Current woes gift of past rulers



"Ms Ressa and Mr. Muratov are receiving the Peace Prize for their courageous fight for freedom of expression in the Philippines and Russia," Chairwoman Berit Reiss-Andersen of the Norwegian Nobel Committee told during news conference. "At the same time, they are representatives



of all journalists who stand up for this ideal in a world in which democracy and freedom of the press face increasingly adverse conditions," she added. According to media, the prize is the first for journalists since the German Carl von Ossietzky won it

UAF developed a plan to revive cotton production

FAISALABAD: Cotton production has shrunk by more than 60 percent from 14.81 million bales to 5.65 million bales in 2020/21 season during a decade, resulting in considerable loss to Pakistan's textile sector and economy, Pakistan position in cotton production has shifted from fourth to fifth in cotton producing countries of the world, said Prof Dr Igrar Ahmad Khan Vice Chancellor University of Ag-

riculture Faisalabad. Addressing a webinar held to mark world cotton day, he said that cotton which was once considered the lifeline of the country farmers and a source of raw material to textile companies, has hit

all-time low in production. He said that poor pest management, shift in cotton area to other crops, climate variability, early sowing, poor quality Bt cotton seed, traditional methods of spraying and gap between farmers and extension staff have been realized as the possible reasons behind cotton yield reduction despite the introduction of genetically modified varieties.

A plan to revive cotton production has been developed by UAF to improve pest management. Combination of whitefly control strategy and updating the curriculum of universities in connection with current agricultural issues faced by farming community may provide sustainable cotton production in Pakistan

50 percent of population is facing malnutrition: VC UAF

FAISALABAD: More than 50 percent of population is facing malnutrition, resulting in stunting growth, said University of Agriculture Faisalabad Vice Chancellor Prof Dr Igrar Ahmad Khan while addressing a seminar to mark World Egg



He said that the per person annual consumption of eggs is only 65 in the country whereas human body requirement stands at 300 eggs a year, causing various diseases due to deficiency of protein and other essential food ingredients.

Dr Kahif Saleemi said nutrient-dense ingredients such as eggs are easy to fit into the diet and formulated foods. He said that egg is an important source of nutrition. It contains proteins, minerals and vitamins. He said world egg day was initiated in 1996 in order to raise awareness among the masses about its benefits and their important role in life. He said we have to adopt the simplicity in our food that would lead towards a health society.

It was reaffirmed that the extension given on September 30 was only due to the fact that FBR's IT System got overloaded and since that has been fixed now, no more extension would be given beyond October 15. – APP

Jewelry exports witness 137% increase

The digitally enabled payment system fully relied on the use of mobile phones and biometric verification to strengthen the link between government assistance and social protection.

Ehsaas Emergency Cash payments were made through branchless banking platforms of two

commercial banks (in retail settings and specially established payment campsites) and their 1,800 biometrically enabled ATMs.

The available cash out points in 2,270 campsites were more than 11,500. Provincial governments and their security apparatus were responsible for logistic arrangements on ground at the payment campsites to coordinate payments in over 2,270 locations across the country, covering an area of over 881,000 square kilometers. Money was deposited in limited mandate accounts and individuals were able to draw the money after biometric authentication in real time.

Smog in Punjab

ITH the winter season approaching and smog making a return in Lahore, the Punjab government has announced that measures will be introduced to improve air quality. On Wednesday, the US Consulate Lahore's monitor recorded the Air Quality Index (AQI) score between 223 and 231. Responding to this, the authorities in Punjab have rightly declared the phenomenon a calamity and directed the administrative secretaries concerned, commissioners and deputy commissioners (DCs) to make concerted efforts for mitigation of this health hazard across the province.

This issue has been around since 2014 with smog becoming a routine affair in Lahore every winter. Last year however, the air quality was so hazardous that Faisalabad and Lahore topped the list of the world's most polluted cities. While it is encouraging to see the provincial government take this issue seriously, it is imperative that it does not politicise the issue by getting bogged down in distractions such as disputing air quality readings or pointing the finger towards Indian Punjab in the case of stubble burning. The fact is that stubble burning is only one of the causes behind dangerous smog levels.

The biggest contributor to pollution in Punjab is the transport sector, and provincial authorities have thus far failed to come up with means to counter this menace. The statistics show that vehicular emissions are responsible for 43 percent of smog in the air, stubble burning 20 percent, industrial emissions 25 percent, and thermal power plants 12 percent.

As far as the issue of traffic is concerned, the authorities will have to come up with creative solutions like designating public transport only days, or finding ways to make car pooling or bicycles more attractive options for commuters. When it comes to reducing industrial emissions, the government has converted a significant percentage of brick kilns to zig zag technology, however several kilns continue to operate without converting to the new technology. This needs to be addressed at the earliest. A variety of forward-thinking measures will have to be implemented as this is not just a seasonal issue, but it is something that will have far reaching consequences for the climate in the region.

Discontent in Balochistan

ALOCHISTAN'S provincial government is in crisis. Infighting within the political administration has been rampant since June when the budget was passed with deep contentions from many sides of Balochistan's political makeup. Coupled with growing infrastructure problems, and a fear of rising terrorism, discontent against the leadership is high, even among one of the ruling parties. The past month has been a show of poor leadership from all politicians involved in Balochistan, as events betray a back and forth of allegations, calls to resign and refusals, causing a stalemate.

The blame lies on Chief Minister Jam Kamal Khan Alyani for being unable to manage his own party members and negotiate effectively. He should have known that these imminent calls for him to resign as Chief Minister would come as soon as he resigned as president of the ruling Balochistan Awami Party (BAP). This move, which had been lambasted by some disgruntled BAP members, has satisfied nobody, and only united those calling for his resignation.

If the Chief Minister thought the resignation from the post of president of the party would pacify the party, he was mistaken, for only a few days later, a group comprising of provincial ministers and lawmakers of BAP and its allies in the coalition government gave Jam Kamal Khan Alyani a 24-hour ultimatum to step down or they would initiate more formal processes against him, like a vote of no-confidence.

The Chief Minister cannot ignore the deadline and go about his role, as he has been doing so far. He must urgently negotiate with at least some party or group if he wants to stay on as Chief Minister. He must find a way to talk to his own cabinet and party members. Otherwise, the group has the numbers to pass a no-confidence vote, which will only usher in more instability for the Balochistan government.

The last thing the province needs is political strife when development must remain a priority.

West can help Afghans without recognizing Taliban

HILE Afghans have finally seen a glimpse of stability for the first time in decades, they now face a major humanitarian and developmental catastrophe. In order to prevent this outcome, it is essential that all stakeholders in Afghanistan and within the international community open a dialogue on how to get aid to the struggling Afghan population.

Though the country made significant strides in development over the last 20 years, its humanitarian situation was dire even before the Taliban takeover in August. In its aftermath, the majority of humanitarian activities ceased, which brought Afghanistan closer to the edge.

In recent weeks, the Afghan healthcare system has been described as "on the brink of collapse". The World Food Programme has warned that only 5 percent of households in Afghanistan have enough to eat. The UN forecasts that, during the next fiscal year, its GDP will shrink by somewhere in the range of 3.6 percent to 13.2 percent. If no action is taken, the country will face near-"universal poverty", with poverty rates rising to 97-98 percent.

In response to these multi-dimensional challenges, at the September 13 Geneva conference, donors pledged more than \$1bn to help Afghanistan. Although this is 30-percent higher than what the UN requested for emergency assistance, it pales in comparison to US military expenditure of \$300m per day over the past two decades. In spite of the pledges, much of what has been committed cannot be utilised because of the gridlock between the Taliban and the international community.

Since mid-August, Afghanistan has been cut off from critically needed resources that would enable it to deal with pressing humanitarian and development challenges.

Presently, Afghan state institutions are facing a financial crisis due to the US government's decision to freeze nearly \$9.5bn of central bank assets in US-based financial institutions.

Due to the destabilising effect this move has had on the banking system and the lack of funds, the country may be forced to rely on money transfers via the Hawala system and traditional forms of money lending and bartering in order to survive. These forms of informal transactions have often been associated with criminal activities, money laundering, and terrorism financing.

Back in August, just as Kabul fell, I argued that a disaster in Afghanistan can be averted. This required both the Taliban and the West to convey their expectations and set clear, measurable targets moving forward - and this remains true today. In charting a way forward towards international cooperation to prevent a humanitarian catastrophe in Afghanistan, all concerned stake-

holders should heed the following important successful community-based reconstruction messages.

First, the Taliban must overcome its instinctive rejection of the West. Despite the tremendous temptation and desire for vengeance, its leadership must also ensure that humanitarian aid is not siphoned off to its fighters and is not used to exert pressure on the international community at any time.

In extensive consultation with Western diplomats that I have had over the past month, it has been made clear to me that the vast majority of Western governments do not want the Taliban to fail. Rather than seeking to undermine the Afghan state, Western powers perceive a strategic self-interest in a stable Afghanistan, given the risk of mass migration, terror threats, and a resurgent narcotics trade. While no governments have rushed to recognise the Taliban, the necessity of some form of cooperation with the group is widely acknowledged.

The Taliban may perceive non-recognition as a snub, but it should be aware that Western governments are constrained by their own electorates appalled by media reporting on human rights abuses and mistreatment of women and minori-

Second, leading Western donors should recognise that a business-as-usual approach will not work in Afghanistan today.

The country under a Taliban government is very different from post-disaster or state collapse zones in which the UN and others can step in to provide aid outside of the framework of the state. Whether or not it is recognised internationally, the Afghan government is functioning within the Afghan state and its national institutions, which have been built up at a great cost in resources and effort over the past 20 years.

They may have some deficiencies and suffer from corruption, but they work.

Yet large-scale development without engaging state institutions is unlikely to go ahead. There is an urgent need to explore potential means of coordination that would allow some form of development assistance to proceed short of full recognition of the de facto Taliban government.

Education and health are two sectors in which Western aid can open channels of communication and coordination with the Taliban without the need for formal recognition.

National institutions with a demonstrated record of effective collaboration are already in place with a wide network of community-based governance structures, non-governmental organisations, and private firms able to lead a whole-of-society approach to development. One example is the Citizen's Charter, which replaced the National Solidarity Programme, one of the largest and most

schemes globally.

It is crucial that international aid builds up rather than replaces local capacities. The Taliban lacks the resources, knowledge, and skills to effectively govern Afghanistan on its own. Financing local priorities, utilising untapped resources, and investing in developing local capacity and public administration would build confidence and make the Taliban more cooperative.

Despite the fact that 120,000 people have fled Afghanistan, including many highly skilled and educated individuals, there is still a large pool of specialists and workers there that can be mobilised for development projects.

The recent post-evacuation "brain drain" should not be used as an excuse by internationals for continuing longstanding and harmful practices of importing human resources.

Third, life-saving humanitarian aid should not be used as a bargaining chip to win political concessions. The West has often tried to utilise humanitarian aid as leverage against the Taliban. This counterproductive approach must be avoided at all costs, to prevent the Taliban from taking desperate measures to pursue close relations with non-traditional donors not equipped to effectively support development in Afghanistan.

Western donors should recognise that there are important political dynamics within the Taliban that affect its decision-making.

In particular, there is a split between military leaders and the political or peace wing that negotiated with the US in Doha. Over time, lack of engagement with the Taliban will only reinforce the position of the hardline military elements.

If the West does not revise its approaches, Afghanistan could easily become a breeding ground for insecurity and a thriving narcotics trade, regionally and globally.

In conclusion, humanitarian assistance is one of the only common languages shared by Kabul and the West today. On all sides there is a strong will to communicate yet what is missing is an effective medium for dialogue. One immediate step in the right direction would

be to establish an independent council of nationally-respected Afghans who could act as an intermediary and facilitate communication between the Taliban and outside parties. At first, this would enable a shared understanding on lifesaving aid delivery and over time, it could open up the potential for the West to constructively engage the Taliban on a range of other issues. Direct or indirect dialogue is vital to not just preventing a humanitarian crisis but also enhancing opportunities for more effective ways of working across the Humanitarian-Development-Peace Nexus.

Rohingya have lost a pioneering leader

EFUGEE camps are places of misery and despair more often than places of refuge and hope. In such precarious conditions, some of humanity's best impulses can come to life. But at least as often, some of the worst impulses will also become manifest. The tragic assassination of Mohibullah, one of the most humane and effective community leaders in Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh, by fellow Rohingya reveals the ugly and self-destructive side of people caught up in a struggle

Back in Myanmar, Mohibullah used to be a science teacher and administrator - a public servant with a knack for numbers and evidence. As soon as he arrived in the Kutupalong camp in Cox's Bazar in 2017, fleeing as the Myanmar army burned down his village, he began collecting information from his neighbors in the camp, trying to compile a list of those killed in the attacks, checking and cross-referencing every bit of testimony the victims could provide. The hope was that, one day, some international court would use this information to bring the perpetrators of these crimes against humanity to justice.

For this purpose, Mohibullah founded a nongovernmental organization, the Arakan Rohingya Society for Peace and Human Rights, which raised his profile among the community and foreign NGOs working in the Bangladesh camps.

Through his documentary work, and his advocacy for the rights and needs of the refugees, he became known to the wider international network of and economic ways of organizing emerge - that human rights workers in the region.

They, in turn, invited him to speak to the UN Human Rights Council in Geneva in 2019, as well as to the White House. But though he had every opportunity to seek asylum while in the West, Mohibullah went straight back to his work in the camps, documenting and advocating for the community.

Unfortunately, what is best for a community is not always best for some people in that community. And those who work to serve the community always find enemies among those whose private interests they cross.

Like most international observers, Mohibullah argued that the best outcome for the Rohingya is for them to be allowed to return to Myanmar, provided they had guaranteed equal rights with other citizens of the country - rights they had been denied for decades.

But not everyone in the camps would be served by

the betterment of their community.

Refugee camps, especially those as large as the sites in Cox's Bazar, where more than 1 million people huddle together in an extremely precarious situation, are places where enforcing the kind of law and order and community policing we are used to in normal society is virtually impossible. In that vacuum of law and order, "alternative" political

is to say, gangs, informal (criminal) markets and, inevitably, extremist groups.

We do not know exactly which group was responsible for the daylight assassination of Mohibullah, although his brother, Habibullah, said that he saw the killing and that elements of the extremist Islamist Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army were responsible. But in any case, both Islamist extremists and traditional criminal gangs would have an equal motive to remove any community leader with wide public credibility who would advocate for a return to some kind of normalcy within the broader political context. The kind of political and economic interests that are served by the destitution and despair of a refugee camp would be threatened by the betterment of the overall community.

There is a wider lesson for everyone here, even those living comfortable lives in stable, developed societies: You and I may have a vested interest in what is best for our communities and societies overall, but not everyone does.

And there are plenty of people who will put their own private motives and gain before what is best for the community as a whole. We must never be complacent about these basic facts of the human experience, lest we allow the worst of us to dictate

how all of us should live our lives. – Courtesy Arab News

Over 55 killed in **Afghanistan Mosque blast**

From Page 01 that 35 dead and more than 55 wounded had been taken there, while Doctors Without Borders (MSF) hospital said 20 were dead and scores more wounded. Matiullah Rohani, director of culture and information in Kunduz for Afghanistan's new Taliban government, confirmed to AFP that the deadly incident was a suicide attack and that at least 46 people had died and 143 were wounded. Taliban spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid had earlier said "an explosion took place in a mosque of our Shia compa-

triots" in Kunduz.

Zalmai Alokzai, a local businessman who rushed to Kunduz Provincial Hospital to check whether doctors needed blood donations, described horrific scenes.

"Ambulances were going back to the incident scene to carry the dead," he said. An international aid worker at the MSF hospital in the city told AFP there were fears the death toll could rise even further.

"Hundreds of people are gathered at the main gate of the hospital and crying for their relatives but armed Taliban guys are trying to prevent gatherings in case another explosion is planned," he said.

Graphic images shared on social media, which could not immediately be verified, showed several bloodied bodies lying on the floor. Pictures showed plumes of smoke rising into the air over Kunduz. Another video showed men shepherding people, including women and children, away from the scene. Frightened crowds thronged the streets.

Aminullah, an eyewitness whose brother was at the mosque, told AFP: "After I heard the explosion, I called my brother but he did not pick up. "I walked towards the mosque and found my brother wounded and faint. We immediately took him to the MSF hospital.

A female teacher in Kunduz told AFP the blast happened near her house, and several of her neighbours were killed. "It was a very terrifying incident," she said. "Many of our neighbours have been killed and wounded. A 16-year-old neighbour was killed. They couldn't find half of his body. Another neighbour who was 24 was killed as well."

Kunduz's location makes it a key transit point for economic and trade exchanges with Taiikistan. It was the scene of fierce battles as the Taliban fought their way back into power this year.

The Foreign Minister also thanked the United States for the Covid-related support extended to Pakistan. Deputy Secretary Sherman conveyed grief and sorrow over the loss of human lives in the earthquake lochistan yesterday.

Deputy Secretary Sherman appreciated Pakistan's support for the evacuation of U.S. citizens and others from Afghanistan, and its continued efforts for peace in the region. Deputy Secretary Sherman underscored the importance of long-standing relationship between Pakistan and the U.S.

It was agreed to continue close communication and coordination on the situation in Afghanistan, security and counter-terrorism, trade and investment, climate change, economic cooperation, and regional connectivity. Deputy Secretary Sherman is visiting Pakistan on 7-8 October 2021. Her visit follows the recent meeting between Foreign Minister Qureshi and U.S. Secretary of State Blinken on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly in New York on 23 September 2021.

Brazil preserve Taiwan their winning start

MONTEVIDEO: Gabriel Barbosa's penalty five minutes from time maintained Brazil's perfect start to South American World Cup qualifying with a come from behind 3-1 win over Venezuela on Thursday. It was a ninth win from nine for the Selecao and extended their lead in the single South American qualifying group to eight points over unbeaten Argentina, who drew 0-0 in Paraguay. Eric Ramirez's early goal gave Venezuela a shock lead in Caracas but Marquinhos equalized with a header before Barbosa's late penalty. Substitute Antony rubbed salt into unlucky Venezuela's wounds five minutes into injury time to leave the hosts rooted to the bottom of the table. "It was a tough game, we started off well below our level," admitted Marquinhos. "It was our second half performance that got us the positive result we wanted." Shorn of the suspended Neymar, Brazil clearly missed his spark, dominating possession but creating little until their late rally. Venezuela took a shock lead on 11 minutes when Yeferson Soteldo stood up a cross into the box and Ramiurez rose unmarked to head into the far corner as two Brazilian defenders in close attendance slipped. Brazil were almost level halfway through the first period but Everton Ribeiro's attempted cross deflected off Nathuel Ferraresi and onto the bar, before the defender cleared the ball to safety. Brazil had the ball in the net on 56 minutes but it was chalked off for a foul by Thiago Silva. Marquinhos rose to head home debutant substitute Raphinha's corner 19 minutes from time, although Venezuela's goalkeeper Joel Graterol should have done better but seemed to be deceived by the ball bouncing in front of him.

And the turnaround was complete when Oscar Gonzalez tripped Barbosa in the box, with the striker calmly slotting the resulting spot kick down the middle of the goal. Leeds United's Raphinha rounded off an impressive debut with a second assist for Antony to tap home from six yards with almost the last kick of the match. Paraguay kept Lionel Messi quiet in a goalless draw in Asuncion. A lively start saw chances at both ends but Argentina's Joaquin Correa should have done better when put clean through on goal, only for a heavy touch to allow goalkeeper Antony Silva to smother the danger. Argentina stopper Emiliano Martinez then made a full stretch save to tip Santiago Arzamendi's piledriver from distance around the post. Correa got beyond Paraguay's defence twice more, both times from Messi passes, but was flagged offside the first time and needlessly tried to square the ball to Angel Di Maria the second time, allowing a defender to clear.

TAIPEI: Taiwan does not military confrontation but will do whatever it takes to defend its freedom and democratic way of life, President Tsai Ing-wen has said, amid a rise in tensions with China that has sparked alarm around the world. Taiwan, claimed by Beijing

as its own territory, reported nearly 150 Chinese air force aircraft flew into its air defence zone over a four-day period beginning last Friday, China's National Day. The sorties now appear to have ended. Taiwan has complained for more than a year of such activities, which it views as "grey zone warfare", designed to wear out Taiwan's armed forces and test their ability to respond. "Taiwan does not seek military confrontation," Tsai told security forum in Taipei on Friday. "It hopes for a peaceful, stable, predictable and mutually beneficial coexistence with its neighbours. But Taiwan will also do whatever it takes to defend its freedom and democratic way of life." China says it is acting to protect its security and sovereignty and has blamed the United States, Taiwan's most important international backer and arms supplier, for the current tensions.

Poland summons Belarusian diplomat after border incident

WARSAW: The Polish foreign ministry on Friday summoned the Belarusian charge d'affaires after Poland said its soldiers were fired at by Belarusian armed personnel on the border between the two countries. A Polish border guard spokeswoman said that the incident happened on Thursday and that nobody was injured as the shots were "probably blank rounds". Belarus denied that its forces had fired any shots and asked the Polish side to provide evidence.

"We have evidence that the shots were fired," foreign ministry spokesman Lukasz Jasina said. "If necessary, this evidence will be handed over to the Belarusian side, and not only to the Belarusian side, of course, but also to the public and other countries," he told reporters. Belarus's state border service earlier wrote on its Telegram channel: "Belarusian border guards have not used weapons on any part of the state border over the past 24 hours".

But Polish border guard spokeswoman Anna Michalska said that "a Belarusian service patrol fired shots in the direction of Polish Army soldiers who patrol the border together with us". "There are more and more of these provocations," she added. Thousands of migrants - mostly from the Middle East and Africa - have tried to cross the Polish border from Belarus since August. The EU has said this influx is deliberately engineered by the Belarusian regime as a way of retaliating against EU sanctions. - DNA

ICC to monitor mental health at T20 WC

DUBAI: Cricketers facing mental health issues during the Twenty20 World Cup will have 24-hour access to a psychologist, the International Cricket Council said on Thursday. The preliminary round matches of the tournament, which will be played under a bio-secure environment, will start on Oct. 17 in the United Arab Emirates and Oman. The event was moved to the Gulf states after a surge of COVID-19 infections in India. The players will have to isolate for 6 days on arrival, during which they will undergo three COVID-19 Tests before they enter the so-called 'bubbles' or managed environment. "We should expect that some people will be affected, their mental health will be affected by being in confined conditions again, particularly perhaps for those who have done it for a long period of time," Alex Marshall, the ICC's head of integrity, told reporters. "The ICC will have available 24 hours a day, a psychologist to speak to any individual who seeks help," he said. "There's a number of things we're doing ... But I think from a day-to-day basis, making sure we keep the environment friendly and pleasant for them." Cricket has mostly been played in restricted environments since it resumed last year after a lengthy disruption because of the pandemic and players in the past have complained about the heavy toll it takes on their mental health. The world governing body has allowed players to be accompanied by close family during the T20 World Cup, which will end with the final in Dubai on Nov. 14, but they would also have to be part of the restricted environment. - DNA

oil is imported from abroad and there's no commercial oil production unit for peanut oil in Pakistan," said Dr. Babar Ijaz, a Ph.D. from China Agricultural University, Beijing who is currently an overseas business manager at Shandong Rainbow Agricultural Technology Co., Ltd., making efforts on promoting Pak-China peanut cooperation.

"Our company, Shandong Rainbow Agricultural Technology is based in Weifang, a big agriculture city of Shandong, China. Our major product is peanut. We produce high oleic acid

peanuts for oil extraction. which is famous in Shandong and other provinces of China." Dr. Babar Ijaz said, adding that they have a lot of peanut planting areas in Xinjiang, China as well.

Pakistan's poverty rate to ease in **FY22: WB**

ISLAMABAD: The World Bank has projected Pakistan's poverty rate to ease from current 4.8% to 4.4% in Fiscal year 2021-22 and 4.0% in next fiscal year (2022-23).

The World Bank has set the extreme poverty line at \$1.9 per person per day, however since 2017, the World Bank has also been reporting poverty rates for all countries using two new international poverty lines: a lower middle-income International Poverty Line, set at \$3.20/day; and an upper middle-income International Poverty Line, set at \$5.50/ day. According to a recent report released by the Bank, Pakistan's lower middle-income poverty rate would also decline from current 37% t0 35.7% in FY22 and 33.8% in fiscal year 2022-23.

Similarly the upper middle-income poverty rate has also been project to ease from current 77% to 76.2% in FY22 and 75% in next fiscal year.

In comparison the poverty rate in other regional countries is much higher than that in Pakistan.

The World Bank report titled "Shifting Gears: Digitization and Services-Led Development" noted that the international or extreme poverty rate in Bangladesh was 12.5% which would ease to 11.9% in next fiscal year. - APP

OCCUPIED JERUSALEM: An Israeli court ruling on Wednesday deeming the performance of Jewish silent prayer within the Al-Aqsa Mosque premises not a "criminal act" has ignited fears among Palestinians that the move is a prelude to divide the holy site between Muslims and Jews in terms of time and space. The unprecedented decision by the judge of the Jerusalem Magistrates Court, Bilha Yahalom, was criticized by the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) as illegal and provocative.

"Such illegal decisions constitute an unprecedented attack on the inalienable religious rights of the Islamic nation and its heritage, a provocation to the feelings of Muslims all over the world, and a violation of freedom of worship and the sanctity of holy places," the top Muslim body's Secretary-General Yousef Al-Othaimeen said in a statement on Thursday. Wednesday's decision was the first by an Israeli court to support Jewish prayer at the Al-Aqsa Mosque compound.

Recently, Israeli settlers began to perform silent prayers during their visits to the site. While the verdict was welcomed by rightwing Israelis, it sparked angry Palestinian and Muslim reactions who vehemently op-

pose any move intended to divide the holy site with Jews in terms of time and space considering it a violation of the existing historical situation in the mosque that prevailed since the Ottoman rule, under the British mandate and Jordanian rule, to the beginning of the Israeli occupation in 1967. Under the existing historical situation, prayer in the mosque is limited to Muslims only, while non-Muslims can visit it as tourists. The administration of the mosque is exclusively for the

Islamic Endowment Department. The Israeli police have already turned a blind eye to the religious rituals performed by the intrusive settlers which are happening gradually during specific times - in the morning and after the noon prayer.

Speaking to Anadolu Agency, Al-Aqsa Mosque preacher Sheikh Ekrima Sabri said the court decision is "invalid." "The court has no right to interfere in the af-

fairs of the Al-Aqsa Mosque," he said.



"The occupation court does not have jurisdiction with regard to the Al-Aqsa Mosque," the sheikh noted, saying the decision "is a prelude to the criminal scheme of the temporal and spatial division of the mosque."

He warned Israel not to temper with the sanctity of the Al-Aqsa Mosque as it is "a trust on the necks of all Muslims.'

Other Muslim leaders and organizations in Jerusalem also condemned the ruling. Meanwhile, Sheikh Omar al-Kiswani, the director of East Jerusalem's Al-Aqsa Mosque, expressed concern that Israeli extremists have greater ambitions behind the verdict.

'We take the decision and its aftermath seriously," al-Kiswani told Anadolu Agency, "For now, it allows (silent) prayers, but what comes after that? The occupation and the extremists have greater ambitions than that."

For Muslims, the Al-Aqsa represents the world's third holiest site. Jews, for their part, refer to the area as the "Temple Mount," claiming it was the site of two Jewish temples in ancient times, which is denied by Muslims. The Jews also openly say that they seek to establish the alleged temple on the ruins of the Al-Aqsa Mosque.

Al-Kiswani said the ruling is indifferent to the feelings of Muslims pointing out the hasty way the settlement groups have moved to implement the verdict on the ground.

IMF wants Pak to hike electricity tariff

ISLAMABAD: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has demanded of Pakistan to increase electricity tariff. The demand was made during the virtual talks between the IMF officials and Pakistan for the release of \$1 billion loan installment.

"Electricity tariff should be jacked up by Rs1.40 per unit," the IMF recommended during the talks as it will help Pakistan in controlling the circular debt. The fund has asked for more steps to increase income tax, sales tax, and regulatory duties collection and urged the Federal Board of Revenue to take steps in this context. The IMF has asked Pakistan to increase FBR's yearly collection to Rs63 trillion from Rs58 trillion, the well-informed sources said. It must be noted that today is the third day of virtual talks between Pakistan with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) in Islamabad. Negotiations are underway with the fund for a \$1 billion loan installment. Negotiations with IMF officials will continue this week. It is to be mentioned that a loan agreement worth \$6 billion was delayed between the IMF and Pakistan.

EU bans additive used in sweets and cakes

BRUSSELS: EU member states on Friday agreed to ban a widely used colouring additive for food, known as the artificial colouring E171 on labels, after the European regulator

E171 contains nanoparticles of titanium dioxide, and is commonly used in a wide range of consumer products. including medicines and cosmetics. The ban pertains to the additive's use in food, where it serves mainly as a whitening and brightening agent in sweets, chewing gum, white sauces and cake icing. The Italy-based European Food Safety Authority (EFSA) in May found that there was a risk that the nanoparticles could cause DNA damage, and no safe level for its daily intake could be established.

France suspended its use in food last year, following research suggesting titanium dioxide could cause pre-cancerous lesions in lab rats. Without any further objection by member states or the European Parliament by the end of the year, the ban will enter into force in early 2022, said a statement from the EU commission.

Iraqi military personnel cast their votes

BAGHDAD: Iraqi security personnel across the country cast their ballots Friday two days before the rest of the nation votes in parliamentary elections.

The vote is being held six months before schedule, in line with a promise made by Prime Minister Mustafa al-Kadhimi when he assumed office in 2020. He is seeking to appease anti-government protesters who rose up in October 2019 in Baghdad and Iraq's south. Friday's so-called "special voting" two days ahead of the election is meant to free police and soldiers so they can provide security on Election Day. A government advisor for election affairs, Hussein al-Hendawi, said more than 1.5 million security personnel were eligible to vote, as well as 120,126 displaced persons and hundreds of hospital patients and prisoners.

There are 3,449 candidates vying for 329 seats in parliament in Sunday's vote, which will be the fifth held since the fall of Saddam Hussein after the US-led invasion of Iraq in 2003.

British woman diplomat sexually harassed in India

ISLAMABAD: A woman diplomat posted at the British Deputy High Commission in Chandigarh, India was sexually harassed on Wednesday, while she was on her way to play tennis, Indian media reports said on Friday. According to a report carried by Hindustan Times, the 60-year old diplomat who assumed office February this year, in her complaint with police, said the incident took place when she left her residence in Sector 9 around 6.30 a.m. to walk towards Chandigarh Lawn Tennis Association (CLTA), near DAV College in Sector 10.

"I was walking past the residential houses when a motorcycle came up behind me. The rider hit me hard with his hand or something on my back. I shouted at him and ran after him but he sped away," the Hindustan Times report quoted her as telling the police. "We can confirm that an official complaint has been registered and a police investigation is underway. We are grateful for the assistance provided by Chandigarh Police," the report further quoted a spokesperson at the commission as saying on condition of anonymity. According to another report carried by Indian newspaper "The Tribune", a senior diplomat of the British Deputy High Commission, Chandigarh, was allegedly molested by a motorcycle-borne miscreant in Sector 10 on Wednesday morning. The Tribune report also quoted the Spokesperson, British Deputy High Commission, Chandigarh as saying, they confirm that an official complaint has been registered and a police investigation was underway. The complainant raised the alarm and ran behind the suspect, but he managed to speed away, the report added. – **Agencies**

NZ cricket confirms tour reschedule talks

KARACHI: The New Zealand Cricket (NZC) has confirmed it is in talks with the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) to reschedule the recently abandoned ODI, T20 series. "New Zealand Cricket is back in discussions about reigniting their postponed tour to Pakistan," says a report in NZ Herald.

The NZC has confirmed that talks are under way between chief executive David White and his counterpart at the PCB. However the report said that both sides are open to the possibility of the Black Caps returning before the end of the current future tours programme cycle in 2023.

A day earlier, Ramiz Raja had revealed that the NZC has contacted them regarding the rescheduling of the home series against Pakistan and "good news will be announced within a week".

Speaking before the Senate Standing Committee on Interprovincial Coordination on different aspects and future goals set up for Pakistan cricket, Raja had said: "The PCB may put forward its terms before the NZC by choosing the month of November in 2022 for the rescheduling of the recently postponed series."

The New Zealand cricket team, last month, backed out of the much-awaited Pakistan tour, citing a "security alert" from their government. The Pakistani authorities had assured the NZC of complete security but the Black Caps insisted on abandoning the series.

China invited to Afghan talks in Moscow

BEIJING: Chinese Foreign Ministry's Spokesperson Zhao Lijian Friday said that the Chinese side had received an invitation from the Russia to attend international talks on Afghanistan to be held in Moscow on October 20.

"The Chinese side has received Russia's invitation. We stand ready to maintain communication and coordination with relevant sides including Russia," he said during his regular briefing held here.

He said that China supported all international efforts that were conducive to promoting peace and stability and gathering consensus in Afghanistan.

According to President Vladimir Putin's special representative on Afghanistan, Zamir Kabulov that Russia would invite representatives of the Taliban to international talks on Afghanistan that it planed to host in Moscow

on October 20. The representative did not provide further details on the planned talks in comments carried by Russian news agencies.

Moscow hosted an international conference on Afghanistan in March at which Russia, the United States, China and Pakistan released a joint statement calling on the then-warring Afghan sides to reach a peace deal and curb violence. - APP
