Gets 90 votes Imran's nominee Sohail elected as new KP CM

All political parties took part in the election process; opposition later boycotted on the pretext that Governor had not accepted CM resignation

PESHAWAR: Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader Sohail Afridi has been elected as the new Chief Minister of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) after securing 90 votes in the provincial assembly. Afridi's nomination came directly from PTI founder and former Prime Minister Imran Khan, reaffirming Khan's strong influence over the party's political direction despite ongoing legal and political challenges. The election session, held amid tight security, saw PTI lawmakers and allies rally behind Afridi, giving him a comfortable majority in the 145-member house. Opposition parties, including the Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam-Fazl (JUI-F) and Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N), staged a token protest before the voting began, alleging procedural irregularities. After his election, Chief Minister-designate Sohail Afridi thanked Imran Khan and the party's parliamentary members for their trust, pledging to focus on good governance, merit-based reforms, and development across the province. KP Assembly Speaker Babar Saleem Swati, in his ruling,

termed the objections raised by Governor Kundi as "unconstitutional". The speaker said that Gandapur tendered his resignation under Clause 8 of Article 130 of the Constitution 1973. "Gandapur sent two resignations to the governor on October 8 and then on October 11. Both resignations were signed by Gandapur, and there is no difference between the signature in the first and second resignation," the speaker ruled. Speaker Swati said that all the requirements for the resignation of Gandapur were in "accordance with the Constitution and law", court's decision in the Hafiz Hamdullah case "It is my responsibility to protect the Constitution and the law."

Oath-taking of KP CM should not be delayed

PESHAWAR: Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) Sec-Salman General Raja on Monday warned that the oath-taking of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Chief Minister-elect Sohail Afridi should not be delayed beyond October 14 (tomorrow). The PTI secretary general made the remarks when he, along with other PTI leaders, arrived at the Peshawar High Court to submit a petition seeking the oath-taking of the newly elected KP CM. PTI's Afridi, earlier in the day, was elected as the new chief executive of the province despite the opposition's boycott of the process. He will replace Ali Amin Gandapur as the KP chief minister.

Internet services to face degradation

ISLAMABAD:Pakistan Telecommunications Limited (PTCL) on Monday announced that users would experience degraded internet services tomorrow (Tuesday) as a submarine cable is being repaired. In a post on X, PTCL said that maintenance work on the submarine cable will be carried out to repair a faulty repeater. "The activity will start on October 14 ... around 11am PST, which can last for up to 18 hours," the telecom giant said. "During this period, customers will face Internet service degradation. We regret the inconvenience, please." Meanwhile, internet monitoring service Downdetector showed users reporting issues accessing social media platforms such as Facebook and Instagram in Pakistan.

Calls for review of Afghan policy

KP Chief Minister Afridi rules out military operation

Afridi urged the federal government and the military establishment to revisit Pakistan's Afghan policy, insisting that dialogue and diplomacy, not force, are the only sustainable solutions

PESHAWAR: The Chief Minister-elect of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) Sohail Afridi has firmly ruled out any new military operation in the province, declaring that such actions in the past have backfired and brought immense suffering to the people. He emphasized that the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) government, under the vision of Imran Khan, would not allow any military operation without taking local communities into confidence.

Addressing on the assembly floor after election, Afridi said thousands of internally displaced persons (IDPs) from earlier operations are still struggling to return to normal life. "We cannot repeat the mistakes of the past. The policy of eliminating terrorism can only succeed when the local people, tribal elders, and community leaders are made partners in the process," he said. "Decisions made in drawing rooms have never worked in KP or the tribal areas." Afridi urged the federal government and the military establishment to revisit Pakistan's

Afghan policy, insisting that dialogue and diplomacy, not force, are the only sustainable solutions. He expressed deep concern over the recent eviction drive against Afghan refugees, calling it "inhumane and disgraceful." "Afghans have lived with us for decades; they deserve respect and dignity, not forced expulsions," he said, adding that the Afghan refugee issue is closely linked with PTI's humanitarian policy. "We request the federal government to treat Afghans with compassion and consult KP's local representatives before finalizing any policy on Afghanistan." Reaffirming his loyalty to Imran Khan, Afridi said he would continue to carry forward the PTI founder's mission for justice and democracy. He warned against any move to shift Imran Khan's imprisonment from Adiala Jail to a military facility, saying, "If such an attempt is made, we will jam the entire country. The KP Chief Minister-elect also expressed strong opposition to drone attacks and other military measures that result in civilian casualties, saying these actions only fuel resentment and instability.

BEIJING: China's Foreign Ministry has expressed deep concern over the recent clashes between Pakistan and Afghanistan, calling on both neighboring countries to exercise restraint and ensure the safety of Chinese citizens and investments in the region. A spokesperson for the Chinese Foreign Ministry said Beijing is closely monitoring the situation and remains in contact with both Islamabad and Kabul. "China is deeply concerned about the recent border tensions between Pakistan and Afghanistan," the statement read. "We urge both sides to resolve their

'China sincerely hopes that both sides will focus on the broader picture, remain calm and restrained, adhere to resolving mutual concerns through dialogue and consultation, avoid escalating conflicts, and jointly maintain peace and stability in both countries and the region', Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Lin Jian said on Monday, commenting on the recent Pakistan-Afghanistan border clashes which caused dozens of deaths. The ministry emphasized that a large number of Chinese citizens are working and traveling in both countries and

vestments in various sectors, including infrastructure, energy, and trade. "It is the shared responsibility of both Pakistan and Afghanistan to protect Chinese nationals, institutions, and projects," the statement added.

China has long maintained close economic and strategic ties with both countries and has been promoting regional connectivity through initiatives such as the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) and other Belt and Road projects. The latest appeal reflects Beijing's growing concern about security risks that could impact its interests and regional cooperation efforts.

Sindh CM launches week-long anti-Polio campaign

The Chief Minister reaffirmed the government's commitment, in collaboration with WHO, UNICEF, the Gates Foundation, and Rotary International, to make Pakistan polio-free

KARACHI:Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah on Monday launched the province-wide anti-polio campaign by administering drops to two newborns at KMC Gizri Maternity Home.

The week-long campaign, running from October 13 to 19, aims to vaccinate over 10.6 million children under five across Sindh.

Sindh Health Minister Dr Azra Fazal Pechuho, IGP Ghulam Nabi Memon, Commissioner Karachi Hassan Naqvi, Secretary School Education Zahid Abbasi, Secretary Health Rehan Baloch, senior health and education officials, EOC Coordinator Irshad Sodhar, and representatives from UNICEF, WHO, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and Rotary others were also present on the occasion. The Chief Minister Murad Ali Shah emphasised the importance of full monitoring in all districts and announced that vaccination teams

would visit households to administer anti-polio drops and provide Vitamin A supplements. He noted that 80,000 health workers and 21,000 security personnel are participating in the campaign.

Expressing concern over the reporting of nine new polio cases in Sindh this year, as well as the continued presence of the virus in environmental samples Shah said, "Polio elimination is our moral responsibility. Every child deserves a healthy and safe future."

He urged parents to ensure their children receive the drops and to contact the nearest health centre if any child is missed. Shah also called on religious scholars, teachers, civil society, politicians, and the media to support the campaign. He assured parents of the vaccine's safety, recalling that Shaheed Benazir Bhutto had administered it to her own daughter. Asifa Bhutto Zardari. The Chief Minister reaffirmed the government's commitment, in collaboration with

WHO, UNICEF, the Gates Foundation, and Rotary International, to make Pakistan polio-free. He stated that any refusal to vaccinate would be reported to a monitoring cell at the Chief Minister's House, and efforts would be made to convince parents.

Talking to the media, Shah emphasised that polio is still endemic only in Pakistan and Afghanistan, stressing their aim for 100 per cent coverage across all 1,400 UCs in Sindh. He added that Pakistani teams also vaccinate Afghan children before they return across the border. To intensify awareness, letters will be sent to all media outlets to promote the campaign. In a lighter tone, Shah said, "I have administered polio drops so many times that I have become an expert," adding, "This is not a difficult task-it is our duty to protect our children."He concluded by reaffirming the Pakistan Peoples Party government's pledge: "We

will create a polio-free Pakistan.

burning crop

LAHORE: The Punjab Agriculture department has urged paddy growers to refrain from burning crop residues after its harvesting in order to prevent smog formation A spokesman for the department said here on Monday that farmers had been advised to follow the guidelines issued by the department for proper disposal of crop residues. He said that burning rice stubble damages the organic matter present in the top soil and reduces soil fertility. He further said that, under the Punjab Chief Minister's Smog Control Programme, the Punjab government had provided 5,000 Super Seeders to farmers at 60 percent subsidy, costing Rs 5 billion, to enable them to manage crop residues efficiently using modern machinery. Paddy growers could utilize Super Seeders to incorporate crop residues into the soil instead of burning them. After harvesting, farmers

could enhance soil fertility by mixing the remaining stubble into the soil rather than setting it on fire, he

Paddy residues could be incorporated into the soil using a Rotavator (in case of manual harvesting) or Disc Harrow (in case of mechanical harvesting), he said and added alternatively, farmers may plough the field deeply, apply half a bag of urea per acre and irrigate the land. He said that this practice improves soil fertility and productivity.-APP



exports to China increases 17% ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's exports of flours and meals of

fish, used in animal feeding have shown a notable increase of 17% in the first eight months of 2025. Gwadar Pro quoting the recent trade data of the General Administration of Customs of the People's Republic of China (GACC) stated, "from January to August this year, Pakistan exported goods worth \$25.19 million in this category to China, compared to \$21.56 million during the same period in 2024. Pakistan exported 23,012.01 tons of Flours meals of fish, used in animal feeding in the first eight months of 2025 while in the same period of 2024, it was 18,63.415 tons. This year's average price was one dollar per KG which is very competitive compared to neighboring countries, according to GACC. Analysts attribute this increase to stronger trade relations between the two countries, with both governments focusing on expanding bilateral commerce in the food and agricultural sectors. Experts believe that the continued growth in exports can be linked to Pakistan's competitive pricing and the rising global demand for high-protein products, including meat and seafood. China's vast market and expanding consumer base are playing a crucial role in boosting demand for such products. They further added that Pakistani enterprises are regularly participating in exhibitions and trade fairs in China, as both nations look to further strengthen their economic ties, this uptick in exports not only reflects Pakistan's growing presence in China's food import market but also signals positive trends in bilateral trade, which is expected to continue expanding in the coming months.—DNA

CDA, Pak-EPA join hands to combat Smog in Islamabad

All brick kilns will have to adopt modern, environmentally friendly zig-zag technology by October 20 be established in Islamabad for testing

ISLAMABAD: Chairman Capital Development Authority (CDA) and Chief Commissioner Islamabad, Muhammad Ali Randhawa, and Director General of the Pakistan Environmental Protection Agency (Pak-EPA), Nazia Zeb Ali, jointly chaired a meeting at the CDA Headquarters on Monday regarding smog prevention and environmental protection in Islamabad. The meeting was attended by Member Planning and Design Dr. Khalid Hafiz, Member Engineering Syed Nafasat Raza, Member Environment Esfandyar Baloch, Deputy Commissioner Islamabad Irfan Nawaz Memon, DG Resources, Pak-EPA and other concerned officers from CDA. The meeting decided on several measures for smog prevention, the elimination of air pollution and environmental protection in Islamabad.

Chairman CDA Muhammad Ali Randhawa said that in this regard, relevant institutions, in collaboration with the Pakistan

Environmental Protection Agency (Pak-EPA), will ensure the implementation of a comprehensive and joint strategy for prevention of smog and clean environment in Islamabad. He said that, in line with the direction of Prime Minister Shahbaz Sharif and Federal Minister for Interior Mohsin Naqvi, protection of environment, including the reduction of smog and air pollution in Islamabad is our top priority. While being briefed by the DC Islamabad, the meeting was informed that various measures are being taken concerning the transport sector, brick kilns and industries in the city to reduce smog. Vehicle carbon emission tests are being conducted to control air pollution in the transport sector. The briefing informed the meeting that data from vehicle carbon tests related to the transport sector is being shared directly on a dashboard. The Pakistan Environmental Protection Agency (Pak-EPA) informed that five certified laboratories are operational in the capital for testing vehicle carbon emissions. Chairman CDA further directed that more checkpoints

The meeting also discussed controlling air pollution from brick kilns and industries. It was mandated that all brick kilns and industries in the capital city, Islamabad, must transfer into modern and environmentally friendly technology. The meeting specifically set a deadline of 20th October, 2025 for brick kilns to adopt modern zig-zag technology. In this context, it was decided that strict legal action would be taken against brick kilns that fail to transition to zigzag technology after the deadline of October 20, 2025. China refutes claims of **Pak using Chinese Tech** to gift rare

ISLAMABAD: stressed that its interactions with the United States would not harm Chinese interests or China-Pakistan cooperation. The rare earth minerals were raw samples of local gemstones, Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson Lin Jian said on Monday, according to Cina Economic Net (CEN). Lin made the remarks in response to a media query regarding reports that Pakistan is using Chinese equipment and technology to export rare earth to the United States, leading to China's introduction of new regulations that strictly control the export of rare earth-related technologies. Some self-published videos and articles claimed that "Pakistan gifted rare earth samples to the U.S. and agreed to cooperate on rare earth. China is countering Pakistan's rare earth exports to the U.S." "China and Pakistan have maintained communication regarding Pakistan-U.S. mineral cooperation," Lin told a daily news briefing, noting that "the reports you cited are either ill-informed, speculative, or even aimed at sowing discord - they are completely unfounded." China and Pakistan, as all-weather strategic cooperative partners, have a high-level of strategic mutual trust and close cooperation on major issues concerning their common interests, said the spokesperson. He stressed that China's latest export controls on rare earth and related items bear no relation to Pakistan, adding that this is China's legitimate move to improve its export control system, serving to better defend world peace and regional stability, and to fulfil non-proliferation and other international obli-

India wants unrest in Pak through facilitators after defeat

Such elements are neither tolerable in any country nor acceptable in the national interest," he remarked.-APP

Gwadar Female students step forward

GWADAR: In a significant shift from traditional education that often falls short of modern

industry demands, a growing number of young females in Gwadar are enrolling in advanced digital skills courses, including e-commerce, digital marketing, data analytics, and graphic design, at the Pak-China Technical and Vocational Institute (PCT&VI), a flagship project under the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC). The aim is to prepare for better job opportunities in the modern digital economy, Gwadar Pro reported on Monday. The University of Gwadar announced on Saturday that 209 candidates have been selected for 12 short courses in technology and business. Out of these, 82 are female students. Digital marketing attracted the highest number of women. Ten female students have been selected compared to six male students. Freelancing also saw a strong female presence, with six of the eight selected candidates being women. In data analytics and business intelligence, women nearly matched men, with ten female students out of 21. The three-month programs are being offered with support from the Shenzhen Institute of Information Technology (SICT) in China. The training covers artificial intelligence, e-commerce, Python programming, mobile application development, graphic design and office automation. Chinese instructors are working alongside Pakistani faculty to build local capacity and strengthen cooperation in education. In total, 127 male and 82 female students qualified. Men continue to dominate in some technical areas such as AI agent development, Python programming and mobile app development. Female students, however, are making their presence felt in digital marketing, freelancing and data analytics. Graphic design and office automation saw nearly equal numbers of male and female students. The institute aims to equip local youth with modern skills so they can benefit from future economic and trade activities linked to regional connectivity. Many students, especially young women, see this as their chance to move into better paid and more competitive fields.-DNA

Railways generates Rs 13.547 b by leasing land

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Railways has generated Rs 13.547 billion in revenue by leasing its valuable commercial and agricultural land over the past five financial years, aiming to transform the department into a profitable entity.

'The department has been leased out around 14,042 acres of railway land for various purposes through competitive bidding," an official from the Ministry of Railways told APP.

The official said that Pakistan Railways leases its land through open auctions under the Railway Property and Land Rules, 2023, which were approved by the Federal Cabinet.

He said the efforts to generate non-fare revenue are being led by the Real Estate Development and Marketing Company (REDAMCO), a subsidiary of the Ministry of Railways.

To a question, the official said the department has also decided to accelerate its ongoing anti-encroachment operations against land grabbers nationwide to reclaim railway land from individuals, groups, and even business organi zations.

Under the directives of Minister for Railways Muhammad Hanif Abbasi, anti-encroachment operations have been launched across the railway network. A joint procedural order was issued to all divisional superintendents for the retrieval of encroached land.

"These operations being conducted with the assistance of the Railway Police and the district administrations of the respective provincial governments," he added.

In a recent operation in the Lahore Division, the department successfully conducted a major anti-encroachment drive in the Mehmood Booti area, reclaiming 15 acres of prime land worth Rs 50 billion.-APP

From advanced combine harvesters and rice transplanters to center-pivot irrigation systems and high-power tractors, dozens of Chinese manufacturers will supply cutting-edge equipment aimed at boosting productivity, reducing post-harvest losses, and lowering labor dependency in Punjab's fields, according to a report published by Gwadar Pro on Monday "We're ushering in a revolutionary transformation in Punjab's agriculture!" stated Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz Sharif at the launch ceremony. "Today, Alhamdolillah, we launched the Hi-Tech Mechanization Bank Financing Program, a groundbreaking initiative worth Rs. 30 billion to empower our farmers with the latest agricultural technology. This is a major leap forward in modernizing our farm-

ing practices, improving productivity, and

delivering real prosperity to our Kisaan. The future of farming in Punjab, the food basket of Pakistan, has arrived." Under the program, interest-free bank financing of up to PKR 30 million will be made available with a six-month grace period and repayment spread over five years.

The Bank of Punjab will finance up to 80 percent of machinery costs, while applicants contribute 20 percent equity upfront. Farmers, service providers and agri-entrepreneurs can apply through an online portal, provided they meet the government's eligibility requirements. Chinese manufacturers dominate the official lists, with 27 companies supplying machinery across almost every category. Information about the companies and their products has been collected by Gwadar Pro from official program documents. Wheat combine harvesters are beingntroduced by Huzhou Liangyi Agro Machinery, Shandong Gold Dafeng (Shandong Dafeng), Jiangsu World Agricultural Machinery (FM World), Chongqing Smart Thinker, IOTEC International (Qingdao). Changfa Agricultural Equipment, Weichai Loval and Zoomlion (authorization pending). For rice, combine harvesters from Huzhou Liangyi, Shandong Dafeng, Jiangsu World, Wuhan Wubota, Xingtai Farming First, Changfa, Weichai Loval and Zoomlion are listed, promising faster and more efficient harvests. Rice transplanters with integrated nursery-raising machines, which is a critical innovation for labor savings and crop uniformity, are being supplied by Huzhou Liangyi and Changzhou Yuanbo with multiple variants, as well as Jiangsu World, Wuhan Wubota, Jiangsu Yong Tao, Jiangsu Dongyang (TYM), SYD (Sheng Chuan) and Zoomlion. Trump's speech at Knesset: Praising Israel's "victory" while ignoring the human cost in Gaza

IN a speech that has drawn widespread criticism, U.S. President Donald Trump addressed the Israeli parliament the Knesset where he lavishly praised Israel's leadership and military for what he described as their "historic victory" in the recent Gaza war. Trump hailed Israel's "strength, courage, and determination," calling the conflict "a triumph of freedom against terror." Yet, his remarks failed to acknowledge the staggering humanitarian toll and the devastation inflicted on Gaza's civilian population, making the address both tone-deaf and deeply disappointing. Throughout his speech, Trump commended the Israeli Defense Forces (IDF) for what he termed a "decisive and moral campaign" against Hamas, asserting that Israel had proven its "unshakable right to defend itself." However, the glaring question that lingered unasked and unanswered was with whom did Israel really fight? The war that Trump glorified was not a battle between equals, nor one of balanced strength. It was a conflict between one of the world's most sophisticated militaries and an impoverished, besieged population where civilians bore the overwhelming brunt of the violence. Even if Israel's stated objective was to target Hamas, the disproportionate scale of force used against Gaza a densely populated strip already crippled by years of blockade turned the campaign into a humanitarian catastrophe. Tens of thousands of Palestinians, many of them women and children, were killed or injured. Entire neighborhoods were flattened, hospitals destroyed, and essential services obliterated. To call this a "victory," as Trump did, is to disregard the moral weight of collective suffering and human tragedy. What made the speech particularly troubling was Trump's uncritical glorification of Israeli power, coupled with his silence on the suffering of Gaza's people. There was no mention of the humanitarian crisis, no recognition of international appeals for restraint, and no reflection on the ethical boundaries of warfare. His words painted a one-dimensional narrative one that celebrated dominance rather than justice, and might rather than morality. Trump's rhetoric served as a political gesture aimed at solidifying his alliance with Israel's right-wing leadership and his evangelical base in the United States. However, in doing so, he overlooked the central truth of this war: that military superiority does not equate to moral legitimacy. Praising the destruction of a helpless population under siege is not a testament to victory; it is an indictment of conscience. The tragedy of Gaza is not merely a political issue but a humanitarian one. Trump's failure to acknowledge that reality reflects a dangerous normalization of disproportionate warfare and collective punishment. In the end, Israel may claim a battlefield triumph, but it comes at the cost of immense civilian suffering and regional instability.

KP CM-elect urges inclusive, pragmatic approach

PESHAWAR: In his maiden address to the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly following his election, Chief Minister-elect Sohail Afridi delivered an impassioned speech promising to resist any fresh large-scale military operations in the province, citing the heavy collateral damage and long-term social costs they have produced. Afridi vowed to carry forward the vision of Imran Khan – stressing people-first governance, respect for civil rights and the need to avoid tactics that further alienate local communities. The new chief minister's remarks combined emotion and party line convictions with policy prescriptions. He repeatedly underscored that past operations have left many internally displaced persons, damaged livelihoods and failed to produce lasting peace. "Military action without local consent has backfired in KP," Afridi told lawmakers, urging that any security measures must include tribal elders, local stakeholders and community leaders if they are to succeed.

At the same time, Afridi's speech acknowledged a delicate political reality: in KP, the security establishment remains a central stakeholder that has borne considerable sacrifices in the fight against militancy. Observers say this makes relationship management with the military unavoidable. While Afridi's rhetoric signals the province's insistence on limiting heavy-handed operations, his calls for inclusion not confrontation point toward a pragmatic path that recognizes the establishment's role while pushing for greater consultation and accountability.

On Afghanistan and refugee policy, the chief minister called for a formal review and greater coordination with the federal government. He argued for humane treatment of Afghan nationals and warned against forced, disorderly evictions that would inflame tensions. Yet his plea for compassion came alongside a sober acknowledgement of security concerns voiced by many in KP: protracted overstaying by some refugees has complicated law-and-order management, strained resources, and, in certain cases, created vulnerabilities that militant groups could exploit.

Afridi's combined message oppose indiscriminate operations, include locals, review Afghan policy reflects a balancing act between principled opposition to collateral damage and hard security realities on the ground. Experts say the CM must now translate rhetoric into measured policy: pursue registration and regularization drives, improve refugee-camp management, cooperate with federal institutions on repatriation and integration programs, and expand community-led policing and development initiatives that undercut extremist recruitment. Critics warn Afridi that while emotional and populist appeals will solidify party support, long-term governance will demand rationalism, consensus building and steady dialogue with the military and federal authorities. Success will hinge on converting his commitments into inclusive decision-making mechanisms, transparent oversight of any security action, and socio-economic programs to address grievances that fuel unrest. As Afridi begins his tenure, the province watches closely: the promise to limit military interventions while protecting peace, dignity and security is popular but its delivery will require both political courage and pragmatic cooperation across institutions.

HE moment finally arrived for which the world had waited for decades. After years of bloodshed, hunger, humiliation, and despair, a breakthrough came in the form of President Donald Trump's 21-point peace plan, a framework that has begun to reshape the Israeli-Palestinian conflict in ways unimaginable just weeks earlier. The first signs of change came quickly. Over 2,000 Palestinian prisoners were released by Israel, while Hamas promised to return Israeli hostages. Humanitarian aid - long blocked at the borders - began to flow again into Gaza, bringing food, medicine, and hospital supplies to a population starved not only of nourishment but of hope. For the first time in years, mothers carried bread home with tears of relief, fathers clutched medicine as if it were treasure, and children smiled with bowls of food in their hands.

This breakthrough was not achieved through Israel's goodwill, nor was it the result of another round of fruitless diplomacy. It was the direct consequence of American pressure, a departure from decades of U.S. policy that shielded Israel from accountability at all costs. Trump's plan not only offered deadlines and frameworks; it came with guarantees. The United States pledged to monitor the process directly, ensuring both Hamas and Israel would adhere to the commitments they had signed onto. Vice President JD Vance confirmed that monitoring teams had already been deployed inside Gaza, across the West Bank, and along the Israel-Gaza border, setting up observation and reporting posts to oversee every step of implementation. This was not a distant promise but a living process already underway, a signal that the plan had moved from paper to reality.

What made this moment remarkable was not only the details of the agreement but the way it came into being. For decades, Israel acted as though international law and humanitarian norms were irrelevant, dismissing United Nations resolutions, ignoring the International Court of Justice, and defying UNESCO rulings. Its leaders, particularly Benjamin Netanyahu, cultivated an aura of invincibility, convinced that American protection was unconditional. That conviction was not without foundation. For generations, U.S. lawmakers, policymakers, and media institutions had been bent to the will of pro-Israel lobbying networks, often at the expense of American reputation, global standing, and even national interest. It was this iron grip that made Trump's move so astonishing.

By pushing forward with the plan, Trump shattered that long-standing dynamic. He defied the machinery of lobbying, money, and influence that had dictated American policy on Israel for decades. He did not act alone; behind him stood the collective weight

of the Muslim world, whose wealth and unity presented a new reality. For the first time, Muslim nations — from Turkey to Saudi Arabia, from Pakistan to Malaysia — stood shoulder to shoulder at a United Nations conference, demanding action and refusing to endorse any solution that did not prioritize Palestinian dignity. Trump read the room not as an opportunist but as a realist. He recognized that American interests, global stability, and moral responsibility all converged on one conclusion: the time for enabling Israel's expansionist ambitions was over.

That Israel, despite its hardliners who openly called for the annihilation of Gaza's population, including infants, was compelled to accept the peace plan demonstrates just how far the ground has shifted. Trump is now set to visit Israel, addressing the Knesset in a moment that would have been unthinkable in past years. Even as extremists pledged to continue their crusade for "Greater Israel," the political reality has changed. The United States, not Israel, is now the guarantor of the next chapter.

The ripple effects are profound. Across Europe, long skeptical of Israeli intransigence, leaders expressed cautious relief. In the global South, the plan rekindled hope that justice could still prevail for the marginalized and oppressed. Within the Muslim world, unity was reinforced by the undeniable reality that their collective power had been decisive in shaping this outcome. And within the United States itself, ordinary citizens and social media movements found validation in seeing their government finally break from blind obedience to Israeli priorities.

For decades, mainstream media outlets, heavily influenced by pro-Israel interests, shaped the narrative to Israel's advantage. Today, however, that monopoly is collapsing. Social media platforms have pierced the information wall, exposing Israeli atrocities and amplifying Palestinian suffering to global audiences. Trump's plan tapped into this shift, reflecting not only strategic calculations but also the growing demand from civil society worldwide that U.S. foreign

policy reflect humanitarian values.

Israel's reluctant acceptance of limits imposed by the plan marks a watershed. For the first time, its leadership has been compelled to recognize that there are boundaries to its ambitions. The narrative of divine entitlement to Palestinian land is being challenged by political reality. The global message is clear: Israel is not above international law, not beyond accountability, and not free to dictate terms unilaterally. By enforcing these limits, the plan strikes at the heart of expansionist ideology. Of course, challenges remain. Hardliners within Israel will resist, and spoilers on both sides may seek to derail the fragile progress. But unlike past initiatives, this plan carries deterrence. Monitoring teams are already on the ground, reporting directly to Washington, and a punitive mechanism is being prepared. These elements give the plan resilience where others failed. If enforced with consistency, it may finally break the cycle of occupation, insurgency, and crackdowns that have defined the conflict for generations. The broader significance extends well beyond Israel and Palestine. Trump's 21-point plan signals a reorientation of American foreign policy, breaking the stranglehold of lobbying networks and restoring independence to U.S. decision-making. It affirms that Muslim nations, when united, can shape global outcomes. And it reasserts the principle that international law, humanitarian values, and logic have weight when backed by power.

History will remember this not only as a diplomatic breakthrough but as a moment when the architecture of global politics shifted. By confronting Israel's defiance and asserting American oversight, Trump altered the balance of power in the Middle East. He may never hold the Nobel Peace Prize, but he has accomplished something greater: he has shown that courage, enforcement, and unity can bring hope to a people long denied it.

The images of mothers feeding their children in Gaza, of freed prisoners reunited with families, and of global leaders preparing to converge on Egypt all testify to the reality of this change. For the first time in decades, light has broken through the darkness of the Israel-Palestine conflict.

The peace plan is fragile, and its future uncertain, but with monitoring already underway and enforcement guaranteed, there is at last reason to believe that justice may triumph over despair.

HE Muslim world today stands at a critical juncture, facing an array of complex challenges that test not only its stability but also its collective will to secure peace, prosperity, and dignity for its people. Among these challenges, security remains one of the most pressing. Terrorism, economic instability, political divisions, and external interference have hindered progress across several regions of the Muslim world. Yet, amid these trials, there remains a strong and growing recognition that dialogue and cooperation-both within the Muslim community and between Muslim and non-Muslim nations-are indispensable for charting a more stable and prosperous future. To address these multifaceted issues, countries have increasingly turned to joint forums at the governmental and parliamentary levels. These platforms enable nations to consult, deliberate, and formulate strategies to tackle common problems collectively. Among those who have played an instrumental role in advancing this form of parliamentary diplomacy is the Speaker of the National Assembly of Pakistan, Sardar Ayaz Sadiq. Through his leadership, Pakistan has not only reinforced its role as a vital participant in global parliamentary diplomacy but also positioned itself as a bridge among Muslim nations seeking unity and common ground. Sardar Ayaz Sadiq has consistently sought to strength-

Sardar Ayaz Sadiq has consistently sought to strengthen Pakistan's parliamentary engagement with the rest of the world. His approach is defined by an awareness of both Pakistan's national priorities and the broader concerns of the Muslim ummah. He is widely recognized for his ability to listen, deliberate, and build consensus—qualities essential in a world increasingly divided by ideological and geopolitical fault lines. The conference culminated in the adoption of the historic Baku Declaration, a document that laid the foundation for long-term cooperation in areas such as trade, security, technology, and cultural exchange. The following year, the initiative was carried forward under the stewardship of H.E. Prof. Dr. Mustafa Şentop, the then Speaker of the Grand National Assembly of Türkiye, who hosted the second Trilateral Speakers' Conference in Istanbul in July 2022.

The Istanbul Declaration that emerged from this gathering underscored the importance of parliamentary diplomacy as a vital instrument for fostering international understanding and cooperation. It also proposed transforming the forum into a more structured and practical mechanism for trilateral collaboration among the three brotherly nations. During that conference, Sardar Ayaz Sadiq extended an invitation for Pakistan to host the third meeting of the Forum, an offer that was warmly and unanimously welcomed. Preparations were soon underway to hold the third

Preparations were soon underway to hold the third Trilateral Speakers' Meeting in Islamabad in March 2023. However, this plan was postponed due to the devastating earthquake that struck the Republic of Türkiye in February 2023, leading Pakistan to express its solidarity through relief efforts and diplomatic support. Now, after careful rescheduling and re-

newed commitment, Pakistan stands ready to host the Third Trilateral Speakers' Conference from October 12 to 14, 2025, in Islamabad.

This forthcoming conference will bring together H.E. Ms. Sahiba Gafarova, Speaker of the Milli Majlis of Azerbaijan, and H.E. Prof. Dr. Numan Kurtulmus, Speaker of the Grand National Assembly of Türkiye, who will lead their respective parliamentary delegations. The theme of the meeting-"Strengthening Fraternal Ties: Parliamentary Cooperation for Regional Peace, Security, and Prosperity"-aptly reflects the shared vision of these three nations. Their discussions will encompass critical global and regional issues, including new and emerging threats to peace, the growing urgency of environmental challenges posed by climate change, and the pursuit of sustainable economic development. Beyond these immediate concerns, the forum will explore pathways to deepen collaboration in diverse sectors such as trade. investment, science, technology, education, and culture. The gathering will serve not merely as a symbolic gesture of friendship, but as a working platform to translate the ideals of cooperation into practical outcomes that benefit the people of all three countries.

The long and painful nightmare is finally over," the US president added. Meanwhile, several buses carrying prisoners released by Israel in exchange for hostages freed by Hamas arrived in the Gaza City of Khan Yunis. Thousands of people gathered to welcome the prisoners, cheering and waving Palestinian Hags in celebration. Trump termed the agreement an "incredible triumph for Israel and the world" as he thanked mediators from the Arab and Muslim world. "Let me also convey my tremendous appreciation for all of the nations of the Arab and Muslim world that came together to press Hamas to set the hostages free and to send them home," Trump said. Kudus scores as Ghana qualify for FIFA World Cup 2026

PARIS: Mohammed Kudus scored as Ghana beat Comoros 1-0 in Accra on Sunday to win Group I and become the fifth African qualifiers for the FIFA World Cup 2026 after Algeria, Egypt, Morocco, and Tunisia. Cheered on by a capacity 40,000 crowd, Ghana dominated first-half possession and territory, but slow, predictable attacks meant Comoros goalkeeper Adel Anzimati-Aboudou was seldom troubled.

However, the home side wasted little time after the interval in taking the lead Tottenham midfielder Kudus struck on 47 minutes. Comoros only partially cleared a goalmouth scramble, and when the ball was crossed low into the six-yard box, Kudus tapped it into the net from point-blank range. Success against Comoros was particularly sweet as the Indian Ocean islanders shocked Ghana at the 2022 Africa Cup of Nations (AFCON) and beat them again in the second round of World Cup qualifying two years ago. Ghana top the group with 25 points from 10 match-

es. Madagascar finished second with 19 points

placed Mali in Bamako. It will be the fifth appearance by the Black Stars in the global showpiece. Their best performance was in 2010 in South Africa, where they lost to Uruguay after a quarter-final penalty shootout.

Qualification for the expanded 48-nation 2026 tournament, which the United States, Canada, and Mexico will co-host, justified the faith of Ghanaian officials in coach Otto Addo, who was under fire last year. There were persistent demands from the public and media in the West African country for Addo to be sacked after a disastrous 2025 AFCON qualifying campaign.

Ghana, winners of the competition four times between 1963 and 1982, did not win any of the six AFCON qualifiers and finished a humiliating last behind Angola, Sudan, and Niger with just three points. The other four automatic African qualifiers for the World Cup will be decided on Monday and Tuesday, with Benin, Cape Verde, Ivory Coast, and Senegal the group leaders. Egypt rested Liverpool star

Mohamed Salah for their final match at home to Guinea-Bissau, and an early goal from Mohamed Hamdy delivered a 1-0 Group A victory in Cairo.

Niger upset Zambia 1-0 in Ndola to finish second in Group E behind Morocco, and currently lie third in the mini-leagues runners-up table behind Gabon and Burkina Faso. The four best-ranked second-placed teams after the final qualifiers on Tuesday advance to the play-offs in Morocco during November. Whoever wins the mini-tournament, featuring single-match semi-finals and a final, qualifies for six-nation inter-continental play-offs next March with two World Cup places up for grabs.

Niger striker Daniel Sosah scored in his third straight qualifier, firing a rebound into the net on 56 minutes after goalkeeper Lawrence Mulenga failed to hold a Victorien Adebayor shot. Meanwhile, the Nigerian squad, coaches, technical staff, and officials arrived safely in the southeastern city of Uyo on Sunday. Returning home after a

Group C win over Lesotho in South Africa last Friday, the jet carrying the Super Eagles had to make an emergency landing in Angola due to a cracked windscreen. The team media officer, Promise Efoghe, said a replacement aircraft was sent to Luanda and the journey to Nigeria was safely completed. Nigeria, the pre-qualifying favourites to win Group C, are third entering the final round on Tuesday, three points behind Benin and one point

below South Africa. However, the Super Eagles could finish first if they defeat shock leaders Benin in Uyo and South Africa do not win at home to Rwanda. South Sudan coach Nicolas Dupuis has reportedly been suspended for 15 days and told to stay away from the national squad after a 5-0 home loss to Group B leaders Senegal on Friday. France-born Dupuis, 57, guided Madagascar to a shock win over Nigeria in the 2019 Cup of Nations in Egypt, and the islanders exceeded expectations by reaching the quarter-finals in their first

appearance. - Agencies

Usman Wazeer set to defend WBC OPBF Silver title

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's undefeated boxing star Usman Wazeer will defend his WBC OPBF Silver Welterweight title in the last week of November 2025, marking another major milestone in his unbeaten journey.

The 24-year-old from Astore, Gilgit-Baltistan, enters the fight with a perfect 17-0 record, aiming to extend it to 18-0 in front of his home fans. Wazeer captured the WBC OPBF Silver belt earlier this year in Thailand after a thrilling knockout win over Indonesia's Stevie Ferdinandus in the tenth round. The fight, broadcast live on DAZN and viewed in 168 countries, established him as one of Asia's most promising boxing talents. "It was a tough fight against a very experienced opponent, but I trusted my stamina and game plan. Now, I'm ready to make history again on Pakistani soil," Wazeer said.

Training under his long-time coach and team in Lahore, Wazeer has entered an intense preparation phase. "Every fight teaches me something new. A key part of his success has been the support of ACTIVIT, a sports and health initiative led by Dr. Rizwan Aftab Ahmed, Director of National Hospital DHA Lahore. Since turning professional in 2019, Wazeer has built an impressive resume - becoming the first Pakistani to win the WBO World Youth title and the WBA Asia Welterweight Championship, alongside his current WBC crown. From humble beginnings in Astore to international acclaim, his story embodies grit, belief, and national pride. "This fight isn't just about me; it's about Pakistan. I want to show the world that champions can rise from our soil," he said.

Pakistan eyes boost in citrus exports to China, global markets

ISLAMABAD: Pakistani government is firmly committed to strengthening Pakistan's agricultural export base, particularly in the citrus sector, through innovation, value addition, and quality enhancement aimed at boosting exports to China and other international markets, Gwadar Pro reported quoting a top official. Federal Minister for Commerce Jam Kamal Khan, speaking on the sidelines of the Agri Expo Sargodha, highlighted that citrus, especially Kinnow mandarin, remains one of Pakistan's signature export commodities with immense potential in China and beyond. "Our priority is to regain our competitive position in international citrus markets by modernizing the entire value chain, from farm to foreign buyers," he said.

He noted that the Ministry of Commerce was actively supporting initiatives to improve agricultural practices, enhance compliance with international phytosanitary standards, and upgrade the logistics infrastructure necessary for temperature-controlled exports, especially to China, which has emerged as a high-value destination for Pakistani fruit. At the Expo, the Pakistan Horticulture Development and Export Company (PHDEC) organized a comprehensive technical workshop titled "Enhancing Citrus Quality and Export Competitiveness: Pest and Disease Control Measures, Harvest and Post-Harvest Management, and Effective Logistics Solutions.' The session drew a large audience of citrus growers, exporters, and agricultural researchers. Experts from the Citrus Research Institute (CRI), Sargodha, shared insights on pest control, harvest optimization, and post-harvest management techniques to improve fruit quality and reduce export losses. The PHDEC also distributed Urdu-language citrus manuals to help farmers adopt Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) and modern orchard management systems aligned with international standards. To streamline export logistics, the National Logistics Corporation (NLC) introduced its reefer container transport solutions, ensuring efficient, temperature-controlled citrus shipments for the upcoming season starting in December. Minister Jam Kamal Khan lauded the collaboration between growers, exporters, and logistics providers, calling such partnerships vital for sustainable growth. - APP

Muthusamy spins South Africa back in first Test against Pakistan

LAHORE: Senuran Muthusamy produced a brilliant spell of spin bowling on Day 2 to claim six wickets and help South Africa bowl out Pakistan for 378 in the first Test at the Gaddafi Stadium on Monday. Resuming their innings at 313 for five, Pakistan looked set for a big total as Salman Ali Agha and Mohammad Rizwan picked up where they left off, extending their sixth-wicket stand beyond 150, the highest for Pakistan against South Africa at home. Both batters appeared in full control

before Muthusamy turned the tide. He first broke the partnership by dismissing Rizwan for a hard-fought 75 off 140 deliveries, which included two fours and two sixes. The left-arm spinner struck again almost immediately, removing Noman Ali and Sajid Khan for ducks to complete a well-deserved five-for. Senuran Muthusamy continued to wreak havoc, bowling Shaheen Afridi for seven to register his sixth wicket, leaving Pakistan nine down. The innings finally ended at 378 when off-spinner Prenelan Subrayen dismissed Salman Ali Agha for a composed 93 off 145 balls, an innings decorated with five fours and three sixes. Muthusamy finished with superb figures of 6-117 in 32 overs, while Subrayen chipped in with two wickets. Kagiso Rabada and Simon Harmer claimed one apiece. Earlier on Day 1, Pakistan had recovered strongly from an early setback after Abdullah Shafique fell cheaply to Rabada for two. Skipper Shan Masood and Imam-ul-Haq then steadied the innings with a 161-run partnership for the second wicket. Imam, making his return to Test cricket after nearly two years, scored a fluent 93 off 153 balls, while Shan contributed 76 off 147, featuring nine boundaries and a six. Babar Azam, who became the first Pakistani and eighth batter overall to cross 3,000 runs in the ICC World Test Championship, looked assured before being dismissed for 23 by Simon Harmer. Saud Shakeel's first-ball duck added to Pakistan's woes, but Rizwan and Salman's partnership ensured a respectable total, keeping the hosts competitive heading into South Africa's first innings later in the day. - Agencies

Ghana qualifies for the 2026 World Cup after 1-0 win over Comoros

ACCRA: Ghana became the fifth African nation to qualify for the 2026 World Cup on Sunday. The 2010 quarterfinalist joins Algeria, Egypt, Morocco and Tunisia at next year's tournament in the United States, Canada and Mexico.

Ghana needed a point against Comoros in its final game in Group I to be certain of qualifying for back-to-back World

Cups and sealed its place with a 1-0 win at Accra Sports Stadium.

In the end it didn't even need that after second-placed Madagascar lost 4-1 at Mali. Tottenham forward Mohammed Kudus scored the decisive goal in the 47th minute to ensure Ghana qualified in style.

Madagascar still finished second, but victory would have improved its chances of being one of the four best runners-up, which compete for a place in the playoffs.

The nine group winners automatically qualify for the World Cup. The four best runners-up play in a mini tournament of two semifinals and a final in November.

The winning team advances to FIFA's playoff tournament against opponents from Asia, CONCACAF, South America

and Oceania. Burkina Faso, second in Group A behind Egypt, rounded off its campaign with a 3-1 win against Ethiopia, with substitute Pierre Landry Kabore scoring a second-half hat trick. Egypt had already qualified and picked up another win by beating Guinea-Bissau 1-0. In Group E Niger beat Zambia 1-0 and fin-

Lebanon president says 'necessary to negotiate' with Israel

BEIRUT: Lebanese President Joseph Aoun called for negotiations with Israel on Monday, after US President Donald Trump brokered a ceasefire in Gaza. In October 2023, Iran-backed Hezbollah began launching rockets at Israel in support of Hamas in the Gaza war. Months of hostilities escalated into all-out war in September 2024, before a ceasefire was agreed two months later. Israel has continued to strike Lebanon, saying it is hitting Hezbollah targets, but according to the United Nations over 100 civilians have been killed since the truce.

"The Lebanese state has previously negotiated with Israel under American and United Nations auspices, resulting in an agreement to demarcate the maritime border... so what prevents the same thing from happening again to find solutions to the outstanding issues." Aoun said according to a presidency statement. "Today, the general atmosphere is one of compromise, and it is necessary to negotiate," he added, specifying that "the form of this negotiation will be determined in due time." Ghana boat capsize kills 15, mostly children

ACCRA: A boat capsized on a lake in northeastern Ghana, killing 15 people, mostly children, maritime authorities said on Sunday. "Tragically, 11 of the deceased were children between the ages of two and 14 years (five males and six females)" in the incident that took place Saturday on Lake Volta in the Krachi West District of the Oti Region, the Ghana Maritime Authority said in a statement The children and other victims, aged up to 64, were traveling from Okuma to Bovime when their vessel overturned, it added. Four adults survived, the statement said, describing the accident as "a critical and unacceptable breach of safety standards." Preliminary findings suggested the boat was overloaded, the authority said.

A specialized investigation team, including naval personnel, was deployed to determine the cause.

The authority added that it would set up a high-level investigation committee with the transport ministry and launch a "sustained lakeside safety enforcement operation" to ensure compliance with passenger limits and life jacket rules. Boat disasters are common on Lake Volta, often caused by overloading and collisions with tree stumps._APP

FPCCI urges FBR to extend income tax return filing deadline: Atif

Karachi: Atif Ikram Sheikh, President of the Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FPCCI), has proposed to the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) to extend the deadline for filing income tax returns for the Tax Year 2025 – currently set to expire on October 15, 2025 – to October 31, 2025. Mr. Atif Ikram Sheikh apprised that, in a letter addressed to Mr. Rashid Mahmood Langrial, Chairman of the FBR, FPCCI has highlighted the challenges faced by taxpayers and stakeholders in meeting the filing deadline. These include delays in obtaining essential financial documents, technical issues with the FBR portal, and difficulties in integrating Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) systems with FBR's digital invoicing requirements.

Mr. Atif Ikram Sheikh emphasized the importance of a taxpayer-friendly approach and urged the FBR to take prompt action to address these concerns. He stressed that to facilitate taxpayers in fulfilling their legal obligations without undue stress, FPCCI has urged the FBR to extend the filing deadline. This extension is expected to provide much-needed relief to taxpayers grappling with these genuine constraints. SVP FPC-CI highlighted that many taxpayers are struggling to gather necessary financial records due to procedural and logistical bottlenecks as FBR's online portal has been reported to experiencing slow performance and technical glitches - hindering smooth submission of returns. VP FPCCI said that businesses are facing difficulties in aligning their Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) systems with the FBR's digital invoicing requirements; which is causing delays in compliance.-DNA

26th Amendment case

'Constitutional matters to be only heard by CB'

ISLAMABAD: Justice Jamal Khan Mandokhail on Monday wondered whether judges comprising the Supreme Court's (SC) Constitutional Bench (CB) hearing petitions against the 26th Amendment could do so if they were its "beneficiaries".

The Amendment was passed by the parliament during an overnight session in October last year, with the PTI claiming seven of its lawmakers were abducted to gain their favour as the party opposed the legislation. The Balochistan National Party-Mengal (BNP-M) also alleged its two senators were being pressured, with both later defying party line to vote in the tweaks' favour. The legislation, which altered judicial au-

thority and tenure, has been a lightning rod for debate with both opposition parties and legal experts questioning its impact on the judiciary's independence.

The tweaks took away the SC's suo motu powers, set the chief justice of Pakistan's (CJP) term at three years and empowered a Special Parliamentary Committee for the appointment of the CJP from among the three most senior SC judges. It also paved the way for the formation of the CB, which is now hearing petitions against the very legislation that enabled its establishment. Former Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) president Abid Shahid Zuberi continued his arguments on the case today. The hearing has been adjourned till 11:30am

tomorrow (Tuesday). The CB hearing the pleas is headed by Justice Aminuddin Khan and also includes Justices Mandokhail, Muhammad Ali Mazhar, Ayesha Malik, Syed Hasan Azhar Rizvi, Musarrat Hilali, Naeem Akhtar Afghan and Shahid Bilal Hassan. During recent hearings, judges have questioned whether the CB has the power to issue orders for the constitution of a full court, as requested by petitioners.

So far, Lahore High Court Bar Association (LHCBA) lawyer Hamid Khan, Balochistan High Court Bar Association (BHCBA)'s counsel Munir A. Malik and petitioner Barrister Salahuddin Ahmed have presented their arguments. Hamid sought the formation of a 16-member bench as per the number of judges present in the SC in Oct 2024. Malik contended that the CB had the power to issue a judicial order for the formation of a

SC adjourns super tax case hearing until Tuesday

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court's constitutional bench on Monday adjourned the hearing of the super tax case until Tuesday. The case was heard by a five-member bench headed by Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan. During the proceedings, Advocate Farogh Naseem presented arguments on behalf of various companies. Justice Jamal Khan Mandokhail observed that NFC may impose taxes other than sales tax. Justice Muhammad Ali Mazhar remarked that no new tax can be enforced after the closing date. Advocate Farogh Naseem agreed, stating that once the prescribed period lapses, no new tax may be levied. Justice Mazhar questioned why the matter had not been clarified to date, adding that the issue keeps surfacing repeatedly without any final interpretation. Advocate Naseem informed the court that the Sindh High Court had earlier struck down a tax enforced from July 1, 2023, ruling instead that a 4 percent rate would apply instead of 10 percent. Chief of the bench, Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan, remarked that judges often face great pressure. Advocate Farogh Naseem commented that no judge has the right to insult a lawyer, to which Justice Amin-ud-Din agreed, emphasizing that patience and composure must be observed during proceedings. Naseem praised Justices Muhammad Ali Mazhar and Shahid Bilal Hasan for always maintaining patience and dignity during hearings.

"full court". On Saturday, a convention jointly hosted by the LHCBA and the Lahore Bar Association resolved to continue its struggle against the 26th constitutional Amendment, declaring that the legal fraternity would not accept any judicial verdict that undermines the judiciary's independence.

The bench will first determine whether the challenges should be heard by a full court comprising all available SC judges or by the same eight-judge CB, before deciding on the legality of the 26th Amendment.

The case was initially taken up in January, and after the CB's approval of petitioners' request for it, the proceedings are being live-streamed on the SC's You-

Tube channel since October 8. At the outset of the hearing, Justice Mandokhail questioned whether it was the right of any party to request a bench of its choice, to which Zuberi replied, "I do not think that any party has the right to select a bench of their choice. But here the case is that we are requesting a full court on some constitutional legal issues." The ex-SCBA president added that he had "always insisted that there should be a full bench". Justice Mandokhail then asked why Zuberi wanted a full court, to which the latter said he would cite past judgements by the judges on the bench that rule for the formation of a full court. Upon the judge asking how many judges were appointed in the apex court currently and what a full court would look like, Zuberi said there were a total of 24 judges. "I am not declaring any judge wrong. All judges are honourable."

EU says Russia 'gambling with war' with airspace violations

KYIV: The European Union's top diplomat Kaja Kallas said Monday that Russia was "gambling with war," after a spate of Russian drones and military jets crossing into the bloc's airspace NATO has boosted its defenses along its eastern borders as it accused Moscow of testing the alliance's air defenses with drone incursions into several members and by flying military jets in Estonian airspace. "Every time a Russian drone or plane violates our airspace, there is a risk of escalation, unintended or not. Russia is gambling with war," Kallas said during a visit to Kviv. "To keep war at bay, we must translate the economic power of Europe into military deterrence," she added. Kallas was in Kyiv for talks on military and financial support for Ukraine, and especially its energy infrastructure, as Russia has resumed attacks on power plants ahead of winter. Ukraine on Monday was forced to introduce power cuts across seven central and eastern regions as a result of the attacks, which Kyiv has called "cynical.""The enemy wants to affect the spirit and mood of our population," Ukrainian Foreign Minister Andriy Sybiga said during a joint press conference with

"This is especially cynical on the eve of winter," he added. Ukraine retaliates by targeting Russian oil refineries, aiming to hamper funding of its war machine. It has launched more than 30 strikes on Russian energy sites since the beginning of August, also triggering a spike in petrol prices inside Russia._APP

Qatar to open museum, first-ever dedicated to Indian artist

NEW DELHI: A museum dedicated to M. F. Husain will open in Qatar next month, the first such institution honoring the legacy of one of India's most famous and influential modern artists. Often called "the Picasso of India." Husain - full name Maqbool Fida Husain - was born in Pandharpur in Maharashtra in 1915. Self-taught as an artist, he began developing his skills by learning calligraphy at a madrasah in his early teens. He moved to Mumbai in the 1930s, surviving by painting cinema posters and honing his craft as the Bollywood industry grew. In 1947, he formed the Progressive Artists' Group with F. N. Souza, S. H. Raza, K. H. Ara, H. A. Gade, and S. K. Bakre, who sought to give Indian art a new modern identity after independence from British colonial rule. "They have all been the top stars of Indian modern art. All of them very consciously decided to create a new language for art in post-independence India, which is away from ancient art, which is away from the British school of art - a completely new language," said Sahar Zaman, an art journalist who has documented Husain's life and work.-APP

Gaza deal brings hope for Ukraine: Zelensky

KYIV: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky on Monday hailed the "extraordinary" Gaza ceasefire as bringing hope that US President Donald Trump could broker an end to the Russian invasion of his country. "When peace is achieved for one part of the world, it brings more hope for peace in other regions," Zelensky said on social media.

He added: "If a ceasefire and peace have been achieved for the Middle East, the leadership and determination of global actors can certainly work for us too, in Ukraine."

Russia invaded Ukraine in

February 2022, setting off the largest conflict in Europe since World War II. Tens of thousands have been killed, millions forced from their homes and much of eastern and southern Ukraine decimated.—APP

EU to restart border monitoring from today

BRUSSELS: The European Union will Wednesday restart a civilian mission to monitor the Rafah border crossing between Gaza and Egypt in support of a US-brokered ceasefire deal, the bloc's top diplomat said Monday. "The EU stands ready to do its part," Kaja Kallas posted on X after Hamas released a first group of Israeli hostages as part of the agreement. "This mission can play an important role in supporting the ceasefire," she said.

The 27-nation bloc set up a civilian mission in 2005 to help monitor the Rafah crossing, but it was suspended two years later after the militant Islamist group Hamas took control of Gaza. The EU-BAM monitoring mission aims to provide a neutral, third-party presence at the key crossing and involves police from Italy, Spain and France. It was briefly redeployed in January but suspended again in March.

Welcoming Monday's hostage release, Kallas highlighted US President Donald Trump's role in this "crucial milestone towards peace" saying the leader "made this breakthrough possible". In a separate statement, European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen said Monday's Gaza summit in Sharm el-Sheikh finalising the agreement to end the war would be "a historical milestone." The bloc "fully supports the peace plan brokered by the United States, Qatar, Egypt, and Turkiye," she wrote.

Pakistan, Germany collaborate

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has taken a significant step toward strengthening its car bon market governance and pricing frameworks under the Supporting Preparedness for Article 6 Cooperation (SPAR6C) initiative, funded by the German Federal Government. Police say protesters dispersed in Muridke; SHO martyred

All connecting roads between Islamabad and Rawalpindi reopened for commuters

LAHORE: Normalcy began returning to the twin cities of Islamabad and Rawalpindi on Monday, as the police reportedly cleared Muridke of Tehreek-e-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP) protesters and reopened key roads to traffic.

Tehreek-i-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP) protesters, who had camped at Muridke after authorities blocked their route to Islamabad by digging up trenches, were dispersed on Monday after clashing with law enforcement personnel, according to police. Authorities moved to close roads and motorways again in and around Lahore and Islamabad - which had started reopening on Sunday – after the development as panic spread among citizens about the potential outcome of the clash. Meanwhile, some schools in Islamabad also closed earlier than usual. The TLP, which began its protest march in

Lahore on Friday, was planning to reach Islamabad and stage a demonstration in support of Gaza and Palestine outside the US embassy. On Sunday, law enforcement agencies, including Pakistan Rangers (Punjab) and large contingents of police from five districts, were dispatched to Muridke and reportedly surrounded TLP protest camp, in what appeared to be preparations for a large-scale operation.

A senior police official, who wished to remain anonymous, confirmed to Dawn.com today that police action to disperse PM Shehbaz commended Naqvi and his team for their efforts in managing the situation and stressed the importance of maintaining consistent, well-coordinated, and effective measures to safeguard the lives and property of all citizens. He reaffirmed the government's firm commitment to ensuring the rule of law and reiterated that the protection of public life and the complete eradication of terrorism remain top priorities of the administration.

Tears, joy in Israel as Hamas hands over first hostages

TEL AVIV: Hundreds of people gathered on Tel Aviv's Hostages Square erupted in joy, tears and song as news broke that Hamas had handed over the first hostages to be released on Monday after two years of captivity in Gaza.

Many had come at sunrise, carrying pictures of the hostages and waving Israeli flags bearing a yellow ribbon, a symbol of the movement calling for the hostages' release. Noga, who wore a badge that read "Last day", shared her pain and joy with AFP. "I'm torn between emotion and sadness for those who won't be coming back," she says.

Hamas and its militant allies took hostage 251 people hostage into Gaza during the unprecedented October 7, 2023 attack. Many of them were released in earlier truces, but 47 people seized on October 7 remained in Gaza. Only 20 of them are alive. Since that day, Noga has worn a small badge each day, counting the days of their captivity.

For the past two years, people have held frequent rallies and gatherings over the past two years on a Tel Aviv square that has become known as Hostages Square.

Over the months it has become the nerve centre of the campaign to free the hostages. When the news broke that the first seven had been released, the square broke out in cheers and song. The Hostages and Missing Families Forum, the main organisation representing relatives of captives, had called on people to gather at the site - evoking the yellow ribbons. As the war in the Gaza Strip has dragged on, the ribbons became ubiquitous in public spaces in Israel, from roundabouts to car door handles and stroller grips.

"Our struggle is not over. It will not end until the last hostage is located and returned for proper burial. This is our moral obligation. Only then will the people of Israel be whole," the forum said in a statement.

Emilie Moatti, a former Labour MP and one of the founders of the forum, told AFP she was "very moved", gesturing toward the crowd and struggling to hold back tears. On giant screens, Israeli television channels broadcast footage from previous rallies at this same spot.

The song Habayta ("Homeward" in Hebrew), playing on a loop through the loudspeakers, resonated differently with the crowd on Monday, as for the first time in months wishes for the hostages' return were about to come true. The song dates back to the 1980s and was originally dedi-

cated to Israeli soldiers fighting in Lebanon.

The return to Israel of the hostages marks the first step in the ceasefire plan brokered by US President Donald Trump. In exchange, Israel is due to free nearly 2,000 prisoners held in its jails, most of them Gazans detained

France's president unveils new cabinet lineup

PARIS: France's President Emmanuel Macron unveiled a new government Sunday, after marathon talks to cobble together a cabinet and prevent the country from slipping deeper into a political crisis.

The lineup, a mix of old and new faces, is Prime Minister Sebastien Lecornu's second attempt at bringing together a team to overcome months of deadlock and pass a much-needed budget through a hung parliament. Last Sunday he presented his first cabinet, but resigned a day later after the lineup was criticised for not having enough new faces. Macron reappointed him on Friday to try again. "A mission-driven government has been appointed to provide France with a budget before the end of the year," Lecornu wrote on X on Sunday.

According to the lineup published by the

presidency, Jean-Noel Barrot remained as foreign minister. Outgoing labour minister Catherine Vautrin took on the defence portfolio. Roland Lescure, a Macron loyalist, is in charge of the economy, with next year's budget as a top priority. There were also new faces.

Paris police chief Laurent Nunez took over the interior ministry, replacing Bruno Retailleau whose right-wing Republicans party said it would not be part in any government this weekend. Monique Barbut, the former France director of the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF), was to head the ministry of environmental transition. Gerald Darmanin however stayed on as justice minister. And Rachida Dati, a scandal-ridden culture minister who is set to stand trial for corruption next year, also retained her post. - APP

Pak hopes for 'true representative government' in Afghanistan

Islamabad says Taliban aggression belies spirit of peaceful neighbourhood, cooperation

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has expressed hope that one day the Afghan people would be emancipated and governed by a true representative government, as it voiced deep concern over the unwarranted aggression by the Afghan Taliban and its allied terrorist outfits. "We also hope that one day, the Afghan people would be emancipated and they would be governed by a true representative government,' the Foreign Office said in a strongly worded statement on Sunday, as it expressed deep concern over unwarranted aggression by the Afghan Taliban, Fitna al-Khawarij, and Fitna al-Hindustan along the Pak-Afghan border on the night of October 11-12, adding that such actions "belie the spirit of peaceful neighbourhood and cooperation.'

The statement said Pakistan, exercising its right to self-defence, had repelled the assaults and inflicted heavy losses on Taliban and affiliated terrorists in terms of men, material, and infrastructure used for planning attacks inside Pakistan. It added that all possible measures were taken to avoid collateral damage and protect civilians.

Pakistan reaffirmed its commitment to dialogue and diplomacy, saying it continued to closely monitor the situation and would take all necessary steps to safeguard its territory and citizens. It warned that "any further provocations will be met with a befitting and unwavering response."

Islamabad also rejected the Afghan interim foreign minister's remarks made in India, terming them an attempt to divert attention from the presence of terrorist groups in Afghanistan. It said the Taliban regime cannot absolve itself of its responsibility for regional peace and stability, adding that the UN Monitoring Team reports have documented the activities of these groups. The statement noted that Pakistan has repeatedly raised concerns over the presence of Fitna al-Khawarij and Fitna al-Hindustan operating from Afghan soil, urging the Taliban to take concrete and verifiable action against them. Pakistan also highlighted that it had hosted around four million Afghans for over four decades, but would now regulate their presence according to international norms and laws.

Reiterating its stance, Islamabad said it desired a peaceful, regionally connected, and prosperous Afghanistan, while calling on the Taliban to act responsibly and fulfil its commitments towards eliminating terrorism. In the border skirmishes, Pakistani forces killed more than 200 Afghan Taliban and affiliated terrorists in self-defence action responding to an unprovoked overnight attack by the Taliban forces and India-backed terrorists, the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) said.

AI or inequality tipped for economics Nobel

STOCKHOLM: The Nobel economics prize wraps up the 2025 season when it is announced on Monday, as experts say this year's prize could honour research on artificial intelligence or inequality. The winner or winners of the prestigious prize will be announced at 11:45 am (0945 GMT). Last year it went to Turkish-American Daron Acemoglu and British-Americans Simon Johnson and James Robinson for research into wealth inequality between nations. Predicting winners is not an exact science, and the nomination and selection process is shrouded in secrecy.

But prize watchers have their strategies to narrow down the contenders. For Micael Dahlen, a professor at the Stockholm School of Economics, it is important to look at the disciplines recognised in previous years. "Information economics is a strong contender," Dahlen told AFP, noting the field was last spotlighted for the 2016 prize.

"In recent years, especially with AI, the field has become highly topical," he said. A strong candidate would then be American economist Erik Brynjolfsson, according to Dahlen. Dahlen also floated the name of Germany's Monika Schnitzer, a prominent economist in the field of international economics. - Agencies

Karachi police quell TLP road block protest

KARACHI: The Karachi police on Monday dismissed widespread rumours of sitins and protests in various parts of the city, assuring the public that the situation remains under control.

Social media flooded with the reports of "deteriorating situation" in the city after claims of protest sit-ins being staged by Tehreeke-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP), just hours after Punjab returned to calm following days of unrest. Karachi police, however, clarified that no demonstrations or sit-ins were currently taking place anywhere in

the metropolis. They added that in some areas, shops were closed by residents themselves due to unverified reports, but the overall environment remains peaceful. Police further stated that Section 144 is in effect

across the city, and no individual or group has been granted permission to hold protests. Officials also confirmed that a brief protest staged by the religious-political party near Sindhi Hotel in New Karachi had ended. The area has been cleared and the road reopened for traffic, the police added. It may be noted that the

Sindh government on Sunday announced a province-wide ban on protests, sit-ins, rallies, and public gatherings under Section 144 for a period of a month, citing security issues.

Pak Stock Exchange extends losses amid IMF delay

KARACHI: The equity market continued its downward slide on Monday as investors reacted to renewed concerns over the International Monetary Fund's (IMF) inconclusive review talks, a widening trade deficit, and persistent fiscal challenges. The Pakistan Stock Exchange's (PSX) benchmark KSE-100 Index closed at 158,443.42, down 4,654.77 points, or -2.85%, from the previous close of 163,098.19. During the session, the index hit an intraday high of 161,988.12 points, down 1,110.07 points, or -0.68%, and slid to a low of 158,067.92 points, reflecting a drop of 5,030.27 points, or -3.08%.

"Markets are reacting to news flow around the IMF, shortage in FBR revenues, and the increasing trade deficit, which is leading to profit taking and pushing the index down," said Ahfaz Mustafa, CEO of Ismail Iqbal Securities. "Result season should help ease this pressure in the coming days," he added. Investor caution deepened after the

IMF's review mission concluded without a staff-level agreement (SLA), with unresolved discussions on external financing tables and the Governance and Corruption Diagnostic (GCD) report delaying progress. Officials said these matters would be finalised in the coming week.

Adding to pressure, the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) missed its annual FY25 collection target by Rs1.2 trillion, despite imposing Rs1.3 trillion in additional taxes. For the first quarter (July-September FY26), the shortfall stood at Rs190 billion, and the IMF has projected that the FBR could miss its annual target by over Rs400 billion for the current fiscal year. "It's an overall correction and healthy exchange of hands as people evaluate evolving domestic politics and Eastern border violence impact," added AAH Soomro, an independent investment and economic analyst. Meanwhile, Pakistan's trade deficit widened 46% year-on-year in September 2025 to \$3.34 billion, as imports surged 14% to \$5.85 billion while exports fell 11.7% to \$2.5 billion, according to PBS.
