Pak announces 48-hour ceasefire with Afghanistan

Taliban's key brigades in Kandahar destroyed in targeted strikes, say security sources

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan and the Afghan Taliban have agreed to a temporary 48-hour ceasefire on the request of the Afghan Taliban regime, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (Mofa) announced on Wednesday. "At the request of the Afghan Taliban regime, and with mutual consent, Pakistan and the Taliban have agreed to a temporary ceasefire for 48 hours, effective from 6pm this evening," the Foreign Office said in a statement. During this period, the FO said, both sides will engage in constructive dialogue aimed at finding a "positive and sustainable resolution" to this issue.

The development comes shortly after the Pakistan Army, as per the security sources, carried out precision strikes against key Taliban positions in Afghanistan's Kandahar province, successfully destroying multiple strongholds in response to recent aggression. According to the sources, the operations targeted Taliban Battalion No 4 and Border Brigade No 6, both of which were completely destroyed during the strikes. The attacks resulted in the deaths of dozens of Taliban militants and foreign operatives, the sources confirmed.

Meanwhile, Security forces successfully repelled unprovoked attacks launched by Afghan Taliban in the Spin Boldak area of Balochistan, said the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) on Wednesday. "In the early hours of October 15, Afghan Taliban resorted to cowardly attack at four locations in Spin Boldak area of Balochistan. The attack was effectively repulsed by Pakistani forces," the military's media wing said in a statement. It said the attacks were conducted through divided villages in the Spin Boldak area with no regard for the civil population. The statement further said that the Afghan Taliban also destroyed Pak-Afghan Friendship Gate on their side, a move the ISPR said clearly displays the mindset with

passport ranks 4th worst in the world

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistani passport has ranked the fourth worst for the fifth straight year, according to this year's Henley Passport Index, a ranking of the world's 199 passports based on the number of destinations their owners can access without a prior visa. In the latest global ranking issued on October 7, Pakistan's travel document was placed

at 103 in the list – tied with Yemen - and ranked higher than only those of Iraq (104), Syria (105) and Afghanistan (106). Per the ranking, Pakistan and Yemen's passports permit visa-free access to 31 countries only out of 227 travel destinations, Iraq's allows travel to 29, Syria's gives access to 26 destinations,

Pakistan to launch first hyperspectral satellite

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's space agency on Wednesday announced the upcoming launch of the country's first hyperspectral satellite (HS-1) from the Jiuquan Satellite Launch Centre in China, scheduled for October 19.

Hyperspectral imaging is a type of advanced camera technology used in satellites to study the Earth and space, according to a study published in the Journal of Computational Intelligence and Neuroscience. Unlike regular satellite cameras that capture only a few

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump has an nounced the start of "phase two" of the Gaza ceasefire agreement, Anadolu Agency reports. "All twenty hostages are back and feeling as good as can be expected," Trump wrote on social media platform Truth Social. "A big burden has been lifted, but the job is not done. The dead have not been returned, as promised! Phase Two begins right now!!!" he added. Israel will allow Gaza's key Rafah crossing to reopen today for humanitarian aid to reach the Palestinian territory, AFP reports, citing Israeli public broadcaster Kan.

Another cop guarding polio team killed

PESHAWAR: Another security person, guarding polio vaccination workers, was killed in the Nowshera district in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) on Wednesday, police said. Pakistan is one of two countries, along with Afghanistan, where polio remains endemic. Hundreds of security personnel and health workers were killed by miscreants over the past decade. The policeman was killed in Nowshera on the third day of a nationwide anti-polio campaign targeting 45 million children across the country. "Two armed men targeted a police officer assigned to protect a polio team," police official Bilal Khan told AFP. "He was killed on the spot," Khan added. The polio team remained safe, according to the police.

PESHAWAR: After much drama over the resignation and election of the provincial chief executive, Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI)-backed lawmaker Sohail Khan Afridi has finally been sworn in as the chief minister of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Afridi replaces his party colleague, Ali Amin Gandapur, as the provincial chief executive after the latter was ordered to step down amid reports of worsening law and order and governance issues. Afridi took oath of the office at the KP Governor House. Governor Kundi, who had earlier rejected Gandapur's resignation, was directed by the Peshawar High Court to administer the oath to the chief minister-elect at 4pm today.

Anti-polio drive achieves over 95pc target on 2nd day

LAHORE: The ongoing anti-polio campaign in Lahore achieved over 95 per cent coverage by its second day, with more than 429,000 children administered polio drops across the district.

The campaign is being conducted under the vision of Chief Minister Punjab Maryam Nawaz Sharif to ensure a Polio-Free Punjab.

A review meeting on the progress of the anti-polio campaign was held here on Wednesday, presided over by Deputy Commissioner Lahore Syed Musa Raza.

The meeting was attended by CEO Health Dr. Asif Arbab, Assistant Commissioners, and representatives of the World Health Organization (WHO) and UNICEF. During the briefing, it was

informed that zero refusal cases were reported, while 45,000 children who were initially unavailable at home were successfully vaccinated through follow-up efforts. All 142 previously identified cases were also covered, ensuring full outreach across the city.

Observers from WHO and UNICEF lauded the strong coordination and effective field operations of the district administration. They particularly commended the leadership, commitment, and active supervision of Deputy Commissioner Syed Musa Raza, noting that field teams remained fully mobilized and no negligence was reported._APP

Textile exports increases 5.63% to \$4.774 b

ISLAMABAD:Textile exports witnessed an increase of 5.63 percent during the first quarter the fiscal year (2025-26) as compared to the same quarter of last year (2024-25).

The overall textile exports from the country were recorded at \$4.774 billion July-September 2025-26 against the exports of \$4.520 billion during July-September 2024-25, a latest data released by Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) said The textile commodities that contributed in trade growth included cotton varn the exports of which increased by 12.22 percent to \$182.447million during the period under review as compared to the exports of \$162.579 million last year. The other commodities that witnessed growth in trade included varn other than cotton yarn the exports of which grew by 6.17 percent to \$9.095 million from \$8.566 million whereas the export of knitwear rose by 12.21 percent to \$1423.800 million from \$1268.908 million, it added.-APP

Sindh to have model aquaculture park

ister Syed Murad Ali Shah chaired the 48th PPP Policy Board meeting and approved the development of a Model Aquaculture Park along the coastal belt, as well as the Nabisar-Vajihar Water Supply Project.

The meeting held at CM House was attended by Provincial Home Minister Zia Lanjar, Special Assistant to CM Sved Qasim Naveed. MPA Qasim Soomro, Chief Secretary Asif Hyder Shah, Chairman P&D Najam Shah, Commissioner Karachi Hassan Naqvi, SMBR Khalid Hyder Shah, Secretary Finance Fayaz Jatoi, Chairman SRB Dr Wasif Memon, Secretary Transport/DG PPP Unit Asad Zamin and other Board members. The Board discussed the establishment of the proposed Aquaculture Park, which will be developed by the SEZ Management Company (SEZMC) on transferred land in the Thatta district's coastal area. Planned facilities for the park include earthen ponds, hatcheries, seafood processing units, green energy

solutions, and export linkages to international markets. Expected benefits are increased exports, sustainable and compliant farming, stable domestic production, job creation, rural development, and technology transfer.

The Chief Minister emphasised transforming Sindh into an export-oriented aquaculture hub. With global aquaculture reaching 223 million tonnes in 2022 and Pakistan's fish demand forecast to nearly triple by 2030, Sindh's largely untapped sector, with its 350 km coastline and 71 per cent of the country's marine resources, offers immense growth potential. The Board also approved PDF funding to hire advisors for evaluating project feasibility and structuring. The Chief Minister said these initiatives would exports, unlock Sindh's blue economy, and empower coastal communities through sustainable aquaculture.

Residents of G-7 slum area demand electricity, street lighting

ISLAMABAD: Residents of the slum area in Sector G-7 have appealed to the authorities to provide a stable electricity supply and install proper street lighting in their locality. The community has been facing severe difficulties due to frequent power outages and the absence of functional streetlights. The residents said, the area plunges into comdarkness sunset, creating serious safety and security risks. Families, especially women and children, struggle to move around at night, while students find it difficult to study without electricity. The residents urged the Capital Development Authority, Islamabad Electric Supply Company (IESCO), and the Islamabad Metropolitan Corporation (IMC) to take immediate action to restore power connections and install streetlights in the area to ensure safety, improve living conditions, and uphold the residents' basic rights.-APP

37 Dengue cases in ICT, 40k sites inspected

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad district administration has intensified its anti-dengue campaign, inspecting more than 40,169 sites across the city to control the spread of the virus, while 37 new cases were confirmed in the last 24 hours - 23 from rural areas and 14 from urban sectors. According to the latest dengue surveillance report, the district teams carried out fogging operations at 2,111 locations and identified dengue larvae at 674 sites, while 20 sites tested negative. In response, 1,468 houses were immediately sprayed with anti-dengue chemicals. The administration has directed all field teams to intensify surveillance and fogging, particularly in high-risk areas. The report highlighted that anti-dengue inspections are being conducted daily in residential, commercial, and open areas. Teams are checking water containers, construction sites, junkyards, nurseries, and stagnant water spots - all identified as potential breeding grounds for mosquitoes. Officials said that the anti-dengue drive aims to eliminate larvae at the source and ensure public safety through preventive measures. Field workers are also spreading awareness among residents about keeping their surroundings clean, covering water tanks, and reporting suspected larvae sites. The administration emphasized that public cooperation is crucial to make Islamabad dengue-free. Residents have been urged to promptly report any larvae detection or stagnant water to local authorities. The teams can be reached through the helpline or the district administration's complaint cell. Strict monitoring has been ordered in all union councils, especially in areas where positive larvae have been found repeatedly. Inspectors are tasked with ensuring that dengue prevention standard operating procedures (SOPs) are followed by households, businesses, and institutions. Officials warned that those found violating dengue SOPs - such as failing to cover water containers or neglecting cleanliness - will face strict legal action. Notices are being issued to violators, and follow-up inspections will be conducted to verify compliance. The district health and environment departments are working jointly under the supervision of the deputy commissioner o maintain real-time tracking of cases and high-risk areas. Data from hospitals, laboratories, and field teams is being compiled daily to guide containment strategies. According to the administration, dengue hotspots are continuously monitored, and emergency response teams are dispatched where cases or larvae are detected. Fogging and spray operations are being prioritized in sectors reporting repeated cases. Public awareness drives are also being carried out through loudspeakers, social media, and door-to-door visits to educate residents on preventive steps. -APP

Ehsan Elahi murder case Two suspects killed in encounter

ISLAMABAD: In the jurisdiction of Noon Police Station, Islamabad, two suspects linked to the high-profile murder of CDA Director Land Ehsan Elahi were killed during a police encounter when their own accomplices opened fire during a raid An official told APP on Wednesday that the deceased were identified as Abid Yasin and Abrar Khan, who had earlier confessed to their involvement in the murder of Ehsan Elahi in Blue Area and the attempted murder of Qaiser Ashfaq. Police said the suspects had been arrested during checking in the Noon area, where they also tried to fire at police but were overpowered, and weapons were recovered from them. According to the FIR No. 976/25 registered at Humak Police Station, the suspects admitted during interrogation that their accomplices were also involved in the crime. Acting on this information, the police took them to a location to help identify the other fugitives. As soon as the team reached, their accomplices suddenly attacked the police party with heavy gunfire.—APP

Senator Rubina mourns Agha Siraj's passing



Trump-Zelensky meeting schedule

S President Donald Trump hosted Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky are to meet in Washington this weekin what was billed as a critical push toward ending the devastating war in Ukraine. In the last meeting, despite the high-profile gathering, no breakthrough emerged, leaving the future of peace in Eastern Europe as uncertain as ever. The talks followed Trump's earlier summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin in Alaska, where the U.S. leader had hoped to secure concessions from Moscow. That effort also ended without tangible progress. The Washington meeting, therefore, carried heightened expectations. Yet, once again, road to peace proved far more complicated than Trump's public optimism suggested.

At the heart of the impasse remain two fundamental disputes: Ukraine's refusal to accept Trump's quiet suggestion to "consider vacating" territories occupied by Russian forces since 2022, and Moscow's unwavering stance on retaining control over Crimea, which it annexed in 2014. Zelensky made it clear during the closed-door sessions that Ukraine will not legitimize Russian occupation by ceding sovereign territory. For Kyiv, any proposal involving territorial compromise is tantamount to surrender. On the other side, Russia continues to insist that Crimea is non-negotiable and shows no willingness to withdraw from regions in eastern Ukraine where its troops remain entrenched. These irreconcilable positions once again dashed hopes that Trump could present himself as the dealmaker capable of bridging the divide. Observers note that Trump's sense of urgency in resolving the conflict is tied not only to his political ambitions but also to his personal quest for international recognition. The U.S. president has repeatedly spoken of his desire to win the Nobel Peace Prize, openly declaring that a Ukraine peace deal would make him a strong candidate. Yet, with both Moscow and Kyiv refusing to budge, critics say Trump's strategy appears desperate rather than pragmatic. His trademark bravado - assuring reporters that "a deal will be done, sooner rather than later" sounded increasingly hollow after two high-profile failures within a month. Still, Trump remains eager to claim progress, framing the meetings as "steps forward" even without tangible results.

Joining Zelensky in Washington were key European leaders, including French President Emmanuel Macron, German Chancellor Friedrich Merz, and European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen. Their presence was meant to demonstrate transatlantic unity in the search for peace. However, European officials privately expressed

frustration at Trump's approach, which many see as focused more on personal political gain than on sustainable conflict resolution. One EU diplomat noted, "Europe has borne the brunt of this war - millions of refugees, massive energy crises, and security risks. We cannot reduce this to a campaign narrative in Washington."

European leaders also used the opportunity to press Trump on postwar reconstruction commitments, trade ties, and NATO funding - issues that remain sources of tension in transatlantic relations. While Trump emphasized his wish to "end the bloodshed in Europe," his critics argue that his credibility is undermined by glaring inconsistencies in his foreign policy priorities. Perhaps the starkest example of these inconsistencies is Gaza. As Trump spoke passionately about ending the war in Ukraine, European and Middle Eastern commentators pointed out his silence on the ongoing humanitarian catastrophe in Gaza. Despite repeated international appeals, Trump has largely avoided criticizing Israel's military campaign, which has killed tens of thousands of civilians and displaced millions.

This double standard has not gone unnoticed. Analysts argue that Trump's insistence on being a peace broker in Ukraine while ignoring Gaza undermines his moral standing. "When it comes to Gaza, he simply shuts his eyes," a European journalist remarked, "and that makes his claims of wanting to 'stop bloodshed' ring hollow." For Zelensky, the Washington trip was another attempt to keep Ukraine firmly on the global agenda. With war fatigue setting in across Europe and America, and with international aid slowing, Kyiv desperately needs continued political and military support. By standing firm in Washington, Zelensky signaled both to his domestic audience and international partners that Ukraine will not compromise its sovereignty. For Trump, the calculus is different. Yet his repeated inability to secure meaningful concessions from either side raises doubts about whether his approach is more performance than substance.

The failure of both the Alaska summit with Putin and the Washington meeting with Zelensky underscores the complexity of the Ukraine conflict. Peace remains elusive not because leaders are unwilling to talk, but because the fundamental interests of the parties involved are deeply irreconcilable. Trump continues to insist that "progress is being made," but without a shift in Russia's or Ukraine's core positions, any deal remains a distant prospect. Meanwhile, the war grinds on, exacting a devastating human toll and destabilizing global security. As the world watches, Trump's balancing act between personal ambition, political survival, and the harsh realities of international diplomacy grows increasingly precarious. For Zelensky, Macron, Merz, and von der Leyen, the task is to keep Ukraine's plight central while resisting the temptation to reduce peace talks to a stage for political theater.

There was no choice but Surgery

HEN a household member catches a mild fever or a common cold, our instinct is modest and sensible: we reach for remedies taught by elders, rest, and avoid heavy medicine unless necessity compels it. If simple measures fail we try the medicines at hand; if the ailment still persists we consult a physician, submit to tests and, when life requires it, accept the surgeon's knife. That sequence – care, counsel, and, as a last resort, decisive intervention – is not merely a matter of health but a prudent moral order. So too should be the conduct of states in the face of threats that arise along their borders.

Pakistan's history of maintaining a neighborly relationship with Afghanistan, marked by patience and tolerance, is long and evident. When the Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan, our country welcomed millions of people fleeing the war. At the peak of this exodus, Pakistan and its international partners recorded around three million Afghan refugees living within its borders, sharing the burden through refugee camps and urban settlements, supported by civic compassion and international aid. This compassionate response became a defining moment in our modern history.

Charity and sacrifice neither require nor ensure limitless tolerance for actions that harm the benefactor. For decades, Pakistan has consistently called on various Afghan governments, and more recently the present authorities in Kabul, to prevent their territory from being used as a base for attacks on Pakistani citizens and institutions. These appeals have come in various forms; discreet diplomatic protests, public demonstrations, and frequent calls to curb militancy spreading across the border. In recent years, Pakistani officials and military representatives have often highlighted cross-border attacks

and safe havens as key issues threatening peace along the Durand Line and beyond.

States must begin with persuasion and patient diplomacy; that is the prescription of prudence. When persuasion is met by cooperation, peace obtains and the long human ties between our peoples - shared faith, familial links across provinces, trade and cultural exchange – can flourish. But when repeated appeals yield little and violent actors continue to exploit porous frontiers, a sovereign state has an obligation to protect its people. That duty is not a posture of aggression but the exercise of responsibility; to act lawfully, with proportionality, and with the greatest possible concern to spare innocent life while neutralizing those who plot violence. Pakistan's public statements and operational summaries in recent years have emphasised intelligence-based operations and the priority given to distinguishing insurgents from noncombatants as part of that burden of proof.

The wider context matters. Regional rivalries and proxy strategies have, at times, transformed local grievances into broader instruments of instability. External actors have sometimes exploited fragilities inside Afghanistan to press geopolitical advantages, and those manoeuvres have a ripple effect across the borders of all concerned states.

The May 2025 episode, marked by a brief vet intense confrontation between India and Pakistan, highlights how swiftly escalation can follow even minor strikes. It serves as a stark reminder that strength without fairness provokes retaliation, and caution without determination invites further challenges.

The four-day crisis in May showed just how quickly neighborhood tensions can escalate into broader threats, highlighting the importance of keeping diplomatic channels open while ensuring a strong and credible defense.

Practical realism does not foreclose moral leadership. Pakistan's calls for mediation—whether to regional powers, Islamic allies, or international partners-deserve consistent repetition and reinforcement. When responsible neighbors and organizations step in with counsel and oversight, the chances for a lasting settlement increase. On the other hand, silence or hesitation from those who could assist makes it harder for diplomacy to work and limits the options for a state committed to protecting its citizens. The goal shouldn't be punitive action but restoring conditions where commerce, travel, and family connections can resume without fear.

Patriotism requires neither reflexive belligerence nor naive forbearance. It demands clarity about right and wrong, courage to defend the innocent, and the wisdom to seek peace that lasts. Let the surgeon's knife remain a last resort used only when every other remedy has been tried and found wanting – but let none mistake for weakness the resolve that protects the homeland. A people that gave shelter in an hour of need ask only that memory be honoured by reciprocal commitment to peace. If Afghanistan's rulers and people value the deep ties that bind us, they will recognize that friendship forbids the use of friendship's soil as a theatre for hostility. Above all, this moment calls for statesmanship: leaders who will summon regional partners and Islamic brethren to counsel, diplomats who will keep every avenue of dialogue open, security services that act within law and with discrimination, and citizens who stand united behind measures that preserve life and liberty. If malign actors persist despite counsel and concord, then, with a heavy heart and a steady hand, Pakistan will do what is necessary to secure the safety of its people – always striving to choose the path most likely to lead back to honourable and enduring peace.

Human Papillomavirus

worldwide, and has gained significant attention due to its strong association with a wide range of benign and malignant diseases. Belonging to the Papillomaviridae family, HPV comprises more than 200 genotypes, of which a subset is categorized as high-risk types because of their established role in the development of cervical cancer, as well as malignancies of the anogenital tract and oropharynx. Low-risk HPV types mainly cause benign conditions such as genital warts, while high-risk strains can lead to cervical cancer by disrupting cell cycle regulation. Cervical cancer remains a major global health issue, particularly in low- and middle-income countries with limited access to vaccination and screening programs. Prophylactic vaccines targeting common high-risk HPV types have shown great success in reducing HPV-related diseases, though challenges in accessibility and awareness persist. In 2020, the WHO launched a global strategy aiming for 90% HPV vaccination coverage in girls by age 15 by 2030. Effective control of cervical cancer requires vaccination, screening, early treatment, and comprehensive care strategies.For individuals aged 9-14 years, two doses are sufficient, while those aged 15-45 years require three doses for complete protection. The HPV vaccine prevents genital warts and significantly reduces the risk of cervical, anal, vaginal, vulvar, penile, and many oropharyngeal cancers. These vaccines are made using recombinant technology to produce purified virus-like particles for each targeted HPV type; they do not contain viral DNA, making them inactive and incapable of causing infection. Currently, three vaccines are widely available: Gardasil 4v (quadrivalent), Gardasil 9v (nonavalent), both produced by Merck & Co. using Saccharomyces cerevisiae, and Cervarix 2v (bivalent), produced by GlaxoSmithKline using a baculovirus expression system. Clinical trials and post-marketing surveillance across multiple regions confirm that all three vaccines are safe, although rare adverse effects have been reported, including anaphylaxis in approximately 1.7 cases per million doses. Investigations into post-vaccination syndromes linked to adjuvants, such as autoimmune/ inflammatory syndrome induced by adjuvants (ASIA), suggest an incidence of 3.6 cases per 100,000 doses. While a few deaths have been reported after vaccination, a direct causal link to the vaccine or its adjuvants remains uncertain. Overall, HPV vaccines are considered highly safe and represent the most effective preventive measure, though they are not recommended for pregnant women due to limited evidence from clinical trials. Importantly, vaccination does not provide protection against all HPV types, which makes regular cervical cancer screening essential

three years for women aged 21-29 years, while women aged 30-65 years should undergo either HPV testing alone or combined HPV/Pap co-testing every five years. Women over 65 years who have consistently had negative results may discontinue screening, though continued testing is necessary for those with abnormal or uncertain results. Whereas Pap tests detect precancerous and cancerous cellular changes, HPV tests identify the presence of the virus in cervical tissue, thereby comple-

menting early detection strategies. The World Health Organization (WHO) has established comprehensive recommendations for the prevention and control of Human Papillomavirus (HPV) infection, with the primary objective of reducing the global burden of cervical cancer and other HPV-related diseases. WHO advises the inclusion of HPV vaccination in national immunization programs as part of a broader cervical cancer elimination strategy, emphasizing early vaccination of both girls and boys between the ages of 9 and 14 years, prior to the onset of sexual activity, as the most effective preventive measure These recommendations reflect a comprehensive approach that combines immunization, screening, treatment, and health education, aiming not only to reduce morbidity and mortality but also to achieve equitable access to pre-

ventive healthcare across different regions of the world. The public health impact of widespread and well-implemented HPV vaccination programs has been increasingly evident in recent years, with robust data demonstrating substantial reductions in cervical cancer incidence and precancerous lesions, significant population-level benefits via herd immunity, notable economic savings, and justification for gender-neutral vaccination policies; for example, a modelling study in Kazakhstan showed that introducing nine-valent HPV vaccination for both boys and girls aged 11-12 years (80% coverage in girls, 50% in boys) could avert nearly 97,714 cases of HPV-related diseases over 100 years compared with four-valent vaccination in a gender-neutral strategy, with 8,527 deaths prevented and treatment cost savings of about 14.7 million US.

Ethiopia and other low- and middle-income settings show that high HPV vaccine uptake in adolescent girls dramatically lowers rates of high-grade cervical intraepithelial neoplasia (CIN2+) and persistent infections of oncogenic HPV types, leading to anticipated strong declines in invasive cervical cancer many years later. Moreover, in regions where both sexes are vaccinated, indirect protection (herd immunity) has led to measurable decreases in HPV transmission even among the unvaccinated, reducing prevalence of vaccine-type HPV strains in the population, decreasing incidence of genital warts and non-cervical HPV-related can-

large cohort studies. China's major metropolitan centers (Beijing, Shanghai, Guangzhou), comparing female-only versus gender-neutral vaccination strategies, show that gender-neutral programs avert more HPV-related cases and deaths, and are cost-effective within reasonable thresholds, given reductions in treatment burden across multiple HPV-associated outcomes. Vaccination is recommended to be administered before sexual debut, generally in the age range of 9 to 14 years, when immunogenicity is highest; some programs also allow catch-up vaccination to older adolescents or young adults depending on national policy. Initiatives such as those supported by Gavi (the Vaccine Alliance) aim to improve this: for example, Gavi support has helped introduce HPV vaccination programmes in many lower-income countries, increasing coverage, providing funding for vaccine purchase, helping adopt simplified dosing schedules (one or two dose regimens where evidence permits), and emphasizing multi-age cohort catch-ups in intro years. Recent research also supports that two doses for younger adolescents are nearly non-inferior in immune response compared to three doses, and that single-dose schedules may hold promise particularly in resource-constrained settings, although longer-term follow-up is ongoing.

In addition, gender-neutral vaccination (including males) is expanding in many countries, which increases herd immunity and offers protection against genital warts and non-cervical HPV-related cancers. Despite these advances, overall vaccine coverage remains well below WHO elimination targets in many settings; inequities persist in both access and uptake, particularly among LMICs, rural areas, and marginalized populations.

Despite clear benefits, HPV vaccination programs worldwide face substantial challenges, particularly in overcoming vaccine hesitancy, increasing coverage rates, and implementing sustainable programs in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). For example, in LMICs, lack of knowledge regarding the cancer-preventive role of the HPV vaccine is strongly associated with lower acceptance; sociocultural stigma attached to the idea of a vaccine for a sexually transmitted infection often suppresses parental and community conversations about vaccination. Without addressing these challenges, many LMICs struggle to meet WHO's ambitious targets (such as 90% of girls vaccinated by 15 years), meaning that despite scientific advances, practical, social, and economic obstacles continue to limit the scale and impact of HPV vaccination on reducing cervical cancer and other HPV-related disease burdens globally.

Islamabad and Kabul are witnessing heightened tensions amid the interim Afghan government's reluctance to act against terrorist groups, operating from Afghan soil, in the backdrop of rising terror attacks in Pakistan. The country has witnessed a surge in cross-border terror incidents since Taliban rulers returned to Afghanistan in 2021, particularly in the bordering provinces of KP and Balochistan.

Saudi boxer Yara Al-Amri's life changed after history-making Asian medal win

RIYADH: The end of 2024 will always hold special memories for Yara Al-Amri. In December last year the young boxer made history by becoming the first Saudi woman to win an Asian medal in boxing — a new milestone for the Kingdom's fast-growing women's sports scene.

The 21-year-old fighter earned a bronze medal at the Asian Elite Championships in Bangkok, competing in the 52-kilogram category in her first international appearance.

She told Arab News: "It was my first international appearance, which was the toughest part — competing outside my country without my home crowd and coaches." The win was historic not only for Al-Amri, but for Saudi sport. "This changed my life, as I wrote history for Saudi Arabia by winning the first Asian medal

in women's boxing," she said. "It doesn't mean we don't have champions, but the sport is still new in our country. Despite starting later than many nations, we quickly reached their level and proved we can compete and succeed."

Based in Riyadh, Al-Amri trains under Ali Al-Ahmari at Al-Shabab Club. Standing 174 cm tall, the right-handed orthodox fighter has built a record of 27 fights, with 23 wins and four losses, and holds seven Saudi national titles.

Her path into boxing began unexpectedly. "I first started boxing as a fitness exercise, but soon felt I truly belonged in the sport," she said. "I've always loved challenge and competition, and boxing gave me exactly that. In the ring, it's just me, my mind, and my hands. Boxing completely changed my lifestyle, mak-

ing me more disciplined and committed." Al-Amri describes the sport as a test of focus as much

as strength. "You have to be patient, strategic, and intelligent. Every movement matters." (SUPPLIED) Outside the ring, Al-Amri is pursuing a university degree, juggling training sessions and academic deadlines. "As a university student, my days are always a challenge," she said. "I train twice a day morning and evening while balancing my classes, studies, and daily tasks. My schedule is packed, but I make sure to manage both my academic and athletic commitments."

Her discipline extends beyond boxing. Earlier this year, she completed the Riyadh Half Marathon, describing the 21-kilometer run as "pure challenge and joy." After nearly 30 fights, Al-Amri has learned to embrace both victory and loss. "The biggest lesson I learned from a loss is never leaving the result to the judges," she said. "The fight must be clear vou have to showcase your skills so strongly that there's no doubt. "Injuries and defeats also taught me resilience," she added. "I always say: 'What doesn't kill you makes you stronger.' Before a fight, I've learned to control nerves and pressure. It's natural to feel it, but once I step into the ring, everything switches off — I focus only on my opponent." Al-Amri credits

Jamaica Tops Group B with 4-0 Win Over Bermuda, Curacao Held by Trinidad; Panama Draws Suriname in Group A Thriller as CONCACAF World Cup Qualifying Race Heats Up

MIAMI: Jamaica beat Bermuda 4-0 on Tuesday to seize the lead in Group B of CONCACAF World Cup qualifying as Curacao slipped to second after a 1-1 home draw against Trinidad and Tobago. Jamaica have nine points with two matches remaining, a point clear of Curacao, while Bermuda are out after four straight defeats

Trinidad and Tobago kept their hopes alive with the draw at Curacao's Ergilio Hato Stadium which put them on five points. CONCACAF's United States, Canada and Mexico have already qualified as co-hosts. The final 12 teams have been drawn into three groups, with the winners of each also qualifying for next year's showpiece.

The two second-place teams with the best records will still have a chance to qualify via playoffs with teams from other regions Jamaica took the lead in Kingston in the 24th minute when Bermuda centre-back Dante Leverock deflected a cross into his own net. Two minutes later Bobby De Cordova-Reid added a second and Shamar Nicholson gave the hosts a 3-0 cushion by half-time.

Dujuan Richards completed the rout in the 76th minute. In Curacao, Kenji Gorre gave the hosts the lead in the 19th minute with a superb right-foot finish into the top right corner, but Tyrese Spicer equalised in the 58th minute for Trinidad and Tobago. – **Agencies**

Hungary deny Portugal, Ronaldo early World Cup berth

Mikel Merino Nets Brace as Spain Thrash Bulgaria 4-0 in Qualifier

Spain Crush Bulgaria 4-0 to Stay Perfect in World Cup Qualifiers, Extend Unbeaten Run to 29 Matches

VALLADOLID: Spain moved a step closer to qualifying for the 2026 World Cup with a comfortable 4-0 win over Bulgaria on Tuesday.

Luis de la Fuente's side were completely dominant and triumphed thanks to Mikel Merino's brace, as well as Atanas Chernev's own goal and a Mikel Oyarzabal penalty. Spain have won all four of their opening matches, scoring 15 times without conceding a single goal to lead Group E by three points ahead of Turkey. Georgia are third with Bulgaria bottom after four defeats. "(Scoring) was something I wanted to work on and I'm doing it," Merino told TVE.

"The merit belongs to the team for creating so many chances, we control games from start to end, and that's the important thing. "We don't have much further to go to get to the World Cup, but it's not done yet... I hope we keep winning."

Do la Fuente was without several injured key players including I amine Vamal. Rodri

De la Fuente was without several injured key players including Lamine Yamal, Rodri Hernandez and Nico Williams, but his side made light work of the visitors in Valladolid. Euro 2024 winners Spain attacked relentlessly and came close to taking the lead when Barcelona midfielder Pedri Gonzalez's chip hit the bar.

Pedri was involved again when they broke the deadlock, with his lofted ball into the area nodded on by Robin Le Normand for Merino to head home.

Bulgaria coach Aleksandar Dimitroy admitted before the game his side were just

Bulgaria coach Aleksandar Dimitrov admitted before the game his side were just trying to avoid a thrashing, and they restricted Spain to just one goal in the first half. Borja Iglesias, who replaced Samu Aghehowa at half-time, should have extended Spain's lead but headed wide when well-placed.

Merino headed home his second of the game a few minutes later from Alejandro Grimaldo's cross as the hosts kept up the pressure. It was Merino's sixth goal in his last four matches for Spain. Chernev bundled substitute Aleix Garcia's cross into his own net for Spain's third goal after 79 minutes. Merino won a penalty in stoppage time as he was clumsily kicked by Martin Georgiev and Oyarzabal dispatched it to seal Spain's triumph. Spain have gone 29 competitive matches without defeat, excluding in a penalty shoot-out, matching a record set between 2010 and 2013 by former coach Vicente del Bosque, encompassing their single World Cup triumph to date.

"I have to congratulate the players... the problem is that we want more," said De la Fuente. "We have to keep competing and winning. I'm happy for this milestone but we're not thinking about it." - Agencies

Before that, Pakistan recorded a commanding 7-2 victory over hosts Malaysia, with penalty-corner specialist Muhammad Sufyan Khan netting a hat-trick. Those performances had raised expectations for a podium finish, but the loss to New Zealand has now derailed Pakistan's campaign. The Sultan of Johor Cup, an annual junior

hockey tournament hosted by Malaysia, serves as an important platform for emerging talent from around the world. For Pakistan, this tournament held particular significance, as many of their players are also part of the senior national setup. CCP announces crackdown on toxic whitening creams

ISLAMABAD: The Competition Commission of Pakistan (CCP) has launched a nationwide probe against companies involved in making, marketing, and selling mercury-laden skin whitening creams. The move aims to protect consumers from serious health risks and to ensure fair competition in the cosmetics market.

The CCP's Office of Fair Trade and Market Intelligence Unit found that several popular whitening products sold in markets and online contain danger ously high levels of mercurv. Many of these products falsely claim to be safe and effective while hiding mercury content from their ingredient lists, said a press release. Mercury is a toxic chemical that can cause kidney damage, neurological disorders, and skin diseases. Its use in cosmetics is banned in most countries. Despite this, many whitening creams in Pakistan continue to use mercury under misleading labels such as "glow," "fairness," "lightening."—APP

"These steps are critical to laying the foundations of durable peace, stability, and prosperity for the Libyan people," Ambassador Usman Jadoon, deputy permanent representative of Pakistan to the UN, told the 15-member Council on Tuesday. Nearly 15 years after the fall of former President Muammar Gaddafi, Libya remains split between two rival administrations: the internationally recognized Government of National Unity, located in the western capital of Tripoli, and the rival Government of National Stability based in Benghazi in the east. Ambassador Jadoon said Pakistan remains steadfast in supporting "brotherly" Libya's sovereignty, independence, territorial integrity, and national unity. The roadmap, outlined by the Special Representative of the Secretary-General (SRSG), Hanna Tetteh, on 21 August 2025, proposed ending the transitional period, progressing the agreement of unified institutions, taking the country to free, fair, transparent, and inclusive presidential and legislative elections in line with Security Council resolution 2755 (2024), within an overall timeframe of 18 months, and, in parallel, convening a structured dialogue with Libyan institutional stakeholders and the people of Libya. In his remarks, the Pakistani envoy stressed the need for establishing clear benchmarks and timelines to measure results and ensure that ongoing efforts translate into tangible outcomes. "Sustained engagement with all political stakeholders and the wider public will also be vital for building consensus and broad-based ownership of the roadmap." In this regard, he reiterated that a Libyan-led and Libyan-owned political process remains the only viable pathway to lasting peace. Ambassador Jadoon commended the High National Elections Commission for holding the recent elections in 34 Libyan municipalities, saying he looked forward to the early elections in the remaining municipalities where polling could not be held due to security and other constraints. On the security track, he looked forward to efforts by all Libyan stakeholders, supported by the UN Support Mission in Libya (UNSMIL), to sustain a fragile truce in Tripoli. "We encourage further confidence-building through inclusive dialogue and commend the role of the Truce Committee and the Security and Military Arrangement Committee for their efforts to secure lasting peace, in and around Tripoli." The Pakistani envoy also called for an early agreement on a unified national budget. "Equally important", said Ambassador Jadoon, "is safeguarding Libya's frozen assets and ensuring their reinvestment for the benefit of the Libyan people in line with Security Council resolution 2769 (2025)." Noting the Libyan Investment Authority's challenges in engaging with financial institutions holding such assets - and such institutions' seeming lack of clarity regarding the application of relevant provisions of that resolution - he suggested the issuance of an "implementation assistance notice" to "clarify operational modalities and address existing interpretational gaps".-DNA

Riyadh to host 2025 World Fire & Rescue Championship

ISLAMABAD: Saudi Arabia is set to host the World Championship in Fire and Rescue Sport for the first time in the Arab world, marking another milestone in the Kingdom's emergence as a global hub for international sporting and professional events The tournament, organized by the General Directorate of Civil Defense in partnership with the International Sport Federation of Firefighters and Rescuers (ISFFR), will take place at Prince Faisal bin Fahd Sports City in Riyadh from October 26 to November 1, 2025. The Minister of Interior Prince Abdulaziz bin Saud bin Naif bin Abdulaziz will officially inaugurate the championship during its opening ceremony on October 28. The event coincides with the centenary of the Civil Defense Directorate's founding, adding symbolic significance to the Kingdom's hosting of the competition. Director General Maj. Gen. Dr. Hamoud bin Sulaiman Al-Faraj commended the interior minister's patronage, emphasizing that the championship reinforces Saudi Arabia's growing reputation as a global destination for major sporting events - an achievement aligned with the goals of Saudi Vision 2030. The Riyadh championship will feature delegations from 22 countries and more than 300 competitors, who will take part in four main events - the 100-meter hurdles, 400-meter relay, ladder tower climb, and combat race. The contests are designed to test physical endurance, teamwork, and technical proficiency through realistic firefighting simulations. Launched in 2002 in Moscow, the World Fire and Rescue Championship has evolved into a leading international competition blending athletic excellence with professional discipline. Over two decades, it has grown to include participants from more than 25 countries across Asia, Europe, Africa, and Latin America, with both men's and women's categories officially recognized. The Riyadh 2025 edition, representing the 20th men's and 11th women's championships, underscores the Kingdom's recognized capability to host complex, specialized global events. It will also highlight modern firefighting technologies, promote international cooperation among fire and rescue services, and uphold WADA anti-doping standards to ensure sporting integrity. The tournament carries a profound humanitarian message celebrating firefighters' heroism, professionalism, and selfless dedication to saving lives. Riyadh's hosting reflects Saudi Arabia's commitment to advancing safety awareness, enhancing national capabilities, and showcasing its leadership role in organizing high-profile international events. "This championship not only celebrates courage and teamwork," said Maj. Gen. Al-Faraj, "but also reflects the Kingdom's broader vision to promote community safety and international cooperation under the transformative framework of Vision 2030.-APP

President Zardari condemns cross-Border attacks

ISLAMABAD: President Asif Ali Zardari has strongly condemned the unprovoked cross-border attacks launched from Afghan territory on Pakistani border posts in the Spin Boldak area of Balochistan and the Kurram sector of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. The President termed the attacks a blatant violation of Pakistan's sovereignty and territorial integrity, and an unacceptable act of aggression. He commended the professionalism and valour of Pakistan's Armed Forces for effectively repulsing the assaults and defending the country's borders.

President Zardari observed that the Afghan Taliban regime remains in constant violation of the Doha Accord by providing safe sanctuaries to terrorist groups that continue to attack regional countries, thereby destabilising the entire region including Pakistan. He further noted that the regime has failed to establish a broad-based and representative government in Afghanistan and continues to monopolise power to the exclusion of other political and ethnic groups.

The President called upon the authorities in Kabul to ensure that Afghan soil is not used for acts of terrorism or hostility against Pakistan. He emphasised that such provocations undermine regional peace and the long-standing bonds of brotherhood between the peoples of Pakistan and Afghanistan. The President reaffirmed that Pakistan desires peaceful, cooperative relations with all its neighbours, but any act of aggression will be met with a firm and resolute response.

FBR extension in income tax filing deadline

ISLAMABAD: The FBR on Wednesday notified an extension in the deadline for filing the income tax returns for the 2025 tax year by 16 days. The notification stated that the income tax particulars could be filed till October 31. Prior to this decision, the tax authority announced to extend the deadline two weeks ago, setting October 15 as the last date of submission. The previous extension was approved following requests from various trade bodies, taxpayers, and tax bar associations, the FBR said.

The tax body faced a shortfall of Rs1.2 trillion against its original revenue target of Rs12.97 trillion for FY25, despite introducing Rs1.3 trillion in new taxes. The shortfall drew scrutiny from IMF during recent technical-level talks, where Islamabad was asked to explain the underperformance, The News reported. The FBR ultimately collected Rs11.74 trillion af ter two downward revisions, with officials attributing the gap to unrealised recoveries worth Rs250 billion tied up in pending court cases.

"Macroeconomic stability and structural reforms must go hand in hand," he said, citing ongoing efforts in taxation, energy, state-owned enterprise restructuring, and public finance as integral to this agenda. Senator Aurangzeb concluded by reaffirming Pakistan's commitment to sustaining reform implementation, strengthening resilience, and positioning the country on a sustainable, outward-looking growth path.

UNGA elects 14 members to **HR** Council

NEW YORK: The United Nations General Assembly has elected 14 member states to serve in the UN Human Rights Council beginning on 1st January, 2026. The 14 countries elected are Angola, Chile, Ecuador, Egypt, Estonia, India, Iraq, Italy, Mauritius, Pakistan, Slovenia, South Africa, the United Kingdom and Vietnam. They will each serve a threeyear term on the Human Rights Council. The Geneva-based Human Rights Council is an intergovernmental body within the United Nations system responsible for promoting and protecting human rights around the world. About one-third of its 47 members are replaced every year to ensure continuity through staggered three-year terms. Seats of the Human Rights Council are allocated on the basis of regional groups for the sake of geographical representation: 13 each for Africa and the Asia-Pacific; eight for Latin America and the Caribbean; seven for Western Europe and other states; six for Eastern Europe. - APP

Rebuilding war-devastated Gaza to cost \$70 billion: UN

UNITED NATIONS: Around \$70 billion will be needed to reconstruct Gaza and make it safe after two years of Israeli war in the enclave, UN development experts said on Tuesday, while aid agencies reported that far too little aid is getting in to meet the needs of desperate Palestinians.

At just 41 kilometres long (25.4 miles) and two to five kilometres wide (1.2 to 3.1 miles), few places in the Gaza Strip had been left unscathed by the constant Israeli bombardment before the latest ceasefire came into effect haltingly last Friday.

According to the UN Development Programme Special Representative for the Palestinians, Jaco Cilliers, destruction across the enclave "is now in the region of 84 per cent. In certain parts of Gaza, like in Gaza City, it's even up to 92 per cent." Speaking from Jerusalem, Cilliers highlighted the findings of the latest Interim Rapid Damage and Needs Assessment (IRDNA) on Gaza by the UN, the European Union and the World Bank, which estimated the damage at \$70 billion.

To kickstart the massive operation, some \$20 billion will be required in the next three vears alone, he told journalists in Geneva.

The UN development agency is present in Gaza alongside humanitarian partners to provide immediate support to the enclave's 2.1 million people. This includes providing clean water, emergency employment, medical supplies, solid waste removal and making homes and public spaces safe by clearing rubble potentially hiding unexploded ordnance or the

many thousands of missing Palestinians. "We've already removed about 81,000 tonnes. That is about...3,100 truckloads," Cilliers explained. "The majority of the debris removal is to provide access to humanitarian actors so that they can provide the much-needed aid and support to the people in Gaza. But we also help with hospitals and other social services that need to be cleared of debris." The UNDP official pointed to "very good indications" from potential donors in support of reconstruction from Arab States, but also from European nations and the United States "which has also indicated that they are going to be coming in supporting some of the early recovery efforts". Important as reconstruction is for Gaza's long-term future, UN humanitarians once

the remaining 20 living Israeli hostages were freed on Monday and Palestinian prisoners were released from Israel. The development followed the signing of a ceasefire deal between Hamas and Israel

signed on Monday evening in Sharm El-Sheikh by US President Donald Trump, and the leaders of Egypt, Qatar and Turkiye. Earlier on Monday, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres welcomed the release of all living hostages from Gaza, two years since they were among some 250 taken during Hamas-led terror attacks in Israel on 7 October 2023. On Tuesday, the focus shifted to the transfer from Gaza of all deceased hostages, an extremely difficult process overseen by the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC). It remains unclear how many deceased hostages will be transferred by Hamas. "When it comes to the living hostages or Palestinian detainees and believe me that's a big issue for us - we actually don't know, we know that we have to be ready," said ICRC spokesperson Chris-

tian Cardon, adding that the complex search

NATO looks to strengthen its defences

BRUSSELS: NATO defence ministers will look Wednesday at shoring up the alliance's ability to counter Russian air incursions, as fears grow that Moscow is testing the West

in a grey zone between war and peace. Focus will also be on bolstering support for Ukraine as US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth joins his 31 NATO counterparts with his boss, President Donald Trump, mulling the supply of long-range missiles to Kyiv. The gathering in Brussels comes after Moscow rattled NATO with a series of high-profile airspace violations in Poland and Estonia that fuelled fears of conflict spilling over its border.

Those were followed up by a spate of mysterious drones that disrupted airports and flew close to military sites in a string of countries. All this has added fuel to concerns that Russia is pushing the boundaries and seeking to probe NATO's reaction.

"In more and more ways, we are in a longterm and intensified conflict with Russia," a Western official said. NATO ministers are set to train their sights on efforts to plug gaps in the alliance's eastern flank after it had to use costly missiles to down Russian drones in Poland.

"We are doing what we trained for, and it works, but we need to do more," NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte said. NATO has launched a new mission and beefed up

its forces in the wake of the incidents, but some countries close to Russia are asking for a more robust response. Diplomats say the alliance is looking to fine

tune its rules of engagement for dealing with Russian incursions and iron out different approaches between member states. NATO is at the same time seeking to speed

up work on better developing anti-drone capabilities and incorporating the sort of low-cost technology Ukraine is using into its own defences. The EU, which will convene its own meeting of defence ministers on Wednesday evening, has proposed creating a "drone wall" to try to tackle the menace. But there is some scepticism from countries like Germany over the proposal and fears that the 27-nation bloc could be treading on NATO's toes.

The drone initiative is one of a number of flagship projects the EU is focusing on as part of a broad push to prepare the bloc for potential conflict with Moscow in the coming years. The EU will present a road map on its plans to ministers and hopes to get sign off on it at a summit of leaders next week. Hegseth, who delivered a blistering jolt to NATO on his first visit in February, is meanwhile expected to tell allies to start making good on a vow to ramp up defence spending. NATO members agreed at their Hague summit in June to reach 3.5 percent of GDP on core military spending by 2035. - Agencies

Boeing delivers 55 planes in September

SAN FRANCISCO: Boeing said Tuesday that it delivered 55 commercial airplanes of all types in September, surpassing its five-year average of 40 deliveries in the month and marking an increase of 22 deliveries from a year ago. Of the 55 planes delivered in September, 40 were 737 MAXs. In September 2018, before two fatal 737 MAX crashes upended Boeing's production, the company delivered 87 airplanes.

Boeing also delivered seven 787 Dreamliners, three 777 freighters, four 767s and one 737 NG. From Jan. 1 through the end of September, Boeing delivered 440 airplanes, compared to 291 for the same time period last year. In the three months between July and September, Boeing delivered 160 planes, up from 116 in the third quarter of 2024. In September, Airbus delivered 73 planes. From January through September, it delivered 507 planes. - APP

Siraj Durrani passes away NAZIR SIYAL

KARACHI: Pakistan Peoples Party senior leader and former Sindh Assembly speaker Agha Siraj Durrani breathed his last at the age of 72 after brief ailment in Karachi on Wednesday. Durrani had suffered a brain haemorrhage a month ago and was admitted to a private hospital in Karachi. After showing signs of improvement following a brief stay in the ICU, he was discharged and moved to his residence. However, his condition deteriorated again,

and he was re-admitted to hospital 10 days ago. He remained unconscious since then, and on Wednesday, doctors confirmed his passing. Durrani was a prominent figure in Sindh's political landscape, with a party affiliation spanning over four decades.

Born on 5 October 1953 in Shikarpur's Garhi Yasin Tehsil, the veteran politician began his education at St Patrick's High School in Karachi and later earned an LLB degree from Sindh Muslim Government Law College. He hailed from a politically active family as his father and uncle both served as members of the Sindh Assembly. Durrani entered politics in the 1980s and was first elected as an MPA from Sindh in 1988. Over the course of his political career, he served as a provincial minister three times and was elected speaker of the Sindh Assembly on two occasions. He remained associated with the PPP for over



four decades and was known as a close and trusted aide of both former prime minister Benazir Bhutto and President Asif Ali Zardari. President Zardari expressed deep sorrow over the passing of former speaker. Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif also expressed deep sorrow over Durrani's passing and offered prayers for the departed soul. He noted that Durrani had rendered significant services as Speaker of the Sindh Assembly and that his contributions to politics and public welfare would always be remembered.

Sindh Chief Minister Murad Ali Shah also expressed profound grief, calling Durrani a principled, loyal, and sincere leader of the PPP. "He played a vital role in strengthening the Sindh Assembly and promoting democracy. His services to the people of Sindh will never be forgotten," Shah said.

SC's Constitutional Bench can hear 26th Amendment case

Justice Ayesha Malik says eight-member bench can direct JCP to form full court; hearing adjourned till Oct 20

ISLAMABAD: Supreme Court's Justice Muhammad Ali Mazhar on Wednesday said that the constitutional bench can hear 26th Amendment case and that judges from all the constitutional benches can be included if necessary. Justice Mazhar's remarks came as an eight-member bench heard the pleas against the 26th Constitutional Amendment passed by the parliament last year. The Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan-led bench also includes Justice Jamal Khan Mandokhail, Justice Ayesha A Malik, Justice Syed Hassan Azhar Rizvi, Justice Musarat Hilali, Justice Naeem Akhtar Afghan and Justice Shahid Bilal Hassan. Around three dozen petitioners, including Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI), Jamaat-e-Islami (JI), Sunni Ittehad Council

(SIC), Lahore High Court Bar Association, Lahore Bar Association, Karachi Bar Association as well as the former seven presidents of the Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) and various individuals in personal capacity, had challenged the validity of the 26th Constitutional Amendment. During the hearing today, lawyer Abid Zuberi representing former presidents of Pakistan Bar Council, argued that the CJP can issue a direction to form a full court. "There is no restriction on the powers; judicial powers are available under Article 75 [of Constitution]," Zuberi said. To this, Justice Amin-Ud-Din responded that if a judicial order concerning a

full court is passed, then it would be

outside the jurisdiction of the judges

not part of the constitutional bench. "The CJP can use [his] administrative powers," the lawyer contended, to which Justice Amin-Ud-Din said that the CJP had no administrative powers. Noting that the work of the constitutional bench is limited, lawyer Zuberi said that there is no restriction preventing the matter from being referred to the CJP. "Referring the matter to the CJP is one thing and passing a judicial order is another." Justice Amin-Ud-Din observed. Expanding on the matter, Justice Ma-

lik questioned whether Article 191A imposed any restriction on passing a judicial order and whether the Judicial Commission of Pakistan (JCP) could be directed to form a full court?
