Imran reiterates call for early general elections

Khan says it will be difficult to prevent the country from collapsing

ISLAMABAD: PTI Chairman Imran Khan on Thursday warned the government to announce fresh soon as possi ble and said that his "party will not stay patient for too

Addressing his supporters during a live telecast, the former prime minister said that the government had destabilised the political situation in the country. "If they [coalition gov-

ernment] keeps pushing us against the wall, we will have no choice but o call on the public," he said, adding that the economy was heading towards a downfall, leading to people's suffering. Khan said that it will be difficult to prevent the country from collapsing if it continues to suffer from political instability, reiterating that the government should conduct fresh elections soon.

The former premier said that the only reason he decided to address the nation was that the risk rate during his tenure was 5%, but it had increased to 9% when the no-confidence motion was submitted against him and now it has reached over 22%. The PTI chief criticised the incumbent government, saying that it had "no way to stop the economy from collapsing." "The government

said that the economy will improve after the revival of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) programme, but today, the country is facing record-high inflation," he said. Speaking about his party. Khan said that the PTI was the only party that could keep the whole country united.

Putin reveals China's 'concern' over Ukraine

It also poses a huge challenge for China - whose relations with the West have nosedived in recent years over issues including human rights and the future of Taiwan.

Their growing relationship - which they characterise as a bulwark to Western dominance signifies a major shift in the world order following the demise of the Soviet Union over 40 years ago.

Russian President condoles the loss of lives in devastating floods



MOSCOW: Russian President Vladimir Putin said on Thursday that pipeline gas supplies to Pakistan are possible, and that part of the necessary infrastructure is already in place, Russian state-owned news agency RIA reported.

President Putin and Pakistani Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif met on the sidelines of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) summit in Samarkand, Uzbekistan.The high-level meeting came after the prime minister reached the Uzbekistan capital to attend the annual meeting of the SCO's Council of Heads of State (CHS) during a twoday visit - from September 15 to 16. After the meeting with Putin, the prime minister held a bilateral meeting with Tajikistan's President Emomali Rahmon. The two leaders held wide-ranging talks covering all aspects of mutually beneficial bilateral cooperation, including regional and international issues. The Prime Minister thanked Tajikistan for its support to the flood affectees in Pakistan and shared details of the devastation caused by the massive floods, induced by climate change.

LB representatives asked to play role for climate change

PESHAWAR ... For the past two decades, climate change has been causing problems for the entire world. Many countries of the world have prepared to face it, but Pakistan is still far away from this destination. We need to take steps to improve water bodies and reduce pollution. In order to avoid disasters like the current flood in the future. These views were expressed by Secretary Local Government Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Mr. Zaheerul Islam while addressing a day long consultative workshop on "Local Government: Legislative Framework and Institutional Capacity for Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation" here at Peshawar on Thursday. The Consultative Workshop was organized by Center for Peace and Development Initiative (CPDI) with support of Pakistan based Germany's Friedrich Nuamman Foundatio. The aim of the workshop was to raise their awareness on the role of local governments in preventing climate change. The workshop was attended by selected representatives of local governments, government officials, civil society and media representatives from across the province. besides others Mardan City Mayor Himayat Ullah Mayar, Swat's Shahid Ali Khan, Swabi's Ghulam Haqqani, and Bara Khyber's Maulana Kafeel Ahmad were prominent. During the open session, almost elected representatives of local government insti-

tutions have informed that they are in

lack of funds and resources. Amongst them former Speaker Asad Qaisar's nephew Atta Ullah Khan was on top. All of them informed that Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government is reluctant to provide them due resources and powers. Zaheer-ul-Islam secretary local government in his most detailed and comprehensive presentation said that a country like Egypt faced a seven-year drought twenty years ago because they had water reserves to use for 1,000 days. Whereas a large country like Pakistan has only eighteen days of water storage which is insufficient to combat drought. He said that the total number of dams in the world is more than 52 thousand in which 21 thousand dams are located in our neighboring country China but unfortunately Pakistan has only 87 dams so far due to which we not only have minor flood water. They are suffering losses due to water shortages, but they are also deprived of water storage at the time of need. Mr. Zaharul Islam said that our scientists need to research and work on how we can use the flood water for our benefit. can be used as He said that the current floods have destroyed agriculture along with infrastructure. This is likely to lead to food shortage and national insecurity in the near future. Prof. Dr. Sardar Khan, Vice-Chancellor of Kohat University, while giving his presentation, said that the share of transportation sector in the emission of harmful and toxic gases is 27 percent, electricity generators 25 percent, industry 24 percent and

venting climate change in Pakistan, we need to improve the system of checks and balances in all these sectors. can bring We need to reduce the use of chemical fertilizers and promote the use of natural fertilizers. Addressing the workshop, Mr. Mukhtar Ahmed, Executive Director of CPDI said that combating climate change is not the work of any federal, provincial or local government, but continuous efforts of all these governments and related institutions to achieve this goal. need of In this regard the importance of local governments is highest because the elected representatives of local governments are present everywhere in every village and they work day and night to alleviate the hardships of their local people. Islamabad: Economic security lied at the heart of national security, said Dr Moeed Yusuf, Former National Security Advisor (NSA) of Pakistan. He was addressing a seminar, titled, "The Future of National Security", arranged by the Institute of Regional Studies (IRS), here on Thursday. Pakistan needed to reorient its focus on geo-economics and this could be achieved by enhancing regional connectivity and development of strong partnerships across the globe. Furthermore, while extending economic and development-centric outreach towards Central Asia via Afghanistan was challenging, it was the most favourable option for Pakistan, he added. Dr Yusuf said that while Pakistan had relied on aid diplomacy for a very long time, it was now the need of the hour to turn to development diplomacy for more sustainable means of ensuring progress at

Another integral component of national security, he added was human security wherein it was concerning that Pakistan lacked long-term strategic planning due to the absence of a judicious model for redistribution of resources. Redistribution of resources to geographically underdeveloped areas was imperative to bridge the widening gap between the developed und underdeveloped regions within the country, he said. Furthermore, Dr Yusuf was of the opinion that institutional reorientation in terms of ensuring provincial-federal synergy while approaching the outside world was crucial, especially in the context of the 18th amendment which had rendered the provinces equally powerful in cinching agreements, for development purposes and otherwise.

Pakistan's floods; death toll touches 1,486

ISLAMABAD: The death toll due to devastating monsoon floods across the country on Thursday surged amid property losses as five more perished in the past 24 hours, taking the total death count to 1,486. Moreover, 12,749 individuals were reported injured since the onset of the rainy season.

The National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) issued a 24-hour situation report released on routine basis that accounted overall life, property and infrastructure losses due to the heavy rains which lashed out various parts of the country. The heavy rains and flash floods caused deaths in various flood affected areas. The Provincial

Disaster Management Authority

(PDMA) Balochistan reconciled mortality number counted in incidents on September 9. It noted that one man, woman and child in Killa Saifullah. In Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP),

a man and child were reported

dead and a man injured in Kurram District. was no incident or loss to report in Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT), Gilgit Baltistan (GB), Punjab, Sindh and Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) during the last 24 hours. The massive torrential rains in the past 24 hours have damaged 300 kilometers (km) roads in Balochistan whereas 10,336 livestock animal died whereas 5,091 houses got damaged during heavy downpour incidents including 2,166 fully damaged and 2,925 got partially damaged during rains. However the cu-



mulative damages so far stated that almost 12.718 km road, 390 bridges and 1.760.372 houses and 918,473 livestock animals got damaged due to the heavy

rains in various districts of all the provinces including that of Gilgit Baltistan and Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK). The NDMA report highlighted that

81 districts across the country were notified as calamity hit areas with some 33,046,329 people affected, 179,281 individuals rescued in various rescue operations some 32 teams were deployed for the survey that was likely to be completed by September 25. In GB, four teams were deployed in the region that started the survey from September 12 and was expected to complete by September 20. In Punjab, three survey teams were deployed in the field that initiated the survey from September 12 and was expected to complete by September 30. In KP, some six teams were on the ground to initiate the survey that commenced on September 15 and would be completed by October 15. In Sindh, the survey would commence as soon as practically possible and was expected to commence from September 25.

PEIRA request to abolish taxes on low fee private schools

It is imperative to mention that Islamabad Capital Territory-Private Educational Institutions Regulatory Authority (ICT-PEIRA) regulates Private Educational Institutions (PEIs) in Islamabad under the ICT-PEIRA Act 2013, and charges regulatory fees, as per Act/ Rules.

ISLAMABAD: Private Educational Institutions Regulatory Authority (PEI-RA), Ministry of Federal Education and Professional Training has requested the authorities concerned for exemption of Municipal/Professional tax from those private schools in Islamabad, which are charging upto Rs 5000 fee from students. According to a notification issued by PEI-RA, the management of low fee charging private educational institutions conveyed that Municipal authorities are serving notices to the educational institutions for charging municipal/ professional taxes.

In addition, it is also mentioned in notices that in case of non-submission, legal action shall be taken against the defaulter private schools. Resultantly, the management of Private Educational Institutions (PEIs) requested for exemption of the aforesaid tax due to fact that low fee charging PEIs are serving the community and they

hardly manage to meet the operational expenses of institutions.

It is imperative to mention that Islamabad Capital Territory-Private Educational Institutions Regulatory Authority (ICT-PEIRA) regulates Private Educational Institutions (PEIs) in Islamabad under the ICT-PEIRA Act 2013, and charges regulatory fees, as per Act/Rules.

In view of the foregoing, the PEIs charging fee upto RS. 5,000/- are considered as low fee charging educational institutions. Therefore.

these PEIs need favorable consideration by the Municipal Authorities too and their request for exemption of Municipal/ Professional Tax is forwarded for consideration, the PEIRA notifica-

tion mentioned. Commenting on the issue, President, Private Schools Network(PSN) Dr Afzal Babar while lauding this initiative of PEIRA, stated that it will benifit around 80 percent of private schools in federal capital.

"These schools are not only fulfilling the gap created by Federal Directorate of Education but also competing public sector schools in achieving SDG goals with selfhelp" he told APP.

He said, these small private schools are helping the government in achieving 100 percent literacy rate in the federal capital, however, the promotion of these institutions mentioned in PEIRA is still pending since 2006. In past PEIRA only collected

amounts from private schools rather than to facilitate them, he lamented.

In developing countries, Pakistan is one of the countries where access to health and health-related indicators is a major concern.

Rapid urbanization and a growing population have threatened people's accessibility to health and the environment. About 400 million people have no access to basic health facilities and nearly 7 million people die each year due to air pollution mostly in low and middle-income countries. Likewise, more than 15 million people living with HIV have no access to treatment, and it is evident that every 2 s, people aged from 30 to 70 die prematurely due to non communicable diseases, chronic respiratory disease, diabetes, and cancer. The textile goods that witnessed negative growth in trade included cotton yarn, the exports of which declined by 17.03 percent, from \$193.389 million to \$160.453 million.

The exports of cotton (carded or combed) declined by 89.61 percent, from \$0.770 million to \$0.080 million, yarn (other than cotton yarn) by 0.81 percent, from \$7.770 million to \$7.707 million, bedwear by 3 percent from

\$528,109 million to \$512,291 million, towels by 6.61 percent, from \$160.614 million to \$150.001 million, madeup articles (excluding towels, bedwear) by 13.63 percent, from \$133.356 million to \$115.183 million while the exports of all other textile materials went down by 0.76 percent, from \$119.192 million to \$118.283 million. Meanwhile, on year-on-year (YoY) basis, the textile goods' exports increased by 7.71 percent in August 2022 to \$1,575.366 million against exports of \$1,462.554 million in August 2021.

Chinese President Xi Jinping along with other leaders will attend the 22nd meeting of the Council of Heads of State of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization in the Uzbek city of Samarkand while paying a state visit to Uzbekistan from Thursday to Friday. The Chinese leader expressed his hopes that the organization can play a greater role in the region and beyond in a signed article carried by leading Uzbek media outlets on Tuesday. "I am confident that with the joint efforts of all sides, the Samarkand Summit will produce fruitful outcomes and make a great contribution to building an even closer SCO community with a shared future and to the peace, stability, development and prosperity of our region," he wrote. This year marks the 20th anniversary of the signing of the Charter of the SCO, and the Samarkand Summit is being held at a critical time when the region faces many challenges and uncertainties. The protracted COVID-19 pandemic, as well as heavily disrupted global industry and supply chains, the Russia-Ukraine conflict and climate change have created a perfect storm for the global economy, which is heading toward a recession. Which means that the SCO must play a more active role not only in upholding regional security and stability, but also in promoting development and prosperity. During the summit, Iran is scheduled to sign a memorandum of obligations to pave the way for its accession to full SCO membership, while the SCO has also received a membership application from Belarus. Moreover, Saudi Arabia, Qatar and Egypt are scheduled to formally become SCO dialogue partners, and negotiations will be held on granting Cambodia, the Maldives and other countries the status of dialogue partner. The fast expanding influence of the SCO attests to the fact that the organization is viewed by the countries of the Silk Road Economic Belt as a vital safeguard for international norms and multilateralism. Bringing together countries from different regions, at different stages of development, and from different civilizations and traditions, the SCO, which now accounts for about 80 percent of Eurasia's territory and 24 percent of the global GDP, is forging a strong collective. It is partnership characterized by non-alignment, dialogue and non-confrontation, and a practical vehicle for exploring the building of a new type of international relations and a community with a shared future for mankind. The SCO-Afghanistan Contact Group, for example, is playing a unique role in helping the country to restore peace and stability through development and political reconciliation. As a regional organization encompassing the largest area and the largest population in the world today, and as a promoter of mutual learning, mutual trust, and mutual benefit, the SCO is also assuming the role of being a practical driver of development.

Commonwealth: An unsure future

Queen Elizabeth II was not just Britain's head of state. She was an integral part of how a country found its lost destiny. The empire was already in decline when the late queen became monarch, but the United Kingdom still had 70 overseas territories and was basking in the afterglow of its moral and military triumph in the second world war. The coronation was a globally significant event, its golden flummery an enactment of the kind of nation Britain thought it was. Monarchy was presented as hierarchy's human face.

But history dispelled the illusion of timeless continuity through ceremonial ritual. With revolts brewing in almost every imperial possession, Britain's global footprint shrank. When Hong Kong was transferred to China in 1997, the Prince of Wales thought it the "end of the empire". A myth arose that Britain had voluntarily decided to transform its colonies into a commonwealth. Having been cruelly exploited for decades, British colonies became independent republics with indecent haste. Today there are only 15 realms with the monarch as head of state. That number is set to fall: Barbados became a republic last year, with Jamaica likely to follow – and even perhaps Australia.

The Commonwealth, with the Queen as its head, was a club designed as a destination for countries parachuting out of British rule. The monarch cultivated warm personal relations with many Commonwealth leaders to keep the group together. The monarchy has been involved in skirmishes with the government – but a post-Brexit executive, pumped up on its own power, has brushed off its interventions. King Charles attempted this year to push back against the disgraceful policy of deporting asylum seekers to Rwanda and his son criticised the Windrush scandal, which saw hundreds of Commonwealth citizens wrongly detained and deported.

Both monarch and heir have acknowledged the harm and legacies of slavery. But both stopped short of crossing swords with the government by issuing an apology for it – for fear, probably, of opening a door to reparations. A monarch should not meddle in politics, even for the right reasons.

This also exposes the weakness of the Commonwealth. Its head has been unable to move politics in a progressive direction in the UK, let alone anywhere else. The post-imperial delusion of British political life was exposed when Boris Johnson failed to oust the secretary general of the Commonwealth.

The future of the Commonwealth and its purpose is unclear. Whether it comes together or comes apart will be up to member states. But they will be watching Britain – aware that it is facing its own uncertain future as a wave of dissolution laps against its shores.

ow to speed up the implementation of 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), outlined in the UN Agenda 2030; how to come up with transformative solutions to renewable energy, food security, and digital connectivity in the post-COVID world; and how to ensure rights of minorities, enshrined in the UN Declaration on Minority Rights 1992 - are the three major asks of United Nations General Assembly's 77th Session (UNGA77), scheduled from 13 to 27 September.

Catastrophic weather patterns due to climate change; poor water management owing to non-availability of sufficient water storage infrastructure; food insecurity caused by shrinking arable land as a result of sprawling housing societies and low per acre yield for want of genetically modified seeds and innovative on-farm practices; unsustainable energy mix because of excessive use of imported fossil fuels for power generation; growing unemployment resulting from the widening mismatch in population growth and employment opportunities due to the low rate of industrialization in developing countries like Pakistan are major challenges plaguing their economies.

This precarious condition is further exacerbated by political instability; lack of effective planning; discontinuation of economic policies; institutional weaknesses and lack of inter-departmental coordination; pilferage of valuable natural resources and above all misplaced priorities in carrying out development projects that have proved counter-productive instead of yielding socio-economic dividends.

Heavy reliance on imports due to lack of import substitution in the local market; and the struggling export sector resulting from low productivity and poor competitiveness due to lack of cutting-edge technologies and insufficient supply of rightly-skilled manpower further compound the woes of developing states.

Poor road and communication infrastructure, unskilled or semi-skilled manpower, focus on brick and mortar hardware instead of service delivery and a serious lack of national development narrative further add to the miseries of all developing nations. It is a pity thatmisgovernance is incentivized in almost all developing countries, as the performance of their public officials is gauged based on their interpersonal skills instead of success in implementing Key Performance Indicators (KPIs).

These challenges resonate with the United Nations Agenda 2030, as its Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) aim to fight these very ills in communities of the world. It is, no doubt, an ambitious transformational plan that focuses on eliminating extreme poverty, reducing inequalities, and resisting climate change to make earth a better place to live. Its Implementation can guarantee a peaceful, prosperous and progressive world order. Therefore, UNGA77



plans to have a dedicated debate on how to accelerate their accomplishment in its key events namely, "SDG Moment", on 19 September, and "Global Goals Weak", from 16 to 25 September.

In the wake of historic climate change-induced floods that have wreaked havoc in Pakistan this summer, SDG 13 (Climate Action) has gained even greater prominence, especially for the developing countries that are bearing the brunt of unscrupulous carbon emissions by the highly-industrialized nations. It is high time to "Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impact".

In the post-COVID world, it has become a new normal that all world systems need a massive realignment to be relevant to social needs. Work in Virtual environments and remote settings have found inroads into almost every sphere of human interaction, be it education, commerce, or service delivery. It will not only highlight the concerns of young people over their education but would also urge the world leaders, civil society activists, and all other stakeholders of the education system like parents, teachers, and students to support the transformation of the education system in order to align it with the ideas of life-long learning, digital learning and learning for life skills.

It is noteworthy that an inclusive growth model is needed to guarantee equal opportunities for all segments of society, regardless of their caste, color, creed, and religious or political ideas.

It has been aptly enshrined in the UN Declaration on Minority Rights, 1992. To highlight the implementation of these rights in different societies of the world in order to have a friction-free robust socio-economic development model, UNGA77 has a special event on "The rights of Minorities". Palestinians right to take fight for statehood back to UN

The Palestinians must take their need for justice and statehood out of the hands of the Americans, whose political system Israel has in a tight headlock. Through masterful public relations propaganda, strategic political campaign funding efforts and simply because it is far better at diplomacy than the Palestinians have ever been, Israel is able to influence American politics when it comes to Palestine. Only by moving the issue to the UN can the Palestinians have hope

year before Israel declared its existence, the UN created its Special Committee on Palestine, known as UNSCOP, to investigate and find a solution to the growing conflict.

Instead of participating, the Palestinian leadership at the time did what has become the Palestinians' political answer to everything they do not like: They boycotted it. Four months later, the special committee recommended the partition of Palestine into two

The UN Partition Plan for Palestine was destined to fail from the start, as it recommended one state that was overwhelmingly non-Jewish and a second that was equally divided between Jews and non-Jews. Worse, the proposed states were an overlapping checkerboard that was destined to collapse and encourage more conflict. We all know what happened then. This week, as the world continues to drift away from justice for the Palestinians and their leaders continue their rejectionist approach to every solution they dislike, a small segment of Palestinian leaders — including 50 from various parts of civil society, one member of the Palestine Liberation Organization Executive Committee and one member of the PLO Central Committee — are urging the UN to do it again.

They want the UN, which this week began the 77th session of its General Assembly, to create another special committee on Palestine, or UNSCOP-2, to complete what the first failed to finish nearly 75 years ago. Tragically, of course, the Palestinians are more divided today than they ever have been. They are dispersed in a diaspora riven by internal squabbling and conflict that makes bringing leaders together extremely difficult. But if the Palestinians who have managed to survive the aftermath of the original UNSCOP living under Israel's brutal apartheid system that was never anticipated by the British or the UN, but was planned by the Zionist leadership at the time, can cast aside the diaspora and do what needs to be done, maybe something can change.

The advocates of UNSCOP-2 hope that the UN will embrace the plan during meetings over the coming weeks



and "produce, within four months, a comprehensive plan to end the Israeli-Palestinian conflict and to report that plan back to the General Assembly."

Turning to the UN is probably Palestine's only hope. The UN is the only place where Palestinians have been able to find honest support for their generations-long displacement and oppression — far different from the lies and distortions of the American political system, which today has a lock on Palestine's future.

Regardless of the differences in rhetoric and attitude of the two American political parties and their leaders, it is clear that President Joe Biden's administration is no different to that of former President Donald Trump. The end results are the same, though the Republican route is through an entirely one-sided approach and the Democratic route is through hypocritical happy talk and intentionally broken promises.

Let me explain it this way. Palestinians are prisoners. Under Trump, the prison starved the prisoners. Under Biden, the prison promised bread, but instead of providing it, it has only offered crumbs. Sadly, when you are starving for freedom, breadcrumbs look far more appealing than they actually are.

The Palestinians must take

their need for justice and statehood out of the hands of the Americans, whose political system Israel has in a tight headlock. Through masterful public relations propaganda, strategic political campaign funding efforts and simply because it is far better at diplomacy than the Palestinians have ever been, Israel is able to influence American politics when it comes to Palestine. Only by moving the issue to the UN can the Palestinians have hope.

The Palestinians in the Occupied Territories also need to extricate their efforts from those of the dysfunctional and divided diaspora, which stews in resentment, anger and uncontrollable emotions.

UNSCOP-2 would be the perfect place to begin a new campaign to erase the failures of Oslo and the old peace process, which was killed off by the Israeli right on the day Yitzhak Rabin was assassinated in Novem-

Advocates of UNSCOP-2, including leaders of the Jewish Peace Lobby, state that "the idea of going to the United Nations to establish UNSCOP-2 first emerged in a New York Times essay in 2012 by former Israeli Foreign Minister Shlomo Ben-Ami, former High Commissioner of the European Union Javier Solana and Jerome Segal, founder of the Peace Consultancy, who is serving as a consultant to the new Palestinian initiative." They argued at a recent press conference in Ramallah that UNSCOP-2 "would create a new process of conflict resolution in which the United Nations becomes a medium for people-to-people peace-making between the Palestinian people and the citizens of Israel. It is believed that this new process can transform Israeli politics and politics in the international community, especially the United States, in ways that ultimately will give rise to an Israeli government which is a serious partner for peace, as were the governments of Prime Ministers Rabin and (Ehud) Olmert."

I agree with them and so should every Palestinian in the diaspora who wants to see a Palestinian state become a reality.

Typhoon Muifa lashes eastern China

SHANGHAI: High winds and heavy rain lashed China's densely populated east coast on Friday, after Typhoon Muifa forced around 1.6 million people to leave their homes and grounded most flights at Shanghai's main airports. Muifa is the strongest tropical cyclone to hit Shanghai - home to more than 25 million people - since record-keeping began in 1949, state broadcaster CCTV said. However, there were no immediate reports of any deaths or casualties. At least 426,000 people were evacuated in Shanghai and another 1.2 million people were taken to temporary shelters in neighbouring Zhejiang province, CCTV added.

Heavy rainfall led to traffic tailbacks and floods in several areas of the Yangtze river delta region, a major global manufacturing hub. Giant waves were seen crashing onto the coastline in Hangzhou bay, to the south of Shanghai, and national radio reported a landslide in Ninghai County in Zhejiang province.

Packing winds of up to 82 kilometres (50 miles) per hour, the storm made landfall at around 12:00 am Friday (1600 GMT Thursday) in coastal areas of Qingdao, state news agency Xinhua reported.

Muifa previously hit the city of Zhoushan in Zhejiang on Wednesday and Shanghai's Fengxian district on Thursday.

It also led to the cancella tion of all flights to China's biggest financial hub.

Air travel slowly resumed in Shanghai as the storm moved north, but most flights from the city's two main airports were cancelled Thursday morning, according to aviation data provider Flightradar24.

Operations at some of Asia's largest container shipping ports in Shanghai and neighbouring Ningbo that were halted because of the typhoon were scheduled to resume Thursday, according to statements

from port officials. Officials ordered all fishing vessels in the Yellow Sea and Bohai Sea to anchor in ports as northeast China braced for the typhoon.

The storm came soon after Typhoon Hinnamnoor hit Shanghai and its neighbouring region last week, causing the suspension of Shanghai ferry services and school closures in parts of Zhejiang.

Muifa is the 12th typhoon to hit China this year, according to state media. Tropical storms, which are expected to increase as the planet warms, were sharply up in 2021, a report by the US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said earlier this month.

UN nuclear agency seeks Russian retreat

VIENNA: The UN nuclear agency's board of governors on Thursday asked Russia to withdraw its troops from Ukraine's Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant, two diplomats said. The text, submitted by Canada and Poland, was approved by 26 of the 35 member states sitting on the Council. China and Russia voted against, while seven countries - Burundi, Egypt, India, Pakistan, Senegal, South Africa and

"The (IAEA) Board of Governors has sent another strong message to Russia: cease immediately all actions threatening nuclear safety and security, and return the Zaporizhzhia nuclear plant and all other Ukrainian territory to control," Australian ambassador Richard Sadleir tweeted. Another diplomat confirmed the move.

Vietnam - abstained.

The resolution supports the efforts of the IAEA which has been in talks with Russia and Ukraine over setting up a security zone around the nuclear plant. Already in March, the IAEA passed a resolution warning about the "unprecedented danger of a nuclear accident' that would endanger not just the population of Ukraine but Europe as a whole.-APP

Major central banks have responded forcefully, raising borrowing costs to cool demand and douse red-hot inflation. But in a new paper, World Bank economists warned that the actions may not be enough to bring high prices under control, leading to a need for more interest rate hikes, which in turn will put the brakes on growth. Many countries will not be able to avoid a recession, but the worldwide slowdown and tightening monetary policy "could give rise to significant financial stress and trigger a global recession in 2023," the paper said. In that scenario, global GDP growth would slow to 0.5 percent in 2023 - a 0.4 percent contraction

of a global recession. "Global growth is slowing sharply, with further slowing likely as more countries fall into recession," World Bank President David Malpass said in a statement. "My deep concern is that these trends will persist, with long-lasting consequences that are devastating for people in emerging market and developing economies."

The World Bank in early June slashed its forecast for global growth to 2.9 percent, more than a full point lower than the estimate in January.

China sees improvement in air quality globally

ISLAMABAD: China has witnessed the fastest improvement in air quality across the world, said a Chinese minister on Thursday.

Over the past 10 years, China's air quality has undergone historic changes, said Huang Rungiu, minister of the Ecology and Environment. The annual average value of fine particulate matter (PM2.5) in China decreased from 46 micrograms/cubic meter in 2015 to 33 micrograms/ cubic meter in 2020 and 30 micrograms/cubic meter in 2021, ecns.cn reported. The days with good air quality reached 87.5 percent, an increase of 6.3 percentage points over 2015, according to the data.

LONDON: Roger Federer, a 20-time Grand Slam singles champion, will retire from top-level tennis after the Laver Cup in London later this month. Swiss Federer, 41, has not played since Wimbledon 2021, after which he had a third knee operation. "My body's message to me lately has been clear," Federer said. "I have played more than 1,500 matches over 24 years. Now I must recognise when it is time to end my competitive career." He added: "To the game of tennis, I love you and will never leave you.'

Federer has struggled with a knee problem for the past three years that has restricted him to only three of the 11 Grand Slams staged since the start of 2020.He has not played a competitive match since losing to Hubert Hurkacz in the quarter-finals at Wimbledon last summer.

He subsequently announced he needed more surgery on his knee having previously had two operations in 2020.

Only Spain's Rafael Nadal, with 22 majors, and Serbia's Novak Djokovic, with 21, have more men's Grand Slam singles titles than Federer. "This is a bittersweet decision because I will miss everything the tour has given me," added Federer.-APP

The virus, which emerged in China in late 2019, has killed nearly 6.5 million people and infected 606 million, roiling global economies and overwhelming healthcare systems.

The rollout of vaccines and therapies have helped stem deaths and hospitalizations, and the Omicron variant which emerged late last year causes less severe disease. Deaths from COV-ID-19 last week were the lowest since March 2020,

the UN agency reported. Still on Wednesday, he again urged nations to maintain their vigilance and likened the pandemic to a marathon race. "Now is the time to run harder and make sure we cross the line and reap the rewards of all our hard work.'

Countries need to take a hard look at their policies and strengthen them for COVID-19 and future viruses, Tedros said. He also urged nations to vaccinate 100% of their high-risk groups and keep testing for the virus.

R. Kelly convicted of child pornography

WASHINGTON: Disgraced R&B singer R. Kelly, who is serving a 30-year sentence for sex offenses, was found guilty of child pornography and other charges on Wednesday after a monthlong trial in his hometown of Chicago. Kelly, whose full name is Robert Sylvest-

of Chicago. Kelly, whose full name is Robert Sylvester Kelly, was convicted of three counts of producing child pornography and three counts of enticement of a minor, the Chicago Tribune reported. Kelly, a three-time Grammy Award-winner. was acquitted by a federal jury of seven other counts including charges that he obstructed justice in a previous trial, the newspaper said. Kelly and two ex-associates had been accused of rigging the singer's 2008 child pornography trial in which a jury delivered a verdict of not guilty. Kelly's former manager, Derrel Mc-David, and an ex-employee, Milton "June" Brown, were tried alongside the singer in the latest trial and were also acquitted of obstruction charges. The 12-person jury took around 11 hours over two days to deliver the verdicts, which could add additional decades in prison to the 30 years Kelly is already serving. A minor victim declined to testify in the 2008 trial because of alleged threats and bribes, but the



EU lawmakers say Hungary no longer a 'full democracy'

STRASBOURG: Strasbourg, France, Sept 15 (AFP/APP):Hungary is no longer a "full democracy" and the EU needs to do everything to bring it back into line with European values, the European Parliament said Thursday. MEPs voted 433 in favour, 123 against, to now describe Hungary - ruled by populist Prime Minister Viktor Orban, who maintains close ties to Russian President Vladimir Putin - "a hybrid regime of electoral autocracy" in "serious breach" of EU democratic norms. The vote was largely symbolic and does not change the course of EU decision making, which requires unanimity of all 27 member states - including Hungary - to adopt major issues, such as sanctions on Russia. With their vote, the EU lawmakers roundly adopted a parliamentary report that said Hungary has been backsliding on democratic and fundamental rights since 2018 through the "deliberate and systematic efforts of the Hungarian government". The report said lack of action by EU institutions, including the commission which is tasked as "guardian" of the EU treaties enshrining democratic standards, had exacerbated the degradation. While EU countries are treading a careful line around Hungary because of the need to win its assent on major decisions, diplomats privately are frustrated with Orban's cosy relationship with the Kremlin and his blocking of further sanctions on Moscow. The commission has likewise been careful to avoid overt criticism, but unease over Hungary's swerve away from rule of law, particularly in failing to curb corruption, is becoming more evident. Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen said Wednesday, in her State of the European Union address to the European Parliament, that the EU "must fight for our democracies". She said her EU executive would work to protect the member states "from the external threats they face, and from the vices that corrode them from within," notably calling out corruption although not naming Hungary directly. She pledged legislative action to step up the fight against corruption, including against "illicit enrichment, trafficking in influence and abuse of power". - APP

Tehran blasts US sanctions

TEHRAN: The spokesman for Iran's Foreign Ministry has strongly condemned the United States for slapping a fresh raft of sanctions on Iranian individuals and firms after falsely accusing them of being involved in cyber attacks against Washington and its allies, emphasizing that persistence on a campaign of deceitful propaganda and disinformation against Tehran will not succeed. Nasser Kan'ani said on Thursday that the US administration is emptv-handed in dealing with the Islamic Republic of Iran, noting "Washington's insistence on resorting to foolish, unlawful and norm-defying behaviors against independent governments and nations is indicative of the American statesmen's inability. - APP

Hamas calls for 'popular mobilization'

GAZA: Palestine's Hamas resistance movement has called on all Palestinians to mobilize to confront Israel's malicious conspiracies against the al-Aqsa Mosque in the occupied al-Quds and protect it against the regime's acts of sacrilege. "Al-Quds [Palestinian] residents are the spearhead of the battle against the occupying Zionists and the nation's hope for defending the first Qibla of the Mus-Mohammad Hamadeh, spokesman for the Hamas branch in occupied al-Quds, said on Wednesday. The remarks followed yet another military-backed desecration of the al-Aqsa Mosque by Israeli settlers. Palestinian media said over 230 settlers entered

the mosque in groups via the al-Maghariba Gate and toured the courtyards. Israeli rabbis also delivered lectures and a number of visitors performed prayers at the site. Radical Israeli groups are encouraging the settlers to visit the flashpoint holy site throughout the upcoming Jewish holidays later this month. As per a long-standing agreement signed between Israel and the Jordanian government in the wake of Israel's occupation of East al-Quds in 1967, Jews may visit the al-Agsa Mosque compound but are not allowed to pray there. However, an uptick in visits by Israeli settlers to the mosque has angered Palestinian Muslims and led to protests. - Agencies

He will shortly be expected, however, to move to Buckingham Palace, the sovereign's London residence and the administrative headquarters of the monarchy. He also seems set to say farewell to his beloved Highgrove family home in the countryside, the embodiment of his environmental principles. Highgrove in Gloucestershire, southwest England, belongs to the Duchy of Cornwall the historic land and property estate established to provide a private income for the eldest son and heir apparent of the monarch. When Charles became king. the dukedom automatically passed to his eldest son Prince William. As king, he now takes command of not only Buckingham Palace but also Windsor Castle: the Palace of Holyroodhouse in Edinburgh. - APP

SAMARKAND: Iran has signed a Memorandum of Obligations to become a permanent member of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO), a central Asian security body, the Iranian foreign minister said. "By signing the document for full membership of the SCO, now Iran has entered a new stage of various economic, commercial, transit and energy cooperation," Hossein Amirabdollahian wrote on social media. The statement came as leaders from China, India, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, Russia, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan headed to the latter's city of Samarkand for a summit of the eight-member SCO, a security group

formed by Beijing and Moscow as a counterweight to United States influence. Afghanistan, Belarus, Iran, and Mongolia are observer countries, while the organisation has six "dialogue partners": Armenia, Azerbaijan, Cambodia, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Turkey. Last year, the rapidly expanding SCO approved Iran's application for accession, while the government in Tehran called on members to help it form a mechanism to avert sanctions imposed by the West over its disputed nuclear programme. "The relationship between countries that are sanctioned by the US, such as Iran, Russia or other countries, can overcome many problems and issues and make them stronger," Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi told his Russian

counterpart, Vladimir Putin, during a meeting in Samarkand. "The Americans think whichever country they impose sanctions on, it will be stopped, their perception is a wrong one." For his part, Putin said relations were "developing positively" between Russia and Iran and gave his full support to the latter's application to become an SCO member. Reporting from the Silk Road oasis of Samarkand, Al Jazeera's Resul Serdar said Iran's full membership is expected to become effective in April 2023. He added that the SCO, the world's largest regional organisation consisting of 40 percent of the world's population and 30 percent of global gross domestic product (GDP),

wants to further expand. "Belarus is also officially going to sign the documents that its membership will be initiated," Serdar said. "Qatar and Saudi Arabia are also expected to become new dialogue partners." Iran's economy has been hit hard since 2018, when then-US President Donald Trump unilaterally abandoned a landmark nuclear deal signed between Iran and world powers, including Russia and China. Months of indirect talks between Iran and US President Joe Biden's administration have hit a dead end over several obstacles to reviving the nuclear pact, under which the Iranian government agreed to curbs on its nuclear programme in re-

California sues Amazon

CALIFORNIA: California filed a lawsuit Wednesday accusing Amazon of using its market influence to prevent merchants from offering buyers better deals elsewhere online, in violation of state antitrust law. Amazon pressures merchants not to list items at lower prices on other websites, which hurts sellers and consumers, California Attorney General Rob Bonta said in the lawsuit. "Amazon coerces merchants into agreements that keep prices artificially high, knowing full well that they can't afford to say no," Bonta said in a release. "Many of the products we buy online would be cheaper if market forces were left unconstrained." The attorney general in Washington had filed a similar suit against Amazon, but a judge dismissed the case in March. "Similar to the DC Attorney General - whose complaint was dismissed by the courts - the California Attorney General has it exactly backwards," an Amazon spokesperson said in response to an AFP inquiry. "The relief the AG seeks would force Amazon to feature higher prices to customers, oddly going against core objectives of antitrust law," Amazon is such a dominant e-commerce site that merchants feel they have little choice when it comes to agreeing to the titan's selling conditions, Bonta's

given bail in sedition case

ISLAMABAD:The Islamabad High Court (IHC) Thursday granted Pakistan Tehreek e Insaf (PTI)'s Leader Shahbaz Gill post-arrest bail in a sedition case registered by the capital's police.

The court accepted the bail against surety bonds worth Rs 500,000 and ordered to release the accused. During the hearing, Chief Justice, Athar Minallah asked Gill's lawyer that how he could justify the statement of the accused to involve armed forces in politics. The chief justice said that political parties had increased so much hatred and it could be seen in the speech.

He remarked that the institutions were not so weak that it could be affected by someone's speech but Shahbaz Gill's irresponsible statement could not be justified in any way.

The court asked whether the government's permission was taken before registering sedition case

The chief said that whether the spokesperson of the political party did not know that the armed forces had taken an oath for not to interfere in politics. He remarked that Shahbaz Gill's statement was irresponsible, inappropriate and defamatory.

Do you think that such an irresponsible statement can influence the armed forces," he asked.

The court asked whether a complaint ever filed on behalf of the institu-

The chief justice questioned that if Shahbaz Gill told anyone to rebel, then tell the court. The court inquired how this charge was made in accordance of the law.

The court said that he was arrested and was inside, then how did he not cooperate. The court said "PTI imposed draconian law in their government, now you want to apply the same." The chief justice said no one should be deprived of bail unless there was concrete material against him. If the same person turns out to be innocent tomorrow then there could be no compensation for him, he said.

Shahbaz Gill's lawyer Salman Safdar said this case was made on political grounds and the investigation had also been completed, adding that the whole case revolved around a speech. The chief justice stopped the lawyer from talking about politics and instructed him to give arguments on legal points. Shehbaz Gul's lawyer read the text of the FIR.-APP

Petrol price likely to slide down by Rs9.62

ISLAMABAD: The price of mogas is likely to drop from Rs235.98 per litre to Rs226.36 after a cut of Rs9,62 per litre on September 16 (Friday) for the next fortnight. However, a slight increase of Rs3.04 per litre is expected in the price of diesel, taking the rate up from Rs247.26 per litre to Rs250.30 for the said duration. Industrial sources said that the average Platts price for motor spirit also plunged by Rs9.55 to Rs92.28 from Rs101.83 for the duration from September 1-15. However, the exchange rate remained on the higher side if compared with the exchange rate registered during August 16-31. And with unchanged customs duty at Rs15.39 per litre, the cost of one-litre petrol in the refinery slid by Rs7.84 per litre to Rs166.76 from Rs174.61 per litre.

Rains, floods caused massive losses to Sindh: President

DADU: President Dr Arif Alvi Thursday said Sindh province had suffered massive losses due to devastating rains and floods and called for extensive measures to help people in time of distress and displacement. in the country.

Talking to media at a relief camp in Government Pilot High School, he said :"This is probably the biggest flood in the history Sindh with huge losses of entire crops." He pointed out rains and floods had also caused devastation in Balochistan, KPK and Punjab but the level of catastrophe was far bigger in Sindh province. The President said the government was tirelessly working for rescue and relief of the affected people who were also being helped through Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP). He said the country had never witnessed devastation on such massive scale and added the government could not cope with the situation single-handedly and urged international community to come forward for help of affected people. He called upon the well-off people of Karachi and other parts of the country to come forward for the help and rehabilitation of affected people. The President asked

the government to take exe measures for providing relief, shelter, education and health services to the affected people. the floods had played havoc with millions of acres of farm lands besides destroying hundreds of thousands of houses. The President observed that the climate change and the rising global temperatures paved the way for the massive floods in Pakistan. "Pakistan contributes minimally to the enhancing temperatures, but it is among the top affected in countries in the world" he added.

Germany to send rocket launchers. armored vehicles to Ukraine

BERLIN: German Defense Minister Christine Lambrecht announced on Thursday that Germany will send two more multiple rocket launchers as well as 50 armored personnel carriers to Ukraine.

On top of that, Germany will send some 200 rockets for the launchers. Ukraine has recently called on Germany to increase its weapons deliveries following a successful counteroffensive against the Russian occupation."We have decided to deliver two more MARS II multiple rocket launchers including 200 ockets to Ukraine," Lambrecht told a Bundeswehr conference. "On top of this, we will send 50 Dingo armored personnel carriers to Ukraine," she added.d.—APP

Imran launched to create 'anarchy, destruction': Maryam

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz Vice President Maryam Nawaz has said that PTI Chairman Imran Khan had been launched in politics to "create anarchy and destruction." Talking to media after her court

appearance in Islamabad along with hubby Captain Safdar on Thursday, Maryam Nawaz said "Imran Khan is not a stakeholder rather he is destruction of Pakistan.'

She said the forces which funded him do not want Pakistan to progress. "Imran brought the economy on the verge of collapse and he had also violated the agreement he struck with the IMF," she added.

Calling Imran Khan a 'fit-(mischief-monger), Maryam Nawaz said that during his over three-and-ahalf-year rule the country's economy reached the brink of destruction. She said Imran had even broken the country's deal with the IMF before leaving the office, which further exacerbated the situation. Maryam alleged that some foreign powers had launched Imran to destroy the new generation's moral values as well as corrupt the country's politics. "These powers do not want Pakistan to progress," she opined. Referring to Imran's statement that he had become more dangerous. she said these words were not meant for his political opponents, but for the country. She made it clear to the PTI chairman that if he wanted general elections in the country, he should dissolve the provincial assemblies of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP)

and Punjab first. PML-N vice president also urged the former prime minister not to use religion for politics. She told Imran that he could not get a clean chit by putting all blame for the country's pathetic situation on the current government's shoulders. "Imran, this is your party which is in power in the flood-affected provinces of Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa," Maryam said, adding, "Therefore, a greater responsibility rests on your shoulders." "Look Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif is visiting all flood-hit areas of the country despite the fact that in none of the provinces the PML-N is in power,"

Any efforts to destabilise Pakistan won't be tolerated

ISLAMABAD: Foreign Office Spokesperson Asim Iftikhar has rejected media reports regarding any stoppage of work or abandonment of the Neelum-Jhelum Hydropower project.

Responding to a question during his weekly news briefing in Islamabad this afternoon, he said India is once again churning out false and baseless reports regarding the Neelum-Jhelum hydropower proiect. He said a fault was detected in the project and is currently undergoing remedial works for which the concerned entity, Gezhouba Group of China, has been contacted. He said

the group has already attained full mobilization at the site and at present, the work is proceeding smoothly without any interruption with completion expected The Spokesperson said

that there is no truth in any report of work stoppage or so-called abandonment. He said these reports are aimed at misleading the public as well as part of malicious propaganda efforts to fuel controversy around Pakistan-China relations. He said such efforts will not succeed as all-weather strategic cooperative part-

ners are fully committed to

strengthening bilateral co-

operation for the benefit of both countries and people. Regarding another question about presence of a UN designated individual in Afghanistan, Asim Iftikhar said that the person is a proclaimed offender and wanted in numerous terrorism-related cases in Pakistan.

He said Pakistani authorities have formally raised this issue with the relevant Afghan interlocutors on multiple occasions. He said Pakistan as well as the international community have sufficient reasons to believe that there are still pockets of ungoverned spaces in Afghanistan that

have been used by terrorist groups as safe havens. The Spokesperson said that multiple deadly cross border terrorist attacks from Afghanistan only increase these legitimate

concerns.

He urged the Afghan interim authorities to take concert and verifiable actions to deliver on the assurances they have given to the international community that they will not allow anyone to use Afghan soil against any country.
