Army demands 'concrete actions' by Afghan govt

Forum expresses concern over "reckless, provocative statements" from Indian military leadership

RAWALPINDI: Amid rising terror incidents in the country, the military's top brass on Tuesday expressed grave concern over the continued use of Afghan soil against Pakistan by terrorists and demanded "concrete and tangible actions" by the interim Afghan government. The concern was expressed during the 267th Corps Commanders' Conference at the General Headquarters (GHQ) in Rawalpindi, chaired by Chief of Army Staff (COAS) General AsimMunir, according to a statement issued by the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR). "The forum stressed the imperative of concrete and tangible actions by interim Afghan government against Fitna Al Khawarij instead of denials as well as continuing with the strategy of undertaking all necessary measures in defence of Pakistan and its people," the military's media wing said.

The meeting came days after 18 soldiers were martyred while thwarting an "act of terrorism" in Balochistan, adding that 23 terrorists were killed in subsequent clearance operations. The ISPR had said the terrorists attempted to establish roadblocks in the general area of Mangocher in Kalat district. "On behest of inimical and hostile forces, this cowardly act of terrorism was aimed at disrupting the peaceful environment of Balochistan by targeting mainly innocent civilians. It said that security forces and law enforcement agencies were immediately mobilised, "who successfully thwarted the evil design of terrorists and sent twelve terrorists to hell, ensuring security and protection of the local populace". However, the ISPR said that 18 soldiers "made the ultimate sacrifice and embraced martyrdom" during the conduct of operations, adding that sanitisation operations were being conducted and the "perpetrators, facilitators and abettors of this heinous and cowardly act, will be brought to justice". girls from attending school beyond the sixth grade,

Official who criticised girls' education ban leaves Afghanistan

Taliban has enforced a three-year ban on female education, preventing girls from attending school beyond grade six

KABUL: A senior Taliban minister who publicly condemned the group's ban on girls' and women's education has reportedly fled Afghanistan, citing fears of arrest. Sher Abbas Stanikzai, the Taliban's political deputy at the foreign ministry, had previously called for the reopening of schools for girls and women, claiming the ban contradicted Sharia law. In January, MrStanikzai spoke out during a graduation ceremony in Khost province, urging the Taliban leadership to reconsider its stance, saying, "There is no excuse for this - not now and not in the future." He added, "We are being unjust to 20 million people," referring to the female population of Afghanistan. His remarks marked the first public criticism of the Taliban's education policy, highlighting internal divisions within the group. The Taliban has enforced a nationwide ban on female education for over three years, preventing

NEW DELHI: A US military aircraft is bringing back more than 200 Indians deported from the US, according to a media report on Tuesday. Local broadcaster, citing sources, reported that a US C-17 military aircraft is returning the Indian nationals and that "each deported Indian national is verified, indicating New Delhi's involvement in the deportation process." "This is likely the first of many such flights that will bring illegal Indian immigrants in the US back," the report said. The Indian Foreign Ministry has yet to issue a statement on the matter.

United States suspends \$ 845 million aid projects in Pakistan

Abrupt suspension has halted development initiatives and placed hundreds of Pakistani jobs at risk

ISLAMABAD: The United States has suspended aid projects worth over \$845 million in Pakistan following President Donald Trump's directive to cut funding for the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) projects worldwide. The abrupt suspension has halted crucial development initiatives and placed hundreds of Pakistani jobs at risk. The US has immediately frozen 39 major USAID-funded projects in Pakistan across various sectors, including energy, economic development, agriculture, democracy, human rights and governance, education, health, and humanitarian assistance. Many of these initiatives, fully or partially funded by USAID, have now come to a standstill, with local NGOs and organisations struggling to sustain operations due to the withdrawal of promised funds. Among the most significant suspended projects is the Integrated Health Systems Strengthening and Service Delivery Integrated Health System Program, a \$86 million initiative aimed at strengthening Pakistan's healthcare infrastructure. The Global Health Supply Chain Program, valued at \$52 million, was designed to ensure

13 Pakistanis among dead in boat tragedy

Out of around 66 Pakistanis on board, only 22 survived: Reports

ISLAMABAD: The Foreign Office (FO) confirmed that 13 Pakistanis died in last month's boat tragedy near Mauritania-Morocco. The FO had earlier reported that the boat, carrying 80 people, capsised near Morocco on January 16. Over 40 Pakistanis were believed to be among the dead. Migrant rights group Walking Borders estimated that around 50 people may have drowned while trying to reach Spain's Canary Islands from West Africa. Reports suggest that more than 40 Pakistanis were killed by African human traffickers on the boat.



He informed that in an operation, 6.712 kg absorbed ice drug was recovered from the bag of a passenger going to Bahrain at Islamabad International Airport. 327 grams hashish hidden in the shoes of a passenger going to Dubai at Peshawar International Airport was rounded up. 6 kg opium and 4.8 kg hashish were recovered from the possession of an accused arrested near Bhuwana in Chiniot. 4 kg heroin and 4 kg ice were recovered from a car intercepted on M-1 Motorway Islamabad and two accused including a woman were arrested. In 5th operation, 6 kg hashish hidden in secret cavities of a car was recovered near Pashtkhara Chowk Peshawar.-APP

Her contributions to Urdu literature were recognized at the highest level. earning her the prestigious Sitara-e-Imtiaz in 1983 and the Hilal-e-Imtiaz in 2000. Deep Seek success

N January 1, people who don't closely follow innovations in artificial intelligence (AI) would not have heard of DeepSeek. However, by late January, it became a widely celebrated sensation. US tech corporations such as Meta and OpenAI were shocked by the apparent breakthroughs accomplished by this hitherto obscure Chinese start-up. In a comprehensive and publicly available post, the Chinese "David" revealed that it had managed to develop a R1 model with performance comparable to OpenAI's o1, at a fraction of the cost that American "Goliaths" have poured into AI over the years. Yet DeepSeek's triumphs should not be construed as a victory for China or a loss for the US. Instead, the breakthrough vindicates the importance of Sino-American cooperation over AI development and governance. The China-located venture succeeded by fusing the best of Silicon Valley-style entrepreneurship, the grit and perseverance of home-grown Chinese talent and a stroke of genius rooted in its intellectual openness. As with many other top Chinese AI and advanced technological firms, the start-up has a uniquely horizontal and non-hierarchical corporate culture. Its staff are driven by a common devotion to purpose but are granted considerable flexibility in the workplace. Indeed, founder Liang Wenfeng – an engineering-trained venture capitalist-turned-AI whizz – once declared, "experience is not that important". DeepSeek had acquired 10,000 Nvidia A100 graphics processing units (GPUs) before export controls imposed by Washington. In embracing the open-source ethos, however, the start-up eschewed an iron grip over its innovation and data, as embraced by many of its American peers. Chinese AI disrupter Deep-Seek claims top spot in US App Store, dethroning ChatGPT The intellectual Earth thrives best when it is flat. The whole world benefits when users globally can download and tweak models. Indeed, for those who criticiseDeepSeek for its apparent censorship, they can download the application, run it on their own GPUs or cloud servers, as they wish. Moreover, Chinese and American AI scientists and data engineers have much to gain from sharing research and aligning best practices. While AI is certainly increasingly applied in military technologies, there are many civilian domains where improvements in algorithmic efficiency can benefit producers and consumers. The classic response levied by hawks in both countries is that cooperation would compromise national security. In an essay casting doubt on some of DeepSeek's professed achievements, Anthropic CEO Dario Amodei called for a doubling down on US export controls to inhibit China's technological rise. He framed the Sino-American technological race as a struggle between "democratic" and "authoritarian" nations. Amodei would find good company in Washington. From lawmakers pushing to revive the "China Initiative" to then incoming US secretary of state Marco Rubio declaring that China had "lied, cheated, hacked and stolen" their way to global strategic strength, the prevailing sentiment does not favour cooperation. Panama President Mulino rejects US claims of Chinese influence in Panama Canal Zero-sum logic is ineffective at best. Chinese AI firms were spurred by the 2022 Chips and Science Act to explore alternative paths to scaling - touted as the holy grail in model quality improvement.

Trump renewal of trade war

S promised, US President Donald Trump has renewed his trade war, firing an opening salvo of punitive tariffs at Canada, Mexico and China. His unfortunate decision, just two weeks into his new term, is a risky gambit likely to spur inflation in America and curb global economic growth. It also is probably just the beginning. Trump has said the tariffs are needed to curb illegal immigration and trafficking in fentanyl, which kills thousands of Americans every year. Mention of the narcotic is perhaps designed to convince those at home the trade war is for a good cause and to distract from the likely wave of inflation to come. Canada and Mexico have announced retaliatory tariffs. China plans to file a claim with the World Trade Organization. Hong Kong is bracing for resurgent US inflation to prolong the high interest rate environment and pressure businesses. Trump's stated broader goal is to restore US manufacturing might, and forcing foreign firms to set up in the United States would help do so. His ultimate target is rival China, the biggest US competitor and the world's largest manufacturer. It will be easier said than done. This may explain why Trump started with close neighbours and trade partners Canada and Mexico, which got whopping levies of 25 per cent, while China saw a relatively marginal 10 per cent. The aim is get the two allies on board, then force others to toe the US line on trade. Trump has warned tariffs against the European Union will "definitely happen". Japan and South Korea are likely targets among US allies in Asia. With allies in line, and a large and attractive market, the US would be better positioned to challenge China. Still, it is unclear how effective Trump's bid will be. World leaders have spent years signing trade pacts and cutting tariffs and non-tariff barriers and are well aware of the costly damage of trade conflicts. China is in a stronger position and better prepared than it was during Trump's first trade war in 2018, having entered into free-trade agreements around the world, built up trade relations with partners in the Global South, and bolstered its technological self-reliance. Its share of global manufacturing output has increased as well, from around 28 per cent in 2018 to nearly 32 per cent last year - double that of America, which it overtook in 2010. While Beijing may soften the blow by letting the yuan depreciate, Hong Kong has no such option due to the US dollar peg. The US should bear in mind it ran a trade surplus of US\$271.5 billion with the city in the past decade. It is questionable how much manufacturing Trump could restore in four years. His plan may prove counterproductive and unilaterally starting trade wars could stir resentment towards Washington, especially as prices rise, both in America and globally. What is certain is there will be more trade frictions to come.

OUISS Althusser, in his exploration of state power, explains two apparatuses through which authoritarian states seek to acquire absolute submission: the repressive state apparatus and the ideological state apparatus. At present, it would seem that India, as a state, is currently operating this twin mechanism well with full rigour in the occupied territory of Kashmir. As if the armed oppression of the people of Kashmir did not suffice, the state is actively indulged in political oppression coupled with propagation of a narrative that paints the very people of Kashmir as villains in India's manufactured tales of the Kashmiri land, trapping the people in two-front war in efforts to gradually erase their identities.

The repressive state apparatus is operating at full throttle, armed oppression in the form of brutal tortures and killing of Kashmiri people have become the state's instrument of control within the Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIO-IK). Ideological state apparatus in the form of political oppression, on the other hand, aims at making the region ungovernable so that status of union territory can be retained in favour of the central government. The recent developments including the so called legislative Assembly elections that were held in IIOJK from 18 September to 1 October 2024, elected 90 members to the new illegally formed Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly as to serve as puppet legislatures under a titular chief minister with its cabinet playing second fiddle to an unelected appointee, the lieutenant governor.

Although, Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP)'s effort to convert a demographic Muslims majority valley into a political minority failed this time as the votes in the valley were highly anti-BJP and their proxies like 'Apni Party' and 'Awami Ittehad Party'. However, this marks the first instance that villainous light. Such content skyrocketed BJP has secured 29 seats in the Jammu region by emerging as a second largest party after Kashmir National Conference (IKNC), which secured 49 seats in coalition with the Indian National Congress (INC) and the Communist Party of India (Marxist) (CPI (M)). specially after the abrogation of the Article 370, establishing false narrative, propagating Islamophobia, and building false icons of Hindutva. The media industry executes it in such a cunning way that it would put Goebbels to shame. Such fictional content mainly aims to justify Indian armed forces illegal presence in the occupied region by dehumanising the local people. In the recent years, it has been consistently observed that incidents of violence against Muslims across India surge right after such media productions.

This rhetoric extends beyond the fictional media to Indian news agencies that readily disseminate misinformation. Indian media promotes the narrative of Indians being gion as normal. It is a tactic that has been functional since occupation to re-enforce illegal India control over the region. Furthermore, international coverage has also been influenced by offering incentives to the foreign journalists in an effort to align India's domestic and international narratives with the state interests as part of a wider strategy of gaining total ideological control over public discourse. Under this scheme, the Indian government has attempted to supress the voices of Kashmiris in two ways: by physically eliminating them and by manufacturing false stories about them. However, the community has persevered by demonstrating indomitability. At the time, when Kashmiri people are trapped in a two-front war, it becomes even more important to express solidarity for Kashmiris, voice their concerns, and bear witness to their struggle and resilience.

Rashford terms his move to Villa 'an easy decision'

LONDON: Aston Villa signed Marcus Rashford on loan from Manchester United for the rest of the season on Sunday to end the England international's exile under Ruben Amorim at Old Trafford. Once a hero for the United fans, Rashford has not featured for his boyhood club since December 12 and admitted earlier this season he was ready for a "new challenge". The 27-year-old had been linked with a move to AC Milan and Barcelona, but the European giants were put off by his reported £300,000a-week (\$372,000) wages. According to Sky Sports, Villa will pick up at least 75 percent of that pay packet for the coming months, rising to 90 percent depending on performance-related bonuses and have an option to make the deal permanent at the end of the season for A£40 million. 'I was lucky to have a few clubs approach me but Aston Villa was an easy decision - I really admire the way that Aston Villa have been playing this season, and the manager's ambitions," said Rashford in a Villa statement. "I just want to play football and am excited to get started. I wish everyone at Manchester United all the best for the

Israeli forces kill 70 in West Bank since start of year

GAZA: The office of Pales tinian president Mahmud Abbas denounced an Israeli operation in the occupied West Bank as "ethnic cleansing" on Monday, with the health ministry saying Israeli forces killed 70 people in the territory this year. In a statement, spokesman Nabil Abu Rudeineh said the Palestinian presidency "condemned the occupation authorities' expansion of their comprehensive war on our Palestinian people in the occupied West Bank to implement their plans aimed at displacing citizens and ethnic cleansing". Later the Palestinian health ministry in Ramallah said there had been "70 martyrs in the West Bank since the beginning of this year", with 10 children, one woman and two elderly people among the dead. The ministry confirmed to AFP they were "killed by the Israeli occupation". The figures showed 38 people killed in Jenin and 15 in Tubas in the north of the West Bank.-APP

Iranian Army launches 'Eqtedar 1403' air defense drill

The country's officials have repeatedly underscored that the Islamic Republic will not hesitate to strengthen its military capabilities, including its missile power, which are entirely meant for defense, and that Iran's defense capabilities will never be subject to negotiations.

TEHRAN: The Iranian Army has kicked off the second phase of the "Eqtedar 1403" air defense drill, focus ing on the protection of the national airspace amid efforts to further bolster the country's defense capabilities. Iran's homegrown 'Majid' air defense missile system took the lead during the new stage of the drill by bringing down various types of pilotless aircraft on Tuesday. During this phase of the comprehensive maneuver, tactics to detect, track, intercept and shoot down hostile targets are set to be practiced. The air defense units participating in the exercise will employ indigenous radar systems as well as a surveillance network in the general areas of the drill, which covers the southwestern and central sectors of Iran. Command and control centers will use homegrown sophisticated active and passive radar systems, and utilize signal and electro-optical monitoring to track hostile targets in the war game zone. Upon interception, smart command-and-control systems will assign appropriate air defense systems to neutralize threats Under the operational command of the Joint Air Defense Base of Iran, the 'Eqtedar 1403' air defense drill seeks to integrate efforts from the Army's Air Defense Force and the Air Force. The exercise is designed to simulate realistic battlefield conditions, providing an opportunity to test a variety of advanced, domestically produced air defense systems. The systems will engage in countering a range of threats, including aerial assaults, missile strikes, and electronic warfare tactics. By recreating such scenarios, the drill aims to evaluate and enhance the readiness of Iran's air defense forces in responding to potential external threats. Iranian military forces hold routine exercises according to a detailed schedule in various parts of the country in order to test their weaponry and equipment and evaluate their combat preparedness. The country's officials have repeatedly underscored that the Islamic Republic will not hesitate to strengthen its military capabilities, including its missile power, which are entirely meant for defense, and that Iran's defense capabilities will never be subject to negotiations.-APP

Türkiye received 15 Palestinians as part of Israel-Hamas deal

ISTANBUL: Turkish security sources said Tuesday that 15 Palestinians released by Israel as part of a cease-fire deal between the Tel Aviv administration and the Hamas resistance movement arrived in Türkiye. Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan confirmed the move. The National Intelligence Organization (MIT) arranged the trip upon the orders of President Recep Tayyip Erdo an to help facilitate the handover. Israel and Hamas agreed upon a cease-fire after more than two years of attacks by Israel on the Gaza Strip, which killed nearly 50,000 people and injured more than 100,000 others. Some 15,000 people from Gaza have been detained since then. The cease-fire deal included the exchange of Israeli and Palestinian prisoners. Israel agreed to

release Palestinian prisoners who were sentenced to life on the condition that they would not return to Palestine. Fidan announced last week in Qatar that some Palestinians forced to leave their country would be hosted by Türkiye and other countries. Sources said MIT worked to arrange the travel of 15 Palestinians in the first stage of a plan to accommodate freed prisoners in another country. They traveled to Türkiye via Egypt. Sources said Türkiye has also arranged for Palestinians to live a secure, happy life" in the country. At a news conference with the visiting Egyptian foreign minister, Minister Fidan said their admission should not be misinterpreted, and Türkive sought to serve peace. Since Israel launched its ground invasion of Gaza in 2023,

thousands of Palestinians - including women, children, medical personnel and civil defense workers - have been detained. Only a small number have been released. many of whom showed clear signs of torture and starvation. A ceasefire agreement between Israel and the Palestinian group Hamas, which began on Jan. 19, includes a three-phase prisoner exchange process, with each phase lasting 42 days. The agreement was mediated by Qatar and Egypt and supported by the United States. The second phase will involve the release of Israeli soldiers, and the third phase will address the return of Israeli remains. A list issued earlier by the Israeli Justice Ministry indicated that over 180 prisoners set to be released were to be deported outside the country in exchange for Israeli hostages held in Gaza. The agreement does not specify the countries where deported prisoners will be sent, but Israeli media, including the country's public broadcaster KAN, reported that destinations might include Qatar or Egypt. Israel claims the deportation aims to minimize "security risks" the prisoners might pose if returned to the occupied West Bank. "We have supported the cease-fire agreement from the beginning. One of its conditions, agreed upon by the parties, is that certain Palestinian prisoners will not remain in Palestinian territories after their release. We saw this in the case of Gilad Shalit when we were asked to take in some Palestinians, and we agreed," Fidan said in Doha on Sunday. Israeli soldier

Gilad Shalit was captured by Hamas in 2006 and was released in 2011 with efforts of Türkiye, which admitted a group of Palestinian prisoners released by Israel in exchange for Shalit. Türkiye is a staunch supporter of Hamas and repeatedly denounced Israel's "genocide" in Gaza against millions of Palestinians. On the diplomatic side, it has worked to establish a cease-fire and a lasting solution to the issue since October 2023. It also dispatched a large amount of aid to the Gaza Strip, although those supplies largely failed to reach their destination due to the Israeli blockade. Aid was only allowed last week after the cease-fire deal. Fidan said that they set up mobile field hospitals in the region and were ready to admit patients from Gaza.-Agencies

Five people shot in attack at Swedish school

STOCKHOLM: police said on Tuesday five people were shot in an attack at a school in the city of Orebro some 200 km (125 miles) west of Stockholm, triggering a massive response by rescue services. "Five persons are confirmed shot," police said in a statement, adding that the extent of any injuries was unclear. "This is currently seen as attempted murder, arson and aggravated weapons offence," the police said. Ambulances, rescue services and police are onsite, a spokesperson for local rescue services said. The shooting took place in a campus area where several schools, for both children and adults are located. Police said students were held indoors at the affected school and also at nearby schools. 'The news of an attack at Orebro is very serious," Justice Minister Gunnar Strommer told public broadcaster SVT, adding that the government was in close contact with police.-APP

Nepal hikes Everest climbing fee by a third

KATHMANDU: Nepal has hiked the cost of an Everest climbing permit by a third, arguing it will help tackle pollution and boost safety on the world's highest mountain, the tourism chief said Tuesday. Fees for the peak spring climbing season will rise from \$11,000 to \$15,000 for a permit to scale the 8,849-metre (29,032-foot) peak, Narayan Prasad Regmi, director general of the tourism department, told AFP. "The cost had remained constant for a decade and it was high time to revise that," he said. Costs of climbing at less popular - and more demanding - times of year such as during winter or the monsoon rains have also risen at similar rates, including from \$5,500 to \$7,500 during the autumn season. Nepal is home to eight of the world's 14 peaks over 8,000 metres and welcomes thousands of climbers each year. Foreign climbers already spend tens of thousands of dollars in their attempt to climb Everest, with more than 400 purchasing permits last year, bringing in around \$4 million to government coffers The funds are put towards cleaning trash from the mountain left by climbers as well as search and rescue operations. Mountaineering expedition companies hoped the price hike would not deter climbers, warning some might look to scale Everest through China. "Some climbers might shift to Tibet where the facilities are much better," said Mingma G Sherpa, who runs the Imagine Nepal mountaineering company, saying the fee must be spent on improving conditions. "Our government just increases the royalty, but doesn't do much," he said. "It needs to also provide support to the climbers and guides."-APP

Madinah launches portal for iftar providers

RIYADH: The General Authority for the Care of the Affairs of the Grand Mosque and the Prophet's Mosque has launched an online portal for iftar service providers at the Prophet's Mosque in Madinah to update their information for Ramadan. According to the authority, updating data is mandatory to continue service, along with contracting approved catering companies and complying with iftar service guidelines. The list of approved companies will be provided after data updates to finalize contracts and issue electronic permits, the Saudi Press Agency reported. Last month, the authority also launched a portal for charitable organizations and individuals to apply for iftar meal services inside the Grand Mosque in Makkah during Ramadan. The service allows the selection of meal sites, with one meal site per person and 10 sites allocated for charitable organizations. Senate body passes anti-human smuggling bill

ISLAMABAD: Standing Committee on Interior also unanimously passes Prevention of Smuggling of Migrants Bill. The Committee has also approved bills increasing penalties for begging and strengthening measures against human smuggling. The committee, chaired by Senator Faisal Saleem, reviewed and approved the Prevention of Smuggling of Migrants Bill, presented by the government. During the session, Interior Secretary Khurram Agha highlighted the rising cases of human trafficking, stressing the importance of stricter laws. He stated that the proposed legislation includes measures to ensure stronger convictions and harsher punishments for offenders. Senator Shahadat wan supported the mov stating that harsher penalties would prevent suspects from securing easy bail. Previously, the maximum sentence for human smuggling was seven years, but under the new bill, it will be extended to ten years.

ATC extends Swati's interim bail

LAHORE: The Anti-Terrorism Court (ATC) in Lahore has extended interim bail for PTI leader Azam Khan Swati in five cases related to the May 9 events until February 12. The hearing was presided over by Judge Manzar Ali Gul, who reviewed Swati's bail applications. During the proceedings, Swati's counsel, Chaudhry Adnan Kalar, submitted an application for exemption from court appearance, citing Swati's heart condition and ongoing medical treatment in Mansehra, which prevents him from traveling. Judge Manzar Ali Gul accepted the exemption request but issued a stern warning, stating, "I am granting a few more days, but the accused must appear in court at the next hearing.'

China hits back with tariffs on US goods after Trump's move

China will impose tariffs of 15 percent on imports of coal and LNG from the US in retaliation for 10 percent levies on Chinese goods

BEIJING: China will impose tariffs of 15 percent on imports of coal and liquefied natural gas (LNG) from the United States in retaliation for Washington's 10 percent levies on Chinese goods. China's Ministry of Finance also announced on Tuesday that there would be 10 percent tariffs on imports from the US of crude oil, agricultural machinery, large-displacement vehicles and pick-up trucks. The new measures were in response to the "unilateral tariff hike" by the US, it said, adding that Washington's decision "seriously violates World Trade Organization rules, does nothing to resolve its own problems, and disrupts nor mal economic and trade cooperation between

China and the United States". Beijing's tariffs, which come into force on February 10, were announced shortly after US President Donald Trump said he would hold a call with his Chinese counterpart, Xi Jinping, in the next 24 hours. Syria plans 10 million agriculture jobs, climate action and water treaty reforms says new minister On Saturday, Trump announced sweeping measures against its top trade partners, including Canada and Mexico, with goods from China facing an additional 10 percent tariff on top of the duties they already endure.

Trump said the measures aimed to punish countries for failing to halt flows of undoc-

EU ready for 'tough' negotiations with US

EU, US trade volume stands at around \$1.5T

BRUSSELS: European Commission President Ursula von der Leven said Tuesday that the EU is ready for "tough negotiations" with the US, while reaffirming the bloc's commitment to safeguarding its interests. "We will be open and pragmatic," she said of negotiations with the US during a speech at the EU ambassadors conference in Brussels. "But we will make it equally clear that we will always protect our own interests - however and whenever that is needed. This will always be the European way." Von der Leyen acknowledged the enduring strength of EU-US relations, which she described as the "strongest of transatlantic partnerships" and a "cornerstone of peace and prosperity for the best part of the century." She also highlighted the deep economic ties between the two, with total trade volume standing at around \$1.5 trillion. "No other economies in the world are as integrated in such an advanced way as the European Union and the United States," she said. Together, the EU and the US account for nearly 30% of global trade in goods and services. "Europe will safeguard its economic and national security, but it is important that we strike the right balance," she said. EU-based companies in the US employ 3.5 million Americans, with another million American jobs directly dependent on trade with Europe, von der Leyen said. She also discussed the complex relationship with China, which will see a pivotal year as the EU marks half a century of diplomatic ties with the Asian giant. She emphasized that the EU is open to "constructive engagement" to find solutions of "mutual interest." "I think we can find agreements that could even expand our trade and investment ties. It is a fine line that we need to walk. But it can lead us to a fairer and more balanced relationship with one of the world's economic giants. And that can make sense for Europe." - Agencies

However, on Monday, he suspended his threat of tariffs on Mexico and Canada, agreeing to a 30-day pause in return for concessions on border and crime enforcement with the neighbouring countries. "China's retaliatory tariffs are a calibrated response rather than an outright escalation," Julien Chaisse, professor at City University of Hong Kong specialising in international economic law, said.

"The measures demonstrate Beijing's willingness to impose economic costs on Washington while maintaining flexibility for negotiation. "The choice of a February 10 start date appears strategic. It allows time for a possible discussion between Trump and Xi which is creating space for last-minute diplomacy before the measures take effect. If talks between the two take place in the coming days, there is room for adjustments, partial exemptions or reciprocal gestures that could prevent a further spiral in trade tensions. "That said, much will depend on Washington's interpretation of these measures. If the US views them as a calibrated step leaving room for negotiation, this could set the stage for discussions rather than further escalation. However, if Trump sees this as a direct challenge, his administration could respond with additional trade restrictions. This would intensify the conflict."

LHC seeks reply from DC over PTI's plea

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court (LHC) on Tuesday sought a reply from the city's deputy commissioner on a PTI plea seeking permission to hold a public rally at Minar-i-Pakistan on February 8. The opposition PTI has decided to observe a "black day" on February 8 (Saturday) to protest against its "stolen mandate" in last year's general elections, which were dominated by independent candidates that the party fielded.

Malik, the PTI's newly appointed Puniab chief organiser, had submitted an application to Lahore DC Syed Musa Raza on January 29, seeking permission for the gathering. However, upon receiving no response, she then approached the LHC yesterday for the rally's approval. Presiding over the hearing today, Justice Farooq Haider directed DC Raza to appear in person on February 6 (Thursday) and submit a response on the petition filed by Malik, also a former PTI MNA.

The judge also sought responses from other respondents named in the plea - namely the Punjab government: the Lahore commissioner, DC and additional DC; and the state.

FBR uncovers Rs 977 mln tax fraud in EF scheme

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) has uncovered a tax fraud worth Rs 977 million carried out under the Export Facilitation Scheme (EFS). According to Director Customs Post Clearance Audit (PCA) South, Shiraz Ahmed, two fraudulent companies misused the EFS to evade taxes on the import of precious metal molds.

The companies allegedly imported 47 containers of high-value metals but manipulated records, declaring only 111 metric tons while 1,560 metric tons of imported goods went missing.

One company was found to have evaded Rs 499 million, while the second dodged Rs 478 million in taxes, Further investigation revealed that the fraudulent companies were not even listed in FBR's active registration database, raising concerns about regulatory loopholes.

ISLAMABAD: Fly Jinnah, a low-cost air carrier for domestic routes, has secured the nod from Bangladesh to operate flights from Karachi to Dhaka, it emerged on Tuesday.

The development comes after Bangladesh High Commissioner to Pakistan Mohammad Igbal Hussain announced last week that direct flights between the two countries were expected to begin within the next few months. He had also revealed that cargo flights between Dhaka, Karachi and Lahore would also commence soon, further facilitating trade and business exchanges. Bangladeshi media outlet The Daily Star reported a day ago that Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (CAAB) Chairman Air Vice Marshal MonjurKabirBhuiyan told it: "They (Fly Jinnah) applied to us, and we have approved it." He further said: "Now they (Fly Jinnah) will appoint a GSA (General Sales Agent). Once they request slots and frequencies, we will provide them. Our part is currently complete.'

Indian media outlet ANI also reported that a direct air link between the two countries would be set up soon after the launch of a direct shipping line between Chittagong and Karachi. "CAAB has approved a proposal of Fly Jinnah to operate direct flights between Bangladesh and Pakistan. We will sign a deal to resume Dhaka-Karachi direct flights," the outlet quoted the said Abdul Naser Khan, additional secretary to Bangladesh's Ministry of Civil Aviation and Tourism, as saying. The two countries were once one nation but split following a bloody civil war, which saw the territory previously referred to as 'East Pakistan' seceding to form the independent nation of Bangladesh. In the years since the split, Dhaka's leaders – especially the recently ousted regime of Sheikh Hasina - stayed firmly in the Indian camp, preferring to maintain close ties with New Delhi and keeping Islamabad at arm's length.

Erdogan holds talks with Syria's interim President al-Sharaa

Despite being constrained by its own economic crisis, Turkiye is offering to help with Syria's recovery after a devastating civil war

ANKARA: Syrian president, Ahmed Al-Sharaa, arrived in Turkiye on Tuesday for talks with President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, his second international trip since ousting President Bashar Assad, an official told AFP. Al-Sharaa was to meet the Turkish leader in the capital Ankara after flying in from Saudi Arabia, where he was seeking help from Gulf countries to finance the reconstruction of his war-ravaged nation and revive its economy. Turkiye, which has close ties with Al-Sharaa, reopened its diplomatic mission in the Syrian Arab Republic and sent its spy chief and foreign minister for talks with him soon after the HTS overthrew Assad on December 8. The pair will discuss "joint steps to be taken for economic recovery, sustainable stability and security," Erdogan's communications chief Fahrettin Altun said on Monday. Despite being constrained by its own economic crisis, Turkiye is offering to help with Syria's recovery after a devastating 13-year civil war. In return, Turkiye is keen to secure Damascus's support against Kurdish militants in northeastern Syria, where the US-backed Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) have been battling Ankara-backed forces.
