COMMENT Ansar M Bhatti floods continue to take a heavy toll on the affected people in particular and the rest of the country in general, the political climate continues to turn rough with each passing day. Despite a number of court cases, including the terrorism one, PTI Chairman Imran Khan seems undeterred and hence moves on with his anti-government campaign. Albeit, the by-elections have been postponed, the PTI has decided not to stop its mass-contact drive. It has rather decided to give it further impetus by putting inflation at top of its agenda. The coalition government was desperate to get rid of Imran Khan's public rallies and that is why it sought to get the elections postponed, however

it has not happened. The movement is

10, 2022 the PTI Chairman announced to give a final call to his workers in near future. Prima facie, Imran Khan appeared to be readying his workers for yet another long march, though many believe this call actually shall never translate into reality, because some under the table deal is already being mulled, which, analysts believe, is likely to bear some fruit. Imran Khan has been using his cards quite prudently or perhaps that is the impression his confidants or even he himself are giving to all and sundry. During his recent public gathering when he made a mention of the appointment of the next army chief, it was not without a purpose. Previously he was holding the view that this appointment does not concern him at all. It was up to the incumbent government to deal with this issue the way it likes. But now suddenly he has come up with a different view on the subject. His live speeches on the national hook-up were barred by the PEMRA after he said that he will not accept the army chief appointment if made by the coalition government. Not only this, he had demanded this appointment to be made purely on merit, which means the army chief must be picked up from the top two senior generals.

Now that is the point where actually the shoe pinches. It has seldom happened

Are we heading towards a final showdown? in the history of Pakistan that the army chief is picked on the basis of seniority principle. He is always picked up from a panel of five or six senior generals. Historically, candidates appearing in the last in the seniority list were most of the time picked up. The respective prime ministers appointed army chiefs with this hope that the person would serve their interests knowing the fact very well that once appointed the army chief then belongs to his institutions only. Various plans are under consideration right now. Since Imran Khan has tried to make the army chief appointment controversial by discussing it in a public rally therefore it is likely that the incumbent government tries to avoid making this appointment and leaves it to the caretaker government. In that case a caretaker government will have to be formed either by the end of September or in October. In this scenario, the general elections may take place in January or February next year, if everything goes well. PTI seems comfortable with this arrangement and would like to have it in place sooner rather than later.

There is another scenario as well. The sitting government may appoint the army chief on merit as demanded by the PTI chairman, which means the top po-

general. The senior most ostensibly would become the Chairman Joint Chiefs of Staff Committee. The senior most may also be appointed as the COAS. If this happens, then obviously it shall be a big shift from status quo to a paradigm change. Hitherto, the forces of the status quo have not allowed any paradigm change to take place in Pakistan.

The Nawaz Sharif camp, on the other hand, has its own plan ready. The PML N supremo is all set to return to Pakistan for that is the only option to keep the PML N vote intact and the party united. Maryam Nawaz has already approached the court to get her passport back. If she is able to get it back, then she departs to London and comes back with her father. There is no denving the fact that the PML N is in dire straits ever since it took over charge of the government after removal of Imran Khan.

have realized that PML N led by Shehbaz Sharif cannot compete with the PTI. The by-elections in various constituencies proved this fact when PML N badly lost to the PTI despite the fact it was in power both at the Center and in the Punjab province. This defeat certainly had rung alarm bells within the ranks of PML N

Realistically speaking, powers-that-be

making it incumbent upon Nawaz Sharif to earnestly think about his return and lead the party. That is the only way to stop the PTI getting two-thirds majority in the general elections.

Regarding Imran Khan's cases, undoubtedly a sword is still dangling over his head because he refused to tender an unconditional apology in the contempt case. The Khan camp believes an unconditional apology would be tantamount to a confession, which means if the court would hand down punishment, Imran Khan shall have no option to challenge the verdict in the Supreme Court. People privy to this case still believe he can go scot free by tendering an apology at the time of the indictment. His legal experts nevertheless opine, an apology involved huge risks. Summing up, September and October

may be crucial months in Pakistani politics. A future course is likely to be set in these months. It all depends on Imran Khan how serious he is in his long march commitment. If he gives a call then things might get complicated. The government has a plan to impose Governor's rule in Punjab or KP in order to avoid a long march. That move would further aggravate tensions. The saner voices, as reports suggest, are busy in finding an amicable way out.

IUCN launches Climate Change Gender Action Plan

Conservation of Nature (IUCN Pakistan) has launched the Climate Change Gender Action Plan in Gilgit Baltistan as part of its commitment to build gender responsive readiness, capacities and innovative approaches amid rising impacts of global warming and environmental degradation in the region.

The IUCN Pakistan has launched its Climate Change Gender Action Plans (ccGAPs) to strengthen the resilience of women and girls in the face of climate-related impacts, while aiming to accelerate progress and support gender-responsive climate action plan with new commitments and initiatives, an IUCN official news release said.

The launch ceremony was held at the Chief Secretary's office; while the guests included senior government officials, members of civil society, local community based organizations, academia and media.

The event opened with welcome remarks from Country Representative, IUCN Pakistan Mahmood Akhtar Cheema who provided an overview of IUCN Pakistan's work in Gilgit Baltistan and its key role in introduction of sustainable trophy hunting initiative which was

The Gilgit Baltistan's conservation strategy and the State of Environment Report was also developed by IUCN in Past and it was currently involved in a major biodiversity related initiative under which over 10,000 youth were involved in research and field activities. Programme Coordinator, IUCN Pakistan, Fauzia Bilqis Malik during her presentation apprised the audience that "the ccGAPs is developed around the six priority sectors including; agriculture and food security, forest and biodiversity, disaster risk reduction, water and sanitation, integrated coastal management and mitigation: energy and transport."

Primarily a multi-stakeholder, cross-sector capacity building process was led by Ministry of Climate Change and IUCN to develop national capacities and focal groups and a cross-sector national action plan, fostering innovative project design to strengthen national and provincial climate change

The presentation was followed by a Questions and Answers session which was facilitated by Head of Climate Change Programme, IUCN Pakistan, Dr Ghulam Rasul.

Speaking on the occasion, Additional Chief Secretary and Secretary Planning and Development Department, Government of Gilgit Baltistan, Aziz Ahmed Jamali said, "This is a great achievement of IUCN and Government of Pakistan in multiple ways, particularly because it is the first ever Climate Change Gender Action Plan of Pakistan lead by Ministry of Climate Change and also because it is the first such initiative by the Green Climate Fund (GCF) to ensure gender mainstreaming in the upcoming GCF funded projects".

Secretary Forests, Wildlife and Environment Faisal Ahsan Pirzada added that the process has engaged representatives and practitioners from all the six priority sectors and across the country which is one of a kind provin-

Globally acknowledged capabilities of forest officers is great honor for Pakistan

Pakistani forest officers can bring green revolution in Middle East with professional skills, better strategy and hard work

ISLAMABAD: Globally acknowledged capabilities of forest officers is great honor for Pakistan. Pakistani forest officers can bring green revolution in Middle East with professional skills, better strategy and hard work. Despite insufficient staff, vehicles and shortage of funds, the forest officers achieved all the targets.

Now it is right to say that the forest officers of Punjab, KP, Sindh, Balochistan, AJK and GB despite insufficient resources are performing better than the forest departments of developed countries. When the Billion Trees Tsunami Project was launched in KP, such a big project had never been started in Pakistan before and no one had any experience of such a big forest project. KP Forest Department started BTTP as a challenge and it was completed on time. When the Ten Billion Trees Tsunami Project (TBTTP) was launched, it was a huge challenge for the Forest Departments of Punjab, Sindh, KP, AJK and GB.

Despite insufficient staff, vehicles, drone cameras, laptops, low wages for skilled labor and Nigehbaans, flat rates for nurseries land, and shortage of funds, the forest officers achieved all the targets. At present, the excellent performance of forest officers of Punjab, KP, Sindh, Balochistan, AJK and GB is being appreciated all over the world. The world has recognized that Pakistani foresters can play an ideal role in controlling the serious situation of climate change. At this time, the whole world is on the target of climate change disasters. Many countries in the Middle East already had very high temperatures and now the temperature is increasing.

Saudi Arabia, UAE, Qatar, Kuwait, Oman used to have very little rains, but now, unexpected and heavy rains are happening. In these states, drains were designed for low rainfall, but now due to heavy rains, floods have started, causing huge loss of life and property. In the past, these states also did not focus on solid planning regarding forests. Most of the area of these states consists of land where plantation cannot be successful.

The temperature and soil behavior of Saudi Arabia, UAE, Qatar, Kuwait and Oman are similar to many areas of Pakistan and AJK .Like Quetta, Khuzdar, Pashin, Nasirabad, Chaman, Nushki, Qila Saifullah, Zhob, Sibi, Jacobabad, Sukkur, Nawabshah, Larkana, Tharparkar, DI Khan, Bannu, Kohat, Karak, DG Khan, Bahawalpur, Multan, Rahim Yar Khan, Bhambhar and Mirpur. In all the four provinces and AJK, the forest officer has succeeded in planting in all those areas where it was not possible to succeed in plantation due to temperature and soil behavior. Some forest officers went to Saudi Arabia to perform Hajj or Umrah, and were also busy thinking about the green revolution in Saudi Arabia. Several forest officers did deep research in this regard. Pakistani Forest Officers in Saudi Arabia, UAE, Qatar, Kuwait and Oman can best bring about green revolution because Pakistani Forest Officers are working in similar temperature, environment and soil as Middle East states . Pakistani Forest Officers have experience of working on big forestry projects too. There are many forest officers in the forest department of Punjab, KP Sindh, Balochistan, Azad Jammu and Kashmir and GB who want to bring green revolution in all friendly countries and especially in Saudi Arabia so that in future these states will not suffer from climate change.

Among the forest officers working in TBTTP, there are officers who have extensive experience in forest departments and some are serving in TBTTP after higher education from foreign countries. If we media persons criticize the forest officers for mistakes and negligence, then it is our duty to appreciate the best performing forest officers. Some senior and highly qualified and experienced and best performing forest officers must be mentioned

In Punjab Shahid Rasheed Awan has worked in various senior positions in Forest Department of Punjab including PD TBTTP now he is Chief Conservator Forest Central Zone Lahore. CM for promotion of sports culture tourism

PESHAWAR: Chief Minister Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Mahmood Khan has said that promotion of sports culture and tourism in the province is one of the prime objectives of the incumbent government adding that development of this sector will not only promote healthy activities but will also contribute significantly to the provincial exchequer. According to details, a total of 124 projects including 90 ongoing and 34 new, worth around Rs.19.5 billion have been reflected in the current Provincial Annual Development Program (ADP) in Sports, Tourism, Youth Affairs, Archeology and Culture sector. These projects also include various development schemes of newly merged districts worth Rs. 2.5 billion. As many as 38 projects will be completed during the current financial year with the aim to provide modern Sports and Tourism facilities to the people of the province.

In a statement issued here from Chief Minister's Secretariat, Mahmood Khan said that as per the vision of Chairman PTI Imran Khan result oriented steps are being taken to promote Tourism and Sports sector on modern lines in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. New projects for the construction of Sports Complexes in Chitral, Lower Dir, Hangu and Abbottabad have been included in the current ADP alongside the rehabilitation and improvement of existing sports facilities across the province. The Chief Minister stated that various projects worth billions of rupees are part of the current ADP so as to boost the tourism potential of the province.

Touching upon the government's initiatives during last four years in Sports and Tourism sectors, Mahmood Khan said that the incumbent provincial government established first of its kind Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Culture & Tourism Authority to promote Tourism at international level and project the positive image of the country and province. Besides three new development authorities (Kalash, Kumrat and Upper Swat) have also been setup. Moreover, for the first time in the history of province Tourism Police have been launched for the protection and security of tourists.

He remarked that the rehabilitation and construction of roads in the tourists spots of Malakand and Hazara region are also underway while at different tourist spots camping pods have been installed for the facilitation of tourists. Similarly, a project for the establishment of four Integrated Tourism Zones in Malakand and Hazara division has been incepted which on completion would boost tourism related activities in the province. Besides the provision of facilities at existing tourists spots discovery and development of new places is also underway.

Govt to provide relief to flood victims

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Minister for Local Government and Rural Development Sardar Faisal Amin Gandapur on Sunday said that all resources were being utilizing to provide maximum relief to the flood victims as well as restore the damaged infrastructure in the province especially in the worst hit dis-

trict of Dera Ismail Khan. He expressed these views during a ceremony organized for the distribution of relief items among the affectees at different relief camps in Kulachi. PIDE Research Brief on Gas Crises in Pakistan

OGDCL predicts Pakistan oil reserves to exhaust by 2025

National Think Tank briefly described that large areas in the country remain unexplored due to security concerns and the law-and-order situation

STAFF REPORT

ISLAMABAD: Gas is the third-largest energy source consumed around the world. However, Pakistan has less than a 1 percent share in world gas consumption. It meets its energy demand through imported and indigenous resources in the ratio of 44:56. Natural gas and imported LNG contribute more than 40 percent to the country's current energy mix, including gas resources used in electricity generation. In recent years, the demand for gas has increased rapidly in Pakistan. However, gas exploration and production have declined, and the LNG operational and regulatory framework is weak, leading to a nationwide shortage and increased supply costs. The latest research brief on "Gas Crises in Pakistan" was revealed by the Pakistan Institute of Development Economics (PIDE).

According to a Press Release issued from the PIDE, a national think tank of the country, it stated that in upstream, 15 gas explorations and production companies work in 55 gas fields spread throughout the country. The gas distribution and transmission are mainly owned and operated by two state-owned companies Sui Northern Gas Pipeline Limited (SNGPL) and Sui Southern Gas Company Limited (SSGCL). The

gas exploration/production industry and gas distribution/transmission industry lack competition in Pakistan. It was said in the study that OGDCL predicts that Pakistan's indigenous oil reserves will be exhausted by 2025. However, current reserves will last a maximum of 15 years if demand is capped at present-day gas levels by 2030.

PIDE research showed that 78% of households have no access to natural gas in Pakistan. Natural gas consumption in the domestic sector has grown by about 11% over the years. Supplying gas to households requires significant investments. The cost of gas supply to households is much higher than the cost of supply to the industry or power sector. Gas allocation policy has remained based on political priorities rather than on the objective of maximizing value addition. Low gas prices and inefficient gas allocations have encouraged higher demands. With 30.6 billion cubic meters of natural gas, Pakistan shares 0.8 % of global production. There is a sharp increase in gas demand in Pakistan, but due to the inefficient distribution of natural gas resources, Pakistan has been facing a colossal gas shortfall, the brief revealed.

National Think Tank briefly described that large areas in the country remain unexplored due to security concerns and the law-and-order situation. For instance, Baluchistan's

Pishin basin is considered a valuable block. However, no exploration activity in this basin because of the law-and-order problem.

According to the PIDE research, all the activities in the gas sector in Pakistan, directly or indirectly, are under government control. An independent regulator was established in 2002 to regulate mid and downstream activities. Still, it remained hostage to government decisions because of the extensive state presence in all activities in the supply chain. The OGRA law allows too much mandatory government involvement in the current oil and gas regulatory system. That has made the regulator powerless. Government interference in service providers' affairs has led to cross-subsidy and an overall deficit in the gas sector. The circular debt in the gas sector has crossed Rs 1.5 trillion, contributed by both the utilities SNGPL and SSGCL. Government irregularities in regulatory frameworks and poor policy formulation are hindering sectoral growth and creating inefficiencies in the supply chain. Politically influenced allocations and monopolistic business operations are all bottlenecks.

The research brief recommends that ensuring reliable and high-quality uninterrupted natural gas supply and efficient services is one of the critical aspects of the regulatory process. The gas distribution companies

must maintain adequate pressure in the transmission pipelines and distribution networks and upgrade the system where necessary to ensure supply of contractual volume and pressure to its consumers. Gas resources are depleting, but these monopolies are expanding their transmission and distribution networks to maximize their financial returns. As a result, these companies, especially SNGPL, have earned enormous profits over the years.

The research further state that in both utilities, mismanagement and irregularities have affected their operational performance. Though private entities own 40% or more of their shares, these companies have no business model. There is no regulatory mechanism to link their financial returns to their operational efficiency. Underground pipeline leakage, poor maintenance, measurement errors, wrong billing, law & order, and theft have contributed significantly to Pakistan's unaccounted-for gas. The two integrated companies, SNGPL and SSGC, are over-regulated monopolies with no incentive to improve their inefficiencies and service delivery. Against the OGRA allowance of UFG at 4.5 %, the gas losses in these companies remained relatively high. After 2017, this allowance increased to 7% and 8.5% for SNGPL and SSGCL to compensate for declining profits.

Women labour participation can increase economic output

ISLAMABAD: Chief Executive Officer Pakistan Furniture Council Mian Kashif Ashfaq Sunday said that in countries with greater gender inequality, closing the gap in women's labour force participation could increase economic output by an average of 35 percent. Talking to delegation of women entrepreneurs led by renowned furniture designer Nida Ejaz, he said "we have to narrow gender gap which he added is harming national as well global growth". He said locking women out of economic opportunities is

non-Islamic, unfair and also harms growth and resilience for all."Over time, gender-sensitive macroeconomic and financial policies will result in higher growth, greater economic stability and resilience, and lower income inequality-a dividend not just for women, but for everyone", he added. He said out of 190 countries surveyed, the world bank found that women were equal legal standing with men in just 12 countries which speaks of sorry state of affairs worldwide. Mian Kashif Ashfaq said according to organisation for economic cooperation and development, gender based discrimination in social institutions costs the world economy \$6 trillion but in recent years countries have reduced these costs through social and legal actions such as curbing underage marriages, criminalisation domestic violence and increasing the number of female elected officials.

He said macro economic and financial policies affect women and men differently, often unintentionally. He said policy makers must help identify and remedy those biases by applying a gender lens to our main activities focusing towards maximum participation of women in every sphere of life for quick economic prosperity. - APP

Railways incur Rs 90m losses per day due to floods

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Railways had been suffering losses of around Rs 90 million per day due to unexpected monsoon rains and flash floods across the country. "The relentless monsoon rains and floods have not only destroyed the many railway tracks, but also damaged the bridges which disconnected Sindh and Balochistan with other parts of the country," officials in the Ministry of Railways told APP on Sunday.

They said during the last month, Quetta was disconnected from the rest of the country after bridge collapse at Mach Station, which had resulted in the cancellation of seven important trains between Karachi and Quetta. Pakistan Railways had also announced suspension of operations of five express major trains on the Main Line-I (ML-I) a few days ago until the rehabilitation of railway tracks, they said.

They said the main line of Pakistan Railways was under the flood-water between Tando Masti Khan-Gambat and Mehrabpur-Lakhro sections. Similarly, the track was sub merged at various spots in Balochistan. The sources said that furthermore, Pakistan Railways had already asked the passengers who want their tickets refunded can contact the respective reservation offices. - APP

Rehabilitation of schools top priority: Tanveer

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Education and Professional Training Rana Tanveer Hussain Sunday said that rehabilitation of schools and providing relief to students in the wake of recent flood disaster will be the government's top priority.

Talking to a private news channel, he said that the assessment of damages caused by the recent flash floods is underway and once it is completed, immediate stens will be taken for the rehabilitation of the damaged infrastructure of schools. Schools and damaged government property were on the priority list, he mentioned. Teachers Association demands supplementary grant

ISLAMABAD: Federal Government College Teachers Association (FGCTA) has demanded immediate release of supplementary grant to the educational institutions at the earliest possible in order to clear the backlog of rental ceiling of the teachers.

The association claimed that the authorities were not releasing the pending rental ceiling of the teachers, who have been struggling for the same for the last over one year.

Teachers' body alleged that the authorities had abruptly reduced the funds of educational institutions in the head of occupancy cost (Rental ceiling) in the current fiscal year 2022-23 without any settlement.

"While our teachers are facing threats of eviction from their house owners due to non-payment of rent, all other employees of ministries, divisions and departments in the same city are getting their regular rental ceiling in time without any problem. This completely disregards the teachers." asserted the president of FGCTA Dr. Rahima Rehman. Talking to APP. Professor Far-

han Azam Vice president of the association said, "The relevant department has failed to release pending rental payments to the house owners of the teachers. The house owners demand the rent from our teachers repeatedly on daily basis and are getting on the teachers' nerves". 'Teachers are compelled

rent obligation which is the responsibility of the government. The association has been struggling for the release of funds for rental ceiling for a long time but the authorities are not paying heed to the issue", he said. Vice president of FGCTA, Professor Tasnim Akhter Mir, "Teachers are suffering with no money to pay the rent. Inadequate funds allocation by the Finance Division has led to delay in rental payments. The authorities must understand that the financial problems faced by the teachers on account of non-payment of rental ceiling for over one year is an absolute infringement upon the their fundamental rights being govern-

ment servants." Dr. Jabir Hussain, the press and information secretary of FGCTA said, "The teachers have been patiently and silently bearing the brunt of overdue payment of rental ceiling. They are paying their rent out of their own pockets, leaving them with insufficient money for other household expenses. Many of them gave testimonies about the hardships they have been facing owing to constant delay in rental payments." The association has urged upon the authorities to immediately release all pending payment of rental ceiling and warned that it would be compelled to resort to democratic way of attaining justice if there is no early release of pending rental ceiling. - APP

17 bids to śmuggle wheat, flour foiled

RAWALPINDI: The Food Department Rawalpindi and district police while foiling 17 bids to smuggle wheat and flour seized 9,424 bags during last seven days. According to a district administration spokesman, the authorities of the food department along with police conducted raids in different areas and rounded up 17 drivers who were allegedly trying to smuggle wheat and flour. Rawalpindi district police and the Food Department on the special directives of Punjab government had also set up five special pickets at exit points of Rawalpindi district to control wheat smuggling. According to a police spokesman, special pickets were established in Naseerabad area, Hakla Interchange, Gangu Bahadur, HMC road and Brahama Interchange. - APP

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Alvi has called upon all the banks of the country to regularly warn their customers and clients about banking scams, including banking frauds involving online funds transfers, and improve their regular communication with clients. He said that simple people were being frequently entrapped by fraudsters and swindled out of their hard-earned money through fake calls and sometimes even inside the banking premises.

The President gave these remarks while writing his decision on a representation preferred by the Habib Bank Ltd (HBL) against a decision of the Wafaqi Mohtasib. He rejected HBL's representation and further directed it to pay Rs 249,525 to a poor

defrauded out of his money by fraudsters who had obtained his personal banking credentials by posing as bank officials on the telephone and got the money transferred out of his account through online means. The President highlighted that as per the State Bank of Pakistan's (SBP) directives, the bank was bound to obtain the customer's consent before activating the Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) facility and the bank had failed to submit any document/evidence to the effect that it had complied with the provisions of

due to the reason that the Bank's EFT facility was made operational unilaterally without the consent and knowledge of the account holder. "Had this channel not been opened by the bank, the account holder could have avoided this financial loss", he noted. He held that gross

regulations of SBP had rendered the Bank non-compliant, and malpractice and maladministration had been established. He concluded that the bank had failed to discharge the burden and statutory liability cast upon it under the law, and no justification was presented to interfere with the original order of the Mohtasib, therefore, the representation was rejected.

As per details, Mr Ali Muhammad (the complainant) was swindled out of his money by fraudsters and he approached the bank for getting a refund of his lost amount. After getting no results, he approached the Wafaqi Mohtasib for retrieval of his defrauded money. The Mohtasib, after investigating and hearing the case, directed HBL to refund the lost amount, but instead of implementing the decision, HBL preferred a representation with the President, which he rejected.

Rs 45 mln for s'hips to minorities' students

ISLAMABAD: The Ministry of Religious Affairs and Interfaith Harmony has allocated Rs 45 million to provide scholarships to minority communities' students for the financial year (FY) 2022-23. Talking to APP, Ministry's Spokesperson Muhammad Umar Butt informed that the ministry had sought applications from the eligible students from primary to university level particularly those who were enrolled in the government educational institutions and secured at least 50 percent marks in their annual examinations and their parents' income was not exceeding to Rs50,000.

ISLAMABAD: Chinese solar energy conglomerate Zonergy and the electricity generation equipment manufacturer Shanghai Electric will contribute a total of Rs19 million for the people affected by devastating floods in Pakistan, Gwadar Pro reported on Saturday. Zonergy has donated RMB100,000 to the Pakistani Embassy in China for the flood relief efforts in Pakistan, according to a senior official of the Zonergy Solar Development Pakistan Ltd.

The company will also provide Rs 6.4 million worth of portable solar energy devices and Rs 2.4 million worth of food supplies for the flood-hit people, the official said. The total package is worth Rs 12 million, he added. Zonergy is a major player in Pakistan's solar energy sector, having installed a 300 megawatts solar power plant in Bahawalpur Punjab.

The company also intends to install another

300MWs solar power plant in Quaid-e-Azam Solar Park in Bahawalpur, according to an Board (PPIB). Meanwhile, sources said that Shanghai Electric will also contribute Rs 7 million worth of relief goods for the people of Mitthi Sindh. The cheque has been drawn and relief goods are being put together by the company officials, the sources said. The company will make a formal announcement in this regard on Friday or Monday, the sources added. Shanghai Electric is the owner of Sino-Sindh

Resources Ltd. (SSRL), a special purpose vehicle to operate a 7.8 million tons per annum lignite coal mine in Thar Coal Block-I in Tharparker district of Sindh. The firm also owns the Thar Coal Block-1 (TCB-1) Power Generation Company, another special purpose vehicle to operate the 1,320 MWs integrated mine-mouth power plant in Thar Block-1. UN Secretary General's visit

NITED Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, who visited flood-ravaged Pakistan, says he has "never seen climate carnage" on such a scale, blaming wealthier countries for contributing to the devastation. Nearly 1,400 people have died and more than a million people have been rendered homeless in flooding that has submerged nearly one-third of Pakistan and destroyed crops in a country that has been facing high inflation and a balance of payment crisis.

"I have seen many humanitarian disasters in the world, but I have never seen climate carnage on this scale," Guterres said on Saturday in the port city of Karachi on his second day of a visit in Pakistan. "I have simply no words to describe what I have seen today," he said.

Taking to Twitter, PM Shehbaz Sharif thanked Guterres for his

"unprecedented support" to the flood victims in Pakistan.

"During his visit to the flood-affected areas and camps under scorching heat, the UN secretary general was overwhelmed by the scale of devastation that has engulfed Pakistan," the premier wrote on Twitter. He said that the UN chief's voice has become the voice of flood victims.

More than a third of Pakistan was submerged by melting glaciers and record monsoon rains that began in June, causing colossal damage to homes, roads, bridges, rail networks, livestock and crops. While Minister of Finance Miftah Ismail estimated the total loss at \$10bn amid a continuing economic crisis, independent analysts put the figure between \$15bn and \$20bn, and fear it could further rise.

Guterres has said he hopes his visit will galvanise support for Pakistan, which has put the provisional cost of the catastrophe at more than \$30bn, according to the government's flood relief centre. Shortly after his arrival on Friday, the UN chief called for "massive" global support.

The devastating floods have also caused significant damage to Mohenjo Daro, a famous 4,500-year-old archaeological site in the southeastern Sindh province which UNESCO has designated a World Heritage site.

War and its impact on the environment

ARS and conflicts always end up destroying infrastructure. It eats up flora and fauna while hurting the environment. Russia's invasion on Ukraine in February 2022 was nothing short of an ultimatum to Ukraine and the world. It was a direct message to the European Union. According to a report, nearly 3,000 civilians have been killed in Ukraine with an equal amount or more to be injured. Russia's onslaught has been polluting Ukraine's environment. Residues from weapons and ammunition have been contaminating the water supply. The risk of illnesses and ailments is likely to emerge when people are exposed to toxic gases. Yevhenia Zasyadko, Head of the Climate Department of the NGO Ecoaction said, "This war can cause many deaths in the future due to polluted water. We record soil pollution and mining of our fields. Food security and our fertile soils are in great danger caused by the actions of the occupiers."

The Russia-Ukraine conflict is not the first time when the adverse impact of war is seen on the environment. The US covered nearly 4.5 million acres of rainforest in Vietnam with herbicides as a part of their tactical plan to fight against the Vietnamese soldiers. Similarly, almost 90% of the wild elephant population at Mozambique's Gorongosa National Park was destroyed during the civil war from 1977 to 1992. While wars adversely affect natural resources, the postwar times compel the citizens to fight with each other to get their hands on the resources that remain. This creates class differences and builds animosity among the citizens. Food shortages are also a result of the same when fields and crops are burned and the land is not suitable for agricultural purposes. Ukraine's 42 million hectares of land are used for agriculture. Time will tell how much of this land will be available for growing crops.

Putin makes civilisationalism fashionable, Dugin puts flesh on its skeleton

USSIAN President Vladimir Putin has inspired civilisationalist leaders to emerge from the woodwork and publicly define their states as civilisational rather than national entities. These leaders speak of civilisational or ethnic worlds with borders that transcend national frontiers, not nation-states. How far they may wish to push claims that challenge the nation-statebased international order is likely to be heavily influenced by whether Mr. Putin achieves his civilisationalist goals in Ukraine. Last month, Hungarian Prime Minister Victor Orban became the latest leader to redefine the nation-state he governs. Speaking on Romanian territory in the predomi-

nantly ethnic Hungarian town of Baile Tusnad in

Transylvania, a onetime Austro-Hungarian possession that is home to a Hungarian minority, Mr.Orban left no doubt that his definition of the Hungarian motherland included Transylvania and other regions in the Carpathian Basin beyond Hungary's borders populated by ethnic Hungarians.

Serbian Interior Minister Aleksandar Vulin articulated a similar view of Serbia's borders a year earlier. "The task for this generation of politicians is to form a Serb world, that is to unite Serbs wherever they live," Mr. Vulin told a political gathering in Belgrade in 2021 attended by President Aleksander Vucic. Widely viewed as 'Moscow's man in Belgrade,' Mr. Vulin said, "for the 'Serb world' to jell, Serbia needs to be economically successful, wellled and have an army that is able to protect Serbia and Serbs, wherever they live."

Speaking the same day on television, Mr. Vulin went further by insisting that all Serbs should be united in one state. However, he later modified his statements by saying that unification would have to occur peacefully as it happened in post-Cold War Germany. Even so, the thinking of far-right ideologue Alexander Dugin reverberates in positions adopted by Mr. Vulin as it does in the civilisationalist framing of geopolitics by Messrs. Orban and Putin. "This is a war of ideas. We are not part of the global civilisation. We are a civilisation by ourselves. ... We had no other possibility to prove that Huntington was right without attacking Ukraine," Mr. Dugin asserts. He was referring to the late Harvard University political scientist Samuel P. Huntington who controversially predicted a post-Cold War clash of civilisations that would be fought not between countries but between cultures.

The degree of Mr. Dugin's influence on Mr. Putin is a matter of debate. Often dubbed in the media as 'Putin's brain' and a Rasputin-like character, Mr. Dugin appears to be in and out of favour in the Kremlin's innermost circles. Similarly, Mr. Dugin has influenced Central European, but to what degree may be debatable. Nevertheless, even those

sceptical describe the far-right ideologue as one of Russia's foremost political theorists.

Mr. Dugin wrote a hugely influential ultra-nationalist tome, The Foundations of Geopolitics: The Geopolitical Future of Russia, which Russian military academies use as a textbook. The book envisions a clash of civilisation between the West and a Eurasian bloc supported by Russia. It also insists that "Serbia is Russia."

"There is no doubt that especially that 1990s work on global geopolitics with its various distinctions profoundly influenced the Russian military and set the stage for a lot of the country's geopolitical ambitions going forward," said political theorist Matt McManus. While there is no or, at best circumstantial evidence of direct contact between Mr. Dugin and Messrs. Vucic and Orban, it is clear that their political environments interact with one of civilisa-

tionalism's leading ideologues. For example, Mr, Vulin hosted Mr. Dugin on his visit to Belgrade in 2019 at a moment when the Serb capital was rife with reports about Russian spying. Going back in history, journalist Predrag Popovic recalls meeting Mr. Dugin twice in Belgrade in the 1990s with the help of Mr. Vucic at the headquarters of the far-right Serbian Radical Party of which he was a member at the time.

Mr. Popovic quotes Mr. Vucic as describing Mr. Dugin as "the most important thinker and political strategist of modern Russia" and "Serbia's greatest friend." Mr. Popovic notes that recently Mr. Vucic refrained from sending Mr. Dugin his condolences when the ideologue's daughter, Darya Dugina, was killed in a car bombing in Moscow in August. Mr. Vucic has often used Mr. Vulin as his frontman in relations with Russia in an effort not to provoke US and European ire.

Ironically, Mr. Orban, in his more liberal days, banned a 2014 far-right gathering in Budapest organized by the Montana-based National Policy Institute at which Mr. Dugin was scheduled to keynote. However, the Hungarian capital has since

become a hub for the European and American farright. Akrtos Media, a key node in the far-right Budapest-based network, published the first full-text English translations of Mr. Dugin's books.

The threat posed by the civilisationalist ambitions of men like Messrs. Putin, Orban, and Vulin, goes beyond the challenge to the rule of law and the notion of territorial integrity enshrined in the United Nations charter. It has fuelled racism and bolstered exclusionist ideologies like Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's anti-Muslim Hindutava Hindu nationalism. It has also emboldened the Myanmar junta that, according to human rights group Fortify Rights, is waging "genocide by attrition" against the beleaguered Rohingya communities of Rakhine State.

In his book, Mr. Dugin argued that "it is especially important to introduce geopolitical disorder...encouraging all kinds of separatism and ethnic, social and racial conflicts, actively supporting all dissident movements - extremist, racist, and sectarian groups." Mr. Orban and Mr. Vulin's civilizational worlds apply the bill to countries that increasingly only nominally fall within the orbit of the United States and the European Union.

What Queen Elizabeth II's death could mean for Britain's global influence

The Queen has also played an important role in increasing Britain's global soft power, and her death may play a role in any decline its influence may see. Throughout the last 70 years, the Queen has arguably acted as the most important diplomatic representative for London, having charmed various heads of state through state and diplomatic visits during her reign. Queen has been required to be apolitical, and this neutral approach has arguably been beneficial for Britain's foreign relations. Among them are US Presidents, of whom the Queen had met 13 out of 14 during her reign

T IS up for question over whether the upcoming King Charles III can fill in Queen's shoes – as the 96-yearold monarch has left a historical legacy.

The United Kingdom and Queen Elizabeth II's lovers around the world have mourned her passing on September 8. Even Britons who are staunch anti-monarchy republicans might acknowledge that she was perhaps a kinder character than those within the institution of the Royal Family.

Yet the passing of the Queen could have more impacts on the UK than just losing a head of state and a Queen. More than iust a mere monarch, the Queen was not only the longest ruling monarch in Britain's history, but she also ruled the UK from when Britain was an imperial power, having been crowned Queen in 1953, when Britain still controlled the Suez Canal and held protectorates and colonies in Africa, the Middle East and Asia. Given the aging Queen's declining health, the death is no surprise and for years Buckingham Palace had planned for her passing. Throughout several days of the 10-day mourning period until the Queen's funeral, the UK's stock markets, banks and other services will be closed intermittently, costing the UK's GDP an estimated \$1-7 billion. Thus, it could do further damage to Britain's economy, which is already grappling with inflation, a cost-ofliving crisis and risks tumbling into a recession.

The Queen's Soft Power

Britain's soft power abroad is one potential casualty of the Queen's death. Despite facing an apparent decline in global power, including a downsizing military and a shrinking economy, one aspect that has helped Britain maintain global influence is its soft power. This has been through institutions like the BBC and British Council, universities attracting top academic talent globally. Various cultural impacts, including musicians and series, have played a role too. Of course, the English language being a global language has also played a vital role in Britain's soft power. The Queen has also played an important role in increasing Britain's global soft power, and her death may play a role in any decline its influence may see. Throughout the last 70 years, the Queen has arguably acted as the most important diplomatic representative for London, having charmed various heads of state through state and diplomatic visits during her reign. The Queen has been required to be apolitical. and this neutral approach has arguably been beneficial for Britain's foreign relations. Among them are US Presidents, of whom the Queen had met 13 out of 14 during her reign. Former President Barack Obama once remarked that "The

like them much better than their own politicians." Interestingly, in 1982, then-US President Ronald Reagan made clear during a tour of European capitals that he was dead set on a horse ride with the Queen in her Windsor Estate, which Reagan later called a "fairy tale experience." This act of diplomacy was claimed to have helped then-Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher secure Washington's

support in the Falklands War with Argentina that year. The Queen also made a historic and 'joyous' visit to the Republic of Ireland in 2011, which was the first visit of a British monarch since the country gained independence from British rule. The Queen's interest in Irish culture and demonstrable support for British-Irish relations arguably bolstered ties between London and Dublin, following decades of low-level conflict with Northern Ireland included until 1998. There have been limits on the Royal Family's soft power abilities. For instance, during the Queen and other Royal Family members' visits to former colonies like Jamaica and Barbados in the Caribbean and India, there have been demands for Britain to apologize and even pay reparations for the British Empire's actions.

It is up for question over whether the upcoming King Charles III can replicate the Queen's charm abroad, with many sceptics saying he lacks the gravitas and charm of Elizabeth II to uphold the Royal Family's reputation. Although he has been in various shots, for instance joining a traditional swords dance with Saudi Arabian princes in 2014, this has arguably been a flashy episode within Britain's already strong ties with the Gulf Kingdom

A Commonwealth in doubt? Another consequence of the Queen's death could be the future of the Commonwealth, in which former British Crown Colonies have retained the Queen as their head of state. In countries like Australia, the Queen had remained popular, with 45 percent of adults saying they preferred the Queen as their head of state as opposed to 31 percent, according to a national poll last year. Support for Australia becoming a republic has steadily declined in the last two decades, the Green Party leader Adam Bandt immediately called to renew the debate over Australia severing its ties to the British monarchy. Other movements like the Australian Republic Movement may also seek to renew the debate over republicanism, with leader Peter FitzSimons saying, "it is unlikely we will ever see a monarch as respected or admired by the Australian people again.'

Even last year, New Zealand's Prime Minister Jacinda Ard-

ern said she thinks the country will become a republic in her lifetime. Both cases highlight how the Queen's death may ignite future debates within other Commonwealth countries over ties to the British monarchy, particularly in the Caribbean, where anti-British sentiment runs deeper than that of countries like Australia, New Zealand, and Canada

Future of the monarchy Another smaller benefactor of the Queen's soft power has been the economy. The Royal Family and Buckingham Palace have played a role in attracting tourism to the UK. Estimates from 2021 show that the Royal Family brings in around £19 billion (\$22 billion) per annum, most of which comes through tourism. Although many people visit London and the UK for reasons other than the Queen, this would likely contribute to a loss of income from the UK's perspective.

As with Commonwealth countries, divisions within the UK could possibly seek to be exposed. Despite Scotland's failed independence referendum in 2014, support for independence has continued. Since Brexit has been finalised despite the Scottish public mostly seeking to remain a member of the European Union, and now the Queen has passed, Scottish nationalists may begin once again to raise questions about the future of the Union

Britain's future influence in the world does depend on other factors. Brexit has impacted Britain's global reputation, and with the nomination of hard-headed Prime Minister Liz Truss, who took the helm of London's foreign policy just two days before the Queen's death, her potentially assertive foreign policy could look to bolster Britain's influence.

However, whether this can compensate for the Queen's passing is certainly up for question. London will still hope to use its prominent cultural, economic and diplomatic links to maintain its clout in the world.

Few can remember what life was like prior to Queen Elizabeth II's reign, so it would be too soon to make bold predictions about what her passing could mean for Britain's future. While the British monarchy may continue to exist into the future, it would certainly need new reforms as Britain looks to find its feet in the 21st century and in a post-Queen Elizabeth II world. Some have suggested the British monarchy may lose relevancy and appeal following the Queen's passing. Yet should King Charles III continue to make such changes to the monarchy, including modernizing it and adapting it to modern-day Britain, it may be able to maintain its soft power, albeit likely to a lesser extent.

OTTAWA: Nearly a year after a defeat in parliamentary elections, the Canadian Conservatives elected a new leader on Saturday, choosing right-wing Pierre Poilievre to lead the opposition to premier Justin Trudeau. Poilievre won 68 percent of about 400,000 votes cast by party members in the first round, putting him well tor, centrist former Quebec premier Jean Charest, with 16.07 percent. Poilievre, 43, beat out five contenders for the top Tory job by railing against inflation and Covid-19 vaccine mandates, promoting cryptocurrencies and pipelines, as well as backing the trucker-led protest convoy that occupied the capital Ottawa in February.

"Tonight begins the journey to replace an old government that costs you more and delivers you less with a new government that puts you first," Poilievre said in a speech in Ottawa after his win. "By tackling Liberal inflation, we'll put you back in control of your life and your money," he said, hitting out at Trudeau's government as "the most expensive" in the country's history.

Trudeau congratulated Poilievre on his win on Twitter, calling for collaboration "to deliver results for people across the country." A veteran politician, Poilievre twice served as a junior minister before Trudeau took office and has been elected seven times to represent a suburban district of Ottawa. - APP

Israeli drone crashes in West Bank over 'technical malfunction'

TEL AVIV: An Israeli UAV (unmanned aerial vehicle) has crashed in the occupied West Bank over what the Tel Aviv regime claims to be a "technical malfunction." Palestinian media cited the Israeli military as saying that the incident took place near the city of Qalqilya early on Sunday when the drone was conducting reconnaissance flights over the area for a future campaign of arrests by the occupying regime. The Israeli military also announced that the crash was "under investigation." The Tel Aviv regime had earlier said it would use drones in the occupied West Bank for the first time when carrying out the arrests. Last month, an Israeli Skylark drone was shot down by Palestinians in the north of the occupied West Bank city of Nablus. The military drone, which was overflying clashes between Palestinians and Israeli regime forces, was claimed by Tel Aviv to have crashed due to a technical fault. The Israeli regime's military has stepped up its deadly raids on the local population in and around the flashpoint cities and towns of the West Bank. Israeli forces continue their near-daily raid-and-arrest operations in various parts of the West Bank, wounding or killing Palestinians. Such raids are carried out while Israeli settlers also conduct acts of violence against Palestinians and their property. - APP

Diaz submits Ferguson to end UFC tenure

LAS VEGAS: Nate Diaz scored a fourth-round submission win over Tony Ferguson at UFC 279 on Saturday, winning the last fight of his UFC deal in a wild bout that capped off an extraordinary week for the UFC.

A backstage brawl caused Thursday's press conference to be cut short, and the card was thrown into disarray on Friday morning when Khamzat Chimaev missed the welterweight limit for his proposed main event fight against Diaz. That miss forced a reshuffle

that saw Ferguson step up to meet Diaz while Chimaev took on Kevin Holland and Li Jingliang faced off against Daniel Rodriguez, but the rescheduled main event did not disappoint.

The 37-year-old Diaz picked Ferguson apart for the first three rounds before grabbing a guillotine choke in the fourth to end the fight

at the T-Mobil Arena. The fan favourite from Stockton, California opened a cut above Ferguson's right eye in the second as his pinpoint boxing started to tell. Ferguson fought back, chopping at the lead leg of Diaz to slow him down, but Diaz was still able to land his combinations to force his opponent back and he played with the crowd, strolling around the cage and leaning against it to take a break. Ferguson shot for a takedown in the fourth round but Diaz, who submitted Conor McGregor to hand the Irishman his first loss in the UFC in 2016, circled his arm around Ferguson's neck and dragged him to the ground to secure the win. "I want to get out of the UFC for a minute and show these UFC fighters how to take over and own another sport. - APP

Survey: 27% Ukrainians want to stay in Finland

HELSINKI: About 27 per cent of Ukrainians who have fled to Finland viewed that they no longer plan to return to Ukraine while onethird (33 per cent) have decided to return to Ukraine after the war has ended or sooner, according to a survey conducted by the Ministry of the Interior.

Almost 40 per cent of the respondents said that their plans were still open; finding employment in Finland and the development of the military situation in Ukraine are the key factors impacting their plans, said the survey result conducted in June-July through interviewing 2,136 people, said the ministry in a press release on Wednesday. - APP

BEIJING: "Pakistan's contribution to climate change is less than one percent, but it is among the top ten countries most affected by climate change," said Naseem ur Rehman, secretary at Pakistan's Environment Commission, in an interview with China Economic Net (CEN). Regarding how climate changes affect Pakistan, he told CEN that there was a set pattern of fog four or five years ago. It used to happen from Dec. 21 and last a period of time until Jan. 10. However, due to climate changes, the same fog came in the first week of Nov., and its arrival caused smog.

"Where it used to be very cold, the weather has changed and it has started to get hot; where it was hot, the weather has become more severe," he said, adding that "recently, there are

heavy floods." Official figures released on Sept 6 showed that the death toll in Pakistan from this season's monsoon rains and floods that started in mid-June has risen to 1,325 with 12,703 injuries.

Multiple factors have been affecting the environment. Pakistan is a forest poor country. A Hamas spokesman said that Moscow had invited the movement to visit Russia to discuss mutual ties and the current situation in the occupied Palestinian territories. The trip follows a visit to Moscow in May by a Hamas delegation, headed by Abu Marzouq, amid heightened tensions and violence surrounding Al-Aqsa Mosque in occupied Jerusalem.

Moscow has previously attempted to help reconciliation efforts between Hamas and Fatah, the leading party of the Palestinian Authority, hosting both sides in Moscow in March 2020, in what was seen as a Russian bid for regional influence.

Italy's far-right eyes easy victory

ROME: Italy's Giorgia Meloni looks unstoppable: with two weeks to the election, final polls show her heading for a thumping victory to lead the country's first farright government as its first female prime minister.

The right-wing coalition, which includes Meloni's post-fascist Brothers of Italy party, Matteo Salvini's anti-immigrant League, and Silvio Berlusconi's Forza Italia, is forecast to pocket 46 percent of the vote.

The left, lead by the Democratic Party (PD), looks to win 28.5 percent, while the populist Five Star Movement (M5S) could take 13 percent, according to a YouTrend poll before a pre-voting embargo. In a startling move, PD head Enrico Letta admitted defeat this week, but urged undecided voters to choose his party or risk handing the right the landslide victory that would allow it to change the constitution. - APP

CSCEC contributes to Pakistan's flood relief efforts

ISLAMABAD: A team of Peshawar-Karachi Motorway (PKM) led by China State Construction Engineering Group Co., Ltd (CSCEC) is massively contributing to Pakistan's relief efforts, Gwadar Pro reported on Sunday. After knowing the devastating flood situation in different parts of Pakistan, the team promptly purchased a large number of local necessities such as rice, grain, oil and sugar, and distributed the relief food to 800 nearby poor victims free of charge, thus relieving the urgent needs of local people. The PKM project team prepared about 500 boxes of various kinds of drugs for treating post-disaster epidemics, organised medical teams to visit nearby villages for free diagnosis, and carried out free medicine delivery activities to equip local villagers with the knowledge of post-disaster disease prevention, thus avoiding the occurrence of infectious diseases, and ensuring the physical health and food safety of the people in the flood-hit areas. The first and second divisions of the PKM project, while completing their own rescue and relief efforts, and figuring out the local flood situation, sent a disaster relief team of 25 people, carrying 11 sets of large machinery and equipment, including loaders, dump trucks, excavators and pumps, to help nearby villages repair roads and divert floods. After several days of emergency repairs, 30 kilometres of water-damaged roads were opened in four nearby villages to ensure unimpeded access to local disaster relief channels. The PKM project also has managers on duty 24 hours a day to patrol the surrounding dangerous areas and help local victims out of trouble. Amanullah, a flood victim, was extremely touched to see the busy figure of the relief team.

Queen's death: Pak to observe day of mourning

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan on Monday will observe a day of mourning over Queen Elizabeth's death, announced Minister for Information and Broadcasting Marriyum Aurangzeb on Sunday.

Aurangzeb issued a news statement to confirm, "Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has given approval to (a proposal) of observing a day of mourning over the demise of the Queen of the United Kingdom. September 12 (Monday) will be observed as the day of mourning in Pakistan.'

The cabinet division has been directed to take further necessary steps for the proceedings over the recommendation of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. It came after Britain's longest-serving monarch breathed her last at Balmoral Castle, Scotland on Thursday. The Queen, who ascended the throne in 1952 after the demise of her father king George VI, passed away aged 96.

Militants linked to banned AQIS, TTP arrested

KARACHI: Law enforcement agencies in Karachi on Sunday claimed to have arrested two militants belonging to the outlawed Al Qaeda in the Indian Subcontinent (AQIS) and the Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP). The arrests were confirmed by the District Central Police and the Counter Terrorism Depart ment (CTD) in separate press statements.

According to District Central police, the law enforcement personnel in sensitive institutions" carried out an operation in the Super Market area of the city's Liaquatabad locality and arrested a suspect, Sohaib Tariq alias Usman, allegedly linked with AQIS.

During interrogation, the suspect revealed that through a man named Talha, he allegedly came in touch with AQIS camp in charge in Afghanistan's Bramcha in 2019, the statement said.

Later, he went to Afghanistan where he allegedly got onemonth military training in the said camp. He also met with two Indian citizens, namely Abdul Rehman and Taha, who were also linked with AQIS and living in Bramcha, the statement said.

After receiving training, he remained in touch with the AQIS leadership in Afghanistan and subsequently, he became associated with the publishing/media section of the banned group.

Five dead in 'massive' Papua New Guinea quake

MORESBY: PORT 7.6-magnitude earthquake shook Papua New Guinea on Sunday, damaging buildings, triggering landslides and killing at least five people, with several more severely injured. Residents in northern towns near the epicentre reported intense shaking mid-morning that cracked roads and sheared cladding off buildings.

Local member of parliament Kessy Sawang said at least two people had died in remote mountain villages, with at least four others airlifted to hospital in critical condition. "There has been widespread damage," she told AFP, adding that a landslide had buried homes and "split" one village where people had

"lost their houses". In nearby Wau, Koranga Alluvial Mining said three miners had been buried alive. There are limited communications in the area, little government resources and few paved roads, making assessment and rescue efforts difficult. Small aviation companies and missionary groups were involved in airlifting some of the injured across the rugged jungle landscape.

"Today, the nation needs to adhere to the eternal golden principles of faith, unity, and discipline in order to cope with the challenges being faced by the country – which is reeling with the economic problems along with natural calamity of flash floods," he wrote on Twitter.

Ukraine reclaims swathes of east in shock offensive

KHARKIV: Ukraine said Sunday that its forces were pushing back Russia's military from strategic holdouts in the east of the country after Moscow announced a retreat from Kyiv's sweeping counter-offensive. In another hotspot of the conflict in recent

weeks, Ukraine's nuclear energy agency said the final reactor at the Russian-controlled Zaporizhzhia plant, Europe's largest nuclear power station, was shut off as a safety measure. The speed of Ukraine's fight back against Russia's invasion has apparently caught Moscow's military off-guard, bringing swathes of territory Russia had controlled for months back into Ukraine's fold.

Crates of dumped munitions and abandoned military hardware were seen scattered in territory left by the Russian forces, images posted by the Ukrainian military showed. "The liberation of settlements in the Kupiansk and Izyum districts of the Kharkiv region is ongoing," the Ukrainian military

said in a general battlefield update Sunday,

Russia depends on to restock its frontline positions in the east and military observers have said their capture by Ukraine would be a serious blow to Moscow's military ambitions in Kharkiv. The head of the Ukrainian military announced early Sunday that as much as 3,000 square kilometres (1,158 square miles) had been wrested from Russia since the offensive began at the beginning of this month.

That figure is already around one-third larger than the total area announced by President Volodymyr Zelensky late Saturday. On Sunday, he announced that Ukraine forces had taken a village of around 4,000 people between Kharkiv and Izyum.

"The great Ukrainian flag has been returned to Chkalovske. And it will be like that everywhere. We will cast out the occupiers from every Ukrainian town and village," he said in a video online. Ukrainian officials this weekend hailed the "astonishing" pace of the counter-offensive and on Sunday, the country's foreign minister used the momentum to appeal to Western allies for more stockpiles of sophisticated weapons. - APP

Greece coastguard fires on 'suspicious' Turkish cargo ship

ANKARA: Greek coastguard ships opened fire on a cargo vessel sailing in international waters in the Aegean Sea, escalating tensions with Turkey that have mounted in recent weeks. There were no casualties in the shooting 11 nautical miles (20km) southwest of the Turkish island of Bozcaada on Saturday, a Turkish coastguard statement said. After "harassment fire" from two Greek vessels, two Turkish coastguard ships went to the area and the Greek boats left, it added. The Greek coastguard confirmed it fired "warning shots" at a ship "moving suspiciously" in Greek territorial waters off the island of Lesbos. The captain of the cargo ship refused to allow an inspection and was later escorted to nearby Turkish waters, said Greek coastguard officials, noting they informed maritime authorities in Turkey about the incident. The area is known for many ships bringing migrants from Turkey to the European Union countries of Greece and Italy. The Greek coastguard says it regularly checks ships behaving suspiciously in the Aegean. The neighbouring countries have been embroiled in disputes for decades and friction has ratcheted up in recent weeks, with both sides alleging airspace violations. Greek officials have raised concerns about another outbreak of conflict in Europe following Russia's war in Ukraine. - DNA

Putin warns Macron about attacks at nuclear plant

President Vladimir Putin on Sunday warned his French counterpart of the potential "catastrophic consequences" of what he said were Ukrainian attacks on the Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant in a Russian-controlled area of Ukraine. During a telephone call with Emmanuel Macron, Putin "drew attention to regular Ukrainian attacks on (Zaporizhzhia nuclear) facilities, including a radioactive waste storage facility, which is fraught with catastrophic consequences," the Kremlin said in a statement.

The largest nuclear power plant in Europe has been a focal point of fighting in recent weeks, raising concerns of a potential nuclear incident. Putin said Russian specialists at the plant were taking steps to ensure its safety and said Moscow was ready to continue work with the UN's atomic agency to agree on "non-politicised" solutions to problems at the facility. – **APP**

Operations at Zaporizhzhia halted: Kyiv

KYIV: Ukraine on Sunday said operations at Europe's largest nuclear power plant have been completely halted. The last of the Zaporizhzhia plant's six reactors was disconnected from the power grid early at 3.41 a.m. (0041GMT), according to a statement by Energoatom, Ukraine's atomic power operator.

"Preparations are underway for its cooling and transfer to a cold state," the agency said. Under Russian control since March, the plant in southeastern Ukraine was disconnected from the country's power grid last Monday, amid growing concerns of a nuclear disaster as Moscow and Kviv accuse each other of attacks on the nuclear facility. - APP
