RAWALPINDI: General Syed Asim Munir, NI (M), Chief of Army Staff (COAS) presided over the 260th Corps Commanders' Conference (CCC) held at GHQ, today. ting close to less than a few days, maybe four or five days of food stocks left," WFP's Middle East spokeswoman Abeer Etefa, told reporters in Geneva via video link from Cairo. She said that out of five flour mills in the Gaza Strip, only one was operating due to security concerns and the unavailability of fuel. "So the bread supply is running low and people are lining up for hours to get bread," she said. Only five bakeries out of 23 in Gaza contracted by WFP were still in operation, she added. Our food supplies within Gaza are running really short," said Etefa. The spokeswoman said there has been no looting of WFP warehouses, and "anyway, whatever we have left in the warehouses is so little". Aid at Rafah Aid agencies have been flying supplies into El Arish airport in Egypt - around 20 kilometres away from the Rafah border crossing and the only one into the Gaza Strip not controlled by Israel. So far Egypt has kept the crossing closed to aid going in or foreign nationals trying to flee, as Israel has repeatedly struck the Palestinian side of the crossing. Ahmed Salem of the

# **UNSC rejects Russia's Gaza ceasefire resolution**

NEW YORK: A resolution proposed by Russia calling for a "humanitarian ceasefire" in Gaza and the release of "all hostages" has failed to receive enough votes to be adopted by the 15-member UN Security Council, with members who voted against it or abstained citing its failure to mention Hamas and condemn the group's Oct. 7 attack on Israeli towns. On Monday, Russia, China, the UAE, Gabon and Mozambique voted in favor, while the US, UK, France and Japan voted against. Brazil, Malta, Albania, Switzerland, Ecuador and Ghana abstained. The resolution had been backed by the UN Arab Group of countries, whose ambassadors were all present at the council meeting. A vote on a rival, draft resolution from Brazil was delayed until Tuesday, Arab News has learned. Russia's resolution expresses "grave concern" at the escalation of violence and the deterioration of the situation, in particular the resulting heavy civilian casualties, underscoring the need for both populations to be protected. # EU to establish humanitarian air corridor to Gaza

BRUSSELS: The European Union (EU) will launch a humanitarian air corridor to Gaza through Egypt, European Commission president Ursula von der Leven announced on Monday, with the first flights expected to depart in the coming days. "Palestinians in Gaza are in need of humanitarian help and aid," von der Leyen said to reporters in Albania on Monday, where she was attending a summit of Balkan nations. "That is why we are launching an EU humanitarian air bridge the deepening humanitarian crisis in Gaza and called for to Gaza through Egypt." # **Solar Parks** PM Kakar invites Chinese investment

The interim premier emphasised that there was no bilateral relation more important for Pakistan than its friendship with China

BEIJING: Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaarul Haq Kakar on Tuesday invited China to invest in solar parks to support Pakistan's fight against climate change and help reduce Pakistan's energy import bill. The interim premier reached Beijing on Monday to participate in the 3rd Belt and Road Forum (BRF) for Inter-national Cooperation. At the airport, he was received by Chinese Min-ister of Science & Techno-Iogy Wang Zhigang, Chinese Ambassador to Pakistan Jiang Zaidong, and Ambassador of Pakistan to China Moinul Haq, the PM's Office said in a press release yesterday.

Addressing a conference in China today, PM Kakar said investments in solar parks would benefit two-fold, explaining that "on one hand they will support Pakistan's endeavours to climate action and also help reduce energy import bill". The prime minister expressed Pakistan's desire to learn from China's models for building industrial parks and special economic zones.

He highlighted that China and Pakistan en-

joyed a time-tested relationship based on mutual trust and shared interests. "Despite international politics, our friendship has remained steadfast." The interim premier emphasised that there was no bilateral relation more important for Pakistan than its friendship with China. "This special relation enjoys across-theboard national consensus in Pakistan," he said. "There should be no doubt that Pakistan would undermine our unique affection for China."

Terming CPEC the manifestation of Pak-China strategic cooperation, Kakar said the project symbolises coordinated efforts of the two countries to bring their economic and trade ties at par with each other. The project also symbolises the two countries' excellent political relations, he added. "For Pakistan, CPEC is a transformative project central to advancing our national agenda to sustainable development, the prime minister continued, adding that the geoeconomic landscape of the country - from Gilgit-Baltistan to the deep sea ports of Karachi and Gwadar - was transformed in the last few years due to CPEC.

# CM Naqvi orders slashing transport fares by 10pc

CM Mohsin Naqvi gave a deadline of 48 hours to reduce the prices and tasked to reduce the transport fares by 10pc

LAHORE: On the special instructions of Caretaker Chief Minister Mohsin Naqvi, it has been decided to pass on the direct benefit of the record reduction in the prices of petroleum products to the people of Punjab.

Under the chairmanship of the CM, a meeting was held in the Chief Minister's Office. Chief Minister Mohsin Naqvi gave a deadline of 48 hours to reduce the prices and tasked to reduce the transport fares by 10pc. Chief minister directed the provincial transport minister and the transport secretary to hold an urgent meeting with the transport owners while the provincial industry and agriculture minister SM Tanveer will hold talks with other associations. Likewise, the agriculture secretary, commissioners and deputy commissioners will also work on price reduction of daily essential items. Chief Secretary has been given the task of reducing the prices of daily commodities. The chief secretary will hold daily meetings with the Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners and review the measures regarding price reduction. Naqvi has ordered the administration to play an active role to provide relief and said indiscriminate crackdown on hoarders should continue. He said that the benefit of reduction in the prices of petro-

leum products will be directly transferred to the people of the province and relief will be given. It was important to give the benefit of the historical relief given by reducing the prices of other commodities to the people, he said, adding the entire team should work hard day and night to give relief to the people. Punjab Caretaker Chief Minister Mohsin Naqvi conducted an inspection of the ongoing Controlled Access Corridor project on Band Road here on early Monday. He meticulously assessed the progress of this significant endeavor, spanning from NiaziChowk to BabuSabu. The Chief Minister underscored the importance of ensuring smooth traffic flow on the closed road throughout the construction phase. He emphasised that the Chief Traffic Officer (CTO) should personally oversee operations and recommended deploying additional traffic wardens.CM received a comprehensive briefing, underscoring the round-the-clock efforts being made to complete the 7.3 km long controlled access corridor within four months. The project encompasses two packages, with Package One spanning 3.65 km from Niazi to Saggian Interchange, and Package Two covering an equivalent distance from Saggian to BabuSabu Interchange.Meanwhile, following the unfortunate incident of a rape case in Narowal, Deputy Com-

missioner Narowal failed to promptly

respond despite explicit instructions. It was noted that the Deputy Commissioner was found in another city without proper authorization, having left the station. In light of this negligence of duty, Punjab CM has taken decisive action, promptly reassigning Deputy Commissioner Narowal to the position of Officer on Special Duty (OSD). Meanwhile, Chief Minister Mohsin Naqvi held a productive meeting with British Parliament Member Khalid Mehmood, delving into matters of mutual interest and exploring avenues to address the concerns of overseas Pakistanis. During the discussion, Naqvi affirmed the strong partnership between Pakistan and Britain in advancing development and prosperity.

Meanwhile, Sami Malik, Pakistan's appointed ambassador to Morocco, paid a courtesy visit to Punjab's Caretaker CMMohsin Naqvi. Extending warm congratulations to Sami Malik on his appointment as ambassador to Morocco, Naqvi conveyed his best wishes for the role. # National Palestine Conference condemns Israeli aggression on Gaza

ISLAMABAD: All political parties' National Palestine Conference has adopted a joint declaration in the context of the current situation in Gaza and Palestine. The conference was organized by Jamaat-e-Islami in Islamabad on Tuesday, in which leaders of national political and religious parties and human rights representatives participated. They unanimously approved 14 points of the declaration.

The national leadership, intellectuals, scholars, civil society, and public representatives of Pakistan strongly protest against the recent Israeli aggression on Gaza and the West Bank and the criminal negligence of the international powers on the human tragedy in Palestine. According to the Gaza Health Department, 2,670 Palestinians, including more or less 900 children, have died and more than 9,600 have been injured by the barbaric bombardment and the interruption of supplies until October 16, 2023. More or less 90 people have died as a result of the Israeli attack on the West Bank. Israel's targeting of hospitals, educational institutions, places of worship, civilian populations, especially innocent

children, women, and vulnerable citizens, volunteers, human rights representatives, and journalists during the attack on Gaza is a clear violation of international humanitarian law. There is a violation. The United Nations Security Council, the International Court of War Crimes, and human rights organizations need to play an effective role in this regard and bring those responsible for war crimes to justice. Israel is trying to discredit the world by calling its barbaric actions a response to Hamas attacks. The reality is that Hamas' recent move is itself a response to the illegal occupation of Palestinian land and the atrocities that have been perpetrated by Israel from time to time.

The participants of this meeting believe that the conflict did not start on October 7, 2023, but it started with the occupation of the Palestinian land. This process of evicting them from their land, and occupying their settlements has been going on for the last 75 years.

Therefore, while there is an urgent need to stop the recent violence, it is also very important to find a real and lasting solution to the conflict. The real solution to the Palestinian issue and the ongoing unrest in the Middle East is the establishment of an independent, sovereign Palestinian state. The international

community should immediately recognize Palestine as an independent state and Ierusalem as its capital.

The governments of the powerful countries, the United Nations and its subsidiary bodies must take effective and decisive measures to stop the Israeli aggression on Gaza. Also, provision of basic needs such as food, water, electricity, oil and treatment for the trapped citizens of Gaza should be ensured in all circumstances. The United Nations and its subsidiary bodies should act on human rights violations and ensure the protection of ordinary citizens regardless of their geographical and political affiliations. After all, Israel is a racist state, based on religion and race. Discrimination laws are in place. It is the duty of the civilized world to refrain from giving legitimacy to such a state. The international community should realize its responsibility without waiting for a new humanitarian tragedy to occur in the region and put pressure on Israel to prevent further bombings, ground operations and sieges. bring to the negotiating table, ensure the uninterrupted flow of humanitarian aid and resources to Gaza, and create an effective and concrete UN

process for lasting peace and a final

# Health experts call for disseminating breast cancer awareness

HYDERABAD: Health ex- Institute of Gender Studies perts and doctors have underscored the critical importance of public awareness and early diagnosis in the prevention and management of breast cancer among female individuals. They urged the citizens especially women to actively disseminate breast cancer awareness as early detection can save numerous lives. They also emphasized that while Pakistan witnesses around 90,000 new breast cancer cases annually, the disease has a survival rate of over 98 percent when diagnosed in the early stages making late diagnosis the primary cause of high mortality in the country. They emphasized this while addressing the breast cancer awareness seminar organized by the

(IGS), University of Sindh Iamshoro on Tuesday. The experts said that October was recognized worldwide, including Pakistan, as breast cancer awareness month and revealed that the country diagnosed approximately 90,000 cases of breast cancer in women annually, primarily attributed to a lack of awareness and limited access to diagnostic facilities. Addressing the seminar, the Director of the institute Prof. Dr. Misbah Bibi Qureshi emphasized the potential reduction in breast cancer incidence through heightened public awareness and early detection. She reiterated the institute's commitment to fostering awareness through seminars and social media initiatives throughout the

comprehensive societal support for women facing breast cancer, including the provision of free medications and advocated joint efforts to educate women on preventive measures and access to free medical camps. She expressed concern over the rising prevalence of breast cancer in Pakistan and neighbouring coun tries, projecting an upward trend based on demographic shifts. She emphasized that early-stage identification significantly impacted the reduction of illness and mortality. She acknowledged that Mammographic screening was influenced by a range of socio-cultural and economic factors but highlighted that women in Pakistan often seek medical attention at advanced stages due to multiple socio-economic.—Agencies

# Eliminating child marriage requires a collective effort

The conference participants unanimously passed resolution to raise minimum age of marriage of girls to 18 years demanding to ensure the fundamental rights of the girls

ISLAMABAD: Applauding PODA for its struggle to protect girl-child's and rural women's rights, Dr. Riina Kionka, Ambassador of the European Union in Pakistan said, "Eliminating child marriage requires a collective effort to ensure that girls have access to education, health information, services and lifeskills education".

She was speaking at the concluding day of the 3-day 16th Annual Rural Women Leadership Conference held here in Islamabad. She further said that child-marriage is fundamentally an issue of gender inequality. It is also a multifaceted problem, with varying legal dimensions and immensely rooted socio-cultural norms, she added.

During the 3-day of the conference around 3000 rural women leaders representing around 150 districts of the country including the four provinces and regions of AJK and Gilgit-Baltistan explored different dimensions of the issue of child-marriage from legal to human rights perspectives demanded to raise the minimum age of marriage of girls in Pakistan excluding Sindh to 18 years of age through legal amendment in the existing laws. The conference participants unanimously passed resolution to raise minimum age of marriage of girls to 18 years demanding to ensure the fundamental rights of the girls the country to harness the underutilized potential that women represent in the country, it is imperative to break free from the gender norms to ensure these



women and girls have essential services, economic resources and gainful employment and that they actively participate in their communities as voters, leaders, member of political parties as candidates. Emphasizing on the right to education Article 25-A enshrined through the Constitution of Pakistan, Executive Director who is president and founder of PODA, Sameena Nazir demanded to give women equal representation at all levels in all sectors. HE Mr. Per Albert Ilsaas, Ambassador of Norway in Pakistan, the Ambassador of Norway in Pakistan, found the conference a platform where women were everywhere in majority to talk on the issues which were on the top of their priorities. A wheelchair-user mother, Azra from Islamabad urged all to make no excuse to declare 18 years as minimum age of marriage of a girl because due to her disability she married off of daughter at an early age who was divorced very young. She urged all to protect young girls fundamental right to get educato lead a dignified life.

Ayesha Raza Farooq, Chairperson National Commission on The Child Rights ensured their support to raise the minimum age of girls to 18 years by signing the resolution.

During the last day of the conference two sessions were held. Earlier speaking during the session on "Enhance Electoral Participation of Rural Women through Voter Registration and Democracy Education", Ms. Nazir said negligence to record girls' birth officially and add girls in Family Form-B results in denial of Computerized National Identity Cards (CNIC) for girls when they turn 18. Without CNIC a woman cannot register as voter in Pakistan that has led to "missing women voters" problem in Pakistan. Low turnout of women voters is also caused by rejected votes when women do not know how to vote correctly. In many cases, women are not able to vote due to lack of transportation facilities and due to fear of violence and harassment. Women with disabilities and trans-



specific obstacles to cast their votes with dignity, she added. Women's CNICs should be registered to enjoy their full rights to vote and combat child marriages and forced conversions."

# Ashrafi urges OIC to take strong stance on Israel's bombardment

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Ulema Council Chairman Hafiz Muhammad Tahir Mahmood Ashrafi on Tuesday said it was almost 10th day that Israel was continuously doing bombardment on Palestine and particularly on Gaza causing causalities of innocent people of all ranks including women, children and civilians. Talking to media persons, he said due to inhuman policies of Israel, the Palestinian people were suffering from shortage of food, water, medicines and other necessities of life adding that trucks carrying relief goods were queuing at the

border of Egypt but, Israel was not giving permission to enter them in the territory.

Ashrafi urged the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) to take a solid stance on the issue of Palestine in its meeting scheduled to be held on Wednesday.

He said Pakistan's Foreign Affairs Minister Ambassador Jalil Abbas Jillani was leaving for OIC's meeting expressing hope that he would make significant development on this issue. He said the Muslim world should not be silent spectator anymore and devise an effective strategic plan to deal with this long-standing issue with collective efforts in letter and spirit on permanent basis.

He said the entire Muslim Ummah was united under the leadership of Kingdom of Saudi Arabia as it the centric point of all faithful around the world and moreover, it was at the helm of affairs of the OIC. Ashrafi lamented that in the United Nations Security Council, the resolution presented by Russia could not be passed as it aimed to stop the war between Palestine and Israel on the humanitarian grounds. He said it was a good

standing by the stance of Muslim countries on the issue of Palestine. He further said the United States (US) President Joe Biden was making an extraordinary wartime visit to Israel this week as he sought to demonstrate staunch support for the country.

Beside other Muslim leadership, he appreciated the Saudi Crown Prince Mohammad bin Salman for demanding to stop the Israel's aggression on Palestine in his recent meeting with US Secretary of State Antony Blinken.

### Railways accelerate up-gradation work to improve services

ISLAMABAD: Railways has accelerated the up-gradation work involving the private sector to improve services in passenger trains as well as major railway stations to address the growing issues, especially sanitation issues.

"The department was of the view that the cleanliness-related services in trains and at major stations, including Lahore, Faisalabad, Karachi, Rawalpindi, Quetta, Peshawar, Khanewal, Sukkur, Sahiwal, Multan and Bahawalpur were not satisfactory," an official in the Ministry told APP.

He said that if services of the private sector were hired under a fast-track policy, the hygiene conditions at stations and in trains could be improved which would also restore the confidence of passengers in the department. The official said the department asked the officials to accelerate efforts to bring uniformity in the design and signboards of stalls at the major railway stations under a policy. It is pertinent to mention here that last year Pakistan Railways decided to engage the private sector to increase profit by improving services at major stations. "The services required to be improved included renovation and construction of washrooms and their maintenance and other janitorial services at platforms, waiting for areas and yards," he added.

To a question, he said that Pakistan Railways has also started up-gradation work of its five major railway stations across the country on modern lines to facilitate the passengers and help the department to generate more revenues. He said the purpose to upgrade the railway stations is to make them commercial hubs for business activities and facilitate the passengers and the railway stations included Karachi, Lahore, Faisalabad, Peshawar and

# 7 more contract with dengue virus in 24 hours

District Coordinator Epidemics Prevention and Control (DCEPC), Dr Sajjad Mehmood, Tuesday said that, among the new cases, ten of each case had arrived from Potohar town urban and Municipal Corporation Rawalpindi area, five from Chaklala Cantonment and one from Gujjar Khan area. He said 101 patients were admitted to district hospitals of which 72 were confirmed cases while 1,919 positive patients were discharged after treatment. Dr Sajjad informed that the district administration had registered 37 FIRs, issued tickets to 11, sealed one premise, and a fine of Rs 200,500 was imposed against the violations of dengue SOPs during the last 24 hours. During indoor surveillance, in the previous 24 hours, the teams checked 16,759 houses and found larvae in 547 homes. Similarly, he added that while checking 6,352 places, the teams found larvae at 93 sites during outdoor surveillance. He added that district health facilities had allocated 228 beds for dealing with the dengue patients while three admitted patients were in critical condition.

hat dignitaries and representatives from more than 150 countries and 30 international organizations are attending the ongoing third Belt and Road Forum for International Cooperation in Beijing is a recognition of the initiative's role as a promoter of common development.

Since its launch a decade ago, the Belt and Road Initiative has made remarkable achievements, benefiting the countries involved. Thousands of landmark infrastructure projects have been completed across the globe, improving connectivity, making travel more convenient and creating more development opportunities for Belt and Road countries. To be sure, the Belt and Road Initiative has ushered in a new development paradigm by overcoming severe challenges, inspiring many other countries to choose the development path that best suits their national conditions. By joining the initiative, whose goal is to improve infrastructure connectivity and provide public goods, more and more countries have realized the initiative's role as a facilitator of global peace and common prosperity. China's external environment has not always been friendly enough to extend the pragmatic initiative across continents. Some narrow-minded, ideologically-driven Western countries' desperate efforts to spread lies and rumors about the initiative are a major factor obstructing the deepening of global cooperation under the Belt and Road framework. Judging by the West's limited contributions to world peace and development in recent years and the growing appeal of the Belt and Road Initiative to developing and emerging market economies, the root cause behind the West's opposition to the initiative seems to be its outdated worldview. While the Western powers pursue narrow, selfish goals by forming small cliques and fueling geopolitical tensions, the Belt and Road Initiative has garnered the support of the international community for its inclusive nature and spirit of multilateralism. Today's is a far less peaceful world, with the Russia-Ukraine conflict dragging on for 18 months, thanks to the policies of the US-led West, and the eruption of a new conflict in the Middle East, and formidable challenges such as climate change and foundering economic recovery not being addressed. In the Belt and Road Initiative, however, the world has a practical tool to address these challenges. As the Chinese leadership has said, no country should be left behind on the road to development. Over the past decade, the initiative has blazed new trails and found a path on which like-minded countries can cooperate to achieve common development. From 2013 to 2022, the cumulative value of trade between China and other Belt and Road countries was \$19.1 trillion, with an average annual growth of 6.4 percent, which reflects the significance of the initiative to the global economy.



# Poland's record turnout election yields landmark result

ack in 2018, as Poland's ruling Law and Justice party (PiS) neared the end of its first term in office, its leader, Jarosław Kaczyński, told one newspaper that his radical right project had only just begun. "We are preparing a long march," said Mr Kaczyński, "one needs, not two, but three terms." On Sunday, Poles turned out in extraordinary numbers determined to thwart that ambition, and they appear to have succeeded in remarkable fashion. Provisional results indicate that the highest election turnout since the fall of communism delivered a famous and unexpectedly clear victory for the opposition coalition of parties. Though PiS emerged once more as the largest electoral force, it lost its majority and seemingly has no viable route to constructing a new one. For Poland, and for the rest of Europe, this constitutes a hugely consequential result. For progressives, it is one to celebrate. During eight years in power, PiS has become a European brand leader for illiberal politics. In government it has gradually taken a wrecking ball to the checks, balances and cultural assumptions that underpin mainstream democracies. The independence of the judiciary and media has been undermined, and state television turned into a mouthpiece for PiS propaganda. Non-European migrants and LGBTQ+ communities have been demonised and presented as threats to the integrity of the nation. Conservative Catholic influence has been mobilised in a draconian crackdown on abortion rights, prompting mass protests. Together with Viktor Orbán's Hungary, Mr Kaczyński's Poland has treated European Union values and norms with contempt, and resisted cooperation on issues such as the migration crisis. Assuming the result is confirmed, the main opposition leader, Donald Tusk, will have a chance to halt this oppressive, authoritarian and confrontational direction of travel. On the international stage, given Poland's status as one the EU's most strategically significant member states, this will bring a vital boost to European unity in deeply challenging times. A former president of the European Council, Mr Tusk can be expected to resolve the rule-of-law issues that have dogged relations with Brussels since 2015. Just as significantly, Poland under his leadership would play a supportive role in maintaining western support for Ukraine, and in sensitive future negotiations over EU expansion to the east. Domestically, repairing the civic and constitutional damage done over the past eight years will not be straightforward. Andrzej Duda, the country's PiSaligned president, remains in office, and managing a coalition government comprising Mr Tusk's centrist Civic Platform party, the centre-right and the left promises to be complicated. Exit poll voting data from Sunday confirms the depth of the support that PiS retains in provincial and rural areas, and among the less well educated. If Mr Tusk wishes to unify a polarised country after the bitterest of campaigns, he will need to offer more to such constituencies. These are potential problems and issues for the future though. The stunning 73% turnout on Sunday - 11% higher than in 2019 - testifies to a popular mobilisation against PiS that has stopped Mr Kaczyński's "long march' in its tracks. # Insecurities of Security Council?

he number of Palestinians killed by a massive Israeli air assault against the Gaza Strip has reached to 2,215. There is a high probability that death toll would have reached to 3,000 by the time you are reading this article. Though five permanent members of United Nation Security Council (UNSC); China, France, Russian Federation, United Kingdom, and United States agree on the necessity to ending the humanitarian crises in Gaza, but deep divisions remain on exactly how to do that. On October 17, Russian Federation drafted and tabled a resolution calling for humanitarian immediate ceasefire between Hamas and Israel in Gaza, was supported by China but received a clear rejection from three other members of UNSC: the western collision. The rejection is rightly stated by the Russian diplomat "a blow to humanitarian efforts".

In fact, we are currently witnessing a grave escalation of violence, and the international community anxiously anticipates the UNSC to intervene in order to halt this bloodletting. However, delegates from Western nations, who have opposed the resolution, have essentially dashed the hopes of the global community for curbing this Israeli brutality. The United States' rationale for rejecting the resolution was surprisingly illogical. They argued that because the resolution didn't condemn Hamas, it should be discarded. This perspective seems to imply that condemning Hamas and preserving lives should go hand in hand; otherwise, innocent people must perish. Is this the proposal put forth by the U.S. delegation at the UNSC? Does such a notion align with morality, international legal principles, or the UNSC's standards when responding to acts that harm innocent civilians? It appears to be an unwise and contradictory stance. Believe it or not, it is essential to revisit the roles and responsibilities of the UNSC. Its

primary obligations include preventing and resolving conflicts, promoting human rights, and maintaining peace. Foremost among these responsibilities is the duty to prevent and resolve conflicts by mediating between warring parties, facilitating negotiations, and promoting diplomatic solutions. However, when millions of innocent lives are at risk due to actions by Israeli forces, it becomes imperative to call for an end to such horrific and heinous acts. The UNSC's moral authority is questioned when its failure to condemn Hamas is used as a justification for allowing Israel to continue actions that result in the killing of innocent civilians. It appears that the UNSC may be unable to effectively fulfill this role. Undoubtedly, the UNSC carries the responsibility of establishing international order and stability, which encompasses arms control agreements, non-proliferation efforts, and counterterrorism initiatives. Certainly, maintaining global security requires fostering an environment conducive to peaceful cooperation among nations. However, this responsibility of the UNSC does not serve as a valid justification for rejecting the Russian resolution aimed at halting the ongoing violence and loss of life in Gaza. It suggests that when the U.S. criticizes Russia for not mentioning Hamas in the resolution, the U.S. may be seen as supporting the tragic loss of human lives in Gaza at the hands of Israeli forces.

The Israeli occupation of Gaza and Palestine has seen numerous phases, and it is essential to swiftly assess the longstanding consequences of this issue. This occupation has given rise to profound humanitarian and political ramifications for the Palestinian population. Notably, the blockade of Gaza has resulted in a humanitarian crisis, characterized by insufficient access to basic necessities like food, clean water, and healthwithin their native territories and within the diaspora, have experienced displacement due to the conflict. An illustrative case in point is the Nakba of 1948, commonly referred to as the Palestinian Catastrophe, which marked the dismantling of Palestinian society and homeland, forcing hundreds of thousands of Palestinians from their homes. Those who remained have had to struggle with checkpoints, obstacles, and a rigorous permit system, severely constraining their access to essential services, education, and healthcare within their homeland. # Modernizing political parties in South Asia

n Pakistan, India, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka the people have signaled that they don't want ruling families in power in perpetuity. Pakistan's protracted and dull process of democratic transition between elected governments is being exacerbated by the poor quality of democracy within political parties. Both are interlinked and need to change.

However, the case for greater democratization within political parties and modernizing them is not indigenous to Pakistan alone. The same is true for political parties, including the main governing and opposition groups across South Asia, including Bangladesh, India, Sri Lanka, the Maldives and Nepal.

National elections are expected in Pakistan, Bangladesh, India and Sri Lanka within the next several months (the Maldives just had theirs last month). Over 100 million new voters have been enrolled in all these countries since their last elections - over 10 million in Pakistan alone. And similarly in the preceding elections before that. And yet if you were a new voter, you would be forgiven for thinking little had changed within parties for ages in terms of leaders in charge, governance structures, policy and decision making and inclusivity towards members that can influence leaders.

And this would mean a psychological disassociation with parties - the relatively lower electoral turnouts in recent elections in most these countries would seem to confirm this tendency. And therein lies the challenge - growing voters are confronted by ageing leaders of political parties that neither speak the language of hundreds of millions of millennial voters or connect with them on their core interests such as upward mobility and demand for efficient urban futures. From the Begums of Bangladesh to the Bhuttos

and Sharifs of Pakistan- time stands still within their parties even though the societies within

which the parties are based have moved on. One key characteristics of most parties that have been in power in the South Asian states over the past several decades is their dynastic leaderships. From the Begums of Bangladesh to the Bandaranaikes and Rajapaksas of Sri Lanka to the Bhuttos and Sharifs of Pakistan to the Gandhis of India – time stands still within their parties even though the societies within which the parties are based have moved on with their egalitarian and citizen-centric political aspirations.

Even where there has been a break with tradition – Narendra Modi in India and Imran Khan in Pakistan – the non-dynastic leaders have been in power within their own parties for seemingly unending years. Khan has been chairman of his party for 27 years. That's longer than most monarchs in many countries in the vicinity of South Asia. Little wonder his promises of change ring

While over 100 political parties are registered in Pakistan, barely a dozen of these have been voted to power to govern national or provincial governments. The trust deficit in the ability of these parties to meet public expectations is at an all-time low in part due to dynastic leaderships – most top leaders are in their 70s now. Sharif is seeking to be prime minister a fourth time.

Pakistani parties have stubbornly resisted modernization or broadened political representation in sync with changing demographics or improving governance through inclusive approaches in a plural polity. This kind of politics is a process of diminishing returns. The quality of democracy within parties is the kind of democracy Pakistan is sick of. Other South Asian states practicing democracy are not much different.

The unfortunate jailings, exiles and assassinations of leaders in Pakistan, India, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and Maldives are signs the system wants their parties but not their ruling families in power in perpetuity. And yet these families – many of whose members' services to democracy in the never-ending struggle against authoritarianism and military dictatorships are not under contention – are not ready to take the hint.

What can be done? If democracy is for the masses, then the majorities need to be engaged in democratic processes - from being voters to supporters to leaders of parties. South Asian societies are younger in median age of citizens than they have ever been in history. In Pakistan alone 65% of the population - 120 million - is under 25.

The parties need to reform and modernize with the primary goal being becoming fit for aspira-

tions and interests of the younger majorities. Admittedly this is easier said than done but then political leadership in democracies is all about keeping politics and their parties relevant and future-fit. Senior leaders of the party don't have to quit politics. They can stay in charge of their parties if they want but either retire from electoral politics or vacate their party leadership positions, making way for more dynamic and ca-

This process begins with open and plural elections within parties. This is the way to inclusive, plural and representative political solutions in changing societies. Having founded them, families may 'own' political parties in the old sense, but their ownership does not extend to democracy. The health and leadership of political parties should be in the hands of emerging leaders attuned to the times and voters.

# Ekiru hit with 10-year doping ban

NAIROBI: Kenyan marathon runner Titus Ekiru has been slapped with a 10-year ban for doping and trying to obstruct the investigation, AIU said Monday. The 31-year-old tested positive for prohibited substances after winning the Milan marathon in May 2021 and the Abu Dhabi event in November that year, it said in a statement. Kenya has seen a surge in doping cases which have stained the reputation of the athletics powerhouse, Almost 70 athletes - mainly distance runners have been banned in the last five years. In addition to the ban, AIU said Ekiru's results including and since the Milan race have been disqualified and all prizes forfeited. His victory in Milan, in the exceptionally fast time of 2hr 2min 57sec, had made him the sixth fastest marathon runner of all-time but he has now been stripped of that accolade. The ban follows a "comprehensive investigation" which revealed tampering by Ekiru to obstruct the AIU probe, and collusion by a senior doctor at a Kenyan hospital, the agency said. - Agencies

# Taylor Fritz feels 'motivated and ready'

TOKYO: Defending champion Taylor Fritz won his Japan Open first round match on Tuesday and said he felt "motivated and ready to play" after lightening his load ahead of the tournament. The American has been one of the busiest players on the ATP Tour this season but he has taken his foot off the gas since the US Open, appearing in only the Laver Cup and Shanghai Masters. He beat Britain's Cameron Norrie 6-4, 6-3 to kick off the defence of his Tokyo title and said it was "probably an advantage that I might be less burnt-out". "After the US Open, I think I had played the most matches of anyone on tour," said Fritz, the number one seed in Tokyo. "I thought it made sense to start the Asia swing in Shanghai. I feel



motivated and ready to play." World number 10 Fritz beat fellow American Frances Tiafoe in last year's Japan Open final and has won six career titles. He is the highest-ranked American in the world and overcame an early setback to dispatch Norrie in his Tokyo opener. "I was holding easily and then out of nowhere he broke me, so it was a tough spot to be in," said Fritz.

"I feel like I played a couple of really good points to break and I played the bigger, more important points better in the return games. "I definitely upped my level." Fritz was joined in the next round by American Ben Shelton, who beat Japan's Taro Daniel 3-6, 6-4, 7-6 (7/2). Australia's number four seed Alex de Minaur also progressed with a 4-6, 7-6 (7/4), 7-6 (7/1) win over Britain's Jack Draper. Australia's Alexei Popyrin eliminated Russian number seven seed Karen Khachanov 6-4, 6-2.

### Span denounces 'genocide' in Gaza

MADRID: Both Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Hamas need to be tried by the International Criminal Court (ICC), Spanish Minister for Social Rights Ione Belarra said on Monday. "Israel is carrying out a planned genocide" in Gaza by leaving hundreds of thousands of Palestinians without water, food, and electricity, Belarra, who is the leader of Podemos, a junior partner in the ruling coalition, claimed. She further described the move as a serious breach of international law and a possible war crime. Belarra also accused Israel of "unspeakable hypocrisy" for what she described as using the horrific murders of civilians by Hamas to justify its own atrocities, both in general and against Gaza in particular. In a five-minute video message broadcast on social media. Belarra accused Netanyahu's government of "apartheid and occupation" of the Palestinians, encouraged and enabled by the US and the EU. Speaking on behalf of her party, Belarra demanded the immediate opening of a humanitarian corridor, by which civilians could leave Gaza to safety.

### 2 Swedes killed in Brussels shooting

BRUSSELS: Two Swedish nationals were shot dead in Brussels late Monday by a suspect who remains at large, in an attack the Belgian prime minister described as "terrorism".

The gunman, wearing a fluorescent orange jacket, fled on a scooter and Belgium subsequently raised its terror alert to four - the highest-for the Brussels region, and level three nationally. Belgian premier Alexander De Croo said the shooting had targeted Swedish citizens. "I have just offered my sincere condolences to the Swedish PM following tonight's harrowing attack on Swedish citizens in Brussels," De Croo said on X, formerly known as Twitter. "Our thoughts are with the families and friends who lost their loved ones. As close partners the fight against terrorism is a joint one." Several Belgian media outlets said the two individuals killed were wearing football shirts belonging to the Swedish national team ahead of a game between Sweden and Belgium. The Group F European qualifier match between the two countries was suspended at half-time "due to incidents," the Belgian side posted on social media accounts. Journalists in the Roi

Baudouin stadium in Brussels said fans were being kept in the ground, and the UEFA website said the match had been halted at one goal apiece. Belgian media reported that Swedish players did not want to continue the game after the attack. A video of a man speaking Arabic and claiming responsibility for the shooting was circulating on social media, a source close to the case said.

### DR Congo shipwreck toll rises to 47

KINSHASA: The initial report by authorities from the northwest Equateur province said 28 bodies had been pulled from the river and dozens more were missing. Speaking to a press briefing on Monday, Transport Minister Marc Ekila confirmed the new toll, but said "we were unable to get the records to determine the exact number of passengers on board" due to an "irregular situation". The accident was due to "overloading", the minister said, while adding that "wooden boats" were not authorised to operate at night. The large riverboat left the city of Mbandaka for the Bolomba Territory in DRC's Equateur province late Friday night. The vast Central African nation has few practicable roads, so travel often occurs on lakes, the Congo River and its tributaries, where shipwrecks are frequent and the toll often heavy.- Agencies

# Russia moves to revoke nuclear test ban treaty

Russia says the aim is to restore parity with the United States, which has signed but never ratified the 1996 treaty, and that it will not resume testing unless Washington does

MOSCOW: Russia's parliament took the first step on Tuesday towards revoking ratification of the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty and its top lawmaker warned the United States that Moscow might even abandon the pact altogether. Russia says the aim is to restore parity with the United States, which has signed but never ratified the 1996 treaty, and that it will not resume testing unless Washington does. But arms control experts are concerned that Russia may be inching towards a test which could usher in a new era of big power nuclear - and which the West would perceive as a Russian nuclear escalation amid the Ukraine war. Parliament's lower house, the Duma,

voted by 412 to zero, with no abstentions, to approve the withdrawal of the ratification in the first of three readings.

"Our vote is an answer to the USA - to their crass approach to their duties to maintain global security," Speaker Vyacheslav Volodin, a member of President Vladimir Putin's Security Council, told parliament. Report this ad "And what we will do next - whether we remain a party to the treaty or not, we will not tell them. We must think about global security, the safety of our citizens and act in their interests," Volodin said. Volodin said that the United States had asked Russia via the United Nations not to revoke ratification. He said Moscow's move was a wake-up call for Washington after its failure to ratify the CTBT for the past 23 years.

Andrey Baklitskiy, senior researcher at the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research, said Russia's deratification of the CTBT was part of a "slippery slope" towards resuming testing. He noted that Putin had said in February that Russia must "make everything ready" to conduct a test in case Washington did so, and that Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu had visited

Russia's testing ground in the remote northern archipelago of Novaya Zemlya in August. CNN published satellite images last month showing Russia, the United States and China have all built new facilities at their nuclear test sites in recent years.

NUCLEAR TEST? Baklitskiy said in a telephone interview he did not see a Russian test as imminent, but "the more you go in this direction, the less of a big decision vou would have to make" to proceed with one. For many scientists and campaigners, the extent of nuclear bomb testing during the Cold War indicated the folly of nuclear brinkmanship, which could ultimately destroy humanity and contaminate the planet for hundreds of thou-

sands of years. But the

Ukraine war has raised tensions between Moscow and Washington to the highest level since the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis iust as China seeks to bolster its nuclear arsenal to accord with its status as an emerging superpower. Putin has said he sees no need to change Russia's nuclear doctrine - a document that outlines that Russia would only order a strike with nuclear weapons if it was attacked, or if the existence of the state was endangered by an attack with conventional weapons.

# Russian shelling wounds 6

KYIV: Russian strikes on the southern Ukrainian city of Kherson wounded at least six people on Tuesday, after Moscow said it had shot down drones headed for annexed Crimea at night. The attacks came as Russia's offensive drags on for almost 20 months and with Kyiv waging a counteroffensive launched during the summer. The head of Kherson, Roman Mrochko, said the southern city saw "massive" Russian shelling that wounded five people. Another strike on a nearby transport company wounded two more people, the region's governor, Oleksandr Prokudin said. Kyiv also said it had shot down six Iranian-made Shahed drones that were launched from Moscow-controlled Crimea for the port city of Odesa. Several hours earlier, Russia said it had shot down eight drones over Crimea, which regularly comes under Ukrainian attacks.—**DNA** 

### Man dead in bushfire in Australia's **NSW**

SYDNEY: Police confirmed on Tuesday that a man died in the Australian state of New South Wales (NSW) after a bushfire ripped through a rural property in the state's north.

Emergency services were called to Stony Creek Lane at Temagog at about 10:15 p.m. local time on Monday. A 56-year-old man was reported missing after a bushfire passed through the area. On arrival, police officers located the body of a man, and his bulldozer nearby was destroyed. The man is believed to be a local property owner, whose identity still requires formal confirmation. The Temagog area is currently remaining under the threat of an outof-control blaze that has already burnt 21,010 hectares. The NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) called on residents to stay alert and monitor their surroundings, as the active fire continues to burn close to properties. According to the fire authority as of 8.00 a m local time on Tuesday, there are 69 fires burning around the state, with 32 not yet contained."While there are no total fire bans today, several areas in the north of the state will experience high fire danger," the NSW RFS warned.—DNA

longstanding diplomatic relationship. Earlier this year, Lukashenko visited Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi in Tehran and the leaders signed a "cooperation roadmap" between the two countries.

"The pressure exerted on our states is unprecedented," Lukashenko told Mokhber. "But you have already learned to resist it to some extent, and your experience is valuable for

Iran has been sanctioned and condemned by Ukraine and the West over its continuous support of Russia amid its ongoing war in Ukraine, including supplying the Kremlin with Shahed kamikaze drones that are used to attack Ukrainian civilian targets and advising Moscow on how to circumvent the international sanctions it faces. During Mokhber's visit to Belarus, the Iranian official is set to meet several Belarusians for "high-level bilateral talks." according to Iran's state news agency IRNA. The one-day visit is expected to result in a new cooperation document to strengthen "ties between the two nations.

# Venezuelan govt and opposition agree to resume talks

CARACAS :Venezuela's government and opposition said that they will restart talks seeking to end the country's political and economic crisis, after a nearly year-long sus-

In a joint statement, the two sides said that the Norway-facilitated negotiations will resume Tuesday in Bridgetown, Barbados, with participation of the United States - the destination for millions of Venezuelans who have fled economic hardship at home. In his weekly television appearance, President Nicolas Maduro said his government was "on the verge of starting a new round of signing agreements" with the opposition. "We are on the threshold of beneficial agreements for the country... I can say that these agreements will be very beneficial for peace, because peace must be taken care of, they will be very beneficial for the upcoming elections," he said. The opposition, backed by several countries including the United States, did not recognize Maduro's 2018 re-election in a vote widely dismissed as fraudulent. The following year, Washington ramped up sanctions against Caracas first imposed in 2015 over the brutal repression of anti-government protests. On Monday, the United States welcomed the announcement of fresh talks.- Agencies

# UN refugee chief rallies support for Rohingya

WASHINGTON: Dwindling humanitarian aid for Rohingya refugees threatens to exacerbate one of the world's largest humanitarian crises, the UN's refugee chief said on Tuesday. Bangladesh is home to around a million members of the mostly stateless minority, many of whom fled a Myanmar military crackdown in 2017 that is now subject to a genocide probe at the International Criminal Court. Frustration is widespread over the lack of progress in a repatriation deal, rampant lawlessness in the refugee settlements and cuts to international humanitarian aid. Humanitarian assistance "is declining" amid crises in Ethiopia, Sudan, Afghanistan, Ukraine and Israel, Filippo Grandi told reporters on the sidelines of a regional meeting. "This is a crisis that should not be forgotten... If contributions decline, we are in trouble." The Rohingya crisis had only 42 percent of the \$875.9 million funding needed this year, he said. Budget cuts have forced the UN World Food Programme to steeply reduce humanitarian aid to the Rohingya camps this year, with funding for rations now at \$8 per refugee per month. Malnutrition in the sprawling camps is already rampant, rights groups say. The United Kingdom's Minister for the Indo-Pacific Anne-Marie Trevelyan announced a 4.5 million pound (\$5.4 million) funding contribution on Tuesday. Grandi said repatriation to Myanmar was still "Plan A," even as he acknowledged many Rohingya were still afraid to return to the country where they are widely viewed as interlopers from Bangladesh. Bangladesh and Myanmar are working on a pilot program to begin repatriating a limited number of Rohingya, despite concerns from rights groups who say conditions are not safe for their return. Rohingya in Myanmar are denied citizenship and access to health care and require permission to travel outside of their townships.

# Turkiye 2024 budget emphasizes on sustainable growth including: "Qualified people,

Ankara: Vice President Cevdet Yilmaz on Tuesday presented details of the government budget proposal for the upcoming year, highlighting it was prepared in accordance with the earlier presented medium-term plan, and said it would prioritize construction, revitalization and Turkiye's growth in all sectors. "Our priority is to rebuild our cities destroyed by the earthquakes," Y lmaz said vowing to overcome the cost of living issue with "realistic and grounded policies." Turkiye has allocated TL 1.03 trillion (\$37 billion) in its 2024 draft budget to meet the cost of earthquake-related damage and the needs of people in the region, Yilmaz said at a news conference in capital Ankara. Citing that despite the slowdown in global economic activities and ef-

fects of the early February earthquakes, they expect economic growth at 4.4% for 2023, Y lmaz said they foresee the economy expanding at 4% next year. "For 2024, we expect our economy to grow by 4% with a more balanced demand composition," he noted. The vice president recalled the positive streak in growth that continued for 12 consecutive quarters, noting Türkiye, which grew by 3.9% in the first half of 2023, has differentiated itself positively among the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) member countries. Y lmaz recalled that the medium-term program was put forward at the beginning of September, and the legal process for public institutions and organizations to prepare their budgets has started accordingly. He also stated that the 12th Development Plan was presented to Parliament on Monday having received the endorsement of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. # **ATC** cancels **Dr Yasmin** Rashid's bail application

LAHORE: The anti-terrorism court (ATC) of Lahore on Tuesday dismissed the bail application of former Punjab health minister Yasmin Rashid. ATC Judge Arshad Javed rejected the bail plea of the PTI leader. The case was registered by the Shadman police for her alleged involvement in ransacking case.

During the proceedings, the prosecutor said new sections had been incorporated in the case and that the former minister was on physical remand for two days. The bail application of Ms Rashid was not admissible, the prosecutor argued. Declaring the application ineffective, the court rejected her bail request.

### 14 PIA flights cancelled due to lack of fuel

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan State Oil (PSO) has stopped the fuel supply to Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) at Multan, Sukkur, and Gilgit airports due to unpaid dues, exacerbating the precarious situation of the national flag carrier. This suspension of fuel supply on Monday led to the cancellation of 14 flights between Multan, Karachi, Sukkur, Islamabad, and Gilgit. According to sources, PIA owes PSO an amount of Rs650 million according to the agreed schedule.

As reported by The Express Tribune on Sunday, PIA has sought additional borrowing of over Rs7 billion from banks due to concerns about the potential partial or complete suspension of its flight operations resulting from a severe financial crisis. According to the report. PIA wrote to the Avi ation Division, requesting an immediate loan of over Rs7 billion from banks. The letter also noted that the government of Pakistan's guarantee includes the option for the airline to secure a loan of Rs7.5 billion.

Interestingly, no bank has shown interest in providing a loan to the airline. The letter also pointed out that due to financial difficulties, fuel supply in Jeddah and Dubai had been halted, and the stateowned oil marketing company PSO had refused to supply fuel to the airline. It also mentioned the possibility of the International Air Transport Association (IATA) suspending its membership at any time, and the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) had issued notices to the airline.

### Apple boss makes surprise China visit

BEIJING: Apple chief executive Tim Cook has made a surprise visit to China. Though in an upbeat mood as he met gamers in the city of Chengdu, the company faces flagging iPhone demand in the country, analysts suggest. It is his second trip to China this year - in March he said Apple had a "symbiotic" relationship with China, a key manufacturing base. But the firm's operations in the country have been complicated by Covid and US-China tensions.

Mr Cook's visit included a trip to Apple's Taikoo Li store to meet young players of Tencent's Honour of Kings online battle game "The energy tonight was off the charts!" he wrote on the Chinese social media platform Weibo. Honour of Kings started in Chengdu but was now "a global phenomenon on the App Store", he told the state-run

China Daily newspaper. He hoped that Chinese developers could repeat this success with software for Apple's new Vision Pro augmented reality headset, which would also use a Chinese manufacturer, the report said. This year marks Apple's third decade in the country. Mr Cook, who has been CEO since 2011, is regarded as the architect of Apple's embrace of Chinese manufacturing, but the relationship has had its ups and downs in recen years. - Agencies

# **Biden to** visit Israel today

WASHINGTON: US Secretary of State Antony Blinken has announced that President Joe Biden is set to pay a solidarity visit to Israel, soon after revealing that Tel Aviv agreed to devise a plan for providing humanitarian aid to Gaza's civilians. During the visit, the top US diplomat said Biden will discuss plans to reduce the number of civilian deaths during wartime, amid a rising humanitarian crisis, while preventing Ha-

mas from benefiting. Blinken announced his decision for the aid plan after 9 hours of negotiations with Netanyahu, which lasted until early Tuesday, after their meeting was disrupted by air raid sirens warning of incoming Palestinian rocket fire, forcing them to temporarily shelter in a bunker.

Blinken, on his fifth day of round-the-clock diplomacy in the region, returned to Israel after visiting six Arab countries in four days to address the humanitarian crisis in Gaza, where Israeli bombardment has martyred over 2,800 Palestinians and forced hundreds of thousands to flee their homes.

# Sweden warns country facing biggest threat

STOCKHOLM: Sweden's prime minister has warned that his country is facing the biggest threat in its modern history after a gunman in Brussels killed two Swedes in an attack that authorities are investigating as terrorism. "Sweden has in modern times never been under as big a threat as now," Ulf Kristersson told reporters on Tuesday. Kristersson said Sweden and the European Union needed to bolster their borders and internal security to prevent dangerous individuals from staying in the bloc. "Every indication is that this is a terror attack, targeting Sweden and Swedish citizens, just because they are Swedes," he said, adding that the region "can't be naive." Two Swedes were shot dead in Brussels and another was wounded on Monday night as Belgium hosted Sweden in a Euro 2024 qualifying football match.Accused gunman, a 45-year-old Tunisian national, was shot dead by Belgian police on Tuesday.

# No one can stop resistance forces

TEHRAN: Leader of the Islamic Revolution Avatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei says if Israeli crimes against Palestinians in Gaza continue, no one can stop Muslims and resistance forces. Speaking in a meeting with a group of Iranian elites and top scientific talents on Tuesday, Ayatollah Khamenei said that Muslim nations are angry at the Israeli bombardment of the Gaza Strip, "If these crimes continue, the Muslims and the resistance forces will become impatient, [and] no one would be able to stop them.' he said. "This is a fact that exists. Of course, whatever the Zionist regime does, it will not be able to make up for the scandalous failure it suffered." The Leader also said that what is in front of the eyes of the whole world in Palestine is the Israeli regime's crime of genocide Claims by some countries that Palestinians have killed civilians are false as all those living in settlements across occupied territories are armed, he asserted.

# Saudi Arabia demands immediate ceasefire

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia denounced on Tuesday the forced displacement of the Palestinian population, calling for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza and the lifting of the blockade. The statement, made during the council of ministers cabinet meeting in Riyadh chaired by King Salman, called for the return to the peace process under the Arab Peace Initiative which seeks to establish an independent Palestinian state along the 1967 borders with East Jerusalem as its capital. The cabinet reviewed discussion on Gaza held between the Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman and leaders of the Türkiye, Iran, and France, as well as with the US Secretary of State. The cabinet also appraised the outcomes of the eighth session of the Saudi-Russian Joint Committee, focused on advancing coop across crucial sectors to fulfill future objectives. - DNA

# Govt gets more time to appeal against SC's verdict

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court (SC) on Tuesday granted 15 days time to the federal government to file an appeal against the apex court's decision abolishing the amendments made to the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) laws. The additional time has been given in the light of the SC (Practice and Procedure) Act 2023, which came into force granting a right to appeal the apex court's verdicts. Attorney-General for Pakistan Mansoor Awan said the extension was sought to add additional grounds in the appeal against the judgment issued by SC on September 15 about the case. "There is now a right of appeal under the Practice and Procedure Act," the AGP said. The SC, on September 15, ruled to strike down some amendments made to the National Accountability Ordinance (NAO), 1999. The NAB amendments case was related to public importance; thus, it fell under the original jurisdiction of the superior court i.e. Article 184(3) of the Constitution. The time limit for filing a revision against the SC decision expired on October 15, with the government seeking 15 more days for filing an appeal. The government was, however, supposed to file the appeal against the NAB amendments verdict today. With the application of the SC law following the top court's decision to uphold it, additional

time has now been granted to the government. Through the appeal, the government is likely to ask the SC to annul the decision against the NAB amendments and order its restoration. Meanwhile, petitioner Zubair Ahmed Siddiqui has filed an appeal against the same verdict of the apex court. Last week, Pakistan People's Party (PPP) Senator Farooq H Naek filed a review petition against the aforementioned decision on October 14. The lawyer filed the review petition on behalf of a citizen named Abdul Jabbar, who was neither party in the litigation nor did he belong to any political party.

# **Pak-Hungary vow to enhance** collaboration in military tech





# Palestinian lawmakers arrested in occupied WB

OCCUPIED WEST BANK: The Israeli army has detained 55 Palestinians, including several parliamentarians, most notably Parliament Speaker Aziz Dweik, during raids across the occupied West Bank, a known rights group confirmed. Amani Sarahneh, a spokesperson for the Palestinian Prisoners Society, told Anadolu news agency that the Israeli arrests included senior figures from the Hamas group and former Palestinian parliamentarians, including Speaker Aziz Dweik. The Israeli army has yet to comment on the arrests. According to the Palestinian Prisoners Society, approximately 6,000 Palestinians are currently being held in Israeli jails. Eleven days into the conflict with Palestinian group Hamas, Israel's bombardment and blockade of Gaza has continued, with over one million people displaced - almost half of Gaza's total population, according to the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA). The fighting began when Hamas on Oct. 7 initiated Operation Al Aqsa Flood, a multi-pronged surprise attack that included a barrage of rocket launches and infiltrations into Israel by land, sea, and air. It said the incursion was in retaliation for the storming of the Al Aqsa Mosque and increased violence by Israeli settlers. The Israeli military then launched Operation Swords of Iron against Hamas targets in Gaza. At least 2,808 Palestinians, including 750 children, have been killed in Israeli airstrikes on Gaza, while the death toll from such Israeli attacks in the occupied West Bank has reached 60. More than 1,400 Israelis have been killed in the armed conflict. - Agencies
