Security forces repel cross-border attack by Afghan Taliban

Pakistan Army's response causes significant losses on the Afghan side, including the destruction of two Taliban tanks

PESHAWAR: Afghan Taliban forces launched an unprovoked attack on Pakistani military posts along the Afghan border, resulting in a fierce exchange of fire. Security sources informed Express News that the Afghan Taliban initiated unprovoked aggression along the Pakistan-Afghanistan border, which was met with a strong response. From the morning of September 7, the Afghan Taliban began unprovoked firing with heavy weapons at Pakistani checkposts from the Afghan area of Plosin, near the Pakistan-Afghanistan border. According to security sources, the unprovoked firing from the Afghan side continued until the evening of September 8 and 9. The Pakistan Army responded with a strong retaliatory fire, inflicting heavy losses on the Afghan Taliban. So far, 16 Afghan Taliban fighters have been killed, and 27 have been wounded, while two of their tanks have also been destroyed. Security sources have stated that any form of unprovoked aggression along the Pakistan-Afghanistan border will be met with a decisive response. This is not the first instance of Afghan troops firing on Pakistani security forces stationed at the border. Pakistan had raised its concerns with Afghanistan after the attacks. Islamabad has also called on Afghanistan's Talisupport for terrorist groups that use Afghan soil to launch attacks on Pakistan.

LHC reinstates Lt Gen Munir as Nadra chairman

Court's one-member bench had declared Nadra head's appointment null and void last week

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court (LHC) has reinstated Lieutenant General Munir Afsar as the chairman of the National Database and Registration Authority (Nadra). Hearing the intra-court appeal filed by the federal government, LHC's two-member bench comprising Justices Chaudhry Muhammad Iqbal and Ahmad Nadeem Arshad suspended the high court's September 6 verdict wherein it had declared Lt Gen Afsar's appointment null and void. The decision, announced by Justice Asim Hafeez, came after a citizen named Ashba Kamran challenged the appointment of Afsar as the chairman in a petition, which was approved by the LHC. Kamran's petition argued that the caretaker government approved the appointment of a serving army officer by amending the Nadra Ordinance. The caretaker government cannot interfere in permanent policy matters, the plea added. During the hearing today, the government's lawyer apprised the court that Nadra ban rulers reign in militants and stop their chairman's appointment notification was challenged in the plea.

Arrest warrant issued for Judge Humayun Dilawar

BANNU: A Judicial Magistrate in Bannu on Tuesday issued arrest warrants for Special Judge of Central-II Islamabad Humayun Dilawar, who convicted Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) founder Imran Khan in Toshakana reference, in a land grabbing case. The arrest warrants were also issued for the judge's father, brother and a registrar in the same case. In a short order Magistrate Mahboob ul Hassan wrote that the investigation officer submitted an application, along with complete record, for issuance of warrant against the accused. "Therefore, by acceptance of instant application, warrant of arrest against the accused Taj Mali Khan, Dilawar Khan, Sadiq and Humayun Dilawar be issued in accordance with law with directions to the ACE [Anti-Corruption Establishmentl to arrest them," stated the order. The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) ACE has been directed to arrest the accused, including the registrar, and present them in the court.

Meanwhile, Musaddiq Abbasi — Special Assistant on Anti-Corruption to KP CM confirmed the development and said a first information report (FIR) had been registered against Judge Dilawar and his three brothers. "The anti-corruption department has obtained the arrest warrants from the court," he said, noting that the accused "illegally" registered the land - meant for government purposes - in their names and occupied it for a housing society. Abbasi claimed that the judge was chief executive of the housing society. On the other hand, the police said the government has suffered a loss of millions of rupees in this matter. Last year in August, the deposed prime minister – who was removed from office via a no-confidence motion in April last year - was arrested from his Zaman Park residence in Lahore soon after being convicted in the Toshakhana case. 'No talks with Establishment' Imran Khan defends

K-P CM, urges PTI to remove 'cowards'

PTI's founding leader reiterates claims of betrayal by the establishment, state negotiations are now off the table

KHAYAM ABBASI RAWALPINDI: Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf

(PTI) founding leader Imran Khan has defended Ali Amin Gandapur and the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Chief Minister's controvertial remarks that have landed him in hot water recently. Talking about the K-P CM's incendiary remarks, Khan claimed that Gandapur had merely expressed the 'nation's sentiments.' 'Party members who had apologised for Gandapur's remarks are weak cowards, they should not remain in the PTI,' Imran Khan said. Imran Khan also stated that the establishment has deceived them, and he is closing the doors to negotiations with all parties from today. Speaking informally with journalists at Adiala Jail, he said that from today he is instructing his party not to engage in any discussions with the establishment. The establishment has deceived us, and from today, I am closing the doors to negotiations with the establishment and any other party.

He mentioned that he had allowed six party leaders to negotiate with the establishment, but he has never stopped anyone from engaging in dialogue. The date and NOC for the September 8 rally were provided by the establishment, and whether we get permission or not, we will hold the rally in Lahore on September 21. Responding to allegations from Faisal Vawda regarding involvement in the murder of journalist Arshad Sharif, the former PTI leader denied any wrongdoing and called for an open trial to reveal the truth. "Everyone knows who Faisal Vawda is speaking for." Imran Khan alleged that Faisal Vawda used to follow him around, trying to arrange a meeting with General Faisal Naseer.

NA speaker demands immediate release of PTI lawmakers

"You cannot arrest anyone from Parliament House or Parliament Lodges," says Speaker Ayaz Sadiq

ISLAMBAD: A day after Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) lawmakers were chased within the Parliament's premises, National Assembly Speaker Ayaz Sadiq Tuesday reprimanded the Islamabad Inspector General (IG) of Police Syed Ali Nasir Rizvi, demanding their immediate release. "You cannot arrest anyone from the Parliament House or lodges. These parliamentarians should be released immediately," said the speaker. Sadiq's directive comes in the wake of the arrests of PTI lawmakers followed by a fiery speech delivered by the party's leader Ali Muhammad Khan on the floor of the lower house today. Sadiq added that he is "very saddened" by this incident and also watched the footage of PTI leader Sher Afzal Marwat's arrest. "What way was it to arrest a parliamentarian?" the speaker questioned IG Rizvi. The speaker maintained he won't remain silent on arrests of lawmakers and will action. Whatever happened in the Parliament will have to be protested. I have ordered all the videos," he said, summoning

DC Haripur enforces 90-day ban on e-cigarettes and vaping

HARIPUR: Deputy Com missioner Haripur Shoaib Abbas Tuesday has imposed a ban on e-cigarettes, vapes, and related nicotine products in Haripur district. The ban, effective from September 6, 2024, will remain in place for 90 days under Section 144. The district administration has imposed the restrictions including the E-cigarettes, vapes, and nicotine products are banned from use in public transport and public spaces. Promotion of e-cigarettes, vapes, and nicotine through media platforms and the display of related pamphlets on walls and vehicles is forbidden. The sale of these products is prohibited for individuals under 21 years of age. E-cigarettes, vapes, and nicotine cannot be stored or sold within a 100-meter radius of schools, colleges, hospitals, and public parks. Violators of these regulations will face strict legal consequences. The public is urged to comply with the new rules and support the authorities in maintaining community health.-APP

Jealousy; brother kills younger in Swabi

PESHAWAR: The police in Swabi district on Tuesday arrested a 17-year-old boy who killed his 12-year-old younger brother in a jealousy.. Topi police said the body of a 12-year-old boy, identified as Muhammad Kashif, was found in bushes near his home in the Zarobi area. The body had strangulation marks on the neck and the killer had left no clues to avert tracing. Police said DPO Swabi while taking a strong notice of the incident directed DSP Topi, Hassan Khan and SHO Haroon Khan to trace the killer at all cost and bring him before the court of law.

SHO Haroon Khan, Additional SHO Saidul Amin Khan and their team thoroughly inspected the crime scene and CCTV footage of the area and arrested the elder brother of the deceased named Anas, son of Fazal Rohan on suspension. During investigation Anas confessed to killing his younger brother, saying that his parents used to love Kashif more than him and he was jealous of this situation. –APP

The signing ceremony to this effect was held here at the office of Senior Member Board of Revenue in which Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Minister for Revenue and Estate Nazir Ahmed Abbasi, Senior Member Board of Revenue Ikramullah, Member Board of Revenue (Admin) Aamir Latif, Managing Director Bank of Khyber Sher Muhammad, Managing Director Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Information Technology Board Akif Khan, and other senior officials were present, said a press release issued here Tuesday. Addressing the meeting, Provincial Minister of Revenue and Estate Nazir Ahmad Abbasi said that E-Stamping is a very important initiative of the Board of Revenue. Stamp duty is an important source of revenue generation and E-Stamping will also provide maximum facilities to the people of the province. Regarding E-Stamping, the first MoU was signed in September 2022, but now instead of the National Bank of Pakistan and the Punjab IT Board, the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Information Technology Board (KPITB) and the Bank of Khyber (BoK) have extended it to all the districts of the province. PFUJ President condemns arrest of Mirpur Journalist

MIRPUR-AJK, Sep 10 (AP-P):Muhammad Afzal Butt, the President of the Pakistan Federal Union of Journalists (PFUJ) has strongly condemned the arrest of journalist Zaffar Mughal in Mirpur. Speaking via video link from Islamabad during a protest rally organized by the Kashmir Press Club, Afzal Butt described the actions against Mughal as retaliatory and expressed deep concern among the iournalist community in Pakistan and Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK). Afzal Butt demanded the immediate release of Mughal within 24 hours and called for the Prime Minister to establish a high-level inquiry committee to investigate the

circumstances surrounding the arrest. He warned that if Mughal is not released, journalists across the country would be compelled to take to the streets in protest. The PFUJ President outlined a planned protest program, starting with the Islamabad National Press Club and extending to journalists nationwide if the situation does not improve. He emphasized that journalists would not tolerate such intimidation tactics and would stand together to defend the rights of their colleagues in Mirpur. During the protest meeting, President Syed Abid Hussain Shah and General Secretary Raja Sohrab Khan also voiced their support for Mughal's

release. Shah condemned the police's aggressive raid on Mughal's home, describing it as an unacceptable act of retaliation against journalists. He urged the Prime Minister of AIK to take immediate notice of the situation, asserting that the journalistic community knows how to protect their rights through peaceful demonstrations if necessary. The protest which began at Chowk Shaheedan and concluded at the Kashmir Press Club, saw a unified turnout from the local journalist community, sig naling their solidarity and determination to address the growing concerns regarding journalist safety and freedom of expression.—APP

This would significantly help cope with the country's flood-caused climate vulnerability through nature-based adaptation interventions and integrated flood risk management, she added. Over the last century, the country's average temperature has spiked by 0.57 C and the average annual precipitation has increased by 25 per cent, aggravating the flood risk, particularly during summer months, she highlighted. As a result, there has been a substantial increase in the occurrence of devastating floods, landslides and drought events, which are surpassing the capacity of the country's existing water infrastructure to stave off any massive economic damages and loss of human life, Alam added.

industrial and agriculture sectors The Indus River is experiencing floods with increasing intensity and frequency. The communities along the Indus, including upstream watersheds and downstream wetlands and floodplains, are disproportionately vulnerable as they depend on the river for food and water as well as their agriculture, livestock and fishing-based livelihoods. "However, the Recharge Pakistan would be a major flood risk prevention initiative and boost the country's water storage capacity and improve groundwater resources to meet galloping population, agricultural and industrial needs," the PM's climate aide highlighted. More importantly, by means of an integrated flood risk management approach, involving the restoration and rehabilitation of water flow paths connected to wetlands and irrigation water supply channels and the development of recharge basins and retention areas, the project would directly benefit an estimated 680,000 people and indirectly support more than seven million people, most of them in flood-prone rural and marginalized communities, PM's climate

aide said. On the occasion, Senior US Embassy official said that the US government, Worldwide Fund for Nature (WWF) and CocaCola were jointly collaborating for the programme which was the first ever large-scale project by the partners and government of Pakistan. The initiative was bringing a paradigm shift from concrete-grey to green infrastructure like earthen water ponds and water bodies (wetlands) that would rehabilitate watersheds with a unique approach from working in the upstream to slow down waterflow in the watershed areas to conserve water and generate green jobs that would help support 680,000 individuals directly by securing their lands, jobs and livelihoods and some 700,000 people would benefitted after the implementation of the project. The project sites included watershed area Ramak in D.I. Khan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Chakar Lehir in Sindh-Balochistan and Manchar Lake and combinedly all these would help 14,000 hectares forested areas restoration, conserve GHG emissions

that would help meet NDCs targets of Pakistan, he said. "In mitigation, so much money is consumed but adaptation is a slow and longterm approach to

handle climate change. This is the unique initiative where government, international climate finance and private sector will yolk together," the US official said. Recharge Pakistan was a \$77.8 million value five-year project involving US government, WWF, Coca Cola and Green Climate Fund (GCF) which comprised of \$1.8 million from WWF, \$5million from Coca Cola and additional \$5 million from US Agency for International Development (USAID) and \$66 million from the GCF which was part of the overall \$5 billion US funding to GCF. "Its groundwater recharging initiative and the people should consider it like a battery that needs to be recharged to ensure survival of human life that uses a science-based approach to capture the rainwater, filter it and return back into aquifer which can used for agriculture, wetland restoration and other purposes," he said.

Climate change poses a significant threat

ISLAMABAD: Speakers at a symposium on the effects of climate change on human life stated that a collective reaction and concerted effort were urgently needed to safeguard vulnerable communities in disputed territories who were threatened by climate change. The seminar, arranged by Kashmir Institute of International Relations in collaboration with International Action for peace and sustainable development on the sidelines of the 57th session of the UNHRC, was attended by international specialists, human rights advocates, diplomats, and academics from all around the world. including Mr. Talha Tufail Bhatti, environmentalist, Mr. Abdul Rehman Research officer CISSAJk, Ms. Eisha Tariq Research intern at KIIR, Syed Faiz Naqashbandi, Mrs Shamim Shwal APHC leaders and Dr Shugafta Ashraf . While the seminar was moderated by Sardar Amjad Yousaf Khan president Internal Action for peace and sustainable development, received a press release from Geneva. Describing climate change as an issue of global concern, the speakers stated that climate change posed a major threat to those living in conflict-affected areas, where communities suffer a slew of challenges exacerbated by political conflicts, violence, and increased militarization. "Kashmir is one of the areas most vulnerable to climate change," they stated. They went on to say that while the protracted conflict poses a serious risk to people's lives, health, food, and way of life throughout the region, it has also severely damaged important sectors of the economy due to fluctuating temperatures, melting glaciers, and constant rains that cause flash floods. "Kashmir has witnessed significant water shortages as a result of the rising temperature", they said. "The region's agriculture sector has been adversely affected by the water scarcity," adding that in addition to affecting the food supply and availability to high-quality food, it has also had an impact on crop productivity. They said, "Kashmir, like other parts of the world, experienced a significant decrease in groundwater". The speakers said that wetlands in Kashmir which host hundreds of species of birds year-round, have been impacted by climate change. Citing to a news report on the impacts of climate change in the Himalayan region, they said that an important dimension that was being deeply neglected amidst intense conflict was that the UN-designated disputed territory is a host to the world's top snow peaks, glaciers, and riverine system on which the lives and livelihoods of millions of people depend. They observed that "India's deployment of over 900,000 heavily armed troops in the disputed territory is a major destabilizer for the local ecology." They stated that the military presence on the rapidly melting Siachin Glacier and even on the LoC were amongst one of the main factors upsetting the ecology. In order to address the climate catastrophe, the speakers said that along with coordinated efforts, a strong and a more comprehensive strategy were required to address these issues effectively -DNA

Govt. decides to accelerate transfer of PWD projects to provinces


ISLAMABAD: The federal government on Tuesday decided to expedite the process of transferring development projects to provinces after the Public Works Department (PWD) was abolished a couple of months back. The decision was made during a meeting chaired by Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives Professor Ahsan Iqbal, attended by the Secretary of Planning and senior

provincial officials which

resolved to transfer PS-DP-funded projects to provincial governments without delay, a news release said. The minister said only the projects were being transferred while funding under the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) would continue. He directed provinces to submit names of ministries overseeing projects slated for transfer within a week. He said the ongoing PWD projects in Islamabad would also be handed over

the capital Development Authority (CDA) and relevant ministries, clarifying that projects were not be terminated but rather reassigned to different institutions. The minister said Balochistan had already completed the necessary formalities, and other provinces must provide complete required details in a week. He outlined that the committee's objective was to resolve legal hurdles and ensure timely completion

To facilitate swift transfers of projects to provinces, he said Deputy Commissioners at the district level would serve as focal persons. They would, along with PWD and concerned agencies, randomize contracts within four to five days and obtain no-objection certificates from contractors. "This decision is expected to ensure timely completion of development projects, ultimately benefiting the people," the minister remarked.

Parents urged to support polio workers in eradicating polio

ISLAMABAD: Ayesha Raza Farooq, focal person of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif for the anti-polio campaign on Tuesday urged the parents of children under-five to cooperate with vaccination teams to get rid of the crippling disease. Talking to a private news channel, she said that the campaign was launched yesterday on a mass scale. The campaign will be done across 115 districts, aiming to vaccinate 33 million children against this debilitating disease, she added. Under the anti-polio drive around 286,000 polio workers will go door-to-door to administer polio drops to children, she further added. She said that 17 cases of polio have been reported in 2024 so far, of which 12 are from Balochistan and 5 from Sindh The Prime Minister gave strict instructions to run the polio drive like an emergency program, she added. Together with provincial governments, district administrations, and strategic partners, an integrated strategy has been developed to reach each and every child of the country, she added.-APP

Women employment quota be enforced

ISLAMABAD: Ombudsman Secretariat for Protection Against Harassment (FOSPAH), on Tuesday, stressed the critical necessity of raising awareness regarding the effective implementation of employment of women for empowering the women. Talking to APP, an official of FOSPAH underscored the multitude of challenges encountered by women, particularly concerning women employment. "We believe that through improving acof financial services that women can realize economic empowerment" said of ficial. She said that quota for women in public service employment for the posts in BS-1 to 15 has been enhanced from 5% percent to to 15 percent. She further added that the Provincial Ombudsman has assured to appoint 33% women as Consultants in his Office as soon as existing consultants complete their tenure. Amendments in the relevant law to provide 33% female consultants are also in process. All women contractual employees have been allowed to avail one additional chance of transfer to the place of residence of spouse in case of marriage, by notification of S&GAD. She further added that Quotas have had a massive impact globally on the number of women in jobs explaining the variation in women's representation in the country's economic empowerment, She further added. She added that media should play their role to tackle gender-based oppression in this regard, She added. Around the world, quota systems in government jobs are employed as a tool to enhance the representation of historically marginalised groups.-APP

Workers' remittances increase by 44%

ISLAMABAD: The overseas workers' remittances witnessed an increase of 44 per cent during the first two months of the current fiscal year 2024-25, the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) latest data said. The inflow of US\$ 5.936 billion was recorded during July-August 2024-25 as compared to the inflow of US \$4.123 billion during July-August 2023-24, showing growth of 44 per cent. Similarly, on a year-on-year basis, the worker's remittance went up by 40.5 per cent in August 2024 to US \$2.942 billion from US \$ 2.094 billion during the same month last year. Remittances inflows during August 2024 were mainly sourced from Saudi Arabia (\$713.1 million), the United Arab Emirates (\$538.4 million), the United Kingdom (\$474.8 million) and the United States of America (\$322.4 million).-APP

Govt. committed to promote Islamic banking in country

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Finance and Revenue Ali Pervaiz Malik Tuesday informed the National Assembly that the government is committed to promote Islamic banking in the country. In response to a Calling Attention Notice in the House, he said that the government plans to launch new Shariah-compliant certificates worth Rs 50 billion under Islamic Finance this month. He explained that two schemes under the Central Directorate of National Savings (CDNS) were launched in July 2023, involving Rs 70 billion in instruments, though these schemes were later suspended. The minister highlighted that Islamic financial instruments are asset-backed, with certificates issued against tangible assets. In 2023, certificates worth Rs 80 billion were issued against assets such as the Lahore-Sialkot Motorway and Islamabad Metro. He said that the government has identified new assets valued at Rs 1,000 billion and has secured the necessary approvals to proceed. Consequently, Shariah-compliant certificates worth Rs 50 billion will be issued this month. The minister also reported a 30 percent increase in Islamic banking accounts and announced plans to issue new certificates based on the recently identified assets.-APP

13 outlaws arrested; drugs and weapons recovered

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) Police apprehended 13 outlaws from different areas of the city during the last 24 hours and recovered drugs, and weapons with ammunition from their possession. An ICT police public relations officer said that, following the special directions of Inspector General of Police (IG) police Islamabad Syed Ali Nasir Rizvi, the Islamabad Police has intensified crackdown against the criminal elements in order to eliminate the crime from the city. Following these directions, the Secretariat police team arrested three accused namely Fida Hussain, Azhar Abbasi and Khalid Mehmood and recovered one 30 bore pistol and 1545 gram heroin from their possession, he said. Likewise, the Industrial Area police team arrested two accused namely Amir and Nasir Abbas and recovered one 30 bore pistol and one iron punch from their possession, he added. He said the Koral police team arrested an accused namely Abrar Ansar and recovered one rifle with ammunition from his possession. Moreover, the Shahzad Town police team arrested an accused namely Ishtiaq Ahmed and recovered murder tool knife from his pos-

session, he added. He said the Bani Gala police team arrested two accused namely Zahid Gul and Ahmed Gul and recovered one 30 bore pistol and 667 gram hashish from his possession. Cases have been registered against the nabbed accused and further investigation is underway, he said. He said during the crackdown against proclaimed offenders and absconders, the Islamabad Police teams arrested four absconders and target offenders from various areas of the city. APHC sounds alarm over plight of Kashmiri detainees

ISLAMABAD: The All Parties Hurriyat Conference in Indian occupied Jammu and Kashmir has issued a stark warning over the deteriorating condition of Kashmiri political leaders and youth languishing in Indian jails, demanding their immediate and unconditional release. According to Kashmir Media Service, in a scathing statement, APHC Spokesman Advocate Abdul Rashid Minhas condemned the Indian government's relentless crackdown on Kashmiri voices, stressing that the use of brute force will never quell the Kashmiris' unwavering resolve for self-determination. Can world tackle climate crisis

WROTE a speculative article in 2000 on what I called "the political trilemma of the world economy". My claim was that advanced forms of globalisation, the nation-state and mass politics could not coexist. Societies would eventually settle on, at most, two out of three. I suggested that it would be the nation-state that would give way in the long run, but not without a struggle. In the short term, the more likely consequence was that governments would seek to reassert national sovereignty to address the distributive and governance challenges posed by globalisation. To my surprise, the trilemma proved to have long legs. My book, The Globalisation Paradox, published a decade later, developed the idea further. The concept of the trilemma has become a handy way to understand the backlash against hyper-globalisation, Britain's exit from the European Union, the rise of the far-right and the future of democracy in the European Union, among other issues. Lately, another trilemma has preoccupied me. This one is the disturbing possibility that it may be impossible simultaneously to combat climate change, boost the middle class in advanced economies and reduce global poverty. Under current policy trajectories, any combination of two goals appears to come at the expense of the third. During the early post-war decades, policies in the developed and developing world alike emphasised economic growth and domestic social stability. The advanced economies built extensive welfare states but also progressively opened their markets to poorer countries' exports, so long as the distributional and social consequences were manageable. The result was inclusive growth in the rich countries, as well as significant poverty reduction in those developing countries that were pursuing the right policies. Successful as this strategy was, it sidestepped the risks of climate change. Over time, the consequences of economic growth powered by fossil fuels have become increasingly difficult to ignore. Cop28 prepares temperature check on climate at Dubai meeting The post-war Keynesian-social democratic bargain in the advanced economies was further undone by the internal contradictions generated by my original trilemma. As hyper-globalisation replaced the earlier Bretton Woods model, labour markets in the advanced economies experienced greater disruption, undermining the middle class and democracy itself. Both of these developments required new strategies. In the United States, President Joe Biden's administration has tackled these new realities head-on. It has broken new ground by promoting substantial investment in renewables and green industries to combat climate change. It deliberately aims to restore the middle class by promoting labour's bargaining power, reshoring manufacturing and creating jobs in regions that were badly hit by imports from China.

ORE than a dozen people associated with the French far-right group Action des Forces Operationnelles (AFO) will soon appear in a terrorism trial for commiting suspected acts of anti-Muslim violence, including a conspiracy to kill 200 Muslim preachers. The proceedings, which have been ordered but not scheduled, will focus on attacks planned between 2017 and 2018, and come as the country witnesses a dramatic rise in anti-Muslim violence since Israel's Gaza onslaught began in October 2023. But despite being a small step in the right direction, the long overdue trial struggles to strike at the heart of a much larger problem: state tolerance for rising anti-Muslim violence in France. The country's treatment of anti-Muslim groups and the way it approaches Muslim rights and liberties are like night and day. The AFO trial simply brings those double standards out into the open, and exposes the government's role in contributing to anti-Muslim violence over the past several months. According to prosecutors, the AFO was planning to kill 200 Muslim preachers and launch grenade attacks against Muslim community members. It planned to engage longrange shooters in a terrorist attack against a mosque in Clichy-la-Garenne, Paris and use female members to poison halal foods in supermarkets. This decision seems risky, particularly at such a politically volatile moment. The sudden reclassification could have an empowering effect on other anti-Muslim groups that are set to face trial. Consider the "Bariols Its members have conflated terrorism with Islam in the

attempt at anti-Muslim massacres can be explained away as misdemeanors, the Barjols could avoid accountability through a similar precedent. A threatened French Muslim community doesn't deserve these contradictions. Given that anti-Muslim violence has risen sharply over the past year, the state owes a concrete assurance that the freedoms and liberties of Muslims are well protected from far-right violence. In November, the French Muslim Council said it

had received dozens of letters containing threats or insults, and that 14 mosques were vandalised. In London, islamophobic offences increased by 140%, according to the Metropolitan police. For instance, the French Muslim Council received 42 threatening letters, and over a dozen mosques have been vandalised since Israel began its war on Gaza in October. A Franco-Turkish cultural association in Loiret was targeted last year, alongside the Turkish-Islamic Union of Religious Affairs (DITIR) in southern France

Ahead of the 2024 Olympics in Paris, critics say France used the need to maintain security as a cover to crack down on its Muslim constituents. Under French Interior Minister Gérald Darmanin, a system of surveillance and obstruction was used to conduct violent raids on Muslims and make it possible for French authorities to devise interventions against "any target" listed on the country's controversial radicalisation and terrorism watchlist (FSPRT)

Faeser, Darmanin also pledged a closer front with Berlin to counter "Islamist extremism," while leader of the far-right National Rally party, Jordan Bardella, has promised to pass a draft law which would help shut down mosques and deport preachers that the state deems as "radicals." It's important to note that taking actions against Muslims deemed to be a threat doesn't require incriminating evidence. In stark contrast, far-right aggressors in the AFO trial could end up with lenient sentences. Suspects will be tried for "terrorist criminal conspiracy" against Muslims, but in a court that doesn't even have the mandate to rule on terrorism. This means they face shorter sentences, and will not be tried before a jury. Thus, protections for Muslims seem unlikely when the state itself has impossibly higher standards for this community compared to the rest of its population. It would be a mistake to view the AFO trial as an actual attempt to bring perpetrators of violence to justice. In fact,

In a recent meeting with German Federal Minister Nancy

it offers a glimpse of a system that is still reluctant to call it terrorism when far-right groups plot mass killings, but not when French Muslims exercise their right to peaceful protest. Since fundamental Muslim freedoms figure low on the government agenda, far-right accountability remains a pipedream. Look to the country's divisive discourse on Israel's war against Gaza. Paris has increasingly normalised arbitrary arrests of Muslims who demonstrate solidarity with Palestinians, targeting their right to peaceful assembly and portraying arrests as a counterterrorism imperative. More importantly, the legislation used to impose such unlawful restrictions - France's "anti-terror" law - serves far-right interests. That's because prominent voices from the hard-right, led by Marine Le Pen, see it as a way to further expand disproportionate restrictions on Muslims and reinforce their narrative of a so-called "Islamist threat. This is important because far-right activism against Muslims has been resonating with other violent groups, such as the Organisation of Social Armies. As "terrorism" remains disproportionately focused around Muslim liberties,

French liberals and the hard right are making it difficult to call out far-right violence for what it really is. In 2023, anti-Muslim incidents in France jumped by 57%, with 828 incidents recorded across the nation over the course of the year, according to the annual report of the Collective Against Islamophobia in Europe (CCIE). Interestingly, AFO's desire to poison halal products in supermarkets is also rooted in the wider, state-sponsored persecution of Muslim women in France. After all, the suspects' goal was to wear nigab costumes to facilitate the poisonings. This symbolises anti-Muslim aggression and severe contempt towards women's right to choose what they wear. Whether through a hijab ban in state schools, unlawful restrictions on full-face veils, or a ban on the abaya, the French government has helped perpetuate a glaring bias against Muslim women. These discriminatory measures have prompted the far-right to increase Islamophobic rhetoric, and intensified racial profiling of Muslim women. Unless the drivers of social exclusion and religious discrimination are addressed, French Muslims could continue to face far-right extremism. Thus understood, AFO's anti-Muslim plotting took place in a society that holds severe intolerance towards French Muslims. It is still unclear why France would take up a case from 2018, but show limited regard for surging anti-Muslim violence in recent months. Ultimately, it will take more than just a terrorism trial for France to change the harsh reality on ground and create a

climate of equality for its six million Muslims.

Bayern Munich striker Kane will become the first person since Wayne Rooney in November 2014 to earn a 100th cap for England. Rooney went on to earn 120 caps, putting him second on the all-time appearance list behind former goalkeeper Peter Shilton (125). The others to have surpassed the century of appearances are David Beckham (115), Steven Gerrard (114), Bobby Moore (108), Ashley Cole (107), Bobby Charlton (106), Frank Lampard (106) and Billy Wright (105). "When you look at the list [of players with 100 caps] it is a list of some our greatest players," Kane said. "I'm sure when I'm retired I'll look back on this with immense pride." Kane said he will next target reaching 100 goals after making his 100th England appearance. "I've done around 15, 16, 17 caps a year whereas a normal year would be 10," he added. "The goals were similar. I felt I was on 30 goals and then I went to 50 and then 60. "It is definitely there and definitely possible. I feel like I am in a good place and these are good targets to try to reach. "Some people may see them as unrealistic but I would rather go for something unrealistic and not quite make it rather than be comfortable just saying I will be happy with 70 or 80 goals." It all started for Kane with a goal just 79 seconds into his debut. Starting on the bench in a Euro 2016 qualifier against Lithuania in March 2015, a 21-year-old Kane came on with the Three Lions 3-0 up and headed in his first goal for his country. Since then he has scored 46 more goals than any other England player. He has also provided more assists than any other player in that time with 17. Of his 99 caps, 29 have come at major tournaments for England (11 at the World Cup, 18 at the Euros), more than any other player. As well as being England's record scorer, he also has the most goals for England at major tournaments, with 15. Kane has scored five hat-tricks for England - against Panama, Bulgaria, Montenegro, Albania and San Marino. Only Jimmy Greaves has scored more with six. His 99 caps have come under four different managers. He made his debut with Roy Hodgson as boss and played 16 times for him, scoring five goals. Kane played in Sam Allardyce's only game in 2016 before making 81 appearances and scoring 61 goals under Gareth Southgate. He then started on Saturday in Lee Carsley's first game in charge against the Republic of Ireland. Asked about what has been the most difficult thing to be able to keep playing at the highest level, Kane told BBC Radio 5 live: "I think to be able to keep producing great numbers, keep producing great moments is probably the hardest thing to do, because there are many players who are trying to take your spot and to take your place. "It is healthy to have that but to be able to get my 100th cap in nine years, essentially shows great consistency." - Agencies

PCB China bans 43 soccer players and officials for life BEIJING: The Chinese Football Association has banned

for life 38 soccer players and five club officials after a two-year investigation into match-fixing and gambling, as part of a crackdown on corruption in one of China's most popular sports. The investigation found that 120 matches had been fixed, with 41 football clubs involved, Zhang Xiaopeng, a senior official from the Ministry of Public Security, told a press conference in Dalian, according to the official Xinhua News Agency. The report did not say whether all the matches were in China. Three former Chinese internationals JinJingdao, Guo Tianyu and Gu Chao and South Korean player Son Jun-ho were among those banned for life, according to findings made public on Tuesday at the press conference by the ministry and the General Administration of Sport of China, at which the CFA president was also present. None of the players have made any public comment. Son was released in March after being detained for 10 months in China and returned to South Korea. Zhang said 44 individuals faced criminal penalties for bribery, gambling, and the illegal opening of casinos, while 17 others were found to have engaged in bribery and match-fixing. CFA President Song Kai said 43 of the 44 had been banned for life from football-related activities, and 17 others received five-year bans. The findings were announced ahead of a World Cup qualifier in Dalian later on Tuesday where Team China will host Saudi Arabia after last week's 7-0 loss away to Japan. The sport has long grappled with corruption, which fans have blamed for the underperformance of the men's national team. China in turn has ramped up its crackdown on soccer-related graft. In August, a former vice president of the national football association was sentenced to 11 years in prison for accepting bribes, and a former director of the competition department was sentenced to seven years imprisonment for the same offence. A former chairman of CFA was sentenced to life in prison in March. - Agencies

A new schedule will be announced later. PCB's announcement came at the end of the first day of the initial round of the three-day matches. Sources indicate that today's play at various centers will not be included in the official records.

Rebecca Cheptegei alleged killer dies from burns

Ugandan Olympian suffered burns to more than 75% of her body in the September 1 attack and died four days later

NEW YORK: The former partner of Ugandan athlete Rebecca Cheptegei, who is accused of killing her by dousing her in petrol and setting her on fire, has died from burns sustained during the attack, the Kenyan hospital where he was being treated said on Tuesday. Cheptegei, 33, who competed in the marathon at the Paris Olympics, suffered burns to more than 75% of her body in the September 1 attack and died four days later. Her former boyfriend, Dickson NdiemaMarangach, died at 7.50 p.m. (12.50 p.m. ET) on Monday, said Daniel Lang'at, a spokesperson at Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital in Eldoret in western Kenya, where Cheptegei was also treated and died.

"He died from his injuries, the burns he sustained," Lang'at told Reuters. Local media reported that he had suffered 30% burns when he assaulted Cheptegei as she was returning home from church with her children. Cheptegei, who finished 44th in Paris, is the third elite sportswoman to be killed in Kenya since October 2021. Her death has put the spotlight on domestic violence in the East African country, particularly within its run-



ning community. Rights groups say female athletes in Kenya, where many international runners train in the high-altitude highlands, are at a high risk of exploitation and violence at the hands of men drawn to their prize money, which far exceeds local incomes.

"Justice really would have been for him to sit in jail and think about what he had done. This is not positive news whatsoever," said Viola Cheptoo, co-founder of Tirop's Angels, a support group for survivors of domestic violence in Kenya's athletic community. "The shock of Rebecca's death is still fresh," Cheptoo told Reuters. Cheptoo co-founded Tirop's Angels in memory of Agnes Tirop, a rising star in Kenya's highly competitive athletics scene, who was found dead in her home in the town of Iten in October 2021, with multiple stab wounds to the neck. Ibrahim Rotich, Tirop's husband, was charged with her murder and has pleaded not guilty. The case is ongoing. Nearly 34% of Kenyan girls and women aged 15-49 years have suffered physical violence, according to government data from 2022, with married women at particular risk. The 2022 survey found that 41% of married women had faced violence. Globally, a woman is killed by someone in her own family every 11 minutes, according to a 2023 UN Women study.

Death toll from Typhoon Yagi in Vietnam climbs to 58

HANOI: The death toll from Typhoon Yagi has risen to 58 in northern Vietnam after heavy rains triggered landslides and flooding, local media reported on Tuesday.A total of 58 people have been confirmed dead, and 40 others went missing due to the most powerful tropical storm of the year, Vietnam News reported, citing the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development. Among the casualties, at least 12 people died due to the storm, 72 from landslides and flash floods, six from floodwaters, and eight from the collapse of Phong Chau Bridge in Phu Th province on Monday. The typhoon hit northern Cao Bang, Lao Cai, Quang Ninh, Hai Phong, and Phu Th provinces. More than 740 people also got injured due to the typhoon and flooding. The storm has also led 85 boats to sink in Quang Ninh, damaging thousands of hectares of rice, crops, and fruit trees. The flood also swept away 1,577 fish farming cages and killed 1,107 livestock and 678,945 poultry. The heavy rain has continued in different areas since early Tuesday, according to the National Centre for Hydrometeorological Forecasting. The Vietnamese government has deployed thousands of military personnel to carry out relief and res cue operations in the affected areas. More than 50,000 people from coastal cities have been evacuated due to the typhoon. Typhoon Yagi, which struck the north ern regions of the Philippines on Sept. 3, caused severe rain, flooding, and landslides, resulting in 20 deaths and 26 missing. The typhoon, which hit China's Hainan province on Sept. 7, led to the deaths of four people and injuries to 95 others.-Agencies

Russia rules out talks with Kyiv

MOSCOW: Russian Security Council Secretary Sergey Shovgu said on Tuesday that Moscow will not engage in negotiations with Kyiv until Ukrainian troops are ousted from Russian territory, "As long as we haven't pushed them off our land, there will be no negotiations," Shoygu vowed in an interview with Russia-24 television. The former defense minister condemned Ukraine's at tempts to reach the Kursk Nuclear Power Plant (NPP), saying such actions are malicious and tantamount to the "height of terrorism." "There's a significant issue here - the Kursk Nuclear Power Plant. We do not and will not negotiate with terrorists. Their desire to commit nuclear terror at the Kursk NPP represents the highest level of terrorism. They aimed to advance and seize the plant, but thankfully, they failed," he emphasized. Russia and Ukraine continue fighting in the Kursk region, where Kyiv launched an incursion on Aug. 5-6, and in eastern Ukraine, where Moscow continues to claim advances

BRIGHTON: Prime Minister Keir Starmer on Tuesday pledged to reset industrial relations strained by widespread strike action, as he became the first UK leader to address the annual meeting of Britain's trade unions in 15 years. The speech, however, came

among early tensions be-

tween the young government and major unions over plans to cut energy benefits for millions of pensioners. Starmer's Labour party billed the speech as a powerful symbol that the centre-left party is back in government after nearly a decade and a half of Conservative rule.

"Partnership is a more difficult way of doing politics," Starmer said, seeking to

draw a line under years of strike action and tensions between unions and the previous administration. Labour has historically been allied with trade union organisations, which contribute a substantial amount to the party's income. The Trade Union Congress (TUC), the umbrella body of 48 member unions comprising more than 5.5 million working people, helped found Labour in the early 20th century. Gordon Brown was the last premier to deliver a speech to its conference in 2009. "It's time to turn the page - business and unions, the private and public sector united by common cause, to rebuild our public services and grow our economy in a new way," Starmer, 62, told TUC delegates

in the seaside resort of



Brighton. "No one in this room wants to hear such a gloomy forecast, I get that," said Starm-

Labour has also laid out proposals to legally ban practices such as "fire and rehire" - where employers let workers go in order to rehire them on contracts with inferior terms - and to ban zero-hours con-

tracts which leave work-

ers without a minimum number of hours to be worked. That has prompted concern among some business leaders while Starmer said his government would also scrap legislation introduced by the Conservatives that set higher thresholds for strike action. The TUC has welcomed the pay deals as a "crucial first step" but tensions are already emerging between some major unions and the new government. "It's good to have a Labour government," Rail, Maritime and Transport (RMT) union general secretary Mick Lynch told AFP. "But they need to be ambitious and they need to be bold and they need to be radical." The disagreements are in part caused by finance minister Rachel Reeves's

promise of imposing "iron discipline" over public finances to claw back what she says is a £22-billion (\$28.8-billion) black hole inherited from the Tories. "They've got a problem because they've given themselves these fiscal rules," said Lynch. "It will make it very difficult for them to deliver what they've promised and also what the country needs."Lynch was among union leaders to call on Starmer to reverse his government's decision to scrap winter fuel benefits for 10 million elderly people. He has described it as a "historic mistake", while Unite boss Sharon Graham accused Labour of opting to "pick the pocket of pensioners" while leaving the richest "totally untouched".

launches Polaris Dawn mission KENNEDY

CENTER: SpaceX launched its daring Polaris Dawn mission on Tuesday, a multiday orbital expedition carrying a four-member civilian crew for the first spacewalk by non-professional astronauts. The crew, led by Shift4 Payments CEO Jared Iscaacman, is also aiming to fly deeper into space than any other manned mission in more than half a century, reaching a peak altitude of 870 miles (1,400 kilometers). "Liftoff of Polaris Dawn!" SpaceX said on X, alongside a photo of the take-off. The highlight of the mission will be the first spacewalk composed entirely of non-professionals, who are wearing sleek, newly developed SpaceX extravehicular activity (EVA) suits outfitted with heads-up displays, helmet cameras and an advanced joint mobility system. Applause broke out across the mission control center as the Dragon capsule separated successfully from the main engine and the first glimpses of Earth came into view.—APP

Arab ministerial meeting opens in Egypt to discuss Gaza

CAIRO: An Arab ministerial meeting convened in the Egyptian capital, Cairo, on Tuesday to discuss Israel's ongoing offensive on the Gaza Strip. Addressing the meeting, Arab League Secretary-General Ahmed Aboul Gheit called for halting the Israeli onslaught on the Palestinian enclave. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is "unwilling to agree to a cease-fire in Gaza," he said. "There is no choice but to halt the war," he added. The ministerial meeting, chaired by Yemen, is also attended by Turkish Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan, EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell, UNRWA Commissioner-General Philippe Lazzarini, and UN Senior Humanitarian and Reconstruction Coordinator for Gaza Sigrid Kaag. "The Muslim world will do whatever it takes to preserve the Islamic identity of Haram al-Sharif with the same spirit," said Fidan during his address at the meeting. He also warned supporters of the Israeli prime minister, saying that they are also accomplices to the ongoing genocide in Gaza. "They will also be held accountable," he added. The meeting discusses ways to end the ongoing Israeli attacks in Gaza and the West Bank, and diplomatic and legal measures to stop aggressive Israeli policies aimed at displacing Palestinians from their land, according to its announced agenda. It also addresses the situations in several Arab countries such as Libya, Yemen, Sudan, and Somalia and security of navigation and energy supplies in the Gulf region. Israel has continued a brutal military offensive on the Gaza Strip since an Oct. 7 Hamas attack despite a UN Security Council resolution demanding an immediate cease-fire. More than 41,000 people have since been killed, mostly women and children, and nearly 95,000 others injured, according to local health authorities.-APP

Indian state orders internet blackout. curfew

NEW DELHI: India's strife-torn northeastern state of Manipur ordered an internet blackout on Tuesday, after imposing a curfew following days of deadly ethnic violence and clashes between protesters and police.

Manipur has been rocked by periodic clashes for more than a year between the predominantly Hindu Meitei majority and the mainly Christian Kuki community, dividing the state into ethnic enclaves. At least 11 people were killed last

week as hostilities between the two communities erupted again after months of relative calm. A notice from the state's home ministry ordered all internet and mobile data services in the state to be shut off for five days in order to bring the latest unrest under control. "Some anti-social elements might use social media extensively for transmission of images, hate speech and hate video messages inciting the passions of the public," the notice said. "It has become necessary to take adequate measures to maintain

law and order in public interest, by stopping the spread of disinformation and false rumours." Internet services were shut down for months in Manipur last year during the first outbreak of violence, which displaced around 60,000 people from their homes according to government figures. Thousands the state's residents are still unable to return home owing to ongoing tensions. Hundreds of Meitei people in the state capital Imphal defied a curfew imposed earlier Tuesday to demand security forces take action against Kuki insurgent groups,

whom they blame for the latest spate of attacks. Indian TV broadcasters showed the police firing tear gas in an effort to disperse the rally. Student-led protests on Monday turned violent after the crowd threw stones and plastic bottles at security forces, police said in a statement. Protesters in another district snatched arms from police and fired at them, the statement added. "One police personnel was hit on the left thigh by a live round and another police personnel was hit in the face by an unknown projectile," it said. The protests were

motivated by a series of insurgent attacks using "improvised" projectile weapons and drone attacks that killed 11 people last week, in what police called a "significant escalation" of violence. Long-standing tensions between the Meitei and Kuki communities revolve around competition for land and public jobs. Rights activists have accused local leaders of exacerbating ethnic divisions for political gain.

Israeli strike kills 40 in humanitarian

CAIRO: Gaza's civil defense agency said Tuesday that an Israeli strike on a humanitarian zone in the south of the Palestinian territory killed 40 people and wounded 60 others, with the Israeli army saying it had targeted a Hamas command center in the area.

The strike hit Al-Mawasi - in Gaza's main southern city of Khan Yunis - which was designated a safe zone by the Israeli military earin the war, with tens of thousands of displaced Palestinians seeking refuge there.However, Israel's military has occasionally carried out operations in and around the area, including a strike in July that it said killed Hamas military chief Mohammed Deif, and which Gaza health authorities said killed more than 90 people.

The ambitious climate project aims to bolster flood resilience and enhance water security across vulnerable regions in Pakistan. Ambassador Blome began his remarks by recognizing PIPS, an independent research and training facility for parliamentarians established with U.S. funding. He emphasized the institute's significant role in educating and supporting Pakistani lawmakers through extensive training and

sees a \$5 million contribution from the United States, is designed to address critical water management challenges exacerbated by climate change. Ambassador Blome likened groundwater to a battery that powers essential life functions but is increasingly unable to recharge due to changing environmental conditions. Expected outcomes include reducing greenhouse gas emissions by nearly 53,000 tons of CO2, creating 127 new groundwater storage basins, and reducing flooding hazards across 50,000 hectares. The initiative is projected to benefit approximately 687,000 people directly and over seven million indirectly in Balochistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and Sindh. The envoy highlighted the historical U.S.-Pakistan partnership in water management, citing collaborative projects like the Mangla and Tarbela dams. He underscored recent efforts under the U.S.-Pakistan "Green Alliance" framework, which focuses on renewable energy, smart agriculture, and water management. "Recharge Pakistan" builds on this longstanding partnership and represents a further commitment to addressing climate change impacts.

ISLAMABAD: The Government of Pakistan's state-of-the-art Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) project is steadfastly progressing in the Islamabad Electricity Supply Company's (IESCO) region. According to the IESCO spokesperson the project is driven by a commitment to bring power sector reforms, innovation, and exceptional customer service. In the initial phase, the installation of AMI meters is rolling out swiftly in the two operation circles of IESCO, namely Rawalpindi City and Rawalpindi Cantt. As of the latest report, over 110,000 AMI me-

ters have been successfully installed. It is expected that by 2026, the replacement of all outdated electricity meters in Rawalpindi City, Rawalpindi Cantt Circles, and Taxila, whereas all MDI meters and

in the surrounding areas, will be replaced with AMI meters, the official said adding the upgradation is anticipated to result in the provision of uninterrupted power supply and a substantial reduction in line losses. The installation of AMI meters will ensure 100pc accurate and timely meter reading, effective control of electricity theft, precise estimation of electricity demand and supply, real-time monitoring and control of electricity consumption, enhanced revenue recovery and automated registration of meter faults to the SDO office, said the spokesperson adding the step is a pioneering initiative and a new venture in Pakistan's power sector.
