PM Shehbaz urges Afghan govt to rein in terrorist groups

"It's up to us how we live cordially and in a friendly way," premier tells Afghan Taliban rulers

LONDON: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has said that it's a sad reality that the soil of neighbouring Afghanistan is being used for terrorist attacks inside Pakistan. The PM was speaking to media outside Avenfield flats where he arrived to meet Nawaz Sharif, the ruling PML-N president, who is also in London for two weeks. Deputy Prime Minister Ishaq Dar was also with the premier. The trio held a meeting in the Park Lane flats and then left for a lunch. PM Shehbaz said: "Afghanistan is our brotherly country and the two countries are neighbours by nature. We have to live as good neighbours. It's up to us how we live cordially and in a friendly way. We have asked the Afghan interim govt several times that the Afghan soil should not be used as per the Doha agreement against Pakistan and its interests.' "Sadly, terror groups such as Tehreek-e-Taliban (TTP) and other terror groups are operating from Afghanistan. They have killed innocent people inside Pakistan. These sacrifices of Pakistanis will not go in vain. My advice to Afghanistan is to rein in these terrorist groups." The PM said he held great talks in Belarus with its leadership. He said: "We had a great discussion in Belarus about Pakistan and Belarus and the opportunities that exist for both countries. We can benefit greatly from

Pakistan hockey team not invited to Azlan Shah Cup 2025: Unpaid hotel bills cited as reason

ISLAMABAD: In a surprising and disappointing development for hockey fans across Pakistan and beyond, the Pakistan national hockey team has not been invited to participate in the 2025 Sultan Azlan Shah Cup being held in Ipoh, Malaysia. This decision has raised eyebrows, especially given that Pakistan were the runners-up in last year's edition of the prestigious tournament.

Sources close to the organizing committee have revealed that the exclusion stems from a financial dispute linked to the 2024 tournament. Reportedly, the Pakistan Hockey Federation (PHF) failed to settle hotel bills and associated expenses from their last visit to Malaysia, leaving a sour impression on the hosts and prompting them to reconsider extending an invitation this year. The decision has been taken after the said hotel management brought the matter to the Malaysian government notice. The Sultan Azlan Shah Cup is one of Asia's most respected and long-running international field hockey tournaments. Named after the late Sultan Azlan Shah, a passionate supporter of the sport, the annual event attracts some of the world's top national teams. Pakistan has had a storied history with the tournament. The green shirts have participated in numerous editions, winning it three times and finishing as runners-up multiple times, including last year when they narrowly lost in the final, displaying a resurgence in form that rekindled hopes among

The amount, although not officially disclosed, was reportedly significant enough to strain relations between the PHF and the tournament organizers. This alleged financial negligence has now translated into a diplomatic and sporting setback. The organizers, upholding professional standards and financial accountability. opted not to extend an invitation to Pakistan this year-a move that reflects growing frustration with the PHF's handling of logistical responsibilities. "This is an unfortunate but necessary decision. All participating teams are expected to adhere to financial and administrative protocols," said a source close to the Malaysian organizing committee, speaking on condition of anonymity. "We deeply respect Pakistan's hockey legacy, but we must maintain a standard of professionalism for the sake of the tournament's integrity." The news has been met with dismay by players, fans, and former hockey legends in Pakistan. Many see this as a continuation of the administrative crisis that has plagued ing from lack of funding and poor management to

declining international performance. This incident has reignited calls for major reforms within the PHF. Critics argue that unless the federation undergoes structural and leadership changes, Pakistan's hockey revival will remain a distant dream. Some sports analysts have urged the government and private sector stakeholders to step in and audit the PHF's operations, ensure accountability, and secure long-term funding for the sport. Beyond the embarrassment, the exclusion from the Azlan Shah Cup is a lost opportunity for the national team to gain valuable international exposure, especially as they prepare for upcoming international competitions and hope to re-establish themselves on the global stage. The PHF has not officially commented on the issue, though internal sources suggest efforts are underway to resolve the matter diplomatically and financially to repair relations with the Malaysian Hockey Federation. KP unveils Rs 3t development plan for FY24-25

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhw government under the leadership of Chief Minister of Ali Amin Khan Gandapur, has laid out an ambitious development strategy to expand infrastructure and services across the province According to CM's spokesperson Faraz Ahmad Mughal, the province has earmarked a massive Rs 3 trillion for development projects for the fiscal year 2024-2025. Of this, Rs 487 billion will be allocated to the merged tribal districts, while Rs 1,628 billion will go to the settled districts. An additional Rs 795 billion has been set aside from foreign aid Out of the 1,920 planned development schemes, 534 are designated for the merged districts, 1,331 for other districts, and 55 will be funded through foreign assistance. Further budget allocations include Rs 103 billion for divisional and district-level projects, Rs 32 billion for human capital development, and Rs 33 billion for rural and economic growth initiatives. For the first time in its history, he said, the KP government has achieved savings of Rs 500 billion through efficient planning across various development schemes. Additionally, the duration of projects scheduled to continue into coming years has been reduced to accelerate progress, he added.-APP

KARACHI: The Federal Minister for National Health Services, Regulation and Coordination Syed Mustafa Kamal on Sunday said that the eradication of polio virus from environment was the responsibility of authorities working at grassroot levels and his Ministry issued guidelines and help in prevention methods for the same across the country. He said that the new phase of anti-polio campaign would commence from April 21 in the country and he urged the parents to get their children immunized against the polio virus for the healthy and better future of their children. The Federal Health Minister Syed Mustafa Kamal talking to media persons after chairing a meeting with the officials of anti-polio and two MNAs from Karachi, said that the polio virus did not have any treatment but there were prevention measures to save children from it. He said that currently there were 44000 refusal cases of polio in the country and out of them 34000 cases were in Karachi. He further said that out of 15000 refusals were being reported from Urdu speaking parents and 10000 from Pashto speaking families in the city. The Minister said that only District East of Karachi had 27000 refusal cases of polio out of 34000 cases. He mentioned that the samples of polio virus in the environment had been reported from the entire Karachi district. Kamal said that polio could be prevented through anti-polio vaccination. Refuting the perception of polio vaccination's side or negative effects even any other rumor, he said that the anti-polio vaccination was totally safe and the parents should get their children vaccinated. He said that the anti-polio vaccination was purchased by the UNICEF and it handed over by them to the government. The Federal Health Minister said that he was in contact with all Provincial Health Ministers for the effective health related resolutions.-DNA

African ophthalmologists complete Diabetic Retinopathy, glaucoma treatment course

ISLAMABAD: A group of 18 African ophthalmologists have successfully completed a one-year specialized training program in Diabetic Retinopathy and glaucoma treatment, marking a significant milestone in international cooperation for healthcare development among OIC member states. Addressing the certificates distribution ceremony, Prof. Dr. Muhammad Iqbal Choudhary, Coordinator General OIC-COMSTECH emphasized the importance of collaboration among OIC member states in addressing shared challenges in public health. He noted that this initiative was a practical demonstration of COMSTECH's commitment to building indigenous scientific and medical capacities in OIC countries. It is not just a training program but an investment in the future of eye care in Africa. COMSTECH, a ministerial standing committee of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), is chaired by the President of Pakistan and works to strengthen science and technology cooperation among the 57 OIC member states. This training initiative was organized in collaboration with the Islamic Development Bank's AFAB program, LRBT, Layton Rahmatulla Benevolent Trust, and the University of Lahore. The participants of the training program received both theoretical knowledge and hands-on training using advanced diagnostic and treatment technologies such as Optical Coherence Tomography (OCT), fundus cameras, and laser therapy systems. The program was specifically designed to offer exposure to tools and procedures that are not commonly available in many parts of Africa. The trainees expressed strong appreciation for the opportunity, describing the program as "transformational" and "instrumental" in enhancing their capacity to combat avoidable blindness back home. One participant noted, "This training not only upgraded our clinical skills but also broadened our perspective on how collaborative, locally-led solutions can drive real change."The initiative aligns with global efforts to reduce avoidable blindness through sustainable, local capacity building. -DNA

US Tariff threat sparks wake-up call for Pak's exports: PIDE

ISLAMABAD: "Trade is not a zero-sum game. It's about shared value-about building connections that make both economies stronger. These proposed tariffs risk severing those ties," said Dr. Nadeem Javaid, Vice Chancellor of the Pakistan Institute of Development Economics (PIDE), in a strong statement accompanying a new policy note. "At PIDE, we see this moment not just as a threat, but as a catalyst-for course correction toward a more resilient, diversified, and strategic export future for Pakistan." A storm may be brewing on Pakistan's trade horizon, as PIDE warns that proposed reciprocal tariffs by the United States could have a dev-

astating impact on the country's export

sector. In a stark policy note released on April 13, 2025, the institute cautions that these tariffs could lead to macroeconomic instability, significant job losses, and a critical reduction in foreign exchange earnings. The study-conducted by Dr. Muhammad Zeshan, Dr. Shujaat Farooq, and Dr. Usman Qadir—analyzes the consequences of a proposed 29% reciprocal tariff on Pakistani exports to the US. When added to the existing 8.6% Most Favored Nation (MFN) tariff, the total duty could reach 37.6%. The result would likely be a 20-25% decline in exports to the US, translating into an annual loss of \$1.1-1.4 billion, with the textile sector bearing the brunt of the blow In fiscal year 2024. Pakistan exported \$5.3 billion worth of goods to the United States, making it the country's largest single-country

export market. A significant portion of these exports were textiles and apparel, which already face tariffs as high as 17% If the proposed tariffs are implemented, Pakistan's price competitiveness would be severely eroded, possibly allowing regional competitors like India and Bangladesh to capture market share The economic consequences would extend beyond textiles. Major exporters such as Nishat Mills and Interloop may be forced to reduce production, threatening more than 500,000 jobs. Non-textile exports—including leather. rice, surgical instruments, and sports goods-also face increased vulnerability. Despite the risks, PIDE views the crisis as an opportunity for strategic transformation. The policy note encourages Pakistan to take swift and thoughtful action in response.

US urged to reconsider 'Global UGRAD program decision'

ISLAMABAD: Chairman Higher Education Commission Dr. Mukhtar Ahmed on Sunday respectfully requested the US government to reconsider its decision on the Global Undergraduate Exchange (Global UGRAD) Pakistan Programme, believing this program's suspension would impact not just educational opportunities but also national pride news channel, Dr. Mukhtar Ahmed stated that the suspension of the Global UGRAD program might not significantly impact Pakistani students' academic pursuits, as they would return to their universities, it would undoubtedly affect the US's cultural harmony and image. Furthermore, he emphasized that this decision would also tarnish the image of American policies, potentially straining people-to-people relations and undermining the goodwill built through educational exchanges between the two nations. The Chairman HEC mentioned that numerous countries, including Canada are now offering excellent opportunities for Pakistani students, potentially diverting attention and interest away from the US as a preferred destination for higher education. He highlighted that Pakistan itself is committed to providing better opportunities for its students, emphasizing the country's efforts to enhance its education sector and offer quality academic experiences to its youth, thereby reducing reliance on foreign programs.—DNA



Memories of the past

RIDAYS in the Gaza Strip are no longer what they used to be; a day people awaited for rest, family gatherings, visits, and the delicious food cooked with love. Today, Friday has become a new burden added to the shoulders of the poor, a reminder of what was, and a warning of what will not be. On Friday morning, a reporter from the Palestinian Information Center wandered through the alleys and market, saying: "I searched for the smell of grilling or even a glimmer of joy, but found only silence, weary faces, and empty pockets. The stalls were bare except for a little; everyone was looking, few were buying, and most were just asking." A seventy-year-old man whispers to a vendor: "How much is the chicken today?" The other replies: "Eighty." The old man sighs and says: "We used to buy two, today we can't afford even half of one." He walks away with a pain in his eyes that cannot be expressed, and disappointment accompanying his heavy steps. Nearby, a mother of five stands, counting coins in her hand as if searching for a miracle. Her eyes are lost, looking at the vegetables and then at her children, choosing the cheapest and most filling options. She says: "I no longer count dishes, but bites... any food that fills the stomach and that's it." Even lentils, once considered a refuge for the poor, have become expensive; oil, sugar, rice-everything is now bought with a heavy breath. Some have replaced meat with bread, while others have replaced bread with patience. In the market, no voice rises above the sound of rising prices; no conversation begins without starting with "In the past, we used to buy..." and ending with "Will we eat today?" People are tired, and faces have begun to look alike: pale, exhausted, and hanging in anticipation of relief that does not come. Friday, which was once a small holiday, has turned into a memory of the past; no meat, no chicken, no table gathering loved ones around it. Just heavy silence, pain dressed in dignity, and hearts trembling in fear of tomorrow. One person said: "I no longer miss Friday because my pain renews with it. It reminds me of what I don't have, and what I can't provide for my children." Few words, but they carry the whole story. In this forgotten corner of the world, hunger is no longer an emergency; it has become a permanent reality. Poverty is not just in pockets, but in souls, in children's gazes, in mothers' despair, and in fathers' inability to say: "Today we will eat."

World's multipolar future

S the world struggles to make head or tail of Donald Trump's tariff war, perhaps what is missing is an understanding of the nature of power discourses. Global hegemons, when things are going their way, employ positive, inclusive and progressive narratives. But when the odds are stacked against them, their language shifts - hostile rhetoric and fighting words replace optimism, alongside negative depictions of perceived threats and adversaries. Consider the British Empire. After it had collapsed and its global dominance waned, it sought to salvage its legacy by rebranding its former colonies as part of "The Commonwealth" - a term projecting unity and hierarchy. In more recent times, similar strategic language has underpinned American hegemony. Take expressions like "the rule-based international system", suggesting fair multilateralism; "free and open Indo-Pacific", contrasting China's trade practices with Western ideals; "liberal democracy", signifying Western superiority; and terms like "global stability", "economic prosperity", "defending human rights", or "alliance of democracies", all of which sought to legitimise America's central role in shaping the global order. Other terms - equally suggestive but aimed at spelling out supposed threats to the hegemonic system - serve to rally allies against challenges to the hegemon. See "authoritarian threats", "economic decoupling", "global fragmentation", "democracy in decline", "disinformation", and the catch-all for crises of all types: "unprecedented challenges". By critically analysing this discourse, we can contextualise the tariff war and strip away the deliberately misleading connotations. For decades, schools and universities have taught a tidy narrative of modern economic growth. Developed countries, they said, followed a clear trajectory: industrialisation and urbanisation, followed by a shift from manufacturing to a services-based economy underpinned by robust financial institutions. Postcolonial nations were expected to emulate this path. However, for nations born in the aftermath of the second world war and amid the Cold War's ideological divide, the easiest development path to follow was "import substitution". It seemed obvious that these newly independent states would seek economic self-reliance by curbing imports and encouraging domestic production. But this approach quickly faltered. Without the necessary expertise or infrastructure, many nations produced substandard goods, wasting time and resources in the process. So the strategy then gave way to "export-oriented development", whereby countries focused on generating wealth through exports. Yet this, too, came at a cost in the form of dependence on foreign expertise, investment and - often - the very colonial powers they had broken free from. True independence proved elusive. The global economic system was too interconnected to properly sever ties. Those pursuing a clean ideological break such as socialist states – faced isolation and, eventually, defeat with the Communist Bloc's collapse in 1991. China's economic transformation offers a striking case study in success, however. Under Deng Xiaoping, the country abandoned isolationism for "reform and opening up", following the export-oriented model already adopted by non-communist nations. Its entry into the World Trade Organization in 2001 accelerated its rise as a manufacturing powerhouse, as did its willingness to accept corruption, environmental degradation, and income inequality. Greedy capitalists, drawn by the promise of gigantic profits, eagerly aided China's ascent.

Trump's approach to global conflicts

HE foreign policy stance of former U.S. President Donald Trump reflected a striking duality, oscillating between isolationist tendencies and assertive military posturing. On the one hand, Trump expressed a pronounced skepticism toward foreign interventions, advocating for a reduced U.S. military footprint abroad. His administration sought to cultivate improved relations with Russia, ostensibly in an effort to facilitate an end to the conflict in Ukraine. His "America First" foreign policy doctrine was generally critical of military entanglements, and in his inaugural address, he stated that the success of his second term would be measured by "the wars we never get into." Conversely, Trump simultaneously projected American military strength through both rhetoric and policy. His administration explicitly declared that the United States would intervene militarily in the event of an attack by China on the Philippines, a US treaty ally. Furthermore, Trump issued direct threats against Iran and North Korea while displaying an aggressive stance toward U.S. allies, suggesting, for instance, that Canada could be annexed as a U.S. state and implying potential military action to secure Greenland and the Panama Canal. This apparent paradox-a blend of isolationism and belligerence-could be interpreted as a reflection of Trump's broader unpredictability or a lack of coherence in his foreign policy approach. However, public opinion in the United States also exhibits erence for non-intervention while simultaneously supporting military action in specific circumstances.

Notably, partisan differences emerged, with Republicans displaying stronger support for military retaliation regardless of the administration in power. These findings do not necessarily indicate a widespread public desire for war. Indeed, Trump's first term was largely characterized by military restraint regarding new conflicts. However, they do suggest that in the event of escalating tensionswhether in the South China Sea or with other adversaries such as Iran-public support for military mobilization could be greater than generally assumed. While public opinion does not always dictate U.S. foreign policy, administrations often remain attuned to public sentiment regarding military engagements. This suggests that hostilities could escalate should adversaries directly engage U.S. forces. Surveys have consistently indicated that the American public prefers a reduced global presence, with a 2025 New York Times poll showing that 60 percent of respondents favored a focus on domestic affairs, including 75 percent of Republicans and 47 percent of Democrats. Meanwhile, a study by the Chicago Council on Global Affairs found that only 17 percent of Americans believed the U.S. had an inherent responsibility to assume a leadership role in world affairs. Despite this, historical patterns indicate that U.S. voters tend to favor more assertive presidential candidates. Political scientist Jeffrey Friedman's research suggests that while Americans often voice opposition to military interventions, they frequently support such actions once undertaken. For example, public disapproval of U.S. involvement in the Balkans during the 1990s gave way to increased approval following President Bill Clinton's decision to bomb Serbia. While military action against weaker adversaries often garners public support, conflicts involving great power adversaries such as China present a different dynamic. To assess public attitudes toward such scenarios, an experimental survey was conducted in collaboration with the Chicago Project on Security and Threats and NORC. The study asked 2,000 American citizens and 700 former polconsider a hypothetical U.S. aircraft carrier near a treaty ally. Respondents were divided into two groups: one was informed that 250 U.S. sailors had been killed, while the other was told there were no casualties. Results showed that 51 percent of respondents supported military retaliation in the absence of American casualties, while 57 percent endorsed a counterstrike if fatalities were involved. Partisan distinctions were evident, with 60 percent of Republicans advocating retaliation even in the absence of casualties, rising to 67 percent when American personnel were killed. Democratic respondents were more measured, with 50 percent supporting a counterstrike in the absence of casualties and 57 percent endorsing one when U.S. personnel perished. Importantly, public support for military action was not driven primarily by a desire for retribution. Instead, the predominant motivation appeared to be the protection of U.S. global standing. Among those advocating for retaliation, 53 percent cited the preservation of American credibility as a decisive factor. For Republicans, this figure rose to 63 percent. While the extent to which U.S. crisis behavior influences the actions of other adversaries, such as Iran, remains debated among scholars, the prevailing public perception is that maintaining a reputation for resolve is strategically significant. The American public holds largely negative views of both Iran and Russia, with 81 percent of Americans expressing an unfavorable opinion of Iran and 86 percent holding a

racism in the UK today. It is a truly extraordinary fact that

negative perception of Russia. Additionally, a 2024 YouGov poll indicated that Republicans overwhelmingly support defending NATO allies in the event of an attack. Nevertheless, historical precedent demonstrates that public support for military intervention is contingent upon specific conditions, including clear acts of aggression, the likelihood of success, and the perceived importance of U.S. interests. These factors have influenced past decisions, such as the non-intervention in Hungary (1956), the India-Pakistan conflicts (1965 and 1971), and the Rwandan genocide (1995). Similarly, U.S. involvement in the Syrian civil war was limited to countering the Islamic State rather than broader military engagement. Despite the heightened risk of military confrontation with China, both Washington and Beijing remain strongly incentivized to avoid direct conflict due to the existential risks posed by nuclear escalation. The Cold War precedent suggests that deterrence mechanisms can function effectively even amidst heightened geopolitical tensions. Historically, China has exhibited reluctance in directly confronting U.S. military forces. During the Taiwan Strait crises of the 1950s, Mao Zedong instructed Chinese troops to avoid direct engagement with American forces. In subsequent confrontations-including the 1995 Taiwan missile crisis and the accidental U.S. bombing of the Chinese embassy in Belgrade in 1999-China opted for diplomatic resolution rather than military escalation. recently, Beijing's have been characterized by non-lethal measures such as cyberattacks and water cannon use against Philippine vessels rather than overt military aggression. Paradoxically, a demonstrated willingness to employ military force could, in some cases, contribute to regional stability by deterring adversarial provocations. For instance, the Trump administration's explicit commitment to defending the Philippines may have compelled China to exercise restraint. However, given Trump's propensity for bellicose rhetoric, his administration could also have inadvertently increased the likelihood of U.S. military engagement. His apparent personal ambition-particularly his desire to secure a Nobel Peace Prize-may have influenced his strategic decision-making. Nevertheless, his assertive declarations, coupled with an American public that is willing to support military action under certain conditions, suggest that the risk of military confrontation remains tangible. The Trump administration's foreign policy was marked by a complex interplay of isolationism and militarism. While the American public generally favors a reduced international footprint, historical patterns indicate that military intervention enjoys substantial support under specific circumstances. The likelihood of conflict with a major power such as China remains uncertain, yet the underlying factors shaping U.S. foreign policy including public sentiment, strategic credibility, and deterrence dynamics suggest that military escalation re-

HE British-based Palestine Solidarity Campaign has taken it upon itself to try and ban me - and other anti-Zionists - from speaking at public meetings up and down the country. In aid of the absurd campaign of censorship, it has tried to pressure and threaten its local branches. I am aware of several attempts to do this. First was the Hastings and Rye group who - to their credit - did not buckle under the pressure to disinvite me and to avoid posting a copy of my speech - or remove it later - on/from the local group website. Next was Bristol, where the local group (and the local Stop the War group) unilaterally withdrew from the Bristol Palestine Alliance in a row, in part over whether I should be allowed to speak at a demo in Bristol. Other elements of the dispute involved objecting to Palestine Action's Huda Ammori and Lowkey as speakers. No doubt there have been other incidents, but the most recent was Chelmsford, where the pressure was so bad that the group unilaterally decided to resign from PSC. The PSC in London attempted to enforce the no-platform position by circulating a briefing they had compiled on things I had said. This was then developed and circulated to all branches and was discussed at a national branch meeting, taking up most of the time allocated for the meeting by all accounts. The document was four pages long, and the purpose of this piece is to respond to the claims made in it. Before we get into details, one thing to bear in mind is that this type of response is due, in part, to the fact that the Left in the UK had been played by Zionists in the anti-racist movement for decades. Genocidal Zionists associated with the Revisionist Zionist movement were involved in the creation of the 'anti-fascist' movement in this country, as I have revealed in earlier reporting. This particular group then (in 1948) affiliated en bloc with Irgun, the group responsible for the King David Hotel bombing and which was involved in 1947 and 1948 in terror attacks against British interests in Palestine and indeed in the UK itself. Since then, the British anti-racist movement has faced the difficulty of accommodating Zionists in order to create a 'united front'. This has been true since the 1970s in Rock Against Racism and the Anti-Nazi League, and it has remained the case ever since in groups like Unite Against Fascism and today's Stand Up To Racism. The problem with allowing Zionists to be involved in leadership positions is that it always comes with a price. That price includes avoiding or soft-pedalling the fact that Zionism is a form of racism and adopting a strategy of opposing 'fascism' when the main form of racism in British Society is state and institutional racism against Black people, the Irish, and latterly, especially, Muslims. Jews are not the victims of either state or institutional

He is the leader of United Torah Judaism, the political party representing most ultra-orthodox Jews. He is a devotee of the Ger Hasidic sect and thus an 'anti-Zionist' who would prefer to die rather than serve in the occupation forces. While simultaneously calling for the end of 'Apartheid' and the occupation, Goldknopf, as Housing minister since 2022, has overseen the largest expansion of settlements in the West Bank in decades. As I said: Jewish supremacists. Do I think that it is something 'inherent' in Jewishness that prevents Jews from joining the struggle for the liberation of Palestine? Well, of course not. We can illustrate this by reference to those Jews who have, in fact, joined the material struggle to destroy settler colonialism. Where, in the Jewish community today, are the equivalents of William Sportisse, a Communist who joined the Algerian struggle for liberation? And where are the equivalents of those better-known heroes of the South African liberation movement Ruth First, Joe Slovo, Ronnie Kasrils? They were all Jews who joined the material struggle against Apartheid. Where is today's anti-Zionist equivalent of Umkhonto we Sizwe, the armed wing of the African National Congress founded by Nelson Mandela? The PSC briefing continues: Jews can only be considered anti-Zionist if they engage in armed struggle... Miller goes on to set a double standard that non-Jewish anti-Zionists are seemingly not required to meet, asking, "How many Jews have engaged in military action against Zionist targets?" If armed struggle is required for a Jew to be anti-Zionist, but not for someone of any other background, that again implies that they should be treated differently from others and greater demands made of them to prove their commitment to anti-Zionism. This is a deeply problematic approach that divides activists on the grounds of their background. The standard - required of everyone, Jewish and non-Jewish alike, in my view - is material opposition to Zionism. Material opposition does not mean everyone or every Jew has to pick up a gun to fight Zionism, but it does mean the necessity of fostering resistance consciousness and crucially material action. In other words, I don't think, and have not said, that Jews can only be considered anti-Zionist if they engage in armed struggle. It's frankly amazing that those who want to tone police our movement can pick up on specific posts on X and pretend that they have not seen or deliberately avoid checking if this interpretation is supported by other things that the person has said. I have been talking for at least a year about the need to escalate to material anti-Zionism. I have also laid out what it means in a long article and many posts on X, TikTok, and Instagram. I have repeatedly said that the cutting (material) edge of the anti-Zionist movement is Palestine Action. But, of course, the PSC doesn't want to hear. It has, of course, in any case, been seeking to sabotage the activities of Palestine Action for many months. But it is still legitimate to ask about the role of Jews in the anti-zionist struggle, specifically for one very good reason. Jews, in general, stand in a different material location in relation to non-Jews to the settler project in Palestine, whether in Palestine or outside it. Jews in occupied Palestine have a privileged vantage point on the regime, which allows them access to locations and situations denied to non-Jews. This could be used to subvert the Zionist entity by passing intelligence, engaging in sabotage, or even persuading die-hard Zionist families to leave, among a myriad of other activities. Am I ruling out pacifists from anti-Zionist action, as some have apparently questioned? Well, of course not. Pacifists can very well engage in Non Violent Direct Action. A thousand flowers of NVDA could, in principle bloom: in settlements, at military bases, or at the border attempting to force aid through. In the so called 'diaspora', Jews - unless they have no contact at all with the Zionist movement or organised Jewry (which is almost totally Zionist in nature) - also have a ma-

terial location allowing them to be of use to other support-

ers of the liberation of Palestine by supplying intelligence,

facilitating sabotage of the Zionist movement, and wearing

down the will of Zionists to resist the their inevitable de-

MADRID: Carlos Alcaraz came from a set down to beat Lorenzo Musetti and win the Monte Carlo Masters for the first time. The four-time major champion produced some superb shots to overcome the Italian 3-6 6-1 6-0 on the clay. It was a competitive match for a set and a half before Musetti, bidding for the biggest prize of his career, began to struggle with a leg injury. The success was a sixth ATP Masters 1000 trophy for Alcaraz - his first since Indian Wells last year - and an 18th title overall. It also gives the 21-year-old a confidence boost before he defends his French Open title in May. "It's been a really difficult week with a lot of difficult situations," Alcaraz said. Musetti's accuracy won out over his opponent's pacy hitting, with the Italian clinching the set on an outrageous drop-shot winner from behind the baseline. Alcaraz hit 14 unforced errors in the first set, 11 off the forehand alone, but settled quickly into the second. - Agencies

AZA is, in fact, the name of an ide-ology. Historically, Gaza has always been the center of Palestinian resistance. Even in the past, conquerors had to pass through Gaza to reach Jerusalem. Gaza is an ancient city that has held significance for all religions. It is mentioned in texts that are over 3,500 years old. The Holy Bible also refers to Gaza multiple times. Palestine was peacefully conquered

during the era of Caliph Umar (RA) and became a part of the Islamic Empire. After the Rashidun Caliphate, this land remained an important part of the Umayyad, Abbasid, and Fatimid empires. During the First Crusade in 1099, the Christians seized Jerusalem and massacred hundreds of thousands of civilians. Eighty-eight years later, in 1187, Salahuddin Ayyubi liberated the Holy Land from Christian control and raised the Islamic flag there. After the Ayyubid rule, the region became part of the Ottoman Empire. When Germany was defeated in World War I, the British sought revenge against their ally, Turkey, by dividing and distributing its territories. As a result, Palestine was split into several parts. Britain took control of Jerusalem and began settling large numbers of Jews there, while the Gaza region remained with Jordan. In November 1947, the United Nations

General Assembly committed a historic injustice by ordering the partition of Palestine between Muslims and Jews. Consequently, in 1948, an illegitimate state called Israel was established in the heart of the Arab world on Palestinian land. The Arabs declared war against this oppressive decision. With British support, Israel captured 70% of Palestine. However, Gaza remained a part of Jordan until the 1967 Arab-Israeli

war, in which Israel seized more Arab territories. It captured Jerusalem, the Golan Heights from Syria, and Gaza from Jordan. After Britain, the United States became Israel's patron, making life unbearable for the Palestinians. Arab world fought several wars for Palestine, but each time Israel ended up occupying more Arab lands. In 1993, under the mediation of U.S. President Bill Clinton, the Oslo Accords were signed between Israel and the Palestinians. Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and PLO leader Yasser Arafat signed the agreement, which aimed to pave the way for a two-state solution. In 2004, Israel withdrew from Gaza. However, after Hamas's victory in the 2005 elections, Israel imposed a blockade on Gaza, which continues to this day. During this time, Gaza's citizens have suffered severe shortages of food and medicine. Israel blocks most humanitarian aid, and every now and then carries out military operations and bombings, resulting in heavy casualties. Despite this oppression, the determination and resilience of the people of Gaza remain unshaken. In the most recent military offensive, Is-

rael has crossed all bounds of humanity. For the past year, it has conducted carpet bombings that have completely destroyed Gaza's infrastructure. Israeli aggression has resulted in the deaths of hundreds of

thousands of civilians. Homes, schools, and hospitals have been reduced to rubble. The city is facing a severe shortage of food and medicine. Even aid sent by the international community is not reaching Gaza. Relief convoys are forced to wait for weeks at the Egyptian border due to lack of permission to enter. In this horrifying injustice against humanity, the United States is not only supporting Israel but also supplying it with weapons. Every resolution against Israeli aggression in the United Nations is vetoed by the U.S., giving Israel more opportunity to oppress. While what the U.S. and Europe are doing is clearly wrong, the real question is: what are the Muslims doing? It's true that no Muslim country is currently in a position to go to war with Israel. However, Arab nations can use their geographical importance. Israel is surrounded on all sides by Arab countries. By closing their airspace, Arab nations could force Israel to its knees. Israel's only maritime route passes between Egypt and Turkey. If these countries have the courage to block this route, Israel would be suffocated. Unfortunately, the rulers are concerned only with their own interests. Many countries maintain diplomatic and trade relations with Israel. Muslim leaders seek U.S. approval to prolong their rule, and the key to American approval lies in pleasing Israel.

Syrian forces deploy at key dam under deal with

DAMASCUS: Security forces from the new government in Damascus deployed on Saturday around a strategic dam in northern Syria, under a deal with the autonomous Kurdish administration, state media reported. Under the agreement, Kurdish-led fighters of the Syrian Democratic Forces will pull back from the dam, which they captured from Daesh in late 2015.

The Tishrin dam near Manbij in Aleppo province is one of several on the Euphrates and its tributaries in the Syrian Arab Republic. It plays a key role in the nation's economy by providing water for irrigation and hydro-electric power.

On Thursday, a Kurdish source said the Kurdish authorities in northeast Syria had reached an agreement with the central government on running the dam. A separate Kurdish source said on Saturday that the deal, supervised by the US-led anti-terror coalition, stipulates that the dam remain under Kurdish civilian administration.

Syria's state news agency SANA reported "the entry of Syrian Arab Army forces and security forces into the Tishrin Dam ... to impose security in the region, under the agreement reached with the SDF."

The accord also calls for a ioint military force to protect the dam and for the withdrawal of factions "that seek to disrupt this agreement," SANA said.

It is part of a broader agreement reached in mid-March between Syria's President Ahmed Al-Sharaa and SDF commander Mazloum Abdi, aiming to integrate the institutions of the Kurdish autonomous administration into the national government.-APP

Algeria protests detention, indictment of consular agent in France

ALGIERS: Algeria protested strongly Saturday after French prosecutors indicted one of its consular officials on suspicion of involvement in the April 2024 abduction of an Algerian influencer in a Paris suburb. The indictment comes at a delicate time in relations between Algeria and its former colonial power, with Algiers claiming the move was aimed at scuppering recent attempts to repair ties. Three men, one of whom works at an Algerian consulate in France, were indicted Friday in Paris on suspicion of involvement in the abduction of 41-year-old Amir Boukhors, Boukhors, known as "Amir DZ," is an opponent of the Algerian government and has more than a million followers on TikTok.-APP

UK govt to take control of British Steel under emergency law

LONDON: The UK government said it was taking control of Chinese-owned British Steel on Saturday after rushing an emergency law through parliament to avert the shutdown of the country's last factory that can make steel from scratch. The struggling plant in northern England had faced imminent closure and Prime Minister Keir Starmer said his government "stepped in to save British Steel" with legislation to prevent its blast furnaces going out. At a rare weekend session, parliament approved the law without opposition to take over the running of the Scunthorpe site, which employs several thousand people and produces steel crucial for UK industries including construction and rail transport. The government saw its possible closure as a risk to Britain's long-term economic security, given the decline of the UK's once robust steel Officials were industry. poised to take over the site after the emergency bill passed into law on Saturday evening, according to UK media reports.-APP

Trump admin's move slammed to list living immigrants as dead

WASHINGTON: Civil rights advocates and lawmakers have denounced a reported Trump administration move to classify thousands of immigrants living in the United States as dead in a Social Security database in an effort to force them out of the country. By entering the names and Social Security numbers of roughly 6,000 immigrants into Social Security's "death master file," the administration has revoked their ability to legally work in the U.S. and receive benefits in a bid to get them to "self-deport," several news outlets reported. A social security number is a unique nine-digit number issued by the federal government to US citizens, permanent residents and temporary working residents and used for various official and identification purposes including tracking earnings. The move will also make it impossible for those

affected to use banks or other basic services where social security number is a necessity. It is part of Trump's effort to crackdown on immigrants who entered the United States under programmes instituted by the US president's predecessor Joe Biden. "This is an outrageous abuse of power," Nancy Altman, president of the advocacy group Social Security Works, said in a statement. "It will not only create extreme hardship, but kill people. Imagine, in one Trump administration keystroke, losing your income, your health insurance, access to your bank account, your credit cards, your home, and more." "If they get away with this, it would be no surprise if they then move on to marking their perceived enemies as dead-citizens and non-citizens alike," Ms. Altman added. "This is a total misuse of the dedicated revenue that workers contribute

to Social Security, with every paycheck. Though Trump claimed he wouldn't cut benefits, he essentially is by diverting dedicated monies from their intended purpose of paying Social Security benefits to the immoral purpose of maliciously ruining lives." "The Trump administration's weaponization of Social Security is shocking and unconscionable, and we expect House Republicans will remain silent." the former Social Security Administration (SSA) Commissioner, Martin O'Malley, who serve under former President Joe Biden joined in the criticism "If they can, contrary to the law and every regulation and without any due process, mark people inside SSA's database dead who legally entered the country and were legally required to be issued a work SSA number, then they can do that to anybody," O'Malley told CNN. The Washington Post reported that the classification of

thousands of immigrants as "dead" came at the request of Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem, who-in tandem with other administration officials—is trampling basic rights as she moves to carry out Trump's mass deportation agenda. Aaron Reichlin-Melnick, a senior fellow at the American Immigration Council, called the Trump administration's scheme "utterly unprecedented" and warned that it "has the potential to cause immense problems for people." "And it's also one with a HUGE potential for error," he wrote on social media. "If the data isn't perfect, people here legally might be effectively declared dead." According to the Post, "among the people being targeted are immigrants who have bona fide Social Security numbers but have lost their legal status in the U.S., such as those who entered under one of the Biden administration's temporary work programs that

have since ended."

The immigrants' names were placed in the database following two memorandums of agreement signed Monday by Noem and Leland Dudek, the acting Social Security commissioner," the Post reported. "The memos authorize Social Security to place the immigrants in the death file for national security reasons and under the Social Security Act." The New York Times reported that the "initial names" added to Social Security's death file "are convicted criminals and 'suspected terrorists," according to internal administration documents. "but officials said the effort could broaden to include others in the country without authorization.' The Institute on Taxation and Economic Policy estimates that undocumented immigrants paid roughly \$26 billion in Social Security taxes in 2022.—Agencies

Syrian President Sharaa heads to UAE on official visit

CAIRO: Syrian President Ahmed al-Sharaa will travel to the United Arab Emirates for his second visit to a Gulf state as president on Sunday, Syria's official news agency reported. He will be accompanied by foreign minister Assad al-Shibani, who visited the UAE earlier this year. They are expected to discuss issues of mutual interest, the SANA state news agency reported. Sharaa visited Saudi Arabia in February on his first foreign trip since assuming the presidency in January. His visit to the UAE comes as the new Syrian leadership attempts to strengthen ties with Arab and Western leaders following the fall of Bashar al-Assad in December at the hands of Sharaa's Sunni Islamist group, Tahrir al-Sham.-APP

China's Xi vows to Prabowo to deepen partnership: Xinhua

SHANGHAI: Chinese President Xi Jinping vowed to deepen his country's strategic partnership with Indonesia in a call with President Prabowo Subianto on Sunday, China's official Xinhua News Agency reported. Xi told Prabowo the bilateral partnership had strategic significance and impact globally, as the two exchanged congratulations over the 75th anniversary of diplomatic ties, Xinhua said. Beijing is trying to persuade other nations to hew to a common line against US import tariffs announced by President Donald Trump. Xi will visit Indonesia's fellow Southeast Asian nations Vietnam, Malaysia and Cambodia from Monday, aiming to consolidate ties with some of China's closest neighbours as trade tension escalates with the United States.-APP

Shipping countries reach historic deal to cut emissions, or pay fee

UNITED NATIONS: After

years of intense negotiations, countries have reached a landmark deal to cut greenhouse gas emissions from global shipping, setting mandatory fuel standards and introducing an industry-wide carbon pricing mechanism. The framework agreed during the UN International Organization Maritime (IMO) Marine Environment Protection Committee aims for net-zero emissions from the sector by 2050 and will be formally adopted in October before coming into force in 2027. They will apply to large ocean-going vessels over 5,000 gross tonnage, which collectively account for 85 per cent of carbon dioxide emissions from the marine shipping fleet.-DNA

Budget 2025-26 BMP for encouraging private sector investment, growth

ISLAMABAD: The Federation of Pakistan Chambers of

Commerce and Industry's Businessmen Panel (BMP) has started consultations on the upcoming budget 2025-26, focusing on issues like boosting trade and industry, reducing the policy interest rate, and lowering GST to stimulate economic growth. FPCCI former president and Businessmen Panel (BMP) Chairman Mian Anjum Nisar while addressing a pre-budget session organized by the BMP here, said the business representatives has been actively involved in finalizing budget proposals and presenting them to the relevant government departments. We are advocating for policies that encourage private sector investment and growth, including reducing the policy interest rate to single digits. Anjum Nisar called for a growth-oriented budget 2023-24 for the trade and industry, suggesting the government to make visible reduction in taxes, helping revive the businesses in the country, urging the government to hold thorough consultations with all stakeholders including the business community on the upcoming federal budget. Indonesia, Egypt upgrade ties to strategic partnership

Saudi Arabia is advancing efforts to deepen economic integration with Egypt, as over 100 investors gathered in Cairo for a high-level forum to unlock \$30 billion in investment opportunities.

JAKARTA: Indonesia and Egypt elevated their ties to a strategic partnership during President Prabowo Subianto's visit to Cairo, his office said on Sunday. Prabowo and Egypt's President Abdel Fattah El-Sisi signed the joint declaration following their meeting in the Egyptian capital on Saturday, the Cabinet Secretariat said in a statement. "The signing of the joint declaration is an important milestone in diplomatic ties between the two countries, signifying Indonesia and Egypt's strong commitment to elevate bilateral ties to a strategic level," the statement reads. "Through this strategic partnership, Indonesia and Egypt are committed to (strengthening) cooperation in various priority fields. From politics, economy, security, defense, culture and education ties, as well as people-to-people relations." Subianto was in Cairo as part of his multi-day tour to the Middle East and has visited the UAE and Turkiye. This was his second time in Egypt since taking office in October. Egypt was one of the first countries to recognize Indonesia's independence, with the two nations establishing diplomatic ties in 1947. Both Jakarta and Cairo believe that their "strong and historic partnership" will provide "real benefits" for the country and their peoples, the Indonesian Ministry of Foreign Affairs said in a statement. Egypt ranks third among Indonesia's top export destinations in the Middle East and North Africa, just after the UAE and Saudi Arabia. With bilateral trade volume worth around \$1.7 billion in 2024, Egypt is Indonesia's top trade partner in North Africa alone. Palm oil, coffee beans, and coconut oil are some of Indonesia's main exports to Egypt. President Prabowo's visit to Egypt is very important. The strategic partnership that resulted from it is quite broad and will be beneficial for the future of both countries," Teuku Rezasyah, an international relations expert from Padjadjaran University in West Java, told Arab News. While trade has been a big aspect of bilateral ties, defense cooperation will likely be a focus of the strategic partnership, he said. "The most likely area of focus will be defense cooperation ... since Egypt has experience in facing different kinds of challenges at the border," Rezasyah said, referring to Egypt's shared land borders with a number of states, including Libya, Sudan, and the occupied Palestinian territory of Gaza. Through the partnership, Jakarta may be seeking to learn more closely from Cairo's experience in dealing with various issues in the Middle East, alluding to Prabowo's ongoing trip to the region that was aimed at boosting Indonesia's role in ending Israel's war on Gaza. A staunch supporter of Palestine, the Indonesian government and people see Palestinian statehood as being mandated by their own constitution, which calls for the abolition of colonialism.-DNA

Syria's Sharaa meets UAE counterpart

CAIRO: Syrian President Ahmed al-Sharaa met with his United Arab Emirates counterpart in Abu Dhabi on Sunday, the Syrian leader's office said, making a second visit to a Gulf state as the country's new Islamist rulers seek to reassure foreign partners they will create an inclusive political system. Sharaa, who met President Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, was accompanied by Foreign Minister Assad al-Shibani.

Svrian state news agency SANA said earlier on Sunday that Sharaa and Shibani were expected to discuss issues of mutual interest with Emirati officials, without giving details. Sharaa visited Saudi Arabia in February on his first foreign trip since assuming the presidency in January. The new Syrian leadership is seeking to strengthen ties with Arab and Western leaders following the fall of President Bashar al-Assad in December at the hands of Sharaa's Sunni Islamist group, Hayat Tahrir al-Sham. Abu Dhabi has been a fierce opponent of Islamist groups across the region, including in Egypt, Sudan and Libya. It has said in the past that extremism and terrorism were a major concern in Syria following the fall of Assad. Western countries are also watching Syria's leaders closely to ensure they create an inclusive government, maintain order in a country fractured by civil war and prevent a resurgence of Islamic State or al Qaeda. - Agencies

Cop gunned down in Karachi

KARACHI: A policeman was shot dead on Sunday in Karachi's Ranchor Line area over what appeared to be personal enmity, police said. According to a statement issued by the Karachi Police Office (KPO) today, constable Muhammad Ayub posted at the Chakiwara police station - was shot dead after unidentified suspects opened fire on him near Ghousia Biryani.

Later, the constable was taken to a hospital, where he succumbed to his injuries and further investigation was under way, the KPO said. Karachi Additional Inspector General of Police (AIGP) JavedAlam-Odho took strict notice of the policeman's murder and sought an immediate report from the senior superintendent of police (SSP).

While expressing condolences to the bereaved family, the AIGP issued instructions to take effective steps for suspects' immediate arrest and a transparent investigation into the incident. He also assured the family of all possible cooperation. Speaking to Dawn.com, South Deputy Inspector General of Police (DIG) Syed Asad Raza said that the deceased was moved to Civil Hospital Karachi, where he succumbed to his injuries.

JI announces nationwide strike in solidarity with Palestinians

Hafiz Naeem addresses political parties, questioning their silence on Gaza

KARACHI: Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) has announced a countrywide wheel-jam strike on April 22 to express solidarity with the oppressed people of Palestine as tensions and violence continue in Gaza.

Addressing a massive rally in Karachi, JI Ameer Hafiz NaeemurRehman urged Muslim leaders across the globe to take decisive action and stand with Palestinians in the face of Israeli aggression.

Thousands, including women and children,

gathered on Shahrah-e-Faisal for the "Million March" organized by Jamaat-e-Islami to pay tribute to the martyrs of Gaza and protest against ongoing Israeli atrocities. Speaking at the event, Hafiz Naeem said, "The UN Charter has been thrown into the river. Terrorists rule the world, and Zionist forces will not spare Muslim rulers either. The time has come for the 56 Muslim countries to unite and fulfill their responsibility." He called on Pakistan's Prime Minister and Army Chief to play a leading role in advocating for Palestine, while urging all polit-

ical parties in the country to stop aligning

with Israeli interests and instead condemn

Israeli aggression and support the Pales-

tinian cause. "The spirit of jihad cannot be



suppressed by hollow slogans," he said, further recommending that all Muslim countries convene a military summit to discuss collective defense strategies

Hafiz Naeem directly addressed political parties including PML-N, PPP, and PTI, questioning their silence on Gaza. "Raise your voice for the people of Gaza. Condemn Israel. Why don't you speak up for the oppressed? History will not forgive you."

He also called on the public and politicians alike to clarify their stance on the boycott of Israeli products. "By buying their goods, we are only strengthening them," he said. "Why does the idea of jihad disturb you? You cannot crush the spirit of resistance with lies." Lamenting the lack of genuine leadership, he said, "This government does not represent us. We must change the system. Even the children of Karachi should march for Gaza. Students from every university must take to the streets.'

Hafiz Naeem concluded by emphasizing the need for unified, bold actions against oppression and urged people to stand on the right side of history.

BD issues arrest warrant for **British MP**

DHAKA: Bangladeshi authorities have issued an arrest warrant for the British MP and former Labour minister Tulip Siddiq. The country's ACC has been investigating allegations Siddiq illegally received land as part of its wider probe of the regime of her aunt, Sheikh Hasina, who was deposed as prime minister in August. The Hampstead and High-

gate MP, who quit as economic secretary to the Treasury in January, was named in the arrest warrant alongside more than 50 others. Lawyers acting for Siddiq denied the charges, which they said were "politically motivated". The ACC had not presented any evidence or informed Siddiq about an arrest warrant, the lawyers added. The UK lists Bangladesh as a 2B extradition country - meaning clear evidence must be presented before ministers and judges make a decision. The ACC is examining claims Sheikh Hasina and her family embezzled up to

spending in Bangladesh. The investigation is based on a series of allegations made by Bobby Hajjaj, a political opponent of Hasina.

Pakistan will not retaliate against Trump tariffs

ISLAMABAD: Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb has stated that Pakistan has no intention of retaliating against the tariffs imposed by the Donald Trump administration. In an interview with the British news channel, the finance minister acknowledged that Pakistan is indeed concerned about the Trump-era tariffs as they have created an atmosphere of uncertainty. "We all need to think about how to move forward in this new world order, and I believe it is essential to engage in dialogue on this matter," he said. Responding to a question, Muhammad Aurangzeb clarified that if the question is whether Pakistan plans to respond with countermeasures, the answer is no. Addressing concerns over Pakistan potentially suffering amid the ongoing US-China trade tensions, the finance minister noted that the United States has long been a strategic partner in trade and other sectors, but relations with China are equally important for Pakistan.

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's trade with the United Arab Emirates (UAE) exceeded \$10.9 billion during the fiscal year 2023-24, highlighting the robust economic partnership between the two nations, according to Pakistan's Ambassador to the UAE, Faisal Tirmizi. The two countries have steadily deepened their economic ties in recent months. In January 2024, Pakistan and the UAE $\,$ signed agreements exceeding \$3 billion, covering collaboration in railway development, special economic zones, and critical infrastructure projects. The UAE remains Pakistan's third-largest trading partner-after China and the United States-and a key source of foreign investment. Over the past two decades, Emirati investments in Pakistan have crossed the \$10 billion mark, according to data from the UAE's Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Speaking to UAE state news agency WAM, Ambassador Tirmizi detailed the breakdown of the \$10.9 billion trade volume, which includes both goods and services. He reported that remittances from the Pakistani expatriate community in the UAE totaled \$6.7 billion in 2024 and are expected to surpass \$7 billion in 2025.

In terms of goods trade, the total reached \$8.41 billion in FY 2023-24. Pakistan's exports to the UAE surged by 41.06% to \$2.08 billion, while imports from the UAE declined by 14.45% to \$6.33 billion. This shift led to a 28.28% reduction in the trade deficit-a notable improvement in bilateral trade balance. In the services sector, trade rose to \$2.56 billion, reflecting a 20.54% year-on-year increase. Between July 2024 and January 2025, goods trade continued to grow by 21.63%, with a 7.53% rise in Pakistani exports, indicating sustained economic momentum.

These figures not only reflect the strength of our bilateral trade but also underscore the vital role of the Pakistani diaspora in supporting Pakistan's economy," Tirmizi noted. The ambassador also shared that 19 Emirati companies are currently operating in Pakistan, with the UAE investing heavily across key sectors such as communications, IT, tourism, oil and gas, banking, real estate, housing, and services. Among the notable developments, major UAE firms like Abu Dhabi Ports and DP World have entered agreements to enhance Pakistan's port infrastructure, including projects linked to the Karachi Port Trust and supporting railway connectivity. "These investments highlight the UAE's deep-rooted commitment to Pakistan's long-term economic growth and regional connectivity," Tirmizi added.

China calls on US to 'cancel' tariffs

BEIJING: China on Sunday called on the United States to "completely cancel" its reciprocal tariffs after Washington announced exemptions for consumer electronics and key chipmaking equipment. "We urge the US to [...] take a big step to correct its mistakes, completely cancel the wrong practice of 'reciprocal tariffs' and return to the right path of mutual respect", a commerce ministry spokesperson said in a statement. A notice late Friday by the US Customs and Border Protection office said smartphones, laptops, memory chips and other products would be excluded from the global levies President Donald Trump rolled out this month. Beijing's commerce ministry said the exemptions were a "small step" by Washington and China was "evaluating the impact" of the decision. It came as retaliatory Chinese import tariffs of 125% on US goods took effect on Saturday, with Beijing standing defiant against its biggest trade partner. The exemptions will benefit US tech companies like Nvidia and Dell, as well as Apple, which makes iPhones and other premium products in China. Most Chinese goods still face a blanket 145% levy after the country was excluded from a 90-day tariff reprieve. - Agencies


