Government employees, welcome PM's decision

PESHAWAR: The Government employees and pensioners here Tuesday welcomed announcement of the Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif regarding 10 percent increase in their salaries and pension. The labourers, farmers and general public also appreciated the newly elected Prime Minister for increasing minimum wages to record Rs 25,000 which was unprecedented in the country's history.

Information Officer (Retd), Misal Khan while talking to APP said Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif has won hearts and minds of hundreds of thousands of pensioners after announcing 10 percent increase in pension of government employees and termed it a landmark decision.

He said it would provide significant relief to price-hike stricken families of pensioners in the wake of price-hike and inflation.

Corona positivity ratio further plunges

PESHAWAR: Positivity ratio has further plunged in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa as only 14 new Corona cases have been confirmed in the province during the last 24 hours, said Corona updates shared by the Health Department here on Tuesday. With the confirmation of only 14 new cases, the number of total active cases has also dropped to 452 in the province. Coronavirus has claimed 6322 lives during the period of over two years. However, no death has occurred due to the virus during the last one week. During the same period 31 patients have also been recovered from the disease in the province reaching the number of the recovered persons to 212522. - APP

FSC reserves verdict on interest monetary system

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Shariat Court (FSC) after hearing arguments reserved its verdict over the petitions with regard to the interest-based monetary system. A three-member bench of the FSC headed by Chief Justice Muhammad Noor Meskanzai heard the case. No representative from the Ministry of Interior appear before the court in the hearing today.

Dr. Muhammad Aslam Khaki, an Islamic jurist, while seeking further time said that the meeting between the President and Attorney not yet confirmed. "It has to be seen that the schemes that have been challenged come in the defination of Riba or not," the counsel said. "No scheme has been challenged, are you opposing," the bench questioned the counsel.

FCCI holds Pakistan **Economic Conference**

Lodhran: Secretary Livestock South Punjab Nasir Jamal Hotiyana said that availability of affordable and quality items in Ramadan bazaars is being ensured. He further said that district price control magistrates should carry out effective monitoring for eradication of artificial inflation. He said that negligence in providing relief to the people during the month of Ramadan would not be tolerated at all. He expressed these views while presiding over a high level meeting held in the Committee Room of the Deputy Commissioner's Office here today. Chinese companies launch 'Special Ramazan Plan' in Pakistan

Working hours have been adjusted from 9 am to 2 pm. Iftar are being organized variously with different groups

ISLAMABAD: Thousands of Pakistani workers and officials are experiencing ease in spending fast during their working hours in Chinese companies since the onset of Ramazan, according to a report published by Gwadar Pro. A number of Chinese companies have launched "Special Ramazan Plan" for Muslim staff as a considerate relief facilitating them to keep fast in true Islamic letters and spirit across Pakistan.

Given the Special Ramazan Plan, Pakistani Muslim Staff are having special allocated times for prayers, reduction in working hours, light workload and ample meal arrangements at sehri (fast-holding time) and Iftar (fast-breaking time). Meanwhile, many companies have announced additional salaries and beforehand salaries enabling Pakistani staff to manage their needs and budgets in Ramazan.

Usama Hamid, senior translator in Challenge Textile. a Chinese company based in Lahore, said that under special Ramazan plan, half an hour of time has been set aside for "Asar prayer".

Meanwhile, Chinese management has allocated a separate space with prayer carpets inside the company's premises, allowing staff to do prayers conveniently. "The time-break and special prayer space have won the hearts of Muslim workers," he added. "Chinese companies allowed staff to leave work for 15 to 20 minutes before the holding and breaking of fast, allowing them to prepare themselves to perform religious practices in accordance with Islamic injunctions", he said. The special Ramazan budget is also serving staff with abundant quality food

during Sehri and Iftari times. Hafiz Hussam Sohail, a Pakistani official working as Manager of Stations in Orange Line Metro Train (OLMRT) told Gwadar Pro that all Muslim staff are in high spirit during Ramazan as the company has reduced working hours, duties and provided maximum ease from Iftari time to Sehri time since the advent of Ramazan, "Instead of 48 hours a week, Muslim staff only need to work for 36 hours. Workers have six hours cut on patrolling assignments. Drivers enjoyed nap arrangements after each trip to observe fast diligently.

There are elaborate arrangements in terms of the quality and the quantity of meals for fasting people. Another perk is that salary will be provided many days before the end of Ramazan,"he detailed.

China's Consul General in Lahore, Peng Zhengwu, said that Chinese companies offered more resting time for Pakistani Muslim staff in Ramazan. Most of them also send traditional gifts to Pakistanis working in various capacities in China-run enterprises.

Especially in Gwadar Port where hundreds of local Muslims are at work. China Overseas Port Holding Company (COPHC) has enforced Ramazan measures. Chairman of Z COPHC, Zhang Baozhong, said that all local employees are paid with a one-month additional salary to help support in the month of Ramazan. "Working hours have been adjusted from 9 am to 2 pm. Iftar are being organized variously with different groups,"he added. President of Lahore Overseas Chinese Association (LOCA) Luo Jianxue said that in Ramazan, Pakistani staff in Chinese companies have less workload and shorter working hours.

Three fresh Covid cases reported in capital

ISLAMABAD: Health officials on Tuesday said that three new Coronavirus cases were reported in the federal capital during the last 24 hours. According to an official of the Ministry of National Health Services, one case was reported on Monday while seven cases were reported on Sunday.

He said that the figure remained high during the past months while the declining trend was observed in th few days. He added so far 135,130 cases were reported from the federal capital and 1,023 deaths were reported from Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) while 134,036 patients had been recovered completely.

He said that on the direction of the Ministry of National Health Services, the district administration of Islamabad had continued surveillance of the capital to control the transmission of the infection. The official said that the local administration had prepared a plan to regularly examine the marriage halls, markets, and petrol pumps by its inspection teams to monitor the implementation of standard operating procedures (SOPs). He said that several local-level administrative decisions were being made to completely control the disease. He advised the citizens to follow precautionary measures to stop the increasing transmission of COVID-19 in the city. - APP

ISLAMABAD: As the holy month of Ramzan has entered into second Ashra, the citizens are gearing up for starting the Eid-ul-Fitr shopping through visiting main markets of federal capital to celebrate the festivity in a fullest manner.

Different famous brands as well as local markets have displayed the latest Eid editions of dresses, shoes and other essential accessories to attract the buyers and gain maximum profits.

Although a number of buyers altered their mode of shopping from physical to digital one during last year's COVID situation, lowever, majority buyers still prefer visiting the shopping malls themselves to shop different items for their ultimate satisfaction.

"I have started visiting the nearest shopping mall after Iftar time to complete Eid shopping for myself and family. Since the tailors have stopped taking orders of stitching dresses, so I have to buy ready to wear dresses for all my family members". Shaista Amin, a house wife said.

Railways earns Rs200.33 billion, in four years

Railways (PR) has earned around Rs 200.33 billion during the last four years and also significantly decreased its working expenses to transform the organization into a profitable entity. "Pakistan Railways has earned Rs49.576 bln in 2017-18, Rs54.514 bln in 2018-19, Rs47.588 billion in 2019-2020 and Rs48.652 bln in 2020-21." an official in the Ministry of Railway told APP. To question about facilitating the people of Gujranwala, he said that Khyber Mail, Tezgam Express, Awam Express, Jaffar Express, SubakRaftar and SubaukKharam were observing stoppages at main

Guiranwala station.

The official said that the punctuality ratio of Pakistan Railways passenger trains have improved by around 90 percent in year 2021-2022 due to untiring efforts of the management. "With the punctuality of trains and concrete measures taken by the previous government, over 20 million passengers have been added in the system, which is an ample proof of department's achievement," he added.

"The quality of food served in the passenger trains had been improved considerably as it had been officially supervised by the authorities that passengers should get pure and quality food on the trains," he added.

To another question, he

said Pakistan Railways had so far upgraded around 630 coaches from its own resources to increase revenue of the department and facilitate its passengers for comfortable travel. He said that 168 coaches were upgraded in 2016-17,

192 in 2017-18 and 260 coaches in 2018-19, while taking several steps to improve financial position of the organization included starting of new trains with the same rolling stock and human resources. The official said Pakistan Railways was also planning to repair another 472 coaches which were either out of service or non-functional since long and required heavy or light

maintenance. - APP

8 vehicles added to CDA's water tanker fleet

ISLAMABAD: Capital Development Authority's (CDA) Water Management Wing has added eight (08) vehicles to water tankers' fleet after necessary repair and maintenance work to improve water supply at sectoral areas. The maintenance and repair work was done in workshop of Machinery Pool Organization (MPO) in short span of time following CDA chairman Aamer Ali Ahmed directions to relief the masses in the holy month said, Deputy Director

General (DG) Water Management, Sardar Khan Zimri. ISLAMABAD: The government has released an amount of Rs 12,629.23 million for various new and ongoing projects of the Interior Division under Pubic Sector Development Programme (PSDP) for year 2021-21 in last three quarters. As per the data of Planning Commission, the government had allocated a sum of Rs 21,048.715 million for various ongoing and new projects to the Interior Division under PSDP 2021-22. As per the Planning Commission, a sum of Rs 12,035.353 million has been specified for various on-going projects while Rs 9,013.362 million for new schemes.

An amount of Rs 710.215 million, allocated for on-going scheme, capacity enhancement of CAF-Management of western border by raising eight additional wings for frontier corps Balochistan (North), Rs 3000.000 million for construction of 10 Avenue, Islamabad, Rs 457.000 million for construction of accommodation for Bhittai Rangers at Karachi, Rs 825.000 million for construction of Korang Bridge and PWD underpass Islamabad and Rs 800.000 million for construction of Model Prison at H-16, Islamabad. - APP

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Environmental Protection Agency (Pak-EPA) on Tuesday underscored that the water availability was a serious concern due to growing scarcity issues in the Capital for sustainable high rise residential projects. Pak-EPA Director Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Ahsan Rafi Kiani chaired the public hearing of the EIA Reports of Imarat Residences (IR) 1&2 highrise residential towers to be developed along the Expressway near Capital Enclave Housing Society.

The Project Proponent for IR-1&2 DrShahidMehmood Director Imarat Groups briefed the participants on both the projects located on Expressway at parallel locations. Mehmood said the IR-1 was located at Zone-V of the Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) that would comprise of three towers.

The project was spreading over an area of 14,336.36 square yards (Sqyd) that would upto 29floors for Tower A, Ground plus 17 floors for Tower B and Tower C with the two basements (each accommodating 312 cars) and elevated site for parking. He added that the IR-1 had a unique location which was accessible from all areas of the twin cities of Rawalpindi and Islamabad. The total covered area of the project would be 14,000 Sqyd with its 47% area as ground cover and 53% for landscaping. The IR-1 would have 467 residential units which would be completed in three years at a cost of US\$80 million where no construction was carried out on the site yet. He added that the project would have minimal impact on environment and biodiversity due to its small area.

While briefing on the IR-2 project, he said the project's total area was 30.4 kanals located along Expressway opposite to IR-1 that would have 933 total units. The total solid waste generation was recorded to be 3,872 kilograms per day.

He informed that the keeping in view the electricity demands, energy and environmental conservation best global practices and standards were being followed to ensure a self sustainable housing project. Dr. Mehmood informed that for liquid waste management septic tanks would be established for sewage collection that would be transported to the Sewage

Treatment Plant being jointly developed by the Imarat Group and Capital Enclave Society that would be completed by 2025.

Responding to various queries, he said for the availability of water three different sources including ground water, Soan water station, and Ghazi Barotha project.

The Project Architect Imarat Group Mr Abdullah informed that the three towers would have central cores and have separate garbage shoots to ensure waste segregation and proper management. "We have three car parkings comprising of two basements and one elevated platform. All units and towers have been designed to have natural air and ventilation for all apartments. We will introduce vertical gardening on the roofs and terraces.

Moreover, we are using porous materials and solar panels to ensure energy conservancy under our main concept of smart development", he added.

Director EIA Pak-EPA DrAhsanKiani directed the project proponent to provide detailed information of public consultation and underlined that the project cost of IR-1 was \$80 million but no mention of second project cost was made in the EIA Report.

He pointed out that the water crisis was going to the major future concern of the Capital whereas the water availability and adequacy of source was not mentioned in the EIA report. He said that the EIA Report details pertaining to electricity demands and energy conservancy were generic and should be updated accordingly.

ISLAMABAD: The government has so far released funds amounting to Rs1,949.72 million to execute seven ongoing and six new petroleum-related projects under the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP 2021-22) against a total allocation of Rs3,249.54 million.

Out of the total disbursement of Rs1,949.72 million, around Rs313.43 million have been spent on petroleum projects during an eight-month period (July-February) of the current fiscal year to accelerate oil and gas exploration activities and achieve self-sufficiency in the energy sector., according to official data available with APP. Macron v Le Pen

S the smoke cleared following the first round of France's presidential election on Sunday, the most significant political speech of the night was arguably delivered by one of the losers. After coming unexpectedly close to beating Marine Le Pen to second place in the race, Jean-Luc Mélenchon, the hard-left leader of France Unbowed, urged his supporters not to vote for her in the runoff between Emmanuel Macron on 24 April. "There must not be one single vote for Le Pen in the second round," said Mr Mélenchon.

The bluntness of the message indicates the gravity of a political moment that feels alarmingly unpredictable and unreadable. Mr Macron secured 28% of the first-round vote. His four-point lead over Ms Le Pen was actually slightly bigger than five years ago, when he went on to win their head-to-head confrontation by a landslide. But the context of 2017 - when Mr Macron was seen as a fresh-faced liberal insurgent promising democratic renewal, and Ms Le Pen was struggling and failing to detoxify her brand - no longer applies. This time round, polls suggest a far tighter contest in two weeks, with some suggesting that the gap between the two candidates is within the margin of error; for the first time in the 64-year history of the Fifth Republic, the French far right has a genuine - if outside - chance of winning the presidency.

How did France get here? Clever PR has enabled Ms Le Pen to successfully soften her public image, while the ongoing collapse of the centre-left and centre-right has normalised her presence in the spotlight. The emergence of a far-right rival in the form of the xenophobic television pundit ÉricZemmour has also helped, allowing the National Rally leader to present herself as a relative moderate while preparing to inherit his support. In the runoff, she will be able to consolidate a far-right bloc of more than 30% of voters.

A president sometimes perceived as aloof, high-handed and on the side of the wealthy - and whose relations with much of the left have ranged from tricky to toxic - thus faces the biggest test of his political career. Perhaps understandably, given his focus on events in Ukraine, Mr Macron has fought a lacklustre and lethargic campaign so far. His visit on Monday to a depressed post-industrial region in northern France signalled a change of gear. Between now and 24 April, Mr Macron must find a way to shore up a "republican front" of anti-far-right voters that appears dangerously fragile. The reckoning as to how it was ever allowed to get this close can come later.

Curbs must remain at place

HE recent global rise in Covid-19 cases has worried experts and public health officials. New worldwide infections have jumped by 8 per cent globally compared to the previous week, with 11 million new cases. As per the WHO, a combination of factors, including the highly transmissible Omicron variant and its BA. 2 sublineage, and the lifting of public health and social measures in several countries, have contributed to the current spike. Low vaccination rates in some countries, driven partly by a "huge amount of misinformation" also explained the rise in new cases, WHO officials noted.

Some of the biggest jumps in Covid-19 cases have been reported in South Korea and China, where cases rose by 25 per cent and deaths by 27 per cent during recent weeks. During this time Africa saw a 12 per cent rise in new cases and 14 per cent rise in deaths, and Europe a 2 per cent rise in cases but no big jump in deaths. While cases are on the rise in some geographies, there are no signs that it causes more severe disease.

In China where the spike is marked, the big jump in cases in Shanghai has resulted in mass Covid testing even as 26 million people face lockdown. Beijing has tightened curbs elsewhere in the country consistent with the country's zero-tolerance policy to prevent its medical system from breaking down. At present the world is witnessing 1.5 million new cases each day. Large outbreaks are spreading in Asia. A new wave is sweeping across Europe. Presently BA. 2 is the dominant strain circulating around the US, accounting for almost three out of every four cases. Broadly the cases have dipped 5 per cent across the US to an average of about 28,700 cases from an average of more than 30,000 cases a fortnight ago. While experts note that a significant rise in hospitalisations or deaths is not expected, there have been signs of hospitalisations rising among the elderly in other countries like the UK.

The current situation calls for a balanced approach. While the world cannot afford to remain captive to Covid forever, we need to keep our guard up. National governments around the world must speed up the administration of the booster dose of the vaccine by opening it up for all. Countries where Covid relaxations are in place, health care infrastructure should remain in top gear. Testing must continue as also common sense measures like masking and sanitising.

Hindu nationalism will ultimately harm all of India

HE ideology will likely leave India divided, weaker and poorer. India marked the festival of Ram Navami - commemorating the birthday of the Hindu deity Lord Ram - with gusto on April 10. But more than the customary celebrations that normally define such pious occasions, the day will be best remembered for the many acts of criminality that swept every corner of the vast nation. Across the Indian states this Sunday, marauding mobs of Hindu fanatics were out on the streets raising provocative slogans against minority communities, primarily Muslims, and vandalising mosques. In some places, they carried out physical assaults. Lord Ram embodies love and remains synonymous with righteous rule. But there was little that was righteous about the manner his birthday was celebrated this time. Amid reports of violence pouring in from various states – from Gujarat in the west to Bengal in the east – even Delhi, the nation's capital, wasn't spared. At its sprawling Jawaharlal Neh-

ru University, known to be a citadel of left-wing liberalism, right-wing activists reportedly attacked students to prevent them from having meat on such an "auspicious" day. Scores were injured and dozens were arrested following the fracas. Minor details, such as Indians being overwhelmingly non-vegetarian, with surveys showing that some 70 percent of them regularly consume meat, mattered little to the assailants. An outspoken section of high-caste Hindus has long been peddling the misplaced religious virtues of vegetarianism, and the Hindutva (Hindu supremacy) brigade that is bent on establishing the supremacy of Hindus is attempting to force the rest of India to adhere to it.

Coming in the wake of a spate of assaults directed at minorities - from lynching Muslim cattle traders to the orchestrated opposition against students who wore the Hijab, the Muslim headscarf - Sunday's Ram Navami served the newest evidence that India is dangerously hurtling down the road of unabashed Hindutya.

But India is a diverse country where Hindus make up some 80 percent of the population. Muslims, Christians, Sikhs, Jains and others make up the rest of the country, where 22 official languages are spoken across regions rooted in different landscapes, customs and traditions. Needless to say, the hegemonic vision of Hindutva does not sit well with an India that has always celebrated its unity in diversity. Many, therefore, are immensely concerned about its ultimate consequences. Muslims, for that matter, already have reasons to be worried. In state after state, they have been targeted, vilified and browbeaten; the latest being the Muslim traders of Karnataka state who have been barred from setting up shop in temple fairs. Before that, their right to offer prayers at designated places was curtailed in places such as Gurgaon, near Delhi. There is now a campaign to ban mosque loudspeakers. Suddenly, these 200 million Muslims can be excused for feeling less Indian. Report after report has indicated

that as a community they have not been doing well. For example, less than three percent of Indian executives in the top 500 companies are Muslim, and no more than 21 percent of Muslim workers have salaried jobs, compared to 33 percent of Hindus. The current situation, high on religious hatred and steeped in growing in-

tolerance, will make it worse for them. If some among the community are to be believed, many Muslims who have the means are already leaving India for safer places. Those who cannot are putting their head down and withdrawing further into themselves, accelerating the process of ghettoisation.

As it is, India isn't doing too well economically. Growth has been sluggish, inflation high and unemployment is on the rise. The overall unemployment was at 7.6 percent, as of the end of March. It could get worse if hatred and strife are allowed to spiral. As many economists say, hate and paranoia are not exactly the means for societies to prosper. According to them, India is unlikely to become an economic powerhouse if it excludes its minorities - some one-fifth of the population from economic activity.

The country, they say, would instead need freedoms, trust and stability to progress. And entrepreneurs, irrespective of their caste, creed and religion, would be required to innovate and inspire. Hindutva fanatics are continuing on their path of muscular nationalism though, undeterred by the commonly voiced apprehensions. They are apparently out to rediscover the lost glory that India forfeited during its long Mughal and latter-day British rule.

But they could be living in a paradise – a fool's paradise to be precise. Using inherently divisive religious nationalism to produce economic growth is the same as using the timber industry to increase the population of trees, a columnist pointed out recently. Many tend to agree that Hindutva will leave India divided, weaker and a lot poorer.

Not only Ukrainians, but all refugees deserve compassion

T has been more than a month since Russia embarked on an all-out invasion of Ukraine. A whole nation has been in despair since troops started moving towards Kyiv on February 24. Entire towns have been destroyed. Tens of thousands have perished. And more than four million people had to flee their homes to seek safety in neighbouring countries.

Day after day we watched tragic, but somewhat familiar, scenes on our screens: mothers running with babies in their arms, families searching for their possessions in the rubble of their homes, thousands of desperate refugees crowding border zones.

But among the footage from Ukraine, there were also some not so familiar scenes: border guards of neighbouring countries welcoming refugees with open arms; citizens hosting Ukrainians in need of accommodation in their own homes; politicians giving speech after speech outlining what they will do to help those fleeing the war; universities offering places to students from Ukraine so they can continue their studies. I was, of course, pleased to see the world unite to support Ukrainians. As someone who knows the horrors of war all too well, I sympathise and stand in solidarity with all those fleeing Russia's brutal invasion. But like so many people who have had to flee a war, as I watched the Ukrainian refugee crisis unfold, I could not help but ask: Where were these world leaders, corporations and universities when armed invaders attacked and burned my village just 11 years ago? Where were the people of goodwill offering for me to stay with them instead of being stuck in a refugee camp for a decade?

I have known forced displacement and war all my life. I was born and raised in a small village in Ethiopia where my father had settled after fleeing the first Sudanese civil war. When I was young, my father told me countless stories about his life in South Sudan. He told me not only about the beautiful village by the Nile where he spent his childhood, but also about the times he had to run and hide from helicopters

dropping bombs.

In 2010, my father's story became my own. My small village in Ethiopia was attacked by armed militias, and I became a refugee. Eleven years later, I am still a refugee. All my family members are still refugees. I am lucky to be living and studying temporarily in Canada, but my family is still stuck in a refugee camp.

The war did not just steal my home and my childhood. It stole my family's future. How different our lives would be now if the world had responded to my father's cry for help some five decades ago with the same compassion and care it is now offering to Ukrainians? Or 11 years ago, when our village in Ethiopia was attacked? My family and I are in no way part of an unlucky minority. According to the United Nations, before the beginning of the invasion of Ukraine, there were already an unbelievable 82.4 million forcibly displaced people across the world.

That is, actually, more people than the entire population of Ukraine. In each refugee camp, each IDP (internally displaced people) camp, and each less formal refugee settlement, from Ethiopia to Bangladesh and Lebanon to Mexico, there are countless children, men and women who want nothing but safety, stability and a place to call home permanently. There are teachers, doctors, engineers, entrepreneurs, students, mothers and fathers who just want to leave the pain and suffering of the past behind, live their lives and contribute to society.

It showed us that the international community can embrace those fleeing war. That the governments can swiftly set up safe pathways for those seeking refuge. That universities and schools can offer places to refugee children to ensure they do not have to give up on their futures due to war and hardship. That common citizens can step up and speak up so the human rights of refugees in their countries are respected. As the war in Ukraine continues, I cannot help but fear the international community will soon get used to the situation in Ukraine - like it got used to the endless wars in many other countries - and turn its back on Ukrainians in need. I also fear that once this crisis is over, governments and people who suddenly showed care and compassion to refugees will return to business as usual they will continue to ignore the plight of those fleeing war, conflict and hardship elsewhere in the world.

In the past month, the international community showed what it is capable of doing for people fleeing conflict. Let us not forget this, and repeat this successful example in other geographies and conflicts. Because every child, every human being, everywhere, deserves

peace and a place to call home.

No amount of Israeli violence will change reality of Palestine conflict

To placate angry Israelis, the Israeli military has in the past raided the city and refugee camp of Jenin on many occasions, each time leaving several dead or wounded Palestinians behind...

HERE is a reason Israel is insistent on linking the recent series of attacks carried out by Palestinians to a specific location, namely the Jenin refugee camp in the northern West Bank. By doing so, the embattled Naftali Bennett government can simply order another deadly military operation in Jenin to reassure its citizens that the situation is under control. Indeed, on Saturday, the Israeli army stormed the Jenin camp, killing a Palestinian and wounding at least 10 others. However, Israel's problem is much bigger than Jenin.

If we examine the events – starting with the March 22 stabbing attack in the southern city of Beersheba, which resulted in the death of four Israelis, and ending with the killing of three Israelis in Tel Aviv, including two army officers – we can reach an obvious conclusion: These attacks must have been, to some extent, coordinated.

Spontaneous Palestinian retaliation to the violence of the Israeli occupation rarely follows this pattern in terms of timing or style. All the attacks,

with the exception of Beersheba, were carried out using firearms. The shooters, as indicated by the amateur footage of some of the events and statements by Israeli eyewitnesses, were well trained and acted with great composure.

An example was the March 27 Hadera attack, carried out by two cousins, Ayman and Ibrahim Ighbariah, from the Arab town of Umm Al-Fahm inside Israel. Israeli media reported the unmistakable skills of the attackers and the fact they were armed with weapons that, according to the Tazpit Press Service, cost more than \$30,000.

Unlike Palestinian attacks carried out during the Second Intifada in response to Israeli violence in the Occupied Territories, the recent attacks are generally more pinpointed, seek police and military personnel, and are clearly aimed at shaking Israel's false sense of security and undermining the country's intelligence services. In the Bnei Brak attack on March 29, for example, an Israeli woman who was at the scene told reporters that "the militant asked us to move away from the place because he did not want to target women or children." While Israeli intelligence reports recently warned of a "wave of terrorism" ahead of Ramadan, they clearly had little idea of what type of violence to expect or where and how the Palestinians would strike.

Following the Beersheba attack, Israeli officials referred to Daesh's responsibility – a convenient move considering that the group had claimed responsibility. This theory was quickly marginalized, as it became obvious that the other Palestinian attackers had other political affiliations or, as in the Bnei Brak case, no known affiliation at all. The confusion and misinformation continued for days. A number of Palestinian workers were quickly rounded up in Tel Aviv on suspicion of being the attackers simply because they looked Arab, offering evidence of the chaotic Israeli approach. Indeed, following each event, total mayhem ensued, with large mobs of armed Israelis taking to the streets looking for anyone with Arab features to apprehend or beat senseless. Israeli officials have contributed to the frenzy, with far-right politicians like Itamar Ben-Gvir leading hordes of other ex-

tremists on rampages in occupied Jerusalem. Israeli officials and media are, once again, conveniently placing the blame largely on Jenin, a tiny stretch of an overpopulated area. By doing so, Israel wants to give the impression that the new phenomenon of retaliatory Palestinian attacks is confined to a single place, which is adjacent to the Israeli border and can easily be "dealt with." An Israeli military operation in the camp may serve Bennett's political agenda, convey a sense of strength and win back some in his disenchanted political constituency. But it is only a temporary fix. Attacking Jenin now makes no difference in the long run. After all, the camp rose from the ashes of its near-total destruction by the Israeli military in April 2002.

The renewed Palestinian attacks speak of a much wider geography: The Negev, Umm Al-Fahm and the West Bank. The seeds of this territorial connectivity are linked to the Israeli war of last May and the subsequent Palestinian rebellion, which erupted in every part of Palestine, including the Palestinian communities inside Israel.

Israel's problem is its insistence on providing short-term military solutions to a long-term problem, which itself results from these very military solutions. If Israel continues to subjugate the Palestinian people under the current system of military occupation and deepening apartheid, Palestinians will surely continue to respond until their oppressive reality is changed. No amount of Israeli violence can alter this truth.

LONDON: Prime Minister Boris Johnson and his finance minister Rishi Sunak have been told they will be fined by police over lockdown-breaking parties held on UK government premises, a Downing Street spokesperson told CNN on Tuesday.

London's Metropolitan Police said earlier Tuesday they had issued more than 50 fines as part of their "Operation Hillman" investigation into gatherings held on government premises in Downing Street and Whitehall while the rest of the country was living under strict pandemic restrictions. Revelations of the parties sparked national outrage. The police fines are confirmation that Johnson and Sunak broke Covid-19 laws created by their own government - even though the Prime Minister previously denied some parties were held and insisted all guidance was followed. The penalty makes Johnson the first sitting UK Prime Minister to be found guilty of breaking the law.

It was unclear which gatherings Johnson and Sunak were facing fines over; the government spokesman said they had no fur-



Palestinian shot dead by Israel

ASHKELON: Israeli occupation forces shot and killed a Palestinian worker at a construction site in Ashkelon city in the

Israeli media reported that a police officer was on a patrol searching for Palestinians working in 'Israel' without work permits in construction sites in the area.

However, the police officer opened fire at the 40-year-old worker, claiming the worker refused to show his identity

The worker has been identified later as Abdullah Srour, a resident of the city of Hebron, south of the occupied West Bank. 45 dead in South Africa floods

DURBAN: At least 45 people have died in floods and mudslides after rainstorms struck the South African port city of Durban and surrounding KwaZulu-Natal province, the authorities said on Tuesday. The country's meteorologists forecasted more "extreme" rains on the way Tuesday night accompanied by "widespread flooding".

"The latest reports indicate that over 45 people have lost their lives as a result of the heavy rains, this number could possibly increase as more reports come in," the province's Department of Cooperative Governance announced in a statement. Days of pounding rain flooded several areas, tore houses apart and ravaged

infrastructure across the southeastern city, while landslips caused train services across KwaZulu-Natal province to be suspended. The rains have flooded city highways, torn apart bridges, submerged cars and collapsed houses. A fuel tank was floating in the sea after being tossed off the road. Civilian deaths in Ukraine rise to 1,892

GENEVA: The civilian death toll in the Russia-Ukraine war has climbed to 1,892, the UN said on Tuesday, while the number of people fleeing the war is now above 4.6 million.

At least 2,558 more people have been injured in Ukraine since Feb. 24, the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) said in a statement.

"Most of the civilian casualties recorded were caused by the use of explosive weapons with a wide impact area, including shelling from heavy artillery and multiple launch rocket systems, and missile and air strikes," it added.

Data from the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) showed the number of people who have left Ukraine since the start of the war has risen to more than 4.61 million.

Most of them have gone to neighboring countries - over 2.64 million to Poland, 701,741 to Romania, 433,083 to Russia, 428,954 to Hungary, 413,374 to Moldova, 320,246 to Slovakia, and 21,292 to Belarus, according to the latest UN-HCR figures.

Millions more are internally displaced in Ukraine, with an update from the International Organization for Migration earlier this week placing the number at 7.1 million. - APP

Philippines floods kill 42 people

MANILA: The death toll from the floods and landslides in the Philippines rose to 42 on Tuesday, according to local sources.

Authorities said search and rescue operations in the Baybay city of the Leyte province were suspended since it was "too dangerous" to continue in the dark, according to the US television

Earlier, the country's disaster management authority said at least 20 people were killed in floods caused by a tropical depression, locally

known as Agaton. Bad weather caused over 280 flooding incidents in many parts of the country. including in the Bicol and autonomous Bangsamoro regions in Muslim Mindanao, the daily Phil Star reported, quoting the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council.

Central Philippines also reported landslides triggered by the floods.

Police teams have been deployed to the flood-hit areas.

More than 95,700 families were affected by the floods, with a large number of peo-

ple being displaced. The bad weather situation damaged 37 roads, five

bridges, and 84 houses. Agriculture fields many parts of the archipelago nation, including in Bangsamoro, have become inundated.

Brig. Gen. Roderick Alba. who is overseeing the rescue efforts, said: "We have also conducted rescue operations for stranded residents. Our rescue teams are on standby. The only way that we can alleviate the worst effect of this typhoon is through the cooperation of every stakeholder." - APP

Germany's annual inflation at 7.3%

BERLIN: Germany's annual inflation rate was at 7.3% in March, the highest since 1981, the Federal Statistical Office's (Destatis) data showed on Tuesday.

On a monthly basis, consumer prices went up by 2.5% in March, Destatis added.

In March, prices increased mainly due to the surge in prices of natural gas and mineral oil products after Russia launched a war on Ukraine. Delivery bottlenecks due to interruptions in supply chains caused by the COV-ID-19 pandemic also contributed to the reading. The annual inflation rate was 5.1% in February, which also was the highest level since the German reunification, the office recalled. -APP

Sri Lanka joins the debt defaulters club

PARIS: Crisis-hit Sri Lanka said Tuesday it was defaulting on all payments on its \$51-billion external debt after running out of foreign exchange to import desperately needed goods.

The Indian Ocean island, which is battling its worst economic downturn since independence in 1948, joins a small club of countries that have failed to repay their debts.

Miftah berates PTI for damaging economy

ISLAMABAD: Senior Leader of Pakistan Muslim League Nawaz (PML-N) Miftah Ismail here on Tuesday lamented that the country's economy was badly damaged during the tenure of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) which had piled the public debt to the level of Rs 6400 billion. Addressing a press confer-

ence along with other PML-N leaders Musaddiq Malik and Muhammad Zubair, Ismail said that PTI had made people to suffer by taking the economy to this bad condition. He said, the fiscal deficit was hovering at around Rs5600 billion and if supplementary grants of Rs800 billion was included, the total amount would reach to Rs6400. The PML-N leader elaborated how the illogical decisions by the previous government had resulted in

increasing overall debt. He, however, expressed the hope that future of Pakistan was brighter under the leadership of Prime Minister Muhammad Shahbaz Sharif. He said all possible efforts would be made to contain the deficit, adding that it was their responsibility to lead country towards better future.

Miftah Ismail who is expected to become Advisor to Prime Minister on Finance, also criticized the PTI government over providing relief package of Rs 370 billion under which the former prime minister Imran Khan had announced to reduce the petroleum prices by Rs 10 per liter and electricity by Rs 5 per unit.

To a question, he said the government had not decided yet to increase the petroleum prices but the decision would be taken after reviewing the summary issued by Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (OGRA). This was a landmine that the PTI government had laid for the upcoming government, he said adding that the amnesty scheme was also needless as it was against the conditions agreed with the International Monetary Fund (IMF). - **APP**

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan League-Nawaz Muslim (PML-N) leaders say PTI's wrong economic policies have led to a projection of 6,400 billion rupees in the current budget deficit. WASHINGTON: The United States believes that Russia has started reinforcing and resupplying its troops in Donbas in eastern Ukraine, a senior U.S. defense official said on Monday.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy said on Monday thousands of Russian troops were massing for a new offensive in the east, and Russia said it would not halt its military operation in Ukraine for any further peace talks.

Despite the resupply efforts in Donbas, the United States did not believe this was the start of a new offensive in the region. the official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

US monitoring rise in rights

WASHINGTON: US Secretary of State Antony Blinken said the United States was monitoring what he described as a rise in human rights abuses in India by some officials, in a rare direct rebuke by Washington of the Asian nation's rights record. "We regularly engage with our Indian partners on these shared values (of human rights) and to that end, we are monitoring some recent concerning developments in India including a rise in human rights abuses by some government, police and prison officials,' Blinken said on Monday in a joint press briefing with US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin, Indian Foreign Minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar and India's Defence Minister Rajnath Singh. did not elaborate. Singh and Jaishankar, who spoke after Blinken at the briefing, did not comment on the human

Blinken's remarks came days after US Representative Ilhan Omar questioned the alleged reluctance of the US government to criticise Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government on human rights. "What does Modi need to do to India's Muslim population be-

fore we will stop considering them a partner in peace?" Omar, who belongs to President Joe Biden's Democratic Party, said last week.

Muslims see wave of attacks on Hindu festival Muslims in several Indian states are on edge after mobs came out in processions, making hate speeches and attacking their properties during the Hindu festival of Ram Navmi.

Most of the violence was reported from the states of Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Jharkhand and West Bengal on Sunday as the Hindu community celebrated the birthday of the god Ram, one of the chief deities of rightwing Hindu groups in India. Dozens of videos have been going viral on Indian social media since Sunday, showing processions of Hindu men wearing saffron scarves and, in some cases, carrying sticks and swords - stopping their motorcycles in Muslim neighbourhoods, playing provocative songs laced with threats of genocide outside homes and mosques, and raising hate slogans. In one of the videos, purportedly from the eastern state of Bihar's Muzaffarpur district, a man was seen climbing a mosque wall and planting a saffron flag on its entrance as others cheered, flashing swords and

At least 13 injured in Brooklyn subway shooting incident

New York governor Kathy Hochul said she had been briefed on the "developing" situation

NEW YORK: At least 13 people have been injured in a shooting incident at a subway station in the New York City borough of Brooklyn, where "several undetonated devices" were recovered, authorities said Tuesday.

A New York police spokeswoman told AFP officers responded to 911 call of a person shot in the Brooklyn subway at 8:27 am (1227 GMT).

The city's fire department gave a toll of "13 injuries at this time," while ABC News quoted police sources as saying at least five people at the 36th Street subway

The police department tweeted that there were "NO active explosive devices at this time.

"Please stay clear of the area" the NYPD tweeted, urging witnesses to contact a police tip line with any information. New York governor Kathy Hochul said she had been briefed on the "developing" situation.

were shot in the incident ues," she tweeted. ABC News reported that police were investigating whether a smoke device was detonated, and that police are hunting for the

suspect. According to NBC, citing NYPD officials and senior law enforcement officials, a man in a gas mask and orange construction vest may have tossed a smoke canister on the platform to distract the rush hour crowd. Mass casualty shootings happen with relative frequency in the United States, where firearms are involved in approximately 40,000 deaths a year, including suicides, according to the Gun Violence Archive website. The incident came just a day after US President Joe Biden announced new gun control measures, increasing restrictions on so-called "ghost guns", the difficult-to-trace weapons that can be assembled at home. Lax gun laws and a constitutionally guaranteed right to bear arms have repeatedly stymied attempts to clamp down on the number of weapons in circulation, despite greater controls being favored by the majority of Americans. - Agencies
