## New Gwadar airport to create jobs, says PM

Pakistan Airport Authority has already issued the Aerodrome Certificate to the New Gwadar Airport whereas the Pakistan Customs has also notified airport

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif hailed the New Gwadar International Airport as a milestone for regional development, highlighting its potential to boost prosperity and job opportunities in the area. In a high-level meeting on Monday, the premier extended heartfelt gratitude to China for constructing the state-of-the-art airport, calling it a testament to the strong Pakistan-China friendship. He urged authorities to transform the airport into a bustling transit hub and ensure seamless road connectivity to enhance accessibility, particularly within the Balochistan province.

He also directed to improve the road system linking the New Gwadar International Airport with other areas of the country especially the province. Additionally, the prime minister also ordered to ensure fool proof security arrangements for the new airport. During the meeting, the prime minister was informed that flights from Gwadar to Muscat would be started from January 10, 2025, whereas talks with regard to starting the domestic and international flight operations by the airlines of Pakistan, China, Oman and United Arab Emirates from Gwadar were underway.

Similarly, the current duration of flight operation of the Pakistan Airlines (PIA) between Karachi and Gwadar will soon be increased to three times per week. It was informed in the meeting that the Gwadar Airport was the largest airport of the country in term of area which will be capable of handling A-380 airplanes whereas 400,000 people will travel through the airport annually. ## Kashmir's demography cannot be changed



## Suleri says 2024 year of economic stabilization

ISLAMABAD: Executive Director, SDPI, Dr. Abid Qaiyum Suleri on Monday said, 2024 has been a year of economic stabilization and recovery as negative GDP growth, heightened policy and inflation rates had transitioned to positive indicators showing reviving growth trajectory. The Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI) hosted an insightful seminar on Pakistan's Economic Outlook for 2024 as part of its Monday Seminar Series, with prominent experts discussing the country's economic trajectory amidst political and global challenges. Dr Suleri acknowledged the substantial progress made in 2024, citing a projected 3% GDP growth, a tripling of foreign reserves to \$12.25 billion, and a significant reduction in inflation and policy rates. He also pointed out that 2025 would be a crucial year, hinging on IMF program commitments, tax reforms, climate change management, and political stability. "Economy in 2025 will depend on a combination of factors, including Pakistan's relationship with the IMF, USA, and China; climate resilience efforts, political stability, and investment in human development," Dr Suleri said. "The revival of political negotiations is a beacon of hope," he said, noting the positive impact of improved relations between the government and opposition. Dr. Suleri noted the importance of improved administrative control to manage inflation, citing the lack of regulation in sugar mills and poor stock management. As Pakistan navigates a challenging yet promising economic landscape, Dr Abid Suleri agreed that while stabilization has been achieved, significant reforms and strategic planning would be essential for sustainable growth in 2025 and beyond. Dr. Shafqat Munir, Deputy Executive Director at SDPI, opened the session by highlighting the government's growing confidence in Pakistan's economic recovery. Referring to a recent press conference by the Finance Minister, Dr. Munir noted the optimistic economic indicators, signaling a potential turnaround after a challenging 2023. Dr. Khaqan Hassan Najeeb, senior economist stressed that Pakistan's economic recovery was only the third time in the last decade that the country had turned to the IMF for assistance. He emphasized the need for urgent reforms in taxation, agriculture productivity, and fiscal expenditure, warning that without substantial restructuring, Pakistan's growth rate would remain below 1%. Dr. Najeeb also called for improved economic diplomacy, particularly with China, to unlock potential investment avenues. Dr. Fareeha Armughan, another SDPI expert, highlighted the government's substantial increase in social protection allocations, marking a historic high of 594 billion rupees. However, she pointed out that critical sectors like education and institutional governance remain underfunded and mismanaged. According to Dr. Armughan, aligning fiscal decisions with climate change and disaster risk reduction policies was crucial for long-term stability. Dr. Sajid Amin Javed, Deputy Executive Director at SDPI, concluded the session by noting the decline in inflation rates and rupee stabilization. However, he emphasized that the government must remain cautious and proactive in 2025, particularly in energy inflation and employment targets. –DNA

## **How driving school program** empowers Pakistani women

dent Laiba Rashid, 22, hopes her life will change once she learns how to drive a motorcycle after undergoing a training program that teaches women how to operate two-wheelers in the bustling eastern city of Lahore. Although the program is 7 years old, it's rare to see women driving motorcycles. Women driving cars or riding pillion on two-wheelers driven by a male relative is more socially acceptable in the conservative, Islamic nation. "I hope this will change my life because I am dependent on my brother to pick me up and drop me to college," Rashid said on her first day at the Women on Wheels (WOW) driving program offered free by the Lahore traffic police. She said she wants to buy a motorcy-


that, previously, there were no women drivers in her family. "Now everybody is convinced that women should be independent in their movement to schools, jobs and markets," she said. Women driving two-wheelers has been a cultural and religious taboo, said Bushra Iqbal Hussain, a social activist and director of Safe

advocating the safety of female children. But more women are now changing the culture, she said, like they did in the 1980s with regular cars, in a bid to reduce their reliance on men to commute. The WOW program has been in operation since 2017, but has become increasingly popular in recent months as



motorcycles offer a cheaper alternative. "Stagnant wage growth and high inflation have eroded the purchasing power of the middle class, leaving motorcycles as the only viable option for many households," said auto sector analyst Muhammad Abrar Polani of investment house Arif Habib Limited. The cheapest four-wheeler in Pakistan, where the annual GDP per capita is \$1,590, costs about 2.3 million rupees(\$8,265) compared to about 115,000 rupees for the most affordable China-made two-wheeler. Sohail Mudassar, a traffic warden, said the WOW program has trained at least 6,600 women, and Rashid's batch was the 86th since it started. "Women of different ages and segments of society join our camp," said

faqat, a senior traffic warden who has trained about "Young 1,000 women. women are quick learners because they are enthusiastic and take risks." One of them, Ghania Raza, 23, who is pursuing a doctorate in criminology, said learning to drive a two-wheeler gave her a deep sense of achievement and empowerment: "It was like breaking a glass ceiling," she said. Shumaila Shafiq, 36, a mother of three and a part-time fashion designer, said she has been driving her husband's motorcycle to the market and other places after graduating from the program. She has designed a special short length abaya, a dress used by conservative Muslim women, to wear while operating the motorcycle.-DNA

## President directs Rs 24m relief to bank fraud victims

ISLAMABAD: President Asif Ali Zardari has directed six banks to provide financial relief amounting to Rs 24.136 million to 31 victims of bank fraud. He gave these directions while deciding upon 31 representations filed against the decisions of the Banking Mohtasib. The President upheld the Mohtasib's decisions in favour of the victims, delivering justice for the defrauded banking customers, a President's Office news release said. Twelve representations filed by United Bank Ltd (UBL) were rejected, with the bank being directed to compensate the victims with Rs 11,570,191. In ten cases, Muslim Commercial Bank (MCB) was instructed to refund Rs 5,291,500. Five representations filed by Allied Bank Ltd (ABL) were dismissed, and the bank ordered to return Rs 4,049,742 to affected customers. Three representations by the Bank of Punjab (BOP) were also dismissed, mandating the bank to refund Rs 2,315,000. Askari Bank Ltd was directed to refund Rs 490,000 in one case, while Habib Bank Ltd (HBL) was instructed to pay Rs 420,000 to a customer in another case. The victims were defrauded by individuals posing as bank representatives, who acquired sensitive banking details through deceptive phone calls and subsequently drained funds from their accounts. Upon discovering the fraudulent transactions, the customers approached their banks for redress but were denied relief. The affected parties then sought relief through the Banking Mohtasib, who ruled in their favour. In response, the banks filed separate representations with the President, challenging these decisions. Hearings were conducted at Aiwan-e-Sadr, and after listening to the petitioners and respondents and perusing the relevant record, the final decisions were delivered. The decisions reflect the President's commitment to providing justice and prompt relief to the people. The President also emphasised the crucial role played by the Banking Mohtasib in safeguarding citizens against the maladministration of commercial banks and financial fraud. He said that the Banking Mohtasib was a vital institution for the swift resolution of complaints, offering victims timely justice without the burdens of prolonged legal procedures.-DNA

He also remembered the humanitarian work of the founding chairman Muneer Ahmed Qureshi alias Munnu Bhai who demonstrated profound involvement in the treatment of patients suffering from Thalassemia. On this occasion, the minister distributed gifts among the children. Director Sundas Foundation Islamabad Air Vice Marshal HI(M) Aftab Hussain described the functions and operations of the foundation, its current services and its challenges. ### IRSA releases 31,500 cusecs water

ISLAMABAD: Indus River System Authority (IRSA) on Monday released 31,500 cusecs water from various rim stations with inflow of 39,100 cusecs. According to the data released by IRSA, water level in River Indus at Tarbela Dam was 1471.77 feet and was 73.77 feet higher than its dead level of 1,398 feet. Water inflow and outflow in the dam was recorded as 16.100 cusecs and 11,000 cusecs respectively. The water level in River Jhelum at Mangla Dam was 1132.70 feet, which was 83 70 feet higher than its dead level of 1,050 feet. The inflow and outflow of water was recorded 6,500 cusecs and 4,000 cusecs respectively. The release of water at Kalabagh, Taunsa, Guddu and Sukkur was recorded as 21,100, 10,600, 18,900 and 1,100 cusecs respectively. Similarly, from River Kabul, a total of 10,100 cusecs of water released at Nowshera and 6.400 cusecs released from River Chenab at Marala.-APP

## lIFA destroys 5,000 kg of expired products

ISLAMABAD: Deputy Director Operations (DDO) of Islamabad Food Authority (IFA), Dr Tahira Saddique, said on Monday that the authority has intensified its campaign against food safety violations and sealed a popular bakery in Blue Area for unhygienic conditions while it raided a distribution center in Koral Town for handling expired products. Talking to APP, she said the authority, accompanied by the Food Safety Teams (FSTs), conducted an inspection at a well-known bakery in Blue Area. The team found hygiene violations during the preparation of bakery items, leading to the immediate sealing of the establishment.

Dr. Saddique revealed that several warnings had been issued to the bakery in the past, but the violations persisted. She emphasized that hygiene standards are non-negotiable, promising strict action against food outlets, restaurants, and bakeries violating safety rules across the federal capital. In another operation, the Food Authority raided a distribution point in Koral Town after discovering that expiry dates on products were being altered. More than 5,000 kilograms of expired inventory were seized and destroyed. The facility was sealed, and a case was registered against those involved in tampering with product dates. Dr Tahira described the practice of selling expired goods as a severe threat to public health, stating that suppliers and sellers who endanger lives for profit are "enemies of humanity." She reiterated the Food Authority's commitment to protecting citizens by ensuring food safety across the federal capital. The Islamabad Food Authority has vowed to continue its operations indiscriminately, ensuring that no entity compromises public health standards for monetary gain.—DNA

ISLAMABAD: "The narrative of climate change reveals deep-seated inequality," remarked Ambassador Jauhar Saleem, President of the Institute of Regional Studies, during a webinar on 'Navigating Frameworks of UNFCCC through the State of Climate Change in Asia'. Drawing from

Pakistan at forums like the UN-FCCC, he noted the stark disparity in climate change effects between developing and developed nations. He emphasized the slow progress seen in past Conferences of Parties (COPs) and called for enhanced collaboration to address humanity's greatest existential threat. Dr. Liudmila Kolomeets, an expert from the World Meteorological Organization (WMO)

ings from WMO's 'State of the Climate in Asia 2023' report in her keynote address. She highlighted concerning trends, including 2023's mean temperature being the second highest recorded in Asia. Additionally, she noted anomalies in precipitation and snow coverage and the ongoing increase in glacial loss in the South Asian region. Dr. Fahad Saeed, a South Asian Regional Climate Scientist from

Pakistan's pivotal geolocation, a convergence point for summer monsoons and winter western disturbances. 'This positioning makes the country especially susceptible to climate variations, evident in events such as the 2022 floods, Glacial Lake Outburst Floods (GLOFs), and heatwaves', he said adding that, there was a great need of integrating scientific insights into decision-making at national, subnational, and local levels.

Mr. Talha Tufail Bhatti, Climate Change Researcher at the IRS, noted that this year's COP financial targets disappointed developing nations. With at least 10 countries experiencing extreme temperatures over 50°C and economic losses reaching \$202.7 billion in 2023, the pledges were insufficient. He emphasized, "there is a need for swift and ambitious action from the international community," based on the experts' insights.

## PR refund Rs 380m on account of undue delay

ISLAMABAD :Pakistan Railways (PR) has refunded an amount of Rs 380 million to passengers during a period of three years due to late start of trains from the originating station. "Rs 33 million have been refunded in 2023, Rs 269 million in 2022 and 78 million in 2021 to facilitate the passengers following their complaints regarding undue delay in trains arrival/departure," an official in the Ministry of Railways told APP. He said Pakistan Railways is taking several steps to improve the service of the trains and facilitate the passengers and in case of late running of trains, passengers are informed in advance through SMS alerts. The official said the passengers are granted a full refund if a train starts more than six hours late from the originating station. Besides the passengers are also provided with complimentary meals in the event of emergencies, he added. He said in case of disruptions, passengers are transported either by alternative railway path or by road service arranged by the department. To a question, the official said the transportation of goods through Railways is always economical for bulk cargo and long-distance hauls providing economy of scale, whereas for transportation of goods for a shorter distance and small cargo, the road has the advantage over Pakistan Railways due to its doorstep loading and delivery options. He said the main advantages of rail transportation over road included manifold fuel efficiency and reduction in transportation cost besides ensuring up to 75 percent improvement in the environment. The official said that rail freight pricing in Pakistan and globally differ significantly due to various factors, including infrastructure, government policies, operational efficiency, and market dynamics. About some key points highlighting these differences including many countries of the world have separated and dedicated freight corridors, bulk haulage regulations, and large transport capacities, he added. -APP


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## War in Gaza killing dreams

MID the rubble of destroyed walls and the danger of narrow alleyways, a group of children decided to snatch moments of joy by playing a soccer match. Their city, devastated by attacks, no longer had a space dedicated to sports activities. Sports clubs were nonexistent, and teams had nowhere to gather. Left with no alternatives, the children sought a reprieve from the world of death and destruction, creating moments of happiness with the meager resources available to them. For a few minutes, the ball moved between their feet. But soon, an Israeli aircraft launched a missile near them, targeting a residential building. Thick smoke billowed from the site, and the children's joyous play turned to sheer panic. They fled in fear, leaving behind their ball and a stark symbol of how even the simplest childhood joys are denied in a landscape scarred by death and devastation. As with everything else in Gaza under the relentless Israeli aggression-ongoing for approximately 15 months-the sports sector has suffered unprecedented destruction. Sports activities, clubs, and players across various disciplines have been decimated, with hundreds killed, injured, or detained. With a soaring number of casualties, injuries, and arrests following Israel's ground invasion of Gaza, sports clubs and facilities were transformed into detention centers and execution sites for civilians. These spaces, once havens for recreation and the nurturing of athletic talent, have been stripped of their purpose. Israeli airstrikes have entirely destroyed numerous key facilities: the UNDP stadium in Rafah, the Friends Equestrian Club, Jabalya Services Club, the baseball and softball field in the Shati Camp, and the headquarters of the Palestinian Olympic Committee. Additionally, the Palestinian Football Association, the Higher Council for Youth and Sports, Palestine Stadium, Gaza Sports Club Stadium, and Khan Yunis' City Sports Complex-along with dozens of other clubs and sports grounds-have been obliterated. The latest statistics from the Palestinian Football Association reveal that 704 athletes and scouts have been killed in the ongoing genocide in Gaza. Hundreds of sports facilities have been destroyed, and the figures are not final due to the high number of missing persons and limited access to information. The Association announced on its official Facebook page that among the victims are 387 individuals affiliated with football as players, administrators, or workers. The casualties include 94 children and 273 young adults. Additionally, 105 scouts and 196 individuals from other sports federations were killed. It also reported that 24 football players have been detained in the West Bank, while no information is yet available on the detention of athletes in Gaza. The Israeli occupation has destroyed 278 sports facilities-268 in Gaza and 18 in the West Bank. Sports journalist Ahmed Al-Agha stated that 70% of Gaza's sports facilities, clubs, and halls have been completely destroyed, with initial losses in the sports sector estimated at \$20 million. This staggering toll is the result of the targeted destruction of buildings, facilities, and fields. Al-Agha also highlighted the deaths of hundreds of athletes in various disciplines, including football. tennis, volleyball, and handball. Among the prominent athletes killed are football striker Mohammed Barakat, a player for the Palestinian national team and a professional for Jordan's Al-Wehdat Club and Palestine's Al-Shula Club.

O not put your hand in the wolf's den." This famous saying emphasizes that those who heed its wisdom avoid deadly attacks and live longer, while those who ignore it often suffer. Unfortunately, our leadership seems to have disregarded the essence of this adage and has dared to reach into the wolf's den of Afghanistan, hoping to emerge unscathed. Earlier this year, Pakistan carried out airstrikes inside Afghanistan, which generated a strong reaction from the Taliban leadership. Their narrative was straightforward: Pakistan's security agencies should focus on safeguarding their own frontiers, managing their internal law and order, improving intelligence capabilities, preventing their citizens from illegally crossing international borders, and refraining from blaming neighbors for

their own shortcomings and weaknesses. Their narrative carries a lot of weight, as millions of dollars from a poor nation, where 40% of the population lives below the poverty line, were spent to build a barbed-wire wall along the Afghanistan border to prevent cross-border movement. Unfortunately, this wall has proven to be ineffective, as if it does not exist. Smuggling across the border continues unabated, cross-border movement remains unstoppable, and terrorist activities have intensified more than ever before. Perhaps we have only partially learned from cross-border attacks carried out by the USA in various countries and by India, particularly in Pakistan. These countries, while successfully eliminating cross-border threats, also strengthened and fortified their internal security. They did so by implementing foolproof border controls, creating effective surveillance systems, identifying internal threats before they could cause harm, and addressing internal political discontent. These measures ensured comprehensive reinforcement of both internal and external security. One example is the USA after the 9/11 attacks. The country drastically revamped border control protocols worldwide. Security measures for air, rail, land, and sea travel were fortified on a global scale. Within the United States, the Department of Homeland Security was established to evaluate and strengthen the nation's security apparatus. This department assessed civil and military installations, identified gaps, and implemented comprehensive security protocols to eliminate potential threats

effectively. Another example is India, which impleattacked inside Pakistan, they stated their actions mented drastic constitutional changes by bringing Indian-occupied Jammu and Kashmir under federal control. Since then, a foolproof security protocol has been established across the region. Since 2019, there have been no significant cross-border incursions into the Jammu and Kashmir valley, nor any major freedom movements. Under high-security measures, the Indian government has successfully implemented mechanisms to suppress any substantial freedom movements permanently. Turning back to the situation in Afghanistan, we seem to have forgotten the well-known adage that Afghanistan is the "graveyard of civilizations." This has been proven true in both the distant and recent past, with no evidence suggesting this will change in the foreseeable future.

I vividly recall an interview with an American general who was in charge of operations in Afghanistan after 9/11. He stated that while the adage might have been true for other nations in the past, it would not apply to the United States, given its superior technology and top-notch training. However, the world witnessed the humiliating withdrawal of Allied forces in 2021, leaving behind billions of dollars' worth of military hardware, abandoning Afghan allies to the mercy of the Taliban, and fleeing on C-130 aircraft. The harrowing images of Afghan civilians clinging to the aircraft's wings and falling to their deaths were etched into global memory. Perhaps the Pakistani armed forces believe themselves to be better equipped and trained than the Allied forces, with superior strategies and tactics. This conviction might have led them to carry out airstrikes inside Afghanistan, aiming to eliminate cross-border threats. However, they have failed to stop the infiltration of the Pakistani Taliban-citizens labeled as Khawarij to foster further hatred against them-while disregarding Pakistan's constitution, which forbids discrimination based on color, creed, or religion.

This subtle reframing allowed them to justify their actions without formally acknowledging the border they do not recognize. With the perception of the Pakistan Army at an alltime low, the Afghan government's commitment to establishing a direct trade link with China through the Wakhan border to reduce its reliance on transit trade through Pakistan, the separatist movement in Balochistan, and the alienation of the people of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) from the central government-combined with the prevailing popular narrative against the Pakistan Army-Pakistan finds itself in a precarious position. The ethnic linkage of the Pashtun population in KP and Balochistan with Afghanistan further complicates matters, alongside the country's ongoing economic and financial meltdown.

Pakistan's lack of sovereignty, exacerbated by its dependence on Saudi Arabia, the UAE, and China for maintaining critical reserves to avoid default highlights its vulnerability. Given these challenges, it is in Pakistan's best interest to improve relations with its neighbors, as its ties with Iran, India, and Afghanistan are perhaps at their lowest point. Instead of taking actions that further deteriorate peace and exacerbate belligerent behavior, Pakistan should focus on fostering better diplomatic and economic relationships to stabilize the region and ensure long-term security and prosperity. If both sides fail to pursue a negotiated settlement, the consequences could be catastrophic. Continued airstrikes and retaliatory attacks risk escalating into open conflict, destabilizing the region and worsening humanitarian crises. For Pakistan, further escalation could strain its already fragile internal security, undermine its international standing, and deplete critical resources. For Afghanistan, emboldened by its ability to strike back, the conflict could cement its role as a destabilizing force in the region. A peaceful resolution through dialogue is urgently needed to prevent these dire outcomes.

MELBOURNE: Australia beat India by 184 runs in a thrilling conclusion to the fourth Test in Melbourne to take a 2-1 lead going into the final match of the series. India were set a target of 340 in 92 overs and batted cautiously throughout the innings with little ambition to chase an unlikely victory. But a sensational bowling performance in the evening session saw Australia take the final seven wickets for just 34 runs as India were bowled out for 155 in the final hour. The tourists slipped to 33-3 but opener Yashasvi Jaiswal looked intent on securing a hard-fought draw for India before he was caught behind off Pat Cummins for 84 from 208 balls with 21 overs remaining. Jaiswal had battled through a wicketless afternoon session alongside wicketkeeper Rishabh Pant, who made 30 from 104 balls - but they were the only men to

pass double figures. Pant eventually ran out of patience and slogged Travis Head to long-on for another wasteful dismissal and his departure after tea sparked the collapse. Cummins and Scott Boland finished with three wickets each while spinner Nathan Lyon took two after his batting heroics, falling for 41 in the second over of the day as Australia were all out for 234. He was bowled by Jasprit Bumrah, who finished with 5-57 in another scintillating performance. The series concludes in Sydney from 2 January, where a win would secure Australia's place in the World Test Championship final alongside South Africa. In front of a record attendance for a Test match in Australia - with 373,691 spectators at the MCG over the five days - captain Cummins delivered another masterclass with the ball and with his tactics. India openers Jaiswal and captain Rohit Sharma started slowly to set the tone for the team's approach, battling to 25-0 from 16 overs with just 12 scoring shots played within the first 90 balls.

#### PSX witnessed bullish trend, gains 3,907 more points

ISLAMABAD: The 100-Index of the Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX) witnessed bullish trend on Monday, gaining 3,907.82 more points, a positive change of 3.51 percent, closing at 115,259.00 points as compared to 111,351.18 points on the last trading day.

A total of 1,059,020,119 shares were traded during the day as compared to 815,920,043 shares the previous trading day, whereas the price of shares stood at Rs 40.889 billion against Rs. 32.917 billion on the last trading day. As many as 465 companies transacted their shares in the stock market, 333 of them recorded gains and 84 sustained losses, whereas the share price of 48 companies remained unchanged. The three top trading companies were Cnergyico PK with 125,613,935 shares at Rs 7.44 per share, WorldCall Telecom with 111,551,930 shares at Rs 1.83 per share and Bank of Punjab with 84,182,656 shares at Rs.10.47 per share.-APP

The exchange rate of the Emirates Dirham remained unchanged to close at Rs75.81, while the Saudi Riyal went up by 01 paisa and closed at Rs74.16.—APP

## Death toll in Ethiopia road accident rises to 71

NAIROBI: The death toll from a road accident in southern Ethiopia has risen to at least 71, according to a local police official. In a Facebook post late Sunday, the Sidama Police Commission Traffic Prevention and Control Directorate said that "68 males and three females are known to have died in the accident so far", citing Chief Inspector Daniel Sankura. The police commission said the incident occurred at around 5:30 pm local time (1430 GMT) when the vehicle plunged off a road and into a river. The post added that "two others have sustained heavy physical injuries", but did not detail any further information about the number of passengers onboard at the time of the incident. The accident occurred in Sidama state - some 300 kilometres (180 miles) south of the capital Addis Ababa - in the Eastern Zone, in Bona Zuria Woreda.-APP

## 31 Kurdish, Turkishbacked fighters killed in Syria

BEIRUT: A Syria war monitor said 31 combatants had been killed since Sunday in ongoing battles between Turkiye-backed groups and Kurdish-led forces. Swathes of northern Syria are controlled by a Kurdish-led administration whose de facto army, the Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF), spearheaded the fight that helped defeat the Daesh group in the country in 2019 with US backing. Turkiye accuses the main component of the SDF, the People's Protection Units (YPG), of being affiliated with the militant Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK), which both Washington and Ankara consider a terrorist group. The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said that seven pro-Turkish fighters were killed in clashes Monday in the northeastern Manbij region, in Aleppo province. SDF fighters had infiltrated the city of the same name after it was retaken by Ankara-backed groups earlier this month, the monitor said. Six other pro-Turkish fighters and three members of the SDF were killed the day before in the same part of Aleppo province, it said. The SDF said Monday that it had carried out attacks elsewhere in the province that destroyed "two radars, a jamming system and a tank of the Turkish occupation" near a strategic bridge

over the Euphrates. According to the Observatory, 13 members of the pro-Turkiye factions and two members of the SDF "were killed as a result of flaring battles" near the bridge and the Tishreen Dam. The Britain-based Observatory said clashes in the area had been going on for around three weeks "as both sides

GENEVA: Former US pres-

ident Jimmy Carter, who died on Sunday aged 100, "saved countless lives" through his work to elimi nate diseases, the head of the World Health Organization said, WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said he was deeply saddened to hear of Carter's passing, calling him a "true leader who inspired so many." "His unwavering commitment to people's wellbeing in the United States and around the world will be remembered forever," Tedros said on X. "His work through the Carter Center has saved countless lives and helped bring many neglected tropical diseases close to elimination. "President Carter's leadership was instrumental in facilitating peace negotiations in the Middle East decades ago, and is a reminder of what our world needs the most today. "Dear President Carter, you will be greatly missed. Rest in peace." The Carter Center works to fight six preventable diseases - Guinea worm, river blindness, trachoma, schistosomiasis, lymphatic filariasis, plus malaria in Haiti and the Dominican Republic - through health education and simple, lowcost prevention and treatment methods.

# Syria eyes 'strategic' ties with Ukraine

DAMASCUS: Syria hopes "strategic partnerships" with Ukraine, its new foreign minister told his Ukrainian counterpart on Monday, as Kyiv moves to build ties with the new Islamist rulers in Damascus amid waning Russian influence. Russia was a staunch ally of ousted President Bashar Assad and has given him political asylum. Moscow has said it is in contact with the new administration in Damascus, including over the fate of Russian military facilities in Syria. "There will be strategic partnerships between us and Ukraine on the po-

litical, economic and social levels, and scientific partnerships," Syria's newly appointed foreign minister, Asaad Hassan Al-Shibani, told Ukraine's Andrii Sybiha. "Certainly the Syrian people and the Ukrainian people h ave the same experience and the same suffering that we endured over 14 years," he added, apparently drawing a parallel between Syria's brutal 2011-24 civil war and Russia's seizure of Ukrainian territory culminating in its full-scale 2022 invasion. Sybiha, who also met Syria's new de facto ruler Ahmed Al-Sharaa in Damascus on Monday, said Ukraine would send

more food aid shipments to Syria after the expected arrival of 20 shipments of flour on Tuesday. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky announced last Friday the dispatch of Ukraine's first batch of food aid to Syria comprising 500 metric tons of wheat flour as part of Kyiv's humanitarian "Grain from Ukraine" initiative in cooperation with the United Nations World Food Programme. Ukraine, a global producer and exporter of grain and oilseeds, traditionally exports wheat and corn to countries in the Middle East, but not to Syria, which in the Assad era imported food from Russia. Russian

wheat supplies to Syria have been suspended because of uncertainty about the new government in Damascus and payment delays, Russian and Syrian sources told Reuters in early December. Russia had supplied wheat to Syria using complex financial and logistical arrangements to circumvent Western sanctions imposed on both Moscow and Damascus. The ousting of Assad by Al-Sharaa's Islamist group, Hayat Tahrir Al-Sham, has thrown the future of Russia's military bases in Syria - the Hmeimim air base in Latakia and the Tartous naval facility - into ques-

MUAN (South Korea): South Korea ordered Monday a "comprehensive inspection" of all Boeing 737-800 aircraft operated by the country's carriers, after a Jeju Air plane crash-landed and burst into flames, killing 179 people on board. air safety officials and staff from the beleaguered aircraft maker Boeing were arriving to join investigators probing the worst air disaster on South Korean soil, which officials initially blamed on a collision with birds. The Boeing 737-800 was carrying 181 people from Thailand to South Korea when it made a mayday call and belly-landing before crashing into a barrier and bursting into flames. Everyone on board Jeju Air Flight 2216 was killed, save two flight attendants pulled from the wreckage. South Korea began seven days of mourning, with flags flying at half-mast and the acting president flying to the crash site in southwestern Muan for a memorial. Acting President Choi Sang-mok, who has only been in office since Friday, said the government was making "every effort" to identify victims and support bereaved families. Choi, an unelected bureaucrat who became acting president after his two predecessors were impeached, said a "thorough investigation into the cause of the accident" would be conducted. He also said South Korea would conduct "an urgent safety inspection of the overall aircraft operation system" to prevent future aviation disasters. South Korea has a solid air safety record and both black boxes from Flight 2216 - the flight data recorder and the cockpit voice recorder - have been found. Officials have so far identified 146 victims using DNA analysis or fingerprint collection, said Joo. Victims' families camped out at the airport overnight in special tents set up in the airport lounge after a long, painful day waiting for news of their loved ones. He stressed that no new connections should be issued without CDA's approval and called for strict legal action against illegal electricity connections. Additionally, discussions were held regarding land allocation for the installation of a 220 kV grid station in Islamabad. Chairman CDA directed IESCO to ensure the immediate provision of electricity in Sector C-14 in alignment with ongoing development works in the area.-DNA

## Turkiye's \$14b plan to boost uplift in Kurdish southeast

SANLIURFA: Turkiye announced on Sunday a \$14 billion regional development plan that aims to reduce the economic gap between its mainly Kurdish southeast region and the rest of the country. The announcement comes amid increased hopes for an end to a decades-long insurgency waged by the outlawed Kurdistan Workers Party, or PKK, in southeast Turkiye as well as the advent of a new leadership in neighboring Syria with cordial ties to Ankara. The eastern and southeastern provinces of Turkiye have long lagged behind other regions of the country in most economic indicators including the GDP per capita, partly as a result of the insurgency. Turkish Industry Minister Fatih Kacir told reporters in the southeastern city of Sanliur fa that the government would spend a total 496.2 billion lira (\$14.15 billion) on 198 projects across the region in the period to 2028.—APP

DEIR AL-BALAH, Gaza City: For Gaza's women, the hardships of life in the territory's sprawling tent camps are compounded by the daily humiliation of never having privacy. Women struggle to dress modestly while crowded into tents with extended family members, including men, and with strangers only steps away in neighboring tents. Access to menstrual products is limited, so they cut up sheets or old clothes to use as pads. Makeshift toilets usually consist of only a hole in the sand surrounded by sheets dangling from a line, and these must be shared with dozens of other people. Alaa Hamami has dealt with the modesty issue by constantly wearing her prayer shawl, a black cloth that covers her head and upper body. "Our whole lives have become prayer clothes, even to the market we wear it," said the

young mother of three. "Dignity is gone." Normally, she would wear the shawl only when performing her daily Muslim prayers. But with so many men around, she keeps it on all the time, even when sleeping – just in case an Israeli strike hits nearby in the night and she has to flee quickly, she said. (AP) Israel's 14-month-old campaign in Gaza has driven more than 90 percent of its 2.3 million Palestinians from their homes. Hundreds of thousands of them are now living in squalid camps of tents packed close together over large areas. Sewage runs into the streets, and food and water are hard to obtain. Winter is setting in. Families often wear the same clothes for weeks because they left clothing and many other belongings behind as they fled. Everyone in the camps searches daily for food, clean water and firewood. Women feel constantly exposed. Gaza has always been a conservative society. Most women wear the hijab, or head scarf, in the presence of men who are not immediate family. Matters of women's health - pregnancy, menstruation and contraception - tend not to be discussed publicly. "Before we had a roof. Here it does not exist," said Hamami, whose prayer shawl is torn and smudged with ash from cooking fires. "Here our entire lives have become exposed to the public. There is no privacy for women." Even simple needs are hard to meet Wafaa Nasrallah, a displaced mother of two, says life in the camps makes even the simplest needs difficult, like getting period pads, which she can-

not afford. She tried using pieces of cloth and even diapers, which have also increased in price. For a bathroom, she has a hole in the ground, surrounded by blankets propped up by sticks. (AP) The UN says more than 690,000 women and girls in Gaza require menstrual hygiene products, as well as clean water and toilets. Aid workers have been unable to meet demand, with supplies piling up at crossings from Israel. Stocks of hygiene kits have run out, and prices are exorbitant. Many women have to choose between buying pads and buying food and water. Doaa Hellis, a mother of three living in a camp, said she has torn up her old clothes to use for menstrual

pads. "Wherever we find fabric. we tear it up and use it." A packet of pads costs 45 shekels (\$12), "and there is not even five shekels in the whole tent," she said. Anera, a rights group active in Gaza, says some women use birth control pills to halt their periods. Others have experienced disruptions in their cycles because of the stress and trauma of repeated displacement. The terrible conditions pose real risks to women's health, said Amal Seyam, the director of the Women's Affairs Center in Gaza, which provides supplies for women and surveys them about their experiences. She said some women have not changed clothes for 40 days. That and improvised cloth pads "will certainly create" skin diseases, diseases related to reproductive health and psychological conditions, she said.—Agencies

# Belgium becomes first EU country to ban disposable e-cigarettes

BRUSSELS: Wildly popular with young people for their dizzying array of flavours, including apple, watermelon and cola, the time is up for disposable e-cigarettes in Belgium – the first EU country to ban them. From January 1, it will be forbidden to sell single-use vapes in Belgium, a bid to protect young people's health as part of a national anti-tobacco plan. The European Union aims to achieve a tobacco-free generation by 2040, reducing the 27-country bloc's smoking population from around 25 per cent now to less than five per cent of the total.Some EU countries plan to bring that deadline forward. Vapes are often promoted as less harmful than smoking traditional tobacco products.-Agencies

## Two road accidents leave 18 dead

LAHORE: At least 18 people were killed and 37 sustained injuries in two separate traffic accidents on Monday, including a bus overturning incident near Punjab's Fateh Jang and a collision between a wedding van and trawler in Sindh's NaushahroFeroze, 11 people, including six women and five men, were killed after a bus met an accident and overturned on the M-14 Motorway near Fateh Jang. Rescue officials told the media that the number of those wounded in the accident stands at 22, adding that the victims hailed from Bahawalpur, Vehari, Sharaqpur and Islamabad, added

the rescue officials. Furthermore, rescue officials said that six people, including three women, have been shifted to Benazir Bhutto Hospital, whereas one injured has been transferred to Islamabad and District Headquarter Hospital, each. Meanwhile, a spokesperson for the Motorway Police said that the bus, travelling from Bahawalpur to Islamabad, met a deadly accident due to the driver's negligence. Motorway Police Inspector General Riffat Mukhtar has ordered an immediate investigation into the bus accident.

#### Syrian FM receives invitation to visit KSA

DUBAI: Foreign Minister of the transitional government in Syria, Asaad Hassan Al-Shibani, said on X on Monday that he had accepted an invitation from his Saudi counterpart Prince Faisal bin Farhan to visit the Kingdom, in what would be his first foreign trip since the ouster of former president Bashar Assad on Dec. 8. "We look forward to building strategic relations with Saudi Arabia in all fields," read a statement posted on the Syrian Arab News Agency's X account. Al-Shibani has expressed optimism about the future of Syrian-Saudi relations, and has emphasized the importance of building strategic ties in all fields, SANA reported.

He added, "I am honored to represent my country and look forward to this opportunity to enhance cooperation and dialogue." It follows comments made by Syria's new leader, Ahmed Al-Sharaa, who said Saudi Arabia had a major role to play in his country's future during an interview with Al Arabiva which aired on Sunday.

"Saudi Arabia has a major role in Syria's future, and I take pride in everything it has done for us," he said adding that he spent his early childhood in Riyadh and hoped to visit the city again. Al-Sharaa also praised recent Saudi statements as "very positive" and commended Riyadh's efforts toward stabilizing Syria. - Agencies

#### Pakistani pilot among two die in UAE

DUBAI: At least two people including a Pakistani pilot died after a small plane crashed off the coast of United Arab Emirates' (UAE) Ras Al Khaimah city. The incident took place on December 26 which was confirmed by the General Civil Aviation Authority (GCAA) on Sunday, stating that investigations are underway to determine the cause. The pilot, identified as FrianzaParveen, was a 26-year-old Pakistani who died in the crash while her companion identified as a 26-year-old Indian doctor Sulaymaan Al Majid.

The diplomatic officials said that the body of the pilot will be repatriated to Pakistan today. The private tourism aviation club plane was used for tourism purposes and crashed in the Sulaymaan's father told Khaleej Times that the crash occurred shortly after takeoff at 2pm near the Cove Rotana Hotel, close to the beach. He had hired the aircraft for sightseeing and his family were at the club to watch the experience. - Agencies

PESHAWAR: Former federal minister Sajid Hussain Turi on Sunday said that at least 128 children had died in Parachinar since the conflict started almost three months ago due to the lack of resources. Kurram has remained cut off from the rest of the country due to violent tribal clashes that began there in November, claiming more than 100 lives. All roads in Kurram, including the Parachinar-Peshawar highway, have remained closed to traffic since Nov 21 after a vehicular convoy was attacked in the Bagan area, in which at least 50 people were killed. GAZA: In the midst of catastrophic humanitarian suffering for more than two million Palestinians - half of them children, the Israeli occupation army continued, for the 451st consecutive day, to pound and target different areas and massacre more civilians in the Gaza Strip, especially in the northern areas. Palestinian Information Center (PIC) said on Monday that the Israeli occupation army carried out attacks on several homes, civilian targets and shelter centers in different areas of Gaza during the past 24 hours, killing and injuring dozens of citizens. Israeli attacks have killed 27 Palestinians and wounded 149 in the latest 24hour reporting period, Gaza's Health Ministry says. The Israeli army's large-scale genocidal campaign in northern Gaza, especially in Jabalia and Beit Lahia, has entered day 87, where its forces continue to intensively bomb homes and shelters and attack civilians while imposing a tight siege on the entire area. Deliberate Israeli attacks on ambulance and civil defense workers already deprived northern Gaza of any rescue services. Local sources said that a young citizen was martyred in an Israeli attack in Jabalia refugee camp in northern Gaza. Another citizen was killed when an Israeli drone opened fire at him in the east of Rafah, south of Gaza. More casualties were reported in other areas of Gaza following Israeli aerial, artillery and shooting attacks last night and today. In a related context, the health ministry in Gaza said on Monday that the Israeli army committed three massacres in different areas of the Gaza Strip during the past 24 hours, and killed and injured at least 176 civilians, while a large number of victims are still under the rubble of bombed buildings or lying on roads. Meanwhile, Israeli forces kidnaped four patients out of 10 as they were transported by the World Health Organization from the Indonesian Hospital to the Al-Shifa Hospital.
