

Ahead of Election 2024 Over 26 killed in two blasts in Balochistan

Blasts target indepdent candidate office in Pishin, JUI-F's leader in Killa Saifullah on eve of general elections

QUETTA: At least 26 people were killed and 50 others injured Wednesday in two separate explosions targeting election candidates in Balochistan, just a day before general elections in Pakistan. A three-day mourning period has been announced by CM Balochistan to mourn the loss of lives in both attacks, Caretaker Information Minister Jan Achakzai said in a presser. The first attack claimed at least 14 people's lives while 25 were injured after an explosion took place outside an independent candidate's office in Balochistan'sPishin, while the second blast took place outside the Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam Fazl (JUI-F) office in the Killa Saifullah district. The Pishin blast took place outside the political office of independent candidate AsfandYar Khan Kakar in Khanozai area. Kakar is contesting elections from NA-265 constituency and Balochistan Assembly constituencies - PB-47 and PB-48 in the February 8 elections.

The injured people have been shifted to the Tehsil Hospital Khanozai, while the bodies have also been transferred, the hospital's MS Dr Habib told media. Dr Habib said most of the injured are in critical condition. Following the blast, an emergency has been imposed across hospitals in Quetta for which additional staff has also been called, the provincial health secretary told Geo News. He added that operation theatres with the staff are ready to treat injured at the Trau-ma Centre, Civil Hospital, BMC, Benazir and Sheikh Zayed Hospital. The independent candidate was not present inside his office when the explosion took place in PP-47 in Pishin. The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has taken notice of the blast and summoned a report from Balochistan

CHAMAN: Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam (F) leader Hafiz Hamdullah survived a gun attack on Wednesday. Police said that unidentified men opened fire on the JUI-F leader's car near the MezaiAdda. Hafiz Hamdullah remained safe in the attack, while the attackers fled in response to the retaliatory firing by Hafiz Hamdullah's guards. The JUI-F leader was travelling from Chaman to Quetta. Earlier, at least 24 people were killed and over 30 injured in two separate bomb blasts targeting the offices of candidates contesting the Feb 8 general elections in Pishin and Killa Saifullah districts of Balochistan on Wednesday. According to details, the terrorism act in Killa Abdullah was carried out outside an election office of Maulana Abdul Wasay, a JUI-F leader, as people had gathered on the premises for a meeting. However, Wasay, who is a JUI-F candidate from PB-3, wasn't present in the meeting when the bomb blast rocked the area, as the

Pak committed to foster democratic process: FO

Security plans have also been finalised to hold the February 8 polls as per electoral laws, says FO spokesperson

ISLAMABAD: The Foreign Office spokesperson Mumtaz Zahra Baloch on Wednesday responded to the remarks made by the United Nations regarding the general elections, saying that Pakistan has finalised the security plans as per its electoral laws. A day

earlier, the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights expressed concern over violent incidents ahead of the upcoming general elections set to take place on February 8 (today). "We deplore all acts of violence against political parties and candidates, and urge the authorities to uphold the fundamental freedoms necessary for an inclusive and meaningful democratic process," spokesperson Liz Throssell said in a statement. In her statement, the UN spokesperson underscored that "no less than 24" incidents have occurred where armed groups have targetted political parties, and called on the authorities to "ensure a fully free and fair vote and to recommit to the democratic process and an

environment that promotes and protects the full range of economic, social, cultural, civil and political rights". In the UN's response, Baloch in her statement, said: "Pakistan is fully committed to fostering an inclusive democratic process, upholding the rule of law and protecting human rights and fundamental freedoms guaranteed in its laws and Constitution." She said that the security plans have also been finalised to hold the February 8 polls, adding that Pakistan's judicial system provides for fair trial and due process. "Domestic legal remedies are available in case of any complaints in the electoral process," said the FO spokesperson. The previous general election campaigns have witnessed spasms of violence, with scores of candidates and voters targeted by bombings and gun attacks and it seems that the 2024 polls are likely to be no different as the country has witnessed a significant surge in targeting of electioneering activities and candidates. Scores of attacks have targetted candidates and electioneering activities of several political parties including the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI), Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP), National Party (NP), Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam-Fazl (JUI-F),

KARACHI Inspector General of Police (IGP), Sindh Riffat Mukhtar Raja Wednesday paid a visit to the Commerce College polling station located near PIDC. Mangla dam water level in continual decline

MIRPUR : As a result of ongoing intermittent heavy snowfall on the upper reaches of the Himalayan state of Jammu and Kashmir, the country's second largest reservoir, Mangla Dam, gradually dries following a continual reduction of inflows followed by increased outflows in the reservoir, where the water level has reduced to a greater extent. The water level in Mangla dam, located in Mirpur district of AJK, was reported as 1150.30 feet on Wednesday, against the conservation maximum level of 1242 feet and the live storage capacity of 1.786 MAF in the reser-

voir, official sources told APP here on Wednesday. The water level in the dam is gradually reducing further, the sources said. Mangla Dam, the largest reservoir in terms of water storage in the country, was filled to its maximum conservation capacity of 1242 feet on August 17 this year as a seasonal impounding of the reservoir, official sources told the news agency. The inflows

and outflows of the Jhelum River at Mangla reservoir were recorded respectively, as 4500 and 30000 cusecs of water from the dam on Wednesday. Meanwhile, the overall position of the river inflows and outflows at Tarbela, Mangla, and Chashma, along with the reservoir levels and the barrages on Wednesday, re-

The Mohtasib processed a record 194,099 complaints during 2023, the registration of complaints witnessed a surge of 18% while the disposal of complaints increased by 22% as compared to 2022. Furthermore, on the recommendations of Wafaqi Mohtasib, 18,000 street children were enrolled in government schools in Islamabad. This was highlighted by Wafaqi Mohtasib (Ombudsman), Mr Ejaz Ahmad Qureshi, during a briefing given to President Dr Arif Alvi, who visited

Wafaqi Mohtasib Office, in Islamabad, today. The meeting was attended by advisors to the Ombudsman and senior officials of the Mohtasib.

While briefing the President, the Federal Ombudsman highlighted the role and performance of the institution. He informed that 193,028 complaints were addressed in 2023 whereas monetary relief of Rs 4.898 billion was provided to the complainants. The meeting was told that 85.4% of Wafagi Mohtasib's decisions were implemented last year, and efforts were underway to further improve the implementation rate. It was apprised that the greater use of technology in Mohtasib had enhanced people's accessibility as 48,190 complaints in 2023 were registered online, which was an increase of 47% from the year 2022.

Similarly, 22,321 complaints were received through Mohtasib's mobile App in 2023 with an increase of 21% as compared to 2022. The meeting was also told that under the Integrated Complaint Resolution System, 18,469 complaints were processed in 2023, whereas Mohtasib's teams had also held Khuli Katcheries, and inspection visits to address people's grievances against government agencies. It was added that 2,113 cases were disposed of through the Informal Resolution of Disputes. The steps taken for the facilitation and resolution of complaints, filed by Overseas Pakistanis, were also highlighted. The Mohtasib further informed that the awareness campaign, undertaken by the Ombudsman, had greatly increased its outreach as well as helped address people's complaints at their

doorsteps. Highlighting the significance of Mohtasib in the provision of expeditious justice and curbing corrupt practices, the President said that Mohtasib was helping promote good governance and delivering free-of-cost justice to people. He stressed the need to further enhance awareness among the people about the role and services of Mohtasib in the provision of timely justice against maladministration of government departments. He also urged the need to further expand the outreach of the Mohtasib to far-flung areas of the country, besides improving people's access to Mohtasib by utilizing modern technology. The President lauded the performance of the Wafaqi Mohtasib and said that it was doing a remarkable job by providing prompt relief to the people.

Cement exports surge, reach \$135.925 million

ISLAMABAD : The exports of cement witnessed an increase of 58.77 per cent during the first six months of the financial year 2023-24, as against the exports of the corresponding months of last year. The cement exports from the country were recorded at US \$135.925 million during July-December (2023-24) against the exports of US \$85.611 million during July- December (2022-23), according to the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). In terms of quantity, the exports of cement also surged by 104.50 per cent going up from 1,713,289 metric tons to 3,503,650 metric tons, according to the data. Meanwhile, year-on-year basis, the exports of cement witnessed an increase of 151.11 per cent during the month of December 2023 as compared to the same month of last year. The exports of cement from the country during December 2023 were recorded at US \$21.927 million against the exports of US \$8.732 million in December 2022. On a month-on-month basis, exports of cement witnessed an increase by 4.86 per cent during December 2023 when compared to the exports of US \$20.911 million in November 2023, the PBS data revealed.

ISLAMABAD : The wheat output in the country during the current season is likely to reach over 28.86 million tons, which would further help in cementing the efforts of the government to achieve sustainable agriculture growth and economic development. Wheat cultivation relies heavily on irrigation water, so the ample water supply as reported by IRSA along with record planting areas indicated the potential for another strong harvest during the crop season 2024-25, said Imtiaz Ahmad Gopang Food Security Commissioner in the Ministry of National Food Security and Research. However, the actual production outcomes will depend on factors such as growing conditions and accessibility of essential inputs particularly fertilizers, he told media on Wednesday. Additionally, weather patterns in March and April crucial for the grains' development and maturation will significantly impact the final output, he added. He said that according to the provincial crop reporting services, wheat production for the Puniab Province was forecast at 23.50 million metric tons, and Sindh at 3.3 million metric tons respectively. Meanwhile, the output for the provinces including Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Balochistan was expected to reach at 1.474 million metric tons and 21.274 million metric tons respectively. Imtiaz Ahmad said that owing to the incentives introduced by the government, wheat sowing in the country during the current season (Rabi 2023-24) increased by 7.5 per cent as compared to the crop sowing of the corresponding period of the last year. During the period under review, wheat sowing had been completed over 23.69 million acres as against the set targets of 22.22 million acres, he said adding that the wheat crop has been sown across more than 23.69 million acres of land in various crop-growing regions during the current season to meet local staple food requirements and maintain strategic reserves throughout the year. The wheat cultivation targets fixed for the period under review were achieved by 107 per cent as crop sowing in two major grain-producing provinces Sindh and Punjab gained momentum as both the provinces surpassed their assigned targets for the current season, he added. He said that the post-flood phenomenon in Sindh has also contributed to massive wheat sowing as adequate moisture in fields during crop cultivation supplemented the overall area under wheat production.-DNA

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) assured on Wednesday that internet services will not be suspended in the country on February 8 (tomorrow) as the nation heads to polls. According to an official statement from the PTA, users can expect internet facilities to be available without interruption or obstacles on the day of the election. Importantly, the government has not issued any directives to shut down internet services on polling day. The confirmation comes a day after Information Minister Murtaza Solangi stated that the government has not issued any guidelines for the shutdown of mobile phone services and the internet during the elections. Highlighting that in case of a

uation in any location, the local administration will evaluate the circumstances and make a decision accordingly. Two days ago, Amnesty International (AI), in collaboration with several other human rights organisations, issued a call to authorities in Pakistan, urging them to guarantee uninterrupted access to the Internet and digital communication platforms for all citizens across the country during the upcoming elections. The appeal came in response to a statement made by Caretaker Interior Minister Gohar Ejaz earlier on February 6, acknowledging the possibility of internet disruptions and shutdowns during Thursday's polls. Addressing a news conference in the federal capital Ejaz dispelled rumours surrounding the elections on Feb 8, saying until now the authorities had

not received any directives to shut down the internet services on the day. He added that any such action would only be taken upon a request from a province or a district.

"As of now, no decision has been to shut down mobile or internet services. However, if necessary, considerations are made based on security requests from specific districts or provinces [internet and mobile service will be suspended]," he remarked.

Expressing concern over the potential limitations on internet access, AI underscored the importance of upholding the right to freedom of expression and ensuring that citizens can freely share and access information online. Internet services have been affected thrice in the past two months. The first time was on December 17, the second on January 7, and the

latest one on January 20. The suspensions coincided with the PTI's virtual events.

The interim government attributed the internet outages across the country to "technical issues", stating that there was no assurance that such incidents would not recur in the future. On January 24, the Sindh High Court (SHC) restrained the relevant authorities from suspending internet services till the general elections. The SHC ordered the caretaker federal government and the PTA to ensure uninterrupted internet services till the polling day. The order came on a petition filed by human rights defender and lawyer Jibran Nasir, who is contesting the polls for PS-110 as an independent candidate, against the frequent "unconstitutional" internet outages in the country in recent days. Recently, the PTI moved the Supreme Court,

urging it to take notice of the disruption of popular social media platforms including X, Facebook. Instagram, and YouTube. In light of these developments, the rights organisations specifically called upon Prime Minister Anwarrul Hag Kakar and the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) to take proactive measures to guarantee full internet access and social media usage throughout the election period. AI and its partners emphasised that any disruptions to internet access during the election would not only undermine the democratic process but also impede the ability of citizens to access crucial information and express their viewpoints freely. The ability to access the internet and utilise social media platforms is vital for citizens to participate in democratic processes, engage in informed discourse, and exercise their fundamental rights.

Punjab records 10 more child deaths from pneumonia

RAWALPINDI : The distressing trend of child fatalities due to pneumonia persists in Punjab - the largest province - with 10 additional children succumbing to the illness in the past $2\overline{4}$ hours. According to the Punjab Health Department, the province reported a staggering 427 new cases of pneumonia within the same period, with Lahore alone registering 149 fresh cases. The latest data reveals a grim picture, with Punjab witnessing a total of 319 fatalities and 20,872 reported cases of pneumonia thus far this year. In Lahore, the figures stand at 58 deaths and 4,050 cases reported during the same period. Health experts have sounded the alarm, attributing the surge in pneumonia cases primarily to the hazardous smog engulfing Punjab, exacerbated by rampant air pollution during the winter season. Vaccination measures Responding to the critical situation, Dr Jamal Nasir, the caretaker health minister of Punjab, issued mandatory vaccination instructions for children against pneumonia on January 11. Dr Nasir stressed that free diagnosis and treatment facilities for pneumonia are available in all government hospitals across the province. Symptoms and causes He highlighted common symptoms of pneumonia, including difficulty in breathing, cough, cold, and fever. Precautions, such as ensuring children wear warm clothes and limiting exposure to cold, were stressed to protect against pneumonia. Causes of pneumonia in children were attributed to factors like lack of breastfeeding, pollution, malnutrition, prolonged exposure to cold, and weakened immune systems. Pneumonia, even in its mild form, can pose a significant threat to life. Symptoms include phlegm and cough, fever, profuse sweating or chills, shortness of breath during normal activities, chest pain when breathing or coughing, fatigue, loss of appetite, nausea, and headaches. The severity of symptoms may vary based

Experts call to move away from iTFAs

ISLAMABAD:A symposium was held in the federal cap ital on the health hazards of trans fatty acids (TFAs), where experts stressed the need for stakeholders' engagement and capacity building of regulators to enforce harmonised standards to counter its hazards. TFAs are fatty acids that are naturally occurring in meat and dairy products, whereas iTFAs are produced after hydrogenation and are mainly found in bakery products, and frozen and refrigerated items. The symposium titled, 'Reducing Industrial Trans Fatty Acids (iFTAs)' in Pakistan was jointly organised by the Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) and Cargill Pakistan. Islamabad Food Regulatory Authority Deputy Director, Dr Tahira Siddiqui, in her presentation, said "Pakistan is the second highest consumer of iTFAs in the world as after petroleum products, its edible oil imports were the largest, worth \$4.3 billion." Stressing the need to ensure dialogue between industry and technical experts to shift from iTFAs, she said, "Industries need to come up with alternatives to iTFAs in their production process and when choosing raw materials. For this purpose, they can be given incentives to promote a shift from iTFAs towards embracing alternatives." She added that it is a complex challenge to eradicate iTFAs, however it can be achieved by adopting efficient policies, and multifaceted approaches to engage all stakeholders. Illegal Afghan nationals repatriate in large numbers

ISLAMABAD : Illegal Afghan residents are steadily returning to their homeland from Pakistan, with figures reaching a significant milestone. According to recent reports, a total of 484,332 individuals have made the decision to leave Pakistan and embark on the journey back to Afghanistan. 

ISLAMABAD : Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) IT Director, Khizar Aziz, dispelled the fears of 'hacking Election Management System' (EMS) in upcoming general elections 2024. saying that no public networks are being utilized for transmitting election results. "Private networks will be employed for the purpose which eliminates concerns about the hacking of the EMS," Aziz told a private news channel. He highlighted that the EMS was equipped with special software, securely housed in the offices of 859 Returning Officers (RO), with the provision of four data entry operators, four laptops, and IT equipment. Simultaneously, Aziz stated the EMS was

also installed in the mobile phones of Presiding Officers (PO) who will capture an image of Form 45 and send it to the Returning Officer. In case of network issue, Form 45 will automatically deliver to the RO once a signal is restored. He explained the process of Section 95, where the Presiding Officer is required to visit the RO's office and display Form 45 on their mobile device. The form will selflock on the Presiding Officer's mobile, ensuring data integrity. Elucidating the working of EMS, Khizer Aziz stated that during the creation of Form 47 the RO will verify that Form 45 is locked on the Presiding Officer's mobile. Computers in the RO office, he said will operate in three modes for national and provincial assemblies, conducting online

data entry. In case of network disconnection, the software will seamlessly switch to an offline mode. Regarding connectivity, he mentioned the existence of a third toll apart from online and offline modes. The ECP IT Director said the Commission has improved the Result Management System from the previous version, ensuring a robust infrastructure connected via fiber optics. Where fiber optics are unavailable, satellite connectivity is utilized. Zafar Iqbal Hussain, the Special Secretary of the Election Commission, added that Presiding Officers will display the results outside the polling stations. He emphasized the importance of polling agents signing Form 45, reinforcing the commitment to transparency in the electoral process.



Legitimacy of US military actions questionable

he recent series of air strikes by the United States on Iran-backed military targets in Syria and Iraq have sparked international concern, as they are a clear violation of the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of these nations. Robert Wood, the US alternate representative for special political affairs at the United Nations, defended these actions as being "necessary and proportionate", citing a country's "inherent right of self-defense" under Article 51 of the UN Charter. However, attempting to use this right to justify unauthorized military operations in the territories of other sovereign nations that a country is not at war with distorts the concept of self-defense. The lack of approval from the nations concerned and the absence of pre-notification prior to the air strikes - which the US initially claimed it had done but which it later admitted it hadn't - further underscores the US' disregard for the principle of respecting other nations' sovereignty, as stipulated in the UN Charter. While State Department spokesman Vedant Patel claimed that Iraq and other regional countries "understood" the US' actions, which were in response to the deaths of three US soldiers, the criticism of the strikes expressed by Syria, Iraq and Iran contradicts this assertion and highlights the unilateral nature of the US' actions. Rather than being acts of self-defense, the air strikes can be seen as retaliatory measures for the deaths of the US military personnel, as indicated by President Joe Biden's statement: "If you harm an American, we will respond." This reflects a retaliatory and vengeful stance rather than a defensive posture. Moreover, the distance of the initial attacks from the US military personnel and the broader historical context of US military involvement in the region suggest a pattern of escalating tensions rather than genuine self-defense. Rosemary DiCarlo, under-secretary-general for political and peace-building affairs of the UN, has emphasized the volatile nature of the Middle East and called for active engagement to prevent further escalation and the deterioration of regional peace and security. Any more long-arm US military actions are not conducive to this and will only exacerbate tensions rather than alleviate them. It is imperative for all parties involved to exercise restraint, adhere to the UN Charter and international laws, and, most importantly, refrain from illegal military actions that violate the sovereignty and territorial integrity of other nations. The US needs to demonstrate some restraint and abide by the established rules of the international community.

Shame on India for its coercion of Sri Lanka

O ome Indian media outlets seemed irrepressible when they reported "India beats China in diplomatic duel" earlier this week, referring to an Indian Navy submarine visiting Colombo, capital of Sri Lanka, on the weekend, shortly after the island country suspended its reception of Chinese research ships under New Delhi's pressure. Their crowing exposes how New Delhi is setting up obstacles to obstruct the development of India-China relations while trying to pass the buck for the souring relations to Beijing. To begin with, New Delhi has been smearing China's marine research ships that belong to the State Oceanic Administration of China as "spy ships" of the People's Liberation Army Navy. Deep sea research is a cradle for new findings and technologies. Many countries do it by themselves or under multilateral cooperation frameworks. As long as China follows relevant international laws and codes, India has no right to interfere in it, let alone by coercing small island countries to do it in its stead. That marine research ships of different countries stop for fueling and supplies in foreign ports is a normal practice. Not to mention the Chinese marine research ships' mission can also be of high value to the engineering and biological security of the ongoing Colombo Port City construction project, which is being carried out and funded by Chinese companies despite the project being ceaselessly vilified and hindered by New Delhi since it started 10 years ago. Under India's pressure, Colombo unilaterally suspended the hundreds of billions of dollars' project in 2015, citing the project's potential impact on the marine environment. After Sri Lanka realized how beneficial the project, which is tantamount to building the country a new city on the sea, would be and found no other country had the capability to complete it, it came back to China. If India really thinks it can replace China in such projects, it should have helped Sri Lanka to complete the Colombo Port City project in 2015 soon after it pressured the country to dump China. The project will be completed in 20 to 25 years with even China's sizable input and world-class civil engineering efficiency. To force Colombo to shut the door on Chinese research ships while China is still helping the country build its largest construction project in history is by no means a diplomatic success for India, but a shame. It only serves to show New Delhi's narrow-mindedness and lack of vision in handling relations with Beijing and its neighbors. Those in New Delhi who view the Indian Ocean as India's sphere of influence should be reminded that a public square outside of one's door is not private property even if it bears one's name.

After 30 years, US needs to let regional leaders take over

he US has carried out a series of retaliatory airstrikes against pro-Iranian militias in Iraq and Syria in response to the fatal drone attack that killed three of its soldiers and injured more than 30 at a base in northeastern Jordan last week. Announcing the strikes, President Joe Biden said the US was not looking to engage in a broader conflict in the region. The Pentagon said that more airstrikes can be expected. At the same time, National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan announced that the US airstrikes were just the beginning of a sustained response and he refused to rule out strikes on Iranian soil itself. Meanwhile, American and British fighter jets and ships have carried out another round of bombings against Houthi positions in Yemen in a bid to stop the group from disrupting shipping in the Red Sea. The Houthis, as well as Iraqi militias associated with Tehran, vowed to retaliate. Also, Israel launched another attack against suspected Iranian targets in the Syrian capital, Damascus. Despite the US response, Republican and conservative pundits in Washington were not satisfied and called on the Biden administration to strike deep into Iran, something that the White House is not willing to do at this time. After more than 30 years of direct military involvement in the region, it would be naive to think that airstrikes will change the geopolitical reality. The Houthis and the pro-Iran proxies in Iraq and Syria will be able to regroup and rebuild their arsenals. After all, this is what a proxy war, orchestrated by the Iranians, is all about: a long and costly war of attrition. Pro-Iranian militias in Iraq are part of the Popular Mobilization Units, which is now functioning under the Iraqi army and whose leaders are represented in the Iraqi parliament. It does not get more complicated than this. The US should have learned by now that no amount of military power can achieve self-serving political objectives The Houthis have a firm grip on most of Yemen and, despite the US-UK strikes, remain capable of disrupting shipping lanes in the Red Sea. Both Iran and Iraq have condemned the US strikes, with Tehran calling them a "strategic mistake" and Baghdad saving they represented a "blatant violation of sovereignty." Any direct attack on Iran will almost certainly result in a wider conflagration and sink the US deeper into the region's quagmire, when the strategic American thinking for the past decade or so has centered on the need to pivot from the region toward South Asia and the Pacific Rim. The lesson the US should have learned by now is that no amount of military power and munitions can achieve self-serving political objectives. The invasion of Iraq, the war in Afghanistan and the Libvan debacle are a few searing examples. So, one should ask the Biden administration

about America's endgame, both in this latest escalation and in the long run. The sad fact is that US diplomatic resources have never matched its military presence in the Middle East. Like Israel, the US puts deterrence ahead of diplomacy when dealing with regional challenges. Israel's deterrence collapsed on Oct. 7 and it took more than 170 attacks on US bases in Iraq and Syria to deliver the message to the Americans that their deterrence had been dented as well. The symptoms have been there for a long time. These include the US' withdrawal from the Iran nuclear deal and the reimposition of US sanctions on Tehran, the uneasy relationship between Baghdad and Washington over America's military presence on Iraqi soil, the occupation of eastern Syria and the alliance with Syria's Kurds, and the indifference to Israel's most right-wing government's provocations and persecution of Palestinians. Then came Oct. 7 and Hamas' attack on Israel, which catapulted the entire region into a vortex of violence and chaos. Israel's war on Gaza has triggered reactions across the region. US diplomacy showed its limits when it came to stopping the genocidal war. America enabled Israel's embrace of a military solution to a seven-decade-old conflict, which, even after more than 120 days of horrific bombing and carnage, has achieved nothing. America's diplomatic resources have been circumvented by its bias in favor of Israel and by its blind reliance on military superiority. America's bombing campaign will also prove shortsighted. It may contain the proxy war and curtail the capabilities of pro-Iranian militias for some time, but it will hardly change the geopolitical realities on the ground. And so, US Secretary of State Antony Blinken embarks on his fifth tour of the region since Oct. 7 carrying many files, all interconnected and all getting more complicated by the day. He is said to be seeking to pressure Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to accept a long-term pause in the war on Gaza in return for a deal to release some of the Israeli captives, while facilitating the uninterrupted flow of aid to Gaza. He will also seek to cement assurances that Hezbollah and Israel will not engage in an open war, the details of which remain unclear. Blinken will also discuss ways to commit Israel to a Palestinian state, hoping to revive the path toward further normalization deals. He may also be seeking to restore some line of communication with Tehran through Qatar to defuse tensions in the region and restore regular shipping activity in the Red Sea. That is a lot on Blinken's plate. But if he had listened to America's regional allies before. his mission would have been much more manageable. For immediate tensions to subside, the war in Gaza must end. This is something that the US has refused to seek, i.e., by

calling for a ceasefire. Instead, Washington was manipulated by Netanyahu in a way that strained America's ties with its regional allies. The US has the necessary leverage to apply on Netanyahu, but it has so far lacked the political will to do so. America's diplomatic resources have been circumvented by its bias in favor of Israel and by its blind reliance on its military superiority. Both have undermined its credibility in the region and beyond. More than three decades since the US invasion of Iraq, the Middle East looks more fragmented and more volatile than ever. The US has turned national states into failed states, triggered sectarian violence and enabled religious fundamentalism and nonstate actors to dominate the scene today. What 30 years of US domination of the region has done is unforgivable. On the other hand, we do not have a two-state solution and Israel is now on the verge of liquidating the Palestinian issue and erasing Palestinian identity. The US has failed to listen to its regional allies and heed their warnings. It has appeased a psychopath, Netanyahu, who unabashedly rejects anything to do with Palestinian statehood. It is time for the US to allow the region's leaders to fix a broken Middle East with as little interference as possible. This week, the influential Foreign Affairs magazine ran an article titled, "Only the Middle East Can Fix the Middle East: The Path to a Post-American Regional Order." The writers, Dalia Dassa Kaye and Sanam Vakil, argue that the US is not in a position to resolve the multilayered problems of the region and local leaders "will have to step up and define a collective way forward." They add: "It is well past time for the Middle East to have a standing forum for regional security that establishes a permanent venue for dialogue among its own powers." Several regional leaders have the means and the intellect to forge such a forum. We have seen mature attempts to resolve conflicts through dialogue, with the Saudi-Iran rapprochement a clear example. The US was not a party to this diplomatic breakthrough. Other countries like Oman, Qatar and Egypt are also playing key roles in resolving regional conflicts.

The time has come for the US to start listening to its regional allies about managing the region instead of dictating a vision based on a legacy of broken promises and weak political will. The war on Gaza has uncovered the depth of US complicity, bias and lack of moral rectitude when it comes to embracing what is fair and right, not only for the Palestinians but for all the people of this region. The US must disengage its Middle East strategy from that of Israel if it wants to secure its interests.

T20 World Cup set to a memorable 'party'

DUBAI: Tournament director Fawwaz Baksh has claimed that he Twenty20 World Cup in June will be a memorable party with strong Caribbean flavours that will help establish cricket firmly in the United States. The event will be co-hosted by six Caribbean countries along with the United States, a market considered crucial if cricket wants to become a truly global game. New York, Miami and Dallas will host a total of 16 matches which will help promoted the games in the US. "When you pair up West Indies and USA, it's a recipe for success," the Guyanese sports administrator told Reuters. "We in the West Indies are known for a great time, we're known for the party atmosphere. When fans come here and watch the games, they should expect that. "So come here to watch great cricket, but come here also to have a great experience." Demand for tickets has been encouraging as more than 1.2 million applications from 126 countries were received within the first 48 hours since the public ballot was launched last week.

That included 900,000 from the U.S. and West Indies. "Introducing cricket into the U.S., which is a new market to us, we weren't quite sure what the response would be," he added. "We know there are quite a lot of expats in the United States and people from all across the world are interested in cricket. "But to see this kind of response, it's very encouraging." The ninth edition of the T20 World Cup will be the biggest yet, with the increase to 20 teams from 16. Poor attendance figures damaged the 50-overs World Cup when it was held in West Indies in 2007 but Baksh said Caribbean administrators won't repeat the mistakes they made last time. Ticket prices for this year's event start at only \$6. "If you want to introduce the sport in the U.S., if you want to revitalise cricket in the West Indies, you have to get the fans here," he said. "And the only way you can get the fans here is by making tickets attractive, making them accessible." The 43-year-old believes the World Cup will set the bar high for future global tournaments. "We all wanted this tournament here, and we all want to capitalise on it," Baksh said. - Agencies


Simona Halep doping ban appeal begins

PARIS: The Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) started hearing Simona Halep's appeal against a doping suspension that could end her tennis career. The former Wimbledon and French Open champion arrived on Wednesday at the top court in global sport in Lausanne for threeday proceedings, hoping that her provisional suspension will be lifted. The 32-year-old Romanian has been provisionally suspended since October 2022 after testing positive for roxadustat, a banned drug that leads to production of red blood cells, at the U.S. Open that year. Halep was also charged with another doping offence last year due to irregularities in her athlete biological passport (ABP), a method designed to monitor different blood parameters over time to reveal potential doping. Halep has consistently denied all the charges. The former world number one has blamed contaminated licensed supplements for her positive test at the U.S. Open. - Agencies

The Zaporizhzhia NPP, the biggest in Europe and among the 10 largest in the world, has been under Russian control since early 2022. –Agencies

UNSC states call on Russia to withdraw from Ukraine

The West took Ukraine's side, imposed heavy sanctions on Russia, and has been providing unprecedented economic, humanitarian, and economic assistance to Kyiv ever since

WASHINGTON: Several UN Security Council member countries on Tuesday called on Russia to withdraw its forces from Ukraine, as the war will enter its third year later this month. "We renew our calls for Russia to immediately withdraw its forces from Ukraine's internationally recognized borders," Robert Wood, deputy permanent representative of the US to the UN, told a UN Security Council meeting on threats to international peace and security. "We do know this: The Kremlin bears full responsibility for the unconscionable death and destruction brought about as a consequence of (Russian President Vladimir) Putin's war of aggression against Ukraine, in violation of the UN Charter," he said. Rus-

sia demanded the council meeting after 28 people were killed in Saturday's attack on a bakery in the Russian-controlled Luhansk region. Moscow described the shelling as a "terrorist attack" by the Ukrainian Armed Forces. Stressing that Russia continues its "relentless attacks" against Ukraine, Wood said Moscow's "aggression against Ukraine is a blatant violation" of the UN Charter and of Ukraine's territorial integrity. UK's Political Coordinator at the UN Fergus Eckersley said thousands of people have been killed in the 700 days since Russia's "barbaric invasion" of Ukraine began. "It is Russia alone that is responsible for the destruction caused by this war," Eckersley said, accusing Moscow of violating the UN Charter. "The quickest path to peace is for President Putin to end his illegal invasion.

We repeat our call for Russia to respect the UN Charter and to withdraw its forces from Ukraine," he added. Riccarda Chanda, deputy permanent representative of Switzerland to the UN, said the Ukrainian people continue to suffer the "devastating consequences" of the war. "We condemn this grave violation of international law and reiterate that Russia must withdraw its troops from Ukrainian territory in order to put an end to this aggression," she said. Shino Mitsuko, Japan's deputy permanent representative to the UN, said Russia should "correct its violations" of the UN Charter, take responsibility, and use its power for the benefit of the entire world. "Japan once again urges Russia to stop its aggression and immediately and unconditionally withdraw from the entire internationally recognized territory of

Ukraine. "Japan will continue to stand with Ukraine as long as it takes," she said. Russian envoy to the UN Vassily Nebenzia, for his part, said they called an urgent meeting of the council with regard to the missile strike by Ukraine against Lysychansk that took place on Saturday.

"I bet that today we will hear allegations that Russia convenes UNSCs on various aspects of the Ukrainian crisis way too often.

"However, we are not the ones who come up with the reasons for the meetings. It is Ukrainian fighters who have become so brutal and brazen that they commit terrorist attacks almost weekly, shelling civilian infrastructure and killing civilians on Russian territory," he said, adding that this is the fourth "terrorist attack of this kind" in the past six weeks. The Ukrainian armed forces feel "total impunity and permissiveness," according to the Russian envoy. "What's more, they feel the unconditional support of Washington, London and Brussels, who do not care about the killings of civilians, broken families and ruined lives," he said.

Criticizing the US and the EU for their support to Ukraine, Nebenzia said the lethal weapons that are sent to Ukraine "are utilized to commit terrorist acts against peaceful people and civilian infrastructure in violation of international humanitarian law."

IMF warns of Maldives foreign debt crisis

COLOMBO: The strategically-placed Indian Ocean nation of the Maldives, which has borrowed heavily from China and shifted allegiance from India, is at high risk of "debt distress," the IMF warned Wednesday.

Beijing has pledged more funding for the Maldives since pro-China President Mohamed Muizzu took power in November.

Muizzu thanked China last month for its "selfless assistance" for development funds after a visit to Beijing. The International Monetary Fund did not give details of the Maldives' foreign debt but said there was a need for "urgent policy adjustment". "Without significant policy changes, the overall fiscal deficits and public debt are projected to stay elevated," the IMF said after a review of the country's economy. "The Mal-dives remains at high risk of external and overall debt distress". The archipelago, famed for its white sand beaches and where tourism accounts for nearly a third of the economy, has recovered economically from the Covid-19 pandemic. But while a planned airport expansion and an increase in hotels are projected to boost growth, the IMF said "uncertainty surrounding the outlook remains high and risks are tilted to the downside." Muizzu's mentor, former president Abdulla Yameen, who ruled for five years until 2018, borrowed heavily from Beijing for construction projects. That left it owing 42 percent of its more than \$3 billion foreign debt to China in 2021, according to the World Bank, citing the Maldives' finance ministry.–APP

Rome partially restores Trajan's Basilica

ROME: The restoration of a portion of the Basilica Ulpia, which soared above the ancient Italian city for over a millennia, helps bring to life the grandeur and magnificence of the original marble monument. While most work on Rome's ubiquitous ruins points downwards, the rebuilding of the basilica's two-storey Corinthian colonnade has brought the focus up - over 23 metres to be exact. "If visitors can't sense the height of the monuments, they won't understand the meaning of the architecture," Claudio Parisi Presicce, Rome's top official for cultural heritage, told AFP on a tour of the site. The Basilica Ulpia was the centrepiece of Trajan's Forum, the largest and last of the imperial forums, named after Marcus Ulpius Traianus, emperor from 98 to 117 AD. Inaugurated in the second century, it mostly collapsed during the Middle Ages, but was unearthed by excavations in the early 19th century and 1930s. The current project, which began in 2021, identified three green marble columns that had been left for nearly 100

Japanese firm ends pact with Israeli company

TOKYO: Adefense firm in Japan halted its strategic cooperation agreement with an Israeli military company following tech the International Court of Justice (ICJ) ruling last month, urging the country to prevent genocide in Gaza. "We have currently suspended any new activities related to the memorandum of understanding and plan to terminate the memorandum by the end of February," said Hachi-mura Tsuyoshi, the chief financial officer of Itochu Aviation, regarding their agreement with Elbit Systems. The partnership was established at the request of the Japanese Defense Ministry as deemed necessary for national security and Japan's Self-Defense Forces, he told an earnings press conference. On the Jan. 26 world court ruling, Hachimura said Tokyo supports the court's role and thus is cutting off the pact this month. In March 2023, Itochu signed a strategic cooperation memorandum of understanding with Elbit Systems, an Israeli military technology and defense equipment manufacturer. Companies under the umbrella of Itochu Corp. have overseas investments in various sectors, including energy, finance, defense, chemistry, communication, food, textiles and construction. The U.N. court on Jan. 26 found South Africa's claim that Israel is committing genocide plausible. The court issued an interim order urging Israel to stop obstructing aid deliveries into Gaza and to improve the humanitarian situation. The statement noted that an international team was formed to follow Israeli crimes committed in Gaza.-APP

Harvard faces US govt probe over discriminating against Muslims

WASHINGTON: Harvard University is facing a government investigation for possible discrimination following a civil rights complaint filed by Arab and Muslim students, according to media reports. Since the start of the Israel-Hamas conflict last October, more than 60 investigations by the US Department of Education have been launched into K-12 schools, colleges, and universities over allegations of discrimination related to shared ancestry, \overrightarrow{ABC} News reported."We support the work of the Office of Civil Rights to ensure students' rights to access educational programs are safeguarded and will work with the office to address their questions," Jason Newton, spokesman for the Ivy League school, told the outlet. The Muslim Legal Fund of America, which lodged the complaint on behalf of the students in January, claims that students have faced "rampant harassment and racist attacks including doxxing, stalking and assault simply for being Palestinian, Muslim, and supporters of Palestinian rights." The group also said certain students have been subjected to assault due to their wearing keffivehs, the traditional Palestinian scarves, "Our complaint addresses Harvard's failure to protect more than a dozen students from harassment, intimidation, and threats based solely on their status as Palestinian, Arab, Muslim, and supporters of Palestinian rights," the legal fund said. "This investigation signifies an important step toward accountability and justice for these students, who all deserve the right to learn in a safe environment and the freedom to express their views," it added.

Farmers' protests block traffic across Spain

OVIEDO: Farmers in Spain continued nationwide protests on Wednesday, blocking key roads and food distribution centers while winning more concessions from the government.

In parliament, Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez announced that Madrid will reinforce the "food chain law" to ensure farmers are not forced to sell food below production costs. He also announced that Spain would implement "mirror" clauses in imports to guarantee that produce entering the market complies with EU standards.

"What banned products do imported oranges contain? What labor rights are in those countries? What type of fuel do they use? Consumers don't know but it should be

clear," protesting Catalan rice farmer Dani Forcadell told El Pais. "This production isn't coming from small farmers, it's international companies that exploit the people and their land to exploit the market here." Sanchez said he would lobby for the simplification of the bureaucracy of the EU's Common Agricultural Policy, which is another major gripe of the protesters. But some of the biggest problems are also at a more local level. In Catalonia, for instance, where around 1,000 tractors are driving toward central Barcelona, threatening to block the major access points, some farmers are outraged by water restrictions due to the drought. In a statement,

Baix Llobregat county said the regional government's drought measures are "temporary band-aids that do not solve the problem in the mid to longterm." They are calling for immediate investments in different water resources, modernization and slam the "fraudulent abuse" of hydro resources by state-backed power companies. Most of the disruptive protests have been organized outside of the three main farmers' unions, which have also called for mobilizations. In Catalonia, the lines of tractors have not been authorized, but daily La Vanguardia reported that they plan to leave the tractors blocking the main entrances of Barcelona this afternoon while farmers

march to meet government officials. A meeting is scheduled with Catalan President Pere Aragones on Wednesday afternoon. "We might just stay here because they never solve anything, they never have," Joan Carles, a spokesperson for a Valles farmers union told El Pais. "They pat us on the back so we'll go home. But we won't move until they improve the situation and guarantee help for the sector, which is dying." Sweden shuts Nord Stream probe over lack of jurisdiction

STOCKHOLM: A Swedish prosecutor probing the 2022 sabotage of the Nord Stream gas pipelines linking Russia and Germany said Wednesday he was closing the investigation because Sweden does not have jurisdiction.

Mats Ljungqvist said there had been "in-depth cooperation" with Germany over the September 2022 seabed operation and he would "hand over material that can be used as evidence in the German investigation." Four large gas

were discovered on Nord Stream's two pipelines off the Danish island of Bornholm, with seismic institutes recording two underwater explosions just before. The pipelines had been at the centre of leaks geopolitical tensions as

Russia cut gas supplies to Europe in suspected retaliation for Western sanctions over Moscow's invasion of Ukraine. While the leaks were in international waters, two were in Denmark's exclusive economic zone and two in Sweden's.-APP

90 detained after terror attack in Istanbul

ANKARA: The number of suspects detained in the aftermath of a terror attack in Istanbul by the Revolutionary People's Liberation Party-Front (DHKP-C) rose to 90 as of Wednesday. Two assailants were shot dead when they fired upon police officers at a security checkpoint outside the massive courthouse complex in the Ça layan neighborhood on Istanbul's European side. A female passerby was killed in the attack while several, including police officers, were injured.

Media reports say terrorists identified as S.Y. and P.B. were planning to broadcast their attack live if they managed to enter the courthouse. They were stopped at the checkpoint, however, when police were suspicious of them and sought to search the duo. Security camera footage emerged after the attack showed the assailants producing weapons in front of the checkpoint and indiscriminately firing. The attack took place as P.B.'s sister was standing trial inside the courthouse on terror charges. The broadcaster A Haber reported on Tuesday that a search of two assailants found one of them had a device attached to a cellphone for a live broadcast of their actions. One of them was also wearing a T-shirt with a slogan of a terrorist group. News agencies said 48 bullets, a large number of plastic handcuffs and pepper spray were also found in possession of the terrorists.

Interior Minister Ali Yerlikaya had initially announced that 40 people were arrested in connection with the attack in the immediate aftermath of the shooting.

Both assailants served time on charges of membership of a terrorist group in the past but they were apparently not involved in any acts of terrorism before. E.Y. was most recently sentenced to seven years and six months in prison eight months ago but appealed the ruling. He was released with a travel ban and judiciary control. P.B. was questioned by police in the past on suspicion of DHKP-C membership and was recently released from prison. Media outlets reported that P.B. complained of prison conditions and her letters were repeatedly made public by a lawmaker of a party associated with the PKK, another terrorist group whose ideology is similar to the DH-KP-C.

The DHKP-C was at the forefront when the notorious Gezi Park protests of 2013 escalated into deadly riots, and members of the group participated in the riots. Some suspects imprisoned for links to the terrorist group have drawn support for their release by lawmakers of the main opposition Republican People's Party (CHP). A CHP lawmaker was among those calling for the release of E.Y. when the latter was imprisoned. "Yesterday's attack proved once more that the CHP is the staunch defender of those terrorists. Some CHP lawmakers even filed a motion in Parliament (for the improvement of prison conditions for terrorists). The CHP is a friend of the political wing of the terrorist group," Erdo an said in a speech in the southeastern province of Sanl urfa on Wednesday.







Briefs ECP rejects Akram's plea for PTI affiliation

ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has rejected Salman Akram Raja's plea for declaring his affiliation with the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf. The ECP released its reserved verdict on Raja's plea, with DG Law Saima Janjua delivering the decision. The commission had reserved its verdict against PTI candidate Raja's plea, seeking to be declared a PTI candidate rather than an independent candidate on Feb 2. Salman Akram Raja filed the plea to avoid being declared an independent candidate and instead be recognised as a PTI candidate on Form-33, which contains the names and details of contesting candidates.

Currently, Raja is not listed as a PTI candidate on Form-33. Consequently, he will now contest the date, with electoral sym-

The ECP clarified that it did not grant the electoral symbol to the PTI, a decision that was upheld by the Supreme Court. The PTI failed to demonstrate in the Supreme Court that intra-party elections were fairly conducted.

1,500 inmates in Punjab jails cast votes

ISLAMABAD: Approximately 1,500 prisoners exercised their right to vote via postal ballot papers in various prisacross Punjab or Wednesday. According to reports, out of the 65,000 incarcerated inmates in Punjab's 43 prisons, nearly 1,500 participated in the electoral process through postal ballots. Mian Farooq Nazeer, the Punjab Prisons IG, confirmed that these inmates were deemed eligible to vote. He said the voting process was closely monitored through cameras, and subsequently, the postal ballots were forwarded to the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP). The ECP had formally requested the chief of Punjab Prisons to facilitate voting for prisoners via postal ballots.

Charles, who left London on Tuesday for his Sandringham residence in eastern England, will meanwhile hold his weekly meeting with Prime Minister Sunak by telephone for a change.

US-led forces will ultimately Humanitarian end its 'mission': Iraqi PM

BAGHDAD: Iraqi Prime Minister Mohammed Shia' al-Sudani says the US-led military coalition purportedly formed to fight the Daesh terrorist group will eventually wind down its presence in the Arab country. Speaking in an interview with the al-Arabiya television news network, Sudani stated that the Western alliance's mission will end at the Baghdad government's official request. "The main purpose of winding down US-led military coalition's mission is to eliminate all possible pretexts for attacks on its advisors," he said. Sudani also censured the US military's latest airstrikes against positions manned by anti-terror resistance groups in the western part of the country close to the border with Syria, asserting, "Any kind of military attack on the Iraqi territory is unacceptable. He said Iraq has not had any contact with the United States following the aerial assaults. The Iraqi prime minister also noted that the withdrawal of US-led foreign forces from the semi-autonomous Kurdistan region is among the issues raised in the course of negotiations between Baghdad and Washington to remove the troops from the country. "The Iraqi government has come up with a formula, under which the [resistance] groups will stop their [retaliatory] attacks in exchange for the cessation of American offensives,'

Sudani explained. Iraq adopted the law to expel foreign forces after Washington assassinated top Iraqi and Iranian anti-terror commanders four years ago. General Qassem Soleimani, commander of the Quds Force of Iran's Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC), and Abu Mahdi al-Muhandis, the second-in-command of Iraq's Popular Mobilization Units (PMU), were martyred along with their comrades in a US drone strike that was authorized by then-president Donald Trump near Baghdad International Airport on January 3, 2020. 'Iraq, US must return to dialogue over future of coalition forces' Meanwhile, Iraqi Foreign Minister Fuad Hussein stressed the need to return to the negotiating table over the future of US-led forces in Iraq.

disaster looms over Rafah

RAFAH: Concern is growing as an Israeli ground invasion of Rafah in the southern Gaza Strip is imminent, with the situation in the city near the Egyptian border getting more intense by the hour amid the occupying regime's genocidal war. There were sounds of explosions in Rafah as Israeli gunboats opened fire at the main coastal road to the west of Rafah on Wednesday. while massive airstrikes were reported in the city, which had been called the safe zone in the strip. Israeli strikes overnight have left eleven people dead, including a journalist and his mother and sister. Israel says its tanks and troops would imminently press into Rafah, and continue until the military has "full reign" over the entire 42-kmlong territory. Gazan families and medics in Rafah - the last refuge for Palestinians within Gaza - have warned of humanitarian catastrophe if Israeli troops push into the border town. Displaced Palestinians crowded into tents in Rafah are fearfully waiting for an anticipated Israeli ground invasion with nowhere left to flee once the regime's troops move in. Kareem Dahman, a displaced Palestinian in the city described the conditions in Rafah as "very difficult," saying "They hear (drones) very, very loud, and we hear the sounds of bombing at night.

Show-cause notice issued to Daniyal

ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has issued a showcause notice to former federal minister Daniyal Aziz, an independent candidate from NA-75 Narowal for the general elections 2024 over 'violation' of the Code of Conduct (CoC).

According to details, the ECP fixed the hearing of the case on February 10 and in the case of Daniyal Aziz's victory in the election, the notification of his triumph will be subjected to the ECP's final decision. According to the District Monitoring Officer's report, Daniyal Aziz is repeatedly violating the code of conduct. The report said that Daniyal Aziz did not appear before the ECP or respond to the earlier notices. According to the report, Rs50,000 fine was also imposed on him.

It is pertinent to mention here that Pakistan Muslim League Nawaz's leader had decided to contest election 2024 as an independent candidate after having differences with the party. Daniyal Aziz came into limelight after PML-N issued a show-cause notice

to him for 'violating' party rules by posting controversial tweets on X, formerly Twitter, and a statement on TV channel holding his own party leader Ahsan Iqbal responsible for hike in prices.

JI emerged as most popular party of Karachi: analysts

Senior journalists, analysts acknowledge JI's strong political strategies attracting Karachiites

KARACHI: Analysts declared the Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) as the most popular party of Karachi - the provincial capital of Sindh – ahead of the nationwide elections set to take place on February 8. The politico-religious party has left behind its previous political pattern of joining hands with multi-party alliances following bitter experiences and decided to contest local and nationwide polls on its own election symbol "scale" (tarazu) in a bid to return to its original status and separate identity. A private news channel aired a special transmission related to the election 2024 in which some of the renowned journalists, political analysts and anchorpersons including Hamid Mir, ShahzebKhanzada, Shahzad Iqbal, Suhail Warraich and Irshad Bhatti acknowledged JI and its Karachi chief Hafiz Naeem Ur Rehman's performance and political movements.

Hussein, in a phone call with US Secretary of State Antony Blinken on Tuesday, stressed the Iraqi government's rejection of the latest US airstrikes and such attacks. He said that "Iraq is not an arena for settling scores between rival countries." Hussein also formally demanded the US Treasury Department reconsider the sanctions it had imposed on several Iraqi banks, raising doubts about whether those sanctions were put in place over compliance issues or "other political reasons." US Central Command (CENTCOM) said in a statement on Friday that its military forces struck more than 85 targets in Iraq and Syria "with numerous aircraft to include long-range bombers flown from the United States."

While expressing his views in the special transmission, Mir said: "The Jamaat-e-Islami claims its popularity among masses in several constituencies based on Plus Consultant's recent survey. The political party's popularity increased after the recent rainfall and a powerful social media campaign favouring the Jamaat-e-Islami."

Shahzeb, speaking on the same show, pointed out a major shift of voters towards the politico-religious party from the Imran Khan-founded PTI and the MuttahidaQaumi Movement-Pakistan (MQM-P) in Karachi before and after the local government (LG) elections. "The latest survey after the LG polls stated that Karachiites made their top priority to elect II and Hafiz Naeem Ur Rehman instead of the PTI or any other party even though the former ruling party won several seats from the port city. Senior analyst and columnist Mazhar Abbas opined that the heavy rainfall in the port city would give a political advantage to the JI Karachi after the party adopted a new strategy two to three years ago by focusing on raising a strong voice on core issues of the economic hub of Pakistan. Mazhar added that questions were also raised on the party's new strategy, however, he admitted that the entire politics of Jamaat-e-Islami Karachi revolves around Hafiz Naeem despite several famous political personalities contesting the upcoming general elections on JI's ticket. Highlighting another strong political scheme of the politico-religious party, the analyst said, "Hafiz Naeem is contesting on two NA seats from Karachi, one from his constituency North Nazimabad and another from Orangi Town. According to the politician, his party raised major issues to Biharis and he is eyeing to get maximum votes from Orangi Town."
