'It's time to root out Fitna al-Khawarij'

Premier Shehbaz calls for unity, says national interest is above all

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Friday declared that the time has come to put an end to "Fitna al-Khawarij," referring to the outlawed Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP), responsible for multiple attacks on security forces and civilians. Addressing the meeting of the Central Apex Committee on the National Action Plan (NAP), the prime minister urged provinces, federal authorities, and institutions to devise a comprehensive plan to combat terrorism and ensure peace across Pakistan. Today's meeting to review the security situation in the country was attended by the civil and military leadership. Welcoming participants to the meeting, PM Shehbaz noted that improving law and order situation in the entire country is important to achieve the agenda of progress and development.

He specifically pointed out the presence of infiltrators, particularly in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and said recent cross-border attacks by terrorists were met with a robust response. PM Shehbaz expressed concern over external and internal elements conducting anti-Pakistan campaigns. "Agents sitting abroad, disguised as friends, are propagating against Pakistan. This is a significant threat," he warned. "We are also cognizant of the foreign hands who are hatching conspiracies against Pakistan from within Balochistan," he added.

The premier warned that enemies with malicious intent are lying in wait, emphasising the need to stay vigilant against such threats. He also emphasised the need for equipping police with modern equipment and ensuring merit based induction in the force. PM Shehbaz expressed satisfaction over



Boat tragedy: FIA arrests 6, including key human trafficker

During the raid in Gujrat, authorities recovered several passports from the suspect, further incriminating him in human trafficking activities

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) has arrested six suspects including a highly sought-after human trafficker, in connection with the Libya boat tragedy. According to an FIA spokesperson, the suspects were apprehended during operations in various areas of Gujranwala and Gujrat. Among the arrested is Khurram Shehzad, identified as a key operative for international agents based in Libya. The FIA revealed that the accused charged a family Rs1mln to send a minor child to Europe via a boat. During the raid in Gujrat, authorities recovered several passports from the suspect, further incriminating him in human trafficking activities. Earlier, the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) Gujranwala zone arrested a notorious human trafficker wanted in connection with the Libya boat tragedy. As per details, the accused identified as Yasir Mehmood was on the Red Book's most-wanted list and had over five cases registered against him in Composite Circle Gujrat in 2023. Mehmood allegedly extorted millions of rupees from victims, promising to smuggle them to Europe. He would illegally transport people to Libya via Egypt and Dubai, where



LONDON: Irfan Sharif, father of the late Sara Sharif, was reportedly attacked by two inmates in Belmarsh Prison, leaving him injured, according to UK media. The attackers used the lid of a steel can to cut his throat and inflicted wounds to his face. The attack occurred on New Year's Day and is believed to have been premeditated. Despite efforts by prison staff to intervene, Irfan Sharif sustained serious injuries and required stitches. ISSI holds seminar on latest discriminatory U.S. sanctions and assertions about Pakistan's missile program

ISLAMABAD: The Arms Control and Disarmament Centre (ACDC) at the Institute of Strategic Studies Islamabad (ISSI), hosted a Roundtable Discussion on "Latest Discriminatory U.S. Sanctions and Assertions about Pakistan's Missile Program - Implications and Challenges." Eminent speakers included Ambassador Zamir Akram, Advisor to the SPD; Dr. Zafar Nawaz Jaspal, Dean of Social Sciences and Professor at the School of Politics and International Relations, QAU; and Ambassador Tahir Hussain Andrabi, DG ACDIS, MOFA. The event brought together senior diplomats, renowned scholars, and practitioners to reflect on the nature of the U.S. sanctions and their implications. In his welcome remarks, DG ISSI Ambassador Sohail Mahmood highlighted the recent U.S. sanctions against Pakistani entities and the surprising statement by a senior U.S. official, Jon Finer, about Pakistan's long-range ballistic missiles. Highlighting the Foreign Office's response to these developments, he noted that the alleged threat perception from Pakistan was characterised as "unfortunate" and U.S. allegations as "unfounded, devoid of rationality and sense of history." The Foreign Office had also underlined that U.S.'s discriminatory policies accentuated military assymetries in South Asia and undermined strategic stability in the region. The Foreign Office had also affirmed that Pakistan's strategic program and capabilities were a 'sacred trust' of the people, it enjoyed complete consensus in the country, and was not subject to any outside intrusion or compromise. Ambassador Sohail Mahmood stressed the importance of constructively engaging the U.S. in order to: (i) ensure that the U.S. recognized Pakistan's legitimate security concerns and legitimate defence needs; (ii) stress the imperative of fair, equal and non-discriminatory treatment; and (iii) effectively address the unfounded claim made by Mr. Jon Finer. He concluded that, in the end, strategic clarity and national resolve would carry the day for Pakistan. Earlier, in his introductory remarks, Malik Qasim Mustafa Director ACDC ISSI, highlighted the continuing challenges posed by the U.S.'s inconsistent approach towards Pakistan. He stated that by imposing these discriminatory sanctions the U.S. has ignored the fragile dynamics of strategic stability in South Asia. Pakistan has faced misperceptions about

its strategic program in the past and it has always sought to address international concerns, while countering baseless

Living in Islamabad, known for its picturesque landscapes and vibrant urban life, means that we often find ourselves outdoors. exposed to the sun's rays. While soaking up the sun can feel refreshing, especially in Islamabad's moderate climate, it's essential to protect your skin from harmful UV radiation. Sunscreen plays a crucial role in maintaining healthy skin, preventing premature aging, and reducing the risk of pigmentation and skin cancer. Islamabad experiences long sunny days for much of the year, making sunscreen more than just an accessory it's a necessity. Ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun

is one of the leading causes of skin damage. Without sunscreen, prolonged exposure to the sun's UVA and UVB rays can lead to sunburns, dark spots, and wrinkles. Even during Islamabad's cooler months, UV rays can penetrate the

clouds, causing harm. Exposure to UV rays without protection accelerates the appearance of fine lines and wrinkles, making your skin look older than it is. Sunscreen helps prevent photoaging, keeping your skin youthful and vibrant. Islamabad's diverse weather conditions can trigger hyperpigmentation issues, especially for people with sensitive skin. Sunscreen prevents these dark patches caused by sun exposure. Skin cancer, particularly melanoma, can be triggered by excessive UV exposure. Daily sunscreen reduces this risk by acting as a shield between your skin and harmful radiation.

Not all sunscreens are created equal, and it's essential to choose one that suits your skin type to ensure maximum protection. Some people have their natural skin oily or acne-prone. Oily skin can become more pronounced in a city like Islamabad, where the humidity levels fluctuate, especially during the monsoon season. They should use Sebum Control sunscreen which is gel-based or water-based. These are lightweight, nongreasy, and won't clog pores. Look for Non-Comedogenic sunscreen that won't causes breakouts. A broad-spectrum SPF 40 or higher is good enough for protecting against both UVA and UVB rays for oily skin people using sebum control sunscreen. Some people have their

natural skin dry which becomes more dry during Islamabad's colder months. If your skin feels tight and flaky. Choose a Moisturizing Sunscreen. Look for products that have hydrating ingredients like hvaluronic acid, glycerin or aloe Vera. Opt for Cream-Based Formulas, these tend to provide extra hydration and are better for dry skin. SPF recommendation is 60 and above is ideal, especially during sunny winter days. If your skin easily reacts to products or gets irritated under the sun, pick a physical (mineral) sunscreen,

these contain zinc oxide or titanium dioxide and are less likely to irritate sensitive skin. Go for sunscreens, labeled fragrance-free and hypoallergenic. SPF Recommendation is at least 60 or above is sufficient for

daily protection. Combination skin can be tricky, as some areas may be oily while others are dry. For those living in Islamabad, where weather conditions fluctuate, you need a balanced sunscreen. Use a lightweight, lotion-based sunscreen. This provides hydration without making oily areas greasy. Look for matte finish, this will keep your skin shine-free, especially in Islamabad's warmer months. SPF recommendation is 60 or higher for balanced protection.



PESHAWAR: Once known as City of Flowers, Peshawar is presently confronted with a monster challenge of air pollution that are posing a serious threat to its residents due to an unchecked smoke emission of hundreds of thousands of vehicles, brick kilns and industrial units mostly operating in its urban areas. The visitors that once impressed by the fragrance of Gul-e-Dawoodi in Peshawar, is now inhaling the growing thick air smoke mostly emitting from thousands of vehicles, brick-kilns, marble units of Warsak Road and chip board factories operating at Hayatabad Industrial Estate, burning of tyres, hospitals waste's burning, which

could be seen even with a naked eye while standing on top of Suray bridge near Jinnah Park, Peshawar City. In Peshawar, the Particulate Matter (PM 2.5) pollution is higher than limits set by the National Environmental Quality Standards (NEQS) with a bigger impact on people's lives having more exposure to toxic air increases age-specific mortality risk. The PM 2.5 pollution enhances an age-specific mortality risk, and the residents of Peshawar are highly vulnerable to it mostly due to an unregulated traffic, brik kilns and chip boards factories," said Professor Dr Muhammad Shafiqur Rehman, former Chairman Environmental Science Department at the University of Peshawar while talking to APP. "Basically, PM 2.5 pollution is a complex mixture of extremely small and light particles that stays for longer in the air and once inhaled, can affect people's hearts, nose to lungs, respiratory system besides leading to high blood pressure, strokes, asthma, cancers and other chronic chest related diseases," he said. Dr Shafiqul Rehman said that the air quality of Peshawar is very poor. He said air quality should be around 25 milligrams (mg) per cubic meter as per WHO standards, adding if the amount of dust, smoke.-APP

PIC performs over 2000, heart surgeries in 2024

PESHAWAR: Peshawar Institute of Cardiology (PIC), the only dedicated cardiac hospital in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, on Friday announced the year 2024 as highly successful by performing over 2,000 cardiac procedures, including 1,901 open-heart surgeries (236 on children), thus becoming one of the largest heart centers in Pakistan. The hospital's annual performance report highlights a significant impact on cardiac care in the region. According to the spokesperson Miss Riffat Anjum, In 2024, PIC's outpatient department (OPD) recieved over 69,489 patients,

The hospital

performed 15,143 angiographies and angioplasties. PIC also provided a beacon of hope for children with congenital heart defects, successfully closing atrial septal defects (holes in the heart) in 811 children using minimally invasive devices. CDNS achieves Rs 700b savings target

ISLAMABAD: The Central Directorate of National Savings (CDNS) has realized a target of Rs 700 billion in fresh bonds and achieved 42.42 percent of the annual target for the first half of the current fiscal year, from July 1 to December 31st. The CDNS has set a reviewed saving target of Rs 1.4 trillion for the financial year (2021-22) which will promote a savings culture in the country, he said, adding that given the current market trend in the country, the ambitious target had been set to further improve the savings culture. The official said that work was being done on institutional reforms in CDNS and new reforms and innovations were being introduced. At this time Automated Teller Machine (ATM) has also been introduced in CDNS which will provide enough facilities to the users," he added. The official said that the directorate had set a target of Rs 75 billion for the new financial year 2023-24 for Islamic finance bonds. Replying to a question; he said the CDNS aimed to introduce new dimensions in the Islamic finance sector. ISLAMABAD: Ms. Sabheen Ghoury, Parliamentary Secretary for Information Technology, called for consistent policies among governments to achieve sustainable progress, stating that environmental challenges were transnational and necessitate a collaborative approach. She spoke at a roundtable on "Pak-China's Vision for a Sustainable Future: Ecological Civilization, Environmental Security, and Global Harmony," organized by the Institute of Regional Studies (IRS) in collaboration with China Global Television Network (CGTN) Urdu. President Ambassador Jauhar Saleem opened the session by stressing the roundtable's significance amid major environmental changes. He commended China for its efforts to

ronmental impacts of rapid industrialization. He noted that, like their cooperation in economic and defense sectors, Pakistan and China also collaborate on critical issues such as climate resilience, mitigation, and adaptation. Mr. Tasawar Zaman Babar, Program Coordinator at CGTN Urdu, commended Pakistan's longstanding friendship with China, which has persisted through various administrations. He emphasized the importance of aligning economic development with environmental concerns in light of the current climate crisis. Mr. Khalid Taimur Akram, Executive Director of the Pakistan Research Center for a Community with Shared Future (PRCCSF), echoed Ms. Ghoury's sentiments, emphasizing that environmental hazards have regional, rather than national, implications. He argued that policies should reflect

Healthcare costs associated with treating pollution-related illnesses strain public health systems, while reduced workforce productivity due to illness or premature deaths affects economic growth. Furthermore, air pollution damages infrastructure, agricultural yields, and tourism, leading to significant financial losses. Socially, air pollution increases inequalities, influencing poor people as they usually live near industrial stations or freeways. These communities have a higher exposure level and do not have good health care so are worse off against the effects of polluted air. 5) Dealing with Air Pollution 6) Issues of air pollution require a multi- dimensional approach. The government needs to enforce stricter rules on industries' and vehicles' emissions. Investing in renewable sources such as solar and wind can minimize reliance on fossil fuels. Public transportation, car pooling, and electric vehicles can be encouraged to minimize the vehicular form of emission. At the individual level, using energy-efficient appliances, reducing waste, and planting trees can contribute to cleaner air. Public awareness campaigns are necessary to educate people on the need to reduce pollution and adapt to sustainable ways of living. How likely is a ceasefire in Gaza?

S the Gaza ceasefire talks stall yet again, some analysts argue that Donald Trump's inauguration could be the key. However, the prospects for ending the war are dependent upon a variety of other factors that are making an Israeli victory impossible. Despite the recent progress towards securing a ceasefire in the Gaza Strip, the Zionist regime has again employed its delaying tactics in order to find the opportune moment. Budget disaster for UN bodies

N October, as part of its preparation for the Cop29 UN climate summit in Azerbaijan, a team from Oxfam released a meticulously researched report on unsatisfactory World Bank accounting standards which made it virtually impossible to discover with confidence the total finance spent on climate-related projects. According to the report, this had created a "crisis of trust and a spate of doubts" about the true value of the finance raised. The complaint was well-justified and critically important. The World Bank is responsible for around 800 climate-related projects which are worth hundreds of billions of dollars in hundreds of countries across the world, carried out in collaboration with dozens of other agencies and governments. Accurate monitoring of what is being spent, and how effectively, is essential if we are to track reliably our progress in protecting thousands of vulnerable communities across the world's poorest nations. Sadly, the Oxfam report has opened a Pandora's box and backfired badly on their efforts to improve the World Bank's reporting transparency. Inaccurate media coverage of the report has led to false suggestions that the World Bank has systematically misdirected or squandered up to US\$41 billion and has triggered demands in the United States for World Bank funding to be withdrawn. For the Make America Great Again (Maga) movement, impatient for US president-elect Donald Trump to assume power, the report provided a golden opportunity to call for the immediate US withdrawal not just from the World Bank but from a host of other UN and multilateral agencies. Trump has long expressed dislike or disdain for most multilateral organisations, and frequently threatened withdrawal. During his first term, he cut funding for the UN Population Fund because of its support for abortion. He cut 30 per cent of US funding for the UNAids and 20 per cent of funds for the World Health Organization. As far back as 2017, he complained that "the WTO was set up for the benefit of everybody but us... They have taken advantage of this country like you wouldn't believe." The misreporting and misinterpretation of the Oxfam report has triggered a rise in social media attacks on US funding not just for the World Bank but for several other UN-related organisations. A single LinkedIn post by a Houston-based Trump supporter which asked "How do you lose \$41,000,000,000?" and falsely claimed that the World Bank was "80 per cent funded by US taxpayers" triggered a vicious string of more than 500 responses that has run for weeks. For a taste, one commenter said "[The US] should be pulling out of the WTO, WHO, IMF, WEF". One insisted that "[the World Bank] didn't lose [the money]. Obviously they gave it to terrorist organisations 100 per cent". These calls for withdrawal from the World Health Organization, the World Trade Organization and numerous other UN institutions have fuelled Trump's distaste for UN organisations in particular and multilateralism in general. They have provided fodder for Elon Musk's Department of Government Efficiency, which is seeking to cut US\$2 trillion from what the new administration believes is an unacceptably bloated government.

Up in the air whether US economic arrows will hit the mark

The Ukraine and Gaza wars have upended all illusions of Western moral superiority – it was always about the raw power conflicts, whether over the control of energy, technology, military, media or finance. The US pumping out more oil to boost its GDP would bolster confidence in the dollar, when dollar weaponisation has caused a shift to alternatives. HE US looks set for simultaneous wars in three areas: deficits, currency and energy. That's incoming US Treasury secretary Scott Bessent's "three arrows" strategy - cutting the US fiscal deficit to 3 per cent of gross domestic product, growing the US economy at 3 per cent a year and expanding US oil and gas production by 3 million barrels per day. These ambitious goals, deeply tied to each other, mean Bessent is looking to deliver what financial markets want: growth plus stability. This is a high-wire job to be executed as part of a rumbustious cabinet that is expected to go gangbusters to fulfil Trump 2.0 policies to "Make America great again". It is fascinating that the United States, Europe and China are all aiming for rejuvenation – and unlikely that all three can return to glory at the same time. The nightmare scenarios are an unintended protectionist depression and/or nuclear war.

National aspirations are never executed in isolation. What the US wants will spark a backlash. So far, the mainstream Western view is that the Chinese economy is in deep trouble, whereas the mainstream Chinese view is that the West is not in great shape either. Still, the US is the world's largest economy and its aspirations must be part of everyone's strategic calculations. Let's unpack Bessent's three arrows. Having simple objectives allows the team to focus. But anyone familiar with bloated bureaucracies, fickle public opinion and infighting knows that a lot can prevent the arrows from hitting their targets. On paper, the three arrows plan looks achievable. But the US fiscal deficit Trump will inherit from the Biden administration stands at 6.4 per cent of GDP, more than double Bessent's 3 per cent target. The second target of 3 per cent GDP growth is not far off an expected 2.8 per cent for 2024 but the average growth rate since 2008 has been nearer 2 per cent per annum.

We can safely say the Biden growth record was achieved through above-average fiscal spending funded by unsustainable debt growth. That's not dealing with structural deficit spending. The third arrow of 3 million barrels of oil a day underlines Bessent's recognition that energy propels growth. As the world's largest oil producer, American output of 12.9 million barrels per day in 2023 was larger than Russia's 10.1 million barrels and Saudi Arabia's 9.7 million barrels. Adding 3 million barrels would mean upping production by 23.3 per cent, largely from shale oil extraction, which is possible only by ignoring the net zero carbon agenda. President-elect Donald Trump cares more about artificial intelligence and cryptocurrency, both hugely energy-dependent, so increasing oil production makes sense for Trumponomics. Geopolitics is driven by energy. Historically, the industrial revolution was powered by fossil fuel innovation. The British empire used coal to power its steam engines but the US industrial rise was powered by cheap domestic oil and gas. Today, half to two-thirds of global recoverable oil reserves are within 600 miles of Tel Aviv while half of the world's exportable oil and gas go through the Strait of Hormuz, according to Cambridge political economy professor Helen Thompson. Any blockage of oil through either Israel bombing Iran or the Houthi rebels shutting down the Hormuz Strait could cause oil prices to rise. But most countries don't want high oil prices, due to the adverse impact on inflation. Meanwhile, the US, Russia, Saudi Arabia and Iran wouldn't want prices to

fall too low, since that would hurt their revenues. The trend towards de-dollarisation has not gathered much momentum, but de-dollarisation is something even Trump fears, considering he has threatened stiff tariffs on anyone who dares challenge the dollar's dominance. Trump threatens new anti-drug tariffs on 'day 1' for China, Canada, Mexico All in all, China is bracing for increased tariffs and more sanctions from the new Trump administration. To reduce its vulnerability to imported energy, it is not surprising that China is building a mega dam in Tibet that will generate three times more electricity than the Three Gorges Dam. In short, how 2025 turns out economically will depend on whether different types of war break out, such as over energy shutdowns in the Middle East or over supply chain choke points elsewhere. Trump wants to get the US out of the Ukraine war and concentrate on China. But Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Ukrainian President VolodymyrZelensky depend on continued conflict to survive politically, it seems. Spending more on defence through higher fiscal deficits is not sustainable for the US. The country needs to get bigger bang for its buck, balance its finances, produce more oil and rejuvenate itself with higher growth and productivity. If the Trump 2.0 team is as uncoordinated as Trump 1.0, then we will see arrows flying everywhere. Meanwhile, the Wall Street consensus is for US corporate earnings in 2025 to grow by 15 per cent and the stock market to remain buoyant. Only time will tell if Bessent's three arrows land on target or shoot the US in the foot. Revel or unravel in the new year.

BRISBANE: Top seed Novak Djokovic crashed out of the Brisbane International in a straight-set quarter-final defeat by Reilly Opelka. Djokovic, chasing his 100th ATP title, went neck-and-neck with the American in the first set before Opelka eased to a 7-6 (8-6) 6-3 victory in one hour and 40 minutes. Opelka, 27, will now face France's Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard, who beat Jakub Mensik 7-5 7-6 (7-5) to reach the semi-finals. "[Djokovic] is the greatest tennis player ever. But it's difficult being in his position," said Opelka, who is ranked 293rd in the world. "The reality is we have nothing to lose against him, so you end up playing

World number one Aryna Sabalenka reached the women's singles semi-finals by defeating Marie Bouzkova 6-3 6-4. The top-seeded Belarusian will now face 17-year-old Mirra Andreeva, who beat former world number two Ons Jabeur 6-4 7-6 (7-2). The duo last met at the 2024 French Open where the Russian teenager upset Sabalenka 6-7 (5-7) 6-4 6-4 to become the youngest player since Martina Hingis in 1997 to reach a Grand Slam semi-final. Czech Republic's Bouzkova made a

good start in the quarter-final by breaking serve in the first game, but three-

time major winner Sabalenka fought back to win the opening set in 51 minutes. She then wrapped up the second set in 53 minutes as she eyes an 18th career title. "It's always tough battles against Bouzkova and I had lost the last one [in Washington]. I came into the match really focused and I'm happy I was able to put her under pressure and finish the match in straight sets," the 26-year-old said. "[Andreeva] is a great player. We recently played an exhibition tournament in Abu Dhabi where I got to know her better. She is also a great person and I am really looking forward to playing against her." Russia's Polina Kudermetova and Ukraine's Anhelina Kalinina will meet in the other women's singles semi-final.

Billings becomes eighth English player to register for the draft

LAHORE: The Pakistan Super League (PSL) on Friday, announced that England's wicketkeeper batter Sam Billings has signed up for the highly-anticipated player draft for the upcoming 10th edition of the marquee league.

The announcement was made on the league's social media handles with a compilation video of Billings's batting exploits from his previous PSL appearances. "English wicket-keeper/batter Sam Billings enters the #HBLPSLDraft." The 33-year-old has represented England across formats, having played three Tests, 28 ODIs and 37 T20Is, and scored 1246 runs with the help of one century and five fifties. He also boasts a wealth of experience of franchise leagues, having Bangladesh Premier League, International League T20, Indian Premier League and Big Bash League. Billings has also featured in two PSL editions and won one title with Lahore Qalandars in 2023. He has played 20 matches and scored 402 runs at a modest average of 25.12 and a strike rate of 131.37 with the best score of 78 not out. Notably, Billings is the eighth English and 33rd overall foreign player to register for the PSL 10 draft, which will take place in Balochistan for the first time as Gwadar is set to host the landmark event on January 11, 2025. The pick order for the player draft has also been announced, with two-time champions Lahore Qalandars making the first pick in the opening round of the platinum category, followed by arch-rivals Karachi Kings. 2019 champions Quetta Gladiators will make the third pick, while Peshawar Zalmi will have the fourth. Last season's runners-up, Sultans, and reigning champions United will make the fifth and sixth picks, respectively. REAL Madrid's manager Carlo Ancelotti acknowledged the competition posed by arch-rivals Barcelona and current leaders Atletico Madrid in this year's La Liga, stating it is harder for a dominant victor to emerge. Barcelona, leaders since August, have slipped to third after winning only one of their last seven league matches, losing the top spot to Atletico Madrid in a 2-1 home loss last month. Ancelotti's Real, who are a point behind Atletico with 40 points from 18 matches, have a chance to provisionally take the top spot when they visit 19th-placed Valencia on Friday. "The level of competitiveness in LaLiga lowers a bit the points you need to win the title," Ancelotti, whose men finished 10 points ahead of second-placed Barcelona when they amassed 95 points during the 2023-24 campaign, told reporters. "The fact that Atletico are there also generates uncertainty and I think it will take less than 90 points to be champions." Ancelotti said while Barcelona's drop in form was unexpected, the club had a strong chance of staging a comeback. "You have a slump and then you get competitive like before. Barcelona and Atletico have the same chances of competing with us," he added. Ancelotti, who has led Real to two LaLiga titles since taking charge in 2021, said he did not expect to get an easy win at struggling Valencia. - Agencies

ISLAMABAD: The price of 24 karat per tola gold increased by Rs.2,200 and was traded at Rs.276,900 on Friday against its sale at Rs.274,700 on the last trading day, All Sindh Sarafa Jewellers Association reported. Per tola and ten gram silver were sold at existing prices of Rs 3,350 and Rs.2,872.08 respectively. Rupee gains 08 paisa against dollar

ISLAMABAD: Pakistani rupee on Friday appreciated by 08 paisa against the US dollar in the interbank trading and closed at Rs278.56 against the previous day's closing of Rs278.64. However, according to the Forex Association of Pakistan (FAP), the buying and selling rates of the dollar in the open market stood at Rs278.35 and Rs 279.85 respectively. The price of the Euro decreased by Rs2.31 to close at Rs286.57 against the last day's closing of Rs288.88, according to the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP). The Japanese yen remained constant at Rs1.77, whereas a decline of Rs.3.33 paisa was witnessed in the exchange rate of the British Pound, which was traded at Rs345.55 as compared to the last day's closing of Rs348.88. The exchange rates of the Emirates Dirham and the Saudi Rival decreased by 02 paisa each to close at Rs75.84 and Rs74.17, respectively.—APP

Israeli evacuation orders, airstrikes highlight ongoing insecurity in Gaza

UNITED NATIONS: Civil-

ians are not safe anywhere in the war-shattered Gaza Strip, the UN humanitarian affairs office, OCHA, has warned. the warning came after Israel once again ordered the evacuation of large areas within Gaza. citing rocket fire into its territory. The new orders cover about three square kilometres in North Gaza and Deir Al-Balah governorates, according to initial analysis by OCHA. Strikes have since been reported in Al Mawasi area, where people had been ordered to move and take shelter. The UN Children's Fund (UNICEF) wrote on social media that five youngsters were reportedly killed on Wednesday night, and others injured, in a strike on a tent in Mawasi - a so-called 'safe zone'. OCHA recalled that currently over 80 per cent of the Gaza Strip is under unrevoked Israeli evacuation orders. Amid this situation, the ability of humanitarians to support people in need across Gaza is further diminishing, the agency warned. "December saw some of the toughest restrictions on humanitarian movement ever recorded. This includes blocking access to border areas for collecting supplies and denving attempts to deliver goods and services or assess needs across Gaza," OCHA said. Overall, Israel denied 39 per cent of UN attempts to move aid workers anywhere in Gaza, with another 18 per cent disrupted on the ground or hindered. Additionally, for besieged areas in North Gaza, access has been denied for 88 consecutive days, or since 6 October. Meanwhile in the West Bank, humanitarians have carried out an assessment in the aftermath of the Israeli forces operation in Tulkarm and Nur Shams refugee camps on 24 and 25 December. The exercise was conducted by OCHA, alongside UN Palestine refugee agency, UNRWA, and aid partners. Teams visited the area on Tuesday and estimate that over 1,000 housing units and about 100 shops were damaged from explo-

sions or bulldozing.-APP

India engages with Trump admin to strengthen eco ties

"We are looking forward to a very deep and substantive engagement with the new US administration," the trade minister said, noting that under Prime Minister Narendra Modi, India has bolstered bilateral relations with successive U.S. administrations, including those led by Barack Obama, Donald Trump and Joe Biden. Bilateral trade between India and the United States. India's largest trading partner, exceeded \$118 billion in 2023/24, with India registering a trade surplus of \$32 billion. Industry estimates suggest that trade could grow by an additional \$50 billion within two to three years, underscoring significant potential for stronger economic cooperation. The government and industry groups favour a broader trade and investment pact with the United States to help Indian manufacturers integrate into global supply chains while retaining policy flexibility to safeguard national interests. Short-term inflation falls by 0.26pc: PBS

ISLAMABAD: The weekly inflation, measured by the Sensitive Price Indicator (SPI), went down by 0.26 percent for the combined consumption groups during the week ended on January 2, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported on Friday. According to the PBS data, the SPI for the week under review in the above-mentioned group was recorded at 326.10 points as compared to 326.96 points during the past week. As compared to the corresponding week of last year, the SPI for the combined consumption group in the week under review witnessed an increase of 3.97 per cent. The weekly SPI with the base year 2015-16 =100 covers 17 urban centres and 51 essential items for all expenditure groups. The SPI for the lowest consumption group of up to Rs 17,732 witnessed decrease of 0.51 per cent and went down to 320.01 points from last week's 321.65 points. The SPI for consumption groups of Rs 17,732 to 22,888; Rs 22,889-29,517; Rs 29,518-44,175 and above Rs 44,175, declined by 0.59 percent, 0.28 percent, 0.10 percent and 0.10 percent respectively. During the week, out of 51 items, prices of 18 (35.29%) items increased, 10 (19.61 percent) items decreased and 23 (45.10 percent) items remained stable. The items. which recorded major decrease in their average prices on a week-on-week basis included tomatoes (13.48 percent), electricity charges for q1 (7.48 percent), potatoes (5.59 percent), pulse gram (0.34 percent), eggs (0.23 percent), garlic (0.21 percent), LPG (0.18 percent), wheat flour (0.09 percent) and pulse mash (0.05 percent). The commodities which recorded major increase in their average prices on week-on-week basis included chicken (10.28 percent), onions (4.93 percent), bananas (1.68 percent), diesel (1.18 percent), pulse moong (1.08 percent), sugar (0.95 percent), gur (0.58 percent), firewood (0.55 percent), vegetable ghee 2.5 kg (0.53 percent), vegetable ghee 1kg (0.28 percent) and petrol (0.21 percent). SBP injects Rs2.43 trillion in the market

KARACHI: The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) injected Rs2,429.65 billion in the market through reverse repo purchase and Shariah Compliant Mudarabah based Open Market Operations (OMO) on Friday.

The SBP conducted Open Market Operation, Reverse Repo Purchase (Injection) on January 03, 2025 for 7-day and 28-day tenors and, as per results issued, accepted an amount of Rs2,245.65 billion offered through 23 bids. The central bank received 10 bids for 7-day tenor cumulatively offering an amount of Rs1,455.8 billion at the rate of return ranging between 13.04 to 13.09 percent while 13 bids were received for the 28-day tenor offering an amount of Rs1,145.65 billion at the rate of return ranging between 13.04 to 13.08 %. The central bank accepted an amount of Rs1,100 billion offered through 10 quotes for 7-day tenor at 13.04% rate of return. Total amount offered at 13.04% was Rs427 billion, out of which SBP accepted Rs100 billion on pro rata basis.-APP

China to boost funding for key projects, broaden trade-in programs in: NDRC

BEIJING: China will increase investment in major projects and expand the scope of tradein programs in 2025, according to the National Development and Reform Commission (NDRC), China's top economic planner, on Friday. In 2025, China will increase the issuance of ultra-long special treasury bonds to implement major national strategies and enhance security capacity in key areas, according to the NDRC. The commission said that it will continue to prioritize key initiatives such as ecological and environmental protection, advancing green growth in the Yangtze River Economic Belt, the new western land-sea corridor, the public service system for the urbanization of rural migrants, and the quality improvement of higher education, Global Times reported. The scope of water conservancy support will be broadened to encompass medium and large irrigation zones and major water diversion projects nationwide. Additionally, intercity railway construction projects in key metropolitan areas will be included in the support framework, and nationwide measures will be adopted to effectively reduce logistics costs for society as a whole. The NDRC said it will fast-track progress on ongoing projects. Building on last year's early issuance of a project list worth approximately 100 billion yuan (\$13.69 billion) for this year, we will soon issue another batch of project lists to ensure swift and tangible outcomes, the NDRC said. The NDRC also said that China will increase the issuance of ultra-long special treasury bonds to broaden coverage and raise subsidy levels for large-scale equipment upgrades and consumer goods trade-ins this year. Subsidies will be implemented for the purchase of new digital products such as mobile phones, tablets, and smartwatches, offering financial incentives for individual purchases of these devices. Furthermore, the incentive levels for replacing new-energy city buses and upgrading power batteries, the updating of agricultural machinery, and the replacement of household furnishings and decorations are set to rise. ooking ahead to 2025, China's expansive consumer market advantages remain steadfast and the consumer market is projected to sustain steady growth, the NDRC said. To boost consumption, the government will aim to raise residents' incomes, diversify the supply of consumer products and services, identify new consumption growth areas and improve the overall consumption environment, the NDRC said.-DNA

Pakistan, Iran navies hold joint exercise

KARACHI: Pakistan and Iran held joint naval drills, Passage Exercise, to enhance interoperability between the two navies and promote shared learning through coordinated activities. The joint exercise was conducted when Pakistan Navy ships Rasadgar and Azmat, along with Pakistan Maritime Security Agency ship Dasht, visited Port Bandar Abbas, Iran.

The flotilla was led by Commander 14th Destroyer Squadron, Commodore Muhammad Umair. The Mission Commander held meetings with naval leadership of Iran. Matters of mutual interest, Navy-to-Navy engagements, and cooper ation in maritime security were discussed. In December last, Pakistan Navy Ship Saif conducted Joint Patrol and Passage Exercise with Royal Navy of Oman Vessel, AL-Seeb and Spanish Navy Ship Santa Maria.

The exercise was conducted during Focused Operation 'Karakoram Resolve' under Pakistan led Combined Task Force. The exercises were aimed to develop synergy and mutual understanding between Navies operating in region while demonstrating interoperability to undertake Joint Operations. Pakistan Maritime Security Agency ship Kashmir also took part in the focused operation.

Yemen warns US, welcome to 'big hell'

SANA'A: Yemen's National Salvation Government has warned the United States and the Israeli regime over the dire consequences of continuing their deadly aggression against the Arab nation. "The Yemeni people are eager to engage in conflict with the nation's enemies, and have been shouting the 'death to Israel' slogan for the past 20 years, besides confronting the equipment that would be deployed by the US and the regime against it," Zaid al-Gharsi, director of the Media and Cultural Affairs Department in Yemen's National Salvation Government, said on Friday.

"However, the people has entered direct confrontation against its adversaries today, and we tell this to them that they are welcome to [their] great hell." The remarks came amid intensified fatal attacks by Washington and Tel Aviv against Yemen, which began last October, when the nation launched its operations against Israeli targets in support of the Gaza Strip and Lebanon, which have respectively come under a war of genocide and escalated deadly assaults by the Israeli regime. The Yemeni Armed Forces have been responding by ramping up their strikes against strategic and sensitive Israeli and American targets, including the US warships and aircraft carriers that are deployed off Yemen's Agencies coastline.

French, German FMs call for peaceful transition in Syria

French Foreign Minister Jean-Noël Barrot and his German counterpart, Annalena Baerbock, said they wanted to forge a new relationship with Syria and called for a peaceful political transition as they met Syria's de facto leader Ahmed al-Sharaa in Damascus on Friday

DAMASCUS: French Foreign Minister Jean-Noël Barrot and his German counterpart AnnalenaBaerbock were in the Syrian capital for talks on behalf of the European Union, in the highest-level visit by major Western powers since Islamist-led forces toppled longtime ruler Bashar al-Assad last month. One of their first stops was Syria's notorious Sednaya prison, north of the capital. Accompanied by White Helmet rescuers, Barrot and Baerbock toured the cells and underground dungeons of Sednaya, an emblem of atrocities committed against

Assad's opponents. Sednaya was the site of extrajudicial executions, torture and forced disappearances. An advocacy group said more than 4,000 people were freed from the detention facility when rebel forces took Damascus on December 8.

Speaking to journalists at the French embassy in Damascus shortly after arriving in the Syrian capital from Lebanon, Barrot expressed his hopes for a "sovereign, stable and peaceful" Syria. It was also a "hope that the aspirations of all Syrians can be realised", he added, "but it is a fragile hope". The visit by the French and German foreign ministers came weeks after rebels, led by the Islamist group, Hayat Tahrir al-Sham

(HTS), ousted Assad from power. In an interview with FRANCE 24 and a group of foreign journalists last month, HTS chief Ahmed al-Sharaa called on Western nations to lift the international sanctions imposed on the Assad regime. In a statement issued before leaving for Damascus Friday, Baerbock said her visit was "a clear signal" - on behalf of the EU - to open the way for a "new political beginning between Europe and Syria, between Germany and Syria". She added that she was travelling to Syria with an "outstretched hand" after Assad's ouster and more than 13 years of civil war, which have devastated the country. "We

now have a goal in mind that millions of

Syrians also long for: that Syria can once again become a respected member of the international community," she added. Since ousting Assad, HTS have sought to reassure Arab countries and the international community that they will govern on behalf of all Syrians, including the country's religious minorities.

Western governments have begun to gradually open channels with Sharaa and HTS, a Sunni Muslim group previously affiliated with al Qaeda, and are starting to debate whether to remove the group's terrorist designation. Baerbock said she was travelling to Syria to express "clear expectations" of the new rulers, who she said would be judged by their actions. "We know where the HTS comes from ideologically, what it has done in the past," said Baerbock. "But we also hear and see the desire for moderation and for understanding with other important actors," she added, citing talks with the US-allied Kurdish Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF). The goal now is for Syria to once again become a respected member of the international community, she added. Baerbock also asked the new regime to avoid "acts of vengeance against groups within the population", to avoid a long delay before elections, and to avert attempts to Islamise the judicial and education systems. "This must be our common objective," she added. Syria's new authorities have announced curriculum changes, including scrapping poetry relating to women and love and references to "Gods" in ancient history courses, and interpreting a Quranic verse about those who had angered God and strayed as referring to "Jews and Nasara", a derogatory term for Christians.

Trade with Pak to be increased: **Uzbek envoy**

KARACHI: Ambassador of the Republic of Uzbekistan, Alisher Tukhtaev, while highlighting the progress in bilateral trade between Uzbekistan and Pakistan, stated that, as agreed by the leaders of both countries, the Uzbek Embassy is aiming to increase bilateral trade to US\$1 billion in the coming years. During a meeting at the Karachi Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI), the Ambassador added that bilateral trade has been progressing well, with mutual trade between Uzbekistan and Pakistan increasing from US\$122 million in 2019 to US\$387 million in 2023.

Economic & Trade Counsellor Bakhrom Yusupov, KCCI President Muhammad Jawed Bilwani, Senior Vice President Zia ul Arfeen, Vice President Faisal Khalil Ahmed, Former Presidents of KCCI Majyd Aziz and Junaid Esmail Makda, along with KCCI Managing Committee Members, were also present at the meeting.

Referring to the recent commencement of direct flights between Tashkent and Lahore, which is another significant step in facilitating closer ties between the two countries, the Uzbek Ambassador informed that efforts are underway this year to introduce direct flights from Karachi to Uzbekistan as well. "We encourage our Pakistani brothers and sisters to visit Uzbekistan and experience the warm hospitality of our people," he said.

He noted that Uzbekistan and Pakistan share a long history of brotherly relations, strengthened by cultural and religious affinities. "The strong ties between our two countries continue to grow, and today, our two countries are closer than ever, thanks to the realization of the vision of regional connectivity between our countries," he said, adding that this vision has been reinforced due to the tireless efforts of both countries to enhance economic cooperation and strategic collaborations. The Ambassador further stated that starting in September 2024, Uzbekistan implemented a soft visa regime for Pakistani citizens, which includes both business and tourist visas, making it easier for people to visit each other and build stronger connections.

Teams working to resolve cable issue, says PTCL

People may experience slow browsing issues due to submarine cable outage, says telecom company

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Telecommunication Company Ltd (PTCL) on Friday said teams were "diligently" working to resolve the matter of disruptions faced by users since last night after a fault in one of the subsea internet cables connecting Pakistan slowed down the network speed in the country. According to PTA, the fault developed in the Asia-Africa-Europe-1 (AAE-1) cable near Qatar. The Africa-Asia-Europe (AAE)-1 cable, which began operations in 2017, connects Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia, Thailand, Pakistan, India, Oman, the United Arab Emirates, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Greece, Italy and France. Faults with the ca-

ble caused internet users in Pakistan to experience frequent slowdowns and disruptions in 2024. While businesses and internet providers alleged that the government's attempts to monitor internet traffic were responsible, the PTA issued a statement in August attributing the slowdown to a faulty submarine cable. According to a statement issued by PTCL today, teams were working "diligently to resolve the matter as soon as possible". "Due to an international submarine cable outage, you may experience slow browsing issues," it said. "We sincerely apologise for any inconvenience caused during this time," it added. Separately, PTCL spokesperson Amir Pasha told media that the state-owned company was "in contact with the international teams" who were working on the issue. "We are receiving regular updates from them, he said, adding that the fault had occurred in the cable near Qatar. Yesterday, during a meeting of the National Assembly Standing Committee on IT and Telecom, minister, Shaza Fatima Khawaja, told the committee that IT or any other industry had not reported any issues related to the Internet.

Attempt to arrest Yoon suspended after standoff

SEOUL: After a dramatic six-hour long standoff with security, South Korean police have called off an attempt to arrest suspended President Yoon Suk Yeol. The 150 officers involved found themselves helplessly outnumbered - first by the large number of pro-Yoon supporters who had gathered outside his residence before sunrise, and then by a human wall of security staff inside the property. Police were trying to carry out an arrest warrant issued earlier this week after Yoon ignored three summonses for him to appear for questioning. The politician is currently under investigation for abusing his power and inciting an insurrection when he tried to impose martial law in early December. Dozens of police vans lined the street outside

Yoon's residence in central Seoul early on Friday morning, before the arrest team - made up of police officers and members of the Corruption Investigation Office (CIO) - began moving towards the building at about 08:00 local time (23:00 GMT). The operation started out with a 20-strong team, but quickly multiplied to some 150 people. Even then, they were outnumbered. While about half of the team was able to get inside, they were locked for hours in a standoff with presidential security officers - who are still responsible for protecting Yoon, despite him being stripped of his powers - and a military unit responsible for protecting the city of Seoul. At one point Yoon's security team engaged in a "confrontation" with the investigating officers, an official with Seoul's Joint Chiefs of Staff told news agency AFP. If they had been successful, Yoon would have become the first sitting president to be arrested in South Korea's history. Yoon's "refusal of the legal process" is "deeply regrettable". said the CIO, which has been investigating Yoon's short-lived martial law declaration last month. It added it planned to call on the acting president - who is in charge of Yoon's security service - to intervene on their behalf. "Considering the situation at the site, as long as the security service continues to stand guard, the arrest is practically impossible," it said. Yoon's supporters, who have been camped out in front of the presidential residence for days, cheered in song and dance as the suspension was announced. - Agencies
