PM reaffirms Pakistan's right to self defense

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif received a telephone call this evening from U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio, amid heightened tensions in South Asia following recent Indian military actions. During the call, the Prime Minister strongly condemned the missile and drone strikes carried out by India, which resulted in the deaths of 31 civilians, injuries to 57 others, and extensive damage to civilian infrastructure. He emphasized that the attacks constituted a blatant violation of Pakistan's sovereignty and territorial integrity and posed a serious threat to regional peace and stability.

Prime Minister Sharif underscored Pakistan's unwavering resolve to defend its sovereignty and territorial integrity, stating that the nation reserved the right to act in self-defense in line with Article 51 of the United Nations Charter. He also conveyed the deep anger and concern among the Pakistani public over what he described as India's unprovoked acts of war.

Pakistan rejects allegations of targeting civilian population

DPM Dar says Pak, India NSAs made contact

ISLAMABAD: Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar said that national security advisers (NSAs) of Pakistan and India have spoken following New Delhi's unprovoked missile strikes. "There has been contact between the two, yes," he told TRT World in response to a question whether the NSAs made contact after India's overnight strikes against Pakistan. India launched strikes on Pakistan and AJK early Wednesday morning — an assault that Islamabad called a "blatant act of war" - as tensions spiral between the nuclear-armed rivals after a deadly attack on tourists in Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kash-

mir (IIOJK) last month. Islamabad said six Pakistani locations, from mosques to hydropower projects, were targeted. At least 31 civilians, including children, were martyred and 57 sustained injuries after India launched unprovoked and devious attack on Pakistan last night. In retaliation, the Pakistan armed forces shot down five Indian Air Force (IAF) jets, seven drones, destroyed a brigade headquarters and a number of checkposts along the Line of Control (LoC). Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar has said that the country has not targeted any civilian population in India, especially Amritsar. Addressing

Regular SC bench to hear case against **Imran Khan** Advocate Salman

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court's constitutional bench has referred the contempt of court case against the founder of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) to a regular bench. The case was heard on Thursday by a five-member constitutional bench headed by Justice Aminud-Din Khan. During the hearing, Justice Jamal Khan Mandokhail questioned whether the case should be handled by their bench or if it falls under the jurisdiction of a regular bench.

Advocate Salman Akram Raja, representing the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf founder, responded that the matter did not involve any constitutional questions and therefore should be referred to a regular bench.

The Additional Attorney General supported this stance, noting that in a previous case involving reserved seats, the court had similarly sent the contempt matter to a regular bench. Subsequently, the consti-

tutional bench accepted the arguments and formally referred the contempt of court case against the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf founder to a regular bench for further proceedings.

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump urged India and Pakistan to cease fighting, saying he is open to helping both countries broker a peace agreement, following early Wednesday's swift Pakistani military re-



sponse to Indian strikes. "It's so terrible," President Trump said at the White House on Wednesday. "I get along with both, I know both very well, and I want to see them work it out. I want to see them stop.

"I know both very well, and I want to see them work it out. I want to see them stop. And hopefully they can stop now," he said. "They've got a tit-for-tat, so hopefully they can stop now. But I know both. We get along with both countries very well. Good relationships with both. And I want to see it stop. And if I can do anything to help I will. I will be there as well."

Trump initially played down the crisis as part of old tensions between India and Pakistan But his administration has scrambled into action in the last 24 hours since the Indian strikes in parts of Pakistan and Azad Kashmir. US Secretary of State Marco Rubio spoke to his counterparts from India and Pakistan on Friday, encouraging them to reopen dialogue to "defuse" the situation, the White House said. Meanwhile, Pakistan's Defence Minister Khawaja Asif told The Ne York Times that he would welcome further U.S. efforts to help defuse his country's crisis with India and praised President Trump.



ISLAMABAD: The Society for the Protection of the Rights of the Child (SPARC), in collaboration with the Social Policy and Development Centre of Health: Cigarette Tax Simulation Model 2025-26."

This model provides evidence-based insights into how effective tobacco taxation can improve public health outcomes and generate vital government revenue. He further noted that cigarette prices in Pakistan remain lower than in many parts of the world. "There is clear evidence that higher tobacco taxes result in lower smoking rates and increased government revenue. Without urgent action, Pakistan could see 490,000 new smokers in the coming year. The government must take decisive steps to sustain progress and protect public health," he urged.

try, Pakistan is facing a major public health crisis-further compounded by the fact that nearly 1,200 children aged 10-14 start smoking every day. The economic burden of smoking in Pakistan is estiwhich accounts for 1.6% of the country's GDP. ANF arrests 8 smugglers with 303 kg of drugs

RAWALPINDI: The Anti-Narcotics Force (ANF), conducting eight operations across the country, recovered as many as 303.769 kg of drugs worth more than Rs 29.1 million and arrested eight suspects, said an ANF Headquarters spokesman on Thursday. He informed that 300 grams of hashish were recovered from an accused near a University area in Attock.In another operation, 1 kg of hashish was recovered from a motorcyclist near a restaurant in Mangopir area, Karachi. The suspects arrested confessed to selling drugs to students of educational institutions. As many as 100 grams of heroin and 4 kg of ice were recovered from a vehicle on University Road, Peshawar, and the suspect was nabbed. Similarly,1.144 kg of ice was recovered from the bag of a passenger going to Qatar at Islamabad Airport. As many as 276 kg of hashish and 10 kg of ice were recovered from a vehicle near Shamkot Toll Plaza, Khanewal and two suspects were arrested. 
ISSI Int'I moot on 'Pakistan and the Region' concludes

In this hour of need, unity is not a political choice—it is a national imperative. Recent developments have underscored the need for a robust and unified stance to counter India's aggressive posture. From its military maneuvers to its disinformation campaigns on international platforms, India's designs are becoming increasingly clear. To effectively resist these moves, Pakistan must present a consolidated front. That front cannot be built without the inclusion of all major political forces, most notably the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI). PTI remains, by all available metrics, the most popular political party in Pakistan. Its exclusion from the national dialogue or any major decision-making forum creates a vacuum that weakens the democratic and strategic resolve of the country. There can be no meaningful or sustainable unity without PTI on board. This calls for political maturity from all sides and a willingness to prioritize national interests over partisan considerations. In this context, the continued incarceration of former Prime Minister Imran Khan serves as a major impediment to building national consensus. While legal processes must be respected, extraordinary times demand extraordinary decisions. In the larger interest of the country, it may be time to consider his release-not as a concession, but as a necessary step towards national cohesion. As long as he remains behind bars, generating broad-based public support for any potential national security response, including a possible war scenario with India, will remain difficult. An All Parties Conference (APC) is the need of the hour. The government should immediately initiate efforts to bring all political leaders to the table. Differences can be set aside for now; the survival and dignity of the nation must come first. The APC should aim not only to formulate a unified domestic response but also to send a clear signal to the international community: Pakistan stands united. On the diplomatic front, recent steps such as Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar's briefing to foreign envoys are commendable. These efforts must be intensified. Our missions abroad must be activated with renewed urgency and provided with all necessary support to expose India's aggression and misinformation. From Washington to Brussels, and from Beijing to Riyadh, Pakistan's case must be presented with clarity, consistency, and resolve. The world needs to see Pakistan not as a fractured polity, but as a determined, united, and responsible nation defending its sovereignty and regional peace. That image can only be achieved if internal harmony is restored. The time to act is now-before it's too late.

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Encroachments plague Islamabad's G-8 sector

NCE known for its peaceful environment and spacious roads, Sector G-8 in the federal capital has become a hotbed of encroachments, making life miserable for its residents. The unchecked sprawl of illegal car showrooms, makeshift shops, and unauthorized workshops has overtaken footpaths and roads, leaving pedestrians with no choice but to walk on the streets-often at the risk of their safety. Footpaths, meant for pedestrians, are now occupied by commercial setups, while the streets remain choked with double-parked vehicles. Residents have long complained about the lack of parking space near their homes and the worsening traffic situation, but their appeals have largely fallen on deaf ears. Despite occasional operations conducted by the Capital Development Authority (CDA), illegal structures quickly return. According to local sources and eyewitness accounts, a well-established nexus between encroachers and certain officials within the civic body allows this cycle to continue. Allegations of bribery and deliberate inaction are common, with reports suggesting that some CDA enforcement officers warn businesses ahead of scheduled operations. The Islamabad Traffic Police (ITP) also faces criticism for turning a blind eye to growing traffic violations and unauthorized vehicle displays by car dealers. The lack of proactive enforcement has emboldened these illegal outfits to expand further. In stark contrast, the Punjab government has carried out effective anti-encroachment operations in cities like Lahore, Faisalabad, and Rawalpindi. Hundreds of kanals of public land have been reclaimed, and authorities have ensured the encroachments do not reappear. Continuous monitoring, community engagement, and penalties for repeat violators have been key to Punjab's success - a model that Islamabad has yet to emulate. As the capital city, Islamabad should reflect disciplined urban planning and efficient governance. However, the G-8 sector stands as a glaring example of administrative failure, where short-term financial interests overshadow long-term civic responsibility. Car showrooms and workshops-meant to operate in designated commercial zones-are now occupying residential areas, polluting the environment and endangering public safety. In some places, even main road lanes are reduced to single-lane usage due to rampant double-parking. To address this crisis, residents demand a sustained anti-encroachment drive backed by strong political will and administrative transparency. They call for the formation of a dedicated task force empowered to seal repeat violators and equipped with digital tools for public oversight. Collaboration between CDA, ITP, and local communities is essential to restore civic order. The current state of G-8 is not just a local issue but a reflection of a broader systemic decay in urban governance. If Islamabad is to reclaim its image as a model city, decisive and consistent action against encroachments is urgently needed.

Now India waits for a befitting attack from Pak

T 8:24 p.m. in Michigan, a dramatic and dangerous shift unfolded in South Asia's fragile balance. India, in what it called Operation Sindoor, launched 24 long-range missiles targeting eight sites across Pakistan and Pakistan-administered Kashmir. The operation marked a grave escalation, not just militarily but morally and diplomatically. According to Pakistan's Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), all 24 strikes were carried out using missiles—no aircraft entered Pakistani airspace. Lieutenant General Ahmed Sharif Chaudhry, Director General ISPR, revealed that the attacks struck six civilian areas, killing eight people and injuring 33 others, including women and children. Among the targets were Bilal Mosque in Muzaffarabad, Abbas Mosque in Kotli, and a mosque in Muridke. A shell hit Kotli Loharaan near Sialkot, and a public dispensary in Shakargarh sustained structural damage.

India claims the operation was a response to the April 22 terrorist attack in Pahalgam, where 25 Indian citizens and one Nepali national were killed. It accused Lashkar-e-Taiba and Lashkar-e-Jhangvi of masterminding the assault and alleged that the attackers were trained inside Pakistan. Yet to this day, no proof has been provided to any international institution. No forensic evidence, no communication intercepts, no cross-border intelligence sharing-just unilateral claims, swiftly followed by missile strikes. From an analytical viewpoint, India's use of long-range precision-guided missiles, rather than airstrikes, reflects a shift in military doctrine. Likely drawing lessons from the Balakot operation in 2019-when an Indian pilot was captured and an aircraft downed-New Delhi opted for remote strikes. Observational data suggests that the majority of missiles struck their targets, barring two which missed near Kotri and Sialkot. This suggests India has developed substantial accuracy in its missile capabilities through satellite-guided systems. That said, this is an analytical conclusion based on outcomes-not an admission by Pakistani authorities. Yet even this precision cannot obscure the Interestingly-and disturbingly-none of the alleged

Even if governments of Muslim-majority countries refrain from publicly condemning the act due to geopolitical considerations, the general public-the masses from Cairo to Jakarta, from Istanbul to Rabat-will view this as an unforgivable attack on the sanctity of Islam. India has, knowingly or unknowingly, invited the wrath of a global Muslim conscience, which may manifest in diplomatic pressure, grassroots protests, and deteriorating people-to-people perceptions worldwide. India, as the world's largest democracy and an aspiring global power, had both the opportunity and responsibility to demonstrate restraint, logic, and leadership. Positioned strongly in diplomatic forums, with growing international trade and military stature, India should have pursued dialogue, reason, and a multilateral investigation. But instead, it opted for arrogance. It acted impulsively, trigger-happilydriven not by logic but by revenge.

By doing so, India has not only abandoned its claimed mantle of regional wisdom, but it has also strategically and diplomatically lowered itself to the level of a struggling Pakistan. A state that once claimed the high moral ground now finds itself embroiled in tit-for-tat aggression with a neighbor it routinely derides. In its rush to punish, India has equated itself with Pakistan-an outcome that shatters the very image it seeks to project globally. Pakistan, though cornered politically and economically, is now left with no choice but to retaliate. But retaliation need not be symmetrical or reckless. In fact, Pakistan now holds a unique strategic initiative. Among its potential responses is the targeting of India's water infrastructure-specifically, the series of dams constructed on the Jhelum, Chenab, and Indus rivers in Indian-administered Kashmir. These dams have long been used by India as political leverage, threatening to reduce or block Pakistan's water supply. Their destruction would not only neutralize India's coercive potential, but also cripple decades of infrastructure planning. These towering structures, built over many years, could be destroyed in minutes—at a cost India would struggle to recover from for at least another decade. This would be a response that avoids civilian

casualties while delivering maximum strategic effect. Moreover, Pakistan has also long accused India of sponsoring terrorism within its borders-funding separatist militants in Balochistan and aiding TTP factions from Afghan soil. If Pakistan now chooses to strike what it considers Indian-supported militant facilities, it would be simply adopting the very doctrine India used to justify its initial assault. More broadly, this episode marks the arrival of a new kind of conflict. Gone are the days of cross-border skirmishes and air force dogfights. What we now see is unmanned warfare-missiles, drones, AI-guided weapons, and remote targeting. Both India and Pakistan are equipped with these capabilities. And both are capable of devastating strikes that can paralyze strategic assets within minutes-without a single soldier crossing a border. International reactions to the crisis are measured but clearly concerned. U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio posted on X that he is monitoring the situation closely after being briefed by Indian National Security Adviser Ajit Doval. President Donald Trump, speaking at the White House, described the attack as "a shame," adding, "I just hope it ends very quickly." Rubio echoed Trump s sentiment and pledged to remain in contact with both Indian and Pakistani leadership in hopes of securing a peaceful outcome. However, events on the ground suggest escalation. Indian airlines including Air India, IndiGo, and SpiceJet have cancelled or diverted flights to Kashmir and cities near the border, including Amritsar, Jammu, Srinagar, Leh, and Rajkot. Two international flights were rerouted to Delhi. These moves, while subtle, are indicative of India bracing for an anticipated Pakistani strike.

India, for now, waits. Not in triumph, but in growing tension. Pakistan has made it unequivocally clear: a response will come "at a time and place of our choosing." Whether it targets military facilities, economic infrastructure, or strategic dams, the choice lies with Islamabad—and so does the initiative. The coming days will define whether the region sinks into prolonged hostility or retreats into a renewed balance of deterrence. India, by acting rashly and without justification, has not only triggered a strategic crisis—it has humbled itself before the world. By targeting mosques, by avoiding evidence, and by discarding diplomacy, it has chosen war over wisdom. And now, for all its missiles, all its claims, all its declarations—India waits.

State behind the gun: India's growing global terror allegations

NDIA'S involvement in covert operations and alleged terrorism-related activities beyond its borders has increasingly come under global scrutiny. Once considered a regional power primarily concerned with internal security challenges, India now finds itself accused of state-sponsored actions in foreign countries-actions that undermine international norms and threaten diplomatic relations. This growing narrative is no longer confined to adversarial states like Pakistan, but is now echoed by countries such as Canada and even the United States, raising legitimate concerns over the modus operandi of Indian intelligence services. One of the earliest and most consistent accusations against India comes from Pakistan, which has repeatedly highlighted Indian involvement in terrorist activities on its soil. The most striking case was the arrest of Kulbhushan Jadhav, an Indian naval officer apprehended by Pakistan's security forces on 3 March 2016 in Balochistan. Jadhav confessed to being an agent of the Indian intelligence agency RAW (Research and Analysis Wing) and to orchestrating subversive activities in Pakistan, particularly in Balochistan and Karachi. The Indian government initially denied his affiliation with RAW but later acknowledged his identity. The International Court of Justice (ICJ), while staying his execution, did not exonerate him, instead emphasizing the need for consular access and due process, confirming the legitimacy of Pakistan's concerns. Apart from Jadhav, Pakistan has on multiple occasions submitted dossiers to the United Nations and other international bodies, documenting India's alleged sponsorship of terrorism. In November 2020, the Foreign Minister of Pakistan, alongside the Director General of Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), presented a detailed dossier containing audio, video and documentary evidence implicating India in sponsoring banned terrorist outfits such as the Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) and Balochistan Liberation Army (BLA). The dossier also linked Indian consulates in Afghanistan with financial and logistical support for these groups.

What elevates these accusations to a global dimension is the revelation from Canada. On 18 September 2023, Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau made an explosive statement in the House of Commons, alleging the involvement of Indian agents in the killing of Hardeep Singh Nijjar, a Canadian citizen and Sikh separatist leader who was shot dead on 18 June 2023 outside a Gurdwara in Surrey, British Columbia. Trudeau stated that there were "credible allegations" linking Indian government agents to the murder, prompting Canada to expel a senior Indian diplomat. India responded by expelling a Canadian diplomat in retaliation, but the damage to bilateral relations was significant. This marked the first time a Western democracy directly accused India of extraiudicial killings on foreign soil-a practice typically associated with authoritarian regimes.

The seriousness of the Canadian allegations was underlined when, on 29 November 2023, the U.S. Department of Justice unsealed an indictment against an Indian national named Nikhil Gupta for plotting the assassination of Gurpatwant Singh Pannun, another Sikh separatist and U.S. citizen. According to the indictment, Gupta was allegedly recruited by an Indian government employee to arrange the murderfor-hire of Pannun in New York. The U.S. authorities arrested Gupta in the Czech Republic, and the case provided damning insight into India's alleged willingness to carry out extrajudicial killings overseas. The indictment cited encrypted communications, financial transactions, and other surveillance evidence indicating a direct link to Indian state actors. These developments have prompted concerns even within India's traditional allies. A report by The Washington Post on 1 December 2023 stated that multiple Western intelligence agencies were now reassessing India's covert capabilities and intentions. The Guardian and BBC also reported that Five Eyes intelligence-a cooperation alliance among the US, UK, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand-had shared intelligence backing Canada's claims, further legitimizing the accusations. It is also important to highlight that India's extraterritorial activities have drawn criticism from human rights organizations. Human Rights Watch and Amnesty International have both raised alarms over India's pattern of targeting dissidents abroad, citing cases of digital surveillance, threats, and in some instances, mysterious disappearances or killings of expatriate critics of the Indian government.

Such actions by a democratic state raise serious ques-

tions about India's adherence to international law and its role as a responsible global actor. They also have broader implications for the international order. If a state engages in the assassination of foreign citizens or dissidents in democratic countries, it sets a dangerous precedent and undermines global norms of sovereignty and the rule of law. In the context of South Asia, these actions fuel instability and erode trust. In Pakistan, Indian-sponsored terrorism has been a long-standing issue. The 13 December 2014 Army Public School attack in Peshawar, where 149 people including 132 children were brutally murdered, was linked by Pakistani officials to groups allegedly supported by India through Afghan territory. While India has denied such involvement, Pakistan has repeatedly sought international inquiry and oversight into these links, including presenting evidence to the UN Secretary-General and the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC). The accumulation of such credible allegations from multiple countries, supported by intelligence sharing and legal indictments, reflects a troubling trend. A democratic state claiming to be the world's largest democracy cannot afford to be seen as a sponsor of terrorism or extrajudicial killings. These revelations must prompt an international call for accountability and transparency. If substantiated, India must be held to the same standard as any other state violating international laws and norms. The world cannot afford selective justice when it comes to state-sponsored violence.

PSL 10: Rossouw, Hasan power Quetta Gladiators

United's stand-in captain, Salman Ali Agha's decision to bowl first backfired as Gladiators accumulated 263/3 in their allotted 20 overs, courtesy of a marathon 134-run partnership between centurions Rossouw and Nawaz

RAWALPINDI: A commanding all-round display by Quetta Gladiators saw them thrash Islamabad United by a massive 109run margin in the 26th fixture of the Pakistan Super League (PSL) 10 at the Rawalpindi Cricket Stadium on Wednesday. Set a mammoth 264-run target, the defending champions crumbled under pressure and were bundled out for 154 in 19.3 overs, succumbing to their fourth consecutive defeat after an impressive five-match winning streak to start the tournament.

Islamabad's chase got off to a disastrous start as Mohammad Amir struck twice in the opening over, removing both openers - Kyle Mayers for a duck and Sahibzada Farhan for just one - leaving the side reeling at 1/2. Wicketkeeper-batter Muhammad Shahzad tried to rebuild with brief stands alongside acting captain Salman Ali Agha (6) and Mohammad Nawaz, but Wasim Jr removed Shahzad in the fourth over after a brisk 24 off 13 balls, which in-

cluded three boundaries and a six. Mohammad Nawaz departed soon after, scoring 10 off four balls before falling to Khurram Shahzad, triggering a rapid collapse that saw United slump to 68/8 inside nine overs. Imad Wasim and Ben Dwarshuis added a glimmer of resistance with a 55run stand for the ninth wicket. Dwarshuis chipped in with 31 off 24 balls, hitting one four and two sixes, while Imad top-scored with a fighting 56 off 41 balls, striking five



boundaries and two maximums before falling to Wasim Jr in the final over.

Amir was the standout bowler for the Gladiators, taking three wickets for just six runs in his two overs. He was supported by Wasim Jr and Abrar Ahmed, who bagged two each, while Faheem Ashraf, Khurram Shahzad and skipper Saud Shakeel chipped in with one scalp apiece. Earlier, Rilee Rossouw and Hasan Nawaz scored swashbuckling centuries and powered Quetta Gladiators to the highest-ever total in the PSL. nership between centurions Rossouw and Nawaz. Shakeel then shared a brisk 36-run partnership with Rossouw until falling victim to Naseem Shah in the last over of the batting powerplay. The skipper made 23 off 18 deliveries with the help of three boundaries. Following his dismissal, Rossouw joined forces with Hasan, and together they steered Gladiators into a commanding position by adding 134 runs for the second wicket. Rossouw, who was the core aggressor of the crucial stand, was

eventually dismissed by Imad Wasim in the 16th over when the Gladiators were nearing the 200-run mark. The South African batter top-scored for the Gladiators with a 46-ball 104, studded with 20 boundaries, including six sixes. Nawaz, on the other hand. batted until the end and made a significant contribution with an unbeaten 100 off 45 deliveries, comprising nine fours and four sixes. The middle-order batter was involved in another crucial partnership for the Gladiators when he added 69 runs for the fourth wicket with Mark Chapman, who made 13 not out from eight deliveries.

Lebanon state media say series of Israeli strikes hit south

BEIRUT: Lebanese official media said Israel conducted heavy air strikes on the south on Thursday, the latest raids despite a fragile November ceasefire between Israel and Hezbollah. The state-run NNA said "Israeli warplanes carried out a wide-scale aerial aggression on the Nabatiyeh region, launching a series of heavy raids in two waves" targeting hills and valleys in the area, located around 12 kilometres (seven miles) from the border. It said "huge explosions... echoed in most areas of Nabatiyeh and the south", causing "terror and panic" among residents, who rushed to pick up their children from school, as ambulances headed to the targeted areas. An AFP photographer saw smoke rising from hills in the region. "We heard a loud strike, about 10 consecutive blows," said Jamal Sabbagh, a 29-year-old doctor who was giving schoolchildren health checks near the city of Nabatiyeh. "Some of the children were scared and there was panic, the teachers were also frightened," he told AFP.

Senegal MPs to weigh graft cases against ex-ministers

DAKAR: Senegalese lawmakers will weigh on Thursday whether to allow several former ministers to faces charges before a special court over accusations they embezzled funds meant for the country's fight against Covid. Senegal's National Assembly last Friday lifted parliamentary immunity for two opposition MPs caught up in the allegations while serving in the nation's last government. Proceedings of this type are rare in the west African county and cases against former ministers in the exercise of their duties must be authorised by lawmakers. Moustapha Diop was industrial development minister while Salimata Diop was the women's affairs minister under former president Macky Sall when the fund to fight the spread of Covid-19 was established in 2020-21. Both have rejected accusations they misappropriated any of the money, which totalled one trillion CFA francs (\$1.7 billion). The

funds were intended to reinforce the healthcare system, support households and the private sector and protect jobs in the west African nation during the pandemic. However, a December 2022 Court of Auditors report revealed ir-

regularities, such as 2.7 billion CFA francs in over-invoicing of rice purchased for disadvantaged households and some 42 million CFA francs for sanitiser. The new national assembly is controlled by the ruling party of President

Bassirou Diomaye Faye, elected in March last year. Faye has made the fight against corruption a policy priority and has launched investigations into the administration of Sall, who was president from 2012 for 12 years. The three

other former ministers accused are Amadou Mansour Faye, also the former president's brother-inlaw, Aissatou Sophie Gladima and Ismaila Madior Fall. Several prominent figures, including artists, broadcasters, fashion designers, as well as senior officials, have been questioned during an investigation which the opposition has slammed as a "witch hunt". Parliament lifted immunity for Moustapha Diop and Salimata Diop last Friday as they were elected as lawmakers in November after Sall left office. Lawmakers are set to meet from 1000 GMT to examine the case. A three-fifths majority of the 165 lawmakers is required for the adoption of each draft resolution, with voting by secret ballot. The accused could then face questioning from the High Court's investigative committee, which will decide whether or not to commit them for trial. The court's final decision is not subject to appeal. - Agencies

Syria had bought about 100,000 tons of wheat in its previous tender reported on March 25, which was believed to be the first large purchase tender since the change of power in Syria late last year. But the donation by Iraq of 220,000 tons of wheat to Syria was expected to be used for Syria's immediate import requirements, traders said.—APP

German spy agency pauses 'extremist' classification for AfD party

BERLIN: Germany's domestic spy agency BfV has paused its classification of the Alternative for Germany (AfD) as an extremist organization in what the AfD on Thursday called a partial victory for its challenge against the decision The agency would not publicly refer to the AfD as a "confirmed right-wing extremist movement" until an administrative court in the western city of Cologne has ruled on an AfD bid for an injunction, a court statement said. The BfV's move last week to classify the farright AfD as extremist pro duced sharp reactions along the fault lines of German politics, with some lawmakers calling for the AfD to be banned and the AfD casting it as an attack on democracy. It also sparked strong criticism from US President Donald Trump's administration, with Secretary of State Marco Rubio calling on the German authorities to reverse their decision. The extremist classification allows the Cologne-based spy agency to step up monitoring of the AfD, for example by recruiting informants and intercepting party communications.-APP

Gates to give away fortune by 2045, \$200bn for world's poorest

Bill Gates LONDON: pledged on Thursday to give away almost his entire personal wealth in the next two decades and said the world's poorest would receive some \$200 billion via his foundation at a time when governments worldwide are slashing international aid. The 69-yearold billionaire Microsoft co-founder and philanthropist said he was speeding up plans to divest his fortune and close the Gates Foundation on Dec. 31, 2045, "People will say a lot of things about me when I die, but I am determined that 'he died rich' will not be one of them," Gates wrote in a post on his website. "There are too many urgent problems to solve for me to hold onto resources that could be used to help people." In an implicit rebuke to President Donald Trump's slashing of aid from the world's biggest donor the United States, Gates' statement said he wanted to help stop newborn babies, children and mothers dying of preventable causes, end diseases like polio, malaria and measles, and reduce poverty. "It's unclear whether the world's richest countries will continue to stand up for its poorest people," he added, noting cuts from major donors also including the UK and France. Gates said that despite the foundation's deep pockets, progress would not be possible without government support. He praised the response to aid cuts in Africa, where some governments have reallocated budgets, but said that as an example polio would not be eradicated without

US funding.-APP

TEHRAN: Iran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi rejected on Thursday allegations his government was involved in a plot to target the Israeli embassy in London, following the arrest of seven Iranian nationals. British police said seven Iranian nationals were arrested on suspicion of "terrorism offences" in separate operations - three on Saturday and four on Sunday. Britain's interior minister Yvette Cooper said the arrests came amid heightened concerns about Iranian activities. The Times newspaper reported that the arrests followed an lleged plot to target the Israeli embassy in London, but officials have not commented. "Iran in no uncertain terms categorically rejects any involvement in such actions and confirms that we have not been informed of any allegations via proper diplomatic channels," said Araghchi in a post on X. "Iran has urged the UK to engage so that we may assist any probe into credible allegations," he added, noting that the "timing and lack of engagement suggest that something is amiss," without elaborating. Emirates airline group announces record \$6.2b gross profit

DUBAI:Dubai's Emirates

Group, which includes the Middle East's biggest airline, announced on Thursday gross annual profit of \$6.2 billion, its third record in three years. The 18 percent rise in profit, based on strong customer demand, slimmed to \$5.6 billion after the UAE's recently introduced corporate tax, which was applied for a full financial year for the first time. "The Emirates Group has raised the bar to set new records for profit, revenue and cash assets, chairman Sheikh Ahmed bin Saeed Al Maktoum said in a statement. The group invested \$3.8 billion in new aircraft, infrastructure and technology "to support its growth plans", the statement said. Its workforce grew by 9 percent to an unprecedented 121,223 employees. The group declared a \$1.6 billion dividend to its owner, the Investment Corporation of Dubai (ICD). Emirates airline, excluding the group's other businesses, posted a record \$5.8 billion pre-tax profit, up 20 percent from the year before. Its revenue grew by 6 percent, reaching \$34.9 billion. Emirates' ground services arm Dnata also boasted a record pretax profit of \$430 million, up 2 percent from last year. State-owned Emirates Group operates the world's largest long-haul carrier.—APPWW

Lebanon's tourism hopes rise as ties with Arab Gulf states warm

BEIRUT: At the boutique hotel of Albergo in Achrafieh, Beirut, a large table of Gulf citizens sat having breakfast last week as a waitress attended to them. This once-common sight had become a rarity in recent years, making the moment particularly significant for the staff. "We haven't seen this in years," the waitress told Arab News. "We are expecting more reservations to come through and more Gulf citizens to be staying with us this summer." For the first time in many years, Lebanese hoteliers, restaurant and shop owners and retailers are hoping for a successful tourism comeback. The latest piece of good news came when the UAE Ministry of Foreign Affairs announced last Sunday that the ban on Emirati citizens traveling to Lebanon would be lifted from May 7. Once a favored summer destination hub for Gulf and neighboring Arabs, Lebanon had been struck by one misfortune after another since the 2006 Israeli-Hezbollah war. Despite a relatively calm decade afterward, the 2020 port explosion followed by a devastating economic collapse and the growing power of Iran-backed Hezbollah had left the country in tatters. Rampant corruption and Hezbollah's powerful presence soured the once warm Lebanese-Gulf relations. In 2021, both Saudi and Emirati citizens were banned from traveling to the country after a Lebanese minister criticized Arab Gulf intervention on the side of the UN-backed Yemen government against the Houthis, another Iran-backed militia. The Kingdom also halted all its fruit and vegetable imports from Lebanon in the same year after shipments were found to be carrying the illicit Captagon drug smuggled inside. With the devastating blows suffered by Hezbollah and allied militant groups last year during their war with Israel, the tide appears to be turning. The deaths of Hassan Nasrallah and other important Hezbollah figures and a stunning pager attack, which left thousands of its fighters and supporters immobile if not dead, have significantly weakened the once-powerful militia that had Lebanon in a prolonged chokehold. The new Lebanese government, headed by President Joseph Aoun, seems determined to usher the country into a new era, going as far as removing flags and symbols of the militant group. Although the fate of international aid still hangs in the balance, structural and economic changes are expected of the new Lebanese government, alongside the full disarmament of Hezbollah. According to the World Bank, during the 14-month Israeli-Hezbollah war that started shortly after the events of October 7, 2023, and the war in Gaza, the estimated damage and economic loss in Lebanon stands at \$14 billion, with the country needing \$11 billion for reconstruction. Arab world policies, particularly from the Arab Gulf states, seem to be softening. In March, Saudi Arabia announced it would review "obstacles" to resuming Lebanese imports and ending the ban on its citizens visiting Lebanon. This announcement came after President Aoun met Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman in Riyadh on his first trip abroad since taking office in January. The UAE's loosening of restrictions on travel to Lebanon followed a meeting between President Aoun and UAE President Mohammed bin Zayed in Abu Dhabi last week. "This decision confirms the return of confidence in Lebanon and opens the door to developing the historical ties that unite the two countries," Laura Al-Khazen Lahoud, Lebanon's minister of tourism, said. She expressed hope that "the remaining Gulf Cooperation Council countries will follow the UAE's step the soonest possible, so that Lebanon can once again become a destination for its Arab brothers and a center for tourism and cultural activity in the region."-DNA

Bangladesh, Saudi Arabia hold meeting on defense coop

DHAKA: Saudi Arabia and Bangladesh held the first meeting of their Joint Committee on Defense Cooperation, as Dhaka seeks to strengthen its security ties with the Kingdom. Mai. Gen. Mohammed Ibrahim Al-Khalidi, assistant chief of training and development of the Armed Forces of Saudi Arabia, was in Dhaka to lead a Saudi delegation for the three-day talks, which concluded on Thursday. The Bangladeshi side was led by Lt. Gen. S.M. Kamrul Hassan, principal staff officer of Bangladesh's Armed Forces Division during the discussion. "This is ... the first time that Bangladesh held a Joint Committee Defense Cooperation meeting with Saudi Arabia," Lt. Colonel Sami-Ud-Dowla Chowdhury, director of Bangladeshi military's media wing ISPR, told Arab News. "Both countries have signed a protocol on Thursday aimed at proceeding further with the discussions held on Tuesday in Dhaka." The Saudi-Bangladesh defense cooperation covers several areas, including joint exercises, arms procurement, indigenous production capability and expertise sharing, Chowdhury said. "With this, Bangladesh developed a defense-to-defense relation with one of our very trusted friends, Saudi Arabia. And definitely, it will open up a new horizon for increased defence cooperation.-APP

Romania contributes 23 percent of agricultural workforce in EU

BUCHAREST: Romania is one of the most important countries in the European agricultural sector, considering that 23% of the total agricultural workforce in the EU, 1.77 million jobs, is concentrated here - the largest share in the Union, according to a recently launched profile report. Romania owns approximately a third of all farms in the EU, although 90% of them are under five hectares, meaning they are subsistence farms. Impact Hub Bucharest (EIT Food representative in Romania), in partnership with Startarium, launched the fourth edition of the report on Romanian AgriFood startups, which provides a comprehensive analysis of the ecosystem: 'Romanian AgriFood Startups Overview Report 2024.' The initiative is part of the series of preparatory events within the Empowering Women in Agrifood (EWA), dedicated to female entrepreneurs and projects created by them in the agrifood field. Empowering Women in Agrifood is an accelerator programme developed by EIT Food, the world's largest food innovation community. EIT Food is supported by the European Institute of Innovation and Technology (EIT), a body of the European Union. According to the same report, agriculture continues to be a key sector for both the Romanian and European Union economies, despite a constantly decreasing contribution to GDP and an increasingly low profitability. The research shows that Romania is one of the most important countries in the European agricultural sector, considering that 23% of the total agricultural workforce in the EU is concentrated here (1.77 million jobs - the highest share in the Union). Also, 44.3% of farmers are over 65 years old, which highlights an acute problem regarding the aging of the workforce. An interesting fact revealed in the analysis is the percentage of women working in agriculture in Romania, 19% in 2021, the highest in the EU, the abovementioned document states. In 2023, when the available data was collected, there were 73 FoodTech and AgriTech startups in Romania. During 2018-2023, there were 18 rounds of financing attracted, of which 14 million euros for the FoodTech sector and four rounds worth 1.6 million euros for the AgriTech sector. In addition, according to the report, the level of digitalisation in Romanian farms is low, although the use of advanced technologies such as sensors, drones, satellite imaging or artificial intelligence would significantly increase the profitability of the sector. -Agencies

PM's Coordinator, Kazakh envoy discuss trade, connectivity, regional coop

ISLAMABAD: Ambassador of Kazakhstan to Pakistan, Yerzhan Kistafin, called on Rana Ihsaan Afzal Khan, Coordinator to the Prime Minister on Commerce, in Islamabad Thursday to discuss avenues for strengthening economic ties to enhance regional cooperation between the two countries. During the meeting, both sides emphasized the importance of enhancing bilateral trade and regional connectivity, said a press release issued here. Rana Ihsaan Afzal Khan underscored Pakistan's commitment to transforming its historically cordial relations with Kazakhstan into a comprehensive economic partnership, for the mutual benefit of both nations. The Ambassador highlighted total trade between the two countries reached \$172.5 million in 2023-24, with Pakistan's exports to Kazakhstan

visa facilitation for business delegates were also discussed. Rana Ihsaan Afzal Khan welcomed the initiatives and expressed Pakistan's readiness to advance mutual trade interests and support regional economic integration, especially in the context of Central Asia's access to global markets through Pakistan. Fed sees rising risks to economy as it leaves rates unchanged

With so much unsettled about what Trump will decide "scope, scale of those effects very uncertain," says Powell

WASHINGTON: The Federal Reserve held interest rates steady on Wednesday but said the risks of higher inflation and unemployment had risen, further clouding the US economic outlook as its policymakers grapple with the impact of President Donald Trump's tariffs. At this point, Fed Chair Jerome Powell said, it isn't clear if the economy will continue its steady pace of growth, or wilt under mounting uncertainty and a possible coming spike in inflation.

With so much unsettled about what Trump will ultimately decide and what of that survives possible court and political battles, "the scope, the scale, the persistence of those effects are very, very uncertain,' Powell said in a press conference at the end of a twoday policy meeting. "So it's not at all clear what the appropriate response for monetary policy is at this time ... It's really not at all clear

what it is we should do.' "I don't think we can say which way this will shake out." It was Powell's subtle way of saying the US central bank, a key actor in shaping the economy, was effectively sidelined until Trump's sweeping policy agenda takes full effect.

ISLAMABAD: At a Regional Dialogue 2025, hosted by the Institute of Regional Studies (IRS), former Defence Minister Engr. Khurram Dastgir warned about the potential escalation between the two nuclear powers. His warning came at a time when two nuclear powers were engaged in a military conflict following the tragic event of Pahalgam. Ambassador Abdul Basit, the former High Commissioner to India, emphasized that regional connectivity cannot be realized unless conflicting bilateral issues, especially those with India, are addressed. He called for a thorough and

honest analysis of Indian strategic thinking to help create realistic and forward-looking policy responses. Highlighting the Kashmir dispute, he warned that the issue is becoming increasingly complex and continues to threaten regional peace and stability. Veteran journalist and DAWN anchor Ms. Arifa Noor noted that Pakistan's approach towards India has often been tactical rather than strategic. She argued that India's anti-Pakistan rhetoric is rooted in broader anti-Muslim narratives. She also criticized Pakistan's media landscape for failing to create space for active foreign policy debates and for not engaging Indian critics of the Modi government, which weakens Pakistan's counter-narrative.

Senator Javed Jabbar, a former Information Minister, emphasized the significant role of the Indian military in shaping New Delhi's foreign policy. He warned that "no diplomatic overture or troop movement occurs without military approval." Defending Track-II diplomacy, he stated, "It is not a betrayal; it is a patriotic platform where dedicated nationalists engage to prevent conflict and preserve dialogue." However, he also asserted that the "virus of Hindutva has infected the Indian psyche," and even if the Congress party were to win, he believes there wouldn't be much change. Mr. Hamid Mir, a senior anchorperson at GEO News, rejected the approach of

track two diplomacy with India, calling it a deceptive strategy. He argued that Pakistan's survival, rather than just the issue of Kashmir, is central to India's long-term strategic posture, which he linked to the ideological pursuit of 'Akhand Bharat.' Mr. Hamid emphasized that all policies toward India should be based on constitutional principles and supported by full parliamentary consensus.

The PAA first announced closure of the airports till 12pm today, then the period of closure was extended till 6pm. According to the PAA, flight operations were temporarily suspended due to operational reasons. The authority took the decision amid heightened threats of India's forces trespassing in the Pakistani airspace. Initial gains wiped out as security concerns grip PSX

NAZIR SIYAL KARACHI: Initial optimism faded on Thursday as the capital market witnessed a sharp intraday reversal, with investors turning riskaverse amid signs that the security situation between Pakistan and India could worsen before stabilising. The wave of panic selling drove the market sharply lower, triggering a regulatory circuit-breaker. The Pakistan Stock Exchange's (PSX) benchmark KSE-100 Index had earlier rallied to an intraday high of 111,881.02 points, up 1,872.00 points, or 1.70%, from the previous close of 110,009.02. However, the index nosedived to a low of 101,598.90 points 8,410.12 points, or -7.64%, as investors rushed to exit positions. The broader KSE-30 Index dropped more than 5% from its previous close, triggering a market-wide halt at 12:34:15pm under PSX Regulations.

North Korea fires flurry of ballistic missiles

SEOUL: North Korea fired multiple types of shortrange ballistic missiles Thursday, South Korea's military said, around a week after leader Kim Jong Un tested a new weapons system for his latest warship. Seoul's military said it had "detected the launch of various types of short-range ballistic missiles," the Joint Chiefs of Staff said. The missiles were "fired from the Wonsan area of North Korea into the East Sea between approximately 08:10 and 09:20 today (from 2310 GMT Wednesday)," they added, referring to the body of water also known as the Sea of Japan. – **Agencies**

Access to jailed Istanbul mayor's X account blocked

ISTANBUL: Turkish authorities on Thursday blocked access to the social media account of Istanbul's jailed opposition mayor Ekrem Imamoglu, who has nearly 10 million followers on X. Imamoglu, who was detained on March 19 on corruption charges he strongly denies, is seen as the biggest rival to longtime leader President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. The arrest could stop Imamoglu taking part in presidential elections scheduled for 2028.

It was not possible to access to his X account on Thursday morning. A message read: "Account Withheld - @ekrem_imamoglu has been withheld in TR (Turkey) in response to a legal demand." A spokesperson for the Istanbul municipality confirmed access to the account was blocked, without giving further details. Watchdog group EngelliWeb, which reports Internet censorship and blocked web sites in Turkey, said on X that access to Imamoglu's account had been blocked on national security grounds. The account "has been blocked under Article 8/A of Law No. 5651, on the grounds of protecting national security and public order, and has been made invisible in Turkey by X", it said. Yaman Akdeniz, a law professor and head of Turkey's Freedom of Expression Association (IFOD), said the details of the blocking order had not been revealed vet, but added: "Through our EngelliWeb project we detected the existence of an article 8/A

order." "This means that the arbitrary order was issued to protect national security and public order. Unfortunately, I am not surprised as hundreds of accounts have been subject to such orders since Imamoglu's arrest," he told AFP. "X has officially become the long arm of the Turkish law enforcement agencies," he said. Lawyer Gonenc Gurkaynak said he would object to the court order. "Regarding the court decision imposing an access restriction on Mr Ekrem Imamoglu's account on X, upon X's request and in my capacity as X's independent attorney, I will be filing an objection application this morning at the relevant court, comprehensively presenting all legal grounds for our objections on this matter," he said on his social media account. In a show of solidarity with Imamoglu, some X users replaced their profile pictures with the Istanbul mayor's. On his last message on X, Imamoglu, who is jailed in Silivri prison on the outskirts of Istanbul, had urged his supporters to join a protest rally held Wednesday, which was called by his CHP party. Tens of thousands of people took part in the

Istanbul rally, one of the biggest in recent weeks. In the days after Imamoglu's arrest, tens of thousands of people took part in near-daily protests. But numbers had dwindled in recent weeks. Wednesday's protest was held outside Istanbul University, which had stripped Imamoglu of his degree the day before his arrest. - Agencies

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
