SCO meeting to strengthen regional coop: Tarar

Country received foreign remittances of worth 8.8 billion dollars during the past three months

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Information and Broadcasting Attaullah Tarar says holding the SCO Council of Heads of Government meeting in Islamabad will pave way for strengthening regional cooperation and resolving common issues.

Addressing a media workshop organized by China Media Group in Islamabad today, he said it is great honour for Pakistan to host the SCO Summit. The Information Minister said the SCO Summit is taking place at the time when our economy is on a positive trajectory and the economic indicators are showing positive trends. The Minister said the country received foreign remittances of worth 8.8 billion dollars during the past three months, while the number of tax filers has also increased due to comprehensive reforms introduced by the government. He said Pakistan's IT exports have risen to 3.2 billion dollars, showing fourteen percent increase in the overall exports of the country.

LAHORE: The Puniab government on Thursday imposed Section 144 in eight cities. According to the notification issued by the Punjab government, Section 144 will be enforced in Multan, Sahiwal, Sargodha, Gujranwala, Vehari, Pakpattan, Okara, and Wazirabad. This will prohibit all forms of political gatherings, sit-ins, rallies, demonstrations, protests, and similar activities. A spokesperson for the Punjab Home Department stated that the decision to implement Section 144 was made at the request of the relevant district administration. The measure will be in effect for three days in the eight districts, from Thursday, October 10, to Saturday, October 12.

75% challans of 2024 cases submitted in **courts: SSP**

RAWALPINDI: The Rawalpindi Police has been investigation the cases on fasttrack basis as challans of all the cases for the years 2022 and 2023, along with 75% of 2024, have been submitted in courts. As per the directives of City Police Officer (CPO) Rawalpindi Syed Khalid Hamdani, the police has made significant progress in the investigation of cases. "No case has been pending for 2022 and 2023 while challans of those registered in the first nine months of 2024 have been submitted in the courts.' Senior Superintendent of Police (Investigation) Saba Sattar said in a statement on Thursday. "Out of 30,737 cases registered during the current year, challans of 23,000 had been submitted in the courts." "Effective investigation and prosecution of cases are critical for the delivery of justice. Arresting and challaning of the accused help in punishing them," he added.

SSP Zunaira said instructions had been issued sub-divisional police officers and station house officers to ensure timely submission of challans of the cases in the courts. Senior officers were per-

:The Punjab Health Department confirmed 109 new dengue cases in the province on Thursday, reporting 96 cases in Rawapindi. In the previous week, 859 dengue cases were recorded, bringing the total number for 2024 to 2.976 so far. 

He underscored the importance of addressing these critical topics in such publications to ensure they remain central to policy planning and decision-making processes. In his remarks, Amba sador

General of ISSI, highlighted key insights from the book, focusing on its critical themes of Economy, Environment, and Society. ANF seizes 65 kg drugs in four operations

A,O Levels exams to continue amid SCO closures in ICT

ISLAMABAD :The Islama-

bad Capital Territory (ICT) administration on Thursday clarified that as it prepares to host the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) meeting, educational institutions in the Federal Capital will face closures, however, centers conducting A-Level and O-Level exams will remain open, ensuring that exams proceed as scheduled. In this regard, Deputy Commissioner (DC) Islamabad, Irfan Nawaz Memon, confirmed that students taking these exams will be unaffected by the city-wide closures. According to the DC, A-Level and O-Level exams will be held at three centers in the city: E-11, Noormahal G.T. Road, and H-8 examination centers. These centers will operate as scheduled to ensure students can take their exams without any disruption. While these exam centers will remain open, all other educational institutions across Islamabad will be closed during the SCO meeting. Meanwhile, the district administration also refuted the rumors about the closure of wedding halls, restaurants, and cafes during the SCO session. Sources clarified that there is no truth to these reports. No orders have been issued by either the federal government or the district administration regarding the closure of such venues. Wedding halls will be allowed to operate, but they will need to follow the traffic plan issued by the local authorities. Roads near the meeting venue will be closed, and there will be restrictions on traffic in certain areas.-APP

Govt financing construction of dams

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Government is financing the construction of various small, medium, and large dams/reservoirs in the country through the Public Sector Development Program (PSDP) to address growing water scarcity and drought. Scores of such projects have been planned to store surplus water which becomes available during the flood season and to provide the same for irrigation and drinking purposes when the natural flow of water in rivers gets reduced, official sources told APP here Thursday. Sharing details they said that the Federal Government is sponsoring construction of 32 dam projects, costing Rs. 1,056.985.586 million during the current fiscal year. Once completed, these projects would store about 8,429,288 acre-feet of water, they added. They said the new areas which would come under irrigation after completion of the said 32 dams would be 436,934 acres whereas the 6.4 million acre-ft water stored in Diamer Basha Dam would be utilized to augment irrigation supplies presently being made to the existing 45 million acres of the canal-irrigated land in the Indus Basin Irrigation System. In addition to the said projects, cognizant of the water scarcity and climate change sit-

uation, several projects are under planning stages, mainly including Shyok Darn (5.0 MAF), Akhori Dam Project (6.0 MAF), Chiniot Dam Project (0.9 MAF) and Murunj Dam Project (0.45 MAF) to enhance water storage.—APP

Mental health crisis reaches boiling point

ISLAMABAD: October 10 marked World Mental Health day, prompting psychiatrists to sound the alarm on the devastating repercussions of silence surrounding mental health and emphasized the urgent need for collective action to educate people to adopt healthy lifestyle, as mental health concerns continue to rise alarmingly. Talking to Private news channel, Renowned Psychiatrist Nargis Asad from Agha Khan Hospital stressed for breaking down barriers to mental health care which was crucial and we need to dismantle the obstacles that prevent individuals from seeking help, starting with stigma and lack of awareness. She said we must educate communities about mental health. normalize conversations and promote empathy. "It is time to prioritize mental health equity and ensure everyone has access to quality care, regardless of background, socioeconomic status, or geographic location," she mentioned. Dr. Nargis emphasized, "Timely diagnosis and

preventing mental disorders and related issues, adding, unfortunately, major challenges associated with mental healthcare include delayed treatment due to lack of awareness, false beliefs, and stigma attached to mental health problems." "The consequences of delayed treatment can be devastating," Dr. Nargis warned. "Untreated mental illnesses can lead to severe symptoms, impaired relationships, decreased productivity, and even suicidal tendencies," she said. "It is imperative that we address these challenges headon," she added. "Millions of people in Pakistan struggle with mental health issues, yet many remain undiagnosed and untreated," Dr. Nargis lamented. "According to the World Health Organization (WHO), over 20 million Pakistanis suffer from mental disorders, with depression and anxiety being the most common," she added.-APP



US support for Israel

ETANYAHU has spent the past year pursuing a military victory to compensate for the intelligence failure on October 7th. He aimed to restore the deterrence lost that day by delivering decisive blows to the Islamic Resistance in Lebanon. This group poses a greater threat to the Israeli occupation entity than any other front, including the Resistance in Gaza. The reality is that if any military faced the kinds of setbacks that the Lebanese Resistance has, it would likely not have survived. The Resistance has endured infiltrations of communication, attacks on key figures, and the assassination of top commanders. In his overconfidence, Netanyahu believed he had defeated the Lebanese Resistance, prompting him to initiate a ground invasion. He operated under the assumption that sustained attacks could dismantle the Resistance before it had the chance to recover. He believed that instability, low morale, and a campaign of displacement would ultimately cripple the Resistance. Alongside this, a media campaign sowed seeds of division, blaming Iran for abandoning its allies. Netanyahu has gained a measure of popularity within the entity due to this. The opposition viewed the assassination of the Secretary-General of the Lebanese resistance as a turning point. America observed these tactical successes and effectively granted the entity freedom to act without intervention, especially during an election period when decisive actions are often avoided. Netanyahu is reasserting his role in shaping Western policies in the region, using shock, force, and fear to impose his vision. This ambition was evident at the UN, where he presented maps and spoke of a Middle East shaped by his fantasies. This included the forced transfer of Palestinians, a permanent occupation of Lebanon, and attempts to limit Yemen and Iraq, all culminating in a 'regime change' in Iran from within. He also believes that if Trump returns to the presidency, he will endorse these actions and support his achievements. However, this ambition was significantly challenged by Operation True Promise 2, which shook the entity and brought reality into focus. The ongoing battle is existential for the entity. Its tactical successes hinge on destructive force, technological superiority, and intelligence. However, the cost of losses mounts with direct confrontation, and the entity will not yield except through force.

America is now redefining the functional role of the entity after decades, allowing it to undertake tasks that the US had been unable to manage for the past thirty years. The time has come for the entity to demonstrate its capacity to achieve stated objectives. The Israeli military is given a free hand now to operate as it sees fit, setting the stage for a New Middle East by the end of the year. If successful, the entity stands to gain significant rewards, potentially expanding its territory to encompass all of Palestine and parts of Lebanon and beyond. While it will receive the necessary support, America does not desire direct intervention. However, failure to defeat the Resistance could mark the end of the entity's current trajectory. The Israeli occupation entity cannot survive without American backing. If the US withdraws support, the entity's collapse is inevitable. Therefore, its operational boundaries are defined by American interests. The US is unlikely to engage directly in a counterattack against Iran, meaning Israeli responses will be limited to what America permits.




Britain and Chinese investmen

LTHOUGH the brief "golden era" of Sino-British relations between 2015 and 2017 is over, an extended period of more sober and pragmatic commercial relations may be at hand. UK media reports point to senior Chinese and British finance ministry officials setting the stage for detailed economic talks in the near future. Reports also suggest Britain's new finance minister, Rachel Reeves, may travel to Beijing early next year to discuss trade and investment. The news follows China's Vice-Premier He Lifeng's phone call with Reeves last month. Both stated an interest in resuming economic and financial dialogue which has been on ice since 2019. The new mood music emerged shortly after British Prime Minister Keir Starmer was elected in July. In his second month in office, Starmer spoke on the phone with Chinese President Xi Jinping. During their call, the leaders talked about potential areas of cooperation such as the economy, trade and education. Both also emphasised nurturing consistent and stable political and economic ties. To launch this fresh policy approach, there would be a series of bilateral dialogues involving their various ministries, which are now swinging into motion. Interestingly, Starmer's election campaign prioritised new foreign policy initiatives including a "full audit" of UK-China relations. The mere fact of this use of business terminology might suggest a greater emphasis on economic objectives in preference to volatile geopolitical issues. During his election campaign, Starmer had championed wealth creation driven by economic growth. Indeed, from the outset, China may well have been considered when the Labour government was setting ambitions to deal with the UK's deepening economic disparities. The focus would likely be on the economic upgrading of regions outside the wealthy centres of London and surrounding southeast England. ONo doubt, turning this complicated objective into reality will require attracting substantial levels of investment into England's north and midlands. The Labour Party lost its traditional heartlands in an unprecedented swing to the ruling Conservatives in 2019, but which it regained this year. Starmer is well aware that retaining these pivotal regional constituencies would require successfully activating this policy – a feat easier said than done. After his party won these regions in 2019, then prime minister Boris Johnson talked about "levelling up" between the north and the south. In the end, the agenda fizzled out. Part of this was due to the Covid-19 pandemic, which hit Britain hard. Even so, longer-term policy errors also played a role, including Johnson's and successive Conservative governments' assaults on inward Chinese investment. In 2020, Johnson's government decided to remove Chinese telecoms company Huawei Technologies from Britain's 5G mobile network. The Conservative government then introduced the National Security and Investment Act 2021. China says UK has 'poisoned' Sino-British relationship over Hong Kong and Huawei Under Rishi Sunak, the UK forced the highly-publicised sale of a stake held by a Chinese state-owned company in a British nuclear plant project. Major deals involving Chinese investment were blocked, including the purchase of an advanced semiconductor facility in Wales and the licensing of state-of-the-art robot camera technology from Manchester.

HOUGH the U.S. President is from the Democratic Party, his party does not hold a majority in either the Senate or House of Representatives. In the Senate, Republicans have 49 seats, while Democrats hold 47 seats; however, four independents caucus with the Democrats, giving them a slim majority. In the House, Republicans control 220 seats, compared to 212 for Democrats, with three vacancies. Despite a thin pseudo majority in the Senate, passing legislation by democrates remains challenging due to tight margins and divisions within both parties. This makes control of both chambers critical for policy decisions into 2025. This would allow him to push for legislation that aligns with Republican core values: limited government, lower taxes, deregulation, and free-market capitalism. On social issues, Trump would likely advocate for traditional family values, religious freedom, pro-life policies, and gun rights, while maintaining a strong focus on national defense and assertive foreign policy. If Kamala Harris wins the election, but the Senate and House remain tilted toward the Republican Party, she would likely face significant resistance in passing key legislation, making appointments, and pursuing her party's agenda. Her goals, such as expanding healthcare, advancing climate action through the Green New Deal, and championing civil rights, LGBTQ+ rights, and women's reproductive rights, would encounter opposition from Republicans. Efforts to reduce inequality through progressive taxation, social programs, and raising the minimum wage

would also be difficult to achieve. I am currently based in Macomb, Michigan, a swing state, where voter loyalties are shifting, particularly among immigrant populations. While Detroit, home to a large Arab community, is increasingly leaning toward Trump due to his non-interventionist stance in the Middle East, much of the white population remains strongly pro-Trump. However, this simplification doesn't capture the fluid nature of voter preferences, which continue to evolve until election day. It is becoming increasingly difficult for Kamala Harris to sell her policies promoting economic inclusivity, such as raising the minimum wage, expanding healthcare access, gun control, progressive taxation, and education reform, including free community college and student debt relief. On social issues, she struggled to sell her reproductive rights, pushing to codify Roe v. Wade (the landmark 1973 U.S. Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion nationwide), access to affordable healthcare and her support to Ukraine and favors diplomatic engagement in the Middle East.. Donald Trump's campaign, on the other hand, revolves around deregulation, tax cuts, and his "America First" agenda, aiming to bring back manufacturing jobs and lower inflation by reducing foreign dependencies. He emphasizes law and order, strong border security, and minimal government intervention in healthcare. Trump supports state-level abortion restrictions and promotes school choice programs, advocating for charter schools and vouchers. His foreign policy focuses on reducing U.S. involvement in international conflicts, particularly in Ukraine, and strengthening ties with Israel through the Abraham Accords (a series of agreements brokered by the U.S. starting in 2020, normalizing diplomatic relations between Israel and several Arab nations), while adopting a tougher stance on Iran. In U.S. elections, typical Republican "red" states, like Texas, Alabama, and Wyoming, traditionally support conservative candidates, focusing on issues like gun rights, lower taxes, and limited government, providing a solid base of electoral votes in the South and rural West. On the other hand, Democratic "blue" states, such as California, New York, and Illinois, tend to favor progressive policies, with a strong base in urban areas and coastal regions, focusing on healthcare, education, and environmental issues. The key to winning presidential elections often lies in swing

states like Florida, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Wisconsin, Arizona, and Georgia, which do not consistently favor either party and can shift based on candidates' appeal and local issues. These battleground states are highly contested because their electoral votes can swing the balance in a tight race. Both parties rely on their traditional strongholds, but ultimately, securing a majority in the swing states is essential to reaching the 270 electoral votes needed to win the presidency. Recent surveys indicate that the race between Kamala Harris and Donald Trump for the 2024 U.S. presidential election remains tight, with Harris holding a slight edge in most national polls. For instance, an Ipsos poll shows Harris leading Trump 48% to 44% among likely voters. However, when undecided voters are pushed to make a choice, more lean toward Trump. Other polls, such as one from The Economist/YouGov, also place Harris ahead by about 4-5 points, but the margins are narrow, especially in key battleground states. Harris is generally favored by voters who consume mainstream and digital media, while Trump finds strong support among conservative media audiences, particularly on issues like inflation and immigration. In contrast, Harris holds an advantage on political extremism. The impact of swing states, where many results are within the margin of error, could be crucial in determining the final outcome, making the race highly competitive. The last presidential debate between Kamala Harris and Donald Trump was held on September 10, 2024, hosted by ABC News. The next presidential debate is likely to be scheduled soon. This debate would play a crucial role in shaping public opinion, particularly among undecided voters, as this debate would highlight the candidates positions on critical issues like the economy, healthcare, foreign policy, and social justice. Till that time the American economy is freezed and the entire world is eagerly awaiting the assumption of power by the most powerful person on this planet.



King of clay, Tennis legend Nadal to retire in November

Iconic tennis star says he will hang boots after Davis Cup finals in November, ending career which brought 22 titles

MADRID: Rafael Nadal, the 22time Grand Slam champion, will retire from tennis at the end of this season. The 38-year-old will represent Spain in his final appearance at next month's Davis Cup Finals in Malaga. Nadal has barely played over the past two seasons because of injuries and suggested last year he could retire at the end of the 2024 season. In a video message released on Thursday, Nadal said: "I am here to let you know I am retiring from professional tennis. "The reality is that it has been some difficult years, the last two especially. "I don't think I have been able to play without limitations." Nadal retires as the second-most successful men's singles player of all time, behind only long-time rival Novak Diokovic. Dubbed the 'King of Clay', Nadal won the French Open singles title a record 14 times, winning 112 of his 116 major matches at Roland Garros. No player has won as many Grand Slam singles titles at the same tournament. Nadal is also a four-time US Open champion and won both the Australian Open and Wimbledon twice. He also won Olympic singles and doubles gold and helped Spain win five Davis Cup finals, most recently in 2019. Alongside enduring rivals Djokovic and 20-time major cham-



pion Roger Federer, Nadal formed the 'Big Three' that dominated the men's game from the early 2000s and drew in legions of fans. "What

a career, Rafa! I always hoped this day would never come," Federer. who famously cried alongside Nadal when he retired in 2022, said.

"Thank you for the unforgettable memories and all your incredible achievements in the game we love. "It's been an absolute honour." When announcing he would not play in the 2023 French Open, Nadal said he planned to retire at the end of 2024 because of the series of injuries which were taking their toll on his body. But, having returned earlier this season, Nadal became increasingly non-committal about his future. The former world number one regularly said he wanted to keep playing as long as his body let him. Now, after a chastening defeat by long-time rival Djokovic at the Paris Olympics in July, he has decided the time is right. "It is obviously a difficult decision, one that has taken me some time to make. "But, in this life, everything has a beginning and an end."

After returning to competitive action in Brisbane in January, Nadal was sidelined again with a thigh injury, missing the Australian Open. Nadal played four tournaments during the European clay-court season, culminating in a first-round defeat at the French Open. Since then he has played just two more tournaments in Bastad and the Olympic Games at Roland Garros. Last month he was included in Spain's squad for the Davis Cup Finals, which takes place between 19-24 November.

"I think it's the appropriate time to put an end to a career that has been long and much more successful than I could ever have imagined," Nadal said. "I'm very excited that my last tournament will be the final of the Davis Cup and representing my country." Nadal was aged three when he was introduced to tennis by his uncle Toni, who encouraged him to transition to playing left-handed after seeing how strongly he could hit the ball. He turned professional aged 15 and three years later helped Spain win the 2004 Davis Cup as they beat the United States, with Nadal defeating world number two Andy Roddick. The following year, he began his dominance of the French Open, beating Argentina's Mariano Puerta in the final. Nadal's five-set win over Federer in the 2008 Wimbledon final - an epic that finished 12 minutes short of five hours - is regarded as one of the best matches in history and one of the pinnacles of their 15-year rivalry. In between those two finals, he won the 2009 Australian Open for the first time with another five-set victory over Federer,

Slam at the 2010 US Open. Although he won all four majors, Nadal will forever be synonymous with the French Open, where a metallic statue of him hitting his trademark forehand was built in 2021. From 2005 to 2014, he won nine of 10 Roland Garros titles and then five of six between 2017 and 2022.

Russia hits civilian, critical infrastructure,

injures 10 in Ukraine

KYIV: Attacks by Russian forces on Ukraine overnight and on Thursday across the country hit civilian and critical infrastructure facilities, injuring at least 10 people, Ukrainian authorities said. Russia launched two ballistic missiles on the southern city of Mykolaiv in the early afternoon, targeting critical infrastructure, regional Governor Vitaliy Kim said. Two people were wounded and a piece of equipment destroyed, he said in televised comments, without giving more details. Russian troops also shelled Kherson and damaged energy equipment, according to Roman Mrochko, head of the southern city's military administration. Several settlements and part of the city were facing power outages, he said. Separately, a flurry of Russian guided bombs early in the morning injured six people, including a 17-year-old girl, and damaged 29 buildings in the southeastern city of Zaporizhzhia, its regional governor Ivan Fedorov, said. Ukraine's air force said on the Telegram messaging app that it had downed 41 out of 62 drones launched by Russia. Russian forces also launched eight missiles, it added, while 14 drones were "locationally lost". "As a result of the Russian missile and drone attacks civilian objects and critical infrastructure facilities in the Odesa, Poltava and Donetsk regions were hit," it said. A drone attack on the central city of Kryvyi Rih injured two people and damaged a five-storey residential building, causing a fire, Dnipropetrovsk region governor, Serhiy Lysak, said. -APP

Egypt, Somalia leaders visit Eritrea amid regional tensions

NAIROBI: The leaders of Egypt, Eritrea and Somalia were due to hold a three-way summit in Asmara on Thursday against a backdrop of heightened tensions in the Horn of Africa region. Concerns about security and stability in the volatile area have mounted since Ethiopia in January signed a controversial deal with the breakaway Somali region of Somaliland, giving it long-sought access to the sea. The maritime agreement infuriated Mogadishu and highlighted regional rivalries as relations soured between Ethiopia and Somalia. The summit between Eritrean President Isaias Afwerki, Egypt's Abdel Fattah El-Sisi and Hassan Sheikh Mohamud of Somalia will focus on "bolstering the ties between the three countries as well as matters of regional security and stability," Eritrea's information ministry said on X. Mohamud, who has already visited Eritrea several times, held separate talks with Isaias shortly after his arrival late Wednesday, the ministry said. They spoke of the need to bolster cooperation "in the heavy tasks of the maintenance of the sovereignty, territorial integrity, independence, and unity of Somalia; which remains a prerequisite for its development against the backdrop of enormous challenges in the past two decades," it added. El-Sisi — whose government is siding with Somalia in its standoff

with Ethiopia – flew in on Thursday and will also meet Isaias before the tripartite summit, the ministry said. The agreement between Addis Ababa and Somaliland would see Ethiopia, one of the biggest landlocked countries in the world, lease a stretch of coastline from Somaliland for a naval base and port. But Mogadishu – which like the rest of the international community refuses to recognize Somaliland's 1991 declaration of independence – has described it as an assault on its sovereignty and territorial integrity. Somalia reacted by growing closer to Ethiopian rival Egypt, with the two countries signing a major military deal in August and Cairo pledging troops for a new African Union mission against the Al-Shabab jihadist group. Cairo has also long been at odds with Addis Ababa, particularly over the vast Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam on the Blue Nile which it says threatens its water supply. El-Sisi's office said his visit would focus on building relations with Eritrea and address "efforts to establish stability and security in the Horn of Africa and the Red Sea in a manner that supports development and serves the interests of the peoples of the region." Relations between Addis Ababa and Asmara have also been deteriorating recently, even though troops from Asmara backed Ethiopian government forces in the brutal 2020-2022 war against Tigrayan rebels. Last month Ethiopian Airlines said it was suspending flights to Asmara because of "difficult" operating conditions. Dubbed the "North Korea" of Africa, Eritrea has been ruled with an iron fist by Isaias since it formally declared independence from Ethiopia in 1993 after three decades of war.—Agencies

Steps taken to protect Beirut airport: Minister

BEIRUT: Lebanon's interior minister Bassam Mawlawi said all measures were being taken to maintain the safety of Beirut's Rafic Hariri airport in a televised address on Thursday. He emphasized that security and military agencies were doing their part to maintain security of the country. Mawlawi said Lebanon was seeking to increase the number of displaced people shelters in Beirut. "Unity is the way to maintain Lebanon's security, there is no place for strife among the Lebanese," he said. Israel has refused to rule out strikes on Beirut's civilian airport and its access roads, even as thousands of people continue to flee the country by air and road every day. United Nations officials warned Wednesday that Lebanon was staring down a "catastrophic" humanitarian crisis as the number of internally displaced people hit 600,000 and Israel presses its offensive against Hezbollah militants. Hezbollah said its fighters were locked in clashes with Israeli troops in southern Lebanon, using rocket-propelled weapons to repel Israeli attempts to breach the border. "Lebanon finds itself facing a conflict and a humanitarian crisis of catastrophic proportions," Jeanine Hennis-Plasschaert, the UN Special Coordinator for Lebanon, told a briefing. Israel has intensified air strikes on Hezbollah strongholds in Lebanon since September 23, leaving more than 1,190 people dead and forcing more than a million to flee, according to an AFP tally of official figures. The UN's humanitarian coordinator for Lebanon Imran Riza said that Lebanon was facing "one of the deadliest periods" in its recent history, reporting that 600,000 people are internally displaced over 350,000 of whom are children. Israel's ground forces crossed into Lebanon on September 30 in response to Hezbollah rocket and artillery attacks over the past year that have forced tens of thousands of Israelis out of their homes in border areas. -APP

Israeli airstrike kills 28 people sheltering in Gaza school

DEIR AL-BALAH: An Israeli airstrike on a school sheltering displaced people in central Gaza killed at least 28 people including women and children on Thursday, while three hospitals in the north were told to evacuate, putting patients' lives at risk, medics said. The strike, in which many more were wounded, occurred in the city of Deir Al-Balah where a million people have taken shelter after fleeing fighting elsewhere after more than a year of war. The Israeli military said on Thursday it had carried out a "precise strike on terrorists" who had a command and control center embedded in a school. "This is a further example of the Hamas terrorist organization's systematic abuse of civilian infrastructure in violation of international law," a military statement said. The Palestinian militant group denies such accusations. Medics said 54 other people were injured at the school. In Gaza's north, the Israeli military was pursuing an offensive begun six days ago when it sent its troops into Jabalia, the largest of Gaza's eight historic refugee camps, and the nearby towns of Beit Hanoun and Beit Lahiya. Palestinian health officials say at least 130 people have been killed so far in the operation, which Israel says is aimed at preventing Hamas from regrouping. The military has told residents to evacuate an area in which the UN estimates more than 400,000 people are trapped. The health officials said the Israeli military on Wednesday gave patients and medics 24 hours to leave the Indonesian, Al-Awda and Kamal Adwan hospitals or risk being stormed as happened earlier in the war at Al Shifa Hospital in Gaza City. Israel, which has not yet commented on evacuation orders for medical facilities, has said Hamas has command facilities concealed within the hospitals, which it denies. Hussam Abu Safiya, director of Kamal Adwan Hospital, said eight patients, mostly children with critical shrapnel wounds, were at risk inside intensive-care units should the army force their evacuation, and the hospital was also running out of fuel. Abu Safiya called for international pressure on Israel to allow medical staffers in north Gaza's three hospitals to continue to operate, saying: "Our message is a message of peace for the sake of those children." Ramesh Rajasingham, director of the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, said an OCHA-World Health Organization team could not reach Kamal Adwan Hospital despite having secured a green light from the Israeli military. "The team was forced to wait at the holding point for hours, and ultimately, the mission had to be aborted. And that's not an unusual practice," Rajasingham told a UN meeting. "In September, less than 10 percent of coordinated missions to the north (of Gaza) were facilitated by the Israeli authorities. "The essential conditions for effective aid operations are severely lacking or entirely absent," he added. Israeli bombardment near Kamal Adwan Hospital has already caused some damage to the facility, medics said. They said they know of many dead bodies lying on the roads outside the hospital because of Israeli fire. The Israeli military told residents of Jabalia and nearby areas to head to humanitarian-designated zones in southern Gaza, but Palestinian and UN officials say there are no safe places to flee to in the densely populated enclave. Philippe Lazzarini, the head of the UN Palestinian refugee agency UNRWA, told the UN Security Council: "Hundreds of thousands of people are again being pushed to move to the south, where living conditions are intolerable." Residents said Israeli forces had encircled Jabalia and ordered them to leave through one corridor. They said troops were interrogating those leaving and making arrests, while anyone trying to leave via a different route gets fired at. Hamas and ally Islamic Jihad said they continued to fight Israeli forces with anti-tank rockets and mortar bombs. The Israeli military said it killed dozens more militants, seized arms and dismantled militant infrastructure in the north. Israel began its offensive after Hamas-led militants carried out a cross-border attack on southern Israeli communities on Oct. 7, 2023, killing about 1,200 people and taking about 250 hostages, according to Israeli tallies.-APP

Reform implementation must for continued economic recovery: WB

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's economy has continued to stabilize from the recent economic crisis, with growth recovering to 2.5 percent in the fiscal year ending June 2024, says the World Bank (WB) in its latest country economic update on Thursday. The report on "The Pakistan Development Update: The Dynamics of Power Sector Distribution Reform", finds that following recession in FY23, economic activity strengthened in FY24 reflecting strong agricultural output, lower inflation, prudent macroeconomic measures, and reduced political uncertainty. But this level of growth is not sufficient to bring down poverty rates, which increased from 40.2 percent in FY23 to 40.5 percent in FY24. "Pakistan's stabilizing economy is on a path of recovery. To sustain and strengthen that positive momentum, steady implementation of the government's structural reforms plan that aims to address long-standing constraints to faster growth will be key. These include reforming an inequitable and distortive tax system, reducing inefficient expenditures and untargeted subsidies, lessening the large state presence in the economy, reducing barriers to trade and investment, and reducing losses in the energy sector" said Najy Benhassine, World Bank Country Director for Pakistan. "Implementation of planned structural policy reforms supported by a strong national

political consensus and increased private sector participation, is critical to mitigate risks, support stronger private-led growth and poverty reduction," he added. As the economic stabilization continues, macroeconomic risks remain high reflecting high financing needs, modest foreign exchange reserves, high debt and debt servicing costs, financial sector vulnerabilities, and a loss-making power sector that continues to weigh on public finances. "Pakistan's recovery is expected to continue, with real GDP growth expected to reach 2.8 percent in FY25," said Mukhtar ul Hasan, lead author of the report. "However, output growth is expected to remain below potential over

the medium-term as tight macroeconomic policy, elevated inflation, and policy uncertainty are expected to continue to weigh on economic activity. Faster growth will be needed to support significant improvements in living standards,"he added. This edition of the Pakistan development update also highlights the challenges in Pakistan's power sector and presents a roadmap for addressing these constraints through private sector participation. "Private sector participation in the power distribution sector offers the potential for better customer service, reduced losses, improved management, increased efficiency and new investment, but good outcomes are contingent on condu-

cive government policies, strong political ownership, and robust private sector participation," said Waqas Idrees, co-author of the report. The twice-yearly Pakistan Development Update is a companion piece to the South Asia Development Update, a twice-ayear World Bank report that examines economic developments and prospects in the South Asia region and analyzes policy challenges countries face. The October 2024 edition, titled Women, Jobs, and Growth, includes economic growth projections and examines the roles greater female labor force participation and trade openness can play in realizing the region's untapped economic growth potential.-DNA

Iraq repatriates 706 people from Syria camp

BAGHDAD: Iraq repatriated 706 people from Syria's Al-Hol camp, home to tens of thousands of people including family members of suspected militants, a security source said Thursday. More than 43,000 Syrians, Iraqis and other foreigners from at least 45 countries are held in the squalid and overcrowded camp in Kurdish-controlled northeastern Syria. Al-Hol houses relatives of suspected Daesh group militants alongside refugees. The security source, who requested anonymity because they are not allowed to speak to the media, told AFP that "706 people, or 181 families, returned to Iraq from Al-Hol and were transferred to the Al-Jadaa," a camp near the northern city of Mosul. It is the fourth group of Iraqis brought back from Al-Hol in a year, according to the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights war monitor. Repatriation of family members of suspected Daesh members has stirred controversy in Iraq, where the militant group seized large swathes of land before being defeated in late 2017. $-\mathbf{APP}$

UK religious hate crime hits record high over Gaza war

LONDON: Religious hate crime in England and Wales rose by a record 25 percent in the last year, fueled by a spike since the start of the war in Gaza, government data showed Thursday

data showed Thursday. The highest annual figure of religious hate crimes in over a decade was due to a rise in offenses "against Jewish people and to a lesser extent Muslims" since the Hamas attack of October 7 last year, the interior ministry said. Overall, there were 140,561 hate crimes defined as an offense based on a person's race, ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, disability or transgender identity - recorded by the police in the 12 months March. Most – 98,799 70 percent – were racially motivated. Both the overall and race hate crime figures are down five percent on the previous 12 months.

But religious hate crimes surged from 8,370 in 2022-23 to nearly 10,500 – the highest annual figure since data collection began in 2012. Hate crimes against Jewish people more than doubled to 3,282 while there were also 3,866 hate crimes against Muslims.

"The appalling levels of anti-Semitic and Islamophobic hate crimes outlined in today's figures are a stain on our society," said interior minister Yvette Cooper.—APP

S. Korea's Kang wins Nobel Literature Prize

SEOUL: The 53-year-old fic tion writer is a former winner of the Man Booker International Prize for her 2007 novel The Vegetarian. At the ceremony she was praised "for her intense poetic prose that confronts historical traumas and exposes the fragility of human life". The Nobel Prize committee has awarded the literary award since 1901 and this marks the 18th time a woman has won the prize. She has won 11m krona (£810,000) which is the amount awarded to each Nobel Prize winner this year. Han is the first South Korean winner of the prize, who was described by the Nobel Prize board as someone who has "devoted herself to music and art". The statement also add

ed that her work crosses boundaries by exploring a broad span of genres - these include violence, grief and patriarchy. A turning point for her career came in 2016. when she won the International Man Booker prize for The Vegetarian - a book which had been released nearly a decade before, but was first translated into English in 2015 by Deborah Smith. It depicts the violent consequences for a woman who refuses to submit to the norms of food intake. Han's other works include The White Book, Human Acts and Greek Lessons. - Agencies

Taiwan's president vows to resist 'annexation'

TAIPEI: President William Lai has pledged to uphold Taiwan's self-governing status in his most high-profile public address since taking office earlier this year. In a thinly-veiled reference to China's claim over the island, Lai said he would "uphold the commitment to resist annexation or encroachment

upon our sovereignty.' At the same time, Lai promised to maintain "the status quo of peace and stability across the Taiwan Strait" and pledged to cooperate with Beijing on issues such as climate change, combating infectious diseases and maintaining regional security. Responding to Lai's speech, a spokeswoman for China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs said it "exposed his intransigent position" on Taiwan independence. - Agencies

PML-N and PPP reach agreement on amendments

Both parties decided to present the amendments in Parliament following further consultation

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Muslim League - Nawaz (PML-N) President Nawaz Sharif and Pakistan Peoples Party Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari have held discussions during which the two leaders reached an agreement on constitutional amendments. Bilawal called on Nawaz Sharif at the Punjab House, where the former Prime Minister welcomed the PPP leader. The two leaders also exchanged views on the country's political situation. The discussion primarily focused on judicial reforms and constitutional amendments. They decided to present these amendments in Parliament following further consultation, with the timeline for this process to be determined in consultation with other political parties. Maryam Aurangzeb, Rana Sanaullah, Pervez Rashid, Irfan Siddiqui, and Ahsan Iqbal attended of the meeting from the PML-N. Meanwhile, the PPP delegation included Yousaf Raza Gillani, Raja Pervaiz Ashraf, Khursheed Shah, MurtazaWahab, MurtazaJavedAbbasi, Naveed Qamar, and Palwasha Khan, Nawaz Sharif is scheduled to attend a dinner in honour of a Saudi

delegation later tonight. According to an earlier working key proposals includes the establishment of a parallel Federal Constitutional Court, alongside the Supreme Court. The Chief Justice of the Constitutional Court will serve for three years, with retirement set at 68 years of age. Additionally, the amendment proposed that any member of parliament voting against party instructions will have their vote disregarded. The proposal also suggested that the authority to appoint the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and the Chief Justice of the Constitutional Court be transferred to the Prime Minister, based on recommendations from an eight-member committee of the National Assembly. One of the most notable amendments includes changes to Article 48 of the Constitution, which would prevent any court, tribunal, or authority from inquiring into advice sent by the Prime Minister or Cabinet to the President. Meanwhile, an amendment to Article 63 would ensure that votes cast against party instructions will no longer be counted. Another major proposal in the working paper involves changes to Article 78, which advocates for the creation of the Federal Constitutional Court.

Massive sales tax evasion uncovered, arrests expected

Tax fraud offenders may face arrest, with up to 5 years for Rs1 billion evasion and 10 years for higher amounts

ISLAMABAD: Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb has announced that there is tax fraud and evasion worth Rs3,400 billion in the country, and a major crackdown will be launched against sales tax evasion. Those involved in sales tax evasion will be arrested. He made this statement during a press conference alongside the Chairman of the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR). During the conference, slides of the tax returns of companies were presented, highlighting that many companies are involved in tax fraud worth billions of rupees. Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb stated that there is significant potential for tax

collection. There is Rs3,400 billion worth of tax evasion and fraud in the country

and fraud in the country. The cement sector alone could generate an additional Rs18 billion in taxes, the battery sector could yield Rs 11 billion, and the beverage sector faces a tax shortfall of Rs11 billion. He further noted that only 14% of the 300,000 manufacturers are registered, and there is a tax shortfall of Rs18 billion in the textile weaving sector. In the iron and steel sector, Rs29 billion is being lost due to excessive input tax claims. A massive fraud is occurring through the input tax adjustment system. Minister Aurangzeb emphasized that individuals involved in tax fraud can be arrested, with penalties including up to five years of imprisonment for tax evasion of Rs1 billion and up to 10 years for larger amounts. At the event, FBR Chairman Rashid Langrial stated that companies have committed large-scale tax fraud in their sales. The tax returns presented are entirely fraudulent and false. While the names of these companies are not being revealed at this stage when arrests are made, they will be based on solid evidence, and the names will be disclosed. The Chairman of the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) stated that the CFOs of companies are not the beneficiaries of tax evasion. CFOs are responsible for signing tax returns, and if there are incorrect sales tax returns, they should not sign them just because the owner tells them to.

PIA privatisation stalled as bidders demand full ownership

The government remains firm on not offering 100% shares to investors amidst the current challenges

ISLAMABAD: The privatisation of Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) has once again hit snags after the six bidding companies demanded 100% share ownership instead of the previously discussed 60%. Concerns have also been raised regarding employee contracts, which propose a three-year tenure without pension benefits. PIA sources indicate that the Privatisation Commission is struggling to address these concerns, causing delays in the bidding process. Initially scheduled for October 1, the bidding date was moved to October 30. However, further issues have since arisen, leaving the privatisation initiative in jeopardy. The government is resolute in not granting 100% shares to the bidding companies. Initially, the discussions focused on offering 60% shares, which has now shifted to 75%. The intention is to secure agreement from the companies on the 75% share offer. If they do not comply, the PIA privatisation will be postponed. The effectiveness of the Privatisation Commission in resolving the raised objections remains to be seen. On the other hand, officials from the Privatisation Commission stated that no new concerns have been presented by the bidding companies. Should any new issues arise, they will be addressed accordingly. As of now, the final bidding for PIA has not occurred, and no conclusions can be drawn until the process is complete. PIA employees and officers also face significant challenges related to the airline's privatisation. Concerns loom over the future of employees if the acquiring company does not provide contracts longer than three years and fails to offer pension and other benefits. Furthermore, the bidding companies assert that they would need to invest between \$500 million and \$600 million, contingent on receiving 100% ownership. Most of PIA's aircraft are currently leased and outdated, resulting in high operational costs. To reduce these costs, acquiring new aircraft is essential, which can only occur if the process is transparent and efficient. Previously, government disclosed that out of six selected parties, only two appear serious about acquiring PIA. The entity may not fetch as good a price as was possible during the last attempt to privatise it eight years ago. Out of the six shortlisted parties, "two parties were seriously active" during the due diligence process of PIA, said Secretary of the Privatisation Commission, Usman Bajwa. India holds state funeral for Ratan Tata

NEW DELHI: The funeral has taken place in Mumbai of Ratan Tata, the chairman of one of India's biggest conglomerates, Tata Group, who died on Wednesday aged 86. Business leaders, politicians and celebrities were among thousands of people who paid their last respects at the centre where his body lay in state before being cremated.

Maharashtra state declared a day of mourning and his coffin was given a military salute as it was taken away for the funeral rites. Ratan Tata took over as group chairman in 1991 and is credited with transforming it into a global powerhouse. During his 20-year tenure, the conglomerate made several high-profile quisitions, including the takeover of Anglo-Dutch steelmaker Corus, UKbased car brands Jaguar and Land Rover, and Tetley, the world's second-largest tea company. Tata was born in a traditional Parsi family in 1937. He studied architecture and structural engineering at Cornell University in the US. In 1962, he joined Tata Industries the promoter company of the group - as an assistant and spent six months training at a company plant in Jamshedpur. From there, he went on to work at the Tata Iron and Steel Company (now Tata Steel), Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) and National Radio
