PTI regains 'bat' symbol

PTI counsel Barrister Ali Zafar said: "Now, no one can stop PTI from winning these elections"

PESHAWAR: In a major turn of events, the Peshawar High Court (PHC) Wednesday restored the "bat" symbol for Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) paving the way for the party to head to polls with its iconic symbol on February 8 polls. The decision was announced following the hearing of PTI's petition challenging the Election Commission of Pakistan's (ECP) decision declaring the intra-party election as null and void and revoking their electoral symbol "bat". The court heard all parties in the case. In its verdict, the court termed the ECP's decision "incorrect". Following the verdict, the court ordered the electoral watchdog to issue a certificate to the PTI and suspended the decision that stripped the party of its symbol. "PTI is a political party entitled to an election symbol," the court said. A two-member PHC bench comprising Justice Ijaz Anwar and Justice Arshad Ali announced the verdict today. A day earlier, the court heard the arguments by the counsels of ECP and the PTI. In today's hearing, the court heard other parties in the case. Speaking to the media outside the PHC after the announcement of the verdict, PTI counsel Barrister Ali Zafar said: "Now, no one can stop PTI from winning these elections." Hailing the decision, the PTI senator said PHC kept its tradition of announcing decisions as per law. "Court has ordered to restore PTI's bat symbol and upload intra-party polls results on its website immediately," he added. The court has annulled the decision to take away PTI's electoral symbol. "It was a conspiracy against the PTI to deprive it of bat symbol," said Barrister Zafar. At the outset of the hearing, one of the petitioner's lawyer Advocate Qazi Jawwad said that his client sought information from the PTI's head office regarding intra-party polls, but did not get any response. However, he said he learned about the PTI's polls through media.

IMF Board takes up Pak issue today

Remittances increase to \$2.38 billion in Dec 2023

KARACHI: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) takes up Pakistan issue today in its Executive Board meeting. The Fund is likely to approve tranche as was agreed in the staff level agreement. Meanwhile, the inflow of workers' remittances sent by overseas Pakistanis increased by 13% to \$2.38 billion in December 2023 as funds were dispatched through official channels following the return of stability in the rupee-dollar parity and the crackdown against illegal currency networks.

Global Health Security Summit PM for establishing global fund to ensure global health security

PM vows to continue anti-polio mission till its complete eradication

ISLAMABAD: Caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar on Wednesday stressed the need to explore mechanisms for global funding that could support nations in need, ensuring that no one was left behind, in the global pursuit of health security. "The call for a sufficiently funded, widely supported country medium-term road-map, as highlighted in the International Health Regulations Core Capacities evaluation, resonates globally. We must invest in open, transparent, and multi-sectoral processes to strengthen buy-in and commitment at all levels," the prime minister said while addressing the inaugural session of the first-ever two-day Global Health Security Summit 2024. Highlighting the importance of enhancing coordination in the health sector beyond borders, Prime Minister Kakar said "One Health"

Imran out of election race

LAHORE: The election tribunal upheld the rejection of former prime minister Imran Khan's nomination papers for Lahore's NA-122 and PS 89 of Minawali, resulting in his exclusion from the upcoming general elections. Justice Tariq Nadeem, presiding over the election tribunal at the Lahore High Court, dismissed the appeal pertaining to the rejection of PTI founder Imran Khan's papers for NA-122. The tribunal upheld the returning officer's (RO) decision, which stated that the candidate's endorser did not belong to the constituency.

AML set to sweep elections in Rawalpindi

RAWALPINDI: Former interior minister Sheikh Rashid Ahmed affirmed on Wednesday his party, Awami Muslim League, will secure a majority in Rawalpindi in the upcoming general elections. Asked to comment on the country's current political situation, Rashid stated that it was for the first time that Pakistani politics was beyond his comprehension. High treason case SC upholds dictator Pervez Musharraf death sentence

Top court throws out Musharraf's appeal against death sentence, declares LHC judgment "null and void"; I wish next time such appeals are heard when accused are alive, says Musharraf's lawyer

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court on Wednesday upheld former president General (ret'd) Pervez Musharraf's death sentence awarded to him by a special court in 2019 in a "high treason case". A four-member bench headed by Chief Justice of Pakistan (CJP) Qazi Faez Isa and comprising Justice Mansoor Ali Shah, Justice Aminuddin Khan and Justice Athar Minallah conducted the hearing. On December 17, 2019, a special court awarded the death sentence to the former ruler under Article 6 of the Constitution after a case of high treason was filed against him during Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz's (PML-N) tenure for his "unconstitutional" decision to impose an emergency in November 2007. On Jan 13, 2020, the Lahore High Court (LHC) declared the verdict, given by the special court formed to hear the high treason case under Article 6, "unconstitutional".

Israeli genocidal war continues

Death toll from the ongoing Israeli bombardments, which started on October 7, climbed to 23,357 martyrs and the number of the wounded surged to 59,410 people

GAZA: As the US-backed Israeli genocidal war on the Gaza Strip entered day 96 on Wednesday, massive aerial and artillery strikes continued to pound neighborhoods and homes and massacre more civilians, mostly children and women. The health ministry in Gaza said on Wednesday that the Israeli occupation army committed 14 massacres in different areas of the Gaza Strip during the past 24 hours, killing at least 147 civilians and injuring over 243 others, while a large number of victims are still under the rubble of bombed buildings or lying on roads. In a statement, the health ministry added that the death toll from the ongoing Israeli bombardments, which started on October 7, climbed to 23,357 martyrs and the number of the wounded surged to 59,410 people. Every day, the Israeli army escalates its air and ground attacks on the Gaza Strip, which has been under relentless bombardment since a cross-border operation was launched by Hamas's armed wing, al-Qassam Brigades, on October 7. Besides the large number of casualties and the huge displacement of people, basic food, fuel, water and medical supplies have run out for the 2.3 million residents in Gaza due to the tight Israeli blockade and the massive destruction of infrastructure and facilities.

PPP Sit-in protests power and gas issues



Envoy: Croatia-Pakistan trade not strong enough

Croatian Ambassador said, "Mirza Imran Baig's appointment as Honorary Consul General of Croatia in Karachi is going to be the extended hand of Croatian Embassy

KARACHI: Ambassador of Republic of Croatia Dr Drago Stambuk has said that although Croatia and Pakistan were friendly countries but the trade exchange was 'not strong enough to be proud of' so the Croatian Embassy was trying its best to improve it. "My duty is to put the business people of both sides together so I'll be arranging political as well as economic consultations between the two countries so that bilateral trade could be improved.", he added while speaking at a meeting during his visit to Karachi Chamber of Commerce and Industry. Honorary Consul General of Croatia in Karachi Mirza Imran Baig, President KCCI Iftikhar Ahmed Sheikh, Senior Vice President Altaf A. Ghaffar, Vice President Tanveer Ahmed Barry, Former President Majyd Aziz, and KCCI Managing Committee

Members were also present at the meeting. Croatian Ambassador said, "Mirza Imran Baig's appointment as Honorary Consul General of Croatia in Karachi is going to be the extended hand of Croatian Embassy. He will be responsible for exploring ways and means to not only improve trade but also facilitate issuance of visas." While identifying delays in issuance of visas as a major bottleneck hindering trade, the Envoy assured that efforts were being made to solve this problem. In this regard, discussions were held with Croatian Honorary Consul General in Karachi whose initiatives to ease visa issuance process will be fully supported. He informed Croatia, which is a member of Euro zone, holds fantastic geo-political position with big ports and railways network, hence, work was underway to make Croatia the hub for Central and South-Eastern Europe. "Howev-

er, Croatia is demographically falling down and it needs people especially skilled and young people. Pakistan holds very good human resource, well-educated English-speaking population along with devoted and intelligent businessmen. I would like to see more Pakistanis coming to Croatia and working in various sectors of our country particularly the tourism industry, which receives millions of tourists every year and it sometimes becomes very difficult to cope so many visitors", he added. Speaking on the occasion, Honorary Consul General of Croatia in Karachi Mirza Imran Baig said that business potential for Pakistanis was incredible in Croatia which was a gateway to Europe bordering Slovenia, Hungary, Serbia, Bosnia and Montenegro, besides sharing maritime border with Italy which was of huge significance. "Trade between Croatia and Pakistan

has been steadily growing as Pakistan's exports to Croatia have been improving at a pace of 7.71 percent annually while Croatia exports to Pakistan have also been rising by 4 percent. Though it's a positive sign but still not enough as there is space for tremendous growth." "To deal with delays in issuance of visas, we are looking into the possible of opening a Drop Box service in Pakistan which will be made available but it will take time as three countries including Croatia, Iran and Pakistan are involved", he assured, adding that Croatian Embassy located in Iran designates over Pakistan as well. He also hinted towards taking a trade delegation to Croatia in collaboration with Karachi Chamber by mid this year and also initiate a Business Council so that all types of trade related issues between Croatia and Pakistan could be dealt under one umbrella.

ISLAMABAD: Ambassador of the European Union H.E Dr. Riina Kionka, Wednesday said that the EU is keen on enhancing cooperation with Pakistan and focusing on exploring more avenues of trade, and investments in multiple sectors like information technology, surgical instruments, sports business, women entrepreneurs, education and textile industry. She said that highest highest-ever number of Pakistani students have been receiving scholarships to study in European universities under the EU's flagship program this year. To another question, she said that the European Union was the largest destination for Pakistani exports where the business community diversifies their exports to the EU to take maximum advantage of the EU's GSP Plus scheme for Pakistan which has recently been rolled. Kionka also termed GSP Plus as tremendously important for Pakistan's economy as it was beneficial not only for textile producers but also through the trickle-down effect of all those people who work in textile factories. She also identified Gems and Jewelry, Tourism, Handicrafts and Auto Parts etc. as potential sectors under GSP Plus, the EU Envoy noted that 28 per-

cent of Pakistan's exports come to the European single market which was a good number but it could further be enhanced. Talking about current political elections in Pakistan, she commented that the top EU diplomat in Pakistan has scheduled a series of meetings with political bigwigs to urge "timely, inclusive and peaceful elections". The EU was sending a handful of top observance in Pakistan to share their expertise and for providing meaningful suggestions. The ambassador said it was the EU priority of his mission to enhance parliamentary diplomacy, people-to-people exchanges, business opportunities, information, and renewable technologies, besides cooperation in the economic sector with Pakistan. The EU-Pakistan Business Forum for Small and Medium Enterprises (SME) is also providing opportunities for both EU and Pakistani businesses to work together to become engines of development and partnership and contribute to enhancing bilateral trade, she mentioned.

Senate committee on climate change meets

ISLAMABAD: A meeting of the Senate Standing Committee on Climate Change presided by Senator Seemee Ezdi was held today at Parliament House. The meeting commenced with Chairperson Senator Seemee Ezdi emphasizing the challenges posed by fog in urban areas. The Ministry of Climate Change and Environmental Coordination provided the committee members with a comprehensive briefing on various aspects of fog, including its formation, types, frequency in winter, and the related issue of smog: covering its types, causes, and impact. Senator Farooq Hamid Naek emphasized that fog is a natural phenomenon, whereas human activities contribute to the formation of smog. He stressed the need to implement measures to combat smog, particularly in areas like Lahore. The ministry clarified that both carbon-intensive

industries and general pollution contribute to smog. It was conveyed that 45 percent of smog is attributed to vehicle emissions. In discussions about the way forward, the ministry emphasized key factors, such as enhancing fuel quality, implementing mandatory annual certification for vehicles, promoting clean energy and sustainable transportation, adopting cleaner agricultural practices, improving waste management, raising public awareness and education, and implementing urban forestation. Additionally, the ministry suggested installing smog towers as a potential solution, citing their successful installation in China and ongoing efforts in India. The ministry affirmed that Living Indus has been selected from among 150 applications for the World Restoration Flagship of the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration, and this achievement was commended by the committee members. Furthermore, the ministry also briefed the committee

on the Living Indus initiative, emphasizing its aim to restore the ecological health of the Indus basin within Pakistan. They highlighted extensive consultations with the public sector, private sector, experts, and civil society, resulting in a comprehensive list of 25 preliminary interventions. These interventions focus on water and flood management, resource mobilization finance, social inclusion, knowledge base and legislation, pollution control, agri-forestry, and biodiversity. It was conveyed that the financing strategy for Living Indus will concentrate on international support, public finance, community involvement, and public-private partnerships. Moreover, former Senator Nisar Memon provided a detailed briefing on the new convention on Delta Unite (The Convention on Conservation of Deltas). He highlighted the challenges of the Indus River, emphasizing that the real issue lies in surface and groundwater, posing a regional and

global challenge. He pointed out that livelihoods, including agriculture, fishing, and livestock rearing, have been adversely affected, leading to various social issues such as poverty and healthcare concerns. In general, he commended the Living Indus initiative and expressed appreciation for the Senate team's active participation in Cop 28. The meeting concluded with the chairperson's suggestion to emphasize climate change in policy-making and foster public awareness regarding the avoidance of plastic usage. In attendance were Senator Mushahid Hussain Sayed, Senator Farooq Hamid Naek, Senator Taj Haider, Senator Abida Muhammad Azeem, Senator Keshoo Bai, Senator Khalida Ateeb, Ex-Senator Nisar Memon, the Secretary of the Ministry of Climate Change and Environmental Coordination and the senior officers from the Ministry of Climate Change and Environmental Coordination.

Poultry prices increase by 30 % in twin cities

ISLAMABAD: The prices of poultry items have increased by 30 percent in the twin cities of Islamabad and Rawalpindi during the last six months, which has created huge volatility in the market. According to the market survey conducted by APP here Wednesday, during the last six months, a 30 per cent increase was witnessed in the price of chicken in the last six months, while as same as 33 per cent increase in the price of poultry eggs in the same period. According to the survey, the price of live chicken in the twin cities was between Rs420 and 440 per kg from the last week of this month of January. Similarly, chicken meat is sold at Rs 680 to 700 per kg in the market of both cities. During this time, it was also found that poultry eggs used to be sold at Rs 390 to Rs 405 per dozen in the market of both cities. Meanwhile, talking to APP, the Chairman Pakistan Poultry Association (PPA), Chaudhry, Muhammad Ashraf said the increase in the current prices of poultry is due to demand and supply issues.—APP

Election Tribunal decides 116 appeals of NA

ISLAMABAD: The Election Appellate Tribunals in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa have so far decided 116 appeals against rejection or acceptance of nomination papers for the National Assembly. According to the spokesman of the provincial election commission, the tribunal disposed of 116 appeals of the National Assembly across the province. The tribunal decided 102 appeals against the rejection of nomination papers for 45 general seats of the National Assembly. Similarly, 213 appeals against the rejection of nomination papers for 115 general seats of the provincial assembly were heard. Fourteen appeals were filed against the approved nomination papers for the provincial assembly. The spokesman said that a total of seven Election Appellate Tribunals in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa had given verdicts on appeals.—APP

ECP directs authorities to provide voter info via SMS

ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has instructed the relevant authorities to provide detailed information on voter registration status and constituency details for national and provincial assemblies on 8300. According to ECP spokesperson, the eligible voters can verify their registration status on the voter lists by sending their Computerised National Identity Card (CNIC) number to 8300. Upon sending an SMS to 8300, an automated response will provide details, including the electoral area's name, block code, serial number, National and Provincial Assembly constituency numbers, district name, electoral region name, telephone number of the relevant district election commissioner, helpline number, and the ECP website. Notably, every registered voter has the choice to authenticate their information by visiting the District Election Commissioner's office in their locality, where the comprehensive electoral roll is available for review.—APP

IIUI extends last date of admission till Jan 15

FTO resolves 8,128 tax complaints, provides relief of Rs 17.74 billion

President visits FTO's office, lauds its performance

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Tax Ombudsman (FTO) has resolved 8,128 complaints against the maladministration of tax and customs authorities during the year 2023 as compared to 6,106 complaints in 2022. Furthermore, the registration of complaints increased by almost 24% as 8,076 complaints were filed in 2023 compared to 6,480 in 2022. FTO has also provided a relief of Rs 17.74 billion to taxpayers in 2023 as compared to Rs 7 billion in 2022. This was highlighted during a briefing given to President Dr Arif Alvi, who visited the FTO Office in Islamabad, today. Federal Tax Ombudsman (FTO), Dr Asif Mahmood Jah, Advisors to the FTO, regional heads, and senior officials of the FTO attended the meeting. Dr Asif Mahmood Jah briefed the President about the FTO's overall performance, outreach and initiatives taken for the facilitation of taxpayers. He informed that FTO provided free-of-cost justice to complainants against the maladministration and high-handedness of tax officials within 60 days, adding that the average time taken for the disposal of complaints had been reduced to 44 days during 2023. APHC concerned over surge in Indian state terrorism in IIOJK

ISLAMABAD: The All Parties Hurriyat Conference (APHC) has expressed grave concern over the surge in Indian state terrorism in Indian illegally occupied Jammu and Kashmir. According to Kashmir Media Service, the APHC spokesman in a statement in Srinagar said since 1947 India has been using military might to break the will of the people and suppress their freedom sentiments but has utterly failed in achieving its nefarious designs. He deplored that India has turned the occupied territory into a garrison where its troops are committing large-scale human rights violations, in fact war crimes. He said, following the Hindutva agenda of communal Hindu organization Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh, the BJP-led Indian government has deprived the Kashmiri people of all their basic rights. The APHC spokesman said the people of Jammu and Kashmir have totally rejected the occupation of their homeland by India and its illegal and unilateral actions of August 5, 2019. He said the peace and freedom-loving Kashmiris have always displayed their indignation and resistance against the Indian illegal occupation. He said the Kashmiri people have been fighting for their birthright to self-determination for the past over seven decades and they will continue their struggle till complete success. The spokesman said, "The Indian authorities have put the entire Hurriyat leadership in jails." "Thousands of Kashmiris have been illegally detained under black laws including Public Safety Act (PSA)," he lamented. He urged the United Nations, Organization of Islamic Cooperation and European Union to take cognizance of Indian state terrorism and machinations to change the demographic composition of occupied Kashmir. He called for implementation of the UN Security Council resolutions to settle the Kashmir dispute for ensuring durable peace in South Asia.—DNA

Workers' remittances record \$2.4 bn inflow in December

ISLAMABAD: The overseas workers' remittances recorded an inflow of US\$2.4 billion during December 2023, the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) on Wednesday said. In terms of growth, during the month under review, remittances increased by 5.4 per cent on month on month basis and 13.4 per cent on year on year basis. Workers' remittances inflow of US\$13.4 billion has been recorded during the first six months of the fiscal year 2023-24. Remittances inflows during December 2023 were mainly sourced from Saudi Arabia (\$577.6 million), United Arab Emirates (\$419.2 million), United Kingdom (\$368.0 million) and United States of America (\$263.9 million).—APP

Iran-US relations

THE longstanding tensions between Iran and the United States have been a defining feature of international relations for decades. Rooted in a complex web of historical, political, and ideological factors, the relationship between these two nations has experienced both periods of diplomatic engagement and heightened hostilities. As of 2024, the ongoing tensions continue to shape the dynamics of the Middle East and have far-reaching implications for global geopolitics. The roots of the Iran-U.S. tension can be traced back to the Iranian Revolution of 1979 when the U.S.-backed Shah was ousted, leading to the establishment of the Islamic Republic of Iran. The subsequent hostage crisis, where 52 American diplomats were held captive for 444 days, set the stage for a strained relationship that persisted through the years. The United States' support for Iraq during the Iran-Iraq War in the 1980s further deepened the mistrust between the two nations. One significant episode in recent history was the signing of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) in 2015, an agreement aimed at curbing Iran's nuclear program in exchange for sanctions relief. However, tensions escalated when the U.S. unilaterally withdrew from the deal in 2018, citing concerns over Iran's regional activities and missile development. The withdrawal strained diplomatic ties and led to a renewed cycle of economic sanctions. The reimposition of economic sanctions by the U.S. severely impacted Iran's economy, contributing to domestic unrest and affecting the livelihoods of ordinary citizens. Meanwhile, the region witnessed a surge in proxy conflicts, with Iran accused of supporting militias in Iraq, Syria, Yemen, and Lebanon. The U.S. responded with increased military presence and sanctions, creating a volatile situation with potential ripple effects across the Middle East. Incidents in the Persian Gulf, including attacks on oil tankers and the downing of drones, escalated tensions further. Both sides engaged in military posturing, heightening the risk of a direct military confrontation. The assassination of Iranian General Qasem Soleimani in January 2020 by a U.S. drone strike added another layer of complexity to the relationship, leading to increased hostilities and threats of retaliation. Despite the escalations, diplomatic efforts to ease tensions have not been entirely absent. Various international actors, including European nations and the United Nations, have sought to mediate and encourage dialogue. The change in U.S. leadership in 2021 saw a shift in approach, with the Biden administration expressing interest in rejoining the JCPOA, albeit with the need for negotiations on broader issues. The Iran-U.S. tension remains a critical and evolving aspect of global geopolitics. The complex interplay of historical grievances, regional power dynamics, and nuclear concerns continues to shape the relationship between these two nations. As the international community navigates these challenges, the path forward remains uncertain, requiring a delicate balance of diplomacy, dialogue, and strategic decision-making to promote stability in the region and beyond.



France's first youngest Prime Minister

EMMANUEL Macron's decision to appoint the youthful Gabriel Attal as France's new prime minister represents a double first in the country's history. At 34, Mr Attal will be the youngest politician ever to hold the office. In his book, *Revolution*, written prior to his first presidential campaign, Mr Macron wrote: "What keeps France united is the acceptance of the diversity of origins and destinies and the refusal of fatalism." As the final phase of the two-term Macron presidency begins, Mr Attal is a choice designed to re-echo the optimism and hopes for democratic renewal present at its outset. More narrowly, Mr Macron's move to replace Elisabeth Borne after only 20 months in office constitutes a political throw of the dice, ahead of European elections in June. These promise to be a torrid affair for the president's centrist Renaissance (RE) party. Marine Le Pen's radical right Rassemblement enjoys up to a 10-point lead in polls, and following the 2022 elections – at which RE lost its majority – has made hay in the national assembly. In stark contrast to his predecessor, the telegenic Mr Attal has won a deserved reputation as a skilled communicator and enjoys stellar personal poll ratings. Usefully, his age also puts him in the same generational cohort as Rassemblement's 28-year-old president, Jordan Bardella. The gamble in the Elysée is that a change of tone will deliver a change in parliamentary dynamics, and a change in the overall numbers. Amid predictions that nationalist radical right parties are set to become the third-biggest force in the European parliament – overtaking the liberal bloc – it must be hoped that Mr Macron's bet comes off. But the president may be investing too much faith in mere mood music. As Ms Borne discovered to her cost, the absence of a majority in the assembly has made the role of prime minister in Mr Macron's second term a borderline impossible job. On the government's fiercely resisted policy of raising the retirement age – which Mr Macron ill-advisedly pursued at the height of a cost of living crisis – Ms Borne was roundly condemned for legislating by decree after failing to garner the necessary votes. Last month, a new immigration law was only passed when draconian new restrictions on benefits for legal migrants were added, at the insistence of the centre-right. Gallingly, Ms Le Pen hailed this moment as "an ideological victory", as her party voted for the beefed-up bill. The political career of Mr Attal, like those of Mr Macron and Ms Borne, began in the Socialist party. But to the dismay of left-leaning RE deputies, who voted en masse against the new immigration law, the right has effectively dictated terms to the minority administration. In consequence, Mr Attal will almost certainly focus on the atmospheric and steer clear of major new legislative battles. Beyond June's elections, Mr Macron's presidency may thus be fated to end with a dying fall, as the internal race to succeed him begins. If he can avoid mistakes while injecting a new sense of optimism, France's new prime minister will be one of the favourites to win the right to take on Ms Le Pen in 2027. But amid signs that a growing number of voters see this beleaguered government as something of a spent force, taking the helm is a huge gamble for Mr Attal, as well as Mr Macron.

Israeli shift in military tactics threatens to be a double-edged sword

US pressure on Israel to switch gears and focus on targeted precision strikes and killings, rather than indiscriminate bombing of the Gaza Strip, potentially heightens the risk of the war escalating into a regional bust-up and expanding beyond the Middle East. The heightened risk suggests US efforts to allow Israel to continue attempting to destroy Hamas while minimising civilian Palestinian casualties could backfire. This would further underline that the only way of preventing an escalation, protecting innocent lives, and securing the release of Hamas-held hostages, is a ceasefire. Even so, US Secretary of State Antony Blinken, on his fifth visit to Tel Aviv since the war began, reaffirmed in talks with Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu, "Israel's right to prevent another October 7 from occurring" but "stressed the importance of avoiding civilian harm, protecting civilian infrastructure, and ensuring the distribution of humanitarian assistance throughout Gaza." Mr. Blinken was referring to Hamas' October 7 attack on Israel that sparked the Israeli assault on Gaza. His reference to infrastructure constituted the United States' first public criticism of Israeli attacks on Gaza hospitals, schools, and other civilian infrastructure. Signalling differences with Mr. Blinken, Mr. Netanyahu's office did not issue a readout after the meeting. Even so, US reluctance to go beyond verbal pressure by threatening consequences if Israel fails to heed US advice may stem from a belief that America's leverage on Israel has diminished over time in economic and political terms. US financial support amounted in 1981 to ten per cent of Israel's GDP. The US' annual US\$4 billion allocation was in 2021 only good for one per cent of GDP. Moreover, Israel today produces many of its most essential weapons domestically, making it less dependent on US arms sales. In addition, Israel concluded in 1991 that it could no longer blindly rely on US protection after the United States did not come to its aid when Iraq fired Scud missiles at the Jewish state during the Gulf war. The attack, the second in 24 hours, occurred as Mr. Blinken discussed Israeli military strategy with Mr. Netanyahu and members of his war cabinet. Israel targeted a second car, hours after the attack, close to the home of Wassim Al-Tawil, a senior Hezbollah commander killed together with another of the group's fighters in a drone attack on Monday, as they travelled by car north of the band. The car was targeted as Mr. Al-Tawil was laid to rest. "We're targeting Hezbollah operatives, infrastructure, and systems they've set up to deter Israel," said newly appointed Israeli Foreign Minister Israel Katz. The United States has been pushing Israel to scale back its bombing of Gaza that has killed more than 23,000 people, a majority innocent Palestinian civilians, withdraw troops from the Strip, and focus on militant Palestinian targets. The killings of senior Hezbollah, Hamas, and Iranian commanders threaten to push Iranian-supported forces to retaliate in ways that could escalate hostilities beyond Gaza and the so far narrow Israel-Lebanese border band. In an indication of how hostilities could escalate, Hezbollah attacked an Israeli air traffic control base south of the band on Monday in retaliation for last week's assassination in Beirut of a senior Hamas official, Salah al Arouri, and Israeli strikes in response. The fact that a majority of Israel's targeted killings have been Hezbollah operatives likely has much to do with US, French, and German efforts to prevent an escalation of exchanges between Israel and the Lebanese group and negotiate a definitive demarcation of the two countries' borders. Hezbollah has rejected Israeli demands to withdraw to a line 30 kilometres north of the border beyond the Litani River. Hezbollah has also said it would agree to Lebanese government

border demarcation talks only after Israel halts its assault on Gaza and accepts a permanent ceasefire. Israel has threatened to militarily push Hezbollah back to the Litani if diplomatic efforts fail. On a visit this week to Israeli troops on the Lebanese border, Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu warned, "If Hezbollah chooses to start an all-out war then it will...turn Beirut and southern Lebanon, not far from here, into Gaza and Khan Yunis." The Israeli attacks on Hezbollah appear designed to force the group to choose between withdrawing and sparking an all-out war that bankrupt Lebanon cannot afford and many Lebanese do not want. Hezbollah leader Hasan Nasrallah has indicated that he does not seek an escalation of hostilities but that his group was prepared if Israel opted for a full-fledged conflagration. Israel's apparent focus on Hezbollah operatives may also be because of its inability so far to take out Hamas' most senior Gaza leaders, including Yahya Sinwar, more than three months into the war. Last week, David Barnea, the head of Mossad, Israel's foreign intelligence service vowed to hunt down every Hamas member involved in the group's October 7 attack on Israel, no matter where they are. Mr. Barnea compared the manhunt to Israel's pursuit of Palestinian Black September after it attacked the Israeli team at the 1972 Munich Olympics and killed 11 athletes. "This is our Munich. We will do this everywhere, in Gaza, in the West Bank, in Lebanon, in Turkey, in Qatar. It will take a few years, but we will be there to do it," Mr. Bar said. While Hamas has yet to retaliate for Mr. Al-Arouri's killing, a senior official warned that it may expand the war beyond Israel and Palestine if the United States continued to support Israel. "The West in general, and the US government in particular, need to reconsider their position because this will have consequences... If the U.S. insists on its position, our entire nation will view it, and treat it, as an enemy... This conflict could go beyond Palestine's borders, and expand in scope," said Hamas official Sami Abu Zuhri. Mr. Abu Zuhri's warning coincided with a call by the Islamic State for lone-wolf attacks on civilian targets in Europe and the United States, including churches and synagogues.

The implications of Myanmar junta's surprise setback

IN a stunning turn of events, the Myanmar military's Regional Operations Command in Laukkai last week surrendered to the Myanmar National Democratic Alliance Army, marking a significant and unexpected shift in the ongoing conflict. The implications of this surrender, coupled with the Three Brotherhood Alliance's rapid gains across northern Shan state, pose a major problem for the military in the northern region and present a formidable challenge for junta chief Gen. Min Aung Hlaing. The fall of the Laukkai command to the Myanmar National Democratic Alliance Army, a prominent ethnic armed group, underscores the volatile nature of the military's hold on power. Laukkai, a key strategic outpost, was considered a stronghold for the Tatmadaw, Myanmar's military. The surrender means not only a loss of territory, but it also lands a blow on the military's morale and is an assertion of the rebels' resilience. The Three Brotherhood Alliance, consisting of the Myanmar National Democratic Alliance Army, the Ta'ang National Liberation Army and the Arakan Army, has capitalized on this momentum, making rapid gains across northern Shan. Their coordinated efforts have seen them overrun hundreds of military outposts, seize key towns and take control of crucial border crossings with China. The rebels' success not only demonstrates their military capabilities but also showcases the fragility of the military's control over the northern territories. This strategic setback is a major concern for Hlaing. The junta's loss of control over these border areas threatens to disrupt trade and create a security vacuum that could have far-reaching consequences for regional stability. The international community's response to the escalating crisis will also play a crucial role. The UN and major world powers must address the root causes of the conflict, emphasizing a diplomatic resolution that respects the rights and aspirations of Myanmar's diverse ethnic groups. Sanctions and condemnations alone may not be sufficient. A concerted effort to engage all stakeholders in meaningful dialogue is essential to laying the groundwork for a lasting peace. The junta's

stubbornness could exacerbate the crisis, leading to more bloodshed and instability. For Hlaing, the situation in the north presents a significant strategic problem. The loss of Laukkai and the broader gains made by the Three Brotherhood Alliance underscore the junta's vulnerability. It is no longer just a matter of quelling dissent but a complex and multifaceted challenge that requires a nuanced and inclusive approach. The junta's refusal to engage in dialogue with ethnic minorities and address their legitimate grievances has created a power vacuum that the rebels are keen to fill. The military's response to this setback will be closely watched. Will it intensify its campaign, further alienating local communities, or will it reconsider its approach and seek a negotiated settlement? The junta's stubbornness could exacerbate the crisis, leading to more bloodshed and instability. Alternatively, a shift toward a more inclusive and conciliatory stance could pave the way for a sustainable solution to the long-standing ethnic conflicts that have plagued Myanmar for decades. The surrender of the Myanmar military's Regional Operations Command in Laukkai, coupled with the Three Brotherhood Alliance's rapid gains across Shan, represents a major defeat for the junta in the northern region. The implications of this setback extend beyond the military sphere, affecting the junta's legitimacy, regional stability and international relations. The conflict in northern Myanmar demands a comprehensive and inclusive approach that addresses the root causes of ethnic tensions and promotes a sustainable path to peace. The ball is now in Hlaing's court and the decisions he makes in the coming days and weeks will shape the trajectory of Myanmar's future.

PCB and Cricket Australia set BBL-PSL schedule

LAHORE: The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) and Cricket Australia have reached an agreement with regards to scheduling of the Pakistan Super League (PSL) and the Big Bash League (BBL). According to PCB Chief Operating Officer (COO) Salman Naseer, there won't be any clashes between PSL and BBL in the future. The two boards will also look to ensure that they can provide a better pool of players for both leagues going forward. "We are thankful to Cricket Australia since we had good interaction with them over the past few months," said Naseer during a press conference in Lahore on Wednesday. "Due to the increasing number of leagues all over the world, there are a lot of clashes in terms of scheduling. Bearing this in mind, we have reached a principle understanding with



Cricket Australia about ensuring that there won't be any clashes as far as BBL and PSL is concerned in the future. "We also talked about player availability keeping in mind that the players have a lot of options, in terms of leagues, and we need to be careful about their workload

management. In the future, both the boards will assist each other with regards to a good pool of players for both PSL and BBL while also ensuring better handling of No Objection Certificates." Meanwhile, as part of the agreement between the two boards, Pakistan women's, Shaheens,

and U19 will tour Australia more frequently in order to get acclimatised with the conditions. During the press conference, which was also attended by PCB Management Committee Chairman Zaka Ashraf and PSL Commissioner Naila Bhatti, the board also confirmed that PSL's media

rights have been sold for the next two seasons. According to local media, the PSL television rights for Pakistan territory have been sold for Rs.6.30 billion in an auction. Meanwhile, the digital rights were sold for Rs1.90 billion. The live-streaming and broadcast rights saw an increase of 113 and 45 per cent for the 2024 and 2025 editions, respectively. Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) management committee chairman Zaka Ashraf also said that the fringe players had gained "good experience" against Australia. He made it clear that the PCB had held talks with Cricket Australia on various matters. "The PCB and Cricket Australia will move forward together," Ashraf said. Expressing his thoughts on the occasion, PCB COO Salman Naseer said: "Due to the surge in franchise cricket, there exists a clash in the cricket calendar." "The PCB and Cricket Australia will extend cooperation in terms of organising the fixture schedule," he said.

Fakhar ready to bat at any positions against NZ

AUCKLAND: Top-order batter Fakhar Zaman has stated that he is ready to bat in the lower order for Pakistan during the T20I series against New Zealand, commencing on 12 January in Auckland. While talking to the media here on Wednesday, Fakhar Zaman opened up about the reports of him dropping down the batting order from his usual number three spot as Saim Ayub is expected to open the innings with Mohammad Rizwan. "I don't view it [batting lower

down the order] as a sacrifice. If the team management doesn't see me fitting into the opening position, it suggests they believe I can contribute to winning matches batting lower in the order," said Zaman. The 33-year-old batter also expressed his optimism about the competition for spots in the team. "Given the competition for spots in the national team, I consider myself fortunate to secure a place in the playing XI, especially with the impressive

performances from players like Babar, Rizwan, and Saim." He further mentioned that he would be happy to play at any number, be it number six or seven to help his side. "If Babar or Rizwan come at one down, then I can come at two down. I will be happy to play at number six or seven even," he concluded. Pakistan's T20I squad partook in the training session today to boost their preparations ahead of the first T20I against New Zealand. The players carried out a robust three-hour training session, harnessing their batting, bowling and feeling skills by partaking in different drills to prepare for the upcoming five-match T20I series against New Zealand. – Agencies

Sandeep gets eight year of jail for rape

KATHMANDU: Nepal's cricketer Sandeep Lamichhane received an eight-year jail sentence from a Kathmandu court for rape on Wednesday, as reported by the Kathmandu District Court. Last month, a single-judge bench of the Kathmandu District Court found the Nepal legspinner guilty of raping an 18-year-old woman, and on January 10, the sentence was officially declared. The court imposed a fine of Rs300,000 (approximately US\$260) and mandated Lamichhane to pay Rs200,000 (approximately US\$156) in compensation to the victim. In early September of 2023, Lamichhane, who was then the captain of Nepal, faced suspension from the Cricket Association of Nepal (CAN) following an arrest warrant issued in Kathmandu related to the case. This development came after a complaint had been lodged against Lamichhane at a Kathmandu police station.

While participating in CPL 2022 with Jamaica Tallawahs in the West Indies, Lamichhane was obliged to leave the tournament immediately upon the announcement of his suspension. Upon his return to Kathmandu in early October, he was taken into custody. Prior to his arrest, Lamichhane had expressed on Facebook his commitment to "fully cooperate in all stages of the investigation and will fight a legal battle to prove my innocence," referring to the allegations as a "conspiracy and wrongful allegation." In February of the current year, Lamichhane reappeared on the Nepal side amidst protests from rights groups for a Cricket World Cup League 2 tri-series at home against Namibia and Scotland. However, during the games, opposing players refrained from shaking hands with him. Although he was not initially chosen for Nepal's squad in the Cricket World Cup League 2 tri-series in Dubai in early 2023, he later joined the team as an injury replacement. The 23-year-old continued to represent Nepal in subsequent events, including the ODI World Cup qualifier in Zimbabwe in June-July and the ODI Asia Cup in August-September of the previous year. Lamichhane made history as Nepal's inaugural cricketer to compete in the Indian Premier League (IPL) when he debuted for the Delhi Capitals in 2018. The leg-spinner was highly sought after in prominent T20 leagues worldwide, including Australia's Big Bash League (BBL), the Pakistan Super League (PSL), and the CPL. He holds the distinction of being the world's second-fastest bowler to claim 50 ODI wickets and the third-fastest to achieve 50 T20I wickets. – Agencies

The five-a-side Hockey World Cup has also been planned later this month while India are scheduled to visit Pakistan later this month to play the important Davis Cup Group I tie at the Pakistan Sports Complex. The Pakistan Hockey Federation (PHF) is dependent on governmental grants and the government has always provided technical and financial support. The Pakistan Sports Board (PSB) vide letter dated January 2, 2024 has conveyed that following events are scheduled in this month which requires a grant of

Rs 37.50 million for participation in FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifier to be held at Oman from 15th to 21st January 2024. Another Rs25 million for Men's FIH

Hockey 5S World Cup to be held at Oman from 28th to 31st January 2024. A sizable grant for Pakistan team's forthcoming Davis Cup tie against India has



also been approved. Some other federations have also requested to issue grants for their upcoming international tours which was accepted with some cuts. Moreover, it has also been planned to conduct mind games for children of public schools under the Prime Minister's initiative. "In order to ensure participation of Pakistan hockey team and to sponsor other events for the promotion of sports besides conducting mind games under Prime Minister's initiative, the concerned recommended to the prime minister vide Note for the Secretary to the Prime Minister dated January 4, 2024 for provision of ad-

ditional funds amounting to Rs100 million through supplementary grant in favor of Ministry for IPC," the summary approved by the ECC said. "Accordingly, the Prime Minister's office has conveyed that the prime minister is pleased to desire that the matter shall be placed before the Economic Coordination Committee (ECC) of the Federal Cabinet. The improvement in the remittances is expected to fuel the ongoing gradual rally in the rupee against the US dollar and strengthen the market as the current account is expected to be in surplus for the second consecutive month of December 2023. SBP reported that remittances rose 13% compared to \$2.10 billion when compared to December 2022. Inflows also showed an improvement of 5.5% compared to \$2.26 billion in November 2023. Remittances, however, have cumulatively slowed down by 7% in the first half (Jul-Dec) of the current fiscal year 2023-24 to \$13.45 billion compared to \$14.42 billion in the same period of the last fiscal year, according to the central bank.

Over 6,618 migrants perish seeking Spain in 2023

OVIEDO : 2023 was the deadliest year on record for those trying to irregularly migrate to Spain, according to a report published Tuesday by Walking Borders, with 6,618 people losing their lives. The vast majority of the fatalities, 6,007, occurred on attempts to cross the vast ocean separating northwestern Africa from the Canary Islands, making the Canary Islands the most lethal migration route in the world, according to Walking Borders. The Interior Ministry said 39,910 people completed the journey last year, a spike of 154% compared to 2022. Walking Borders said for many of the deaths, search and rescue operations were not mobilized or were delayed for so long that lives were threatened. "The capacity to save lives exists. If we used the same measures that we do to track cruise ships, fishing vessels or other ships with Europeans on board, this massacre would be reduced considerably," the head of Walking Borders, Helena Maleno, said while presenting the report. According to the organization's estimates, 84 boats trying to reach Spain disappeared with everyone on board.—APP

Cubans fear 500% fuel price surge, worsening inflation

HAVANA : Already under the yoke of inflation and product scarcity, many Cubans don't know how they will cope with a new 500-percent surge in the fuel price. The communist island's cash-strapped government announced the five-fold increase Monday with effect from February 1, as part of a series of measures seeking to cut its budget deficit. The cost of a liter of regular gasoline will rise from 25 pesos (20 US cents) to 132 pesos, while the price of premium gasoline will jump from 30 to 156 pesos, it said. To buy ten liters of fuel for his motorbike - enough for a week - Domingo Wong told AFP he would now have to fork over half his monthly salary of about \$21. "Ten liters is what I use in a week without doing anything special, just the daily: going to work, bringing my daughter to school, visiting my sister," the 57-year-old building guard said as he waited patiently in line to fill up his bike. The nation of 11 million people is experiencing its worst economic crisis since the collapse of the Soviet bloc in the 1990s due to consequences of the coronavirus pandemic, the tightening of US sanctions in recent years, and structural weaknesses in the economy. According to official estimates, the Cuban economy shrank by two percent in 2023, while inflation reached 30 percent in 2023. Independent experts say this is likely an under-estimation.—APP

Austin kept cancer diagnosis from the White House

WASHINGTON : President Joe Biden was only told that US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin was being treated for cancer, the White House has said. Mr Austin, 70, was admitted to hospital on 1 January and then to the intensive care unit for complications following surgery in December. He has faced criticism for not telling senior officials about it for days. He has since apologised for not "ensuring the public was appropriately informed". The lag in notifying the White House raised potential national security concerns and issues of transparency within the Biden administration. The defence secretary sits just below the president in the chain of command for the US military, and is one of the most important members of the president's Cabinet. The Pentagon confirmed Mr Austin remained hospitalised on Tuesday.—APP

Which countries back SA in genocide case at ICJ?

Here are countries which welcomed the ICJ case that says Israel is committing genocide against Palestinians in Gaza

NEW YORK: The International Court of Justice (ICJ) based in The Hague will hold its first hearing in South Africa's genocide case against Israel on Thursday, with several countries welcoming the move amid a global chorus for a ceasefire in Gaza. South Africa filed the lawsuit end of December, accusing Israel of genocide in its war on Gaza and seeking a halt to the brutal military assault that has killed more than 23,000 Palestinians, nearly 10,000 of them children. The 84-page filing by South Africa says Israel violated the 1948 Genocide Convention, drawn up in the aftermath of World War II and the Holocaust. Both Israel and South Africa are signatories to the United Nations Genocide Convention, which

gives the ICJ - the highest UN legal body - jurisdiction to rule on disputes over the treaty. All states that signed the convention are obliged to not commit genocide and also to prevent and punish it. The treaty defines genocide as "acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national, ethnical, racial or religious group". Here's what we know about the countries backing South Africa in its case against Israel, and the countries that oppose the case at the world court. Which countries have welcomed South Africa's ICJ case against Israel? The Organization of Islamic Countries (OIC): The 57-member bloc, which includes Saudi Arabia, Iran, Pakistan and Morocco, voiced their support for the case on December 30. Malaysia: In a statement released on January 2, the Malaysian Ministry of Foreign

Affairs welcomed the South African application. It reiterated a call for an independent Palestinian state "based on the pre-1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital". Turkey: Turkish Ministry of Foreign Affairs spokesperson Oncu Keceli posted on X on January 3 welcoming South Africa's move. Jordan: Foreign Minister Ayman Safadi said on January 4 that Amman would back South Africa. Bolivia: On Sunday, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Bolivia dubbed South Africa's move as historic, becoming the first Latin American country to back the ICJ case against Israel. The Maldives, Namibia and Pakistan: The three countries expressed support for the genocide case filed by South Africa during a UN General Assembly session on Tuesday. Besides countries, many advocacy groups and civil

society groups worldwide have also joined South Africa's call. These include Terreiro Pindorama in Brazil, Asociacion Nacional de Amistad Italia-Cuba in Italy, and Collectif Judeo Arabe et Citoyen pour la Palestine in France, reported independent outlet Common Dreams. Which countries filed the ICC request earlier? Bolivia also pointed out it had earlier filed a request to International Criminal Court (ICC) Prosecutor Karim Khan alongside South Africa, Bangladesh, Comoros, and Djibouti to investigate the situation in Palestine. Khan said he received the request on November 30. The ICC and the ICJ are sometimes conflated with one another. Both the courts are located in The Hague, Netherlands. While the purpose of the ICJ is to resolve conflicts between

states, the ICC prosecutes individuals for committing crimes, according to the University of Melbourne's Pursuit platform. While states cannot be sued at the ICC, the prosecutor can open an investigation where crimes, including genocide, were likely committed. Who is not backing South Africa's ICJ case? The United States has voiced its opposition to the genocide case. National security spokesperson John Kirby called South Africa's submission "meritless, counterproductive, and completely without any basis" during a White House press briefing on January 3. Israeli President Isaac Herzog told US Secretary of State Antony Blinken on Tuesday that "there is nothing more atrocious and preposterous" than the lawsuit. Herzog also thanked Blinken for Washington's support of Israel.

Fair media is indispensable for prosperous

ANKARA : Türkiye's Communications Director Fahrettin Altun has commemorated January 10 Working Journalists Day, stressing that fair media culture is an indispensable element of a more prosperous and peaceful world. In a statement released by the Directorate of Communications on Wednesday, Altun stressed that "one of the most important problems of today's world is the 'Crisis of Truth,'" with incessant disinformation campaigns becoming a major challenge around the globe. With communication opportunities improving day by day and access to information becoming easier, a crucial need has emerged to access accurate information in its purest and simplest form, he said. "All journalists who work in the light of the truth and in line with the principles of professional ethics should be recognised as members of a highly respected profession," Altun said. "We consider the maintenance of a fair media culture in our country and the international arena as one of the indispensable elements of a more prosperous and peaceful world." The communications director sent his prayers to the journalists who lost their lives in the line of duty, especially in Gaza.—APP

2 dead after migrant boat sinks off Greek island

ATHENS: At least two people died when a boat carrying migrants capsized Wednesday off the Greek island of Lesbos in the Aegean Sea, port police said, while up to 16 people were missing. An inflatable dinghy from the nearby Turkish coast ran aground on the rocky shores of Agios Georgios, east of Lesbos, around 3:00 am local time (01:00 GMT), pushed by strong winds. According to those rescued, 36 people were on board the boat. Authorities said they had found 18 migrants who had managed to get off the dinghy, plus two bodies in the sea near the coast, according to an official from the coast guard's office. Authorities say the other 16 people dispersed after the boat ran aground and were still missing. Coast guard patrol boats were not able Wednesday to carry out searches at sea due to a sailing ban because of bad weather. The island of Lesbos is one of the gateways for migrants seeking to enter the European Union, many making perilous journeys by sea.—Agencies

Iran develops new drone for Russian

LONDON: Iran has developed a new drone that could be used by Russia to strike Western air defense systems in Ukraine, News media reported on Wednesday. A security source told Sky that the Shahed-107 drone, part of Iran's Shahed family of unmanned aerial vehicles, could operate as both an explosive and reconnaissance aircraft. Several units are believed to have been offered to Russia as part of an initial \$2 million deal. Tehran is known to have supplied Moscow with significant quantities of Shahed-136 kamikaze drones, which can fly long distances and explode on impact, threatening Ukrainian infrastructure and air defenses. The source said Iran's development of the Shahed-107 shows "the significant force design work Iran is engaged in to support Russia's interests regarding Ukraine." With a range of up to 1,500 km, the Shahed-107 can be launched from a vehicle and poses a major threat to Ukraine's air defenses, which rely heavily on systems provided by the US and other Western countries. The latest Shahed model is expected to be fitted with a video transmitter, providing Russian forces with the ability to select targets on the front in eastern Ukraine. The source told Sky that the drone was tested in a trial by Russian and Iranian security forces at a base in central Iran. The development of the new Shahed model is the latest evidence of growing armaments transfers between the two countries.—APP

Kim reiterates to 'annihilate' South, calling it 'principal enemy'

Kim Jong-un stresses Pyongyang would not take unilateral action but has 'no intention of avoiding a war as well'

PYONGYANG : North Korea's leader Kim Jong-un has reiterated that Pyongyang will "annihilate" South Korea, dubbing it as its "principal enemy." "If the ROK dares attempt to use armed forces against its sovereignty and security and such opportunity comes, we will have no hesitation in annihilating the ROK by mobilizing all means and forces in our hands," Kim said. ROK stands for the Republic of South Korea, the official name of South Korea, while DPRK, or the Democratic People's Republic of Korea is the official name of North Korea. The Korean Peninsula was divided during a war in the 1950s. Kim's statement came during an inspection of North Korea's major munitions factories in the past two days, Pyongyang-based KCNA reported. This

is the second time in a month Kim warned to "annihilate" South Korea. On New Year's eve, he ordered North Korea's top commanding officers to "thoroughly annihilate" South Korea and the US if they initiated a military confrontation. Tensions on the Korean Peninsula have long persisted as the US, South Korea and Japan held, both separately and jointly, military drills while Pyongyang fired missiles and also launched a military satellite. Early this month, Seoul claimed North fired artillery shells in waters off its western coast but North denied and said it was a "deceptive operation" to assess South's response capacity. Kim defined South Korea as a "state most hostile toward" North Korea which has "pursued a history of vicious confrontation with bloodshot eyes to overthrow our regime and social system for nearly 80 years." Calling for bolstering up the military ca-

pabilities for "self-defense and the nuclear war deterrent first of all," Kim said: "We would by no means unilaterally bring a great event by the overwhelming strength in the Korean Peninsula but we have no intention of avoiding a war as well." Earlier on, Kim visits arms factories amid criticism over trade with Russia North Korean leader Kim Jong Un visited arms factories this week, state media outlet Korean Central News Agency (KCNA) reported on Wednesday (Jan 10) as the United States and its partners condemned the country's arms transfers with Russia. Kim also highlighted recent "shortcomings" in the organisation of munitions production and called for readjustment while emphasising the "strategic importance of the production of major weapons", state media said. KCNA photos of Kim's visit to a munitions factory showed him inspecting mobile

short-range missile launch vehicles. His visit comes as nearly 50 countries condemned Russia's procurement and use of North Korean ballistic missiles against Ukraine. "Russia's use of DPRK ballistic missiles in Ukraine also provides valuable technical and military insights to the DPRK," the joint statement said on Tuesday, using the initials of North Korea's official name. White House national security adviser Jake Sullivan in a call with his South Korean counterpart, Chang Ho-jin, on Tuesday "condemned in the strongest possible terms" North Korea's transfer of the missiles to Russia, the White House said. US National Security Council spokesman John Kirby said on Tuesday that after the initially reported uses of North Korean ballistic missiles on Dec 30 and Jan 2, Russia had fired more such weapons at Ukraine, including one that landed in Kharkiv.

Gunmen burst into Ecuador TV studio live on air

QUITO : Armed men wearing balaclavas burst into the studio of a public television station on Tuesday in Ecuador's drug violence-torn port city of Guayaquil, taking hostage several journalists and staff members, live footage showed. "Don't shoot, please don't shoot," one woman shouted as gunshots rang out while the attackers, carrying rifles and grenades, forced terrified crew of the TC broadcaster onto the ground. "National Police units in Quito and Guayaquil have been alerted about this criminal act and are already on the scene," police said in a brief statement to journalists. The live broadcast continued uninterrupted, although lights went off on set. About 30 minutes after the gunmen appeared, police could be seen entering. "Police, police," called out one man in uniform. "We have a wounded colleague," a man replied. "Please, they came in to kill us. God don't let this happen. The criminals are on air," one of the journalists told AFP in a WhatsApp message. The incident came as Ecuador's new president, 36-year-old Daniel Noboa, grappled with a security nightmare after the escape from prison of one of the country's most high profile gangsters, Jose Adolfo Macias, known as "Fito." Noboa declared a 60-day country-wide state of emergency Monday, including in Ecuador's notoriously violent prisons, and imposed a nighttime curfew. In response, gangsters took several police officers hostage, and released a chilling video in which one of them was forced to read out a message addressed to Noboa. "You declared war, you will get war," the clearly terrified officer reads. "You declared a state of emergency. We declare police, civilians and soldiers to be the spoils of war." Noboa was elected in October on a pledge to fight rampant drug-related crime and violence in the South American country - once considered a bastion of peace, but now a key stop on the US- and Europe-bound cocaine trade.—APP

Moon mission fails and NASA program delayed

WASHINGTON : A private US lunar lander mission is doomed to fail, and NASA pushes back plans to return astronauts to the Moon. The twin developments Tuesday represent blows to America's ambitions to stimulate a commercial space economy, develop a lasting presence on Earth's nearest neighbor, and use it as a jump off point for Mars. China meanwhile is looming in the rear view mirror, targeting 2030 for a crewed landing. Astrobotic's Peregrine Lunar Lander blasted off Monday from Florida's Cape Canaveral Space Force Station, then successfully separated from its rocket. Just hours later, though, Astrobotic reported an inability to orient Peregrine's solar panel towards the Sun and keep its battery topped up. A propulsion system glitch was found to be causing a critical loss of fuel and damaging the spacecraft's exterior. The company said Monday the mission had "no chance of soft landing" - dashing hopes for the first ever successful landing by a non-government mission, and America's first soft touchdown on the Moon since Apollo 17 in 1972. NASA has paid Astrobotic more than \$100 million to ship scientific hardware to the Moon to answer questions about surface composition and radiation, as the US space agency prepares to send astronauts back for long term missions. The failure doesn't mean the strategy of ramping up commercial partnerships is innately flawed, Michael Lembeck, a former NASA official turned associate professor in aerospace engineering at the University of Illinois told AFP.

Zelensky in Baltic tour, seeks security and EU support

KYIV: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has arrived in the Lithuanian capital for an unannounced visit to the Baltic states, staunch allies of the war-torn country. The three Baltic states - all former Soviet republics which are now EU and NATO members - are among Ukraine's staunchest allies. "Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania are our reliable friends and principled partners. Today, I arrived in Vilnius before going to Tallinn and Riga," Zelenskyy said on social media platform X. "Security, EU and NATO integration, cooperation on electronic warfare and drones, and further coordination of European support are all on the agenda," he said. The Baltic tour marks Zelenskyy's first offi-

cial trip abroad this year. The focus of the Baltic trip, Zelenskyy said on his official Telegram channel, will be security concerns, Ukraine's hopes to join the European Union and NATO, and building partnerships in drone production and electronic warfare capacities. The small countries on the Baltic Sea are among Ukraine's staunchest political, financial and military supporters. They have pushed Kyiv's other Western allies to provide increasingly sophisticated weapons since Russia's full-scale invasion in February 2022. Russia's belligerence toward its neighbor Ukraine has some in the Baltics worried that they could be Moscow's next target. The three countries were seized and annexed by Josef Stalin during World War II before gaining independ-



ence again with the breakup of the Soviet Union in 1991. They joined NATO in 2004, placing themselves under the military protection of the U.S. and its Western allies. Zelenskyy, in his Telegram message, expressed gratitude for their "uncompromising" support of Ukraine over the past 10 years, referring to 2014 when Russia's aggression

started the illegal annexation of Ukraine's Crimea peninsula. Russia's recent escalation of missile and drone attacks is stretching Ukraine's air defense resources, a Ukrainian air force official said Tuesday, leaving the country vulnerable unless it can secure further weapons supplies. Zelenskyy's energetic international diplomacy during the war has been essential to maintain pressure on friendly countries to keep supplying Kyiv with billions of dollars in weaponry, from German Leopard tanks to U.S. Patriot missile systems and Storm Shadow cruise missiles from the U.K. However, material support has recently tailed off. A plan by the administration of U.S. President Joe Biden to send to Kyiv billions of dollars in further aid is stuck in Congress, and Europe's pledge in March to

provide 1 million artillery shells within 12 months has come up short, with only about 300,000 delivered so far. Russia gears up for Drel glide bomb production amid Ukraine war Russia plans to start serial production of its new glide Drel bomb this year, the state TASS news agency has cited a representative of the Rosstec state defence conglomerate as saying in remarks published. The bombs, some of Russia's newest weapons, are capable of flying independently using a gliding flight path onto a target at a greater distance and opening above it at "the right moment," TASS reported. "To date, the product has passed all types of tests," TASS cited an unnamed representative at Rosstec as saying. "The production of the first batch of the Drel aerial bomb is planned for 2024."

Tussle in PPP erupts over ticket distribution

KARACHI: The tussle within the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) erupted over the ticket distribution for the forthcoming general elections. The PPP's former provincial minister, Mumtaz Jakhri, had decided on Wednesday to lock horns with the PPP candidate in the upcoming elections. Expressing his thoughts, Jakhri said, "I have not parted ways with the PPP, but the party itself has separated me. The PPP had the policy of awarding tickets to the candidates who clinched victory in the 2018 general elections." "What was my mistake that the ticket was not awarded to me? Now I will contest the elections from PS-3 as an independent candidate," a tussle in PPP erupts over ticket distribution. Earlier, it was reported that the PPP Central Executive Committee (CEC) endorsed former foreign minister Bilawal Bhutto Zardari as the party's official candidate for the position of Prime Minister. The decision was met with unanimous approval during the hybrid meeting held at Bilawal House, where key party members gathered to deliberate on key matters. Chaired jointly by Asif Zardari and Bilawal Bhutto, the meeting addressed pivotal issues such as the upcoming general elections, the party's election campaign, and the formulation of the party manifesto.

Blinken to make surprise visit to Bahrain

TEL AVIV: US top diplomat Antony Blinken will make a surprise visit to Bahrain Wednesday, a State Department official said, the latest leg of a crisis tour of the Middle East. After meeting Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas in the occupied West Bank city of Ramallah, Blinken will fly to Bahrain for talks with King Hamad on preventing a regional escalation of the Israel-Palestine war in Gaza. The Gulf kingdom is a key partner of Washington and hosts the US Navy's Fifth Fleet. Bahrain last month joined a 10-country naval task force announced by the United States to protect the vital Red Sea shipping route. Blinken is on his fourth Middle East tour since war broke out with the October 7 attacks on Israel. The US top diplomat said Tuesday that the war had exacted "far too high" a toll among civilians in Gaza, particularly children, and called for more food and medical aid to be delivered to the territory. Israel's relentless offensive has killed 23,200 people in Gaza, most of them women and children, according to the health ministry in the Hamas-run territory. - APP

Abbas reiterates Gaza strip is integral part of Palestine

President Abbas stressed the need to immediately stop the war of extermination against the Palestinian people in Gaza and West Bank

RAMALLAH: The President of the State of Palestine Mahmoud Abbas received US Secretary of State Anthony Blinken at the presidential headquarters in the city of Ramallah. The President discussed with the US Secretary of State the latest developments in the Palestinian territories, the efforts made to stop the Israeli aggression against Palestinian people in the Gaza Strip and the West Bank, including Jerusalem, and the importance of accelerating the entry of humanitarian aid into the Gaza Strip, and enabling shelter centers and hospitals to operate as they provide what is necessary to alleviate the suffering of citizens. President Abbas warned of the danger of the measures taken by the Israeli occupation authorities aimed at displacing Palestinian people from the Gaza Strip or the West Bank, including Jerusalem, which were revealed by statements issued by Israeli ministers and officials, which call for the expulsion of the Palestinian people from their land, stressing the complete rejection of the displacement of any Palestini-



an citizen, whether in the Gaza Strip or the West Bank, adding that "we will not allow it to happen." The President reiterated that the Gaza Strip is an integral part of the Palestinian state, noting that it is not possible to accept or deal with the plans of the occupation authorities to separate it, or cut off any part of it, stressing the need to release Palestinian clearance funds immediately, because their withholding violates agreements and international law. The President stressed that the Gaza Strip has priority, and Palestinian people, who fall under the responsibility of the State of Palestine and its administration, will not be abandoned. President Abbas stressed the need to immediately stop the war of extermination against the Palestinian people in Gaza and the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, so that the political solution based on international legitimacy can be implemented, starting with the State of Palestine gaining full membership in the United Nations by a decision of the Security Council, and convening an international peace conference to end the Israeli occupation of the land of the State of Palestine, with East Jerusalem as its capital, which achieves peace and security for all.

Parvez, Moonis Elahi out of election race

LAHORE: The appeal challenging the rejection of nomination papers for former Punjab chief minister and PTI leader Chaudhry Parvez Elahi, his wife Qaisara Elahi, and his son Moonis Elahi was turned down. The decision, pronounced by Justice Ahmad Nadeem Arshad, dismissed Elahi's appeal filed for various constituencies, including NA-64 Gujarat, PP-32, PP-34 and NA-59 Tala Gang. Moonis Elahi's appeal against rejected papers in NA-64 Gujarat, PP-32, PP-34 and NA-69 Mandi Bahaudin constituencies were also dismissed. Additionally, Elahi's wife Qaisara Elahi's appeal for acceptance in all constituencies was rejected. Yesterday, the Lahore High Court's Appellate Tribunal reserved its judgment on the matter.

Punjab suspends classes for one week

LAHORE: Caretaker Punjab Chief Minister Mohsin Naqvi on Wednesday announced a one-week suspension of classes for students in grade one and below. This decision comes as the province grapples with cold wave. Naqvi made this declaration during an urgent session held at Lahore's Children's Hospital, where he addressed the unfortunate demise of 36 children due to pneumonia. Consequently, exams for grades 1-10 have been postponed. Highlighting the alarming statistic that eight out of 10 children are currently battling pneumonia, Naqvi directed schools to cease morning assemblies. Stressing the importance of keeping children with pneumonia at home, he urged vaccination for both children and the elderly to curb the spread. This move follows the reopening of schools post winter vacations, initiated on December 18, 2023. In efforts to adapt to the inclement weather, the provincial government previously adjusted school hours from January 10 to January 22, starting at 9:30am.

Pak-Qatar joint aerial exercise 'ZILZAL-II' kicks off in Qatar

DOHA: Pakistan Air Force and Qatar Emiri Air Force are all geared up to participate in joint aerial Exercise Zilzal-II, commencing in Qatar. First held in the year 2020, Zilzal-II air exercise is the 2nd in the series of these exercises, hosted by State of Qatar. The exercise is one of the most complex joint air force exercises, which aims at promoting interoperability between the two allied nations while providing an opportunity for shared learning. The exercise will mimic a near realistic aerial warfare scenario coupled with real-time opportunity for the participating Air Forces to test their operational readiness. China tells US it will 'never compromise' on Taiwan

BEIJING: China vowed on Wednesday it will "never compromise" on Taiwan and told the United States to stop providing military aid, days ahead of a crucial election on the self-ruled island. China claims Taiwan, which holds elections on Saturday, as part of its territory and has vowed to seize it one day. The election is being closely watched - including by policymakers in Beijing and Washington - as its outcome will impact the future of Taiwan's relations with an increasingly assertive China. In their first defence talks of the year, held at the Pentagon on Monday and Tuesday, Chinese officials demanded that Washington "stop arming Taiwan, and oppose Taiwan's 'independence'", according to a Chinese defence ministry readout. The officials said Beijing would "never compromise or back down" on the territory's status, the readout said on Wednesday. According to the Pentagon's readout on Tuesday, the United States reaffirmed its calls for "peace and stability" across the Taiwan Strait that separates Taiwan from China. Michael Chase, the Pentagon's deputy assistant secretary for China, Taiwan and Mongolia, restated the United States' commitment to its "One China" policy, which emphasises it does not support Taiwanese independence. Washington has provided Taiwan with military aid under an assistance programme aimed at foreign governments, prompting frequent criticism from Beijing. US President Joe Biden and Chinese leader Xi Jinping agreed in November to restart military talks between the two countries, after being put on hold for more than a year. Relations between Beijing and Washington had nosedived in recent years on flashpoint issues from technology and trade to human rights, but the two presidents described their November meeting as a success.

Enforced disappearances Intelligence officials should be prosecuted

ISLAMABAD: Justice Mohsin Akhtar Kayani of Islamabad High Court (IHC) has observed that enforced disappearances take place because state institutions do not believe in the rule of law and called for prosecuting intelligence agencies' officials. "Is it difficult that police will write a supplementary [statement in FIR] and make the intelligence officers accused? Time will come when intelligence officers will be prosecuted," the IHC judge remarked during a hearing of a petition filed by lawyer Imaan Mazari seeking recovery of missing Baloch students on Wednesday. Justice Kayani said the prime minister, secretaries of interior and defense must give an affidavit that enforced disappearance will not happen in the future. "Police are the front face of the state, other institutions are not..." he added. The IHC judge said trials of terrorists are held in anti-terrorism courts. "Is it forbidden to hold the trial of Baloch extremists in the same courts?" asked Justice Kayani. The IHC judge also asked the federal government to restore the anti-terrorism courts in Balochistan to hold trials of the accused and added that the petitioners seeking recovery of missing Baloch students did not want to protect terrorists. "The concept of missing persons is only found in Pakistan, not in other countries," the judge noted. During the hearing, the IHC judge also expressed concerns about the well-being of recovered persons. "No missing Baloch person has ever come before me after recovery...I don't know if the recovered people are fine or not?" The IHC judge also inquired from petitioner Mazari whether the protest sit-in staged by protesters against enforced disappearances is still underway.

Dr Mahrang using protests in bid to move abroad

QUETTA: As protests for the recovery of Baloch missing persons continue in Islamabad, caretaker Balochistan Information Minister Jan Achakzai has said that Dr Mahrang Baloch, a human rights activist who is leading Baloch Yakjehti Committee's (BYC) camp in the federal capital, wants to move abroad on asylum. The minister's remark came during a press conference in Quetta on Wednesday, where he shared the Baloch Enforced Disappearance Commission's report on the missing persons. This report may shut the propaganda mills, he added. The interim minister said that the issue of Baloch missing persons has been used as an organised campaign and some people's motivation can also be used in election campaigns and other interests. "Everyone knows Dr Mahrang's motivation. She wants to get asylum in any foreign embassy or settle in any foreign country by getting a visa. She has a dream to become Malala II," Achakzai said.

British HC celebrates UK-Pakistan strong people-to-people ties
