NEW YORK: Pakistan will relent" until Kashmiri people have realized their right to self-determination through

a free and impartial plebiscite in accordance with the UN Security Council resolutions, Ambassador Munir Akram said Friday. Speak ing in a webinar commemorating Kashmir Solidarity Day on Feb 5, the Pakistan envoy said that the Kashmir dispute was the unfinished agenda of self-determination in the South Asian sub-continent. At the outset, Ambassador Akram welcomed the distinguished panelists, reminding the audience that it was a day to reaffirm "our unflinching support to our Kashmir brothers and sisters" waging a heroic and epic struggle against India's barbaric occupation for more than seven decades. – APP

Govt ends dialogue with TTP

Sheikh Rashid says the talks could not go ahead as there were things that could not be accepted

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Interior Sheikh Rashid Ahmed on Friday said that the federal government while rejecting the conditions announced to end dialogues with the banned Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP). Briefing the Senate Committee on Home Affairs, Sheikh Rashid Ahmed said that the Afghan Taliban had initially held talks with the banned TTP and tried to persuade them to settle issues with Pakistan but the talks could not go ahead as there were things that could not be accepted.

The interior minister said that there were people of the outlawed TTP in the border areas of Afghanistan and many groups may have come together, adding that two of their terrorists had been killed in Islamabad recently.

Sh Rashid said that the conditions laid out by them were not acceptable to the government following which they ended the ceasefire themselves, adding that we have received indications that negotiations will not succeed.

Regarding terrorism in Balochistan, the minister said the communication that was intercepted in Thursday's incidents, people were not only in touch with Afghanistan and India but also from other places. "Seven people including a major were martyred in the attack," he added.

Security forces kill 3 terrorists

RAWALPINDI: Three terrorists were killed including two high value targets at Balgatar, Kech in a follow up clearance operation conducted on a makeshift Terrorist hide-out linked with recent terrorist activities in Panjgur, Inter Services Public Relatiuons (ISPR) said in a statement. According to ISPR, the terrorists hide out was surrounded on a major intelligence tip off. Security Forces encircled the well dug out Terrorists and in intense exchange of fire killed all 3 Terrorists hiding there. The killed individuals include terrorist commander Summair alias Bahar, terrorist commander ALtaf alias Lalik and Terrorist commander Phailan Baloch who was involved in terrorist activities against security forces in Hoshab, Panjgur and other areas The killed terrorists were involved in terrorist activities in complete Balochistan. Cache of arms and ammunition recovered from hide out.

India: Hijab wearing students face ban

27 students were barred from entering a government-run pre-university college

NEW DELHI: The southern Indian state of Karnataka is witnessing a deepening hijab row, with the Indian media reporting a second incident in recent weeks of Muslim students being denied entry to their educational institution for wearing headscarves. According to Hindustan Times, 27 students were barred from entering a government-run pre-university college - which is equivalent to a high school - on Thursday for wearing hijabs in the coastal town of Kundapur in Karnataka's Udupi district.

A video of the incident was widely shared on social media. The report said the decision not to allow entry to students wearing hijabs was taken after

State Bank receives \$1.053 bn from IMF

Reserves swell to USD 16.7 billion; rupee strengthens

ISLAMABAD: The State Bank of Pakistan said Friday that it received \$1.053 billion from the International Monetary Fund after the successful completion of 6th review of Extended

Fund Facility (EFF) programme for Pakistan. 'Following the successful completion of the 6th review of the IMF program, #SBP has received the next tranche of \$1.053 billion," the State Bank tweeted.

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) on Wednesday had approved 6th tranche of EFF programme for Pakistan. The IMF mission led by Ernesto Ramirez

Rigo had held virtual discussions during October 4-November 18, 2021 in the context of the 2021 Article IV consultations and the sixth review of the authorities' reform program supported by the IMF's Extended Fund Facility (EFF). The Pakistani authorities and IMF staff had reached a staff-level agreement on policies and reforms needed to complete the sixth review under the EFF, however the agreement was subject to approval by the Executive Board, following the implementation of prior actions, notably on fiscal and institutional reforms.

It is pertinent to mention here that the fund had approved \$6 billion, three-year loan facility for Pakistan back in July 2019 to help resuscitate the country's ailing economy. Tareen expressed the hope that the country's economy would grow at a rate of 4.5-5pc in the current fiscal year, despite commodity price shocks in the international market, and that the growth rate would increase to six per cent in the next fiscal year. - APP

ISPR refutes Indian COAS' LoC claims

The ceasefire agreed "only due to Pakistan's concerns for the safety of people of Kashmir"

ISLAMABAD: Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) Director General Maj Gen Babar Iftikhar on Friday rejected Indian Army Chief Manoj Mukund Naravane's claim that the ceasefire arrangement on the Line of Control (LoC) was holding because India had negotiated from a "position of strength".

The 740-km LoC had seen unprovoked artillery shelling and firing from across the dividing line until February last year when India and Pakistan recommitted themselves to the 2003 ceasefire, bringing relief to the lives of the affected population.



On Thursday, Indian Army Chief Naravane said the ceasefire continued to hold because India had negotiated from a position of strength. Speaking about the ongoing military

US backs potential Saudi, UAE arms sales Says it will continue to support the

WASHINGTON: The US State Department has approved Washington's latest raft of proposed weapons sales to the Middle East, with Saudi Arabia, Jordan and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) preliminarily approved for deals - if they are not blocked by US Congress. The sales come at a time of heightened tensions with Iran, and as the UAE has

seen a rare string of attacks claimed by the Houthis, a rebel group that a Saudi-led military coalition, of which the UAE is a member, continues to fight in Yemen. Saudi Arabia has been regularly targeted by Houthi missile and drone attacks in recent years. The United States has said it will continue to support the defence capabilities of its allies in the region - notably Saudi

During the meeting, both sides reviewed the progress of ongoing CPEC projects and discussed the preparations for future initiatives. The Prime Minister was accompanied

by cabinet ministers and senior officials for the meeting while Mr. He Lifeng was accompanied by Vice Chairmen Ning Jizhe and Tang Dengjie and other senior officials of the NDRC.

In his remarks, the Prime Minister said that Pakistan-China All-Weather Strategic Cooperative Partnership was time-tested and timeless. Despite COVID-19 pandemic, work on all CPEC projects progressed steadily due to joint cooperation of both sides. The Prime Minister appreciated efforts of the NDRC and relevant authorities of both sides in this regard.

Reaffirming the commitment of two sides to timely completion of CPEC and its high-quality development, the Prime Minister said that both sides would continue expediting efforts to achieve Gwadar's potential as a hub of regional commerce and industry while also prioritizing preparatory work on the ML-I and

other key energy projects. In his remarks, Chairman NDRC said

that China attached immense significance to CPEC and was firmly committed to its steady progress and development. He noted that China has become Pakistan's largest investment and trade partner in last seven years and both sides were keen to maintain the momentum of overall economic and trade ties in future as well. Chairman He added that NDRC and all

relevant Chinese institutions would continue their efforts to encourage Chinese state-owned and private enterprises for investment in CPEC projects. In this regard, both sides had decided to establish new green, digital, health, trade and industry corridors, which would enhance sector-wise cooperation in these areas. Thanking the Prime Minister for his firm support, Mr. He Lifeng expressed China's readiness to assist Pakistan in the areas of industrialization, agricultural modernization, science and technology and socio-economic development. During the meeting, both sides welcomed the signing of the Framework Agreement on Industrial Cooperation between the Board of Investment (BOI) and the NDRC which would, inter alia, facilitate relocation of China's industrial units to CPEC SEZs and accelerate investment from China and elsewhere.

Both sides also signed the Minutes of the 6th JWG meeting on Gwadar which was held on 30 December 2021. The Minutes were signed by Mr. Asad Umar, the Federal Minister of Planning, Development and Special Initiatives, and Mr. Ning Jizhe, the Vice-Chairman of NDRC.

FESCO installing industrial, commercial domestic connections

FAISALABAD: The procurement process in line with the vision of the FES-CO Board of Directors (BOD) is continuing despite corona and fluctuation in the valuation of dollars, said Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Faisalabad Electric Supply Company (FESCO) Engr. Bashir Ahmed.

He said that pending industrial, commercial, domestic and agriculture connections are being installed on priority basis and all defective meters would also be replaced till the end of this month. He further said that despite a comprehensive plan from FESCO (BOD), FESCO was facing problems for purchase of new material due to corona pandemic, devaluation of the dollar and lack of interest from the vendors but FESCO continued the tendering process

By the grace of Allah and sustainable efforts of FESCO administration now



sufficient material is available at FES-CO stores, he added. He said that 963 distribution transformers, 103000 single phase electricity meters, 675 Kilometer PVC cable, 18855 Kilometer Rabbit, Dog, Osprey and Ant conductors and 4310 structure & poles are presently available at FESCO regional store and after the availability of all sorts of electricity connection on war footing. He said that FESCO has also escalated the electrification of new villages under the SAP program.

Similarly, procurement worth 3829 million is in progress for the GSC & GSO Department of Project Management Unit (PMU) while 6 power transformers of 31/40 MVA, 12 power transformers of 20/26 MVA, 590 Towers, 750 Kilometers rail conductor, other cables and safety equipment have already purchased.

He disclosed that due to comprehensive and systematic planning, FESCO would not face material shortage in the coming years while replacement of the two-phase transformers under annual maintenance program, up-gradation of grid stations and work on different LT and HT proposals would be completed till end of March. He said that the Customer Services Department has also upgraded to facilitate the FESCO consumers.

PCR test rate cut down in Sindh

KARACHI: The Sindh Healthcare Commission (SHC) on Friday reduced the Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test charges to Rs4,500 per test to increase the percentage of people tested for Covid-19 as there is surge in cases in the province.

As per notification, the test charges from home is fixed at Rs4,800. Meanwhile, the Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) from laboratories cost Rs1,200, said the Sindh Healthcare Commission.

According to the commission, prices were fixed after meeting with all stakeholders including laboratories and hospitals in Karachi. Chairman Sindh Commission Ahsan Qavi said that people should complain to the Healthcare Commission if they were overcharged for the Covid-19 testing.

The commission has also stressed to take strict action against the public and private hospitals and laboratories if they charge more for the PCR test. It is pertinent to mention that earlier the Punjab Health Commission had reduced the PCR test charges to Rs4,800 per test to increase the percentage of people tested for Covid-19.

1,500 poultry units distributed in Faisalabad

FAISALABAD: The livestock department will distribute 1,500 poultry units under the next phase of promotion of the poultry industry in the Faisalabad division.

Director Livestock Dr Haider Ali Khan said here Friday that 500 poultry units would be given in district Faisalabad, 22 in Toba Tek Singh and 400 units each in districts Chiniot and Jhang.

He said that poultry units would be distributed in Toba Tek Singh on Feb 8, in Faisalabad on Feb 9 and 12, In Jhang on Feb 22 and in Chiniot on Feb 23. He said that each poultry unit comprises five hens and a male hen and it will be given for Rs 1,140 per unit. – **APP**

US Embassy spends \$6.4 mn on preservation of Nusserwanjee building

KARACHI: U.S. Consulate joins Indus Valley School of Art and Architecture and Indus Valley School of Art and Architecture and Sindh Exploration and Adventure Society to celebrate preservation and renovation of Karachi`s historic Nusserwanjee Building. US Consul Generalark Stroh, IVS President Dr. Kaleemullah Lashari, SEAS Secretary General Dr. Asma Ibrahim were main figures at the ceremony, says US Consulate release here on Tuesday.

This landmark restoration was made possi-



ble through a \$ 140,000 United States Ambassadors Fund for Cultural Preservation (AFCP) grant to restore the building implemented by SEAS and facilitated by IVS.

The United States has awarded more than \$6.4 million dollars (approximately 1.1 billion rupees) for 30 such cultural heritage projects across Pakistan. Consul General Stroh explained that the U.S. Mission supported the preservation of heritage sites like the Nusserwanjee Building realizing that these sites mean so much more than bricks and mortar.

They strengthened communities, and they were an investment in building a stronger and more prosperous Pakistan, he said. BRT, a flagship project of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) was launched on August 13,

2020. The project was completed at a cost of Rs. 69b. The Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) imported buses from China for the BRT project. With the last import of 30 buses from China in February 2021, the BRT bus fleet reached 158. Besides buses, all the machinery running the system has been imported from China. - APP

ISLAMABAD: Local communities as stakeholders are an essential element for the success of a policy as they contribute to national cohesion and economic growth if given ownership and provided the right opportunities. This holds true for the coastal communities, and while acknowledging this aspect, Pakistan Navy follows a humanistic approach in its security strategy as evinced by various development projects based along the country's coast. This was highlighted by speakers at the book launch ceremony of Gwatar Bay to Sir Creek: The Golden Coast of Pakistan - History and Memoirs, authored by Vice Admiral Iftikhar Ahmed Rao (retd) and published by IPS Press, the publishing arm of Institute of Policy Studies (IPS). The event was organized jointly with National Institute of Maritime Affairs (NIMA).

The session was chaired by Admiral Mohammad Asif Sandila (retd), former Chief of Naval Staff, co-chaired by Khalid Rahman, Chairman IPS, and graced as guests of honor by Kanwal Shauzab, Parliamentary Secretary, Ministry of Planning Development & Special Initiatives, Admiral Muhammad Zakaullah (retd), former Chief of Naval Sta, Lt Gen Tahir Mahmud Qazi (retd) and Vice Admiral Abdul Aleem (retd), Director General NIMA. The gathering was also addressed by Ambassador (retd) Khalid Mahmood, Chairman, Institute of Strategic Studies, Islamabad, Ammara Durrani, Assistant Resident Representative, Chief Development Policy Unit, UNDP and Ambassador (retd) Syed Abrar Hussain, Vice Chairman IPS.

The participants were of the view that the book provides insight into the latent human angle to Pakistan's coastline; the development potential that has become critical for the politics and economics of the region. As such it is important to en-



gage and empower the local population not just along the coast but all over the country for national security.

The book provides a number of pointers how to make this happen. It was observed that policy formulation is not a mechanical process and cannot be done in isolation to history and background. It must include consultations with stakeholders, as evident from various incidents shared in the book.

In this context, the speakers stated that amid the current negative narratives about Pakistan, the book depicts a success story that how the successive governments consistently worked for retrocession of Gwadar to Pakistan from Oman, which was finally achieved in 1958. Reflecting on his rich experiences along the coastal belt, Admiral Rao shared several anecdotes from his book where he remained at the center of many development-related works,

fisherfolk in the Sir Creek region. This initiative culminated in the digging of the Marines Canal that continues to help the fishermen in gathering enough catch for sustainability while remaining safe. The former Deputy Chief of Naval Staff (Operations) rued the prevailing sea-blindness in the country, albeit appreciating that gradually awareness about the issue is beginning to be raised through different steps taken by various research and academic institutions. Admiral Sandila acknowledged that he got attuned to many historical facts by reading the book. He spoke highly of the quality of the references used in the book, while stating that the work also presents a vision for the coastline which can prove to be very beneficial for the country going forward.

Khalid Rahman signified the importance of such comprehensive work, especially for research and policy arenas, in the digital era where even the most experienced and significantly placed policy practitioners and key opinion leaders are compelled to express their views in a short manner. In such an environment, solid and sustainable policy-making should be based on reports and books that are factual and works of research and not just built on information gathered in real-time, he added.

Kanwal Shauzab called the book a reflection of the author's 40 years of experience in the maritime domain, offering insightful geographic, economic, social and development perspectives of the region. She commended the author for an inspirational work written in a very simple, jargon-less language, thus making it an easy read for experts and newbies alike. Ammara Durrani termed the book a work of a polymath that brings together several social sciences disciplines that make up public policy. She said the government is well aware of the regional disparities and has kept regional equalization as one of the cornerstones for policy-making. In this context the book should be an essential read for developmental policymakers, diplomats, and commercial stakeholders looking to invest in the coastal areas.

Ambassador (r) Khalid Mahmood said development of Gwadar should be people-centric. He said Pakistan also needs to focus on different aspects like applying to the International Seabed Authority for an exploration license, shipbuilding, port construction, etc. to boost blue economy. Vice Admiral Abdul Aleem (retd) was of the view that the maritime community is also responsible for sea-blindness. Besides, academia is not coming up with work focused on the maritime sector and as such there is poor understanding of this vital area of the economy. Lt Gen Qazi (retd) highlighted the book's immense scholastic value and said that it presents the perspective of Pakistan on Sir Creek and other regions.

Afghan crisis may be a security threat to Pakistan

ISLAMABAD: Experts at a webinar called upon the world to resolve the current humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan immediately which, they said, is lingering on with each passing day and may cause security threat to Pakistan. The webinar titled: 'The Afghanistan Impact - Security Threats to Pakistan Confirmation', was organized by Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) here.

Speaking on the occasion, Pakistan's former ambassador to Afghanistan Mr Ayaz Wazir said that in the last six months incidents of uprising within and outside the Afghan state are under control which shows the worth of Taliban regime. First, he said, we should be looking at our own interests in Afghanistan and then we should take care of the regional interests in coordination with other countries.

He maintained that the major issue faced by the Taliban government at the moment is the humanitarian crisis. However, after the talks between Taliban representatives and the US government that held in Norway, the world has started dispatching aid for the Afghan people.

"I hope the world countries would reconsider their opinion in the light of their individual interest as to how to interact with the Taliban government in future," Mr Wazir said. The Taliban have to prove that they are capable of running a country effectively like any other state, he said, adding that an inclusive government will be welcomed with open arms by the international community. Stressing the need for engaging select people from the previous Afghan government, he said Afghanistan should go for fair elections, or at least the Afghan jirga should be called to solidify their position to the world as the represent-

ative of the state. SDPI Executive Director Dr Abid Suleri said that the humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan is lingering on and may cause problems for Pakistan in terms of influx

He also urged the intending pilgrims not to submit their hard-earned money to any private tour operator as long as the Hajj Policy 2022 was announced by the ministry. He also cautioned the tour operators of strict action for collect ing money in the wake of Hajj applications. - APP

While speaking at the event organized by the Institute of Regional Studies in connection with the Kashmir Solidarity Day, he said 'the entire nation of Pakistan has always stood with the people of Kashmiris and will continue to stand alongside its Kashmiri brothers and sisters'. It was due to Pakistan's government and intelligentsia's continuous efforts towards exposing India's fascist ideologies that world has started looking at India from a different lens, he argued

Mr. Afridi said that 'India's unilateral action of 5th August 2019 has injected a new energy into

the Kashmiri struggle and the Indian forces are now facing multidimensional resistances in IIOJK'. while highlighting the role of Kashmiri diaspora, he stressed that 'It was imperative to strengthen linkages with the Kashmiri diaspore abroad especially in the United States and the United Kingdom to further the Kashmir cause'. BJP regime'. She lamented that world was keen on talking on human rights and even on animal rights but was turning a blind eye on the grave human rights violations in IIOJK.

Iftikhar Ambassador Spokesperson Ministry of Foreign Affairs, reiterated Pakistan's support to Kashmiris. He stated that the government has vociferously projected the Kashmir cause internationally. He was of the view that Paki-

stan's stance has been reinforced by the UN by declaring that 'Kashmir remains a disputed territory and its resolution would only be possible through exercising the right of self-determination guaranteed by the UN resolutions'. While responding on genocide

predicted by the Genocide Watch, FarzanaYaqoob, former Minister AIK, argued that 'genocide is already underway in IIO-

He urged overseas Kashmiris to galvanize international support for Kashmir cause as systematic demographic changes was underway in IIOJK which would directly impact the longstanding stance of plebiscite.

Shamim Shawl of All Parties Hurrivat Conference, said that Indian atrocities were not restricted to male activists, wom-

en had also been subjected to physical and mental tortures by Indian forces. She stressed the need to protect vote bank amid systematic demographic changes unleashed by India. She urged Kashmiri diaspora to maintain its linkages with

the people of Kashmir. Earlier, Ambassador Nadeem Riyaz, President IRS in his opening remarks spoke about the Kashmir issue, the atrocities committed on the innocent people of IIOJK and the possible impact of the domicile law. He called upon the international community to raise their voice for the innocent people of Kashmir so that they can be given the rights promised to them by the Security Council resolutions. Stabilisation measures

FTER eight months of back-and-forth consultations, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) gave the green light on the release of the next \$1 billion tranche in Pakistan's \$6 billion Extended Facility Fund (EFF) on Wednesday. The decision was a result of the government getting the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) Bill across the line. Getting the disbursement approved was only a step, however, on the long road towards stabilising the economy. The government's biggest problem has been controlling inflation, and this release is not likely to help in slowing down the rate of price increases, at least until the tail end of the year.

Beyond the politics of the SBP bill, there are the very real belt-tightening measures that the government has to take to remain in the programme going forward. This is only the halfway stage; roughly \$3 billion has been released with another half to go. The central bank now has the autonomy to determine interest rates, price stability and the exchange rate without government intervention, and out of these, the last is something that needs to stabilise in order for us to get some much-needed respite from our overly-burdened import bill. Other attempts to trim it down have not been adequate so far.

Another factor to consider is that the overall purchasing power of the average citizen—especially those below or near the poverty line and the salaried class—will greatly decrease as the government begins to implement the IMF-mandated changes. The revised FBR targets, sales tax rationalisation across industries, the readjusted electricity rates and the personal income taxation reforms are all policies that will directly affect the living standards of a large part of households in Pakistan.

Now that this tranche has been granted, the government must look to find some growth in an economy that is contracting through austerity decisions. This is no easy task but some small gains can be made through ensuring that industries keep producing export output, and focusing on not stifling key industries such as digital and IT while imposing taxes and other measures. This can be a hard year with a move towards stabilisation or another year of dismal economic performance with nothing positive on the horizon. Only the government can decide which path we take.



India refuses visas

EVOTED Pakistani pilgrims, belonging to far-flung areas of the country had gathered in Lahore, preparing to cross the Wagah Border into India, in order to attend the annual Urs of Khawaja Moinuddin Chishti in Ajmer from February 3 to 14. However, at the last moment, the Indian state, for no apparent reason, and without any precedent, refused the issuance of visas, leaving the pilgrims in utter mental stress.

This shameful incident should be an eye-opener to the rest of the world. Pilgrims crossing the border to visit sacred sites has long been cited as one diplomatic initiative that could lead to reduced tensions and better relations between India and Pakistan.

This incident, of the stranded Pakistani pilgrims, refused visas at the last minute, should leave no questions as to which country is interested in peace, and which country is the aggressor. This act by the Indian government should be contrasted with Pakistan's highly hospitable treatment of Indian religious tourists. Pakistan High Commission in November issued about 3,000 visas to Indian Sikh pilgrims to enable them to participate in the 552nd birth anniversary celebrations of Guru Nanak in Pakistan, with Prime Minister Imran Khan himself taking several initiatives to facilitate Sikh pilgrims. It should be noted that India's behaviour is not only unethical, but it violates the agreements India itself signed. The Protocol on Visits to Religious Shrines 1974, a bilateral agreement between India and Pakistan facilitating Indian and Pakistani nationals to visit certain religious shrines in both countries, covers five locations in India, including the shrine of Ajmer Sharif Dargah. Considering India's history of reneging on bilateral agreements, perhaps the world should not be surprised that the 1974 Protocol was not respected either.

Despite the history of hostilities, conflicts and aggression between the two countries, the one unique characteristic found in both India and Pakistan was multiculturalism and the historical sanctity placed by the subcontinent on mysticism, religion and spirituality. It is extremely regrettable that the Modi government and the new wave of fascism that has swept in India are actively undoing any mutual respect in even this one sacred aspect. It is hoped that Pakistan at least will commit to respecting tradition, and not fall to India's level.

The violation of Human Rights in Occupied Kashmir

INCE 1947, Article 370 had given Jammu and Kashmir a semi-autonomous constitutional status. Under its provisions, the region had freedom in all matters except its legislature, constitution, flag and communications, foreign affairs and defense. Ending this status is a fresh attempt to eradicate the Kashmiri people, their rights and the linguistic, social, cultural, economic and political existence of the local people. The legality of the special status solution is being challenged by legal and constitutional experts in India, who have opposed the country's Supreme Court decisions in recent years. With the recent abrogation of Article 370 and Article 35A, India has allowed permanent resettlement of non-Kashmiris in Kashmir. The Constitution of Kashmir first defines membership and settlement. Non-Kashmiris are now allowed to buy property, keep it and settle in Kashmir permanently.

Under these changes, for example, Gujars (Bakarwal) in Kashmir are immediately at greater risk. They migrate seasonally with the animals to look after the animals and the land. Indian laws regarding land as a

sole property will not allow them to live on land as they have historically done. These changes will also lead to population rearrangement in Kashmir.

Kashmiris have long speculated that India intends to settle military and paramilitary families in Kashmir as well as establish semi-permanent military colonies in Kashmir. Indigenous peoples from Asia, such as Kashmiris, have long faced threats to their existence and inherited rights, especially "relative" land rights, as colonial relations between indigenous peoples and settler states make land encroachment profitable. This will make indigenous peoples aliens.

Since 5 August 2019, India cancelled all access and communication with Kashmir. The Internet, cell phones and landlines have been cut off, and 14.7 million people cannot access essentials such as food and medical aid as India moves to gain full control of its territory using military force. Apart from the extremely rare media, Kashmiris have not been able to communicate with each other or with the outside world. The entire area of Jammu and Kashmir is basically under siege.

Kashmiris are additionally targeted because they are primarily Muslim and culturally and linguistically distinct. The Indian Government has gained so much control over the social media that their accounts are suspended on the pretext that they have written anything against Hindutva ideology or Hindu fascism. They cannot write freely about how the Indian regime uses its power to oppress and suppress Kashmiris, and cannot upload the photos of the Kashmiri freedom fighters, particularly BurhanWani. This is how their voices stand suppressed and they are unable to demonstrate their inhuman situation on a wider spectrum across the globe.

Now the families of those who joined the freedom struggle at their own will are being harassed and intimidated even during nights. The Armed Force Special Power Act (AFSPA) gives the Indian army full impunity to barge into houses and kill inhabitants when they feel it necessary. This law has been misused so many times where innocent people were brutally killed and the killers did not face a trail. Coming to the roads,

emergency services are allowed to ply on the National highway, which is an important lifeline and the main thoroughfare for every state, which the army travels on. This thing causes the backing up of local vehicles that may stretch to a few miles. This creates extreme problem to the commuters particularly patients, doctors, officegoers, and so on. They have cut down forest trees and thereby converted the hills into nude mountains. Many of the wild animals got killed due to their habitats' destruction.

The media, academics, and legal and political analysts have never touched on indigenous rights, as stated in the UN declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, when Kashmir is being debated. But an indigenous rights framework is needed to carefully assess the various rights violations facing Kashmiris. India is violating several international human rights conventions and declarations it has signed which apply to Kashmir.

There has been a terrible silence by the world leadership on the ongoing crimes in Kashmir. Kashmiris have been the guardians, gardeners and custodians of Kashmiris' land, water, each other and inhuman life. Regardless of the colonial boundaries, the most important thing is what Kashmiris want as an independent indigenous people. Under the UN declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, India has a duty to consult with local people, rather than making decisions that affect them unilaterally, and give them the highest priority to self-government and self-determination. If provided an opportunity. In 1948, the UN resolution on Kashmir would have ratified the right of Kashmiris to determine their own future. The world is not taking cognizance of the Indian brutality in Kashmir. It is because of the fact that India with its huge population is their greatest product consumer, be it arms and ammunition, social media, food products, oil, and so on. Therefore, the countries who have their interests in India cannot raise their voice against India. If they happen to say anything and ever condemn any Indian cruelty, then In-

Holocaust Museum highlights stakes in a battle for soul of Islam

ONTROVERSY over the opening of Southeast Asia's first Holocaust museum highlights differences in the Muslim world over the limits of religious tolerance and Muslims' ability to debate those limits. The controversy over the museum in Minahasa, North Sulawesi, home to one of Indonesia's two known synagogues, comes as the United States and American Jewish groups have pressured the world's largest Muslim-majority democracy to recognize Israel. Indonesia's minuscule Jewish community is estimated to number about one hundred.

US and Israeli officials believe that recognition of Israel by Indonesia, or one of Asia's other largest Muslim-majority countries, would allow Saudi Arabia, the custodian of Islam's two holiest cities, Mecca and Medina, to follow the United Arab Emirates and Bahrain in establishing diplomatic relations with the Jewish state. The two smaller Gulf states established relations with Israel in 2020.

The controversy over the museum at the Shaar HaShamayim Synagogue also erupted as autocratic Arab countries sought to rebuild ties to their erstwhile Jewish communities in a bid to project themselves as beacons of religious moderation and tolerance.

Crackdowns on freedom of expression in countries like the UAE and Bahrain have allowed the two countries to portray an image of near-unanimous public support for their burgeoning relations with Israel.However, the crackdowns have not stopped expressions of anti-Jewish sentiment in countries like Kuwait.

"Is this who we have become in a country whose heritage prides itself on coexistence? What a pity. What a loss for us. How heartbreaking for our forefathers, a few of whom were Jews who lived here alongside us," said Kuwait-based poet and writer Nejoud Al-Yagout.

Ms. Al-Yagout spoke out after the US embassy in Kuwait was accosted last November on social media for wishing Jews a happy Hanukkah feast. By contrast, the controversy in Indonesia has focused more on the condemnation of Israeli policy towards the Palestinians than on anti-Jewish sentiment. It highlighted sharp divisions among Indonesian Muslims in dealing with the Israeli-Palestinian conflict and their ability to put their differences on public display. The controversy was fueled by the fact that the Holocaust museum became

a reality because of support from Yad Vashem, Israel's official memorial to the Jewish victims of the Nazi Holocaust. A Yad Vashem executive participated by video link in last month's inauguration of the museum on International Holocaust Day. Yad Vashem's role sparked speculation that the museum was a backdoor to furthering Israeli-Indonesian relations. "The Indonesian government should act decisively and immediately demolish the museum because it is provocative and its presence is not welcomed among many in this country," said Muhyiddin Junaidi, deputy chairman of the advisory board of the Indonesian Ulema Council (MUI), the country's top body of Islamic scholars. Echoing Mr. Junaidi's remarks, Sudarnoto Abdul Hakim, the group's deputy chairman for foreign affairs, insisted that "Jewish communities and the descendants of Jewish people everywhere, including in Indonesia and North Sulawesi, should...see fairly, clearly the brutal acts that have been perpetrated by Israeli Zionists against the Palestinian people since 1948."Mr. Abdul Hakim suggested that Jewish leaders meet with the Council "to prevent things that are not desirable... I think this is a good step to resolve the issue in a persuasive way.'

Mr. Abdul Hakim's potentially ominous remarks and Mr. Junaidi's call for the museum's destruction contrasted starkly with statements by Yahya Cholil Staquf, the newly elected chairman of Nahdlatul Ulama, the world's largest civil society movement that has an estimated following of up to 90 million people.A proponent of humanitarian Islam, Mr. Staquf, joined global leaders in commemorating the United Nations International Holocaust Remembrance Day last month. "Holocaust remembrance serves as a memorial and vivid reminder of the cruelty, violence, and suffering that so many human beings... have, for thousands of years, inflicted upon others. Today, in remembrance of the Holocaust and its millions of victims, Nahdlatul Ulama and I wish to raise our voices in a simple, heartfelt call: Let us choose compassion," Mr. Staquf said in a virtual event co-hosted by the Los Angeles-based Simon Wiesenthal Center founded to honour one of the world's foremost hunters of Nazi criminals.

Unlike the Indonesian council and the US embassy in Kuwait's detractors, Mr. Staquf did not shy away from recognizing the genocide against the Jews while at the same time demanding justice for the Palestinians.Mr. Staquf made that clear, not only in his call for compassion but also by speaking at an event hosted at about the same time by the Palestinian embassy in Jakarta.

"Palestinian self-determination is a humanitarian mandate. All parties, including Hamas, Fatah, and the world community at large, must set aside their subjective interests and focus upon improving the lives of the Palestinian people. For the fate of the Palestinians is the fate of humanity," Mr. Staquf said. He was referring to the Islamist group that controls the Gaza Strip as well as the party that governs the West Bank. The divergence in approach between Mr. Satquf and the Indonesian Council spokesmen is about much more than the Palestinian issue. It is about what the essence of Islam should be in the 21st century, an Islam that looks backward and nurtures grievances or an Islam that seeks to reach out, build bridges, and find solutions.

Salah, Mane set for Cup of Nations final showdown

YAOUNDÉ: Liverpool teammates Mohamed Salah and Sadio Mane are getting ready to face off against each other in the Africa Cup of Nations final in Cameroon this weekend after Egypt beat the hosts on penalties on Thursday to set up

a clash with Senegal. Egyptian captain Salah did not need to step up in the semi-final shoot-out as Cameroon failed three times from the spot, allowing the Pharaohs to win 3-1 on penalties after a goalless 120 minutes in Yaounde.

That was after Mane starred with a goal and an assist as Senegal overcame Burkina Faso to win 3-1 in the first semi-final a day earlier.

Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp could have been forgiven for wishing both players had been knocked out of the tournament sooner so they could return to Anfield, but he expressed delight for the attacking duo on Friday. "It is a great achievement for both getting through to the final," Klopp said in a press conference ahead of his team's FA Cup tie against Cardiff on Sunday. That game will be played just a few hours before the Cup of Nations climax at the Olembe Stadium.

"So far it's been a really successful tournament for our boys. It will be exciting.

"Now it's obviously not so easy because one will definitely be really happy after and the other one much less so, but both have a good chance to achieve something really big."

It will be a second AFCON final appearance for Salah, a member of the Egypt team beaten by Cameroon in the 2017 showpiece in Libreville. The 29-year-old has already admitted his determination to lift the Cup of Nations for his country, having made his international debut in 2011, a year after they won their last continen

ISPR refutes Indian COAS' LOC claims

From Page 01 stand-off with China on India's northern border, Naravane said the "developments adequately underscore the requirement for ready and capable forces, with an optimal component of boots on ground backed by modern technology".

Reacting to the Indian army chief's comments, the DG ISPR termed the claim "clearly misleading".

The ceasefire was agreed "only due to Pakistan's concerns for the safety of people of Kashmir living on both sides of the LoC", he tweeted. "No side should misconstrue it as their strength or other's weak-

The surprise truce announced in late February 2021 had brought an end to years of violence along the frontier that saw thousands of skirmishes rattle the Himalayan territory, where the two sides have used artillery, mortars, and small arms

The deal effectively reinstated an earlier ceasefire signed by the two sides in 2003 that had been trampled by thousands of violations in recent years.

The ISPR said the original deal had largely held until 2016, when tensions exploded in occupied Kashmir, resulting in a surge in violence between the two sides.

As fighting along the LoC raged, ties between the rivals went into freefall with India repeatedly accusing Pakistan of sending infiltrators across the LoC, while Islamabad lambasted Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government for stoking Hindu nationalist sentiment against Muslims.

The two sides came close to another all-out war after an attack inside India-occupied Kashmir in 2019 led to titfor-tat air strikes. But even after stepping back from the brink, fighting along the LoC escalated, reaching an apex in 2020 with thousands of clashes reported.

BEIJING: The country where the coronavirus outbreak emerged two years ago launched a locked-down Winter Olympics on Friday, proudly projecting its might on the most global of stages even as some Western governments mounted a diplomatic boycott over the way China treats millions of its own people. Chinese President Xi Jinping declared the Games open during an opening ceremony heavy on ice-blue tones and winter imagery that was held in the same lattice-encased National Stadium that hosted the inaugural event at the 2008 Olympics. That makes Beijing the first city to host both winter and summer Games. And while some are staying away from the second pandemic Olympics in six months, many other world leaders attended the opening ceremony. Most notable: Russian President Vladimir Putin, who met privately with Xi earlier in the day as a dangerous standoff unfolds at Russia's border with Ukraine. The Olympics - and the opening ceremony – are always an exercise in performance

for the host nation, a chance to showcase its culture, define its place in the world, flaunt its best side. That's something China in particular has been consumed with for decades. But at this year's Beijing Games, the gulf between performance and reality will be particularly jarring. Fourteen years ago, a Beijing opening cer-

emony that featured massive pyrotechnic displays and thousands of card-flipping performers set a new standard of extravagance



to start an Olympics that no host since has matched. It was a fitting start to an event often billed as China's "coming out." Now, no matter how you view it, China

has arrived - but the hope for a more open country that accompanied those first Games has faded. For Beijing, these Olympics are a confirmation of its status as world player and power. But for many outside China, particularly in the West, they have become a confirmation of the country's increasingly authoritarian turn. As if to underline that transformation, the opening ceremony Friday was staged at the same stadium - known as the Bird's Nest - that held the 2008 version. Back then, Chinese dissident artist Ai Weiwei consulted on its construction. Now, he is one of the country's best known dissidents and lives in exile. Chinese authorities are crushing pro-democracy activism, tightening their control over Hong Kong, becoming more

confrontational with Taiwan and interning Muslim Uyghurs in the far west - a crackdown the U.S. government and others have called genocide.

The pandemic also weighs heavily on this year's Games, just as it did last summer in Tokyo. More than two years after the first COVID-19 cases were identified in China's Hubei province, nearly 6 million human beings have died and hundreds of millions more around the world have been sickened.

He said some female students had been attending classes at the college while wearing hijabs for the past few days. He added that other students had objections over it and they had sought action. "As the situation was getting tense, I called a meeting of parents on Wednesday when a number of boys were seen in the college with shawls," the lawmaker said.

However, President Joe Biden announced in February last year that the US was ending support for offensive operations by the Saudi-led coalition in Yemen and all "relevant" arms sales. Advocates and legislators have since decried the approval of a \$650m sale of air-to-air missiles to Saudi Arabia in November as undermining that pledge.

The most recently approved sales to Saudi Arabia include 31 communication and navigation terminals at a cost of \$23.7m to upgrade the kingdom's missile defence system, according to the Pentagon.

The State Department approved the UAE to buy \$65m worth of spare parts for its Homing All the Way Killer (HAWK), Phased Array Tracking Radar to Intercept on Target (PATRIOT), and Terminal High Altitude Area Defense (THAAD) missile defence systems.

'This sale supports the UAE's existing ability to deter and defend against hostile threats by maintaining the operational readiness of critical air defense systems," the Pentagon's Defense Security Cooperation Agency said in a public

Spain to supply gas to Morocco

MADRID: Spain on Thursday said it would help Morocco ensure its energy security by allowing it to transport supplies through the Maghreb-Europe gas pipeline (GME) following a supply crisis with Algeria. "Morocco has asked for support to guarantee its energy security on the basis of trade relations and Spain has responded positively as it would do with any other friend or neighbour," Spain's ecological transition ministry said in a statement. "Morocco will be able to obtain liquefied natural gas (LNG) on the international markets, bring it to a regasification plant on the (Spanish) mainland and use the GME pipeline to transport it to its territory," it said, without giving a date nor outlining the volumes concerned. Morocco's energy ministry declined to reveal details of the deal

Moroccan news website Le360 said it followed several weeks of talks between Rabat and Madrid.

The announcement came three months after Algeria said it would not renew an expiring 25-year deal to use the pipeline through which it had transported gas to Spain via Morocco.

Algeria, Africa's biggest gas exporter, had used the GME since 1996 to export some 10 billion cubic metres of gas per year to Spain and onwards to Portugal. In return, Morocco had received around a billion cubic

metres of gas per year as transit fees, covering around 97 percent of its needs. Ending the contract directly affected Rabat's energy supplies at a time when global gas prices have peaked. – **APP**

Iraq played 'pivotal role' in elimination of Daesh

BAGHDAD: Iraq has played a "pivotal role" in operations to destroy Daesh/ISIS and their efforts eventually led to the elimination of the terror group's leader, the country's prime minister said on Friday. "Iraq's Security Forces have played a pivotal role in killing and capturing Daesh terrorists inside Iraq and gathering intelligence that finally led to the head of this terrorist organization," Mustafa al-Kadhimi said on Twitter. Daesh/ISIS leader Abu Ibrahim al-Hashimi al-Qurayshi was killed in an operation by US forces in northern Syria this week. According to the Pentagon, al-Qurayshi blew himself up to avoid being captured, also killing his wife and two children.

Al-Qurayshi, whose real name was Amir Muhammad Saeed Abdul Rahman, had taken over after Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi was killed by the US in 2019. He hailed from Tal Afar in Iraq's northern Nineveh province. The operation to eliminate al-Qurayshi came after a spike in Daesh/ISIS activity in Syria and Iraq, where the terrorist group carried out multiple attacks in the past few months. – $\ensuremath{\mathbf{APP}}$

Military response not in cards: Canada PM

OTTAWA: Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said Thursday a military response to the ongoing Ottawa protest against COV-ID-19 measures is "not in the cards right now. Ottawa police Chief Peter

Sloly said this week that all options are on the table, including calling in the military, to end the ongoing demonstration that was being called an "occupation' by some on the city council. Thousands of protesters railing against vaccine mandates and other COV-ID-19 restrictions descend ed on the capital last weekend, deliberately blocking traffic around Parliament Police Hill. estimate about 250 remain.

Trudeau said one must be "very, very cautious" about deploying troops on Canadian soil, adding there has been no such request to the federal government. He said any formal requests for assistance from the City of Ottawa or Ontario will be considered. - Agencies

China, Russia oppose NATO expansion amid tensions

Xi and Putin called on NATO to "exercise a fair and objective attitude towards the peaceful development of other states"

BEIJING: China on Friday put its weight behind Russia in opposing NATO's expansion eastward amid ongoing tensions with Ukraine. "The (two) sides oppose further enlargement of NATO and call on the North Atlantic Alliance to abandon its ideologized cold war approaches," said a joint statement released by the Kremlin after a meeting between Chinese President Xi Jinping and his Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin in Beijing. They met ahead of the Beijing Olympics opening ceremony.

It urged NATO to "respect sovereignty, security and interests of other countries.

There have been fears of a military invasion for weeks because of the deployment of Russian soldiers in the border area with Ukraine. Moscow denies planning such a step. Ukraine and Russia have been locked in conflict since hostilities broke out in the eastern Donbas region in 2014 after Moscow annexed the Crimean Peninsula.

Russia has demanded security guarantees from the West, including that Ukraine would not join NATO. The US and NATO handed their written responses to the proposals, but Moscow said its main concerns were ignored. Xi and Putin called on NATO to "exercise a fair and objective attitude towards the peaceful development of other states."



"Russia and China stand against attempts by external forces to undermine security and stability in their common adjacent regions. intend to counter interference by outside forces in the internal affairs of sovereign countries under any pretext, oppose color revolutions, and will increase cooperation in the aforementioned areas," the readout said. They expressed "grave concern" on "serious international security challenges,"

and that "no state can or should ensure its own security" at the expense of others. On Washington's increasing engagement in Asia Pacific, the statement noted that both Beijing and Moscow "stand against the for-

Russia also reaffirmed its support for the "One-China principle," saying "Taiwan is an inalienable part of China, and opposes any forms of independence of Taiwan.'

Meanwhile, Putin announced Russia has signed a new contract with China to deliver an additional 10 billion cubic meters (bcm) of gas. "Our oilmen have prepared good new solutions for the supply of hydrocarbons to the People's Republic of China. And the gas industry has also taken another step forward - I mean a new contract for the supply of gas to China from the Russian Far East at 10 billion cubic meters per year," he said.

The two countries reached a new record trade turnover of \$140 billion, the Russian president said, adding that it is a step to reach \$200 billion. Xi said his meeting with Putin will give an additional impetus to the development of Russian-Chinese relations. "The world has entered a new period of upheaval and change" and that "humanity is facing many challenges and crises," he said. In these circumstances, he added, Russia and China "remain committed to the original goal - making unremitting efforts for the sustainable development of relations" and protection of their fundamental interests. "Everything is getting stronger (between Russia and China) - political and strategic mutual trust," he said.

NATO chief appointed Norway CB governor

BRUSSELS: NATO chief Jens Stoltenberg has been named the new governor of Norway's central bank (Norges Bank). Stoltenberg was among 22 applicants for the post. Oystein Olsein, the current governor, said on Friday Stoltenberg cannot take office until around Dec. 1, adding: "But I know that Norges Bank will be in safe hands under the leadership of Deputy Governor Ida Wolden Bache from 1 March." Stoltenberg, 62, holds a postgraduate degree in economics from the University of Oslo.

He served as Norway's finance minister from 1996 to 1997, followed by two stints as prime minister from 2000 to 2001 and 2005 to 2013. He took the top NATO post in October 2014 and his tenure runs until the end of September 2022. - **APP**

Romania interested in gas co-op with Azerbaijan

BAKU: Romanian Energy Minister Virgil-Daniel Popescu has said that his country is interested in long-term cooperation with Azerbaijan on natural gas. He made the remarks during the meeting with Azerbaijani counterpart Energy Minister ParvizShahbazov on February 3 on the sidelines of the 8th Baku-hosted meeting of the Southern Gas Corridor Advisory Council.

During the meeting, the parties discussed the diversification of natural gas supplies and opportunities for bilateral cooperation in this direction. The Romanian minister added that the interconnectors implemented with his country's participation will contribute to the expansion of the Southern Gas Corridor.

On the same day, Parviz Shahbazov held a meeting with Moldovan Deputy Prime Minister and Infrastructure and Regional Development Minister Andrei Spinu. Spinu briefed on the current situation with natural gas supplies to the country and highlighted the prospects of cooperation with Azerbaijan in this field. In turn, Shahbazov noted the Advisory Council's contribution to the supply of natural gas to Europe via the Southern Gas Corridor from a new source and welcomed Moldova's participation in this meeting for the first time. Speaking about the Southern Gas Corridor, the minister noted that there is potential for exports increase.

"Realizing these opportunities and expanding the Southern Gas Corridor is a process that includes identifving consumers, signing contracts, investing, building interconnectors and providing the necessary support. We are ready to start a dialogue with the interested parties in this direction," he said. Shahbazov also held a meeting with Hungarian Foreign and Trade Minister Peter Szijjarto. - APP

JAKARTA: After many days of inconsistency in his health conditions, Malaysia's veteran leader Mahathir Mohamad on Friday said he has "recovered." "I have recovered, not fully but have recovered," said Mahathir in a video message released today. There had been many unconfirmed reports making rounds on social media regarding the health of the world's oldest former prime minister, who led Malaysia to unprecedented economic growth. However, last week his spokesperson Sufi Yusuff had told Anadolu Agency that his health was "improving." Mahathir, 96, was admitted to National Heart Institute in Kuala Lumpur.

"For the past few days, I have been going back home from the hospital," Mahathir said in a voice sounding frail. The former prime minister said that doctors at the hospital are still conducting medical "procedures." Thanking people for their prayers for his healthy recovery, the video shows Mahathir surfing through a newspaper in his hands and his wife sitting beside him while he is taking sips from a cup. "Many (people) had sent flowers and (get well) cards, ´ he added. "My hope is that soon I will recover fully."

On Dec. 16, 2021, the former premier was admitted to the institute. In 2006, he had a heart attack, and the following year, he suffered another. Mahathir served as the country's fourth and seventh prime minister. He was the country's longest-serving prime minister from July 1981 to October 2003 and then again from May 2018 to March 2020, making up a total of 24 years.

He urged the international community to play its role in fulfilling its commitment to the Kashmiri people, made through UN resolutions assuring them of their right to self-determination.

Macron heading to Russia, Ukraine

PARIS: French President Emmanuel Macron will visit Moscow and Kyiv to meet his counterparts early next week, his office said on Friday, in the highest profile effort by a Western leader to deescalate the Ukraine crisis. Macron will go to Russia on Monday to meet President Vladimir Putin and to Ukraine on Tuesday for talks with President Volodymyr Zelensky. The French president, who has called for a deescalation in the crisis, has over the last days repeatedly held telephone talks with Putin and Zelensky as well as talking to US President Joe Biden. His office had said late Thursday after Macron's latest talks with Putin and Zelensky that the discussions sought "to identify the elements that should lead to a deescalation".

In a possible nod to Russia's concerns about NATO expansion and US military presence in eastern Europe, it said exchanges had started on the "strategic balance" in Europe, which should make it possible to see "a reduction in the risks on the ground and guarantee security".

Western powers have been engaged in intense diplomatic efforts over the last weeks over the build-up of some 100,000 Russian troops close to the border with its pro-EU neighbour raised fears it was planning a new invasion of Ukraine.

Although Ukraine has sought to play down the risk of an invasion, tensions are running high after the US Pentagon said Thursday it had evidence of a plan by Moscow to film a fake Ukrainian attack on Russians to justify a real assault. German Chancellor Olaf Scholz has also indicated he plans to visit Russia soon although the timing is not immediately clear.

The French president has over the last years maintained that Europe must keep channels open to talk with Russia. He has insisted that a "demanding dialogue" is preferable to open confrontation with Moscow in a fast-changing world dominated by the rise of China. Macron paid his only visit to Russia as president in May 2018 to attend the Saint Petersburg economic forum and meet Putin. – APP

Germany's Scholz to visit Russia

MOSCOW: German Chancellor Olaf Scholz will visit Russia for talks with President Vladimir Putin on February 15, the Kremlin said Friday, as tensions rage between Moscow and the West over Ukraine.

"A visit by Scholz to Moscow will take place on the 15th," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters, adding that the two leaders will hold "substantial" bilateral talks. It will be Putin's first face-to-face talks with Scholz since he took over as German chancellor in December. The announcement comes amid a major European diplomatic effort to ease tensions after Russia amassed tens of thousands of troops on the Ukrainian border, raising fears of an invasion. Scholz said earlier this week he would travel to Moscow to discuss the crisis.

Russia denies it plans to invade but has demanded wide-ranging security guarantees from the West, including that Ukraine never be allowed to join NATO. The two leaders are also set to discuss the controversial Nord Stream 2 gas pipeline from Russia to Germany, among a host of other controversial bilateral and international issues.

Germany has traditionally been seen as more open to dealing with Russia than some other Western countries, but there are some sources of tensions. On Thursday, Russia said it was closing the Moscow bureau of German broadcaster Deutsche Welle in response to Berlin's ban on the German-language channel of Russian state TV network RT. - APP

At least 10 killed as bus hits landmine

MOGADISHU: At least 10 people were killed and two others wounded on Friday when the bus they were travelling in struck a landmine in Somalia, security officials

and residents said. The victims were heading to the southern port city of Kismayo when an explosion ripped through their vehicle as it hit what was believed to be a landmine, local security official Mohamed Nur Dahir told AFP by phone.

"This was a horrible incident, ten people - all of them innocent civilians - were killed and two others wounded in the explosion which destroyed the minibus they were trave-

ling in," he said. "Terrorists plant mines along the road used by civilian transport, and this is not the first time they have done so," he added. Many of the victims were taken to Kismavo for treatment, city resident Abdukadir Mohamed Weli told AFP that. - APP

ISLAMABAD: Chief Justice of Pakistan Umar Ata Bandial has said since the armed forces of Pakistan play an important role to defend the country that's why they are looked upon with great respect and admiration.

Talking to a 49-member delegation of the Command and Staff College, Quetta, led by Lt Colonel Hashim Iqbal Bajwa, which called on him in Islamabad on Friday, the CJP briefed them about the salient features of the 1973 Constitution and the powers of the Supreme Court as laid down in it.

Spokesman for the Supreme Court said that besides Pakistan, officers of 20 other countries were also included in the delegation. On the other hand, CJP Bandial, who has taken oath to his office only two days ago, is faced with an increasing backlog of cases as their number has now risen to 53,547.

According to a report, 118 more cases were added to the backlog already pending with the SC dated between January 16, 2022 and January 31, The report reveals that presently 30,427 civil cases are sub judice. "Similarly, 28 suo motu notices and one reference are also pending," the report says. Furthermore, the apex court is yet to decide the fate of 133 petitions pertaining to basic human rights, while the number of criminal cases and jail petitions has exceeded 11,000. It has also been disclosed that no hearing was held during the last 15 days of January at the SC's Lahore, Quetta and Peshawar registries.


LAHORE: Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) spokesperson Marriyum Aurangzeb lashed out at Prime Minister (PM) Imran Khan on Friday and said that he has put a huge debt on each and every Pakistani.

Pakistanis Chief Minister reviews KPK law and order situation

PESHAWAR: An important meeting to review the overall law & order situation in the province was held here on Friday with Chief Minister Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Mahmood Khan in the chair. The meeting took stock of the overall law & order situation in the province including Newly Merged Districts. The chief minister while expressing his concerns on the increasing incidents of law & order in the province, has directed the relevant departments and entities to make coordinated and concerted efforts under a well devised strategy to curb such incidents. The forum also discussed and reviewed various factors behind the in-

creasing incidents of law & order in the province and took important decisions to improve the overall situation to a satisfactory level by taking action against criminals and miscreants elements.

Chief Secretary Dr. Shehzad Bangash, Inspector General of Police Muazam Jah Ansaari, Principal Secretary to CM Amjad Ali Khan, Secretary Home Khushal Khan, Representatives of 11 Corps and other Civil and Military officials attended the meeting.

The forum has decided to further strengthen the Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) and to extend it to the district level, and the relevant police officials were directed to submit workable proposals to this effect. The forum also agreed to constitute

a joint forum of all the stake holders in order to ensure integrated efforts against the incidents of law & order in the province by putting in place an effective mechanism of coordination and liaison among the concerned civil and military entities. It was also decided in the meeting to hold monthly meetings of concerned departments with chief minister in the chair to review law & order situation in the province on regular basis.

Similarly, the forum has decided to immediately setup a special cell under CTD to effectively curb the incidents of extortions in the province, and the concerned authorities were directed to take steps for the awareness of general public regarding the aforesaid cell.

PCR test rate cut down in Sindh

KARACHI: The Sindh Healthcare Commission (SHC) on Friday reduced the Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test charges to Rs4,500 per test to increase the percentage of people tested for Covid-19 as there is surge in cases in the province.

As per notification, the test charges from home is fixed at Rs4,800. Meanwhile, the Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) from laboratories cost Rs1,200, said the Sindh Healthcare Commission.

According to the commission, prices were fixed after meeting with all stakeholders including laboratories and hospitals in Karachi. Chairman Sindh Commission Ahsan Qavi said that people should complain to the Healthcare Commission if they were overcharged for the Covid-19 testing.

Pak records 48 Covid-19 deaths

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan recorded the highest number of COVID-19 deaths -48 - in the last 24 hours, since October 7, 2021, taking the overall death toll to 29,420, the National Command and Operation's Centre (NCOC) data showed Friday morning.

The graph indicates a consistent increase in hospitalisation, with 1,618 patients in critical care, but the positivity rate has remained below 10% for the fourth consecutive day.

The number of new cases in the last 24 hours stands at 6,377 after 1,513,619 diagnostic tests were conducted, placing Pakistan's COVID-19 positivity ratio at 9.94%.

The new infections placed Pakistan's confirmed case count at 1,448,663, while the active case count clocked in at 101,858. Earlier this week, Special Assistant to Prime Minister on Health Dr Faisal Sultan asked the public to stop being lazy and get a booster shot if they haven't already, as Pakistan continues its battle against the Omicron-driven fifth COVID-19 wave.

He had urged people to get their COVID-19 booster shots if six months had passed since they got their second vaccination dose. "Scientific data has shown that people need an additional dose of the vaccine despite being fully vaccinated for protection against COVID-19 if six months and over have passed," Dr Sultan had said, while addressing a press conference after attending a meeting at the NCOC in Islamabad.

He had said that earlier, the NCOC was only asking people to get the booster dose, but now it is recommending it again based on scientific evidence. - APP

Hindu senator presides over Kashmir session

ISLAMABAD: Hindu Senator Krishna Kolhi on Friday presided over the Kashmir session of the upper house of the parliament. Addressing the members, Krishna Kolhi remarked that it was a slap on the face of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi that a Hindu lawmaker was presiding over the Pakistani Senate's session on Kashmir.

Later, the senators strongly condemned the terrorist attacks in Noshki and Panjgur areas of Balochistan and offered Fateha for martyrs of the security forces. The House also offered Fateha for personnel of Nowshera police and father of Minister for Maritime Affairs Ali Haider Zaidi. Senator Mushtaq Ahmed led the Fateha and prayed for peace and security of the country. The senators also adopted a resolution to express solidarity with the people of Kashmir.

Leader of the Opposition in Senate and former prime minister Yousaf Raza Gilani said India was trying to change the population ratio in Kashmir. "If India wants to restore relations with Pakistan, then it should reverse its move of August 5, 2019, through which it repealed the illegally occupied Kashmir's autonomous status," Gilani said. He said the Kashmir issue should be resolved according to the wishes of Kashmiris. He said India had been oppressing Kashmiris for more than seven decades. The Indian state's violence had reached dangerous levels and it was engaged in genocide of Kashmiris, he maintained.

Gilani said his party leaders like former prime ministers Zulfikar Ali Bhutto and Benazir Bhutto would become a voice of Kashmiris. He said peace was not possible in the South Asia till resolution of the Kashmir conflict. He said his party stood in solidarity with Kashmiris. He demanded from India to release all political prisoners in Kashmir, lift curfew, stop changing demographic character of Kashmir and restore Kashmir-related confidence building measures.
