WASHINGTON: Pakistan is poised to sign a preliminary deal on a review of its loan programme with the International Monetary Fund this week, the country's finance minister said, a key step required to pave the way for another \$1.24 billion payout from the lender. An IMF mission left Pakistan last week without signing a so-called staff level agreement on the second review of the Washington-based lender's \$7 billion Extended Fund Facility and the first one on its \$1.4 billion Resilience and Sustainability Facility agreed in 2024 to shore up the economy after a severe financial crisis.

"The mission was on the ground for a couple of weeks, we had very constructive dialogue with them around the quantitative benchmarks, the structural benchmarks, and we've been having some follow-up discussions," Muhammad Aurangzeb told a foreign news agency during an interview on the sidelines of the IMF World Bank annual meeting.

"During the course of this week, we're hoping that we can get the SLA done." Countries under IMF lending programmes need to pass regular reviews, which - once signed off by the Fund's executive board, trigger a payment of the next tranche of IMF funding. The IMF programme agreed in September 2024 helped shore up then-cash-strapped Pakistan's \$370 billion economy that was engulfed in an economic crisis with inflation spiralling to record highs, a rapidly depreciating currency and a bulging external deficit. Aurangzeb expected the government would launch a green Panda bond - the first one denominated in Chinese yuan for Pakistan - before year-end and return to international markets next year with a bond

IMF forecasts Pakistan's inflation rate to hit 6%

ISLAMABAD: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has projected an increase in Pakistan's inflation rate, forecasting a Consumer Price Index (CPI)based inflation of 6% for the fiscal year 2025-26. The global lender released its latest World Economic Outlook (WEO) on Tuesday, expecting that inflation in the country was likely to increase from 4.5% in FY25 to 6% in the ongoing fiscal year. Globally, inflation is projected to decline to 4.2% in 2025 and to 3.7%in 2026. While the IMF projected global growth to slow down from 3.3% in 2024 to 3.1% in 2026, it kept Pakistan's economic growth unchanged at 3.6% for the ongoing FY2025—26. Meanwhile, the IMF stated that the unemployment rate in Pakistan is projected to decline during the current fiscal year. According to projections, the unemployment rate in the country is likely to come down to 7.5% from last fiscal year's 8%. The IMF, however, stated that its forecasts did not take into account the impact of recent floods, which were still being assessed. Earlier this month, Pakistan apprised the IMF of economic losses to the tune of Rs371 billion in the aftermath of floods.

KYIV: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said Monday he will go to Washington this week to see US President Donald Trump, to discuss air defences and how to put more pressure on Russia. A special order was issued for the campaign, with the deployment of 285 police personnel across the country to provide security to the vaccination teams. SC judges debate formation of full court

Senior lawyer Abid Zuberi argues CJP still holds the authority to form full court

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court's (SC) Constitutional Bench (CB) on Tuesday engaged in a debate over whether the chief justice of Pakistan (CJP) holds the authority to constitute a full court, as hearings continued on petitions challenging the 26th Constitutional Amendment.

SC constitutional bench, headed by Justice Amin-ud-Din, heard several petitions filed against the 26th Constitutional Amendment passed by parliament in October 2024. Other members of the bench include Justice Mandokhail, Justice Muhammad Ali Mazhar, Justice Ayesha A Malik, Justice Syed Hassan Azhar Rizvi, Justice Musarat Hilali, Justice Naeem Akhtar Afghan and Justice Shahid Bilal Hassan. Around three dozen petitioners, including Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI), Jamaat-e-Islami (JI), Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC), Lahore High Court Bar Association, Lahore Bar Association, Karachi Bar Association as well as the

former seven presidents of the Supreme Court Bar Asso-

ciation (SCBA) and various individuals in personal capacity, had challenged the validity of the 26th Constitutional Amendment. During the hearing today, Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan questioned, "Can the chief justice form a full court consisting of all judges of the constitutional bench?" To which, senior lawyer Abid Zuberi argued that the CJP still holds the authority to form a full court," adding that "directions can be issued for its constitution."

At one point, Justice Ayesha Malik remarked that the committee has the authority to form benches, not a full court. "[The] committee's powers cannot be equated with those of the chief justice," she observed. Justice Jamal Mandokhail observed that "some say Article 191-A should be set aside but how can it be ignored?" Justice Ayesha Malik remarked that there are already judgments available on this matter. Balochistan CM vows eco growth through PPP mode

Balochistan Chief Minister, Mir Sarfraz Bugti has expressed strong optimism that the province is on the verge of achieving its long-standing goal of becoming polio-free

QUETTA: Balochistan Chief Minister, Mir Sarfraz Bugti has reaffirmed the provincial government's commitment to driving economic growth through strategic partnerships with public and private sector institutions.

He made these remarks while chairing a high-level meeting at the Chief Minister's Secretariat, focused on reviewing progress on the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Pakistan Petroleum Limited (PPL) and the development of the Sui Master Plan The meeting was attended by Chief Secretary Shakeel Qadir Khan, MD PPL Sikandar Ali Memon, the Provincial Secretary for Energy, and senior officials from relevant depart-

ments and Sui gas field projects. During the session, the Managing Director of PPL presented a comprehensive briefing on the MoU's implementation and the milestones achieved under the Sui Master Plan. Chief Minister Bugti emphasized that Balochistan's natural resources are a public trust, and the benefits must directly reach the local communities, particularly those residing in Sui. He stressed that the government is ensuring maximum local participation in projects related to employment, education, healthcare, and basic infrastructure. Describing the Sui Master Plan as a cornerstone of regional de-

velopment, Sarfraz Bugti highlighted its comprehensive strategy for enhancing local infrastructure, social services, and energy initiatives. The plan aims to foster sustainable and inclusive growth, tailored to the needs of the people. Sarfraz Bugti expressed satisfaction with the province's progress that no polio case has been reported from Balochistan this year. He credited this achievement to the joint efforts of the provincial government, the Health Department, and frontline field workers, whose dedication has kept the virus at bay.

Reaffirming his government's resolve, CM Bugti added "We are determined that the dream of a 'Polio-Free Balochistan' will soon become a reality.' He directed all relevant departments to ensure full logistical support for field teams and to guarantee that no child in any district or union council is missed during the campaign.

The Chief Minister praised the critical role of field workers, volunteers, religious scholars, and local representatives, noting that their hard work and dedication are propelling Balochistan toward a healthier, polio-free future.-DNA

Afghans working details in Peshawar Cantonment sent to Centre

PESHAWAR: Details of Afghan nationals working and residing in Peshawar's Cantonment area have been sent to the federal government The information includes data on Afghan refugees, traders, employees and residents operating in the city's commercial zones. According to sources on Tuesday, detailed records have been compiled for thousands of Afghan refugees involved in various businesses in areas such as Liaqat Bazaar, Khyber Bazaar, Shuba Bazaar, Dabgari Garden, Shafiq Bazaar, and Jinnah Street. The data covers Afghans engaged in the cloth trade and other commercial sectors. In the first phase, preparations have been completed for a possible large-scale operation against illegal Afghan residents across all cantonment areas of the province. Sources indicate that a strict policy has been formulated regarding Afghan refugees living or conducting business in these zones. It said efforts are ongoing across the country to facilitate the repatriation of Afghan nationals. The process has seen varying levels of speed, with some phases progressing rapidly while others face delays. So far, hundreds of thousands of Afghan refugees, including men, women and children, have returned to Afghanistan. Authorities indicate that the upcoming phase may involve tougher enforcement measures, following the submission of

He instructed the School Education Department to make full use of technology to monitor student attendand address causes of absenteeism. The CM directed education officials to ensure that the new system not only identifies absentees but also investigates underlying issues in teaching environments and ensures timely interventions. The meeting at CM House was attended by Minister for Education Syed Sardar Shah, Chief Secretary Asif Hyder Shah, Chairman

Abbasi, Secretary Finance Fayaz Jatoi, Secretary to CM Raheem Shaikh and others. SAMRS, a landmark initiative of the School Education and Literacy Department (SELD), has been developed under the Sindh Early Learning Enhancement through Classroom Transformation (SELECT) Project. Supported by the Government of Sindh, the World Bank, and the Global Partnership for Education (GPE), this sysnology for strengthening the education sector.

Briefing the meeting, Education Minister Syed Sardar Ali Shah described SAMRS as a technology-driven solution to lower dropout rates by not only addressing absenteeism but also identifying broader issues relating to school environment, teacher performance, and student learning outcomes. Sardar Shah said that the system offers real-time data collection through an offline mobile application and dashboard, recording attendance and key indicators directly from schools daily. 

Pakistani handmade cutlery gains popularity in China

ISLAMABAD: In the first eight months of 2025, Pakistan's handmade cutlery and metal implements have seen a notable surge in demand from China, according to a China Economic Net's report. Exports of tools, implements, cutlery, and similar items made of base metals amounted to \$5.11 million, marking a modest increase of 2% compared to the same period last year, when exports totaled \$5 million, according to the General Administration of Customs. The biggest contributor to this growth is the export of pliers, pincers, tweezers, and similar tools, which saw a significant boost in both volume and value. In 2025, Pakistan shipped 135,191 kg of these tools, worth \$2.44 million. This represents a remarkable 30% increase from the \$1.88 million worth exported in the previous year, signaling growing demand for these products in China's expanding manufacturing and industrial sectors. Furthermore, scissors, tailors' shears, and similar cutting tools have been well-received, with exports reaching \$1.19 million in 2025. While this figure is stable compared to last year's performance, the consistent demand for these precision tools further illustrates the increasing popularity of Pakistani-made cutlery in China. Experts believe the rise in exports can be attributed to the superior craftsmanship of Pakistani artisans, whose handmade products are known for their durability and quality. As China's appetite for premium, handmade metal products continues to grow, Pakistan's cutlery and tools sector is expected to maintain its upward trajectory in the coming years.-APP

Pakistani scholar champions AIdriven green transition

ISLAMABAD: Prof Abdul Rauf, a Pakistani academic at China's Nanjing University of Information Science and Technology highlighted the transformative potential of artificial intelligence in advancing sustainable development and fostering inclusive growth under the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) at the **CRID** International Scholars Research Workshop in Nanjing. 
Gwadar Free Zones likely to be exempted from Dollar conversion

ISLAMABAD: Gwadar Free Zones are likely to receive a waiver from the existing Foreign Exchange Policy, as the government has formed a high-level committee to exempt both the Gwadar South Free Zone and the Gwadar North Free Zone from the current Foreign Exchange Policy Framework. This significant move will allow all companies operating in the Gwadar Free Zones to directly convert RMB into Pakistani rupees, effectively eliminating the role of the U.S. dollar once and for all, according to a Gwadar Pro's report on Tuesday. At present, export-oriented companies-mostly Chinese enterprisesoperating in both Gwadar Free Zones must first convert RMB into U.S. dollars, and then convert those dollars into Pakistani rupees for local payments. This double conversion results in two rounds of exchange deductions-first from RMB to dollar, and then from dollar to rupee-causing substantial financial losses to companies in the Gwadar Free Zones. A Gwadar Port Authority official told Gwadar Pro that if the government approves the committee's recommendations, in line with the directions issued by the Minister for Planning, Development, and Special Initiatives during the 82nd CPEC Progress Review Meeting held last month regarding the agenda item "Foreign Currency Pilot Project in Gwadar Free Zone," all Chinese companies operating in the Gwadar Free Zones will be able to directly convert RMB into Pakistani rupees. They will no longer be required to convert RMB into U.S. dollars first. "This will eliminate the double conversion process and protect companies from unnecessary financial losses," he added. When asked about the committee's composition, he said it includes representatives from the Gwadar Port Authority, the Ministry of Industries and Production, the CPEC Secretariat, the Federal Board of Revenue, the State Bank of Pakistan, the Ministry of Maritime Affairs, the Board of Investment, and the Ministry of Finance.-DNA

All roads across Capital cleared for traffic

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad Traffic Police (ITP) announced that all roads across the federal capital have been reopened for traffic flow, following earlier diversions and partial closures. An official told APP on Tuesday that Chief Traffic Officer (CTO) Hamzah Humayun confirmed the clearance of all major routes. including Red Zone entry points, Srinagar Highway, Expressway, Jinnah Avenue, Margalla Road, and Faisal Avenue. He said IIP teams worked throughout the day to restore smooth movement across the city.

CTO Hamzah appealed to citizens not to create a sudden rush on the roads, saying: "All corridors are now open, but motorists should proceed with patience to avoid unnecessary congestion." He added that the Islamabad Traffic Police remains active round the clock in the service of citizens and continues to facilitate them through advisory broadcasts on FM 92.4 and updates on official platforms.-APP



Shehbaz praises Trump at Sharmel-Sheikh: A diplomatic tightrope

PRIME Minister Shehbaz Sharif joined U.S. President Donald Trump at a joint press conference on October 13, 2025 during the peace and development summit in Sharm el-Sheikh, where global leaders gathered to witness signing of the Gaza peace deal. The event took an interesting turn when President Trump invited Prime Minister Shehbaz to address the audience a gesture that made Shehbaz Sharif perhaps the only foreign leader to speak on the occasion. During his remarks, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif showered praise on Donald Trump, describing him as "a genuine man of peace" and once again nominating him for the Nobel Peace Prize. The Prime Minister lauded Trump's "bold leadership and remarkable diplomatic acumen," crediting him for "achieving what others could not in fostering peace and economic cooperation." The conference was attended by several world leaders, including British Prime Minister Keir Starmer, the Presidents of Türkiye, Indonesia, and representatives from the European Union and the Gulf region. Interestingly, while Trump had invited the Indonesian President to also speak, but he was not available, leaving Shehbaz Sharif as the sole guest from the Muslim world to address the gathering alongside Trump.

The Pakistani Prime Minister's remarks were met with polite applause, but also with raised eyebrows among diplomatic observers. While Shehbaz's effusive praise may have been intended as a gesture of goodwill and an effort to strengthen ties with Washington under Trump's renewed global influence, seasoned diplomats view such unrestrained admiration as risky.

In diplomacy, balance is often the key. Excessive praise particularly in a multilateral setting can sometimes be interpreted as political alignment or even endorsement of an individual's policies, which may not always align with Pakistan's long-term strategic interests. Observers note that diplomacy is rarely about absolute truths or unfiltered admiration. It is, rather, an artful balance a calculated blend of truth, tact, and subtlety. In this context, Prime Minister Shehbaz's unguarded enthusiasm for Trump's leadership may have crossed a line of diplomatic prudence. Trump, known for his unpredictability, has often shifted positions dramatically from warm praise to sharp criticism depending on his evolving political agenda. This makes any overt alignment with him a potential diplomatic gamble. Should Trump alter his stance toward Pakistan in the future, today's praise might appear awkward or even politically costly. While the gesture may have earned Pakistan a moment of spotlight and perhaps goodwill in Trump's circle, experts suggest that measured diplomacy rather than open adulation would have served the country's interests better.

ASEAN's achievements and Pak role in a rising regional power

THE Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), established in 1967, has emerged as a dynamic regional bloc that has significantly shaped Asia's political, economic, and socio-cultural landscape. Comprising ten member states-Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Brunei, Vietnam, Laos, Myanmar, and Cambodia-ASEAN has grown from a Cold Warera alliance into one of the world's most influential regional organizations. Its evolution from a conflict-prevention mechanism into a powerful economic and diplomatic player is a testament to the success of regional cooperation. Among ASEAN's major achievements is its economic integration. With a combined GDP of over \$3.6 trillion and a population exceeding 670 million, ASEAN constitutes the fifth-largest economy in the world. Through the ASEAN Economic Community (AEC), the bloc has advanced regional trade, reduced tariffs, and facilitated investment flows among member states. Additionally, initiatives like the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP)-the world's largest free trade agreement involving ASEAN and key partners including China, Japan, and South Korea-underscore ASEAN's growing centrality in global commerce. Peace and stability in a historically volatile region is another key ASEAN success. Through consistent dialogue and multilateral diplomacy, ASEAN has maintained relative peace among its members for decades. Its consensus-based approach, while sometimes criticized for being slow, has prevented open conflicts and fostered trust among

nations with diverse political systems and historical grievances.

In the socio-cultural sphere, ASEAN has worked to promote regional identity and cultural exchange. Programs in education, youth exchange, environmental sustainability, and disaster relief have helped build a sense of community and mutual resilience. Notably, ASEAN's role during the COVID-19 pandemic, in terms of sharing resources and medical support, highlighted its capacity for coordinated regional response. Pakistan, though not a member of ASEAN, has steadily strengthened ties with the bloc. As a member of the ASEAN Regional Forum (ARF) since 2004, Pakistan has engaged in security dialogue and regional cooperation. Islamabad views ASEAN as a crucial partner for its "Vision East Asia" policy, seeking enhanced trade, investment, and diplomatic ties. Pakistan's exports to ASEAN are growing, and its strategic location offers potential as a bridge between Southeast Asia and Central Asia. Pakistan's deeper involvement with ASEAN can also serve as a counterbalance to regional isolation and an opportunity for economic diversification. With China as a major player in both CPEC and RCEP, Pakistan can leverage these linkages to align more closely with ASEAN's economic frameworks. Moreover, collaboration in areas like counter-terrorism, education, tourism, and climate change can further solidify Pakistan's role as a proactive partner.

The doctrine of reciprocity: Pakistan's emerging deterrence logic

N a week defined by regional tension and intensifying rhetoric, Pakistan's Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) released one of its most assertive statements in recent memory - warning India that any act of aggression would invite an "unrestrained" response. The communiqué, couched in formal diplomatic tone yet brimming with strategic meaning, marks a clear shift in Pakistan's defense posture - from restraint to deterrence.

For years, Pakistan's national security messaging revolved around the principle of restraint – a deliberate choice to prevent escalation while safeguarding its core interests. The latest ISPR statement, however, retrames this approach. Restraint, it asserts, is no longer a permanent posture but a conditional response. The statement, responding to "highly provocative" remarks by India's Defence Minister and senior military leadership, declares, "We shall resolutely respond without any qualms or restraint."

In essence, Pakistan's new policy signals a transition from restraint to reciprocity. For years, Islamabad exercised strategic patience, attempting to defuse tensions even when provoked. But the new language implies that patience has limits. According to ISPR, India's "new normal" - cross-border strikes, targeting of urban centers, and exaggerated claims of downing Pakistani aircraft - has redrawn the boundaries of engagement. Under such conditions, Pakistan's response, the statement emphasizes, will now align with this new normal. This is not merely a restatement of deterrence; it is the formal articulation of a doctrine of reciprocity – "We will respond as you act."

Yet the statement's real strength lies not just in what it says, but in what it leaves unsaid. The phrase "by all means necessary" introduces deliberate ambiguity keeping adversaries uncertain about the

scale and method of Pakistan's potential response. This echoes the logic of Cold War deterrence, where uncertainty itself served as a stabilizing force. By blurring the line between conventional, cyber, and tactical responses, Pakistan enhances deterrence without explicit escalation.

The timing of this warning is equally significant. The Middle East is once again in turmoil – the Gaza war, the interception of the Global Samud Flotilla by Israel, and shifting political winds in Washington and London have all deepened global volatility. As rightwing populism resurges across the West – from Donald Trump's comeback in the U.S. to the rise of Reform UK – multilateral restraint is giving way to unilateral assertive ness. For Islamabad, this means one thing: self-reliant deterrence.

The challenge now is balance – demonstrating resolve without risking miscalculation. A doctrine of reciprocity, if mismanaged, can quickly spiral into escalation. Pakistan must therefore complement its strong military signaling with parallel diplomatic engagement, doctrinal clarity, and institutional safeguards. As Pakistan steps into this new strategic phase, its greatest test will be maintaining equilibrium - projecting power without inviting peril. The new normal it defines must not become the next flashpoint. True strength lies not merely in matching aggression, but in managing it - with clarity, confidence, and control.

The World's Failure in Yemen

HE war in Yemen has become a tragic case study in how international neglect, regional appeasement, and internal divisions can empower an extremist movement. The Houthis not only survived years of conflict but are steadily growing. At the heart of the imbalance is technology. The international community, particularly the United States and its Western allies, has refused to provide anti-Houthi forces with the drones and drone defenses necessary to level the battlefield. Meanwhile, Iran supplies the Houthis with advanced systems. These drones have been used not just against Israel in headline-grabbing attacks but also against Yemeni rivals such as the Southern Transitional Council (STC) arguably the most competent and effective military force resisting the Houthis. The STC governs much of southern Yemen and maintains more legitimacy among locals than Al-Alimi's Saudi-dependent council. Yet when it comes to military aid, it is starved of the tools it needs. The STC is left buying low-grade commercial drones, none of which can match Houthi systems. To make matters worse, manufacturers often report serial numbers of these purchases to China or the United Nations, creating a paper trail that undermines the very forces fighting on behalf of the "internationally recognized government." This hypocrisy is glaring. The U.N., in theory, opposes the Houthis. In practice, however, its mechanisms from the Stockholm Agreement to the actions of member states like Iran, China, Russia, and Oman have shielded Houthi supply lines and offered the group international breathing space. The cost of this neglect is visible on the ground.

In Aden, locals whisper that Houthi drones routinely fly over government buildings, conducting surveillance and signaling their ability to strike at will. Even if these flights are not always offensive, they serve as psychological warfare, undermining the already fragile confidence in southern governance. The refusal to provide drone defenses contradicts the rhetoric of Washington, Abu Dhabi, and even Tel Aviv, all of whom regularly declare the Houthis a regional menace. The analogy is simple: doctors warn patients to finish the full course of antibiotics to prevent infection from roaring back stronger. Firefighters know never to extinguish only 90% of a wildfire. Yet when it comes to countering the Houthis, the world seems content

to let the flames smolder, ensuring that they flare back more dangerously than before. A serious strategy would begin with Aden. It would provide a platform for drone operations, intelligence sharing, and naval protection in the Bab el-Mandab strait, one of the world's most critical maritime chokepoints. Just as importantly, it would send an unmistakable message to Saudi Arabia, Oman, and others who continue to play both sides: the Houthis cannot be appeased into moderation. Strengthening the

STC's coast guard would also pay dividends. It would curb weapons smuggling along the coast and assure local populations that international powers are invested in their security. Unlike other Yemeni factions, the STC has shown openness to cooperation with external partners. Unlike Al-Alimi, it does not derive its legitimacy from Riyadh but from its ability to govern on the ground

What Yemen needs is not another U.N.-sponsored signing ceremony but a concrete shift in how the world addresses the conflict? True peace comes from preparation-strengthening legitimate local forces, cutting off Houthi supply lines, and ensuring that extremist groups cannot use drones to terrorize populations or disrupt shipping lanes. President Donald Trump, Secretary of State Marco Rubio, and Secretary of War Pete Hegseth now face a critical test. If they are serious about defeating the Houthis, they must stop treating Yemen as a side issue and begin investing in practical measures: supplying drones, providing drone defense systems, and establishing a permanent U.S. presence in Aden. Anything less is not just negligence but also an invitation for the Houthis and their Iranian backers to expand their reach.

The world has ignored Yemen for too long. However, failure to act decisively now will not just doom Yemenis to continued suffering. It will embolden Iran, destabilize the Red Sea, and threaten one of the world's most strategic waterways. Peace will not be achieved through empty speeches at the United Nations. It will come only through denying the Houthis the oxygen they thrive on and empowering those willing to fight them effectively.

Major champions teeing off as LPGA makes **Ione annual S. Korea stop this week**

The sixth edition of the BMW Ladies Championship will start Thursday at Pine Beach Golf Links in Haenam, some 330 kilometers south of Seoul in South Jeolla Province

SEOUL: The LPGA Tour will make its annual stop in South Korea this week, with a scenic course on the country's southern coast hosting major champions and homegrown stars over four days. The sixth edition of the BMW Ladies Championship will start Thursday at Pine Beach Golf Links in Haenam, some 330 kilometers south of Seoul in South Jeolla Province.

There will be no cut in the 72-hole tournament featuring 78 players, who will vie for the US\$2.3 million purse. The champion will take home \$345,000. This will be the

first edition held at Pine Beach Golf Links, famous for having several greens and tee boxes sitting along the beach and atop seaside cliffs. It has long been regarded as one of the best courses in South Korea thanks to its scenic backdrop and the challenges it presents with sloping fairways and intimidating bunkers.

The LPGA and BMW Korea have moved the tournament around the country since the southeastern port city of Busan held the first two editions in 2019 and 2021. The 2020 event was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The tournament was held in Wonju, about 85 km east of Seoul, in 2022, before Paju, northwest of Seoul, hosted the next two editions. A South Korean player won each of the first two editions, Jang Hana in 2019 and Ko Jin-young in 2021, and then two players of Korean descent, Lydia Ko of New Zealand and Minjee Lee of Australia, were the champions in 2022 and 2023, respectively. Last year, another Australian player, Hannah Green, won for the first time in South Korea. Green is back this week as she tries to become the first repeat champion of the tournament. She is one of three former champions in the field,

joined by Lee and Ko Jin-young. Lee, who won the KPMG Women's PGA Championship in June, is also one of four

players with a major title this season, alongside U.S. Women's Open champion Maja Stark, Amundi Evian Championship winner Grace Kim and AIG Women's Open champ Miyu Yamashita.

The South Korean contingent, in addition to Ko Jin-young, world No. 18 with two major titles, will feature Kim Hyo-joo, the top-ranked South Korean player at No. 8; Ryu Hae-ran, world No. 12 and the 2023 LPGA Rookie of the Year; and Kim A-lim, the 2020 U.S. Women's Open champion. Kim Hyo-joo, Kim A-lim and Ryu have all won an LPGA tournament this season, while Ko will be seeking her first title since May 2023.

80 S Koreans missing in Cambodia scam center row: Seoul

SEOUL: Eighty South Koreans who were possible victims of fake jobs or scam centers were unaccounted for in Cambodia, South Korea's foreign ministry told AFP Tuesday.

A foreign ministry official said that between January and August this year, 330 South Koreans were reported to have gone missing or been held against their will after entering

As of August, "The safety of about 80 people has yet to be verified," a foreign ministry official told AFP.

The ministry added that they are cross-checking the figures with police data at home to avoid overlap.

While there were around 21 cases of kidnapping or confinement involving South Koreans in Cambodia in 2023, the figure jumped tenfold to 221 last year and further surged to fifteenfold as of August, lawmaker Yoon Hu-duk said in a parliamentary hearing.

The recent death of a Korean college student in Cambodia — reportedly kidnapped and tortured by a local crime ring — has shocked South Korea._

Erdogan says Syrian Kurds' quick integration

to help Syria

ISTANBUL: Turkiye's President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said Syrian Kurdish forces' quick integration into Syria would help accelerate the country's development and promote national unity, in remarks shared by his office Tuesday. The Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF), which controls large swathes of Syria's oil-rich northeast, signed an agreement with the new Syrian authorities in March to merge their civil and military institutions though the terms of the deal were never implemented. Last week. Syria announced a comprehensive cease fire with the Kurdish forces after talks between President Ahmed Al-Sharaa and Kurdish leader Mazloum Abdi that followed deadly clashes in the northern city of Aleppo. In an interview with AFP, Abdi said he had reached a "preliminary agreement" with Damascus on the integration of his troops into Syria's military and security forces. Erdogan, whose government forged close ties with Syria's new rulers, said the integration should happen as soon as possible. "The swift integration of the SDF into Syria will also accelerate Syria's development efforts," he told reporters on the plane back from a summit in Egypt "We commend the Syrian government for moving forward with a vision that encompasses all ethnic and religious elements of the country," he said. "This is in the interest of both Syria and Turkiye." Between 2016 and 2019, Turkiye launched three offensives in northern Syria against Syrian Kurdish fighters, who form the backbone of the SDF, and against Islamic State (IS) group militants.-APP

Embattled French PM faces opponents in parliament

PARIS: Embattled French Prime Minister Sebastien Lecornu was preparing to give a high-stakes speech to a divided parliament on Tuesday, with two parties already trying to topple his government. France, the eurozone's second-largest economy, is in a political crisis that has spooked markets and raised concern about its minority government's ability to govern and pass measures to ease the country's debt burden. After a week of drama that saw Lecornu resign only to be re-appointed days later, the 39-year-old prime minister has urged his new cabinet to do everything to help France overcome the deadlock. Lecornu was on Tuesday morning meeting Macron, who has returned from a summit in Egypt aiming to find an end to the Gaza war. All eyes will be on Lecornu from 1300 GMT when he gives his policy speech in parliament, where opponents have threatened to vote his cabinet out. The hard-left France Unbowed party and far-right National Rally have already filed motions to topple Lecornu's new cabinet. The Socialists have said they will not back the motions, giving them little chance of succeeding, but will file their own motion if Lecornu does not immediately suspend a reform that raised the retirement age from 62 to 64. The reform, which the government forced through parliament without a vote in 2023, sparked months of angry protests. In a bid to gain opposition backing, Lecornu earlier this month promised not to use that measure, and allow all bills to be debated in the lower house. But Lecornu, the seventh prime minister of Macron's mandate, has also said his priority was to get a budget approved by the end of the year. Lecornu told his new cabinet on Monday he was counting on them to "show the utmost restraint and humility". "Service is something that requires putting egos aside," said Lecornu. Lecornu's two immediate predecessors were ousted in a standoff over an austerity budget, and his immediate task is to put together a 2026 budget plan. The new cabinet is expected to present a draft budget on Tuesday that aims for a deficit below five percent of GDP, according to government spokesperson Maud Bregeon. The government must give parliament the constitutionally required 70 days to scrutinise the plan before the end of the year. Macron has come under unprecedented pressure in recent days. Some opposition leaders are urging him to call snap elections or resign, and even key allies such as former prime minister Edouard Philippe have distanced themselves from the 47-year-old president. Macron sought to shift all responsibility for the turmoil to political rivals as he travelled to Egypt on Monday, saying those who had sought to destabilise Lecornu were "solely responsible for this chaos". "It is everyone's duty to work towards stability," he said. France has been locked in political deadlock ever since Macron gambled on snap elections in the summer last year. He had hoped the polls would consolidate his power, but they instead ended up in a hung parliament, with the National Rally gaining ground and becoming the chamber's single largest party. The far right senses its strongest chance to seize power in the 2027 presidential elections, when Macron's second and last term runs out.-APP

He said that technical cooperation in biotechnology and agricultural innovation can transform both our economies and create new opportunities for our farmers and industries. He said that there is a great potential for collaboration in information technology and industrial development, areas where Argentina has made remarkable progress. He said that Argentina is a reliable partner for Pakistan in sectors like meat processing, agriculture machinery, sports goods and surgical instruments, all of which hold great promise for bilateral trade. LCCI President Faheem ur Rehman Saigol said, "I am a sports lover and a great admirer of Maradona and Messi, who played a pivotal role in making Argentina the World Champion in football more than once." He said that we are well aware of the importance of Argentina as one of the largest economies in Latin America with a GDP of over 630 billion dollars - according to the World Bank. Argentina is known for its vast natural resources in energy and agriculture. He said that both countries are not just maintaining good diplomatic relations, but they are also regular trading partners. I pin great hopes on today's meeting with regard to opening new avenues for business partnerships and investment collaboration. "As per figures taken from State Bank of Pakistan, the volume of total bilateral trade reached 394 million dollars in 2024-25. Pakistan's exports to Argentina were almost 51 million dollars while imports were worth 343 million dollars. The balance of trade is in favour of Argentina, however, we are keen to increase the volume of exports so that both countries may benefit out of international trade", Faheem-ur-Rehman Saigol said.-DNA

Pak, Vietnam initiate negotiations on PTA with pledge to deepen bilateral coop

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan and Vietnam on Tuesday officially signed and launched negotiations on a Preferential Trade Agreement (PTA) aimed at strengthening trade, investment and economic cooperation between the two countries The announcement and signing took place during a high-level bilateral meeting and the Pakistan-Vietnam Business Forum, held in Islamabad, co-chaired by Federal Minister for Commerce Jam Kamal Khan and Vietnam's Minister of Industry and Trade Nguyen Hong Din, according to a news release. The Business Forum was attended by Federal Minister for Science and Technology Khalid Hussain Magsi, Federal Minister for Communications Abdul Aleem Khan, Federal Minister for Maritime Affairs Junaid Anwar Chaudhry, Federal Minister for National Food Security and Industries Rana Tanveer Hussain, and Nawabzada Mir Zarain Khan Magsi, Parliamentary Secretary for Culture and Tourism, along with senior officials, diplomats, and leading members of the business communities from both sides. In his address, Commerce Minister Jam Kamal welcomed the Vietnamese Minister and delegation, terming their visit as a reflection of the shared resolve of both nations to transform their longstanding friendship into a robust and future-oriented economic partnership. He noted that Pakistan and Vietnam enjoyed cordial relations built on mutual respect. political understanding, and people-to-people linkages, and that the Business Forum represented a major step forward in

expanding commercial and investment cooperation. Jam Kamal highlighted that although bilateral trade between Pakistan and Vietnam has shown steady progress, it has remained below its potential. He identified promising areas for collaboration, including textiles, leather, pharmaceuticals, agriculture, food processing, fisheries, construction materials, and information technology, urging the business communities to take full advantage of these opportunities. The most significant outcome of the event was the formal signing of the Joint Statement on the Launch of Pakistan-Vietnam PTA Negotiations by both ministers. The signing marked a historic milestone in bilateral trade relations and set in motion a structured process to agree by the end of 2025. The PTA would provide a comprehensive framework to enhance market access, diversify trade baskets, and remove tariff and non-tariff barriers. It is expected to foster a balanced and mutually beneficial trading partnership, boosting competitiveness and export potential for both economies. Nguyen Hong Di n welcomed the initiative, emphasizing that the PTA would diversify export markets, strengthen resilience against global economic challenges, and create new opportunities for sustainable and inclusive growth. He underscored the importance of conducting negotiations transparently and ensuring balanced benefits for both countries. Iam Kamal encouraged the private sectors of both nations to view each other as long-term collaborators rather than short-term trading partners, highlighting Pakistan's strategic location, enabling business environment, and young, skilled workforce as key strengths. He invited Vietnamese investors to explore opportunities in Pakistan's Special Economic Zones (SEZs) for joint ventures, manufacturing partnerships, and re-exports. Both sides also agreed to enhance connectivity and people-to-people linkages, including the establishment of direct flight routes between Pakistan and Vietnam to promote trade, tourism, and business travel. They also discussed improved visa facilitation for citizens of both countries to encourage greater mobility of entrepreneurs and tourists. Highlighting the shared cultural and spiritual heritage, Minister Jam Kamal spoke about the potential for religious and cultural tourism, particularly in relation to Pakistan's Gandhara and Taxila civilizations, which are home to some of the most sacred Buddhist heritage sites in the world. The Vietnamese Minister acknowledged Pakistan's efforts in promoting Buddhist tourism and termed pilgrimages to these sites as journeys to the spiritual roots of the Buddhist faith. Referring to Vietnam's remarkable economic transformation, Jam Kamal stated that Pakistan sought to learn from Vietnam's success in value-added manufacturing, industrial modernization, and trade facilitation, applying those lessons to expand its own export base.-Agencies

Pope urges Italy to remain open to migrants

ROME: Pope Leo XIV thanked Italy on Tuesday for its efforts to combat human trafficking but urged the country to remain open to welcoming and integrating migrants as he took part in a pomp-filled meeting with the Italian president.

Leo completed the rite of passage for every new pope by traveling across Rome to the Qurinale Palace for a meeting with President Sergio Mattarella. Escorted by the presidential horse honor guard into the palace courtyard, Leo thanked Italy especially for its welcome of pilgrims during the 2025 Holy Year, which has seen millions of extra tourists pouring into the Eternal City.

Wearing his formal red cape and brocaded stole, Leo thanked Italy for its "generous assistance" to migrants and its efforts to combat human trafficking.

"I encourage you to keep alive your attitude of openness and solidarity," he said. "At the same time, I wish to emphasize the importance of constructive integration of newcomers into the values and traditions of Italian society, so that the mutual gift realized in this encounter of peoples may truly enrich and benefit all."

It was a reference to Italy's role at ground zero in Europe's migration debate, given its proximity to North Africa — making it the preferred destination for smuggling operations setting off from Libya and Tunisia.

The right-wing government of Italian Premier Giorgia Meloni has made cracking down on illegal migration a priority, including by sending migrants back home or to detention facilities in Albania and prosecuting alleged smugglers. Meloni and her hard-line minister Matteo Salvini were in the front row of the audience, held in a gilded reception room of the palace with extra-tall palace guards standing at attention —APP

North Macedonia nightclub fire toll rises to 63

SKOPJE: The death toll from a North Macedonia nightclub fire rose to 63 on Tuesday, when a musician died of his injuries almost seven months after the blaze, the country's prosecutor said Vladimir Blazev-Panco, a 46-year-old singer with the band DNK, died in Skopje early in the day after being hospitalized due to serious injuries, the prosecutor confirmed. On March 16, a fire at a hip-hop concert in the eastern town of Kocani triggered a stampede in the overcrowded nightclub, leaving dozens dead and injuring nearly 200. Eight musicians from the band were among the victims of the club fire that caused shock in the small Balkan country. The blaze was sparked by fireworks in the venue. Prosecutors alleged the club

met almost no safety standards.—APP

Western govts waging sustained attack on right to protest: Study

LONDON: Western govern-

ments are waging a sustained attack against the right to protest, the International Federation for Human Rights has warned, citing the growing criminalization of pro-Paldemonstrations. estine Governments in the UK, US, France and Germany have "weaponized" domestic counterterrorism legislation and fears of antisemitism to suppress public anger over the Gaza war, the study found, drawing on opensource research, eyewitness testimonies and reports from international organizations. "This trend reflects a worrying shift towards the normalization of exceptional measures in dealing with dissenting voices," said Yosra Frawes, head of the Maghreb and Middle East desk at FIDH. The study, which was conducted between October 2023 and September 2025, highlights concerns over the censorship of elected politicians, violations of media rights, and the silencing of civil society and academic freedom in the four major Western countries. Defence minister slams Afghanistan's mixed stance

Khawaja Asif says a state has right to respond when it is attacked

ISLAMABAD: Defence Minister Khawaja Asif on Monday criticised the Taliban-led Interim Afghan Government's mixed approach of issuing threats and, on the other hand, calling for talks. Asif's remarks come against the backdrop of heightened tensions along the frontier and follow a series of

cross-border incidents. In the border skirmishes, Pakistani forces killed more than 200 Afghan Taliban and affiliated terrorists in self-defence action responding to an unprovoked overnight attack by the Taliban forces and India-backed terrorists, the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) said.

Speaking on Geo News' programme "Aaj Shahzeb Khanzada Kay Sath", Asif questioned Kabul's credibility following its foreign minister's statement amid the recent Pakistan-Afghan istan escalation.

The defence czar said a state has the right to respond when it is attacked and insist ed that Pakistan did not target civilian populations but instead destroyed militant hideouts and sanctuaries. He warned that Afghanistan's soil has become a haven for various terrorist organisations. The minister stressed that safeguarding the country's borders is a federal responsibility, not a provincial one, though he welcomed cooperation from the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government if

UNITED NATIONS: Pakistan has welcomed the United States' facilitation of a peace agreement between Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) and Rwanda, who were engaged in a prolonged conflict, and Qatar's efforts that led to the Doha Declaration and a prisoner exchange mechanism, saying these moves raise hopes for a ceasefire in the country's troubled eastern region. "Recent diplomatic initiatives offer a fragile but real opening for peace," Ambassador Asim Iftikhar Ahmad, permanent representative of Pakistan to the United Nations, told the UN Security Council on Tuesday.

Speaking in a debate on the situation in Africa's Great Lake region, he emphasized that the sovereignty and territorial integri-

ty of the DRC must be fully upheld. For decades, armed groups have plagued the eastern DRC. However, the situation has sharply deteriorated since January 2025, when M23 rebels, backed by Rwanda, captured key cities in the Kivu provinces. Rwanda has denied that it provides military support to the rebels.

Since the start of the year, more than 1.6 million people have been newly displaced, with over 68% of these displacements attributed to ongoing conflict, according to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA). In his remarks, the Pakistani envoy said, "The Great Lakes region stands at a decisive juncture." He also commended the mediatory role of

Togo's President Faure Gnassingbe who was tasked with facilitating talks between the DRC, Rwanda and the M23 rebels, with

a focus on implementing peace agreements and achieving a sustainable ceasefire.

"Sustained peace also requires tackling root causes: illicit resource exploitation, governance gaps, and cross-border criminal networks," Ambassador Asim Ahmad said. "Transforming the region's mineral wealth into shared prosperity is essential to breaking the cycle of conflict". The Pakistani envoy also called for strengthening MONUS-CO, the UN peacekeeping mission in DRC, to enable it to perform its vital mandate which was being eroded by resource constraints. The Mission, he said, was already impacted by the budget cuts, and further reductions might irreversibly cripple it. The Mission, the Pakistani envoy said,

must be strengthened - not weakened - to ensure, among other of its task, ceasefire verification and civilian protection. "M23

(rebels) must also lift all restrictions on the

freedom of movement of MONUSCO." (The Pakistani 'Blue Helmets', who formed the bulk of the UN peacekeeping mission in DRC, departed earlier this year after 20-years of service in the country.) Pakistan, he said, remains steadfast in its support for international and African-led initiatives with UN engagement for peace in DRC. Briefing the Security Council, a senior United Nations official told ambassadors that there is "real hope" for a ceasefire in eastern DRC, outlining several key priorities, including addressing the root causes of conflict, such as illegal resource exploitation and weak governance. Huang expressed hope that talks between the Congolese authorities and the 23 March Movement (M23) would resume soon and result in a comprehensive peace agreement.

TLP chief Saad Rizvi 'traced, to be arrested soon,' say sources

ISLAMABAD/RAWALPINDI: As life in Islamabad and Rawalpindi returned to normal after the police crackdown on TLP protesters who were marching towards federal capital, the law enforcement agencies (LEAs) have traced TLP chief Saad Hussain Rizvi and leader Anas Rizvi, the sources said on Tuesday. Noting that the leaders will be "arrested soon", sources said leaders should immediately surrendered themselves to the LEAs so that they can be given due medical attention. 'Nothing can be said about the injuries of Saad [Riz-

vi] and Anas [Rizvi] at this

time," the sources added. The TLP's protest had intensified as TLP workers insisted on continuing their march, citing similar demonstrations in Europe. At the heart of the crackdown was Muridke - the flashpoint of the confrontation. A case was registered there, with police alleging that a rifle found with TLP leader Anas Rizvi was used for firing rounds during the protests. Despite social media claims of "numerous casualties," hospital sources reported few admissions. According to the police report, three people – a TLP worker, a bystander, and a police officer - were confirmed dead. Other claims remain unverified, with officials describing the higher figures circulated

online as "exaggerated." Speculation swirled about the whereabouts of TLP chief Saad Rizvi and other senior leaders. During negotiations with the government, the TLP delegation included Shafique Amini, Ghous Baghdadi, and Faizi, who met Punjab Health Minister Khawaja Salman Rafique, Punjab IG Usman Anwar, and Allama Tahir Ashrafi, among others.

Iohar Cup hockey: Pak-India match ends in a draw

'La Nina' may trigger coldest winter in decades in Pakistan

UN-OCHA report says La Nina occurs when sea surface temperatures in Pacific Ocean cool abnormally

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan is likely to experience one of its coldest winters in decades due to the La Ni a climate phenomenon, according to the report published by the Intersector Coordination Group (ISCG). The latest situation report on Pakistan's monsoon floods warns that the La Nina pattern could bring colder-than-usual temperatures across much of the country, further straining the coping mechanisms of flood-affected households, particularly in the mountainous areas of KP and GB. A La Nina occurs when sea surface temperatures in the Pacific Ocean drop abnormally, disrupting global weather systems and often leading to extreme temperature shifts. In its October forecast, the report published by UN-OCHA says marginally negative phases of both the El Nino Southern Oscillation and the Indian Ocean Dipole are expected to influence rainfall across Pakistan. "Northern Punjab, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Azad Jammu and Kashmir, and Gilgit Baltistan may experience below-normal rainfall, while southern regions, including Sindh, Balochistan, and southern Punjab, are likely to receive near-normal precipitation," it noted.

"Expected impacts include possible disruptions to Kharif crop harvesting due to isolated storms, increased risk of dengue outbreaks in stagnant water conditions, higher chances of glacial lake outburst floods in upper areas, reduced river inflows affecting irrigation, elevated smog and air pollution in plains, and adverse effects on livestock health and fodder availability due to above-normal temperatures," the report added. It further said that Pakistan faces a deepening post-flood crisis marked by reduced response capacity and growing risks to food security and health. The report noted "a diminishing response capacity both by government and humanitarian partners," stating that while local and international actors had mounted a strong initial response, their presence and resources on the ground had since declined.

After uprising, Nepal's Gen Z rush to register to vote

KATHMANDU: In Nepal's capital, young would-be voters are huge - including deep public distrust in Nepal's estabsince deadly anti-corruption protests toppled the governfirst time participating in an election, and they see it as a chance to shape the future of their country of 30 million people, burdened by deep economic woes.

At least 73 people were killed in the September 8-9 protests that left parliament, courts and government buildings in flames. The unrest was triggered by a brief ban on social media but fuelled by long-standing frustration over eco-

nomic hardship and corruption. Within days of the government's collapse, 73-year-old former chief justice Sushila Karki was appointed interim prime minister to steer the Himalayan nation until elections on March 5, 2026. "The pillar of this new government is built on the dead bodies of students," said student Niranjan Bhandari, 21, as he waited to provide biometric data to complete his registration. "That's why, in the upcoming election, we want to uproot the old faces who have been clinging to power for too long," he added.

"I'm here to register for my new voter identity card for that very reason." Nepal's political future hangs in the balance. The challenges ahead to ensure elections pass off smoothly

line up enthusiastically to register for the first elections lished parties. It remains unclear whether protesters and youth will try to form their own party, or if old politicians ban on KP Sharma Oli, the 73-year-old Marxist who served as prime minister four times before he was forced from power, as a commission investigates the unrest. But Oli remains outspoken, calling for the reinstatement of

the parliament "that was unconstitutionally dissolved", in an address to supporters earlier this month. The unrest also battered Nepal's already fragile economy,

where the World Bank estimates a "staggering" 82 percent of the workforce is in informal employment, with GDP per capita at just \$1,447 in 2024.

The bank this month updated its economic assessment for Nepal, warning that "recent unrest and heightened political and economic uncertainty are expected to cause growth to decline" to 2.1 percent.

But at a district Election Commission office in Kathmandu, the excitement among the younger generation is clear. "I'm really excited," 20-year-old student Sambriddhi Gautam told AFP. "This will be my first time participating in an election." Gautam, who is studying to be a chartered accountant in neighbouring India, said she had returned to register to make sure she can take part. - Agencies

Trump to attend signing of Thailand-Cambodia 'peace deal'

KUALA LUMPUR: US President Donald Trump will attend the ceremonial signing of a peace agreement between Thailand and Cambodia at an upcoming summit of Southeast Asian nations, the foreign minister of host Malaysia said Tuesday. Tensions between Thailand and Cambodia erupted in July into the deadliest military clashes in decades, killing more than 40 people and forcing around 300,000 to flee their homes. The two sides

agreed to a ceasefire - brokered in part by Trump - after five days of fighting, and have since repeatedly traded accusations of truce violations.

Donald Trump "is looking forward to witness the Thailand-Cambodia peace deal," Mohamad Hasan told reporters at a press conference in Kuala Lumpur. The US leader is expected to attend the Association of

Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) summit in the Malaysian capital from October 26-28.

Cambodian Prime Minister Hun Manet has said he nominated the US president for a Nobel Peace Prize, crediting him with "innovative diplomacy" that ended the clashes. Thailand's prime minister Anutin Charnvirakul said last week that he received a letter from Trump, with the US leader saying he wanted to see the two fighting neighbours resolve tensions. - Agencies

There is no insurgency in Balochistan: CM

QUETTA: Balochistan Chief Minister Sarfraz Bugti on Tuesday dismissed the presence of an insurgency in the province, blaming "India-backed so-called separatist movements" for the worsening security situation. In recent months, Balochistan has witnessed a rise in terrorist attacks. The outlawed Balochistan Liberation Army (BLA), in particular, has adopted new tactics to inflict higher casualties and directly target Pakistani security forces. Addressing participants of the 17th National Workshop in Quetta, the chief minister maintained that there was "no insurgency in Balochistan but so-called separatist movements" in the province. "The purpose of these anti-state elements is to harm and

divide Pakistan," he said. He added that the Indian spy agency Research and Analysis Wing (RAW) was behind the deterioration of the security situation in the province."The Indian agency RAW has a clear role behind the deteriorating situation in Balochistan," he said. "Separatists are pleased with India but want to harm Pakistan."

CM Bugti added that the war against terrorism was not only the armed forces' prerogative but "the whole nation's joint fight". He added that a "false impression of uneven

development" was deliberately created in the province to sow division, adding that terms like "disgruntled Baloch were coined to justify terrorism". "A person who resorts to violence and takes up arms is not angry but a terrorist," he said. The chief minister also said that distances were created between the youth and the state through social media propaganda. "The government is going to universities and every forum to hear the grievances of the youth," he maintained. Bugti said that in order to improve the security situation in the province and deal with terrorism, the Counter-Terrorism Department (CTD)'s capacity was being enhanced. "For this purpose, Rs100 million has been allocated. Security forces are conducting op-

erations in areas where it is difficult to distinguish between friends and foes," he said. According to recent reports issued by Pakistan Institute for Conflict and Security Studies (PICSS) and the Centre for Research and Security Studies (CRSS), the first three quarters of 2025 in the country saw nearly as much violence as witnessed in all of 2024.
