ANKARA: Foreign Minister Bilawal Bhutto Zardari said on Wednesday that they do not want to legislate at gunpoint or under any pressure. In his interview to Turkish media outlet on Wednesday, he said, "We have started the first phase of electoral reforms which has been passed by the parliament." Sana vows to crush 'subversive' elements

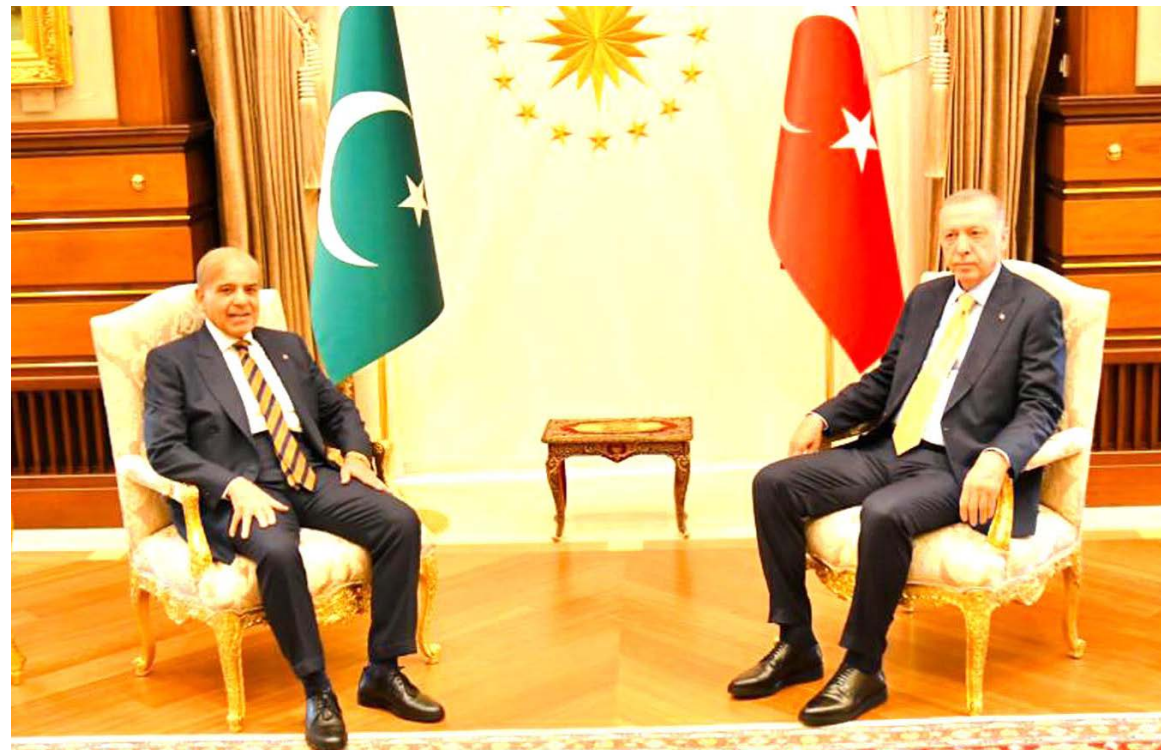

Top Court disappointed over violence

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court (SC) said Wednesday it was "disappointed" to note that riots took place in the federal capital despite its order to create a balance between both sides - the PTI and the government. "We are disappointed to note that bona fide effort made by Court was disrespected," the Supreme Court said in a written order on the plea filed by the Islamabad High Court Bar Association (IHCBA) against the government's decision to block roads to stop PTI's "Azadi March". The top court had earlier disposed of the IHCBA's petition and issued a verbal order a day after PTI Chairman Imran Khan on May 26 had announced calling off the long march. The court said by acting upon assurances given on behalf of the top leadership of PTI and issuing directions to the government, its order created a balance between the mutual

50-Member traditional Jirga left for Kabul

Gandhis summoned in money laundering probe

NEW DELHI: India's financial crime-fighting agency wants to question the two most senior members of the Nehru-Gandhi dynasty, who lead the main opposition Congress party, as it investigates a complaint of money laundering, the party said on Wednesday. The summons by the enforcement directorate is linked to a nine-year-old complaint by a lawmaker of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's

Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) against Congress President Sonia Gandhi and her son Rahul, the party said. The lawmaker, Subramanian Swamy, had accused the Gandhis of forming a shell company and illegally gaining control of properties worth \$300 million. "A disgusting and cowardly conspiracy is being hatched against the leadership of the Indian National Congress to mislead the country," the Congress party said in a statement that condemned the notice sent to the Gandhis. "The entire party and every worker will stand shoulder to shoulder with them and we will fight and win this attack on the country's democracy." The assets in question had belonged to a firm that published the National Herald newspaper, founded in 1937 by India's first prime minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, who was Rahul Gandhi's great grandfather. For his part, Swamy welcomed the action by the enforcement directorate and said he hoped they would be jailed, adding on Twitter, "From bail to jail as soon as possible."

Russian forces advance, US to send precision rockets

KYIV: Russian forces on Wednesday pressed closer to the centre of an industrial city in a drive to grab a swathe of eastern Ukraine, while the United States said it would supply advanced rockets to Kyiv to help push Moscow to negotiate an end to the war. Ukraine's General Staff said Russian forces, now 98 days into their invasion, pounded infrastructure in eastern and southern regions, including the city of Sievierodonetsk, which they entered on May 27 and is the main focus of their ground offensive in the eastern Donbas region. According to provincial governor Serhiy Gaidai, a Russian airstrike hit the Azot chemical factory in Sievierodonetsk on Tuesday, blowing up a tank of toxic nitric acid and releasing a plume of pink smoke. Kremlin says talks with Zelenskiy possible

MOSCOW: Russia said on Wednesday that it did not rule out a meeting between President Vladimir Putin and his Ukrainian counterpart Volodymyr Zelenskiy, but that any such talks needed to be prepared in advance. Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters in a call that work on a peace document with Ukraine had stopped a long time ago

million weapons package expected to be formally announced on Wednesday. "We have moved quickly to send Ukraine a significant amount of weaponry and ammunition so it can fight on the battlefield

"But we don't see any signs of that right now," he added. Instead, Mr Blinken said it was likely there would still be "many months of conflict" as Russia continues its onslaught in the east of Ukraine.

dollars worth of equipment such as drones and anti-aircraft missiles - included the M142 High Mobility Artillery Rocket System (HIMARS), which Kyiv has said is "crucial" to counter Russian missile attacks. Addressing concerns that such weapons could draw the United States into direct conflict, Jonathan Finer, deputy White House national security adviser, said Washington had asked Ukraine for assurances the missiles would not strike inside Russia. Russia, however, warned of an increased risk of direct confrontation with the United States. Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov, speaking in Saudi Arabia, said the supply of the rocket launchers to Ukraine raised the risks of a "third country" being dragged into the conflict. Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said such supplies would not encourage Ukraine's leadership to resume stalled peace talks. "We believe that the United States is purposefully and diligently adding fuel to the fire," Peskov said.

EU's oil embargo

In the lead-up to this week's European Union summit in Brussels, Germany's economy minister and deputy chancellor, Robert Habeck, warned that unity over sanctions on Russia was "starting to crumble". If that assessment was intended to galvanise EU leaders at a crucial moment, it appears to have just about done its job. The partial embargo on Russian oil imports agreed at the summit on Monday night constitutes a significant, if belated, ratcheting up of economic pressure on Vladimir Putin's regime. After a month of negotiations between member states, objections from Hungary were finally overcome through a temporary exemption for oil transported through a Soviet-era pipeline to central Europe. Given that Germany and Poland will forgo imports from this source, by the end of the year the embargo should cover over 90% of Russian oil supplies to Europe. The EU's foreign policy chief, Josep Borrell, was therefore justified in describing the oil embargo as a show of unity and a "landmark" agreement. An announcement of 9bn in economic aid to Ukraine was also welcome, although it should only be seen as a start. However, financing that colossal challenge is tomorrow's task. In the shorter term – as it attempts to intensify the financial squeeze on Mr Putin – the west must give Ukraine the military assistance it needs to resist Russian forces, while continuing to avoid moves that risk escalating and widening the war. In May, Washington committed to a \$40bn package to aid Ukraine's war effort, and the supply of US weapons is accelerating – including vital artillery capability. European countries need to up the pace of their own contributions, as the Kremlin attempts to concentrate overwhelming force in the east and annex new territory. But the US president, Joe Biden, was right this week to rule out sending long-range missile systems to Ukraine which could be deployed to hit targets inside Russia. The goal, as Mr Putin's appalling war of choice continues, must be that President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and the Ukrainian people are enabled to negotiate its end from a position of strength and dignity. If this is to be achieved, it will be through a combination of economic pressure on Moscow and military resistance. Russia's armed forces are being steadily and damagingly depleted, even as incremental territorial gains are made. Thus far, Mr Putin has shown total disregard for the human cost of his invasion, now measured in tens of thousands of lost lives. But the cumulative impact of sanctions can set logistical limits to his brutal revanchist ambitions. This week's oil embargo is an important step in that direction.

New cold war must not come to S. Pacific

From May 26 to June 4, State Councilor and Foreign Minister Wang Yi is paying official visits to eight countries in the Pacific region upon invitation. He will also pay a virtual visit to the Federated States of Micronesia, hold a video conference with the Prime Minister and Foreign Minister of the Cook Islands and Premier and Foreign Minister of Niue, and host the second China-Pacific Island Countries Foreign Ministers' Meeting in Fiji. This is the first time that the Chinese foreign minister will visit all Pacific island countries that have diplomatic relations with China and also the first time that a meeting under the Foreign Ministers' Meeting mechanism will be held in a Pacific island country. This normal interaction between sovereign states, however, has made Washington and Canberra extremely anxious. Since May, the US has accelerated the promotion of its so-called Indo-Pacific Strategy, and launched a diplomatic offensive around China. The South Pacific region has been unilaterally listed by the US in its Indo-Pacific Strategy as a key part. In the joint statement from Quad leaders released in Tokyo on May 24, there is a separate paragraph emphasizing the Quad countries will further enhance cooperation with Pacific island countries. Taking the US and Australia's words and deeds over the past few months into consideration, we can easily decipher their diplomatic rhetoric and grasp the unspoken message: The US and Australia have declared that they will "confront China" and "compete for influence" with China. For Washington, the South Pacific region has long been synonymous with "nuclear weapons testing grounds" and "nuclear waste dumping grounds," while Australia blatantly calls the region its "backyard." In February, US Secretary of State Antony Blinken visited Fiji in a rushed manner. Acting Fijian Prime Minister Aiyaz Sayed-Khaiyum bluntly said there was a general feeling in Pacific island countries that "Washington is talking about us, not talking to us." Everyone knows that if it weren't for China, the US and Australia would probably not have bent over to look at those South Pacific island countries. Climate change is the very issue that South Pacific island countries most care about. In November, when former Australian prime minister Scott Morrison spoke at the UN Climate Summit, he even referred to "tackling climate change" as "tackling China." He spoke his mind. The people of South Pacific island countries hope to be respected and live a good life. At an international conference, some Australian scholars shared their experience of visiting these countries in recent years: When they got off the plane, they saw that the airport runway and terminal building were renovated; everything was different from 10 years ago. The local people have made money by working in Chinese enterprises, and their living standards have improved significantly. They asked themselves: What did we do in the island countries before?

What if Biden chooses not to run in 2024?

Most of presidential politics has boiled down to the ability to deliver in the moment that the national audience tunes in. That's what made Bill Clinton and Barack Obama two-term presidents, the only Democratic presidents to be reelected since FDR

Surveying the Republican field for 2024, I found a clear front-runner in former president Donald Trump and plenty of bench strength. There's a front-runner on the Democratic side, too – if President Joe Biden wants another run, it is hard to imagine anyone taking him on, no matter their personal misgivings. If Biden doesn't run, Vice President Kamala Harris is as prohibitive a favourite as Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis is in a Trump-less GOP field. But leading a pack is never an enviable position. Everything gets thrown at the leader. Third or fourth is fine at this stage. So who could seize the nomination from her if the president retires – as seems likely to many. Start with senators: Vermont's Bernie Sanders, Massachusetts's Elizabeth Warren, Minnesota's Amy Klobuchar, New Jersey's Cory Booker, New York's Kirsten Gillibrand, and Colorado's Michael F. Bennet and John Hickenlooper have all displayed the Oval Office itch before; it never goes away. Sanders running at 81 or 82, much less winning at 83, seems at best improbable. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg hasn't distinguished himself in the Cabinet – yet – but unsmiling ports and supply chains could still turn out to be his calling card. Democrats will find it hard to deny the stage to anyone who has run

perhaps even if she does not. That leaves open the billionaire lane. No, not Mike Bloomberg. Did anyone else notice Jeff Bezos's recent tweets about inflation? Inflation is a career killer for incumbents at the federal level, and even sitting governors get splattered with its mud. But not executives of unquestioned success, especially someone like the Amazon founder who not only can speak to supply chains but who has built them. He has so far been nimble in his public appearances, and while he is no longer chief executive, his company has proved that it can deliver for people. Amazon's response to the draft decision in the pending Mississippi abortion case – it will pay travel costs for employees seeking abortions – is going to become a progressive "must have" from corporate America. There are other billionaires, of course, but cash must come with charisma. Bring the voters a story, and a back story, and even more besides: known achievement. Bring us what made Buttigieg plausible in 2020: brains and a fluid delivery. Most of presidential politics has boiled down to the ability to deliver in the moment that the national audience tunes in. Voters want to see clear leadership under pressure, so they can have some confidence of their choice in a real crisis. That's what made Bill Clinton and Barack Obama two-term presidents, the only Democratic

presidents to be reelected since FDR. Some Republicans and not a few pundits are obsessed with the possibility that Hillary Clinton could run again – in part because they have always over-fearled her and because she triggers the Never Hillary wing of the GOP in 50 ways. More than one television executive drools over a Trump-Clinton rematch for one reason: ratings. It's all about the ratings. But all that misses how exhausted and impatient Democrats are with the gang from Chappaqua, N.Y., and Little Rock – and have been for years. It's not my tribe though, and I thought Ted Kennedy was going to take down President Jimmy Carter in the 1980 primaries. I thought Clinton was going to best Obama in 2008, and I assumed that Harris would clear the field in 2020. It's a strange business, presidential campaigning, and the leftward migration of the party has older Democratic operatives such as James Carville warning that the drift has gone too far. That's a sign that it is unlikely to stop now. Exactly 50 years ago, the United Nations Conference on the Human Environment took place in Stockholm. This was the first UN conference of world leaders to make the environment a major global issue. On 2-3 June 2022, world leaders are coming together again in Stockholm to mark its 50th anniversary. They are expected to talk about the state of the climate and the environment under the theme "A healthy planet for everyone's prosperity – Our responsibility, our opportunity". The UN General Assembly, in a Resolution on May 24, 2021, had decided to convene this Stockholm+50 to organise leadership dialogues on the actions for a healthy planet and prosperity for all, sustainable and inclusive recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic, and faster implementation of the environmental dimension of sustainable development. These leadership dialogues involving all relevant stakeholders are expected to contribute at the Stockholm+50 to some clear and concrete recommendations on strengthening international cooperation and messages for action. Just a few days before the Stockholm+50, as part of the preparation, Sweden also hosted the environmental ministers meeting of the G20 countries. This UN Con-

ference in Stockholm hopes to increase the pace of the countries' transition to a sustainable future for the planet. This week's planned deliberations highlight the importance of global cooperation and multilateralism to address the triple planetary crisis – climate, nature, and pollution. All UN member states are invited to attend the Stockholm+50 as all have a shared responsibility for the global environmental challenges. The UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres and the US climate envoy John Kerry are expected to attend, among other world leaders. However, it is important to ask, what are these rounds of deliberations among world leaders to deliver in concrete to face the global environmental crisis? In 1972, 114 global leaders met in Stockholm under the slogan 'Only one Earth' to agree on the future environmental work on the planet. The Stockholm Declaration then aimed to inspire and guide the world in preserving and improving the human environment. The 1972 Stockholm Conference became iconic for the modern environmental movement and aroused widespread interest and civic participation worldwide. Not only the global leaders but activists from all over the world also had gathered in Stockholm in a never-before-seen global movement for the environment. But what has happened during these five decades? Unfortunately, not so much that world leaders or environmental activists can be proud of. The Stockholm Conference in 1972 had emphasised the need for a planned and careful transition from the unsighted economic growth to sustainability. In the last five decades, many parts of the world have witnessed rapid economic growth and a reduction in extreme poverty. However, several countries have also faced financial crises that have pushed millions of families into poverty. The debt burden of developing countries has multiplied. More than 800 million people go to sleep without food every day. The gap between the developed and developing countries has widened further. The number of poor and unemployed people is at its highest level ever. Many regions and societies have been left behind and struggling for survival. The quest for economic growth and, in some cases, even providing food and shel-

ter to a rapidly expanding world population has led to the widespread devastation of renewable natural resources like land, air, water, forest, and biodiversity. The decline in the availability of these resources already threatens the life and survival of present and future generations. Climate change has brought further uncertainties over the availability of these critical resources and even threatens the survival of this planet. There is no doubt that climate change has now become a serious concern. In 1972, the Stockholm Declaration had clearly warned, "A point has been reached in history when we must shape our actions throughout the world with a more prudent care for their environmental consequences. Through ignorance or indifference, we can do massive and irreversible harm to the earthly environment on which our life and well-being depend." Instead of heeding this warning, we continue to overexploit nature, destroy the soil, pollute the water, cut down the forests and do very little to control the carbon emission filling the atmosphere. We continue to ignore that environmental degradation and climate change take away our basic human security. After 50 years of the 1972 Stockholm Conference, the world is still far from transitioning to a sustainable and just economy with green policies and institutions. It will be naive to expect much from the gathering and deliberations of world leaders this week in Stockholm to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the UN Conference on Human Environment. There is no usual diplomatic buzz and very little expectation over any decisions coming out of the Conference. It is very likely to be another occasion for deliberations over the world's environmental crises without taking any decision on how to address them. Being occupied with the Ukraine Crisis and its Nato membership issues, the host, Sweden, does not look well prepared for this important Conference. The global focus on war and refugee issues has forced the critical environment and climate issues into the background. With the Stockholm+50, unfortunately, the world is going to miss another opportunity to save the planet. *Courtesy: Gulf News*

Why West must try harder on case for Ukraine

Mediating an outcome to this disastrous war has proved tough for European powers. They know this has upended the post-Second World War security architecture. The challenge is how to end this swiftly but to ensure that this is permanent, not just a cease-fire, where war can begin again at some point in the future. European powers do not want to live in the shadow of Russian threats and aggression

What is clear from the YouGov poll published in Arab News today is that NATO and European powers have to work harder in various areas of the world, including the Middle East, to explain their actions and put their case. Many respondents felt

noncommittal but craved an end to the conflict as soon as possible. Ignoring the region as the EU and the US have done on so many issues recently is so short-sighted. The poll shows why a skeptical audience in the Middle East does not understand the Western position on the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Trust in Western powers has not exactly been high in the Middle East. This is understandable given the colonial and imperial records of powers such as Britain, France and latterly the US. Everyone in the region knows about the betrayals of Sykes-Picot and the Balfour Declaration. Everyone knows how the poorly conceived US and UK war on Iraq in 2003 turned out, a disaster Iraq

has yet to recover from. Russia does not have quite the same legacy to contend with. In contrast, if you go to eastern European and Baltic states who lived under the yolk of the Soviet Union, you find an entirely different picture. They feel threatened, as clearly now do Finland and Sweden who are on the path to joining NATO. The Russian invasion has united NATO powers and Europe at a time when divisions had been rampant. The poll highlights the perception that this is a European war and not something of direct concern to the region. It has extremely serious knock-on effects, but it is not a conflict to take sides on. Most countries want to see this ended and to maintain relations with both Russia and the US. Mediating an outcome to this disastrous war has proved tough for European powers. They know this has upended the post-Second World War security architecture. The challenge is how to end this swiftly but to ensure that this is permanent, not just a cease-fire, where war can begin again at some point in the future. European powers do not want to live in the shadow of Russian threats and aggression. Russian leaders clearly do not want to feel threatened by NATO. The challenge is how to provide an exit for Putin from Ukraine. Russian forces have

not fared well and the "three day war" has continued for three months and counting, with Russia being forced back both from the edge of Kyiv and also Kharkiv. Ukrainian forces could actually win, but that also poses a problem in how dangerous the wounded Russian bear would be. Is it wise to humiliate Russia? Aiming for an all-out victory could end up as an all-out loss. Many have criticized the likes of President Macron of France for continuing a dialogue with President Putin. They cannot see the point. They may be right in that the Russian president seems very determined and unlikely to just withdraw. Many argue that the likes of Macron and Chancellor Olaf Scholz of Germany may privately believe that Ukraine should lose some territory for the sake of a broader peace, something Ukrainians would oppose. Scholz has called for "a cease-fire in Ukraine as quickly as possible." However, the recently elected German chancellor has faced major criticisms within the German parliament over dragging his feet on Ukraine. Italian leaders have also been reluctant to be as forthright as some of their NATO partners. Hungary under President Orbán is barely in the European camp on this, and is blocking any further sanctions on Russia even though this has

caused major ructions with its neighbors, especially Poland. The counter argument to this is powerful. Russia occupied and annexed Crimea in 2014 and started a war in eastern Ukraine. It reinvaded Ukraine in 2022, had invaded Georgia in the past and pummelled Chechnya. How does one ensure that Russia would be content with just some additional territory in Ukraine and stop? Would this also not reward aggression? What sort of security guarantees would be sufficient for vulnerable states and indeed Ukraine itself? Russia is on the back foot militarily so is this the time perhaps to push for a deal? It may have to be bold but would have to include the withdrawal of Russian forces to the pre-Feb. 24 front lines minimum. Russia will want to see lifting of sanctions and guarantees for ethnic Russians in eastern Ukraine. It will not be easy. Trust is non-existent. Neutral brokers trusted by all parties are not readily available. China could play a role but is closer to Russia. Israel and Turkey tried to mediate but failed. Without a viable political process then things could deteriorate rapidly. The fear is that by the time of any future poll of Arab opinion, the crisis will have engulfed the Middle East, just as it has Europe, as this conflict goes truly global. *Courtesy: Arab News*

Pakistan women beat Sri Lanka by eight wickets

KARACHI: Leg-spinner Ghulam Fatima produced her career-best while seasoned opener Sidra Amin and captain Bismah Maroof stroked half-centuries as Pakistan recorded a crushing eight-wicket win over Sri Lanka to take a 1-0 lead in the three-match ICC Women's Championship ODI series at the Southend Club, Karachi on Wednesday. This was the first match in the 10-team ICC Women's Championship 2022-25 cycle, the top six sides at the end of the cycle (including the tournament hosts) will qualify for the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2025. Set a 170-run target, Pakistan coasted him courtesy a 143-run alliance between Sidra and Bismah – Pakistan record for the second-wicket in ODIs. The previous best was an unbeaten 133-run partnership between Javeria Khan and Nahida Khan against Ireland at Colombo in 2017. On Wednesday afternoon, Sidra and Bismah came together after the early loss of Muneeba Ali (14), the left-hander was dismissed with the total at 28 in the 8th over. The pair produced a series of impressive strokes while rotating the strike with great proficiency as Pakistan made light work of the paltry target. The right-handed Sidra reached the fourth fifty of her career on the 82nd ball of her innings. Bismah registered her 16th fifty on the 84th ball of her innings. Sidra was bowled by Oshadi Ranasinghe for



76 with Pakistan mere two runs away from the target. Sidra scored 76 off 119 balls (seven fours) while Bismah contributed 62 off 101 balls (five fours) Achini Kulasuriya and Oshadi Ranasinghe took the wickets to fall in the Pakistan innings. Pakistan chased down the target in the 42nd over with 49 balls to spare, Omaima Sohail hit the winning run and returned unbeaten on one. Earlier, Sri Lankan captain Chamari Athapaththu won the toss for the fourth consecutive time on the tour and like the T20Is, decided to bat first again. Athapaththu lost her opening partner Hasi Perera (4) to a run out with the score at seven. The left-handed Sri Lankan captain was the second wicket to fall as she perished attempting a big hit against left-arm spinner Sadia Iqbal. Athapaththu scored 25. From 96 for three in the 30th over, Sri Lanka endured a mid-innings slump as they crashed to 96 for six in a space of four balls with Ghulam Fatima accounting for two wickets off successive balls. The first two go was Prasadani Weerakkody (30 off 44 balls, three fours), Oshadi Ranasinghe was bowled the next ball without offering a shot. Sri Lanka only reached 169 due to a fighting unbeaten 49 off 50 balls (five fours, one six) by Kavisha Dilhari. Ghulam Fatima produced the best spell of her ODI career finishing with hugely impressive figures of 10-2-21-4. – APP

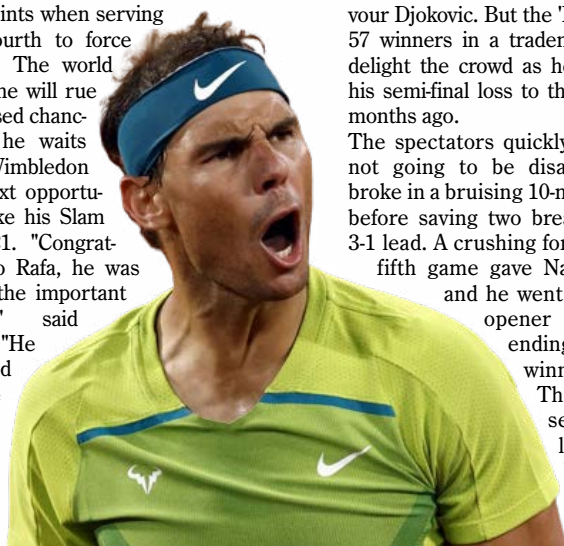

Nadal downs Djokovic to reach French Open semis

PARIS: Rafael Nadal edged a late-night classic against old rival Novak Djokovic in the early hours of Wednesday in four sets to reach his 15th French Open semi-final. The 13-time Roland Garros champion won the pair's 59th career meeting 6-2, 4-6, 6-2, 7-6 (7/4) after a four-hour-and-12-minute quarter-final on a raucous Court Philippe Chatrier. Nadal sealed his eighth victory in 10 French Open matches against last year's winner Djokovic at 1:16 am local time (2316 GMT Tuesday) to set up a last-four clash with third seed Alexander Zverev on Friday. "I'm very emotional. For me it's incredible to play here," said Nadal. "Playing against him is always an amazing challenge... to win against Novak, there is only one way, to play your best from the first point until the last." The 35-year-old has lost just three of his 113 matches on the Paris clay since his 2005 title-winning debut and now only trails Djokovic 30-29 in their career head-to-head. The Spaniard, seeded fifth, remains on course for a record-extending 22nd Grand Slam title after lifting this year's Australian Open, which Djokovic missed after being deported from the country over his Covid vaccination status.

Djokovic overturned a double-break deficit to take an 88-minute second set and missed two set points when serving for the fourth to force a decider. The world number one will rue those missed chances while he waits until Wimbledon for his next opportunity to take his Slam tally to 21. "Congratulations to Rafa, he was better in the important moments," said Djokovic. "He showed why he was a great champion. Well done to him and his team, he deserves it." Nadal was a slight underdog heading into the match after being taken five sets in the previous round by Felix Auger-Aliassime and he had even hinted it could be his last appearance in Paris due to a persis-



tent foot injury. The colder, slower conditions of the night session were also expected to favour Djokovic. But the 'King of clay' smashed 57 winners in a trademark performance to delight the crowd as he gained revenge for his semi-final loss to the same opponent 12 months ago. The spectators quickly realised they were not going to be disappointed, as Nadal broke in a bruising 10-minute opening game before saving two break points to open a 3-1 lead. A crushing forehand winner in the fifth game gave Nadal a double break and he went on to serve out the opener with relative ease, ending his opponent's winning run of 22 sets. The first game of the second set was even longer than the first, but the result was the same as Nadal took his sixth break point. A string of unforced errors from Djokovic and Nadal's cute winner at the net saw the reigning champion a double break behind again. Djokovic finally took a break point for the first time when Nadal netted a drop shot, before winning another

gruelling return game – in which Nadal was given a warning for a time violation – on his fifth break point to level the set. Opportunities came and went for both players, but Nadal fired long as Djokovic took his second set point in the 10th game. Nadal came out fighting though and broke, to love, in the first game for the third successive set. Djokovic saw another break point come and go before giving up his own serve again to slip 4-1 adrift. Nadal served out for a two-sets-to-one lead in game eight as Djokovic blazed wide on the second set point, with the clock ticking past midnight and shivering fans reaching for blankets to keep warm. Djokovic missed a simple shot early in the fourth set and lashed out at the net in frustration, drawing deafening boos from the crowd. The top seed immediately refocused though and broke serve for a 2-0 lead when a hotly-contested line call went in his favour. Djokovic had the chance to send the match into a decider on his own serve. But Nadal saved two set points before gobbling up a second break point with a trademark forehand winner. Nadal made a rapid start to the crucial tie-break to race into a 6-1 advantage. Djokovic managed to save three of the match points, but Nadal got over the line at the fourth time of asking.

WASHINGTON: South Korean K-pop sensations BTS didn't sing a word but in a White House visit Tuesday to meet President Joe Biden the supergroup's message against anti-Asian racism came loud and clear. The seven stars, dressed in matching dark suits and ties, with white shirts, joined White House Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre at the briefing room podium - a tiny, but powerful stage. The singer Park Ji-min, better known as Jimin, said through a translator that the group is "devastated by the recent surge of hate crimes" in the United States. Another member, Suga, appealed for tolerance, saying, "It's not wrong to be different. I think equality begins when we open up and embrace all of our differences." Group members did not take questions from reporters before going into a meeting with Biden and, according to the White House, recording "digital content." Outside the mansion's grounds on the other side of a tall black fence, fans who dub themselves the "Army" gathered in hopes of a glimpse. The brief appearance before journalists itself reportedly garnered more than 300,000 viewers on the White House's YouTube channel, more than 10 times the traffic on a day when the only people watching events in the briefing room are mostly media or political professionals.

MEXICO CITY: Mexico banned sales of electronic cigarettes and other vaping devices on Tuesday because of concerns about their health effects, the government announced. President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador said it was a "lie" to claim that e-cigarettes are a safe alternative to inhaling tobacco smoke. "The vapors are also harmful for health," added Lopez Obrador, who signed a decree introducing the ban on World No Tobacco Day. He showed a pink vaping device to illustrate how the products are intended to appeal to young people. "Look at the color, the design," Lopez Obrador said. Mexico City authorities meanwhile announced that smoking of any kind would be prohibited in the capital's main square, the Zocalo, and surrounding areas in the busy historic district. City Hall said the move was aimed at raising awareness of the health risks.

Brazil storm
death toll
rises to 106

RECIFE: Flooding and landslides triggered by torrential rain have now killed at least 106 people in northeastern Brazil, officials said Tuesday as emergency workers continued a desperate search. The force of the landslides ripped apart houses in neighborhoods including Jardim Monteverde, a poor community just outside the city of Recife. Locals have likened the roaring surge of mud to a tsunami. "It was a tragedy. I lost a lot of friends," 49-year-old resident Maria Heronize told AFP on the verge of tears. Rescue teams have found dozens of bodies buried after floodwater tore through the neighborhood on Saturday. Six more bodies - the last of those reported missing in the neighborhood - were recovered Friday, bringing the search there to an end, the Pernambuco state government said. Elsewhere, at least eight people remain missing, said disaster management officials for the state, scene of the latest in a series of deadly weather disasters to hit Brazil in recent months. Crews are using dogs trained to sniff for people and planes to locate the missing. At least 24 municipalities in Pernambuco have declared a state of emergency and more than 6,000 people have lost their homes or been forced to flee. - Agencies

The event will be an important step toward strengthening democratic traditions in our country. and the faith of people in the reality of the ongoing changes, which is natural because reforms are held in interests of the entire society and not to increase the privileges of some people, including President's,» said Tokayev. The Kazakh Head of State also said that he had and will have no intention to extend the terms of his presidency with the use of the referendum - the question, according to him, he is asked within the country and abroad. In his words, the present ed program of political modernization is very extensive in its content, with the main emphasis placed on strengthening the system of protection of rights and freedoms of people, greater participation of citizens in state government, increasing transparency and efficiency of government institutions.

Polish FM calls

OSCE Chairman. Rau is paying a visit to Kazakhstan as part of the familiarization tour of the region as the newly elected OSCE Chairman. He is to visit Uzbekistan and Mongolia as well. Koshanov noted that the visit of the OSCE Chairman takes place ahead of the important political event for Kazakhstan - the referendum. The Majilis speaker believes that it serves as the support for the cause of reforms of the Head of State and the national plebiscite. During the meeting, the sides discussed the current state of and prospects for interaction between Kazakhstan and OSCE, and bilateral Kazakhstan-Poland relations, including parliamentary ones. Rau thanked the Kazakh people for accepting and supporting tens of thousands of Polish deported to Kazakhstan during the political repressions in the 30s of the last century.

Chinese scientist suggests
organic farming methods

BEIJING: We must reduce the use of chemical fertilizers so organic farming methods such as fermented farmyard manure and returning straw to the field are worthy of promotion, by which can also effectively cope with the high price and shortage of local fertilizers. We are very willing to share our experience with the Pakistani friends in this connection " This was stated by Wang Yan, General Manager of China's Yangling Qingpita Garden Dragon fruit Demonstration Base, in an exclusive with China Economic Net (CEN). He noted that the harvest season for Pakistani mangoes already started. This kind of fruit famed for

strong flavor, high sweetness and fine fiber has long been favored by the world market. However, local farmers are worrying about the production reduction caused by various factors. According to an official of the Ministry of National Food Security and Research, Pakistan last year produced around 1.7 to 1.8 million tons of mango, but this year, he said mango production in the country might face a 30 percent reduction. Some professionals have given even less optimistic forecasts. "This year, mango production may be confined to 0.9 million tonnes from 1.8 million tonnes last year," according to All Pakistan Fruit and Vegetable Exporters Association (PFVA) Patron in Chief Waheed Ahmed. So, what is the root cause? Pakistan

Agriculture Research Council (PARC) Chairman Dr Ghulam Ali indicated that the early arrival of summer and abnormal high temperature did not allow the crop to get the required time for the process of fruiting. Mid-March saw average temperatures between 37-42 degrees. In contrast, the average temperatures during the previous season were around 34 degrees. Besides, rupee depreciation, rising labor costs along with high tariff of electricity and gas have significantly multiplied the cost of processing mangoes. Given this, exporters have been forced to slash the export target by 25,000 tonnes to 125,000 tonnes for the current season. Facing plight of Pakistani mangoes, Chinese and Pakistani experts are trying to find opportunities for cooperation to change the status quo.

At a joint press conference with Swedish Prime Minister Magdalena Andersson, Antonio Guterres said the war has also worsened the energy and financial crises, hitting the most vulnerable countries and economies. He said urgent decisions are needed to ensure that Ukrainian grain and Russian fertilizers reach global markets. The UN chief thanked Sweden for its unwavering support to the UN and multilateralism. On Tuesday, Turkish presidential spokesperson Ibrahim Kalin told journalists that President Recep Tayyip Erdogan spoke to his Russian and Ukrainian counterparts over the phone about exporting Ukrainian agricultural products by sea. Andersson, for her part, slammed the Russian attack on Ukraine, terming it an "unjustified, clear violation of international law." Accusing Russia of committing war crimes against the civilian population, she added: "Russia must be held accountable for its actions." Asked about Ankara's stance over the country's NATO bid, Andersson said she looks forward to further constructive meetings with Türkiye. Sweden and Finland formally applied to join NATO on May 18, a decision spurred by Russia's war on Ukraine, which began on Feb. 24. - Agencies

NUR-SULTAN. KAZINFORM - No cases of monkeypox have been registered in Kazakhstan so far, Minister of Healthcare Azhar Giniyat confirmed Wednesday, Kazinform correspondent reports. While addressing the Government's meeting, Minister Giniyat assured that Kazakhstan has not registered any cases of monkeypox so far. In her words, the cases of this infectious viral disease are mostly registered in the Western Africa, including Congo and Nigeria. Despite all precautions, the fresh cases of monkeypox were reported in the UK, Portugal, and Spain. «The early symptoms of monkeypox are fever, headache, shivering, rash,» said Azhar Giniyat, adding that the ministry stands ready to diagnose the disease with special tests. According to her, all arriving travelers are screened at the border. Temperature measurements are taken in order to prevent the spread of monkeypox in Kazakhstan.

eases Covid
curbs

SHANGHAI: Shanghai slowly whirled back to life Wednesday as a range of Covid-19 restrictions were eased after a two-month lockdown that confined residents to their homes and battered the Chinese economy. The commercial hub of 25 million people was closed down in sections from late March, when the Omicron virus variant fuelled China's worst outbreak in two years. After some rules were gradually relaxed over the past few weeks, authorities on Wednesday began allowing residents in areas deemed low-risk to move around the city freely. "This is a moment that we have been looking forward to for a long time," the Shanghai municipal government said in a statement on social media. "Because of the impact of the epidemic, Shanghai, a megacity, entered an unprecedented period of silence." On Wednesday morning, commuters trickled into subway stations and office buildings, scanning QR codes that certify they are virus-free. Some gathered in small groups to chat in a park, while staff at shopping centres and markets arranged products and cleaned in apparent preparation for customers. A day earlier, bright yellow barriers that had hemmed in buildings and city blocks for weeks were taken down in many areas. More than half a million remained under restrictions as of Wednesday, according to the authorities.

Denmark votes
on joining EU's
defence policy

COPENHAGEN: Traditionally eurosceptic Denmark votes Wednesday in a referendum on whether to overturn its opt-out on the EU's common defence policy after Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The vote comes on the heels of neighbouring Finland's and Sweden's historic applications for NATO membership, as the Ukraine war forces countries in Europe to rethink their security policies. More than 65 percent of Denmark's 4.3 million eligible voters are expected to vote in favour of dropping the exemption, an opinion poll published on Sunday suggested. Analysts' predictions have, however, been cautious, given the low voter turnout expected in a country that has often said "no" to more EU integration, most recently in 2015. Polls open at 8:00 am (0600 GMT) and close at 8:00 pm. Final results are due around 11:00 pm. "We must always cast our ballots when there is a vote", Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen urged Danes in the final televised debate of the campaign on Sunday. "I believe with all my heart that we have to vote 'yes'. At a time when we need to fight for security in Europe, we need to be more united with our neighbours", she said. Denmark has been an EU member since 1973, but it put the brakes on transferring more power to Brussels in 1992 when 50.7 percent of Danes rejected the Maastricht Treaty, the EU's founding treaty. It needed to be ratified by all member states to enter into force. In order to persuade Danes to approve the treaty, Copenhagen negotiated a series of exemptions and Danes finally approved it the following year. - Agencies

Pak, Iran sign MoU on bilateral cooperation

ZAHEDAN: The Memorandum of Understanding on the Development of Bilateral Cooperation between the Islamic Republic of Iran and Pakistan was signed at the end of the ninth meeting of the Joint Border Trade Committee between the two border provinces of neighboring countries. According to the public relations section of the General Directorate of Industry, Mining and Trade of Sistan and Baluchestan, Iraj Hassanpour, head of the Sistan and Baluchestan General Directorate of Industry, Mines and Trade, and head of the delegation of the Islamic Republic of Iran, and Mohammad Sadigh, head of the customs of Balochistan, Pakistan, signed a memorandum of understanding between the Joint Border Trade Committee in Zahedan after two days of continuous talks.

Germany to send IRIS-T air defence system to Ukraine

BERLIN: Germany will supply Ukraine with the IRIS-T air defence system, Chancellor Olaf Scholz said, following pleas from Kyiv and German opposition parties to step up heavy weapons deliveries. Scholz said Germany had been "delivering continuously since the beginning of the war", pointing to more than 15 million rounds of ammunition, 100,000 grenades and over 5,000 anti-tank mines sent to Ukraine since Russia invaded it on Feb. 24. "Most recently, the government has decided that we will deliver the most modern air defence system that Germany has in the form of the IRIS-T," Scholz told lawmakers in the Bundestag, without specifying the exact model. A security source told Reuters last month that Germany was considering supplying IRIS-T SLM medium-range surface-to-air defence systems to Ukraine.

Berlin's decision on the matter does not mean the air defence system will be delivered swiftly. "It will take a while, months," Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock told lawmakers, adding the system, made by arms manufacturer Diehl, had initially been intended for "another country". Responding to critics who claim Berlin has not done enough to help Ukraine defend itself, Scholz told parliament his government had responded to the Russian attack with a "massive change of policy in Germany" by opting to send heavy weapons into a war zone. Ukraine's requests for heavy weapons intensified in recent weeks when Moscow turned its fiercest firepower on the country's east after failing to take the capital, Kyiv. Scholz said talks were continuing with Germany's partners on ways to further arm Ukraine against the Russian attack. - Agencies

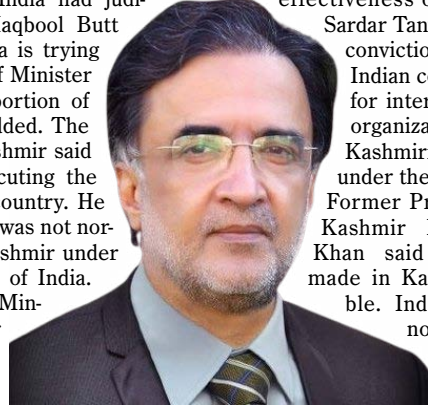

Qamar Zaman Kaira also paid rich tribute to the spirit of Kashmiri leadership of Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir for its continuing struggle for achieving their inalienable right to self-determination

Azad Kashmir President Barrister Sultan Mehmood said that India had judicially assassinated Maqbool Butt and Afzal Guru. "India is trying to bring a Hindu Chief Minister by changing the proportion of the population," he added. The President of Azad Kashmir said that India was persecuting the minorities inside its country. He said that the situation was not normal in Jammu and Kashmir under the illegal occupation of India. Azad Kashmir Prime Minister Sardar Tanveer Ilyas expressed the determination to stand by Kashmiri brothers. He said that the verdict of the court on Yasin Malik was a violation of interna-



national law, which speaks volumes of ineffectiveness of the UN. Sardar Tanveer Ilyas said that the conviction of Yasin Malik by an Indian court is a question mark for international human rights organizations. Kashmiris bury their martyrs under the green crescent flag. Former Prime Minister of Azad Kashmir Raja Farooq Haider Khan said that the sacrifices made in Kashmir are unforgettable. Indian oppression could not dampen the spirit of independence of Kashmiris, he said. Former Prime Minister Azad Kashmir Abdul Qayyum Niazi underlined the need to work out a plan of action on the Kash-

mir issue. Additional Foreign Secretary Mumtaz Zehra said that the number of forces is being increased to suppress the voice of Kashmiris, India is pretending to the world that the situation in Occupied Kashmir has returned to normal. "Change in population is a violation of international law. We rejected the report of the zoning commission on Occupied Kashmir," she said. She said Yasin Malik was punished illegally, India could not suppress Kashmiris by force. Kashmiri leaders including Sardar Atiq Ahmad Khan, Chaudhry Abdul Majeed, Sardar Yaqub, former Opposition Leader Chaudhry Yasin, former President Raja Zulqarnain Khan, Former Speaker Shah Ghulam Qadir, Chaudhry Latif Akbar, Mirza Shafiq Jral, Sardar Hassan Ibrahim and Hurriyat leaders and political dignitaries were also present on the occasion.

ECP takes its decisions fearlessly: CEC

ISLAMABAD: The chief election commissioner has asserted that the Election Commission of Pakistan takes its decisions fearlessly, proclaiming if someone gets upset by these decisions, it's his problem. While having an informal talk with media, CEC Sikandar Sultan Raja said on Wednesday that the Election Commission always took decisions according to the constitution and law "as everyone is our friend". He said that the ECP made its decisions without any fear vowing that it would continue doing so. "If somebody becomes angry with the ECP decisions, it's his problem," he added. The opposition party, Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf, is not happy with the election commissioner accusing him of always showing tilt towards the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz. The party held nationwide protests against the ECP on the call of its chief Imran Khan on April 26 for not de-notifying membership of the party's dissident legislators. However, the ECP de-notified 25 dissident MPAs of the PTI on May 23 after the verdict of the Supreme Court which rendered dissident members' votes invalid while giving its interpretation of Article 63-A. The PTI again filed a petition in the Lahore High Court against the ECP for delaying notification of five MPAs on the reserved seats in Punjab Assembly. The court, however, yesterday directed the Election Commission of Pakistan to issue a ruling by June 2 with regard to the notification of five MPAs on reserved seats in the Punjab Assembly.

China conducts 'readiness patrol' around Taiwan

BEIJING: The Chinese military said on Wednesday it had conducted a combat "readiness patrol" in the seas and airspace around Taiwan in recent days, saying it was a necessary action to respond to "collusion" between Washington and Taipei. China, which claims democratically governed Taiwan as its own territory, has stepped up its military manoeuvres around the island over the past two years or so, as it seeks to pressure Taipei to accept its sovereignty claims. China has been particularly unhappy with U.S. support for Taiwan. U.S. President Joe Biden angered China last week by appearing to signal a change in an American policy of "strategic ambiguity" on Taiwan by saying the United States would become involved militarily if China were to attack the island. U.S. officials said there had been no change in policy. In a statement, the People's Liberation Army Eastern Theatre Command said the combat "readiness patrol" had happened around Taiwan in recent days and was "a necessary action against U.S.-Taiwan collusion". "Recently, the United States has frequently made moves on the Taiwan issue, saying one thing and doing another, instigating support for Taiwan independence forces, which will push Taiwan into a dangerous situation," the command added. Taiwan is part of China and Chinese troops continue to strengthen military training and preparations to "thwart" interference from external forces' and actions by those who support Taiwan independence, it said. While the statement did not give an exact date for when the drill happened, Taiwan on Monday reported the largest incursion since January by China's air force in its air defence zone. The island's defence ministry said Taiwanese fighters scrambled to warn away 30 aircraft. Taiwan has complained repeatedly of such missions in its Air Defence Identification Zone, or ADIZ. - Agencies

Texas town mourns teacher killed in school shooting

UVALDE: The Texas town of Uvalde will on Wednesday lay to rest one of the two teachers gunned down in last week's elementary school massacre, along with her husband who died days later - leaving their four children orphaned. Irma Linda Garcia, 48, was killed when a teen-aged gunman went on a rampage at Robb Elementary on May 24, a massacre that also left another teacher and 19 young children dead. Adding to the tragedy, her 50-year-old husband Joe died two days later. They had been married for more than 24 years. "They began their relationship in high school and it flourished into a love that was beautiful and kind," obituaries for the two said. They are survived by two daughters and two sons. A GoFundMe set up for the Garcias said Joe died of a "medical emergency" on May 26. It sought to raise \$10,000, but more than \$2.78 million has been donated so far. "I truly believe Joe died of a broken heart and losing the love of his life," the page said. John Martinez, who identified himself as Joe's nephew, also tweeted that the father of four had "passed away due to grief." The first funerals for students killed in the attack were held Tuesday. As the community mourned, anger has seethed over the response of police. Officers have come under intense criticism over why it took well over an hour to neutralize the gunman, a move Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) director Steven McCraw has admitted was the "wrong decision."
