PM directs ensure safety measures

ISLAMABAD: Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar had directed to immediately rescue the eight persons trapped in a chairlift at Pashto area in Battagram. According to a statement released by the Prime Minister office, the Prime Minister directed the National Disaster Management Authority, Provincial Disaster Management Authority and all relevant rescue agencies to rescue students and teachers by utilizing all resources. The Prime Minister also instructed to ensure safety arrangements on all such chairlifts in the hilly areas. He directed to immediately close the chairlifts which are in dilapidated condition and do not meet the safety standards. Caretaker Interior Minister Sarfaraz Ahmed Bugti has directed to speed up the rescue operation to save the children and teachers stranded in Battagram chairlift. On the instructions of the Prime Minister, Pakistan Army has been requested to join the rescue operation. He said all resources should be used in the rescue operation. - DNA

ever, rescue operation via copter has been suspended due to darkness and the windy weather. While remaining people were rescued by arranging a mini cable car as the heli operation became impossible due to weather and darkness. The army decided to start a ground operation to save the remaining six people stuck inside the cable car with alternative means.

Another cable car – smaller in size - has been hung on the same cable to retrieve the people. Moreover, the

6 soldiers martyred in Waziristan encounter

Four terrorists sent to hell, while two terrorists were injured

RAWALPINDI: At least six soldiers were martyred while fighting terrorists during an intense exchange of fire in South Waziristan's general area Asman Manza in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) province, the military's media wing said in a statement on Tuesday. According to the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), troops effectively engaged the terrorists' location and resultantly four terrorists were sent to hell, while two terrorists were injured. 
ISLAMABAD: The federal cabinet has decided to hold an interfaith harmony moot at national level next week. The decision was taken during a meeting of the federal cabinet held in Islamabad on Tuesday. The meeting was chaired by interim Prime Minister Anwaarul Haq Kakar. PM Kakar briefed the cabinet members about his visit to violence-hit Jaranwala where some disgruntled elements burnt down churches and houses of the Christians a few days ago. The prime minister categorically stated that the state would not allow extremism and the reli-

gious confrontation in the society. He said it is the top most responsibility of the state to provide protection to the minorities in the country. He vowed exemplary punishment to the Jaranwala tragedy culprits. On this occasion, the cabinet also decided to arrange an interfaith harmony conference at national level next week.

The national interfaith moot will invite in

ternationally recognized scholars of various faiths and schools of thought. The conference will prove a milestone in the promotion of interfaith harmony in the society. Addressing the cabinet, PM Kakar said that the caretaker government's prime mandate was to assist, and monitor the electoral process which was the constitutional requirement. He said keeping in mind the prime mandate, the caretaker government would monitor its day-to-day activities to the best of its abilities. "We are here as a constitutional continuation for a limited period of time and we are not here to design the government model or structure," the prime minister said. He maintained that as a continuation of the previous government, the caretaker setup was generally supposed to carry on with the general policy until and unless there were any violations of rules or business. "The National Assembly has retired and we are waiting for the new elections," he said adding the second arm of

Pak Bait ul Mal ready to work with ICCI on welfare projects

ISLAMABAD: Aamir Fida Paracha, Managing Director, Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal (PBM) said that his organization is ready to work with ICCI on welfare projects, so the Chamber should prepare its proposal for skills development and empowerment of women and send it to him that would be considered for implementation. He said that the PBM is being digitized to promote transparency and increase the confidence of donors. He said that they are working on devising a scoring system for beneficiaries on the pattern of Benazir Income Support Program, which will greatly facilitate the beneficiaries and reduce documentary requirements. He said that good projects of the previous government including the shelter homes have been continued, but those shelters have been closed which had no beneficiary and were costing great expenses. He said that many welfare projects including 50 women empowerment centers are working under PBM. He said that the scholarships for poor students in the universities have been further increased while the scholarship for the poor students of Balochistan has been increased to 20%. He said that the government has increased the budget of Pakistan Baitul Mal from 6 billion rupees to carry forward the welfare projects. He expressed these views while addressing the business community during his visit to the Islamabad Chamber of Commerce and Industry. Ahsan Zafar Bakhtawari, President, Islamabad Chamber of Commerce and Industry (ICCI), said that Pakistan Baitul Mal is rendering valuable services for the welfare of the poor and needy people of the society, which is laudable. He said that PBM is doing many welfare projects including provision of education & medical treatment to the poor segments of society, so he strongly appealed to the business community and the philanthropists

with PBM so that this institution can better serve the poor and needy members of the society. Engr. Azharul Islam Zafar, Vice President ICCI said that PBM is carrying out a great mission by serving the suffering humanity and suggested that it should also play role in providing education to 20 million out-of-school children. Minister reviews situation after dissolution of PIDB

LAHORE: Caretaker Provincial Minister for Industries and Commerce SM Tanveer chaired a meeting to review industrial projects implemented by Punjab Industrial Development Board (PIDB) and the situation after the dissolution of the board in 1997, here at TEVTA Secretariat on Tuesday. The minister was briefed that PIDB had set up 14 industrial projects including 5 sugar mills, 3 textile mills and 6 rice mills. All industrial projects undertaken by the board had been privatized, 18 cases were pending in various courts regarding recovery of dues. The cell is functioning under an administrator after the dissolution of the board to settle litigation and recovery of dues, the meeting told. Provincial Minister SM Tanveer said that expenditure of millions of rupees from the government treasury every year since 1997 to recover the dues of Rs 100 million was deplorable. In a difficult economic situation, the country could not afford to waste resources. Matters should be settled amicably with the stakeholders, he added. CM's visit to Hospital unveils patients' complaints

LAHORE: Punjab Caretaker Chief Minister Mohsin Nagvi visited the Holy Family Hospital Rawalpindi, uncovering concerning inadequacies in medical facilities and distressing patient conditions. Patients and their attendants voiced a multitude of complaints during the visit, said a handout issued here on Tuesday. The CM issued a stern warning to Medical Superintendent and the vice chancellor of Rawalpindi Medical University, laying down a 7-day deadline for significant improvements. The hospital was marked by subpar sanitation arrangements, and patients complained about undergoing tests and acquiring medications from external sources. Additionally, grievances emerged regarding monetary demands from hospital guards for various services. Disturbingly, specific wards exhibited unsanitary conditions, including broken beds and bloodstains on bed linens. Patients also lamented treatment delays, prolonged reception queues, and the unavailability of ventilators. The visit revealed certain wards experiencing overcrowding and dire conditions due to insufficient resources. Expressing his deep concern over the dilapidated conditions, the CM ordered

measures to enhance facilities on an urgent basis. He checked the treatment facilities and inquired about the well-being of patients and the facilities provided to them. He inspected emergency, children and dengue wards and the medical unit, listened to the patient's problems and issued directions to resolve them. He emphasised enhancing efficiency within available resources to provide relief to patients. Quality treatment was a public right, he said and vowed to revisit the hospital while stressing the need for improvements. A significant development emerged as several guards. accused of extorting money from patients and their attendants, were apprehended by the police. Prompt action was taken based on complaints lodged during the chief minister's visit, resulting in immediate arrests and legal proceedings against the guards.

Caretaker ministers Dr Nasir Jamal, Amir Mir, Vice Chancellor Rawalpindi Medical University Prof. Dr. Muhammad Umar and Medical Superintendent Dr Ijaz Butt were also present. Punjab Caretaker Chief Minister Mohsin Naqvi on Tuesday visited the under-construction new emergency section of Services Hospital Lahore and inspected the progress of ongoing construction activities.

Provincial Information Minister Amir Mir accompanied him. The chief minister expressed his dissatisfaction with delay in the finishing work. He directed that all pending work be expedited, even if it required round-the-clock efforts. Noticing old beds outside the new emergency section, he expressed his displeasure and instructed for new beds to be provided promptly. Additionally, he voiced his dissatisfaction with the air-conditioning system and ordered its immediate improvement. Taking swift action, the CM promptly contacted the Secretary Communication and Works and instructed him to enhance facilities in the new emergency area. "Comprehensive planning should be made to stop water accumulating in the basement," he added. He conveyed his intent to inaugurate the new emergency room for patients only when fully satisfied.

Mohsin Naqvi tasked the Principal of Services Hospital with supervising and ensuring the completion of all tasks with the utmost quality and efficiency. The Medical Superintendent of Services Hospital was also present.-APP

KARACHI: Pakistan People's Party (PPP) Senator Taj Haider has expressed concern over the digital census saying that his party's central election cell has received disturbing reports about the undercount of the population from sources located in different provinces. He said that Initial computations in the province of Sindh reveal that the damage done to the province of Sindh as a result of the so-called 'Digital Census' is far bigger than what was initially feared and warned against when we now look at the population figures published in the Gazette notification of August 7, 2023", a communique said here on Tuesday. Sindh, which remains the destination of economic migrants from other provinces, Gilgit Baltistan, and Azad Kashmir, besides a large number of illegal migrants, has been allotted an average family size (AFS) of a mere 5.64. Punjab has an average family size of 6.43. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa 6.94, and Baluchistan 6.42. He noted that the reduction of just one person in average family size results in a reduction of 18 to $20\,\%$ in the total population of Sindh. He further said there were only four districts in Sindh, two of them urban

Pak values its relations with UK, Iran: Sanjrani

British High Commissioner, Iranian Ambassador Meet Chairman Senate Muhammad Sadiq Sanjrani

Islamabad; 22 August 2023: In a series of significant meetings, the British High Commissioner, Ms Jane Marriott, and the Iranian Ambassador, Dr Reza Amiri Moghaddam, held separate meetings with the Chairman Senate, Muhammad Sadiq Sanjrani, at the Parliament House today. The meetings were marked by a thorough exchange of views on matters of mutual interest and the exploration of avenues for enhanced cooperation between Pakistan and the respective countries. During the meeting between

Chairman Senate and British High Commissioner Jane Marriott, a comprehensive range of topics were deliberated upon. Issues of paramount importance such as trade, investment, parliamentary cooperation, and public relations between the two nations were discussed in detail. ISLAMABAD: With the theme of Cave Temple Conservation in the Context of Climate Change, the first International Forum on Cave Temple Conservation was launched in Chongqing Municipality, China Economic Net (CEN) reported on Tuesday. The event was held in the Baoding Mountains, whose carvings were made during Southern Song Dynasty (1127-1279) are regarded an important part of the Dazu Rock Carvings World Cultural Heritage Site, which was were listed as a UNES-CO World Cultural Heritage Site in 1999.



1 houdhry Rahmat Ali was among the **9** earliest proponents of the establishment of the state of Pakistan. A Pakistani Muslim nationalist, Rahmat Ali is widely acknowledged as the originator of the term "Pakistan" for a distinct Muslim homeland in South Asia, and he is credited as the initiator of the Pakistan National Movement. Ali was born in November 1895 into a Gujjar Muslim family in a district of Indian Punjab. From his early years, Rahmat Ali exhibited exceptional academic promise. Following his schooling, he enrolled at the Islamia College of Lahore. After completing his graduation in 1918, he initially taught at Aitcheson College Lahore before later enrolling at Punjab University to pursue legal studies. However, in 1930, he relocated to England to join Emmanuel College, Cambridge. He acquired a BA degree in 1933 and an MA in 1940 from the University of Cambridge. In 1943, he was admitted to the Bar at Middle Temple Inn, London. Ali concluded his education in England. attaining MA and LLB degrees with honors from the universities of Cambridge and Dublin. Ali was ardent-

His inspiration stemmed from Islamic history, particularly the accomplishments of Prophet Muhammad in uniting diverse Arab tribes during the inception of Islam. Ali advocated that in order to navigate the increasingly hostile Indian environment, Indian Muslims should unite under a common banner. He was also deeply influenced by the writings and philosophy of Allama Muhammad Iqbal. Alongside the works of Muhammad Igbal and others, Ali's writings significantly contributed to the inception of Pakistan. While Ali had previously articulated his concept of an independent Muslim state on the subcontinent before relocating to Britain, it was during his time there that he published his pamphlet titled "Now or Never: Are We to Live or Perish Forever?" in 1933. Issued on January 28, 1933, the pamphlet contained an appeal 'on behalf of the thirty million Muslims of PAKSTAN, who reside in the five Northern Units of India - Punjab, N. W. F. P. (Afghan Province), Kashmir, Sindh, and Baluch-

istan. The appeal conveyed their unwavering demand for recognition of their distinct national status, set apart from the rest of India, through the establishment of a separate Federal Constitution grounded in social, religious, political, and historical reasons. This renowned 1933 pamphlet, commonly referred to as the Pakistan Declaration, commenced with the iconic statement: "At this significant juncture in the history of India, while British and Indian statesmen are laying the foundations of a Federal Constitution for that land, we direct this appeal to you, in the name of our shared heritage, on behalf of our thirty million Muslim brethren living in PAKISTAN – denoting the five Northern units of India, namely Punjab, North-West Frontier Province (Afghan Province), Kashmir, Sind, and Baluchistan." As per one account, Rahmat Ali had already coined the term in late 1932, during a bus ride in London. Enclosed herewith is an appeal on behalf of the thirty million Muslims of PAKISTAN, residing in the five Northern Units of India - Punjab, North-West Frontier (Afghan) Province, Kashmir, Sind, and Baluchistan. It encapsulates their plea for recognition of their national status, distinct

gious, social, and historical grounds. Rahmat Ali signed the letter as Rahmat Ali (Choudhary) and assumed the title of 'Founder, Pakistan National Movement'. This marked the first public appearance of the newly coined term 'Pakistan'. It marked the inception of an idea that would reshape the course of South Asian history. Ali's pamphlet was characterized by assertive arguments that aimed to drive home certain points. However, Ali was now a man with a purpose. In 1935, he authored a book titled "Pakistan: Its contents were a mix of fantasy - like his assertion of a 'Pak Empire' dating back to ancient times, and his insistence on using the term 'Paks' to refer to people even in that era. Some parts were idealistic - such as his vision of Islam as a unifying force that would transcend regional, caste, class, and linguistic differences. Nevertheless, it represented an effort to give tangible form to a dream. Meanwhile, the political landscape in India was undergoing a different transformation, a direction that Ali might not have disapproved of. In 1937,



alternate geographical depictions of the subcontinent, Ali referred to himself as the "founder of the Siddiqistan, Nasaristan, and Safiistan National Movements". Mian Abdul Haq, a contemporary of Rahmat Ali at the University of Cambridge, noted that Rahmat Ali's mindset shifted after 1935 due to his extensive study of "major Nazi works, of which he knew many pas-

sages by heart". In October 1948, a mere month after Jinnah's demise, Ali was instructed by Liaquat Ali Khan, Jinnah's successor, to leave the country, and his possessions were seized. The partition had already inflicted substantial harm upon Ali. He had lost his ancestral lands in what was now Indian Punjab and had essentially forfeited his stable income. The command to depart Pakistan was another harsh setback. Upon returning to England, Ali spent his remaining years in genteel poverty. His passing in 1951 was solitary, with his body discovered several days later. It fell upon his former college to cover the costs of his funeral. The Pakistani government eventually reimbursed Emmanuel College for Ali's funeral expenses November 1953, but only after prolonged corre-



Chinese economy: it looks bad

SPATE of recent statistics shows that the Chinese economy is faring poorly. The country was supposed to rebound after ditching its draconian "zero Covid" policies, but, after an initial revival, things have gone awry. Earlier this month it slipped into deflation. Key indicators, including industrial production, investment and retail sales, came in well below expectations. The most concerning figure, however, is the one that we can't see. The youth unemployment rate was suspended from the monthly economic data release, having reached a record 21.3% in June - suggesting not only that July was grimmer, but that improvement is not expected soon. The government has stopped publishing swathes of statistics in recent years. While there are many reasons for that, and while some may still be released to data firms, it has probably helped to bury some bad news, and makes it harder to cross-reference information. Chinese economists are also under pressure to avoid discussing negative indicators. Under the Communist party, the economy has always served politics. But the subservience has not been so marked for decades. Tech giants have been reined in and bankers ordered to study Xi Jinping Thought. The question is whether political tightening is affecting not only economic performance, but our knowledge of it. The primary concern is the domestic audience, not least because the authorities, reluctant to turn to a stimulus, need them to spend. (Strikingly, the National Bureau of Statistics - NBS - stopped publishing a consumer confidence index in April.) But there is also growing hostility towards the outside world. But the leadership has its own blind spots. Li Keqiang, premier until this spring, once told an American diplomat that GDP figures were "man-made" and unreliable. Analysts like to inspect information from the lowest possible levels of bureaucracy because they know that figures are massaged at each stage by officials seeking approbation from superiors. Close watchers say that the NBS has worked hard to address such issues, meaning that at least some data is probably more accurate than before. But in a system where there is increasing pressure to manifest only "positive energy", people are frightened to bear bad news. Not only has investigative reporting been muzzled, but reportedly even the "internal reference" service for top officials - secret briefings by journalists and researchers, very different from their published work - is increasingly hampered by self-censorship or editing by gatekeepers along the way. "It is a system which is intended to put blinders on the public but also works for decision-makers," suggests the political scientist Prof Dali Yang. His book Wuhan notes how China carefully created a disease early-warning system after Sars - only for bureaucratic fragmentation and deliberate suppression of negative developments to prevent reports of the Covid-19 outbreak from reaching Beijing in the critical early stages. True, central planners watch the economy much more vigilantly. They unquestionably have a far better view of it than the rest of us. The question is whether their information is good, and fast, enough.

Japan's water rush opens Pandora's box

APANESE Prime Minister Fumio Kishida announced on Tuesday that Japan will start releasing the nuclear-contaminated water that has been generated from the decommissioning of the tsunami-destroyed Fukushima nuclear power plant into the Pacific Ocean as early as Thursday. It is no coincidence that the announcement came two days after he returned home from the Camp David meeting with his US and ROK counterparts. Both the Yoon Suk-yeol government and the Joe Biden administration have kept a studied yet condoning silence on the announcement that heralds Japan opening a Pandora's box. Not only are the long-term impacts on the marine environment unknown, but also the move will set a bad example for other countries which may treat the oceans as a free dumping ground. The way the Japanese leader claimed that his government has "removed" the so-called last obstacle to the move also shows how Tokyo has overstretched itself. The outcome of the hours Kishida spent on Monday lobbying Masanobu Sakamoto, head of the National Federation of Fisheries Cooperatives, for the organization's support were later presented in a different way. While the latter made his organization's firm opposition to the plan unequivocally clear, Kishida told reporters that Sakamoto's response signaled "improved understanding", and his government brazenly hinted that the last hurdle to the release of the radioactive water had been overcome. Sakamoto's "response" included his welcome to Kishida's pledge that the government will provide long-term subsidies and support to the fishing communities until the release ends. Does that really mean they have an "improved understanding" of the move? Do they really have the power to veto the plan that Tokyo has treated as a political and diplomatic undertaking rather than an environmental one from the very beginning? The Kishida government has smeared China's concerns as "politicized" and regarded those previously expressed by the Republic of Korea, Australia and New Zealand and the Pacific island countries as "understandable but not necessary". But the question is whether that pledge will be binding on the future governments of Japan over the decades, and what about people in other countries that will be affected by the move. As Junichi Matsumoto, the Tokyo Electric Power Company executive in charge of the water release plan, told the media, the discharge is still only an initial step in a "daunting" decommissioning process that is expected to take decades. It is the acquiescence of the International Atomic Energy Agency, as reflected by its partial report on the release plan, that has emboldened Tokyo to press ahead with the discharging of the water which many experts say is "ill-advised" and "premature". Japan is making a shortsighted and selfish decision that the world is expected to pay the price for.

WO years subsequent to the resurgence of the Taliban into power, gence of the failban into power, no sovereign state has accorded recognition to their governance, despite their most earnest endeavors. The Taliban leadership has dispatched envoys on several diplomatic missions abroad, spanning China, Pakistan, Qatar, and Russia, yet this assiduous diplomatic campaign has thus far yielded no success. Afghanistan remains ensnared in isolation and burdened by international sanctions. Three fundamental rationales elucidate the failure hitherto of their pursuit for recognition. Firstly, it resides in the Taliban's suppression of women. The curtailment of women's entitlements to education, occupation, and liberty of agency by the Taliban is precipitating the swift erosion of their sense of self. The state's subjugation of women has effectively excluded them from nearly every sector of the labor realm, and the recent proscription on women's cosmetic establishments has further truncated their prospects for employment. These draconian policies, emblematic of the Taliban's modus operandi, raise grave concerns concerning the human rights milieu in Afghanistan. A UN report in February underscores this stark actuality, contending that the denial of women and girls' rights may constitute gender-based violence, a transgression against humanity. Consequently, the Taliban's systemic campaign against women and their violations of human rights render their regime noxious. Any entity that transgresses this threshold is liable to evoke global censure. A further rationale resides in the Taliban's endeavor to establish an external governance that overtly discriminates against non-Pashtun eth-

no-linguistic groups within Afghanistan. minority populations of northern Afghani-The government has dismissed international calls for political inclusivity due to its capacity to do so, and the likelihood of a diverse Taliban-led government materializing is as tenuous as a government truly representing the populace. How Washington views the war in Afghanistan two years on

The US' war in Afghanistan covered two decades, including two Republican and two Democratic presidential administrations. WO years after the US and its allies withdrew from Afghanistan, partisan political views in Washington have hardened, while foreign policy experts are starting more comprehensive reviews of the entire war. The American public strongly supported pulling out of Afghanistan but was disappointed in how the war ended. Polling at the time of the withdrawal showed that a strong majority of Americans wanted to end the war and believed that the US had failed to achieve its goals in Afghanistan. Polling also found that a slight majority disapproved of President Joe Biden's handling of the withdrawal, while the event marked a notable decline in his approval ratings.

The partisan political narratives have changed little. Republican leaders and commentators argue that Biden is solely responsible for the chaotic and deadly nature of the withdrawal, while ignoring the reality that Biden inherited limited options from the Trump administration. The Republican-controlled House of Representatives has held hearings to highlight the tragedy of the withdrawal and place blame on the Biden administration. Afghanistan is unlikely to be a major point in the presidential election, but Republicans will try to use it against Biden.

On the Democratic side, there is a mix of blaming the Trump administration and simply hoping to move on. In April, the White House produced a report that largely blamed the Trump administration for its 2020 deal with the Taliban, its drawdown of troop numbers and a lack of planning for an intended withdrawal. Democratic leaders acknowledge that Biden made some errors but blame the Trump administration for the most important mistakes. With political perspectives set in stone, the discussion among foreign policy experts is more interesting. Within think tanks and among experts with experience shaping and implementing Afghanistan policy throughout multiple presidential administrations, there is a more thoughtful review occurring. A year ago, the focus in Washington was primarily on reviewing the last two years of the war, especially the Trump deal with the Taliban and then the final withdrawal under Biden. Now, two years after the withdrawal, there appears to be more space for broader, nuanced discussion about the entire 20 years of US combat in Afghanistan. The US' war in Afghanistan covered two decades, including two Republican and two Democratic presidential administrations. Among those administrations, Congress, the federal bureaucracy, the US military and Afghan leaders, there is plenty of blame to go around. While politicians engage in finger-pointing, foreign policy experts are trying to take a big-picture look at what happened and to identify lessons.

This work is just beginning. In December 2021, Congress established a bipartisan Afghanistan War Commission to conduct a review of US policy toward Afghanistan during the full 20 years of war. For this commission and other experts, there is plenty of material already available for study and further documents and testimony will emerge. There is a general consensus that the war was a failure and that the withdrawal was a debacle. The questions are more about why and how. The expert discussion about the war is starting to take shape. Many experts – including some Republicans and even some who worked in the Trump administration – believe that the US gave up most of its leverage in return for very little in the 2020 deal with the Taliban. While it was obvious that the US wanted out of the war, better diplomacy could have contributed to a preferable conclusion. Previous administrations also bear some responsibility for missing opportunities to negotiate with the Taliban from a position of strength.

The 2003 invasion of Iraq made Afghanistan a secondary priority for Washington, diverting many resources. The Obama administration recognized that and tried to correct course, but much of the damage was already done, and the Obama administration made its

Other critiques fall under the general category of failing to understand Afghanistan and adapt to the country's realities. For example, building a centralized Afghan military with good equipment but lacking in other fundamental areas was a mistake. The influx of foreign aid often was not wisely distributed. Corruption was a massive problem that absorbed significant amounts of aid. US policy also suffered from unclear and frequently changing goals. Was the US in Afghanistan solely to defeat Al-Qaeda? To defeat all terrorists? To ensure that the Taliban could never regain power? To conduct nation-building? To ensure stability? Leaders and policymakers often lacked clear answers to these questions and failed to clearly communicate their goals to the American public in honest and straightforward ways. While much of the power and thus responsibility was held by presidential administrations, Congress also failed to provide sufficient oversight - at least oversight that put the nation's interests ahead of scoring partisan PR points. There were other mistakes, including those related to military operations and political organization. These include losing Afghan support through the collateral damage of war. The US and its allies had some achievements. Afghan women gained far more rights and there were other significant economic and humanitarian successes. For many Afghans in cities, particularly Kabul, life improved. The desperate desire of so many Afghans to flee in August 2021 demonstrated what they expected from life under the Taliban. Americans will probably never reach a full consensus on what went wrong in Afghanistan. Scholars, policymakers and citizens still debate what went wrong in the war in Vietnam, why the US invaded Iraq, and so on. A consensus on Afghanistan will likely be elusive, but the coming years will produce improved understanding and perhaps some useful lessons.

Moreover, the SSG team based in Kaghan Valley was also contacted after which helicopter reached the location at 11:45am. Meanwhile, the Pakistan Air Force (PAF) helicopter reached the site at 2pm. Emery wants to make 'new history'

LONDON: Unai Emery has urged Aston Villa to "write a new history" ahead of the Premier League club's first European campaign in 13 years. Villa face Scottish Premiership side Hibernian in the first leg of their Europa Conference League qualifying play-off at the Edinburgh team's Easter Road ground on Wednesday. Premier League referees are under instruction to clamp down on time-wasting, although Arsenal manager Mikel Arteta said after Monday's match a stopwatch may be needed to ensure consistency in decision-making. Odegaard, who scored the only goal of the game with a penalty after Eddie Nketiah had been tripped by Palace goalkeeper Sam Johnstone, said it would take time for players to adjust. - Agencies

Thavisin elected Thailand's new prime minister

BANGKOK: Thai lawmak ers, including those selected by the former junta administration, on Tuesday elected former real estate tycoon Srettha Thavisin the country's new prime minister. Thavisin, nominated by Pheu Thai Party (PTP) leader Chonlanan Srikaew, secured 482 votes, easily beating the 376 needed for victory, according to the Thai Public Broadcasting service. A total of 747 lawmakers were eligible to vote, with 165 voting against Thavisin while 81 abstained. At least 19 lawmakers were absent from parliament. The PPT had claimed support of a 314vote coalition from 11 parties. Today's vote was the second to elect the nation's 30th premier since general elections were held in May. Last month, Move Forward Party chief Pita Limjaroenrat failed to win the premiership. Separately, Thailand's Supreme Court on Tuesday sent former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra to prison for eight years upon his return from over 15 years in exile. Shinawatra faced corruption charges and three convictions from his long absence. - **DNA**

Germany misses its own climate targets set for 2030

GENEVA: Germany will not meet its own climate targets by 2030, according to the 2023 projection report on future greenhouse gas emissions published Tuesday. The report was commissioned by the German Federal Environment Agency (UBA). Germany had set itself the goal of blowing 65% less carbon dioxide (CO2) into the air in 2030 than in 1990. But according to the report, prepared by a research consortium, 746 million tons of CO2 were only a reduction of about 40%. The experts do not expect that to change fast enough.

According to the researchmodel calculation adding up how much CO2 will be emitted in Germany from 2023 to 2030, the country will see a total climate protection gap of 331 million tons. "331 million tons is already considerable," a UBA spokeswoman told public broadcaster NDR. She added: "The total gap by 2030 is more than 40% of our current annual emissions. To save that, further measures are needed." The transport and construction sectors in particular stand out negatively in the report because both exceeded their maximum permissible emissions in 2022. This is the second time in a row that the transport sector has done so. However, according to the report, it is still possible to achieve Germany's 2030 climate protection targets in all sectors. UBA refers to its own study published at the beginning of July under the title Climate Protection Instruments Scenario 2030 (KIS-2030). According to the KIS-2030, a reduction in emissions of 68% compared to 1990 would be possible through a variety of climate protection measures. - Agencies

ANKARA: Recent actions by the UN peacekeeping force on Cyprus are "incompatible with the founding spirit of the UN." Türkiye said on Tuesday. "The recent events have unfortunately once again demonstrated how some practices of the UN on the island do not actually align with the founding spirit of the UN," Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan said at a news conference with visiting Bulgarian Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Mariya Gabriel in the capital Ankara. Fidan's remarks came after the UN Peacekeeping Force in Cyprus (UNFICYP) last week intervened in road construction work to link the Turkish Cypriot village of Pile in the buffer zone with the rest of the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC). The road expansion is strategically important for residents as it will give them more options to reach Pile, where Turks and Greek Cypriots live together. The Greek Cypriot

administration and the UN are opposed to the project. Residents of Pile will be able to travel shorter distances and will not have to pass through British bases when crossing to the Turkish side when the 11.6-kilometer (7.2-mile) construction and repair work ends. The first 7.5 km (4.66 mi) of the road will pass through the village of Yigitler, and the second 4.1 km (2.55 mi) will pass through Pile. A road construction project from Yigitler has always been on the agenda to deliver the necessary humanitarian aid to the Turkish community in Pile, Fidan said, adding that the UN had never condemned or tried to hinder a roadway built by the Greek Cypriot administration of Southern Cyprus in Pile. Türkiye observes that the civilian and military presence of the UN on the island lacked internal coordination, Fidan said, adding: "Because there are longstanding negotiations between the civilian representative and the officials of the TRNC. These talks have been going on for a long time. They had been informed



when this road would be built." Ankara did not welcome the sudden accumulation of UN vehicles in the buffer zone, said the Turkish foreign minister. "We think that the UN has lost its neutrality on this issue," he added. Türkiye will keep supporting Northern Cyprus in every field, including for its recognition by the whole world. Fidan underlined. Fidan and Gabriel also discussed bilateral relations, Türkiye's EU membership process, and regional and international issues. On Ankara's EU membership process, Fidan said Türkiye's integration with the bloc would reinforce Brussels'

position as a "global actor," but that member states chose not to see the matter this way. Turkish membership would offer "new opportunities to both the EU and our region. I recommend that EU officials and leaders take advantage of this new window of opportunity before it closes," he added. Ankara expects the EU to reconsider its stance, Fidan said. "All of a sudden, the opening of chapters stopped for political reasons ... The process of rational evaluation of the EU criteria was suspended and the process of political evaluations began." Türkiye applied for EU membership in 1987 and has been a candidate country since

Negotiations for full membership started in October 2005 but have stalled in recent years due to political hurdles erected by some countries. Gabriel, for her part, underlined Bulgaria's strong support for Ankara's EU membership. "Türkiye is in the EU membership process. Bulgaria, as a member, supports Ankara's initiative towards Europe," she added. possible future steps on irregular migration and terrorism. RSF says it killed 260 **Sudanese** soldiers

KHARTOUM: Sudan's main paramilitary group the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) said Monday that they killed 260 soldiers of the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) amid intensified clashes. The RSF said in the statement that it also captured part of an SAF tank unit in southern Khartoum and seized tanks and military vehicles. "Our forces have made a great breakthrough in the battles today around the SAF tank unit in the Al Shagara neighborhood (of Khartoum) and seized a lot of weapons and killed 260 from the enemy forces and arrested hundreds of others," it said. However, the SAF denied the claims. confirming that the army's special forces repulsed an attack by the RSF on the tank unit."Our forces have repulsed a failed attempt of attack by the RSF. An SAF special unit has defeated the RSF and is still tracking them and inspecting the neighborhoods around the tank unit," it said in a statement on social media. Eyewitnesses said there were aggressive battles Monday between the two sides in southern Khartoum and Omdurman with intensive airstrikes, bombings and

drone strikes. The RSF has repeatedly attacked the tank unit in the Al Shagara neighborhood, prompting the residents of the nearby neighborhoods of Gabra and Al-Sahafa and other areas to leave their homes. Thousands of people have been killed and more than 4 million displaced since the beginning of the war between the RSF and SAF on April 15, espe-

cially in Khartoum and Darfur state. –**APP** Hun Manet elected as Cambodia's

Ethiopia to launch joint Saudi probe

Addis Ababa: Ethiopia will launch a joint investigation with Riyadh into a Human Rights Watch report that accused Saudi border guards of killing hundreds of Ethiopian migrants trying to enter the Gulf kingdom, the foreign ministry said Tuesday. "The Government of Ethiopia will promptly investigate the incident in tandem with the Saudi Authorities," the ministry said on X, formerly Twitter, a day after the publication of the HRW report sparked global outrage. The allegations, described as "unfounded" by a Saudi government source, point to surge in abuses along the perilous route from the Horn of Africa to Saudi Arabia, where hundreds of thousands of Ethiopians live and work. 20-year-old woman

from Ethiopia's Oromia re-

gion, interviewed by HRW,

said Saudi border guards opened fire on a group of migrants they had just released from custody. Ukraine counting on Bulgaria for alternative to Black Sea grain deal

KIEV: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said Tuesday that he was counting on Bulgaria's support for establishing alternatives to the Black Sea grain deal.

"Ukraine is ready to use alternative ways for the 'grain corridor.' We count on Bulgaria's support in this regard," Zelenskyy said during a meeting with Bulgarian Prime Minister Nikolai Denkov in the Greek capital Athens, according to an official statement. The deal gave a safe passage for the transportation of grains from Ukraine's Black Sea ports averting a global food crisis. But Russia suspended its participation in the deal this July. Zelenskyy thanked Denkov for Bulgaria's "comprehensive support" for Ukraine, including through provisions for defense. "He (Zelenskyy) thanked Nikolai Denkov for his support of the Ukrainian Peace Formula and the readiness of the Bulgarian side to participate in the implementation of its specific points. The Head of State also

noted Bulgaria's accession

to the Joint Declaration of Support for Ukraine adopted by the G7 countries at the NATO Summit in Vilnius," it added. Zelenskyy's peace formula, which consists of 10 conditions, was laid out at the latest G20 summit in Indonesia, with its final step being signing a peace accord. It also focuses on issues such as nuclear safety and food and energy security. Zelenskyy later met with his Serbian counterpart Aleksandar Vucic, during which they both noted mutual support of territorial integrity and sovereignty is "an important part of the partnership between Ukraine and Serbia." A statement by the Ukrainian presidency after the meeting said Zelenskyy informed Vucic of the situation at the frontline. Both presidents discussed "the most important issues of regional security, bilateral relations, and prospects for their development." Zelenskyy and Vucic also discussed the common challenges on their path to EU membership, the statement further said. He thanked Vucic for Serbia's humanitarian aid

German FM backs Ukraine's drone attacks

BERLIN: German Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock on Tuesday defended Ukraine's drone attacks inside Russia, and argued that Kyiv is acting within international law. "Russia has attacked Ukraine, and therefore Ukraine has a right enshrined in the UN Charter to defend its country, to defend its people," Baerbock said at a joint news conference with her Estonian counterpart Margus Tsahkna in Berlin. Responding to a question on the recent drone attacks targeting Moscow, she said: "Russia has violated the prohibition of the use of force in the UN Charter. Russia is bombing civilian targets in Ukraine relentlessly, targeting grain silos, hospitals, and churches. Ukraine is defending itself within the framework of international law." Estonian Foreign Minister Tsahkna also voiced support for Ukraine's counteroffensive, and stressed that Kviv's military operations are within the framework of international law. "Russia is responsible for starting the aggression. Russia is responsible of starting genocide. Russia is responsible of everything what it's doing in Ukraine," he said. "We must push Russia back to Russia. We must use aind of opportunities for that,

to Ukraine and its hosting of Ukrainian refugees. Vucic on Instagram said he discussed bilateral, regional and global matters with Zelenskyy. "We looked back at the events in

In a report, published late Monday, the Institute for Public Policy Research (IPPR) stated that the "perma-backlog" risk posed by the Illegal Migration Bill could continue indefinite-

ly "given arrivals likely to outpace removals," even if the controversial Rwanda plan is deemed lawful.

The bill aims to deport asylum seekers arriving in the UK by small boats, and the plan includes detaining the majority of those arriving in small boats for the first 28 days without bail or judicial review. "Illegal Migration Act and Rwanda plan are unlikely to have a major deterrent effect on arrivals. But migration patterns may shift, leading to more undetected arrivals who do not make asylum claims and a growing undocumented population," the report warned. Recalling the sharp increase in arrivals by small boat from less than 300 in 2018 to over 45,000 last year, the report highlighted that there is no reason to expect a "significant decline by 2025." The think tank researchers claimed that the asylum backlog, which currently stands at more than 130,000 cases, will most likely remain significant in coming years. "With a general election expected in the next 12-18 months, the UK's asylum system is in crisis," said the report, noting that the system costs around £3.6 billion (approximately \$4.6 billion) a year in asylum support costs. Comparing potential scenarios for asylum policy over the next 12-18 months, the study predicted that there would still be a growing perma-blog situation with continuing small boat arrivals in the best-case scenario. "Under most plausible scenarios - even those most advantageous from the government's perspective - the likelihood of small boat arrivals falling to zero or negligible amounts is very low." -Agencies

EU reiterates support for membership aspirations LONDON: The European Union on Monday reiterated its

support for the membership aspirations of the Western Balkan countries, Ukraine and Moldova in the bloc. European Council President Charles Michel and European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen attended an evening dinner in the Greek capital Athens on the occasion of the 20th anniversary of the Thessaloniki Declaration, in which the bloc reiterated its full and unequivocal commitment to the EU membership perspective of the Western Balkans and its support for the acceleration of the accession process and related reforms. Michel, who released a statement on the social media platform X, formerly known as Twitter, said he had productive meetings with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and Moldovan President Maia Sandu. "WesternBalkans, Ukraine and Moldova have a common European heritage, history and future. Enlargement remains a top priority for EU - a strong tool to foster peace, security and prosperity on our continent. We need to find the way forward to make this vision of Europe a reality," he said. Von der Leyen said: "We need to bring our friends, the aspiring members of the EU, much closer to us and much faster. Glad to be in Athens to discuss the European perspective of our neighbors and partners in the East and the Western Balkans. We will keep bringing down barriers between our regions." She said she met separately with Kosovo Prime Minister Albin Kurti and Serbian President Aleksandar Vucic.

African Union suspends Niger over coup

ADDIS ABABA: The African Union said Tuesday it had suspended coup-hit Niger until civilian rule is restored and announced it would assess the implications of any armed intervention in the Sahel nation. In a crisis now nearly four weeks old, the West African regional bloc ECOWAS has threatened to use force to reinstate Niger's elected president, Mohamed Bazoum. The Peace and Security Council "requests the AU Commission to undertake an assessment of the economic, social and security implications of deploying a standby force in Niger and report back to Council," the bloc said, following strong differences on the matter. Army officers toppled Bazoum on July 26, prompting the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) to approve activation of a "standby force to restore constitutional order" in Niamey. The bloc has said it is ready to intervene as a last resort but is continuing to press for a diplomatic solution. The AU last week held a meeting on the crisis against a backdrop of divergent views within the bloc over any military intervention.

The coup has heightened international worries over the Sahel, which faces growing jihadist insurgencies linked to Al-Qaeda and the Islamic State group. Niger is the fourth nation in West Africa since 2020 to suffer a coup, following Burkina Faso, Guinea and Mali. The new military ruler General Abdourahamane Tiani has proposed a three-year transition back to democracy, a call rejected by ECOWAS, which sent a delegation to visit Niger on the weekend in a final diplomatic push. Abdel-Fatau Musah, ECOWAS

commissioner for politics and security, described the proposal as "a joke" and said the bloc would "never accept it". "We want constitutional order to be restored as soon as possible," he told Al Jazeera in an interview broad-

Imaan Mazari gets bail in damage case

ISLAMABAD:Pronouncing a reserved verdict, a district and sessions court in Islamabad on Tuesday accepted the bail application of human rights lawyer and daughter of former PTI leader Shireen Mazari, Imaan Hazir Mazari, in the case of interference in official duty and causing damage to public properties in lieu of bail bonds of Rs30,000 each.

Two FIRs had been registered against Imaan and former member of the National Assembly (MNA) Ali Wazir belonging to the Pashtun Tahaffuz Move¬ment (PTM) at Tarnol police station of the federal capital. The same court, however, send Wazir to Adiala Jail on judicial remand. An anti-terrorism court in Islamabad had on Monday granted to the police three-day physical remand of Imaan Mazari and former lawmaker Ali Wazir in a sedition case. Wazir was arrested on Saturday, while Imaan was picked up from her home in the early hours of Sunday.

Life returns to normalcy in violence-hit Jaranwala

JARANWALA: Life starts returning to normalcy seven days after riots in Jaranwala as traffic is back on roads and markets have also opened. On the other hand, on the directives of Punjab Chief Minister Syed Mohsin Naqvi, work is in progress for the rehabilitation of members of the Christian communitv whose homes were destroyed and even churches were burnt by mobs of people who had gone berserk after hearing reports of desecration of the holy Quran. A relief camp has been set up at city's Danish School where besides the provision of other facilities, teams of doctors are also present for the treatment of patients. Earlier, Prime Minister Anwarul Haq Kakar and CM Naqvi had distributed cheques among the affected members of the community. Rs2 million were given to each affected person. Similarly, different NGOs, too, have provided ration to the victims of violence. Over 80 homes and 19 churches were vandalized and torched when thou-sands rampaged through a Christian neighbor-hood in Jaranwala last week. Terror and pan-ic gripped the town for hours as the mob armed with batons, push carts and patrol cans stormed Christians' homes and churches, ransacked them and even burnt them.

North Korea airline flies first int'l flight since Covid

PYONGYANG: North Korea's flagship carrier has flown its first international flight since the pandemic. Air Koryo's JS151 left Pyongyang Tuesday morning and landed at Beijing Capital Airport at 09:16 local time (01:16 GMT), data from real-time flight tracking service Flightradar24 showed. It is unclear who was on board or how many passengers JS151 was carrying.

Travel agency Koryo Tours said the Pyongyang-Beijing route was reopened as a means for North Koreans to get home. According to Flightradar24, flight JS151 was flown on a Tupolev Tu-204 aircraft which can carry up to 210 passengers.

It is unclear how many passengers were on board the plane, scheduled to depart for Pyongyang from the Chinese capital at 13:05. But Kyodo News reported that Air Koryo's check-in counter at Beijing airport was packed with passengers wearing North Korean flag pins on their chests and pushing trol leys full of baggage.

PIA grounds 11 aircraft; 3 beyond repair

RAWALPINDI: Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) has grounded 11 aircraft, including three of its Boeing 777s, as the national flag carrier faces a serious financial crisis due to the uncontrolled flight of dollars and increase in prices of petroleum products. According to sources, the air-

line, which operates around 30 aircraft, has been facing serious difficulties in procuring spare parts for the past three years due to scarcity of funds, which has resulted in the grounding of 11 planes. Two of the three wide-body Boeing 777 aircraft were grounded in 2020 and one in 2021 Five A320 aircraft have also been grounded - two in 2021 and three in 2023. PIA also grounded three ATR aircraft - one each in 2020, 2022 and 2023.

ISLAMABAD: PTI leader Asad Umar on Tuesday secured pre-arrest bail from a special court in Islamabad - established a day earlier to hear the cases filed under the Official Secrets Act – in the ongoing cipher case. The bail was approved with surety bonds of Rs100,000. Talking to reporters outside the court, he also refuted media reports regarding his arrest by the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA). These reports emerged after a first information report (FIR) was registered against PTI Chairman Imran Khan and party leader Shah Mahmood Qureshi under the Official Secrets Act. It also named Umar as one of the "associates" that investigators wanted to question in this connection. A day earlier, the special court remanded Qureshi into FIA custody for four days. Separately, the agency also recently interrogated Imran in Attock jail, where he is currently serving a sentence in the Toshakhana case. Umar, along with PTI lawyer Babar Awan, reached the special court in Islamabad. - DNA

Trump plans to turn himself in over Georgia indictment

WASHINGTON: Former U.S. President Donald Trump plans to surrender on Thursday in Atlanta in connection with his indictment in Georgia on charges he sought to overturn his 2020 election loss in the state, he said on social media on Monday.

"I'll be going to Atlanta, Georgia, on Thursday to be ARRESTED," Trump, who is running for reelection in 2024, said on his Truth Social platform. He described the indictment as a politically motivated effort to derail his reelection campaign.

US media earlier reported that Trump planned to turn himself in at the Fulton County jail in Atlanta on Thursday. The date was set during negotiations between Trump's lawyers and the Fulton County district attorney's office on Monday over Trump's consent bond and release conditions, according to media.

In a 98-page Georgia indictment revealed last week, Trump and 18 other defendants were charged with a total of 41 criminal counts in connection with efforts to reverse his defeat in the state's 2020 election.

John Eastman, Trump's former personal lawyer who has also been indicted in the Georgia case, plans to surrender to Fulton County authorities on Wednesday, a court filing showed on Monday. Eastman had reached a \$100,000 bond agreement with Fulton County District Attorney Fani Willis earlier on Monday.

The Georgia case marked Trump's fourth indictment. He faces a New York state trial in March involving a hush money payment to a porn star and a federal trial in May in Florida for allegedly mishandling federal classified documents.

Another indictment, in Washington federal court, accuses him of illegally seeking to overturn his 2020 election defeat. U.S. Special Counsel Jack Smith has requested a January trial, but a date has not yet been set. Trump has pleaded not guilty in all criminal cases and could spend much of next year in court, even as he campaigns to retake the White House.

In Georgia, the former president will face a \$200,000 bond and orders not to send threatening social media messages as the he awaits trial, according to a bond agreement on Monday signed by Trump's attorneys and the Fulton Country district attorney. Security will be tightened around the jail when Trump surrenders, the local sheriff's office said. Trump has repeatedly asserted without evidence that indictments against him are "witch hunts." He has reg ularly attacked Willis online and called her "radical left" and "corrupt."

Trump, the front-runner for the 2024 Republican presidential nomination, and his co-defendants were indicted on Aug. 14. Willis gave them until Friday at noon ET (1600 GMT) to surrender or face arrest.

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Tuesday adjourned the appeal

against his conviction and sentence in the Toshakhana case till Thursday. Today, the IHC also took up the plea seeking "better class/A-Class" jail facilities for Imran while also urging that his detention in At-

tock Jail be declared "illegal" and for the ex-premier to be shifted to Adiala Jail in Rawalpindi. On August 5, a trial court in Islamabad found the PTI chief guilty of "corrupt practices" in a case pertaining to concealing details of state gifts and sentenced him to three years in prison. The verdict also means that he stood disqualified from contesting general elections for five years. A day ago, a report by Additional District and Sessions Judge Shafqut Ullah Khan stated that the "grave concern" regarding a lack of privacy around Imran's prison cell's toilet facilities due to a CCTV camera's presence was "genuine" and point towards a violation of prison rules.

China urges Japan to halt release of contaminated water into sea

BEIJING: China strongly urges Japan to cancel the plan to release nuclear-contaminated water into the sea and dispose of it responsibly, a Foreign Ministry spokesperson said Tuesday in Beijing. Spokesperson Wang Wenbin told a news briefing that in disregard of the strong concerns and firm opposition from the international community, the Japanese government announced the decision to start releasing the Fukushima nuclear-contaminated water into the ocean from August 24. "This is extremely selfish and irresponsible, as the discharge will spread the risks of nuclear contamination to the rest of the world, and by doing so, Japan is putting its selfish interests above the long-term wellbeing of the entire humanity. China is gravely concerned and strongly opposed to this. We have made serious demarches to Japan," said Wang. For the past two years and more, the legitimacy, legality and safety of Japan's ocean discharge plan has been questioned over and over again by the international community. Japan has yet to address major international concerns such as the long-term reliability of the purification facility, the authenticity and accuracy of the nuclear-contaminated water data, and the effectiveness of the monitoring arrangement, he said. China and other stakeholders have pointed out on multiple occasions that if the Fukushima nuclear-contaminated water is truly safe, Japan wouldn't have to dump it into the sea and certainly shouldn't if it's not, said Wang, adding that it is unjustified, unreasonable and unnecessary for Japan to push through ocean discharge plan. - APP

Europe's heatwave turns deadly as 18 bodies found

In Spain, where most of the country was in very high or extreme risk of wildfire as a consequence of the summer's fourth heatwave, authorities were struggling to stabilise a huge wildfire that has been ravaging forests on the island of Tenerife for a week

ALEXANDROUPOLIS: Eighteen charred bodies were found in a remote village in northern Greece on Tuesday, where wildfires have been raging for days, the fire brigade said as a heatwave hitting southern Europe turned deadly.

Greek media, without citing sources, said the bodies found south of the village of Avantas in northern Greece were thought to be of migrants. The broader Evros region is a popular route for migrants crossing from Turkey into Greece. On Monday, the burned body of another man believed to be a migrant was found in

the region, a local police official said. Firefighters were also battling blazes in Spain, Italy and Portugal as well was two new blazes that broke out near the Greek capital, Athens, as the region suffered hot, dry and windy conditions that scientists have linked to climate change.

In Spain, where most of the country was in very high or extreme risk of wildfire as a consequence of the summer's fourth heatwave, authorities were struggling to stabilise a huge wildfire that has been ravaging forests on the island of Tenerife for a week. Temperatures were likely to reach or ex-

ceed 40 degrees Celsius (104 degrees Fahrenheit) in large areas of the southwest and northeast of the Iberian peninsula, national weather agency AEMET said. In the Greek port town of Alexandroup-

olis, not far from Avantason, wildfires forced the evacuation of dozens of hospital patients, including newborn babies. A ferry was turned into a makeshift hospital after 65 patients were evacuated from the University Hospital. Elderly patients lay on mattresses strewn across the cafeteria floor, paramedics attended to others on stretch-

ers and a woman held a man resting on a sofa, an IV drip attached to his hand. "I've been working for 27 years, I've never seen anything like this," said nurse Nikos Gioktsidis. "Stretchers everywhere, patients here, IV drips there ... it was like a war, like a bomb had exploded." The burned body of a man believed to be a migrant was found in a rural area near Alexandroupolis on Monday, a local police official said. "Weather conditions are extreme and will remain extreme for the coming days," Fire Service spokesman Vassilis Varthakogiannis told ERT TV. - Agencies
