PTI Chairman Imran Khan says absconder Nawaz making country's biggest decisions from London

GUJRAT: Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf Chairman and former Prime Minister Imran Khan has said that the absence of rule of law is the main root cause of all problems being faced by Pakistan. Addressing PTI long march rallies in Gujrat and Kamalia through video link, he said the appointment of the next chief of army staff (COAS) must be made according to merit. However, he said that those in power had not done anything on merit and questioned if they would rightfully select the army chief on merit. "They want their own army chief because they want to steal."

PTI Chairman Imran Khan lashed out at PML-N supremo Nawaz Sharif and premier Shehbaz Sharif. "The one [Nawaz] who looted country for the 30 years will make decisions about army chief's appointment, elections date and caretaker setup," he said, "No one can even imagine that this can happen in a civilised society because rule of law prevails there." FIR shows absence of rule of law: Qureshi



Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif consults Nawaz Sharif in London

LONDON: Following his crucial meetings with PML-N supremo Nawaz Sharif and other party leaders in London, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif Friday maintained that the army chief's appointment will be constitutionally decided. The prime minister is expected to reach Pakistan today from London. The process of the appointment of new army chief shall start upon his return, sources say. "Army chief's appointment is a constitutional matter. It will be decided according to the constitution," PM Shehbaz said.On November 2, the premier departed for London after wrapping up his two-day visit to Egypt to attend the COP27 summit. The premier - after his fourth meeting during which he also met with Vice President Maryam Nawaz for over two hours is on his way to return to Pakistan. In London, the prime minister and the



PML-N chief have taken important decisions which also include deliberation over the next army chief's appointment.

Two rounds of the meetings were also attended by Defence Minister Khawaja Asif and Punjab PML-N leader Malik Muhammad Ahmed Khan. The Sharif brothers will also take the Pakistan Democratic Movement's (PDM) leadership into confidence on the matter. The prime minister's visit to London came two weeks before the end of Chief of Army Staff Qamar Javed Bajwa's tenure, who will retire on November 29.



71 dengue patients admitted to allied hospitals

RAWALPINDI :As many as 71 patients were admitted to three hospitals in the city, out of which 52 tested positive while the remaining results were being processed. District Coordinator of Epidemics Prevention and Control (DCEPC), Dr Sajjad Mehmood, Friday informed that 28 patients were admitted to the Benazir Bhutto Hospital(BBH), 27 to the District Headquarters Hospital(DHQ) and 16 to the Holy Family Hospital. He added that out of the total diagnosed with dengue positives, 44 belonged to Rawalpindi, while two patients were in a critical position at BBH. Dr Sajjad informed around 26 more dengue cases were reported in Rawalpindi during the last 24 hours, raising the tally of confirmed cases to 4,577. The health official said that the district administration, in collaboration with allied departments, had registered 3,030 FIRs, sealed 679 premises, issued Challans to 7,864, notices to 14,120, and a fine of Rs 10, 678,118 imposed on violations of anti-dengue SOPs from January 1 to date in various areas of the district. Dr Sajjad added that den gue cases were decreasing with turning weather cool which was not suitable for the survival of the dengue parasite.-APP

Sindh seeks 3-month delay in LB polls in Karachi

KARACHI: The Sindh government wants postponement of local government polls in Karachi by three more months, it emerged on Friday.Sources said that the Sindh cabinet on Friday approved a proposal seeking the adjournment of the polls. The provincial government has also written to the election commission for the postponing the by-polls for three more months. Meanwhile the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) will discuss the issue of LG elections in Karachi and Hyderabad on Nov. 15. PPP leaders will explain the government position to election commission.

The Karachi administrator will brief the electoral body about the law and order situation in Karachi. Other political parties will also share their opinion about the issue. The Sindh government argues that additional police personnel have been sent to Islamabad at the interior ministry's request ahead of the PTI's sit-in. According to a report, police personnel cannot leave the flood-affected areas. In view of the shortage of the police force, peaceful local government are not possible at this moment, the report added.

ICT admin's action

Capital Territory (ICT) administration special teams on Friday arrested 22 professional beggars and imposed fines over Rs 26,500 on shopkeepers for overcharging. Diplomat wants Pakistani AIOU organizes businessmen to exploit US expertise

PESHAWAR :The United States has long been Pakistan's largest export market, importing more than \$5 billion Pakistani goods that is surpassing any other country and we want bilateral economic relations to be further strengthened inviting Pakistani businessmen to come to US and get advantage of United States expertise in different sectors. This was stated by Nathan

Seifert, Counselor for Commercial Affairs during his meeting on trade-ties between Pak-US with Member Board of Investors and former convener of Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industries for Pakistan, Afghanistan and Central Asia Shahid Khan Shinwari on Friday. The two held an hour-long meeting and thoroughly discussed Pakistan-US trade ties and exchange of visits of Pakistani businessmen to US to have business-to-business meetings with different US companies for extending trading ties and to get benefits from the US expertise in fields of business. Ayaz Ali Khan, Commercial Specialist of the Embassy of the United States of America in Islamabad was also present at the meeting. The main products that Pakistan exports to the United States are house linens, knitted sweaters, and other clothing articles. During the last 25 years the exports of Pakistan to the United States has increased at an annualized rate of 4.79%, from \$1.26B in 1995 to \$4.04B in 2020. The United States is also one of the top trading partners of Pakistan.

Pakistan is importing aluminum, aircraft, spacecraft, dairy products, honey, edible products and manmade staple fibers. Mr. Nathan said, we work closely with Pakistan on a wide array of issues ranging from energy, trade and investment, health, clean energy and combating the climate crisis. The United States has been one of the largest sources of foreign direct investment in Pakistan and remains Pakistan's largest export market, he said. Trade and investment relations between the United States and Pakistan continue to grow and the U.S. government supports this relationship by organizing business to business trade delegations, providing technical assistance, and promoting business opportunities for U.S. companies to develop U.S.-Pakistan commercial partnerships. For more than 70 years, Pa-

kistan has been an important partner and that is why we want that the businessmen of Pakistan including Khyber Pakhtunkhwa should come up to various trade expos for interaction with various US companies for expanding their business sphere. Such direct communications

with companies based in the US would help them learn more about expanding their businesses, Mr. Nathan Seifert said. He said Pakistan is the fifth largest country in the world with regard to population and ranked as the 44th largest economy in 2022 according to IMF estimates. The United States has long been Pakistan's largest export market, importing more than \$5 billion of Pakistani goods in 2021, far surpassing any other country. The United States has also been a leading investor in Pakistan for the past 20 years. In the most recent fiscal year, U.S. direct investment in Pakistan increased by 50 percent, it is now the highest in over a

Major U.S. investments are concentrated in consumer goods, chemicals, energy, agriculture, business process out-sourcing, transportation, and communications. The United States has sought to deepen commercial ties with Pakistan, including through engagement by senior officials from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Department of State, and the U.S. International Development Finance Corporation (DFC) with Pakistani leaders.

However, Pakistan's business climate has areas that needed to be strengthened, including regulation, intellectual property protection, and taxation. The United States continues to work with Pa-

kistan to achieve business climate enhancements. Mr. Nathan said it is good opportunity for the Pakistani businessmen to visit and interact with leading companies of the world and through that way it would help Pakistan-US to deepen trade ties. Nathan Seifert and Shahid Khan Shinwari, CEO of Shahid and Brothers, pledged to strengthen trade ties and business-to-business contacts to enhance the bilateral trade volume.

PIMS director's lies regarding Arshad Sharif exposed

ISLAMABAD: Arshad Shaheed's family has demanded the martyr's post-mortem report from Pakistan Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS) thrice, contrary to the claims made by PIMS Director Dr Khalid Masud, it emerged on Friday. Director PIMS Dr Khalid Masud claimed in a talkshow that Arshad Shari's family never contacted him or the hospital for the journalist's post-mortem report, adding that if they had contacted, he would have provided them the report. After Masud's statement in a prime time talkshow, it emerged that the family has contacted PIMs twice on November 1 and November 3 with the second request Dr Khalid Masud.

Masud had written on the letter that the family should get death certificate from police and the post-mortem report from the court. Despite all this, Masud not only lied on national television about having no knowledge of family's attempts to get Arshad Sharif's post-mortem report.

After the interview aired, Arshad Sharif's family again contacted Masud, upon which he again refused their request. As the family reminded him of yesterday's interview, he said that he will take back his statement. It is pertinent to mention

here that the family has still not received the post-mortem report but a private TV channel's anchor received

being a letter addressed to graphic images of the martyr's body this week upon which the anchor claimed that Sharif was tortured for hours before being killed, a claim contradicted by Kenyan journalists.

One of the top investigative

journalists of Pakistan, Arshad Sharif was shot dead on the outskirts of Kenya's Nairobi city on October 23. He had worked for the country's top news channels and newspapers in the past. He was awarded 'Presidential Pride of Performance' for his exceptional journalism in the year 2019. His show 'Powerplay' was one of the most-watched talkshows in Pakistan and people loved the way Arshad came up with stories regarding the ruling elite's

CCP recommends to issue show cause notice to online education provider ISLAMABAD: The Compe-British Lyceum Private vertising in newspapers and

tition Commission of Pakistan (CCP) on Friday recommended to issue a show cause notice to online education provider M/s. British Lyceum Private Limited, which was engaged in deceptive marketing practices and acting prima facie violation of Section 10 of the Competition Act, 2010.

A press release issued here Friday said that in this regard CCP conducted an inquiry, which found M/s.

Limited acting prima facie in violation of Section 10 of the Competition Act, 2010 and recommended issuing a

show cause notice to it. M/s. British Lyceum is an online educational institute, which is an associated company of American Lyceum Private Limited and Royal Lyceum Private Limited and have dozens of branches across Pakistan. The CCP took notice of certain claims that British Lyceum was adposting on their website, suspecting the claims to be in violation of Section 10. The three major claims that called the attention of Commission included, "teachers can earn Rs80,000 to Rs250,000 per month; education program worthy of Rs3.75 billion is endorsed by Cambridge Global; and that there are eminent educationists and technologists on our Board of Directors." Taking notice on its own under Section 37(1), CCP conducted an Inquiry to see whether these claims violated Section 10 and regarding the first claim, the inquiry stated that British Lyceum in its newspaper advertisement announced a special package under which teachers could earn Rs80,000 to 250,000 per month, with a disclaimer published on the bottom left corner of the advertisement stating: "terms and condition apply, for details, visit website."-APP

Work completed on Water Plant in Gwadar

ISLAMABAD: In order to provide clean drinking water to residents of Gwadar city, almost 30 percent work has progressed on the construction of 1.2 MGD (million gallon per day) Water Desalination Plant.

desalination water plant is being completed with the Chinese grant of Rs2 billion.

Talking to Gwadar Pro, Dawood Baloch, Project Director of under-constructed Desalination Plan said that it is a matter of immense mirth that work continues to proceed on expeditious and smooth manner as flow of civil work including foundation work and structure work did not suffer any stumbling block.

"Event previous phase of comprehensive soil testing in the premises of Gwadar Port Free Zone area went uninterrupted under the guideline of Gwadar Port Authority and the government," he added.

Alongside the ongoing construction of 1.2 MGD desalination plant, GPA rolled out a process to lay down around 1 kilometer long water supply line from plant site to Gwadar city's main water supply network, he revealed. He added that

through this connectivity, potable water will be supplied to inside taps of residents of Gwadar.

He said that for this purpose, GPA has already commenced formal bidding process seeking services of qualified firms. After the tendering procedure enters into finality on November selected enterprise will be awarded contract to proceed in accordance with rules and regulations.

Another GPA official said that the 1.2 MGD Water Desalination Plant is spreading over approximately one acre. "The plant is supposed to complete in 12 months but hopefully it is expected to be completed

before April, 2023." He said that the water desalination plant is being completed in collaboration with GPA and China Harbor Engineering Company (CHEC) The 1.2 MGD Water Desalination Plant project, he said, will be enough to meet the water demand of the Gwadar city and Gwadar port. He said initially a 0.5 MGD Water Desalination Plant project was inked with the conduction of feasibility and survey by government of Pakistan and China. On July 5, 2021, the government approved the 1.2 MGD Water Desalination Plant for Gwadar.

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Single Window (PSW) and the Drug Regulatory Authority of Pakistan (DRAP)signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) today to further expand their partnershipfor trade facilitation through the integration of cross-border business processes of DRAP. The integration of DRAP systems under PSW shall provide the electronic submission, processing, and issuance of licenses, imported products (drugs, medical devices, health, and over-the-counter products), No Objection Certificates (NOCs), and other certificates, as prescribed for specified products falling under DRAP's regulatory jurisdiction. During the ceremony, the CEO PSW, Mr. Syed Aftab Haider, said, "The Pharmaceutical industry has long been identified as a priority sector by the government due to its size and contribution to the national economy and its potential for exports. Integration with the PSW system will help the pharmaceutical industryto reduce its time and cost of trading across borders by adopting the best practices in customs and regulatory clearances centered around technology and digitization of procedures and information requirements". The MoU signing ceremony marked the integration of DRAP under the PSW system that will help stakeholders in the clearance of pharmaceutical raw materials, products, and devices for imports and exports. Under the initiative, extensive business process reengineering of DRAP's cross-border trade has been carried out, resulting in the redesign of 31 processes and the digitization of 56 paper-based documents. Going forward, the system will create the enabling environment for further digitization of DRAP's back-end processes. DRAP CEO Mr. Asim Rauf said, "DRAP is mandated for effective coordination and enforcement of the Drugs Act, 1976 to regulate the manufacture, import, export, storage, distribution, and sale of therapeutic goods in the country.Integration with the PSW system will provide DRAP to get better visibility of all import and exporttransactions and help improve its control measures while facilitating trade through the implementation of the Integrated Risk Management System, digital payments, and electronic integration with labs and other relevant service providers. Going forward, the system will also provide an interface for the electronic receipt of commercial documents attested by Pakistani missions abroad to mitigate fraud risks and save time and cost of doing business".



She said almost one third of Pakistan was inundated and the loss and damage combined amounted to US \$30 billion according to the Post-disaster Needs Assessment adding that the livelihood,

agriculture and food are severely impacted and the century's record flood has changed the entire topography in the South of the country has changed and become unrecognizable, said a press release received here.

She emphasized on the flood loss-

es to Pakistan incurred this year and the significance of the Living Indus Initiative in flood risk management, adaptation and resilience of the Indus River system. Continuing the conversation on Pakistan's recovery and adaptation needs, Sherry provided an overview of the Living Indus Initiative and how it would help in restoring the ecosystems of the Indus Basin.

"Restoring the ecological health of the Indus River system within the boundaries of Pakistan is a crucial step to ensure our climate resilience, especially during natural calamities like floods," said the minister. HESCO will have its own transformer

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Farooq as the Chief Justice of Is-

ISLAMABAD:Federal Minister for Energy, Engineer Khurram Dastagir Khan, on Friday informed the National Assembly that Hyderabad Electric Supply Company (HESCO) will have its own transformer repair workshop by June 2023.

The ministry has issued directions in this regard and the work has been started, said the minster responding to a question raised by MNA Salahuddin.

The minister said that HESCO during fiscal year 2020-21 spent 98.722 million on repair maintenance of transformers and during 2021-22 spent 175.899 million rupees while repairing 841 transformers. He informed that he visited Hyderabad on

the direction of Prime Minister and spent five days during early time of floods in Sindh and was shocked to know about the issues regarding repair of transformers in

He told the house that HESCO had made an agreement for repair of transformers with three private companies and these companies following the guidelines of PPMS about repair and maintenance perform their job. Unfortunately, in some of the areas people collect funds for repair and maintenance of transformers in this region and get them repaired through private vendors without following guidelines, he told the house.

He said, his ministry has issued clear directions to HESCO to establish their own repair workshop before 30th June 2023.

About low voltage, the minister said that his ministry has already issued directions to make earthing of all transformers across the country along with balancing all three phases of transformer for ensuring provision of full voltage to the consumers.

He said employees of distribution companies do not provide earth to the transformer and balance the load of three phases due to which transformer fails to provide full voltage.

US midterm results: Red wave that wasn't

ome setbacks count almost as good news. Clearly, the Democrats have lost ground in the midterms. While it may be weeks before control of the Senate is determined, if Georgia goes to a runoff, the Republicans still appear likely to take the House, though more narrowly than hoped. They will use control to mire the administration in legislative deadlock and committee investigations. High-profile Democrats such as Stacey Abrams in Georgia and Beto O'Rourke in Texas were also easily defeated. But this was "definitely not a Republican wave, that is for darn sure", the senator Lindsey Graham acknowledged as early results came in on Tuesday night. The sense of the GOP falling short is not just about pre-poll punditry. Joe Biden may be on track for the best performance by an incumbent in the midterms since 2002, when George W Bush enjoyed extraordinary popularity in the wake of September 11. It was also a bad night for Donald Trump, expected to declare his 2024 candidacy this week. There will be an increased Maga caucus in the House (giving Kevin McCarthy, currently minority leader, a headache). But while the former president's support may be critical in primaries, it looks less helpful in general elections. True, JD Vance won his Senate race in Ohio; but the Democrat John Fetterman flipped Pennsylvania, defeating Mehmet Oz, and in Michigan, the governor Gretchen Whitmer saw off the challenge from Tudor Dixon. Two Republican victories were almost as unwelcome to Mr Trump: the re-election of Georgia's governor, Brian Kemp, who defied his pressure to overturn the results in the state in 2020, and especially the landslide in Florida for Ron DeSantis, seen as the most likely challenger for the presidential nomination - as Mr Trump's threats to the governor show.

In many ways the Democrats' performance looked more like the result of a vote against Republican extremism than a vote of confidence in Mr Biden's party. Inflation was the top issue for voters, but abortion came close behind - and outranked it in Pennsylvania. Despite GOP candidates' last-minute attempts to blur their hardline anti-abortion stances, as they realised their unpopularity, voters turned out to defend women's right to autonomy and healthcare. California, Michigan and Vermont supported ballot measures that effectively prevent state legislators enacting bans. Overall the results are a fillip for Democrat morale and, despite Mr Biden's relatively low profile in this campaign, strengthen his position in his party (though according to one exit poll, only 30% of voters said they wanted him to run again in 2024; 67% said they didn't). He will also retain precious authority in international dealings. All this is a relief. But after one of the most ferociously fought elections, with a staggering \$16.7bn spent, the US's challenges and divisions are as glaring as ever.

t is necessary to place HR in a political and economic context in order to understand their global operation. The central position of HR in international law and politics is the result of gradual development following the

Second World War. When the UN was founded, rights were not central to the idea of international order and the focus was on the co-operation between sovereign nations. As the UN system developed, the UDHR and the subsequent Conventions were seen as placing limits on the sovereignty of states. Indeed, in more recent years, HR have been linked to a vision of international development that place obligations on the developed countries to assist the social and economic development of poorer nations. HR have thus become central in articulating an international legal order committed to social and economic justice and have become an essential part of the management of the world economy. The IMF, the WTO and the World Bank are institutions of international law that were created by treaties. The WTO regulates and encourages world trade, and the IMF and the World Bank both regulate world finance, make loans to nations and assist in the economic development of poorer nations. The Articles of Agreement for the World Bank and the IMF were drawn up and adopted at Bretton Woods in 1944.

Their objectives were to provide finance for the reconstruction of the post-War world, but both institutions have become increasingly involved in the economic development of the Third World. The World Bank provides low-interest loans, interest-free credit and grants to developing countries, as well as loans to higher income developing countries. The WB provides an essential source of finance to poorer countries who are either unable to borrow money in international markets, or can only do so at high interest. In the past the WB operated on the basis that economic goals such as the relief of poverty were strictly separate from HR, but it now argues that HR are an essential part of the economic development of poorer countries. Furthermore, rights themselves are only considered possible within developed economies, in that they are product of people organised through government. For example, many public services will only reach the poor if governments are both capable of delivering them, and do so without the obstacles of corruption; laws created to end child labor will be more effective in economic conditions that allow families to live off of the incomes of parents; and legal rights are better pursued in effective court systems.

The IMF's Articles of Agreement indicate that ber of key principles run through the agreements it is directed to manage world financial systems. Its powers extend over international monetary co-operation, the maintenance of orderly exchange rate arrangements and the facilitation of world trade. A balanced growth of international trade will achieve high levels of employment, real income and the development of national economies. Another central task of the Fund is to offer 'temporary' financial help with 'adequate safeguards' to member nations having difficulties with balance of payments. The safeguards must ensure that the overriding objectives of international stability are achieved. Like the World Bank, these are first of all economic objectives. If one looks below the surface, however, all of the IMF's activities contribute directly or indirectly to reducing poverty and fostering human rights. Macroeconomic imbalances and high inflation are detrimental to the poor. The wealthy are partly protected against inflation because they own assets, whose prices rise during inflationary periods. The poor often have their real earnings eroded because prices may rise faster than wages. Moreover, inflation contributes to the misallocation of resources, which hampers economic growth and employment (Leite, 2001). This argument is similar to the one put forward by the World Bank. Trade may promote growth, and a rise in living standards. If this is coupled with a well-managed economy, a nation should be able to 'create an environment that supports poverty reduction'. Indeed, poverty reduction can be thought of as a precondition for a human rights culture.

The IMF understands its task in helping poorer countries by ensuring that economic concerns are linked to the creation of 'better governance' structures. For instance, a right to property would be vital in securing investment in a country. Investors would have to be sure that their investments were safe, and that the courts of that country would use the law to ensure that protection. Thus a functioning legal system is a precondition for the attraction of foreign investments that would aid in the development of a nation's economic prosperity. The WTO aims to regulate and co-ordinate world trade. It is a forum for negotiation between nations in relation to trading matters, and it also provides a dispute resolution mechanism. A numthat the WTO oversees relating to the foundation and perpetuation of a multilateral trading system. Three principles are fundamental: (i) trade without discrimination: nations must treat their trading partners with equality; (ii) imported and locally produced goods must be treated equally with regard to tariffs and taxation; (iii) ongoing negotiations towards the realization of free trade is in the interests of all nations.

WTO take into account human rights obligations in regulating world trade? As Mary Robinson has argued that the world's economic system and human rights law have tended to develop separately from each other. For example, intellectual property rules have led directly or indirectly to the exclusion of many people from access to essential medicines, notably those needed by the developing world to inhibit the spread of HIV/ AIDS, malaria and TB. Similarly, in many countries policies that promote the privatization of public services have made it more difficult for people to send their children to school, to secure safe drinking water, and to have access to health care.

These failures have undermined the legitimacy of national and global political institutions, and impacted negatively on the quality of life of millions of people. Mary Robinson points out that both international HR law and international trade law seek to improve standards of living. Although the primary objectives of these institutions are oriented towards the management of world trade and the world economy, they have begun to appreciate in different ways that human rights form a part of their remit.

The IMF and the World Bank finance loans to aid the development of the economies of the world's poorer nations. Human rights have increasingly come to be appreciated as central to economic well-being. Human rights are seen as an element in a broad approach to re-structuring economies. One way in which a government can be assessed in terms of its efficiency is the extent to which it has a functioning legal system that protects human rights. From the perspective of the WTO, there is a similar sense that rights and trade are not incompatible. One could consider, for example, the negotiations of the WTO in the area of anti-HIV/AIDS medicines and intellectual property rights.

He went on to say that a country is unable to prosper when it forgets its morals.

He stated that this scenario could never occur in any civilized country as rule of law prevails. He lamented that the corrupt were not facing the consequences as there was no rule of law in Pakistan. "I can't get a first information report registered as an ex-prime minister because a powerful person is in it," he said. He added that he strived for two years for EVMs, which could eradicate 90% of rigging in polls but they ended the project because they want to rig elections.

The former PM while rais ing question on presence of pictures of slain journalist Arshad Sharif said that his mother is not being provided the postmortem report despite repeated demands.

"I knew the plan. The plot was prepared in September," Khan told his supporters, without presenting any evidence for his claims. "The march will just get strengthened after this incident.

Khan has described the shooting as an "assassination attempt" and blamed Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Interior Minister Rana Sanaullah for being behind the attack.

Khan was ousted in April in a no-confidence vote in Parliament, but he says his removal was unlawful and a conspiracy by his political opponents orchestrated by the United States, a charge denied by both Washington and Sharif. Khan's protest convoy started from Lahore two weeks ago with Khan and thousands of his supporters - in trucks, cars or on foot - marching toward Islamabad for what was to be an open-ended rally until his demands were met.

MELBOURNE: England and Pakistan's staff will be poring over weather charts as well as tactics in the lead-up to the T20 World Cup final, with a gloomy forecast threatening to scupper the decider at the Melbourne Cricket Ground. Heavy rain is expected on Sunday's match day and also the reserve day on Monday as a multi-year La Nina weather phenomenon continues to drench much of eastern Australia. The tournament has already seen a slew of Super 12 matches washed out, though the semi-finals passed without disruption in Sydney and Adelaide. While the forecast could put a dampener on the crowd at the MCG, organisers will plough ahead with the starting time of 7 p.m. (0800 GMT) on Sunday and hope each side can squeeze 10 overs in, the minimum required for the final. If the match starts on Sunday and is unable to be completed, it will resume at 3pm (0400 GMT) on Monday, leaving players with a nervous night's sleep. If Sunday is completely washed out, the match will start at 3pm on Monday, with the teams on notice to be ready to linger well into the evening if the weather forces it.

In the worst-case scenario where Monday is also washed out, then the World Cup will have joint winners for the first time. However, Melbourne is known for having "four seasons in one day", particularly in spring, and forecasts are often wide of the mark. Pakistan played a full game against India in their Super 12 blockbuster at the MCG despite a dire outlook for rain. Rain was expected on Friday, too, but Pakistan trained under leaden skies at the MCG without ever running for cover. Pakistan team mentor Matthew Hayden, who accurately predicted struggling captain Babar Azam would return to form with the bat in the semi-final against New Zealand, was banking on the weather to cooperate. - Agencies

NY-bound **Emirates flight** returns to Athens after US tip-off

ATHENS:A New York

bound Emirates flight car-

rying nearly 250 people was Thursday forced to return to Athens shortly after takeoff following a US security alert. Officials said the information related to "a suspicious person travelling on board". A police spokesman said the plane was accompanied back to the Greek capital's Eleftherios Venizelos international airport by two F-16 Greek air force fighter jets. Flight EK-210 was turned back 45 minutes after takeoff and landed at around 10:00 pm (2000 GMT), the spokesman said, adding that searches were ongoing on the plane. The flight was carrying 228 passengers and 18 crew members. Greek media reported that US authorities warned Greek police of the presence of a "suspicious person" on board the plane. Earlier on Thursday, another Emirates flight to Dubai was not allowed to take off from the Athens airport and all passengers were also checked over security concerns but nothing suspicious was found, police sources added. That flight took off after a fivehour delay. An Emirates spokesperson confirmed both incidents. "Emirates can confirm flight EK210 from Athens to Dubai on 10 November returned to stand before takeoff," the spokesperson said in an emailed statement to AFP. "Flight EK209 from Athens to Newark on 10 November also made an unscheduled return to Athens, due to security checks requested by the authorities," they added, saying passengers had been rebooked to travel on Friday and been provided with overnight accommodation.-APP

Tsunami warning after magnitude-7.1 quake near Tonga

SYDNEY: A magnitude-7.1 earthquake struck in the sea off Tonga late Friday, according to the US Geological Survey, sparking a tsunami warning.

According to the USGS, the earthquake hit 10 km (six miles) deep, about 200 km southeast of Neiafu, a town in the northeast of the Pacific archipelago nation.

"Hazardous tsunami waves are possible for coasts located within 300 km of the earthquake epicenter," said the Pacific Tsunami Warning Center. Seismic activity is fairly common around Tonga, a country with about 100,000 people spread across 171 islands. In January this year, it was rocked by the eruption of the Hunga-Tonga-Hunga-Ha'apai volcano, one of the most powerful such events in modern times, according to researchers from the Univer-

sity of Bath.-APP

Ethiopia govt says army controls 70 percent of

NAIROBI :The Ethiopian government said on Friday that 70 percent of the war-stricken northern region of Tigray was now under federal army control.

"70% of Tigray is under ENDF (Ethiopian National Defence Force)," Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed's national security adviser Redwan Hussein said on Twitter. "Aid is flowing like no other times," he added. AFP was not able to independently verify the claims. Access to northern Ethiopia is severely restricted and Tigray, which has a population of about six million people, remains inaccessible to journalists. Ethiopia's northernmost region is in the grip of a severe humanitarian crisis due to lack of food and medicine. and there is limited access to basic services including electricity, banking and communications. Redwan's comments come more than a week after the government and the rebel Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF) reached a deal aimed at ending their brutal two-year conflict. Talks have been underway in the Kenyan capital Nairobi this week between representatives of the warring sides to discuss plans for disarming the rebels.-APP

Kenya court drops \$60M corruption case of deputy president

NAIROBI:A Kenyan court on Thursday dropped a \$60 million corruption case against Deputy President Rigathi Gachagua, citing insufficient evidence.

Anti-corruption Magistrate Victor Wakulile also rebuked the prosecution, saying that Kenya's judicial system should not be treated as a "doormat." Gachagua was among four people who were charged with corruption in July 2021, before he became the deputy president. They were all released on bail in August last year. Wakulie said that they may be rearrested if any evidence against them is acquired by the court in the future. Since Kenyan President William Ruto was elected as the East African country leader on Sept. 13, many charges involving corruption affecting his allies

US midterms, where do House, Senate races stand?

WASHINGTON: Three days after polls closed in the United States midterm elections, neither Democrats nor Republicans had attained enough victories to claim control of either the House of Representatives or the Senate.

Counting was set to continue across the country on Friday, with Republicans closing in on the 218 seats needed to reach what is projected to be a far less than expected majority in the House. By late on Thursday, they had taken 211 seats compared with the Democrats' 192 in the 435-seat chamber.

The Senate race remained far less certain, with counting continuing in key races Arizona and Nevada. Some trends from the tally have boosted Democrats' hopes of winning both races, and thus attaining a 50-seat majority in the 100seat chamber, where the vice president - in this case Democrat Kamala Harris breaks ties.

Winning only one of the races in Arizona and Nevada would mean control of the Senate will be decided by a December 6 run-off in Georgia. Here's where things currently stand: Senate

Arizona: Incumbent Democrat Mark Kelly appeared to widen his lead over Republican challenger Blake Masters on Thursday to an about 5.6 percentage point margin, but the results of hundreds of thousands yet to be counted mail-in ballots could quickly shrink the difference. Nevada: Republican candidate Adam Laxalt's lead shrank to less than 10,000 votes over Democratic incumbent Catherine Cortez Masto on Thursday, with an estimated tens of thousands of ballots still to be counted. Many of those include mail-in ballots, a segment of the vote Cortez Masto has performed well in. Georgia: With neither candidate - Democrat Raphael Warnock and Republican Herschel Walker - reaching the 50 percent threshold needed to win outright in Georgia, the race will be decided in a run-off election on December 6. That new election could also be the decider of Senate control, depending on the results in Arizona and Nevada. House Republicans are just

seven victories away from claiming control of the House, with outstanding re-

ifornia, Colorado, Maine, Maryland, Nevada, New York, Oregon and Washington. California and Arizona: Analysts say Democrats still have the narrowest of paths to taking control, a scenario that would require a near clean sweep of the most competitive remaining races concentrated in California, where 16 races remain uncalled, and Arizona, where three races are outstanding. Colorado: Incumbent Republican Lauren Boebert, a ferocious supporter of former President Donald Trump and proponent of the QAnon conspiracy theory, has expanded her lead over Democratic challenger Adam Frisch. Some have viewed the unexpectedly close race as a referendum on the electability of the Republican party's

France accepts migrant ship as row with Italy blazes

TOULON:A rescue ship carrying 230 migrants docked at the French port of Toulon on Friday amid a blazing row between France and Italy over which country is responsible for them. The Ocean Viking, operated by a French NGO, had picked up the migrants at sea near the Libyan coast before spending weeks seeking a port to accept them.

France had never before allowed a rescue vessel carrying migrants from the Mediterranean to land on its coast, but did so this time because Italy had refused access. The rescue came a day after French Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin said that the migrants were Italy's responsibility under EU rules, and that the French move was an "exceptional" measure. He said Italy's refusal to accept the migrants was "incomprehensible" and that there would be "severe consequences" for relations with Italy which he said had "lacked humanity".

On Friday, Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni condemned what she called an "aggressive reaction" by the French government, telling reporters that it was "incomprehensible and unjustified". The Ocean Viking ship had initially sought access to Italy's coast, which is closest to where the migrants were picked up, saying health and sanitary conditions onboard were rapidly worsening. Italy refused, saying other nations needed to shoulder more of the burden for taking in the thousands of migrants trying to reach Europe from North Africa every year. "Everybody is very, very tired, but also relieved to set foot on land, it's the end of an ordeal," Laurence Bondard, a member of SOS Mediterranee, the NGO operating the Operation Viking, told .-APP

Finland's forest-ers decry 'unfair' EU climate plans

ASKOLA, FINLAND :Standing next to a freshly cut clearing the size of seven football fields, Finnish forest engineer Matti Jappila pointed to growth rings in a tree stump up to 300 years old. "I have started to systematically carry out these loggings, sort of in advance," he said. Like many Finns, Jappila fears that an upcoming EU biodiversity strategy, which aims to protect 30 percent of the land in the EU, will make his forestry livelihood "completely unprofitable". The European Union proposed a new Nature Restoration Law in June that aims to restore by the end of the decade 20 percent of nature areas like forests and wetlands to the state they were in 70 years ago. In a report last year, the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) said restoring natural forests and drained peatlands and improving sustainability of managed forests "generally enhances the resilience of carbon stocks and sinks." But in Finland, where forests cover around 75 percent of land, the proposals by Brussels have sparked outrage in the forestry industry, as well as a rift in the coalition government. On Friday, the centre-left government survived a no-confidence motion brought by the main opposition parties over its handling of the issue, with 103 votes in its favour to 73 against. "This regulation proposed by the Commission is exceptionally unfair to Finland," Saara-Sofia Siren, an MP in the opposition National Coalition Party, told AFP. The loud noise of a clearing saw filled the thick boreal forest of spruce and birch, as Jappila prepared another part of his estate to be cut down in December - before the EU can force him to protect it.-APP

ASEAN leaders struggle with Myanmar crisis at summit other members - Cambo-

PHNOM PENH: Southeast Asian leaders have demanded that Myanmar's military rulers implement a peace plan aimed at stopping the bloodshed in the country where thousands have been killed since the army seized power in a coup last year. The Myanmar crisis dominated the first day of talks on Friday at the summit of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASE-AN) in the Cambodian capital, Phnom Penh.

ASEAN leaders blocked Myanmar's military ruler, Senior General Min Aung Hlaing, from attending the gathering over the spiralling violence in his country, and amid frustration that the generals in Myanmar are uninterested in imple-

Leaders of the regional power bloc had agreed to "five-point consensus" peace plan with the My-

anmar leadership in April last year, but the military has so far ignored it. Indonesian President Joko Widodo told reporters on the sidelines of the summit on Friday that he had proposed broadening the ban on Myanmar political representatives at ASEAN events - something urged by human rights groups. "Indonesia is deeply disappointed the situation in Myanmar is worsen-

ing," Widodo said. "We must not allow the situation in Myanmar to define ASEAN," he added. Indonesian Foreign Minister Retno Marsudi said the

Weekly inflation continues to increase: PBS

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has a weekly report on inflation registering another increase in inflation by 0.74 percent. The overall rate of inflation in the country was recorded at 29.24 percent by PBS. The PBS data shows that during the week, out of 51 items, 22 items' prices were increased, 14 decreased, and 15 remained unchanged. In a week, onion became expensive by 27.16 percent, potato price increased by 5.13 percent, tea increased by 4.62 percent, sugar by 3.6, eggs by 2.13 percent, and chicken by 1.98 percent. The cost of firewood has also increased by 1.21percent, according to the Bureau of Statistics In one week, the prices of 14 commodities decreased including pulses, cooking oil, ghee, flour, LPG, and garlic. –APP

Biden faces high expectations at UN climate talks

SHARM EL SHEIKH :US President Joe Biden arrived at UN climate talks in Egypt on Friday armed with major domestic achievements against global warming but under pressure to do more for countries reeling from natural disasters. Biden will spend only a few hours at COP27 in Sharm el-Sheikh, three days after US midterm elections that have raised questions about what the result could mean for US climate policy. Climate action in the United States - the world's second biggest emitter - was given a major boost this year when Congress passed a landmark spending bill, the Inflation Reduction Act.-APP

EU warns of 'difficult months' as eurozone faces recession

BRUSSELS: The EU warned on Friday the eurozone was set to fall into recession this winter as Brussels hiked inflation forecasts for 2022 and 2023 on the back of high energy prices. Europe is reeling from the economic shockwaves unleashed by Russia-Ukraine conflict, which have fuelled a spike in energy costs and hit the wallets of consumers around the continent. The EU's executive arm said increased uncertainty and prices "are expected to tip" the eurozone and most of the bloc's member states into recession in the last quarter of this year. "The contraction of economic activity is set to continue in the first quarter of 2023. Growth is expected to return to Europe in spring," the European Commission said. "With

powerful headwinds still holding back demand, economic activity is set to be subdued, with GDP growth reaching 0.3 percent in 2023." Brussels predicted that the EU's biggest economy Germany would fare the worst of the member states with a contraction of 0.6 percent next year. Overall, eurozone GDP growth for 2022 was put at 3.2 percent after early strong months of the vear. But the EU's economy commissioner Paolo Gentiloni said "the impact of soaring energy prices, rampant inflation, are now taking their toll." "We have some difficult months ahead of us," Gentiloni said. He cautioned that "the potential for further economic disruptions due to Russia's war is far from exhausted." The downbeat

forecast came as the commission sharply raised its predictions for inflation in this and next year. It said eurozone inflation was expected to stand at 8.5 percent for 2022, a point higher than earlier forecast, and 6.1 percent in 2023, over two points higher than predicted previously. "Inflation has continued to rise faster than expected, but we believe that the peak is near. Most likely at the end of this year," Gentiloni said. We are projecting a very gradual reduction of inflation because inflation next year is still projected to be quite high.' He warned however that inflation could end up two points higher in 2023 if the EU "fails to prepare" adequately in advance for next winter by filling up its

gas stores.-APP

Azam Swati arrest: PTI senators hold rally

ISLAMABAD: Senators belonging to Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) on Friday held a sit-in outside the parliament building to condemn arrest of senior leader senator Azam Swati. Swati was arrested last month by the Federal Investigation Agency after he tweeted about the army chief. He alter alleged that he was beaten by the FIA officials in his house and the car in which he was taken away. Earlier the PTI senators marched the from Parliament house to the Supreme Court (SC) in protest against the torture on several parliamentarians. They demanded justice for Azam Swati, allowing him to file a case. The PTI senators first held a token sit-in as a protest outside the parliament house on Friday. After that they marched towards the SC building. They also demanded registration of case about the attack on Imran Khan in Wazirabad on Nov. 3.

The party says the police have not yet registered Imran Khan's FIR about attack on him. He wants to nominate Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, Interior Minister Rana Sanaullah, and a senior intelligence officer for making a plan to kill him. PTI has already rejected an FIR registered by a police official at Wazirabad. The Supreme Court had ordered registration of the FIA.

India's top court frees Rajiv's killers

NEW DELHI: India's top court on Friday ordered the release of six people convicted over the assassination of former prime minister Rajiv Gandhi.

Gandhi was 46 when he

was killed by a woman suicide bomber at an election rally in the southern state of Tamil Nadu in 1991. The assassination was carried out by the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE), a Sri Lankan armed separatist group. India's Supreme Court said the convicts were being released based on their "sat isfactory conduct" in prison and that they had served over three decades of jail time. The six - three of whom had been condemned to death before their sentences were commuted are the last still in prison for the assassination, although two were already out on parole. "I am very happy... I am very thankful to each and everybody," Nalini Sri-


China to continue providing new opportunities to Pak

Alluding to the flagship China Pakistan Economic Corridor project, Nong Rong said 47 projects under this corridor have already been started or completed while in the next phase the two countries are stepping up cooperation in industry, agriculture, health, science and technology sectors. He said Pakistan's agricultural trade surplus with China reached 640 million dollars last year and is expected to exceed 4 billion dollars this year.



Banks to get punishment for over charging on LCs: Pasha

Ghous Pasha wowed on Friday to give exemplary punishment to the commercial bank who were over charging on Letter of Credits (LCs) payments. Briefing the Senate Standing Committee on Finance and Revenue the minister of state said that the banks responsible for over charging would be fined heavily so that they should avoid such actions in future. The meeting of the committee was held under the chairmanship of Senator Saleem Mandviwalla. Governor State (Bank of Pakistan SBP) Jameel Ahmed said that when the commercial banks faced shortage of dollars they started charging extra dollars on payments of LCs. He said that the Central Bank had thoroughly investigated the matter.

Senator Kamil Ali Agha enquired whether the businessmen who were over charged would get back their money. The governor SBP said that they would not get their money back but action would be taken against the banks involved in the matter. Senator Faisal Raheem proposed to cancel the license of the concerned banks. The Governor SBP said that for 80% LCs, the banks don't need our permission while permission for 20% of LCs was obligatory. He said that the payments of LCs of up to \$100,000 would start this month. Chairman Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) Asim Ahmad briefed the committee about the issue of dismissal of daily

wages employees of Pakistan Customs in Balochistan. He informed the committee that in Balochistan "we needed around 30 helpers adding that some employees were given employment for 3 months and some for 6 months. He said that these were local based and engaged in contract-based employment adding that they were paid from the special fund of Customs. The Chairman highlighted that around 15 employees of them misused their powers and on the report of the agencies, we have dismissed 15 employees. Senator Kamran Murtaza asked FBR to provide relevant documents in this regards next meeting. The Chairman FBR also explain the committee on containers stuck at Port-Qasim due to custom. He said that around 2800 containers are stranded at Port Qasim due to various issues including unopened LCs and import ban. He said that 100% surcharge has been imposed on some containers resultant the peoples do not want to take out containers by paying surcharge. Governor SBP said that more than 500 containers have been cleared and gradually this problem will be solved. Among others the meeting was attended by Minister of State for Finance Dr. Aisha Ghous Pasha, Senators Mohsin Aziz, Faisal Saleem Rehman, Dilawar Khan, Kamran Murtaza, Kamil Ali Agha, Fida Muhammad, Hidayat Ullah, officials of Finance Division and FBR are also participating in the meeting. – APP

US Envoy for overcoming climate, agri challenges

United States exported \$700 million in cotton to Pakistan, whose textile makers turned around and sent \$4.6 billion in textiles back to United States

LAHORE: US Ambassador to Pakistan Donald Blome has said that the U.S.- Pakistan Green Alliance will help meet climate and agricultural productivity challenges of the present and future. Speaking at the Oil Seeds Summit at a local hotel on Friday, he said the U.S. soy industry has a great story to tell about U.S. farmers' sustainable stewardship of soil and water resources, and "I'm sure that U.S. representatives will be excited to share that story with their partners here in Pakistan. Highlighting the U.S. soybeans' contribu-

tion to Pakistan's food security and the important partnership between U.S. soybean producers and Pakistani soy processors, he discussed at length the "robust economic relationship" between the two countries. As part of his visit to promote the U.S.-Pakistan bilateral partnership in agriculture, trade, and economy, the en-

voy met with representatives from the All Pakistan Textile Mills Association (APTMA) to discuss how to deepen the already thriving relationship between Punjab's textile sector and U.S. cotton producers. He said one of the great economic success stories of the U.S.-Pakistan partnership is the relationship between U.S. cotton and Pakistani textile producers - and this success is centered in Punjab. Blome said, "The two-way trade in cotton and textiles was \$5.3 billion in 2021, which is more than half of the \$8.9 billion trade between our nations.'

He said the United States exported \$700 million in cotton to Pakistan, whose textile makers turned around and sent \$4.6 billion in textiles back to the United States. This two-way trade keeps growing, and it is centered in Punjab. Ambassador Blome also met officials of the Corteva - a U.S. agrisciences company, and learned how U.S. hybrid seed corn is contributing to Punjab's farmers' yields and incomes. He said the United States is working with Winrock International on a \$20 million agricultural development project to strengthen the agricultural sector in Southern Punjab. Ambassador Blome also interacted with farmers from the Southern Punjab and listened to their problems. He said the project will improve their horticultural crop outputs via this U.S. Department of Agriculture-funded project.
