GILGIT: Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar on Tuesday directed the authorities concerned to identify the elements spreading chaos in the name of religion in Gilgit, and take strict action against them. The prime minister, chairing a meeting to discuss development projects and law and order situation in Gilgit Baltistan, said the security of every citizen was the state's responsibility. In the meeting, the prime minister was briefed about the progress on projects in information technology, health, education, and other sectors, as well as the issues. He was told that steps had been taken to identify and address the problems confronting the education sector in all GB districts, particularly Diamer and Astore.

The measures taken for the promotion of education sector included the provision of food to the students, reconstruction of buildings and rehabilitation of dilapidated structures, professional training of teachers, and establishment of smart schools. The prime minister was also apprised of projects in the GB health sector including the establishment of a 24hour helpline to address the issue of mental health.

Besides the performance of the environment and tourism sectors, the prime minister was also briefed about the sowing of wheat and subsidy on the crop, production and potential of hydel power in GB as well as the budget. Prime Minister Kakar directed the GB administration and leadership to assess the scope of the ongoing development projects and give a special focus on those of a crucial nature. Interim Interior Minister Sarfaraz Bugti, Interim Information and Broadcasting Minister Murtaza Solangi, Gilgit Baltistan Governor Syed Mehdi Shah, Chief Minister Gulbar Khan, GB chief secretary and IG Police, and senior officers attended the meeting. SC upholds convictions of two ex-army officers

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court (SC) ruled on Tuesday that pleas filed by two former army officers against their convictions for plotting to overthrow the government of late prime minister Benazir Bhutto in 1995 were "without merit" and hence, stood dismissed. The two ex-army officers, Col Mohammad Azad Minhas and Col Inayat Ullah Khan, were arrested on Sept 26, 1995, along with now deceased Maj Gen Zaheerul Islam Abbasi, Brig Mustansir Billa and 38 other military officers on the charge of plotting to storm a corps commanders meeting scheduled to be held on Sept 30 that year at the General Headquarters in Rawalpindi. The alleged plan included the assassination of then-prime minister Benazir and army chief Gen Waheed Kakar, senior cabinet ministers and military chiefs, to be followed by the proclamation of the Islamic system of Khilafat with Maj Gen Abbasi as Ameerul Momineen. The details of the conspiracy were revealed after Qari Saifullah breakaway faction called Harkat-ul-Jihad al Islami,

TRIPOLI: At least 2,300 people were killed in Libya and thousands more were reported missing on Tuesday after catastrophic flash floods broke river dams and tore through an eastern coastal city, devastating entire neighbourhoods. As global concern spread, multiple nations offered to urgently send aid and rescue teams to help the warscarred country that has been overwhelmed by what one UN official labelled "a calamity of epic proportions". Massive destruction shattered the Mediterranean coastal city of Derna, home to 100,000 people, where multi-storey buildings on the river banks collapsed and houses and cars vanished in the raging waters. Cracks down on electricity theft continues

PESHAWAR: The district administration, in a joint operation with WAPDA officials on Tuesday, disconnected dozens of illegal electricity connections (kunda mafia) and registered FIRs against those involved. Upon the directives of Shah Fahd, Deputy Commissioner Peshawar, a crackdown operation is currently underway against electricity theft and the Kunda mafia in the provincial capital. The insiders said the national flag carrier has requested the government for immediate provision of funds. Earlier it emerged that PIA is likely to ground more planes amid the current financial crisis. The flight suspension looms on the PIA heads as 15 more aircraft will be grounded if the national airline does not pay the amount within two days.

ISLAMABAD: Ahsan Zafar Bakhtawari, President, Islamabad Chamber of Commerce and Industry (ICCI) said that the government should focus on the pharmaceutical industry to boost exports as this sector has great potential to increase esports to over US\$ 5 billion within a few years with the support of the government. He said that around 639 pharmaceutical manufacturing units are working in Pakistan, employing approximately 240,000 people and exporting products worth more than \$300 million to over 60 countries. However, streamlining reg-

ulations and addressing the key issues of this industry would help boost its exports to billions of dollars. He said this while addressing a delegation of Pakistan

the local manufacturing of active pharmaceutical ingredients (APIs) to reduce our dependence on imports. This would not only make Pakistan self-reliant but would also create opportunities for export-oriented growth. He said that ICCI is actively working with the relevant authorities of the government including the Ministry of Commerce and Special Investment Facilitation Council to promote the pharma in-

dustry and assured that ICCI

would cooperate with PPMA in resolving the key issues of this sector. Speaking on the occasion, Arshad Mehmood, Zone Chairman North of PPMA said that the pharma industry is importing most of its raw material to manufacture medicines, but due to significant devaluation of the rupee and the rising inflation, the manufacturing cost of this has increased manifold. He stressed that the government should introduce a zero tax regime for import of pharma plants & machinery and the packing material besides reducing taxes on utility bills that would help upgrade the pharma industry and further boost its exports. Engr. Azhar ul Islam Zafar, VP ICCI said that the Chamber has constituted a committee for the pharmaceutical sector, which is working to resolve the major issues of this sector.

Emergency response launched against threat on cotton crop

LAHORE: In response to the whitefly threat to the cotton crop, Punjab Caretaker Chief Minister Mohsin Naqvi has instructed Secretary Agriculture Iftikhar Sahu to implement immediate protective measures on an emergency basis. Secretary Agriculture is set to visit Jampur to over see these security measures, said a handout issued here on Tuesday. As part of the whitefly eradication campaign, helicopters and drones, in collaboration with the Pakistan Army, will be deployed for crop spraying in southern Punjab. The initiative commences with the deployment of two drones in the Rajanpur area, where 1,000 liters of potent pesticide will be applied over 300 acres in Jampur. Additionally, 1,400 high-pressure spray machines are being utilized in Rajanpur and Bahawalpur districts, with a concerted effort to secure ample canal water for the cotton zones. The Pakistan Army has graciously provided helicopters and drones for the extensive spraying operation. Expressing solidarity with the diligent farmers, the CM reassured that their tireless efforts will not be in vain. Every conceivable measure will be employed to shield the cotton crop from the whitefly attack. - DNA

13 warehouses sealed for sugar hoarding: **Commissioner Rawalpindi Liagat Ali**

Commissioner Rawalpindi ware houses sealed on charges of hoarding sugar, seized 2313 bags of 50 kg to be sold to consumers in the Sunday market at Rs 150 per kg

RAWALPINDI: Commissioner Rawalpindi Division Liaqat Ali Chatha directed the Deputy Commissioners of the four districts that the meeting of the District Price Control Committee must be convened at least twice a month so that the prices can be determined correctly and appropriately. He said that the country is currently going through a critical economic situation, but we are trying hard to provide all possible relief to the people. He said that the participation of market committee members and administrative officers should be

ensured in the bidding process in the market - soon Rawalpindi city will have its own market which

will reduce the prices. He expressed these views while presiding over a meeting held at the Commissioner's Office Rawalpindi. In the meeting, Additional Commissioner Coordination Syed Nazarat Ali, Deputy Commissioner Rawalpindi Dr. Hasan Wagar Cheema, Additional Deputy Commissioner Revenue Nabil Sandu, Assistant Commissioner General Maleeha Jamal, Director Agriculture Rana Shahid, Chief Officer Municipal Corporation Amjad Chaudhry, Civil Defense Officer Sanjida Khanum and other concerned officers attended meeting in person whereas Deputy Commissioner Attock, Jhelum and Chakwal participated through video link. Commissioner further said that although the increase in prices of essential commodities is linked to the increase in the global market due to which all products are affected, we are trying our best not to let anyone take undue advantage of this situation. He directed that some lenien-

cy should be given to those who create artificial inflation through hoarding and to provide relief to the public, he ensured the supply of food items at the DC counters set up at all stores at official rates and quality. While briefing Commissioner Rawalpindi about the details of the measures to be taken in connection with price control, it was informed that from September 1, 2023 till now, during a total of 10,429 raids across the district, 786 violations were reported and a total of Rs. 1,021,000 fines were imposed. 02 FIRs, 05 buildings were sealed and 09 wholesalers were arrested. Similarly, to moderate the prices of sugar, 21 warehouses suspected of hoarding were checked, out of which 2313 bags of 50 kg were seized and 13 warehouses were sealed. Commissioner Rawalpindi said that this sugar seized from hoarders should be sold to consumers at the rate of Rs 150 per

kg in the Sunday market.

Toyota Corolla and Yaris cars sales also declined by 52.83 percent as it went down to 2,186 units from 4,635 units in previous year. Suzuki Swift's sales also decreased by 11.48 percent as its sale went down to 755 units from 853 units last year. Sale of Suzuki Cul tus declined to 482 units during the first two months of the current year, whereas during the same months last year, the sale was recorded at 1,072 units while the sale of Suzuki WagonR also decreased to 604 units from 647 units last year.

The escape of Wandsworth reveals

Nhe escape of a suspected terrorist from HMP Wandsworth last week proves the point that critics of English and Welsh prisons have been making for some time with rising desperation. Overcrowded, dirty jails with demoralised staff are unable to fulfil their purpose of rehabilitating prisoners. They are also a danger to inmates, staff and the public. Daniel Khalife, who was on the run for four days, was recaptured in west London on Saturday. Alex Chalk, the justice secretary, has ordered an investigation into how the former British soldier managed to flee by strapping himself to the bottom of a catering delivery truck. Sir Mark Rowley, the Metropolitan police chief, believes the escape must have been planned, possibly with help from inside the prison, and 150 counter-terrorism officers were involved in the search. It seems likely that mistakes were made in Wandsworth, and individuals may be culpable. The placement of a man accused of involvement in espionage in a category B prison, rather than at high-security Belmarsh, will be examined. So will the decision to employ him in the kitchen - a "plum job" usually offered to prisoners serving long sentences, according to John Podmore, a former governor. But Mr Chalk's promise to leave no stone unturned and find out "who was on duty" did not inspire confidence. Instead, the panicked ministerial reaction was a disturbing example of locking the stable door after the horse has bolted. With a population at 171% of its certified capacity, Wandsworth is the second most overcrowded prison in the English and Welsh estate - just behind HMP Durham. A previous escape from Wandsworth took place in 2019. But problems are not limited to one or two "failing jails". After an inspection, the issuing of an urgent notification is the most serious step inspectors can take, requiring an action plan from the government within 28 days. In an unprecedented deterioration, three separate urgent notifications have been issued in the past five months - one of them about Cookham Wood, a youth prison, which was found to be full of homemade weapons. Of course, public concern - and that of politicians and the security services - is highest when prisons are revealed to be incapable of performing their most basic task, of keeping people locked up. But as well as punishing criminals, jails are supposed to help them change. Amid current levels of violence, overuse of solitary confinement and lack of purposeful activity, experts warn that inmates are more likely to be made worse. Earlier this year, a German court refused a British extradition request on the grounds that detention conditions were unacceptable. The number of prison officers has climbed by 3.2% since last year, to 22,426. Over the same period, the number of prisoners rose by 7% to its current total of 87,124 – not far off the all-time high of just over 88,000. But perhaps more alarming than the raw numbers is the fact that – as in police forces, schools and hospitals - experienced staff whose jobs were cut under austerity are proving difficult to replace. The new people hired by recruiters, when ministers belatedly recognised the harm caused by depleted workforces, are not like-for-like replacements. Rapid turnover and difficulties around retention are now acute issues across the public sector.






Ties between N.Korea, Russia is bad for everyone

orth Korea is adept at grabbing attention through both rhetoric and weaponry. It announced that it had launched its first "tactical nuclear attack submarine", though the South Korean military said it did not appear to be operational. The most important development of recent days, however, is the report that Kim Jong-un will visit Russia, to discuss weapons sales with Vladimir Putin. Moscow has also proposed trilateral naval drills with China. An old but never easy three-way relationship is picking up again. Mr Kim's grandfather rose to power thanks to the Soviet Union's support; China's close but fraught relationship with its neighbour is longstanding. Yet from 2006, Moscow and Beijing were sufficiently concerned about Pyongyang's weapons programme to support a series of UN security council sanctions, even as their differences with the west on other matters mushroomed. Last year, however, they blocked a USdrafted resolution to tighten sanctions. The shift began with Donald Trump. His lurch from threats of "fire and fury" to bestowing a bilateral meeting on Mr Kim pushed a previously disdainful Xi Jinping into embracing Pyongyang. When a second Trump summit broke down, Mr Kim courted Russia too, to remind the US that he had options, and held his first meeting with Mr Putin in 2019. But the invasion of Ukraine was a turning point. North Korea is one of a handful of countries to have enthusiastically backed Russia at the UN. A year ago, US intelligence said it believed that Moscow was buying huge quantities of artillery shells and rockets from Pyongyang as its stocks were rapidly consumed. This summer, Mr Kim personally guided Sergei Shoigu, Russia's defence minister, around an arms exhibition. The pandemic appears to have left North Korea in desperate circumstances. The leadership cut the country off entirely and seized the opportunity to tighten its grip over every aspect of life - leaving people unable to feed themselves. China is believed to have been propping it up with emergency supplies. Nonetheless, while food is desperately needed, the regime is likely to press Moscow hard for technological assistance. Pyongyang's alarming progress in its weapons programmes proceeds, but it still needs expertise and income to advance further. On Russia's part, its need for help from its former protege is another indication of its reduced status. And while the compatibility of Pyongyang's older Soviet-copy arms is presumably a factor, the discussions also suggest that China so far remains unwilling to sell Russia weaponry, despite its "no limits" friendship, diplomatic backing and the ongoing sale of dual-use equipment. Neither Moscow nor Beijing wants to see North Korea advance its capabilities. It is a costly, unreliable partner. They want to avoid nuclear proliferation in the region and to limit the development of US-Japan-South Korea partnership: though it is primarily a response to China's growing might, concerns about Pyongyang have contributed. Russia would like to maintain its battered relationship with South Korea - a major trade partner prior to the invasion of Ukraine - rather than push it closer to the US. But even if Mr Putin stops short of sharing technology, income from arms sales is more likely to be used to fund weapons development than it is to feed malnourished North Koreans. Russian purchases might also encourage others to buy from Pyongyang again. The renewed ties are cause for significant concern, and not only in Ukraine. The impact of civil wars on Burundi's politics and economy

urundi is formally known as the Republic of Burundi. It is a landlocked country, almost entirely surrounded by land, with no direct access to the sea. Located in the Great Rift Valley, it serves as a linkage between the African Great Lakes region and East Africa. Burundi shares its border with Rwanda to the north, Tanzania to the east and southeast, and the Democratic Republic of Congo to the west. Lake Tanganyika runs along its southwestern border. The capital city of Burundi was Bujumbura until it was moved to Gitega in 2019. Bujumbura is the largest city in Burundi and is renowned for its beauty due to its location on Lake Tanganyika. Gitega is the second-largest city and is home to the Burundi National Museum, which adds to its allure by showcasing the culture and history of Burundi. Dancing and drumming are integral parts of the people's entertainment and signify the culture of Burundi. Grilled meat and fish are popular components of their cuisine.

Burundi has a population of over 11 million, making it one of the countries with the lowest population in the world. It is noteworthy that the majority of Burundi's population is under 25, indicating a high youth population rate. Population growth is increasing rapidly, posing a significant challenge in terms of providing adequate education, food, and shelter. Women in Burundi tend to have more children compared to other countries, with various cultural practices such as early marriage and a preference for large families contributing to this trend. Illiteracy, lack of education, and limited family planning services also play a role. There are three main ethnic groups in Burundi: Hutu, comprising 85% of the population; Tutsi, making up about 14%; and Twa, constituting only 1% of the population. These ethnic groups have distinct cultures, traditions, languages, and be-

haviors, regardless of their biological identities. Hutus are primarily involved in farming and agriculture, while Tutsis are engaged in cattle herding. Twa people live as a minority in Burundi and face challenges related to unequal rights in society. The official languages of Burundi are Kirundi and French, with Swahili also spoken widely. Unlike some other African countries, Burundi's ethnic groups are less diverse, with Hutus and Tutsis forming the majority of the population and sharing language homogeneity. Kirundi, one of the official languages, serves as a common means of communication between these two groups. Christianity is the most followed religion in Burundi, with approximately 93% of the population adhering to it. Roman Catholicism accounts for 63% of Christians, while Protestantism represents 25%. Other religions are also followed by a minority of people in Burundi, with about 4.5% practicing indigenous beliefs and 2.1% following Islam. Burundi was an independent kingdom before the 20th century. After World War I, Germany was defeated, and subsequently, both Belgians and Germans ruled over Burundi and Rwanda. Burundi gained independence in 1962, but it experienced assassinations, coups, regional instability, and a devastating civil war that claimed thousands of lives. Ethnic tensions between Hutus and Tutsis have been a recurring issue in Burundi's history. In 1965, a coup attempt in Burundi was driven by these ethnic tensions. In 1972, Hutu militants attacked Tutsis with the intention of causing harm. From 1993 to 2005, Burundi endured a civil war in which Tutsis suffered significant casualties. The ongoing Somali civil war, which began in 2007, also contributes to ethnic tensions. Ethnic differences have been exacerbated by the historical favoritism shown to Tutsis during Belgian rule. Competition for limited economic resources has further strained relations among ethnic groups, and the presence of refugees in Burundi has added to ethnic tensions.

The persistent and ongoing civil wars in Burundi have been a major cause of political instability. These conflicts have resulted in significant loss of life, negatively impacting the economy and political stability. Many people have been forced to seek refuge in neighboring countries due to the severe conflicts. The instability within the country has hindered development efforts, causing a depletion of the economy and reduced investment due to an unstable government. Weak leadership has further contributed to an unstable political environment and poor governance. In times of war, the country's priorities shift away from education, healthcare, and infrastructure toward maintaining an unstable structure. The psychological impact on the population is also profound. To address ethnic tensions, actions are needed at both the national and international levels. Dialogues should be encouraged with ethnic groups, political leaders, and civil society organizations. Ethnic-based violence has significantly affected basic human rights in Burundi, and steps should be taken to strengthen the rule of law to combat cruelty and injustice. A just society can be established where everyone is treated equally regardless of their caste, creed, or religious beliefs. No one is above the law, and accountability is essential for developing a stable political system and governance. In the long run, education and awareness are crucial for resolving these tensions. Establishing an equitable system and promoting awareness of its importance can lead to lasting peace in the country. History has shown that systems of equality and justice are the foundation for prosperity, while injustice deprives ordinary people of their rights, which is unacceptable.

Burundi's economy is heavily reliant on agriculture, with approximately 90% of its economic production coming from this sector. Farming holds paramount importance in Burundi, as many people rely on crop cultivation to feed their families. The country's major export is coffee, which is abundantly produced there. Additionally, tea is a significant export commodity. Maize is another staple crop in Burundi, playing a vital role in reducing food insecurity in the country. Maize is a drought-resistant crop that can thrive in varying climatic conditions and improve soil fertility. Due to its high production, many people in Burundi meet their needs by selling maize. Similarly, sorghum and beans are also sold on a large scale in Burundi, serving as a crucial source of income for its impoverished population. However, Burundi's agricultural production faces serious challenges due to its underdeveloped status, lacking the machinery required for enhanced production. Consequently, agriculture primarily relies on basic tools, resulting in limited output. The absence of high-quality insecticides and fertilizers further hinders crop quality and protection from pests. Burundi experiences varying climatic changes based on altitude. In the western part of the country, where mountains are located, heavy rainfall occurs almost year-round, and temperatures remain relatively high due to the altitude. In contrast, the Rift Valley, with its lower altitude, receives minimal rainfall throughout the year and experiences high temperatures and humidity. Overall, Burundi has two main rainy seasons: one from February to May and a shorter one from September to November. Unfortunately, these rainfalls can damage crops and harm agricultural production. The educational system in Burundi is on the brink of collapse, with one of the lowest literacy rates in the world. During the Burundian civil war, 25% of schools were destroyed, and many teachers were killed. Although education for six years is compulsory, almost half a million children lack access to education and does not attend school. Political instability has not only

impacted the system externally but has also resulted in a shortage of qualified teachers, leading to a significant decline in the quality of education. In a country where the majority of the population consists of youth, such a failing education system poses a severe obstacle to development and prosperity, contributing to high youth unemployment. Transportation is challenging in Burundi due to poorly constructed roads. In rural areas, many people have to travel long distances on foot, while bicycles are commonly used for transportation within cities and towns. Buses and minibuses are used in major cities for convenience. Motorcycles, commonly known as "boda-bodas," are occasionally used for urban transportation. However, they are rare in Burundi. Improving road infrastructure and transportation options is essential for the country's economic growth. The healthcare system in Burundi is underdeveloped, with the majority of hospitals, both public and private, concentrated in the capital, Bujumbura, and urban areas. Some small healthcare facilities exist in rural areas to provide basic medical treatment, but access to quality healthcare remains a concern. Limited education also contributes to the shortage of qualified medical professionals. As a result, diseases such as malaria, tuberculosis, HIV/AIDS, and malnutrition are widespread. Hypertension and diabetes are common among the Burundian population and maternal and child health is at risk. It is crucial for organizations and NGOs to play a significant role in providing healthcare facilities to ensure the well-being of the population. Corruption is a major issue in Burundi and ranks among the top 25 most corrupt countries globally. Corruption erodes public trust in the government and discourages foreign investors, leading to slower economic growth. Ethnic tensions, poor infrastructure, low income levels, and limited agricultural production all contribute to the destruction of Burundi's economy. These factors have led to Burundi being labeled as one of the world's poorest countries.

PCB announces schedule of **Women's U19**

LAHORE: PCB on Tuesday announced the schedule of the five-team U19 T20 Women Cricket Tournament 2023, which is set to commence at the Lahore Country Club in Muridke from Wednesday, 13 September. The tournament promises to showcase the incredible talent and passion of young female cricketers from across the nation. The tournament will feature five teams namely Challengers, Conquerors, Invincibles, Stars and Strikers. The nine-day tournament will be conducted on a round-robin basis, meaning each team will play at least four matches. The final will be played on 21 September, after the league stage is done. The toss will take place at 09:30 PST, while the first ball of the match will be bowled at 10:00 PST. The U19 T20 Women Cricket Tournament 2023 serves as a perfect opportunity for the players to stake a claim in the national U19 side ahead of Pakistan U19 women's team's maiden tour to Bangladesh in January 2024. To further incentivise the players to bring out their best performances, the PCB has also introduced financial awards to encourage the players to bring out their best. The winning team will receive PKR 0.5 million, while the runner-up will get PKR 0.3 million. The player of the tournament will be PKR25,000 and each player of the match will receive PKR10,000. The tournament's top performers - best player, best batter, best bowler and best wicket-keeper - will be gifted kit bags to encourage them to enhance their skills and pursue their cricketing ambitions. The PCB has also finalised the five squads, which consist of 14 players each. These squads have been selected by the national women's selection committee headed by former Test cricketer Saleem Jaffar after country-wide open trials in eight academies last month. Eleven players have been placed in the reserve pool and they can be called up based on a team's requirement. Only players born on or after 1 September 2004 are eligible to play in the tournament. IHF pulls out Olympic qualifiers from Pakistan

LONDON: The International Hockey Federation (FIH) has pulled out one of the men's Olympic qualifier events for the 2024 Paris Olympics from Pakistan. The growing concern over non-cooperation and undue interference in the daily operations of the Pakistan Hockey Federation (PHF) reportedly became the reason for this decision, which was a tough choice for the FIH. It may be noted that the PHF had recently faced suspension by the Pakistan Sports Board (PSB), which subsequently mandated fresh elections just last month. This suspension came into immediate effect on the orders of former prime minister Shahbaz Sharif, who issued the decree on his final day in office. The suspension of the national hockey governing body, sanctioned by the state-owned institution, the PSB, has played a pivotal role in the international body's decision. In a prior announcement made in July, the FIH had disclosed that China, Pakistan, and Spain were chosen to host the FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifiers, set to unfold between January 13 and 21, 2024. Lahore had been designated as one of the venues for the men's qualifying matches. - Agencies

Poland extend ban on Ukraine grain imports

WARSAW: The Polish government on Tuesday agreed to extend a ban on Ukrainian grain imports unilaterally even if the current EU restrictions expire on September 15. "Regardless of the (European) Commission's further decision, we will not open the border to Ukrainian grain after that date," the government said in a statement. The statement said the government was still looking to extend the ban at the EU level but would do so in any case. "If Brussels does not keep the embargo, we will introduce these measures ourselves... The interests of the Polish countryside are most important to us," it said. The conflict in Ukraine and the problems with Ukrainian grain exports through the Black Sea have resulted in the EU becoming a major transit route and export destination for Ukrainian grain. In June, the EU agreed to restrict imports of grain from Ukraine to five member states seeking to protect their farmers who blamed those imports for the slump in prices on local markets. The five member states are Bulgaria, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Slovakia. The five have asked for the restrictions, which expire on Friday, to be extended. The issue is particularly sensitive in Poland as the country is holding elections next month. – **APP**

Over 400,000 people at risk of Emergency hunger: UN

New York: A recent UN agency analysis published on Tuesday warned that every 1% cut in food assistance risks pushing more than 400,000 people to the brink of starvation, emphasizing the importance of scaling up life-saving assistance. The UN World Food Program (WFP) "is being forced to drastically cut rations in most of its operations as international humanitarian funding plummets," the agency warned in a statement. "Experts at the agency estimate that, as a result, an additional 24 million people could slip into emergency hunger over the next 12 months a 50 percent increase on the current level," it added. Citing WFP Executive Director Cindy McCain, the statement said: "With the number of people around the world facing starvation at record levels, we need to be scaling up life-saving assistance - not cutting it. "If we don't receive the support we need to avert further catastrophe, the world will undoubtedly see more conflict, more unrest, and more hunger. Either we fan the flames of global instability, or we work quickly to put out the fire." According to the statement, there are currently 345 million people facing acute food insecurity worldwide, with 40 million of these in emergency levels of hunger. .- Agencies

Search for survivors after Morocco quake continues

Morocco's desperate search for survivors, four days after a powerful earthquake killed more than 2,800 people, most of them in remote villages in the High Atlas Mountains.

MARRAKESH: Hopes were dimming on Tuesday in Morocco's desperate search for survivors, four days after a powerful earthquake killed more than 2,800 people, most of them in remote villages in the High Atlas Mountains. Searchand-rescue teams from the kingdom and abroad kept digging through the rubble of broken mud-brick homes. hoping for signs of life in a race against time following the 6.8-magnitude quake late Friday.

In the tourist hub of Marrakesh, whose UNES-CO-listed historic center suffered cracks and other major damage, many families still slept out in the open, huddled in blankets on public squares for fear of aftershocks.

Where are all these poor people going to live?"

But the need was most desperate in remote and poor mountain villages such as Missirat, only reachable via winding dirt roads southwest of Marrakesh, where traumatized inhabitants have searched by hand for missing relatives.

Many of the region's traditional adobe homes crumbled to rubble and dust, while some concrete houses now stand ajar, their former residents gingerly salvaging mattresses, blankets, and cooking utensils from them.

"We feel completely abandoned here, no one has come to help us," one desperate villager, Khadija Aitlkyd, 43, told AFP. "Our houses have collapsed and we have nowhere to go.

Many Moroccan citizens have rushed to help quake victims with food. water, blankets and other aid or by donating blood to help treat the injured, an effort joined by the national football team. The quake was Morocco's strongest on record and the deadliest to hit the North African country since a 1960 earthquake destroyed Agadir on the Atlantic coast, killing between 12,000 and 15,000 people. Overall, at least 2,862 people have died and more than 2,500 been injured in the latest tragedy, according to an official toll issued late Monday.

Morocco has allowed rescue teams to come to its aid from Spain, Britain, Qatar and the United Arab Emirates but so far declined offers from several other nations, including the United States and Israel. -100,000 children affected - Albert Vasquez, the Spanish unit's communications officer, warned on Monday that "it's very difficult to find people alive after three days" but stressed that "hope is still there".

The United Nations estimated that more than 300,000 people have been affected, one-third of them children, by the powerful seismic event that hit just after 11 p.m. (2200 GMT) when most families were asleep. "Thousands of homes have been destroyed, displacing families and exposing them

to the elements at a time of year when temperatures drop down during the nighttime," the UN Children's Agency said. "Schools, hospitals, and other medical and educational facilities have been damaged or destroyed by the quakes, further impacting children." The rebuilding effort is expected to be enormous for the country which is already suffering economic woes and years of drought and now fears a downturn in the crucial tourism sector. Prime Minister Aziz Akhannouch chaired a meeting on Monday on housing and reconstruction and then pledged that "citizens who have lost their homes will receive compensation," adding that the details would be announced

Irate Zimbabweans and the opposition condemned the appointments on social media, saying Emmerson Mnangagwa was creating a family dynasty after winning a disputed election on 23 August. Armenia's landmines killed 3,385 Azerbaijani people

idential adviser said on Tuesday that 3,385 Azerbaijani people have died due to landmines planted by Armenia since 1991. Hikmet Hajiyev shared details about the loss of lives due to landmines laid by Armenia within Azerbaijani territory, both during the occupation of Azerbaijani lands and in the aftermath of the Second Karabakh War. Fifty-five Azerbaijani people lost their lives in blasts caused by mines laid by Armenia since the end of the Second Karabakh War on Nov. 10, 2020, Hajiyev said on social media platform X. He added that 251 others were injured. Among those killed were 42 civilians and 13 soldiers, he also said. "Terrifying figures of Armenia's systematic and deliberate landmine terror policy against Azerbaijan. Since 1991 up today, 3,385 Azerbaijanis have become victims of landmines infested by Armenia. Armenia and illegal punpet junta regime continues to implant landmines produced in Armenia along the whole perimeters of 'grey zone',' he wrote. Relations between Azerbaijan and Armenia have been tense since 1991 when the Armenian military occupied Nagorno-Karabakh, a territory internationally recognized as part of Azerbaijan, and seven adjacent regions. -APP

Austria reopens the embassy in Baghdad

GENEVA: Austria's foreign minister is set to reopen the Austrian Embassy in Baghdad Tuesday in a formal ceremony. Alexander Schallenberg told a press conference with his Iraqi counterpart Fuad Hussain in Baghdad on Tuesday that his visit is a "sign of trust." Austria wants to "turn a new page" in its relationship with Iraq, he added. Schallenberg is also set on Tuesday to meet Iraqi President Abdul Latif Rashid and Prime Minister Mohammed Shia

Dutch art detective recovers stolen Van Gogh

HAGUE: A Dutch art detective has recovered a precious Vincent van Gogh painting that was stolen from a museum in a daring midnight heist during the coronavirus lockdown three-and-a-half years ago, police said Tuesday. Arthur Brand took possession of the missing painting, the 1884 "Parsonage Garden at Nuenen in Spring", worth between three and six million euros (\$3.2 million), at his Amsterdam home on Monday, stuffed in a blue IKEA bag. Brand, dubbed the "Indiana Jones of the Art World" for tracing a series of high-profile lost artworks, told AFP that confirming the painting was the stolen Van Gogh was "one of the greatest moments of my life." "Arthur Brand, in cooperation with the Dutch police, has solved this matter," Richard Bronswijk of the Dutch police arts crime unit confirmed to AFP. "This is definitely the real one, there's no doubt about it." Brand told AFP that frequent calls by him and the Dutch police to hand back the stolen artwork finally paid off when a man, whose identity was not revealed for his own safety, handed Brand the painting in a blue IKEA bag, covered with bubble-wrap and stuffed in a pillow casing. A video clip supplied by Brand showed him unpacking the painting in his lounge and gasping in astonishment when he realised what it was. "I couldn't believe it," he said.—APP

The Presidency's Directorate of Communications and Legal Policies Board hosted a symposium entitled "2023 Constitution to Replace 1982 Constitution" on Tuesday, the 43rd anniversary of a coup by the military junta that drafted the current Constitution. President Recep Tayyip Erdogan reaffirmed the desire to introduce a brand-new and fully "civilian" constitution in a speech at the symposium. He called upon all political parties, academics specialized in the field and other experts to help them draft the new constitution.

The symposium was held at a museum in the capital, Ankara, a former prison where the junta led by Gen. Kenan Evren seized power. "Turkiye went through one of the darkest periods in the history of the Republic of Türkiye 43 years ago. We will never forget those days when 50 people were hanged and almost every household felt the suffering (at the hands of the junta). "If these walls of Ulucanlar, Mamak, Diyarbak r and Sa malc lar could talk, they would tell us about those days," he said,

referring to notorious prisons run by junta across Türkiye where anyone, regardless of their political affiliation, could be subject to torture and arbitrary detention in the aftermath of the coup. "Putschists will account for their crimes in the afterlife, for crimes against young people like Hüseyin Kurumahmuto lu, who was found not guilty after being hanged," he said, referring to a prominent nationalist activist. The president said the

biggest blow by the putschists of 1980 to the country was the 1982 Constitution. "Although it has been amended 23 times since 1987 and though we made a historical administrative change in 2017, we still have a coup constitution," said the president, who became the first president under the new executive presidency system after the 2017 referendum on constitutional amendments. Since its founding, the modern

Turkish state has been governed under four Constitutions, with the first one being adopted in 1921, and changing in 1924 and 1961 before the Constitution of 1982 was implemented. The debate on crafting a new constitution has become more prominent after Türkiye reelected incumbent President Erdogan and his Justice and Development Party (AK Party) in last May's landmark elections. Erdo an has been pushing to replace

dum, allowing the people to decide. The AK Party retained 268 seats in the May 14 parliamentary polls, far higher than its closest rival, the Republican People's Party (CHP), which won 169 seats. The AK Party, however, is part of the People's Alliance, which also includes its closest ally, the Nationalist Movement Party (MHP), and together, the alliance has 323 seats. Erdo an said that although each amendment was significant, they also damaged the "integrity" of the constitution. "For this reason, we launched work for a new constitution about a decade ago at Parliament. WTO warns of 'first signs' of trade deglobalisation GENEVA: The de-globaliza-

tion of international trade is far from a reality, but "the first signs of fragmentation" are appearing, the WTO warned Tuesday, concerned about the effects of the phenomenon on growth and development. The idea of "de-globalization" has gained traction since the war in Ukraine and pandemic-related lockdowns in China prompted significant disruption to global supply chains. In its annual report on international trade, economists with the World Trade Organization (WTO) argued in favor of "reglobalization" as "the first signs of trade fragmentation threaten to slow growth and development". For several decades, the expansion of global trade has surpassed global economic growth, but the trend "kind of stopped around the global financial crisis of 2008-2009, and since then, it's been kind of stagnating", WTO chief economist.-APP

Fawad Hassan inducted into cabinet

ISLAMABAD: Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-HaqKakar on Tuesday inducted former bureaucrat Fawad Hasan Fawad into the interim cabinet. The appointment has also been approved by President ArifAlvi under Article 224 (1A) on the advice of Premier Kakar. During his career, Fawad held highly sensitive and important positions in Pakistan and abroad.

Before his retirement, Fawad's last post was director general of the Civil Service Academy in Lahore. He also served as principal secretary to the then-prime minister Nawaz Sharif as well as the Punjab chief minister. He also served as secretary to various offices including Excise and Taxation, Communication and Works, Health, and S&GAD with the Punjab government. He served as Deputy Commissioner Quetta and Lahore. After Nawaz's ouster from office and indictment in the Avenfield corruption case, Fawad was also arrested by the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) for his alleged involvement in the Rs14 billion Ashiana-e-Iqbal Housing Scheme scam in 2018. However, in February 2023 he was acquitted in the case.

Ex-US general says Afghan Taliban cannot be trusted

WASHINGTON: The US cannot trust the Afghan Taliban, Marine Corps General (retd) Frank McKenzie who oversaw the US withdrawal from Afghanistan in 2021 has said. The US marine who headed the US Central Command from 2019 to 2022, further added that he believed the Afghan Taliban would act only in their own interests and they could not be trusted. "They actually have a long-term familial and cus-

tomary relationship with al-Qaeda ... I think that relationship is far stronger than any potential relationship they choose with the United States," McKenzie said. His remarks came during an interview with CBS News on September 10 – a day before the anniversary of the 9/11 attack that shocked the world and launched one of the biggest US off-shore campaigns in the form of "War on Terror".

During the interview, the commander said that one of the reasons that the US was in Afghanistan was "to prevent the use of that country as a base from which to gather strength and either to direct or inspire attacks on our homelands, or the homelands of our allies." He further said: "As a result of our withdrawal from Afghanistan, it is now far more difficult for us to pursue those objectives.'

Stranded Canadian PM leaves India

NEW DELHI: Canadian Minister Justin Trudeau has left India after a technical problem in his aircraft was fixed. Indian minister Rajeev Chandrasekhar said he was at the airport to thank Mr Trudeau "for his presence at the G20 summit" and "wished him and his entourage a safe trip back home".

Mr Trudeau was set to fly on Sunday, following a tense meeting with Indian PM Narendra Modi at the G20 summit. But he had to stay back for two more days after his plane developed a snag. Earlier in the day, press secretary of the Canadian prime minister Mohammad Hussain told Indian news agency ANI that "the technical issue with the plane has been resolved. The plane has been cleared to fly". In a statement sent to the BBC, Canada's Department of National Defence on Monday confirmed that the prime minister's aircraft - a Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) CC-150 Polaris with the tail number '01' - suffered a "maintenance problem" stemming from a "component that will have to be re placed". - Agencies

Pakistan, Azerbaijan discuss collaboration in diverse fields

On the night of June 16th and 17th, the security forces - in a highly placed IBO - killed most wanted Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) terrorist commander Zafar Khan alias Zafari son in Dara Adam Khel The other two terrorists were identified as Hasan Khan son of Muhammad Imran. a resident of Bazi Khel, and Anas alias Ali, a resident of Nangarhar, Afghanistan.

West caged African children, says Russian President

on Tuesday that African nations will always remember the dark chapter of Western colonial oppression when European powers trafficked children from the continent and put them on display in cages. Putin also claimed that the same countries are trying to push their former dominions into indentured servitude. Speaking at the plenary session of the Eastern Economic Forum in Vladivostok, the Russian leader predicted it would not be too difficult for Russia to restore relations with Africa to the level of the Soviet era, when Moscow provided the continent with ample economic aid. The Russian leader argued that African countries remember Moscow's help in the struggle for independence and that Moscow had never acted as a colonizer. "Our cooperation has always been based on either mutual grounds or the desire to help," he said.

However, Putin noted that these countries remember not only Soviet aid but also Western ruthlessness. As late as 1957, "people from Africa were taken to Europe in cages... You can't watch that without tears. Children sitting in cages, displayed for everyone to see," Putin recalled. "No one in Africa will ever forget it." The Russian president said the West has not abandoned its subjugation attempts. "Even now, they are trying to boss around and pursue their generally neo-colonial policies," Putin said, explaining that Western countries have imposed trillions of dollars worth of loans on the region. The West has concocted a credit system with

low them to pay back their loans. These are not credit relations; this is some kind of [punitive] indemnity," he added. However, Russia adheres to a different approach, which gives it an advantage in fostering ties with its partners worldwide, Putin argued.

Last week, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov pointed out that African countries are ready to talk with their Western counterparts. However, the latter should not expect spectacular results if they reduce dialogue to "patting on the back" while failing to address the continent's "pressing needs." To foster closer ties with the region, Russia hosted a landmark Russia-Africa forum in St. Petersburg this summer that produced many bilateral agreements in various fields. Dozens of African delegations also attended it despite what Moscow described as "unprecedented pressure from the West" to skip the summit.

Russian President Vladimir Putin has provided an update on the casualties the Ukrainian military incurred since their operation commenced in early June. He further noted that Kiev had not achieved the anticipated results it had initially sought. Putin said at the Eastern Economic Forum in Vladivostok on Tuesday: "There are losses, big losses. Since the start of this counteroffensive, the casualties [have reached] 71,500 people." The president claimed that Kiev is seeking to achieve results "at any cost," which makes it look like the Ukrainian leadership does not care about its own citizens' lives. - Agencies


