ECP dismisses plea seeking removal of Fawad



ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) Thursday rejected a plea

that sought the removal of Fawad Hasan Fawad from the post of caretaker Federal Minister for Privatisation and Inter Provincial Coordination. The plea, filed by Advocate Syed Aziz Uddin Kaka Khel on September 29, requested the ECP to remove "biased ministers" from the interim government ahead of the general polls, scheduled to take place on February 8, 2024. The ECP, in its verdict, said the petition appears to be a result of a personal grudge. According to Geo News, the electoral body said that Fawad is the privatisation minister; therefore, he cannot influence the election process. The ECP added that the minister has been serving in important positions in the past. Advocate Kaka Khel had filed the petition against caretaker federal cabinet members Cheema and Fawad.

RAWALPINDI: General Syed Asim Munir, NI (M), Chief of Army Staff (COAS) presided over the two days long 261st Corps Commanders' Conference (CCC) held at GHQ, today. Forum paid rich tribute to the supreme sacrifices of Shuhadas including officers and men of the Armed Forces, Law Enforcement Agencies and Citizens who laid their lives for ensuring peace and stability in the country. Participants also offered Fateha for the Shuhadas including those of DI Khan attack. Forum reiterated Pakistan Army's resolve

to defend the sovereignty and territorial integrity of Pakistan against direct and indirect threats. Forum expressed serious concern over continued repression and reprehensible human rights violations by Indian military forces in IIOJK. The recent acts of abduction, torture and killing of civilians by the Indian Army were unequivocally condemned by the participants. Such acts constitute grave crimes against humanity and cannot dampen the spirit of the brave Kashmiris who are struggling for their lawful right of self- determination. Pakistan would keep supporting its Kashmiri brethren with all political, moral and diplomatic support for resolution of Kashmir issue according to international law and relevant UNSC resolutions. Forum was briefed on prevalent geo-stra-

tegic environment, challenges to national security and own strategy in response to evolving threat. The sanctuaries and liberty of action available to the terrorists of

proscribed TTP and other groups of that ilk in a neighboring country and availability of latest weapons to the terrorists were noted as serious points of concern impacting security of Pakistan. Forum resolved that all terrorists, their facilitators and abettors, working on the behest of hostile forces to destablise Pakistan will be dealt with full might of the state. The forum expressed full solidarity with the people of Palestine and condemned serious human rights violations and war crimes being perpetrated in Gaza while reiterating Government's stance of demanding an immediate ceasefire in Gaza and peaceful resolution of the ongoing conflict.

Forum reiterated its support for ongoing efforts to promote socioeconomic growth and encouraging foreign investment under the umbrella of Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC). Forum also took holistic review of the ongoing actions being taken against smuggling, money laundering, power theft and hoarding of essential items amongst other illegal economic activities. ISLAMABAD: The Foreign Office on Thursday regretted the "interference" by some foreign missions in Pakistan for commenting on the Baloch protesters, saying the country was fully capable of handling its internal matters. Foreign Office Spokesperson Mumtaz Zahra Baloch, at a weekly press briefing, said the Constitution of Pakistan guaranteed freedom of expression to its citizens and the laws were in place to deal with such cases internally. The spokesperson's statement came in response to a question over the recent tweets by Norway's embassy and the European Union Ambassador in Pakistan who expressed "concerns" over the alleged mistreatment of Baloch protestors in Islamabad. "The interference of foreign embassies in Pakistan is regrettable," she said, adding the country was committed to protecting the rights of its people. She said the country's courts were independent and had taken decisions in this regard on several occasions. Asked if the coming year held any prospects of resumption of ties with the eastern neighbour, the spokesperson said India needed to take steps to create an environment for the dialogue. She, however, categorically pointed out that the dialogue with India could only take place based on "equality, respect and with discussion on Jammu and Kashmir as the priority issue." IHC halts Imran trial till Jan 11

Justice Aurangzeb issues stay order on PTI founder's plea challenging his indictment, trial in state secrets case

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Thursday approved Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) founder Imran Khan's petition to halt his trial in cipher case till January 11, 2024. IHC's Justice Miangul Hassan issued the order on the PTI founder's appeals wherein he challenged his indictment, proceedings and gag order in the cipher case by the special court established under Official Secrets Act. Earlier during the hearing of the case, Justice Aurangzeb rejected PTI chief's plea to grant a stay on the trial, stating that the court would first serve notices before issuing an order. In this regard, the IHC issued notice to the federation and asked Khan's lawyer Usman Gul to submit all necessary documents related to the cipher trial at the next hearing. Highlighting the alleged irregularities in the cipher case, the PTI counsel contended in the court that a first information report (FIR) was lodged before the filing of a complaint. 

fter the decision in the Tosha Khana case, a petition was filed against Imran Khan in the Election Commission for his disqualification and removal from the chairmanship, along which the Election Commission issued an order to hold intra-party elections within 20 days. As a result of which PTI conducted intra-party elections as per the orders of Election Commission, Barrister Gohar Ali Khan was elected as the new Chairman so that in case of Imran Khan's ineligibility, there would be no questions raised about the party tickets given by him, PTI had submitted the results of the intra-party elections to the Election Commission.

But now, five members of the Election Commission, in a unanimous decision, rejected PTI's intra-party election and withdrew the bat sign from PTI. PTI was accused that they did not hold the intra-party elections earlier but when they did, they were not in accordance with the constitution of PTI itself, in light of which Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf has been deprived of the bat sign just before the elections. The election symbol is the identity of any political party, which plays a prominent role in allowing voters to identify that party's candidates on the ballot paper. So PTI is trying its best to save its representation "The bat", but the recent verdict has somewhat dashed its hopes. Barrister Gohar Ali Khan has claimed that he will be challenging this decision in the High courts and Supreme Court as well. In the past too, efforts were made to erase some political parties' election symbol effecting their existence. Those parties had been stripped of their election symbol but they still survived and have been able to identify themselves with a new

election symbol. Pakistan People's Party and Muslim League-N are the foremost examples among them. But now it is to be seen that Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf manages to hold up in the upcoming elections after having lost their identification of the bat symbol and their candidates forced to enter the polls with different election symbols, so the question is Will this party be able to maintain its existence in the future? Will it be recognized with a new symbol? Will it be able to take back the iconic mark of the bat? Only time will tell us the answers to these questions.



Indian judiciary. "Peace is suppression to silence **'High blood Pressure'** affects 23% youngsters

ISLAMABAD: Health experts Thursday warned that a silent epidemic of high blood pressure affects over 3 million people in Pakistan with a shocking 23% prevalence among youngsters aged 18-29 due to unhealthy dietary patterns and less exercise habits. Talking to a Private news channel, A renowned Cardiologist Prof Dr Fawad Tariq expressed his serious concern over an alarming stage of high blood pressure patients in Pakistan where over 45 years old women population is suffering from this disease. He underlined the need to create more mass awareness drives about the use of healthy food, care, and prevention to control the spread of the disease. He said that high blood pressure (hypertension) is not just a concern for the elderly but for youth population which was increasingly falling victim to this silent threat. Fast food and processed snacks have become staples in the diet of many young Pakistanis, he said, adding, the excessive intake of sodium, unhealthy fats, and sugary delights wreaks havoc on blood pressure levels, setting the stage for hypertension. He suggested that adopting healthier lifestyle habits can potentially decrease your likelihood of developing high blood pressure and contribute to lowering it if already elevated. Youngster should practice such as meditation, yoga, and mindfulness can be powerful tools in mitigating stress and promoting overall well-being. Expert mentioned that according to recent Pakistan Adolescents Schools Survey that over 80% of adolescents in Pakistan had unhealthy diets. A WHO study revealed that 82.8% of boys and 87.3% of girls aged 13-15 were not sufficiently active. Another study reported that 54.3% of Pakistani adolescents were physically inactive, with factors like schools lacking playgrounds and lack of parental support correlating with physical inactivity. He stressed the importance of combined community education and healthcare provider education for hypertension control.—DNA

Experts call for anticipatory climate adaptation to cope crisis in region

ISLAMABAD: The experts at a high-level roundtable called upon Thursday, the government and policymakers to come up with an inclusive and holistic approach to meet the exacerbating climate crisis through anticipatory adaptation. The roundtable titled "Foresight and Futures Thinking for Anticipatory Adaptation in Pakistan" was organized by the Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) in collaboration with the International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development (ICIMOD) to address how various stakeholders are thinking of future risks, and how these risks could be integrated into existing plans and pol-In his opening remarks, Dr Babar Shahbaz, Faculty of Social Sciences, Institute of Agricultural Extension Education and Rural Development, set the

ground for the participants to deliberate on pertinent issues precisely. To become future-fit, he said, it is important to understand future risks and take anticipatory actions. Amina Maharjan, Senior Specialist Livelihoods and Migration, ICIMOD briefed the participants on the foresight and future thinking for anticipatory adaptation in the region, methods to explore future pathways in terms of foresight, scenario development, development of efficient strategies and understanding foresight beyond predictions. She briefed the participants on the emerging concept of foresight as the method of scoping, sensitization, participatory scenario development, integration into plans and policies, gender-inclusive steps to address data gaps, and other shortcomings hampering climate resilient fu-

ture development through a futuristic approach. Sultan Mehmood, the World Food Programme (WFP) representative, mentioned the climate adaptation-related interventions being implemented through the WFP collaboration, particularly the Living Indus Initiative. He underscored the need to address water management, governance, land area protection and multi-hazard vulnerability risk assessment (MHVRA) as crucial components to successfully meet the challenge of climate foresight. Muhammad Farooq, Senior Joint Secretary, Ministry of Climate Change and Environmental Coordination, briefed the roundtable about the steps taken by the Ministry in the aftermath of the rising magnitude of climate catastrophes. -APP

Nutritionist calls for reducing sugar intake for optimal well-being

ISLAMABAD: A health expert on Thursday emphasized the need to reduce sugar intake to promote overall well-being and combat the rising health concerns associated with excessive sugar consumption. "Excessive sugar intake is a major contributor to various health including obesity, diabetes, and cardiovascular diseases," Dr Babar Saleem, a prominent nutritionist told a private news channel. ISLAMABAD: The exports of spices witnessed an increase of 19.21 per cent during the first five months of the financial year 2023-24, as against the exports of the corresponding months of last year. The spices exports from the country were recorded at US \$45.179 million during July-November (2023-24) against the exports of US \$37.898 million during July-November (2022-23), according to the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). In terms of quantity, the exports of spices also surged by 82 per cent going up from 8,478 metric tons to 15,431 metric tons, according to the data. Meanwhile, year-on-year basis, the exports of spices increased by 4.29 per cent during the month of November 2023 as compared to the same month of last year. The exports of spices from the country during November 2023 were recorded at US \$10.428 million against the exports of US \$9.999 million in November 2022. On a month-on-month basis, exports of spices however decreased by 5.13 per cent during November 2023 when compared to the exports of US \$10.992 million in October 2023, the

US biggest threat to other countries' security

ormer US secretary of state Mike Pompeo, who was previously head of the Central Intelligence Agency, was at least frank and explicit when he said of the operation in the contraction of the operation in the contraction of t explicit when he said of the organization: "We lied, we cheated, we stole." His prideful admission underscores the extreme lengths to which the United States will go to compromise the national security of other countries in pursuit of its own interests. In yet another example of what dirty tricks the CIA has been playing overseas, current and former agency officials told The Wall Street Journal that China's national security agency all but blinded the CIA in the country a decade ago when it cracked its network in the Chinese mainland. As many as two dozen agents working for the CIA were rounded up. The CIA is still struggling to rebuild its human espionage capabilities in China, which according to the report is the agency's top intelligence target. That the US spy agency wants to be active in China is no surprise given its history, which is marked by illegal activities such as torture, kidnapping, assassination plots, illegal surveillance of foreign leaders and US citizens, as well as engineering civil unrest and the overthrowing of regimes. The blithe way in which the current and former CIA officials talked about how the agency has conducted and will continue to conduct activities targeting China reveals the double standard Washington has adopted in terms of national security. The US has used national security as an excuse to launch its full-scale campaign to contain China, which includes trying to prevent Chinese high-tech companies such as Huawei having access to any external markets worldwide, blocking high-tech US-based investments going toward the country, and trying to decouple China from the global industry and supply chains in the name of "de-risking". Washington has repeatedly – unwarrantedly and unsubstantiatedly – described China as the "most consequential threat" to US national security. Thus when a Chinese civilian balloon for meteorological research drifted off course due to strong winds and entered US airspace in February, anti-China hawks in Washington seized the chance to whip up anti-China hysteria by describing the balloon as part of China's extensive aerial surveillance program targeting the US, an accusation that was fabricated out of thin air for the occasion, as the Joe Biden administration later admitted. The latest disclosure of CIA's activities in China once again proves that it is the US, rather than any other country, that is the fundamental source of chaos in the international order, and poses the biggest threat to the national security of other countries and world peace and stability.

errorism is condemnable. Terrorism sponsored by a UN Member on the soil of another UN sovereign member is a punishable crime, whether it is seen under domestic law or International. When these terrorist acts are committed by a UN Member state on a community discriminated against for their belief, religion or culture with the aim of exterminating or terrorizing to deter or suppress them, or for causing displacement or mass exodus or crush their right to self-determination, then it falls in the domain of Crimes Against Humanity for which there are International Laws, Conventions and Judicial Mechanisms to call the perpetrators to account, irrespective of whether the sponsors are states or individual perpetrators. India, the so-called world's largest democracy (mocker racy) has history of wars against people of various ethnic, religious and culture orientations including the Naxal-Maoist people, Sikh Community, peoples of the Seven states namely; Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura, Arunachal Pradesh, Mizoram, Manipur and Nagaland. Persecution of the people belonging to the identified states and Jammu & Kashmir have been going on during pronounced making headlines in the international media constantly ever since BJP Government under Modi's leadership assumed the helm. Extrajudicial killings, public lynchings, Enforced disappearances, and demographic changes are the hallmarks of PM Modi's regime. International Community's apathy, particularly the criminal silence maintained by the United States of America, which is nurturing India as a counterweight to China, and the double standards of the world's champions of democracy and human rights, have encouraged India so much that it has started carrying out assassinations of the leaders of the Sikh community on foreign soils. Assassination of Canadian Sikh Hardeep Singh Nijjar in Surrey, British Columbia, in June this year sent shock waves across the globe. Early this month, the US Department of Justice announced that it had foiled an alleged plot by an Indian official to assassinate a Sikh Activist and American Citizen in New York City. It is important to assess the reactions of both the US and Canada following the assassination in Canada of its citizen and the unearthing of assassination plot in the US. Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS) submitted a report in 2017 to warn the Canadian Government that Indian Intelligence Agency RAW's networks in Canada were planning attacks on Sikhs in Canada and influence elections in Canada with Indian diplomatic mission's facilitation. The Report identified two diplomats. CSIS had irrefutable evidence of Indian maneuvering in 2016 elections. But vested interest refrained

Canadian Government from taking action. The Indian activities continued while the Canadian Government looked the other way. However, the assassination of Hardeep Singh Nijjar compelled PM Justin Trudeau to reveal before the parliament that at G-20 he had told US President Joe Biden and PM Modi of India that India had killed Nijjar. Trudeau then went public. US Government's reaction to the Indian involvement in the killing of Nijjar has been a muted one. Even after US Justice Department's unearthing of assassination plot and US Canada close working under 5 Eye Intelligence Mechanism, there had not been any reaction of consequence to India. USA had always envisioned India as a lynchpin of its policy towards Asia Pacific to counter the China's exponential economic rise as a challenger to the US dominance and Russian assertion of its military might. The USA's vested interest to court India as its proxy in the region of its two historical Great Game adversaries and challengers, United States has crossed all limits to favour India. It did not sanction India over purchase of S-400 missiles from Russia while it sanctioned the others for the same breach of the US sanctions Act called 'Countering American Adversaries Through Sanctions Act (CAATSA) of 2017.' The US also did US sanctions against Iran. The US has been massively assisting India to build its arms with technology transfer. The US has signed three foundational and strategically very sensitive agreements during 2016-2020, called LEMOA, COMCASA and BECA. The USA exercises double standards selectively. Besides India in Asia-Pacific, USA courts relations with Israel in view of its strategic interests in the oil rich Middle East. Currently, a case in point is American cruel bias against Palestine in the face of ongoing genocide by Israel in Gaza. Given the US influence over Australia and its practical demonstration on a number of occasions, it can't be ruled out that Australian discrimination against the Sikhs whereby it did not allow the Referendum for Khalistan, recently, could be under pressure of the US. Indian condemnable act of assassination of Hardeep Singh achieved two objectives. One, messaging to the Sikhs pursuing Khalistan movement that they were not beyond India's reach regardless of their location. Two, embarrass Canada for rejecting Indian objections to allowing Khalistan Referendum in Canada in September 2022 and issuing adverse travel advisory for visitors to India. It was a message for the Canadian leadership that India could kill its citizens at will and couldn't do damn about it. Even though India conspired to kill a Canadian citizen in their sovereign territory, the reaction was not close to what any other sovereign state would have taken. Lack of warranted reaction damaged Canada's reputation among its own citizens and expatriates'

doubt India mastered the art of staging terrorist attacks not just on its own soil while blaming others but also on foreign soils. Use of foreign soil for perpetrating terrorism by India is not a new phenomenon. A person none other than the US Secretary of Defence, Chuck Hagel, said in 2011 that: "India Finances Trouble in Afghanistan's neighbouring country using Afghan soil. His statement was later authenticated by the voluntary statements made by Ehsanullah Ehsan, who was first the spokesperson for the terrorist organizations viz. TTP and later Jamaat ul Ahrar (JuA). Ehsan shared how Indian state agency RAW funded the two terrorist organizations for terrorist activities. Departure of British Empire from the sub-Continent was envisaged as ushering in an era for coming into existence of a number of new states. Sikhs were among the significant entities with their history of sovereignty in line with the Sikh religious teachings of the founder of Sikhism, Guru Nanak. They eyed for Punjab to be their Khalistan but with Muslims majority, Punjab was divided. However, the connivance between the British Empire and Hindu Leaders was instrumental in the drawing of boundaries with inferior designs. Sikhs have ruled the part of the Sub-continent during 19th century under Maharaja Ranjit Singh and fought wars with the British Imperial Forces. It would not be beyond conception to think that the British adversarial past with the Sikh Empire and Hindus being Sikh Empire's subjects, devised the lasting problematic partition plan for 1947. Indian hostility against Sikh community is the most targeted one. The region and its people have been in turbulence ever since. Mistreatment of Sikhs as a minority, set an impetus to their separatist campaign called Khalistan Movement. 2023 witnessed overwhelming votes in a referendum in favour of an independent state for the Sikhs. In 1984, the then Indian PM Indra Gandhi ordered 'Operation Blue Star' to crush Khalistan Movement. Sikhs leadership was targeted while Sikh Temples or Gurdwaras including their most sacred Golden Temple. Were destroyed. A large number of Sikh leaders were killed in the operation. There are numerous reports of inhuman treatment meted out to the Sikh minority in India including

IHC halts Imran trial till Jan 11

From Page 01 founder's lawyer what the point of the petition was. "The point is that the legal procedure was not completed before the indictment," said the lawyer, responding to the judge. He said that a legally authorised official can file a complaint directly in court. "You are saying that an authorised officer can file a complaint directly," asked the judge. At this, the lawyer requested that the IHC direct the trial court to conduct the hearing of the case after five or six days. "The court can complete the trial in the meantime," he mentioned. "How many witness statements have been completed so far?" the judge questioned. To which, the lawyer responded by saying that statements of 25 witnesses have been recorded, while cross-examination of three has been completed out of the total 27 witnesses. The cipher trial is being conducted on a daily basis, the PTI counsel told the court. FIA Prosecutor Raja Rizwan Abbasi received the notice in the courtroom. Attorney General for Pakistan (AGP) Mansoor Usman Awan also appeared in the court and informed that the statements of 25 witnesses have been recorded in the cipher trial. PTI lawyer Salman Akram Raja, who joined the hearing via videolink, said statements of many witnesses were recorded after the judgment of this court. Judge Aurangzeb said: "I can't ignore the court's previous proceedings regarding the cipher case. I am concerned about the way the cipher trial is being conducted." The court acknowledged that the trial court judge conducted the hearing early because he was ordered to do so. Expressing concerns over the in-camera trial, the IHC judge observed that the special court judge should have ordered conducting an open trial on every hearing of the case. To which, the AGP told the court that media is allowed to cover the trial proceedings. "Was the cross-examination of witnesses carried out in the presence of the media," Justice Aurangzeb inquired. The AGP said the statements of three witnesses were related to the secret code of the diplomatic cable, adding that the foreign secretary's statement will also be recorded in-camera. The judge observed that the cipher trial was being conducted in haste, and termed the trial the first of its kind. "The importance of open hearings is not clear to the special court judge. nor to the prosecutors," the court maintained. The court added that it has to be seen whether the right to a fair trial under Article 10-A is granted in such cases or not. "What facts were [presented] before the Supreme Court when bail was granted?" the IHC judge asked. There were statements from 13 witnesses before the SC, the AGP responded. "The Supreme Court was looking into the bail matter," he added. "This clarifies [my statement]," Justice Aurangazeb said. The apex court said that there is not enough material before them to deny bail, the IHC judge added. Both Khan and his party's Vice-Chairman Shah Mahmood Qureshi were granted post-arrest bail in the cipher case by the Supreme Court on December 22, 2023. Earlier on December 13, the PTI founder and vice-chairman were indicted in the cipher case again by the special court after the IHC declared their jail trial null and void. Both politicians have pleaded not guilty to their involvement in the offence

MELBOURNE: Pakistan were on top in the second Test against Australia in Melbourne after claiming four quick wickets in the second innings but Mitchell Marsh and Steve Smith helped the home side get back in the game with a crucial partnership. After the initial setbacks, Australia recovered to reach 187-6 at stumps with a lead of 241 runs. Marsh and Smith's 153-run partnership brought Australia back in the game, after they were reduced to 16-4, on a pitch that was assisting the bowlers. Marsh, who was dropped on 20 by Abdullah Shafique, scored 96 runs in 130 balls with the help of 13 fours. Salman Ali Agha took a sensational catch at first slip as Marsh was dismissed by Mir Hamza. He dived low to his right and completed a one-handed catch to end Marsh's game-changing knock. Meanwhile, Smith was dismissed on the final ball of the day by Shaheen Afridi after scoring 50 runs Resuming at 6-2 after lunch, Mir Hamza took two wickets in as many balls to rattle the home side. India unlikely to travel to Pakistan for DC

ISLAMABAD: India could potentially have to forfeit a Davis Cup play-off against rival Pakistan, as the local tennis association stated on Thursday that the team awaited approval from New Delhi for travel. The All India Tennis Association (AITA) sought approval from the sports ministry to travel to Pakistan after the International Tennis Federation (ITF) tribunal rejected a request to move the fixture to a third country. "The proposal is still pending with the ministry, and we are awaiting a decision," said AITA secretary-general Anil Dhupar. Pakistan Tennis Federation (PTF) president Salim Saifullah Khan mentioned that 18 members of the Indian squad had applied for visas for the World Group 1 clash scheduled for February 3-4. "We have all the arrangements put in place. They will be given the best security and accommodation. Let politics be kept away from sports, and better sense prevails," he added. New Delhi last hosted the Pakistani tennis team in 2006, and the Indian Davis Cup team last visited Islamabad in 1964. According to India Today, a 2019 match was moved to Kazakhstan due to political tensions, as cited by the AITA. Sports matches between India and Pakistan are infrequent due to decades of hostility. no more breaking the international norms when it comes to sports management. Yet again the same mistakes are being repeated in hockey where the next few weeks are most important to determine Pakistan hockey's international status/future. In almost twenty days' time, Pakistan is to compete in the Olympic Qualifying round in Oman. The country has already missed the last two Olympics due to non-qualification. This time around, Pakistan has got a good opportunity to make it to the Paris Olympics (2024) provided a competitive team handled by able coaches raised for the occasion. The fresh controversies that engulfed the game of hockey have already dampened the players' spirits. With fears of an international ban looming over, one wonders how the country's hockey team would be able to confront the challenges on both fronts. On one hand, Pakistan hockey faces FIH reaction while on the other there is not much time left for the start of the Olympic qualifying round. The FIH offices are to reopen on January 6 following the Christmas and new year's holidays. If the power-grabbing issues remained unsettled by that time, fears are there the FIH may step in to exert its authority. In that case, it will be vet another blow to Pakistan sports.

Nigeria armed attacks: death toll hits 200

KANO: At least 200 peo ple were confirmed dead in a series of armed gang attacks in central Nigeria, a local official said late Wednesday. Monday Kassah, head of the local government in Bokkos, told Anadolu that two more people died at hospital on Wednesday night, raising the death toll to 200. "I can assure you that the figure will definitely rise above 200 in one or two days to come. We are seriously in mourning as we lost our brothers and sisters," he said. The death toll is rising as some with serious injuries at hospital are dying, while many people are still missing and search for them in the bush is underway, Kassah added. Armed gunmen attacked 20 communities in the Bokkos and Barkin-Ladi local government areas of the Plateau state from Saturday into the early hours of Monday, killing people, burning houses, and looting farm products. According to Kassah, 221 houses were set ablaze and 35 motorcycles and motor vehicles were burnt down. On Wednesday, President Bola Ahmed Tinubu said his administration will not rest on its oars until victims of the gruesome attacks on communities get justice and the residents are safe.-DNA

Iran, Russia shift trade to local currencies

MOSCOW: Iran and Russia have finalized an agreement to trade in their local currencies instead of the U.S. dollar, Iran's state-run news agency reported. "The establishment of new financial and banking platforms has opened a 'new chapter' in banking relations between Iran and Russia, with the two countries agreeing to ditch the U.S. dollar and instead trade in local currencies," said, citing information from the Central Bank of Iran. The deal was finalized at a meeting held in Russia between the central bank governors of the two nations, it said. Platforms such as non-SWIFT messaging systems and establishing bilateral brokerage relations using national currencies are now being used by banks and businesses in Iran and Russia, it added. In July 2022, Iran and Russia announced plans to use their

announced plans to use their national currencies instead of the U.S. dollar in mutual trade. During a meeting that month in Tehran, Iran's leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei expressed the need to abandon the dollar in global trade.—Agencies

Gas tanker blast in Liberia kills dozens

MONROVIA : At least 40 people have died following the explosion of a gas tanker in north-central Liberia, the West African country's chief medical officer, Francis Kateh has said. The fuel truck crashed late on Tuesday in Totota, Lower Bong County, and soon after exploded, killing and injuring many who had flocked to the scene. Dozens of people are still in hospital with serious burns, and the death toll could rise, Kateh told reporters. Poor road safety and weak infrastructure have made Sub-Saharan Africa the world's deadliest region for crashes, with the fatality rate three times higher than the European average, according to United Nations figures. Police earlier put the death toll at 15 and said at least 30 people were injured as locals gathered at the scene. "There were lots of people that got burned," said Prince B. Mulbah, deputy inspector general for the Liberia National Police. Another police officer, Malvin Sackor, said that after the crash, some locals had begun to take the leaking gas when the tanker exploded, killing some and wounding others. He said that the police were still gathering the total number of injured and killed. An eyewitness from Totota, Aaron Massaquoi, told AFP that "people climbed all on top of the truck tak ing the gas. -APP

US, Mexico agree to keep border crossings open

MEXICO CITY: Mexican and U.S. officials agreed to keep border crossings open, Mexican President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador said on Thursday, following a visit by U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken that focused on securing Mexico's help to stem record-high migration.

The United States earlier this month temporarily shuttered several crossings, including two key rail bridges, to redeploy enforcement resources elsewhere across the border amid soaring migrant numbers, a pivotal issue in next year's U.S. elections. "This agreement has been reached, the rail crossings and the boarder bridges are already being opened to normalize the situation," Lopez Obrador told a morning press conference. "Every day there is more movement on the border bridges." Lopez Obrador said Wednesday's meetings with the U.S. delegation, which included Blinken and Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas, were "direct," and he praised the Biden administration's relationship with Mexico. "The relationship with Biden is very good, and he is very respectful of us, of Mexico," he said, adding that Biden "understands that this (migration) phenomenon has to do with poverty."

Lopez Obrador earlier this month said he would help the



United States by boosting measures to curb migration, without giving details. U.S. and Mexican officials have not released any more information about possible agreements reached during the meeting so far. The bilateral talks come as hundreds of migrants and asylum seekers, many with small children, slowly walk across southern Mexico. The caravan, which Lopez Obrador has reduced to some 1,500 people, is unlikely to reach the U.S. border. But it has highlighted the plight of migrants and asylum seekers, who are fleeing violence, conflict, poverty, and climate change. The issue of fentanyl, a powerful and deadly opioid, was "hardly discussed" in the meeting, the president added. The United States has been pressing Mexico to do more to combat fentanyl trafficking, while Mexico has been pushing for stronger U.S. controls to prevent firearms from the neighboring country from reaching powerful drug cartels.

Meanwhile, Mexico says it detected 680,000 migrants moving through the country in the first 11 months of 2023 and assigned over 32,000 military troops and National Guard officers – about 11% of its total forces – to enforce immigration laws. The National Guard now detains far more migrants than criminals. – Agencies

Speaking in an interview with Russian state news agency TASS, Lavrov pointed out that the Ukrainian authorities speak only about war and use aggressive rhetoric. "Any cease-fire is out of the question (for the Ukrainian authorities). The ban on negotiations with the Russian leadership, established by Zelenskyy on Sept. 30, 2022, continues to be in effect. Draw your own conclusions," he said. The United States, backed by the UK, Japan and Canada, has proposed moving forward with preparatory work so that options would be ready for G7 leaders to consider at a potential meeting around February 24, according to the report. The intrigues of Western countries whose dominance is ebbing away are largely responsible for pitching the world into turmoil, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov has said in an interview published on Thursday.Lavroy, in a year-end interview released by the official TASS news agency, warned that no one world-wide could be certain of escaping unscathed from Western machinations in 2024. Lavrov also restated Russia's complaint that Ukraine was unwilling to hold peace talks to end the 22-month-old conflict in Ukraine. which Moscow calls a "special military operation". "I must note an absence of any will for peace on the part of the regime of (Ukrainian President Volodymyr) Zelenskyy," Lavrov told media reporters. "His representatives think only in categories of war and resort to totally aggressive rhetoric. There is no consideration of holding peace talks ... Draw your own conclusions." Europe's efforts to boost arms production and help Ukraine to fend off Russia's offensive are facing an unexpected obstacle.

Sudan RSF Leader visits Ethiopia amidst conflict

NAIROBI: The leader of Sudan's paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) arrived in Ethiopia on the second stop of his first trip abroad since war erupted with Sudan's army in April. Mohamed Hamdan Daglo's visits to Ethiopia and Uganda come as regional diplomats scramble to broker a meeting between the RSF commander and his rival, Sudanese army chief Abdel Fattah Al-Burhan. The warring generals have not met face-to-face since the outbreak of fighting between their forces that has killed over 12,000 people by some conservative estimates, and forced million to flee. Daglo was greeted upon arrival in Addis Ababa by Ethiopia's Deputy Prime Minister Demeke Mekonnen, according to a post on X by the country's foreign ministry that didn't provide any further details. On Wednesday, Daglo visited Uganda and met with President Yoweri Museveni, the RSF leader and Museveni's office said. Daglo said he "put forward our vision to engage in negotiations, cease hostilities, and rebuild the Sudanese state based on new, just foundations." He is also expected to visit Kenya in coming days, a source close to the RSF told AFP. "After having visited Uganda and Ethiopia, Hemeti will go to Nairobi in order to try to rally the member states of IGAD to his cause before going to Djibouti to meet General Al-Burhan," the source said, referring to Daglo by another commonly used name. IGAD, a bloc representing eight countries in the wider East Africa region, has been trying to bring Al-Burhan and Daglo together since war erupted on April 15. On Wednesday, Djibouti's foreign ministry said a meeting between the rivals planned for December 28 had been "postponed to early January 2024 for technical reasons." The UN Security Council last week voiced "alarm" at the growing violence in Sudan and the spread of fighting to areas previous considered a haven for those displaced by the conflict. By the end of November, at least 12,190 people had been killed in the fighting, according to a conservative estimate from the Armed Conflict and Location Event Data project. The United Nations says more than seven million people have been internally displaced by the war, while another 1.5 million have fled into neighboring countries.-APP

Turkish parliament delays vote on Sweden's NATO ANKARA: The Turkish Parliament is not expected to

hold a full vote on Sweden's NATO accession protocol before mid-January, parliamentary sources told Media Reporters. Sweden's accession to the U.S.-led Western alliance was approved by the foreign affairs committee on Tuesday, bringing an end to a 19-month standoff that strained ties between Ankara and its Western allies. It must now be voted by the full 600-seat Parliament, where President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's ruling alliance holds the majority. The president would then need to sign it into law. Although Erdogan's party could call for a special session to discuss the measure, it will likely wait until after Parliament's scheduled return on Jan. 15. The Nordic country, together with its neighbor Finland, abandoned decades of military nonalignment and sought to join NATO after Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022. Türkiye and Hungary were the only NATO members to oppose their applications. Türkiye eventually relented on Finland, ratifying its bid in April, but continued to oppose Swedish membership. Ankara has been angered mainly by the Nordic country's tolerance of members and sympathizers of the PKK. This terrorist group has led a bloody campaign against the Turkish state since the 1980s, killing over 40,000 civilians, as well as the Gülenist Terrorist Group (FETÖ), which orchestrated a bloody coup attempt in 2016. 'Fulfill commitments' Sweden tightened its counterterrorism legislation in response to Turkish pressure.-APP

Turkiye 'neutralizes' 59 PKK terrorists: Erdogan

ISTANBUL: Turkiye "neutralized" 59 PKK terrorists as part of anti-terror operations since Dec. 22, President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said on.Speaking to local officials in the capital Ankara, Erdogan said: "If terrorism has come to the point of ending within our borders today, the operations we carry out in Iraq and Syria are the key reason for "Our red line is to uphold the principle of one nation, one flag, one homeland, one state under all circumstances, as this guarantees our national survival," he added. Türkiye will resolutely continue the anti-terror operations until the last terrorist is no longer a threat to the nation, he said. "We continue our operations beyond our borders. We do not allow terrorists to tarnish our homeland with their dirty feet," Erdogan added.

Turkish authorities use the term "neutralize" to imply the terrorists in question surrendered or were killed or captured.

The recent anti-terror opera-

tions followed Friday's PKK terror attack that killed 12 Turkish soldiers in northern Iraq. Turkish airstrikes, since then, have destroved dozens of terror targets in northern Iraq and Syria and "neutralized" senior terrorists. PKK terrorists often hide out in northern Iraq to plot cross-border attacks in Türkiye. It also has a Syrian branch, known as the YPG. Since 2016. Ankara has launched a trio of successful anti-terror operations across its border in northern Syria to prevent the formation of a terror corridor and enable the peaceful settlement of residents: Euphrates Shield (2016), Olive Branch (2018), and Peace Spring (2019). In its more than 35-year terror campaign against Türkiye, the PKK - listed as a terrorist organization by

Türkiye, the US, and EU – has of more than 40,000 people, inbeen responsible for the deaths cluding women, children, and inoffshoot.

Netanyahu's words on Erdogan are null and void

ANKARA: AK Party's Deputy Chairman and Party Spokesperson, Omer Celik, has declared that the statements made by Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, targeting Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, are null and void. Celik lashed out at Netanyahu's remarks on President Erdogan in an X post shared on Thursday. Emphasising Netanyahu's history of indiscriminate aggression against civilian people, he stated "The words of Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu, who has committed the most brutal aggression in history without any distinction towards civilians, against our esteemed President, are null and void." Describing Netanyahu's actions as "war crimes, crimes against humanity, and attempted genocide against Palestinians," Celik asserted that the Israeli PM would be remembered with disdain and eventually held accountable before the law. "The fight against terrorism in Türkiye is the most legitimate struggle in the world, conducted within the framework of the law," he responded to the Israeli PM who tried to overshadow Türkiye's counter-terrorism efforts. "Türkiye's struggle against terrorism is in full compliance with all the rules of international law," he said. 'Systematic massacre' Calling Israel's occupation of Palestine the longest-standing, planned and systematic massacre, Celik criticised Netanyahu's administration for bombing Palestinian civilians, forcing them to evacuate their ancestral lands, and even attacking hospitals where they sought refuge. "While our President addresses the world in the name of humanity and human conscience. Netanyahu represents the enemy of humanity and all forms of action against it," Celik remarked. Promising continued solidarity with innocent children, women, elderly civilians in Palestine, Celik concluded, "We will persist in supporting our Palestinian brothers and sisters in their legitimate quest for their rights."-Agencies

Floods, landslides in eastern DRC kill scores

KINSHASA : Heavy rains overnight in South Kivu province in eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) have caused flooding and landslides, killing at least 40 people, local media reported. At least 20 people were fo nd dead in the provincial capital Bukavu while the bodies of 20 others were discovered in the surrounding village of Burhinyi, reports said on Wednesday, citing the governor's office. The Democratic Republic of the Congo is regularly hit by disasters such as floods and landslides, in part due to urban overcrowding, dilapidated infrastructure and shoddy house construction. Search and rescue efforts are ongoing, and there is concern that the death toll may rise. In May this year, at least 438 bodies were found in areas of Kalehe Territory in South Kivu hit by flooding due to heavy rains. The DRC, located in a tropical climate zone, frequently faces natural disasters during the rainy season. -DNA

Apple secures watch ban pause victory

WASHINGTON: A federal court handed Apple a victory on Wednesday by suspending a ban on the US sale of its latest watch models in a feud over patents with health company Masimo. We are thrilled to return the full Apple Watch lineup to customers in time for the new year," an Apple spokesperson said in an email to AFP."Apple Watch Series 9 and Apple Watch Ultra 2, including the blood oxygen feature, will become available for purchase again in the United States at Apple Stores starting today and from apple.com tomorrow by 12 pm (2000 GMT)," the email added.

The ban on certain Apple smartwatch models came into effect Tuesday, after US President Joe Biden's administration opted not to veto a ruling on the patent infringements.

But the federal court said the ban order would not take effect pending its consideration of whether to allow a pause on the ban throughout the full appeal process.

After a complaint by Masimo, the United States International Trade Commission (ITC) decided in October to ban Apple Watch models over a patented technology for detecting blood-oxygen levels. Masimo contends it invented the technology and that Apple poached key employees to win access to the know-how. Apple last week paused its US sales of Apple Watch Series 9 and Apple Watch Ultra 2 in compliance with the order.

But the iPhone-maker contends that the ITC finding was in error and should be reversed, and appealed the decision in the federal appeals court.

Masimo declined to comment on the development. Apple did not immediately reply to a query from AFP.

Jordan to restrict essential goods exports

RIYADH: Jordan has regulated the export and re-export of essential goods, including rice and sugar, amid soaring shipping costs following tensions in the Red Sea. Corn, sunflower, palm, and soybean oil were also among the main products covered in the ban. The government's restrictions align with the Food Security Council's recommendation to limit the trade activity for these items. The world's top transportation companies, including container giants Maersk and Hapag-Lloyd, stopped using Red Sea routes after Yemen's Houthi militant group began targeting vessels earlier this month, disrupting global However, Maersk earlier this week said that it has scheduled several dozen vessels to travel via the Suez Canal and the Red Sea in the upcoming weeks, signaling that global shipping firms are returning to the route. According to new industry data by Flexport, diverted iourneys around Africa can take as much as 25 percent. – **Agencies**

Russia reopens embassy in **Burkina Faso**

OUAGADOUGOU: Russia on Thursday reopened its embassy in Burkina Faso after a gap of nearly 32 years, the West African nation's government and a Russian diplomat said. The mission was closed in 1992. The Russian ambassador to Ivory Coast, Alexei Saltykov. said Russian President Vladimir Putin would name the new envoy.

The Burkinabe foreign ministry confirmed in a statement that "Russia formally reopened its embassy this Thursday in Ouagadougou." Saltykov said he would head the mission in Burkina Faso until the new ambassador is named and described Burkina Faso as "an old partner with whom we have solid and friendly ties." Burkina Faso last year experienced two military coups - both triggered in part by discontent at failures to stem a raging jihadist insurgency. Since coming to power in September 2022, the ruling junta has distanced itself from France, its historic partner and former colonial power, and moved closer to Russia. In October, Burkina Faso signed a deal with Russia for the construction of a nuclear power plant to increase the energy supply to the Sahel country where less than a quarter of the population has access to electricity. - APP

Dar caused billions loss to exchequer: Zubair

Zubair said the Sindh govt agreed to take control of the Steel Mills on the condition that its liabilities would be retained by the federal government

KARACHI: Ex-privatisation minister Muhammad Zubair held former finance minister Ishaq Dar responsible for causing a loss of billions of rupees by halting the privatisation of loss-making public sector enterprises (SOEs) during the PML-N's 2013-2018 tenure. In an interview with a local TV channel, Zubair alleged that the privatisation of the PIA, Steel Mills and Fesco was in the final stages when Dar stopped it and this caused a loss of billions of rupees.

He said he disagreed with several decisions of Dar regarding privatisation. Regarding the Steel Mills privatisation, the PML-N leader said the final session of the cabinet committee on privatisation was being held when Dar proposed that the Steel Mills be not privatised but handed over to the Sindh government because then lead-



of the Pakistan Peoples Party wanted that. Zubair said he did not agree with Dar on that because he believed that such commercial entities should be run by those who were capable of running them and it was not the gov-

ernment's job to run them. He said the government had already caused massive losses by trying to run them. The former privatisation minister said that as the cabinet committee decided to hand the Steel Mills over to the Sindh government, the federal government wrote to then Sindh chief minister Murad Ali Shah in this regard and spent around eight to 10 months in correspondence with the Sindh government, but those efforts turned out to be useless.

Later, he added, the decision to give the Steel Mills to the Sindh government was cancelled. Regarding the PIA, Zubair said its privatisation was discussed in multiple sessions of a parliamentary body that had representation of all parties.

'India targeting high-profile journalists with spyware'

has again targeted high-profile journalists with Pegasus spyware, Amnesty International and The Washington Post said in a joint investigation published Thursday. Created by Israeli firm NSO Group, Pegasus can be used to access a phone's messages and emails, peruse photos, eavesdrop on calls, track locations and even film the owner with the camera. Watchdogs have documented widespread use of the spyware - which is normally only sold to governments or security agencies - against journalists and activists in dozens of countries, including India. In 2021, New Delhi was accused of using Pegasus to surveil journalists, opposition politicians and activists, with leaked documents showing the spyware had been used against more than 1,000 Indian phone numbers. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's

main political rival, Rahul Gandhi, was among those targeted. The government denied conducting "illegal surveillance" but refused to cooperate with a Supreme Court probe

into the allegations, the findings of which have not been made public. The OCCRP, one of the two target organisations named in Thursday's report, published an investigation in August into the financial dealings of Indian tycoon Gautam Adani, a key business ally of Modi.

Adani's conglomerate shed more than \$100 billion in value earlier this year after a US short-seller investment firm made explosive allegations of accounting fraud, which the Indian company dismissed as an organised "smear campaign". Mangnale told AFP that he was targeted "within hours" of sending questions to Adani Group on behalf of the OCCRP. "I can't blame the Adani Group or the Government of India for it, because we don't have the evidence yet," he added. "But, the chronology itself is really telling." Varadarajan of The Wire suggested to The Washington

Post that he had been targeted for leading opposition to the detention of a prominent news publisher in New Delhi. Local media reported last month that authorities were again investigating allegations by opposition politicians of attempted phone tapping after they reported receiving warnings from Apple of "state-sponsored attackers". In that case, Ashwini Vaishnaw, the

information and technology minister, said the government was "concerned" by the complaints. Activists say that press freedom in

the world's biggest democracy has suffered during Modi's tenure. India has fallen 21 spots to 161 out of 180 countries in the World Press Freedom Index, compiled by Reporters Without Borders, since he took office in 2014. Journalists reporting critically on the government say they are subjected to judicial harassment and relentless campaigns of online abuse. - APP
