RAWALPINDI: At least two civilians were martyred while 10, including three soldiers, sustained injuries when an Afghan suicide bomber, affiliated with Hafiz Gul Bahadur Group, attacked a security forces' convoy in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's Bannu District, said the military's media wing on Monday. The Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), shared that the unfortunate incident occurred on Sunday in the Bakka Khel area when a motorcycle-borne suicide bomber exploded himself. Out of the injured, the ISPR said, seven were civilians while three were soldiers. It added that the sanitisation operation was being carried out in the area to eliminate any other terrorists found in the area. "Security forces of Pakistan are determined to eliminate the menace of terrorism and such sacrifices of our brave civilians and soldiers further strengthen our resolve," said the ISPR. The group behind the bombing is a faction of the outlawed Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP). Pakistan has faced a surge in terrorism in recent months, with the TTP and other militant outfits intensifying their actions against security forces. In response, the state has also launched operations to curb terrorism.

COURT REPORTER ISLAMABAD: Islamabad High Court (IHC)

Chief Justice Aamer Farooq on Monday wondered how can a person amass assets beyond his known sources of income without indulging in corruption. The remarks came during the hearing of Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) supremo Nawaz Sharif's netition challenging his conviction in Al Azizia and Avenfield references. A two-member division bench headed by the IHC chief justice and comprising Justice Miangul Hassan Aurangzeb heard the appeals. In July 2018, former prime minister Nawaz was sentenced to 10 years in jail in the Avenfield reference filed by the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) in the light of the Supreme Court order. The Al-Azizia Steel Mills corruption reference pertains to the case in which he was sentenced to seven years in jail on Dec 24, 2018. He was also fined Rs1.5 billion and US\$25 million. Nawaz was declared a proclaimed offender in both references in December 2020

The minister emphasized that there was an adequate stock of wheat in the country as public wheat stock included 39,24,367 metric tons in Punjab, 8,17,394 metric tons in Sindh, 2,15,082 metric tons in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and 89,354 metric tons in Balochistan. Pakistan Agricultural Storage & Services Corporation Ltd (PASSCO) accounted for 17,18,177 metric tons, he added. Private wheat stock comprises 3,37,270 metric tons in Punjab, 93,165 metric tons in Sindh, 14,918 metric tons in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and 4,157 metric tons in Balochistan. The Minister for Parliamentary Affairs said that Pakistan had over seven million (7,213,884) metric tons of wheat, with an additional imported stock of 10.33,845

metric tons, ensuring there was

no shortage. He said the support price for provinces differed, being Rs 4600 in Punjab and Rs 4700 in Sindh. During discussions on the motion, Senator Dilawar Khan said that Pakistan should export wheat rather than its import and called for concessions to the agriculture sector. Maulana Abdul Ghafoor Haidri highlighted Balochistan's agricultural challenges, emphasizing the lack of canal systems. He expressed concern about the removal of subsidies for poor farmers on electricity. Senators Dr. Zarga Suharwardy Taimur and Rukhsana Zuberi stressed the need for a concrete solution to address the issue. The minister acknowledged the collective wisdom of the Senate which ultimately provided guidance to the government. He said that discussions on the topic would be tabled before the Cabinet and Prime Minister for positive consideration.

Action against underage, unlicensed drivers going on

Police launched a comprehensive campaign against underage and unlicensed drivers in the district.

According to a press release issued by DPO office here on Monday, a total of 181 cases were registered while 1149 challans were also issued against underage drivers and 1077 challans issued against those driving without a license during last ten days.

A spokesman for Traffic police said that vehicles and motorcycles were also being impounded over violation in the district.

In addition, some parents were also called on the spot and given a warning in which they were asked to give a surety bond (affidavit) to not let their underage children drive in the future. The purpose of the campaign was to discourage underage and inexperienced drivers so that the accidents that occur every day can be reduced, he said. The District Police Officer Muhammad Faisal Kamran said that parents and teachers should play their key role in eliminating the driving craze among young people.

In the next phase, the police would also file cases against the parents of underage drivers along with them, DPO added.-APP

Media urged: Highlight flood-affected communities at COP28

COP28 presents an exceptional opportunity for Pakistani media to amplify the miseries of the climate victims

PESHAWAR: National media should amplify the sufferings of flood-affected communities during the upcoming International Climate Conference (COP28) in Dubai, from 30th November to 12 December 2023. This was discussed in an online training session on COP28 and the Role of National Media, organized by Resilient Future International -a research and training company. Journalists and university students participated in the training session. Aftab Alam Khan, the lead trainer, pointed out that while more than 5000 journalists are expected to attend COP28, many journalists from economi-

cally developing countries may not be able to attend due to financial constraints. He has emphasized the need for media houses and donors to support Pakistani journalists in attending such climate conferences. Aftab noted that national media can play three roles during COP28, reminding the world about the continuous sufferings of flood-affected people, especially women, children, transgenders, the elderly and the The national disabled. media should support demands for meaningful Loss and Damage Fund and drastic cuts in greenhouse gases (GHGs) and lastly keep the nation aware of

the proceedings of the climate conference. The International Conference of Parties (COP-28) on climate change was scheduled in Dubai, but the sufferings of climate injustice were evident in the flood-affected communities in Pakistan, he commented. COP28 presents an exceptional opportunity for Pakistani media to amplify the miseries of the climate victims. By playing such a role the media would complement the efforts of Pakistan and other countries in COP28 towards a meaningful agreement on the Loss and Damage Fund, Aftab continued. Last year, during COP27, Pakistan's

leadership in G77+China

and a vigorous presentation of climate vulnerabilities brought the Loss and Damage Fund to the negotiation table, he recalled. Aftab added that the media should highlight the issue of the continuous rise in

greenhouse gases (GHGs) generated from fossil fuels, which is the primary cause of climate change. The UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's (IPCC) 2018 report stated that GHG emissions needed to be reduced by 45% by 2030. However, the current plans of top-emitting countries would lead to an increase in GHG emissions by 10.6%. which is insufficient to stop climate change. Those

countries should commit to a drastic reduction in GHG emissions in COP28. Chair of the session, Dr. Shafqat Munir, Deputy Executive Director of the Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) noted that journalists should also keep an eye on the preparatory work run up to COP28. The Transitional Committee on Loss and Damage Fund met 5 times this year to deliberate on the nature and structure of the Fund. He also added that the most important resource documents for journalists are, Nationally Determined Contributions and the National Adaptation Plan.

LAHORE: After three-day closure to curb smog in 10 districts of Punjab, educational institutions reopened on Monday, bringing back the hustle and bustle of life. Moreover, business activities also came back to the pre-lockdown routine. Though all curbs have gone, the condition of wearing masks continues. Roadside eateries were seen in the morning packed to their capacities and public transport also saw rush of travellers. The caretaker Punjab government had taken a bold decision to opt for a smart lockdown as the menace of smog persisted, causing respiratory ailments to the dwellers of cities. The step brought some relief but the air pollution seemed persisting as with 353 air quality index (AQI) Lahore remained at the top of the list of the most polluted cities of the world. India's capital New Delhi is the second most polluted city and Karachi is at the third spot. According to health officials, more than 7,000 people were brought to five big hospitals of Lahore with breathing problems. It may be recalled that last week the Lahore High Court (LHC) ordered to keep all educational institutions closed on Saturdays until the end of January to curb smog. The

a Class-IV job," he said, adding every effort including the construction of universities and investment in the education sector would be a futile exercise if quality education was not provided to students.



The International Conference of Parties (COP-28) on climate change was scheduled in Dubai, but the sufferings of climate injustice were evident in the flood-affected communities in Pakistan, he commented. COP28 presents an exceptional opportunity for Pakistani media to amplify the miseries of the climate victims. By playing such a role the media would complement the efforts of Pakistan and other countries in COP28 towards a meaningful agreement on the Loss and Damage Fund, Aftab continued. Last year, during COP27, Pakistan's leadership in G77+China and a vigorous presentation of climate vulnerabilities brought the Loss and Damage Fund to the negotiation table, he recalled. Aftab added that the media should highlight the issue of the continuous rise in greenhouse gases (GHGs) generated from fossil fuels, which is the primary cause of climate change. -DNA

Death of Maulana Zafar Ali Khan observed

ISLAMABAD: The 67th death anniversary of renowned journalist, writer, poet and leader of Pakistan movement Maulana Zafar Ali Khan was observed Monday. Born Wazirabad in 1873, he rendered exemplary services in the Pakistan Movement and was imprisoned due to his stiff resistance against the British Raj.

In 1945-46, Zafar Ali Khan was elected to the Central Legislative Assembly as a Muslim League nominee. He was Editor of Urdu Newspaper 'Zamindar' which became one of the most influential newspapers the sub-continent. He died on November 27,1956 in Lahore and was buried in Wazirabad.

Four more diagnosed with dengue virus in RWP

RAWALPINDI: As many as four more dengue cases were reported in Rawalpindi during the last 24 hours, raising the tally of confirmed cases to 2,668 in the district. District Coordinator Epidemics Prevention and Control (DCEPC), Dr Sajjad Mehmood, Monday said that, among the new cases, two of each case had arrived from Municipal Corporation Rawalpindi and Potohar town urban area. He added that presently 22 patients were admitted to district hospitals of which 12 were confirmed cases while 2,654 were discharged after treatment.

The health officer added that though dengue cases decreasing sharply were with changing weather, there was a need to remain vigilant as mosquito was taking place indoors due to favourable environment.



Pakistan secures LNG shipment for January delivery

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has purchased a liquefied natural gas shipment for January delivery to address fuel deficit this winter, Bloomberg has reported. Pakistan LNG Limited (PLL) has awarded tender to Oman's OQ Trading for a spot LNG cargo to be delivered in January. State-run PLL has secured the shipment at a price premium to the spot market due in part to Pakistan's credit risk, sources said. Pakistan has struggled to procure spot cargoes of LNG after global prices spiked last year following Russia's invasion of Ukraine, leaving it to face widespread power outages. The PLL had earlier invited from international suppliers for the supply of one LNG cargo on a Delivered Ex-Ship (DES) basis at Port Qasim, Karachi. PLL has been mandated by the government to import and sell natural gas, LNG and re-gasified LNG. It procures LNG from international markets and enters into onward arrangements for the supply of gas to end users, managing the whole supply chain of LNG. – DNA

Oil marketing association rejects weekly review of fuel prices

ISLAMABAD: The Oil marketing association has rejected the caretaker government's move to review the fuel prices on a weekly basis. The chairman oil marketing association in a letter penned to the Ministry of Petroleum and the chairman Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (OGRA) has rejected the weekly fuel prices review. The OMA stated that weekly fuel price reviews will cost them and add to their misery. The move will create problems for consumers, transport and other sectors, the letter stated. Earlier, All Pakistan Petroleum Dealers Association rejected the plan and said the prices of petroleum products cannot be determined every week. On November 24, the Government of Pakistan decided to revise the prices of petroleum products weekly and sought recommendations from stakeholders and Petroleum Dealers Association regarding its decision to switch the revising of petroleum products pricing from fortnightly to weekly. In a letter, the government asked the stakeholders to submit "meaningful views/ comments, including pros and cons. of switching from fortnightly to weekly pricing, it any, within five working days" It is pertinent to mention here that the PTI-led government in 2020 established a fortnightly pricing mechanism for petroleum products and shift from the price benchmark based on Pakistan State Oil (PSO) oil im-

ISLAMABAD: In the Sarah Inam murder case, the main accused, Shahnawaz Amir, was acquitted of illegally possessing a Kalashnikov by the city's Judicial Magistrate Umar Shabbir. The court also ordered the release of the accused in the Kalashnikov recovery case, citing numerous loopholes in the presented evidence. The judgment was pronounced after the prosecution failed to prove its case, with the court noting the absence of a key witness. Shahnawaz Amir was arrested by Islamabad Police on September 23, the previous year, for allegedly killing his Canadian wife, Sarah Inam, at an Islamabad farmhouse. Sarah, a 37-year-old Canadian economist with a master's degree from the University of Waterloo, had worked with Deloitte and USAID during her career. She was married to Shahnawaz only three months before her tragic murder. – DNA

ANF recovers 420 kg drugs in seven operations

RAWALPIND: Anti-Narcotics Force (ANF) while conducting seven operations across the country managed to recover over 420 kg of drugs and arrested five accused, said an ANF Headquarters spokesman here on Monday. He informed that in an operation, ANF recovered 800 grams of Ice drug from a parcel booked for Bahrain at a courier office in Rawalpindi. 100 intoxicated tablets (ecstasy) were recovered from an accused netted from Bhara Khau in Islamabad. In the third operation, 24 kg hashish was recovered from a vehicle intercepted near Sher Shah Toll Plaza, Multan while an accused was arrested. 25.2 kg of hashish was recovered from a vehicle stopped on Super Highway Karachi. An accused was also sent behind the bars. 15.6 kg hashish was recovered from secret cavities of a vehicle near PDA Motorway Peshawar. ANF also netted an accused. 75 kg Ice drug was recovered from an abandoned vehicle in the Bonstan area of Panjgur. In the seventh operation, 279.2 kg of hashish was recovered from a house near the Habib Zai area of Qila Abdullah. The recovered drugs were stored for smuggling. Separate cases under the Anti-Narcotics Act have been registered against the arrested accused while further investigations are under process.—APP

Pak-China sugarcane coop edges ahead for bright future

ISLAMABAD: Pak-China sugarcane cooperation edges ahead for bright future despite challenges, according to a report published by Gwadar Pro on Monday. The surge in sugar prices in Pakistan reflects a series of deep-rooted elements. Key factors contributing to this situation includes the increase in sugarcane production costs manipulation by domestic sugar "mafia" and a flawed subsidy system.

Moreover, our entire sugarcane industry needs technological changes to bring about industrial upgrading and help reduce related costs. Dr. Fahd Rasul, Associate Professor of Agronomy, University of Agriculture Faisalabad (UAF) told Gwadar Pro that the highly volatile sugar price has jumped from 85 rupees/kg to 160-170 rupees/kg ahead of the crushing season start. Sugarcane production in 2021-22 based on official plantation areas of about 1.25 million hectares

was about 88.6 million tons, a certain growth from the same period of last year (1.16 million ha/80.9 million tons). The unit output in 2021-22 (70.35 Tons/Ha) is almost the same as the previous year (69.55 Tons/ Ha), according to Annual Report 2022 published by Pakistan Sugar Mills Association (PSMA). However, Pakistan's sugarcane yield per hectare is much lower than that of other major producers. In 2018 alone, the yield was 62 tons, far below the world average of

73 tons as well as India's 80 tons. Sikandar Khan, a PSMA senior official, noted that in addition to artificial factors such as monopoly and market manipulation, the increase in sugarcane production costs such as fertilizers, pesticides and transportation is the main reasons for the soaring sugar prices. Sugarcane uses more subsidized agricultural inputs than other cash crops, especially fertilizers and water. In highly water-stressed countries, including Pakistan, sugarcane consumes much more water than any other cash crop. It is urgent to cultivate high-quality sugarcane varieties that consume less water, have higher sugar extraction efficiency, and are more resistant to pests and diseases. "The sugarcane industry in Pakistan is characterized by the cultivation of several key varieties, particularly in the Punjab region.

Pak regional exports increase 14.21% in 4 months

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's exports to the seven regional countries witnessed an increase of 14.21 percent in the first four months of the fiscal year (2023-24) as compared to the corresponding months of last year. The country's exports to the regional countries including Afghanistan, China, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, India, Nepal, and the Maldives account for a small amount of \$1443.868 million, which is 14.76 percent of Pakistan's overall exports of \$9776.912 million during July-October (2023-24), State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) reported. China tops the list of countries in terms of Pakistan's exports to its neighbouring, leaving behind other countries such as Bangladesh and Afghanistan. Pakistan carried out its border trade with the farther neighbour Sri Lanka, India, Nepal, and Maldives. Pakistan's exports to China witnessed an increase of 40.36 percent to \$952.216 million in four months of this year from \$678.386 million during last year while exports to Afghanistan also surged to \$180.686 million from \$176.019 million. The country's exports to Bangladesh however decreased by 34.73 percent to \$192.193 million this year from \$294.499 million whereas exports to Sri Lanka rose by 2.68 percent to \$114.473 million from \$111.489. The exports to India decreased to \$0.069 million from \$0.110 million in the previous year. Exports to Nepal increased by 10.91 percent to \$1.138 million from 1.026 million while to Maldives increased by 17.87 percent to \$3.093 million from 2.624 million, it added. On the other hand, the imports from seven regional countries were recorded at \$3855.354 million during the period under review as compared to \$4259.578 million during last year, showing a decline of 9.48 percent. The imports from China during July-October 2023-24 were recorded at \$3737.818 million against the \$4139.263 million during July-October 2022-23, showing a decrease of 9.69 percent during the period. Among other countries, imports from India are worth \$73.575 million against the imports of \$62.603 million, an increase of 17.52 percent while imports from Afghanistan decreased by 81.30 percent from \$10.151 million to \$1.898 million.-DNA

US Withdrawal from Afghanistan and Its Impact on Pakistan

Afghanistan is situated at the crossroads of Central Asia and South Asia. It shares 2640 kilometers of its eastern border Pakistan. Afghanistan gained peculiar importance for Pakistan after the Soviet invasion in 1979. Constantly, for the last 40 years, it has been involved in three wars including Soviet Invasion, Afghan Civil War, and Global War on Terror (US Invasion). Taliban takeover and constant precariousness in Afghanistan have energized terrorist groups - ideologically aligned with the Afghan Taliban - which in turn posed a grave impact on the National Security

invasion of Afghanistan in 2001 following the 9/11 incident, a Peace Agreement in 2020 was signed between the Taliban and the US in Doha, Qatar ending the 20 years of war. Consequently, the Taliban retook control of Kabul on August 15, 2021. Tehrik-e Taliban Pakistan (TTP) is an alliance of militant networks formed in 2007 to muster armed opposition against Pakistan and its military. It is a predominantly Pashtun group operating against the state of Pakistan. The main goals of TTP are given below: 1. enforce Shariah law in Pakistan by use of force 2. To conduct Jihad against Pakistani security forces These goals share similarities with the goals of the Afghan Taliban when they were dueling against US and its allied forces. The US withdrawal and the Afghan Taliban takeover encouraged and inspired the Pakistani Taliban. Because it is believed that the Taliban defeated the US a global superpower. Both Pakistani and Afghan Taliban believe in the armed struggle to establish the supremacy of Islam. This belief provides a shared ideology to both TTP and Afghan Taliban.

They both consider every system, order, and ism which is in conflict with Islam and Islamic Caliphate (Khilafat) as disbelief (Kufr). As the Afghan Taliban defeated the Afghan National Security Forces after the US withdrawal from Afghanistan, TTP started attacking Pakistani Forces. Because TTP and the Afghan Taliban both claim that they will retaliate against anyone who protects, defends, or supports any foreign invasion, troop, and puppet government. Ideological similarities could be seen in the flags of both TTP and the Afghan Taliban. White background and an imprint of Kalma constitute the flag of both the Afghan Taliban and TTP. TTP is now enjoying free operational movement in the Taliban regime. The Taliban also has released TTP prisoners in Afghanistan including Deputy Ameer Maulvi Faqir Mohammad. TTP celebrated the said move with full zeal and zest and videos went viral on social media. Hussain Haqqani stated in his article published in Foreign Policy on March 03, 2023, that, Pakistan is confronted by violence from Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP), a derivative of the Afghan Taliban movement that is culturally and

After the US withdrawal from Afghanistan, the Taliban were glimpsed as heroes in Pakistan. Social media outlets were overflowed with video clips of the Taliban roaming in the presidential palace in Kabul and celebrating the triumph. They emerged victorious in the eyes of their ideological allies in Pakistan. As a result, the scourge of terrorism has resurfaced again. About 31 terrorist groups have joined hands with TTP since July 2020 and started to revolt against the writ of the state and intensified the armed struggle inspired by the so-called Taliban victory. TTP and other terrorist organizations are bouncing back with more energy and motivation after the US withdrawal from Afghanistan. The Afghan Taliban and TTP both hold strong beliefs in employing violence to mold the world according to their own definition. According to the data revealed by the Security Report 2022 of Pakistan Institute of Peace Studies, Pakistan faced a 27% increase in terror attacks from the year before. During August and September 2022. TTP started gathering in the Dir, but ISPR rubbished the exaggerated presence of TTP and issued a statement that Pakistan Army is observing their presence and movement. On November 28, 2022, TTP terminated the ceasefire agreement concluded during Baiwa's regime, and on November 30. a TTP suicide bomber blasted himself in the vicinity of a Police truck in Balochistan. In the first 4 months of 2023, 265 attacks were conducted by TTP against law enforcement agencies which resulted in 234 casualties and 282 soldiers sustained injuries, according to the media wing of TTP. The immediate meltdown of the Ghani regime and abrupt Taliban control over Afghanistan without the political settlement of the Afghan conundrum has left issues threatening the national security of Pakistan. Terrorist activities increase in Pakistan after the US withdrawal from Afghanistan. The main goals of TTP are not aligned with the true essence of the Constitution of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan. Because they challenge the writ of the state and deny to abide by the existing laws. If they want

accordance with their own radical interpretation of Islam, they can choose the prevailing mechanism democracy to implement their system of government. It is a peaceful way to propagate their views and beliefs. Pakistan cannot allow someone to create chaos and disturb the peace and sanctity of the state and to impose its will by the use of force. Pakistan as a state should negotiate with, aimed to maintain peace and establish its writ, TTP if they surrender themselves before the Constitution of Pakistan. Argentina would benefit from joining BRICS

rgentinian president-elect Javier Milei's team in charge of international relations is reportedly weighing up whether Argento experts the team has consulted, represents "an opportunity rather than a risk" for the country. While a final official decision has yet to be made, whichever side the coin lands on will have a significant impact on Argentina's economic future. That the right-wing libertarian president-elect is mulling the merits of joining may be indicative of a softening of his hard-line campaign stance. That stance included a number of provocative claims in addition to the suggestion that the South American country would not be one of the new members joining the BRICS grouping of the world's five largest emerging markets. Having secured victory in the election, that he is apparently willing to adopt a more pragmatic change in attitude comes as no surprise. Given that Milei is no longer in the opposition, he is now tasked with the seemingly impossible mission of navigating Argentina out of unprecedented economic woes marked by a triple-digit inflation, depleted foreign reserves and a poverty rate of more than 40 percent. Against this backdrop, good relations with the major emerging markets of BRICS are just too important for Argentina. It would be akin to cutting off one's nose to spite one's face to distance Argentina from other emerging economy markets. As outgoing president Alberto Fernandez said, joining BRICS would help Argentina "open up possibilities of joining new markets, of consolidating existing markets, of raising investment coming in, of creating jobs and raising imports", all of which Argentina desperately needs. Membership of the enlarged BRICS would definitely align the country with the economic dynamics of the BRICS member states, which combined already account for 42 percent of the world's population and more than one-fourth of the global GDP. The new BRICS with the addition of six countries would represent 46 percent of the world population and around 37 percent of global GDP when measured at purchasing power parity. The BRICS grouping has become an important platform for emerging markets and developing countries to strengthen solidarity and cooperation. The New Development Bank the group established in 2014, as well as the BRICS nations' trillions of dollars in reserves, would be able to provide enough liquidity to help Argentina refinance its mounting debts. Indeed, Argentina would have nothing to lose, but everything to gain, from its joining of BRICS. Not to do so would prove to be extremely costly for the country.



China, Japan, ROK strengthen ties for common interests

hat the foreign ministers of China, Japan and the Republic of Korea met for their first trilateral meeting after a hiatus of four years should be considered a positive development for the relations among the three major countries in East Asia. Given the fact that the GDP of the three economies put together makes up about 25 percent of the world's total and the trade volume among the three constitutes about 20 percent of the world's total, how their cooperation fares has a bearing on the economic development of the world. No wonder Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi told his Japanese and ROK counterparts that the three countries should play a more proactive role in promoting regional and global development in the face of the headwinds buffeting the global economy. To this end, Wang called on the three countries to restart negotiations on their trilateral free trade agreement as soon as possible, maintain the momentum of regional economic integration, improve the multi-channel and multi-level regional free trade arrangements, and contribute to the common goal of pushing for a Free Trade Area of the Asia-Pacific. Wang urged his Japanese and ROK counterparts to resist turning regional cooperation into camp politics. He also said in bilateral meetings with Japanese Foreign Minister Yoko Kamikawa and ROK Foreign Minister Park Jin that economic and technology issues should not be politicized, which is undoubtedly a prerequisite for Japan and the ROK to have good relations with China. For any sustained improvement in the relations among the three neighbors, it is vital that the three countries show respect for each other and pay due care and attention to each other's core concerns. It is natural for the three countries to have differences on a range of issues. But as close neighbors and important economic and trade partners to each other, continued communication is essential and they should establish a long-term mechanism to iron out or shelve their differences. It is also important for the three countries to promote cooperation and exchanges in a wide range of areas, which will hopefully increase political trust among them and thereby facilitate the improvement of bilateral and trilateral relations. That the three sides agreed to create the necessary conditions and make the relevant preparatory work for the leaders of the three countries to meet is a positive move in this respect. Seoul and Tokyo should be clear about why the annual meeting among the leaders of the three countries agreed upon in 2008 has been suspended since 2020. They both need to not let Washington guide their actions and they should refrain from following its lead in politicizing economic and technology cooperation and trying to put the brake on China's development. There is no reason for the three countries to let their differences, which can be peacefully resolved, prevail at the expense of the development of their ties.

he 1839 -1949 period was called a century of humiliation in Chinese History. 40 years ago the poverty rate in this country was more than 90 percent. But now China has proved its mettle. In 2021 GDP of China was 17.73 trillion dollars. Today China is the world's second biggest industrial economy, and it has proved itself to be a country with the biggest foreign reserves in the whole world. In 2018 China's share in export of domestic products all over the world was 18.66 percent. China's economy has grown faster than any other country in the world and this progress is unsurpassed. All these facts invite the need to analyze Chinese development scientifically and find the reasons for its progress. Deeper scrutiny will reveal that certain factors contributed to this tremendous success and they are enumerated below, "Sincere leadership, Self-reliance, and indefatigable work". Under Mao Zedong's leadership, China flourished without war, weapons, or the use of force through the army. An indication of this is the reality that you go anywhere in any part of the world and you will find things made in China. Simplicity was Mao's hallmark. He used to wear simple clothes, lived in a humble house, and used a bicycle. He very rarely went on foreign visits to any other country in his life (only twice in fact for state visits to the Soviet Union). Mao declared capitalism as exploitative and decided that China would manufacture the products itself to avert dependence. The theory is termed as Mao's Great Leap Forward. The campaign was centered on a shift from an agrarian system towards an industrial society through the formation of people's communes. In 1966 Mao Zedong initiated a cultural revolution. As a result, China got isolated from the rest of the world. However, the Chinese now had realized that this had pushed China to the brink of destruction from economic point of view. Chinese leadership then

decided to adopt the capitalistic system for foreign investment. In 1972 the first step towards Chinese development started when USA President Richard Nixon visited China. In this way the relations of both the countries flourished. The next visionary leader was Deng Xiaoping. Under his rule, Chinese Textile Revolution saw its boom. TVEs (Township and Village Enterprises) flourished. These were used to produce toys, furniture farm tools and fertilizers and they became foundation of the Chinese economy in the 1990s along with the textile industry. These were a part of reforms introduced by Deng Xiaoping. The top-down policy had not addressed the local problems and failed because of state control. Deng introduced the private and joined stock ownership and he adopted the bottom-up approach instead. It is pertinent to mention here that cheap and skilled labour also enabled China to become the world's factory. Chinese economic policy evolved from time to time with changing and emerging technology. The echo system for special Economic zones was developed which included massive infrastructural investments. These investments included high-speed railways and electricity grids. Factories were built under private ownership with minimal taxes. Manufacturing, outsourcing, and conditional foreign investments were also introduced by China in the 1990s. Ali Baba, an e-commerce company incorporated elements of Google, eBay, and Amazon. Similarly, Baidu (a Chinese search engine) is referred to as a copycat of Google. Today its network has expanded to almost 80 countries. From 1990 till 2010 China grew rapidly. Xi Jing Ping adopted the go-global policy and through Belt and Road Initiative Chinese investments reached Asia, Europe, and Africa. The COVID-19 pandemic and the escalated policies as a nationwide lockdown

impacted its economy significantly. However, China has proved resurgent and fought the menace. China serves as a potent and worthwhile example to emulate and follow suit by all the developing and underdeveloped countries of the world.

From Page 01 Centre for Research and Security Studies (CRSS), in a report released in October, noted that the security forces lost at least 386 personnel in the first nine months of 2023, marking an eight-year high. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Balochistan were the primary centres of violence, accounting for nearly 94% of all fatalities and 89% of attacks (including incidents of terrorism and security forces operations) recorded during this period. Furthermore, Pakistan has blamed Afghanistan for the rising terrorism and Islamabad has been consistently pointing out the use of US-made weapons by terrorists involved in attacks in the country. In September of this year, the Foreign Office had expressed concerns over the "advanced weapons" being used by the terrorists in Afghanistan to attack Pakistan and its security agencies.

He secured a 2-0 win over Australia for Italy's first Davis Cup title since 1976. Matteo Arnaldi provided Italy with the initial point, securing a 7-5, 2-6, 6-4 victory over Alexei Popyrin.

The No. 4 Sinner defeated top-ranked Novak Djokovic in both singles and doubles matches in Saturday's semifinal against Serbia. The 22-year-old Italian needed 1 hour and 21 minutes to seal Italy's victory against Australia. "We are all very young. We are really hungry to try to win it one more time for our life, but having this feeling at least once, it is a really special feeling," said Sinner, who has beaten nine top-10 players since September, although he lost to Djokovic in the ATP Tour Finals a week ago. Arnaldi saved eight break points before securing a break of his own to close out the first match in the decisive third set. "I think I won one of the most important matches of my life," the 44th-ranked Arnaldi said. The Italians, who had never won the title other than in 1976, had lost in the



three finals they played against Australia, which was last year's runner-up to Canada. Australia eliminated Finland in the last four this year. The Aussies are 28-time champions but haven't lifted the trophy at the men's tennis top team event since captain Lleyton Hewitt was on the winning squad as a player in 2003. MILAN: Lautaro Martinez ensured that In-

ter Milan kept hold of their two-point lead at the top of Serie A as he struck in scrappy 1-1 draw at closest rivals Juventus. Argentina forward Martinez swept home Marcus Thuram's low cross in the 33rd minute following fine play down the right flank from his strike partner, to keep second-placed Juve at arm's length in the title race. His 15th goal in all competitions brought Inter level six minutes after Dusan Vlahovic broke a two-month scoring duck with a similar firsttime finish at the Allianz Stadium in Turin. The stalemate ended a six-match winning streak in all competitions for Inter, who are favourites to claim a 20th Scudetto ahead of AC Milan who have also won the league 19 times. "For how the match went we'll take the point," said coach Simone Inzaghi to DAZN. "We know it's not easy to score at Juventus but after going behind the team stayed in the match and we scored a great goal." Inzaghi's side have come through the first of a series of tough tests with a Champions League trip to Benfica next up on Wednesday before

they face Napoli in Naples next Sunday. Sierra Leone govt regains control after attack

FREETOWN: Sierra Leone's government has said it was in full control after reporting a security breach by unidentified attackers at a military armoury in the capital Freetown that sparked armed clashes. Authorities in the English-speaking West African country - which has been going through a political crisis following elections in June this year - have declared a national curfew until further notice. The "government is in firm control of the security situation in Freetown, the attackers are retreating," information minister Chernor Bah told AFP. An AFP journalist said calm was slowly returning to the capital by Sunday evening, but checkpoints heavily guarded by security forces remained in place. "We are trying to collate the number of arrests and casualties," Bah said, adding that "those responsible for today's attack will be hunted down to face the full force of the law". Videos posted on social media appeared to show men in uniform under arrest in the back or beside a military pick-up truck.-APP

Teens in court for French teacher's beheading

PARIS: Six teenagers go on trial behind closed doors on Monday, accused of involvement in the beheading of French history teacher Samuel Paty by a suspected Islamist in 2020 in an attack that struck at the heart of the country's secular values. The teacher had shown his pupils cartoons of the Prophet Muhammad in a class on freedom of expression, angering a number of Muslim parents. Muslims believe that any depiction of the Prophet is blasphemous. One of the minors is a 15-year-old girl who allegedly told her parents that Paty had shown caricatures of the prophet in her class. She will be charged with false accusation after it was established that she was not in the class when it happened. Paty, 47, was killed outside his school in a Paris suburb by an 18-yearold assailant, born in Russia of Chechen origin, who was shot dead by police soon after the attack. The five other minors to be prosecuted, aged between 14 and 15 at the time of the attack, will be charged with premeditated criminal conspiracy, or ambush. They are suspected of having pointed out Paty to the murderer or helped monitor his exit from the school. All six minors were referred to the children's court and could face 2.5 years in prison. .-APP

Philippines promotes southern Muslim region's cuisine globally

MANILA: The Philippines wants to promote halal cuisine from Mindanao and put the island on the global culinary map, a tourism official said on Monday as efforts are underway to attract more Muslim travelers from around the globe to the region. Tour ism is a key sector of the economy for the Philippines, an archipelagic country known for its white sand beaches and beautiful diving spots, with the sector contributing nearly 13 percent, or about \$44 billion, of the country's gross domestic product in 2019. After the global travel industry ground to a halt due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Manila expanded its tourism goals to revive the sector and began to position itself as a Muslim-friendly destination. "We are promoting Filipino halal food, specifically Muslim Mindanao food, because we want more people to go to Mindanao," Myra Paz Abubakar, the Department of Tourism undersecretary for Muslim affairs, told Arab News on Monday. The southern island of Mindanao is one of the few regions with a sizeable Muslim population in the Philippines, a minority group that makes up around 6 percent of the country.--APP

Luxon takes oath as New Zealand's new PM

Luxon, 53, once chief executive of Air New Zealand, was sworn in as head of a new coalition government by New Zealand's governor-general in a ceremony in the capital Wellington

WELLINGTON: Former airline boss Christopher Luxon formally took office as New Zealand's prime minister, vowing to tame inflation and bring down interest rates. Luxon took over on Monday six weeks after his conservative National Party won national elections, ending a sixyear Labour Party reign ushered in by Jacinda Ardern. Luxon, 53, once chief executive of Air New Zealand, was sworn in as head of a new coalition government by New Zealand's governor-general in a ceremony in the capital Wellington. "It is an honour and an awesome responsibility," Luxon told reporters. "The number one

job is to fix the economy. We have to reduce the cost of living and get inflation under control so we can lower interest rates and make food more affordable." Luxon said his new government would also focus in its first few months on restoring law and order and improving public services. "We need to go to work," he said. The former Labour government had struggled to control the rising cost of living, a global issue blamed in part on pandemic-related supply issues and Russia's attack on Ukraine. The previous prime minister, Labour Party leader Chris Hipkins, took over from Ardern in January. She had unexpectedly resigned,



calling an end to her five-year period in office because she no longer had "enough in the tank". Luxon said his cabinet would meet over the next two days with a focus on signing off their plans for the first 100 days in office.

National has promised to crack down on crime, ban cellphones in schools and scrap planned fuel tax hikes. "A lot of our focus is on tackling the underlying cause of inflation," Luxon said. "That means a series of things to make sure we generate savings out of the public service and that government spending is prudent." Luxon becomes the 42nd prime minister of New Zealand after protracted coalition talks came to an agreement on Friday. His National party has formed a three-party coalition with the conservative ACT and populist New Zealand First parties to govern in the

123-seat parliament. In a first for New Zealand, the deputy prime minister role will be shared in two 18-month stints. New Zealand First leader Winston Peters, 78, was sworn in alongside Luxon as deputy prime minister but will hand over the role at the end of May 2025. He will be replaced by ACT leader David Seymour for the remainder of the threeyear parliamentary term. Luxon, a father of two, is a wealthy teetotaller and lover of country music who rose to prominence when he ran the national airline for seven years before entering politics.-Agencies

US shoppers set online spending record WASHINGTON; US con-

sumers spent a record \$9.8 billion online on Black Friday, up 7.5% from the previous year, local media reported. "We've seen a very strategic consumer emerge over the past year, where they're really trying to take advantage of these marquee days so that they can maximize on discounts," Vivek Pandya, a lead analyst at Adobe Digital Insights, told CNBC on Saturday. According to the report, Black Friday's top-selling categories were smartwatches, televisions, toys and gaming. Earlier, Adobe Analytics, which covers most US online retailing sites, reported that Americans spent \$5.6 billion in online shopping on Thanksgiving Day, up 5.5% from last year. The retail sector in the US sees a pivotal period commencing with Thanksgiving Day, celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November each year, followed by the widespread discounted shopping frenzy of Black Friday. This holiday shopping season continues with Small Business Saturday, designed to boost sales for small businesses. and Cyber Monday, the Monday following Thanksgiving weekend and the second-biggest shopping day and biggest day for online sales. Important for the retail sector, the shopping season extends through Christmas and culminates with a grand finale on New Year's Eve.—APP

Russia downs dozens of drones headed for

Moscow

MOSCOW: Ukraine overnight tried to attack Moscow with dozens of drones. Russian authorities said, just a day after Ukrainian officials reported that Russia had launched its most intense drone attack on Kyiv since the beginning of its full-scale war in 2022. Russian air defenses brought down at least 24 drones over the Moscow region - which surrounds but does not include the capital and four other provinces to the south and west, the Russian Defense Ministry and Moscow Mayor Sergei Sobyanin reported in a series of Telegram updates. Neither referenced any casualties. Andrei Vorobyev, governor of the Moscow region, wrote on Telegram that the drone strikes damaged three unspecified buildings there, adding that no one was hurt. One drone crashed into a 12-story apartment block in the western Russian city of Tula, about 180 kilometers south of Moscow, lightly wounding one resident and causing limited damage, local Gov. Aleksei Dyumin wrote on Telegram on Sunday morning. Moscow's Vnukovo and Domodedovo airports also briefly shut down because of the drone attack, according to Russia's state-run news agency Tass. Both appeared to have resumed normal operation, according to data from international flight tracking portals. Russian Telegram channels speculated that Ukrainian forces had deployed a previously unseen type of drone in the purported strike, pointing out some similarities to the Iranian-made weapons Moscow routinely employs in its attacks on Ukraine.-APP

Australia allocates \$168m budget for asylum seeker monitoring


SYDNEY: The Australian government has committed an additional \$168 million in funding for police and other law enforcement officials to monitor 141 refugees and migrants freed when a court ruled their indefinite detention was unconstitutional. The new funding over two years reflects an increase in the workload of law enforcement officials due to government concerns about a heightened community risk posed by those released following a landmark High Court decision on November 8. That ruling said the government could no longer indefinitely detain foreigners who had been refused Australian visas, but could not be deported to their homelands and no third country would accept them. The migrants

released due to the High Court ruling were mostly people with criminal records. The group also included people who failed visa character tests on other grounds and some were challenging visa refusals through the courts, with some being refugees and stateless people. Home Affairs Minister Clare O'Neil said the government's priority was protecting the safety of the Australian community within the limits of the law. "This funding will ensure that our agencies are able to dedicate the time and resources that will be required to manage this cohort into the future," O'Neil said. The Parliament passed a raft of emergency laws on November 16 that imposed restrictions on the newly released migrants including curfews, police reporting conditions and a requirement to wear an electronic ankle bracelet to track their movements at all times.

Reasons behind test case decision Lawyers for a Chinese refugee last week lodged a High Court challenge to the new measures, arguing their client was being punished through his curfew and being forced to wear an electronic bracelet. The seven High Court judges will on Tuesday release the reasons for their test case decision made three weeks ago to free a stateless Rohingya man convicted of raping a 10-year-old boy. The reasons will shed light on the legality of the government's legislative responses and whether more migrants need to be released. Some recently freed migrants could potentially be detained again. Hannah Dickinson, the principal lawyer at the Melbourne-based Asylum Seeker Resource Center, said the additional spending on law enforcement would result in increased policing that was "entirely unnecessary, unjustified and ... damaging to the community." O'Neil also announced she would soon introduce draft legislation in response to a recent High Court decision that found a government minister could not strip citizenship from a man convicted of terrorism. Under the proposed new laws, a judge rather than a minister would decide whether the Australian citizenship of a dual national would be stripped during a sentencing hearing. The crimes for which citizenship could be removed would be extended beyond terrorism to include espionage and covert foreign interference in Australian politics on behalf of a foreign government.

N.Korea boosts military amid satellite plans

SEOUL: North Korea warned on Monday it would continue to exercise its sovereign rights, including through satellite launches, while its troops were reported to be restoring some demolished guard posts on the border with South Korea. North Korea's foreign ministry said the launch of a reconnaissance satellite last week was prompted by the need to monitor the United States and its allies, state media KCNA reported. "It is a legal and just way to exercise its right to defend itself and thoroughly respond to and precisely monitor the serious military action by the US and its followers," the KCNA report said. Nuclear-armed North Korea launched the satellite on Tuesday, saying it successfully entered orbit and was transmitting photographs, but South Korean defense officials and analysts said its capabilities have not been independently verified. The launch prompted South Korea to suspend a key clause in a 2018 inter-Korean military agreement and resume aerial surveillance near the border. North Korea in turn declared it was no longer bound by the agreement and would deploy weapons on the border with the South. Citing South Korean military officials, Yonhap news reported that North Korean soldiers had been observed bringing back heavy weapons into the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) border and setting up guard posts that the two countries demolished in the wake of the de-escalation agreement. South Korea estimates the North had about 160 guard posts along the DMZ and the South had 60. Each side demolished 11 of them after the military deal signed in 2018. A South Korean defense ministry spokesperson declined to confirm the report. Yonhap reported heavily armed North Korean soldiers had been spotted restoring damaged guard posts in several locations since Friday, citing photographs from cameras in the DMZ. The United States had called an unscheduled meeting of the UN Security Council on Monday to discuss the North's satellite launch. On Nov. 22, nine members of the Security Council joined the United States in a statement condemning the North's satellite launch for using ballistic missile technology.—Agencies

Sinking exports: Textile sectors failure to compete

The most important production sector of Pakistan in terms of industrial production, GDP and international trade is textile sector. Textile sector produces are the most exported items of Pakistan. Textile sector in Pakistan is the largest production of Pakistan, it is considered be the 46% of the total manufacturing sector of Pakistan and generates more than 40% of the employment of the total labour force. However, for the last two decades the Textile Sector exports of Pakistan are exhibiting deteriorated performance. the decline in textile exports reveals the unsatisfactory competitive performance. 52% of the export of Pakistan are concentrated in a single value chain textile, apparel and cotton. Currently total exports of cotton, apparel and textile products values more than 18.12 billion, 18% of the total exports of Pakistan in 2022 comprises of textile products, more than 19% are apparel product and the share of cotton

export has shrunk to 10% only. Textile exports of Pakistan in 2003 were USD 2.3 billion, that have grown to USD 5.6 billion in 2023, however the share of Pakistan is shrinking in the global exports of textile sector. In 2003 around 10% of the total global exports were made by Pakistan which has shrink to 6.6% in 2023 with a persistent falling trend. Textile exports of Viet Nam were USD 0.13 billion in 2002 and with a persistent growth rate, Viet Nam's total textile exports have grown into USD 3.1 billion in 2021 and USD 2.1 billion in 2022. Viet Nam has successfully enhanced it share in the global textile exports. in 2003 the global share of Viet Nam's textile exports was mere 0.6% that has increased to 3.1% in 2022.

As compared to the regional competitor, textile sector of Pakistan unfortunately couldn't sustain its growth due to incompetencies deep rooted in inefficiencies. Industrial growth in 1970s, 1990s and 2000 did not meaningfully translated into vertical and horizontal industrial intensification of the textile

sector of Pakistan. A few supply chain actors have been keeping themselves updated and this sector has failed to sustain its competitiveness; due to failure to develop a market-oriented research and development as com-

pared to the regional competitors. The internal setbacks in the textile sector of Pakistan includes outdated technology, lack of automation and lack of rational standardization of the wool and threads. 33% of the machinery remains idle whole year. Innovation and diversification of the production is either not existent, outdated or not at par with the standard and requirement of the international market. Textile governing institution remains ineffective. Pakistani textile sector's market concentration remains majorly two large buyers i.e., the European Union and the United States of Amer-

Shortages of raw cotton, scarcity and soaring prices of the fuels and electricity, depreciating exchange rate, inefficiency and non-availability of innovation centers and research institute, fluctuating raw material prices has further worsen the export performance of textile sector of Pakistan. Wages and production costs in China

are increasing, hence there is ample scope for the Pakistani textile industry to regain its competitiveness and its share in the international market. As per an estimate by the international Growth Center around USD 1 million spent on financings on twisting and knitting raises export by USD 0.27 million, and in Pakistan approximately 50,000 kegs filament of cotton generates employment opportunities for 400 people. Pakistan's textile sector possesses immense export potential however it has failed to export even half of the total potential. Export potential of Bedlinen of Cotton (HS Code 630231) is USD 1.7 billion for Pakistan while Pakistan's total exports of the same produce are mere USD 982 million mere 53% of the total export's potential. The textile sector of Pakistan has been suffering primarily due to lack of serious efforts to enhance quality standards and diversifying the

export produces. Serious and targeted interventions are need to curb the high manufacturing costs due to high raw material prices and hefty levies on import of cotton fibers. The subsidies scheme administered are often ill planned and lacks a proper framework based on achievable milestones aimed at enhancing production, marketing and export efficiencies.

Due to non-existence of a vibrant and robust supply value chain, adequate research and development center, and conducive environment, Pakistan has been unable to value add its cotton and untap the true export potential. Leveraging the China Pakistan Economic Corridor and entering into joint ventures and partnerships with Chinese counterparts may bring noticeable improvements. Human capacity development, enterprise capacity development should be prioritized to introduce new technologies, trend and evolution of new practices of processing, producing and exporting high-end products.

ISLAMABAD: A court has granted the benefit of the doubt to Shahnawaz Amir the main suspect in the murder of Sarah Inam - in the case involving the possession of a Kalashnikov firearm that was obtained illegally. In its decision, the court highlighted the prosecution's failure to prove its charges against the accused, Sara's husband and son of prominent journalist Aya Amir, terming its evidence "doubtful".

Iudicial Magistrate Umar Shabbir said that the benefit of the doubt is the right of the accused. "Complainant Constable Tariq was not produced as a witness," the court noted. It should be noted that the police had registered a separate case related to the recovery of a Kalashnikov from the suspect.

Currently, the final arguments in the murder case against Shahnawaz are continuing at the session court. Last month, the prime suspect rejected all evidence submitted by the prosecution against him, terming it "baseless". Amir was presented before Additional District and Sessions Judge Nasir Javed Rana, where he told the court that on the night of the incident, his mother prepared dinner for them.

"We all ate together, chatted a lot and then went to sleep. Sarah went to the bathroom in the middle of the night. I was asleep at that time. I woke up at 7am and went to F-8 Market to get breakfast," he said.

Ahad Cheema gets clean chit

LAHORE: The National Accountability Bureau (NAB) has given a clean chit to caretaker prime minister's adviser Ahad Khan Cheema in the reference of assets beyond means on Monday. According to a report submitted by NAB, all the assets of Ahad Cheema match with his income and therefore, it doesn't require any reference against him.

The report says all the alleged 'benamidars' (individuals holding property on behalf of others) of Ahad Cheema made the properties from their personal income and it cannot be linked with Cheema.

The report claims that the accounts of Ahad Cheema's relatives including Sadia Mansoor, Mansoor Ahmed and Nazia Ashraf are not 'benami' accounts of Cheema. Ahad Cheema's total income is Rs213 million while his expenses are Rs131 million, the investigation reveals. It added that the former bureaucrat provided NAB with his income and profit records during the re-investigation. The submitted record was found correct after thorough verification.

NATO chief seeks Turkish approval for Sweden

ANKARA: NATO Secretary-General Jens Stoltenberg told reporters on Monday that the time has come for Türkiye to approve Sweden's membership to the military alliance. Stoltenberg has long sought to convince Türkiye to accept Sweden's membership while Ankara repeatedly expressed concerns over the Nordic country's tolerance of terrorist groups, namely the PKK and Gülenist Terrorist Group (FETÖ), as well as the country regularly allowing the desecration of the Quran under police protection. The NATO chief was speaking at a news conference ahead of a meeting of foreign ministers of the bloc, under the shadow of the Palestine-Israel and Russia-Ukraine conflicts. "Sweden has delivered on what they promised and now the time has come for Turkey to finalize the accession process," Stoltenberg said. Türkiye and Hungary are the only NATO members not yet to have ratified Sweden joining the alliance more than 18 months after it applied for membership. The Turkish Parliament started to debate Sweden's bid to join this month after President Recep Tayyip Erdogan launched the process following a deal at a NATO summit in July. NA-TO's other 29 allies had hoped to be able to formally welcome Sweden into the alliance at a meeting of foreign ministers in Brussels this week. However, the process is still at the committee level in the Turkish Parliament. - DNA

Iran urges permanent truce to in Gaza

TEHRAN: Iran on Monday called for a permanent ceasefire in Gaza to stop Israel's "crimes" in the territory as the truce between Israel and Hamas entered its final day. With the four-day truce is approaching its scheduled end early Tuesday, Hamas has said it is willing to extend the pause and free more hostages. The pause that began Friday has seen dozens of hostages freed, with over 100 Palestinian prisoners released by Israel in return. "As the Islamic Republic of Iran, we want and expect... that the crimes of the Zionist regime against the Palestinian people will be stopped completely," said Nasser Kanani, Iran's foreign ministry spokesman. Kanani told reporters during his weekly press conference that Iran is "following" the extension of the truce "with the regional party active in this field, the state of Qatar." Iran's Foreign Minster Hossein Amir-Abdollahian was on a visit to the Qatari capital Doha on Thursday. "One of the main goals of the ongoing negotiations and efforts is to ensure that the existing temporary cease-fire takes a stable form and that the cruel aggression of the Zionist regime (Israel) against Gaza is not repeated," he added. - Agencies

Shahzad **Akbar comes** under acid attack in UK

LONDON:Former prime minister Imran Khan's accountability chief Shahzad Akbar has revealed that an unidentified man threw acid on his face at his home in the United Kingdom. The incident took place in an area near London outside the former Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader's residence. Speaking to media. Akbar said a delivery person came to his house and threw acid on him as soon as he opened the door. However, he said, most of the acid landed on the door and only a small amount landed on him.

"My wife and children remained unharmed, only I got some injuries," said the former PTI leader. Akbar told media that he is currently living in a small village outside of London where he shifted about 1.5 months ago. He said that his new address had been leaked. The politician, who has been in self-exile in the UK, said that he was at home with his kids on Sunday when a delivery man wearing a helmet rang the doorbell. - Agencies

Sweden's PM condemns call to tear down mosques

STOCKHOLM: Swedish Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson on called for some mosques to be seized and lev elled during a speech at his annual party conference on Saturday. "We need to start confiscating and tearing down mosques where anti-democratic, anti-Swedish, homophobic, anti-Semitic propaganda or general disinformation is being spread," Akesson said. Kristersson, whose coalition government does not include SD but relies on its support, condemned the statements as "disrespectful".

"I think it is a disrespectful way of expressing oneself, a polarising way of expressing oneself," Kristersson told broadcaster SVT. "This misrepresents what Sweden stands for internationally," he added. Akesson's speech sparked anger both in Sweden and abroad and forced Kristersson to issue a statement on X, formerly Twitter, reiterating Sweden's "constitutional right to freedom of religion". "In Sweden, we do not demolish places of worship. As a society, we must fight back against violent extremism whatever its grounds – but we will do so within the framework of a

Last year, Sweden was the target of a vast disinformation campaign claiming its social services were "kidnapping Muslim children" and placing them in Christian homes, forcing the authorities

Displacement of Palestinians 'red line' violating peace treaty

DUBAI: Jordan's Prime Minister Bisher Khasawneh called the displacement of Palestinians a "red line" that constitutes a fundamental violation of the peace treaty between his country and Israel, The Jordan Times reported on Monday. Khasawneh highlighted the treaty's key provision defending against forced population movements, stating that such displacement would dissolve the Palestinian issue and threaten Jordan's national security. Khasawneh warned that if displacement of Palestinians occurs, the peace treaty would become meaningless. He affirmed Jordan's support for Egypt's rejection of displacing Palestinians from the Gaza Strip, fearing a precedent of forced removal in the West Bank. Khasawneh stressed King Abdullah's longstanding support for a two-state solution and warned against neglecting it, foreseeing a region plunged into violence. Jordan considers any attempt to alter the status quo in Al-Aqsa Mosque as another "red line" with consequences for crossing it, the prime minister warned. Khasawneh said Jordan was exploring options to secure alternatives in the event that the supply of liquefied natural gas from Israel is halted. He said Jordan was talking with other Arab countries, while affirming Amman's commitment to contractual obligations with Israel. - Agencies

Lightning and rain kill 24 in western India

NEW DELHI: At least 24 people have been killed in lightning strikes and rain in India during intense storms, officials said. The rain damaged houses and killed livestock across western Gujarat state. Storms are unusual in Gujarat during winter, meteorologists said, and the fierce downpour caught many off guard. Flash floods and lightning strikes kill thousands of people in India each year. Scientists are warning that rising global temperatures are fuelling a surge in extreme weather events. Rising land and sea surface temperatures warm the air above and make more energy available to drive thunderstorms from where lightning emanates. Rain and hailstorms were expected to continue in western India on Monday. At least 18 of the 24 deaths were attributed to the lightning strikes, officials said in a statement late on Sunday. Gujarat state was hit by heavy rainfall accompanied by thunderstorms and hailstorms on Sunday and Monday, with some areas receiving up to 144mm (5.7 inches) of rain in 24 hours, Reuters news agency reported citing state government data. India's Home Minister Amit Shah said he was "deeply saddened" by the deaths, adding that local authorities were engaging in relief work. In India, lightning strikes killed more than 100,000 people between 1967 and 2019, according to official data. This is more than a third of fatalities caused by natural hazards during this period. - Agencies
