Pak-Kuwait agree to deepen ties, sign many MoUs

KUWAIT CITY: Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaarul Haq Kakar met Kuwait Crown Prince Sheikh Meshal Al Jaber Al Sabah on Wednesday and the two sides agreed to deepen the bilateral relationship between the countries. Kakar had arrived at Kuwait's Bayan Palace earlier today to hold talks with the country's top leadership. The premier — who recently wrapped up his trip to the United Arab Emirates — had landed in Kuwait last night to cement ties with the Gulf state. In a statement, the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) said that during the meeting Kakar reaffirmed the importance Pakistan had attached to its relationship with Kuwait and reiterated the desire to further expand bilateral cooperation in diverse fields. "He underscored the resolve to forge deeper economic engagement between Pakistan and Kuwait, including in trade, energy, information technology, labour, mineral and investments," the statement said. PM Kakar also expressed satisfaction at the close cooperation between the two countries at multilateral fora, the statement said. "He appreciated the measures undertaken by Kuwait for the recruitment of Pakistani manpower in the fields of health, security and infrastructure," it added. Meanwhile, the Kuwait crown prince reciprocated the sentiments of the prime minister and "reiterated the desire of Kuwaiti leadership to further deepen and broaden bilateral relations with Pakistan". PM Kakar is also due to meet his counterpart Emir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad but the latter was admitted to a hospital due to an emergency health problem and his condition is stable, the state news agency reported.

KSA extends \$3bn deposit term for 1 year

ISLAMABAD: In a major development for the struggling economy, Saudi Arabia has extended the term of its \$3 billion deposit with the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) for another year. "The Saudi Fund for Development (SFD) on behalf of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia has extended the term for the deposit of USD 3 billion maturing on 05 December 2023 for another one year," the SBP announced in a statement on Wednesday. The extension of the term of the deposit is a continuation of the support provided by the kingdom to Pakistan, which will help to maintain the foreign currency reserves of Pakistan and contribute to the economic growth of the country, the statement added. The \$3 billion deposit agreement was initially signed through the SFD with the SBP in 2021 and rolled over subsequently in 2022, after the issuance of

Global coop needed against migrant smuggling

BRUSSELS: Caretaker Foreign Minister Jalil Abbas Jilani has underscored the need for impactful international collaboration to create effective regulatory structures to tackle migrants smuggling while incentivizing legal means for human mobility. He expressed these views while addressing the International Conference on Global Alliance to Counter Migrant Smuggling in Brussels. The Foreign Minister was on a two-day visit to Brussels, Belgium, at the invitation of the European Commissioner for Home Affairs, Ylva Johansson. Jalil Abbas Jilani emphasized the need for legal pathways for migration to curb irregular migration and migrant smuggling. He also highlighted the steps taken by the Government of Pakistan to curb irregular migration. On the sidelines of the Conference, the Foreign Minister held meetings with senior European Union's officials and members of the European Parliament. In his meeting with EU Commissioner for Home Affairs, Ylva Johansson, the Foreign Minister welcomed the progress under the recently launched Migration and Mobility Dialogue, including opening of legal pathways for migration and operationalization of

ISLAMABAD: In a major relief for the former prime minister, the Islamabad High Court (IHC) Wednesday acquitted Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) supremo Nawaz Sharif in the Avenfield Apartments reference case. The court also dismissed the plea filed by the National Accountability Bureau in the Flagship reference against the PML-N supremo after the accountability watchdog withdrew it. An IHC division bench comprising Chief Justice Aamer Farooq and Justice Miangul Hassan Aurangzeb announced the verdict on Nawaz's plea to overturn his conviction in the graft case. Recently, the high court also acquitted PML-N Vice-President Maryam Nawaz and her husband Captain (ret'd) Muhammad Safdar in the Avenfield reference,

GAZA CITY: The armed wing of Hamas announced on its Telegram channel that the release came in response to a request from Russia. Hamas said that the two Russians were handed over to the "Red Cross a short while ago as a prelude to handing them over to representatives of the Russian Foreign Ministry". Hamas's armed wing said three captives were killed in previous Israeli bombardment of Gaza. The Qassam Brigades identified them as the youngest captive, 10-month-old Kfir Bibas, his four-year-old brother and their mother. Meanwhile, two Palestinian children have been shot dead by Israeli troops attacking Jenin city in the occupied West Bank, the Palestinian Health Ministry says. The ministry identified the two, who were killed by Israeli occupation forces early on Wednesday, during Israel's ongoing aggression against the city of Jenin and its camp, as the eight-year-old Adam Samer al-Ghoul and the fifteen-year-old Basil Suleiman Abu al-Wafa. The Ministry said the occupation forces continued their aggression against the Jenin camp, where they launched a massive arrest campaign and forced citizens in Damj neighborhood to get out of

Soekarno's legacy exhibition strengthens Indonesia-Pak ties

Indonesia-Pakistan exhibition unveils shared history and cultural ties, celebrating Soekarno's enduring impact on bilateral relations

ISLAMABAD: The Embassy of the Republic of Indonesia in collaboration with the National Archives of Indonesia, the National Library of Pakistan, and National Archives of Pakistan inaugurated today a week-long exhibition of "Soekarno's Legacy in Building Stringer Bonds of Indonesia-Pakistan Brotherhood, National Library of Pakistan, 29 November-2 December 2023. UN intervention urged for Kashmir resolution

From the seminar, Federal Minister for Information and Broadcasting Murtaza Solangi, Senator Mushahid Hussain Syed, Senator Dinesh Kumar, Federal Minister for Human Rights Khalid George, Former President of Azad Kashmir Sardar Yakub Khan, Chairperson Friends of Kashmir Ghazala Habib, Hurriyat leader Farooq Rahmani, Altaf Wani, Abdul Hameed Lone, Jay Salik, Faiz Naqshbandi, Waqar Hasan, Hasan Ibrahim, Fawar and others spoke. Mashaal Hussain Malik

said that according to the United Nations Charter, everyone has freedom of religion and expression of their thoughts, these laws provide protection to the followers of every religion, even the Indian Constitution mentions it. And it has also signed the Charter for the Protection of Minorities. "Unfortunately, after 2014, when the government was formed under the leadership of Modi, Hindu-Tava politics has flourished in India. After that, the time is very difficult for us as well. All the Hurriyat leaders, including my husband, were locked up in jails," he said. They are being poisoned in jails, Ashraf Sahrai and Syed Ali Geelani lost their lives in custody. She said that apart from this, atrocities against minorities are common in India, their target killing and acts of terrorism against them are normal, a Sikh leader was targeted for killing in Canada, similarly Sikh leaders were killed in Pakistan. Jeet, Attar Singh


were targeted in Canada while plans to target key Sikh leadership in the US also emerged. Apart from this, Kashmiris in Pakistan were targeted. He said that India has committed 294 hate crimes against Muslims, Sikhs and other minorities in 2021, thousands of churches have been targeted, Christians are being forced to convert, RSS is involved in various acts of terrorism, RSS is taking hateful steps to establish Hindu supremacy in India, RSS has created a parallel army which is a threat not only to India but to the region and the whole world. Because the world is not taking any action against fascist leaders like Netanyahu and Modi, due to non-implementation of international laws, Geneva Conventions and laws regarding humanity, India has become a land where no religion or caste a person belonging to a relationship is not safe, all this is being sponsored by the state.

ISSI organizes seminar on Pakistan-Philippines bilateral relations

The Seminar, titled "Pakistan-Philippines Bilateral Relations in the Changing World," aimed to explore opportunities for enhanced collaboration across a broad spectrum

ISLAMABAD: The China Pakistan Study Center, Institute of Strategic Studies Islamabad (ISSI), in collaboration with Embassy of the Philippines, organized a seminar today, focusing on relations between Pakistan and the Philippines in the changing global landscape. The Seminar, titled "Pakistan-Philippines Bilateral Relations in the Changing World," aimed to explore opportunities for enhanced collaboration across a broad spectrum. He also underscored the importance of Pakistan-Philippines relations in the context of Pakistan's elevated partnership with ASEAN. Ambassador Maria Agnes M. Cervantes, Ambassador of the Philippines in Islamabad, reminded that Pakistan and the Philippines had signed 25 cooperation agreements - strengthening bilateral cooperation on various track of the relations. She highlighted the potential for increased economic cooperation, especially in Information Technology, and emphasized the importance of people-to-people exchanges and cultural understanding. Ambassador Mohsin Razi, former Ambassador of Pakistan to the Philippines, shared his views on the excellent relations between Pakistan and the Philip-

ippines based on common values, dating back to the establishment of diplomatic ties in 1949. He highlighted mutual support on the international forums, including the Philippines' support for Pakistan's ASEAN engagement and joint initiative to promote inter-faith dialogue. Despite challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, bilateral trade between the two countries has substantially increased, he noted. Chrysl Sicut from the Philippines Embassy discussed economic agreements between the two countries, highlighting diverse areas for increased economic cooperation. Ms. Sicut called for a more open policy framework on trade and investment and encouraged streamlined people-to-people exchanges. Dr. Jay L. Batongbacal, Director of the Institute for Maritime Affairs and Law of the Sea, Philippines, shared information

about the security issues in ASEAN region and Philippines' perspective. He advocated for cooperation in maritime affairs for mutual economic development and security. Dr. Anna Mahmood from IJU focused on the untapped potential of maritime cooperation between Pakistan and the Philippines, emphasizing the significance of maritime security and trade for economic growth. Dr. Sameera Imran from NDU delved into the potential of bilateral relations in the changing global landscape, advocating for cooperation in research and development between the two countries. Significant legislations in place to protect and empower Women

RAWALPINDI: Special Assistant to Prime Minister for human rights and women empowerment, Mushaal Hussein Mullick, has said that higher education is not just a pursuit of knowledge but a gateway to critical thinking and skills acquisition. It provides individuals, especially women, with the necessary resources to navigate an ever evolving world. She was addressing the opening ceremony of the two-day international conference at Fatima Jinnah Women University Rawalpindi. The two days international conference would bring together distinguished guests, scholars, and policymakers to explore the nexus between higher education and women empowerment. Mushaal Hussein Mullick threw light on the systematic obstacles women had faced in accessing higher education in the past. She said that though some milestone in this regard had been achieved, challenges such as gender bias, cultural norms and

economic disparities are still hindering women's educational access. SAPM said that Zainab Alert Response and Recovery Act, 2020; Enforcement of Women's Property Rights Act 2020; The Anti Rape (Investigation and Trial) Act 2021; and The Protection against Harassment of Women at Workplace (Amendment) Act, 2022 are significant legislation enacted by the Government to protect and empower women. She stressed the connection between women's education and economic progress. Mushaal Mallick highlighted that education goes beyond academic accomplishments to critical thinking, problem-solving, and communication skills which are essential for effective leadership. Women with education are not merely economic contributors but also act as agents for driving social transfor-

IESCO imposes over Rs 6.1 mn fine

ISLAMABAD, Nov 29 (AP-P): Islamabad Electric Supply Company (IESCO) has imposed fine of Rs 6.1 million on 166 power pilferers during last 24 hour across all five circles of the company during the ongoing anti power theft and recovery drive. The IESCO spokesperson told that over Rs 110.1 million fine has been imposed on 2,754 power thieves during the current month. Around 124 FIRs have also been registered in the concern police stations while 64 have already been arrested, he said. IPO-Pak, US for improving IP policies, laws in Pakistan

ISLAMABAD: In a bid to promote intellectual property rights in the country, Intellectual Property Organization Of Pakistan (IPO-Pakistan) and US Intellectual Property Counselor for South Asia Wednesday reaffirm the commitment to carry forward the agenda of improving Intellectual Properties (IP) policies, laws and regulations in Pakistan. This was discussed during a high level visit of the US delegation to IPO-Pakistan Headquarters here headed by US IP Counselor for South Asia, John Cabecca, and consisted of Ms. Dong Eun, Zach Bailey and Hamza Khan. While the Pakistani side was led by Chairperson IPO, Farukh Amil, Director General, Ms. Shazia Adnan, and senior management of IPO-Pakistan were also present in the meeting, said a press release issued here. The chairperson IPO-Pakistan briefed the delegation about the measurements taken by the organization for promoting IPRs. He said that IPO-Pakistan believed that Patents, Trademarks and Copyrights had an important role in economic growth and development and in that regard it had already taken a number of initiatives to improve the IPR regime in the country. Regarding the establishment of IP tribunals in the country, the chairperson informed the US delegation that two new IP tribunals had been established in Quetta and Rawalpindi and approval of two more had been granted. Appreciating the advancement and development of IPRs by the US, Farukh Amil desired that IPO-Pakistan would like to benefit from the US experience and expertise in IP. To raise IP awareness in Pakistan, it was useful to have high profile engagement such as an MoU that would chart further action. It would also help provide a conducive environment for stronger commercial ties and greatly strengthen investor confidence, he added. Shazia Adnan informed that IPO-Pakistan's accession to the Marrakesh Treaty was also in the final stage and would be signed by the President soon. She said that after deliberate discussions on the draft amendments in the Copyright Bill, 2023, it would be soon forwarded to the Parliament for its final approval. Emphasizing on the capacity building, the DG said that IPO-Pakistan might face some post copyright amendment/treaties accession capacity building issues and sought help in training judiciary, enforcement agencies and copyright staff.—DNA

Three more dengue cases surface in RWP

RAWALPINDI: As many as three more dengue cases were reported in Rawalpindi during the last 24 hours, raising the tally of confirmed cases to 2,680 in the district. District Coordinator Epidemics Prevention and Control (DCEPC), Dr Sajjad Mehmood, Wednesday said that one of each case had arrived from Potohar town urban, Municipal Corporation Rawalpindi and Chaklala Cantonment area. He added that presently 25 patients were admitted to district hospitals of which 17 were confirmed cases while 2,661 were discharged after treatment. Dr Sajjad informed that during indoor surveillance, in the last 24 hours, the teams checked 1,950 houses and found larvae in 30 homes. Similarly, he added that while checking 1,701 places, the teams found larvae at eight sites during outdoor surveillance.—APP

NPO to organize webinar on solar system for electricity generation

ISLAMABAD: The National Productivity Organization (NPO) will conduct a Webinar on 'Solar System for Electricity Generation' on December 05 (Wednesday). "Energy growth is directly linked to the well-being and prosperity of a country and in Pakistan, the economy is mainly reliant on the electricity being produced by conventional energy resources such as coal, oil, and natural gas," according to an NPO document shared here. "Given adequate support, renewable energy technologies can meet the growing demand at lower prices than those usually forecast for conventional energy. Renewable energy technologies like solar, wind, bio, hydro, ocean and hydrogen are clean sources of energy; that have a much lower environmental impact than conventional energy technologies," it added. The workshop will provide information about renewable energy, solar energy, basic concepts of electricity, photovoltaic (PV) modules and their new models, PV system components, type and application of PV systems, basics of PV system sizing for the domestic sector, financial benefit analysis and financing options, ON grid, OFF grid, ONGRID hybrid & net metering, and Battery selection.—APP

The country is seriously threatened by climate change

ISLAMABAD: Chairman of National Business Group Pakistan, President Pakistan Businessmen and Intellectuals Forum, All Karachi Industrial Alliance, and former provincial minister Mian Zahid Hussain said on Wednesday that discussing climate change is no longer a fashion but has become a real threat. Ignoring this danger would be tantamount to suicide; thus, efforts should be made to manage resources to deal with the problem, he said. Talking to the business community, the veteran business leader said that Pakistan is among the ten countries in the world that are most affected by climate change. Millions have been affected, while more than 1700 precious lives have been exposed to the devastating rains caused by climate change. Yet, unfortunately, no comprehensive plan has been put in place to deal with this menace permanently. He said that the Islamabad High Court has also issued instructions to the CDA to find a permanent solution to the problem of car showrooms in Islamabad and for this purpose it should analyze the best models of this business in other major cities of the world including London, Malaysia and Singapore. He stressed that the

CDA should find a sustainable solution for car showrooms by taking all stakeholders into confidence. Engr. Azharul Islam Zafar Vice President ICCI termed it important to address the problems of motor dealers for the better growth of the business activities of this sector and assured that ICCI will cooperate with the Association to solve their issues. Former President ICCI and Secretary General of UBG Pakistan Zafar Bakhtawari said that the auto industry is playing a vital role in the development of the economy by paying taxes of around 30 billion rupees and stressed that the

government should facilitate this industry and motor dealers by creating favorable conditions for their business. Alvi directs bank to refund Rs 344,600 to fraud victim

ISLAMABAD: President Dr Arif Alvi, upholding the orders of Banking Mohtasib, has directed Allied Bank Ltd (ABL) to pay Rs 344,600 to a customer as the amount fraudulently transferred from his account. The bank had committed maladministration by opening the fund transfer facility without the consent of customer which caused him financial loss, the President House said Wednesday. Deciding upon a representation filed by ABL against the decision of the Banking Mohtasib, the president held that the bank failed to discharge the burden and statutory liability cast upon it under the law and that it had committed basic irregularity and non-compliance by activating In-

ternet Banking/Electronic Funds Transfer (IB/EFT) channel without customer consent. In his decision, he observed that although the complainant received a phone call from a number similar to the bank's helpline, after which, a sum of Rs 344,602 was transferred from his account, however, if the IB/EFT facility had not been opened by ABL, the customer could have been saved from the financial loss caused to him with no fault on his part. The president pointed out that the complainant had neither requested the IB/EFT facility nor had conducted any transaction through such channels in the past. Ameer Ali Wasan (the complainant), a citizen of Hyderabad, immediately filed a complaint with the bank after the fraud but his grievance was not resolved. Lat-

er, he approached Banking Mohtasib to get a refund of the lost amount. The Mohtasib directed ABL to refund the defrauded amount, but ABL filed a representation with the President against the decision. The president held a personal hearing of the case and in his decision noted that ABL failed to establish the legitimacy of the disputed transaction in terms of Section 41 of the Payment System and Electronic Funds Transfer Act, 2007. "From the perusal of the record, it is apparent that the transactions were conducted on a single date and almost in a very short span of time and on the same pattern. It could have evoked the alert system of the Bank, to at least call the customer about it. It is a matter of concern to be

addressed by the Banks and the regulator i.e., State Bank of Pakistan," the President noted. He added that the citizen was not conversant with digital banking and did not have adequate knowledge of the present-day banking products based on modern technology. In view of the facts, the president concluded that IB/EFT was an unsolicited facility and the bank had failed to comply with various binding and mandatory provisions of the Payment Systems and EFT Act 2007 as well as directives issued by the State Bank of Pakistan regarding the opening of such channels. The president, therefore, rejected the representation filed by ABL and directed it to report compliance to Banking Mohtasib within 30 days from the date of the order.

China and Pak promote agro-forestry economy

ISLAMABAD: The third Science and Technology Exchange Conference on China-Pakistan Tropical Arid Non-wood Forest was held both online and offline this week in Zhengzhou, China, and Gwadar simultaneously. The exchange conference was aimed at to showcase achievements and research progress of both nations in the field of economic forestry. It also sought to facilitate academic exchanges of woody medicinal herbs and active substances between China and Pakistan, according to a report published by Gwadar Pro on Wednesday. The event, co-hosted by the Chinese Society of Forestry (CSF) and Central South

University of Forestry and Technology (CSUFT), drew over 220 officials, scholars, students and business representatives from both countries. In 2021, to enhance the economic and ecological development of the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), CSUFT, China Overseas Port Holding Company (COPHC), and Yulin Holdings collaborated to establish an Engineering Research Center for Tropical Arid Non-wood Forest. The center aims to showcase a green and sustainable development approach, focusing on the non-wood forest industry and its compatibility with ecological, economic, and social benefits in Gwadar. During the review and discussion of the pro-

gress made over the past years, Zhang Baozhong, chairman of COPHC, introduced the impact of eco-economic forest construction on the business environment in Gwadar. Focusing on the collection and utilization of germplasm resources of arid and salt-tolerant and non-wood barren forests, the organizer invited experts to make special presentations on the research progress and development prospects of different plants, including *Eucommia ulmoides*, *Elaeis guineensis*, *Moringa oleifera*, and *Hippophae rhamnoides*. The event was organized by Henan Agricultural University, Henan Forestry Society, Economic Forest Branch of CSF, COPHC and Yulin Holdings.

FGEHA to complete Green Enclave-II in 2025

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Government Employees Housing Authority (FGEHA) would complete the development work of Green Enclave-II residential project of the government employees by 2025. "The work of the first part of the project Green Enclave-II (Commoners Sky Garden) is going on vigorously. The Housing Authority Green Enclave II-Project is a joint venture of the Ministry of Housing and Construction, with Sky Garden to provide low-cost plots/flats to government employees," an official told APP. He said the work on the first part of Green Enclave-II was progressing towards completion, which consisted of about 11,000 kanals of land.—APP

Pak locally produced 15.66 million phones in Jan-Oct 2023


ISLAMABAD: In the initial ten months of 2023, Pakistan has manufactured or assembled 15.66 million mobile sets domestically, as per the latest data from Pakistan Telecommunication (PTA). The country also commercially imported 1.26 million mobile phones during the same period. The data shows that 92.6% of the phones have been locally assembled/manufactured, highlighting massive reliance on domestic productions. In contrast, 7.4% of the phones have been imported, contributing to the reduction of the country's import bill. As per PTA's data, out of the 15.66 million mobile sets, 10.25 million are classified as Second Generation Mobile (2G mobile), commonly known as GSM phones while 1.41 million of these mobile sets are smartphones. The data shows the dominant role of Chinese companies within the top 10 brands actively involved in local manufacturing and assembling of phone sets. Leading the chart is China's VGO Tel with the production of 1.96 million phone sets, followed closely by 'itel' with 1.89 million sets. Infinix has contributed 1.70 million mobile sets, while Xiaomi's Redmi follows with 0.92 million phone sets manufactured/assembled, and Tecno has assembled/manufactured 0.89 million mobile sets. In 2022, Pakistan locally manufactured 21.95 million phone sets alongside the commercial imports of 1.53 million phone sets. The leading brand in this race was China's itel with 3.03 million sets. Similarly, VGO Tel produced 2.40 million sets, and Vivo and Infinix manufactured/assembled 1.72 million sets each in 2022. China's Tecno and Oppo were also among the top 10 brands each engaging in the assembling/manufacturing of 1.34 million and 1.12 million mobile sets, respectively, according to a report published by Gwadar Pro on Wednesday.

Model CCI students visit Parliament House



NEPRA concludes hearing into FCA of DISCOs for Oct

ISLAMABAD: National Electric Power Regulatory Authority (NEPRA) on Wednesday concluded public hearing into fuel cost adjustment (FCA) of all power distribution companies (DISCOs) for October. The hearing was presided over by the NEPRA Authority comprising Chairman Waseem Mukhtar, Member Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Engr Maqsood Khan, Member Balochistan Mithar Niaz Rana, Member Sindh Rafique Ahmad Shaikh and Member Punjab Amina Ahmed. Central Power Purchasing Agency-Guarantee (CPPA-G) on behalf of XWDISCO sought Rs 3.53 per unit increase in power tariff for the said period. The financial impact of the increase was estimated as Rs 32.7 billion. Out of total, around Rs 25 billion and Rs 3.2 billion were included old adjustment of Thar Coal Block 1 and China Power respectively. The net increase has been calculated as Rs 3.13 per unit for the said period. Hydel generation accounted for the largest share, constituting 32.54%, local coal-based production followed with a contribution of 13.94% and imported coal with a 3.51% share. Similarly, gas-based electricity accounted for 7.35% of total generation while re-gasified liquefied natural gas (RLNG) represented a substantial 20.25% share in electricity.—APP

Preparedness for spillover natural precaution

A month into the so-called Operation 1027, a joint offensive against the Myanmar government forces by the Brotherhood Alliance of three ethnic armies in the country's northern region, fighting continues along the China-Myanmar border. In light of this, the People's Liberation Army has conducted live-fire drills on the Chinese side of the border since Saturday. While there is no denying the two are interrelated, it is groundless overstretch to talk about a Chinese attempt to interfere in Myanmar's internal affairs, as some Western observers have done. At both government-to-government and people-to-people levels, China and Myanmar have been on good terms. So good that the close official relationship has been a constant target of Western criticism as some Western countries aspire for changes in Myanmar politics. Beijing's critics, however, often ignore the fact that the Chinese government's good-neighborly ties with the government in Myanmar is based on the principle of mutual noninterference. This principle sits at the center of the Chinese diplomatic compass – the Five Principles of Peaceful Coexistence. With no signs of the fighting abating along the border, it is only natural for China to upgrade its own preparedness to deal with any unexpected scenarios. "It is the responsibility of the PLA to safeguard border security and protect the lives and property of people living in the border areas," said the PLA Daily. "The drills being conducted ... are aimed at testing the mobility, border control abilities and firepower capabilities of the military units so that the People's Liberation Army is ready for any emergency." According to the PLA Southern Theater Command, the drills are being carried out in accordance with an annual training plan. Those who accuse the Chinese of siding with the ethnic forces should not neglect what the Myanmar military has to say. A spokesman of the Myanmar government stated on Saturday that Myanmar had been informed of the drills. Military relations between China and Myanmar are firm, collaboration between the two militaries is friendly, and getting closer. Nor should they ignore the fact that the PLA's exercises are only part of Beijing's response to the situation. Wary of the fighting's effects spilling over and disturbing peace on the Chinese side, Beijing has repeatedly appealed to the conflicting parties to agree to a cease-fire and negotiate. It has also coordinated with the Myanmar authorities to accommodate displaced refugees and help third-country nationals withdraw via China. China and Myanmar share a border of more than 2,000 kilometers. The surge in fighting has displaced more than 2 million people in Myanmar, according to a United Nations' estimate. The domestic conflict on the other side of the border is certainly a grim and genuine concern for China.



UK must return looted relics to where they belong

The dispute between the United Kingdom and Greece over the ownership of the Parthenon Sculptures escalated, with UK Prime Minister Rishi Sunak canceling a meeting in London with his visiting Greek counterpart Kyriakos Mitsotakis following the latter's renewed call for the return of the 2,500-year-old marbles. The Greek prime minister said that the Parthenon Sculptures, which were removed from Greece by the British diplomat Lord Elgin in the early 19th century, had been "essentially stolen" and asked for their early restitution. Greece has long insisted that the works were illegally removed from the country and they should be handed back to join other surviving relics in the purpose-built Acropolis Museum. The UK government has steadfastly rejected Greece's demand, citing the 1963 British Museum Act – which prohibits the removal of objects from the British Museum's collection – as an excuse. That the UK prime minister canceled his scheduled meeting with his Greek counterpart, only hours before it was due to take place just because the guest had repeated the international consensus that looted artifacts should be returned to their country of origin, shows the sensitivity of the UK to the issue. Thanks to its colonial past, the UK, like many other Western colonial powers, removed countless relics and artifacts from its colonies and other countries. Of the more than 8 million items that the British Museum now holds, the majority were either light-fingered or smashed-and-grabbed from other countries, including more than 23,000 pieces of cultural relics that were looted from China. The return and restitution of cultural property is central to the 1970 UNESCO Convention on Prohibiting and Preventing the Illicit Import, Export and Transfer of Ownership of Cultural Property. And calls from the international community for the museums in Western countries to return the plundered relics they hold have intensified in recent years. Some countries have already taken steps to right their wrong. Germany, for example, last year returned 22 Benin Bronzes including sculptures and plaques looted from the ancient Kingdom of Benin to Nigeria, in a crucial step to address the country's "dark colonial history", as its foreign minister said. Yet despite this, the British Museum has so far refused to return the artifacts to their country of origin, partly on the grounds that they would not be taken good care of. Yet a scandal exposed in August involving some 2,000 artifacts that have inexplicably gone missing from the museum points to the huge loopholes in its security and management. The UK must face up to the crimes it committed during its colonial past and take concrete steps to correct some of its historical wrongs by returning all looted or stolen artifacts to their country of origin.

Unprecedented bloodshed

I got a message to join a session about prevailing conditions of Palestine particularly the Gaza; the speaker of the session was the president of Alkhidmat Foundation Dr. Hafeez ur Rehman. We all are quite updated about the atrocities of Gazans due to the social media platforms despite biased policies of a few social media applications. In the morning once I had a thought that probably it will be the waste of time to attend the presentation but the grief of the people of Gaza drove me to the head office of Alkhidmat Foundation to listen to the speaker. The gallantry of people of Gaza is simply exceptional from a child to the elderly. In early days of the conflict we all witnessed a video of a lady in her eighties refusing to leave her home while majority of her neighborhood left following the ultimatum of Israeli defense forces, hours later there was all rubble including her house while reporters were certain that the lady embraced martyrdom. Throughout the conflict we did not witness even a single clip of misconduct by any Hamas fighters with Israeli prisoners of war while there is abundance of videos on social media platforms depicting indiscriminate manhandling of Israeli troops with men, women and children. Israeli spokespersons quote and refer to the data and trends of wars during last hundred years, a few of cold-hearted representatives did mention even about Hiroshima and Nagasaki in a cunning manner. Attacking Jabaliya refugee camp with 2000-pound bombs twice in a few days speaks volume about savagery and madness of Israeli military. The brutality of Israel is unprecedented in the known human history. If we compare death toll of children during 48 days of the conflict with entire six years of World War Two (WWII), it is 80% more than the per day death toll of children in WWII. According to the estimates around 69 children were killed per day during WWII while in Gaza count stands at 125 children per day. Save

the Children reported on November 28, 2023 that at least 6,000 children have been killed in Gaza since the start of the escalation. According to the reports over 1.8 million people in Gaza, or nearly 80 per cent of the population, are estimated to be internally displaced. Of them, nearly 1.1 million IDPs are sheltering in 156 UNRWA facilities across Gaza. United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) reported, "About 15,100 housing units were destroyed, and 10,656 housing units were rendered uninhabitable, 139,000 housing units were subjected to minor to moderate damage, pointing to the destruction of entire neighborhoods, especially in Beit Hanoun, Beit Lahia, Shujaiya, the area between Gaza and the Beach refugee camp, and Abasan Kabira in Khan Yunis." Vanessa Romo from NPR's news desk reported on November 21, 2023, "Israeli attacks have killed more than 200 health care workers in Gaza since the start of the war, and another 215 health workers have been wounded. And those left behind say there is little time to mourn the dead." According to Lauren Leatherby of New York Times (November 26, 2023), "More than twice as many women and children have already been reported killed in Gaza than in Ukraine after almost two years of Russian attacks, according to United Nations estimates. And the number of women and children reported killed in Gaza since the Israeli campaign began last month has already started to approach the civilians documented to have been killed by the United States and its allies in Afghanistan during nearly 20 years of war. More than 60,000 buildings have been damaged or destroyed in the Gaza Strip, satellite analysis indicates, including about half of the buildings in northern Gaza." Alkhidmat is working on several fronts. Initially Alkhidmat extended ready food in collaboration with Turkish NGOs. The speaker

of the session explained that how relief goods are supplied utilizing Egypt's El Arish airport and how odd mechanism at Rafah Crossing is causing difficulties for relief activities; while audience were astonished that Palestinians are being discriminated and denied right of free movement ceasing Gazans in a real-life cage for people. Alkhidmat plans to establish a field hospital with the technical help from a Turkish institution which requires around 2.5 billion rupees. He emphasized that Alkhidmat has abundance of supplies of relief goods but the real challenge is the transportation. They are working in close liaison with the government to extend every possible relief to the civilians in the Gaza to contribute a bit in relieving their agony. However, they need facilitation for exclusive cargo plans to transport winter packages for the people of Gaza which costs around six thousand rupees per person. I am taking this opportunity to request every Pakistani to contribute to this noble cause to the fullest of their capacity in any given manner. Alkhidmat also launched an app to register volunteer doctors to travel to the Gaza to extend medical support to the wounded and sick civilians of the Strip. It was a moment of gratitude for the speaker to mention that around three thousand doctors have already volunteered to travel to Gaza while more than fifteen hundred are female doctors among them which indeed shows a deep concern and commitment to the humanity. We all have to extend what we can to the orphans, widows, elderly, sick and wounded human beings of Gaza to give them hope that morality has not yet vanished.

Europe's rising tide of immigration hysteria

Make no mistake. This is not about "illegal" immigration. It is about racism, pure and simple. For instance, it suits the UK government to make an issue out of "stopping the boats" crossing the English Channel. But the numbers involved are tiny compared with the number of migrants coming to the UK legally to work as doctors, nurses and care home assistants, or to study as students. And even those students are coming under fire. Make no mistake. This is not about 'illegal' immigration. It is about racism, pure and simple. The UK is seeing a record number of students coming from overseas to study

In the Netherlands, a formerly fringe far-right party wins more seats in the Dutch general election than any other political group. In Dublin, a knife attack outside a school triggers rioting and looting by right-wing thugs. In the UK, support for the right-wing Reform party is increasing. The common theme in each of these stories is immigration, a topic that has risen to the top of political agendas across Europe, threatening to transform liberal democracies into illiberal bastions of intolerance. Make no mistake. This is not about "illegal" immigration. It is about racism, pure and simple. For instance, it suits the UK government to make an issue out of "stopping the boats" crossing the English Channel. But the numbers involved are tiny compared with the number of migrants coming to the UK legally to work as doctors, nurses and care home assistants, or to study as students. And even those students are coming under fire. Make no mistake. This is not about 'illegal' immigration. It is about racism, pure and simple. The UK is seeing a record number of students coming from overseas to study. Worth millions of pounds to universities, which charge foreign students far higher fees than their British counterparts, they contribute significantly to the nation's gross domestic product. Some stay on in the country after completing their course. If they do, it is because they have got a job and are paying taxes to the treasury. Regardless, right-wing politicians are now demanding that such students should not be allowed to bring family to live with them. Europe is walking, eyes tight shut, into a new dark age that makes a mockery of the 70 million-plus lives lost during the Second World War in the effort to rid the world of the cancerous, supremacist ideology of the Nazis. A fundamental misunderstanding underpins Europe's rising tide of immigration hysteria:

Europe, with birth rates declining, needs immigration. In the UK in particular, migrants form a large part of the workforce, including doctors and nurses, but also carry out many of the low-paid jobs. But at the same time, right-wing politicians are peddling the false trope that migrants are taking "our" jobs and housing, clogging up "our" health system and – most sinister of all – "changing the shape of our country before our very eyes." That latest incendiary quote comes from Richard Tice, a wealthy British property developer who founded the Brexit Party and is now the leader of its successor, Reform UK, which says Britain is "broken" and "needs net-zero lawful immigration." The Conservative government, he said, had "totally betrayed" the British people because immigration to the UK was at a record high. It is, but only because, if it was not, Britain's economy would collapse. Europe is increasingly under the spell of those who would highlight our differences rather than our similarities. Regardless, traditional, more reasonable political parties across Europe are in a bind. If they ignore the rising tide of racist hysteria, they will be swept away, and so they are pandering to the mob. In the UK, the Conservative government is fragmenting, torn apart by the competing narratives of the beleaguered party's few remaining centrist MPs and extremists like the recently sacked Home Secretary Suella Braverman, the key cheerleader of the bizarre policy of dispatching boat people to Rwanda. In the Netherlands, a four-party coalition government collapsed in July after failing to reach agreement over measures to control the flow of migrants. Into the moral vacuum stepped radical right-winger Geert Wilders, a preposterous man who rants about the "tsunami of asylum and immigration" and who has pledged to "ban" the Qur'an, close the country's borders and deliver "Next," a Dutch version of Brexit.

On one level, this growing distaste for non-European foreigners is hilarious, given that it is a direct consequence of the colonialism that European states such as the UK and Holland imposed on the world for centuries. But such truths cast no shadows on the fantasy landscapes occupied by the likes of Wilders. The advantages of cultural diversity are obvious, and too numerous to list, and in choosing to present multiculturalism as a threat rather than an asset, right-wing politicians expose themselves for what they are – racists. In Ireland last week, anti-migrant mobs gathered following an incident in which five people, including a five-year-old girl, were stabbed outside a primary school in Dublin. In the words of the police, "hateful assumptions" that the attacker was a foreign national spread quickly and mobs took to the streets, expressing their disdain for foreigners by, oddly, vandalizing and looting Irish shops. Ironically, the man who risked his own life to save the wounded victims was himself a migrant – a fast-food courier and a father of two originally from Brazil. Unfortunately, Europe is increasingly under the spell of those who would highlight our differences rather than our similarities in a cynical bid to seize power. The roots of all the disruptions in the Middle East and North Africa that have, to a significant extent, contributed to Europe's migrant problems can be traced to European intervention in the region dating back to the First World War. The challenge now for Europe's moderate, mainstream politicians is to recognize and own this history, to hold the line of decency and to combat, rather than pander to, the false narratives of the extremists. So far, however, none have appeared capable of rising to this challenge and Europe is slipping inexorably into a moral dark age as a result.

the "royal directives that reflect the continuation of the close relationship between the two brotherly countries". Pakistan's economy is in dire straits with its foreign reserves depleting quickly amid less inflows from overseas investors. Analysts also see the Pakistani rupee falling to 350 by the end of 2024 as the local unit is set to end this year as the worst-performing currency. The country was on the brink of default last year, but it was averted after the International Monetary Fund (IMF) approved a short-term bailout with strict conditions — pushing the inflation up as Pakistan underwent several structural reforms, which saw an increase in gas, energy, and petrol prices.

Shan Masood aims to make history in Australia

Pakistan have never won a Test series in the 12 times they have toured down under, with the South Asian side losing the last 14 five-dayers in a row there

LAHORE: Newly appointed captain of Pakistan cricket team Shan Masood set his side a tough target on Wednesday for their forthcoming tour of Australia — make history. Pakistan have never won a Test series in the 12 times they have toured down under, with the South Asian side losing the last 14 five-dayers in a row there. But Masood, 34, who took over the Test side after Babar Azam relinquished the captaincy in all formats of cricket following Pakistan's disastrous World Cup campaign, sees an opportunity. "When you have not achieved something in history, then you have an opportunity to change it," he told a news conference in Lahore ahead of the team's departure. "So we will make an effort to produce positive results for Pakistan and for the World Test championship." Pakistan are on the top of the World Test Championship 2023-25 cycle with wins in both Tests against Sri Lanka, while India are second and Australia are third on the nine-team table. But Australia are flying high after winning the



last cycle of the championship and lifting the 50-over World Cup earlier this month. The Test series starts with the first match in Perth from December 14, followed by Melbourne (December 26-30), and Sydney (January 3-7). Pakistan lost both Tests by an innings margin during

their last tour — a series Masood was part of. "We need to score 400 and then take 20 wickets," said Shan Masood of what was required. "We did not do that on our last tour in 2019, so that is the goal." Shan Masood admitted Australia would be high on confidence. "The positive thing will be to have the belief to play well, and all those playing contribute to give Australia some tough times." Masood insisted the tourists had prepared well for this series. "We tried to replicate the Australian conditions in our training camp in Rawalpindi, which has a bouncy pitch," he said. He also hailed the appointment of former England skipper Adam Hoolioake, who coaches in Australia, as the team's new batting coach. "Teams hire people who have local knowledge, and he is an expert in Australian conditions so his appointment will help us to apply ourselves in those conditions." He also backed his predecessor Azam to have a big tour, saying the team's batting "will go around him". "We want to play the type of cricket that our fans enjoy — a good and fighting brand," he said.

Imad Wasim joins Islamabad United, Hassan Ali moves to KK



LAHORE: The Pakistan Super League saw one of the biggest trades in its history as Karachi Kings' skipper Imad Wasim joined Islamabad United while Hassan Ali has joined the 2020 PSL winners, confirmed the league on Wednesday. "HBL PSL 5 winning captain Imad Wasim will don Islamabad United colours in the ninth edition of the tournament. Imad, who was named as the All-Rounder of HBL PSL 8, has been snapped by Islamabad United in the Platinum category," the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) said in a brief press release. "Hassan Ali (Diamond category) moves to Karachi Kings. By virtue of this player trade, Karachi Kings have received Islamabad United's first round silver pick in exchange for their second round silver pick," it added. Al Hilal reach Champions League knockouts

ABU DHABI: Salem Al Dawsari missed two penalties but scored with a lob from distance as Saudi Arabian side Al Hilal sealed a spot in the Asian Champions League knockout stages on Tuesday. The winger, who was last month named the continent's best men's player, spurned a spot-kick in either half in the Group D tie against Navbahor in Uzbekistan. But after substitute Malcolm struck the game's opening goal, Al Dawsari atoned with some distinction for the four-time champions late on in a 2-0 win. Malcolm's effort, a rebound from Al Dawsari's second saved penalty on 68 minutes, was the Brazilian's first touch of the match. The goal was also his first in the competition since a summer move from Zenit Saint Petersburg. With four minutes remaining, Al Dawsari made the result safe when he beat goalkeeper Utkir Yusupov from around 35 yards. Navbahor's Ibrokhim Yuldoshev was sent off late on for a second bookable offence. The victory was enough to take Hilal, Champions League runners-up last season, through to the last 16 as group winners with one game to spare. In Group A, UAE's Al Ain suffered their first defeat of this continental campaign when they lost 3-1 at home to Pakhtakor of Uzbekistan. The result mattered little to the 2003 champions, though, since Al Ain had already secured their place in the last 16. In the group's other fixture, Saudi side Al Fayha got only a second win of this campaign with a 3-1 home victory against Turkmenistan's Ahal. Pakhtakor are second going into the final matchday. Only the group winners are guaranteed to advance to the last 16, with the six best runners-up joining them. In the East Asian side of the draw, Japan's Kawasaki Frontale made it five wins from five Group I matches to ease into the knockout stage, defeating Malaysia's Johor 5-0 at home. South Korean side Ulsan stay second following a 3-1 victory against BG Pathum United in Thailand. Both BG Pathum United and Johor will exit the competition at the group stage. — Agencies

nullifying the conviction handed to them in 2018 by an accountability court. On July 6, 2018, the trial court sentenced Nawaz to 10 years in jail upon conviction along with a £8 million fine (approximately Rs1.3 billion), in the Avenfield corruption reference for owning assets beyond known sources of income and an additional year for not cooperating with NAB, both of them to be served concurrently. Manchester City claim top spot to beat Leipzig

MANCHESTER: Manchester City's Julian Alvarez scored in the 87th minute as the European champions clawed their way back from two goals down to beat RB Leipzig 3-2 and clinch top spot in Champions League Group G with one round of matches remaining. Erling Haaland and Phil Foden also netted in the second period after one of City's most underwhelming recent first-half performances to give Pep Guardiola's team 15 points after five games. Leipzig, who had also reached the last 16, have nine. "First half was the worst I've seen us," midfielder Foden told TNT. "Courage and motivation changed it around. This team has great mentality and its so nice to see." Haaland added another record to his bulging resume, becoming the fastest player to 40 Champions League goals. The striker became the quickest to 50 Premier League goals on Saturday. Lois Openda pounced on a pair of City defensive blunders for both Leipzig goals, sprinting onto a long ball from goalkeeper Janis Blaswich that bounced over a lackadaisical Manuel Akanji



in the 13th minute. He struck again with seemingly similar ease in the 33rd, spinning around Ruben Dias en route to scoring. "We had to be as relaxed as possible and we reacted really well," Guardiola told TNT. "We are first in the group and I am very satisfied for the reaction at the end. The team runs and fights and has spirit." Haaland, who poured in five goals against

Leipzig in a 7-0 rout in the Champions League last 16 in March, finally gave City fans something to cheer in the 54th minute when he ran onto a pass from Foden and struck a low left-foot shot into the net. "We just needed that (first) goal to get going," Foden said. "Even the fans were a lot louder after the goal. Once the first went in the motivation was there. We've got a

great record at the Etihad and it only takes one goal to change things." City levelled with Foden's excellent first touch and finish in the 70th and Alvarez fired the hosts ahead when Foden's pass was deflected into his path for a close-range effort. "What I told the guys was that we made (City) angry in the first half," Leipzig manager Marco Rose told reporters. "If we kept the clean sheet a little bit longer, maybe then the chance became bigger to win or to take something home." Guardiola's side narrowly avoided their first defeat in European competition at the Etihad since a group stage loss to Olympique Lyonnais in 2018, which was also the last time City trailed by two goals the Champions League. Three days after their 1-1 top-of-the-table Premier League draw with Liverpool, City looked like zombies through the first half, although they had a flurry of chances before the break, their best being Dias's header over the bar. It was Guardiola's second comeback from a two-goal deficit in his Champions League managerial career after his Bayern Munich side rallied to beat Juventus in the 2016 quarter-finals.

Ukraine says
downed
21 drones,
missiles

KYIV : Ukraine said Wednesday that its air force had destroyed nearly two dozen Russian attack drones and several missiles in Moscow's latest aerial assault on targets across the country. Officials in Kyiv say Russian forces have been stockpiling drones and missiles for systematic attacks on Ukraine's struggling energy grid over winter months. "In total, the strike involved: 21 Shahed-136/131 strike drones; three X-59 guided missiles," Ukraine's airforce announced on social media, claiming to have downed all the drones and two of the missiles. It said it used fighter jets, anti-aircraft and mobile air defense units to down the drones and missiles in southern and central regions of Ukraine. It added that the third missile, which was not downed, did not reach its target. There was no immediate comment from the Russian side. Russian strikes on Ukraine's energy infrastructure last winter left millions in the cold and dark for extended periods. The Kremlin said Kyiv was ultimately responsible for not entering negotiations.—APP

NAYPYIDAW : Myanmar's military is carrying out a sustained offensive involving fighter jets to regain control of a key town from an armed ethnic minority group. Accounts from the residents, as well as a statement from the Arakan Army, provided the most detailed accounts of the battle for control of the town. "They (the junta) have been firing heavy weapons at the town continuously," one resident said on Wednesday, requesting anonymity for security reasons. "Yesterday a jet fighter dropped two bombs that started a fire," said the resident who said they were sheltering in a nearby village, adding the blaze was still burning. A resident of Sittwe said the military was shelling Paultaw from bases around Sittwe. "They are firing artillery from Sittwe towards other towns especially Paultaw every day, day and night," a resident said also requesting anonymity. The Arakan Army said it was "rescuing" civilians still trapped. Junta spokesman Zaw Min Tun on Tuesday said the military was engaged in fighting around Paultaw but did not give details. The Arakan Army moved into Paultaw, a town of 20,000 people close to a crucial deepwater port in the capital of western Rakhine state, on November 15.

BERLIN : Heavy snowfall in Germany has caused severe traffic disruptions in several states across the country, and led to the deaths of two people in car accidents. The German Weather Service (DWD) on Wednesday warned of icy conditions with snow, and storms in some areas. Central and southern Germany are particularly affected. In the Hessian state capital of Wiesbaden, 55 people including 27 children had to spend the night in a school because they were unable to leave due to the weather. Many people in the state had to be freed from their vehicles due to trees collapsing under the weight of the snow. Local authorities in affected states called on citizens to stay at home, and not to walk in the forest. "The situation is acutely life-threatening due to the danger of falling trees," a statement from the Rheingau-Taunus district said. Northern Germany was less affected, but there were also numerous accidents. In addition to road traffic, public and air traffic is also affected. At Frankfurt Airport alone, nearly 300 flights were canceled on Monday and Tuesday, operator told local media.—APP

ANKARA : President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Wednesday welcomed Vietnamese Prime Minister Pham Minh Chinh in the capital of Ankara. The pair held a closed-door meeting at the Presidential Complex, the Turkish Presidency said in a statement. Ankara is set to open a consulate general in Vietnam's economic capital, Ho Chi Minh City, Turkish Vice President Cevdet Yılmaz confirmed after holding talks with Pham Minh Chinh earlier in the day. Pham Minh Chinh's visit to Ankara was the first of its kind on a prime ministerial level, marking the 46th anniversary of Vietnamese-Turkish diplomatic ties. In 2015, then-Foreign Minister Mevlüt Çavuşoğlu paid the first visit to Vietnam on a foreign minister level after a 17-year interval. Both nations have resident embassies in Hanoi and Ankara. Vietnam sent a large search-and-rescue team to southeastern Türkiye in February when two



massive earthquakes leveled 11 provinces and claimed over 52,000 lives. "We have also agreed to increase our mutual visits and dialogue," Yılmaz told reporters. Vietnam is a key trading

partner for Türkiye in the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) region. "Military issues and the defense industry are a dimension of our relations that need to be developed," Yılmaz

said. He and Pham Minh Chinh agreed to increase cooperation in combating international terrorism and transnational crimes. The pair further discussed the "grave developments" in Pales-

tine, expressing the "will to end the attacks on Gaza as soon as possible and to initiate a political process that will result in a just and permanent peace based on the two-state solution." The talks and meetings between the top Vietnamese and Turkish officials will mostly focus on economic and trade cooperation matters. Vietnam has seen its export turnover in the Turkish market on the rise over the past two years. In the year to October, bilateral trade inched up 13.6 percent year on year to US\$1.9 billion. Of this, Vietnam exported \$1.5 billion worth of products to Turkey, up over 16 percent year on year, while importing \$369.2 million worth of items from Turkey, up 8.5 percent. Turkey remains a potential buyer of many Vietnamese items, such as mobile phones, garments, textile materials, footwear, computers, and others. Meanwhile, Turkey is a supplier of machines and equipment, fabrics, pharmaceuticals, chemicals, auto parts, and household appliances to the Vietnamese market.

Moscow-NATO ties unlikely
to normalize: Ryabkov

Moscow ready to find common ground 'only on an equal and mutually respectful basis,' but this has always been problem for NATO, says Deputy Foreign Minister Ryabkov

MOSCOW : Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Sergey Ryabkov said on Wednesday that Russia-NATO relations are unlikely to normalize in the foreseeable future. Moscow is ready to find common ground "only on an equal and mutually respectful basis," but this "has always been a problem for the North Atlantic Alliance and its member countries," Ryabkov said in an interview with the Russian daily Izvestia. When asked if a Russia-NATO conflict is possible in the absence of prospects for



normalization, Ryabkov said it depends on the alliance. Russia, for its part, "is ready to defend its national interests with all means at (its) disposal." "Those who continue to test us for strength, apparently, have come to believe that there are no limits to

their own gambling, the game of raising bets. But they may be among the losers," he warned. The diplomat believes there are no prospects for peace talks with Ukraine because the West, which backs Kyiv, "repeats like a mantra" that Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's "peace formula" is the only basis for agreement, "but on such a basis dialogue is impossible." Concerning arms control, Ryabkov said there are no draft agreements between Russia and the US to extend the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (New START), which expires in Feb. 2026. However, if the

US expects to win the next arms race if START-3 is not renewed, Ryabkov says it is mistaken. "We will not fall to provocations, which are very characteristic of American policy in the Russian direction, but we are guaranteed to ensure our security," he said. The official also reiterated his previous assessment of the possibility of breaking the Russian-US diplomatic relations. "But we emphasize again and again at different levels that the Russian side will never initiate such a step," he said, adding, "If this happens, it will happen as a result of Washington's decisions and actions."

COP28 puts out
welcome mat to
lobbyists

DUBAI : "All views are welcome. All views are needed," declared Sultan Al Jaber, president of the UN's COP28 and head of the Emirates state oil and gas company in the run-up to the climate talks in Dubai. That welcome also extends to lobbyists and big oil companies, some of whom will be part of national delegations when negotiations start on Thursday. Here we look at some of the questions that raises. "Leaders, experts and people of influence" come together in the COP's "blue zone", where talks take place, the UN states, without mentioning lobbyists. But lobbyists can get accreditation by joining a national delegation or from one of the 2,000 "observer" groups made up of NGOs and professional groups. "When people think about lobbying, they think about behind-closed-doors meetings between a company or their representatives and a policymaker. And that's certainly a lot of it," Faye Holder, program manager at think tank InfluenceMap, told AFP. But it can also "include things like social media posts, advertising, sponsorships, the use of trade groups or astroturf groups", fake organisations made to look like grassroots groups, she said. The lack of clear rules at the talks about conflict of interest has long been criticised. Indeed, hosts the UAE were accused this week of using its role as COP28 hosts to discuss fossil fuel deals with other governments, according to leaked documents obtained by the BBC.—Agencies

Russia mulls 'loyalty'
pledge for foreigners
to enter country

MOSCOW : Foreigners entering Russia could be required to sign a "loyalty agreement" upon arrival, pledging not to criticise Moscow's offensive in Ukraine, under new rules being prepared by the interior ministry. The move would oblige foreigners to comply with strict laws banning criticism of the conflict in Ukraine, and not to distort the Soviet's role in World War II, the state-run news agency reported. The person would agree not to "discredit in any form the foreign and domestic state policy of the Russian Federation." The foreigner would also comply with refraining from "distorting the historical truth" of the Soviet role in World War II. Ukraine has said that Russian forces had ratcheted up attacks on the nearly-encircled industrial town of Avdiivka in the eastern Donetsk region, a recent flashpoint of Moscow's attack. Russia launched a renewed bid to capture the war-battered town last month and analysts suggest Moscow's forces have made incremental gains. "The enemy of the last day has significantly increased its activity. It is using armoured vehicles," Oleksandr Tarnavsky, the Ukrainian commander responsible for the territory, said. Ukraine's foreign minister has said that it won't "back down" in its fight against Russia, despite doubts over US support and minimal progress on the front line. "We have to continue, we have to keep fighting. Ukraine is not going to back down," Ukraine's top diplomat Dmytro Kuleba told Kiev's NATO backers in Brussels. "Our strategic goal, which is territorial integrity within internationally recognised borders as of 1991, remains unchanged," he said. "The issue here is not just Ukraine's security it is the security and safety of the entire Euro-Atlantic space." It is in the interest of both Ukraine and NATO for Kiev to prevail in its war with Russia, the alliance's chief has said. "So therefore, it is important that our solidarity with Ukraine is not only demonstrated in words, but also in deeds," Secretary-General Jens Stoltenberg said in a joint news conference with Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba in Brussels. The European Union has delivered about 300,000 of its promised million shells to Ukraine so far, Ukraine's Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba has said while visiting a NATO event in Brussels.—APP

El Nino-induced flooding claims 120 lives

NAIROBI : Severe flooding caused by the El Nino weather phenomenon has killed 120 people in Kenya, while people in almost 90,000 households have been forced to leave their homes, the government said. The latest estimated death toll in Kenya has doubled as heavy seasonal rains following the worst drought in four decades have submerged towns and villages across East Africa, rendering hundreds of thousands of people homeless. Thousands of homes have been washed away or are marooned, while farmland has been submerged and tens of thousands of livestock drowned, aid agencies said. In neighbouring Somalia, floods have killed at least 96 people and displaced 700,000, a disaster management official said. Kiambera nears overflow Four counties in eastern Kenya - Tana River, Garissa, Wajir and Mandera - are most severely affected. Interior Minister Raymond Omollo said. "All major dams are being monitored, but Kiambera has a meter remaining to overflow," Omollo said in a statement, referring to the Kiambera Hydroelectric Power Station in Tana River. "We call on those downstream to move to higher ground even as government enhances power generation to mitigate the challenge." The Kenya Meteorological Department forecast that heavy rainfall will continue until January 2024. The climate crisis is causing more intense and more frequent extreme weather events, according to scientists. In response, African leaders have proposed new global taxes and changes to international financial institutions to help fund climate crisis action.—DNA

Africa is a 'double victim' of injustice: Guterres

WASHINGTON : UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has expressed strong support for Africa, saying the United Nations is ready to work with the African Union to bolster cooperation. "Africa has been the double victim of injustice. First of all, historic injustice linked to colonialism and to slavery. And second, the present injustice in relation to the way power relations are established in the world and namely in relation to financial and economic power," Guterres said on Tuesday at a

news conference with Moussa Faki Mahamat, the chairperson of the African Union Commission. Mahamat was in New York to attend the 7th AU/UN High-Level Conference to evaluate progress on the implementation of existing cooperation framework agreements. He and Guterres also signed a new joint framework agreement on human rights. Guterres said the partnership between the African Union and the UN is "essential" and Africa remains "one of the key priorities" for the UN. "What Africa needs above all is justice in international relations because Africa has been the vic-



tim of the structural injustices of our international relations. "At the same time, I would like to say that we are totally committed to work with the

African Union in all areas of our common activity," he added. Mahamat said that Africa is going through a difficult period in terms of peace and security. "Unfortunately, it has become a haven for terrorism and extremism. Many of our regions are affected by these phenomena," he added. Africa is facing economic challenges due to the Covid-19 crisis, climate crisis, and the ongoing conflict between Ukraine and Russia. Turning to last year's Black Sea grain deal brokered by Türkiye and the UN to resume grain exports from three Ukrainian Black Sea ports that

were paused after the Ukraine war, Mahamat said that what is happening in Ukraine is having a direct impact all over the world, particularly on the African continent. Increases in the prices of energy, food products and fertilizers negatively affected the productivity of African agriculture, he said. "That's why we welcomed the Secretary-General's efforts together with Türkiye to reach this grain agreement," he stressed. "The deal has played a key role in addressing the global food crisis. Türkiye always stresses that it is ready to do what is necessary to send grain to poor African countries."

NZ plans
to lift ban
on selling
cigarettes
to children

ANKARA : The New Zealand government on Wednesday confirmed its 49-point agenda for the first 100 days, which includes lifting a ban on selling cigarettes to children under the age of 14, as well as imposing a prohibition of cell phones in schools. Following his Cabinet meeting on Wednesday, Prime Minister Christopher Luxon confirmed his 49-point action plan, describing it as "ambitious for New Zealand," state-run media said. Luxon said his coalition government will repeal amendments to the "Smokefree Environments and Regulated Products Act 1990 and regulations," according to Radio New Zealand. His administration will also implement school reforms, such as a ban on cell phone use. In December last year, New Zealand's previous parliament passed legislation banning the sale of tobacco to anyone aged 14 or below, a significant step towards the country's goal of becoming smoke-free by 2025. The law, which was first proposed in July of last year, prohibits the sale of any tobacco product to anyone born after Jan. 1, 2009. The law took effect earlier in January this year. "New Zealanders voted not only for a change of government but for a change of policies and a change of approach - and our Coalition Government is ready to deliver that change," Premier Luxon said on X. He added that his government will introduce legislation to reform the Reserve Bank with a single mandate of price stability in order to reduce inflation.

Cambodia
makes 1.2 bln
USD from
exports

PHNOM PENH : Cambodia earned a total of 1.2 billion U.S. dollars from the exports of raw cashew nuts and dry rubber during the first 10 months of 2023, according to official reports on Wednesday. A report from the Cashew Nut Association of Cambodia showed that the kingdom exported a total of 615,000 tonnes of raw cashew nuts to Vietnam during the January-October period this year, down 16.7 percent year-on-year. The Southeast Asian country made 831 million dollars in revenue from the exports of the commodity, the report said. Meanwhile, the General Directorate of Rubber reported that Cambodia exported 283,829 tonnes of dry rubber in the first 10 months of this year, an increase of 3 percent compared to the same period last year. The kingdom earned 376.6 million dollars from the exports of dry rubber during the above-mentioned period, down 7.3 percent year-on-year, the report added. "A tonne of dry rubber averaged cost 1,327 dollars during the January-October period of 2023, about 154 dollars lower than that of the same period last year," Him Oun, director general of the General Directorate of Rubber, said in the report.—APP

Tokyo stocks
end lower

TOKYO : Tokyo stocks ended lower on Wednesday, as a higher yen against the dollar weighed on the market. The benchmark Nikkei 225 index was down 0.26 percent, or 87.17 points, to end at 33,321.22, while the broader Topix index slipped 0.51 percent, or 12.21 points, to 2,364.50. The dollar stood at 147.21 yen, against 147.50 yen in New York and 148.18 yen in Tokyo on Tuesday. Overnight, US Federal Reserve Governor Christopher Waller said he was "encouraged" by recent progress on the economy and more confident that inflation was returning to the Fed's desired level. The comments, seen as fairly dovish, helped weaken the dollar against its major peers including the yen, analysts said. The Tokyo market started lower "with investors spooked by the yen's shift toward appreciation," IwaiCosmo Securities said. But a subsequent pause on the yen's strengthening "prompted traders to buy high-priced stocks, which is bolstering the market," said Daiwa Securities.—APP

Imran's plea rejected in threatening judge case

ISLAMABAD: A sessions court rejected on Wednesday former prime minister Imran Khan's request for acquittal in the intimidation of a female judge case. Civil judge Muhammad Mureed Abbas ruling came as he presided over the case's hearing, in which prosecutor Rizwan Abbasi completed his arguments. At the last hearing, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) chief's lawyer, Salman Safdar, had completed his arguments. The deposed prime minister was booked under terrorism charges in August 2022 at Margalla police station in the federal capital for his remarks at a rally in F9 Park where he warned Additional District and Sessions Judge Zeba Chaudhry and police high-ups of dire consequences for their "biased" attitude towards his party. Imran had alleged that Judge Zeba was aware of the torture being inflicted upon PTI leader Shahbaz Gill - then in jail - and still did not release him on bail. He had also threatened to take action against the judge as well as the inspector general police (IGP) and deputy inspector general police (DIG) of Islamabad. The case was registered by complainant Magistrate Ali Javed. It should be noted that the FIR was lodged hours before another Islamabad police station received a written complaint from a resident of G-11/2 for lodging a case against the former premier for making hate speeches and inciting rebellion against the army, police as well as the judiciary.

US military aircraft crashes off Japan island

TOKYO: A US military aircraft with six people on board has crashed off Yakushima Island in south-western Japan. Japan's Coast Guard said one person had been found dead near the crash site. Japan's NHK broadcaster said the CV-22 Osprey hybrid plane had been trying to land at Yakushima Airport with one engine on fire. There is no US comment. Ospreys - which can function as a helicopter and a turboprop aircraft - have been involved in a string of fatal crashes over the years. The aircraft that went down on Wednesday was thought to be heading from Iwakuni base in the western Yamaguchi prefecture to Kadena base in the country's south-westernmost Okinawa region. Japan's defence ministry said the aircraft disappeared from the radar at 14:40 local time (05:40 GMT) on Wednesday. The Coast Guard received a distress call five minutes later, saying the plane had crashed. It then sent six boats and two helicopters to the scene. At 16:00, the helicopters spotted what looked like a part of the plane and a life raft, a spokesperson told media.

NEW YORK: Days later, American supermodel Gigi Hadid, of Palestinian roots, retracted her social media posts, against Israel, the only country that 'keeps children as prisoners of war' and offered an apology for not checking the facts. 'Ahmed Al-Manasra, abducted by the Israeli occupation at the age of 12, has endured solitary confinement despite his severe health condition.

'The history of Romania, like that of Europe, is not like a triumphal march and has never been always a luminous succession of happy events. On the contrary, Romania's history has been marked by numerous crises and difficult stages, which have often threatened the very lives of the people, our freedom, the identity of communities and the very existence of our state. Our forefathers lived through wars, faced natural disasters,



endured famine, survived periods of severe social tension and were victims of the darkest political regimes. Their determination, courage, capacity for sacrifice and will to live in freedom and peace made it possible for them to overcome all these difficult trials, despite almost unimaginable challenges.' He said, each year, the anniversary of the Great Union is giving us the opportunity to honour the memory of the sacrifices Romanians made for laying the foundation of the modern Romania, which ultimately placed us in the midst of the great European family. The end of the First World War and the armistice concluded in 1918, represents a crucial moment in the history of mankind causing deep changes both in international relations, and at socio-cultural level. 'We, in Romania and in Europe, will always



remember that over a million soldiers from South Asia had fought courageously and heroically in different battle fields of the WWI and 60,000 of them, mostly from today Pakistani Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, had paid the ultimate price in defending the ideals of peace, freedom, liberty, dignity, democracy and fundamental human rights. Today we pay tribute and honour them as much as we honour our heroes! Eduard Preda added, National Day has a special significance for Romania's diplomatic missions and consular offices, contributing to the promotion of Romanian cultural identity and the development of ties with Romanian communities in host countries. Talking about bilateral relations he said, Romania and Pakistan enjoy very good bilateral relations and Pakistan represents an

important partner for Romania in the South Asian region. We acknowledge Pakistan's efforts in fighting terrorism, militancy and radical extremism and hope that these endeavours will continue to be an important part of international war on terror. We are eager to work hard for taking forward the bilateral agenda, as well as the cooperation within the EU-Pakistan framework and in multilateral formats, especially in the UN. Moreover, we are engaged to improve the current status of Romania-Pakistan relations, characterized by friendship and collaboration and the new dynamism witnessed in the recent years that rendered a fruitful political dialogue, reflecting a clear desire of both states for developing a pragmatic relationship in fields of mutual interests, he concluded.

MQM-P seeking empowered local govts

KARACHI: MQM-P Convener Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui said the conference - attended by politicians, social workers, journalists, lawyers and business representatives - aimed at bringing political parties under the same roof towards a collective goal of assisting the public in building a prosperous, empowered and robust Pakistan with the help of collaboration between religious and political factions. He said the Constitution, in its present form, could neither protect itself nor common citizens. 'Now there is a need for implementing a constitution that can ensure equal rights of citizens. Just as the powers of prime minister and chief ministers are listed in the Constitution, the powers of local governments should also be highlighted. The real reason behind the crisis in Pakistan is the lack of honest intention which is more problematic than the unfair distribution of resources. Pakistan needs a constitution in which workers are represented by workers and not landlords or feudals,' he added. MQM-P Senior Deputy Convener Mustafa Kamal expressed optimism with hopes for an end to the challenging times for Pakistanis and welcomed the presence of all parties at the conference. The former Karachi mayor lamented that five people are in control of the resources and authority of this country while there is no procedure defined in the Constitution to bring the resources and power to the lower level. He added that MQM-P was presenting three proposals for amendments to the Constitution. Just as the powers of chief ministers and prime minister are written in the Constitution, the powers of local government representatives should also be written.

FIR to be lodged against PM if Baloch students not recovered, warns IHC

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Wednesday ordered the federal government to recover all missing Baloch students, warning that a case would be registered against the caretaker prime minister if they failed to ensure the recovery of the students. IHC Justice Mohsin Akhtar Kayani made these remarks during a hearing of a case regarding the implementation of the recommendations of the Commission of Inquiry on Enforced Disappearances. Attorney General for Pakistan (AGP) Mansoor Usman Awan told the court that 22 Baloch students had been recovered and reached home. However, the AGP said 28 Baloch students were still missing and efforts

would be made to recover all the missing persons. Expressing displeasure, Justice Kayani said the missing persons is a matter of basic human rights. Citing a report, the IHC judge said there is no law and order in the country. Referring to the missing persons, the senior judge wondered: 'Are such things take place in a civilised society? Every missing person who is recovered says I don't want to pursue the case.' If the missing persons are not recovered, the IHC judge said he will order the registration of the first information report (FIR) against caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar and interim Interior Minister Sarfraz Bugti. 'I am stating this in very clear words.' The judge's warning comes after the caretaker PM failed to appear before the court as he was summoned by the IHC to appear in person in the missing students'

case on November 29 (today).

However, the premier had stated that he would skip the hearing owing to his foreign trips as he is currently on an official visit to the Middle East. Justice Kayani said the defence secretary and the interior secretary would also be held responsible if Baloch students were not recovered. He further asked the authorities concerned to present the missing persons in court even if they are terrorists. He said if the trial of Indian spy Kulbhushan Jadhav can be held then anyone can be tried if they had committed any crime. The IHC directed to provide the details of the families of all the missing persons to the government committee and asked the interior minister to meet the Baloch families in two weeks. Justice Kayani said it has been determined in the high court and the Supreme Court judgment that the state is obligated to provide all possible support to the missing persons' families. The IHC adjourned the hearing of the case till January 10.

Shehbaz stresses on holding timely polls

LAHORE: Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) President Shehbaz Sharif Wednesday stressed that the general elections, which are slated to be held on February 8 next year, should be conducted on time. '[Holding the elections on time] is the requirement of law and democracy,' said the former prime minister while speaking to journalists after he appeared before an accountability court in Lahore in the Ramzan Sugar Mills reference. The court had summoned Shehbaz a reference filed by the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) alleging that the former chief minister of Punjab misused his authority by using public funds for the construction of a bridge to facilitate the Ramzan mills, owned by his sons. Shehbaz said that PML-N supreme Nawaz Sharif will announce the party manifesto in the election campaign, adding that they are starting the campaign with full preparation. He also addressed the issues raised by the Pakistan Peoples Party

(PPP) of not being provided equal opportunities to contest the upcoming polls, Shehbaz said: 'I went to court today and this is called the level-playing field and Nawaz Sharif will also produce himself in an Islamabad court today.' The former premier said that the Sharif family has suffered hardships but Nawaz Sharif still bowed before the law. 'Nawaz Sharif ended his exile and came back to Pakistan. We always respected the judiciary,' he added. Shehbaz, speaking about the May 9 incidents which were followed by Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) Chairman Imran Khan's arrest in the Al-Qadir Trust case, said that the facilitation of the perpetrators of the May 9 events would be anti-national. 'A conspiracy to overthrow the army was hatched on May 9 and any democratic government will not tolerate treason,' he stressed. Meanwhile, Shehbaz, during the hearing said that he was summoned in the clean water case but was arrested in Ashiana reference. 'I will not discuss the merits of the case, my lawyer will do it,' he told the court, adding that the court gave me justice in the Ashiana case. 'After that, NAB arrested me in the sewer case. I was told that I had issued a directive for the construction of a drain which was built by an MPA,' he said. The PML-N president told the court that they have installed thousands of clean water projects during his tenure. - DNA

TEHRAN: Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei says the historic Hamas' Al-Aqsa Storm was mainly against the Zionist regime, but was able to disrupt the table of American policies in the region and will hopefully erase the "agenda." Ayatollah Khamenei made the remarks in a meeting with hundreds of members of Iran's Basij volunteer forces in Tehran on Wednesday on the occasion of the National Basij Week. The historic event of al-Aqsa Storm is against the Zionist regime but it is aimed at de-Americanization. This incident literally managed to disrupt the table of American policies in the region, and God willing, if this Storm continues, it will wipe out the whole table,' Leader noted. Ayatollah Khamenei stressed that the Israeli atrocities in Gaza not only disgraced the Israeli regime but the United States, certain European countries and Western culture and civilization. 'The barbaric and cruel actions that the Zionist regime committed in its crimes against the people of Gaza, not only destroyed the reputation of the regime, but also that of the United States. It took away the reputation of several renowned European countries, and also ruined the reputation of Western culture and civilization,'

Ayatollah Khamenei said. 'The culture and civilization of the West is the very civilization that when 5,000 children are killed with phosphorus bombs, the regime of a certain Western country says Israel is defending itself. Is this self-defense? This is Western culture, which has been discredited,' he added. The Leader of the Islamic Revolution said the Israeli atrocities in Gaza over the past 50 days summarize the regime's decades-long crimes against Palestinians. 'The tragedies of the last 50 days are a small part of the 75-year-long crimes of the Zionist regime in Palestine,' Ayatollah Khamenei noted. 'Al-Aqsa Storm will not run out of steam and they should know that the current situation will not continue.' The Leader also underlined that, 'The Islamic Republic believes in a referendum in Palestine based on the Palestinian public opinion. The Islamic Republic is not of the view of throwing Zionists and Jews into the sea.' Elsewhere in his address, Ayatollah Khamenei said the United States failed to hatch it plots for the formation of a 'New Middle East,' adding that the so-called 'two-state solution' in the Palestinian territories was part of the same hostile policy which failed miserably. In the case of Lebanon, Americans said they are after formation of a 'New Middle East.' The Middle East means West Asia. They said that they want to give this region,

which is called the Middle East, a new political, geographical map based on the US's illegitimate needs and interests,' the Leader said. 'Of course, what they sought did not happen. On their new map, they intended to destroy Hezbollah but Hezbollah became 10 times stronger; they wanted to devour Iraq but they failed; they wanted to take over Syria and inflicted their proxies under the name of Daesh and al-Nusra on the Syrian government, and for seven, eight, ten years, they continuously supported and provided them with money and equipment, but again they failed,' the Leader added. Underlining that Western plots against the region had entirely fallen flat, the Leader said, 'One of the components of this New Middle East was to finalize the Palestinian issue in favor of the usurping Israeli regime, so that nothing called Palestine would be left at all; they reneged on the issue of the treacherous 'two-state' that they had earlier approved.' Ayatollah Khamenei stressed that the issue of Palestine is moving towards resolution, which secures Palestinian sovereignty and territorial integrity. 'We presented our plan, a referendum, a Palestinian referendum,' the Leader said. 'Of course, the occupiers have no right but the Palestinians themselves whether in Palestine or in the neighboring countries of Palestine or in the camps or in other places. There are several million

Palestinians. They can express their opinion, which is a globally-favored, acceptable and civilized logic for the administration of Palestine,' Ayatollah Khamenei said. Meanwhile, Iran's top nuclear official says the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), which is a subsidiary of the United Nations, will be responsible for any incident that could be caused by the Zionist regime of Israel's nuclear threats against Palestinians in the Gaza Strip. Mohammad Eslami, who leads the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran, said on Wednesday, that Israel continues to threaten the world with nuclear bomb attacks while it has refused to sign IAEA's protocols banning the spread of the use of such weapons. 'The IAEA bears the ultimate responsibility for any incident,' said Eslami while speaking to reporters on the sidelines of a Cabinet session in Tehran. The comments came weeks after an Israeli minister said that the regime should use nuclear bombs in its attacks against Gaza where it has been involved in a relentless military campaign since early October. That comes as Israel has not publicly admitted to possessing nuclear weapons. Eslami said the threats have revealed the real nature and intentions of the Zionist regime for the world. He said the regime had previously threatened to use nuclear bombs against Iran.

Turkey expecting to ratify Sweden's NATO accession

ANKARA: Turkey has told Sweden it expects to ratify its long-delayed accession to the NATO military alliance within weeks, Sweden's foreign minister said on Wednesday. Sweden and Finland asked to join NATO last year after Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine. But Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan, whose country is a NATO member, raised objections over what he said was the two countries' protection of groups that Ankara deems terrorists. Turkey endorsed Finland's membership bid in April, but has kept Sweden waiting. 'I had a bilateral with my colleague, the (Turkish) foreign minister ... where he told me he expected the ratification to take place within weeks,' Swedish Foreign Minister Tobias Billstrom told reporters before the second day of a meeting of NATO foreign ministers. There was no immediate confirmation or comment by Turkey. Turkey has demanded that Sweden take more steps to rein in local members of the Kurdistan Workers' party (PKK), which is considered a terrorist group by the European Union and the United States.

Canada to audit flight operations in Pakistan

KARACHI: A Transport Canada team is scheduled to visit Pakistan on December 04 to conduct the flight operations and airport security audit. According to the details, the delegation of Transport Canada will conduct the audit of Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) direct flights to Canada from Karachi Airport on December 05. The Canadian Transport team will also inspect the PIA airplanes and audit the airport security arrangements as well. During their stay, the Canadian delegation is scheduled to receive detailed briefings on the security measures implemented at Karachi Airport, covering aspects like baggage screening, passenger boarding processes, and over all passenger safety protocols. It is worth mentioning here that the purpose of Transport Canada's visit is to enhance the security and efficiency of direct flights to Canada from Islamabad, Lahore, and Karachi. The airport authorities will also be given a visit to the Joint Search Baggage Counter established by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) at Karachi airport.

Ukraine downed 21 drones, missiles

KYIV: Ukraine said Wednesday that its air force had destroyed nearly two dozen Russian attack drones and several missiles in Moscow's latest aerial assault on targets across the country. Officials in Kyiv say Russian forces have been stockpiling drones and missiles for systematic attacks on Ukraine's struggling energy grid over winter months. 'In total, the strike involved: 21 Shahed-136/131 strike drones; three X-59 guided missiles,' Ukraine's airforce announced on social media, claiming to have downed all the drones and two of the missiles. It said it used fighter jets, anti-aircraft and mobile air defense units to down the drones and missiles in southern and central regions of Ukraine. It added that the third missile, which was not downed, did not reach its target. There was no immediate comment from the Russian side. Russian strikes on Ukraine's energy infrastructure last winter left millions in the cold and dark for extended periods.
