3 dead in Nangarhar mosque blast

NANGARHAR: At least three people were killed and 15 wounded on Friday by a blast at a mosque in Afghanistan's restive Nangarhar province, a hotbed of activity for the militant Islamic State (IS) group, officials said. The blast - for which no group has yet claimed responsibility - underscores one of the many challenges facing the new Taliban regime in Afghanistan, with the United Nations warning the country is also on the brink of the world's worst humanitarian crisis. It happened during Friday prayers in Spin Ghar district of the eastern province, near the border with Pakistan. "I can confirm a blast during Friday prayers inside a mosque in Spin Ghar district. There are casualties and fatalities," a Taliban official told AFP. - Agencies



Tomato made Rs23 pricier this week

KARACHI: The weekly inflation has noted 1.81 per cent increase across the country with 30 essential food items recording an increase to a point that just a kilogram of tomatoes was made Rs23 pricier, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics reported Friday. The PBS report noted a record 17.37 pc yearly inflation in the country based on data it collected from 50 markets across 17 Pakistan cities.

The Sensitive Price Index -a weekly inflationary indicator that measures the change in the cost of a fixed basket of goods- for the current week ended on 11th November recorded an increase of 1.81 pc, said the PBS weekly report. – **DNA**



Expressing concern over the 40,000 deaths due to breast cancer every year, she told that it was the time for the women to realise the gravity of the situation and be concerned about their health. She said the survival rate of breast cancer patients across the globe was about 95-98 percent compared with 45 percent in Pakistan due to late diagnosis.

First Lady, who is leading the nationwide breast cancer awareness campaign, urged the women in the country to get to know the symptoms of breast cancer and practice every month the five-minute routine of self-examination.

Early diagnosis is the best cure against breast cancer instead of the expensive and painful treatment at later stages of the disease, Samina Alvi said, informing that in Pakistan with 100,000 new cancer patients every year, breast cancer was most prevalent as compared to its other forms. She informed that a healthy lifestyle, balanced diet, and physical exercise could improve the health of women and could also contribute to minimizing the chances of a fatal disease. She stressed upon men to extend support to women in their families suffering from breast cancer or in need of medical advice.

ISLAMABAD: A high-level delegation from global venture capital firm 500 Global visited the Special Technology Zones Authority (STZA) in Islamabad to meet with Chairman STZA Mr. Amer Hashmi and his team. Sleep disorders linked to Covid: Study

ISLAMABAD:A new research has shown a 31 per cent increased risk for hospitalisation and mortality n patients with sleep-disordered breathing and sleep-related hypoxia. The findings of the study were published in the journal 'JAMA Network Open'. The research team, led by Reena Mehra, MD, analysed retrospective data from 5,400 Cleveland Clinic patients, Medical Daily reported. The findings showed that while patients with sleep-disordered breathing and sleep-related hypoxia do not have an increased risk of developing COVID-19, they have a worse clinical prognosis from the disease. As the COVID-19 pandemic

continues and the disease remains highly variable from patient to patient, it is critical to improving our ability to predict who will have a more severe illness so that we can appropriately allocate resources," said Dr Mehra, director of Sleen Disorder Research at Cleveland Clinic, American academic medical center based in Cleveland, Ohio. - APP

the residential sector only three times a day with the 'bare minimum supply of liquefied natural gas (LNG)' during December through March of upcoming winter to minimise gas shortages in the country. This is part of the Gas Load Management Plan for winter 2021-22 presented to the Cabinet Committee on Energy (CCoE) at a meeting presided over by Minister for Planning and Development Asad Umar. "Gas to residential sector shall be provided three times a day for cooking only," the meeting was informed by the Ministry of Energy (Petroleum Division), adding that "RLNG diversion [to domestic consumers] to be made bare minimum keeping in view the operational stability of the system". It reported lower LNG availability in the coming months, particularly January, February and March. However, the Petroleum Division showed relatively smaller deficits against the demand based on clear intention that the bare minimum LNG would be allowed to flow to the residential sector. With these principles in mind, total shortfalls in December would be around 22mmcfd (million cubic feet per day), increasing to 137mmcfd in January and then going down to 75mmcfd in February and March. The meeting was informed that gas supply to dedicated consumers - power and fertiliser sectors – on independent system outside the national pipeline network was expected to remain stable without any unforeseen eventuality. In this category, the supply and demand would remain unchanged and range between 1,061 and 1,200 million cubic feet. In the pipeline network, power plants on the SNGPL system will be provided RLNG as per the actual consumption of winter of last year with five per cent more supplies and any deficit will be recouped through furnace oil. Fertiliser plants on both SSGCL and SNGPL systems are expected to operate uninterrupted and any local gas or imported RLNG diverted from captive power plants of the exports sector after switching to power grid will be supplied to the export industry. - DNA

Pakistan has highest diabetes prevalence

ISLAMABAD: Ahead of World Diabetes Day, the International Diabetes Federation (IDF) has released new figures showing that the prevalence of diabetes in Pakistan has increased significantly as 33 million adults in Pakistan are now living with diabetes a 70% increase since 2019. According to IDF, in 2021, diabetes will be responsible for 400,000 deaths in the country- the highest number in the Middle-East and North Africa Region. These findings from the 10th Edition of the IDF Diabetes Atlas, which will be published on December 6th, report that one in four adults (26.7%) in Pakistan are living with diabetes - the highest national prevalence in the world.

Pakistan now has the third highest number of people living with diabetes in the world, after China (141 million) and India (74 million). An additional 11 million adults in Pakistan have Impaired Glucose Tolerance (IGT), which places them at high risk of developing type 2 diabetes. More than a quarter (26.9%)

of adults living with diabetes in Pakistan are undiagnosed. When diabetes is undetected or inadequately treated, people with diabetes are at risk of serious and life-threatening complications, such as heart attack, stroke, kidney failure, blindness and lower-limb amputation. These result in reduced quality of life and higher healthcare costs. IDF says that 537 million

adults are now living with diabetes worldwide - a rise of 16% (74 million) since the previous IDF estimates in 2019. "The rapidly rising level of diabetes in Pakistan presents a significant challenge to the health and wellbeing of individuals and families in the country," says Professor Abdul Basit, Director, Bagai Institute of Diabetology and Endocrinology, Baqai Medical

He said, "I urge both the front line workers to work with dedication and the caregivers to express their support by vaccinating their children against the diseases. "Measles and rubella are a couple of devastating diseases that cause severe sickness

and can take lives," said Dr. Muhammad Akram Shah, National Programme Manager, Expanded Programme on Immunization (EPI).

In recent years cases have surged dramatically in Pakistan. "Measles cases rose alarmingly affecting thousands of children and claiming many young lives. We need to vaccinate every child", said Dr. Shah.

He said that the campaign will be conducted in public and private health facilities, outreach centres as well as educational facilities, for 12 days from November 15 to November 27. Nearly half of the children who are to be immunized are enrolled in schools.

The MR vaccine will be available in the routine immunization schedule children at nine months and 15 months of age.

"The Measles and Rubella campaign will move us not only one step closer to maintaining measles elimination and accelerating rubella control, but also one step closer to reducing the overall child mortality across Pakistan. Every child has the right to access life-saving healthcare," said Dr. Palitha Mahipala, WHO Repre-

Unrest in IIOJK

THE situation is tragic indeed as twelve people have lost their lives since last month. 911 Helpline

OVERNMENT helpline numbers can be a useful way to speed up state response to emergencies and disasters, and prove an accessible outlet for help. The introduction of emergency response helplines has been a good utility in Pakistan as well, aiding Covid-19 patients, victims of crime, victims of domestic violence, mental health patients and so on. Pakistan now aims to go beyond the various different helplines introduced and converge them all into one national response center. The government is set to launch an all-in-one emergency helpline 911 to swiftly respond to calls for help across the country. The 911 number is modelled after the hugely successful 911 helpline in the United States. This was a plan which had been set in gear since August, with the National Telecommunication Corporation (NTC) and the Digital Pakistan initiative of the IT ministry working on an effective digital platform for emergency response. Now, three months later, the helpline has finally been made functional. According to Deputy Commissioner (DC) Hamza Shafqat, the caller will only have to dial 911 and it will be routed to the concerned emergency response department.

This is clearly a more convenient way of doing things. Almost every citizen previously must have had a moment of confusion while dialling an emergency response number considering the various departments with their specific numbers—the emergency rescue service is 1122, fire service is 16, police helpline is 15 while Covid-19 helpline is 1166. Unarguably, remembering one helpline number, that too 911, is much easier and effective, especially in emergencies where time is of the essence. However, as mentioned, this does require a lot of good digital skills and organisation. The NTC and the IT ministry appear to have put in effort but it is hoped that the final central system, responsible for routing and directing the calls, is organised and effective. If consolidation leads to slower response time and loss of information, the benefits of this initiative are lost.

Biden should reject US return to Iran nuclear deal

RAN has been dominating the news over the past month. It all started with the recent conflict between Lebanon and the Gulf states over controversial televised comments made by Lebanese Information Minister George Kordahi. Even though Kordahi's remarks were made a month before he became a member of a Christian party allied to Hezbollah, the Gulf countries are fed up dealing with a nation con-

trolled by an Iranian proxy.

In Iraq, Prime Minister Mustafa Al-Kadhimi on Sunday survived an assassination attempt made using Iranian-made drones while he was at his residence in Baghdad's heavily fortified Green Zone. The attack followed direct threats made by pro-Iran Shiite militia leader Qais Al-Khazali of the Asa'ib Ahl Al-Haq group, which is designated as a foreign terrorist organization by the US.

Meanwhile, debates on whether the Biden administration should revive the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, also known as the Iran nuclear deal, continue in Washington.

Members of the Republican Party have accused President Joe Biden of ignoring the hostile attitude of the Iranian regime toward the US and its allies abroad in order to fulfill his campaign promise of returning to the JCPOA. A US garrison at Al-Tanf in Syria was last month attacked by a drone, while an Israeli-managed commercial oil tanker was targeted in the Gulf of Oman in July. Tehran has been accused of being behind both attacks.

Seventeen Republican lawmakers last week sent a letter to the White House urging the president to desist from continuing diplomatic talks with Tehran and not to reward Iran for its violent behavior. They said Biden was sending a dangerous message to America's friends and adversaries alike that Washington is willing to lift sanctions and negotiate with the world's largest state sponsor of terrorism as it attacks their country, in reference to the Al-Tanf attack. "This attack is yet another reminder that your administration is setting the wrong priorities by working to re-enter the Iran nuclear deal. If Iran is willing to engage in this kind of behavior while negotiations are still ongoing, imagine the respect they will have for any agreement once the ink is dry," the letter read. It added that the administration continues to weaken America's ability to combat the Iranian regime by lifting sanctions.

"The Biden administration has to walk a fine line between demonstrating to Iran that Tehran will benefit from sanctions relief if the deal is restored, while not giving in to Iranian leverage," she said.

While Tehran seeks the lifting of all sanctions, this month's decision by the US Treasury Department to impose sanctions on two Iranian entities and four individuals makes it clear that this option will not be available, which should push Iran to soften its language. Would it consider that? Absolutely not.

Iranian Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian criticized the US decision on Twitter, writing: "The White House calls for negotiations with Iran and claims to be ready to return to the JCPOA. Yet it simultaneously imposes new sanctions on Iranian individuals and entities. The purpose of negotiations is not talking for the sake of talking, but to achieve tangible results on the basis of respect for mutual interests."

So how should the Biden administration deal with the Iranian nuclear file? With the support of the Republicans, the president should abandon his campaign promise to revive the deal and explain the decision to his base by highlighting all the Iranian atrocities against the US, its allies and the millions of innocent people around the world, while tightening the sanctions on the Tehran government.

Learning from Iraq, forced government change from outside will not benefit either country. However, the US supporting regime change would give the Iranian opposition inside the country motivation for demonstrations and civil disobedience. It almost happened in 2009 and it could happen again in 2021. Biden needs to find the courage to take a stand against the people that are pushing him to sign a new deal with Iran.

The climate crisis is about the Global South's present

COP26 has been criticised as the most "exclusionary" summit ever for civil society organisations, people from the Global South and those with disabilities. OP26 in Glasgow, Scotland, was an event where less than 0.0004 percent of the population met to negotiate our lives. World leaders, through their decisions on how to limit global heating, are the powers deciding who gets to live and who gets to die. Keeping temperature rise below 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 degrees Fahrenheit) is not negotiable, and yet, we are not on track to meet it. According to Climate Action Tracker, even with the targets pledged during COP26 we will be heading towards 2.4C (4.3F) of warming.

Amid this, COP26 has been criticised as the most "exclusionary" summit ever for civil society organisations, people from the Global South and those with disabilities. COP26 Coalition, a UK-based civil society coalition of environment NGOs said twothirds of the people who it was helping travel to Glasgow were unable to make it because of visa restrictions, accreditation problems and COVID-19 vaccine inequity as a result of uneven access to vaccines. This was especially harsh on the Global South, with many people denied a seat at the table. Activists from the Global South who managed to be at COP26 despite these hurdles have been cut out of pictures and excluded by the media. The exclusion of the Global South is a common theme in climate conversations and negotiations.

When we are excluded, our voices are silenced, our experiences go unheard and the reality of the climate situation in the Global South is blurred. This exclusion becomes a refusal to acknowledge the proximity of the climate crisis and casts it as a problem of the future when millions are dying today. Young people around the world are anxious about the future, and rightfully so, but a warped focus on it suggests that the general populace would rather care about white children's future than the Black, Brown and

Indigenous children's present. If this is to

continue, then we have already lost. In my country, India, the climate crisis is an unwanted caller that has taken up space in our homes. She is not scheduled to arrive at a later date – she is already here. The world is currently at 1.2C (2.2F) above preindustrial levels and this is already brutal for so many people in India. Less than 50 percent of Indians have access to safe drinking water. Droughts, coupled with increasing demand and terrible groundwater management, make access to this water even harder. Lack of safe water means lack of sanitation, especially during a pandemic.

For some villages, droughts are becoming a way of life. Some 20 percent of the country faces drought-like conditions.

Elsewhere, there is extreme rainfall. Just last month, the southern state of Kerala experienced flooding and landslides due to heavy rainfall. This killed 42 people and stranded thousands. In northern India, heavy rain battered the state of Uttarakhand, causing flooding and killing at least 46 people. In my city, Bengaluru, the airport was flooded due to unprecedented rains.

We in India have experienced most of the

morbid climate calamities on the menu ranging from cyclones, floods, and land-slides to heatwaves and drought just this year. We know what it feels like to be affected by the climate crisis in numbing detail. I first noticed the preoccupation with the future among activists at Fridays for Future International when I joined the movement in 2019. Our campaigns and conversations focused on the future, and they did not measure up to the emotion of marginalised communities, such as the ancient tribes who have had their land snatched and laid siege to in the name of coal in India's Has-

deo forest, or people who have watched

their homes wash away in floods. Our messaging did not even come close to covering what it means to be an Adivasi (Indigenous) activist like HidmeMarkam who was imprisoned earlier this year and charged under counterterrorism legislation used to punish environmental defenders. The 28-year-old land and women's rights activist had been protesting against extractive mining and for locals' rights as well as fighting for Adivasis jailed on false charges. Environmental activists including myself (I was jailed for 10 days and released on bail in February during the ongoing farmer protests) are punished by the Indian government for asking for a liveable planet. SudhaBharadwaj, a trade union activist, lawyer, and teacher turned 60 in jail the day Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced India's commitments at COP26, with pledges including carbon neutrality by 2070 and an increase in the share of electricity generated by solar, wind, and other non-fossil fuel sources. Bharadwaj has worked to secure better wages for workers and land rights for Adivasis but was accused of being a Maoist with plans to overthrow the government. More than three years after her arrest, her

trial is yet to start. On the same day as Modi's announcement, a group of more than 50 Adivasis in Chhattisgarh state walked 30km (19 miles) to highlight the rising air pollution due to coalfired thermal plants in Raigarh. People from these communities have had their land and forests taken away to build coal mines. Coal has affected their livelihoods and health, yet our prime minister wants to expand coal mining. Last year, India launched an auction for 38 new blocks for mining. Some of them pass through Adivasis' ancestral land.

I could not unsee the overlapping injustices in my country and was desperate to change this. At Fridays for Future, I raised the issue of how our stance of focusing on the future removed us far from ground realities and we could no longer continue this. We cannot fail to highlight the loss and damages happening in the Global South now. When we do, we do an injustice to Adivasis and environmental defenders on the front line of the climate crisis.

This is why we at Fridays for Future decided to start MAPA – Most Affected People and Areas. MAPA was created to ensure that the focus is on people who are most affected by the climate crisis, to focus on the present, not just our future. We have been working on centring voices of those most affected through our campaigns, and by bearing witness to the loss and damages caused by the climate crisis today.

To fight the systems that are responsible for the climate crisis, we need news organisations, activists and governments to first acknowledge the urgency and proximity of the climate crisis. To elicit climate action, we must change conversations. We must live in the moment. And we need to strip environmentalism of its white garb because if we do not fight for the present – there is no future.

Colonial surveillance: Palestinians already live in a tech dystopia

Solitary confinement itself is a form of psychological torture. It's particularly true when prisoners are not allowed to leave their cells for long periods of time. Surveillance in these circumstances amounts to a form of subjugation and dehumanisation

OR Israel, the basic human rights of colonised Palestinians, such as the right to privacy, are irrelevant. Earlier this year, a Palestinian friend told me that, while passing through an Israeli checkpoint in the West Bank, Israeli soldiers knew her location without even seeing her identity card. This was scary to hear, and it made me wonder if Israeli soldiers used facial recognition technology to identify my friend's face and destination. I knew there must be at least some surveillance mechanisms employed that we do not yet know about. This becomes clearer when we see Israeli soldiers taking pictures of Palestinians in the occupied West Bank — an act that is often live-streamed on social media platforms.

It did not take long before we came across report of the Israeli military using smartphone facial recognition software called Blue Wolf to track Palestinians in the occupied West Bank. As an incentive to build the database, Israeli soldiers competed for prizes to see which unit could take the most pictures of Palestinians. This violated

basic human rights, including the right to privacy. The database contains profiles of virtually every Palestinian in the West Bank and includes a "security rating" for each one. When soldiers use their phones to capture the image of a person, a colour flashes signifying whether the individual in question should be arrested, detained, or let free. Across the world, this type of software is often used by authoritarian regimes to help oppress populations. There have also been debates about the legality and safety of facial recognition. The method itself can be inaccurate and misidentify individuals, which can put their life in danger. The software has been banned by several US cities, and the European Parliament called for a ban of its usage by police in public.

However, for colonial powers, basic human rights of the colonised are typically irrelevant. Hence, the new surveillance program does not come as a surprise. Palestinians, both within and outside Palestine, already live in a tech dystopia. Colonial surveillance has been constant and aims to strip them of what remains of their privacy.

In the city of Hebron in the West Bank, the Israeli monitoring program is happening without any notification to the local population. It eliminates spaces for safe and free social gathering because the cameras are always filming. The scale of Israeli mechanisms of control, intimidation, and surveillance that Palestinians have faced, and continue to face, is beyond the scope of any one article. That said, I will highlight two examples here: the population registry and prisons.

In both the Gaza Strip and the West Bank, the Palestinian population registry is fully controlled by the Israeli occupation authorities. All changes made to these records, including registration of births, marriages, divorces, deaths, and changes in address/name, require Israeli approval. Only after such approvals may the Palestinian Authority amend or issue an identity card. This in turn controls where Palestinians may live and whether they may travel to other areas in occupied Palestine. Methods of surveillance are also present in Israeli jails. As soon as Palestinians are jailed, they are monitored

as part of the Israeli technique of psychological warfare. And with advances in technology, human operators are becoming unnecessary. Since 2003, the number of Israeli jailers has been continuously reduced, having been replaced with cameras. The manually operated door locks in jails have been replaced with electronic systems. with one prison officer in a central monitoring room to control a section of more than 100 prisoners. Having fewer prison staff may result in further psychological violence. In solitary confinement, for example, prisoners have regularly been prohibited from leaving their prison cells to get some daylight or practise sport because there are not enough prison staff to 'monitor them.' This results in them staying in their prison cells for long hours - if not days - on end.

Solitary confinement itself is a form of psychological torture. It's particularly true when prisoners are not allowed to leave their cells for long periods of time. Surveillance in these circumstances amounts to a form of subjugation and dehumanisation. It not only ensures Palestinians are constantly monitored but also prohibits them from exercising their basic rights, whether it's seeing the sun or walking outside.

In colonial contexts across all temporalities and geographies, the coloniser will not only try to oppress and dehumanise the colonised but will also treat them as 'controlled subjects.' The coloniser will ensure their rights are curtailed and their most intimate details, pictures and whereabouts are known. Colonisation means no privacy. It means invading your most intimate spaces whenever and wherever the coloniser wishes.

ever and wherever the coloniser wishes. Israeli security and surveillance experts enforce politics of fear, and in so doing create a hostile and an aggressive program that enables the colonial order to justify its continued violence against the colonised. If the international community does not challenge such ideologies, they become complicit in continued violence and failing to hold those responsible to account. In doing so, they obstruct true justice and genuine confrontation of power.

Blinken says Qatar to handle US interests in Afghanistan

WASHINGTON: The United States on Friday agreed to set up an interests section in Afghanistan under Qatar, assisting US citizens following the shuttering of the embassy during the Taliban takeover. Welcoming his Qatari counterpart to Washington, Secretary of State Antony Blinken signed an agreement that established Qatar as the United States protecting power in Afghanistan" with the Gulf ally to establish a US interests section at its Kabul embassy.

"Let me again say how grateful we are for your leadership, your support on Afghanistan, but also to note that our partnership is much broader than that," Blinken told Foreign Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al-Thani. VIENNA: Austria is days away from ordering millions of unvaccinated people to stay at home, its chancellor has said, in a rare move that underscores the increasing exasperation of European leaders towards those who have not yet been inoculated against Covid-19. Chancellor Alexander Schallenberg told reporters on Friday that the government should give the "green light" for the move this weekend.

"The aim is clear: we want on Sunday to give the green light for a nationwide lockdown for the unvaccinated," Schallenberg said at a news conference in Innsbruck. He had earlier called the country's vaccination rate "shamefully low," and hinted that the measure would be triggered within days. "In other states that rate is a lot higher - it is shameful as we have enough vaccines available," Schallenberg said at a separate press conference on Thursday. His warning came as a wave of

10 EU nations causing 'high concern' over Covid

STOCKHOLM: Ten countries in the 27-member European Union face a Covid situation of "high concern" the bloc's diseases agency said Friday, warning the pandemic was worsening

across the continent. "The overall epidemiological situation... was characterised by a high and rapidly increasing overall case notification rate and a low but slowly increasing death rate," the European Centre for Disease Control said.

"Case notification rates, death rates, and hospital and ICU admissions are all forecast to increase over the next two weeks."

In its latest weekly risk assessment, the agency listed 10 EU countries in its highest category of concern -Belgium, Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Estonia, Greece, Hungary, Netherlands, Poland and Slovenia. "Countries with lower vaccination uptake continue to be the most severely affected," said the agency.

Germany was among 10 other EU nations classed as "high concern" and France among three of "moderate

Italy, Malta, Spain and Sweden were of low concern.

The agency said four countries had been raised into a higher category since the last assessment, and five countries had been lowered

Countries urged to curb fossil fuels

GLASGOW: A draft statement of the COP26 summit Friday called on nations to ease their reliance on fossil fuels as talks entered their final hours without any sign of delivering the emissions cuts needed to limit global warming to 1.5C.

After two weeks of roundthe-clock negotiations, delegates produced a roundup of their progress, which celerate "the phaseout of unabated coal power and of inefficient subsidies for fossil fuels".

Delegates in Glasgow from nearly 200 nations are charged with keeping the Paris Agreement temperature goals alive even as climate-driven disasters hit countries the world over.

The summit began with a bang as world leaders descended on Glasgow armed with a string of headline announcements, from a commitment to slash methane emissions to a plan to save the rainforests.

But progress has stalled in the underlying technical and now minister-level negotiations.

With one day left of scheduled talks, countries are hardly any closer to agreement over whether national emissions cutting plans must be ramped up in the short term, how climate action is reported, and how vulnerable nations are supported. - APP

Lebanon failing its people: UN poverty envoy

BEIRUT: The Lebanese government is failing its people, the UN envoy on extreme poverty Olivier De Schutter said Friday, warning that the country is on course to becoming a failed state.

"Lebanon is not a failed state yet, but it is a failing state, with a government failing its population," he told a press conference in Beirut at the end of a 12-day visit to Lebanon.

"I saw scenes in Lebanon that I never imagined I would see in a middle income country," he said. Lebanon's fragile government, formed in September to stem the country's

worst-ever financial crash, has yet to take serious action to stop its downward spiral. Around 80 percent of Lebanon's population is estimated to be living under the poverty line, as defined by international organisations. After having fully lifted subsidies on fuel, the authorities are now gradually reducing them on medicine and flour.

MOSCOW: The European Union said on Friday it was making progress in tackling a migrant crisis on the Belarus-Poland border after Turkey barred the citizens of three Middle East countries from flying to Belarus. Hundreds of migrants, mainly Kurds from the Middle East, have been stuck for days on the border in near-freezing temperatures, with the WHO saying on Friday it was "very concerned" about their plight.

Poland is refusing to allow them to cross, with the West accusing Belarusian leader Alexander Lukashenko of bringing them into the country to send over the border in revenge for sanctions.

In the first move to prevent more migrants from arriving, Turkey said that Iraqis, Syrians and Yemenis would no longer be allowed on flights from Turkey to Belarus because of "the problem of illegal border crossings" into the European Union.

sovereignty and independence of Afghanistan and willing to continue practical engagement with Afghanistan and urge the international community for the provision of humanitarian assistance to Afghanistan.

"We welcome the role of UN as a coordinator in contributing to the stability and we condemned the terrorist attacks in the country," he added.

He said that they also met with Afghanistan's Acting Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi who shared the measures for building the inclusive government, protecting women rights and children

rights and counter terrorism. Yue Xiaoyong, Chinese Envoy for Afghan Affairs, the US State Department's Special Representative and Deputy Assistant Secretary for Afghanistan, Thomas West and Russia's Special Afghanistan Envoy Zamir Kabulov participated in the meeting. Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi presided over the meeting.

This is the first full-fledged meeting off the Troika Plus after Taliban's takeover of Afghanistan. The last meeting was held in Doha on August 11 while another meeting was convened by Russia in Moscow on October 19.

Pak-KSA to ink MoU for financial support soon

ISLAMABAD: Saudi Arabia will soon transfer the promised amount in the shape of deposits to Pakistan under the pledged financial assistance, the Kingdom's Ambassador in Islamabad Nawaf Bin Said Al-Malki said.

In an interview with the government wire service, he said a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) will be signed in a few days for the cash deposits and deferred oil payment facility.

Saudi Arabia lately announced to deposit \$3 billion with the State Bank of Pakistan to address the counbalance-of-payments crisis. Besides, the Kingdom pledged a one-year deferred oil payment facility.

The envoy said that the Saudi government considered Pakistan as a dear country with a very deep and strong relationship. The Kingdom always stood with Pakistan and extended support to it on multiple occasions, he added. "Our connection is with the Pakistani flag and we consider it our brotherly country. Pakistan has a very bright future," he added.

Ambassador Nawaf Bin Said Al-Malki said the people of Pakistan loved the the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia from the core of their hearts and held the Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques in high esteem.

Govt taking steps for ensuring fiscal discipline

ISLAMABAD: Minister of State of Parliamentary Affairs Ali Muhammad Khan says the government is taking necessary steps for ensuring fiscal discipline and consolidation, stabilizing the economy and accelerating growth.

Responding to a question during Question Hour in the Senate on Friday, he said debt to GDP ratio decreased by four percent during 2020-21 and government expects that this ratio will decrease further by two to three percent during the ongoing fiscal year.

To another question, the Minister of State informed the House that total domestic and external debt stood at 41 trillion rupees. Responding to another question, Ali Muhammad Khan said the government has developed a Refinance and Credit Guarantee Scheme for collateral Free Lending to small and medium enterprises of the country.

He said the scheme envisages a time bound refinancing of around sixty billion rupees in three years by State Bank of Pakistan to selected commercial banks. The Minister of State said total subsidy of 25.84 billion rupees for risk sharing will be provided to State Bank of Pakistan by the government over a period of

ISLAMABAD: Interim Afghan Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi on Friday said that Afghanistan hopes that the temporary ceasefire deal reached between Pakistan and the banned Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) turns into lasting peace.

On Monday, Federal Minister for Information and Broadcasting Fawad Chaudhry announced that the government of Pakistan and the banned outfit have reached a "complete ceasefire" during peace talks.

While addressing a seminar at Institute of Strategic Studies Islamabad during his visit to the federal capital, Muttaqi confirmed his role in mediating peace talks between both sides. Amir Khan Muttaqi also confirmed that 75 percent of the girls in the country, after a hiatus following the takeover of Kabul, had returned to schools.

of education rights of girls in Afghanistan, at his public talk organized by the Centre for Afghanistan, Middle East and Africa (CAMEA) here at the Institute of Strategic Studies, Islamabad (ISSI).

The Taliban after taking control of the country in August had closed the schools with millions of girl students confined to their homes, which had attracted criticism by the international community.

However, the Acting Afghan FM stated that 75 percent of girls had resumed their education after returning to schools. He pointed out that it was "con-

tradictory" of the international community to emphasize women's education, but have little focus on the salary of teachers, as the disbursement was getting difficult due to the freezing of the country's

He mentioned the negative campaign in foreign media against the interim government of Afghanistan, terming it contrary

"We, in Afghanistan have a historic opportunity to create a win-win situation for everyone. The new developments have opened new opportunities for stability," he said. Muttagi, who arrived here on Wednesday leading a delegation shed light on the new developments in Afghanistan besides expressing views on the new "balanced" foreign policy and relations with Pakistan.

"We must not be a prisoner of the past. The peace in Afghanistan means peace in Pakistan and vice versa," he said. "We are now pursu-

ing a balanced policy". He said there remained no anti-Pak elements in Afghanistan and the new government was trying its best to not let the territory be used

against any other country. The Afghan acting foreign minister said since the takeover of Kabul without any bloodshed, there was peace due to the support of the people. He stressed that the "new government of Afghanistan does not pursue a policy of re-

Crude oil prices go down in world markets

ISLAMABAD: Crude oil prices fell to 82.87 a barrel in the world market. Last week the price of crude oil in the world market stood at 78 a barrel.

According to Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority sources, on November 6, the government fixed the prices at 85 per barrel. OGRA started working to set the prices from November 16 to December 1, 2021.

According to the global market, there is no justification for the forthcoming increase in the prices of petroleum products, OGRA sources said.

The government can maintain prices by imposing the current rates of all taxes, OGRA sources added.

Consumers can also get relief of up to Rs. 9 on petrol and diesel by eliminating or reducing levy tax. The government is levying Rs 9.62 per liter on petrol and Rs 9.14 per litre on diesel. OGRA will send a summary of prices of petroleum products to the Ministry of Finance on November 14. – APP

ISLAMABAD: The federal government has decided to again put name of PML-N President and Leader of the Opposition in the National Assembly Shehbaz Sharif on the Exit Control List (ECL).
