

Besides, the OGDCL car ried out 432 Line KM of geological field work was in Orakzai, Tirah and Khuzdar North blocks.

In 2019-20, the company conducted 3,407 L-KM 2D and 1,324 Sq. KM 3D seismic surveys.

During the year under review, the OGDCL also injected 12 new wells, producing 584,808 barrels (BBL) crude oil and 12,092 million cubic feet (MMCF) gas, in its production gathering system.

"The injected wells include Mela-7, Pasakhi-11, Pasakhi Deep-6, Pasakhi West Deep-2, Saand-1 & amp; 2, TAY South West-1, Umair-1, Mangrio-1, Togh Bala-1, Nashpa-10 and Qadirpur-62 which cumulatively yielded gross crude oil and gas production of 584,808 barrels and 12,092 MMcf respectively," it said. – APP

Afghan-Tajik tensions

ENSIONS between the new government in Afghanistan and Tajikistan have been persistent lately. Reports have emerged that Tajik forces held parades in regions bordering Afghanistan earlier in the week in a show of power and that the Taliban also sent thousands of its fighters to the border with Tajikistan. This is a concerning development and such impulsive shows of might should be refrained from as they only imperil stability in the region.

There is a need for both sides to adopt a more conciliatory tone and discuss concerns through talks. Since the Taliban's takeover of Afghanistan, Tajikistan has not shied away from expressing strong opinions on the composition of the new Afghanistan government and instances of human rights violations. Concerns regarding the inclusivity of the government are understandable given that ethnic Tajiks make up the second biggest ethnicity in Afghanistan-27 percent. At the same time, the Taliban have made clear that they view Dushanbe's criticism of them and the composition of their government as meddling in Afghanistan's internal affairs. Perhaps some of the issue also lies with the tone and tenor in which these concerns are being communicated to the Taliban. Nevertheless, the Taliban must also understand countries around the world have raised concerns about the inclusivity of the government setup and it is not just Tajikistan. Therefore engaging constructively on this issue is going to be key in terms of improving relations with the international community and gradually gaining legitimacy.

Meanwhile, PM Imran Khan has been dealing tactfully with such sensitive issues and engaging with multiple partners to defuse tensions. His telephone call to President Emomali Rahmon to bring down the hostilities is what was needed at that point in time. There are understandably multiple concerns in the realm of security, rights, and a humanitarian crisis when it comes to the new government in Afghanistan. However, addressing these issues will be a medium to long-term process which will require patience and sustained engagement.

Countries such as the US must understand that isolating or abandoning a country completely is only going to make matters worse for the Afghan populatoin and the region at large. The new government is a reality and now the task is to restore some semblance of stability to Afghanistan so that a crisis can be averted.

Talking about Covid

AKISTAN'S declining trend of Covid-related deaths should be greet-D ed with optimism-albeit, cautious. With cases plateauing to almost 28 per cent of the peak and vaccinations gathering momentum (27 per cent has had at least one dose administered), one might wonder whether we are finally inching towards the end of this dark and dreary tunnel. However, as emphatic groups upon groups of pilgrims return from the annual pilgrimage, let's just put a hold on the fireworks.

The National Command and Operation Centre is spot-on in treating those heading back with extra caution. Placed in Category C on the coronavirus infections' list, those having come in contact with the coronavirus hotspot must be at a greater risk of transmission. Indian health officials have already marked the Hindu pilgrimage of Kumb Mela as the superspreader that likely fuelled the deadly surge earlier this year. While Baghdad tried its utmost best to uphold safety precautions in hosting the pilgrimage before opening doors to overseas travellers, divine providence always finds a corner to reign supreme. Stories about unmasked pilgrims throwing caution to the wind in the name of religious fervour are all over the news. This is not to make light of anyone's beliefs but Pakistan has already had its Wuhan moment last year. Call it a lackadaisical response to a fast-spiralling crisis or the fatalistic manifestation of simply not having the means, Islamabad's poor handling of pilgrims returning from Iran had cost Pakistan dearly. The still-brewing administrative fallout of Sindh, intervention of the all-powerful military and an unovercomeable burden on the country's feeble healthcare are just some of the dire ramifications. Such catastrophic were our affairs that even the longevity of the sitting government had become fodder for gossip in drawing rooms all over.

Battling a virus that keeps attacking us in newer, more lethal forms is no ordinary feat. And such extraordinary times call for extraordinary measures. Living with Covid-19 is a new reality. No qualms about that. Ergo, instead of giving in to the whims of those who prioritise fanning discord flames over national security, Pakistan needs to step up its quarantine facilities. In the past, dubious directives allegedly given by Special Assistant to PM (Overseas Pakistanis) Syed Zulfiqar Bukhari) with regard to clearing pilgrims were said to have spelt the medical catastrophe. Such irresponsible innuendos need to be bid farewell to. Then again, it would be overwhelmingly hard to convince people to stay in special camps after hundreds cried of being stuck in squalid conditions last year. Efforts to contain the virus can only work if the government provides humane conditions in these quarters. Before expecting the returnees to co-operate, the NCOC needs to put its own house to order.

The coronavirus saga is far from over. But just to prevent the ship from hitting rock-bottom, we need to gain grounds whenever there are signs of another outbreak. For a society hell-bent on living in denial and disbelief, we've been quite fortunate. But disregarding the public health catastrophe can only work so far!

campaigning. He is holding rallies across the country and on October 9, he will hold one in the state of Iowa, where all presidential bids start.

Back in July, journalist Michael Wolff, who wrote three damning books about Trump, concluded after a bizarre and unexpected dinner invitation by the former president, that his run in 2024 is a certainty. But for now, the brand mogul cherishes stoking the media speculations and public anticipation, which helps heal his bruised ego and keeps the donation money flowing. His Political Action Committees, PACs, have raked in more than \$82m during the first half of this year. But what will he run on? What will be his message, his mantra?

My guess is that he will start by doubling down on his "rigged election" false claim, and will ask his followers to "Reverse the Steal" in order to "Make American Honest Again". He has got to go with the big lie all the way to the polls - or not go at all. Anything less outrageous, less audacious, less offensive will not work. Besides, he clearly cannot help it, anyway. The man, whom US media has called the "liar in chief" who "steals credit [...] invents history and spins conspiracy theories", will do what it takes to win. So smug, he will portend to teach America a lesson in honesty and truth - his alternative truth.

Trump's penchant for deception is well illustrated in author Bob Woodward's trilogy, Fear, Rage, and Peril, Trump directs his venom against friends and foes alike. Over the past few years, he has never hesitated to humiliate Republican leaders, even war heroes, regardless of political repercussions. Even today, as he plans a rerun for the White House, Trump continues to degrade influential party leaders including his own former Vice President Mike Pence, and the Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell.

All of this begs the question: if Trump is so offensive, so incompetent and so dangerous to the country, why does he continue to maintain such a strong grip over the Republican party even after leaving office? And, why are Republicans running for Congress in 2022 either seeking his endorsement or trying to escape his wrath? Why is he likely to be the party's official candidate in 2024? To be sure, a lot depends on next year's midterm elections.

A victory on November 8, 2022, that allows for a Republican majority in either or both Houses of Congress, will render Biden a sitting duck president and boost Trump's chances come November 5, 2024. Come to think of it, a Republican defeat could also propel Trump to the top of the 2024 list as the most likely saviour of the party's influence against visibly ageing Biden or against his vice president, the lightweight Kamala Harris. Trump may have been a terrible president but he has proven himself a talented populist. His uncanny fearmongering is the main source of his influence and the driver behind his popularity, especially among the Republican base. Funnily enough, Trump allegedly did not even know what "populist" meant when he first began to think about running for office, as one hilarious anecdote at the beginning of Woodward's first book illustrates. The fact that Trump received 75 million votes after four disastrous years that included mismanaging the pandemic and leading to an economic crash, and social unrest, and that he continues to be so popular with the party base, despite damning media reports, is a testimony to his ability to rally support, albeit by dubious means. Paradoxical as it may be, this ostentatious bling-bling billionaire has convinced the majority of his party base and much of the country's white working class that he is their best if not their only ally against the snobbish, selfish elites who manage America's decline. In fact, he has garnered the support of the majority of white Americans, against the federal bureaucracy or as he has called it, "the Deep State", which stands accused of assaulting their rights, freedoms, culture and, well, privileges. Trump has mastered the politics of fear and fury as Woodward's books show. In the epilogue to Peril, the third book in the trilogy which was published in September, the author recounts an earlier conversation with Trump, the bombastic and confident outsider as well as the petty and cruel insider, who is tantalised by the pros-

pect of power and is eager to use fear to get his way. "Real power is, I don't even want to use the word 'fear'," Trump says, and he adds, "I bring rage out, I do bring rage out, I always have." But Woodward is so focused on demonising Trump that he fails to see or highlight the cynicism of his influential detractors. He goes to a great length exposing the former president but says little about Washington's elites that enabled him. But Trump's populism would not have been as effective if it were not for the cynicism of his detractors. The ruling elites who pretend to be "holier than thou", while robbing the country blind; who preach political correctness but lack political decency; who hold onto power even if it means presiding over the US's decline.

In that vein, Woodward's trilogy constitutes selectively edited accounts of those complicit with Trump, who talked only after they were fired by Trump, or after Trump was fired by the American people. They are taken at their word and excused about the rest. When Woodward recounts Trump's various exchanges with Gary Cohn, the former Goldman Sachs executive-turned-White House-economic adviser, the former president is portrayed as an idiotic protectionist who roots for US manufacturing, while the laissez-faire, free-

NHE fear and rage that gripped the US capital under the presidency of Donald Trump have left the country in peril, its democracy ill, and its immunity weak. Trump may have been excised from office in November but Trumpism has not been eradicated. After months of post-elections recovery, it is back with a vengeance, slowly metastasising throughout the country's body and soul. Less than a year after winning "the battle for the soul of America", President Joe Biden is slipping in the polls while his predecessor's numbers are, well, rising. In fact, according to a recent poll, Trump is already ahead of Biden, albeit by a small margin of 48 to 46 points. These numbers may flip again in favour of the Democrats if they are able to pass the New Deal-like infrastructure and reconciliation bills in Congress before the end of the year, which will inject trillions of dollars into the US economy.

But even the effect of such legislation may prove transitory, depending on a number of economic and political factors, and on the Republican opposition to the socialist "nanny-state" policies on the federal and state level. Meanwhile, 14 Republican-controlled states under Trumpian influence passed 24 new laws that assert their control over the running of elections and make it easier to overturn elections results. Trump continues to reject the last election results and is yet to officially declare his candidacy, but everything he says or does is the last co-written with fellow journalist Robert Costa. In the three books published over the past three years, the Washington Post newspaper veteran journalist goes to a great length to show how even Trump's closest advisors and allies think he is "a (expletive) liar". Trump's own personal lawyer, John Dowd thought he is such a pathological liar that he cannot even be trusted to testify to former Special Counsel Robert Mueller during his investigation into Russian meddling in the US elections without perjuring himself.

But it is not only lying; politicians are known to lie. The man portrayed rather convincingly in the trilogy, is incredibly devious, utterly incompetent, and terribly dangerous. Woodward interviewed hundreds of people associated with the Trump administration, leading members of his cabinet and his party, as well as leaders of Congress and the military. According to him, many of them thought Trump is, simply put, unfit to be president of the United States

They called him crazy, paranoid, suffering from a narcissistic personality disorder. His close ally and Attorney General, William Barr rebuked him, saving suburban voters "think you are a f***ing a**hole". The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff of the military, General Mark Milley, thought Trump was so erratic and dangerous during his last months in office, that he may take decisions that could lead, albeit unintentionally, to confrontations with the likes of China or Iran with the potential use of nuclear weapons.

trade investment banker is seen as a brilliant man. But is it really OK, for example, that the US imports a significant amount of antibiotics and other basic medicines from China? No less during pandemic times?

Woodward seems to have never met a Wall Street executive or an Ivy League school graduate he did not like. Same for the generals, the congressional leaders, and the establishment figures: they are either right or excused for their wrongness. Bottom line, Trump is evil but the establishment is good, even if run by a corrupt self-serving elite, be it, Democrat or Republican. When Trump demands justification for any of the hundreds of military bases around the globe or demands immediate troops withdrawal from any part of the world, he is portrayed as a fool, ignorant of national security interests and processes. Any shrinking of US overseas military commitments is so preposterous in the eyes of Woodward and his beloved generals that it does not even merit comment. And that is why as long as it is business as usual in Washington, as long as the ruling elites continue to be satisfied with managing US decline, Trumpism will persist and metastasise and there is no stopping Trump and co laughing their way to Washington, again. In sum, Trump will certainly run. And if he wins, as he may well do - my fingers trembling as I type - his victory will spell the death of American democracy with grave consequences the world over.

Africa cannot be a French pawn

EPTEMBER was not a good month for troops, while also claiming the lives of 55 French French President Emmanuel Macron. First, he had to deal with the bomb dropped on him by France's closest allies - the US and Britain - who had jointly muscled in on a deal that France had signed with Australia for the supply of a dozen nuclear-propelled submarines. Macron and the entire French diplomacy was left staring in disbelief when the new "AUK-US" partnership announced that the \$65 billion deal with France was off and now it was the UK and US that would supply the subs.

Even as Macron was trying to deal with the unexpected situation in the Indo-Pacific, other crises were either brewing or erupted, this time far closer home, in west and northern Africa, where within a matter of days, the French saw a series of close relationships turn sour. France was suddenly in a very public spat with countries ranging from Mali and Chad in west Africa to Algeria and Morocco in the north.

Even as France was accusing the AUKUS countries of backstabbing it, Mali accused France of abandoning it in the midst of an ongoing battle with a clutch of extremist organizations ranging from Daesh to Al-Qaeda. The French, in turn, said Mali had engaged Russian mercenary outfit the Wagner Group to help in the battle and it was not willing to play along with this.

The relationship with neighboring Chad, which was almost entirely a French colony for over 150 years, has also been going through the rough and tumble for the past few months, especially as the French began drawing down their ill fated and barely effective antiterror military operation in the Sahel region.

France has deployed over 5,500 soldiers for the past eight years to counter the spread of Daesh and Al-Qaeda in the Sahel region. But Paris has little to show for its efforts as the terrorists have been killing thousands of civilians as well as local

soldiers.

The announcement by Macron in June of a drawdown to Barkhane marked a complete reversal by the president since his election in 2017. Soon after taking charge at the Elysée, Macron had announced a broad initiative for the Sahel region and had also invited leaders of the entire region to Paris for an all-encompassing summit.

Besides talking about development in the region, Macron also significantly enhanced French military engagement in west Africa. However, as his first term comes to a close, facing a strong challenge from the farright, Macron has been forced to abandon the Sahel and bring the curtains down on a military campaign that has cost over \$2 billion and has never been popular at home.

The military disaster reflects French challenges in a region that Paris has long seen as its backyard and an opportunity to showcase France as a global power with a lot of influence beyond its borders. Even though most of the countries in north and west Africa have been independent for nearly 60 years, France has never really had a clean break from the continent, keeping its interests and interference handy over the decades. It was a common parlance in Paris that whenever there is a coup d'etat in any former French colony, one aircraft would ferry the deposed leader to exile in Paris and the same plane would leave with the new leader who has just finished his exile in France to head back home.

France has also been accused of using its military and monetary might to install or depose leaders - depending on who would do its bidding - giving lucrative contracts to French business

or its political leaders.

Even as it was still trying to get out of the Sahel quicksand, France got involved in another verbal spat with some African nations. In a sudden move, France said it would dramatically cut the number of visas issues to nationals of Algeria, Morocco and Tunisia. It justified its decision by saying that the three former colonies were not doing enough to allow illegal immigrants to return. France said it was "a drastic decision, and unprecedented, but one made necessary by the fact that these countries are refusing to take back nationals who we do not want or cannot keep in France." Both Algeria and Morocco reacted furiously to the move and accused the French of not telling the full truth.

Though Macron's moves in west and north Africa may appear to be independent of each other, his actions in various African countries seem to have been prompted more by events at home rather than overseas. With just over six months before the presidential elections, Macron is facing heat from all sides. For a long while he has been trailing far-right leader Marine Le Pen in opinion polls. However, in the past few weeks there havebeen dramatic changes in the political scenario in France with the emergence of another farright candidate, columnist Eric Zemmour, whose anti-Muslim and anti-migrant comments make Le Pen seem like a gentle nun in the church.

The French politicians seem to realize that there is a hard shift to the right, at least among the candidates and their statements, pushing Macron to take decisions that he expects to go down well with at least a section of French voters.

While some African leaders may be willing to understand and ignore his actions and comments as those propelled by domestic compulsions rather than a drastic shift in the official stance of France, the damage caused by these actions is unlikely to disappear or be made good once the elections are over. France needs to make a clean break with its policies towards its former colonies and start afresh, instead of again using Africa as a pawn for its own short-term interests. - Courtesy: Arab News

"It is a sensitive case, which is why a remand request was held behind closed doors," Papatheodorou added. Cypriot media, citing a police source, have reported that the suspect, who has not been charged, was arrested on Sept. 27 in the capital Nicosia, just after crossing by car from a checkpoint linking the Turkish-controlled north and the southern parts of the ethni cally divided island. A silencer was also found in his vehicle, the reports said. People using the checkpoint at the time reported extensive searches of vehicles during the crossover transit. Israel appeared to hint that its intelligence services had contributed to Cyprus' foiling of the suspected attack plot. "There are security threats. As you can see, the Shin Bet, the Mossad, all of the security forces know how to handle them,' Foreign Minister Yair Lapid told reporters when asked about the incident. "The fact is that we're there. We're minding matters." Cypriot media have also reported that the suspect was on the island for about 20 days prior to his arrest and rented two cars in succession. They said he used an electric scooter to travel frequently to the north side of the island via a pedestrian crossing. In his statement, Sidi denied local media reports on Sunday that described the arrest as having thwarted a criminally motivated assassination attempt against Teddy Sagi, an Israeli magnate.

Tickets for Indo-Pak T20 World Cup clash sold out

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's match against India remains as one of the most highly anticipated fixtures in world cricket, which is exactly why millions of fans are eager to watch the fierce rivals go head-to-head whenever they meet. The tickets for India-Pakistan at T20 World Cup were sold within hours after they went on sale on Sunday. The seats in sections including General, General East, Premium, Pavilion East and Platinum, have all become unavailable on the Platinumlist, the website where the tickets are being sold for the T20 World Cup.

Fans logged on to the website seconds after ICC announced that the tickets were on sale. Many fans were placed in queue with thousands of users ahead of them; the wait time was said to be more than an hour.

On Sunday night, the only tickets which were available for purchase were Premium and Platinum tickets which cost Dh1,500 and Dh2,600 respectively. However, as of Monday morning, they have also become unavailable on Platinumlist. The T20 World Cup will kick-off from October 17 and the highly anticipated game between two fierce rivals is set to take place on October 24 at the Dubai International Stadium. The ICC has informed that all venues will be operating at approximately 70 percent of maximum seated capacity. – **DNA**

TASHKENT: US Deputy Secretary of State Wendy Sherman has met with Uzbek President Shavkat Mirziyoev in Tashkent to discuss ways to strengthen bilateral relations between the two countries and the situation in Afghanistan.

England players were presented with the proposed conditions for the tour on Sunday evening. The first Test begins on 8 December and the series is due to end on 18 January.

NEW DELHI: Indian cricket legend Sachin Tendulkar has been named in the recently published investigative report, called Pandora Papers, which exposed financial secrets of the powerful and elite across the world, on Sunday. The investigative report that was released on Sunday by the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ), leaked 11.9 million documents from 14 financial services companies globally. The former cricketer and his wife Anjali Tendulkar as well as his father-in-law Anand Mehta have been named in the investigation of records of Panama law firm Alcogal which are part of Pandora Papers.

The three were named as Beneficial Owners and Directors of a BVI-based company called Saas International Limited. However, Tendulkar's attorney denies any wrongdoings regarding the investment: "Tendulkar's attorney said the cricket player's investment is legitimate and has been declared to tax authorities."

UN chief highlights 'enormous' benefits of greener cities "Three-quarters of the infrastructure that will exist in 2050 has yet to be built," he said. "Economic recovery plans offer a generational opportunity to put climate action, renewable energy, and sustainable development at the heart of cities' strategies and policies"

NEW YORK: UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has said that the benefits of making cities more environmentally friendly are "enormous", and include reduced climate risk, more jobs, and better health and well-being. "City leadership in using green materials and constructing energy-efficient, resilient buildings powered by renewable energy, is essential to achieve net-zero emissions by 2050," he said in his message for World Habitat Day, marked on Monday. The theme for this year's celebration of cities and towns worldwide is accelerating urban action for a carbon-free world.

Cities are responsible for about 75 per cent of the world's energy consumption and over 70 per cent of global greenhouse gas emissions, it was pointed out. Urban areas across the globe are facing the dual crises of COVID-19 and climate change, the UN chief said. Around 4.5 billion people live in cities today, but that population is projected to grow by almost 50 per cent, by 2050.

By mid-century, over 1.6 billion urban residents may have to survive through average summertime highs of 35 degrees Celsius. Guterres said that cities and towns are at the core of climate action to keep the 1.5 degrees goal within reach.

"Three-quarters of the infrastructure that will exist in 2050 has yet to be built," he said. "Economic recovery plans offer a generational opportunity to put climate action, renewable energy, and sustainable development at the heart of cities' strategies and policies. As populations grow in emerging economies, demand for transport, which accounts for nearly 20 per cent of global carbon emissions, is also multiplying. The UN Chief said cities are already working on this, trying to ensure that this demand is met zero-emission by vehicles and public transit. Guterres concluded by asking for a global moratorium on internal combustion engines to underpin these efforts, saying it should happen by 2040 at the latest.

In a message for the day, Executive Director of UN-Habitat, Maimunah Mohammad Sharif, said that unless the world takes urgent action, "the greenhouse gases produced by

ever expanding urban centres, will continue to push global air temperatures higher." Ms Sharif remembered that, this year, the day is celebrated only weeks before the UN climate change summit, COP26, happening in early November in Glasgow. For the UN-Habitat Chief, the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic is an opportunity for the world's cities to put climate action on

AUCKLAND: New Zealand has abandoned its long-standing COVID-19 elimination strategy in the face of a challenging delta outbreak, authorities announced on Monday. Instead, the country will focus on increasing vaccination rates and learning to live with the virus.

"With this outbreak and delta the return to zero is incredibly difficult," Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said in a major policy shift. "This is a change in approach we were always going to make over time. Our delta outbreak has accelerated this transition. Vaccines will support it," she said.

The move comes weeks after New Zealand's biggest city, Auckland, recorded its first COVID case after nearly six months of no infections. The city has now been under lockdown for close to 50 days, with restrictions extended to some other parts of the country. Restrictions in Auckland are set to be scaled back in phases starting Wednesday, Ardern said, allowing resi dents to leave their homes and connect with loved ones in the outdoors.

In the face of increased pressure over her approach, Ardern said she was not looking to record zero cases, but to stamp out the virus in an aggressive manner.

Macron said he would like to produce Arabic and Berber publications to counter the "disinformation" and "propaganda" in the Maghreb that is "carried out by the Turks and completely rewrites history."

Algeria shuts airspace to French military

ALGIERS: Algeria has closed its airspace to French military planes, France's military said, escalating the biggest row between the countries in years. A spokesperson for the French Armed Forces said on Sunday that Algeria had closed its airspace to two flights, but that it would have "no major consequences" for operations in the Sahel region, south of Algeria. Algeria's government and military were not immediately available for comment on the closure of airspace.

On Saturday, Algeria recalled its ambassador to Paris citing comments attributed to French President Emmanuel Macron, who was quoted in Le Monde as saying Algeria's "politico-military system" had rewritten the history of its colonisation by France based on

to the memory of over 5.63 million martyrs who sacrificed themselves with a valiant resistance against French colonialism [between 1830-1962]," it said.

Tensions between the two countries have been growing since France decided to cut the number of visas issued to Algerians, Tunisians and Moroccans. According to French media, orders were issued to deport 7,731 Algerians between January and July this year but Algerian authorities provided consular documents required for the repatriation for just 31 people.

Chakib Kaid, the Foreign Ministry's secretary general, conveyed Algeria's grievances to the French envoy, according to a ministry statement. He said the French government's "unilateral decision...was issued without coordination with the Algerian side," which raises questions about "its motives" and implementation. French Prime Minister Jean Castex was scheduled to visit Algeria on April 11 for a high-level Franco-Algerian intergovernmental committee meeting, but it was cancelled by the French side due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The following day, France insisted there were no tensions with Algeria after Castex abruptly called off the visit. Shortly after, appearing on a news program, Clement Beaune, France's secretary of state for European affairs, said: "There are sometimes use of excessive words in Franco-Algerian relations."

He was referring to a statement by Algeria's Labor Minister El Hachemi Djaaboub, who declared France "our traditional and eternal enemy." Algerian Army Chief of Staff General Said Chengriha earlier this year also called on France to hand over maps of nuclear test sites in his country's desert in the 1960s to be cleared of radiation.

Romanian billionaire dies in plane crash

MILAN: A small private plane has crashed into an empty building on the outskirts of Milan in northern Italy, killing all eight people on board, according to police.

The plane, which took off from Milan's Linate city airport on Sunday, was headed for the island of Sardinia, officials said.

It was piloted by Romanian billionaire Dan Petrescu, according to Italian media.

The 68-year-old was one of Romania's richest men. He headed a major construction firm and owned a string of hypermarkets and malls. He also held German nationality, the Corriere della Sera newspaper reported.

Corriere and the AGI news agency said Petrescu's 65-year-old wife, who also had French nationality, and their son Dan Stefano, 30, were killed. Also on the plane with the family were four of their friends, two sisters and a couple with their one-year-old child.

The crash occurred just outside a metro station in the Milan suburb of San Donato. People in the area reported hearing a blast when the plane collided with the two-storey building, which was empty at the time as it was being renovated.

India to pay \$674 for every covid death

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court's order followed a petition by lawyers seeking compensation under India's disaster management laws. India has officially recorded more than 447,000 Covid-19 deaths so far.

However, experts believe that up to 10 times more people could have died in the pandemic.

They have arrived at different estimates after examining excess deaths - a measure of how many more people are dying than would be expected compared to the previous few years.

On Monday Justice MR Shah said the "next of kith and kin of the deceased person" shall be paid this compensation within a month of applying. This would "over and above the be amounts paid by the centre and state under various benevolent schemes". he said. The court added that the compensation should be paid within 30 days after a family submits an application.

In June, petitioners sought the court's intervention in paying compensation to the families of Covid-19 victims. They said since Covid-19 was "specially" notified as a disaster under India's National Disaster Management Act, compensation should

be paid to the victims. The 2005 law was enacted for efficient management of disasters, including preparation of mitigation strategies, capacity-building and compensation for lost lives, injuries and damaged properties. - APP

TEHRAN: Iran foresees talks with world powers aimed at reviving its nuclear deal resuming by early November, foreign ministry spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh said Monday.

"I don't think it will take us the same amount of time as it took the Biden administration to come," Khatibzadeh said, referring to US diplomats under President Joe Biden indirectly joining the Vienna talks.

For the government of Iran's ultraconservative new President Ebrahim Raisi, "I don't think the (return to talks) will take as much as 90 days," he said, suggesting talks will be underway again by early November. It is the first time Iran has suggested a rough date for a possible return to the table. The 2015 nuclear deal gave Iran sanctions relief in return for tight controls on its nuclear programme, monitored by the UN.

In 2018 then-US president Donald Trump withdrew from the multilateral deal and began reimposing sanctions. Tehran has gradually rolled back its nuclear commitments since 2019.

Some 35 current and ex-leaders are featured in 11.9 million documents leaked from financial services companies across world

LONDON: Governments moved on Monday to limit the fallout from a release of millions of documents detailing how leaders have used offshore tax havens to stash assets worth hundreds of millions of dollars.

Some 35 current and former leaders are featured in roughly 11.9 million documents leaked from financial services companies across the world that include reports of luxury homes on the French Riviera, Monte Carlo and California.

The documents, known as the "Pandora Papers", were obtained by the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ) and released in stories by media partners including The Washington Post, the BBC and The Guardian.

Allegations range from corruption to money laundering and tax avoidance.

Although holding assets offshore or using shell companies is not illegal in most countries, the revelations are embarrassing for leaders who have pushed austerity measures or campaigned against corruption.

Russian leader Vladimir Putin is not named but he is linked via associates to secret assets in Monaco, particularly a waterfront home acquired by a Russian woman reported to have had a child with him.

"This is just a set of largely unsubstantiated claims," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said. "We didn't see anything on hidden wealth within Putin's inner circle." Jordan was also keen to play down the revelations, which exposed how King Abdullah II created a network of offshore companies and tax havens to amass a \$100 million property empire from California to London.

The country's royal court said the properties were funded with the king's personal wealth and were used for official and private visits.

"Any allegations that link these private properties to public funds or assistance are baseless and deliberate attempts to distort facts," a statement said. The ICIJ found links between almost 1,000 companies in offshore havens and 336 high-level politicians and public

officials, including more than a dozen serving heads of state and government, country leaders, cabinet ministers, ambassadors and others.

More than two-thirds of the companies were set up in the British Virgin Islands. Family and associates of Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev - long accused of corruption in the central Asian nation - are alleged to have been secretly involved in property deals in Britain worth hundreds of millions.

And the documents also show how Czech

Prime Minister Andrej Babis - who faces an election later this week - failed to declare an offshore investment company used to purchase a chateau worth \$22 mil-

lion in the south of France. "I have never done anything illegal or wrong," Babis hit back in a tweet, calling the revelations a smear attempt aimed at influencing the election.

Nearly 2 million of the 11.9 million leaked documents came from a Panamanian law firm called Alcogal, which the ICIJ said had become "a magnet for the rich and powerful" seeking to hide wealth offshore. Alcogal, whose clients allegedly included

the Jordanian monarch and Czech prime minister, rejected accusations of shady dealings.

ICIJ's director Gerard Ryle said in a video accompanying the investigation that those best placed to halt such practices were the ones who were benefiting most.

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia has confirmed that it had held its first round of direct talks with Iran's new government last month, part of a process begun earlier this year to reduce tension between the Gulf's rival powers.

Both nations severed ties in 2016 and began talks in April, at a time when Washington and Tehran were discussing reviving a nuclear pact that Riyadh and its allies had opposed.

Three rounds of Saudi-Iranian talks were held in Iraq in the months before Iran's new president, Ebrahim Raisi, took office in August. Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan Al Saud said the latest round had



taken place on September 21. He did not give the location of the meeting. The date coincides with a speech by Raisi at the UN General Assembly in New York.

"These discussions are still in the exploratory phase. We hope they will provide a basis to address unresolved issues between the two sides and we will strive and work to realise that," he told a joint news conference. Riyadh and Tehran have both said they hope the talks can ease tensions, while playing down expecta-

tions of a major diplomatic breakthrough. Iran did not immediately comment on the September 21 round of talks. Riyadh has said it would judge the government of Raisi by the reality

Lowest global virus death toll for 11 months

PARIS: The weekly number of coronavirus deaths worldwide has fallen to levels unseen for almost a year, according to an AFP count on Monday based on official national figures.

The 53,245 deaths recorded worldwide between September 27 and October 3, an average of 7,606 each day, showed that the global pandemic continues the downward trend that began at the end of August, after a peak of around 10,000 deaths per day.

The new weekly death toll figure is the lowest recorded since Oct 31-November 6.2020.

Over the last month the number of Covid-19 related deaths has fallen by almost a quarter, as vaccination campaigns make

Pakistan reports lowest death toll since July

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan on Sunday reported 1,490 new COVID-19 cases and 27 more deaths, the National Command and Operation Center (NCOC) said on Monday. The NCOC said the country's number of overall confirmed cases had risen to 1,251,348, including 1,177,249 who have recovered.

The number of active cases has dropped to 46,206 who are under treatment across the country, while 3,407 are in critical condition.

According to the NCOC, the pandemic killed 27 people on Sunday, increasing the death toll to 27,893. Pakistan's southern Sindh province is the most affected region of the country with 460,111 infections followed by eastern Punjab province which has reported 433,286 infections. - APP

progress. After a year of Coronavirus waves, linked in particular to the spread of variants including the more contagious Delta strain, the curve of new cases is also down, by almost a third compared to the end of August.

With nearly 81 doses of anti-Covid-19 vaccine administered per 100 inhabitants

worldwide, according to an AFP count, the authorities hope to see this decline continue, even if there are still major disparities between regions.

For every 100 residents of North America 123 vaccines doses have been administered. The figure for Africa is 11 doses per 100 people, with half the nations on the continent managing to fully vaccinate just two percent of their people, according to the World Health Organization's Africa office.

Since the virus was first discovered in China in late 2019, around 4.8 million people have died of Covid-19 around the world.

The WHO has said that taking into account excess mortality directly and indirectly linked to Covid-19 the pandemic's true overall toll could be two to three times higher than official records.
