Glacier burst wreaks havoc in GB's Ghizer

GB authorities confirm widespread damage but no loss of life has been reported so far

GILGIT: A glacial lake outburst in Gilgit Baltistan's (GB) Ghizer district has once again unleashed flooding and caused widespread destruction, leading to the creation of artificial lake, officials said on Friday. GB government spokesperson Faizullah Firaq confirmed that the glacier burst at Tali Das in the Gupis area of Ghizer triggered flooding and destruction. He said that multiple villages were submerged, causing severe financial losses. However, no loss of human life has been reported yet. According to the district administration, landslides have completely blocked the Gilgit-Shandur Road. Landslides occurred from two directions in the Tali Das stream, cutting off the Raushan village.

Ghizer's additional deputy commissioner reported that a landslide in Raushan, Tali Das, had completely blocked the flow of the Ghizer River since 3am, with more communities being affected by the floodwater. However, timely warnings to residents ensured that no lives were lost. GB Home Minister Shams Lone said that although the flood had caused devastation in Ghizer once again, no loss of life had been reported so far. He added that reports had emerged of some people being stranded, for which helicopters had been requested. A Force Command Northern Areas commander has already dispatched a helicopter on an emergency basis for rescue efforts. Meanwhile, the government spokesperson said that over 50 people have been rescued so far. He said the glacier outburst has blocked the river flow in the region, causing water to back up and form a large lake, putting nearby settlements at risk of submergence. He also confirmed that

Heavy Rains Expected in North Pakistan Aug 23–27

ISLAMABAD: Deputy Director Meteorological Department Anjum Nazeer Zaigham on Friday advised the public to remain vigilant as heavy rainfall is expected in Gilgit-Baltistan, Kashmir, and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa from August 23 to 27, with light to moderate showers likely in central Punjab, southern Sindh and other regions. In an exclusive interview, a senior meteorologist stated that several vulnerable areas across the country are expected to receive heavy to moderate rainfall from August 23 to 27. The regions most likely to be affected include Gilgit-Baltistan, Kashmir and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, where continuous downpours may increase the risk of flash floods and landslides, experts said. The meteorologist also warned of isolated light rain events in Karachi during the same period, which could lead to urban flooding in low-lying areas. Authorities have been urged to stay alert and take precautionary measures to minimize the impact of the expected weaththe GB chief minister was personally monitoring the situation. er system, especially in disaster-prone zones.



May 9: Imran Khan's another nephew arrested

Shahrez Khan given to police for 8-day remand in Jinnah House attack case

LAHORE: Another son of Aleem Khan, sister of PTI founder Imran Khan, was on Friday arrested in connection with May 9 riots case in Lahore, the SSP Investigation said. Without providing further details the SSP investigation said the matter was under investigation. The development came only a day after jailed Imran's nephew Shahrez Khan was arrested in Jinnah Attack House case related to the May 9 violence – a reference to the riots that broke out in the country following the arrest of PTI founder in a corruption case in 2023. The PTI, on its official X handle, said that after Shahraiz, Aleema Khan's other son, Shershah, "has also been abducted".

Earlier today, an anti-terrorism court (ATC) in Lahore approved an eight-day physical remand of Shahrez Khan in connection with the May 9 Jinnah House attack case. The court had earlier reserved its verdict on a police plea seeking a 30-day remand of Shahrez, who had been arrested on Wednesday night. ATC Judge Manzar

Ali Gul announced the order after hearing arguments from both sides.

During the proceedings, Advocate Salman Akram Raja, who represented the suspect, argued that his client had been arrested two years after the Jinnah House attack. He told the court that Shahrez's mother, Aleema, had already been discharged from the same case and urged that the suspect should also be discharged.

Raja further questioned the police, asking what evidence they had against his client, maintaining that Shahrez had no connection with PTI's political affairs. He again pressed the court to drop the charges against his client. Police, however, opposed the request, saying that the suspect was involved in the Jinnah House attack in Lahore. Deputy Superintendent of Police (DSP) Asif Javed presented the case record in court, affirming the suspect's role in the incident. After hearing arguments from both sides, the court reserved its decision on the request for physical remand, announcing that the verdict would be

Govt announces food package for flood affectees

The chief minister directed authorities to prepare cheques by Friday afternoon for immediate disbursement of food package payments adding that each affected family will receive Rs15,000, which will be transferred through mobile banking

PESHAWAR: The provincial government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has announced a food package of Rs.15, 000 for each flood affected family in various district of the province.

This was announced during a meeting held here with Chief Minister Ali Amin Gandapur in the chair. The meeting reviewed relief and rehabilitation activities in flood-affected districts of the province.

The meeting was attended via video link by deputy commissioners from Buner, Swat, Shangla, Mansehra, Battagram, Lower Dir, Bajaur, Swabi and Tank, along with the chief secretary and other senior officials. Officials briefed the chief minister

He said that compensation for fully destroyed houses had been increased from Rs. 400,000 to Rs1.00 million, while partially damaged homes would now receive Rs 300,000 instead of Rs100,000, and added that the losses of livestock would also be compensated.

He said that for livestock losses, Rs 500 million have been allocated to the Livestock Department to provide both fodder for livestock in the affected areas.

Gandapur also instructed officials to give special attention to the affectees of Bajaur saying that voluntarily displaced families there should also be provided the Rs15, 000 food package. He further directed that surveys of losses in Tank, Dera Ismail Khan and South Waziristan be started immediately.

The chief minister said that owners of vehicles swept away by floods would be compensated Rs 500,000 per vehicle, and a case to this end would be presented to the cabinet for approval.

He also ordered district administrations to make full preparations for the expected second spell of monsoon rains, including precautionary measures in vulnerable areas.

Populations at risk from glacial lake outburst floods (GLOFs) in Upper Chitral and Upper Swat should be temporarily relocated to safer places, he said, while tourists in those regions should also be restricted to secure zones.-APP

IPP calls for creation of new provinces

ISLAMABAD: kam-e-Pakistan Party (IPP) has formally called for the creation of new provinces in the country, aimed at improving governance, public service delivery and overall administrative structure.

According to the statement issued on Friday after the Party meeting, it has been proposed that the existing four provinces may be divided further into three administrative regions each North, South, and Central.

It has been mentioned that the current identity and name of the provinces can be retained as well. This step, the Party asserts, is essential to address the growing population and modern governance challenges more effectively. In a Party meeting chaired by IPP President & Federal Minister Abdul Aleem Khan, this demand has surfaced in the larger public interest. The meeting was attended by Minister of State Aun Chaudhry, Punjab President Rana Nazir Ahmed Khan, along with other senior office bearers and Members of the Assembly.

Talking in this regard, IPP President Abdul Aleem Khan emphasized that the rapid population growth has made the establishment of new provinces unavoidable. He said this initiative will bring

Government services closer to the masses, enabling state institutions to perform their duties more effectively.

ISLAMABAD: Once perched majestically atop Pir Sohawa, Monal Restaurant stood as one of Islamabad's most iconic landmarks. Over the years, it became more than just a dining place—it was a symbol of Pakistan's hospitality and natural beauty. Tourists from across the globe, diplomats, and locals flocked to Monal to enjoy its scenic views, authentic cuisine, and the experience of dining above the clouds. For many, it was a proud showcase of Pakistan's

cultural richness. However, the closure of Monal by former Chief Justice Qazi Faez Isa drastically changed the fate of this hilltop gem. The Supreme Court, at the time, declared the establishment illegal, citing that it had been built on protected Margalla National Park land. While the court's order may have been rooted in environmental concerns, the aftermath has shocked and saddened many. Today, the very space once associated with family gatherings, celebrations, and international tourism has reportedly transformed into a hub of

obscenity and immorality. Videos and accounts circulating on social media suggest that the abandoned premises are being misused for nude dances, vulgar shows, and activities that not only degrade the sanctity of the site but also tarnish Islamabad's cultural and moral image. This tragic transformation has sparked anger and dismay among citizens. "When Monal was functioning, it was a symbol of pride. Families felt safe, and foreigners left with a positive image of Pakistan. Now, it has become the opposite—a shameful spectacle,"

says one concerned resident. Critics argue that while the intention behind shutting down Monal may have been to protect the environment, the decision lacked foresight. Instead of preserving the land or repurposing it for constructive use, the closure has created a vacuum, allowing immoral activities to flourish unchecked.

The irony is stark: a place once known for bringing together families and promoting tourism has now become associated with obscenity. This has raised serious questions about governance, enforcement,

and the consequences of decisions made without considering ground realities. Islamabad, known for its serene beauty and cultural modesty, cannot afford to let such degradation continue. The authorities must act swiftly—either by reclaiming and rehabilitating the site or by establishing strict oversight to ensure that the area does not remain a breeding ground for moral and social decay. The story of Monal should serve as a cautionary tale: without vision, even the most cherished landmarks can fall into ruin, leaving behind only regret and embarrassment.

Rising enrollments put

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad's public schools are under growing strain due to rising enrollment from an increasing population and a preference for government schools, though officials acknowledge the challenge and cite ongoing efforts to expand facilities According to the Federal Directorate of Education (FDE), around 423 public schools and colleges cater to more than 200,000 students in the capital. With Islamabad's population growing from about 800,000 in 1998 to more than 2 million by now, many classrooms now accommodate 40 or more students, against the international benchmark of 30 students per class. Parents say the trend reflects both financial realities and trust in public institutions. "Private schools are charging up to Rs. 30,000 a month. For families like ours, government schools are the only choice. At least our children get proper teachers and basic facilities here," said Nadeem Khan, a parent from G-9. Another parent, Saima Bibi from I-8, noted that while teachers are hardworking, overcrowded classrooms make it difficult for weaker students to receive adequate attention, urging authorities to open more sections in such schools." The government's introduction of a school bus service under the Prime Minister's Education Reforms Programme has also played a role in increased enrollments. In 2017, the FDE received 200 buses, with 70 handed over in the final tranche. Although some were initially idle due to staffing or budget gaps, over 90% have since been made functional, including a dedicated "Pink Bus Service" operating 22 buses specifically for the pick-and-drop of students and staff.

"Earlier, I could not afford daily transport for my children. Now, with the school bus, I send all three without worrying about safety or cost," said Muhammad Imran, a father from Bhara Kahu. Officials acknowledge that this boost in accessibility, which is a success in promoting attendance, has also indirectly added pressure on already crowded classrooms.—APP

UNDP concerned over devastating floods

ISLAMABAD: The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is deeply saddened by the tragic loss of life and widespread destruction caused by the recent floods across Pakistan. Relief efforts have already saved countless lives, but urgent needs remain acute. In response, UNDP has provided emergency relief items to assist flood-affected families in the hardest-hit regions of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP). These supplies include 180 tents, 103 stretchers, 230 sleeping bags, 130 floodlights and 53 first aid kits, among other essentials. In close coordination with Provincial Disaster Management Authority and the Planning and Development Department KP, the relief items are being dispatched to Nowshera, where PDMA will distribute them to communities based on immediate needs.

CDA chief for optimal cleanliness system, modernizing SWM

ISLAMABAD: An important meeting was held at the CDA Headquarters chaired by Chairman CDA and Chief Commissioner Islamabad, Muhammad Ali Randhawa, regarding establishing an optimal cleanliness system and modernizing solid waste management in Islamabad. The meeting was attended by CDA Member Administration and Estate Talat Mahmood, Member Engineering Syed Nafasat Raza, Member Planning Dr. Khalid Hafiz and Member Environment Esfandyar Baloch along with the Director General P&C, Director Solid Waste Management, Project Director Solid Waste Management and other senior officers. The meeting reviewed the solid waste management system in both urban and rural areas of Islamabad. During the briefing, it was briefed that Islamabad has been divided into two separate packages. The first package will cover sectors and urban areas, including Zones 1, 2, and 3, while the second package will comprise rural areas, including Zones 4 and 5. The meeting was briefed that a two-bin system will be introduced in residential areas. Chairman CDA Muhammad Ali Randhawa directed that a three-bin system be implemented in markazs and commercial areas after conducting a feasibility study. Chairman CDA further directed to expedite the process of formal bid invitations. The meeting also included a detailed discussion on the criteria for selecting solid waste management companies. Chairman CDA emphasized that the bidding process must be entirely transparent, merit-based, and open-competitive to enable maximum participation from high-quality national.—DNA

Pa receives \$208m net FDI in July, China tops with 25% share

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan received \$208.1 million in net foreign direct investment (FDI) in July 2025, the first month of the ongoing financial year 2025-26, with China emerging as the leading investor, Gwadar Pro reported on Friday quoting the latest data released by the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP). China contributed \$51.5 million in net FDI, accounting for 24.7 percent of the total inflows. The gross inflows from China stood at \$89 million, but an outflow of \$37.6 million brought the net figure down to \$51.5 million. Other major contributors in July included Canada (\$37.8 million), Hong Kong (\$30.1 million), Switzerland (\$20.6 million), the United Arab Emirates (\$19.7 million), the United Kingdom (\$16.9 million), Singapore (\$9.1 million), and the United States which recorded a modest \$3.6 million. The remaining investment came from other partner countries. During the previous fiscal year 2024-25. Pakistan received a total of \$2.46 billion in FDI, of which nearly half (49.9%) came from China, amounting to \$1.22 billion.

This was almost double the \$643.2 million net investment received from Beijing in FY 2023-24, underscoring China's growing role as Pakistan's single largest investor.

Deforestation worsening Pak's floods, experts cite lessons from China

ISLAMABAD: The recent monsoon floods, which have claimed more than 300 lives across Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Gilgit-Baltistan, and Azad Kashmir, have once again underscored Pakistan's severe vulnerability to climate change. According to Gwadar Pro, experts warn that rampant deforestation is amplifying the destruction caused by heavy rains and flash floods. "The trees that once held the mountains together are gone. Every year the floods get worse," said Shazia Bibi, a farmer from Azad Kashmir whose fields were washed away this season. Official figures confirm the trend. Pakistan's forest cover has fallen from 3.78 million hectares in 1992 to just 3.09 million hectares in 2025, leaving only five percent of total land under forests, the lowest in South Asia. In Azad Kashmir, forest cover dropped from 46 percent in 2000 to 39 percent in 2020, a decline directly linked to worsening floods and landslides. "Deforestation is dismantling Pakistan's first line of defense against floods," said Dr. Pervaiz Amir, a senior environmental economist. "The cost in human lives and economic damage is far greater than any short-term gains from logging or land use." By contrast, China has emerged as a global leader in afforestation and flood management. Since 2012, it has planted over 66 million hectares of trees, raising forest coverage above 25 percent and contributing nearly one-quarter of the world's new forests. Environmentalist Professor Ma Jun described the effort as "strategic,-APP

EU, UN Women, and FJA advance gender-responsive policy

ISLAMABAD - Through funds provided by the European Union, UN Women Pakistan, in partnership with the Federal Judicial Academy, successfully concluded a three-day Training of Trainers (ToT) on Gender-Responsive Policing. The initiative was made possible through the EU-financed Deliver Justice Project The training empowered 27 police instructors -9 men and 18 women -from Balochistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and NACTA to integrate gender-responsive practices, standardize gender-based violence (GBV) training, and promote survivor-centered approaches. It also positioned the Federal Judicial Academy as a national coordination hub for gender-responsive policing. "This initiative makes clear that gender-responsive policing is not a standalone effort," said Ms. Jacqui Ketunuti Deputy Country Representative, UN Women Pakistan. "It is part of a systemic shift where police, prosecutors, judiciary, and social services must work in unison to build survivor trust and ensure justice. With the EU's strategic support, we are not only training individuals but also shaping institutional cultures and strengthening accountability across Pakistan's justice system." Mr. Jeroen Willems, Head of Cooperation at the European Union Delegation to Pakistan, reaffirmed: "As the European Union, we are proud to partner with Pakistan on strengthening its rule of law institutions. Following this EU financed

training, I look forward to seeing how these trainers use their new skills to strengthen police training as well as service delivery to further enable an accessible, inclusive, and gender-responsiveness service to all citizens in Pakistan. "This initiative has strengthened the foundation for a unified training culture across provinces," noted Mr. Hayat Ali Shah, Director General, Federal Judicial Academy. "By equipping police instructors with survivor-centered approaches, we are moving closer to an accessible, gender-responsive justice system." In his closing remarks, Hon'ble Justice Mian Gul Hassan Aurangzeb emphasized: "A justice system can only be credible when it protects the most vulnerable. This Training of Trainers reflects our joint responsibility to equip law enforcement with the knowledge and tools to respond effectively to gender-based violence and uphold pro-women laws." The training featured specialized sessions on the National Framework for Gender-Responsive Policing, pro-women legislation, curriculum development, and inter-academy learning. It also included a high-level dialogue with Justice Farah Jamshed (Peshawar High Court), MNA Huma Akhter Chughtai, Syeda Tanzeela Sabahat (Secretary LJCP), Umer Riaz (Former DG PVE, NACTA), and senior police leadership, who highlighted pathways for embedding gender-responsive practices into mainstream policing and justice delivery. This training is part of the EU-financed 19 million euro Deliver Justice Project, which works to strengthen the rule of law, expand access to justice, and protect women and marginalized groups in Pakistan. The project has been running since 2021.

What's driving alarming rise in student drug addiction?


ISLAMABAD: "I was in 6th grade when I lit my first cigarette, just weeks after losing my mother," recalled Saad, a BS student at a local university whose voice trembled as he recounted becoming prey to addiction. "I didn't know what I was running from, but I knew I didn't want to feel anything. What started as a way to numb the pain quickly turned into an addiction I couldn't escape." Behind every drug-addicted student lies a story most people never hear, stories not of rebellion, but of loss, trauma, loneliness, and silent suffering. For Saad, what began as a cigarette in a too young age evolved into a chain of dependencies. He didn't choose drugs to feel high, he chose them to feel nothing. Psychological deprivation and unresolved emotional pain are often at the root of such decisions. Talking to APP, clinical psychologist and psychosexual family therapist Dr. Sobia Khateeb explained that addiction rarely begins

with the drug itself, it begins with what's missing.

what's missing. "Peer pressure, trauma, academic stress, low self-worth, and family conflict are among the major triggers," she explained. "Most young people are not looking to get high. They're looking for relief, from grief, loneliness, or pressure to perform." "Saad's story is just one thread in a growing web of youth addiction across Pakistan, particularly within the student population, where academic pressure, emotional neglect, and easy access to harmful substances are quietly fuelling a crisis few dare to confront out loud," says psychiatrist Dr Zainab talking to this scribe. Dr. Muhammad Manshoor Hussain Abbasi, Assistant Professor at COMSATS University Islamabad, pointed to the growing popularity of substances like vape pods and nicotine pouches, seemingly considered harmless. These are consumed secretly, often under the impression they're not as harmful," he told APP. "While smoking is banned on campus, the university can't monitor students off-campus. Within our premises, the Proctorial Board enforces strict discipline. If a student is caught, the case is reviewed and appropriate action, ranging from fines to suspension, is taken." Dr. Abbasi also emphasized that prevention goes beyond punishment. "It's about creating awareness and giving students reasons to say no." At NUML University, an educationist Muhammad Sanaullah Khan takes a proactive approach. "Conversations matter," he said while speaking to APP. "I integrate real-life cases into my lessons to show what drug use does in the long run. I also check in on students who seem withdrawn or stressed." "Being an educator today means being more than a teacher. You have to build trust. Only then will students come to you before they turn to drugs." Drug addiction is not just a health issue, it's

a social, educational, and moral crisis. It threatens students' futures, damages their mental health, ruins careers, and destroys relationships. Substances like vape pods, Velo, and synthetic drugs are becoming dangerously normalized, often with no effective checks or monitoring. Law enforcement officials acknowledge the growing concern. Speaking to APP, Waseem Raja, a senior police official at Margalla Police Station, revealed that drug-related offenses involving youth are taken seriously.

"We track drug peddlers in collaboration with civil society. Their records are reviewed and repeat offenders are punished under the Control of Narcotic Substances Act," he stated. "If students are caught using drugs outside their campuses, we involve their families and institutions immediately. Counseling is the first step, but serious or repeat offenders face



Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi Visits Pakistan

IN a significant diplomatic engagement, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi visited Pakistan this week to discuss the ongoing progress of the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) and the bilateral cooperation between the two countries. Wang emphasized that despite the challenges, China cannot simply abandon its investments and partnerships in Pakistan. . On the diplomatic front, discussions also touched upon Pakistan's balancing act between China and the United States. Pakistan has carefully maintained its ties with both powers amid increasing tensions and global competition. The United States has reportedly urged Pakistan to reduce its dependence on China, pushing Islamabad to diversify its alliances and economic partners. However, Pakistani officials made it clear that reducing reliance on China is not feasible at this stage. The deep-rooted economic involvement, especially through CPEC, makes Pakistan-China cooperation vital for Islamabad's development agenda. Pakistan views its partnership with China as both a geopolitical necessity and an economic opportunity, while still keeping diplomatic channels open with the US. Wang Yi concluded his visit by reaffirming China's vision of a "win-win" relationship with Pakistan and pledged to work through current challenges together. Both sides agreed to accelerate the implementation of CPEC Phase 2 initiatives and enhance security measures to protect ongoing projects. In summary, the visit of Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi served as a reminder of the strategic importance China places on Pakistan amidst regional complexities.



The Future of NATO: Do We Still Need It?

ATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization) was created in 1949 to provide collective defense for its member states, primarily in Europe and North America. The core principle of the alliance is that an attack against one member is considered an attack against all, as outlined in Article 5 of the NATO treaty. This principle has been invoked only once, in response to the September 11 terrorist attacks in 2001. Following the Cold War, NATO shifted its focus from solely deterring Soviet threats to addressing a wider scope of security challenges. The alliance expanded its roles into crisis management, peacekeeping, and combatting terrorism. NATO conducted missions in the Balkans, Afghanistan, and maritime security operations. Furthermore, the alliance grew eastward, incorporating many former Warsaw Pact countries and Soviet republics, thereby redefining its strategic objectives.

Today, NATO faces multifaceted challenges that raise questions about its traditional role and future viability. The most acute challenge is the resurgence of Russia as a geopolitical adversary, especially after its invasion of Ukraine in 2022. This conflict revitalized NATO's original mission of collective defense and caused members to strengthen their military presence, especially in Eastern Europe. Simultaneously, internal disputes within NATO have emerged, including disagreements over defense spending and diverging views on global powers such as China and Russia. Some member states have questioned NA-TO's ongoing relevance and the financial costs of membership, particularly as security threats evolve beyond traditional military conflicts into realms such as cyber warfare, terrorism, and hybrid warfare. The rise of China as a global power also affects NATO's strategic considerations. Although China does not pose a direct military threat to NATO members comparable to Russia, its expanding influence in technology, economics, and geopolitics challenges the alliance to reexamine and update its strategic priorities accordingly. Despite these challenges, several strong arguments affirm NATO's continued necessity:Collective Defense and Deterrence: NATO remains the world's most effective military alliance for credible deterrence against aggression, particularly from Russia. Its integrated command structure and coordinated capabilities outperform any other security arrangement globally. Political Unity: Beyond its military functions, NATO fosters vital political dialogue and cooperation among Western democracies. This coordination helps address a broad spectrum of security issues, including counterterrorism and cyber defense. Adaptability: NATO has demonstrated resilience and adaptability over decades. It is expanding its focus to include new domains like cyber and space and is exploring partnerships beyond the traditional Euro-Atlantic sphere. Support for Global Stability: Through joint exercises and partnerships, NATO plays a crucial role in stabilizing conflict regions and enhancing interoperability among diverse militaries worldwide. NATO's future will largely depend on its ability to reform and stay relevant amid an increasingly complex global environment.

AK-US relations have a long and complicated history, often resembling the unpredictable weather in the hill station of Murree. On a sunny day there, one might think the skies will stay clear, only to see clouds gather and rain start within minutes. In much the same way, trust in this relationship has never been constant—warmth and cooperation can suddenly turn into coldness and disengagement. Noam Chomsky, the renowned American linguist and political thinker, once described U.S.-Pakistan relations in blunt terms, calling Pakistan a "tool" in Washington's geopolitical chess game. Pakistan, in his view, has been useful when needed-against the Soviets, against Al-Qaeda-and then left on its own when Washington's attention shifted elsewhere. His conclusion is clear; the United States does not have permanent friends—only permanent interests. U.S. support for military rulers such as Zia-ul-Haq and Pervez Musharraf, Chomsky insists, was never about promoting democracy but about securing bases, intelligence networks, and influence in the region. In recent months, however, one development has been seen as a rare moment of alignment between Islamabad and Washington. The U.S. formally designated the Balochistan Liberation Army (BLA), responsible for spreading unrest in Balochistan, as a terrorist organization. This move, though long overdue in Pakistani eyes, was welcomed as a cool breeze, signaling a partial acknowledgment of Pakistan's concerns. For years, Pakistan has highlighted the destructive role of groups like the BLA in sabotaging stability in Balochistan, targeting Chinese and local workers on CPEC projects, and undermining development in the province. The significance of this decision cannot be understood without recognizing Balochistan's immense wealth in natural resources. It is no exaggeration to say that Allah has blessed this province with treasures beneath its rugged mountains and desert plains. Balochistan is home to vast deposits of copper and goldmost famously at the Reko Diq site in Chagai

another major mining site, has been producing copper, gold, and silver for decades. Beyond these precious metals, the province contains significant coal reserves in Dukki, Harnai, and Mach; large quantities of chromite in Muslim Bagh and Khuzdar; and marble of exceptional quality in Chagai and Loralai.

For the United States, the geopolitical significance of Balochistan is intertwined with the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC). Gwadar is a flagship CPEC project and a potential gateway for Chinese trade routes to the Middle East and Africa. Washington has often expressed concern about the security of this port and the broader Chinese presence in the region. The unrest in Balochistan, partly fueled by groups like the BLA, has raised questions about the viability of long-term projects. By supporting Pakistan's efforts to dismantle such networks, the U.S. is not only aiding Chinese investment security but also ensuring that its own potential commercial interests in the region are preserved. Interestingly, the current U.S. president's approach to foreign relations seems less focused on military interventions and more on economic diplomacy. Unlike predecessors who preferred strategic entanglements, this administration appears more inclined toward fostering trade and infrastructure investments. This shift in priorities could have implications for South Asia. India, once a central pillar of U.S. Indo-Pacific strategy, may no longer be as indispensable in Washington's economic calculus, especially given trade disputes, human rights concerns, and New Delhi's balancing act between the West and Russia.

In this changing environment, opportunities

may emerge for Pakistan-provided it acts with clarity and foresight. Our policymakers must recognize that while foreign support can be useful, no external power will prioritize Pakistan's long-term welfare over its own interests. The history of our relations with Washington is testimony to this reality. Whether during the Soviet-Afghan War, when Pakistan was armed and funded to serve as a frontline state, or in the post-9/11 period, when our territory became a staging ground for counterterrorism operations, the pattern has been consistent; intense cooperation during shared crises, followed by neglect or even sanctions when those crises passed. Now, with the U.S. labeling the BLA as a terrorist organization and signaling a willingness to engage in more constructive economic dialogue, Pakistan must decide how to channel this into lasting benefits. Securing Balochistan and unlocking its mineral wealth is not just an economic imperative but also a strategic necessity. Transparent policies, fair distribution of resource revenues, and local development are key to ensuring that the people of Balochistan see themselves as stakeholders rather than bystanders in the province's progress. Only then can the province's gold, copper, marble, coal, and energy reserves serve as a foundation for national prosperity rather than a source of conflict. The metaphor of Murree's weather still applies-Pak-U.S. relations may warm today and cool tomorrowbut by learning from history, Pakistan can prepare for those shifts. If we keep our own interests at the center, maintain a diversified network of international partnerships, and ensure that our internal stability is not hostage to external agendas, then even unpredictable weather can be managed. After all, clouds will come and go, but the strength of the ground beneath us-like the mineral-rich soil of Balochistan-must be our enduring foundation.

Climate resilience is a strategic investment in future growth

OR emerging markets and developing economies, or EMDEs, investing in resilience is not a luxury; it is an imperative. Climate disasters ecological degradation are impeding their economic prospects and straining their finances. Perhaps more importantly, these shocks are exacerbating unsustainable debt burdens at a time when donor countries are slashing development aid, making it harder for EMDEs to finance investments in climate adaptation. Over the past two decades, the 74 economies comprising the Climate Vulnerable Forum and the Vulnerable Group of Twenty have suffered more than \$525 billion in losses – equivalent to roughly 20 percent of their collective gross domestic product – due to climate shocks. This includes acute disasters like floods, hurricanes, and droughts, as well as slower-moving events such as desertification and coastal erosion.

To that end, the Sharm El-Sheikh Adaptation Agenda, launched in 2022, proposes 30 adaptation targets in key sectors such as agriculture, public health, and infrastructure with the goal of spurring inclusive, effective, and equitable action by 2030. The proposed outcomes are not merely defensive; they create jobs, boost productivity, and improve creditworthiness. Unfortunately, these benefits are not reflected in current macroeconomic frameworks. The problem is structural. And investments in nature-based solutions such as restoring mangroves or wetlands can simultaneously address climate, food, and water challenges, and boost infrastructure performance.

As a result, high-impact interventions such as coastal defenses, underground power lines, and mangrove restoration are sidelined in favor of more conventional infrastructure projects like roads, bridges, and ports.

These perverse incentives are reflected in EMDEs' planning and budgeting processes. The environment ministries that oversee Nationally Determined Contributions and National Adaptation Plans under the Paris climate agreement tend not to engage systematically with finance ministries, meaning that these resilience strategies are not fully integrated into medium and long-term national financial planning. That leaves NDCs and NAPs at risk of being aspirational, rather than actionable.

With critical adaptation investments overlooked in budgets, and with insufficient volumes of grant or concessional finance to plug ensuing gaps, many are calling for changes in how debt is treated, including reforms of fiscal frameworks so that investments in climate and nature resilience are treated as productive. A recent paper by the Bridgetown Initiative outlines four steps that governments can take to achieve this goal. First, EMDEs must quantify acute and chronic climate and nature risks. A better understanding of the potential macroeconomic effects can help guide assessments of the financing required to reduce those risks. The paper offers a new typology to help categorize investments by risk type and sector, which would streamline the process. Once policymakers have identified which investments are needed, they must assess their impact on the economy's growth trajectory. Spending on resilience measures can reduce future losses from climate disasters, boost productivity, and raise incomes. These benefits must be incorporated into forecasting models, as is already done for traditional infrastructure investments. Countries are trapped in a vicious cycle of vulnerability. The long-term growth benefits of resilience-focused capital projects could then be factored into debt-sustainability analyses. This would show that such investments are, in fact, fiscally prudent with the right financing conditions, thus strengthening the case for more concessional and longer-term borrowing.

Lastly, with a more comprehensive understanding of the macroeconomic effects of resilience-based interventions, EMDEs can devise credible investment plans and financing strategies that align with fiscal and budgetary policy. Factoring climate resilience into macroeconomic planning should strengthen, not diminish, a country's growth narrative. When done well, this empowers finance ministries to engage more effectively with donors, credit-rating agencies, markets, and international financial institutions, all of which play a critical direct or indirect role in curporting recilience and adaptation effects.

in supporting resilience and adaptation efforts. With the IMF and the World Bank reviewing their Debt Sustainability Framework for Low-Income Countries, this is an opportune time for EMDEs to update their methodologies to reflect the benefits of adaptation measures. Climate and nature shocks are now an economic reality, not a distant threat. Building resilience to these shocks will form the foundation of sustainable

development and fiscal stability for years to come.

From Page 01 such dialogue between Pakistan and India will be welcomed. Commenting on India's arms buildup, he expressed concern that India's accumulation and procurement of weapons pose a serious threat to regional stability and Pakistan's security. He criticized the international community for turning a blind eye to India's aggressive pursuit of military capabilities that far exceed its legitimate security needs, warning that this trend remains a source of regional instability.

He, however, affirmed that Pakistan has the capability to respond effectively and defend its territorial integrity and sovereignty. He reiterated Pakistan's commitment to maintaining a full spectrum of deterrence to ensure the safety and security of its people and to uphold peace in South Asia. In response to another question regarding terrorist sanctuaries in Afghanistan, the Spokesperson from Afghanistan remains a central issue in Pakistan's discussions with Afghan authorities. He noted that Afghanistan is an important neighbor, and Pakistan seeks friendly and brotherly relations with it. country as a whole to get to the World Cup after such a long time," said Solano. "[Head

coach] Ricardo Gareca did a wonderful job in unifying the team and we were able to do that. I think the lack of discipline was one of the reasons my generation was unable to qualify for the World Cup.'

Targets and expectations, though, are more modest with Pakistan. But Solano is keen on not only bringing the South American flair but also grit and determination, and the fighting spirit, to the national and Under-23 teams. Many players, the local-based ones in particular, have had to do without any kind of domestic action. But in his first few training sessions, he has seen that the talent is promising. "I've seen some really talented players who have had to make do without domestic football," he said. "That [domestic football] is something we need to collectively work on: me, the PFF and its leadership. But the big thing is that they're willing to fight for a spot on the national team. "It is something I've told the diaspora players I've spoken to since I took over. I've told them that they have to try and make their presence felt at the training camps because those who are here are willing to give everything to make the team." For a man who has fought so many battles himself, Solano is counting on

that desire to lift Pakistan football.

Solano, who represented Peru over 90 times and played top flight football in England, struck a realistic yet hopeful tone. "I know this is a big responsibility and a challenge," he said. Journalist Khawar Hussain's death declared 'suicide'

KARACHI: Investigators from a three-member inquiry committee declared journalist Khawar Hussain's death "suicide" as they submitted a 30-page report to Sindh Inspector-General Ghulam Nabi Memon, it emerged on Friday. Hussain, a young journalist associated with a private news channel, was found dead in his car in mysterious circumstances outside a restaurant on Hyderabad Road in his hometown, Sanghar, last week.

The probe committee concluded "suicide as the only cause of death of journalist Hussain" based on the "detailed visit of the crime scene, interview of the witnesses, examination of post-mortem reports, forensic reports, and analysis of CCTV footage". The report includes an eightpage section supported by medical records.

CCTV footage from Karachi to Sanghar, tracing Hussain's travel route, as well as video evidence from the hotel parking area up to the point of the incident.

Investigators also reviewed

Deputy Inspector General (DIG) Irfan Baloch, a member of the committee, said the CCTV footage showed no individual approaching the journalist's vehicle during the incident. The report added that video evidence, call data records, and witness statements from people who last contacted Hussain were all examined. The medical and post-mortem reports also confirmed suicide. The committee concluded that while the cause of death was suicide, determining the underlying reasons would require the cooperation of Hussain's family.

Blockbuster 'Sincaraz' rivalry ready to light up US Open

Sinner and Alcaraz Rivalry Heats Up as US Open Battle for No. 1 Begins

NEW YORK: Jannik Sinner and Carlos Alcaraz will be aiming to write another chapter of their blockbuster rivalry when the US Open men's singles gets underway on Sunday. As the era of men's tennis's "Big Three" recedes into the rearview mirror, Sinner and Alcaraz have accelerated onto centre-stage to fill the void created by the retirements of Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal and the decline of Novak Djokovic. In their five meetings in Grand Slams so far, Sinner and Alcaraz have produced encounters that have been every bit as memorable as anything Federer, Nadal and Djokovic served up. This season, Alcaraz drew first blood with a spellbinding 4-6, 6-7 (4/7), 6-4, 7-6 (7/3), 7-6 (10/2) victory over Sinner to claim the French Open title in June. Sinner then hit back to claim the Wimbledon final last month, defeating Alcaraz in four sets, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4.

"I keep looking up to Carlos because even today I felt like he was doing a couple of things better than I did," Sinner said after his Wimbledon win. "That's something we will work on because he's going to come for us again." The two men also have history in New York, meeting in an epic, 5hr 15min 2022 quarter-final showdown finally won by eventual champion Alcaraz at

around 2:50am local time. "Every time we play against each other, I think our level is really high," Alcaraz has said of his rivalry with Sinner. "I don't see any player playing against each other having the level that we are playing when we face each other." - 'A gift to our sport' - Australian legend

Rod Laver, meanwhile, says simply that Sinner and Alcaraz are a godsend to tennis. "Their growing rivalry is a gift to our sport, and it's matched by the genuine respect they show for each other," Laver wrote on social media after Sinner's Wimbledon win. "Win or lose, they compete with joy, class, and sportsmanship. That's what makes

champions." Alcaraz and Sinner's battle for supremacy this season will carry an extra edge at the US Open, with the world number one ranking also at stake.

Sinner and Alcaraz met in Monday's Cincinnati Open final, although fans were denied another classic after an ailing Sinner retired in the first set while trailing 5-0.

Alcaraz's win in Cincinnati means that he has closed to within 2,000 points of Sinner in the ATP rankings. To ensure he remains world number one. Sinner will likely need to win in New York while Alcaraz can reclaim top spot if he advances one round further than Sinner. Sinner, though, is unlikely to surrender



his ranking position without a fight. Prior to his retirement in Monday's Cincinnati final, Sinner had racked up an impressive 26 consecutive wins on hard courts. Assuming the Italian's fitness holds up, few would bet against the world number one launching the start of a new lengthy winning run in New York over the coming fortnight. Sinner opens his campaign in the first round

against Vit Kopriva, with the earliest major obstacle a potential quarter-final with Britain's Tack Draper. In other side of the draw. meanwhile, Alcaraz must navigate a path to the final which could include the 38-yearold Djokovic. Djokovic heads into New York knowing that the window for winning a record 25th Grand Slam singles title is rapidly closing. The Serb has not played since his semi-final exit at Wimbledon last month. Djokovic has not reached a Grand Slam singles final since his defeat to Alcaraz at Wimbledon last year. His last US Open victory came at the 2023 final, where he defeated Daniil Medvedev. Yet Djokovic maintains that he can still be relevant in the era of Sinner and Alcaraz, warning after Wimbledon that he continues to raise his game at Grand Slams. "I think, regardless of the fact that I haven't won a Grand Slam this year, or last year, I still feel like I continue to play my best tennis at Grand Slams," Djokovic said. "Those are the tournaments that I care about at this stage of my career the most."

Lebanese president asks UK to support UNIFIL mandate

BEIRUT: Lebanese President Joseph Aoun on Thursday urged the UK to back Lebanon's request to the UN Security Council for the renewal of the mandate for the UN Interim Force in Lebanon, the international peacekeeping force in the south of the country. He stressed the important role it plays in upholding the ceasefire agreement with Israel and efforts to guarantee regional stability. He reaffirmed Lebanon's commitment to the continued presence of UNIFIL forces in southern Lebanon and told the British Ambassador to Lebanon, Hamish Cowell, that he "attaches great importance to the UK's support for his position calling on the Security Council to extend UNIFIL's mandate, both to ensure the full implementation of Resolution 1701, and to enable the complete deployment of the Lebanese Army along Lebanon's internationally recognized borders." Resolution 1701 was adopted by the Security Council in 2006 with the aim of resolving the conflict that year between Israel and Hezbollah. It calls for the withdrawal of Israeli forces from Lebanon, the withdrawal of Hezbollah and other forces from southern Lebanon, and the disarmament of Hezbollah and other armed groups.—APP

12 dead, 4 missing after bridge collapses in China

BEIJING: Twelve people were killed and four are missing after part of a bridge under construction collapsed Friday in northwest China, state media reported.= A video published by state broadcaster CCTV showed the middle of the bridge's arch section suddenly giving way and plunging into the waters of the Yellow River below.= The cause was a steel cable failure, state news agency Xinhua said. The People's Daily newspaper said 15 workers and a project manager were on-site at the time. Twelve people have been confirmed dead and four people are still missing, CCTV reported.

The bridge on the Sichuan-Qinghai Railway is the world's largest-span double-track continuous steel truss arch bridge, according to People's Daily. It is also China's first railway steel truss arch bridge to span the Yellow River—the country's second-longest—the report said.

Images published on state media show the partially built bridge with its middle section missing and two giant scaffolding towers and several cranes alongside it. Hundreds of rescue workers were mobilized for the search and rescue operation. Xinhua said.

Industrial accidents are fairly common in China due to vague regulations and lax safety standards.—APP

Philippines, Australia aim to sign new defense pact in 2026

MANILA: The Philippines and Australia plan to sign a new pact to develop the Southeast Asian nation's military infrastructure, their defense chiefs said on Friday, as they seek to counter China's "unilateral activities" in the region. The plan was announced as Australia and the Philippines staged joint military exercises, which included live-fire drills and involved about 3,600 personnel, in the western and northern Philippines. Beijing and Manila have had a series of confrontations in the disputed South China Sea, a crucial waterway China claims in almost its entirety despite an international ruling that its stance has no legal basis. "We both acknowledge and are experiencing the pressure that the rules-based order is being placed under here in the Indo-Pacific," Australian Defense Minister Richard Marles told reporters after meeting his Philippine counterpart in Manila.-APP

17 sectoral councils operationalizes to boost manufacturing sector

ISLAMABAD: The government has operationalized 17 sectoral councils to design policies and boost competitiveness across manufacturing and services Rana Ihsaan Afzal Khan, Coordinator to the Prime Minister on Commerce and Industry, told Wealth Pakistan that the Ministry of Commerce has undertaken a comprehensive reform initiative. The Ministry of Commerce has established 17 sectoral councils, nine of which are for manufacturing and eight for the services sector, he said in a release issued here on Friday. The sectors include hospitality, tourism, logistics, jewellery, and minerals.

These sectoral councils give sectoral policy recommendations. "This is a big job. We have never worked on sectoral policy before," he said. Integrating the private sector expertise, the council aims to cover the entire value chain, starting from raw materials up to finished goods. The coordinator told Wealth Pakistan that the private sector is leading the sectoral councils. "We have the working groups of stakeholders. They are representatives of the provincial government, federal government and private sector. They will analyze the entire sector, point out weak areas and give recommendations on the overall sector policy," he explained. He said that by systematically reviewing each sector, the government aims to create coherent policies that align the industrial, trade, and fiscal strategies. Alongside policy reforms, Pakistan continues to attract investment in key sectors. Fashion Private Limited has announced a \$100 million expansion in the textile sector, reflecting confidence in the country's manufacturing potential. Rana Ihsaan confirmed progress on digital trade and regional integration. "The e-commerce policy 2.0 is on the cards. The draft is ready. We are about to finalize it. Many things are coming up. The GCC FTA is about to come," he added. He said sectoral councils, investment momentum, tariff rationalization and digital trade reforms will help Pakistan position its industries for greater competitiveness in regional and global markets.—DNA

ISLAMABAD: The Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) has introduced a new category of mutual funds titled "Infrastructure Schemes" under the framework of open-end collective investment schemes. This initiative represents a significant step towards strengthening the role of capital markets in channeling long-term

savings into infrastructure development, said a press issued by the SECP on Friday. The proposal for creating a distinct category was initially presented at the Mutual Fund Focus Group Session 2025, where it was identified as a key milestone under the Fund Management Department's Roadmap 2025-26. Extensive consultations were subsequently held with the Mutual Funds Association of Pakistan (MUFAP) and other stakeholders to refine the framework The final structure reflects both industry feedback and SECP's commitment to ensuring regulatory clarity, investor protection, and alignment with national development priorities. Pakistan faces an urgent requirement to expand and modernize its infrastructure, with financing needs estimated at nearly USD 15 billion annually. Current infrastructure spending remains significantly below international benchmarks, amounting to just 2.1 percent of GDP compared to the global standard of 8-10 percent. By introducing a dedicated regulatory category, the Commission seeks to provide stronger visibility to infrastructure-focused mutual funds, while offering investors a transparent and well-structured avenue for participation in projects of national significance. Under the framework, Asset Management Companies (AMCs) may categorize infrastructure schemes as equity, debt, or hybrid funds depending on their investment focus. Eligible sectors include energy, transport, logistics, water, sanitation, communication, and a wide range of social and commercial infrastructure such as hospitals, educational institutions, industrial parks, affordable housing, and tourism facilities. This broadened scope is intended to mobilize both retail and institutional investors towards ventures that directly contribute to Pakistan's development agenda. To promote investor confidence, the framework prescribes minimum fund sizes of Rs. 100 million for perpetual schemes and at the close of the subscription period for closed-end schemes. AMCs will be required to invest a minimum seed capital of Rs. 25 million in closed-end schemes with maturity exceeding three years, ensuring alignment of interest between managers and investors. Closed-end schemes may also offer periodic subscription and redemption windows after one year, subject to conditions clearly set out in the offering documents.

The framework provides flexibility in relation to Net Asset Value (NAV) disclosure for closed-end infrastructure schemes, requiring disclosure at intervals not exceeding one month as specified in the constitutive documents. In addition, schemes must maintain at least 70 percent of net assets invested in infrastructure securities on a quarterly basis, with any shortfall to be regularized within three months.

A transparent fee structure has also been introduced. Management fees are capped at three percent per annum for equity schemes and 1.5 percent for debt schemes, while hybrid schemes will follow a weighted average based on asset allocation. No sales load will be permitted, though contingent load may apply in the case of early redemption under closed-end schemes. By establishing this dedicated category, SECP seeks to bridge Pakistan's infrastructure financing gap through long-term domestic savings, while ensuring strong investor safeguards. The initiative reaffirms SECP's commitment to fostering sustainable growth and deepening capital markets as a vehicle for economic development. —APP

Call for 'immediate' access to Gaza for foreign media

RIYADH: The Media Freedom Coalition, which promotes press freedoms worldwide, called Thursday for Israel to allow independent, foreign news organizations access to the besieged Palestinian territory of Gaza. "Journalists and media workers play an essential role in putting the spotlight on the devastating reality of war,' said a joint statement signed by members of the coalition from 27 countries, including Britain, France and Germany. The statement also condemned the violence directed against journalists and media workers, and called on Israeli authorities and all other parties "to make every effort to ensure that media workers in the conflict area can conduct their work freely and safely." "Deliberate targeting of journalists is unacceptable. International humanitarian law offers protection to civilian journalists during armed conflict," the statement said, adding that every attack against media workers must be investigated and those responsible prosecuted. The other signatories were tralia, Austria, Belgium, Chile, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Sierra Leone, Slovakia, Slovenia, Sweden, Switzerland, Ukraine, the Netherlands, and Canada. Aside from rare guided tours, Israel has barred international media during the war, in which at least 242 Palestinian journalists

and media workers have

India's top court allows release of picked-up stray dogs

India's Supreme Court says the scope of the case would be expanded across India

NEW DELHI: India's Supreme Court directed on Friday the release of stray dogs picked up in Delhi and its suburbs after sterilisation and immunisation, modifying an earlier order and widening the scope of the case to ensure a nationwide policy on such strays. Animal lovers had appealed against the court's order this month to move all stray dogs to shelters in the area, following media reports of a rise in the number of cases of rabies, especially among children. The relocation decision drew criticism regarding its implementation, citing lack of infrastructure and medical treatment. Many animal lovers took to the streets to protest against the order.

On Friday, the court said that dogs picked up in the past few weeks in Delhi and its suburbs would be released after sterilisation and immunisation, barring those showing aggressive behaviour or rabies infections. A three-judge panel of the court said the scope of the case would be expanded across India and the court would formulate a uniform policy for all stray dogs soon. In April, the government said nearly 430,000 dog bite incidents were reported nationwide in January, against 3.7 million cases in all of 2024. India has 52.5 million stray dogs, a survey of homeless pets by Mars Petcare has shown, with 8 million homeless canines in shelters. Media reports suggest Delhi alone has 1 million stray dogs. Reuters could not independently verify the figure. To curb public feeding of stray dogs, the court also directed the setting-up of designated zones.

Five dead in bomb attack on Colombia air base

BOGOTA: Five people were killed and dozens were injured when a vehicle bomb ripped through a busy street in the Colombian city of Cali on Thursday, local authorities said. Police said the bomb had targeted the Marco Fidel Suarez Military Aviation School in the north of the city - a fresh challenge to the country's fragile peace process ahead of the 2026 elections.

"There was a thunderous sound of something exploding near the air base," 65-year-old eyewitness Hector Fabio Bolanos told AFP. "There were so many injured people," he said. "Many houses were damaged in front of base." Several buildings and a school were evacuated. Cali mayor Alejandro Eder said preliminary reports indicated at least five people were killed and 36 people were injured. - Agencies

FIA Launches Al App to Ease **Immigration**

ISLAMABAD: Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi has announced the launch of an Artificial Intelligence (AI)based application developed by the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) to simplify immigration processes and combat human trafficking. EU top diplomat warns Ukraine

BRUSSELS: The top diplomat of the European Union (EU) has warned against pushing Ukraine to give up territories to Russia as part of a future peace deal. Speaking in her first UK interview since EU leaders joined Donald Trump's White House peace talks

with Ukraine, Kaja Kallas told the BBC's Today prokeep Ukrainian territories was a "trap that Putin wants us to walk into". The Donbas region in eastern Ukraine has long been contested by Russia, with military aggression forcing 1.5 million Ukrainians to flee over the past decade. Ukraine has consistently rejected conceding Donbas to the Kremlin in exchange for peace, though Trump stressed the need for "swapping of territories".

Pakistan's Reko Diq goldcopper mine project secures \$410m financing from ADB

Pakistan hopes mineral project will attract global investors, offering concessions to US companies under Trump admin

ISLAMAAD: The Asian Development Bank (ADB) will provide a \$410 million financing package to help develop Pakistan's Reko Diq copper-gold mine project, one of the world's largest untapped deposits, which will be operated by Barrick Gold, according to an official statement. "Reko Diq will help the critical minerals supply chain, while advancing the clean energy transition and driving digital innovation across the region and beyond," said ADB President Masato Kanda. "ADB's support is also a game-changer for Pakistan, creating quality jobs and underpinning the nation's transition toward a more resilient and diversified economy," he added. Islamabad hopes the project will serve as a springboard to draw more foreign interest to its mineral sector, particularly to exploit rare earth deposits. Pakistan has already attracted interest from the Trump administration and offered future concessions to US companies. The loans and a financing guarantee will support the development of Reko Diq, which is expected to produce copper and gold from 2028 and generate about \$70 billion in free cash flow over its lifespan. The financing is composed of two loans totalling \$300 million to Barrick and a \$110 million partial credit guarantee to cover the equity component of the Government of Balochistan.

The \$6.6 billion project in Balochistan is 50% owned by Barrick, with the other half held by the federal and provincial governments. The project aims to raise upwards of \$2 billion and has a previous agreement for \$700 million in financing from the International Finance Corporation, the World Bank's private investment arm. The project's developers are in talks with other prospective financiers, including the US Export-Import Bank, Export Development Canada and Japan's JBIC and expect to sign term sheets this quarter, project

director Tim Cribb told Reuters in April.

Israeli minister says Gaza City will be razed

TEL AVIV: Israel's defence minister has said Gaza City will be destroyed if Hamas does not agree to disarm and release all hostages. Israel Katz's comments came after the Israeli cabinet approved plans for a massive assault on Gaza City, despite widespread international and domestic opposition. On Monday, Hamas agreed to a proposal by Qatari and Egyptian mediators for a 60-day ceasefire, which according to Qatar would see the release of half of the remaining hostages in Gaza.

But Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has apparently rejected this, saying he had instructed negotiations to begin for the release of all remaining hostages and an end to the war in Gaza on terms "acceptable to Israel". Israel believes that only 20 of the 50 hostages are still alive after 22 months of war. Israeli

negotiators will be dispatched for renewed talks once a location has been determined. In a video statement during a visit to the Gaza division's headquarters in Israel on Thursday night, Netanyahu said he had "instructed to immediately begin negotiations for the release of all our hostages".

"I have come to approve the IDF's [Israel Defense Forces] plans to take control of Gaza City and defeat Hamas," he said.

"These two matters - defeating Hamas and releasing all our hostages - go hand in hand," Netanyahu added, without providing details about what the next stage of talks would entail. Reinforcing Netanyahu's message, Defence Minister Katz posted on social media on Friday: "Soon, the gates of hell will open upon the heads of Hamas's murderers and rapists in Gaza - until they agree to Israel's conditions for ending the war, primarily the release of all hostages and their disarmament.
