LAHORE: Punjab Assembly Speaker Chaudhry Pervez Elahi has said that the government should avoid violence and solve the problems through dialogue instead of ego. Nigeria expresses desire to enhance bilateral trade ties

Pakistan and Nigeria are enjoying excellent diplomatic relations but it could not be translated into economic terms according to their potential

FAISALABAD: Pak-Nigeria bilateral trade must be enhanced to one billion dollars in view of robust diplomatic relations between the two countries and in this connection the private sectors of two countries should play their proactive role, said his Excellency Mohammad Bello Abioye, High Commissioner of Nigeria.

Addressing the business community in Faisalabad Chamber of Commerce & Industry (FCCI) here today, he said that Pakistan and Nigeria are enjoying excellent diplomatic relations but it could not be translated into economic terms according to their potential. He said that now we must focus on increasing economic relations by involving private sectors of the two countries. ISLAMABAD: Muhammad Shakeel Munir, President, Islamabad Chamber of Commerce & Industry (ICCI) said that the repeated hikes have been made in the power tariffs & petroleum prices during the last 3 years due to which the cost of doing business in Pakistan has increased manifold and the business community was finding it very difficult to promote business activities due

to high business cost. He called upon the government to rationalize the utility tariffs, petroleum prices and high taxes in order to reduce the high cost of doing business that would help in

reviving the business activities. ICCI President said that the electricity prices in Pakistan have increased by over 40 percent during the last 3 years. He said that the price of petrol has increased by over 48 percent and that of diesel by over 26 percent from October 2018 to October 2021 while gas tariffs have also been increased significantly. He further said that the

PKR has reportedly devalued by almost Rs.49 since 2018 showing a devaluation of 40 percent making the import of industrial raw material costlier. Due to these factors, the cost of doing business in Pakistan has



gone up many times and it has become very difficult for the business community to compete with regional competi-

tors for exports. He urged that the government should focus on rationalizing tariffs and duties and promote ease of doing business to help revive the business and economic activities in the country.

Jamshaid Akhtar Sheikh, Senior Vice President ICCI said that according to the World Bank's latest Pakistan Development Update, the share of exports in Pakistan's GDP has declined from 16 percent in 1999 to 10 percent in 2020.

He said that the rising produc-

tion cost could be one of the important factors for decline in exports. He stressed that the government should take measures to reduce production cost in order to make our exports more competitive in the national market.

Muhammad Faheem Khan, Vice President ICCI said that the frequent increase in utility tariffs and POL prices has pushed up inflation and reduced the purchasing power of consumers, which was also causing slowdown in business activities. He emphasized that the government should take strong measures to bring down production costs in order to facilitate the growth of business activities.

Telecom sector attracts \$202.34mln

ISLAMABAD: The country's telecom sector has attracted Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) of \$202.34 million during the Fiscal Year 2020-21, which showed investors' confidence in the policies introduced by the incumbent government for promotion of this industry. "The telecom sector has contributed over Rs 218.8 billion to the national exchequer during the last financial year" said an official of Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA).

He said that teledensity (landline telephone connections per 100 people in a specified geographic area) till July was recorded at 87.5 percent while the number of active cellular mobile subscribers reached 185 million till July, 2021.

The number of broadsubscribers band reached 104.43 million in July while the broadband penetration was recorded at 47.68 percent during the same period, he added.

He said that data usreached to 6855 age PB [PetaByte] in 2020-21. He further said that Complaint Management System of PTA, launched in 2021 and upgraded in 2020, was used for facilitation of telecom consumers for lodging complaints, processing and redressal of consumers' grievances. Space enthusiasts can participate in contest

ISLAMABAD: Space enthusiasts can participate in the CubeSat Creative Design Contest under the Belt and Road Teenager Space Maker Camp being arranged by collaborative efforts of Pakistan and China with special focus on exploring the paradigm of CubeSat technology and applications for the socio-economic development.

After the death of her husband, the complainant was granted family pension regularly but on lesser rates. The complainant stated that she was drawing monthly pension of Rs 21,928 whereas it should have almost doubled after 15 years, having incorporated all increments made from time to time by the Government.

Feeling aggrieved, the complainant approached the Wafaqi Mohtasib for redressal of her complaint. The Wafaqi Mohtasib in its order,

dated 09.03.2021, stated that it was unjust that WAPDA Pension Directorate had not fully followed the government policy and the widow had not been allowed back increases on restoration, whereas Director (Pension) WAPDA had circulated in-



structions to all DISCOS/GENCOS/ NTDC, under SOP-2002, to allow back increases to all pensioners on the restored portion of pension. Moreover, the widows of the deceased pensioners have not been specifically barred from this facility, therefore, maladministration on the

part of LESCO is established. The Wafaqi Mohtasib in its decision further stated that as per policy of the government of Pakistan, restoration on commuted portion is granted to retired/deceased employees after allowing increase on the restored portion of pension from the date of retirement.

Similarly, the Accountant General of Pakistan Revenue, Lahore, and AGPR, Islamabad, had adopted this policy in light of the judgement of the Federal Services Tribunal, dated 05.01.2012, which was upheld by the Supreme Court of Pakistan vide its judgement, dated 24.04.2012, that the families of the pensioners were also entitled for the increases made from time to time on the restored portion of pension.

Secondly, this meeting holds utmost importance for the reason it was convened—regional security. Displacing Palestinians

HE dispossession and displacement of Palestinians on their own land continues unabated as it was reported this week that Israel is advancing plans for building more than 3,000 illegal Jewish settler homes in the occupied West Bank. Reports reveal that the Civil Administration's high planning committee gave the final green light to 1,800 homes and initial approval for another 1,344 in the Palestinian territories. International law clearly has no significance in this context as the settler colonial machinery is now unequivocally unapologetic about the oppression it is carrying out. The Housing Minister Zeev Elkin responded to the development by stating that "strengthening Jewish presence (in the West Bank) was essential to the Zionist vision."

This announcement came a day after the US criticised Israel for its policy of building settlements and expressed concern about the new housing units. However, this performative rebuke stopped short of anything substantial as the State Department spokesman stated that the Biden administration would raise this issue directly with senior Israeli officials during private sessions. We have witnessed this very dynamic play out multiple times in the past, where international actors offer mild criticism while Israel continues to get its way without facing any actual consequences.

For years, the US has officially condemned these settlements but has always shied away from applying any pressure on Tel Aviv to change its behaviour. Many have argued that the US aid to Israel should be made conditional, however politicians in the US come under immense criticism for even tabling this idea. The Biden administration can pretend all it wants about how its policy is different from its predecessor, but the fact remains that it is the chief enabler of this settler colonial project.

This announcement also makes clear that the current ideologically diverse coalition—which ousted Benjamin Netanyahu's pro-settlement government in June—is not really a "government of change". The policy of de-facto annexation is in full swing, and the world cannot afford to continue looking the other way anymore.

Why the Hazara people fear genocide in Afghanistan

7 N the aftermath of the withdrawal of international troops from Afghanistan, violence against the Hazara population has escalated. With a long history of persecution, including by the Taliban, the Hazaras are right to fear a genocide. While the Taliban and other armed groups are targeting and committing human rights violations against the people of Afghanistan, the Hazara ethnic and religious population is especially at high risk. The international community must pressure the Taliban to guarantee the protection of the rights of the Hazara people, to ensure a genocide against them does not take place. As one of the largest ethnic groups in Afghanistan, the Hazara people have endured various forms of oppression from Pashtun rulers and governments, including slavery, systematic expulsion from ancestral homes and lands, and massacres. These experiences have led some to consider Hazaras to be one of the "most persecuted people in the world" In the late 19th century, Pashtun ruler Abdur Rahman Khan sought to bring the Hazara people in their homeland of Hazarajat under his rule. He waged a brutal war against the community, which resulted in bloody "massacres, looting and pillaging of homes, enslavement" and the transfer of Hazara land to Pashtun tribes. It is estimated that Hazarajat lost some 60 percent of its population to ethnic cleansing, which has led some scholars to term the carnage a genocide. Over the following decades, Hazaras continued to face repression, discrimination and socio-economic marginalisation. Many were forced to "conceal their identities" to obtain state identification. Until the 1970s, a large percentage of the Hazara population could not access higher education, enrol in the army or secure higher-level government jobs. After the withdrawal of Soviet troops in 1989, Afghanistan descended into civil war between various armed groups. In 1993, President Burhanuddin Rabbani, worried by the positions that Hazara armed groups had taken in Kabul's Shia-majority areas, decided to launch an offensive against them. Intense shelling, arbitrary killings of civilians and targeting of Hazara men resulted in hundreds killed and forcibly disappeared.

atrocities against the Hazaras did not stop. "Tajiks to Tajikistan, Uzbeks to Uzbekistan, and Hazaras to goristan [graveyard]," was the mantra of the Taliban at the time. And its fighters made good on such threats.

In 1998, as the armed group was attempting to establish full control over Afghanistan, it laid a siege on Hazarajat, blocking supply routes and starving the civilian population. In August of the same year, Taliban fighters captured Mazar-e Sharif, a city in northern Afghanistan, going on a rampage targeting Tajiks, Uzbeks and particularly, Hazaras. Human Rights Watch estimated that at least

Human Rights Watch estimated that at least 2,000 people of different ethnic communities, including Hazaras, were killed and according to estimates by Hazara groups, the death toll may be as high as 15,000.

The US-led invasion of Afghanistan, which toppled the Taliban regime, brought new hopes for the Hazara people. Although discrimination in the country continued, the community was able to participate in public life much more freely. Hazara youth were quick to embrace all forms of education and emerged at the forefront of social change initiatives, while Hazara women pushed for women's emancipation. These gains in education and social standing have encouraged the community to mobilise and demand an end to discrimination and a greater political space. When the post-Taliban governance of Afghanistan was being set up at the Bonn Conference of 2001, Hazaras were estimated to make up 19 percent of the country's population. Yet in the following years, the political space they were given in the country did not reflect the proportion of the population they constituted. After 2001, the Hazaras also continued to suffer targeted violence at the hands of the Taliban and other armed groups. Since 2015, the emergence of the even more extreme Islamic State Khorasan Province (ISKP) unleashed an even deadlier wave of attacks on the Hazara population, with suicide bombers targeting schools, mosques and even hospitals in Hazara neighbourhoods. The return of the Taliban to power in Kabul has meant not only a rollback of the limited social gains the Hazaras had achieved, but also new atrocities against the community. In August, Amnesty International reported that at least nine Hazara men were massacred by the Taliban when its fighters took over Ghazni province in July. Then earlier this month, the organisation released evidence of another massacre in which 13 Hazaras, including a 17-year-old girl. were killed in late August in Daykundi province. In late September and early October, reports in Western media emerged of mass "evictions" of Hazara people from their ancestral homes and lands in Daykundi province. Taliban fighters forced over 4.000 Hazaras from their homes, claiming they had no ownership over their land, leaving them stranded without food or shelter as harsh winter approaches. In Mazar-e-Sharif, a local Taliban court decided to expel some 2,000 families, again based on false claims that they do not own their homes.

The Taliban leadership may have moderated its rhetoric to please the international community, claiming that it will protect all ethnic groups, but it has done nothing to stem the growing number of crimes being committed by its fighters. What is more, the group has also clearly declared that it will only accept Hanafi jurisprudence, which would effectively preclude any accommodation of the Shia Islamic law and values followed by Hazaras. Expectedly, no Hazara representative was included in the Taliban government announced in September.

It is also not surprising that, despite the insistence by the Taliban that it can provide security and peace in Afghanistan, ISKP has continued its deadly attacks against the Hazaras. In October, the bombing of a Hazara mosque in Kunduz resulted in the death of more than 100 peo-

Govts must restore trust on climate change

Not yet. A small majority of EU and British citizens believe a radical change in habits is the best way to counter climate change. But technological innovation will be needed to enable those adjustments, which aligns with the views of survey respondents in the US and China about the best way forward. In any case, investment trumps behavioral change. In 2020, unprecedented pandemic-induced restrictions on mobility and economic activity caused a 5.8 percent drop in global greenhouse gas emissions. That might look like good news, but it's really a measure of just how challenging it will be to achieve similar reductions every year from now on.

We need a technological revolution and, when it comes, we must be prepared to finance it. Decades of invest-

By now there is a clear pattern of Taliban atroci-

ple. Another bombing of a Hazara mosque in Kandahar killed at least 47 people and wounded scores of others.

Despite ample rhetoric on the need to protect religious minorities, regional players have also not stepped in to help the Hazara people. While it is presumed that Iran may come to the protection of Shia minorities, it did not come to the aid of Hazaras during the massacres of 1998 and has not taken any serious action since the Taliban took over Kabul in mid-August.

Tehran supported the Taliban in its fight against the US and even hosted some of its leaders; its policies towards Afghanistan are built on its perceived national interest. Therefore, it is unlikely that it would take any significant steps to protect the Shia of Afghanistan. The only hope for the Hazara people is that the international community will stay true to its own commitments to human rights and pressure the Taliban into concessions. To secure guarantees of Hazara rights and protection, it can leverage the aid the Taliban has requested. The World Bank and the International Monetary Fund have already stopped payments to Kabul, while the US has frozen the country's assets held on US territory. These funds can be used in negotiations with the Taliban.

All Afghans face precarious and dangerous circumstances in their country, but the situation is particularly desperate for the Hazaras, who have been historically marginalised, dispossessed and massacred. The risk of ethnic cleansing and even genocide that they face should be a matter of international concern and international human rights bodies need to take action.

The newly appointed United Nations special rapporteur on Afghanistan must immediately investigate the systematic attacks and forced displacement of Hazaras to ensure those responsible are identified and held to account. The international community has a legal, moral and political obligation to protect the Hazara people. It must honour the commitment of "never again" in the Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide.

Uniting the world to tackle climate change

HE term 'COP' stands for 'Conference of the Parties' which have signed the UN Framework Convention of Climate Change (UNFCCC). In the climate change circle, for almost three decades, world governments have met every year to counterfeit worldwide reaction to the climate crisis. The COP is hosted by a different country per annum and the first such conference 'COP1' occurred in Berlin, Germany in 1995. The conferences are attended by world leaders, ministers, and negotiators but also by legislatures from civil society, business, international organizations, and the media.

PARIS AGREEMENT:

The Paris Agreement is an international treaty signed by almost all countries in the world at COP21 in Paris in 2015. The Paris Agreement's central aim is to strengthen the global response to the threat of climate change by keeping a global temperature rise this century well below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase even further to 1.5 degrees Celsius. The Paris Agreement requires (although doesn't legally bind) all Parties to put forward their best efforts through "nationally determined contributions" (NDCs) and to strengthen these efforts in the years ahead. The United Kingdom will host the 26th UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties

(COP26) in Glasgow on 31 October – 12 November 2021. COP26 is a critical conference for global climate action.

CLIMATE CRISIS VS PAKISTAN:

Pakistan has been be found globally in the top ten countries most affected by climate change in the past 20 years owing to its geographical location. In Pakistan rapidly arising climatic changes are perhaps the greatest threats to human existence. Considering that, The Government of Pakistan being aware of the circumstances and taking actions thus, The Pakistan

delegation at COP-25 secured 06 positions for various committees under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) showing trust on Pakistan's commitment to climate negotiations. The NDC Partnership is supporting Pakistan in mapping out its climate-resilient development trajectory. Furthermore, Ministry of Climate Change is also in the process of revision of NDCs. There is an opportunity to collaborate on Measurement, Reporting and Verification (MRV) and GHG emission inventory strengthening components for the revision of NDCs under the UNFCCC reporting. Plus, In order to mitigate the carbon emission impacts of vehicles on the environment and its associated costs, the Government of Pakistan has approved its National Electric Vehicle Policy targeting a 30 percent shift to electric by 2030. In addition, the world's first "zero emissions" metro line project has been launched in the city of Karachi. Pakistan has also decided to get out of its plastic addiction by banning the single use plastic. Apparently, with these initiatives Pakistan is moving into countries that are increasingly working to counter issues such as climate change and global warming. Now it is expected that the coming conference Cop26 will be represented by the Prime Minister of Pakistan.

HE world must change how it tackles the climate crisis. The current approach is too slow and risks falling short of our own targets for limiting global warming and mitigating its impact. And, no longer satisfied with political pronouncements, people are demanding action. This popular unease is borne out by the European Investment Bank's annual climate survey. Some 75 percent of EU citizens, 69 percent of Britons and 59 percent of Americans say they are more concerned about the climate emergency than their governments are. And roughly half of those surveyed say the difficulty in solving the climate crisis is primarily due to government inactivity. For those of us steering public organizations, these findings should be seen as a dire warning. If citizens stop trusting their governments to do something about climate change, many might conclude that there is no hope and give up. Governments would then face an even tougher task gaining public support for the policies and programs that are vital to our future.

We cannot allow that to happen. The remedy for a lack of public confidence is to invest massively in concrete climate projects and innovations, starting immediately. Climate action represents a tremendous business opportunity and policymakers must be savvy enough to embrace it. The upcoming UN Climate Change Conference (COP26) in Glasgow will serve as a major test of the credibility of governments' commitment to effective action. The whole world will be watching. For its part, the EU is leading the way with major commitments, including a pledge to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 55 percent, relative to 1990 levels, by 2030. And as the EU's climate bank, the EIB is at the forefront of this effort, with commitments to support 1 trillion (\$1.16 trillion) of investment in climate action and environmental sustainability by 2030. We are in the critical decade for addressing climate change and biodiversity loss. In all the countries surveyed, large majorities (93 percent in China, 81 percent in the EU, 74 percent in the UK and 59 percent in the US) consider climate change the biggest challenge of this century. Yet there is a lack of public faith in our chances of meeting current goals. In the EU, 58 percent of citizens believe their country will fail to cut carbon emissions drastically by 2050, compared to 55 percent in the UK and 49 percent in the US.

Does this mean our citizens are resigned to environmental disaster? ment in renewable energy have paid off. Wind and solar power are now highly competitive and widespread. If every driver in the EU switched to an electric vehicle tomorrow, EIB mobility experts estimate that existing wind turbines would be able to provide 85 percent of the electricity needed to power them.

Now, we must scale up game-changing technologies like green hydrogen and advanced energy storage solutions. With 75 percent more patents in green digital technologies than the US (and four times as many as China), the EU is a world leader in this field. It also has expertise to share in areas such as renewable energy, climate adaptation, flood control, advanced weather forecasting tools, and resilient infrastructure. Moreover, a third of the 2 trillion contained in the Next Generation EU recovery plan and the EU's next longterm budget has already been committed to the European Green Deal. But, to rise to the challenge, we need a Global Green Deal that can mobilize the private sector's full innovative potential and financial firepower. By exporting its cutting-edge clean technologies. the EU can be the link between those organizing climate action, those pursuing innovation, and those managing economic development. These are the pillars upon which a sustainable global economy will rest.

To be sure, there are potential downsides to the green transition and addressing them requires immediate action. Those hit hardest by the move away from polluting industries will need to be supported through compensatory investment. As we pursue technological breakthroughs, we must not neglect the need for continuing massive investment in mature climate technology such as wind farms. Similarly, efficiency-boosting investments could make a major dent in the 35 percent of greenhouse gas emissions that comes from buildings - the single biggest energy consumers. And energy system integration (through a single market for energy) would go a long way toward achieving the EU's carbon-neutrality target.

For policymakers, the imperative is to eliminate barriers to investment, such as regulatory uncertainty and fragmented markets, particularly now that COV-ID-19 has created additional obstacles like high private-sector debt. According to the EIB's latest investment report, 45 percent of EU firms plan to cut or delay their investment plans because of the pandemic. The message from this year's climate survey is clear. Governments must act now if they are to retain the good will of their citizens. That means making immediate climate investment on a massive scale, with a major emphasis on innovation and the opportunities associated with building a new, reinvigorated economy. Europe, with its ingenuity and financial muscle, must be at the center of this global transformation. – Arab News

Barca B coach SergiBarjuan will be in charge at Camp Nou after Koeman's sacking was confirmed on Wednesday night following a 1-0

Xavi Hernandez is reportedly close to being appointed as Koeman's replacement but the return of the club's legendary midfielder is not expected to come before the weekend. There should be a buzz of excitement nonetheless, with the prospect of Xavi coming back to the club he joined as an 11-year-old and left in 2015 enough to stir the players and fans. Barjuan oversaw training on Thursday afternoon, when Barcelona president Joan Laporta also addressed the squad, explaining the decision to dimissKoeman and emphasising the onus is now on them to spark a revival. 'We're all in the same boat here," Sergio Busquets said on Wednesday night. "It's everyone's fault. For good and bad, we're a team and we have to show it on the pitch." Two wins in seven league games have left Barca languishing in ninth, six points adrift of Real Betis in fourth. The increasingly real possibility of failing to qualify for next season's Champions League was likely a key factor in Koeman's removal. Finishing in the top four will be the top priority for Koeman's replacement but the other immediate objective will be to reach the Champions League knock-out stage this season, after consecutive 3-0 losses to Bayern Munich and Benfica left the team on the brink of an early exit.

Beating Dynamo 1-0 last week has given Barca hope but they will need another victory in Kiev on Tuesday against the bottom team in Group B to have any realistic chance of overhauling Benfica. Frenkie de Jong, Ronald Araujo and Pedri are all doubtful to face Alaves, who have enjoyed an upturn in form after two consecutive wins over Cadiz and Elche. Ansu Fati could return after missing the defeat by Rayo, with Sergio Aguero set to continue up front. Real Madrid's goalless draw at home to Osasuna on Wednesday was overshadowed by Koeman's exit but Carlo Ancelotti's team missed the chance to go two points clear at the top of the table. "You might think I'm crazy but I liked the way we played," said Ancelotti after being held by Osasuna. "The first half, not so much, but in the second half, much better. I have nothing to criticise my players for." - Agencies

VIENNA: Spanish teenager Carlos Alcaraz held his nerve in the final-set tie-break to beat Matteo Berrettini 6-1 6-7 (2/7), 7-6 (7/5) in the quarter-finals of the ATP event in Vienna on Friday. The 18-year-old easily took the first set, lost the second on a tie-break before sealing victory over the Wimbledon finalist on his third match point in the third-set tie-break. Alcaraz broke the Italian's first two service games of the match and cruised to the first set in 29 minutes.

The second set went with serve, although Berrettini saved two break points in the fifth game before taking the tie-break comfortably. Alcaraz broke the Italian in the fourth game of the final set and led 4-1 but Berrettini broke back to love in the seventh game. After Alcaraz raced to a 6-3 lead in the tie break, Berrettini held his serve on the first two before the Spaniard sealed victory on his own serve to reach his first ATP 500 semi-final. He will face the winner of Friday's duel between the 12thranked Canadian Felix Auger-Aliassime and German Alexander Zverev, who is number four in the world. Alcaraz is the fifth-youngest semi-finalist in an ATP 500

event. The record is held by Zverev, who aged 17 reached the last four in Hamburg in 2014.

The Spaniard reached 38 in the world in September after progressing to the last eight at the US Open - the youngest men's quarter-finalist in that Grand Slam tournament in 58 years. At 18 years and four months - a thigh injury forced him to retire from his US Open quarter-final with Auger-Aliassime -- he was the youngest player to be ranked so high since compatriot Rafael Nadal, who was 17 when he reached No. 37 in April 2004. - APP

EU will not recognize new Israel's settlements "The EU will continue to play its part supporting steps towards sustainable peace between Israelis and Palestinians," it added

BRUSSELS: The EU reiterated its call for Israel to halt its plans to expand settlements in the occupied Palestinian territories on Friday, warning that any new changes to the pre-1967 borders that are not agreed upon by the parties will be rejected by the bloc. "Settlements are illegal under international law and constitute a major obstacle to the achievement of the two-state solution and a just, lasting and comprehensive peace between the parties," according to a statement from the office of EU foreign policy chiefJosepBorrell.

Underlining that the EU strongly rejects the expansion of settlements, the statement said the union will not recognize any changes to the pre-1967 borders, including those pertaining to Jerusalem, that are not agreed upon by the parties.

The statement urged the Israeli government to revoke the recent steps, which are totally incompatible with ongoing efforts to reduce tensions, and instead focus on furthering meaningful re-engagement between the conflicting parties. "The EU will continue to play its part supporting steps towards sustainable peace between Israelis and Palestinians," it added. On Sunday, Palestinian Prime Minister Mohammad Shtayyeh called the plans "a blatant aggression on our lands.

However, despite Shtayyeh's condemnation, Israel's Higher Planning Council approved the construction of 3.144 settlement units in the West Bank on Wednesday. There were 13 illegal Jewish settlements in occupied East Jerusalem and 253 others in the West Bank. More than 660,000 Jewish settlers live in these settlements, making life even harder for Palestinians living under occupation. Under international law, the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, is regarded as "occupied territory," making all Jewish settlements there illegal. - Agencies

Russia considers it illegal



MOSCOW: Russia's Foreign Ministry said Thursday that it considers Israeli settlement activities in the occupied territories of the West Bank and East Jerusalem illegal, noting they undermine chances for establishing a viable, geographically contiguous Palestinian state. Speaking at a video briefing in Moscow, Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova warned Israel that its plans to double the number of Israeli citizens living in the Jordan Valley by 2026 can be regarded as the de facto annexation of most of the occupied Palestinian territories. Russia also sees such a move as undermining the effectiveness of efforts by the international community to create

conditions for the early resumption of Palestinian-Israeli political dialogue, Zakharova said. She also called on both Israelis and Palestinians to refrain from steps fraught with escalation in the region and forestalling an outcome of direct Palestinian-Israeli negotiations on a set of final status issues. On Oct. 24, the Israeli government announced construction tenders for 1,355 housing units in the West Bank and 83 housing units in East Jerusalem. - Agencies

"Europe is going to be affected most severely, if Afghanistan does not get access to this money,' said Mehrabi. Myanmar junta jails NLD patron for 20 Years

YANGON: A junta-controlled court on Friday sentenced U Win Htein, the detained patron of the National League for Democracy, to 20 years in prison for high treason over a press conference where he condemned the Feb. 1 coup. "He was sentenced to 20 years under Article 124A of the Penal Code by the Dekkhinathiri special court in a Naypyitaw detention cell," said U Myint Thwin, the lawyer representing the NLD patron.

The Penal Code's high treason article defines the crime as attempting to "excite disaffection" towards the government or defense services personnel and carries up to 20 years imprisonment.

The lawyer said U Win Htein denied the charges, saying it was his "responsibility as a party leader to inform the public".

The police were preparing to transfer the 80-year-old to an unspecified prison, said the lawyer. It is the first most lengthy sentence for an NLD member.

The former military captain was arrested on Feb. 4 at his home in Yangon when he returned from Naypyitaw and taken back to Oketarathiri police station in the capital. His daughter Chit Su Win Htein said the sentence "is as we expected. It's not a surprise but it's sad and out-

rageous to hear about the ridiculous sentence." She urged Myanmar's people to "hold on" and said the

"perpetrators of this injustice will be held accountable". The lawyer said the charges

relate to a short press briefing where he issued a letter to the public and criticized the coup. He called it a result of Senior General Min Aung

On October 22, the foreign currency reserves held by the SBP were recorded at \$17,146.7 million, down \$346 million compared with \$17,492.2 million on October 15.

Meanwhile, overall liquid foreign currency reserves held by the country, including net reserves held by banks other than the SBP, stood at \$23,933.8 million. Net reserves held by banks amounted to \$6.787.1 million.
