Dar terms Russia a key player

Russia to support Pak bid for BRICS membership: DPM

Two sides review bilateral cooperation, pledge to coordinate on multilateral platforms such as the UN and SCO

ISLAMABD: Russian Deputy Prime Minister Alexei Overchuk stated on Wednesday that Moscow supports Pakistan's inclusion in BRICS. During a joint press conference with Pakistan's Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar in Islamabad, Overchuk responded positively to questions about Pakistan's request to join the group of leading emerging market economies. Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar stated that discussions with his Russian counterpart focused on expanding economic relations between Pakistan and Russia. During the press conference, he noted that bilateral trade reached \$1 billion last year, and both countries prioritise expanding trade ties by addressing logistical and related issues. Dar stressed the potential for energy cooperation with Russia and expressed Pakistan's eagerness to develop connectivity projects, including rail and road networks, between the two nations and beyond. Regarding regional cooperation, he highlighted that Pakistan views Russia as a key player in West, South, and Central Asia, and strengthening mutually beneficial relations with Russia is a priority for Pakistan's foreign policy. He also mentioned Pakistan's commitment to working with Moscow towards achieving peace and stability in Afghanistan. Recognising Russia's historically strong ties with the Muslim world, the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), and its stance on the Palestine conflict, Dar appreciated Russia's position that freedom of speech should not be used to disrespect revered figures or religions, as it could hurt the sentiments of the Muslim Ummah. Dar expressed hopes for continued high-level contacts and reaffirmed Pakistan's commitment to deepening relations with Russia. On his part, Deputy Prime Minister Overchuk discussed the prospects for collaboration between Pakistan and the Eurasian Economic Union, which includes Armenia,

Trial court barred from issuing final verdict

IHC issues notices to respondents over couple's acquittal pleas and adjourn hearing till September 26

ISLAMABAD: The IHC on Wednesday stopped the accountability court from issuing a final verdict in the £190 million settlement case against incarcerated PTI founder Imran Khan and his wife Bushra Bibi. A two-member bench of the high court comprising Chief Justice Aamer Farooq and Justice Miangul Hassan Aurangzeb heard the couple's acquittal plea in the said case. The PTI founder on September 7 had filed a plea seeking acquittal in the £190 million case after the Supreme Court's verdict in National Accountability Bureau (NAB) amendments case.

ECP adjourns intra-party polls case

RAWALPINDI: Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) founder Imran Khan has alleged that a constitutional amendments are being pursued to extend the terms of three top officials, including Chief Justice Qazi Faez Isa, Islamabad High Court's chief justice, and the Chief Election Commissioner. Speaking to the media at Adiala Jail, Imran claimed that the government, despite losing previous political battles, is now resorting to these amendments to safeguard fraudulent election results and protect officials in power. "They are amending the constitution to extend the terms of three umpires," Khan said. He e-Insaf (PTI) leader Ali Muhammad warned that if Chief Justice Isa is removed, investigations into the May 9 protests and the alleged rigged elections will be launched. Imran criticised the delay in addressing the May 9 events, accusing the government of trying to dismantle his party. He pointed out that he had been targeted with over 140 legal cases before May 9, adding that attempts to

ISLAMABAD: President Asif Ali Zardari has categorically rejected the elections for the Legislative Assembly of Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIOJK), asserting that these polls are no substitute for the Kashmiri people's right to self-determination. He emphasised that such elections are unacceptable to the people of Kashmir and called upon the international community to hold the Modi government accountable for ongoing human rights violations in IIOJK. He further urged the need to take concrete steps toward conducting a plebiscite in line with relevant United Nations Security Council Resolutions. The President expressed these views while talking to a delegation of migrants from IIOJK, residing in Pakistan since 1989, led by Mr Uzair Ahmed Ghazali, at Aiwan-e-Sadr, on Wednesday. Welcoming the delegation, the President condemned the Legislative Assembly elections in IIOJK, terming them as part of India's broader strategy to consolidate its illegal occupation of the region. Constitutional Package Fazal becomes a hard nut to crack for the govt

"Proposed amendment draft not acceptable in any way," says JUI-F chief

ISLAMABAD: Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam Fazl (JUI-F) Chief Maulana Fazlur Rehman, who took the centre stage as both the government and the opposition sought his support, has completely rejected the draft of the "controversial" constitutional package, aimed at making changes to Pakistan's judicial and parliamentary systems. "The draft we were given was reviewed, and it was in no way acceptable," the veteran politician said while talking to journalists after attending a luncheon at Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader Asad Qaiser's residence on Wednesday. The government pushed the proposed constitutional package amid speculation about a potential extension in the tenure of Chief Justice of Pakistan (CJP) Qazi Faez Isa, who is set to retire in October this year, following the PTI's request last month for the early issuance of



decision by Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government of imposing a levy of two percent Infrastructure Development Cess (IDC) on commercial value of export consignments has left drastic impact on business in the province by shrinking export upto 70 percent.

MULTAN: In a shocking incident, as many as 29,000 insulin vials worth Rs 20 million were allegedly stolen from the Health Department's warehouse in Multan and it left thousands of citizens in urgent need of the life-saving drug without access. The case was initially registered with Shah Shams Police Station, where Multan Police quickly launched an investigation. As part of the operation, three officials of Health Department were handed over to the Anti-Corruption Department for further inquiry. The source informed that Chief Police Officer (CPO) Multan referred the inquiry to Director Anti-Corruption for thorough investigation. The theft has triggered public concern, especially as the stolen insulin vials were meant to be distributed to diabetic patients across the region. With a large number of citizens depending on these crucial supplies, their health remains at risk as authorities work to resolve the situation. Just days before the theft, the Punjab Health Department had suspended two key officials. The missing insulin has caused a severe shortfall, leaving countless citizens without vital medication. Authorities were under pressure to recover the stolen vials and bring the perpetrators to justice swiftly to restore public confidence and ensure the health needs of those affected are met. This developing situation continues to highlight the need for tighter security measures in the handling of essential medical supplies, especially in regions where such incidents can directly impact the well-being of thousands, the sources stated.-APP

31 new dengue cases confirmed in Punjab LAHORE: The Punjab and Secondary Healthcare emphasized the impor-

Health Department confirmed on Wednesday that 31 new cases of dengue were recorded across the province in the last 24 hours. According to official data, Rawalpindi accounted for 30 of the cases, while one case was reported in Lahore. Over the past week, 266 new cases of dengue virus infections have been identified, bringing the total number of cases in Punjab in 2024 to 786. A spokesperson for the Primary

Department reassured the public that the department has made all necessary arrangements for dengue prevention, with government hospitals well-stocked with necessary medicines, including treatments for Dengue. In response to the rising number of cases, the Health Department issued an advisory,urging the public to maintain clean and dry surroundings to help prevent the spread of the virus. They

Cotton production drops by over 63pc

Ginners Association (PCGA), here on Wednesday. By September 15, 2024, only 1.43 million bales have been produced which is a remarkable drop from 3.93 million bales during the same period last year. Punjab, the country's largest cotton-producing province, has seen a severe 65.13pc decline, with only 538,686 bales produced. In comparison, 1.54 million bales were produced by this time in 2023. The Sindh province has also faced a sharp reduction of 62.5pc, producing just 895,342 bales this year compared to 2.38 million bales last year. Balochistan, contributing the least, has managed to produce only 34,900 bales so far. According to cotton experts, the steep decline is being largely attributed to climate-related challenges. Record-breaking heat, pest infestations, and erratic rainfall have devastated crops in key growing regions. This year, heatwaves of up to 48°C scorched cotton fields across Punjab and Sindh and it led to lower yields. Similarly, continuous rains over the past two weeks in Sindh have further delayed cotton picking and it resulted in labour shortages and price slumps. Despite hopes for improvement with the end of the monsoon season, the situation remains grim for many farmers, the experts remarked. High production costs are another critical issue affecting cotton growers. Fertilizers, pesticides, and labor costs have surged and it left farmers unable to maintain their crops. Compounding this problem is the lack of climate-adaptive cotton varieties, a challenge that research institutions have struggled to address due to insufficient funding. The Pakistan Central Cotton Committee (PCCC), once at the forefront of developing resilient crops, now faced severe budget cuts, hampering efforts to innovate and protect future yields. Experts warn that without investment in research and development, the country's cotton sector can face continued decline. Despite the negative outlook, some areas have reported improved fruiting and the situation offers hope for a possible recovery. Agricultural specialists also stressed that swift action was required, particularly in guiding farmers on pest management and climate resilience. They added that urgent intervention from both the government and research bodies was needed to stabilise the cotton industry. Without such measures, the country's economy, heavily reliant on textile exports, could face lasting damage, they concluded. -DNA

Turkmenistan to become first Central Asian nation to utilize Gwadar Port

set to become the first Central Asian nation to utilize Pakistan's Gwadar Port under the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) as a draft agreement between the Port of Gwadar and the Port of Turkmenbashi is under review at the cabinet level. The partnership aims to enhance regional trade by linking South and Central Asia through improved rail, fiber, and transit routes, Gwadar Pro reported on Wednesday. This deal is expected to reshape trade dynamics in the region, boosting regional trade prospects and instilling hope and confidence in the port's potential. Experts believe this strategic development at

ISLAMABAD: Turkmenistan is Gwadar will pave the way for vast regions of Central Eurasia, Afghanistan, Southern Russia, and Southwest China to converge at Gwadar. The agreement reflects both nations' dedication to strengthening trade links and promoting broader regional integration. Khalid Taimur Akram, a Central Asia and regional expert and analyst, noted that this access could offer numerous benefits to other landlocked Central Asian nations and Pakistan. Located near the Strait of Hormuz, Gwadar is strategically positioned to serve as a transit point for energy supplies to and from Central Asia. It would provide a shorter and more efficient trade route to the international seas,

costs and time for countries such as Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, and Kyrgyzstan. He said the trade from Gwadar port to Central Asian Republics (CARs) will reduce the distance to 50 percent as compared to routes through Iran, with freight charges reduced by around 30 percent. He underscored that with lower costs and shorter transit times, the volume of trade through Gwadar is likely to increase. This can lead to greater economic integration between Pakistan and CARs, fostering stronger regional ties. Akram also emphasized that by providing an alternative to tra-

ditional trade routes, Pakistan's

Gwadar Port will diversify trade options for Belt and Road (BRI) countries including CARs. This diversification reduces reliance on a single route, thereby enhancing trade security. Turkmenistan's export statistics highlight its robust trading capacity, presenting a significant opportunity for Gwadar Port to capitalize on. As per data from trading economics, exports in Turkmenistan increased to USD14.1 billion in 2023 from USD 13.5 billion in 2022. Exports in Turkmenistan averaged USD5.7 billion from 1992 until 2023, reaching an all-time high in 2023 and a record low of 64.34 USD Million in 1992. - DNA

India seeking to install a 'puppet assembly' in IIOJK through sham elections

ISLAMABAD:Chairman the Kashmir Council Euro pean Union Ali Raza Syed stated on Wednesday that India had planned to establish a puppet assembly in Illegally Indian Occupied occupied Jammu and Kashmir through sham election drama. In a statement Ali Raza Syed condemned India's decision to terminate Article 370 and 35A on August 5, 2019, which ended IIOJK's special status. He also criticized New Delhi's changes to the territory's domicile rules, allowing non-Kashmiris to settle in the disputed territory and altering its demographic composition. He said India was misleading the international community by staging assembly elections, despite deploying one million troops and banning freedom of expression and independent media. Ali Raza questioned the legitimacy of the elections while key Kashmiri leaders, including Masarrat Aalam Butt, Muhammad Yasin Malik and human rights defender Khurram Parvez, remained imprisoned in Indian jails.

Pakistan to showcase climate actions, solutions at COP29: Romina

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister's Coordinator on Climate Change and Environmental Coordination (MoCC&EC), Romina Khurshid Alam emphasized the significance of COP29 as a platform for Pakistan to present its climate actions, challenges, and potential solutions. The PM's Aide was addressing a meeting of development partners regarding preparation for 29th COP of UN-FCCC here on Wednesday. Speaking at a meeting with development partners, she highlighted the need for collaboration to achieve climate diplomacy goals, promote gender equality, and advance smart agriculture initiatives through private sector engagement. Alam underscored the urgency of addressing climate change in Pakistan, which ranks among the most vulnerable countries globally. She pointed

The floods in 2022 alone caused over 24 billion PKR in damages. She called for input from development partners to enhance Pakistan's participation in COP29, aiming to secure increased climate finance for adaptation projects as well. Alam also stressed the importance of gender equality in climate action, referencing a successful recent regional parliamentarians meeting held in Islamabad focused empowering women the green economy. Through these efforts, she aims to position Pakistan as a proactive player in global climate discussions and advocate for justice regarding loss and damage caused by climate change.

Dead body of unknown woman recovered from Margalla

ISLAMABAD: The body of an unidentified woman was found on Wednesday along the road in the Margalla Hills, about 1.5 kilometers from Monal, the victim was allegedly gunned down by unknown assailants. The police said, the woman had been shot in the head by unknown outlaws. The Kohsar Police, led by SHO Shafqat Fayaz, reached the scene and shifted the body to Polyclinic Hospital for further investigation. The police have collected the fingerprint samples of the deceased to determine her identity. The investigation into the murder is ongoing, with officers working to uncover any leads on the suspect or motive behind the killing. –**APP**

ANF seizes 539 kg drugs in eight operations

RAWALPINDI: Anti-Nar-

cotics Force (ANF) while conducting eight operations across the country managed to recover 539 kg drugs worth Rs 30 million and arrested six accused, said an ANF Headquarters spokesman here on Wednesday. He informed that 200 grams hashish was recovered from a motorcyclist rounded up near a university in Bosan Road, Multan. The accused namely Osama Rehman Khan, a resident of Khanewal, confessed to selling drugs to students of educational institutions in Multan. The arrested accused used to supply drugs to the students of various universities and colleges through the canteen and hostel staff. In another operation, 500 grams opium was recovered from a university in Rawalpindi. 500 grams hashish was recovered from a house near Sadigabad, Rawalpindi and an accused was arrested. 100 grams hashish was recovered from the possession of an accused netted near a university in Sector H-11, Islamabad. 300 grams hashish was recovered from a car intercepted near a hotel in Mansehra and an accused was arrested. The arrested accused confessed to supplying drugs to the students of educational institutions. In an operation, 2.4 kg opium was recovered from a parcel booked for Sheikhupura at a courier office on Ring Road Peshawar. 14 kg hashish and 1 kg ice were recovered from a vehicle on Pasni Coastal Highway, Gwadar and an accused was arrested during the operation. In another operation conducted in Pishin, Balochistan, 520 kg hashish was recovered. Cases under the Anti-Narcotics Act have been registered against the arrested accused and further investigations are under process. -APP

72 dengue patients under treatment in allied hospitals

RAWALPINDI :As many as 72 dengue patients are currently under treatment in Rawalpindi's Allied hospitals. During the last 24 hours 30 more cases have been reported. According to the latest report released by the District Health Authority, this year's total positive cases reach 445. The largest number of cases, 20 were reported from Pothohar Town alone during the last 24 hours. Chak Jalal Din area remains among the top affected areas of the city. Five cases were reported from areas of Chaklala Cant Board (CCB). The report shows an increasing ratio of admitted to discharged patients, which indicates number of admitted cases are greater than those who have been released after complete treatment from the hospitals. Benazir Bhutto Hospital nests largest dengue cases with 36 patients, followed by Rawalpindi Teaching hospital with 15 patients under treatment. On the other hand, the CM Mobile Health Unit conducted a check up visit in Chak Jalal Din and other areas where 335 patients were checked out of which 233 patients were checked by the health unit in Chak Jalal Din. The health unit also conducted 104 different medical tests.

ISLAMABAD: Chief Executive, the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Authority (NDRRMA), Anil Pokhrel has urged the governments of Pakistan and Nepal to work jointly to raise effective voice for effective climate action at the global climate forums.Pokhrel underscored that the joint efforts at global forums of Pakistan and Nepal should focus on demanding the world community to ensure accessible climate finance instruments for the developing countries facing adverse impacts sive interview with media at the sidelines of the regional climate dialogue, NDRRMA, Chief Exec-

utive, Anil Pokhrel said Pakistan and Nepal shared same Hindukush Himalaya region with similar landscape and monsoon patterns and also hazards like earthquakes, forest fires, floods, and landslides in its disaster-prone terrain in the Hindukush Himalaya Region. He added that the NDRRMA was eager to learn more about the NDMA, Pakistan's experiences during climatic disaster and also have an experience sharing opportunity. "In Nepal, we have been tackling hazards from a single aspect of disaster and missing inter-sectoral links of disasters. We have seen GLOF (glacial lake outburst flood) events, whereas glacial lakes and moraine dams are weakening." Anil Pokhrel said. The 2005 Earthquake in Muzaffarabad was a massive earthquake

and any such earthquake during monsoon would have more devastation like the glacial lakes' explosion chances were increasing due to faster melting in the north, he added. The NDRRMA chief pointed out that the forest fires' suite was also aggravating the GLOF activity as its black surface absorbs more heat and accelerates melting as permafrost is melting faster in the entire Hindukush Himalya Region. "We need start looking at its intersectionality and complexity of disasters that also cascades into larger devastations downstream," he said. The debate of least greenhouse gas emitter, he said was decades old, whereas the countries like Nepal and Pakistan sharing same risks need to come together as a one singular voice to negotiate more

effectively at the forums like COP forums as the COP29 was ahead in Baku, Azerbaijan. Pakistan and Nepal should work together to narrate the hazards and risks devastations faced by the two countries due to increasing global warming and climate change impacts on the region due to the historical emissions of the developed world driving glacial melt, droughts and forest fires in the region, he added. "This is where the international finance structure has to be designed in such an effective way that it should be substantial, quick, and directly drawn by the climate vulnerable countries like ours that should help in recovery and reconstruction post disasters. Anil Pokhrel said. Commenting

on mega dams construction in

the disaster Fault-line areas, the NDRRMA Chief Executive said the science and technology evolution around dams construction had evolved over the last few decades. The countries undertaking such projects should not forget in addition to one time investment in risks assessment and designing alongwith long-term observation, monitoring and network systems as there is a need to design a disaster component for it as if it fails then what do in that scenario, he added. Dr. Fareed Somroo, a health expert, in an interview with APP said that exposure to fine particulate matter can lead to low birth weight, developmen-

tal issues, and increased risks of preterm birth in infants. Pregnant women exposed to pollutants face higher risks of miscarriage and complications like pre-eclampsia. For the elderly, who often suffer from pre-existing conditions, air pollution increases the likelihood of chronic respiratory and heart diseases, further straining rural healthcare systems. The pollutants from traditional cooking practices not only damage health but also contribute to deforestation and the release of black carbon, which worsens global warming. Prolonged exposure to these pollutants leads to respiratory infections, lung diseases, and increased risks of heart attacks and strokes. In rural areas where healthcare

is limited, these health issues are particularly troubling. Addressing the challenge of air pollution in rural areas requires comprehensive action. Climate expert Naseer Memon in response to this scribe suggests enforcing emission standards in industries and promoting cleaner technologies across both urban and rural settings. He emphasizes the importance of adopting improved cookstoves and alternative fuels to reduce indoor air pollution. Memon also advocates for better waste management practices in rural areas, including banning the open burning of trash and crop residues. Storm warning on immigration


AS-DE-CALAIS, France, Sept. 3: illegal immigration kills again. The umpteenth sinking of a boat in the English Channel on the way to Britain claimed the lives of 12 Eritreans, including children. Rescuers managed to save 51 others. On Sunday, eight others died in the same conditions. Forty-five people have now died attempting these crossings since January, setting a record. In 2021, there were 30, including 27 in the same shipwreck. Since 2018, 136,000 people have made the crossing using these boats of death, on which smugglers now shamelessly transport 70 to 80 people, in comparison to 30 to 40 people previously, into a country where immigration is increasingly being condemned by the far right. Southport, England, July 29. No one has forgotten the tragedy. In a dance hall, someone savagely attacked children with a knife, killing three girls aged 6 to 9. A 17-year-old was arrested. The police had declared that his attack was not linked to terrorism and urged people to remain calm, but false information very quickly portrayed him on social media as an illegal migrant, an asylum seeker, a Muslim, who had arrived in the UK by boat. None of this was true. As soon as he came to power, Prime Minister Keir Starmer reacted firmly against the far right and the assailants who had attacked Muslims, asylum seekers and police officers across the country. Following the latest shipwrecks in the English Channel, he announced that he would speed up the process regarding asylum applications, increase the deportations of illegal migrants and fight harder against smugglers. The UK, where carrying firearms is strictly limited, is now experiencing an upsurge in knife-related violence, often involving young individuals. Since 2010, the number of incidents has increased by a third. This is similar to Germany. Solingen, North Rhine-Westphalia, Germany, Aug. 23. A Syrian refugee stabbed participants in a "festival of diversity," killing three people and injuring several others. Before him, on June 2 in Mannheim, a 25-year-old extremist from Afghanistan stabbed a 29-year-old policeman to death. Each crime shook the country. In response, the government of Olaf Scholz pledged to restrict the carrying of knives in public and to speed up the deportation of illegal refugees. As the triple homicide in Solingen occurred only a week before important regional elections in Saxony and Thuringia, Scholz announced a stricter policy on migration and had 28 Afghans deported to Kabul. This was a first since the Taliban returned to power in 2021. However, this did not reassure the public, which was up in arms regarding the government's handling of immigration. The Alternative for Germany won the elections in Thuringia, the first victory of its kind for the far right in the post-Second World War period. In Saxony, the same party was hot on the heels of the Christian Democrats. Scholz's Social Democratic Party fell back and his allies collapsed. A serious setback for the chancellor, one year before the legislative elections of September 2025. The far right is attracting more and more German voters, thus becoming an earthquake in a country that claimed to be a proud advocate for welcoming migrants back in the days of Angela Merkel.

Afghanistan feature in White Houserace

HREE years after the chaotic US withdrawal from Afghanistan, both Democrats and Republicans are revisiting the incident. Neither side is providing a credible or comprehensive explanation as to why Kabul fell into the hands of the Taliban on Aug. 15, 2021. Instead, the lack of an Afghan strategy on the part of both the Biden and Trump administrations is being filled with mutual accusations of "you lost Afghanistan." The issue now is how the Afghan problem will fit into the 2024 presidential election campaign. Republicans believe that Democrats are vulnerable on the issue of Afghanistan. It was the Biden administration that failed to stop the Taliban's onslaught on Kabul and protect the government of then-President Ashraf Ghani. More problematic was the Daesh suicide bombing attack on Kabul airport that killed 170 Afghans and 13 American military personnel during the evacuation. Republicans in Congress last week released a report, which was the culmination of a three-year investigation into the factors and circumstances that led to the US failure in Afghanistan. Among its findings were: "(The Biden administration) had the information and opportunity to take necessary steps to plan for the inevitable collapse of the Afghan government, so we could safely evacuate US personnel, American citizens, green card holders and our brave Afghan allies." Days earlier, as the report on Afghanistan was being finalized, House Republicans subpoenaed Secretary of State Antony Blinken, requesting his testimony on the Afghan withdrawal. So far, he has not responded to their demands. Instead, a State Department spokesperson said: "The secretary has testified before Congress on Afghanistan more than 14 times - more than any other Cabinet-level official. It is disappointing that, instead of continuing to engage with the department in good faith, the committee has issued yet another unnecessary subpoena." Additionally, a White House spokesperson described the Republican report as "cherry-picked facts, inaccurate characterizations and preexisting biases." The timing of the report on Afghanistan holds significant weight in the 2024 election race, but it remains unclear if it will influence voters. The report aims to blame President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris for failing to maintain the pro-Washington government in Afghanistan. According to Texas Republican Rep. Michael McCaul, who chaired the investigation as a member of the House Foreign Relations Committee, "at each step of the way, the administration picked optics over security." The report itself is a thorough attempt to uncover what happened in Afghanistan. It spans more than 350 pages and includes testimony from numerous senior military officers at the Pentagon. Seven lengthy public hearings were held and about 20,000 pages of State Department documents and correspondence were examined. Among the key sources was retired Col. Seth Krummrich, who was the chief of staff for the Special Operations Command Central. He noted: "I called their advance 'the red blob.' We tracked the Taliban advance daily, looking like a red blob gobbling up terrain.

IYADH last week hosted four high-level meetings with four of the original five BRICS members. Although not planned that way, the meetings with BRICS members indicated how the Gulf Cooperation Council countries are balancing their strategic partnerships. On Wednesday, Chinese Premier Li Qiang met with the Saudi leadership and also with the GCC. And on Sunday and Monday, the GCC foreign ministers met with the foreign ministers of Russia, India and Brazil. These four important powers are founding members of BRICS and hold similar views on global affairs, including on the war in Gaza and the underlying Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Brazil, China, India and Russia represent important strategic pivots in their respective regions. China is the largest and most powerful nation in East Asia, just like India in South Asia, Brazil in South America and Russia in Eastern Europe. With a combined population of more than 3 billion people, they account for about 40 percent of humanity.

Economically, the four countries and the six GCC member states together represent a formidable economic force, with a combined gross domestic product of \$29 trillion, accounting for more than 26 percent of the global economy.

The highest ranking of the foreign dignitaries was Li, who became the eighth premier of China in March 2023. He is believed to be President Xi Jinping's right-hand man and was chosen as a member of the Chinese Communist Party's most powerful standing committee in October 2022. Like other senior Chinese officials, Li expressed great interest in the GCC-China strategic partnership, which was established when Xi met with the GCC's heads of state in December 2022, but their engagement goes back decades. China has been very consistent as probably the superpower that is most supportive of the organization, in addition to being quite keen on its partnerships with individual GCC member states. The GCC has signed more agreements with China than any other nation, in standards, patents, civil aviation, economic cooperation and strategic dialogue. More agreements are under discussion. China and the GCC are very close energy partners. More than 30 percent of China's oil imports come from GCC exporters and it is the destination for 25 percent of the GCC's petrochemical exports. They are now discussing cooperation February in a speech before the Russian Federon renewable energies, including nuclear and hydrogen energy. India is the GCC's third-biggest trading partner after China and the EU, with two-way trade at \$174 billion. The two sides have also agreed to upgrade their political and security dialogue. In recognition of this fact, they last week agreed on a joint action plan for the next five years. The plan includes trade and investment promotion and cooperation in the areas of energy, agriculture and food security, transport, health, education and cultural engagement, in addition to political and security dialogue. The GCC established a strategic dialogue with Russia in 2011 and the two sides have had many rounds of political consultations at the ministerial and sub-ministerial levels since. The two sides share common views on fundamental issues such as Gaza, Palestine and Yemen, where Russia has been consistently on the right side of history. However, the GCC and Russia do not see eye to eye on a number of other important issues, such as Syria and Russia's military ties with Iran. The GCC states have voted for UN resolutions on Ukraine but have refrained from imposing sanctions. Russia has praised the GCC's balanced position on the conflict and especially its members' mediation, which has resulted in several waves

The concept of a rules-based world order, which the US and its European allies cling to, is increasingly becoming obsolete, Lavrov said. Instead, a new, just and democratic multipolar world order is emerging, centered on the UN and a balanced consideration of the interests of all countries. The influence of states in the Global South and East is rapidly expanding, with the GCC states playing a rapidly increasing and major role, he added. GCC-Russia trade is relatively limited, at about \$21 billion in 2023, but there are important economic links and greater potential for more trade and investment. Through OPEC+ and the Gas Exporting Countries Forum, Russia and the GCC oil and gas producers coordinate their policies to maintain market stability.

Brazil and the GCC established their first links about 20 years ago by concluding agreements with MERCOSUR, in which Brazil is the dominant power. In 2005, the Brazilian President Lula da Silva convened in Brasilia the first ever Arab-South American summit, which was followed by two more summits in Da Silva's first two terms. The GCC countries were fully supportive of his ideas and Qatar hosted the second summit in Doha. Following the first summit, joint investment and trade-promotion events with Brazil led to a quadrupling of trade exchanges in just a few years, while direct shipping and air links were also established between Brazil and the GCC countries for the first time. Now that Da Silva is back in power, he may again try to energize the two regions for greater political and cultural engagement and more trade and investment.

In addition to Gaza and the Palestine question, maritime security is a top priority for all of these nations, all of which expressed alarm at the Houthis' Red Sea attacks. While of course differences remain on this and other issues, the 10 countries vowed to strengthen their partnerships and work together to tackle global and regional challenges. It was indeed a very busy week for Riyadh.

Were the exploding pagers in Lebanon part of a larger Israeli blunder?

ENJAMIN Netanyahu's security cabinet has approved a plan to wage a war on Lebanon under the pretext of returning Israeli settlers to their colonies in the northern part of historical Palestine. Historically, the Israeli government does not usually discuss its military plans in the public arena. The security cabinet meeting, initially scheduled for Sunday, was delayed to Monday until after the arrival of American envoy Amos Hochstein. Following their meeting, Israeli Prime Minister told Hochstein thanked the US for its support, but "Israel" "will do what is necessary" for the return of the Israeli settlers to the "Jewish only" colonies located along the frontlines with Lebanon. According to Israeli sources, the Biden administration wanted to avoid a broader regional conflict that might involve the Resistance in Lebanon, Yemen and Iran, at least until after the US elections in November. However, all indications suggest that Netanyahu is resisting the American demands, and even disregarding the opinion of his own war minister who does not believe it's the right time to expand the war. Netanyahu's preparations for the war could also include dismissing Yoav Gallant and replacing him with Gideon Sa'ar from the racist New Hope party. This prompted Biden to send Hochstein to warn the Israeli prime minister of dangerous consequences if he moves ahead and dismisses Gallant. military units along the Lebanese border. As an example, on September 16, leaflets in Arabic were dropped in South Lebanon ordering residents to leave their homes and warning that civilians who remain become legitimate Israeli targets. But shortly afterward, the Israeli military announced that no official evacuation order had been issued and that the leaflets were distributed without proper authorization. Besides the hollow excuse of the lack of proper authorization, army units do not have printing machines to prepare leaflets that include the exact date and timing - 4:00 p.m. (13:00 GMT) - by which civilians should complete their evacuation. Leaflets are typically brought by other specialized units to the frontline. This raises the question: Could the leaflets have been part of earlier war plans? Did Hochstein's visit force a delay in the timing, but the change wasn't communicated down to the unit responsible for distributing the leaflets? Then on the following day, Tuesday September 17, approximately 3000 pagers exploded simultaneously across Lebanon. Is there a connection between the original timing of the leaflets and the detonation of the pagers? The above two incidents suggest a serious misstep and could have possibly derailed the original Israeli war plans against Lebanon. In fact, these miscalculations may potentially become larger than "Israel's" security screw-up on October 7, 2023. Before arguing the points for this hypothesis, one must acknowledge that booby-trapping the pagers was possibly one of the most sophisticated espionage operations orchestrated by the Israeli Mossad; no less than the assassination of Ismail Hanieh in Tehran. Having stated the above, however, one might be surprised in concluding that as far-reach-

ing as this covert action was for the Israeli spies, in all likelihood, this was a failure. The Israeli terrorist assault resulted in the killing of 11 Lebanese, including two children, and injuring close to 3000 individuals. Despite what was reported in the managed Western media, many were innocent civilians, some were driving cars, while others were shopping in crowded markets.

In this attack, "Israel" did not aim to merely terrorize civilians, they do that daily. The targeting of the pagers was intended to disrupt the communication channels for Resistance operatives, as well as the civilian infrastructure such as hospitals and Civil Defense. Therefore, for the above to achieve optimum effectiveness, such an operation would need to have taken place during the initial Israeli military attack, not on a normal afternoon in Lebanon, hence the relationship between the "unauthorized" leaflets ordering Lebanese civilians to evacuate by 4 p.m. September 16, and the flub of the exploding pagers precisely 24 hours later. In essence, it appears that "Israel" had initially prepared to order the evacuation ahead of a planned military action on the 16th. At the same time, the pagers were programmed to detonate during the initial phase of the war, 24 hours later, to disrupt communication channels, and create confusion and disarray in the midst of war. However, the overextended Israeli army that failed to prevent the release of the evacuation leaflets on May 16, when the war was likely delayed, also did not halt the premature detonation of the pagers on September 17. The last oversight, the second within 24 hours, may have resulted in a missed strategic opportunity for the Israeli army, and another blunder for the Israeli leadership.

Italy's World Cup icon Schillaci

ROME: Italian icon Salvatore Schillaci, the top scorer at the 1990 World Cup, has died aged 59. Schillaci, better known as 'Toto', scored six goals to win the Golden Boot at the 1990 World Cup on home soil. Italy lost in the semi-finals, but Schillaci was also awarded the Golden Ball as the best player and gained hero status. Schillaci was diagnosed with colon cancer in 2022. Capped 16 times for his country, scoring seven goals, he represented Italian giants Juventus and Inter Milan after beginning his club career at Messina. Juventus, whom Schillaci joined in 1989, said: "We immediately fell in love with Toto. His desire, his story, his being so wonderfully passionate, and it showed in every game he played. "We at Juve were lucky enough to get excited about him before - in that incredible summer of 1990 - the whole of Italy did, captivated by those wonderfully energetic celebrations of his." Schillaci scored his first goal of the 1990 World Cup as a substitute against Austria, and after another substitute appearance against the United States earned his first start against the Czech Republic. Partnering Roberto Baggio up front, Schillaci scored again as Italy's campaign built momentum, and his hero status was confirmed with further goals in the subsequent knockout round matches against Uruguay and the Republic of Ireland in the quarter-finals. Despite opening the scoring in the semi-final against Argentina, Italy lost out on penalties in Naples - but Schillaci sealed the Golden Boot with his sixth goal of the tournament in the third-place play-off against England. He would finish runner-up to Germany's World Cup-winning captain Lothar Matthaus for the 1990 Ballon d'Or. New AI laws to crack down on election deep fakes in the US

CALIFORNIA: Governor

California Gavin Newsom signed several groundbreak ing laws aimed at regulating the artificial intelligence (AI) sector, positioning the state as a leader in AI oversight. Among the new legislation announced, are three laws focused on curbing AI deepfakes that could influence elections in the US, and two others protecting actors from unauthorized AI clones of their likeness or voice. The law AB 2655 requires major platforms like Facebook and X to remove or label AI-generated election-related deepfakes. Additionally, AB 2355 mandates the disclosure of AI-generated political advertisements. These measures are part of a broader national conversation, as the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) is also considering similar regulations. Two other laws AB 2602 and AB 1836 specifically target the media industry, requiring studios to seek permission before using AI replicas of actors, living or deceased. These laws were backed by the Screen Actors Guild - American Federation of Television and Radio Artists. Newsom is also reviewing SB 1047, a contentious AI bill that some argue could stifle the open-source AI community. He has two weeks to sign or veto the measure.—APP

ISLAMABAD: Food group exports from the country during the first two months of the current financial year grew by 42.39 per cent as compared to the exports of the corresponding period of the last year. During the period from July-August, 2024, food commodities valued at \$1.011 billion were exported as against the export of \$710.651 million in the same period of the last year, according to the data of the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics. In the first two months of the current financial year, the exports of commodities including rice grew by 95.58 per cent as 340,703 metric tons of rice worth \$646.667 million were exported as compared to the exports of 340,703 metric tons of \$233.992 million. The change in leadership comes as the U.S. e-commerce giant is fast expanding in India, with plans to invest up to \$26 billion by 2030, even as it faces intense regulatory scrutiny. Newsagency reported last week that India's antitrust body found that Amazon and its biggest local rival, Flipkart, violated laws by preferring select sellers, prioritising certain listings, and steeply discounting products, hurting other companies. The regulator could impose fines on the companies along with mandating them to change their business practices.-DNA

Google overturns \$1.66b

ALPHABET unit Google won its challenge on Wednesday against a 1.49 billion euro (\$1.66 billion) antitrust fine imposed five years ago for hindering rivals in online search advertising, a week after it lost a much bigger case. The European Commission in its 2019 decision said Google had abused its dominance to prevent websites from using brokers other than its AdSense platform that provided search adverts. The practices it said were illegal took place from 2006 to 2016. The Lux embourg-based General Court mostly agreed with the European Union competition enforcer's assessments of the case, but an-

ments, but annulled the decision imposing a fine of almost 1.5 billion euros on Google, on the grounds in particular that it had failed to take into account all the relevant circumstances in its assessment of the duration of the contractual clauses that it had found to be unfair," the judges said. The AdSense fine, one of a trio of fines that have cost Google a total of 8.25 billion euros, was triggered by a complaint from Microsoft in 2010. Google has said it changed the targeted contracts in 2016 before the Commission's decision. The company last week lost its final fight against a 2.42 billion euro fine levied for using its price comparison shopping service to gain an unfair advantage over smaller European rivals.—APP

US Fed set to make first rate cut since 2020

WASHINGTON: The US Federal Reserve is all but certain to cut interest rates on Wednesday for the first time in more than four years, a significant move likely to ripple through global financial markets. Senior officials at the US central bank including Fed chair Jerome Powell have in recent weeks in-

dicated that a rate cut is coming this month, as inflation eases toward the bank's long-term target of two percent, and the labor market continues to cool. The decision will affect the rates

LAHORE: Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader and former Supreme Court Bar Association president Hamid Khan once again asserted that only Justice Mansoor Ali Shah would be recognised as chief justice (after retirement of CIP Qazi Faez Isa). US reiterates 'policy'denying support to Pakmissile initiative

WASHINGTON: The United States has reiterated its "longstanding policy" denying support to Pakistan's ballistic missile programme, saying it will continue to use sanctions and other tools to ensure its own national security and protect its financial system from being used by "proliferators". In a press briefing on Tuesday, addressing a query regarding the recent sanctions considered "biased and politically motivated" by Islamabad – as per the journalist, State Department Spokesperson Matthew Miller said that while Pakistan has been a long-term partner of the US, there are disagreements. "... and when we have disagreements, we won't hesitate to act on those to protect America's interests," he said, emphasising on the country's policy to deny support to Pakistan's missile programme. "... we will continue to use our sanctions and other - our other tools to ensure our national security cannot be - cannot be impacted, and that the US

financial system cannot be used by proliferators," said Miller. The statement comes days after the US imposed sanctions. Washington had similarly targeted three China-based companies with sanctions in October 2023 for supplying missile-applicable items to Pakistan.

The Beijing Research Institute of Automation for Machine Building Industry, according to Miller's statement last week, had worked with Pakistan to procure equipment for testing rocket motors for the Shaheen-3 and Ababeel systems and potentially for larger systems. The sanctions also targeted China-based firms Hubei Huachangda Intelligent Equipment Co, Universal Enterprise, and Xi'an Longde Technology Development Co, alongside Pakistan-based Innovative Equipment and a Chinese national, for knowingly transferring equipment under missile technology restrictions, said Miller. In the briefing, the spokesperson also addressed a question pertaining to the "real reasons and concerns" that triggered the sanctions imposed on a Chinese research institute and several companies involved in supplying Pakistan's ballistic missile programme.

Israel must end presence in Palestinian territories: UN

NEW YORK: The United Nations General Assembly on Wednesday adopted a Palestinian-drafted resolution that demands Israel end "its unlawful presence in the Occupied Palestinian Territory" within 12 months. The resolution received 124 votes in favor, while 43 countries abstained and Israel, the United States and 12 others voted no. The action isolates Israel days before world leaders travel to New York for their annual UN gathering. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is due to address the 193-member General Assembly on Sept. 26, the same day as Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas. The resolution welcomes a July advisory opinion by the International Court of Justice that said Israel's occupation of Palestinian territories and settlements is illegal and should be withdrawn. The advisory opinion - by the highest United Nations court, also known as the World Court - said this should be done "as rapidly as possible," although the General Assembly resolution imposes a 12-month deadline. The General Assembly resolution also calls on states to "take steps toward ceasing the importation of any products originating in the Israeli settlements, as well as the provision or transfer of arms, munitions and related equipment to Israel ... where there are reasonable grounds to suspect that they may be used in the Occupied Palestinian Territory." The resolution is the first to be formally put forward by the Palestinian Authority since it gained additional rights and privileges

3 dead, 100 wounded in new wave of Lebanon device explosions

BEIRUT: A second wave of device explosions killed three people and wounded more than 100 in Hezbollah strongholds of Lebanon on Wednesday, officials said, stoking fears of an all-out war in the region. A source close to Hezbollah said walkie-talkies used by its members blew up in its Beirut stronghold, with state media reporting similar blasts in south and east Lebanon. AFPTV footage showed people running for cover when an explosion went off during a funeral for Hezbollah militants in south Beirut on Wednesday afternoon. Three people were killed and more than 100 wounded in the latest attacks, the Lebanese authorities said, with the health ministry also describing the devices targeted as walkie-talkies. It came a day after the simultaneous explosion of hundreds of paging devices used by Hezbollah killed 12 people, including two children, and wounded up to 2,800 others across Lebanon, in an unprecedented attack blamed on Israel. There was no comment from Israel, which only hours before Tuesday's attacks had announced it was broadening the aims its war with Hamas in this month including a seat among UN members in the the Gaza Strip to include its fight against the Palesassembly hall and the right to propose draft resolutions. tinian group's ally Hezbollah. - Agencies
