ISLAMABAD: Chief Justice of Pakistan (CJP) Gulzar Ahmed on Tuesday said that the law did not allow land meant for defence purposes to be used for commercial gains, saying such land should be returned to the government once its strategic use has ended. A three-judge bench headed by the chief justice and comprising Justice Qazi Mohammad Amin Ahmed and Justice Ijazul Ahsan resumed the hearing on the issue of military lands being used for commercial purposes. As the hearing got under way, the chief justice again grilled Defence Secretary retired Lt Gen Mian Mohammad Hilal Hussain over commercial establishments

being built on military land. "The law's intention is not that defence land is used for any other purpose," Justice Gulzar reiterated. "If [the land] is not being used for defence then it will go back to the government." "This is government land," the top judge said, noting that cinemas, petrol pumps, housing societies, shopping malls and marriage halls were being constructed on land meant for defence. General sahib, these are not defence purposes," he told the defence secretary.

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court of Pakistan Tuesday ordered the release of MNA Ali Wazir on bail. The Waziristan lawmaker has been directed to deposit surety bonds worth Rs 400,000. Ali Wazir was arrested on charges of issuing statements against state institutions during a speech on December 06, 2020. The FIR against the MNA was registered at a Karachi police station.

Wazir had filed an appeal against the Sindh High Court's (SHC) verdict which had dismissed his bail plea. The lawmaker had claimed that he is innocent and not guilty of the offences mentioned in the FIR. The court observed that the other accused in the hate speech case had been granted bail, which was not challenged, so Wazir could not be kept in jail as well. The lawmaker, however, may not be re-

ISLAMABAD: Two weeks after passage of bills related to electoral reforms from joint sitting of the Parliament, the Federal Cabinet on Tuesday viewed that the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) was bound to hold all the next elections including by-polls through the Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs). "The Federal Cabinet while discussing the most important decision on the EVM opined that after amendment in the [election] laws, it is mandatory for the election commission to hold all next by-polls through EVMs," Minister for Information and Broadcasting Chaudhry Fawad Hussain told the media persons after the meeting chaired by Prime Minister Imran Khan.

The HRW report detailed "the summary execution or enforced disappearance" of 47 former members of the Afghan National Security Forces (ANSF), including military personnel, police, intelligence service members and paramilitary militia, who had surrendered to or were apprehended by Taliban forces between August 15 and October 31.

HRW says the report is based on a total of 67 interviews, including 40 in-person interviews with witnesses, relatives and friends of victims, and Talib an fighters. Some people were granted anonymity by HRW for their report. In some cases, families report stories of people who simply disappeared. The findings of the investigation would

make a mockery of the Taliban's previous claims to the international community that it would lead a more inclusive government than it did two decades ago. Its leaders had promised a reprieve for those who collaborated with US forces during the American presence in the country.

Iraq declares election results

BAGHDAD: The political bloc led by Shia leader Muqtada al-Sadr was confirmed the winner of the October parliamentary election. Iraq's independent election commission announced the final results on Tuesday following weeks of recounting and intensified rejection from the losing parties.

Five seats changed as a result of the appeals and recounting process in the capital: Baghdad, Nineveh, Erbil, Kirkuk and Basra. "We have committed ourselves to dealing with the election results in accordance with the law, and with utmost integrity and impartiality," said Jalil Adnan Khalaf, chairman of the election commission's Board of Commissioners, at a press conference. - APP

Macron urges Raisi to respect obligations

PARIS: French President Emmanuel Macron has called on his Iranian counterpart Ebrahim Raisi to return to fulfilling Tehran's obligations under the 2015 nuclear deal "without delay" as negotiators seek to revive the accord at talks in Vienna, his office said.

In telephone talks on Monday, Macron urged Raisi to engage in a "constructive manner" in the talks that resumed after a suspension of almost half a year, following the election of the hardliner to the Iranian presidency. European powers are seeking to revive the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) that has been moribund since the United States walked out in 2018, prompting Tehran to ramp up nuclear activities as Washington reimposed sanctions.

France's objective "was to see Iran return to full respect for all of its commitments under the JCPOA and that the United States return to the agreement," the French presidency said.

Macron also "underscored the need for Iran to engage constructively in this



direction so that the exchanges allow a swift return to the agreement," it added. "Iran must return without delay to compliance with all its commitments and obligations... and quickly resume cooperation that allows the (UN atomic) agency to fully carry out its mission," it said.

A statement from Raisi's office added that he urged Macron "to strive with other parties in Vienna to conclude the negotiations and lift the sanctions against Iran." "Sending a full team to

Experts warn increasing smoking trend in girls

ISLAMABAD: The health experts at the National Dialogue organized on Tuesday under the auspices of Paki stan National Heart Association (PANAH) to expose the propaganda of "Tobacco Harms and Tobacco Industry Tactic" warned that the trend of taking up smoking was gaining more attraction in girls than boys that needed urgent attention of the stakeholders.

The purpose of the dialogue was to expose the mislead ing campaign of the tobacco industry called 'Behtr Pakistan'. The campaign was only propaganda of the industry that exaggerated illicit trade share so that tax increase on tobacco could be avoided, the experts said. Speaking on the occasion, Chairperson National Commission on the Rights of the Child Afshan Tehseen Bajwa said that due to the attracting tactics and campaigns of tobacco industry around 1,200 school going children used to start smoking daily. "Among the children girls are particularly more tempt ed to opt for smoking and there number is growing at an alarming pace where smoking has become a norm among such young girls' cohort that is an alarming indicator," she added.

Bajwa urged to promote role models and effective parenting among the youth to contain smoking. The experts hailing from Pakistan Institute of Development Economics (PIDE) and others indicated that raising taxes on tobacco was the single most effective policy to reduce its consumption.

The court said it would interpret the law concerning the land of cantonment boards in light of the Constitution, with Justice Amin remaking: "This is also very important for the institution's own reputation." The CJP then turned to the attorney general, saying "They must be made to understand the law, who will do that?"

He said a retired major had given the land of Global Marquees, a wedding venue near Gora Qabristan, on lease to a private party, and asked whether he had the authoritv to do so.

The CJP expressed dissatisfaction over a report submitted by the defence secretary regarding the case, saying the report "claims the [illegally built] buildings have been demolished, but they are still there".

The defence secretary responded that he would visit the sites in person and take pictures to compile a new report. "This situation is a cause of embarrassment for the army and us both," CJP Ahmed remarked, following which the attorney general offered to withdraw the report submitted today.

The court directed him to submit a detailed report within four weeks, identifying the purposes of each piece of cantonment land.

Aawaz II KP learning and development forum concludes

Child Labour Survey for KP will be completed by June 2022 and the recommendations will be used to shape government policies and actions

PESHAWAR: Minister for Labour, Shaukat Yusufzai reiterated the Kyber Pakhtunkhwa Government's commitment to eradicating child labour and harmful practices like early age marriages.

He was speaking at the concluding session of the two-day Aawaz II KP Learning & Development Forum in Peshawar on Tuesday.

The minister said that the Child Labour Survey for KP will be completed by June 2022 and the recommendations will be used to shape government policies and actions. He appreciated the role of Aawaz II in highlighting key implementation challenges and onground service delivery issues. Deputy Country Director, British Council Pakistan Mark Crossey said that together with support from partners and stakeholders, Aawaz II is making an impact in the 22 districts of KP and Puniab to promote inclusion and basic rights of the marginalised and vulnerable members of the society.

The Forum brought together about

100 activists from nine KP districts in which the Aawaz II Programme is operational. Dialogue and information sharing were identified as the two kev factors that are helping the programme promote inclusion of vulnerable groups including women, children, transgender persons, the differently-abled and religious minorities.

On the second day of the two-day event, three sessions were held. The first was on including the perspectives of PWDs. Zawar Noor, speaking in this session, stressed that the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities Bill, 2021 must be expedited so the rights of the differently-abled are protected and they feel integrated and equal to other citizens.

The Deputy Secretary Social Welfare, Altaf Husain, said that the Social Welfare Department is very hopeful that the legislation will be passed very soon. He also shared current projects initiated by Social Welfare Department including setting up of brail printing

process and facility for online registration of the differently-abled. In the session on Mainstreaming of Transgender Persons, Namkeen, Social Activist appreciated efforts to include transgender persons through programmes like Aawaz II and stressed on the need to promote registration of transgender persons with the social welfare department.

Speaking about including minorities, MPA Ravi Kumar said that the government has given priority to integrating religious minorities in the province. He said it was important to recognise that the majority has played an important role in the rights and integration of religious minorities. As a Member of the KP Assembly, MPA Kumar said that he not only takes up issues of minorities but also of other vulnerable groups like women, trans persons, and persons with disabilities. MESSAGE OF H.E. NICOLAE GOIA **Ambassador of Romania**

THE 1st of December 1918 represented the main event in the history of modern Romania, when the great Assembly in Alba-Iulia voted to unite Transylvania with Romania thus creating a unitary state. Building on a 100-year history, December 1st was adopted as Romania's National Day in 1990, but had grown into a meaningful celebration for Greater Romania since 1918. On 1st of December 2021 we celebrate the 103 years since the realization of our Great Union. One hundred and three years back, the century long ideal of national unity has been achieved, building the foundation of the modern Romanian state. The anniversary of the Great Union has given us the opportunity to honour the memory of the sacrifices made for laying the foundation of new Romania which ultimately placed us in the midst of great European family. Although it lost its ritual purposes, the pig's sacrifice is still a powerful practice in rural Romania, having very precise social and utilitarian implications for families in the countryside. It's also becoming a tourist attraction and one of the highlights of many winter holiday offers.

Christmas

Of utmost religious relevance for the Romanians, Christmas (Crăciunul), is a get-together time, accompanied by both religious and secular customs. The Christmas tree is usually decorated on the 24th of December and lasts until the first days of January. Fir trees were considered sacred by the Dacians and had-still have, in some parts of Romania-a very strong symbolic relevance at weddings and funerals. On the morning of the 25th everybody finds gifts under the tree. Christmas is also an opportunity for elaborate family meals. With fasting now over and the pigs slaughtered, pork is in abundance, accompanied by other traditional foods and drinks, such as the famous sarmale or cozonac.

Carols are probably one of the most joyous parts of the holiday and one of the best preserved winter traditions. Throughout December it is very common to have carol concerts held in most cities. The oldest Romanian carols are secular and talk about the family life, the village life, and old rituals, usually ending with good wishes, while the religious carols are newer and inspired by biblical and other religious texts. In the morning of the

Christmas Eve. children are the ones who start caroling, with adults joining in later on. In the rural parts of the country the carollers are wearing their festive traditional clothes. The New Year

While the New Year's Eve is vet another reason for celebration, with hearty meals and all-night parties, it's the numerous ceremonies and superstitions related to the renewal of the year that draw the attention.

Besides caroling, Pluguorul (The Plow) is probably one of the most renowned winter traditions. Groups of peoplego from house to house to wish friends and neighbors a fruitful new year, good weather and good luck, by reciting a lengthy fixed poem and being accompanied by noisy drums, whips, bells, and lots of shouting aimed at chasing away the bad spirits. Certain rituals (The Goat, The Bear, The Stag), performed by masked people, are magical ceremonials very similar to theatre plays and involve a main character (the aforementioned animals) that dies and then it's brought back to life, in a ceremony symbolizing the end of the present year and the beginning of a new one, and the purification of the soil for the following crops. As it often happens, most of these customs-especially the traditional caroling, the wishes and the ritualsare best preserved in the countryside, where they are passed on from generation to generation.

received academic training in sculpture. He worked hard, and quickly distinguished himself as talented. He continued his studies in Munich, and École des Beaux-Arts in Parisand was invited to enter the workshop of Auguste Rodin. Even though he admired the eminent Rodin he left the Rodin studio after only two months, saying, "Nothing can grow under big trees". He continued After leaving Rodin's workshop, Brâncui began developing the revolutionary style for which he is known. His first commissioned work, The Prayer, was part of a gravestone memorial.

It depicts a young woman crossing herself as she kneels, and marks the first step toward abstracted, non-literal representation, and shows his drive to depict "not the outer form but the idea, the essence of things." He also began doing more carving, rather than the method popular with his contemporaries, that of modeling in clay or plaster which would be cast in metal, and by 1908 he worked almost exclusively by carving.

In the following few years he made many versions of Sleeping Muse and The Kiss, further simplifying forms to geometrical and sparse objects. His works became popular in France, Romania and the United States and in 1913 Brâncusi's work was displayed at both the Salon des Indépendants and the first exhibition in the U.S. of modern art, the Armory Show. One of his major groups of sculptures involved the Bird in Space - simple abstract shapes representing a bird in flight. The works are based on his earlier Măiastra series.In Romanian folklore the Măiastra is a beautiful golden bird who foretells the future and cures the blind. In 1938, he finished the World War I monument in Târgu-Jiu (Romania) where he had spent much of his childhood. Table of Silence, The Gate of the Kiss, and Endless Column commemorate the courage and sacrifice of Romanians who in 1916 defended Târgu Jiu from the forces of the Central Powers.

BUILT in the19th centuryaccording to the specifications of Carol I, Romania's first King, the Peles Castle is an image of the monarch's aesthetic mindset, combining the German and Italian neo-Renaissance. Peles is located near the town of Sinaia, in the Prahova County, and it is one of the most famous castles in Romania, maybe even more than Corvin Castle, Bran Castle, or the Rasnov Fortress. The blood ties between the members of the Romanian and the British royal families, the Russian dynasty and the royal families of Germany and Greece, as well the Romanian Queen's tireless patronage of arts, have attracted to the castle the most resonant names of the 19th and early 20th century. **History of Peles Castle**

When King Carol I of Romania visited the location on which the beautiful castle now stands, he was amazed by the stunning scenery of the Carpathian Mountains that surround it. The construction of Peles Castle was commissioned byKing Carol, and on August 22, 1873, the foundations were laid in the form of a hunting house and a summer retreat for the Romanian royal family. The castle was designed by the German architect Johannes Schultz in a Neorenaissance style that combined numerous features of classic European styles. Besides the castle, other constructions were erected, such as a power plant, the Economat Building, the royal stables, the guards' chambers, and the Foisor hunting lodge. Later additions were also built between 1893 and 1914 by the Czech architect Karel Liman.

Peles became the first castle in Europe fully powered by locally produced energy, with the electric system beingcompleted in 1884 and the centralheating system in 1897. The castle was completed in 1914, and it remained a royal residence until 1947.

After the forced abdication of King Michael I, Peles was seized by the Communist regime in 1947, together with all the properties of the royal family. In 1948 the whole estate was closed, and numerous pieces of art were moved to the Art Museum in Bucharest. Peles Castle was thenopened as a museum in 1953 by the communist regime, and it remained so until 1975 when it was closed again due to its advanced state of deterioration. Between 1975 and 1989, the castle was constantly renovated and was also used by the communist regime as a





retreat for the heads of state that visited Romania. After the Romanian Revolution of 1989, the castle was once again opened to the public, and n 2007 it became the property of King Michael.

Inside and around Peles Castle

The inner courtyard, with its medieval air, carries the tourists back in time. The Sovereigns' Gate opens the journey into the castle, and a monumental marble staircase leads up to the Hall of Honor, the official reception space that witnessed the pres-

ence of royal guests, fromEmperor Franz Joseph to the Crown Prince of Japan. Peles Castle also hosted numerous artists such as George Enescu or Jacques Thibaud, that were the guests of Queen Elizabeth of Romania, the wife of King Carol I.

The impressive castle spreads over anarea of 3,200 square meters, housing 160 roomsthat impress through their beauty and sophistication. The best known is he Great Armory Room, hosting some of the finest collections of arms and armor, withover 4,000 pieces of weaponry that were collected or received as a gift, mainly from Western and Eastern Europe, but also from other regions of the world.

Constantin Brancusi The most influential sculptors

Constantin Brancusi, one of the most influential sculptors of the 20th-century and a pioneer of modernism, called also "the patriarch of modern sculpture", was born in Hobita (Romania), on 19th February 1876. A passionate wood-carver, he produced numerous wood sculptures, often with a folk flavour, and he frequently carved prototypes for works later executed in other materials. He is best known for his abstract sculptures of ovoid heads and birds in flight. Formal studies took him to Craiova School of Arts and Crafts, where he pursued his love for woodworking, graduating with honors in 1898 and then to Bucharest School of Fine Arts, where he

Govt needs not to curtail imports

ISLAMABAD: The government needs to draw a broadbased policy thrust to focus on increase in exports rath er than curtailing imports, said a report released by the Planning Ministry.

According to the report titled "First Quarterly Economic Review for FY22" the structure of imports had been changed marginally during the current government in a bid to pursue the policy of increasing exports rather than curtailing imports. The report added that four-fifth of imports are essentials and could not be avoided.

The share of food imports had increased from 9.7% in the year 2017-18 to 13.5% in FY2020-21, similarly share of other consumer goods also increased from 6.3% to 8.7% during the period under review.

The share of intermediate primary goods in imports remained same while that of intermediate manufacturing goods increased from 13.3% in Fy18 to 14.0% in FY21. Share of Petroleum, Oil and Lubricants (POL) and other energy in the country's to tal imports, however went down from 23.4% in FY 18 to 18.1% in FY21, while that of capital goods also went down from 8.8% to 6.3%. Similarly share of textiles in the country's imports rose to 10.4% in FY21 agaisnt the shrae of 8.3% in FY18, the report added. - APP

RWMC to control City's cleanliness operation

RAWALPINDI: Chairman Rawalpindi Waste Management Company Col. (R) Ajmal Sabir Raja Tuesday said that after the expiration of seven years contract with Turkish multinational conglomerate Albayrak company, the RWMC would take over the cleaning system of the city from Wednesday. Talking to the media, the Chairman said that 1436 sanitary workers and 210 vehicles of Albaurak would part of RWMC, which would dispose of around 850 tons of garbage daily from the city areas. He said that more than 4000 waste bins had been placed in the city to keep the city neat and clean while a control room was set up that would monitor the cleanly ness operation round the clock, seven days a week. Meanwhile, Managing Director RWMC Awais Manzoor Tarar said that RWMC would carry out all cleanliness work from December 1, 2021, from which the company would save around 30 per cent per month. He said that RWMC was determined to provide the best sanitation environment to the city's residents, and no compromise would be

Cyber security graduates vital for digital Pakistan

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Alvi on Tuesday said the risk of cyberattacks grew with Pakistan's advancement towards digitalization, thus requiring a strategy to effectively counter threats and secure national data.

Addressing the awards ceremony of the first nationwide Cyber Security Hackathon 2021, the president said cyber data had become the most valuable commodity world over and stressed that Pakistan direly needed to produce a huge number of graduates in the field of cybersecurity. Themed as 'Hackers Ignited - Journey of young cybersecurity warriors', the Hackathon was organized by Digital Pakistan under the Ministry of Information Technology & Telecom, and Ignite.

Of 1176 registered teams, 475 participated in the qualifying rounds of the public-private sector sprint held at Islamabad, Lahore, and Karachi in November in five categories.

These included network attacks and exploitation, operating system exploitation, system application exploitation (including web), mobile device and application

exploitation, and speed programming (C++, C#, and Python).

President Alvi said throughout the world including Pakistan, the infrastructure of vital importance such as banking system, credit card data, telecommunication, electricity and dams, hospitals, etc were digitalized and pointed out that anything linked with the internet or cloud was "susceptible to cyber or ransomware attacks".

He said the recent cyberattacks on the system of the Federal Board of Revenue and National Bank of Pakistan drew the attention towards an effective guard to defeat the cyber threats.

He said with changing concepts of security, the country's defence was linked with enhanced awareness and capabilities to develop and deploy a proper mechanism. To match the rapid technological development, he said, there was no option but to opt for digitalization, however emphasized ensuring in-built cybersecurity set up to save the 'treasure of data'.

He said a paradigm shift in policymaking was needed to abreast the country with an 'offensive and defensive cybersecuri-



ty. Instead of traditional brick-and-mortar educational facilities, the short-term online and virtual courses could also prepare the human resource for the market, he added.

Dr Alvi expressed confidence that Hackathon 2021 would help find talent to im-

prove the country's cybersecurity readiness and incident response capabilities. He said he had been constantly encouraging the vice chancellors of universities to work towards producing a large number of graduates in the field of cybersecurity. He mentioned that the government was offering 50,000 scholarships for students in different academic disciplines with a fifty percent disbursement allocated for girls. President Alvi gave away awards and cash prizes worth Rs 6 million to the winners of the Hackathon competitions.

Secretary Ministry of IT & Telecom Sohail Rajput said cybersecurity had become a critical domain globally, particularly in the scenario of frequent cyberattacks at national institutions. He said the IT Ministry was working on an ecosystem fulfilling the needs of a safe

cyberspace in the country. The Hackathon 2021, he said, greatly helped in identification of talented youth

ISLAMABAD: Domestic production of vegetable ghee decreased by 5.18% during the first quarter of the current financial year, whereas the output of cooking oil grew by 6.77% as compared to the production of the corresponding period of last year.

During the period from July-September, 2021, the local output of vegetables was recorded at 327,460 tons as compared to the production of 345,337 tons of the same period last year, according to the provisional quantum indices of Large Scale Manufacturing Industries for September 2021 with the base year 2005-06, which have been developed on the basis of latest data supplied by the source agencies. About 112,510 tons of vegetable ghee were domestically produced in the month of September 2021 as compared to the production of 114,107 metric tons of the same month of last year. – APP

MoCC, foodpanda ink MOU for ecofriendly packaging

ISLAMABAD: The Ministry of Climate Change (MoCC) and food panda, online food and grocery delivery platform, on Tuesday, inked a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to promote the reduction of polythene or plastic bag use in restaurants through industrial partnership.

The MOU was signed by the senior officials of the Ministry and foodpanda global parent-Delivery Heri here at the MoCC in the presence of Special Assistant to the Prime Minister (SAPM) on Climate Change Malik Amin Aslam. As per the MOU, foodpanda would create awareness within the restaurant industry to discontinue the use of polythene bags and for reduction of plastic waste in the pilot cities of Clean Green Pakistan Index (CGPI) Phase-I and Phase-II based on priorities mutually established with the MoCC. Under the CGPI initiative, 35 quantifiable indicators of solid and liquid waste management, cleanliness, and plantation would be gauged in the cities to trigger a healthy competition leading to eco-friendly cities.

The foodpanda would also launch two campaigns every year each for six months to target the restaurant industry with the aim to set goals for reducing material waste, to adopt recyclable or compostable packaging, where the two campaigns would focus on green and sustainable packaging. Booster shot

HE provincial health department of Sindh has decided to offer free-of-cost Pfizer booster shots to people who have already been fully vaccinated in the province. 

Voter manipulation

ITH the by-election of NA-133 in Lahore on the line on December 5, 2021, the Election Commission of Pakistan must stay vigilant. The troubling video regarding the alleged sale and purchase of votes is one instance where the authority must get to the truth without any delay. The video appears to show two men paying off prospective voters and asking for an oath to vote for the PML-N. The former ruling party has come out to vociferously deny its hand in this purported theft of votes. As expected, all sides have wasted no time in blaming one another. PTI and PPP have alleged that PML-N might be engaged in influencing voters through monetary gains while PML-N has in turn claimed that PPP might be behind this. The ECP has already announced that a forensic audit of the video will be carried out to determine responsibility. This is important to get beyond the narrative of accusations. The authority's mandate is to ensure free, fair and impartial elections and investigating this falls right into the wheelhouse. Previous investigations have been useful-but action is still pending. We must not forget that this is not the first instance of potential malpractice and it certainly will not be the last. The election watchdog has to ensure that each

report is investigated to its fullest. Beyond this instance, we still have the lingering issue of the Daska by-polls and the damning investigation that followed. Action must be taken against those found guilty in Daska as well, in order to set the right precedent and prevent the brazen attacks on our democracy. The task to ensure transparency and fairness in elections is by no means simple, but each time irregularities are unearthed, we have an opportunity for course correction, but only if we take stern and immediate action. Authorities must act on instances of electoral fraud and manipulation in order for the system in spite of those that would try to derail it.

Saudi Arabia's exciting journey into a reimagined future

Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030, an outcome of such imagination by Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, is steering the Kingdom into a futuristic journey, with one grandiose project after another. Oxagon is the latest addition - a floating hexagonal industrial complex that will, in a decade's time, provide the world's first fully integrated port and supply chain ecosystem for NEOM. NEOM itself is being built as a futuristic city at a price tag of \$500 billion on the Red Sea coast in the northwestern Saudi province of Tabuk. Powered by green hydrogen, it seeks to provide a postmodern experience in urban living that we can only dream about - with robot maids, airborne taxis, an artificial moon and much more. The Line is NEOM's flagship project. It is a linear city linking the coast of the Red Sea with the region's mountains and upper valleys that is being built along a 170 km line – with no cars, no streets, no carbon emissions and a hyperloop running down the middle, providing a supersonic, friction-free travel service to its 1 million residents.

Oxagon represents a fundamental shift in how the world views manufacturing. Its smart factories will offer products in sustainable energy, autonomous mobility, water innovation, sustainable food production, health and well-being, modern methods of construction and technology, and digital manufacturing, including telecoms, space technology and robotics.

NEOM and its flagship projects will operate in "digital air," with satellite communications, cloud parks and a hyperdata center. Together with two major tourism and entertainment destinations - the Red Sea Development Project and AMAALA - they are geared toward accomplishing Vision 2030's strategic goal of making Saudi Arabia a hub of international investment, business, travel, tourism and trade. The same goal underpins so many other mega-tourism and entertainment projects that celebrate and promote Saudi Arabia's heritage and natural beauty, such as Qiddiya near Riyadh, AlUla in the northwest and Soudah in the Asir region. There are also ambitious infrastructure ventures, from multi-lane metros to smart housing complexes and business districts across major cities. Being the center of the Islamic world, Saudi Arabia already hosts millions of Muslims for Umrah and Hajj every year. However, its liberal visa policy introduced in 2019 is meant to attract other foreign tourists who yearn to explore and seek pleasure in a new territory. Vision 2030 seeks to attract 100 million tourists annually by the end of the decade, with the National Tourism Strategy announced in October planning to invest \$1 trillion in the tourism sector. But the Kingdom also wants more foreign investors, hoping to raise \$100 billion in foreign direct investment by 2030. Under the National Investment Strategy announced at the Future Investment Initiative Forum in October, it will spend \$7 trillion to implement the Vision 2030 projects. The contributions will come from the Public Investment Fund, with a net worth of \$450 billion, and the private sector, including Saudi Aramco and the petrochemical firm SABIC. The FDI is hard to come by, but its prospects have increased due to the revamping of the regulatory framework and progress in other enabling conditions, resulting in the issuance of more than 400 FDI licenses in the first quarter of 2021. In February, the government also issued an ultimatum to international companies to either shift their regional headquarters to the Kingdom by January 2024 or risk losing their government contracts. The response was prompt, with 40 multinationals, including PepsiCo, Siemens and

Unilever, deciding to relocate to Riyadh – a trend that is likely to accelerate.

Saudi Arabia has a clear advantage over other Gulf states in terms of geography: It has a landmass the size of Western Europe, with two vast coastlines on key shipping routes. The Red Sea ports, with NEOM and Oxagon as the major industrial outposts, will particularly help the Kingdom to harness 13 percent of the world's trade through the Red Sea.

Saudi Arabia also has an edge over other Gulf competitors in terms of demography: The bulk of its 33 million population is young, offering an enormous demographic dividend. Vision 2030 seeks to tap this potential by using the Saudi drive to diversify its oil-based economy and become one of the 15 largest economies in the world by 2030 to significantly curtail youth unemployment, especially by promoting small and medium-sized enterprises and raising women's participation in the workforce, which has already increased from 20 percent to more than 33 per-

Why Iran may become a latent nuclear state

The record shows that the US is disposed to making bad decisions on false pretences that lead to horrific outcomes in the Middle East, but I doubt we are close to another foolish decision yet. Neither Washington nor Tehran is interested in such military escalation. Biden's strategy is highly enriched uranium and the powerful centrifuges that produced it before nuclear-related sanctions are lifted. It insists other sanctions may only be lifted after Iran changes its "destabilising" regional behaviour. And it also insists on the need for a more comprehensive, more permanent agreement that guarantees Iran may never produce nuclear weapons.

In short, as mistrust runs deep and expectations run wild, a return to the 2015 agreement is looking utterly improbable and terribly insufficient to settle the nuclear issue. That is why, the Biden administration is contemplating the use of so-called Plan B, which includes stronger diplomatic pressure and tougher economic sanctions against Iran. But then again, this is a policy that has been tried and has failed many times. What is the point of redeploying it, knowing Iran could accelerate its uranium enrichment to the 90 percent needed to become a nuclear state, while its hardline government boasts mounting "economic resistance" against American imperialism? If America does not play it carefully, it may have to go at it alone. Russia and China are not going to join any new American pressure campaign against Iran, considering their tensions with the Biden administration. It is doubtful the Europeans will join either, without a realistic endgame in sight. That is why the US has recently warned that "all options are on the table". But we have heard that before regarding the Taliban in Afghanistan and look how that turned out. We have also heard it muttered on Ukraine, Taiwan, Venezuela, Syria, North Korea, etc. Some reports now speak of the Biden administration outsourcing the war option to Israel, giving the region's only nuclear power the green light to act militarily against the Iranian nuclear programme, which may well lead to an all-out regional war. The record shows that the US is disposed to making bad decisions on false pretences that lead to horrific outcomes in the Middle East, but I doubt we are close to another foolish decision yet. Neither Washington nor Tehran is interested in such military escalation. Biden's strategy is to largely disengage militarily from the Middle East hotspots, not get drawn into a quagmire worse than the Iraq war. And despite his bluster, Khamenei has shown to be careful not to drag Iran into a military confrontation with the US - one that is sure to cripple the Islamic Republic, weaken its regime and damage its regional standing. That is why, Washington will persist in its pursuit of a diplomatic solution, knowing all too well that Iran will continue to drag its feet in Vienna while it speeds up its enrichment, even refusing, for now, to negotiate directly with the Americans before sanctions are lifted. And here lies the fundamental difference between Vienna 2015 and Vienna 2021. Tehran may no longer be accelerating its enrichment to use as leverage in the negotiations, as it did prior to the 2015 agreement, but rather to become a de facto latent nuclear state. To be clear, a latent nuclear state is not a nuclear power. It is a state that possesses the know-how and the resources to quickly become one - much like Japan, which is also a signatory to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT). By contrast, Israel, which is a nuclear power, is not a signatory. In fact, Iran has long wanted to be like Japan. Iranians who see Japan as a model to emulate, have long considered it a double standard that Japan can have the fuel cycle and "stay happily" in the NPT, but Iran cannot. Iran may be more interested at this point in time in becoming a latent nuclear state like Japan than a nuclear power like India, Pakistan or Israel. Not only is this consistent with its official line, which states that Iran will not develop nuclear weapons that it considers "immoral", it is also more realistic than becoming a nuclear power and more achievable than ever before. Short of a dramatic political reversal, this could lead to a direct confrontation with the US and/or Israel. But my guess is that for the foreseeable future, it is going to be the Arabs, those in Iraq, Syria, Lebanon, Yemen and elsewhere, who support a Middle East free of nuclear weapons, that will pay the price of this foolish regional Cold War.

S the negotiations to salvage the æ 2015 Iran nuclear agreement resume in Vienna, it is a déja vu all over again. The United States warns of crippling sanctions, Israel threatens war, the Europeans plead and prod, and the Arabs watch from the sidelines, as Iran drags out the talks and accelerates its uranium enrichment. Except this time, diplomacy seems destined to fail, leaving the door open to a number of scenarios, which, thanks to former US President Donald Trump and his Middle East brain trust, former Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, include war and/or the distinct possibility of Iran becoming a latent nuclear state.

After all, it was Trump who decided to nuke the internationally recognised 2015 agreement. After repeatedly condemning it as "rotten" and "disastrous", he abandoned it in 2018 on the basis of unsubstantiated and unrelated allegations. To make matters worse, Trump imposed new crippling sanctions on Iran, including secondary sanctions on third parties trading with the country, and ordered the assassination of its most revered general, Qassem Soleimani.

Boxed in, Iran lashed out in all directions. Most importantly, it renewed its uranium enrichment programme, bringing it ever closer to weapons-grade level.

After US President Joe Biden took office in January, he failed to use the small window of opportunity to disavow his predecessor's policies and get the deal back on track in the first half of the year. His attempts to exploit Trump's sanctions to force Tehran into accepting new conditions have backfired.

In August, Ebrahim Raisi, a hardline cleric and a protégé of Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei, was elected president of Iran.

Today, Tehran insists its return to the agreement is conditional on the Biden administration's lifting "all sanctions" imposed after 2017 – whether nuclear-related or not. It expects Washington to provide the necessary guarantees that no future administration may abandon the deal again. And it will wait for proof that the sanctions are totally and truly lifted before making any moves towards the agreement. It also rejects any and all discussion of its missile systems and regional role. For its part, Washington expects Iran to return to the status quo ante and dispose of the

detected around 87,197 cases of gas theft on its network during the last fiscal year, under a comprehensive Unaccounted for Gas (UFG) reduction plan given by the government. "There are 86,959 gas theft cases of consumers and 238 are of non-consumers," according to an official document. The company also registered 377 FIRs (First Information Reports) against the gas pilferers.

The UFG losses of SNGPL and Sui Southern Gas Company (SSGC) stood at 8.83 per cent and 15.85 percent respectively during the fiscal year 2020-21.

"Volumetric loss of SNGPL remained at 34,021 million cubic feet (mmcf) of gas and SSGC 67,476 mmcf of gas, mainly because of gas leakages, measurement errors and theft," according to an official report available with APP. In 2019-20, the SNGPL and SSGC had prevented a volumetric loss of around 9,938 MMCF gas against the UFG reduction target of 14,806 MMCF gas.

The UFG is a phenomenon of gas loss that occurred due to various technical factors when gas flowed from fields to end consumers. It is calculated as the difference between metered gas volume injected into the transmission and distribution network (Point of Dispatch/Delivery) and the metered gas delivered to the end consumers (Consumer Meter Station) during a financial year.

In line with the government policy to reduce line loss, the report said the gas companies were taking all possible measures to bring down the UFG ratio gradually in the coming years. - DNA

TOKYO: Japan's main opposition party on Tuesday elected its 47-year-old policy chief as leader, as it tries to regroup following a disappointing electoral performance against the country's long-ruling conservatives. Kenta Izumi, who is far from a household name in Japan, takes the helm of the Constitutional Democratic Party after its celebrated founder Yukio Edano stepped down over poor results in October's election.

Izumi faces the difficult task of uniting Japan's fractured opposition bloc in the face of the Liberal Democratic Party, which has ruled Japan for nearly all of the past seven decades.

He has pledged to strength en programmes to assist the poor and needy in an apparent effort to draw a contrast with the ruling party's generally pro-business policies. "We will conduct politics that are people-centred,' he said. The eight-term lawmaker, who beat three candidates for the leader ship job, won his first lower house seat at age 29, unusu ally young in Japan.

The father of three was born in northern Hokkaido and represents a district in Kyoto where he went to college and began working as a staff member for a local politician

Fiscal deficit narrows to 0.8pc in Q1

ISLAMABAD: The fiscal deficit narrowed to 0.8 percent of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) during the first quarter of the fiscal year 2021-22, according to monthly Economic Update and Outlook for November released by the finance ministry here.

Last year, the deficit during the period was recorded at 1.1 percent of GDP, it says adding the revenue growth outpaced the growth in expenditures.

In absolute terms, the fiscal deficit has been reduced to Rs 438.5 billion in Q1 FY2022 against Rs 484.3 billion in the comparable period of last year.

The primary balance remained in surplus and stood at Rs 184.2 billion (0.3 percent of GDP) in Q1 FY2022 against the surplus of Rs 257.7 billion (0.6 percent of GDP) last year

"The fiscal performance remained strong during the first quarter of the current fiscal year on the back of healthy growth in tax revenues, careful expenditure management and higher provincial surplus," the report says.

During the period under review, total revenues posted an impressive growth that outpaced the rise in expenditures.

Total revenues grew by 22.3 percent, primarily driven by 36.6 percent growth in tax collection from both federal and provincial levels. - APP

COVID-19 vaccinations mandatory for people aged 60 and over, a drastic step for the country grappling with a new surge in coronavirus cases.

Authorities said they would impose a 100 euro (\$114) fine on every individual over the age of 60 who was not vaccinated. The measure would apply each month from Jan. 16 onwards.

About 63 percent of the population of about 11 million is fully vaccinated. Vaccine appointments have picked up in recent weeks.

"We are focusing our efforts on protection of our fellow citizens and for this reason their vaccination will be mandatory from now on," Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitso takis told a cabinet meeting. "Greeks over the age of 60 who have not been vaccinated must, by Jan. 16, booked an appointment for their first dose, or else they will face a 100 euro administrative fine every month.

Greece has recorded a spike in infections this month, with daily cases hitting record highs.

It has recorded 931,183 infections and 18,067 deaths since the start of the pandemic last year.

The country this month barred unvaccinated people from indoor spaces including restaurants, cinemas, museums and gyms, even if they had tested negative for the coronavirus.

WASHINGTON: The Pentagon launched a fresh probe Monday into a 2019 airstrike that killed civilians in Syria, two weeks after a New York Times investigation claimed the US military concealed dozens of non-combatants' deaths.

Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin instructed Army General Michael Garrett to "review the reports of the investigation already conducted into that incident" and "conduct further inquiry into the facts and circumstances related to it," Pentagon spokesman John Kirby said. Garrett's three-month review will assess "civilian casualties that resulted from the incident, compliance with the law of war, record keeping and reporting procedures," Kirby added. It will also probe whether measures

were effectively implemented, if "accountability measures" should be taken and if "procedures or processes should be altered."

According to a Times investigation published mid-November, a US special force operating in Syria - sometimes in complete secrecy - bombed a group of civilians three times on March 18, 2019, near the Islamic State (IS) bastion of Baghouz, killing 70 people, mainly women and children.

The Times report says a US legal officer "flagged the strike as a possible war crime" but that "at nearly every step, the military made moves that concealed the catastrophic strike." The Times found the strike "was one of the largest civilian casualty incidents of the war against the Islamic State," but was never publicly acknowledged by the US military.

Reports were delayed, sanitized and classified. United States-led coalition forces bulldozed the blast site. And top leaders were not notified," the report said, adding findings of a Pentagon probe were "stalled and stripped of any mention of the

strike. A statement released by the Pentagon after the report said the initial investigation into the incident by the US Army Central Command, which oversees military operations in the Middle East, found the strikes were "self-defense," "proportional" and that "appropriate steps were taken to exclude the presence of civilians." A US-led coalition and Kurdish-led allies announced the defeat of the IS proto-state, known as the "caliphate," at the end of March 2019 after overcoming the last jihadist holdout of Baghouz.

First Omicron case detected in Japan

TOKYO: Japan on Tuesday confirmed its first case of the Omicron coronavirus variant, a day after authorities announced new Covid border restrictions.

"Regarding the traveller arriving from Namibia, it was confirmed to be a case of Omicron after analysis at the National Institute of Infectious Diseases," government spokesman Hirokazu Matsuno told reporters.

'This is the first Omicron case confirmed in Japan, he said, adding that the infected traveller, a man in his 30s, is now in isolation at a medical facility.

The announcement came a day after Japan tightened its border rules again, barring all new foreign arrivals just weeks after relaxing tough regulations to allow some students and business travellers entry.

The new rules mean only Japanese citizens and existing foreign residents can enter the country, with few exemptions, and those coming from areas with known Omicron cases require hotel quarantines ranging from three to 10 days.

Japan has recorded just over 18,300 coronavirus cases during the pandemic, while avoiding tough lockdowns. After a slow start, its vaccination programme picked up speed and nearly 77 percent of the population is fullv vaccinated. - APP

Can Taliban keep the lights on in winter?

KABUL: As poverty and hunger grow in the country, the new government scrambles to meet its electricity debt obligations, facing the grim prospect of Afghanistan plunging into darkness.

It is getting dark and Zabihullah Bawar, a 34-yearold former construction worker, seems anxious as he rushes towards his old mud house in Kandahar. He uses his mobile-phone torch to lighten the room he shares with his family of four. The home's small solar battery is broken and the family will spend the cold night of November 25 in nothing but candlelight.

Zabihullah has been jobless for the last four months and has no money to get the battery repaired. The government-run construction and development projects have halved since the Taliban grabbed power in Afghanistan in mid-August. As a result, hundreds of thousands of laborers have lost their jobs.

Zabihullah worked as a daily-wage construction worker. With much of the building activity coming to an end, he could only find work a handful of days in the past three months. "Sometimes, we don't have anything to eat for several days. I can't buy powdered milk and medicine for my one-year-old son." While the economic prospects have severely shrunken, the public services that depend heavily on an uninterrupted power supply are being affected, too. To keep offices, universities and hospitals running, the Taliban will have to keep the country's electricity grid functional.

There are presently 8 to 10 hours of power outages on a daily basis in Kabul. The cold weather, coupled with difficult economic conditions, has made life difficult in the country. Other provinces and rural areas endure power outages for longer hours.

The Taliban has a difficult road ahead. Afghanistan owes millions of dollars to neighbouring countries that supply electricity to the war-torn nation.

On November 1 2021, SAGR, the US government's leading oversight authority on Afghanistan reconstruction, reported that the Taliban's interim government faces severe revenue shortages in addition to potential technical and personal difficulties.

The new government has to pay its electricity debt of \$110 to \$130 million with Uzbekistan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Iran.

Afghanistan relies heavily on electricity imports from these countries. Its domestic power production does not meet the country's energy needs. The total installed capacity for domestic power production is around 700 megawatts, while Afghanistan's Ministry of Energy and Water places the country's electrical needs at 2000 megawatts.

The Taliban only recently resumed the collection of electricity bills from consumers in Kabul and nearby provinces. Collections have been delayed since the Taliban's takeover in August due to the fact the country's banking system was rendered dysfunctional. Also, the new regime took a while to appoint leaders to the country's power department, Da Afghanistan Breshna Sherkat (DABS).

One official, who wishes to remain anonymous, tells TRT World, "After several rounds of talks, we could convince the banks to keep the electricity bills pavment desk open even if the branches are not able to provide other banking services"

Faryal Talpur name removed from ECL

"We will not let the government give an 'amnesty' to these people," he vowed.

Bilawal said he saluted the person-

nel of the Pakistan Army and Police who had laid down their lives fighting against the TTP terrorists. He said that the government was secretly holding talks with the terrorists involved in the APS tragedy. "We will not accept the negotiations with the proscribed organisation.

PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari said that the "culture of pressuring courts over phone calls" to rein in political leaders should now end, saying that courts and parliament must take measures to end this practice once and for all.

"We are not happy at all that audio tapes are emerging against those who would threaten and pressure courts over phone calls to hand sentences of 20 years' [imprisonment] to Shaheed Bibi and Zardari and to seize their family property," Bilawal told a rally in Peshawar. "We think the system of making phone calls is wrong today and was wrong then and in the future, no one should have the courage to



make such an attempt.³

The PPP leader said "Imran must realise the gravity of the situation and stop practising undemocratic politics, otherwise, he will suffer the same fate as that of his predecessors." Accusing the government of surrendering to the International Monetary Fund's (IMF) terms and conditions, the PPP chairman said that the 'deal' struck between the government and the Fund would take its toll on the masses.

He vowed not to let the govern-

ment make the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) subservient to the IMF. He alleged that 'selected' Prime Minister Imran Khan was trying to give a safe passage to Kulbhushan Jadhav. "PPP will not allow him to give amnesty to the Indian spy," he expressed the resolve.

The PPP chairman also accused the government of befooling overseas Pakistanis in the name of electoral reforms. "We are of the view that there should be an 'electoral college' for the Pakistanis living abroad," he said, and added, "We will continue to oppose the electronic voting machines (EVMs)."

He said the PTI government's poor performance had laid bare the hollowness of its tall claims of bringing 'change' in the country. "Now it is in everybody's knowledge which 'change' the PTI was talking about before coming to power. That 'change' is joblessness and inflation," he taunted. Bilawal alleged that 'selected'

Prime Minister Imran Khan had given instructions to the government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa not to allow the PPP to hold a gathering in the provincial capital.

"Come and see Mr 'selected' that the entire city of Peshawar has thronged the PPP's Jalsa," he said, and claimed that it came to power, PPP would make the country's economy 'poor friendly'. Earlier in his statement on the occasion of the 54th foundation day of the PPP, he said that after a long struggle and unprecedented sacrifices, only PPP can pave the way for democracy in Pakistan. Azerbaijan says 14 dead in helicopter crash

BAKU: Fourteen people died Tuesday in an Azerbaijani military helicopter crash which went down in the east of the Caucasus country during a training flight, officials said. "Fourteen people died and

two more were wounded as a result of a state border service helicopter crash," the ex-Soviet republic's frontier guard said in a statement.

It said all of the victims were military servicemen. Earlier Tuesday, the country's border service and prosecutor general said in a joint statement that "a military helicopter belonging to Azerbaijan's state border service crashed today at Garakheybat airfield in the Khyzy region at approximately 10:40 am (GMT 0640) while conducting a training flight."

They said an investigation was underway into the accident's causes.

The incident came two weeks after Azerbaijan and neighbouring Armenia engaged in the worst fighting along their shared border since going to war last year over the contested Nagorno - Karabakh region. – APP

Moderna warns against vaccine struggle

LONDON: Existing Covid-19 inoculations will struggle against the fast-spreading Omicron variant, the head of vaccine manufacturer Moderna warned Tuesday, as countries ramp up vaccination programmes and impose further restrictions in an effort to curb growing concern.

First reported to the World Health Organization in South Africa less than a week ago, the new strain has rapidly spread from Africa to the Pacific, and from Europe to North America as dozens of countries have announced travel restrictions. While no deaths have yet been reported from Omicron, and it could take weeks to know how infectious and how resistant the strain may prove to vaccines, its emergence underscores how besieged the world remains by Covid-19, nearly two years after the first cases were recorded. Stephane Bancel, the head of US vaccine manufacturer Moderna, told the Financial Times in an interview published Tuesday that data would be available on the effectiveness of vaccines

Moscow: West, Ukraine threaten Russia

MOSCOW: Russian President Vladimir Putin said Tuesday that military exercises and other moves by the West and Ukraine threaten Russia's security, warning against crossing the Kremlin's "red lines". Addressing an investor conference via video link. Putin declined to say whether Moscow planned to move troops across Ukraine's border - as the West has been alleging for weeks.

"Look, they spoke about a possible Russian military intervention in Ukraine at the beginning of the year. But as you see this did not happen," Putin said.

"It is not about intervening or not intervening, fighting or not fighting. It's about mending ties,' Putin said, adding that it was important to take into account the security interests of all parties. "If we sincerely strive to achieve this then no one will feel threatened." Putin addressed investors as tensions spiral between Moscow and Brussels, and NATO looks to counter a fresh Russian military build-

up on Ukraine's border. The new buildup follows a similar surge in the spring, when Russia gathered around 100,000 troops on Ukraine's borders but later announced a drawdown. Putin said Moscow was concerned by Western moves to conduct largescale previously unan nounced military drills near Russia's borders, singling out US-led exercises in the Black Sea.

Separately, Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov lobbed a series of new accusations against Kiev and said Russia reserved the right to respond if its security was threatened.

GB Ex-judge distances himself from affidavit

ISLAMABAD: Former chief justice of Gilgit-Baltistan Rana Shamim on Tuesday distanced himself from an affidavit attributed to him in which allegations of collusion were levelled against another former jurist Mian Saqib Nisar, telling the Islamabad High Court (IHC) that he had not yet examined the 'leaked' document.

Shamim made the remarks during the hearing on show-cause notices issued over an investigative report that highlighted Shamim's alleged accusation against Nisar of colluding to deny bails to top PML-N leadership before general elections 2018. At the outset of hearing, Justice Minallah remarked that the case was related to "my court and its accountability", adding, "along with media freedom, this case is also about the independence of the judiciary." Justice Minallah asked Shamim whether he had submitted his response, to which the latter replied that the court should ask his lawyer about it. He added that there had been a tragedy in his family and requested the court to schedule the next hearing after December 12. The IHC chief justice, however, gave Shamim four days to submit his written response.

Shamim was previously represented by his son Ahmed Hassan Rana, an advocate of the Supreme Court. However, he later changed his legal counsel to Latif Afridi. "I have not yet seen the [published] affidavit," the ex-GB judge informed the court, referring to the document in the report carried by The News. It may be mentioned here that The News report had said that Shamim confirmed the contents of the leaked affidavit both on a phone call with the correspondent, as well as a message.

BERLIN: Germany's incoming chancellor Olaf Scholz on Tuesday signalled his backing for mandatory coronavirus jabs, a party source told media, as the country struggles to contain a fierce fourth wave of the pandemic. Scholz, who is holding crisis talks with regional leaders, said he was "aware that there were cross-party debates" among lawmakers about making the vaccine compulsory, a source at the meeting said.

"Scholz signalled his sympathy for such a regulation," added the source, who is from Scholz's centre-left Social Democratic Party (SPD). The introduction of mandatory jabs would have to be approved by parliament.

Outgoing Chancellor Angela Merkel's conservative CDU/CSU bloc, which will not be part of Scholz's incoming ruling coalition, has also come out in favour of requiring citizens to be inoculated against Covid-19. Scholz, Merkel and the heads of Germany's 16 states are discussing tougher curbs to confront record-high infection rates and rapidly filling intensive care beds.Among the measures being discussed are the closures of bars and clubs, and limiting large events.
