Qatar to invest \$3bn in Pakistan after PM's visit

The minister termed the development an outcome of effective foreign policy and a milestone in Premier Shehbaz's economic agenda

ISLAMABAD: Qatar will invest \$3 billion in diverse sectors of Pakistan, including trade, investment, culture, and others following a successful visit of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, Information Minister Attaullah Tarar said on Friday. "Qatar had earlier pledged to invest \$3 billion in Pakistan," said Tarar while addressing a press conference in Islamabad today. The announcement came after PM Shehbaz returned to the country after concluding his two-day official visit to Doha. During the presser, the information minister referred PM Shehbaz's recent visit to Saudi Arabia where he met Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman and Minister for Investment Sheikh Khalid Bin Abdul Aziz Al Faleh.

The Saudi Arabia has increased investment from \$2.2 to \$2.8 billion after the signing of 34 memorandums of understanding (MoUs), he said, adding that the additional investment and investments. Targeting polio workers School children among 9 killed in Mastung explosion

Emergency declared in hospitals; Balochistan CM condemns attack targeting innocent children; over two dozen injured

five schoolchildren and a policeman, were killed in an explosion targeting security personnel guarding polio vaccinators in Balochistan's Mastung district on Friday. The incident took place near the Girls High School at the Civil Hospital Chowk in Mastung. After being informed, police and rescue officials rushed to the scene and shifted the injured and the bodies to the hospital for medico-legal formalities. The bomb disposal squad also reached the spot soon after the explosion and started collecting evidence. In a statement, the hospital administration added that 33 injured people were undergoing treatment at DHQ and Nawab Hospital in Mastung, among which most were schoolchildren. The ages of the deceased schoolchildren, which include girls and boys, are between 10 to 13 years old, while four policemen

ISLAMABAD: Amid opposition from the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) and Jamiat-Ulema-e-Islam Fazl (JUI-F), the Senate Standing Committee on Law and Justice Court judges to 25 in order to clear the backlog of cases. Government slammed over increasing petroleum prices

Hafiz Naeem expresses strong disapproval over recent increase in petroleum prices, calling it "shameful"

the federal government for increasing the price of petroleum commodities, noting that it would further increase the burden on the inflation-hit masses. Contrary to market expectations, the government raised the petrol price by Rs1.35 per litre on Thursday night, effective until November 15. As per the Finance Division's notice, petrol now costs Rs248.38 per litre, up from Rs247.03. High-speed diesel (HSD) increased by Rs3.85, now priced at Rs255.14 per litre from Rs251.29. However, kerosene oil saw a reduction of Rs1.48, bringing the price to Rs161.54, while light diesel oil dropped by Rs2.61 to Rs147.51 per litre. In a statement on X, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) said that in advertisements, the government claims that all is well, but on the other hand, it keeps on increasing prices of basic necessities. ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's annual inflation rate punched in at 7.2% in October 2024, up from 6.9% in September but markedly lower than the 26.8% recorded in October 2023, data from the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) showed on Friday. The reading reinforced months of easing inflation - which hit a historic high of 38% last year and was at 26.8% in October 2023 - ahead of a meeting of the country's central bank next week to review the policy rate, which Hafiz Naeem-ur-Rehman expressed strong disapproval over stands at 17.5%. KP govt signs agreement for power transmission line

The transmission line will deliver electricity generated from the 84 MW Matiltan Hydropower Project and other provincial projects in Swat to the national grid, or at discounted rates to local industries. PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has signed an agreement with a private company to lay down its own power transmission line.

Under the leadership of Chief Minister Ali Amin Gandapur, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has become the first province in the country to undertake this initiative. The signing ceremony took place at the Chief Minister's House in Peshawar, where officials from Pakhtunkhwa Energy Development Organization (PEDO) and the private company NetRecon inked the agreement in the presence of Chief Minister Ali Amin Khan Gandapur. In the first phase, a 40-kilometer-long 132/220 kV transmission line will be laid from Matiltan to Madian. This project, estimated to cost 8 billion rupees,

Alternative energy sources, industrialisation focus of Punjab govt, says Shafay

LAHORE: Provincial Minister for Industries, Commerce and Investment Chaudhry Shafay Hussain said on Friday that alternative energy sources and industrialisation were the prime areas of focus for the Punjab government. "An agreement with a Chinese group has been finalised for manufacturing of solar panels in Punjab, while the negotiations with Austria are also well on the way to build small hydel projects in Pakistan," he stated during a meeting here at Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry (LCCI). LCCI President Mian Abuzar Shad, Senior Vice President Engineer Khalid Usman and Vice President Shahid Nazir Chaudhry gave a detailed overview of the ongoing business situation and shared various solutions. Former

LCCI Presidents Mian Anjum Nisar, Muhammad Ali Mian, former Senior Vice President Ali Hussam Asghar and former Vice President Tahir Manzoor Chaudhry also spoke on the occasion. Provincial Minister said that his role as an industrialist offers him unique insights into business concerns, vowing to support and elevate the industrial sector through impactful and sustainable initiatives. He highlighted the significant ongoing projects such as the Punjab's largest industrial estate FIED-MC where infrastructure developments, including perimeter wall construction and telecommunication improvements are underway. "I have submitted a request to the Prime Minister to establish a railway station within the estate to streamline goods transportation, benefiting lo-

cal manufacturers." The minister shared further plans to drive energy efficiency and reduce operational costs for Punjab's industries. He said that a 30 MW solar power plant is being installed to provide affordable electricity to the Faisalabad Industrial Estate. He also expressed views about a new partnership with a Chinese company to manufacture solar panels locally to reduce reliance on imports and boosting the local green energy sector. Citing India's impressive solar panel export figures, he expressed optimism that Punjab's solar manufacturing could similarly contribute to the economy. LCCI President Mian Abuzar Shad underscored Punjab's crucial role in Pakistan's GDP, contributing over 50 percent. He said that rising production costs in Punjab

affect the entire country's industrial sector. He said that escalating gas, electricity and fuel prices, high policy rates and manufacturing charges that severely impacting operational budgets. He advocated for a more supportive financial environment for SMEs, which comprise over 65 percent of Punjab's business landscape, including accessible loans without excessive collateral requirements. To alleviate the pressure of rising land costs, he proposed a straightforward leasing policy to make land available to both new and existing SMEs at affordable rates, as industrial estate land prices have surged to nearly Rs 50 million per acre. LCCI Senior Vice President Engineer Khalid Usman and Vice President Shahid Nazir Chaudhry

called for greater representation of LCCI within the boards of industrial regulatory bodies. They highlighted that enhanced collaboration would streamline policy implementation and ensure timely support for industrial challenges. ISLAMABAD: Parliamentary leader of Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) Senator Irfan Siddiqui Friday slamming the PTI's history of failed attempts to draw large crowds in Islamabad, said that the current government's progress can not be derailed by their conspiracy-driven attempts. In an exclusive talk with a private news channel, he pointed out that PTI has a history of using propaganda and conspiracy theories for political gains. Siddiqui emphasized that the law will be equally applied to all prisoners, making no exceptions. He also referenced the May 9 incident and said that politicians should not create instability in the country, specifically pointing out PTI's role in doing so. Senator further emphasized the importance of impartial courts, urging them to make decisions based solely on constitutional laws, without bias towards individuals or institutions. He hopes for a judiciary that upholds the principle of equality before the law, ensuring that justice is served fairly and without favouritism. Responding to a query about Bushra Bibi, Senator Siddiqui clarified that there will be no leniency or deal with PTI, however, as time passes, it may become evident that they have committed to avoiding participation in any political activities. Senator Irfan Siddiqui also clarified that Nawaz Sharif's recent trip to America was solely for personal medical check-ups, dispelling any notions of an official visit. Siddiqui added that Nawaz Sharif will spend 2-3 weeks in the United States and will also make a stopover in Dubai during his travels. While responding to another question, Senator Irfan Siddiqui criticized PTI's stance on Palestine, saying if they genuinely care, they should send their leaders to help resolve the issue. He pointed out that PTI did not take the matter seriously when a resolution was passed for Palestine, refusing to sign it - a move Siddiqui deemed shameful. CDNS attain Rs 232b mark in annual savings target

ISLAMABAD: Central Directorate of National Savings (CDNS) has achieved a target of Rs 232 billion in fresh bonds and achieved 12 percent of the annual target in the first quarter of the current fiscal year, from July 1 to October 31. The CDNS has set an annual target of Rs 1650 billion for the current Fiscal Year, 2024-25, which will promote the saving culture in the country, the senior official of CDNS told APP on Friday. Similarly, the CDNS has set a target of Rs 170 billion in investment in Islamic finance for the Current Fiscal Year, which will lead to the growth of the Islamic economy in the country. Replying to a question, he said that the CDNS has realized a target of Rs1.742 trillion in fresh bonds and exceeded 100 percent of the annual target in the last fiscal year 2023-24, from July 1 to June 30. National Savings has set an annual target of Rs 1.7 trillion for the year 2023-24; it is encouraging that this year, "We surpassed the 100 percent of the annual target." The CDNS surpassed the annual target and achieved the target of Rs 1.6 trillion in fresh bonds in the previous fiscal year 2022-23, he said. He said this was an Rs 200 billion additional annual target than the target of Rs 1300 billion for the previous financial year 2021-22. The CDNS has set a reviewed saving target of Rs 1.4 trillion for the financial year (2021-22) which will promote a savings culture in the country, he said, adding that given the current market trend in the country, the ambitious target had been set to further improve the savings culture. The official said that work was being done on institutional reforms in CDNS and new reforms and innovations were being introduced. At this time Automated Teller Machine (ATM) has also been introduced in CDNS which will provide enough facilities to the users," he added. The official said that the directorate had set a target of Rs 75 billion for the new financial year 2023-24 for Islamic finance bonds. Replying to a question; he said the CDNS aimed to introduce new dimensions in the Islamic finance sector. Replying to the question of Senator Zeeshan Khanzada in the 343rd session of the Upper House, the minister informed that the Engineering Development Board mandated for issuance of vehicles assembling and manufacturing certificates had issued 51 certificates to produce two and three-wheeler EVs (motorcycles and rickshaws) in Pakistan. He added that for the manufacturing of EV 4-wheeler, licences had been issued to two companies including Eco Green Motors Pvt Ltd and Regal Automobile Pvt Ltd. The minister informed that 40 sites had been selected for setting up the Charging stations on the Motorway and a viable and acceptable electricity tariff had been fixed on which work would be started soon. Rana informed that 31 companies had applied for the assembling of the 4-wheeler plant on which work was under progress. He added that the government was determined to promote energy efficiency and transition to clean technologies in the automotive sector.—APP

The foundation stone of Serena Chowk Interchange and F-8 Exchange Chowk Interchange projects will be laid on November 5. Dengue affects 131 more patients

RAWALPINDI:Dengue fever's consistent acceleration has added 131 new patients during last 24 hours. According to the details released by the District Health Authority Rawalpindi on Friday, majority patients includes 47 from Pothohar Town Peri Urban areas while 36 from Rawalpindi Cantt Board localities and 12 patients were reported from Municipal Corporation areas. Specialized dengue wards established in various allied hospitals contain 290 patients under treatment including 84 natients are admitted in Holy Family Hospital, 80 in Benazir Bhutto Hospital, 42 in Rawalpindi Teaching Hospital, 25 in Fauji Foundation Hospital and 25 patients are under treatment in different private hospitals. Since January this year, have been diagnosed with dengue fever. Financial penalties/ fine on dengue SOPs violators has reached Rs. 21.48 million. Besides imposing financial penalties, 5179 cases have also been registered against the violators. The data shows dengue fatalities remain 11 in the district.—**APP**

Inconsistent economic policies triggers Industry closures: Nasir


ISLAMABAD: Nasir Mansoor Qureshi, President Islamabad Chamber of Commerce and Industry (ICCI) has called for collective efforts to enhance Pakistan's export capabilities and pull it out of the current economic crisis. Trump victory and the world

SUPPORT Donald Trump, but not for the reasons you might think. Supporting the Republican presidential nominee and former US president exclusively based on a four-year term loses sight of the possible impact of his protectionist policies and his preference for withdrawing the United States from its traditional spheres of influence in global commerce and diplomacy, and from its military commitments. This has allowed other players, like China and Russia, to fill the void, democratising the international landscape as organisations like Brics and the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation begin to overshadow the USled Western order by providing countries with an alternative framework. Trump's "America first" policy is crucial to ushering in a multipolar world. A key feature of the Trump administration was tariffs. Trump imposed tariffs of up to 25 per cent on about three-quarters of Chinese imports to reduce a trade deficit, bring jobs back to the US and stop China from allegedly exploiting US intellectual property. However, US importers faced US\$4.4 billion in extra monthly costs from tariffs, totalling US\$52.8 billion annually and costing US\$414 per household. Of this, US\$282 per household went to taxes, while US\$132 per household ended up causing a net loss to the US economy each year. When tariffs are levied at 10 per cent, most firms will absorb the cost in their margins, but once scaled up, they are inevitably passed on to the consumer. Moreover, US firms seeking alternative supply chains faced inefficiencies, and some Chinese firms established factories in Southeast Asia and Mexico to circumvent tariffs. Trump wants to impose a 10 per cent tariff on imports to the US from all countries and 60 per cent duties on imports from China. This would benefit China in the long-term by pushing it to diversify its trade partners, focusing on developing economies in Asia, Africa and South America, and to negotiate trade agreements that would be more equitable for all parties, further reducing the attractiveness of trading with the US. This would have a flow-on effect on US global trade agreements, as evidenced by Trump's withdrawal from the Trans-Pacific Partnership, which had been designed to counter China's influence in the Asia-Pacific region. In 2016, then-US president Barack Obama stated, "America should write the rules ... Other countries should play by the rules that America and our partners set, and not the other way around". The TPP aimed to address China's emissions, labour standards and low-cost manufacturing that undermined US competitiveness. It also sought to prohibit subsidies to Chinese state-owned enterprises and prevent technology transfer from US companies. However, after Trump's withdrawal from the TPP, China and 14 other countries, some of which were TPP members, signed the world's largest free-trade deal, the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership. Even US allies such as Japan and South Korea signed on, showing that East Asia was indifferent to the China-US economic rift when it came to business. Then there are Trump's moves to retreat from certain conflicts. Trump reached a deal with the Taliban to end the war in Afghanistan, creating a timetable for a withdrawal, which happened under the Biden administration.

HE United States presidential election has always held significant interest for Pakistan, as American foreign policy shapes Pakistan-U.S. relations in ways that affect Pakistan's economic stability, security, and diplomatic standing. Each election in Washington brings renewed anticipation in Islamabad, prompting policymakers to question whether the next administration will foster closer cooperation or introduce new challenges. Historically, Pakistan-U.S. relations have followed cycles of collaboration and divergence, with each American presidency adopting its own stance, largely determined by U.S. strategic interests.

The question of which American party might hold a "soft corner" for Pakistan often surfaces with each election cycle. The perception in Pakistan has long been that Republican administrations are more aligned with Pakistan's strategic needs, especially concerning defense and security. This view dates back to the Cold War, when President Nixon supported Pakistan during the 1971 crisis with India, aligning with Pakistan at a time when India was closer to the Soviet Union. The Reagan administration later cemented this impression, viewing Pakistan as a critical ally against Soviet forces in Afghanistan. During this period, Pakistan received substantial military aid, which many Pakistanis saw as a symbol of strong bilateral ties with Republican leadership. Pakistan-U.S. relations have roots dating back to 1950, when Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan visited the U.S., choosing Washington over Moscow as a first step toward alignment with the West. This decision laid the foundation for decades of partnership based on strategic alignment. Through periods of both collaboration and conflict, Pakistan and the U.S. have navigated a complex relationship shaped by global politics, mutual benefits, and changing needs. Today, as Pakistan observes the upcoming American election, it does so with several expectations. Foremost is the hope for continued economic aid and trade support to help stabilize Pakistan's economy, especially amid current challenges. Defense cooperation remains a priority as well, given the complex security landscape in South Asia. Pakistan seeks American support to counterbalance India's growing defense capabilities and strategic influence. The Kashmir issue is also a focal point for Pakistan, as it hopes the U.S. will assume a balanced approach, encouraging dialogue and stability in South Asia. However, Pakistan is realistic about the strong U.S.-India alliance, shaped by Washington's view of India as a counterbalance to China, which has complicated American engagement in the Kashmir dispute.

The catastrophic implications of Israel's anti-UNRWA laws

N Monday evening, Israel's Knesset approved two bills essentially barring the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East from operating in Israel and severely curtailing its activities in Gaza and the West Bank. The new measures are expected to come into force within 90 days

The Knesset's action was taken despite global appeals, including from the US and other friends of Israel, against this move. It is believed to be part of a larger plan to dismantle UNRWA and tighten the siege of Palestinians in the Occupied Territories, deliberately increasing the suffering of the Palestinians in an attempt to force them to leave and to make the realization of a two-state solution more difficult. If implemented, the new measures would have disastrous results for most of Gaza's 2 million beleaguered residents, as UNRWA is their only lifeline - as it has been for the past 75 years, since the organization was established by the UN in 1949. It is the main provider of education and health services in the Strip. In addition to Gaza, UNRWA is responsible for Palestinian refugees in the West Bank and beyond. In 2023, about 6 million people were registered with the relief agency and eligible to receive its assistance

The votes were shocking. One bill barring UNRWA from operating in Israeli territory was approved with 92 votes in favor and just 10 against, while the other - curtailing its activities in the Gaza Strip and the West Bank by banning state authorities from having any contact with the agency passed by 87 votes to nine. According to UNRWA officials, it will be almost impossible for the agency to work in Gaza or the West Bank if Israel stops issuing entry permits to those territories or allowing coordination with its security forces. Since taking over the Gaza-Egypt border post and deploying its troops along the border in May, Israel controls all points of access to Gaza and the West Bank. Israel has already de facto curtailed UNRWA's activities

in Gaza, where the population is facing starvation and dwindling supplies of medicines and vaccines. The new laws will make it worse. Obstructing the work of UNR-WA is a clear breach of the UN Charter. Member states have a duty to cooperate with the UN and its organs, especially those of a humanitarian, economic, social or

as well as many UN treaties and resolutions, make that duty unambiguous. There is a higher duty to refrain from obstructing their work. Failure to cooperate with UN agencies, let alone actively barring them from carrying out their duties, is thus a serious violation of the UN Charter. Chapter II makes membership of the UN itself conditional on respecting its charter.

UNRWA Commissioner-General Philippe Lazzarini said in Riyadh on Wednesday that the bills were part of a larger effort by Israel to dismantle UNRWA, tighten the siege of Palestinians in the Occupied Territories and make a twostate solution more difficult. Israel has made the dismantling of UNRWA an objective of the war, "in defiance of the General Assembly and Security Council resolutions and of the International Court of Justice, including with a plan to replace UNRWA in East Jerusalem with settlements," Lazzarini said. He added that, in the past year, "at least 237 of our colleagues have been killed, many with their families," and nearly "200 of our buildings have been damaged or destroyed, killing hundreds of displaced people seeking UN protection." Besides breaching the UN Charter, Israel's action could trigger war crimes prosecutions, as it is likely that barring UNRWA from carrying out its duties will intensify the catastrophic conditions in Gaza, including starvation, with famine looming not far behind.

He added that there was a "plausible" case that Israel was using starvation as a weapon of war in Gaza and that, if intent were to be proven, that would amount to a war crime. International humanitarian law prohibits the starvation of civilians as a method of war-

fare. This prohibition is clearly spelled out in the Geneva Conventions' additional protocols and has become part of customary international law. In addition, Article 8 of the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court provides that intentionally starving civilians by "depriving them of objects indispensable to their survival, including willfully impeding relief supplies," is a war crime. At the core of the request for arrest warrants against Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Defense Minister Yoav Gallant made by the International Criminal Court's prosecutor are allegations that the two were part of a plan to use "the starvation of civilians as a method of warfare" in Gaza.

Barring UNRWA from providing basic services will only add to the levels of starvation already observed in Gaza. The international community should heed Lazzarini's call for help by using "all the political, diplomatic and legal tools" to reject Israel's attempts to dismantle UNRWA, sideline the UN and undermine multilateralism. This means that the bills need to be rescinded or their application put on hold. Secondly, he asked that UNRWA's role is safeguarded "today and during the inevitably long and painful transition between a ceasefire and the day after.' Late on Wednesday, the UN Security Council expressed "grave concern" over Israel's new legislation and "strongly warned against any attempts to dismantle or diminish UNRWA's operations and mandate, recognizing that any interruption or suspension of its work would have severe humanitarian consequences for millions of Palestinian refugees who depend on the agency's services and also implications for the region." Norwegian Foreign Minister Espen Barth Eide said on Tuesday that Oslo was "initiating a UN resolution asking the International Court of Justice to clarify Israel's legal obligations to ensure that aid reaches Palestinians," adding that "UNRWA must survive. No country is above international law." There is a special obligation on Israel's closest friends, such as the

US, UK and Germany, to make sure that it rescinds the

new legislation or suspends its implementation.

MUMBAI: Ajaz Patel triggered a late collapse to lead New Zealand's fightback against India after RavindraJadeja's five-wicket haul booked the visitors on 235 on the opening day of the third Test at Wankhede Stadium on Friday. At the Stumps on Day 1, India were 86/4 with Shubman Gill and Rishabh Pant, unbeaten on 31 and one respectively. The hosts had a shaky start to their innings as they lost their captain Rohit Sharma (18) with just 25 runs on the board.

Following the early hiccup, YashasviJaiswal put together a defiant partnership with Shubman Gill to lead India's recovery. The duo added 53 runs for the

Iraq tries to avoid regional fight as militias fire at Israel

BAGHDAD: Nervously watching in Iraq – a coalition of Iran-backed Israel's destructive campaigns in Gaza and Lebanon, Iraq is working to avoid being drawn into the growing regional conflict as Iran-backed armed groups launch attacks on Israel from Iraqi soil, sources familiar with the matter say. Two decades after the US-led invasion that toppled Saddam Hussein, Iraq is experiencing relative stability with high revenue from oil sales funding a service-based agenda that has turned much of the country into a construction site. Iraq does not have diplomatic relations with Israel and Prime Minister Mohammed Shia Al-Sudani's government is wary of regional conflicts that could affect its delicate balancing act between Washington and Tehran, both states it is allied with. Spillover from regional conflict resulted in months of tit-for-tat attacks between Iranbacked armed groups and US forces stationed in Iraq and the region that only subsided after Iran intervened in February. But Sudani's government has not been successful in a push to convince the Islamic Resistance

armed groups – to stop firing rockets and drones at Israel, according to four sources in Iran-backed armed groups and two government advisers. Two visits to Iran by Iraq's top security officials in the past two months, seeking Tehran's help to rein in its allied Iraqi factions, failed, the sources said. "The Iraqi delegation received a cold reception in Tehran ... The answer was: those groups have their own decision and it is their call to decide how to support their brothers in Lebanon and Gaza," said a senior Iraqi security official briefed on the visits. Baghdad turned to Washington, asking US officials to intervene with Israel to prevent retaliation for the attacks, including one that killed two Israeli soldiers and wounded more than 20 on Oct. 4, the sources said, the first time such an attack has been reported to cause fatalities. "Washington was understanding of the repercussions of possible Israeli strikes in Iraq and pledged to help," said an Iraqi foreign ministry official. A spokesperson for the US embassy in Baghdad did not

immediately respond to a request for comment. Four militia sources said the Kataib Hezbollah and Nujaba groups, which are leading the attacks on Israel, have warned the prime minister against pressuring them to halt their actions and vowed to continue their attacks as long as Israel continued its Gaza and Lebanon operations. The issue has divided parties in Iraq's ruling coalition, all of whom are sympathetic to the Palestinian cause and view Israel as an enemy, though some differ over how involved Iraq should be in the regional confrontation. Shiite leaders discussed the risk of repercussions from attacks on Israel and possible Israeli retaliation during two meetings in October, said Ahmed Kenani, a Shiite lawmaker from the ruling alliance. Key players in the Shiite coalition view direct confrontation with Israel as counterproductive and potentially damaging to Iraq, according to four Shiite lawmakers. Yemenis rally to support Palestinian, Lebanese resistance

Sanaa: Hundreds of thousands of Yemenis have taken to the streets of the northwestern province of Sa'ada and elsewhere in the country, expressing solidarity with Palestinian and Lebanese nations and denouncing Israeli atrocities in the Gaza Strip and Lebanon. The demonstrators on Friday waved Yemeni, Palestinian and Lebanese flags, and carried banners in support of freedom and the Axis of Resistance. They held up portraits of martyred resistance leaders, including Hezbollah's former secretary-general Sayyed Hassan Nasrallah, and chanted slogans in condemnation of Israeli crimes against Palestinian and Lebanese peoples. In a statement, they called upon Arab and Muslim nations to stand up against Israeli atrocities, reiterating they will not abandon Palestinians and the Lebanese nation and will continue to support them fervently. The protesters roundly denounced Israeli acts of aggression and atrocities against the residents of Gaza, which are being carried out with the full support of the United States. They also praised the resilience and steadfastness of the Palestinians.-DAN

UK urged to evacuate hospitalized children from Gaza

LONDON: A British charity has urged the UK government to evacuate 21 critically ill children currently in a hospital in northern Gaza, Sky News reported. The Kamal Aswan Hospital is besieged by Israeli forces and was recently raided by troops, who detained staff and left the facility with only two doctors to care for more than 150 patients. It was also targeted by an Israeli airstrike on Thursday. Its supplies are reportedly running low and many of its facilities are no longer operational. Project Pure Hope has called on the UK to facilitate the evacuation of vulnerable children trapped inside. "We are witnessing a humanitarian disaster of historic proportions," it said in a statement. "With each passing hour, the children's chance of survival diminishes without advanced medical intervention - intervention that cannot be provided under the hospital's current, catastrophic conditions." The charity said it has sufficient money to fund an evacuation of 21 children in critical condition at the hospital. It added that it held a meeting with UK Foreign Office staff this week to discuss its plans, but so far the government has not agreed to take in patients. "While other countries ... have opened their doors to these paediatric cases, the UK remains a notable outlier, having yet to implement any such programme," the charity said. The US, Switzerland, Italy Ireland and the UAE have taken in hospitalized children from Gaza since the start of the conflict over a year ago. Fears for the safety of people in the area around the hospital have grown in recent weeks amid an uptick in Israeli military activity and Israel's refusal to allow sufficient aid to reach displaced civilians. Charities have warned of famine and disease, and aid workers struggle to move around Gaza, especially to the scene of military strikes to help civilian casualties. Project Pure Hope's concerns about the fate of patients at Kamal Aswan Hospital have been echoed by medical charity Medecins Sans Frontieres, which said it is "deeply concerned" by the situation after one of its staff members was detained by Israeli forces. Israel claims that Hamas has been using the hospital, located in the Jabaliya refugee camp, as a base, and that it has found weapons stored at the facility.-APP

Eight dead as huge fire engulfs cooking oil factory

JAKARTA: Eight people died in a large fire at a cooking oil factory near the Indonesian capital Jakarta. local fire au thorities said on Friday. Around 20 firefighting trucks are at the site and have contained the blaze in most areas of the factory, authorities said. Footage from Metro TV showed flames and billowing black smoke coming out of a building in the center of an industrial complex in Bekasi, a city on Jakarta's eastern edge. The report said roads had been closed around the factory. All of the bodies had been evacuated from the site, Suhartono, head of Bekasi's fire department SAID, adding that three other people were injured. But the number of casualties could still rise, he said, Local authorities are investigating the cause of the fire. The factory is operated by PT Primus Sanus Cooking Oil Industrial (Priscolin), said Suhartono.-APP

Weekly inflation slightly up for combined consumption groups

ISLAMABAD: The weekly inflation, measured by the Sensitive Price Indicator (SPI), went up slightly by 0.10 percent for the combined consumption groups during the week ended on October 31, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported on Friday. According to the PBS data, the SPI for the week under review in the above-mentioned group was recorded at 319.40 points as compared to 319.09 points during the past week. As compared to the corresponding week of last year, the SPI for the combined consumption group in the week under review witnessed an increase of 14.45 per cent. The weekly SPI with the base year 2015-16 =100 covers 17 urban centres and 51 essential items for all expenditure groups. However, SPI for the lowest consumption group of up to Rs 17,732 witnessed decrease of 0.36 per cent and went down to 312.02 points from last week's 313.16 points. The SPI for consumption groups of Rs 17,732 to 22,888 also decreased by 0.40 percent however for consumption groups from Rs 22,889-29,517 and Rs 29,518-44,175 it increased by 0.18 percent and 0.32 percent respectively. The SPI for consumption group above Rs 44,175, decreased by 0.07 percent, according to PBS data During the week, out of 51 items, prices of 12 (23.53%) items increased, 12 (23.53%) items decreased and 27 (52.94%) items remained stable. The items, which recorded major decrease in their average prices on a week-on-week basis included tomatoes (11.02%), chicken (10.57%), onions (1.68%), bananas (1.42%), sugar (1.20%), pulse mash (0.98%), gur (0.69%) and wheat flour (0.43%). The commodities which recorded major increase in their average prices on weekon-week basis included eggs (3.40%), garlic (2.95%), lpg (1.92%), mustard oil (1.49%), pulse moong (1.27%), firewood (1.09%), vegetable ghee 1kg (1.08%), vegetable ghee 2.5kg (0.50%), potatoes (0.30%) and curd (0.20%). On-year basis, the commodities that witnessed decrease included wheat flour (31.76%), electricity charges for q1 (20.32%), chilies powder (20.00%), tomatoes (19.37%), diesel (17.05%), petrol (12.77%), rice basmati broken (8.09%), cooking oil 5 litre (7.45%), sugar (7.16%), bread (5.55%), eggs (3.93%) and washing soap (0.32%). The commodities which recorded an increase in their average prices on year-on-year basis included, gas charges for Q1 (570.00%), pulse gram (83.11%), pulse moong (39.09%), powdered milk (25.57%), beef (23.53%), onions (17.95%), garlic (17.55%), shirting (17.02%), cooked daal (15.14%), mutton (13.68%), georgette (12.81%) and ladies sandal (12.52%). -DNA

NEW DELHI: India's capital New Delhi was wreathed in poisonous smog Friday, with air pollution worsening after a fireworks ban was widely flouted for raucous celebrations for the Hindu festival of lights, Diwali. New Delhi's traffic-clogged streets are home to more than 30 million people, and the city is regularly ranked as one of the most polluted urban areas on the planet. The city is blanketed in cancer-causing acrid smog each year, primarily blamed on stubble burning by farmers in neighbouring regions to clear their fields for ploughing, as well

as factories and traffic fumes. But air worsened Friday after a thunderous night of firecrackers lit as part of Diwali celebrations, despite city authorities last month banning their sale and use. City police had seized nearly two tonnes of fireworks before Diwali, but the crackers remained readily available for sale in neighbouring states. Many residents celebrated at home, holding a family meal and lighting small candles in praise of the Hindu goddess Lakshmi and symbolising the victory of light over darkness. Others launched firework rockets and booming crackers, rocking the

densely packed city throughout the night. Police are often reluctant to act against violators, given the strong religious sentiments attached to the crackers by Hindu devotees. Critics say arguments between rival politicians heading neighbouring states - as well as between central and state-level authorities - have compounded the problem. India's Supreme Court last month ruled that clean air was a fundamental human right, ordering both the central government and state-level authorities to take action. "Delhi's toxic air is killing us softly with its smog," the Times of India wrote in an

editorial last week, as the winter pollution returned. "It is nothing new, but what doesn't cease to amaze, year after year, is the state's stilted response." Levels of fine particulate matter – dangerous microparticles known as PM2.5 pollutants that enter the bloodstream through the lungs - surged to more than 23 times the World Health Organisation recommended daily maximum. Soon after dawn, pollutant levels topped 345 micrograms per cubic metre, according to monitoring firm IQAir, which listed air in the sprawling megacity as "hazardous". It rated New Delhi as worst in the world, just above

smoke-choked Lahore, 400 kilometres (250 miles) to the northwest. The New Delhi government has previously sought to cut pollution by restricting vehicle traffic, including a scheme that only allowed cars with odd or even number licence plates to travel on alternate days. Authorities have also imposed seasonal bans on construction work and on diesel-powered vehicles from entering the city. "The gravity of the problem is such that incremental changes are insufficient," The Indian Express wrote, criticising "an unfortunate lack of resolve from both the centre and state governments. –**DNA**

Pakistani rice offered at lowest in **Indonesia's** tender

JAKARATA: The lowest price offered in the international tender from Indonesian state purchasing agency Bulog to buy about 500,000 metric tonnes of rice was estimated at \$479 a tonne cost and freight (c&f) for rice expected to be sourced from Pakistan, European traders said on Friday. The lowest offer was said to have been made for 26,000 tonnes. No purchase has yet been reported and price negotiations are expected to continue in coming days, traders said. A decision is expected next week. Reports reflect assessments from traders and further estimates of prices and volumes are still possible later. Rice arrival in Indonesia is sought in November to December and the rice can be sourced from Thailand, Cambodia, Vietnam, Myanmar, Pakistan or India. Price offers were submitted on Friday. Two other offers of rice from Pakistan were the next lowest at \$484 and \$485 a tonne c&f, traders said. -APP

Opposition protests over Istanbul mayor's arrest

ISTANBUL: Turkish opposition parties called for protests Thursday at what they said was the politically-motivated arrest of an opposition mayor for alleged links to the banned Kurdish PKK militant group. Several hundred protestors rallied on Wednesday evening outside an Istanbul court where Ahmet Ozer. mayor of the Istanbul district of Esenyurt, was charged several hours after being ar-

Ozer belongs to the main opposition Republican People's Party (CHP), which denounced the allegations as "baseless". Both the CHP and DEM, the main pro-Kurdish party - which also slammed his arrest as a "political coup" - called demonstrators to rally at 4:00 pm (1300 GMT) outside Esenyurt town hall. But the police shut down the area. banning any demonstrations there, prompting organisers to shift the protest to a square several kilometres (miles) away. The interior ministry said Ozer was arrested for "membership of the PKK terror organisation" and confirmed appointing Istanbul's deputy governor to replace him. The PKK, which since 1984 has waged a decades-long insurgency against the Turkish state that has killed thousands, is blacklisted as a terror organisation by Turkey and its Western allies. But Ozer denied the charges when he appeared in court on Wednesday evening, the private NTV television said.—APP

Quds Force to stand by Hezbollah until Zionism eradicated

TEHRAN: The commander of the Quds Force of the Islamic Revolution Guard Corps (IRGC) has reaffirmed the force's support for the Lebanese resistance movement Hezbollah until the full liberation of the occupied al-Quds and the eradication of the Israeli regime. Brigadier General Esmail Qaani made the statement has he extended his felicitations on the appointment of Sheikh Naim Qassem as Hezbollah's new leader after the Israeli assassination in September of the movement's former secretary general Sayyed Hassan Nasrallah. "I assure you that your brothers in the Quds Force will stand by Your Excellency and Hezbollah until the elimination and eradication of the evil lineage of Zionism and the freedom of Palestine and Holy al-Quds," Qaani said. The top commander also praised the appointment of Sheikh Qassem as Hezbollah's new leader and commemorated the sacrifices of his predecessor, Nasrallah, as well as former head of Hezbollah executive council Hashem Safieddine, who were both martyred in Israeli airstrikes on the Lebanese capital of Beirut's southern district of Dahieh. "By the grace of God, the resplendent and struggle-filled path of the martyrs will continue with more speed and strength under the management and leadership of Your Excellency," Qaani added.—APP

Swati remanded to judicial custody

ISLAMABAD: An Anti-Terrorism Court (ATC), on Friday, remanded for mer senator and Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader, Azam Swati to judicial custody in connection with a series of protest-related charges. The court hearing was presided over by Judge Tahir Abbas Sipra, and other judicial forums heard multiple cases against the former Senator.

Swati was presented before the ATC, with his legal counsel, Advocate Ali Bukhari, representing him in the court. The prosecution brought Swati from the Islamabad High Court (IHC) to the ATC after the IHC annulled his previous physical remand.

The IHC directed the authorities to place Swati on judicial remand, citing legal requirements. The ATC then ordered his transfer to jail under judicial custody. Subsequently, Swati was presented before Judicial Magistrate Humaira Afzal, who, following IHC's instructions, remanded him to judicial custody.

Advocates for the defence contended that since October 5, Swati has been detained, facing approximately twelve FIRs. The defence further noted that these FIRs had not been disclosed in prior submissions to the IHC. In addition, the ATC has issued notices and summoned arguments from the prosecution on Swati's post-arrest bail applications in seven of the pending cases.

Punjab govt bared from issuing detention orders

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court has barred the Punjab government from issuing any detention orders until December 5. LHC's Justice AmjadRafiq issued the ruling while hearing a petition filed by Advocate Azhar Sid dique challenging the legal status of such orders.

The decision noted that, according to the government lawyer, the government has issued 20,000 such king of orders since 2022, with 4,470 issued in 2023 alone. The petitioner's lawyer argued that the government used house arrest orders for political victimisation. He called for amendments in the relevant law under Article 10-A of the Constitution. After hearing the arguments, Justice Rafig instructed the provincial government to refrain from issuing any house arrested orders until December 5. He also directed the lawyers to present arguments regarding the legal status of Section 3 of the law at the next hearing.

Death toll in Spain floods reaches 205

MADRID: The death toll

from Spain's worst floods in a generation has climbed to 205, rescuers said on Friday, with the number expected to rise as more people are believed missing. Spanish rescuers opened a temporary morgue in a convention centre and battled to reach areas still cut off on Friday as the death tol from catastrophic floods rose to 205 people in Eu-

rope's worst weather disas-

ter in five decades In Valencia, the eastern region that bore the brunt of thedevastation, at least 202 people have died, regional authorities said. Three have died in Castilla La Mancha and Andalusia. The number of dead is now almost level with the 209 who died during heavy floods in Romania in 1970. Floods in Portugal in 1967 killed nearly 500 people. Some 500 soldiers were deployed to search for people who are still missing and help survivors of the storm, which triggered a fresh weather alert in Huelva in southwestern Spain. - Agencies

BERLIN: Germany will close the three Iranian consulates on its soil in response to the execution of German-Iranian Jamshid-Sharmahd, Foreign Minister AnnalenaBaerbock said Thursday. "We have repeatedly and unequivocally made it clear to Tehran that the execution of a German citizen will have consequences. serious Baerbock said, announcing the closure of the consulates in Frankfurt, Munich and Hamburg in a televised announcement.

The execution, announced on Monday, had already provoked tit-for-tat diplomatic protests, with Chancellor Olaf Scholz calling it a "scandal". "The fact that this assassination took place in the light of the latest developments in the Middle East shows that (Iran's) dictatorial, unjust regime... does not act according to normal diplomatic logic," Baerbock said. "It is not without reason

that our diplomatic relations are already at an alltime low," she said.

The closures will affect a total of 32 consular staff, according to the foreign ministry. Baerbock did not mention Iran's embassy in Berlin but said Germany would "continue to maintain our diplomatic channels and our embassy in Tehran". - Agencies

Objections removed from Imran Khan's bail plea

American delegation visits Punjab CM, **USAID** discuss Adiala Jail in Rawalpindi enhanced US-Pakistan coop

RAWALPINDI: A three-member delegation from the US Embassy visited Adiala Jail in Rawalpindi on Friday, where they were granted consular access to three detained American citizens. The visit included meetings with individuals held under the Foreign Act, according to jail sources. The delegation met with detainees Abid Malik, Sadiga Saeed, and Alex Pleado in the office of the Additional Superintendent, a meeting that lasted approximately one hour. Members of the US delegation included Irfan Jan, Mike Murphy, and Raheel Javed. Following their meetings, the delegation departed from Adiala Jail. The meeting took place days two days after the Biden administration confirmed that it received a letter from more than 60 United States (US) Congress members urging the White House to advocate for the release of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) founder Imran Khan who is coincidently also jailed in the same prison. On Tuesday, US State Department Spokesperson Matthew

Miller confirmed the letter's receipt during a briefing and stated that the administration would "respond in due course." The letter, led by prominent Congress members such as Ilhan Omar and RashidaTlaib, called on President Biden to secure guarantees from Pakistani authorities for Imran's safety in custody. Miller further noted that the US supports a "sustained democracy" in Pakistan, adding that a recent meeting between US Deputy Assistant Secretary for Democracy and Human Rights Monica Jacobson and Pakistan's Human Rights Secretary in Islamabad focused on fundamental rights and freedoms.

The spokesperson declined to comment on claims that the release of Khan's wife and sisters from detention was linked to US involvement, stating only that discussions covered "support for a vibrant civil society and strong democratic institutions." Yesterday, a coalition of 160 parliamentarians expressed strong discontent over a recent letter from 62 US Congressmen, calling for a re-evaluation of the US commentary on Pakistan's political dynamics and urging Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif to address perceived external interference In their letter to the prime minister, the lawmakers criticised the US legislators for what they deemed a skewed view of Pakistan's domestic politics. They argued that the letter exaggerates a political narrative that primarily serves the interests of a single political party, namely Imran Khan's PTI.

CM Gandapur slams govt crackdown on PTI workers

PESHAWAR: Chief Minister of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Ali Amin Gandapur, has announced one-step promotions for government employees recently released after their arrest during protests in Islamabad. In addition to the promotions, Gandapur granted the employees a week's leave and a stipend of Rs 10,000, Express News reported. The announcement came as the arrested officials, including 34 police personnel, 7 TMAs, and 42 rescue workers, returned to Peshawar following their release. Additionally, it was reported that 86 prisoners were released from District Jail Attock late last night. Among those released were two PTI provincial assembly members, 46 Rescue 1122 staff, 25 police officers, and 13 municipal employees. These detainees had joined Ali Amin Gandapur's convoy during the protest and were released after their bail petitions were approved by the court. They had been arrested in various locations, including Attock, Rawalpindi, and Islamabad, facing multiple charges, including those under the Anti-Terrorism Act. Following the court's bail approval, the jail administration received the release orders, enabling their return. Gandapur personally welcomed the employees upon their arrival, presenting them with flower garlands as a gesture of support.

BEIRUT: Lebanon's Prime Minister Najib-Mikati on Friday criticized Israel's "expansion" of its attacks on his country, saying they indicated a rejection of efforts to broker a truce after more than a month of war. "The Israeli enemy's renewed expansion of the scope of its aggression on Lebanese regions, its repeated threats to the population to evacuate entire cities and villages, and its renewed targeting of the southern suburbs of Beirut with destructive raids are all indicators that confirm the Israeli enemy's rejection of all efforts being made to secure a ceasefire," Mikati said.

Mikati's statement came a day after Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu met visiting US officials to discuss a possible deal to end the war in Lebanon

47 Palestinians killed in Israeli strikes

GAZA: Forty seven Palestinians were killed and dozens injured, most of them children and women, in overnight Israeli bombardment of the city of Deir Al-Balah, the Nuseirat camp and the town of Al-Zawayda in the central Gaza Strip, the Palestinian news agency WAFA reported on Friday. The Gaza war began after Hamas-led militants attacked Israel on Oct. 7, 2023, killing some 1,200 people and taking 251 hostages back to Gaza, according to Israeli tallies. Israel's subsequent assault on Gaza has killed more than 43,000 Palestinians and reduced most of the enclave to rubble, Palestinian authorities say. At least 46 Palestinians were killed in Israeli military strikes across the Gaza Strip on Thursday, mostly in the north where one attack hit a hospital, torching medical supplies and disrupting operations, the enclave's health officials said. Israel's military has accused the Palestinian militant group Hamas of using Kamal Adwan Hospital in Beit Lahiya for military purposes and said "dozens of terrorists" have been hiding there. Health officials and Hamas deny the assertion. The health ministry in the Gaza Strip called for all international bodies "to protect hospitals and medical staff from the brutality of the (Israeli) occupation." Medical charity Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) said on Thursday that one of its doctors at the hospital, Mohammed Obeid, had been detained last Saturday by Israeli forces. It called for the protection of him and all medical staff who "are facing horrific violence as they try to provide care." - Agencies
