PPP decides not to be part of govt

Bilawal says Asif Zardari the most suitable choice for the President post; PPP also demands NA speaker ship, Senate Chairman slot; PML N prime minister candidate will have PPP vote because PPP does not want instability in country

ISLAMABAD: Despite days-long consultations between the two major parties of the country, the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) has decided to back Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz's (PML-N) candidate for the prime minister's slot but will not be a part of the federal government. PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari made the major announcement during a news conference in Islamabad after the Central Executive Committee's (CEC) session on Tuesday, saying that he was withdrawing from the candidacy for prime minister's post as "the PPP doesn't have the mandate to form the federal government". "It is a fact that the PPP does not have a mandate to form the federal government and due to that I will not be putting myself forward for the candidacy of the prime minister of Pakistan," said the 35-year-old politician, who ran the 2024 general election for the country's top slot.

The Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) and PML-N, he said, had more numbers than his party in the National Assembly (NA), but since the former has announced that they would not engage in any dialogue with the PPP, there is no possibility of a PTI or independents-led government in the country. It may be noted that PTI founder Imran Khan brushed off the possibility of forming a coalition government with PPP, PML-N or MuttahidaQaumi Movement-Pakistan (MQM-P).

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court Tuesday rejected the Punjab government's progress report on the Jaranwala incident, with Chief Justice QaziFaez Isa saying it is "worth throwing in the trash". The chief justice's remarks came during the hearing of a case

Justice Kayani asked the interim pertaining to the rights of minorities where the provincial government of Punjab submitted its progress report about the incident. On August 16, a charged crowd vandalised several churches and set scores of houses on fire in Jaranwala town of the industrial ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High district of Faisalabad after clerics made announcements in mosques inciting the mob to attack the Christian community under alleged allegations of blasphemy. JOHANNESBURG: South Africa's government said on Tuesday that it had asked the World Court to consider whether Israel's decision to extend its military operations in Rafah required the court to use its power to prevent further breach of Palestinians' rights. The ICJ last month ordered Israel to take all measures within its power to prevent its troops from committing genocide against Palestinians in Gaza, in a case brought by South Africa. Israel is planning to expand its ground assault into the city of Rafah, where over 1 million have sought refuge from offensive that has laid waste to much of the Gaza.

UN chief urges Pakistan to avoid tensions, resolve election issues

Guterres urges authorities and political leaders to maintain calm atmosphere, says spokesperson

ISLAMABAD: Amid growing calls for investigation into poll-related irregularities, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres Monday called on Pakistani authorities and political leaders to resolve the issues related to last week's election through established legal procedures and to avoid any action that raised tensions. The February 8 elections were marred by allegations of rigging and irregularities after the results suffered inordinate delay and mobile services remained suspended on the polling day. Several political parties mainly Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) are holding sporadic protests across the country against alleged rigging in favour of the opponent candidates. Independent candidates belonging to Imran Khan-led PTI are in the lead with 92 seats, followed by PML-N (79) and PPP (53). In a statement, the UN chief also urged Pakistan to maintain a "calm atmosphere" in the country. "The secretary-general is monitoring the situation in Pakistan and calls for the resolving all issues and disputes through the established legal frameworks, and for human rights and the rule of law, to be fully respected in the interest of the people of


Shutter down strike against rigging in Balochistan

IPS launches study group to review new govt legislation

SE&LD \$154 millions World Bank project faces corruption: Letter to CS Sindh



KARACHI: According to the reliable sources, a corruption scandal has come up in Sindh Early Learning Enhancement through Classroom Transformation (SELECT) Project, a project run by the Sindh Education & Literacy Department funded by the World Bank, which worth US \$154 millions are running. Among them, massive corruption is taking place in various forms. In this regard, SELECT Project Manager/Director (HR/Admin) Hameed Alwani wrote a letter to the Secretary School Education & Literacy asking for conducting a transparent inquiry against the Project Coordinator Erum Ismail Rind who is marked by corruption and nepotism in the SELECT Project. In the letter, he said that

Project Coordinator Erum Ismail Rind by nepotism has given jobs to her relatives, including own family members. It is further narrated that a million rupees of contract l for the material/services, the documents of VTT Globe Firm were returned/ rejected for late submission on August 18, 2023 but despite this the contract is given to it which is a total violation of SPPRA rules and an ample example of massive corruption and kickbacks. While the corruption of 46 lakhs has been done by Junaid Hameed Samo, the Chief Program Manager/ Project Director RSU-SELECT and Erum Ismail Rind, the Project Coordinator, SELECT Project in the purchase of two servers, which is not shown in the stock register, whereas their RAMs have been installed refurbished, which indicates huge corruption. As per letter during the

year 2022-23, Mr. Junaid Hameed Samo, the Project Director, procured/ purchased 12 laptops, out of which 2 laptops are missing, which is also inquired by the Audit Party 2023. Letter further stated that the Project Coordinator Erum Rind is Headmistress Cader lady and she is holding an important post of Project Coordinator, which is also a violation & contemp of the orders of the Honorable Sindh High Court. While looting in the project, Chief Program Manager RSU has lost two vehicles bought/ purchased for the project, one Honda City, and one Alto Suzuki, respectively, from the showroom. Though he has already retained three other government vehicles. Some of the important posts of the project have been sidelined and kept vacant so that they can do more corruption. It is mentioned in the letter that Iunaid Samo is a 19 grade officer but

he is Chief Program Manager/PD of about seven to eight (7 to 8) projects including RSU, ASPIRE, DEEP, SELECT etc which shows nepotism & giant corruption on his part. In addition to this, it is highlighted in the letter that an irrelevant/ outsider person, Mr. Liaquat Solangi, who is an expert in jugglery of figures & corruption, is taking the budget finance job so that maximum corruption can be done in the project. Instead of conducting a transparent inquiry, the Education Secretary has replaced/ transfered the manager/ director HR Admin who wrote the letter for the inquiry, which seems that the Secretary Education is providing protection to the corrupt team. Govt releases Rs 507 bn funds in seven months

ISLAMABAD,): The federal government has authorized the utilization of development funds amounting to Rs 507.979 billion, out of a total allocation of Rs 940 billion, for various ongoing and new social sector uplift projects of the federal ministries and divisions during the first seven months (July-January) fiscal year 2023-24 under its Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP). Out of the total authorized/disbursed amount, the total amount spent so far on the development projects during the corresponding period stood at Rs 190.443 billion, according to the latest

data released by the Ministry of Planning, Development and Special Initiatives. According to the disbursement mechanism of the Planning Division, the development funds allocated in the federal budget are released at the rate of 20% in the first quarter (July-September), followed by 30% each in the second and third quarters, and the remaining 20% in the last quarter (April-June) of a fiscal year. The detail showed that Rs 127.066 billion out of a total allocated amount of Rs 211.777 billion had been disbursed to corporations including National Highway Authority (NHA), National Transmission and Despatch Company (NTDC) and Pakistan Electric Power Company (PEPCO). For

the Aviation Division, funds amounting to Rs 3.270 billion have been disbursed and Rs 668.86 million for the Board of Investment. Similarly, the government authorized Rs 61.312 billion to the Cabinet Division, Rs 2.430 billion to the Ministry of Climate Change, Rs 660 million to the Commerce Division, Rs 126 million to the Ministry of Communications (other than Rs 1.920 billion to the Defence Division, Rs 960 million to the Defence Production Division, Rs 504 million for the Establishment Division 5.100 billion to the Federal Education & Professional Training Division, Rs1.932 billion to the Finance Division, Rs 86.347 billion to Provinces and Special

4.199 Polio teams to administer drops

Eiaz added that anti-polio drops would also be administered at 182 transit points while teams would also be deputed at toll plazas so that no child could miss immunization. The CEO added that the objective of regularly conducting anti-polio campaigns was to keep children through protective drops and increase their immunity. Political parties have started horse trading

SIFC only hope to revive economy amid political chaos

ISLAMABAD: Brigadier (retd) Aslam Khan, Chairman of Pakistan Economy Watch (PEW), said on Tuesday that the SIFC has emerged as the only hope for economic recovery amid increasing political uncertainty. The elections left the country in a polarised and unstable state, as they did not deliver political stability but instead created uncertainty and legitimacy issues. Aslam Khan said that all three major parties declared victory soon after the elections and claimed they were the largest party in the National Assembly. But soon, it appeared that neither won a simple majority, leaving no party in

a position to form a government independently. Therefore, he added that a split mandate will soon result in a weak coalition government that cannot deliver, which will fan the masses' frustration. Aslam Khan said that the new government will face several daunting challenges. The most important is dealing with an economy still in the ICU and soaring inflation that has fuelled a cost-of-living crisis. It is believed that the new government will be unable to maintain the economic stability achieved by the caretaker government through unpopular decisions. He said that the new government would be unable to implement tax reforms, revive or sell lost state-run enterprises, and would not like to see further

energy price hikes as decided by the IMF. The split mandate will hinder political and economic stability. It will also be challenging to sign another agreement with the IMF, which is necessary to save the country from bankruptcy. Politicians would focus on horse trading, keeping allies happy, and dealing with the opposition as they were handled, while economic stability would be outside their list of priorities. He said that in this grim scenario, the Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC) could play a crucial role in implementing necessary but unpopular decisions despite opposition from some quarters. The SIFC should be further strengthened to help steer the country out of problems, as expecting

politicians to deliver is self-deception. He observed that the SIFC must be the driving force behind structural reforms regardless of the interests of political and business elites. Aslam Khan said that inflation, rising energy prices, and costly imports have taken a toll on the masses and increased business costs. The ever-growing circular debt cripples power and gas companies, hindering infrastructure investment and service delivery and pushing masses to the wall. He said frequent price changes create uncertainty for consumers and businesses, hampering long-term planning and investment decisions. Extensive cross-subsidies and distorted pricing burden the government and fail to reach the most deserving.

Dependence on imported gas exposes the sector to volatile global energy markets. Then, on top of this, there is leakage and theft that are costing Pakistan billions annually and impacting supply.

He said that SIFC should investigate the energy sector, as power and gas companies suffer from outdated infrastructure, poor governance, operational inefficiencies, and massive corruption. which lead to high costs and service disruptions. He added that the lack of competition stifles competitiveness and discourages efficient management practices, damaging the economy. Handling imported gas is often criticized as it only adds to the financial burden, but local exploration is still not a priority.

PR earns over Rs 6.84 mln in four years through saloons

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Railways has generated revenue worth over Rs 6.84 million through utilizing its 23 saloons and inspection coaches for commercial purposes, during the last four years. "At present, Pakistan Railways has only 23 saloons and inspection coaches with different dignitaries of the country who are entitled to use these saloons when needed," an official in the Ministry of Railways told APP. Giving the details, he said, "Two highly luxurious coaches have been allocated for the Prime Minister's Secretariat while four coaches have been allocated for the Minister for Railways, Secretary/Chairman of Railways, and another senior official in the ministry." The official said, "Only one saloon has been allocated to the federal government while one each has been allocated to the Governors of Sindh, Balochistan, Punjab, and the provincial governments." In addition, eight saloons had been allocated for the Railway Headquarters Lahore, in which one each would be marked to Chief Executive Officer/General Manager (BS-22), Additional General Manager BS-21, Inspector General Railway Police, Federal Government Inspector, and four salons were allocated for Principal Officers, he added. The official said six saloons had been allocated for Divisional Superintendents of Peshawar, Rawalpindi, Quetta, Sukkur, Lahore, and Karachi. He said that the Principal Officers of Pakistan Railways were entitled to travel at these saloons or inspection coaches only when they were on duty. Above all, they said luxury saloons were also available for private travel on a rental basis. The official said the saloons were very luxurious and had two rooms, a bath, a dining area, and a kitchen like a tiny house on wheels with the availability of every facility. He said some of these saloons were inspection coaches and their back wall was made of glass from where officers could view the track and surrounding area. "Pakistan Railways officers are not entitled to use this facility other than duty and all these salons are mostly 40-50 years old," he added. President writes to Swiss President



The view on Sunak's transgender jibe

ishi Sunak needs to say sorry. Using transgender people as a political punchline in the Commons last week while the mother of murdered teenager Brianna Ghey was in parliament was grossly offensive. He should apologise rather than continue with self-exculpatory dodges. By failing to acknowledge his error - and make amends - Mr Sunak emphasises a lack of a connection with, curiosity about and compassion for others. Brianna's father was right when he called the prime minister's words degrading and dehumanising. He has asked for an apology. But it's hard to communicate with people if you haven't listened to them. These are grieving parents of a young person who was murdered, in part, because of her transgender identity. Expressing regret for his crass jibe is the least Mr Sunak can do. But, sadly, grubby electoral calculations appear more important to him than basic human decency. The prime minister has chosen to prevail in the court of public opinion he cares about most - the opinion of reactionary voters. Mr Sunak thinks he must win these over if he has any chance in the Wellingborough byelection, one of two on the same day this week. Hence his attempt on Monday to reach out to voters on GB News, a TV channel that trades in "anger-tainment". It's a desperate ploy. Wellingborough's Tory MP was forced to leave parliament after a recall was triggered, having been found to have bullied a staff member as well as indecently exposed himself to them in a hotel room. Backed by a Brexit-supporting multi-millionaire, GB News, like its prime-time star Nigel Farage, is remaking the Conservatives. A recent survey of Tory members by the ConservativeHome website found more than half now tune into GB News. The channel provides a home for divisive cultural issues. Nastiness is what it has primed viewers to crave. James Kanagasooriam from the pollster Focaldata last week wrote about how social attitudes explained today's tribal politics. His work suggests supporters of Mr Farage's Reform party are overwhelmingly anti-immigration and anti-net-zero. Seven out of eight believe white people are the forgotten victims of racism and that gender at birth cannot be changed. With Reform polling higher than the Lib Dems, Mr Sunak thinks dignity can take a back seat. He's wrong, as even some cabinet ministers publicly acknowledge. Such is the state of the Conservative party that it experiments with government by conspiracy theory, with "15-minute cities" influencing transport policy. Paranoia might animate GB News viewers, but it won't translate to the rest of the country. Polling suggests they want better public services and higher taxes for the rich. Paying a tax rate of just 23% on £2.2m of his "earnings and gains" last year surely lies behind why Mr Sunak can't connect with hard-up voters. Since Brianna's death, local Tory politicians have refrained from using wider transgender issues, which can be of legitimate public interest, for "culture war" attacks. Tragedy had awakened them from a partisan nightmare. Mr Sunak could have used this moment to appeal to what Abraham Lincoln called "the better angels of our nature". Instead he leaned into grievance stoking.

Digital pound gains momentum amid risk concerns

wo years ago, the House of Lords looked into whether the Bank of England should issue digital pounds to be held in electronic wallets. Peers were unconvinced, asking if this wasn't "a solution in search of a problem". Last December, MPs on the Treasury select committee said the same thing. The government's response, however, was to tell the public to prepare for a "Britcoin" to be in use by the end of the decade. Physical money has been around for thousands of years for good reason. Cash is convenient, reliable and anonymous. It seems unlikely that these advantages could be replicated online. State-backed e-cash might look inevitable to officials who say money is already digital, pointing to cryptocurrencies and smartphone payments. But central bank digital currencies (CBDCs) are different. A Britcoin would shift the management burden from commercial banks to Threadneedle Street. Paul Tucker, a former deputy Bank governor, argued in his book Global Discord that the west is responding to China's digital renminbi, which potentially gives the state social control through direct access to banking transactions. Yet the UK government can already spy on commercial bank accounts. It doesn't do so without good reason. Brett Scott, a former broker and the author of Cloudmoney, accepts that there is a geopolitical rivalry. The difference, he says, is that private corporations can push their agendas harder in the west than in Beijing. During the pandemic, finance and technology firms accelerated moves towards a cashless society, which saw hitherto unimaginable levels of surveillance and data extraction. A world without notes and coins would hurt those least able to afford it. Poor and elderly people often prefer to budget with cash. A million UK adults don't have a bank account. The Royal Society of Arts calculated that going cash-free risked 10 million Britons losing control of their finances. The prospect of a cashless society also unnerved central banks. They worried about being dominated by commercial banks. Their answer: central banks should have their own digital currencies. However, if central banks pushed CBDCs, they risked destabilising the financial institutions they oversaw. Central banks can't go bankrupt. People would vote with their feet if they could effectively open accounts at the Bank of England. According to a 2019 survey of 23 central banks, 82% of respondents worried that digital currencies could cause runs on banks. To address concerns, caps on CBDC holdings have been suggested. But limits may put off many from using digital pounds. Mr Scott rightly compares the digitalisation of money to Uberisation - a process where convenience is traded for societal threats that older behaviours kept in check. That's why we need a debate rather than passively accepting state-backed digital money. Facebook's global cryptocurrency, Diem, was killed off by money-laundering concerns. But pervasive monitoring of spending could change society's psychology for the worse. Rightwing conspiracy theories have been launched by excitable talk about the potential to place conditions on who can use digital money, for what, and with whom. Technically feasible? Eventually. Politically realisable? Gradually. Desirable? Well, that depends on your perspective. Maybe in developing countries, a digital central bank currency could be used - as was attempted briefly in Ecuador - to stymie an overly powerful.

As the international community grapples with the Gaza carnage, Xinjiang's authorities updated regulations designed to further isolate religious communities from their counterparts abroad, align their religious doctrine with Chinese Communist Party principles, and weaken separate ethnic identities. Intended to bring Xinjiang's regulatory framework in line with national Chinese laws and regulations adopted since 2014, the revised rules came into force this week, days after China published a white paper outlining the legal framework for its counterterrorism efforts. The regulations affect all religious groups, including Christians, Taoists, and Buddhists. Anti-Iewish comments include frequent comparisons of Jews to Nazis and conspiracy theories that American Jews control power and wealth in the United States. In late January, Chinese social media influencer Zhou Zheng" posted on his Haokan Video account a video titled 'Never Believe What the Jews Say.' Mr. Zhou asserted that "homeless" and "filthy rich Jews" prior to the Holocaust had betrayed Germany by seizing control of the German economy prior to the Holocaust. Mr. Zhou claimed that Jews had collaborated with Japan against China in World War II and in the mid-1800s incited Britain to invade China. China has reason to believe that its anti-Muslim and anti-Jewish campaigns are safe bets. Arab and Muslim nations remained silent, and in some cases even endorsed past repression of the Uighurs, including the incarceration of an estimated one million in reeducation prisons.

calculations could change in the wake of the Gaza war. Relations with China are likely to figure in recently revived US-Saudi defence cooperation talks. The talks were put on hold because of the war. Saudi Arabia hopes to ultimately walk away from the talks with a legally binding US commitment to the kingdom and the region's security, support for its ambitious civilian nuclear program, and a credible pathway to a resolution of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict in exchange for the establishment of diplomatic relations with Israel. No one expects Saudi Arabia to weaken its economic ties with China, its largest oil customer. Nor is the kingdom expected to publicly criticise the People's Republic. Even so, the United States will seek to ring-fence Saudi Arabia's relationship with China by limiting technology cooperation between the two countries and extracting a pledge that the kingdom will not host or endorse Chinese bases in the Gulf. The Chinese white paper asserts that China confronted a serious terrorism problem in the 2010s, but insists its crackdown on the Uyghurs was in line with the rule of law and respect for human rights. Arguing that "religious extremism is not religion," the paper said that China "while striking hard at unlawful and criminal terrorist activities...attaches greater importance to the education and rehabilitation of victims of extremist teachings who have committed only minor offenses." The paper frames the revised regulations that govern religions, and the responsibilities of indigenous religious organizations and professionals. The measures promote mixed housing, a principle applied in Singapore, and the creation of cultural parks and public areas that "promote...a social structure and community environment that embeds all ethnic groups" and showcase the region as part of the "Chinese nation." Uyghurs have long complained that China has sought to dilute their presence in Xinjiang, their historic homeland, through labour transfer programs, by importing Han Chinese, and forcing birth control despite a 2021 official report that asserted a 1.67 per cent Uyghur compounded annual growth rate in the past two decades. The updated regulations do not single out Muslims, but they are the prime target. They leave little room for doubt about their purpose. They aim is to create a Chinese Islam and Muslim culture that is defined by the party rather than religious tradition and practice and scholarly debate. "Religious venues are to be, effectively, training grounds that promote the values of the Chinese Communist Party to the people" Human Rights Watch charged in a statement. Religious communities, professionals, and activities must "practice Core Socialist Values" and "adhere to our nation's orientation towards the Sinification of religion," the regulations stipulate. They specify that religion should not interfere with "clothing, ulations oblige religious groups to ensure that "interpretations of religious teachings and rules (are) in line with contemporary China's requirements for development and improvement, and in line with the outstanding traditional Chinese culture." The updates expand the 2014 rules that defined as "extremist" traditional Muslim attire, including men's beards and women's headscarves, and penalised possession of digital recordings of Qur'an recitations. The updates require religious schools to "operate...with

Chinese characteristics" defined as "cultivating patriotic religious talents" and "correctly interpreting religious doctrine." Legitimising a massive mosque remodelling campaign in recent years, the updates demand that "religious activity sites that are newly built or renovated, expanded, or rebuilt...reflect Chinese characteristics and style in areas such as their architecture, sculptures, paintings, and decorations." A 2020 Australian Strategic Policy Institute study concluded that two-thirds of Xinjiang's had already been altered, often removing domes and minarets. Human Rights Watch reported last year that Sinicising mosques had expanded beyond Xinjiang into other Chinese provinces. China's efforts to Sinicise Islam have so far stopped short of altering doctrine. Also, China has not detailed what a "correct interpretation" would be beyond a reference to patriotism. Tackling the doctrine may be a red line for Arab and Muslim nations that China does not want to cross.

Ethnic cleansing now the most likely outcome in Gaza

This Israeli threat escalated at the tail end of yet another fruitless Antony Blinken mission to the region. The chief American diplomat has made five trips to the Middle East since Oct. 7 but has come away empty-handed every time. all an Israeli assault on Rafah be the final bloody slaughter to cap the destruction of Gaza? More than 1.3 million Palestinians, including 610,000 children, have been forcibly corralled into the ever-shrinking, unsanitary hellhole of this small city on the Gazan border with Egypt. They now await their fate. Most have been displaced as many as five or six times in what is now comfortably the largest forced displacement in Palestinian history. Many are eating grass or animal feed and drinking foul water. Rafah is the last place of semi-refugee in Gaza, but also the primary gateway for the lifesaving aid that permits this ghostly Palestinian existence to continue - for now. This Israeli threat escalated at the tail end of yet another fruitless Antony Blinken mission to the region. The chief American diplomat has made five trips to the Middle East since Oct. 7 but has come away empty-handed every time. If he feels embarrassed at the way Benjamin Netanyahu manhandles him, he has been trying hard not to show it. After yet another bruising encounter with the Israeli prime minister, Blinken was both late and tired when he appeared for his press conference. While Blinken said that Hamas' response to a US-Egyptian-Qatari proposal left possibilities for a deal, Netanyahu crushed all hope once again by stating this was "delusional." Instead of a deal on the release of hostages and a ceasefire, Palestinians were left contemplating the prospect of yet more mass carnage. The dominant question for all of them is: where to next? Israeli spokespeople just cannot or will not answer that simple and obvious question. Netanyahu has instructed the Israeli military to provide him with options on this. Where can the Palestinian civilians in Rafah go? Do they get given some corridor to travel north, to the center of Gaza? But where is safe? The roads are bombed and cratered. The Gaza Strip is littered with unexploded ordnance and buildings on the brink of collapse. Humanitarian agencies have no means of preparing safe shelters in these areas. Any major attack on Rafah would be hammering yet another nail into the already well-nailed coffins of the hostages left in Gaza. Most Israelis have come to the conclusion that Netanyahu cares not a jot for their welfare. When might this happen? This is not clear. No doubt Israel will further torture those in Rafah by keeping them guessing. Based on previous experience, the Israeli army will give them

as it is, so it is not safe even now. Egypt has reportedly warned Hamas that Israel is giving it two weeks to give up the remaining hostages before starting operations in Rafah. If there is to be an evacuation of hundreds of thousands from this area, even two weeks may not be enough time. Remember, thousands more are now injured and sick than when many were forced to evacuate the north last year. Egypt has feared this moment, not just since October, but for years. Egyptian leaders know full well that Israel has dreamed of dumping Gaza or the Palestinians of Gaza on Egypt. The desire to wash Israel's bloodied hands of its responsibility for their fate is clear. Egypt has threatened to suspend its peace agreement with Tel Aviv if this goes ahead. The dominant question for Palestinians in Rafah is: where to next? The Israelis cannot or will not answer that simple question. A few mild expressions of concern from American and European leaders have made their way into the public domain. The EU's foreign policy chief, Josep Borrell, stated that an Israeli military offensive on Rafah "would lead to an unspeakable humanitarian catastrophe and grave tensions with Egypt." German Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock said: "The people in Gaza cannot disappear into thin air." British Foreign Secretary David Cameron said he is "deeply concerned about the prospect of a military offensive in Rafah." It hardly adds up to serious pressure on Israel. But what about US President Joe Biden? He has just stated that Israel has gone "over the top." Pressure is growing, including from within his own administration, to go much further and read the riot act. Netanyahu is treating him with contempt and needs to be shown that he cannot get away with it. The US has a myriad of options at its disposal to display serious displeasure if Biden has the courage. Statements will not be enough. They never have been. International leaders need to rid themselves of the delusion that Netanyahu has ever wanted any form of deal with Hamas. He has always pushed for what he deems to be "total victory." Absent a massive amount of coordinated American and European pressure, which has never looked like materializing, Netanyahu has zero political or personal interest in harnessing himself to an agreement that sees the survival of Hamas, an entity he has sworn to destroy.

The general Israeli public would not trust a deal with Hamas, let alone Bibi's base. Total victory is the only scenario where Netanyahu might conceivably survive politically. Only if this consummate, if highly slippery, political operator can turn to his critics and proclaim that he has delivered the end of Hamas as threat does he have a chance. So far, he has had few trophies, with hardly any senior Hamas leaders taken out, and with 134 hostages still unaccounted for. But world leaders should not be surprised at how Israel is conducting its destruction of Gaza. If they had listened to the Israeli leaders, including Netanyahu, they would see that they are delivering on their promises in terms of the scale of the onslaught. Many have explicitly said that they want to smash Hamas everywhere in Gaza, so therefore they cannot leave four Hamas battalions in Rafah. Many have sworn to depopulate Gaza or at least thin out the population. Israeli Agriculture Minister Avi Dichter said that the military campaign in Gaza was explicitly designed to force the mass displacement of Palestinians. In a television interview last November, he proclaimed: "We are now rolling out the Gaza Nakba." Remarkably, many of the same Israeli politicians promising a new Nakba remain in denial about the first one in 1948. One reason Rafah is even an option is because major global powers have shamefully ignored the rulings of the International Court of Justice. Israel has to return to the court by Feb. 23 to report on its progress in adhering to those rulings. Let us be clear. A major assault on Rafah alone would almost certainly breach one, if not two or even three, of those rulings: the first to avoid genocide, the second to facilitate humanitarian aid and the third to preserve and not destroy evidence of genocide. But alongside genocide, what Palestinians also fear is the ethnic cleansing of Gaza. How long will it be before Israel creates a breach in the Egyptian border wall and drives thousands into the Sinai? It would be a dream fulfilled to expel hundreds of thousands. For some, this may have seemed far-fetched when many observers, including myself, pitched this as a plausible scenario back in October. Frankly, it is fast becoming the most likely outcome.

Like the previous edition, the PSL 9 will take place in two legs with Multan Cricket Stadium and Lahore's Gaddafi Stadium hosting 14 matches between them from February 17 to 27. The action then moves to Rawalpindi's Pindi Cricket Stadium and Karachi's National Bank Stadium, where 16 matches will be held from February 28 to March 12. The event will then move to Karachi in its entirety for the playoffs.

And she reckons she is beginning to find her stride again after becoming a mum. "I feel like I'm a much better player now. In Australia, my returns weren't as good and I don't feel like I was as focused as I am now," said the match winner.

On coming back physically after pregnancy she added: "It's been a really tough journey. "I felt like I was chasing myself in the past and it honestly wasn't really healthy to do.

"After giving birth, I feel I trained really quickly, I'm a very big perfectionist and it's tough when you don't see results as quickly. "I felt like I was driving a car that wasn't mine. So my body didn't feel like the body that I was used to." "It was in that journey I felt like I learned how to love myself as I am now. I got to wake up every day and see my daughter and know that I was strong enough for her to come into this world." Osaka's next assignment on her comeback trail is a second round date with Petra Martic of Croatia. This is the second time the pair have crossed swords but it comes a decade after their first encounter. A 16-year-old Osaka prevailed on that occasion, a final qualifying round

match at Stanford in 2014.

DHAKA: Batter Najmul Hossain Shanto has been appointed as captain in all three formats for the next year amid ongoing uncertainty over the availability of former skipper Shakib Al Hasan, the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) said. Shanto, who led Bangladesh in a multi-format series against New Zealand in December, will be in charge of the side at the Twenty20 World Cup in the Caribbean and United States in June. The BCB said that they consider Shakib as their "first choice" to return to the role but uncertainty over his health prompted them to go for Shanto. "We have elected Shanto as aptain in all three formats," BCB President Nazmul Hassan told reporters on Monday. "We discussed the national team captaincy for the longest time in this meeting. "Not many players have made a more impressive start to their international career than Shamar Joseph, with the West Indies quick rising from relative obscurity to the cusp of stardom after just two matches," the ICC said in a press release. "It didn't take long for Joseph to make his mark on debut in the first Test against Australia as the 24-year-old revived memories of West Indies quicks of yesteryear when he claimed the prized wicket of the world's No.2 ranked batter Steve Smith with his very first delivery. "Joseph picked up another four Australian scalps on his way to sensational figures of 5-94 in his first Test appearance in Adelaide and backed up this effort with decent scores of 36 and 15 coming into bat for his side at No.11. "Somehow, Joseph produced an even better performance during the West Indies' upset victory over Australia in the second Test in Brisbane. He produced a spell for the ages to collect figures of 7-68 that helped the Caribbean side to their first Test triumph in Australia since 1997." Over two Tests, Joseph scored 57 runs at a decent average of 28.50, having also bagging 13 wickets at an impressive average of 17.30. - Agencies

SA fightback after Ravindra impresses in Hamilton

Rachin Ravindra bagged figures of three for 33 as South Africa slipped to 220 for six on the first day of the second Test at Seddon Park on Tuesday. The Proteas won the toss and decided to bat on a bright, sunny day in Hamilton. Ruan de Swardt, who was 55 not out, and Shaun von Berg. unbeaten on 34, will resume on day two after notching up 70 for the seventh wicket as the visitors look to avoid becoming the first South Africa team to suffer a Test series loss to New Zealand.

De Swardt, featuring in his second Test, scored his maiden half century with a four through the covers in the final hour of play and he and von Berg, making his debut at the age of 37, negotiated the second new ball to make

it to stumps. The Black Caps had made three changes to their team to introduce a fourpronged seam attack and two of them had an early impact. After Matt Henry had removed Clyde Fortuin for a golden duck in the second over of the day, debutant quick Will O'Rourke made Neil Brand his first Test victim when he trapped the South Africa skipper in front for 25. At 37, Neil Wagner is at the other end of the experience spectrum and he struck next, a trademark short ball sending Raynard van Tonder back for 32 after a diving catch in the gully from Tom Latham. Ravindra, the ICC's Emerging Player of the Year and scorer of a double century in the first Test, took over to tear the

Record-setting West Indies beat Australia in 3rd T20

Andre Russell's rapid 71 in record stand guides tourists to victory in final T20

PERTH: Andre Russell and Sherfane Rutherford put on the biggest sixth-wicket partnership in a Twenty20 international to steer the West Indies past Australia by 37 runs in their third and final clash on Tuesday.

Both men crunched quickfire half-centuries to propel the visitors to 220-6 in Perth with Australia managing just 183-5 in reply, Warner top-scoring on 81 in his last appearance for Australia at home. Chase, one of the two changes West Indies made for the final game, derailed Australia's pursuit with the wickets of Warner and Josh Inglis in one over to end up

with 2-19. "It's a very good feeling to come here and get a win," West Indies captain Rowman Powell said after losing the series 2-1. "The boys showed some heart and courage. We had good plans through the three games but execution let us down.'

Australia fast bowler Xavier Bartlett, who impressed in his ODI debut against the West Indies, continued to prosper in white-ball cricket by getting openers Johnson Charles and Kyle Mayers in his debut T20 after Josh Hazlewood was rested for the final game. Charles edged Barlett's fifth delivery to wicketkeeper Inglis and Mayers played a short ball back onto his stumps in the pacer's second over. Zampa had Chase (37) clean bowled soon after the batting powerplay and when Powell edged Aaron Hardie behind the wickets, the West Indies were stuttering at 79-5 in the ninth over. Russell and Rutherford

didn't get bogged down against the pace and revived things with a strong partnership, raising the best-ever sixth-wicket stand in a T20 international by contributing an aggressive 139 runs off just 67 balls.



Zampa's penultimate over went for 28 with Russell clubbing four sixes and a four and the leg-spinner finished with 1-65 - the most expensive figures by an Australia in a T20. Russell, who hit seven sixes and four boundaries, finally holed out at mid-off in the last over of fast bowler Spencer Johnson (1-49).

Warner, possibly playing his last home international as he plans to retire from all forms of cricket after the T20 World Cup in June, gave Australia a fast start by completing his half century off 25 balls.

The introduction of spinners Akeal Hosein and Chase halted Australia's pursuit. with captain Marsh hol-

wicket. Glenn Maxwell, who made a brisk unbeaten century in the second T20, was clean bowled by Romario Shepherd with a superb leg stump yorker for 12, before Tim David made a rapid unbeaten 41 off 19 balls and reduced the margin of defeat. Glenn Maxwell made a record-equalling fifth T20 century for Australia earlier in the series. "Thought we were in a great position, went for the kill to try and get a few more wickets," Marsh said. Russia warns of 'tough response' if **West seizes** assets

MOSCOW: Russia warned the West on Tuesday that Moscow would be very tough if the United States and European Union seized hundreds of billions of dollars worth of Russian After President Vladimir Putin sent troops into Ukraine in 2022, the United States and its allies prohibited transactions with Russia's central bank and finance ministry, blocking around \$300 billion of sovereign Russian assets in the West. The EU on Monday adopted a law to set aside windfall profits made on frozen Russian central bank assets, it said on Monday, in a first concrete step towards the bloc's aim of using the money to finance the reconstruction of Ukraine. "This is theft: It's the appropriation of something that doesn't belong to you," Russian Foreign Ministry Spokeswoman Maria Zakharova told Sputnik radio, news media reported. Zakharova said the response from Moscow would be "extremely tough" as Russia felt it was essentially dealing with thieves. "Considering that our country has qualified this as theft, the attitude will be towards thieves," Zakharova said. "Not as political manipulators, not as overplayed technologists, but as thieves." -DNA

Ethiopian forces accused of civilian massacre

ADDIS ABABA: Ethiopia's government security forces killed at least 45 civilians in a massacre in Amhara state in late January, the independent state-affiliated Ethiopian Human Rights Commission (EHRC) said Tuesday. A statement said the EHRC had confirmed "the identity of were extrajudicially killed by government security forces for allegedly 'supporting Fano'," an ethnic Amhara militia. "However it can be assumed that the number of victims is even higher," it underscored. The killings in the town of Merawi follow months of clashes last year between Ethiopia's military and Fano, a "self-defence" militia. The fighting prompted the federal government to impose a state of emergency in August that was extended by four months by lawmakers this month. The United States last week said it was deeply concerned by reports of "targeted civilian killings" in Merawi and called for an independent investigation. The Amhara violence reignited concerns about the stability of Ethiopia months after a peace agreement was signed in November 2022 to end a two-year conflict in the neighbouring region of Tigray.-APP

UN alarmed by escalating violence in DR Congo

UNITED NATIONS: The UN Security Council said it was concerned by "escalating violence" in the eastern Democratic Republic of Congo on Monday, condemning in a statement the offensive launched earlier this month by M23 rebels near the city of Goma.

Clashes have intensified recently between the M23 – among the strongest of dozens of armed groups roaming the country's troubled east -- and the Congolese army. The DRC, the UN and Western countries say Rwanda is supporting the rebels in a bid to control vast mineral resources, an allegation Kigali denies. Council members, who met Monday to discuss the issue, "reiterated their condemnation of all armed groups operating in the country. They expressed concern about the escalation of violence and a sustained tension in the region," according to a statement read by Guyana ambassador Carolyn Rodrigues-Birkett.-DNA

Briefs Erdogan calls on conscientious countries to support UNRWA

Recep Tayyip Erdogan stresses need for Israel to recognize independent Palestinian state based on 1967 borders, urges support for refugees

ANKARA: Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Tuesday urged all "conscientious" countries to protect the UN agency for Palestinian refugees or UN-RWA, which he said provided a "lifeline for 6 million refugees in Jordan, Syria, Lebanon, and Palestine." Speaking at the World Governments Summit in Dubai, the United Arabic Emirates, Erdogan said, "I would like to express our regret for the growing character assassinations on the United Nations Agency for Palestinian Refugees," as about a dozen of its staffers have been accused of involvement in the Oct. 7 Hamas attack on Gaza. The agency has already ordered an investigation of the allegations, but numerous countries have cut off its funding, risking a humanitarian crisis. Looking at the deep causes of the Gaza conflict, Er-

dogan said: "Every step taken will remain incomplete unless an independent, sovereign, and geographically integrated Palestinian state is established within the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital." "If Israel wants lasting peace, it must stop pursuing its expansionist ambitions and accept the existence of an independent Palestinian state," said Erdogan. He said that Israel, viewing itself as outside international law, has maintained its policies of "occupation, usurpation, destruction, and massacre for decades." "We will never leave our Palestinian brothers abandoned, helpless, or alone," he added. Erdogan arrived in the United Arab Emirates early Tuesday as part of a two-day visit to attend the summit. He will address the threeday summit, with this year's theme "Shaping Future Governments," which is bringing together state and government officials and representatives of

international organizations, the private sector, academia, civil society, think tanks, the media and businesspeople from various countries.

Since a cross-border incursion by the Palestinian group Hamas on Oct. 7, killing some 1,200 people, the Israeli offensive into Gaza has killed more than 28,000 people and caused mass destruction and shortages of necessities. The Israeli war on Gaza has pushed 85% of the territory's population into internal displacement amid acute shortages of food, clean water and medicine, while 60% of the enclave's infrastructure has been damaged or destroyed, according to the UN. Israel stands accused of genocide at the International Court of Justice, which in an interim ruling in January ordered Tel Aviv to stop genocidal acts and take measures to guarantee that humanitarian assistance is pro-

Canada says Israeli assault on Rafah would be devastating

OTTAWA: Canada on Monday joined those urging Israel not to mount a ground invasion against Gaza's southern Rafah neighborhood, saying such an attack would be devastating for Palestinians. Israel says it plans to assault Rafah, the last relatively safe place in the enclave, to which more than 1 million displaced people have fled. The office of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu wants the military to evacuate Rafah and destroy four Hamas battalions it says are deployed there. A woman carries the body of a Palestinian baby, killed in Israeli strikes, amid the ongoing conflict between Israel and the Palestinian Islamist group Hamas, at Abu Yousef Al-Najjar hospital, in Rafah, in the southern Gaza Strip. "I'm very concerned about what's going on in Gaza, in particular in Rafah. The operation would be devastating and is devastating to Palestinians and all those seeking refuge," Foreign Minister Melanie Joly told reporters. "What the Netanyahu government is asking them to do, which is to leave again, is unacceptable. Because they have nowhere to go and so that's why we need right now for the violence to stop," she said, reiterating Canadian calls for a sustainable ceasefire and the release of hostages. Joly said she would be holding talks with US Secretary of State Antony Blinken in Washington on Tuesday. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau says Israel has the right to defend itself after the Hamas assault on Oct. 7, but has gradually hardened his tone as the civilian death toll in Gaza has mounted.—Agencies

Highlighting comparative advantage available to US investors, Masood Khan pointed out presence of around one million expatriates in the US who were the real bridge-builders between the two countries; the existing profitable business ventures of around 80 US companies in Pakistan-mostly Fortune 500 companies; the existing investment portfolios of Pak-US citizens and the excess capacity which was available to be invested back in Pakistan for undertaking profitable business ventures. The Ambassador emphasized that Special Investment Facilitation Council was effectively addressing is-

sues which were faced by the investors in past. He urged the participants to create awareness about SIFC among Pak-US business community enabling them to take advantage of the facility. "Pakistani American investors have proven success stories in various areas including hospitality, healthcare, diagnostics, and pharmaceuticals. We encourage you to scale up your investments in Pakistan," said the ambassador. Masood Khan said that the Embassy of Pakistan and the four Consulates were creating synergies and connecting Pak-US business community for greater economic activity. "We are trying to connect all chambers of commerce under one umbrella to augment their efforts for the promotion of trade and in the country," he said. The Ambassador also said that a virtual summit of all chambers of commerce and business organizations would be held soon to be followed by an in-person investment seminar. He underscored the importance of an upto-date database of Pak-US business community to be shared with SIFC for better outreach and facilitation. Kremlin, Musk deny Russian army using Starlink

KYIV, Ukraine: The Kremlin on Monday rejected Ukraine's claims that Russian troops fighting on the frontline were using Starlink Internet terminals. Kyiv's GUR military intelligence agency said it had evidence that the terminals were being used on a "systematic" basis by Russian troops, accusing Moscow of "smuggling" them into the country. Starlink, owned by Elon Musk's SpaceX, is a network of satellites in low Earth orbit that can provide Internet to remote locations, or areas that have had normal communications infrastructure disabled. "My companies have probably done more to undermine Russia than anything," Musk said during a streamed session on X, formerly known as Twitter, criticizing US funding to Ukraine. Musk maintained that SpaceX had taken away two thirds of Russian space launch business and that "Starlink has overwhelmingly helped Ukraine." "It cannot be officially supplied here and is not officially supplied here," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters on Monday. "Accordingly, it cannot be officially used here in any way," he added. The system is not active in Russia, meaning even a device inside Russia could not connect. But Kyiv has accused Russian troops of using the device across the frontlines in Ukraine. "Starlink is freely available in Russia. Compared to last year, now the use of Starlink in the Russian army on the front line has become more systematic," GUR spokesman Andriy Yusov said Monday on state television. He said it would not "reveal all the details" of its claims. Ukraine itself has widely used Starlink to ensure communications and connectivity for its troops during link terminals to Russia "categorically false" in a post on his X social media platform. "To the best of our knowledge, no Starlinks have been sold directly or indirectly to Russia," he added.-Agencies

Serbian President vows to expedite EU accession

BELGRADE: Serbia is determined to speed up its path to European Union membership, President Aleksandar Vucic said in an interview. Vucic said Serbia expects "clear signals" from the EU on this issue, speaking at a joint press conference with Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis in the capital Belgrade. He said relations between Serbia and Greece are "friendly and brotherly," with Greece supporting Serbia's EU membership. "Serbia and Greece have always mutually supported each other's territorial integrity, and I believe that this will be the case in the future." he said. He added that his meeting with Mitsotakis focused on renewable energy resources and infrastructure. Mitsotakis said there has been "visible progress" in relations between the two countries. "Serbia and the Western Balkans have a European future. For us, there is no future without the Western Balkans and Serbia. The participation of the entire Western Balkans is our strategic goal, and by accelerating the reforms you will carry out in your country, you will get closer to the EU in a shorter time," he said. He added that Greece's stance on Kosovo's independence will not change. "We believe that European mediation and dialogue are the only way to normalize relations between the two parties (Serbia and Kosovo) and will significantly contribute to stability in the region, which is the goal of all of us," said Mitsotakis. Kosovo declared independence from Serbia in 2008 and was recognized by many countries, including Türkiye. But Belgrade has never recognized Kosovo and claims it is still part of neighboring Serbia. During his working visit to Belgrade, Mitsotakis attended the Greek-Serbian

COP hosts UAE, Azerbaijan, Brazil announce climate 'troika'

The UAE hosted last year's COP28 conference in Dubai, while Azerbaijan will host this year's summit followed by Brazil in 2025

PARIS: Past and future UN climate talk hosts the United Arab Emirates, Azerbaijan and Brazil said Tuesday they are forming a "troika" to push for an international agreement to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius. The UAE hosted last year's COP28 conference in Dubai, while Azerbaijan will host this year's summit followed by Brazil in 2025 The three countries were mandated by 198 signatories to the Dubai agreement to work together on a roadmap to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius, a key climate goal that has been seriously threat-

ened by global greenhouse gas emissions. "The Troika helps ensure we have the collaboration and continuity required to keep the North Star of 1.5°C in sight - from Baku to Belem and beyond," COP28 president Sultan Al Jaber said in a statement. Taking into account current climate pledges, the world is still on track to warm between 2.5 and 2.9 degrees Celsius over this century, according to UN estimates. The 1.5-degree Celsius limit will probably be reached between 2030 and 2035, according to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). According to the final agreement reached at COP28, the troika partnership should "significantly enhance international cooperation and



the international enabling environment to stimulate ambition in the next round of nationally determined contributions". This

is "with a view to scaling up action and implementation during this critical decade and keeping the 1.5°C limit within reach", according to the agreement. At COP28, the world agreed to "transition away" from fossil fuels, but there was no progress on unblocking financial flows to developing countries, a major sticking point in negotiations. This issue is set to be a central theme of COP29 in Baku, where a new target is expected to be set for the financial support provided by developed countries for climate change. According to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, rich countries are about two years late in meeting their initial

pledge of \$100 billion in annual climate funding by 2022. The UN's high-level expert group on climate finance said in 2022 that developing nations (excluding China) need to spend some \$2.4 trillion a year on clean energy and climate resilience by 2030 - four times current levels.

"We are committed to lever aging our strength as a bridge builder between the developed and developing world as host of COP29, to accelerate efforts to keep 1.5 in reach," said COP29 president-designate Mukhtar

"Key to that will be establishing a new climate finance goal that reflects the scale and urgency of the climate challenge.

Thai ex-PM Thaksin to be released: **Justice** minister

BANGKOK: Jailed former Thai prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra is to be freed, the kingdom's justice minister said Tuesday, possibly as soon as the weekend - just six months after returning from 15 years of self-imposed exile. The controversial billionaire, twice elected premier and ousted in a 2006 military coup, was jailed for eight years on graft and abuse of power charges in August, but within days had his sentence cut to one year by King Maha Vajiralongkorn. Justice Minister Tawee Sodsong said Tuesday that the former Manchester City owner, 74, would be among 930 prisoners granted early release. 'He is in the group where they are in a critical condition or aged over 70. He will be released after six months automatically," Tawee Sodsong told reporters. Thaksin was jailed on August 22 last year, and Thai media reported that his release could come any day from Saturday. The exact details of his release are not clear, but he may be subject to monitoring - possibly with an ankle tag – and restrictions on his right to travel. His homecoming coincided with his Pheu Thai party returning to government in alliance with pro-military parties, leading many to conclude that an agreement had been struck to cut his jail time. The rumours grew stronger when he was transferred to a police hospital within hours of being sentenced because of his poor health, and it is not clear that he has spent any time in a prison cell. Local media reported Thaksin had been suffering from chest tightness and high blood pressure when he was admitted to hospital, and in the following months, his family said he had undergone two

ROME: Italian Defence Minister Guido Crosetto was hospitalised with suspected pericarditis in Rome overnight, his ministry said on Tuesday. Crosetto, 60, was "in very good shape and could be discharged later in the day, but health checks are still ongoing", a ministry source added. He suffered severe chest pains and walked on his own to the emergency room of the San Carlo di Nancy hospital in Rome, the ministry said. He was monitored and underwent a heart coronography, the statement added. In a post on X, Italian Foreign Minister Antonio Tajani wished Crosetto a speedy recovery. "We look forward to seeing you soon," he wrote on the platform formerly known as Twitter. Pericarditis is inflammation of the lining around the heart that causes chest pain, but is not usually serious.-Agencies

Protests may resume if demands ignored The head of

France's biggest farming union - the FNSEA - said on Tuesday that protests that hit the sector last month could resume if the government does not do more to meet their demands for better pay and working conditions. MORE: Places the U.S. Government Warns Not to Travel Right Now the government is in talks with farmers over getting them higher selling prices to supermarkets and over loosening regulation and bureaucracy which farmers have said was a burden on their businesses. However, FNSEA head Arnaud Rousseau said that, with 10 days to go until the start of the annual national farming convention, the government was not doing enough. "We are not moving at the right pace," Rousseau told French TV station TF1. Asked if farmers could restart the roadblocks that hit many motorways in January, Rousseau replied: "Very probably."Farmers across Europe - in countries such as Poland, Spain, Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands - have demonstrated over the last month for more money and better working conditions.—APP

Gaza ceasefire talks resume as Rafah under Israeli fire

Officials from the US, Egypt, Israel and Qatar are holding a meeting in Cairo to attempt to seal a truce in Gaza

CAIRO: Officials from the United States, Egypt, Israel and Qatar were meeting in Cairo on Tuesday to try to agree a truce in Gaza as international calls grew for Israel to hold back on its planned assault on the Palestinian enclave's southern city of Rafah. More than one million displaced civilians are crammed into Rafah, many living in camps and makeshift shelters, having fled to there from Israeli bombardments in other areas of Gaza during more than four months of warfare.

Israel says it wants to flush out Hamas militants from hideouts in Rafah and free Israeli hostages being held there, and is making plans to evacuate trapped Palestinian civilians. But no plan has been forthcoming and aid agencies say the displaced have nowhere else to go in the shattered territory. Israeli tanks shelled the eastern sector of Rafah overnight, causing waves of panic, residents said. Rafah neighbors Egypt but Cairo has made clear it will not allow a refugee exodus over the border.

Gaza health officials announced 133 new Palestinian deaths in the past 24 hours, bringing the total to 28,473 killed and 68,146 wounded since Oct. 7. Many other people are believed to be buried under rubble of destroyed buildings across the densely populated enclave, much of which is in ruins. Supplies of food, water and other essentials are running out and diseases are spreading. Around half of Gaza's 2.3 million people are now packed into Rafah, many of

Self-defense does not include 'expulsion of Palestinians'

BERLIN: Israel's right to self-defense does not include the expulsion of Palestinians from Gaza, Germany's foreign minister said Tuesday on the eve of a visit to Tel Aviv. "I would like to emphasize again that the right to self-defense applies, and that every country, like Israel, has the right to defend itself against terrorism, but it does not include expulsion," AnnalenaBaerbock told a joint press conference with Palestinian Authority Foreign Minister Rivad al-Maliki. She reiterated the need for Israel's army to create "safe corridors" in Gaza and for the southern Gaza city of Rafah - home to some 1.4 million people, and the target of an expected Israeli army offensive - calling

It is playing the game of wasting time to pursue its war of genocide against our people in Gaza," Abu Zuhri told Reuters. There was no comment from Israel on the status of the talks but it says it tries to minimize civilian deaths and says Hamas fighters hide among civilians, something the group denies.

"We are keen to attack Hamas targets without Hamas terrorists using civilians as human shields," Israeli government spokesman Eylon Levy said on Tuesday.

In Berlin, German Foreign Minister AnnalenaBaerbock, who will visit Israel on Wednesday, voiced concern about the looming Israeli offensive on Rafah. She said Israel had the right to defend itself against terrorism, but this did not mean the expulsion of the population. South Africa on Tuesday asked the World Court to consider whether Israel's plan to extend its offensive into Rafah required additional emergency measures to protect Palestinians' rights.

US Senate passes \$95bn package for allies

WASHINGTON: The US Senate has approved a long-awaited \$95bn (£75.2bn) aid package for Ukraine, Israel and Taiwan after months of political wrangling. While Democrats were in favour of passing the bill, Republicans were divided and previously voted it down. The package includes \$60bn for Kyiv, \$14bn for Israel's war against Hamas and \$10bn for humanitarian aid in conflict zones, including in Gaza. The bill will now go to the House, where its fate remains uncertain. The package, which also includes more than \$4bn in funds for Indo-Pacific allies, passed the Senate despite criticism from Republican House Speaker Mike Johnson and former President Donald Trump. Lawmakers voted 70 to 29 to approve the package. In the end, 22 Republicans joined most of Democrats to vote for the legislation, including Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell. "History settles every account," Mr McConnell said in a statement following the vote. "And today, on the value of American leadership and strength, history will record that the Senate did not blink." Ukraine's president also said he was "grateful" to senators for passing it. "For us in Ukraine, continued US assistance helps to save human lives from Russian terror. It means that life will continue in our cities and will triumph over war," Ukraine's President VolodymyrZelensky wrote in a post on X, formerly known as Twitter. The vote came after an all-night Senate session during which several Republicans made speeches criticising the measure. Consideration of the bill dragged on for days, as a group of right-wing Republicans led by Senator Rand Paul of Kentucky vowed to slow down the process. "Shouldn't we try to fix our own country first?" he said on the floor on Monday as he began filibustering the bill. - Agencies

Govt can't function without Imran: Khosa

ISLAMABAD: Senior Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader Sardar Latif Khosa says neither government nor democracy can function without the PTI founder. Speaking to media outside ECP on Tuesday, Khosa said, "you cannot minus the largest political party of the country this way". "Our polling agents were forcibly ousted from the polling stations during the counting process," he said. He added that the PTI wasn't given even the playing field but people took revenge through ballot on the polling day. According to Khosa, it is illegal and unconstitutional to call their winning candidates as 'independent'. "We are not independent. We clearly mentioned PTI as our party on the nomination papers but we were deprived of the election symbol," Khosa said. It was the only election in the history of country in which voters were searching for their candidates, he deplored. Latif Khosa demanded immediate release of the PTI founder from jail and added that all the sentences handed down to him must be quashed. "We are ahead with 170 seats in the National Assembly as per the initial Form-45. We demand election results based on the Form-45," said Khosa who defeated PML-N stalwart Khawaja Saad Rafique on Feb 8 polls from Lahore's constituency.

Tear gas fired as farmers march on New Delhi

NEW DELHI: Police in northern India have fired tear gas to prevent thousands of protesting farmers demanding minimum crop prices from marching on Delhi. The capital is ringed by razor wire, cement blocks and fencing on three sides to keep protests at bay. The government fears a repeat of 2020 - dozens died in a year-long protest that ended only after ministers agreed to repeal controversial agriculture laws. But just over two years later, farmers say other demands have not been met. India's farmers form an influential voting bloc and analysts say the government of Prime Minister Narendra Modi will be keen not to alienate them. His Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is seeking a third consecutive term in power in general elections this year. Pictures on Tuesday showed thick clouds of tear gas being used to disperse protesters near the city of Ambala, about 200km (125 miles) north of the capital. Police also fired tear gas, as they did on Monday, at the Shambhu border between Haryana and Punjab states. Drones flew continuously over the crowd and dropped tear gas on people below. "It literally rained tear gas shells through the day," said a BBC Punjabi reporter who was present. There were a few injuries in the crowd - mainly people hit by plastic bullets fired by police.

In response, some demonstrators pelted police with stones. Farmers used wet sacks and clothes to protect themselves from the tear gas shells. Protesters used wet clothing and sacks to try to protect themselves from tear gas Farmers, most of whom are from Punjab, say they want to peacefully cross Haryana to reach Delhi, but they have not been allowed to do so. Scuffles between police and protesters have also been reported at the Shambhu border and the situation remains tense. In 2020, protesting farmers hunkered down for months, blocking national highways that connect the capital to its neighbouring states. The movement was seen as one of the biggest challenges to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government. Traffic jams and disruptions were reported across Delhi on Tuesday as authorities blocked roads and diverted traffic. Police have also prohibited large gatherings in the city, including at border points between the capital and neighbouring Uttar Pradesh and Haryana states, through which the farmers are expected to reach the capital. In Haryana, the BJP-led state government has suspended internet services in seven districts until Tuesday. Two rounds of talks between farm union leaders and federal ministers have so far failed to break the deadlock. Farmers are asking for guaranteed floor prices - also known as minimum support price or MSP - which allows them to sell most of their produce at government-controlled wholesale markets, or mandis. They are also demanding that the government fulfil its promise of doubling farmers' income. - Agencies
