BEIJING: Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif and Premier Li Qiang of the People's Republic of China reaffirmed their resolve to further strengthen the all-weather strategic cooperative partnership between Pakistan and China. Both sides agreed to continue working together on five new corridors under the next phase of CPEC.

A number of MoUs and agreements were signed to enhance cooperation in CPEC Phase-II, science and technology, information technology, media, and agriculture.

According to a statement issued by the Prime Minister's Office Media Wing, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif met Premier Li Qiang in Beijing. During the meeting, both leaders expressed satisfaction over positive developments in Pakistan-China relations. Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif expressed heartfelt gratitude to the Chinese leadership and people for their unwavering support for Pakistan's regional integrity, sovereignty, and socio-economic development.

### **Digital currency** to get legal cover after framework

KARACHI: The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) has agreed in principle to recognise digital currency once a comprehensive legal and regulatory framework is in place. This was disclosed by SBP Deputy Acting Governor Dr Inayat Hussain, while briefing the Senate Standing Committee on Finance, chaired by Senator Saleem Mandviwalla, at the Parliament House on Wednesday, reported The News

The Senate panel considered the Virtual Assets Bill 2025 and it would continue its review in the next meeting for granting its assent. On the discussion of the Virtual Assets Bill 2025, the SBP informed that they would withdraw the notification for banning digital currency by declaring the digital currency as legal once the legal and regulatory framework are put in place. The committee deliberated on the Government Bill titled "The Virtual Assets Bill, 2025".

### **Justice Athar says**

### Talk of 'hybrid system' is admission of dictatorship

He blamed what he said was the "lack of constitutional governance" in the country that was responsible for elite capture over the rule of law or the Constitution

ISLAMABAD: Supreme Court Justice Athar Minallah on Thursday said that the talk of a "hybrid system" prevalent in the country actually amounted to an admission to the presence of a dictatorship.

What had previously only been a term coined by analysts to describe the unique system of governance currently in vogue, is now apparently being worn as a badge of honour. Defence Minister Khawaja Asif had in July spoken in glowing terms about the 'hybrid regime' that currently runs the country. The term is used to describe the informal power-sharing arrangement, whereby the country's military holds a great deal of influence on the incumbent civilian setup and has a big say in the way the affairs of the state are managed.

In remarks on the issue while addressing the Karachi Bar Association (KBA) today, Justice Minallah said: "It is something to accept that people today say there is a hybrid system, that [actually] means there is dictatorship and there is no constitutional governance." He blamed what he said was the "lack of constitutional governance" in the country that was responsible for elite capture over the rule of law or the Constitution.

"I had to write in many high court orders that there is no rule of law or Constitution in the country; there is elite capture," he explained. He said that the history of the country's judiciary was "not something to be proud of for me". The judge said that his generation had passed its time, caused whatever destruction it could to the country, and should never be afraid to

### ECP postpones Punjab by-elections due to flooding crisis

ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has postponed the upcoming by-elections in five National Assembly seats and four provincial assembly seats in Punjab amid the flooding crisis in the province. The by-elections were supposed to be held in the following constituencies: NA-66 (Wazirabad), NA-96 (Faisalabad-II), NA-104 (Faisalabad-X), NA-129 (Lahore-XI-II), NA-143 (Sahiwal-III), PP-73 (Sargodha-III), PP-87 (Mianwali-III), PP-98 (Faisalabad-I) and PP-203 (Sahiwal-VI). The ECP said that the communication system in the province was badly disrupted due to the "unprecedented floods", along with a lot of other damage to connectivity and public infrastructure.

### **Death toll from Punjab floods** rises to 46

LAHORE: The Punjab PDMA has said that 46 people have died so far and more 3,900 villages have been impacted across the province due to the severe floods. According to a PDMA statement shared by the Punjab government on X, a total of over 3.8m people have been affected, while 1.8m were safely rescued. Over 400 relief, 444 medical and 395 veterinary camps have been set up in the flood-hit districts.

### **KP** continues to reel under terror as attacks surpass 600

Police report says 138 civilians, 79 police personnel martyred in province

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, which has been at the forefront of Pakistan's fight against terrorism, has witnessed more than 600 terrorism incidents in the first eight months of 2025. As per a police report, there were 605 terror incidents in the province till August, which resulted in the martyrdom of 138 civilians, while 352 others were left wounded. Whereas 79 police personnel were martyred and 130 were injured, the report added. In last month alone, 17 civilians were martyred and 51 were wounded, along with 13 police personnel martyrdom and 46 injuries in a total of 129 terror incidents.

Meanwhile, 351 suspects were named in terrorism incidents, 32 were gunned down and five were arrested in August. Bannu reported the highest number of terror incidents, 42, in the previous month. ### **UK Announces** Additional £1.2 Million

ISLAMABAD: The United Kingdom has announced an additional £1.2 million (approximately PKR 45.4 crore) in humanitarian assistance to support anticipatory flood response efforts in Sindh. # Pak's first flora conservation station launched in Thar

Qasim Siraj Soomro, Member of the Provincial Assembly from Tharparkar appreciated the initiative, stating: "The people of Thar deeply value these efforts which help protect the threatened wildlife, including the rich flora

ISLAMABAD: There is a pressing need for the development and implementation of a comprehensive Biodiversity Conservation Action Plan to safeguard diverse plant species on the verge of extinction in Tharparkar.

Experts highlighted that these plant species are facing a threat due to overgrazing, expansion of unsustainable agriculture, and excessive extraction of commercially and medicinally valuable plants to protect the area's unique and critically endangered plant biodiversity, Pakistan's first desert-region Flora Conservation Station has been launched in Thar Coal Block II on Thursday, said a press release issued here Thursday. Set up under the Partnership for Biodiversity Conservation in Thar, this conservation station has been established by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), in collaboration with Sindh Engro Coal Mining Company (SEC-

MC) and Thar Foundation. With implementation support from local partner Baanhn Beli, the Flora Conservation Station builds on four years of IUCN-SECMC partnership and rigorous scientific research, which has included globally critically endangered vulture conservation efforts, ecological surveys, sustainable

saline agriculture and saline aquaculture, and environmental education programs. This facility enhances their ongoing efforts in Thar for conservation and propagation of indigenous plants, restoration of degraded rangelands, and safeguarding ecosystems that are essential for the livelihoods of local communities.

Many of these species were documented during IUCN's ecological baseline survey (2020–2022), which recorded more than 149 plant species, including two globally threatened species such as the Indian Bdellium Tree and Desert Teak. By strengthening livestock grazing resources and promoting sustainable vegetation use, the project is expected to deliver long-term ecological resilience in Tharparkar.

Speaking on the occasion, Qasim Siraj Soomro, Member of the Provincial Assembly from Tharparkar appreciated the initiative, stating: "The people of Thar deeply value these efforts which help protect the threatened wildlife, including the rich flora. Conserving our fast-declining plant species is not only vital for biodiversity but also for the livelihoods of our communities who

depend on livestock and rangelands.

This conservation station gives us hope that future generations will inherit a greener and more sustainable Thar".

Mahmood Akhtar Cheema, Country Representative, IUCN Pakistan, explained that Thar is home to some of the most unique and threatened plant species in the world, including those listed on the IUCN Red List. This initiative contributes not only to local ecological resilience but also helps achieve global biodiversity targets. "It is high time we must support conservation initiatives and reconnect local communities to the threatened biodiversity", he added. Amir Iqbal, Chief Executive Officer SECMC, stated: "With its critical role in enhancing Pakistan's energy security and rich ecological heritage. Thar stands as a beacon of hope, resilience, and national progress. As a socially responsible company, SECMC remains committed to uplifting local communities while leading sustainable development in the region. The launch of Pakistan's first-ever Flora Conservation Station, in partnership with our valued partner IUCN, is another milestone in our journey to safeguard Thar's

### Drug-free Peshawar campaign expanded province-wide

It was decided that a comprehensive plan would be presented to the Chief Minister at a meeting scheduled for September 10 at the CM's House, where UNO-DC representatives would also be invited. ### Muqam hands over relief goods to Afghans authorities

On the direction of Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif, Federal Minister Engr Amir Muqam went to Torkhum border in Khyber tribal district where he delivered huge consignment relief goods containing necessary daily use items, food and medicines to authorities of Afghanistan for earthquake victims.

Talking to media persons, Engr Amir Muqam said that the people and government of Pakistan stand with Afghans brothers and sisters in these hours of difficulty and this massive relief package was aimed to help the earthquake victims.

At least 1469 people in Afghanistan were killed and around 3700 injured besides nearly five million affected in eastern Afghanistan when a 6 magnitude quake struck it on Sunday, collapsing mud-brick homes on sleeping families. He said Prime Minister Muhammad Shahbaz Sharif has expressed deep condolences and sorrow over loss of lives and prop-

erties during the earthquake in Afghanistan. On the Prime Minister's directions, Engr Amir Mugam said the relief goods consignment was handed over to Afghans authorities at Torkham border that connects Pakistan and Afghanistan. Soon after the powerful earthquake, the Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Muhammad Ishaq Dar talked to his Afghan counterpart and assured every possible assistance and support. He said Pakistan has also suffered colossal losses due to natural calamities including foods that wreaked havoc first in Khyber Pakthunkhwa and later Gilgit Balistan and Punjab province. Besides loss of lives and properties floods, he said that livestock, agriculture products, and communication infrastructure including roads and bridges were largedly affected in Pakistan.

Engr Amir Muqam appreciated the support of national building departments including NGOs and philanthropists organizations for assistance of flood victims.

## CDA to develop 3 new graveyards to meet growing demand

ISLAMABAD: An important meeting was held at the Capital Development Authority (CDA) Headquarters under the chairmanship of Chairman CDA and Chief Commissioner Islamabad, Muhammad Ali Randhawa. The meeting was attended by CDA Board Member Engineering, Syed Nafasat Raza, Member Planning Dr. Khalid Hafiz and other senior officers. In line with the directions of the Federal Minister of Interior, Mohsin Nagyi, several decisions were made during the meeting regarding the allocation of land for establishing new graveyards in Islamabad. Following the Federal Interior Minister's instructions, it was decided to develop graveyards at three newly

allocated locations in the city. Chairman CDA said that the new graveyards would be developed keeping in view the growing needs of Islamabad's population. During the briefing, it was informed that approximately 800 kanals of land have been allocated for a new gravevard at Pandorian. Similarly, land has also been allocated for new graveyards at Humak and Malpur. The meeting was informed that 200 kanals have been allocated for the new graveyard in Malpur, while over 10 kanals have been allocated for the graveyard in Humak. The new gravevards will facilitate the population of both urban and rural areas of Islamabad. Chairman CDA directed to promptly commence work on the development of model graveyards at all these sites. He directed that the construction of the graveyards should take into account the best model and international standards.

Chairman CDA directed that all facilities related to funeral and burial services must be ensured in the new graveyards. He also instructed the CDA to construct boundary walls and walkways in the new graveyards. He directed that provisions for a funeral hall, facilities for bathing the deceased, a mosque, ablution areas and all other necessary amenities must be ensured. Additionally, he instructed to ensure parking facilities, permanent installation of LED lights and water supply in the new graveyards. It is important to note that alongside the construction of new graveyards, the existing graveyards in the Capital City of Islamabad are being

upgraded on modern lines. Chairman CDA instructed that the existing graveyards be upgraded with boundary walls, security, permanent lighting arrangements and walkways. For public convenience, he also directed to provide special electric funeral buses for burials in both new and old gravevards.

## Isolating Afghanistan means isolating Afghans, say experts

ISLAMABAD: Attempting to isolate Afghanistan means isolating the Afghans, which allows space for terrorist groups to operate in the country, said Kathy Gannon, renowned author and former Director for Afghanistan and Pakistan for the Associated Press. She also felt that just issuing ultimatums to the Taliban may not produce the desired results. Ms. Gannon was speaking at a roundtable discussion organized by the Institute of Regional Studies.

While calling for engagement with various stakeholders in Afghanistan, including the Taliban government, the Afghan affairs expert stated that Western countries were drawing misleading conclusions about Afghanistan without active engagement with Afghans on the ground. "There has to be a rethink of policies and strategies concerning Afghanistan," she emphasised.

Ms Gannon also shared that although there were considerable restrictions on the education and freedom of movement of women, she did see women working in public spaces and unaccompanied by men in Afghanistan during her visit to the country a few days ago. She also appreciated the relatively improved security environment and the reduction in corruption in Afghanistan. "The country of 42 million people is functioning. It's not functioning perfectly, but it is," noted Kathy Gannon.

Well known author and Executive Director of the Centre for Research and Security Studies, Imtiaz Gul, called for a comprehensive multilateral and regional approach to counter terrorism emanating out of Afghanistan, because terrorism was a concern for all neighbouring countries. While appreciating the Taliban administration's desire to engage with regional countries,



and the rest of the world, he urged the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan to address their concerns as well.

Pakistan's former envoy to the US, China and India, Ambassador Ashraf Jehangir Qazi, cautioned against a short-term and security-centric approach toward Afghanistan and called for a pragmatic, long-term, and broad-based strategy of 'generous engagement'. He also felt that the Afghans were best qualified to find solutions to the formidable challenges their country faced. President IRS, Ambassador Jauhar Sal-

eem, brought out the distinctions between the western perspective on Afghanistan focusing on the shortcomings of governance, lack of fundamental freedoms, and insecurity and terrorism emanating from Afghanistan that called for a policy of disengagement, and the more nuanced perspective presented by the speakers arguing positive persuasion through balanced engagement and enhanced cooperation. He underlined that Pakistan had always called for Afghan-based and Afghan-led solutions to the country's problems without foreign

intervention, and has stayed engaged with its important neighbour viewing it as a potential partner for promoting trade and connectivity. At the same time, he added that Pakistan expected Afghanistan to keep its commitment of not allowing its soil to be used by any terrorist groups to carry out terrorism against Pakistan. ## Urgent action needed to prevent disease outbreaks after floods

ISLAMABAD: Medical professionals warned Thursday that unless urgent steps are taken the flood aftermath could become a breeding ground for diseases and advised that addressing the lack of clean water, hygiene, nutrition, vaccinations and proper waste disposal is crucial to prevent the spread of typhoid, malaria, dengue, mental and respiratory health issues. While speaking exclusively with a local news channel, infectious diseases expert Shobha Luxmi explained the potential health risks following the floods, highlighting the urgent need for proper hygiene and sanitation. She mentioned that dirty environments, filled with mud, flies and mosquitoes near flood relief camps can ing to a surge in infections. These conditions, she warned, could overburden already stretched hospitals and health facilities, making it even more difficult to manage and treat those in need. She emphasized that maintaining cleanliness is critical in preventing the spread of waterborne diseases and infections, adding, providing soap, clean nets for sleeping and sanitizers to help curb the transmission of harmful bacteria and viruses. She further stressed the importance of having adequate nutrition for those affected by the flood, particularly vulnerable groups like children, pregnant women and the elderly Luxmi mentioned that proper nutrition strengthens the immune system, which is vital in fighting off infections in such dire conditions. Finally, the expert called on authorities to ensure access to clean drinking water, which she stated is essential to avoid outbreaks of diseases like typhoid and cholera. "Access to safe water, proper hygiene and nutritional support must be prioritized in flood relief efforts," she said. -APP

### SCO's spirit injects momentum into Pak's Agri Modernization

ISLAMABAD: spirit Shanghai Cooperation Organization injects a new momentum into Pakistan's Agricultural Modernization, China Economic Net (CEN) reported on Thursday. "We learned not only advanced agricultural knowledge and techniques in China, but also the spirit of innovation and collaboration that makes agriculture a force for prosperity," said a Pakistani trainee who returned from the SCO agricultural base in Yangling Demonstration Zone in Shaanxi province. In July of this year, the first batch of 292 Pakistani agricultural trainees completed a 90-day training program in China and returned to Pakistan to begin practical work in their respective fields. Ali, a trainee who runs a farm in Pakistan, said that water scarcity is common on farms in Pakistan. During his training in China, he saw Chinese farmers using drip irrigation technology to water crops while covering the cultivated land with plastic film. This not only saves water but also prevents diseases and controls weeds, which was entirely new to him. He plans to adopt this technology on his own farm and hopes it can be widely promoted in Pakistan.

In addition to inviting Pakistani agricultural talents to train in China, China has also established extensive connections with Pakistani universities, including Rawalpindi Women University the Federal Urdu University of Arts, Sciences & Technology, and the University of Swat, further expanding the reach of bilateral agricultural cooperation.—APP

### Criminal gets thrice death sentence for rape, murder

RAWALPINDI: Additional Session Court in Rawalpindi has awarded three times death sentence to Irfan Azeem, convicted of kidnapping, rape and murder. The detailed trial was presided over by Additional Sessions Judge Afshan Ijaz Sufi here Thursday.

According to the details, the verdict pertains to case FIR No. 522, registered on March 15, 2023, at Dhamial Police Station. Azeem was found guilty under Sections 302, 367-A, and 376(2)(i) of the Pakistan Penal Code (PPC) for the kidnapping, rapping, and murder of a 13 year old boy.—APP

## Suki Hydropower project marks first year of commercial operations

ISLAMABAD: The Suki Kinari Hydropower Station, a flagship project under the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), has completed its first full year of commercial operations. Inaugurated in September 2024, the 884 MW facility has generated over 2.7 billion kilowatt-hours of electricity to date, contributing significantly to Pakistan's national grid and helping to reduce reliance on imported fossil fuels, according to a report carried by Gwadar Pro on Thursday. To mark the anniversary, SK Hydro hosted a Media Open Day at the newly inaugurated CEEC Pakistan Regional Office. Journalists from leading media houses were briefed on the project's performance and toured key facilities, including the CEEC Corporate Culture Exhibition Hall and the under-development "Smart Hydropower" centralized control room, which will further enhance operational efficiency. Project officials noted that the hydropower station has played a growing role in supporting Pakistan's transition to renewable energy, while also contributing to the diversification of the national power mix. Beyond energy production, the project has made notable contributions to local development. At peak construction, more than 6,000 workers were employed on-site, while a series of community-focused initiatives have been undertaken in the surrounding areas. These include afforestation drives, educational support programs, and the establishment of a trout hatchery aimed at preserving the region's ecological balance. Infrastructure upgrades, such as improvements to the N15 highway, have also been facilitated through project support, improving connectivity and economic activity in the region. Media representatives praised the quality of construction, operational standards, and the integration of intelligent management systems at the facility. Many described the Suki Kinari Hydropower Station as a model of CPEC cooperation, demonstrating how strategic energy investments can deliver clean power while also promoting economic and social progress.-DNA

Three lawyers including Khurram Baig Advocate and Hasnain Haider Thahim submitted their power of attorney to the court on behalf of APP.

On the occasion, the judge inquired whether the lawyers of all the accused were present. On this, a lawyer told the court that some lawyers were busy in the High Court. On which, the judge Humayun Dilawar expressed his annoyance and remarked that "no excuse will work, if the lawyer of any accused is absent in the future, I will reject the bail in a minute." Adnan Akram Bajwa's lawyer requested the court to hear his client's plea separately; however, the court clarified that all the bail petitions would be heard simultaneously. The judge remarked that this is not a retail shop, I will not listen to the arguments one by one, all the lawyers should come prepared, and I will not tolerate frivolity. During the hearing, the lawyer of the accused Khurram Shahzad took the position that he was not aware of the charges against his client. On which the court directed FIA investigation officer Muhammad Junaid to

inform the accused of the charges. Investigation officer Muhammad Junaid told the court that accused Ijaz Magbool, as a former Secretary to MD, illegally received cheques of Rs 750,000 and Rs 200,000, of which there is no record of official use. Accused Khurram Shahzad cashed a cheque of Rs 22.7 million from the salary credit sheet. More than Rs 7.9 million was transferred to the personal account of accused Murtaza, while millions of rupees were deposited in another account. Accused Imran Munir was a former manager account. During his tenure on the post, cheques of Rs 1.8 million, 2 million, 1.78 million and 1.47 million were illegally cashed, of which there is evidence of embezzlement. Accused Sajid Ali was also a former manager account. During his tenure, Rs 22.7 were transferred from the Provident Fund, while cheques worth more than Rs 9.8 million were also issued illegally. Accused Shahid Latif is accused of transferring pension funds to the accounts of serving employees, thus causing irreparable loss to the corporation's funds. Accused Tahir Ghuman, as the in-charge of audit, could not fulfill his responsibility. Every cheque issued should be checked against the ledger and the payment from the government bank account and the approved amount should be mutually the same. An FIR was registered against him for failure to fulfill official duties and facilitation. The investigation officer of the case, Muhammad Junaid, told the court that former Executive Director Adnan Akram Baiwa was responsible to monitor the financial affairs of the institution but he failed to fulfill it due to which the financial matters were not only mismanaged but also provided free opportunities for loot to the co-accused. On this occasion, the learned judge ordered that the hearing of the pre-arrest bail petitions of all the accused will be held together on September 16, and all the lawyers will come with case preparations. -APP

## Pakistani Textile innovators forge new pathways



"This type of exhibition enables Pakistani companies to not only upgrade their technological capabilities but also form strategic alliances for entering third-party markets." The timing of the expo aligns with high-level diplomatic engagement, including the Pakistani Prime Minister's visit to the SCO summit in Tianiin and the second Pakistan-China Investment B2B Conference in Beijing. Textile is one of the central themes in these discussions, with numerous joint ventures and technology transfer agreements related to

manufacturing facilities in Pakistan expected to be advanced, noted the Consul General. Among the Pakistani exhibitors is Azgard Nine Ltd. a producer of environmentally sustainable denim fabrics and garments for global markets. Deputy General Manager Sana Arshad expressed strong optimism based on past successes. "Our participation in the spring edition yielded positive results, and we are highly confident that this edition will open even more doors for innovation and partnership," she remarked. Threat to Regional Peace

ATER is the lifeline of nations, and for Pakistan, a largely agrarian country, its survival and economy are directly tied to the steady flow of rivers origi-

nating from India. However, recent reports and repeated instances highlight how

India is deliberately manipulating water flows to Pakistan – releasing water when it is not needed, and blocking it when Pakistan's farmers and people desperate-

ly require it. This practice, often termed "water terrorism," is not only unjust

but also a dangerous game that could severely damage relations between the two

neighbors. The 1960 Indus Waters Treaty, brokered by the World Bank, has been

regarded as one of the most successful water-sharing agreements in the world.

Despite wars and hostilities, the treaty has largely endured, giving India control over the eastern rivers (Ravi, Beas, Sutlej) while Pakistan received rights

over the western rivers (Indus, Jhelum, Chenab). Yet, over the years, India has

tried to exploit loopholes, building dams and barrages on the western rivers and controlling flows in a way that undermines Pakistan's rightful share.

When India suddenly releases large volumes of water during monsoon or floods,

it causes devastation in Pakistan's plains, destroying crops, homes, and liveli-

hoods. Conversely, when Pakistan needs water during sowing or peak irrigation seasons, India often holds it back, creating drought-like conditions. This delib-

erate manipulation is more than just mismanagement – it is a clear attempt to weaponize water against Pakistan. Such tactics not only breach the spirit of the

Pakistan has repeatedly raised this issue on diplomatic platforms, urging India to

honor its commitments and act responsibly. But India's increasing aggression and

provocative statements from its officials reveal a mindset where water is being

used as a pressure tool against Pakistan. Such actions amount to environmental



### The United Nations: A toothless tiger

THE United Nations (UN) was founded in 1945 with the noble aim of maintaining international peace and security. Yet, nearly eight decades later, the organization stands as a shadow of its original vision—paralyzed by geopolitical rivalries, held hostage by veto-wielding powers, and rendered increasingly irrelevant in resolving the world's most pressing conflicts. From the Israel-Iran tensions to the Gaza crisis, the Kashmir dispute, and the endless infighting in Africa, the UN has failed to act as an effective mediator. The Secretary-General, instead of being a moral authority, has been reduced to a helpless figurehead whose pleas for peace are ignored by warring nations and powerful Security Council members alike. If the UN can no longer fulfill its primary mandate, then it is time to ask: What is its purpose?

The fundamental problem with the UN lies in its structure. The Security Council's five permanent members (P5)-the United States, Russia, China, France, and the United Kingdom-hold veto power, allowing any one of them to block resolutions that threaten their interests. This has turned the UN into a battleground for great power politics rather than a platform for conflict resolution. The ongoing humanitarian catastrophe in Gaza is a glaring example of the UN's impotence. Despite overwhelming global condemnation of Israel's military actions, the US has repeatedly vetoed ceasefire resolutions, shielding its ally from accountability. The Secretary-General's appeals for restraint are dismissed, and UN agencies like UNRWA are defunded and demonized. If the UN cannot even enforce its own humanitarian principles when a nuclear-armed state flouts international law, then what good is it? The recent exchange of missile strikes between Israel and Iran further exposed the UN's irrelevance. Rather than mediating de-escalation, the Security Council remained deadlocked, with Western powers backing Israel and Russia and China refusing to take a strong stance. The Secretary-General's calls for restraint were ignored, proving that the UN has no real authority when major powers are involved. The Kashmir dispute between India and Pakistan has been on the UN agenda since 1948, yet no meaningful progress has been made. India dismisses UN resolutions as outdated, while Pakistan uses them for rhetorical leverage. The UN's failure to enforce its own mandates has left Kashmiris trapped in a cycle of violence and repression. If the organization cannot even facilitate dialogue after 75 years, why does it still pretend to care?

From Sudan to the Democratic Republic of Congo, Somalia to the Sahel, Africa remains a hotbed of conflict. The UN's peacekeeping missions (MONUSCO, MINUSMA, etc.) have been criticized for inefficiency, corruption, and even complicity in abuses. The Security Council pays lip service to African crises but refuses to authorize robust interventions when they do not align with Western or Russian interests. The current Secretary-General, António Guterres, has become a symbol of the UN's impotence. His statements on Gaza, Ukraine, and other conflicts are met with indifference. When he invoked Article 99 of the UN Charter to force attention on Gaza, the Security Council barely reacted.

## SCO Summit 2025: Jeopardised by India's Missteps

The SCO Summit was convened at a critical moment in global geopolitics. The world today faces unprecedented instability: Trump's aggressive tariff regime has weaponized global trade, disrupting supply chains and punishing economies. including India, China, and Russia. In South Asia, India and Pakistan recently faced a dangerous military confrontation that brought the region to the brink of a devastating war, averted only by a fragile ceasefire that saved thousands of lives. In Europe, the Russia-Ukraine conflict continues to destabilize global energy markets, while Trump's attempts at mediation have thus far failed

HE Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) Summit 2025 in China was one of the most significant geopolitical gatherings in recent years, bringing together three global superpowers-China, Russia, and India-alongside important regional players like Pakistan, Iran, and Central Asian nations at a time when the world stands on the edge of political, economic, and military upheaval. With NATO reasserting itself, the United States under President Donald Trump weaponizing tariffs, and regional flashpoints from Ukraine to Gaza and South Asia, this summit carried the potential to reshape global alliances and strengthen multilateral cooperation. Yet instead of emerging as a defining moment, the summit became a missed opportunity, largely because of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's confrontational conduct, misplaced priorities, and provocative statements that derailed the possibility of a unified SCO declaration and weakened the bloc's collective response to Western dominance.

The SCO Summit was convened at a critical moment in global geopolitics. The world today faces unprecedented instability: Trump's aggressive tariff regime has weaponized global trade, disrupting supply chains and punishing economies, including India, China, and Russia. In South Asia, India and Pakistan recently faced a dangerous military confrontation that brought the region to the brink of a devastating war, averted only by a fragile ceasefire that saved thousands of lives. In Europe, the Russia-Ukraine conflict continues to destabilize global energy markets, while Trump's attempts at mediation have thus far failed. In East Asia, the United States has escalated tensions with China by establishing long- and short-range missile facilities in Japan and creating a defensive ring stretching across the South China Sea and Pacific, posing a direct strategic threat to Beijing. Meanwhile, in the Middle East, Israel's relentless campaign in Gaza and the West Bank has resulted in widespread displacement, civilian casualties, and annexation of Palestinian lands, sparking outrage across Asia and beyond. Against this backdrop, the SCO-representing 40% of the world's population and nearly 30% of global GDP-had a historic opportunity to chart an independent course, strengthen regional alliances, and collectively respond to Western economic, political, and military dominance. It could have laid the foundation for greater economic cooperation, explored trade settlements in yuan or local currencies, and spoken with a unified voice on sovereignty, security, and development. Instead, much of this potential was lost because of India's confrontational approach and Modi's controversial conduct, which distracted the forum from its central objectives and deepened divisions within the bloc.

Prime Minister Modi used the SCO platform to pursue his domestic political agenda, prioritizing confrontation over cooperation. One of the clearest examples was his relentless focus on targeting Pakistan over terrorism. Despite the fact that all SCO members collectively condemn terrorism in all its forms, Modi repeatedly singled out Pakistan, making direct accusations and threatening punitive measures. His language transformed what should have been a constructive, collaborative conversation into a politically charged confrontation. Rather than using the forum to strengthen regional security frameworks, Modi alienated Pakistan and created unnecessary friction with China and Russia, both of whom see

Islamabad as a strategic partner in South Asia. Tensions escalated further when Modi openly criticized China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), declaring that "connectivity loses its meaning if it bypasses sovereignty," an unmistakable reference to the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), which runs through disputed territory in Kashmir. While sovereignty concerns may be valid, raising the issue in this forum and framing it as an attack on China undermined the spirit of regional integration that the SCO seeks to promote. With over 150 countries engaged in BRI-related projects and billions of dollars in infrastructure, trade, and investment flows tied to the initiative, Modi's remarks risked alienating not just China but many other SCO members benefiting from the program. Instead of working toward solutions that accommodate national sensitivities while promoting connectivity, India created further discord at a time when unity was critical.

The most controversial moment came when Modi directly urged Russia to end its war in Ukraine, a position that not only ignored the complex dynamics of the conflict but also bypassed the fact that Ukraine is not an SCO member. By effectively assigning blame to Moscow in the presence of President Vladimir Putin, Modi politicized the forum and further strained ties within the organization. At a time when the SCO could have provided a neutral platform for dialogue, India's unilateral positioning alienated Russia and derailed the possibility of consensus on the conflict's broader regional and global implications.

The result of these actions was the loss of extraordinary opportunities that could have reshaped Asia's strategic landscape. The SCO Summit had the potential to create alternative financial and trade mechanisms that would protect member economies from U.S.-imposed sanctions and Trump's punitive tariffs, including the unprecedented 50% tariffs imposed on Indian exports. A unified SCO response to such measures would have sent a strong message of resilience to Washington. The summit could also have facilitated the creation of alternative supply chain frameworks and currency settlements, boosting regional self-reliance while reducing dependency on Western-controlled systems. Furthermore, a united SCO could have collectively condemned Israel's ongoing atrocities in Gaza and the West Bank, asserting the bloc's moral authority and influence on one of the world's most pressing humanitarian crises. Similarly, the fragile India-Pakistan ceasefire could have been strengthened through mediation frameworks discussed within the summit. These measures would not only have stabilized the region but also positioned the SCO as a credible alternative to NATO and other Western-led alliances in shaping global security and economic priorities.

Instead, Modi's confrontational stance turned the summit into a political battlefield, undermining its relevance and weakening its impact. By framing India's positions as superior and by openly criticizing both Pakistan and China while indirectly challenging Russia, Modi alienated key partners and prevented the SCO from issuing a strong, unified declaration. At a time when collective strength was essential, India's approach exposed internal divisions and diminished the bloc's ability to assert its influence on the global stage. This failure carries far-reaching consequences. India's conduct risks eroding its credibility as a serious multilateral player and raises doubts among SCO members about its reliability as a partner. More importantly, the fractured summit outcome allows the United States and its Western allies to continue exploiting divisions within Asia, maintaining dominance over trade, finance, and security frameworks without facing an effective counterbalance. The inability of the SCO to deliver a cohesive strategy strengthens Washington's hand and undermines efforts to build a multipolar global order.

The SCO must now confront difficult questions about its own structure, leadership, and objectives. If the organization is to remain relevant, it needs internal checks and balances to prevent any single member from jeopardizing its collective agenda. Its focus must return to economic integration, infrastructure development, and multilateral coordination in response to Western sanctions and financial coercion. Disputes between members should be addressed diplomatically and privately, ensuring that the organization presents a united front on critical issues like trade, security, and sovereignty.

The SCO Summit 2025 was a rare moment when emerging powers had the chance to reshape the balance of global power and demonstrate Asia's capacity to define its own future. Representing over 3 billion people, the organization had the influence and authority to strengthen regional integration, reduce dependency on Western systems, and challenge global inequities. But instead of a historic breakthrough, the summit exposed the vulnerability of an organization undermined from within. By pursuing narrow domestic political agendas in an international forum, Prime Minister Modi not only weakened India's standing but also jeopardized the SCO's ability to act as a credible counterweight to Western power. At a time when the world faces escalating conflicts, economic fragmentation, and deepening humanitarian crises, Asia needed leadership, vision, and unity. What it received instead was division, distraction, and paralysis. Unless the SCO learns from this failure and reforms itself to ensure collective purpose and discipline, it risks becoming yet another fractured body-unable to defend the interests of its members and irrelevant in shaping the new world order.

### Tariffs, Jobs and the Future of Pakistan's Auto Industry

Global practices offer lessons. VERY so often, a policy decision emerges that goes far beyond statistics and spreadsheets: it speaks which a nation's economy is headed. Pakistan's newly announced National Tariff Policy is one such case. By slashing customs duties on imported vehicles from the current 100-50% range to a mere 15% over five years, eliminating regulatory duties that now reach up to 90%, and phasing out additional duties, the government has taken a step that may please importers and car dealers. But for Pakistan's domestic auto industry, this is less a "reform" and more a looming storm.

The automotive sector in Pakistan is not just about cars on roads; it is an industrial backbone. It hosts 13 global brands, is supported by over 1,200 parts manufacturers, and directly sustains 1.5 million jobs. Indirectly, nearly 3 million livelihoods depend on it. More than US\$5 billion has been invested in infrastructure, technology, and tooling in recent decades. To undermine such a base with abrupt liberalization is to gamble with one of the country's few credible industrial success stories.

The revenue stakes are equally serious. At present, the government collects nearly one crore rupees in tax on a luxury vehicle costing three crore. With a fiscal deficit exceeding one trillion rupees, removing such revenue streams raises a pressing question: where will the state make up the shortfall? Even more troubling than tariff cuts is the decision to allow commercial imports of used cars. No country with established CKD (completely knocked down) manufacturing permits this, precisely because it erodes domestic production. In Pakistan, what began as a concession for overseas Pakistanis has been systematically misused for commercial trading. The fallout is not merely economic – it fuels informal money transfers through Hundi and Hawala, inviting scrutiny from watchdogs such as FATF. Global practices offer lessons. In New Zealand, every imported vehicle undergoes a two-stage inspection, covering odometer tampering, emissions, damage, and safety, with independent verification of repairs. In Australia, the Road Vehicle Standards framework mandates that imports comply with strict environmental and safety norms before they can even be registered. Pakistan, too, could adopt a similar model: pre- and post-shipment inspections, UN-standard certifications, mandatory data exchange with exporting countries, and legally binding commitments from importers to supply spare parts and after-sales services for at least a decade. Balancing protection with competition is key. Experts recommend lowering the tax depreciation rate from 1% to 0.25% (capped at 36%), setting minimum trade prices in consultation with stakeholders, and imposing a carbon levy on older imports to align policy with environmental objectives. Duties on smaller vehicles could be rationalized to improve accessibility for the middle class without dismantling domestic capacity.

The pressures on the auto sector are already im-

mense. High taxes and erratic policies have pushed new cars out of the reach of ordinary citizens. At the same time, the global transition to electric vehicles is accelerating. With China offering competitively priced EVs, Pakistani manufacturers face a dual challenge of survival and transformation. While the government's incentives for EV adoption are welcome, these must be integrated into a policy framework that supports existing production rather than replacing it.

The Pakistan Automotive Manufacturers Association (PAMA) has emphasized two demands: retaining regulatory duties to protect local industry and banning unrestricted imports of used cars. Moreover, any tariff liberalization should be gradual, giving the sector time to build competitiveness instead of being blindsided by a flood of cheaper imports. This is not about resisting globalization. South Korea, Thailand, and China all nurtured their auto sectors through phased liberalization, protecting domestic industries until they were mature enough to face global markets. Pakistan, with its modest volumes and fragile economics, is not yet in that position. The choice is stark: pursue abrupt liberalization that dismantles decades of investment and jeopardizes millions of jobs, or adopt a balanced path that preserves industrial strength while preparing for the mobility future. For policymakers, the lesson is clear. Protect domestic industry today, and you secure not only jobs and investment but also the foundation of industrial resilience for generations to come.

According to a report released by the Pakistan Institute for Conflict and Security Studies (PICSS), an Islamabad-based think tank, the country witnessed 78 terrorist attacks during June, which resulted in at least 100 deaths. Among the fatalities were 53 security personnel, 39 civilians, six militants, and two members of local peace committees.

A total of 189 people were injured, including 126 members of the security forces and 63 civilians.



### 'Biggest' Women's Asian Cup can help drive change, says top official

HONG KONG: Next year's Women's Asian Cup can help break down barriers for women in the region, a lead organiser told AFP, saying it will be the biggest tournament in its history. Australia will host the 12-team competition on March 1-21, having successfully staged the FIFA Women's World Cup in 2023 along with New Zealand. That competition broke records on and off the pitch while women's football has boomed in Europe, with this summer's continental championships in Switzerland played out to unprecedented crowds. Sarah Walsh, an Australian former international player and now chief operating officer of the local organising committee for next year's tournament, admitted that Asia is playing catch-up in that respect.

Some countries in the region are lagging when it comes to gender equality in society, but football can play a part. "Any time we platform women, particularly on broadcast, or in the centre of the pitch when there's 40,000 people watching, absolutely (it can have a wider impact)," Walsh said on the sidelines of a Hong Kong football conference. "There are still inequalities in Australia, and I think that platforming the

There is no concern about the locals turning out en masse again in March for the Matildas, but Walsh knows that "it will be challenging to fill out the stadiums" for some other games.

"Europe is leading the way with the Euros, but I think that we have a lot of catching up to do as well," said Walsh. As well as the Matildas, Japan, North Korea and title-holders China will all be serious contenders. At the other end of the scale, Bangladesh are at the Women's Asian Cup for the first time. "I spend more of my time thinking about this than anything else," said Walsh about how the tournament can replicate the kinds of crowds and interest generated by the European equivalent. Organisers have multiple solutions, including drawing on Australia's multi-cultural communities. Early ticket sales have been promising, said Walsh. She told the World Football Summit in Hong Kong on Wednesday that next year's 21st edition "will absolutely be the biggest Women's Asian Cup ever". But Walsh said a one-off successful tournament, including strong television audiences in Asia, is just the start. "You only have to look at the investment that's happening, particularly in the Middle East, and how we think that might translate to women's football," she said, adding that while Saudi Arabia will not be at this Asian Cup, "it's just a matter of time". "It's all moving in the right direction," she said.

South Africa Set for Full Pakistan Tour in 2025 Featuring Tests, ODIs, and T20Is

ISLAMABAD:International cricket in Pakistan is set for another major boost as the Men in Green will officially host South Africa for a full series, with the tentative schedule of the upcoming tour now released. The Proteas will play two Tests, three ODIs, and three T20Is in October and November 2025, marking their first Test appearance on Pakistani soil in more than four years. According to the proposed schedule, the two Tests are slated for October 12-16 and October 20-24, with the limited overs leg to follow from 28th of October. ODIs are scheduled for 28, 30 October and 2nd of November with T20Is taking place on 5, 8 and 9th of November.

### Quetta-born boxer says his ultimate goal is to bring glory to country

ISLAMABAD: Pakistani professional boxer Shoaib Khan Zehri is set to represent the country in the upcoming Universal Boxing Organisation (UBO) World title bout in Turkiye, where he will go up against Indian opponent Thakur Kumar. The historic clash is scheduled to take place in Turkiye on September 27. Zehri will be Pakistan's sole representative in the prestigious event, marking a significant milestone in the nation's 76-year boxing history.

The Quetta-born boxer expressed his determination ahead of the highly anticipated contest, saving that his ultimate goal is to bring glory to the country. "I will give my best to raise Pakistan's flag high," Shoaib said. "This fight is about Pakistan's honour. I am fully prepared and confident of beating my opponent," he added.

The 27-year-old boxer also underlined the dedication and hard work he has put into his training camp. "I have trained hard for this challenge. My focus is on discipline,

endurance and strategy," he said. "The youth from Balochistan and from all over Pakistan look up to me, and I want to show them that with commitment and hard work nothing is impossible," he concluded.

In recognition of his achievements, the Balochistan Police recently appointed Zehri as its goodwill ambassador. He was also conferred the honourary rank of Deputy Superintendent of Police (DSP) by Inspector General of Police Moazzam Jah Ansari on February 19. Notably, he is the second athlete from the province to be given this honour, following fast bowler Naseem Shah.

Zehri's accolades include being a WBC gold medalist, Asian Boxing Federation (ABF) Asian Champion, and Pakistan Boxing Council (PBC) national champion. He also heads Chief SKZ Promotion.

The 27-year-old maintains an unbeaten professional record with six wins, one draw, and one cancelled bout. Zehri has steadily built a reputation as a disciplined



and technically gifted boxer. His latest victory came on November 8, 2024, at the Fitbox Fighting Championship, where he outclassed Ziaullah Amin to secure a unanimous decision. He defeated Muhammad Bilal in September last year at the Boxing Fight Show, again winning by unanimous decision.

Zehri also convincingly beat Sajid Khan in January 2024 in a bout titled Shoaib vs Khan. Although his scheduled fight against Anocha Phuangkaew in March 2023 was cancelled, his 2022 campaign showcased his rise on the international stage.

On November 30, 2022, he defeated Indonesia's Hendrik Barongsay via unanimous decision in The Challenger event.

Two months prior, on September 28, 2022, Zehri secured a third-round victory over Thailand's Sornram Sopakul in Fight of the Future. He also fought to a split draw against Irfan Ullah on July 31, 2022, at New Friend's Professional Boxing Fight Night the only blemish on his otherwise flawless record. On June 10, 2022, he faced Ali Raza in the Khan vs Farooq event, where he impressed with a composed unanimous decision victory. - Agencies

#### **UK** sanctions target Russians linked to deportation of Ukrainian children

LONDON:

Wednesday imposed sanctions on 11 more individuals and entities affiliated with the Russian state, targeting those involved in what it said were Moscow's attempts to forcibly deport and indoctrinate Ukraine's children. Ukraine says that more than 19,500 children have been taken to Russia or Russian-occupied territory during the war without the consent of family or guardians, calling the abductions a war crime that meets the UN treaty definition of genocide. Moscow has said it was protecting vulnerable children from a war zone. "The Kremlin's policy of forced deportations, indoctrination and militarization of Ukrainian children is despicable," foreign minister David Lammy said in a statement, setting out Britain's latest round of sanctions against Russia for the war in Ukraine. Organizations such as the Akhmat Kadyrov Foundation which runs re-education programs for Ukrainian children and teenagers, subjecting them to militaristic training, and its president, Aymani Nesievna Kadyrova, are among those targeted, the statement said. The sanctions include asset freezes, travel bans and other penalties. The Russian embassy in London said the sanctions were unlawful and based on "unfounded claims" from Ukraine about the forcible transfer of children. "We call upon the UK authorities to refrain from making baseless accusations in future and to avoid hindering the efforts aimed at protecting the rights and interests of minors," it said in a post on social media. In March, a report by the United Nations Human Rights Office said Russia had inflicted suffering unimaginable on millions of Ukrainian children and violated their rights since its full scale invasion of Ukraine began in 2022.-APP

### Palestine at center of Arab League ministerial talks

DUBAI: Palestine dominated the agenda as Arab League foreign ministers met in Cairo on Thursday, with leaders calling for an end to Israeli settlement activity and reiterating support for the establishment of a Palestinian state.

The session focused on efforts to persuade more Western countries to recognize Palestinian statehood and to halt what ministers described as "Israeli aggression against the Gaza Strip. UAE Minister of State Khalifa bin Shaheen Al-Marr urged an immediate end to "displacement and colonization in Palestinian territories," adding that the UAE has presented an official roadmap for establishing a Palestinian state. He also underscored the importance of stability in Libya and Syria, welcomed Lebanon's decision to restrict weapons to state control, and called on the international community to shoulder its responsibilities toward Yemen. Al-Marr further pressed for greater Arab economic cooperation, expanded partnerships, and a unified stance on peace and counter-terrorism at what he described as "a very dangerous moment" in the region. Jordanian Foreign Minister Ayman Safadi echoed the centrality of Palestine, describing joint Arab action as "a necessity that should be placed at the top of our priorities." He reaffirmed Jordan's support for Lebanon's stability and Syria's reconstruction while warning against "plans to divide" Syria. nArab League Secretary-General Ahmed Aboul Gheit delivered some of the strongest remarks, condemning Israeli policies and voicing support for Palestine, Lebanon, and Sudan-.DNA

Uzbekistan is interested in advanced technologies, efficient agricultural solutions used in Belarus. The country hopes to deepen cooperation in the processing of agricultural products and their export.-APP

### Palestinian govt warns of deepening health crisis amid Israeli genocidal war

RAMALLAH: The Government of Palestine warns of the grave and mounting consequences of the ongoing Israeli genocidal war and siege on the Gaza Strip, attacks by the Israeli occupation forces and colonial-settlers across the West Bank, as well as the financial strangulation imposed by the Israeli occupation on the State of Palestine, particularly impacting the health sector, which has now driven the Ministry of Health's accumulated debt to more than \$912 million, paralyzing the sector's ability to secure life-saving medicines, medical consumables, and

In the Gaza Strip, the situation is nothing short of catastrophic. Israel's ongoing genocidal war has deliberately dismantled the health system, reducing hospitals and medical infrastructure to ruins. Coupled with a total and suffocating Israeli siege that blocks the entry of food, medicine, and life-saving supplies, and reinforced by a systematic policy of starvation, this has produced an unparalleled humanitarian disaster. The few hospitals that remain partially functional are unable to provide even the most basic services. Children-our people's future-are the most affected, as they will bear the scars of starvation, deprivation, and denial of treatment, for decades to come, as they continue to bear the brunt of Israel's grave violations that threaten their lives, health.

In the West Bank, the Israeli occupation's financial strangulation-directly resulting from Israel's ongoing withholding of Palestinian clearance revenues and the deliberate suffocation of public finances-is endangering the very foundations of healthcare delivery. The debt burden has left over 110 essential medicines and 170 categories of medical consumables and laboratory materials at zero stock, forcing thousands of patients to be referred to private and non-governmental hospitals, already suffering their own financial crises, effectively increasing the medical referral bill and purchasing of services. Patients with chronic diseases, such as diabetes, hypertension, heart and kidney disease, face life-threatening deterioration due to the lack of essential medicines and the inability to receive proper treatment. The absence of adequate medical care will have long-term consequences, leaving them to suffer life-long and irreversible consequences. The financial crisis for non-governmental hospitals is particularly evident in East Jerusalem hospitals, especially Al-Maqasid and Augusta Victoria, two of the most vital centers for cancer treatment and specialized care, and among the largest referral centers for the Ministry of Health patients. Their ability to operate is now at risk, endangering the

lives of countless patients who rely on their services. The Government reiterates that the Israeli genocidal war, siege, and financial strangulation are not only crippling the Palestinian healthcare system but also constitutes a direct threat to patient safety and the continuity of critical health services across Palestine.

The Government calls on the international community, Arab states, and donor partners to urgently intervene to,-Pressure the Israeli occupation to halt its genocidal war on the Gaza Strip; Lift the siege and open Gaza's border crossings, allowing for the unimpeded entry of food, medicines and supplies; Enable the reconstruction and reactivation of Gaza's devastated health system; Pressure the Israeli occupation to release the withheld Palestinian tax revenues; Provide direct financial support to cover the accumulated debts of the Ministry of Health Immediately replenish depleted stocks of medicines and medical supplies. Sustain the financial lifeline of Palestinian hospitals and referral centers.

The Government underscores that the right to health is a fundamental human right under international law, and the international community bears both a moral and legal responsibility to ensure that Palestinian patients are not denied access to essential healthcare due to the Israeli occupation's collective punishment measures.—Agencies

Kim, who is now detained at the Seoul Southern Detention Center, did not attend the hearing submit any statement of opinion, they added. The SMOE has informed Kim, through the detention center, to review the hearing results and transcripts. The revocation will be finalized if she does not appeal the results. In June, Sookmyung Women's University in Seoul canceled Kim's master's degree earned from its Graduate School of Education due to thesis plagiarism. ### 'Pink and green protests call for a reset in Indonesia

JAKARTA: RESET SYS-TEM" reads graffiti above an intersection in the Javanese city of Yogyakarta, painted hastily in vibrant green and pink after deadly protests swept Indonesia last week. Pink and green have quickly come to symbolise a solidarity movement after violent protests, sparked by discontent over economic inequality and lavish perks for lawmakers, rocked Southeast Asia's biggest economy. In the capital Jakarta, office worker Dila paused at her desk to apply a bright green and pink filter to her Instagram and WhatsApp profile pictures. "What we need now is solidarity among each other... because there's still a long way to go," said 28-year-old Dila, who declined to give her full name. Pink represents the colour of the hijab worn by a woman who stood outside the House of Representatives to protest, waving the national flag in defiance of police guarding the building. Green has come to symbolise 21-year-old delivery driver Affan Kurniawan, who was run over by an armoured paramilitary police vehicle and whose death stoked anger among workers who face big pay deductions and longer working hours. - APP

A key pillar of this reform effort is the establishment of internal checks and a policy of zero tolerance towards corrupt practices. This includes profiling of FBR's workforce based on integrity and initiating disciplinary and criminal action where needed.

It may be recalled that in order to strengthen control mechanisms and prevent the misuse of auctioned vehicles, FBR in August 2021 introduced the 'Auction Module' in its WeBOC system. This system enhancement was aimed at addressing the issue of multiple vehicles being registered against documents issued by Customs after the

Through this module, Motor Registration Authorities (MRAs) were enabled to verify auctioned vehicle details online before registration, significantly reducing reliance on paper-based manual verifications. The goal was to both strengthen institutional controls and facilitate legitimate buyers.

However, despite these reforms, reports emerged in July 2025 regarding misuse of the aforementioned Auction Module. In response, FBR immediately initiated an inquiry into the matter. Since the module's launch, details of 1,909 vehicles had been uploaded into the system. Upon detailed scrutiny, it was discovered that 103 of these vehicles had been fraudulently uploaded using fake user identities. MRAs smuggled vehicles, effectively granting Based on a digital audit and internal investigations, FBR identified the user IDs through which the fraud was committed. As a result, on 9th July, 2025, FBR suspended one Deputy Collector and one Assistant Collector, whose credentials had been misused in the commission of this crime.

The investigation further revealed that this was part of a wider criminal racket involving officials from MRAs and car dealers. Recognizing the gravity of the issue, FBR determined that the matter warranted action beyond internal disciplinary proceedings. Accordingly, a formal request by FBR was made on 9th July, 2025 for the constitution of a Joint Investigation Committee (JIT), comprising senior officers from the FIA, Customs,

the Customs digital system. Following FBR's formal complaint to FIA dated 10th July, 2025, the JIT commenced its investigation. As a result, on 28th August, 2025, the FIA lodged an FIR against already identified officers, after being found involved in fraudulently legalizing smuggled vehicles. Today, these individuals have been formally arrested by FIA. It is also pertinent to mention that Customs Enforcement has so far lodged seven FIRs and arrested 13 individuals in connection with this broader scam.

This action sends a clear and firm signal that the criminal elements within the organization will be identified, exposed, and proceeded against in accordance with the law. FBR remains fully committed to holding its officers accountable and ensuring that the integrity of public service

"The Secretary-General is profoundly saddened by the recent floods in northern Pakistan, which have reportedly claimed more than 400 lives," his spokesperson Stephane Dujarric said in a statement.

The disaster, caused by a "severe monsoon exacerbated by climate change," has affected some 1.5 million people, leaving hundreds of thousands in need of humanitarian aid, according to the statement. It further noted that "more than 3,000 homes, over 400 schools, and some 40 health facilities have been damaged."

The UN chief commended Pakistan's response efforts,

cating more than one million people in Punjab." He also "expresses his solidarity with the Government and people of Pakistan, extends his heartfelt condolences to the families of those who have lost their lives, and wishes a swift recovery to those who have been injured."

### after Lisbon funicular derails

LISBON: A famed Lisbon funicular derailed Wednesday and smashed into a building, killing at least 15 and injuring 18 in one of the Portuguese capital's most popular tourist spots. "A tragedy that our city has never seen," Lisbon Mayor Carlos Moedas said of the accident involving the yellow Gloria funicular, one of the capital's best-known symbols. All of the victims have been recovered from the wreckage, said Tiago Augusto, an official with the Inem emergency services, adding that they included foreigners. Rescuers confirmed a toll of 15 dead and 18 injured. De-

Authorities declared Thursday a day of national mourning. The accident happened at 6:15 pm local time (1715 GMT)

on a steep stretch of tracks near Liberty Avenue. Images shared on social media showed the moments immediately following the tragedy, with the funicular appearing out of a cloud of smoke and debris, completely smashed against a wall. Another funicular was stopped a few metres away on the tracks as tourists and onlookers watched, stunned. The SIC television channel quoted a witness as saying that the funicular, which can hold about 40 people, hit a building as it sped down the steep street "at full speed". "It hit a building with brutal force and collapsed like a cardboard box; it had no brakes," the woman said. The Lisbon public transport operator said it had complied with "all maintenance protocols". "Everything was scrupulously respected," Pedro Bogas, the head of Lisbon Carris, said at the site of the accident, adding that maintenance of the funiculars has been done by an outside contractor for the past 14 years. General maintenance is carried out every four years and was last conducted in 2022, Carris said. Intermediate maintenance

takes place every two years and was completed in 2024.

Lisbon prosecutors were opening an investigation into

the circumstances of the accident. - APP

### **Gujrat sinks in deluge from 'record rainfall'**

Torrential rain leaves Gujrat swamped, flooding villages and city areas

GUJRAT: Torrential rainfall wreaked havoc in Gujrat, submerging several villages while urban flooding caused water to accumulate in city areas, as Punjab reels from widespread inundation resulting from the ongoing surge in rivers. As much as 577 millimetres of rainfall was recorded in Gujrat on Wednesday, with rainwater drains spilling and inundating many adjoining villages and damaging crops. The water also entered the district jail and the premises of the sessions court. Due to water accumulation in the sessions court, several prisoners were trans-

ferred to jails in Lahore and Gujranwala.

According to the Guiranwala Commission-

er, Gujrat received 577mm of rain in 24 hours, resulting in multiple areas being submerged and villages inundated. Meanwhile, the Provincial Disaster Management Authority (PDMA) has said that heavy water flows were surging across major rivers and headworks in Punjab, amplifying fears of large-scale flooding downstream.

In the latest update on Thursday, PDMA Director General Irfan Ali Kathia said that rescue efforts in Guirat were facing challenges due to the heavy rains. However, he said, that the unusual scale of rain in Gujrat was not new as the area often receives heavy downpours. He added that the next 24 hours were critical for Multan as flood levels remained dangerously high in the Ravi, Sutlej, and Chenab rivers. While

giving details of the situation at major locations, the PDMA DG said that the flow at Marala Headworks on the River Chenab had reached 247,000 cusecs, while at Khanki Headworks the flow had risen to 526,000 cusecs. At Qadirabad Headworks, water discharge has climbed to 530,000 cusecs, and at Chiniot Bridge, the flow stands at 494,000 cusecs. At Trimmu Headworks, the flow has reached 253,000 cusecs.

On the River Ravi, PDMA reported flows of 82,000 cusecs at Jassar, 98,000 cusecs at Siphon, and 97,400 cusecs at Shahdara. At Balloki Headworks, the discharge is 121,600 cusecs, and at Sidhnai Headworks, it has reached nearly 140,000 cusecs.

The River Sutlej is also witnessing significant inflows, with 319,295 cusecs record-

ed at Ganda Singh Wala, 132,492 cusecs at Sulaimanki Headworks, and 95,727 cusecs at Islam Headworks. At Panjnad Headworks, the flow currently stands at 169,032 cusecs, PDMA stated.

Multiple rivers in Punjab, including Sutlej, Ravi and Chenab are witnessing increased water flow due to torrential rains coupled with the water discharge from India. Nearly 900 people have been killed in

various flood-related incidents across the country since late June, while also causing widespread damage to infrastructure and properties. With vast swathes of land left inundated in floodwaters in Punjab, Sindh is also preparing for a possible super flood as the water flowing in the rising rivers is set to enter the region in a few days.

### Turkey bans concert by French singer

ISTANBUL: Turkish authorities Wednesday said they have banned a planned concert Friday in Istanbul by Enrico Macias after calls to protest the French singer's pro-Israeli views.

The Istanbul governorate said in a statement that it had wanted to prevent any demonstrations on the sidelines of the concert "against the genocide of the terrorist state Israel in Gaza and its supporters". The 86-yearold singer told AFP that he has performed in Turkey for 60 years and is "deeply surprised and saddened not to be able to see my audience, with whom I have always shared values of peace and fraternity."

Macias, who was born into a Jewish family in Algeria, has on several occasions defended Israel's lethal response to Hamas's deadly October 2023 attacks.

"My problem is that I can't stand the violence of the terrorists." he said in an interview on YouTube in August. "And if there was violence on the Israeli side, it was because of Hamas, he said, while saying he had "nothing against the Palestinians." Macias has lived in France since 1961, where he has contributed to the popularity of Arab-Andalusian music. - APP

### All 2024-25 audit reports returned to AGP

ISLAMABAD: The speaker National Assembly has returned all annual audit reports for the audit year 2024-25, covering fiscal year 2023-24 (FY24), to the Auditor General of Pakistan (AGP). citing serious procedural violations amid controversy over the staggering figures of financial irregularities quoted in the documents. "It is a contempt of the National Assembly," the spokesman said, adding that the AGP office was even pressing NA officials to place the reports before the House despite the violations.

The government, meanwhile, suspects that "someone inside the AGP office" is deliberately attempting to embarrass it by leaking the controversial audit reports, which cite an "unbelievable" Rs375,000 billion in financial irregularities during FY2023-24.

The figure -27 times the federal budget of Rs14.5 trillion and more than three times Pakistan's GDP of Rs110 trillion - has raised serious questions about the credibility of the audit process. Former Auditor General Javed Jehangir described the number as "abnormal" and in need of urgent review. "This staggering amount warrants careful re-examination," he told The News, pointing out that during his tenure, audit reports were never published before their presentation in parliament.

### Narendra Modi warns China

NEW DELHI: Images this week of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi holding hands with Russian President Vladimir Putin at a summit hosted by Chinese President Xi Jinping seemed to confirm what many experts have already concluded - the US has stumbled in its effort to draw India into its diplomatic orbit.

Successive US presidential administrations have sought to cultivate the historically non-aligned India as a strategic counterweight to China and Russia. But as the images of Modi in Tianjin underlined, US President Donald Trump appears for now to have undercut that goal with a series of actions. These have included piling 50% tariffs on Indian goods and publicly browbeating New Delhi over what his administration sees as its opportunistic purchases of cheap Russian oil. The souring of the India relationship comes even as US adversaries China, Russia and North Korea have tightened their ties, despite Trump's desire to reset relations with each of them.
