

PDM parties fail to evolve a consensus

PPP in favour of talks, JUI, Bugti say Imran Khan is not reliable

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan Democratic Movement (PDM) parties failed to evolve a consensus whether to hold talks with the PTI or not during a meeting chaired by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, on Tuesday. According to sources, the PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari categorically stated that PPP was a democratic party and thus believed in talks with all political players. He added, the country was passing through a difficult phase that required all political forces to join hands in order to rid the country out of crises. Bilawal further said his party was ready for talks with all parties including the PTI provided the PTI leadership shows maturity and seriousness.

Bilawal was supported by Khalid Magsi and Moshin Dawar. The JUI spearheaded by Maulana Fazal ur Rehman nevertheless seemed adamant with its stand of not undertaking any negotiations with Imran Khan. The JUI leadership was of the view that Imran Khan was not a serious person therefore there was no point in talking to him. KABUL: The number of Afghans in poverty nearly doubled to 34 million as the nation was racked by the collapse of the US-backed government and the Taliban takeover, the United Nations said Tuesday. Vast foreign subsidies were halted and aid programmes dramatically cut back after the US-backed republic fell in 2021 as many countries refused to deal with the Taliban

authorities in Kabul. Those NGOs still providing vital help were dealt a further blow in December last year by a Taliban government order barring Afghan wom-en from working for them. The curb was extended this month to the UN's Afghan female employees and the organisation said it faces an "appalling choice" over whether to continue its aid schemes.

Pakistan shares plan to secure \$3bn with IMF

ISLAMABAD: The coalition government on Tuesday shared its plan with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) for securing an additional \$3 billion to bridge the financing gap as it expedites efforts to convince the lender to release the next loan tranche, media reported citing sources. The IMF is seeking "necessary" financing assurances at the earliest to conclude talks with Pakistan on its stalled bailout, Fund's mission chief for Pakistan, Nathan Porter, confirmed last week. The IMF had asked Pakistan to arrange

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shahbaz Sharif has lauded Chief of Army Staff (COAS) General Asim Munir's efforts for securing financial commitments from friendly countries, one of the last conditions set by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to unfreeze a \$6.5 billion credit line.

The prime minister's statement came days after Finance Minister Ishaq Dar had announced that the United Arab Emirates had given an assurance to the IMF for a \$1 billion loan to Islamabad. Saudi Arabia had already made assurances for a \$2 billion loan, according to the finance ministry.. Addressing a meeting of the ruling coalition

parties here on Tuesday, the prime minister said the IMF agreement was in its final phase as securing loans from friendly countries to bridge the external financing gap was the one of the last conditions to revive the stalled \$6.5 billion bailout package.

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif Tuesday approved the appointment of new envoys of Pakistan to various countries. As per official sources the premier had given nod to the appointment of 19 envoys and one counsel general while objection was raised on two names. The summary was sent by Foreign Minister Bilawal Bhutto Zardari to the prime minister for approval.

Dr Faisal, who is currently serving in Berlin, has been posted as new high commissioner to Britain while Dr Bilal will be Pakistan's new permanent ambassador to the United Nations office at Geneva. Source said, Ayesha Ali appointed as new envoy to Prague, Ibrar Hussain to Kenya, Javed Imran to Tunisia, Khalid Hussain to Algeria, while

Mian Atif Sharif has been posted as ambassador to Ethiopia. Pakistan's permanent representative in Geneva, Khalil Hashmi, will be posted as ambassador to Russia. Mudassar Tipu, Zeeshan

Ahmed and Saqib Rauf will be the new ambassadors in Tehran, Iraq and Bahrain, respectively. Pakistan's high commissioner in Kenya Syeda Saqlain was posted as ambassador to Germany.

Shah and Ahmed Maruf will be Pakistan's new ambassadors to Malaysia and Bangladesh, respectively. Pakistan's ambassador to Saudi Arabia, Amir Khurram Rathore, was posted as Pakistan's new ambassador to Indonesia. Pakistan's ambassador to Denmark Ahmed Farooq was posted as Pakistan's new ambassador to Saudi Arabia. The posting of Aamer Ahmed Atozai as consul general in New York was also approved. After the objection, the two names were removed from the summary and the appointment of all the remaining envoys was approved. ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has appointed Senator Talha Mahmood as federal minister for of religious affairs and interfaith harmony.

"In terms of rule 3(4) of the Rules of Business, 1973, the Prime Minister has been pleased to assign the additional portfolio of Religious Affairs and Interfaith Harmony to Senator Muhammad Talha Mahmood, Federal Minister for State and Frontier Regions, with immediate effect," reads the notification.

He has replaced the late Mufti Abdul Shakoor who lost his life in a road accident in the federal capital on April 16. Earlier, a police report, establishing causes of Mr Shakoor's death, had said that a speeding vehicle crashed into his car that resulted in his death. The vehicle that crashed into the JUI-F leader's car was going over the speed limit, the report said. A case had been lodged with the Secretariat police station on the complaint of JUI leader Haji Qudratullah.-APP

Remission in sentences for prisoners on Eid

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Alvi on Tuesday approved remission in sentences for prisoners on the occasion of Eid ul Fitr.

The president approved the remission of 90 days in exercise of the Article 45 of the Constitution, the President House said.

The relief will be applicable to male prisoners above 65 years, who have completed their one-third sentence.

The remission will also be applied to the female prisoners aged above 60 years, who have completed their one-third sentence. Likewise, the prisoners under the age of 18 years, who have completed their onethird sentence, would also be eligible for availing the relief. However, the remission will not apply to those convicted of capital punishment, espionage, rape, anti-state activities, kidnapping, and terrorism, incurring loss to national exchequer, financial crimes, and robbery.—DNA

The power sector must be focused on overcoming the energy trilemma revolving around the availability, accessibility, and affordability of electricity, said Sadia Dada. For that, power industry must integrate new solutions and ensure targeted investments, she added. While drawing on the modelling of the power system undertaken by K-Electric (KE), she said that since privatization the company

ment of 474 billion rupees - six times more than its profit - across its value chain that has resulted in doubling its customer base from 1.8 million to 3.4 million, increasing its energy supplies from 2,200 MW to 3,380 MW, and reducing its transmission and distribution (T&D) losses from 34.2% to 15.3% which surpasses the target set by NEPRA for the year. plans to invest additional 484 billion rupees for the next seven years, which would add 2,172 MW in its generation capacity, including 1,182 MW of renewables. Through its investment plan 2030, KE aims to introduce more innovations in its distribution segment, such as Advanced Distribution Management System, mobile workforce management, Geographical Information Systems (GIS),

and Advance Analytics & Artificial Intelligence that would translate into improved customer experience through faster resolution, fewer interruptions, and enhanced capacity.

Salahuddin Rifai highlighted that technology and digitization ideas have often been wrongly tackled by the power sector. Consequently, all the costs and expenses are borne by consumers, making the affordability goal futile. He stressed a consumer-oriented power sector and optimization of cost. Also, as effective use of resources and ideas requires energy experts' input, a professional board must be developed to advise the government in planning, he added. To establish greater power security in Pakistan, there is a need to systematize wholly with an improved approach, said Mazhar Ranjha. Case studies on different aspects, including tariff indexation, investments, planning, digital transformation, etc. must be done to derive workable solutions.

SC moved for disqualification of President

ISLAMABAD: A plea has been filed with the Supreme Court seeking the disqualification of President Arif Alvi.The petition, moved by citizen Chaudhry Muhammad Imtiaz, sought the disqualification of President Dr Arif Alvi under Article 41.

According to the petition, President Arif Alvi is violating his oath by working on the directions of one political party. He pleaded with the court to immediately remove Alvi from the top office. Back in March this year, a similar disqualification plea was filed against Arif Alvi which was turned down by the Supreme Court of Pakistan. A two-member bench headed by Justice Iiaz-ul-Ahsan heard the petition filed by a citizen, Zahoor Mehndi, under Article 62 1(F) of the Constitution. The petitioner raised six objections to his candidature, and one of them was that at the time of the presidential election, he (Alvi) was an under-trial accused and was not eligible for the presidency.

FCAA welcome end of regulatory duty on imports

Frontier Custom Agents Association (FCAA), Zia-ul-Haq Sarhadi has welcomed the decision taken by the government of abolishing 100 percent duty on import of used cars and some other items. In a press statement issued here on Tuesday, Ziaul-Haq Sarhadi said the decision will provide a big relief to price hike stricken consumers and businessmen of the country. The federal government, Zia added, had taken a decision in November 2022 of enforcing 100 percent duty to discourage import of used cars and to benefit local manufacturers of cars, but the decision did not yield fruitful results.

They urged; Government should pay heed to matter by incorporating criminology as primary qualification for such advertised positions. Moreover, they appreciated NACTA authorities' initiative for incorporating criminology degree

NEPRA notifies reduction in power tariff

ISLAMABAD: Electric Power Regulatory Authority (NEPRA) on Tuesday notified a 0.0006 paisa per unit reduction in power tariff for WAPDA power distribution companies under the monthly fuel adjustment mechanism (FCA) for February.

The Central Power Purchasing Agency (CP-PA-G) on behalf of XW-DISCO has requested 85 paisa increase in the tariff for the said period, said a notification. The Authority had conducted a public hearing into the matter on March 30 with Chairman NEPRA in the Chair. Earlier, the FCA for January was charged as 48 paisa. The FCA for February would be charged 48 paisa less as compared to January. The FCA would be applicable to the billing month of April, the notification said. It would also be applicable to all consumers except lifeline, agri, domestic consumers using up to 300 units, electric vehicle charging stations, and K-Electric. -APP

Overseas ministry to establish protectorate offices

ISLAMABAD: Parliamentary Secretary of Overseas Pakistanis and Human Resource Development Syed Agha Rafiullah on Tuesday informed the National Assembly that a summary has been moved to establish protectorate of emigrant offices in all the major cities. Responding to a calling attention notice regarding non-availability of protectorate of emigrant offices in Sukkur, Bannu, Abbottabad and Gilgit-Baltistan, he said, "Keeping in view the importance, the Ministry has moved a summary to establish offices in all the major cities and minster himself would introduce it to the federal cabinet for the approval soon.'

He informed the members that former Prime Minister Imran Khan has shifted Abbottabad protectorate of the emigrant office to Sawat on the request of the then communication minister.

He said that the minister of Overseas Pakistan had carried out visits to various countries to explore more job opportunities for Pakistanis. "Agreements with various counties are in the pipeline and these would be finalized soon" he added.

He said that talks with Malta, Korea and Japan are also underway to accommodate more Pakistanis in these countries.

He said that all the information regarding availability of job opportunities abroad is for the information of the public. Responding to another question, he claimed that during the previous regime Imran Khan's front man committed corruption in the overseas ministry. The Speaker National Assembly Raja Pervaiz Ashraf referred the matter to the concern committee for detailed dis-

Alvi directs reimbursement of health insurance claim

The President in his decision stated that the onus to prove the pre-existing ailment rested upon the petitioner company and the repudiation of the insurance claim required unimpeachable evidence

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Alvi has upheld the decision of the Federal Insurance Ombudsman (FIO) directing an insurance company to reimburse the full health insurance amount of 57,172 Australian Dollars (AUD) to a citizen, who had been denied the insured amount on flimsy grounds, within 30 days.

(Fahad complainant Mahmood) had obtained a Worldwide Travel Insurance Policy from a company (United Insurance Company of Pakistan Ltd) for his father to travel to Australia with a sum assured of USD 50,000 for Medical Expenses and Hospitalization Abroad.

During his stay in Australia, his father was admitted to hospitals twice and was treated for a few days. He filed the health insurance claim but the company only honoured the claim for his father's first admission to the hospital in Australia. The second admission claim was denied on the ground that his father was admitted the second time due to pre-existing ailments (chronic kidney disease, chronic heart failure, diabetes, benign prostate hypertrophy and hypertension) which he did not disclose at the time of obtaining the policy from the company. Feeling aggrieved, the complainant approached the FIO for relief, which passed the order in his favour. Subsequently, the company filed a representation with the President against FIO's order, which was rejected.

The President in his decision stated that the onus to prove the pre-existing ailment rested upon the petitioner company and the repudiation of the insurance claim required unimpeachable evidence regarding the existence of the alleged pre-existing ailment and its knowledge by the policyholder. "No clinical investigation or diagnostic assessment has been produced by the petitioner company to prove the factum of pre-existing ailment", he added. The President further held that FIO had rightly observed that "the business of insurance obliges the company to ensure the protection of the

interests of insurance policyholders. Due diligence is required to be carried out by the respondent company before the issuance of policy as it relates to the policy applicants' health, belongings and life. Without going through due process, the issuance of policy creates such situations. After getting his policy issued, a policyholder considers himself covered against various eventualities. A policyholder travelling abroad can come across health issues in a foreign land requiring urgent medical cover, which is exactly the purpose of the travel insurance policy".

The President said that the company was a well-established organization and it had all means at its disposal to ascertain pre-existing ailments before issuing the policy. He observed that the company had accepted the first admission claim without any objection but it took the plea of a pre-existing ailment while repudiating the second admission claim unjustifiably without producing cogent material to corroborate its stance. He further observed that the repudiation of the second admission claim on flimsy ground, while honouring the first admission claim, constituted maladministration on the part of the company, which was unjust, unreasonable and based on irrelevant grounds.

The President, therefore, upheld FIO's order and rejected the company's representation.

He said the whole nation saluted the services of the martyrs. The president also saluted the martyrs for their duty and bravery. He also thanked the families of the martyrs on behalf of the whole nation. President Alvi offered sympathies with the families of the martyrs and prayed to Allah Almighty for courage to bear this irreparable loss. He also prayed for elevation of ranks of the martyrs in paradise.— DNA

Rehmani condemns killing of lawmaker

ISLAMABAD, Apr 18 (AP-P):Jammu and Kashmir People's Freedom League Chairman Muhammad Farooq Rehmani has condemned the live TV murder of four-time lawmaker Atiq Ahmad and his brother Ashraf Ahmad in Uttar Pradesh, India, where police failed to protect them amidst reports of anti-Muslim violence.

The attacker allegedly shouted anti-Muslim slogans while the brothers were handcuffed and the police failed to protect them during a medical check-up in broad daylight.

Rehmani expressed deep concern over the increasing incidents of anti-Muslim violence in India and warned of a humanitarian crisis if the world fails to act. He urged immediate intervention to stop the slaughter of Indian Muslims.

He stated that Indian Muslims were being slaughtered like animals in their own homeland by the RSS Rashtriva Swavamsevak Sangh) gangs without any intervention from the international community. Rehmani added that the only fault of Indian Muslims was their belief in Islam, and "this was being used to justify their persecution".

Moreover, he highlighted that while in the Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIOJK), Kashmiris were being targeted for demanding the right of self-determination, the demographic changes were being made to alter the Muslim majority character of the state. Rehmani warned that such atrocities could lead to a severe humanitarian crisis and urged the world community to take immediate action to stop the ongoing violence against Indian Muslims. Commenting on the 2019 Pulwama attack, he stated that the revelations made by Satya Pal Malik, former

governor of IIOJK, had vindicated Pakistan's stance and confirmed that the attack was a part of the terrorism bogey used to enact fake encounters against the youth of Kashmir. Rehmani accused India of violating promises made with the people of Jammu and Kashmir and international humanitarian law, as well as failing to protect the rights of Indian Muslims according to the Nehru-Liaqat Pact. –**APP**

RAWALPINDI: The Food Department Rawalpindi and district police here on Tuesday foiled three bids to smuggle 2275 flour and 60 fine flour (maida) bags. According to a district administration spokesman, the authorities of the food department along with Potohar Division police conducted raids in different areas and rounded up three namely Noor ul Amin, Ghulam Naveed and Aminullah. He informed that the accused were trying to smuggle wheat flour bags out of Rawalpindi division. The Food Department Rawalpindi and district police on the directives of Deputy Commissioner (DC) and City Police Officer, Rawalpindi were strictly monitoring all the exit points of Rawalpindi district to foil wheat and flour smuggling bids, he added.—APP

IMF continues to ignore many distressed countries

ISLAMABAD: Saifuddin Sheikh, Executive Director of Pakistan Economy Watch (PEW) on Tuesday said the IMF is sitting on more than 1000 billion dollars but it is constantly ignoring many poor countries that are stuck in difficulties.

The policies of the lender are affecting its influence and reputation, and many countries are not listening to it. he said.

Saifuddin Sheikh said that despite massive capital, the international organisation is ignoring many countries that are asking for one to three billion dollars, which is reducing confidence in this institution.

The IMF continues to alter its conditions for loans for political gains; therefore, it would be better to call it the Western Monetary Fund instead of the International Monetary Fund because it has focused on the development of western countries. The business leader said that many countries are frustrated with the IMF and are now looking to China for loans.

Currently, 65 countries

have to return 15 percent of their external debt to China. And in the case of Pakistan, about 30 percent of its external debt is taken from China, which is increasing. He said that the IMF never presses poor countries to raise taxes on the privileged class; it always targets the common man.

The IMF has been subject to a range of criticisms, generally focused on the conditions of its loans; it has also been criticised for its lack of accountability and willingness to lend to countries that are known for corruption of rulers and wastage of funds.

The IMF always stresses reducing government borrowing, increasing taxes and interest rates, and lowering spending. It also calls for allowing failing firms to go bankrupt. Its structural adjustment, privatisation, and deregulation have seldom worked as expected. He recalled that during the Asian crisis of 1997, many countries such as Indonesia, Malaysia, and Thailand were required by the IMF to pursue tight monetary and fiscal policies to reduce their budget deficits and strengthen exchange rates. However, these policies caused a serious recession with very high levels of unemployment in these countries, which was a failure of the lender.

He noted that it is very difficult for a country to develop under the IMF's umbrella, which is why the number of countries that take help from it is reducing. No country can develop

until it implements such reforms and policies in such a manner that it no longer need loans from the IMF and other international institutions, he observed.

IRSA releases 110,500 **cusecs water**

ISLAMABAD: The Indus River System Authority (IRSA) on Tuesday re-leased 110,500 cusecs of water from various rim stations with an inflow of 102,300 cusecs. According to the data released by IRSA, the water level in River Indus at Tarbela Dam was 1434.37 feet and was 36.37 feet higher than its dead level of 1,398 feet. Water inflow in the dam was recorded as 32,200 cusecs while the outflow as 35,000 cusecs. The water level in River Jhelum at Mangla Dam was 1106.30 feet, 56.30 feet higher than its dead level of 1,050 feet. The inflow and outflow of water were recorded as 32,600 cusecs and 38,000 cusecs respectively. The release of water at Kalabagh, Taunsa, Guddu and Sukkur was recorded as 39,600, 31,900, 25.500 and 6,000 cusecs respectively. Similarly, from River Kabul, a total of 21,700 cusecs of water was released at Nowshera and 7,900 cusecs were released from River Chenab at Marala.—APP

ANF seizes over 6765 kg drugs worth US\$ 355.112 mn

ISLAMABAD, Apr 18 (APP):Anti-Narcotics Force (ANF) seized 6765.499 kg drugs, worth US\$ 355.112 million and arrested 29 persons including one Woman and impounded 15 vehicles while conducting 36 counter narcotics operations throughout the country.

According to spokesperson of the ANF, the seized drugs comprised 3724.670 Kg Opium, 75.743 Kg Heroin, 1080.209 Kg Hashish, 88.355 Kg Methamphetamine (Ice), 16,700 Kg Amphetamine, 1720 Kg Ketamine, 58 Kg Volume Tabs (170000 x Tablets) and 1.822 Kg Diazepam Tabs (10040 x Tablets) and 120 x Liters Liquid Amphetamine. ANF Balochistan recovered 4742.88 Kg Drugs in 7 operations while arrested 6 persons involved in drugs smuggling and impounded 4 vehicles. The seized drugs comprised 3716.670 Kg Opium, 64 Kg Heroin, 878.510 Kg Hashish, 67 Kg Methamphetamine (Ice), 16.700 Kg Amphetamine, and 120 x Liters Liquid Amphetamine. ANF Punjab recovered 1757.045 Kg Drugs in 8 operations while arrested 9 persons including 1 x woman involved in drugs smuggling and impounded 6 vehicles. The seized drugs comprised 3.600 Kg Opium, 9.075 Kg Heroin, 23.160 Kg Hashish, 1.210 Kg Methamphetamine (Ice) and 1720 Kg Ketamine. ANF Khyber Pakhtunkhwa recovered 149.245 Kg Drugs in 9 operations while arrested 4 persons involved in drugs smuggling and impounded a vehicle. The seized drugs comprised 2.400 Kg Opium, 0.581Kg Heroin, 128.764 Kg Hashish and 17.500 Kg Methamphetamine (Ice). ANF Sindh recovered 62.525 Kg Drugs in 4 operations while arrested 3 persons involved in drugs smuggling and impounded 3 vehicles. The seized drugs comprised 1.550 Kg Heroin, 2.975 Kg Hashish and 58 Kg Volume Tabs (170000 x Tablets). ANF North recovered 53.804 Kg drugs in 8 operations, arrested 7 persons in drugs smuggling and impounded a vehicle. The seized drugs comprised 2 Kg Opium, 0.537 Kg Heroin, 46.800 Kg Hashish, 2.645 Kg Methamphetamine (Ice) and 1.822 Kg Diazepam Tabs (10040 x Tablets). –APP

Wheat output increases 1.6%

ISLAMABAD: Federal Committee on Agriculture (FCA) was apprised that owing to the incentives introduced by the incumbent government to mitigate the adverse impact of catastrophic floods and torrential rains during the last moon soon season and to revive the local agriculture sector, the output of Rabi crops witnessed significant growth. The FCA which met with Secretary Ministry of National Food Security and Research Zafar Hassan was told that wheat output during the Rabi season 2022-23 increased by 1.6 per cent as compared to the production of last year and total output was estimated at 26.81 million tons.

The high-power committee which, is mandated to oversee strategic measures for ensuring food security in the country was apprised that wheat crop was sown over 9.0 million hectares to fulfil the local staple food requirements as well as for keeping the strategic reserves. While, the committee observed that the potato production during the season grew by 1.9% as compared to the output of last year, whereas the total production was recorded at 7.9 million tons. During the season the potatoes were cultivated on over 0.3 million hectares. The tomato production for 2022-23 is estimated at 563.6 thousand tons from an area of 45.7 thousand hectares, there is an increase in production of 1.2% over the last year.—APP

ith the majority of it dedicated to coordinating their actions to help the United States safeguard its hegemony, the joint communique issued on Tuesday upon the conclusion of the three-day G7 foreign ministers' meeting in Karuizawa, Japan, points to the fact that the club of the richest economies is allowing itself to be "Natolized" by Washington as a geopolitical tool of the US.

Despite the great lengths they have gone to hide the sword sheathed in a scabbard decorated with partner-competitor-rival motifs, that China was listed as one of the 11 "pressing global challenges", along with the Ukraine crisis and nuclear issues of Iran and the Korean Peninsula, clearly demonstrates the US-led club's true intent.

That many China-related issues are included in the joint statement — including the Taiwan question, the maritime disputes in South China Sea, alleged "human rights issues" in Xinjiang, Tibet and Hong Kong, cyberspace governance and trade frictions — only serves to give the impression that the document was drafted by Washington and Tokyo together before it was toned down by the rest.

While claiming it is their "intention to promote human security and continue building a global community that leaves no one behind", what the document reinforces is that it is the actions of the US and its allies that are the true challenges to peace and stability.

At the same time, the US is leaving no stone unturned to obstruct China's negotiations with regional countries over the maritime disputes in the South China Sea, which, to Washington's embarrassment, have made remarkable progress, among which is the agreement that no external forces should be allowed to interfere in the disputing parties' efforts to settle regional affairs.

If there is truly no change in their basic positions on the Taiwan question, including their upholding of the one-China principle, they would not have aired their support for the Chinese island to participate in some world bodies, which has been vetoed year after year by the international community. They know that the renewed support will embolden the diehard secessionists on the island to stick to their cause, as elbowing the island into the door of some international organizations as a parallel with sovereign states is something they have sought to do for years. All this being said, and given the growing aggressiveness of the increasingly "Natolized" G7, it begs the question, which countries are the ones not acting in accordance with their obligations under international laws.

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Blaming China not enough

If there is a problem in the United States, you can bet your bottom dollar that rather than getting to grips with it, the default action will be to blame China. It doesn't matter what stripe the administration is. Such is the case with the deadly synthetic opioid, fentanyl, that kills tens of thousands of Americans each year.

According to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 107,735 Americans died from a drug overdose between August 2021 and August 2022, two-thirds of them due to an overdose of a synthetic opioid, mainly fentanyl. Yet despite it claiming to favor cooperation with China to crack down on narcotics and the fact that China takes a very tough line against illicit drugs, the US pointed a finger at China being the source of the problem, indicting and sanctioning Chinese individuals and entities on April 14 for their claimed "involvement" in fentanyl precursor chemicals. China has done all that can be done to curb the illicit trade in fentanyl. It officially added fentanyl to the Supplementary List of Controlled Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances with Non-medical Use in May 2019, a key move in preventing the illicit manufacturing, trafficking and abuse of the substance. That the US' move is a political one rather than a practical one is evidenced by the fact that the US is blaming China for exporting "fentanyl precursors", which are in fact only ordinary chemicals sold through normal trade.

As Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Wang Wenbin said at a regular news briefing, "instead of reducing domestic drug demand, strengthening prescription drug control, and enhancing education, the US tries to confuse the public, mislead the public, and shift responsibility for its own ineffective governance". Contrary to its claims, "China, in the spirit of humanitarianism, has been trying to help the US as best it can".

Indeed, according to the US Customs and Border Protection, the United States has seized no fentanyl-related substances from China since their scheduling. The latest accusations by the US have shifted to link China with Mexico, claiming that China is shipping precursor chemicals to the country, where drug cartels produce the lethal drug and smuggle it overland into the US. Yet China has not received any report or data from Mexico on the use of Chinese precursor chemicals for drug production there, nor has the US provided any evidence about the flow of Chinese chemicals into Mexico for fentanyl production. May 9 marks the second National Fentanyl Awareness Day in the US. If US politicians mean to save US lives, it is time for them to do something that really helps tackle the problem rather than just making China the scapegoat.

S President Joe Biden's visit to Belfast last week inevitably drew comparisons with key interventions made by fellow Democratic President Bill Clinton in the Northern Ireland Peace Process more than two decades ago.

Clinton's three visits — in 1995, 1998 and 2000 — were widely viewed as being instrumental first in nudging unionists and republicans toward a deal, and then in keeping the 1998 Good Friday Agreement alive during the turbulent months and years after it was signed.

Observers in Belfast, Dublin and London, as well as interested parties further afield, hope that Biden's visit will have a similarly galvanizing effect on politics in the province which, once again, appear to be deadlocked. Biden, of course, lacks the pull of Clinton. As one Irish civilian who witnessed both presidents' visits told The Guardian: "Clinton was charismatic, like a film star. Biden is ... older."

Thankfully, Northern Ireland is in a very different place now compared with when Clinton first visited. The peace agreement has held for 25 years despite numerous challenges along the way. It is perfectly possible that Biden's intervention will do the trick – aided by the \$6 billion of investment in the province he has promised reluctant unionists if they return to the power-sharing agreement. Even so, it is hard not to reflect that, in addition to lacking the charisma of Clinton, Biden also does not bring the same power projection enjoyed by his presidential counterpart in the 1990s. This is not a question of personality, per se, but rather of the different global reality in which Biden operates. While Clinton could charm the people of Northern Ireland toward a settlement as head of unquestionably the most powerful state on earth, and leader of a victorious West, Biden instead leads a divided US and a weakened West. Clinton's intervention was part of a wider global American agenda in the 1990s and 2000s. Successive presidents pursued a liberal global hegemony that fre-

quently promoted its two values of neo-liberal capitalism and democracy. Unchallenged by any serious rivals after the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991, this "unipolar" moment allowed Clinton to intervene in Bosnia, Sierra Leone and the Israel-Palestine peace process, though he would later be criticized for not acting to prevent the genocide in Rwanda. Tony Blair, the former British prime minister and one of the original architects of the Good Friday Agreement, proved to be a partner in US activism after his election to the British premiership in 1997. While Clinton and Blair would later be criticized, rightly, for some aspects of their liberal interventionism, their actions reflected a period of unparalleled Western confidence, belief, and power. Fast forward to 2023, and Biden is not operating from the same commanding position. The US remains the most powerful state in the world but it is far from unchallenged. China is close to matching it economically, if not militarily, while Russia is more combative than it was in the 1990s. Moscow's invasion of Ukraine has shown the limits of Western power in today's multipolar world. Only Western states have joined Washington's sanctions on Russia, while almost all states in Asia, South America, Africa and the Middle East have declined to do so. While Clinton came to Northern Ireland keen to heal Britain and Ireland's long-running problem and to boost the Western coalition as it pursued a US-led "New World Order," Biden's challenge is simply keeping the fragile Western coalition together. Indeed, Biden would be justified in feeling frustrated that he needs to intervene at all. The Northern Irish stalemate that threatens peace in the province has come about because of Brexit, a damaging goal for the Western coalition in which two of Washington's allies, Britain and the EU, have turned on one another in mutual recrimination. At a time when Biden would rather these key Western partners were uniting to face down

shared Russian and Chinese threats, years of wrangling and recriminations over Brexit have only made the Western alliance more fractious. Britain's new Conservative Prime Minister Rishi Sunak has adopted a more conciliatory approach than his more anti-EU predecessors, but Biden will be well aware that Sunak himself was a leading Brexiteer and signed off on the confrontation with Brussels when he was chancellor.

Biden has welcomed Sunak as a security partner in the new anti-China AUKUS alliance between the US, the UK and Australia, but this is no Blair-Clinton or Blair-Bush partnership. Brexit has made Britain less powerful and less relevant to the US and, as a result, has weakened the Western coalition. Of course, Brexit was not the only act of Western self-sabotage that has weakened the global position of the US and its allies. Bush and Blair's invasion of Iraq was arguably the beginning of the decline, followed by the financial crash of 2008 and Western governments' reactions to it. Former President Barack Obama's unwillingness to enforce his chemical weapons red line in Syria in 2013 damaged perceptions of American power, while the election of Donald Trump in 2016, and the divisive nature of US politics that followed also damaged American credibility. The constant news bulletins reporting on mass shootings and angry pro- and anti-Trump rallies continue to hit US soft power. The world has moved on since Clinton's charismatic visits to Northern Ireland, and the West is now weaker. Biden is not responsible for this, as many of the developments were before his time and/or beyond his control, but it is the reality he faces nonetheless.

As US president he might still be able to persuade recalcitrant unionists but circumstances mean he is not promoting the positive vision of the future that Clinton did. Biden's goal is merely to hold the fragile Western order together, not sell it to the world as Clinton did.

fter 27 years climbing a mountain of Islamophobic bias, America appears to have taken a step back. The intake staff of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the nation's largest Muslim civil liberties and advocacy organisation, received 5,156 total complaints in 2022. This represents a 23 percent decrease since the previous year.It is the first recorded decline since we started tracking such data in 1995. Perhaps, we have summitted the mountaintop of bias directed at American Muslims, and while we are still way up where the eagles fly, we are, nevertheless, entitled to some hope. Complaints about law enforcement and government overreach dropped by 38 percent. Given that we reported a 32 percent total complaint increase in the first year of the Trump presidency, the change of administration in Washington may have played a role. The fallout of the January 6 insurrection in 2022, during which the seat of the US Congress was ransacked, may have contributed as well. For years, white supremacists and antigovernment groups enjoyed political cover. Republican-driven political correctness ensured that staff at the Departments of Justice and Homeland Security knew that focusing on groups unrelated to the Muslim community could have negative implications for their careers. After January 6, it is possible that overbroad law

After January 6, it is possible that overbroad law enforcement surveillance and informants deployed against law-abiding Muslims may have decreased, as such law enforcement agencies directed their focus toward actual threats. In educational settings the picture remains troubling. School incidents of Islam-ophobia rose by 63 percent in 2022. Among them was the case of a Florida teacher interrupting praying Muslim students and accusing them of doing "magic". She told them she was "interrupting the floor" and almost stepped on a child, as she walked over the group's prayer mats while the children were still

engaging in prayer. There was also the case of an employee at a Maryland school who allegedly locked an Afghan Muslim ninth grader in a bathroom where the child was beaten by other students. A week later the student still had a severe concussion. But there have been also positive developments in the education and sport sectors. Public officials in Ohio and Maryland enacted laws designed to protect athletes who observe their religious beliefs while competing. This came after student athletes Noor Abukaram and Je'Nan Hayes were disqualified from high school sports competitions in the two states for wearing headscarves. In 2021, Illinois became the first state to protect religious athletes in this manner. We encourage legislators in other states to follow suit. In other spheres, challenges remain. Banking while Muslim continues to be a struggle for many, as financial institutions continue closing or not opening bank accounts for people based on their choice of religion. Why? Because existing legislation, such as the Patriot Act, allows such discrimination to take place. Last year, 22 US lawmakers concurred in an open letter, noting, "Countless US individuals, businesses, and charities have been victims of discriminatory policies and practices that appear to limit their access to financial services because of their religion or national origin." In March, the Institute for Social Policy and Understanding (ISPU) reported that 27 percent of the Muslims they surveyed reported facing challenges from financial institutions. It is all legal so no lawsuit can clear up this inclination to discriminatory practice. That is why, the US government must take action; it is time for the Biden administra-

tion and banking regulators to update account

monitoring practices put in place over the last

20 years to ensure that financial institutions no

longer see it as beneficial to discriminate against certain types of customers – mainly Muslim, Iranian and Arab Americans.

Another area that needs urgent attention is freedom of speech. Many American Muslims participate in the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) movement to help pressure Israel to treat Palestinians with dignity and in accordance with its obligations under international law. So far 35 states have passed anti-BDS legislation and many others are considering such bills. Last year, there was a positive development in Texas, which has had an anti-BDS law in place since 2017 requiring local government contractors to sign a certification that they do not support the boycott of Israel. In January 2022, a judge ruled in favour of Rasmy Hassouna, the owner of an engineering company, who had sued the city of Houston for trying to impose an anti-BDS clause in his contract with the city administration. After the ruling, Hassouna was able to sign the contract without the clause.

From Page 01 The United Nations De-Programme (UNDP) released on Tuesday a stark new assessment of 2022 data estimating 34 million Afghans were living below the poverty line.

The figure is a staggering increase of 15 million on 2020, the last full year of rule by the Western-backed government that crumbled in a matter of weeks the following summer. There is no contemporary census data for Afghanistan but the UN uses a population estimate of 40 million, meaning 85 percent of the nation is projected to be in poverty.

"Some have been compelled to sell their homes, land or assets that gener ate income," the UNDP report said. The UN airlifts vast sums of US dollars into Afghanistan to pay staff and operating costs - cash injections that have also been vital in shoring up the nation's faltering economy.

Calling Chelsea broken 'a bit much' - Lampard

LONDON: Saying that Chelsea are currently "broken" is "a bit much", says their interim manager Frank Lampard. The Blues sacked manager Graham Potter earlier this month with the team 11th in the Premier League, despite spending more than £550m on players this season. The Champions League is the last competition they can win this season but they trail Real Madrid 2-0 before Tuesday's quarter-final second leg. "We are not where we want to be. That's clear," said Lampard. "But I think the word broken is a bit much. "The league position is a reality, and we are 2-0 down in this game. We have to work against that." Real have won the Champions League a record 14 times, beating Liverpool in last season's final, and are second in Spain's La Liga. Lampard was asked if overturning Real's advantage from the first leg and reaching the semi-finals would rival 2012 when, as a player, he helped Chelsea win the Champions League for the first time. "I don't think anything that happens tomorrow will be better than winning the Champions League," said the 44-year-old, who is Chelsea's record goalscorer. China's economy grows 4.5%

Beijing: China's gross domestic product (GDP) grew 4.5% from a year ago in the first quarter of 2023, much above market forecasts of 4%, according to flash data released on Tuesday.

This was the strongest growth since the first quarter of last year, largely due to China's reopening and lifting of strict COVID-19 curbs that were in place for nearly three years.

The figure accelerated from 2.9% in the fourth quarter of last year, according to China's National Bureau of Statistics. On a quarterly basis, the world's second-largest economy grew 2.2% in the January-March period, picking up from an upwardly revised 0.6% in October-December. In 2022, China's GDP increased by 3.3%, less than the government's target of 5.5%. Retail sales, a key driver of China's growth, jumped 10.6% in March, marking the strongest rebound since June 2021 and exceeding expectations due to an uptick in consumer confidence. Industrial output increased 3.9% in March, slightly lower than market forecasts of 4%.—**DNA**

What is happening in Sudan? A simple guide

Fighting has erupted in Khartoum and other cities in Sudan as powerful rival military factions battle for control, increasing the risk of a nationwide civil war.

Here's a simple guide to the conflict: Power struggle at the heart of the violence Fighting broke out on Saturday after weeks of tension between the army and the powerful paramilitary group, the Rapid Support Forces (RSF). Both groups were allies. Together, they seized power in a 2021

coup. But tensions increased over the proposed integration of the RSF into the military. The key question is who is in control and who would be the military's commander-in-chief during an integration period. According to analysts, this is a power struggle for the control of the country. Most of the fighting is occurring in the capital, Khartoum, but clashes are reported across the country. At least 185 people have been killed and thousands injured in the first three days. who became rivals? The protagonists in the outbreak of violence are army General Abdel Fattah al-Burhan and his deputy and the RSF leader, General Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, commonly known as Hemedti. In October 2021, al-Burhan and Dagalo orchestrated a coup, upending a fragile transition to civilian rule that had been started after the 2019 removal of longtime ruler Omar al-Bashir. Al-Burhan, a career soldier from northern Sudan who rose through the ranks under the nearly 30-year rule of al-Bashir, took the top job as the de facto ruler of Sudan after the coup. Dagalo, from Darfur's camel-herding Arab Rizeigat people, assumed responsibility as his number two. As the army and civilian leaders came together to try to hammer out a deal to end the political crisis the coup brought on, integrating the RSF into the regular army became a

According to analyst Kholood Khair, a December framework agreement for the deal "ratcheted up tensions between al-Burhan and Hemedti" when it "elevated Hemedti's position into Burhan's equal, rather than his deputy".

Khair, the founder of the Khartoum-based Confluence Advisory think tank, said: "That shift in power is why conversations about security sector reform and integration of the RSF have ended up in armed conflict rather than heated debate around the table." is the RSF? The RSF was created in 2013 and evolved from the socalled Janjaweed militias, which are accused of war crimes in the Darfur region. During the Darfur conflict in the 2000s, the government used the group to help the army put down a rebellion.

In 2017, a law legitimising the RSF as an independent security force was passed. "As he rose to prominence, [Daga-

lo's business interests grew with help from al-Bashir, and his family expanded holdings in gold mining, livestock and infrastructure," Adel Abdel Ghafar, director of the Foreign Policy and Security Program at the Middle East Council on Global Affairs, told Al Jazeera. Despite being a longtime al-Bashir ally, Dagalo took part in overthrowing the president when the 2019 uprising broke out.

Russian court rejects appeal of detained US iournalist

MOSCOW: A Russian court has rejected the appeal of US journalist Evan Gershkovich against his pre-trial detention. He appeared in court in Moscow on Tuesday - the first time he had been seen in public for weeks. He was arrested in the city of Yekaterinburg while working for the Wall Street Journal (WSJ) newspaper and charged with spying. MrGershkovich stood with folded arms in a bullet-proof glass enclosure, wearing jeans

and a blue checked shirt. He gave a quick smile while standing calmly, but did not say anything to the reporters present. The court rejected his legal team's offer to free him on bail of 50 million roubles (\$614,000) or put him under house arrest. MrGershkovich will stay at a former KGB prison until 29 May at least. Along with his lawyer, US ambassador to Moscow Lynne Tracy was also present in the courtroom. This is the same court where Kremlin critic Vladimir Kara-Murza was just convicted of treason and sentenced to prison on Monday. Media were allowed in the courtroom at the start of the hearing before being ushered out and will be permitted to return at the end of the hearing.

Chinese tech giant denies Pentagon spy claim

BEIJING: Chinese surveillance technology giant Hikvision has denied it is illegally disguising its products sold to the US government to enaresponding to media queries about allegations revealed in a recently leaked Pentagon document. But Hikvision did not answer questions on whether it partners with Chinese intelligence agencies. The company is the world's largest surveillance camera maker and has close links to the Chinese state.

It supplies its products to resellers who in turn supply governments and companies, often with the resellers' branding, in a process known as "white labelling". Though this is a common business model, Hikvision has come under intense scrutiny for its ties to the Chinese state and the use of its products in monitoring Uyghurs. The US had previously banned Hikvision products from its government supply chains, but in November regulators took this a step further and put in place a nationwide ban, citing concerns over national security.

Islamabad court grants post-arrest bail to Gandapur

The judge also direct ed the PTI leader to furnish two surety bonds amounting to Rs0.3 million each Gandapur, a former federal minister, was arrested last week from outside the building of the Peshawar High Court's Dera Ismail Khan Bench. He was handed over to Islamabad's Golra police but his custody was later given to Bhakkar police.

The first information re-(FIR) registered against the PTI leader with Golra police mentioned an audio in which he could purportedly be heard using derogatory language against federal coalition. hurling threats on government officials and inciting public against government.

BEIJING: China's foreign minister told his Israeli and Palestinian counterparts that his country is ready to help facilitate peace talks between the two sides, in its latest effort at mediation in the region. In separate phone calls to the two officials on Monday, Qin Gang expressed China's concern over intensifying tensions between Israel and Palestinians and its support for a resumption of peace talks, the Foreign Ministry said in statements issued late Monday. Last month, Saudi Arabia and Iran reached a deal in China to restore diplomatic ties

that were cut off in 2016. It was a dramatic

moment of diplomacy for China that Beijing

touted as evidence of its ability to be a dip-

lomatic player in the Middle East. Qin stressed in his talks with Israeli Foreign Minister Eli Cohen that Saudi Arabia and Iran have set a good example of overcoming differences through dialogue, a statement about that phone call said. He told Cohen that Beijing encourages Is-

rael and the Palestinians to show political courage and take steps to resume peace talks. "China is willing to provide convenience for this," he was quoted as saying. Israel and the Palestinians have not held substantive peace talks on ending the century-long conflict in over a decade. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's government is committed to expanding settlements in the occupied West Bank which most of the international community considers illegal and an obstacle to peace

- and several of his key allies are staunchly opposed to the creation of an independent Palestinian state. Cohen expressed his country's commitment to reducing tensions, but said the problem appeared to be difficult to resolve in the short term, the Chinese Foreign Ministry statement said. Israel's Foreign Ministry said in a statement that Qin and Cohen discussed "the importance of maintaining quiet at the Temple Mount, particularly in the final days of Ramadan," the Muslim holy month, but made no mention of peace talks with the Palestinians. It said that Cohen conveyed "the threat that we see in Iran's nuclear program" and called on China to help prevent Tehran from obtaining nuclear weapons. Qin also told Palestinian Foreign Affairs Minister Ri-

yad Al-Maliki that China is willing to play an active role in the resumption of talks, a second statement said.

On Tuesday, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Wang Wenbin confirmed Qin's outreach to the two officials. "It is never too late to do the right thing," he said. This month, violence in Israel and the West Bank has increased, touched off by an Israeli police raid on Jerusalem's most sensitive holy site, the compound home to the Al-Aqsa mosque. The Israeli military struck sites linked to the Palestinian group Hamas in southern Lebanon and the Gaza Strip after militants in the two territories fired rocket salvos at Israel. Massive landslide buries trucks, kills at least 2 people

TORKHAM: A landslide during a thunder and lightning storm on the main road through Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's Khyber Pass buried more than 20 trucks on Tuesday, killing at least two people, with dozens more feared trapped, officials said. Abdul Nasir Khan, the deputy commissioner of the Khyber district, told media that two Afghan citizens had been killed in the landslide and authorities were trying to recover the bodies.

Separately, Rescue 1122 spokesperson Bilal Faizi said eight injured persons had been provided first aid care, while four had been moved to the hospital.

The official said a fire had broken out immediately after the landslide as drivers were cooking meals for sehri on gas stoves. "The blaze is now under control,' he told media.

Faizi said heavy machinery including 12 ambulances, four fire vehicles, three recovery vehicles and three heavy excavators had been deployed at the site as the wreckage was extensive. Photos shared by officials showed truck containers

mostly buried in huge piles of rocks. According to a statement issued by the KP Disaster Management Authority, the landslide took place on the main route connecting Pakistan-Afghanistan Torkham border at 2:30am.

Saudi FM arrives in Syria's Damascus

DAMASCUS: Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan arrived Tuesday in Syria's Damascus on an official visit, Saudi state TV al-Ekhbariya reported. Prince Faisal was received by the Minister of Presidential Affairs of Syria, Mansour Fadlallah Azzam, at Damascus International Airport. Prince Faisal bin Farhan's visit to Damascus confirms the Kingdom's keenness on a political solution, the Saudi Foreign Ministry said, adding that Saudi Arabia was keen on the unity, security, stability and Arab identity of Syria. Last week, the Saudi prince held talks with his Syrian counterpart, Faisal Al-Miqdad, in Jeddah. A joint statement was issued confirming that the talks discussed achieving a settlement in Syria due to its return to its Arab surroundings, as well as ways to find a political solution that preserves the unity of Syria. - DNA

Sudan's warring sides agree for a 24-hour ceasefire

More than 180 people killed in Sudan fighting, UN envoy says

KHARTOUM: Sudan's rival commanders agreed a 24-hour ceasefire from Tuesday evening, the army said, following calls to each side from US Secretary of State Antony Blinken over fierce fighting in Khartoum that saw shots fired at a US diplomatic convoy. The ceasefire will start at 6.00 p.m. (1600 GMT) and will not extend beyond the agreed 24 hours, Army General Shams el-Din Kabbashi, a member of Sudan's ruling military council, said. US Secretary of State Antony Blinken

held separate calls with the army chief and head of the paramilitary Rapid Response Forces (RSF), whose power struggle has killed at least 185 people and derailed an internationally-backed deal for a shift to civilian government after decades of autocracy and military rule.

Gunfire echoed across Sudan's capital for a fourth day on Tuesday, accompanied by the sound of warplanes and explosions, a Reuters reporter said. Residents in Khartoum's twin city of Omdurman, on the other side of the Nile, also reported air strikes that shook buildings and anti-aircraft fire.

Blinken said a US diplomatic convoy came under fire on Monday in an apparent attack by fighters associated with the RSF, adding that all those in the convoy were safe. He called the incident "reckless" and said any attacks or threats to US diplomats were unacceptable. Blinken, speaking in Japan, said he had telephoned both RSF leader General Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, known as Hemedti, and Sudan's army chief General Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, appealing for a 24-hour ceasefire "to allow the Sudanese to be safely reunited with families" and to provide them with relief.

Fighting between Sudan's army and the RSF that erupted on Saturday has killed at least 185 people and injured more than 1,800, UN envoy Volker Perthes said on Monday. The RSF's Hemedti, whose whereabouts have not been disclosed since fighting began, said he had "discussed pressing issues" with Blinken during their call and more talks were planned. In posts on Twitter he said the RSF approved a 24-hour armistice. The RSF also issued a statement saying it was waging a continuing battle to restore "the rights of our people."

MOSCOW: The Kremlin said on Tuesday that President Vladimir Putin had visited two frontline regions in Ukraine, prompting a strong rebuke from Kyiv which said he was viewing "the crimes of his minions." The Kremlin did not say when Putin visited the southern region of Kherson and the eastern region of Lugansk, which Putin claimed to have annexed last September without fully controlling them.

The Kremlin chief sent troops to Ukraine in February, 2022, triggering the largest conflict in Europe since World War II. Ukrainian forces have said they are preparing for a spring counter-offensive. MykhailoPodolyak, an adviser to

President Volodymyr Zelensky, dismissed Putin's trip as "a 'special tour' of the mass murders author... to enjoy the crimes of his minions for the last time.'

After Putin's visit was made public on Tuesday, Ukrainian officials said Russian forces had shelled the central market area of Kherson, injuring six people. Last year, Russia was beaten back

in northern and southern regions and Moscow's forces have made only incremental gains in eastern Ukraine. Much of the fighting is now concentrated around the eastern town of Bakhmut which has become the longest and bloodiest battle of the conflict.
