Inflation at highest ever level

SPI for the combined consumption group in the week under review witnessed an increase of 45.50pc

ISLAMABAD: The Sensitive price Indicator (SPI) based weekly inflation for the week ended on September 1st for the combined consumption group, witnessed an increase of 1.31 percent as compared to the previous week. The SPI for the week under review in the above mentioned group was recorded at 222.85 points against 219.97 points registered in the previous week, according to the latest data of Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) said Friday. As compared to the corresponding week of last year, the SPI for the combined consumption group in the week under review witnessed an increase of 45.50 percent. The weekly SPI with base year 2015-16=100 is covering 17 urban centers and 51 essential items for all expenditure groups. The Sensitive Price Indicator for the lowest consumption group up to Rs 17,732 witnessed 1.63 percent increase and went up from 225.48 points in last week to 229.15 points during the week under review. Meanwhile, the SPI for the consumption groups

High prices can trigger protests, warns IMF

WASHINGTON: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has warned against protests and instability in Pakistan amid rising inflation - which just hit a 47-year-high in August. Pakistan's inflation measured by the consumer price index (CPI) has hit a 47-year high, accelerating to 27.3% in August 2022, the level last seen in May 1975. The full impact of massive flooding on the prices of food items and other commodities is yet to come. "High food and fuel prices could prompt social protest and instability," the IMF said, in an executive summary of the seventh and

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Friday announced Rs 100 million for the rehabilitation of Bobar village in Gilgit's Ghizar district badly affected by the flash floods. The prime minister, during his visit to the village, was told in a briefing that the floods had killed 17 people and damaged 249 houses in the village. Moreover, 794 animals and several orchards were also washed away during the calamity. The prime minister ordered the authorities concerned to pay compensation of Rs 1 million each for the families who had lost their dear ones in the

Are militants re-grouping in Swat, other areas?

PESHAWAR: Since second week of August, militants mostly associated with banned Tehrik Taliban Pakistan are making announcements regarding resuming of their activities in scattered areas of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. First these militants emerged in three different places of Matta Swat whereas they made hostages two high ranking officers of Army and one of Police force for over 20 hours. Prior to this attempt, the militants (Unknown) opened indiscriminate firing against vehicle of MPA at Lower Dir. The MPA himself injured seriously while four

others were killed in attack. In current week, first the militants (banned TTP) through a pamphlet informed people in Hangu and Aurakzai districts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa about arrival and reactivating. Later they circulated a similar leaflet at Dara Adam Khan. And on the same day from 30 to 35 armed militants landed at Amazai area of Buner District where they remained till Wednesday night. Reportedly these militants reached in Buner from adjacent TorGhar district. Advisor to Chief Minister Mahmud Khan said, "our ceasefire agreement with banned TTP is intact and they are not involved in recent incidents occurred either in Swat and Lower Dir or appeared in Buner etc. He said that there are several groups and factions of militants and some of them are against of peace agreement, therefore they are He believes that certain elements that are against ceasefire and negotiations are engaged in carrying out such subversive activities. However, security forces are on high alert throughout the province.

The Pakistan Institute for Conflict Studies in a report revealed that during August at least 18 personnel of security forces and 37 civilians were killed and 55 included nine personnel injured in 31 terror acts/attacks throughout the country in August

cluding both civilians and personnel were killed and 46 injured in violent acts during July 2022. It reported 8 per cent decrease in violence acts in August compare to July 2022 but the number of casualties in August remained too high.

Top cleric killed in mosque blast in Afghanistan's Herat

HERAT: A leading pro-Taliban cleric is among 18 people killed in a blast outside a mosque in the Afghan city of Herat. Mujib Rahman Ansari died alongside his brother, members of his security detail and civilians gathered for prayers in a suspected suicide blast, officials say. It is not yet clear who is behind the attack, which the Taliban denounced as "sinister" and "cowardly". The killing is the latest in a string of assassinations of prominent pro-Taliban figures in the country. According to police, Ansari was arriving at Gazargah mosque to lead Friday noon prayers when a suicide bomber kissed the cleric's hand and detonated an explosive device. Unverified images on social media appear to show a number of bloodied corps es lying amid a scene of devastation outside the mosque compound in the western Afghan city. Local officials say at least 23 people were wounded in the attack, but local reports suggest the total casualty figure could be significantly higher. "Unfortunately, the country's popular religious scholar Mawlawi Mujib Rahman Ansari has been martyred in a cowardly attack during the Friday prayers in Herat," a Taliban spokesman tweeted. - Agencies

Afghan Taliban forces kill IS operative in Farah

MADRID: Afghan security forces have stormed a hideout of Daesh or Islamic State (IS) out in the western Farah province, killing an operative, reported the state-run Bakhtar news agency on Friday. An IS member was killed and a large amount of ammunition was seized from his hideout during an operation conducted by intelligence forces in Farah on Thursday, according to the report. No security forces members were

harmed during the operation, the media outlet said, without providing more details. In the meantime, the private television channel Tolonews has reported that the security forces had killed a shadow governor of Daesh group for Farah province and arrested three others very recently. The Taliban-run administration said it would not allow any group to use Afghanistan's soil against any other country. - Agencies

MUZAFFARABAD: While addressing a seminar organized by the University of Azad Jammu and Kashmir to mark the first death anniversary of late Kashmiri leader, Syed Ali Shah Geelani, speakers described the late freedom fighter as a real hero of the Kashmir freedom movement for his undaunted resistance against the Indian tyranny all through his life. They said that Syed Ali Shah Geelani fought throughout his life to free the Kashmiri people from Indian subjugation and his unprecedented struggle and spirit of resistance will continue to inspire the coming generations of Kashmiris.

Speaking at the seminar, Prof Dr. Mohammad Qayyum Khan, Director of Finance and the senior professor of the University said that Syed Ali Shah Geelani, who entered the politics of Kashmir in the 1950s, waged a peaceful political struggle for 37 years for the settlement of the Kashmir issue, but ultimately he realized that India, the claimant of the world's largest democracy will not grant

Kashmiris their inalienable right to self-determination through democratic means. Geelani who was elected three times as a member of the Occupied Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly quit parliamentary politics in the late 80s and dedicated himself to organizing the freedom movement within Occupied Kashmir and at the international level to expose the real face of India, Dr. Qayyum added. Despite all the difficulties, sufferings, and plights, Syed Ali Geelani demonstrated unprecedented determination and courage and never compromised on his principled stand, Dr. Qayyum said.

"He was a true Pakistani who believed in attaching the political destiny of Kashmiris with Pakistan after freedom from India and he remained committed to this ideology till the last breath of his life," he asserted. Pakistan doesn't want to be a toy in anyone's hands

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Alvi said that being an independent country, Pakistan neither wanted to be a toy in anyone's hands nor looked for polarization. "Pakistan doesn't want to be a toy in anybody's hands. Pakistan is an independent country. Pakistan wants good relations with everybody, particularly at the time when we are going through economic turmoil (and) the world is going through economic turmoil. Türkiye is going through economic turmoil," the president said in an interview with Turkish Anadolu Agency published on Thursday.

everyone as the world was going through the economic turmoil. "Pakistan is not looking for any polarization and does not want to be in any camp," he said. On Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's upcoming visit to Pakistan in September, he said Islamabad would welcome him. He said Pakistan

and Türkiye had a very deep, long-lasting relationship. On Ukraine war, he said Pakistan wanted peace and the role and lauded the President Erdogan's role in this regard. "The strategic understanding of what is happening around Türkiye, as well as around Pakistan, is important. The fact that the thinking of the Muslim Ummah should be together. That will always be on the agenda. The fact that our ties are demonstrated to become closer is important for the people of Pakistan and Türkiye," he commented. Asked to comment on Pakistan's plan to purchase oil and grain from Russia, he said it was the government to decide on the matter. He said Pakistan was looking for good relationships with our long-term friends, which was the United States of America. And similarly, the country also wanted to continue and further establish its ties with China, he added. To a question, about China

Pakistan Economic Corridor, the president said it was a partnership which was very important to Pakistan's economic interest. Regarding relations with India, he said, "Pakistan has been looking for peace. But whether India is looking for peace, I'm not sure because all our overtures have been put under a question mark. I believe that India's actions in Kashmir were a serious setback to peace." We believe that Kashmir (issue) should be settled according to the United Nations resolutions At the same time, he said Pakistan was also Muslims by the ruling BJP party and the Muslim world is also concerned about the way Muslims were being isolated in India. To a question, the president said Pakistan wanted peace in Afghanistan because it was related to its economy as well. He said Pakistan has done its part for brotherly relations with Afghanistan and advised the interim Afghan government to make it broader, improve women education. Asked to comment on the political situation in Pakistan, he said his role was to try to reduce this political polarization. "It is a democracy - Pakistan is a democracy and Pakistan is gradually becoming a strong democracy. We are going through these trials and tribulations which are happening," he added.

To another question, he said media needed to be able to give a free expression an also expected the media to act responsi bly. About the catastrophic floods in Pakistan, he agreed with the prime minister's stance that there was so much structural damage that Pakistan should be looking for international help because the climate change situation would be affecting a lot of countries. - APP

PAF short documentary showcases soldiers' valour

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan Air Force (PAF) Directorate General Public Relations on Friday released a short documentary highlighting the courage and bravery of valiant PAF heroes that showcased details of the air battle fought on September 02, 1965. 'Quality of items at utility stores highest and the prices lowest'

ISLAMABAD: In order to improve the demand and supply and to ensure uninterrupted supply of branded items at all utility stores across the country, the prices of some branded items have been increased. but this increase is by the branded companies. Various national and multinational branded companies supplying goods to utility stores have increased the prices of various branded items. The prices of these items were kept stable for the last seven months. Utility Stores Corporation does not manufacture or produce itself but purchases from reputed and certified branded companies of the country. When raw material prices increase, production charg-

es increase and transportation charges increase, the product cost also increases due to which the prices have to be revised. So that demand and supply improve and availability of these products is possible. Despite this, the utility stores are committed to providing basic and branded items to the public at lower rates than the open market. The new prices of these items at utility stores are lower than the printed retail market price. Remember, subsidized ghee at Rs 300 per kg, sugar at Rs 70 per kg and 20 kg bag of flour at Rs 800 are available in abundance at all utility stores across the country. Subsidy is also being given on pulses and rice. Apart from this, hundreds of other branded items available at utility stores are also being provided on cheaper rates than the general market.

IRSA releases 309,900 **cusecs water**

ISLAMABAD: Indus River System Authority (IRSA) on Friday released 309,900 cusecs water from various rim stations with inflow of 328,100 cusecs. According to the data released by IRSA, Tarbela Dam has already attained its maximum conversation level of 1550 feet and was 152 feet higher than its dead level of 1,398 feet. Water inflow and outflow

in the dam was recorded as 168,900 cusecs each.

The water level in River Jhelum at Mangla Dam was 1187.45 feet, which was 137.45 feet higher than its dead level of 1,050 feet. The inflow and outflow of water was recorded 28,200 cusecs and 10,000 cusecs respectively. The release of water at Kalabagh, Taunsa and Sukkur was recorded 187,000, 416,500 and 531,900 cusecs respectively. Similarly, from River Kabul, a total of 75,300 cusecs of water released at Nowshera and 26,100 cusecs released from River Chenab at Marala. - APP

3 bike lifters arrested

RAWALPINDI: Police have arrested three bike lifters and recovered three stolen motorcycles and other items from their possession. According to a police spokesman, a team under the supervision of SHO, Airport Police Station managed to net three accused namely Owais, Farooq and Adnan and recovered three stolen motorcycles from their possession. A case has been registered against the accused while further investigation was underway. Superintendent of Police, Potohar appreciated the police team and directed to net the accomplices and facilitators of the accused. He also directed the police officers to continue raids against lawbreakers and send the violators behind the bars. - APP

Army holds 200 helicopters sorties

RAWALPINDI: The Pakistan Army Aviation during the flood relief efforts flew 200 helicopters sorties in various areas of the country to evacuate stranded people and also transport rations and medicines. The Inter Services Public Relations (ISPR) news release said that during the past 24 hours, some 1,991 stranded individuals were evacuated and 162.6 tonnes of relief items were delivered to the flood affected people.

So far, over 50,000 individuals were shifted to safer locations from calamity hit areas. However, some 147 relief camps were functional round the clock in flood affected areas of Sindh, Southern Punjab, Balochistan, and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) for flood affectees. Over 60,000 patients were treated and provided 3-5 days' free medicine so far whereas 221 flood relief items collection points were established across the country. Moreover, more than 1,350 tonnes of food, medicines and other sustenance items were also collected. - APP

Prices increased by companies

ISLAMABAD: Utility Store Corporation (USC) spokesperson on Friday said an increase in the prices of some branded items was made by the companies and corporation had nothing to do with this hike. Despite the increase in the prices of the items, the USC was offering the same at subsidized rates across the country in order to provide maximum relief to the poor segments of the society, the spokesperson said. He said that various national and multinational companies supplying goods to utility stores had increased the prices of their products, which had remained stable for the last seven months.

"We do not manufacture or produce any item, rather purchase them from reputed and certified companies of the country." He said that the product cost went up as raw material, production and transportation costs went up. Thus, the companies had to revise the prices of their products. "Despite this, the utility stores is committed to providing basic and branded items to the public at lower rates as compared to the open market", he said. The new prices of these items at utility stores are lower than the printed retail market price, he added. The subsidized items, including ghee at Rs 300 per kg, sugar at Rs 70 per kg and 20 kg bag of flour at Rs 800 were available in abundance at all utility stores across the country. Subsidy was also being given on pulses and rice, he added. - APP

8 drug peddlers, weapon holders held

RAWALPINDI: Rawalpindi police in an action against suspected drug peddlers, bootleggers and illegal weapon holders on Friday arrested eight accused besides recovering 1040 grams narcotics, 10 liters liquor, two 30 bore pistols and ammunition from their possession. A police spokesperson said that Waris peddler namely Sheraz and recovered 1320 grams charras while Civil Lines police rounded up Zubair for having 20 liters liquor.

Similarly, Kalar Syedan police arrested Faisal and Alam Khan for carrying two 30 bore pistols and ammunition. Pirwadhai police netted two accused identified as Kakay Khan and Irfan and recovered 210 grams charras and 10 liters liquor. Morgah and Taxila police arrested Zulfiqar with 260 grams charras and Jameel Ahmed with 250 grams charras. The spokesperson said that separate cases have been registered against all suspects while further investigations are underway. Divisional Superintendents of Police directed the police officers to accelerate ongoing operations and drug peddlers, bootleggers and illegal weapon holders, he added. - APP

Rescue 1122 timely response saves pulseless baby

RAWALPINDI: The Rescue 1122 on Friday successfully saved the life of one year old baby boy in critical condition while promptly responding to an emergency call for help and ambulance service. A Rescue 1122 official told APP that a couple from Mardan brought their one year old boy -Hamza son of Nasir Shah in critical condition to the Military Hospital (MH) for treatment without knowing the fact that it had no paeds department to treat children.

The parents of the child lacked information about the concerned healthcare facility and that's why went to that hospital. However, the MH provided necessary first aid to the child and referred him to a public hospital for further treatment, he added. The parents called 1122 for ambulance service to shift their child in severe condition to a public hospital, he said. The ambulance was moved to the spot and on arrival it was found that the child had low pulse and sugar level, he added. The official mentioned that when the team reached the child was found critical and upon shifting him into ambulance alongwith hospital staff he lost his pulse and respiratory rate. - APP

Over 3 million children at risk amid floods: UNICEF

ISLAMABAD: More than three million children are in need of humanitarian assistance and at increased risk of waterborne diseases, drowning and malnutrition due to the most severe flooding in Pakistan's recent history, UNICEF warned on Friday. UNICEF is working with government and non-government partners to respond to the urgent needs of children and families in affected areas, said a news release issued here. Some 33 million people including approximately 16 million children - have been affected by this year's heavy monsoon rains in Pakistan, which have brought devastating rains, floods and landslides. Over 1,100 people including over 350 children have lost their lives, and a further 1,600 have been injured. Over 287,000 houses have been fully, and 662,000 partially, destroyed. Some major rivers have breached their banks and dams overflowed, destroying homes farms and critical infrastructure includ-

ing roads, bridges, schools, hospitals and

public health facilities. "When disasters hit, children are always among the most vulnerable," said Abdullah Fadil, UNICEF Representative in Pakistan, "These floods have already taken a devastating toll on children and families, and the situation could become even worse. UNICEF is working closely with the Government and other partners to ensure that children affected get the critical support they need as soon as possible." In affected areas, 30 per cent of water systems are estimated to have been damaged, further increasing the risk of disease outbreaks with people resorting to open defecation and drinking unsafe water. There are reports of significant damage to education infrastructure as 17,566 schools have been damaged, further jeopardizing the education of children. After two years of school closures due to pandemic in the last few years, children once again risk further dis ruption to their learning, in areas where one-third of girls and boys were already

The rainfall - nearly three times the national 30-year average, and more than five times the 30-year average in some provinces, has led to the government declaring a national emergency, with 72 districts declared 'calamity-hit' - mostly in Balochistan and Sindh, the two worst-affected provinces, as well as in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Punjab. Cases of diarrhoea and water-borne diseases, respiratory infection, and skin diseases have already been reported. They affect populations which are very vulnerable -40 per cent of children already suffered from stunting, caused by chronic undernutrition, before the floods hit. The perilous humanitarian situation is expected to continue to worsen in the days and weeks ahead as heavy rains continue in regions already underwater. As part of the UN flash appeal to support the response, led by the Government of Pakistan launched this week - UNICEF is

appealing for US\$37 million, and aims to reach children and families in the coming months with support including lifesaving medical equipment, essential medicines, vaccines and safe delivery kits, safe drinking water, sanitation supplies, nutrition supplies and temporary learning centres and learning kits. According to UNICEF's Children's Climate Risk Index (CCRI), Pakistan is a known 'climate hotspot', where children are considered at 'extremely high risk' to the impacts of climate change, ranking 14th out of 163 CCRI-ranked countries and regions, placing Pakistan in the 'Extremely high risk' classification category in the Index. Children in 'Extremely high risk' countries face a deadly combination of exposure to multiple climate and environmental shocks combined with high levels of underlying child vulnerability, due to inadequate services, such as water and sanitation, healthcare and education. - APP

ISLAMABAD: On the persistent follow up by PAJCCI and recent meeting of Zubair Motiwala; Chairman PAJCCI with Naveed Qamar; Minister of Commerce, Government of Pakistan has now issued the SRO on Cross-stuffing of containers for Afghan transit trade covering both forward and reverse cargo. Cross stuffing will be allowed at Karachi & Gwadar seaports in especially designated areas and off dock terminals. The SRO also provides for the transfer of non-containerized cargo in open trucks at land border sta-

tion/crossing for reverse transit cargo. Detailed process has been provided by Ministry of Commerce for each stage covering all steps for the ease of traders and bonded carriers. The whole process will be technologically facilitated using Customs Computerized System (CCS) from the GD filing to cargo reaching the destination eliminating manual intervention and susceptibility of any violation. PAJCCI has been following up this matter since last one year with various government functionaries and ministry. With cross stuffing the cost of detention & demurrage will be reduced, the cargo movement will increase, delays will be curtailed, where required open trucks can be used for land trade and designated space/off dock terminals will provide essential safety of the cargo. This process will greatly reduce cost of business and hardships faced by business community as well as dent the unfair charges by shipping lines imposed in the name

of container security charges. Motiwala on behalf of business community thanked the Minister of Commerce, honorable Naveed Qamar and appreciated his quick response in resolving long standing issue. He hoped that Government of Pakistan will continue to support business community to generate high revenue by removing trade barriers.

PTA making efforts to restore services

ISLAMABAD: Telecommunication Authority (PTA) and telecom companies are making all possible efforts to fully restore all telecom services in the flood-hit areas. "In the wake of devasting floods and torrential rains that wreaked unprecedented havoc across the country PTA and telecom operators' efforts to restore connectivity have resulted in the reduction of non-functional sites count from 3386 (6.55% of the total sites across the country) to 1076 (2.08%)", the PTA said in a news release.

"Efforts are ongoing for complete restoration of all telecom services," the authority said. Floods and rains have majorly affected and damaged infrastructure telecom in Balochistan, Southern Punjab, Upper Sindh and areas of KPK. The challenges included prolonged power breakdowns, continuous heavy rains causing the rain and flood water to enter into exchange buildings and cuts in Optical Fiber Cable (OFC) due to land sliding. PTA has been monitoring the situation round the clock and has made all possible efforts so that people can stay connected in these difficult times. - APP

Flood-affected people need 'healing': Musadik

ISLAMABAD: Minister of State for Petroleum Dr Musadik Malik on Friday said some provinces had been drowned under flood waters and their people were in dire need of 'healing', but PTI chairman Imran Khan was busy doing dirty politics in the testing times. "The flood-affected people are in dire need of remedial measures as their lives and integrity is in danger... But Imran Khan disappointed us by doing politics at this critical juncture and hurling threatening statements in public meetings such as 'he will not spare' and 'he will reveal names'," he regretted while addressing a news conference here. The minister said Imran Khan should have the courage to name the people whom he would not spare and reveal the names instead of mere hurling threats. He criticized the PTI chairman for hiring the services of lobbyist David Fenton in the US, who was known as the founder of the denuclearization programme besides getting money and land from Malik Riaz to protect his money-laundering and receiving millions of pounds from Arif Nagvi, Chief



Executive of the Abraj Capital and Investment Company, indicted by the US courts in a range of cases and could get up to 290year jail. He underlined that two mega economic scandals were made in the history of the country. hina's alleged treatment of Uyghurs in Xinjiang – including mass extrajudicial detentions, family separations and forced labour - is by now well documented, despite the secrecy surrounding it. Yet when Michelle Bachelet visited the region earlier this year, the usually outspoken UN human rights chief adopted some of the Chinese Communist party's framing of the issue. As a long-awaited report into the region remained unpublished on her desk, human rights groups grew concerned that it might be watered down or suppressed entirely. But on Wednesday night, months after its completion and only minutes before she left office, she finally issued the document. Reading its 46 pages, it is little surprise that Beijing sought to block its release. It states clearly that "serious human rights violations" against Uyghurs may amount to crimes against humanity. China embarked on what it portrays as a counter-extremism and counter-terrorism crackdown after deadly attacks inside and outside Xinjiang. But as the report makes clear, the official conception of terrorism and extremism is so vague that an extraordinarily wide range of normal activity has been targeted, to devastating effect.

"Resisting government propaganda" and closing restaurants during Ramadan have been listed as signs of extremism. Detainees have reportedly been sent to "vocational education centres" - Beijing's term for the detention camps, when it finally acknowledged them - for speaking to relatives abroad or for having too many children; some were told that a quota had to be filled. Former detainees describe enduring torture, including beating with electric batons, forced sterilisation and sexual violence. The report describes these accounts as credible. Companies and countries can no longer claim, as they have done, that it isn't clear what is happening in the region, or that action can be left to the UN. China has said the centres have closed; while at least some have done, many of the detainees appear to have been transferred to work in factories or jailed on the flimsiest grounds. Intensive surveillance polices Uyghurs outside custody. Families remain separated. Countries - including the many Muslim-majority nations that have remained silent - should take this report as a spur to action and an opportunity to press China on these terrible abuses. It must now be tabled at the Human Rights Council, where member states should push hard for investigation. The council also notes the credible accounts of "intimidations, threats and reprisals" - including the prospect of forced return - for Uyghurs campaigning from abroad, without whom many abuses would not have come to light. They must be given the protection that other countries cannot provide to Uyghurs inside China.

It also appears to be a cheap joke to blame only the climate change as doing by some political figures. Why have you failed to develop bold policies when you are aware that there has been a significant change in the climate that threatens to destroy agriculture, infrastructure, livestock, dams, communication, routes, bridges, the environment, and lives at any moment with extremely high rainfall, flooding, or windstorms? Certainly said, poor future planning and ineffective sustainable development strategies are

Europe's fragile unity is fast passing its tipping point

s Europe is hit by a drought, the worst in 500 years, there's surprising wisdom coming to the dry shores, reminding Europeans that their long-held grandeur might fast evaporate into a delusion. "If you see me, then weep," reads an inscription on a 'hunger stone', which recently appeared after water levels fell in the Elbe river in Germany. Found in European rivers, 'hunger stones' are markers from another time and age indicating water levels during previous historic droughts - they warn of famine and hardship, which is likely to follow when these stones become visible. In what appears to be a Biblical prophecy coming true, Europe has been gripped by massive wildfires, the worst drought in 500 years and record-breaking summer temperatures. The food and energy crises as a direct

Germany, low water levels in the Rhine river mean traffic of industrial goods has slowed, and barges can only carry a quarter of their capacity to ensure they are grounded on river beds. This has quadrupled shipping costs on the Rhine.

As the Russia-Ukraine conflict hits the six-month mark, there's further hardship coming the way of Europe in the form of an exacerbated energy crisis and divided loyalties between member countries. Germany has already moved onto stage three of its gas emergency plan, which means the country will not have enough gas to provide for both industry and households. The German government, obligated by law to provide gas to households, is likely to ration gas supply to the industry. Gas is currently more expensive on the international market than what is being billed to European customers, which means when the price correction

strikes in autumn, consumers will be left with a huge hole in their pocket. There's also talk of drafting laws in Germany to help landlords lower the heating in centrally-heated apartment buildings. The government is proposing to reduce the central heating temperature from 22 to 17 degrees centigrade. This has sent further shock waves among a populace which is used to the smaller luxuries of life. Germans are now investing in electric heaters and wood-burning heaters, but that's only those who can afford them. Analysts in Germany are worried about the possibility of social instability. If the coming winter is particularly intense with the reduced gas flow into homes and the rising price of electricity, there is a strong possibility of protests from both sides of the political spectrum, the right and the left. A financial analyst from Spain recently said that the Spanish remember poverty and political uncertainty. He said he remembers growing up how poor the country was, but wondered what the Germans would do when hit with a high cost of living crisis. Energy conservation is the new buzzword in Europe, forcing the EU to look inwards and call on the shared European values. After Germany, Italy and France are the EU's biggest gas users and are likely to be affected the most should Russia completely switch off the gas this winter. Currently, gas flow in the NordStream 1 pipeline is at 20 percent of its capacity. Italy has just one bilateral deal on emergency gas sharing, while France has none.

But when Germany went looking to call on those shared European values at a recent meeting of the European Energy Commission, there wasn't much sway. One Spanish diplomat, while speaking off the record, told a senior journalist, "We haven't been living beyond our means", implying that Germans had been doing just so and now expect everyone else to help them. The Greeks weren't too impressed either. Germany has previously dealt very harshly with the country following the Greek financial crisis of 2009. Greece has only this year managed to shake off monitoring of its finances by the EU following the strict conditions Germany/EU had placed on them. The proposal to cut gas consumption by 15 percent was met with fierce resistance by Portugal, Spain, Greece, Italy, and other countries which depend less on Russian gas and feel that they are being forced to compensate for the mistakes of others, especially Germany. That pushback meant Germany came out of the European Commission meeting with only a voluntary deal of reduction of gas consumption. A voluntary deal means nothing, it is only a weak promise; one can expect all EU member countries to act only in their own interest. While it is not clear to what extent hot water, electricity and heating will be available in countries like Germany, Austria, Italy or Hungary, it is abundantly clear that the crisis in Europe is pressing at the seams of European unity. Most European politicians, mindful of public backlash in their own backyards, are likely to not introduce strict gas usage regulations on their own people so that Germans can have a more comfortable winter. But Germany's waning economy is visible all across Europe. Rampant inflation in the Eurozone is further widening the cracks in the EU. Should the European Central Bank raise interest rates, it could plunge southern Europe into a new sovereign debt crisis akin to the 2010 upheaval. However, should that happen, many in southern Europe are not sure whether Germany will be able to bail them out again. Germany's industrial base is getting weaker and the population poorer; thousands of tenants have been reaching out to the renters' association, asking them to lobby the government to subsidise energy costs. In the summer, the German government introduced a populist nine Euro monthly train ticket valid for country-wide travel for three months only. That promotion stops at the end of August, and there are calls to extend it indefinitely, but the finance minister said there is no budget for that.

In these conditions, if Germany has to bail out European countries, there will very likely be mass protests in the country, putting further pressure on the government and European unity. It is now a well-assumed idea that European solidarity is already past its tipping point. But could the energy crisis coupled with the climate crisis and global economic slowdown push it to breaking point? The answer is quite possibly, yes.

G20 talks end with pledge to accelerate energy transition

JAKARTA: G20 energy talks in Bali ended Friday with the world's leading economies pledging to accelerate the transition to cleaner energy, but there was no binding agreement as officials struggle to overcome discord over Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The price of energy has skyrocketed since Moscow launched its military offensive, with many Western countries scrambling to find alternative sources in an attempt to cut ties with Russia. Energy upheavals have put pressure on global efforts to address climate change. Host Indonesia put forward

a plan at the talks outlining principles to speed up a "fair" transition to greener energy and it was endorsed by the G20 nations. The non-binding "Bali Compact", which lists principles for achieving net zero emissions, was agreed by all members, Indonesian energy minister Arifin Tasrif said. Details were not released but the minister said the plan seeks to strengthen national energy planning and implementation to improve energy security, efficiency and boost investment and financing. Serena and Venus

NEW YORK: Serena and Venus Williams' doubles return proved shortlived as they fell to a first-round defeat at the US Open. Teaming up for the first time since 2018, and probably the last time, they lost 7-6 (7-5) 6-4 to Czechs Lucie Hradecka and Linda Noskova. Together, the American greats have won 14 Grand Slam doubles titles. Serena Williams, 40, is due to retire after the tournament, while the future plans of elder sister Venus, at 42, remain unknown. Serena plays Australia's Ajla Tomljanovic in the third round of the women's singles on Friday, but Venus was knocked out in the first round. Opening the night session on Arthur Ashe Stadium on Thursday, the sisters failed to convert two set points on their opponents' serve at 5-4, with break points having earlier gone begging for both pairs.

Hradecka and Noskova edged the ensuing tie-break on their first set point, with 37-year-old Hradecka wrapping up proceedings with a powerful backhand down the line. She and Noskova, 20 years her junior, went on to dominate the second set, sealing an early break. They soon held double break point for 4-0 but Noskova couldn't convert from close to the net in a slice of luck for the Williams sisters, who went on to hold and end a five-game losing streak. They went on to break back but it proved in vain as Hradecka and Noskova broke their serve again on their second match point. The Williams sisters remain the most recent women's doubles team to hold all four major doubles titles at once with wins at Wimbledon and the US Open in 2009, followed by triumphs at the Australian Open and French Open in 2010. The last of their Grand Slam doubles titles together came at Wimbledon in 2016, more than 17 years after their first at Roland Garros in 1999, while they also have three Olympic doubles golds. Venus Williams returned to action for the hard-court swing, appearing in Cincinnati, Toronto and Washington, after nearly a year off following a leg injury, and was awarded a wildcard for the US Open. She is currently ranked 1,504th in the world in the singles, while Serena is 605th. They have a combined 30 Grand Slam singles titles, 23 of which belong to Serena.

Nadal overcomes freak injury at US Open

NEW YORK: Rafael Nadal overcame a freak injury scare when he accidentally hit himself with his own racquet to reach the US Open third round on Thursday. The Spaniard defeated Italy's Fabio Fognini 2-6, 6-4, 6-2, 6-1 but only after suffering a bizarre self-inflicted injury when leading 3-0 in the fourth set. The four-time champion, and holder of a men's record 22 Grand Slam titles, was hurt when his racquet bounced back off the court as he stretched for a ball, hitting him squarely on the nose. The 36-year-old dropped his racquet to the Arthur Ashe Stadium floor and sprinted to the sidelines, where he lay on his back with his nose bloodied. The Australian and French Open cham-

pion required a medical timeout to have the wound tended before resuming the match with a bandage across the bridge of his nose. It was the third time in the match that the trainer had been summoned onto court. "I was a little bit dizzy and it was a little bit painful," admitted Nadal, who said he had suffered a similar injury in the past caused by a golf club. He feared he had broken his nose in the incident. Nadal said that despite being a set and 4-2 down, he was happy to have recovered after coming into the tournament still worried by the abdominal injury he suffered at Wimbledon.

That problem caused him to forfeit his semi-final at the All England Club against Nick Kyrgios. It also came in a year which has seen him suffer a fractured rib and have to play the

BELGRADE: Türkiye's top diplomat on Friday gave assurances that Türkiye will help ensure the Balkans' gas needs will be met this winter. "The war in Europe is a wake-up call. We see how vulnerable we are to various shocks. Winter is coming,' Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu told the opening of the Open Balkan Initiative Summit in Belgrade, Serbia's capital. "Energy and food security became common challenges. There is no recipe other than solidarity. As Türkiye, we continue to do our best for smooth implementation of the Istanbul grain deal. We also do our best to help our Balkan neighbors in ensuring their gas needs for the winter," he added, also citing the deal reached in Istanbul this July unblocking Ukrainian grain exports. Cavusoglu also criticized European Union on the stalled EU accession bids of North

Macedonia and Albania. "We see the Open Balkan Initiative as a bridge between the Balkans and the EU. In the past, enlargement has been among the most successful policies of the EU. But the EU has become inward-looking, and narrow political interests hijacked the enlargement agenda," he said. "Nobody can offer a good explanation as to why North Macedonia and Albania have waited for so long. And we congratulate both of them on the beginning of accession negotiations." North Macedonia became an EU candidate in 2005, while Albania was granted candidate status in 2014. Albania's negotiations have been stalled since 2020 due to a dispute with Bulgaria over linguistic and historical issues. On recent developments in the region, Cavusoglu emphasized that Türkiye will continue encouraging dialogue between Serbia and Kosovo. "The (recent) agreement on ID cards shows the merit in focusing on our shared interests rather than differences. Türkiye has open communication with both parties. We will continue to encourage dialogue to reach an agreement on vehicle plates and other remaining issues," said Cavusoglu. Serbia and Kosovo on Saturday agreed on a new border policy under an

EU-facilitated dialogue process. Tension was rising in the region over Kosovo's plans to make it mandatory for everyone, including Serbs living in the north, to have a Kosovo ID card and license plate. Kosovo declared its independence from Serbia in 2008, with most UN member states, including the US, UK, France, Germany, and Türkiye, recognizing it as a separate autonomous country from its neighbor. Serbia continues to see Kosovo as its territory. Cavusoglu added that President Recep Tayyip Erdogan will visit the region next week, adding: "The current situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina will be on the top of our agenda. We cannot allow another conflict at the heart of the Balkans."

Climate activists target UK parliament

LONDON: Members of climate activist group Extinction Rebellion on Friday glued themselves to the Speaker's chair in the UK House of Commons, calling for a "Citizens' Assembly" to help shape environmental policy. "Just before noon today (1100 GMT), a group of around fifty people took nonviolent action at the House of Commons," the group said in a statement.

"The parliament action began with three people booked on an official tour of the building, gluing themselves in a chain around the Speaker's Chair."

The group, wearing t-shirts reading "Let The People Decide", took it in turns to read a speech calling for a Citizens' Assembly to "give ordinary people a say over the major crises facing us." Parliament is currently on summer recess, with politicians due to return on Monday.

Outside parliament, another member climbed up scaffolding around the Elizabeth Tower housing "Big Ben" and raised a banner reading "Let The People Decide Citizens' Assemblies Now". Two others chained themselves to the railings.

"To create a new, fairer politics will require first thousands, then millions of us," said Alanna Byrne, of Extinction Rebellion.

"It will require sustained culture-shifting civil disobedience, until we become impossible to ignore." - APP

Finnish trial of journalists 'unacceptable'

LONDON: Prosecution of investigative journalists in Finland, an EU country, is "unacceptable," the Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ) said on Friday.

The comments from the CPJ came amid ongoing press freedom controversy in Finland as three investigative journalists have been facing a court case for "revealing state secrets" in an article published in local daily The Helsingin Sanomat in 2017. Reiterating that the CPJ is "closely monitoring this case", its Europe Director Attila Mong said: "It is unacceptable that investigative journalists in an EU country could face prison sentences for their work." Mong told Anadolu Agency the CPJ thinks that "prosecuting these journalists will have a chilling effect on national security reporting in Finland." "The Finnish journalists" reporting was in the public interest, they provided context and background to national security policies and decisions, prosecuting them sends a wrong message to other journalists working on similar topics," he added. The charges stem from a Dec. 16, 2017 article on the activities of the Finnish Intelligence Research Center, a unit that conducts military intelligence operations, according to

BERLIN: A pilots' strike has forced German air carrier Lufthansa to cancel nearly 800 flights on Friday, affecting around 130,000 passengers. The strike began at 00:01 a.m. local time and is set to continue until 23:59 p.m., according to a statement by the pilots' union Vereinigung Cockpit (VC). Lufthansa has asked its passengers to check the current status of their flight online, contact a call center for a rebooking solution, and avoid traveling to the airport. "Due to the strike, only a few or no service counters are open there. It is therefore highly unlikely that you will be offered an immediate alternative there either," the company said. Nearly all Lufthansa flights from Frankfurt and Munich hubs were canceled on Friday due to the strike.

There might be more flight cancellations or delays this Saturday and Sunday due to the effects of the strike, the airline warned.

The pilots' union decided to strike after negotiations with the management failed to make any headway on Wednesday. must present a significantly improved offer," negotiator Marcel Groels said in a statement, adding that the positions of the management and the union were "too far apart" at the moment. He said the collective bargaining commission is demanding compensation for the loss of real wages and an internationally competitive remuneration structure in all occupational groups.

Chile to vote on new Constitution

BOGOTA: Chileans will hold a historic plebiscite on Sunday to decide to approve a new Constitution.

About 15 million Chileans 18 and older must cast ballots to replace the Constitution that was drawn up during Augusto Pinochet's dictatorship, which has been law since 1980.

The drafting of the new Constitution began in 2019 after social unrest that resulted in a first plebiscite where 80% of the population decided a new Constitutional text should be made.

In 12 months, 155 popularly-elected individuals, representing a variety of voices, worked to draft the new Constitution. The result, presented in July to President Gabriel Boric, is a 178-page progressive document that embodies gender equality and Indigenous rights, expands social protections and prioritizes environmental protection. The constituent assembly said the proposal is a response to Chileans' requests for a more equal society.

A senior intelligence officer confirmed that Rasheed "was providing information to Canadian intelligence while smuggling people"

to Daesh/ISIS, the BBC reported. In a video he took of Begum, Sultana and Abase at the Syrian border, Rasheed can be heard directing the British schoolgirls to a car that would take them to their destination. Rasheed was arrested by authorities in Türkiye's southern city of Sanliurfa shortly after he smuggled Begum into Syria.

According to the BBC, the Canadian agent also obtained information on the terrorist group itself, documenting the location of homes of foreign fighters in Syria, as well as identifying IP addresses and locations of internet cafes used by fighters in Daesh/ ISIS-controlled territory. After his arrest. Rasheed told law enforcement that he was gathering information on everyone he helped and "passing this information to the Canadian Embassy in Jordan," the BBC report said. He had also been in contact with an infamous UK member of the terrorist group, Raphael Hostey, and the pair coordinated on supplying fighters and weaponry. "I need you to work under me. Officially ... I want you to help us bring people in," Hostey said to Rasheed in a text conversation seen by the BBC. "You work for us

ing in brothers and sisters," Hostey added, to which Rasheed responded with: "I am ready, brother."

The UK revoked Begum's citizenship in 2019 and she is currently held in a detention camp in northeastern Syria. Her lawyers, who have launched legal proceedings to get her back to the UK, said it was "shocking" that a Canadian intelligence asset helped in trafficking young girls.

They told the BBC that "intelligence-gathering looks to have been prioritized over the lives of children." UK authorities have yet to comment on the issue, with

a government spokesman saying "it is our long-standing policy that we do not comment on operational intelligence or security matters," the BBC report said. Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said the government "will follow up on the claims."

Taliban arrest woman who accused official of rape

KABUL: The Taliban has arrested an Afghan woman who accused a senior official of rape. The woman, who was identified only by her first name Elaha, released a video earlier this week in which she alleged being forced into marriage, beaten and repeat edly raped by former Taliban Interior Ministry spokesman Saeed Khosti.

She said she was speaking from an apartment in Kabul where the Taliban had confined her after she tried to escape the country, and pleaded for rescue. "These may be my last words.

He will kill me, but it is better to die once than to die every time," she said. On Wednesday, a day after the video surfaced, the Taliban said Elaha had been arrested for defamation on orders of the chief justice Abdul Hakeem Haqqanil, would "soon be sentenced according to Sharia law".

Devastating floods claimed 470 lives in Sindh: CM

Drug dealers to get death or life sentence

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Alvi on Friday assented to the Control of Narcotic Substances (Amendment) Bill, 2022, which allows a death sentence or life imprisonment for illicit trafficking of narcotics and psychotropic drugs. This includes drugs of varying quantities including heroin, morphine, cocaine, and methamphetamine (ICE). The Act provides a maximum

punishment if the offence involves any narcotic drug or psychotropic substance inside or near a school, college, university, educational premises, or any other educational institution. After President Alvi's approval, the bill has become the Control of Narcotic Substances (Amendment) Act, 2022 in terms of Article 75 of the Constitution. The Control of Narcotic Substances (Amendment) Act, 2022, allows imprisonment which may extend to life imprisonment, however, not less than 20 years with a fine not less than Rs1 million for offences involving heroin and morphine weighing 4kg or more.

Ex-NYPD officer gets 10 years sentence

NEW YORK: Former New York City police officer Thomas Webster, who assaulted police in the Jan. 6, 2021, attack on the U.S. Capitol, was sentenced on Thursday to 10 years in prison, the longest sentence yet handed down in a case related to the attack. "The Defendant is sentenced to concurrent terms of 120 months," according to details of the sentence posted on the online portal page of the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia. Webster was found guilty in May of assaulting a Washington police officer during riot at the Capitol by supporters of then-President Donald Trump. - DNA

Pakistani political group urges US to boost aid

NEW YORK: A prominent political group of Pakistani-American activists has called on the US Congress and Biden administration to pass a \$13 billion aid package to provide desperately needed humanitarian assistance to Pakistan, which is battling the worst-ever floods. Through its National Disaster Management Authority, the Pakistani Government - which has declared a national emergency - is leading the response in coordinating assessments and directing humanitarian relief to affected people. More than 1,000 people have been killed and at least 33 million displaced from what the United Nations has characterized as a "monsoon on steroids." Approximately one-third of Pakistan is under water, as heavy rainfall since June has deluged the country. The Atlantic Council, a Washington-based American think-tank, estimates flooding so far has caused \$5.2bn in damages to Pakistan and will require \$7.9bn in reconstruction costs. As flood waters move south, the situation is expected to deteriorate even further.

The Atlantic Council valued Pakistan' from flooding in 2022 at around \$17 billion, bringing the two-year total to a minimum of \$30 billion. As climate change progresses, flooding crises in Pakistan are expected to grow. The country contributes less than 1% of the world's greenhouse gas emissions yet continues to bear the brunt of climate related disasters year after year, it was pointed out, "Pakistan faces one of its darkest hours today with a third of the country underwater. What is most tragic is that this year's floods, just like last year's, are a harbinger of worse climate related disasters to come," Dr. Ijaz Ahmad, Chairman of the American Pakistani Public Affairs Committee (APPAC) said in a statement. - APP

Pakistan rejects Indian propaganda

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan categorically rejects the contents of Indian newspapers' story regarding banned outfit relief activities. It only betrays India's bias and prejudice towards Pakistan, and is part of India's regular and continuing attempts to mislead the international audience.

Under the rules, in force until Sunday, each household will be allowed to send one person out to buy groceries and essential goods per day, provided they have tested negative for Covid-19 in the previous 24 hours, an official notice said. It added that all residents would be tested for the virus, urging them not to leave the city unless "absolutely necessary". The mood appeared calmer on social media on Friday, with some residents saying they were able to order food to be delivered to their apartment gates and to go out to buy groceries. Others said they had resorted to sleeping at their offices in order not to miss work. Authorities had initially sought to quash talk of a looming lockdown, with police saying they had detained a man for "creating panic" after he warned that the city could shut down.

Al urges India to end repression of human rights in IIOJK ISLAMABAD: London-based rights watch-

dog, Amnesty International, urged the Indian government to end repression of human rights in Indian illegally occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIOJK). According to Kashmir Media Service, the Amnesty International on Friday released a new briefing titled 'We are being punished by the law', Three years since of abrogation of Article 370 in Jammu Kashmir.

The briefing documents "how civil society at large and journalists, lawyers, human rights defenders in particular have faced relentless interrogations, arbitrary travel bans, revolving door detentions and repressive media policies while blocking access to appeals or justice in courts and human rights bodies." Amnesty International in the briefing said the Indian government has drastically intensified the repression of rights in IIOJK in the three years since the change in status of the region.

"For three years now, civil society and media in Jammu and Kashmir have been subiected to a vicious crackdown by the Indian government, which is determined to stifle dissent using draconian laws, policies and unlawful practices in their arsenal," said Aakar Patel, chair of the board of Amnesty International India. "By harassing and intimidating critical voices, authorities are targeting all credible, independent sources of information in and about Jammu and Kashmir. There is a silence achieved on all dissent through heavy handed repression which has spread fear and uncertainty in the region," he said. Assault on freedom of expression and movement Amnesty International, in the report, has recorded at least 60 instances of crackdown on journalists and human rights defenders since August 2019. A Kashmiri journalist who has been harassed by the authorities, was quoted by Amnesty International as saying, "They (security forces) tell you in so many ways - subtle as well as brazen - that the cost of pursuing journalism in Jammu & Kashmir is huge.'

The Amnesty International said that the Indian government had total control on information coming out of the region after passing restrictive media policies such as the 2020 Revised Media Policy and 2021 Film Policy. And that, after an initial six-month internet shutdown, the Indian authorities still often suspend internet services in various parts of Kashmir often without any prior notice. In addition, the sudden forced closure of the Kashmir Press Club in 2022 by the Indian government was a big blow to the already disintegrating media pool.
