KARACHI: Ambassador of Thailand in Pakistan, Chakkrid Krachaiwong said due to Covid pandemic the bilateral trade between Pakistan and Thailand had reduced, however the volumes are anticipated to cross \$1.6 billion this fiscal year.

Speaking at the ceremony to mark 70 years of diplomatic and trade relationship between the two countries. Thai Ambassador said bilateral trade volumes exceeded \$800 million in the past six months.

"The talks on the Free Trade Agreement (FTA) between Thailand and Pakistan and progressing, which would enhace the trade volumes," Chakkrid Krachaiwong said. The diplomat also expressed interest in tourism development.

Later, talking to newsmen Thai diplomat said Pakistan manufactured the best footballs in the world. ISLAMABAD: Acting Afghan Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi has confirmed that they were mediating between Pakistan and the Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP), though no agreement was reached yet Muttaqi, who was visiting here mainly to attend Troika Plus meeting, told BBC Urdu in an interview published Sunday that the Taliban government was mediating on the desire of both the parties in Pakistan.

T has been my consistent view that the Prime Minister may not complete his five year term because we do not have any such precedent, albeit I personally think if people have voted someone to power for five years, he or she should be allowed to complete the term. Even if the prime minister is not delivering, it should be left to the voters to decide about his fate. Unlike the PM, the PTI government may be allowed to limp on till the end of its legal term, which will end in 2023. The Capital is

abuzz with a plethora of rumors these days. Govt defeat in the National Assembly last week when it failed to get its bills passed, in fact gave further rise to these rumors. Then happened the drama of joint sitting of the parliament. The session had to be called off at the eleventh hour for the allied parties of the PTI refused to lend their support for the passage of certain bills including the one relating to use of the Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) in the next general elections.

The allies complain of being ignored and discarded by the PTI top leadership. PML Q and the MQM, even in the past had raised their voice against what they called injustices meted out to them by the PTI leadership. Even this time, they did not name anybody but obviously their complaints are directed towards the prime minister, and thus want him to be replaced. Certain names are also being heard who may replace the prime minister in case of any in-house change. Interestingly, name of the defence minister is also there who has recently been given a clean chit in a corruption reference. A couple of other contenders from Multan and Islamabad regions have also



girded up their loins in case the top of-

fice is bestowed upon them. The opposition on the contrary has demanded for early elections though none of them has done homework for this. But since they want to get Imran Khan out of power come what may, they won't mind fresh elections knowing the fact that they are not going to win majority seats. I have written time and again, PPP always chooses to play safe and smart. It become part of PDM only when it intends to exert pressure on the "aliens" and after getting some concessions it spares no time in divorcing the alliance. Rumors are ripe that PPP once again wants to be part of the PDM and the

booby trap. PPP's sudden inclination towards the PDM; resurgence of the TLP and abrupt strange behavior of the allied parties of the PTI may not be a mere coincidence. 36,200 bags of hoarded fertilizers recovered

LAHORE: A meeting was informed on Sunday that during the ongoing crackdown on hoarders, 36,200 bags of fertilizers were recovered in different cities.

A report, presented to Punjab Chief Secretary Kamran Ali Afzal at Civil Secretariat. said that 17,000 bags were seized in Bahawalpur and 19,200 bags in Faisalabad

The meeting also reviewed the prices and availability of essential commodities and the ongoing crackdown on hoarding.

The chief secretary directed the deputy commissioners to prepare a strategy for the sale of confiscated stocks in the market at the fixed price. He said that urea fertilizer was in abundance, but dealers were creating artificial shortage by storing it in warehouses. He said that increase in the supply of fertilizer in the market would automatically reduce the price. He asked the deputy commissioners to keep a close watch on the prices of essential commodities as well as their supply and de-

ISLAMABAD: The Higher Education Commission (HEC) has clarified a news item published in a section of the press regarding HEC's briefing to a Senate body about performance of several universities. The Senate Standing Committee on Federal Education and Professional

Training was briefed on the performance of Quality Enhancement Cells (QECs) of the Universities that were assessed during 2019-20, and not the overall performance of the universities. The measurement stand-

ards/criteria for QECs and Institutional Performance are different. The yearly progress of QECs is measured on six quantifiable standards whereas the performance of universities is reviewed against 11 defined standards. The news regarding perfor-

mance of the universities has been misinterpreted by some newspapers.

The QECs are annually

assessed by HEC's Quality Assurance Agency (QAA) for their performance against the defined parameters. The Yearly Progress Reports of QECs for Financial Year 2018-19 were finalized that were provisionally assessed during 2019-20. Every university provides Yearly Progress Report against the given criteria and targets, which are (i) Conducting self-review of Institutional Performance Evaluation, (ii) Self-Assessment of Programmes, (iii) Accreditation of Programmes by the Accreditation Councils, (iv) Conduct Self Review MS/MPhil & PhD Programme Review from HEC, Self-Review, NOCs of MS/MPhil & PhD programmes, (v) Strengthening of QECs Secretariat, Memberships of Statutory Bodies & International



QA bodies, Conducting of Awareness Seminars/ workshops, and (vi) Implementation of HEC's Quality Assurance guidelines

and policies. The QECs play a key role in sensitizing the university administration and faculty towards the Quality Assurance issues of the university education and create awareness about the need for Self-Assessment by the programme managers in the universi-

As COVID-19 pandemic hit Pakistan in February

2020, the degree awarding institutions were forced to close their on-campus activities, resultantly the planned activities of QECs were also halted including finalization of assessment of Yearly Progress Reports of 2018-19, conducting Progress Review Meetings and Capacity Building workshops for QECs.

The overall performance of a Higher Education Institution (HEI) is reviewed periodically after every five years against 11 defined standards of Institutional Performance Evaluation (IPE). The standards are namely, Mission Statement and Goals, Planning and Evaluation, Organization and Governance, Integrity, Faculty, Students, Institutional Resources, Academic Programmes and Curricula, Public Disclosure and Transparency, Assessment & Quality Assurance and Student Support Service.

Review visits are planned, data is collected from the focused HEIs in the form of University Portfolio Report (UPR). A panel is nominated by QAA, which conducts review visit, evaluates the HEI against the defined standards and the report is shared with the University/ HEI for submitting Compliance Implementation Plan (CIP) to QAA.

QAA follow-up with the respective university for implementation of the recommendations made in the review report of the university. The impact of quality as-

NCOC to relax curbs in cities with excellent vaccination

Pakistan's COVID-19 positivity rate dropped below 1% for the 2nd consecutive day for the first time since March last year, when the govt started recording data on the pandemic

ISLAMABAD: The National Command and Operation Centre (NCOC) on Sunday announced that it would relax the COVID-19 protocols in cities with "excellent vaccination progress."

According to a notification issued in this regard, the decision was taken during the NCOC's session on November 12, 2021. The meeting reviewed the disease situation in the country and the full vaccination status of different cities.

To encourage and incentivise cities with excellent vaccination progress, the forum decided that it would allow relaxations in the non-pharmaceutical interventions (NPIs) so that life could return to normal, the statement said. Accordingly, the basis of NPIs for cities have been decided as per the following vaccination progress:

Excellent vaccination progress: 50 % and above. According to this criterion, cities – where the COVID-19 protocols will be relaxed - include Narowal, Jehlum, Mandi Bahauddin, Peshawar, Bhimber, Bagh, Mirpur, Skardu,

Gilgit, Ghizer and Islamabad. Good Vaccination Progress: 40-50% Cities that fall into this category include Rawalpindi, Sargodha, Sialkot, Mianwali, Kallar Kahar, Hafizabad, Rahim Yar Khan, Karachi, Chitral, Charsadda, Balakot, Jehlum Valley, Rawalakot, Muzaffarabad, Neelum, Hunza and Kharmang Valley.

Low Vaccination Progress: Less than 40%. All other cities of the country fall into this category. Per the NCOC, the NPIs will remain effective from November 16 to November 30, while a review will be carried out by the forum NCOC on November 29.

Meanwhile, Pakistan's COVID-19 positivity rate dropped Sunday below 1% for the second consecutive day for the first time since March last year, when the government started recording data on the pandemic. In the last month, Pakistan has con-

sistently reported a coronavirus positivity rate of less than 2% and less than 1,000 daily infections. Hospitalisations and the daily death count have also dropped, indicating an overall improvement in the COVID-19 situation in Pakistan. On Sunday, the National Command and Operation Centre's (NCOC) data showed that 263 people tested positive for the virus after 33,767 tests were taken. This makes it the second consecutive day the country reported less than 300 cases of infection in a single day.

Eleven people, meanwhile, lost their lives to the virus, pushing the death tally to 28,606. The total number of cases so far since the pandemic started stands at 1,279,636, while the active case count is 22,855.

COVID-19 infections are decreasing in Pakistan, with 447 new infections reported on average each day. That's 8% of the peak - the highest daily average reported on June 17.

Pakistan has administered at least 118,333,360 doses of COVID vaccines so far. Assuming every person needs 2 doses, that's enough to have vaccinated about 27.3% of the country's population.

Per last week's report, Pakistan averaged about 1,053,302 doses administered each day. At that rate, it will take a further 42 days to administer enough doses for another 10% of the population.

Diabetes to kill 400,000 deaths by year-end: Report (IGT), which places them at News Desk

ISLAMABAD: International Diabetes Federation (IDF) has claimed that diabetes will be responsible for 400,000 deaths in Pakistan in the year 2021, declaring it the highest number in the Middle-East and North Africa Region.

According to IDF's new figures which were released on the occasion of World Diabetes Day observed on Sunday (November 14), one in four adults (26.7%) in Pakistan are living with diabetes - the highest national prevalence in the world.

These findings from the 10th Edition of the IDF Diabetes Atlas, which will be published on December 6, reported that Pakistan now has the third highest number of people living with diabetes in the world, after China (141 million) and India (74 million).

An additional 11 million adults in Pakistan have Impaired Glucose Tolerance

"The rapidly rising level of diabetes in Pakistan presents a significant challenge to the health and wellbeing of individuals and families in the country," says Professor Abdul Basit, Director, Baqai Institute of Diabetology and Endocrinology, Baqai Medical University.

All set for Anti-Measles, Rubella drive

RAWALPINDI: Chief Executive Officer(CEO)District Health Authority Dr Faiza Kanwal has said that as many as 2,328,972 children between 9 months to 15 years of age would get anti-Measles and Rubella vaccine in the entire district under a 13 daylong drive, starting from November 15 to 27.

Under the drive, she told APP, that 328 medical officers, 1812 skilled persons besides 1812 team assistants and 3368 social mobilizers would visit 210 Union Councils of the district, including 46 Union Councils(UC) of Metropolitan Corporation Rawalpindi (MCR), 36 tehsil Rawalpindi, 28 Rawalpindi Cantt, 33 Gujar Khan, 14 Kahutta, 11 Kalar Syeda, 10 Kotli sattian, 15 Murree and 17 Union councils of tehsil Taxila. Giving details of the number of children targeted during the drive, she informed that some 454,793 would administer the doses in the MCR area, 503,107 in tehsil Rawalpindi 419,016 in Rawalpindi Cantt. Similarly, in Gujar Khan, the number of children who would receive the vaccine was 293,328. In Kahutta, 95,036, 93,610 in Kalar Syeda and 51,408 in Kotli Sattian. In contrast, 292,081 children would receive the doses in tehsil Taxila while Murree the number was 100,593. The CEO further said Medical superintendents and Principals of government hospitals and educational institutions had provided lists of vaccinators and students enrolled in government and private schools to make the campaign successful, she added.



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Cars price hike

OR four months, the auto industry welcomed much celebration from the country when it announced a decrease in auto prices in July. Assemblers slashed prices by Rs62,000-400,000 on various locally-assembled cars and SUVs. However, as with most things to do with the economy, and following the streak of bad luck the market has been on, the bubble of low prices didn't last. Since November, assemblers have hiked up prices sharply. One of the major assemblers, Lucky Motor Corporation Limited (LMCL), increased prices ranging from Rs228,000-500,000 on locally-assembled and imported vehicles. Prices of Toyota vehicles were increased by Rs140,000-580,000 on the same day.

This is just the start—all the carmakers are predicted to follow this price hike. Regal Automobile Industries Limited (RAIL) looks geared to increase the prices of their products from Rs200,000 to 400,000. It is likely that all the other companies will follow suit.

From the looks of it, this appears to be a global trend. Globally, the transaction price of the average new vehicle has been over \$40,000 all this year and reached \$45,031 in September, amounting to an increase of \$4,872 or 12.1 percent in the past year. The rise in the price of energy, all forms of energy, has led to a global wave of inflation, and the auto industry, a stakeholder in any change in the energy industry, is no exception. However, the global rise in inflation cannot be constantly used as an excuse for the government's inaction. It is unclear whether the actions of the auto industry have been approved by the government or not. Considering the government has been making efforts in keeping local gas prices low, it cannot allow automakers to get away with this excuse of global inflation. The subsequent increase in prices of all automakers, one by one, is also worrying. Automakers still have to be brought in line, and continuing to facilitate competition is the way to go.

HE recent series of happenings on the issue of Tehreek-i-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP) have once again endorsed differences between the military establishment and government. It was necessary to stand up jointly against the irrational demands of the far-right hardliners. Political and diplomatic challenges are met ac-

cording to the international procedures and processes, not the way the hardliners demanded. After the Rangers (semi-armed force) refused to use power to disperse the TLP recent violent protests, the establishment has endorsed their stance on the TLP once again. By this, what message the establishment has conveyed to the public at home and the international community. What it has endorsed after paving a path for the TLP agreement on their terms with the government instead of snubbing them. Another stain on the uniform, one of the many in recent years.

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Pulling back from the brink

Citing a litany of crises and tensions in Central and Eastern Europe, Balkan scholar Damir Marusic warns that "the whole edifice feels rickety

HE family of nations is balancing on the edge of an abyss as mushrooming religious and ethnic intolerance becomes the norm.

Western as well as non-Western societies have helped paved the road towards the abyss: the West by abandoning the post-World War Two principle of 'Never Again' and the non-Western world by never embracing it and failing to adopt the principle of 'forgive but don't forget.'

Exasperating matters is the fact that the United States and Europe look at individual crises rather than a threatening pattern of developments. In doing so, they fail to recognise the structural problems that challenge Western values of democracy, tolerance, and pluralism.

Citing a litany of crises and tensions in Central and Eastern Europe, Balkan scholar Damir Marusic warns that "the whole edifice feels rickety. It feels like the order we have all taken for granted since the end of the Cold War is badly decaying, and has gotten so fragile that it might well shatter soon... We notice individual problems, but we don't see how it adds up, nor how we got here... We are still, in some strange way, operating as if things are more or less fine-yes, adjustments must be made, but our world is durable and sound."

Mr. Marusic argues that the rot in the system has been exasperated by the troubled US wars in Iraq and Afghanistan in the wake of the 9/11 Al-Qaeda attacks on New York and Washington. "As the final collapse of the Afghanistan project earlier this year proved, the whole optimistic premise of nation- and order-building upon which the EU project is ultimately premised was also undermined by America's failures," Mr. Marusic said.

Geopolitical battles are being fought on the backs of innocent and desperate people. They fuel tensions and threaten stability in Central and Eastern Europe and spark humanitarian catastrophe in Yemen and Afghanistan. An ethnic and religious divide characterises the tens of thousands of Middle Eastern migrants ferried by Belarus with Russian support to the Polish border. Ten British soldiers have been dispatched to the border to help Poland with fencing.

The exploitation of deep-seated religious and ethnic hostility drove Bosnian Serb leader Milorad Dodik to threaten to withdraw Serb troops from the army of Bosnia Herzegovina and create a separate Serb force. Bosnia Herzegovina was created as a federation at the end of the Bosnian war in the 1990s with Muslim, Serb and Croatian entities that enjoyed autonomy. The federation retained control of the military, top echelons of the judiciary, and tax collection. Mr. Dodik has said that the Bosnian Serb parliament would also, in what would amount to de facto secession, establish a separate Serb judiciary, and tax administration.

The writing is on the wall across the globe from the United States and Europe to Afghanistan and China. Islamophobia and anti-Semitism have become mainstream. Hindu-Muslims tensions spill across South Asian borders. Sunni Muslims persecute their Shiite brethren in Afghanistan, risking clashes between the Taliban and Iran. The Christian minority in the cradle of Abrahamic faiths has been decimated.

Men like former Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu and Republican Jews in the United States have joined thinly veiled anti-Semitic attacks on liberal philanthropist and Holocaust survivor George Soros rather than insulate their political and ideological differences with the billionaire from assaults laced with undertones of religious prejudice and racism.

Similarly, French presidential contender Eric Zemmour questions the innocence of Alfred Dreyfus, the Jewish army officer whose false conviction for treason sparked bitter controversy in the walk-up to World War One. Mr. Zemmour also rejects the notion that French collaborationist wartime leader Philippe Petain assisted in the deportation of Iews to Nazi death camps, asserting instead that Mr. Petain had saved Jews.

Finally, China has launched a frontal assault on Turkic ethnic and religious identity in the north-western province of Xinjiang that has gone largely unchallenged in the Muslim world.

At the core of the problem lie not social media that function as megaphones, aggregators and creators of echo chambers and silos rather than instigators but political, religious, ethnic, and cultural leaders who play on base instincts in pursuit of popularity and power.

Lebanon, Iraq and potentially Afghanistan are fallouts of the institutionalisation and instrumentalisation of religious and ethnic prejudice and intolerance at the expense of notions of mutual respect, adherence to human dignity and coexistence.

Sectarian warlords loot the Lebanese and Iraqi states and weaken their institutions. Recent violence in Beirut suggests that protagonists, including former Christian warlords and Shiite allies of Iran, are willing to risk a second round of civil war to secure their vested interests, sending a middle-income country spiralling into widespread poverty.

Long-term, the solution is education systems that stress the importance of humanitarian and moral values as well as religious and ethnic tolerance as the guardrails of governance and politics and ensure that ethnic and religious prejudice and racism are socially taboo attitudes.

The short-term tackling of the problem will have to involve dialogue and negotiation. A recent study showed that John F. Kennedy's decision to seek an arms control treaty rather than escalate a debilitating and risky arms race after the Soviet Union detonated the world's most powerful nuclear weapon in 1962 succeeded where accelerated conflict

Applied to religious and ethnic intolerance, lessons learnt from Mr. Kennedy's approach require that governments and religious and ethnic groups that pay lip service to interfaith and other forms of dialogue or assert that they promote democratic and humanitarian values are held to account rather than be allowed to rest on their laurels with hollow promises and declarations.

This year's chairmanship by Indonesia of the Group of 20 (G20) that brings together the world's largest economies has an opportunity to stress humanitarian and democratic values and promote a framework for dialogue. The chairmanship puts Nahdlatul Ulama, the world's largest Muslim civil society organisation that emphasises those values, on global public display given that it is poised to play a role in the G20's inter-faith tack.

Jon Grinspan, a curator of political history at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History, argued in a New York Times op-ed entitled 'The Last Time America Broke,' that the United States, despite deep-seated polarisation that has brought religious and ethnic intolerance to the forefront, had not passed the point of no return. He noted that civil society had repeatedly brought America back from the brink.

"We're not just helplessly hurtling toward inevitable civil war; we can be actors in this story. The first step is acknowledging the dangers inherent in democracy. To move forward, we should look backwards and see that we're struggling not with a collapse but with a relapse," Mr. Grinspan wrote.

It's a message that is as true for the rest of the world as it is for the United States.

What COP26 achieved — and what it didn't

ESPITE two years of international diplomacy and two weeks of intensive negotiation, Glasgow's COP26 summit was unlikely to be a decisive moment in the 25-year iourney of UN-led climate change negotiations. Sure, positive steps have been made, and the negotiations didn't collapse, a real threat at some previous COPs, such as Copenhagen in 2009. The mood in Glasgow was also lifted by a surprise US-China cooperation agreement which, while short of specifics and lacking the ambition of Washington and Beijing's pre-Paris agreement in 2015, created more political space for a Glas-

Nevertheless, even optimists must acknowledge that the event lacked the ambition needed to fulfil the promise of Paris six years ago, which set a cap on global warming of 1.5C above pre-industrial levels. Several key bodies, including the

International Energy Agency, have said that if all the commitments announced wereimplemented in full – a huge "if" – global temperatures could be limited to just under 2C.

However, Selwin Hart, the UN assistant secretary-general for climate change, has challenged such forecasts and asserted that the world is still on a "catastrophic" course to well over 2C. He highlighted a gloomy UN assessment of the 2030 picture, which indicates global emissions are on track to rise by 13.7 percent, a huge gap to bridge between today's policies and action and long-term ambitions, and warned: "We cannot celebrate before we've done the job."

This confusing picture is one key reason why it is likely that there will be divergent views of COP26'sachievements. The only certainty is that there is no room for complacency, and the best that can perhaps be said is the event brought greater definition to the roadmap needed to keep 1.5C alive as the COP presidency baton is handed to Egypt in 2022 and the UAE in 2023.

A fundamental question now is what needs to change to get even more traction, with the clock ticking toward what scientists warn are dangerous levels of climate change. After all, Egypt will not be able to mobilise the same diplomatic resources for COP27 as the UK did, despite the uneven commitment of Boris Johnson's government.

The answer is complex, but an increasing number in the international community perceive that there may now be a three-year window of opportunity, while President Joe Biden remains in office, to act in what he has called a decisive decade. After January 2025, when Biden's term ends, the election of a Republican climate-skeptic president - possibly even Donald Trump - cannot be ruled out.

Post-Glasgow, there is much needed to build irresistible momentum in future talks. This includes high levels of business engagement, which was one of the key themes of Glasgow. On Friday, for instance, the Investor Group on Climate Change

- 733 major institutional investors worth more than \$52 trillion dollars, more than half of all the assets under management globally - called on countries to go further with negotiating texts, including ending fossil fuel subsidies.

This underlines that, ultimately, the world's success in tackling climate change rests on deep, collaborative partnerships across the public and private sectors, with each challenging the other to deliver greater ambition. To enable this, greater clarity is needed on the post-Glasgow roadmap so that action can be taken, decisively and immediately, right across society.

This highlights the critical importance – now, not decades later - of implementation after what is sometimes seen as a half dozen lost years of delivery after Paris. One of the key lessons of that period is that implementation of climate deals is best achieved through national laws as country emission commitments are most credible and durable if they are backed up by legislation.

In the US, part of the reason Trump was able to unravel Barack Obama's Paris ratification so easily is that it was politically impossible to have the treaty approved by Congress. Obama therefore embedded the agreement through executive order, which Trump rescinded, before Biden reinstated it.

Compared to executive orders and other regulatory devices, legislation is more difficult to roll back. This is especially so when it is supported by well informed, cross-party politicians who can put in place a credible set of policies and measures to ensure effective implementation.

While we are not yet close to meeting 1.5C, these domestic legal frameworks are potentially crucial building blocks to measure, report, verify and manage emissions. The ambition must now be that they are replicated in even more countries, and progressively ratcheted up, creating a global sustainability framework for billions across the world.

Queen Elizabeth suffers **'sprained**

LONDON: Queen Elizabeth II has a "sprained back" Buckingham Palace said, and had to miss Sunday's Remembrance service in London - her first planned public appearance since resting on medical advice.

The ceremony honouring fallen troops is close to the monarch's heart and her absence will deepen concerns over her health after she stepped back on medical advice at the end of last month and spent a night in hospital undergoing unspecified

She then resumed "light duties", but pulled out of a scheduled attendance at the UN climate change summit in Glasgow after being ad vised to rest.

Queen, sprained her back, has decided this morning with great regret that she will not be able to attend today's Remembrance Sunday Service at the Cenotaph," a palace statement said.

"Her Majesty is disappointed that she will miss the service.'

Her son Prince Charles placed a wreath on her behalf, as in previous years. It is only the seventh time she has missed the service in almost 70 years on the throne, with the previous six due to either pregnancy or foreign visits.

A two-day trip to Northern Ireland was also shelved as was her appearance Tuesday at the General Synod, the national assembly of the Church of England which she heads. - APP

TUNIS: Tunisian police have clashed with protesters near the chamber of the suspended parliament as demonstrators marched against President Kais Saied's seizure of political power four months ago.

Hundreds of police had blocked off the area where thousands of protesters were gathering on Sunday to demand that Saied restore the parliament and normal democratic rule. Increasingly vocal opposition, along with a looming crisis in public finances, may pose a new test of how Saied and the new government he has appointed will tackle threats to their authority.

"Shut down Kais Saied" and "Freedom! Freedom! End the police state!" protesters chanted as they pulled down barriers obstructing the roads leading to the parliament building at the capital's Bardo palace, leading to clashes.

"We are under one-man rule since July 25 ... we will stay here until they open the roads and end the siege," Jawher Ben Mbarek, a protest leader, told Media.

Saied seized nearly all powers in July, suspending the parliament and dismissing the government in a move his critics called a coup, before installing a new prime minister and announcing he could rule by decree.

The president said his actions were needed to end governmental paralysis after years of political squabbling and economic stagnation, and has promised to uphold rights and freedoms won in the 2011 revolution that brought democracy.

His moves appeared to have widespread

popularity and thousands of his supporters gathered for a rally to back him last month. However, several prominent politicians have been arrested and hundreds have faced travel bans, while a former president living outside Tunisia, Moncef Marzouki, faces prosecution for his verbal attacks on Saied.

Journalist Elizia Volkmann, reporting from the protests near parliament, said the police have "completely blocked" the area around the building and have established checkpoints but that there is still a "slow and steady stream" of people seeking to join the demonstrations.

"A lot of protesters have large printed placards or pictures of journalists and members of parliament, lawyers, who have been arrested or imprisoned since July 25," Volkmann said

"They want to return to normal functioning of parliament," she added. "They want to return to the 2014 constitution, they want Kais Saied to step down and they would like to see new ... [presidential and legislative] elections held.

While demonstrators who attend anti-government protests are usually identified as supporters of the Ennahdha party, which was the biggest party in the now-suspended parliament, Volkmann said the crowd in Sunday's rally was "very diverse".

Ben Mbarek, a member of an initiative called Citizens against the Coup, which called for the protests on Sunday, said at a news conference that Tunisian authorities are "restricting travel" and limiting "modes of transport" in Tunis in a bid to prevent people from attending the rally - a move he said violated freedom of expression.

PARIS: World champions France booked their place at next year's World Cup in Qatar in style as Kylian Mbappe fired in four goals in an 8-0 thrashing of Kazakhstan at the Parc des Princes on Saturday.

Karim Benzema scored twice and there were further goals for Adrien Rabiot and Antoine Griezmann whose penalty marked his 42nd goal for France, taking him ahead of Michel Platini. Only Thierry Henry (51) and Olivier Giroud (46) have scored more for France. The French will be joined at the finals by

neighbours Belgium as the world's top-ranked team saw off Estonia 3-1 in Brussels to ensure top spot in Group E ahead of Gareth Bale's Wales who beat Belarus 5-1 in Cardiff.

The Netherlands, who missed out on the 2018 World Cup, looked on course to join them as they led Montenegro 2-0 going into the last 10 minutes of their encounter in Podgorica. However, the Dutch conceded two goals in the last 10 minutes to draw 2-2. They still top Group G but are just two points ahead of Turkey and Norway.

On the sixth anniversary of the 2015 attacks in Paris which claimed the lives of 130 people, France put on a spectacular ball rolling when he put the world champions ahead after just six minutes. The Paris Saint-Germain star, playing on

his home ground, added a second six minutes later and completed his first hat-trick

Leading 3-0 at the break, France turned up the heat even more in the second half as Benzema struck twice before Rabiot and Griezmann had their moments in the spotlight.



It was fitting that Mbappe had the final say, stroking home his fourth to complete the rout three minutes from time. France top Group D, leaving Finland and Ukraine to scrap over second place.

"A World Cup is a dream, an aim, it's everything and it's a unique chance to play in a team that can win it. We're going over there to win it," Mbappe said.

The Finns have a two-point advantage going into the final round of matches after seeing off Bosnia-Herzegovina 3-1. The Finns had Jukka Raitala sent off before half-time but goals from Brentford forward Marcus Forss, Robin Lod and Daniel O'Shaughnessy sealed the win.

Belgium had dropped just a single point in qualifying up to this point and knew that victory over Estonia would guarantee them top spot in Group E. Manager Roberto Martinez, however, was without first-choice strikers Romelu Lukaku, Mitchy Batshuayi and Touri Tielemans who were all injured.

That meant a call-up for Christian Benteke and the Crystal Palace forward did not disappoint, taking his chance to press his claims by netting the opener after just 11 minutes.

"I know I'm only the third choice in the hierarchy of the forwards but I'm not giving up." said Benteke.

Ecuador prison clash kills 68

BOGOTA: At least 68 prisoners were killed and 12 others injured in prison violence in Ecuador on Saturday. According to local media, riots and clashes broke out at the Litoral Penitentia ry in the city of Guayaquil. Gunshots and explosions continue to be heard from the prison.

A large number of soldiers and police were assigned to control the incidents in the prison. The authorities will reportedly hold a news conference regarding the events during the day.

Local media said the conflict emerged due to leadership struggle between gangs and prison conditions.

Speaking at a news conference on Sept. 31, President Guillermo Lasso declared a state of emergency in all prisons in the country for 60 days.

- Prison violence in Ecuador Incidents between gangs sometimes result in riots in Ecuador's prisons, where there are nearly 38,000 detainees. Some 80 prisoners died in the riots that erupted simultaneously in three cities in the country on Feb. 24.

US military hide 'war crime' in Syria: Report

WASHINGTON: The U.S. military covered up 2019 airstrikes in Syria that killed up to 64 women and children, a possible war crime, during the battle against Islamic State, the New York Times reported on Saturday.

The two back-to-back airstrikes near the town of Baghuz were ordered by a classified American special operations unit tasked with ground operations in Syria, according to the report. The newspaper said that U.S.

Central Command, which oversaw U.S. air operations in Syria, acknowledged the strikes for the first time this week and said they were justified.

In a statement on Saturday, Central Command reiterated the account it gave the newspaper that 80 people were killed in the strikes including 16 Islamic State fighters and four civilians. The military said it was unclear if the other 60 people were civilians, partly because women and children could have been combatants.

In Saturday's statement, the

military said the strikes were armed women and at least one "legitimate self-defense," proportional and that "appropriate steps were taken to rule out the presence of civilians."

"We abhor the loss of innocent life and take all possible measures to prevent them. In this case, we self-reported and investigated the strike according to our own evidence and take full responsibility for the unintended loss of life," Central Com-

The number of civilians among the 60 fatalities could not be determined because "multiple

armed child were observed" in video of the events, it said, adding that the majority of the 60 were likely combatants.

Central Command said the strikes took place while Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) were under heavy fire and in danger of being overrun and the SDF had reported the area clear of civilians.

The Defense Department's inspector general launched an inquiry into the March 18, 2019, incident, but its report was ultimately "stripped" of any mention of the bombing and a

thorough, independent probe never took place, according to the Times. The newspaper said its report was based on confidential documents and descriptions of classified reports, as well as interviews with personnel directly involved.

An Air Force lawyer present in the operations center at the time believed the strikes were possible war crimes and later alerted the Defense Department's inspector general and the Senate Armed Services Committee when no action was taken, the Times said

5 killed as thousands rally in Sudan

KHARTOUM: The death toll during the protests against the military ruling in Sudan's nationwide demonstrations increased to five. while 20 people have been injured, according to the Central Committee of the Sudanese Doctors (CCSD) on Saturday.

Nationwide demonstrations rocked the capital Khartoum and other cities against the coup and in support of the dissolved civilian government. "As the death toll of today's

protests increased to 5 and dozens injured in different parts of Khartoum and other cities, we are calling on the human rights organization in order to follow up and monitor the violence used against the protesters," the CCSD said in a statement.

Thousands of Sudanese protesters took to the streets on Saturday against the head of Sudan's ruling military council, Gen. Abdel Fattah al-Burhan.

Eyewitnesses in different neighborhoods told Anadolu Agency that the police and security organs have used tear gas and live bullets against the protesters. Saturday's rallies were

called by the Sudanese Professionals Association, which is leading the protests, to demand civilian rule. The activist movement was key in organizing protests that led to the ouster of long-serving President Omar Al-Bashir in 2019.

UAE aviation authority issues warning to PIA, other airlines

KARACHI: After the detection of COVID-19 in passengers from Pakistan, the Abu Dhabi airport officials issued a warning to the Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) and other airlines.

The Emirati civil aviation authority issued new instructions for Pakistan, stating that the concerned airline will face a ban on flights for two days after the detection of coronavirus among seven of its

The ban will be extended to one week if the airport authorities detected seven or more coronavirus cases twice a week. Following the ban, the airline's flights will be restricted to making landings at the UAE airports. It further stated to conduct mandatory coronavirus tests and PCR reports of all passengers at the flights. Earlier in September, Pakistan had issued new guide-

Pakistani passengers will be given booster shots of the COVID-19 vaccine while the travellers will have to pay additional charges for getting vaccinated with vaccines from different companies.

istered COVID-19 booster shots.

The booster shots will be administered to the passengers who are holding education, business and tourism visas.

The travellers aged between 12 and 17 will be administered single-dose vaccines, whereas, those aged 18 or above will be given booster shots of vaccines from three companies. The new guidelines had also provided details regarding the payments and travel documents as the outbound passengers will have to submit a challan worth Rs1,270. The health authorities had established vaccination centres for administering booster shots.

Three centres were established in Karachi, one each in Hyderabad and Sukkur, one each in Azad Jammu and Kashmir's Mirpur, Muzaffarabad, Gilgit, Islamabad, two in Lahore, one each in Faisalabad, Multan, Sialkot, Rawalpindi, Peshawar, Mingora, Dera Ismail Khan, Abbottabad and Quetta.

COP26 outcome not enough: UN chief

NEW YORK: UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said Saturday that the outcome of the UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow, Scotland, or COP26, is not enough.

"The approved texts are a compromise. They reflect the interests, the conditions, the contradictions and the state of political will in the world today. They take important steps. But unfortunately, the collective political will was not enough to overcome some deep contradictions," he said in a statement on the conclusion of COP26.

"Science tells us that the absolute priority must be rapid, deep and sustained emissions reductions in this decade, specifically, a 45-percent cut by 2030 compared to 2010 levels. But the present set of Nationally Determined Contributions, even if fully implemented, will still increase emissions this decade on a pathway that will clearly lead us to well above 2 degrees by the end of the century

compared to pre-industrial levels," he said. He welcomed the agreement between the United States and China in Glasgow that pledges to accelerate action to reduce emissions in the 2020s.

To help lower emissions in many other emerging economies, there is a need to build coalitions of support including developed countries, financial institutions, those with the technical know-how. This is crucial to help each of those emerging countries speed the transition from coal and accelerate the greening of their economies, he said.

"I want to make a particular appeal for our future work in relation to adaptation and the issue of loss and damage,' said Guterres. "Adaptation isn't a technocratic issue, it is life or death. Protecting countries from climate disaster is not charity. It is solidarity and enlightened self-interest."

"We have another climate crisis today. A climate of mistrust is enveloping our globe. Climate action can help rebuild trust and restore credibility. That means finally delivering on the 100-bil-



climate finance commitment to developing countries. No more IOUs, It means measuring progress, updating climate plans every year and raising ambition ... And it means, beyond the mechanisms already set out in the Paris Agreement, establishing clear standards to measure and analyze net-zero commitments from non-state

He said COP26 created some building blocks for progress: commitments to end deforestation, to drastically reduce methane emissions, to mobilize private finance around net-zero emissions. And the texts today reaffirm resolve toward the 1.5-degree

goal, boost climate finance

for adaptation, recognize the need to strengthen support for vulnerable countries suffering from irreparable climate damage. And for the first time they encourage international financial institutions to consider climate vulnerabilities in concessional financial and other forms of support, including Special Drawing Rights. And finally, they close the Paris rule book with agreement on carbon markets and transparency, he noted. The UN chief re-

mained cautiously optimistic about the future. "Success or failure is not an act of nature. It's in our hands. The path of progress is not always a straight line. Sometimes there are detours. Sometimes there are ditches. As the great Scottish writer Robert Louis Stevenson said: 'Don't judge each day by the harvest you reap, but by the seeds that you plant.' We have many more seeds to plant along the path. We won't reach our destination in one day or one conference. But I know we can get there. We are in the fight of our lives," he said. "COP27 starts now."

KUWAIT: Kuwait's Emir Sheikh Nawaf al-Ahmed al-Sabah accepted on Sunday the resignation of the government, state news agency KUNA reported, as the oil-rich country's rulers seek to end a feud with lawmakers that has hindered fiscal reforms.

Minister Sheikh Prime Sabah al-Khalid al-Sabah submitted on Nov. 8 the resignation of his cabinet, formed in March.

An Emiri decree asked the outgoing government to remain in a caretaker capacity until a new cabinet is formed, KUNA said.

The disagreement centres on the prime minister having been granted temporary immunity by parliament protecting him against questioning from MPs on issues including handling the COV-ID-19 pandemic and corruption until the end of 2022. It has hindered efforts to boost state finances - hit hard last year by low oil prices and the pandemic - and enact a debt law needed to tap global markets.

At least one dead as twin quakes hit Iran

TEHRAN: Two strong earthquakes struck southern Iran within 90 seconds Sunday, killing at least one person and sparking scenes of panic, official sources said.

The 6.4 and 6.3 magnitude earthquakes hit at a depth of 15 kilometres (9.3 miles) in Hormozgan province, the Iranian seismological centre said. A 22-year-old man was killed by a falling electricity pole, Iranian Red Crescent chief Mehdi Valipour told state television. He said several teams have been deployed to assess the damage public broadcaster aired live footage from the area showing trucks stopped on the road, having been shaken by the tremor. In a video broadcast on state television purportedly of an aftershock, a man is heard saying: "Look what the quake did to the mountains... another earthquake, it's shaking the trucks and flattening the mountains." Walls of buildings cracked in the southern port city Bandar Abbas, the capital of Hormozgan province, local governor Azizollah Konari told journalists. "The earthquakes lasted a long time and frightened people," state television said.

The United States Geological Survey (USGS) measured the tremors at magnitudes of 6 and 6.3. - APP

Russia starts supplying S-400 missile to India

MOSCOW: Russia has started supplying India with S-400 air defence missile systems, Russian news agencies reported on Sunday citing Dmitry Shugayev, the head of the Russian military cooperation agency.

The supplies put India at risk of sanctions from the United States under a 2017 US law aimed at deterring countries from buying Russian military hardware.

"The first supplies have already been started," Interfax cited Shugayev as saying on Sunday at an aerospace trade show in Dubai.

He said that the first unit of an S-400 systems will arrive in India by the end of this year. The \$5.5 billion deal for five long-range surface-to-air missile systems, which India says it needs to counter a threat from China,

was signed in 2018. India faces a range of financial sanctions from the United States under Countering America's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act (CAATSA), which names Russia an adversary alongside North Korea and Iran for its actions against Ukraine, interference in the US 2016 elections and help to Syria.

ISLAMABAD: Palestinian Ambassador Ahmed Rabei on Sunday expressed his country's resolve to enhance existing bilateral ties with Pakistan in multi-sectors and take them to the optimum level for the benefit of the people of both countries.

Ambassador Rabei said that the Palestinian government was working out traders and chamber of commerce level collaboration with Pakistan whereas a separate economic desk was also established at the Foreign Ministry of Pakistan.

Palestine, he said has huge religious and heritage tourism potential with over 22,000 heritage sites registered in the UNESCO. Moreover, the Al-Aqsa Mosque is the first qibla (point of direction to offer prayer) as the Muslims go to Kingdom of Saudi Arabia (KSA) to perform Hajj should also visit their first Qibla.

In a contrast, he mentioned that almost four million Christians visited Bethlehem and Nasra for religious tourism whereas only half a million Muslims visited Al-Aqsa Mosque.

"Palestine is the conduit of Asia, Europe and Africa which historically has imprints of various nations interactions, culture and traditions due to their invasions on their land," Ambassador Rabei said. The Palestinians possessed a culturally diverse background and were flexible and easily adaptable to intricate and challenging environments.

The entire Middle East and surrounding region's first ever airport was established in Palestine whereas the region's first Radio station was also established here which was headed by a Palestinian women that indicated the level of women liberty and empowerment back in the early twentieth century era before British and Zionist Occupation.

"Most of the early educationists in KSA and Kuwait were Palestinians that were highly educated and intellectually rich people in the entire region. We had the first school of the region in Palestine in 1921," he underscored.

The fishermen were arrested by the Pakistan Maritime Security Force (PMSF) and handed over to the dock police for illegally fishing in Pakistani waters.

Austria approves lockdown for unvaccinated

VIENNA: Austrian Chancellor Alexander Schallenberg announced on Sunday that a lockdown for unvaccinated people will begin on Monday.

'We must raise the vaccination rate. It is shamefully low," Schallenberg told a news conference announcing the new measure.

People who have not been vaccinated against COVID will only be allowed to leave their homes for specific purposes, like going to a doctor, getting groceries, going to work - or getting vaccinated.

There will be random checks to ensure compliance, according to the decision from a meeting of Schallenberg and the heads of the country's state governments.

COP 26 ends with global pledge to speed up action on climate change

ISLAMABAD: The 26th global United Nations climate summit came to a successful conclusion in the UK with a global agreement to accelerate action on climate change this decade. Nearly 200 countries agreed the "Glasgow Climate Pact" to keep 1.5C alive, but it will only be delivered with a huge global effort.

Agreements made at COP26 include 130 countries across the globe, including Pakistan, committing to end and reverse deforestation, along with cutting methane emissions by 30% by the year 2030. Around 30 big Pakistani businesses signed

26for26 campaign pledging to halve their carbon emissions by 2030 and to achieve net zero by 2050. Last week, the UK announced more than £55 million to help Pakistan build its resilience to the impacts of climate change, manage water more sustainably and unlock climate investment. Pakistan is ranked as the 8th most vulnerable country to climate change

Pakistan has said it aims to produce 60% of its energy from renewable sources by 2030 and has committed to not importing any new coal.

When the UK took on the COP26 leadership role nearly two years ago, only 30% of the world was covered by net zero targets. This figure is now at around 90%. Over the same period, 154 Parties have submitted new national targets, representing 80% of global emis-

The UK Presidency has also been focused on driving action to deliver emissions reductions. We have seen a huge shift in coal, with many more countries committing to phase out unabated coal power and ending international coal financing. While on the world's roads, the transition to zero emissions vehicles is gathering pace, with some of the largest car manufacturers working together to make all new car sales zero emission by 2040 and by 2035 in leading markets. Countries and cities are following suit with ambitious petrol and diesel car phase out dates.

COP26 was the largest international event of its kind ever held in the UK with more than 25,000 delegates convening in the city of Glasgow, including world leaders, opinion formers and top businesses.

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
