Punjab govt moves

TLP to be banned after violent protests

TLP offices 'sealed' in Islamabad

LAHORE: The Punjab government has decided to approach the Centre to impose a ban on an "extremist party" following the recent wave of violent protests orchestrated by the Tehreek-e-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP). At a high-level meeting on law and order, chaired by Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz in Lahore, the provincial leadership approved "historic" and "extraordinary" measures. Without naming any party, the statement issued by the provincial government said those involved in inciting violence, spreading hatred and violating the law will be arrested "immediately".

It further said that extremist party's leaders and workers responsible for the deaths of law enforcement agencies' personnel and involved in damaging public property will be tried in anti-terrorism courts. The leadership of the party is also expected to be placed on the Fourth Schedule of the Anti-Terrorism Act, which places strict limits on their movement and activities.

As part of the broader clampdown, the provincial government plans to seize all of the party's properties and assets, which will be handed over to the Augaf Department. It's also moving to ban the group's posters, banners, and advertisements entirely. Their social media accounts will be shut down, and any associated bank accounts frozen. The statement has also signalled that any misuse of loudspeakers, in violation of the Loudspeaker Act, will be met with tough penalties. The move comes as part of a broader crackdown aimed at restoring public order and reinforcing the writ of the state and rule of law after recent unrest across the province. Earlier this week, the law enforcement agencies launched a crackdown on TLP protesters and dismantled their protest camp in

China says it supports Pak-Afghan ceasefire

BEIJING: China supports countries in exercising restraint and realising a full and lasting ceasefire, its foreign ministry said on Thursday, when asked about Pakistan and Afghanistan agreeing to a 48-hour ceasefire. China stands ready to continue to play a constructive role for continued improvement in the two countries' relations, Lin Jian, a spokesperson for the foreign ministry, told a regular press briefing.

On Wednesday, the Foreign Office (FO) announced that a temporary ceasefire had been agreed with Afghanistan for the next 48 hours amid recent border hostilities between the two countries.

"A temporary ceasefire has been decided between the Pakistani government and the Afghan Taliban regime, with the mutual consent of both parties, for the next 48 hours from 6pm today, at the request of the Taliban. "During this period, both sides will make sincere efforts to find a positive solution to this complex but solvable issue through constructive dialogue," the FO said. Taliban regime spokesperson Zabiullah Mujahid said on X that

Ceasefire a good omen for regional peace

ISLAMABAD: After days of deadly border clashes between Pakistan and Afghanistan, both sides have agreed to a 48-hour temporary ceasefire a move that many observers are calling a positive development for regional peace and stability. The decision came after a sharp escalation in hostilities, triggered by Pakistan's recent strikes on terrorist hideouts of the Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) inside Afghan territory.

The conflict spiraled when Afghan forces launched retaliatory attacks on Pakistani border posts. The situation worsened on October 15, when Afghanistan once again targeted Pakistani positions, provoking a strong and measured response from Pakistan's security forces. Pakistan's counterattack inflicted significant losses on the Afghan side, prompting Kabul to request an immediate ceasefire.

Islamabad, in a statesmanlike move, accepted the Afghan request but made it clear that this 48-hour truce is conditional Afghanistan must refrain from any further "adventurism" or provocations. The gesture demonstrates Pakistan's preference for dialogue and peace over prolonged military confrontation.

The temporary ceasefire, though fragile, offers a glimmer of hope for a region that has long been marred by mistrust and intermittent violence. Pakistan and Afghanistan share not only a long and porous border but also deep cultural, religious, and historical ties. Neighbours cannot be changed; they must learn to coexist.

Indeed, this episode serves as a reminder that both nations have far more to gain through cooperation than confrontation. Persistent hostilities only serve to destabilize the region and hinder socio-economic development. Both countries must now take this pause in fighting as an opportunity to address the root causes of tension particularly the issue of cross-border militancy.

For years, Pakistan has been urging the Taliban-led Afghan government to take decisive action against the TTP, which continues to orchestrate attacks from Afghan soil. Despite repeated assurances from Kabul, the menace of TTP remains unchecked. Islamabad's recent operation targeting TTP hideouts was aimed at dismantling the terrorist infrastructure that threatens Pakistan's national security.

The Afghan government's inaction has only deepened Pakistan's frustration. The Taliban, having once been victims of external aggression themselves, should understand the gravity of allowing militant groups to operate freely. As long as the TTP continues to find safe havens in Afghanistan, mutual trust between the two neighbours will remain elusive.

Whenever Pakistan and Afghanistan engage in conflict, it is the regional spoilers who rejoice. Among them, India stands out as the biggest beneficiary of discord between the two Muslim-majority neighbours. New Delhi, still reeling from its recent military humiliation where seven of its aircraft were reportedly shot down in a confrontation with Pakistan - has every incentive to stoke instability along Pakistan's western border.

A distracted Pakistan means an advantage for India, which seeks to undermine Islamabad diplomatically and militarily. Although a direct Indian adventure against Pakistan is unlikely in the near future, there is little doubt that India would prefer a prolonged Pakistan-Afghanistan conflict that keeps Islamabad's attention divided. This underscores the need for both Kabul and Islamabad to see beyond immediate grievances and recognize the broader geopolitical game at play.

Peace in Afghanistan is not just an Afghan or Pakistani issue - it is a regional necessity. Many crucial energy and connectivity projects, such as the Turkmenistan-Afghanistan-Pakistan-India (TAPI) gas pipeline and CASA-1000 power transmission project, depend on stability in Afghanistan. Without peace, these multi-billion-dollar initiatives will remain stalled, depriving the entire region of economic growth and energy security.

Afghanistan's internal peace is also vital for Pakistan's border regions, which have suffered immensely from terrorism and the influx of refugees. Sustainable peace in Afghanistan would pave the way for secure borders, enhanced trade, and people-to-people exchanges that could transform South and Central Asia into a hub of economic activity.

While Pakistan has every right to defend its sovereignty and respond to aggression, it must continue exercising restraint and strategic patience. The Taliban government does not respond effectively to threats or military might their political and ideological roots are deeply intertwined with decades of conflict and resistance. They do not understand the language of coercion; their mindset has been shaped by war.

However, history has shown that engagement and diplomacy can yield results where force fails. Even the world's superpowers from the Soviet Union to the United States - learned that military domination in Afghanistan is futile. Pakistan, therefore, must tread wisely, using dialogue, economic incentives, and religious diplomacy to bring the Taliban leadership toward mutual understanding.

Another major sticking point between Islamabad and Kabul is the issue of Afghan refugees. Millions of Afghans have lived in Pakistan for decades, benefiting from its hospitality and generosity. However, their prolonged stay has created economic. social, and security challenges for Pakistan. The government's recent decision to repatriate illegal Afghan refugees has drawn criticism from Kabul and some international quarters.

While Pakistan has legitimate concerns about its internal security, the process of repatriation should be carried out humanely and with-

out coercion. The refugees, many of whom were born and raised in Pakistan, should not be made scapegoats for diplomatic failures. A joint mechanism involving both governments and international organizations could ensure an orderly and dignified repatriation process.

Pakistan's current predicament is, to some extent, the outcome of its own past policies. Over the years, Islamabad has supported certain factions or groups for strategic purposes only to find them later turning against the state. These short-term tactical moves have often produced long-term instability. The rise of the TTP is a stark reminder of how such groups, once nurtured for geopolitical gains, can evolve into uncontrollable monsters.

Moving forward, Pakistan must adopt a consistent, principle-based approach toward Afghanistan one that prioritizes peace, non-interference, and mutual respect. Strategic depth should be replaced with strategic cooperation.

The 48-hour ceasefire between Pakistan and Afghanistan may be short, but it carries immense symbolic importance. It demonstrates that even after fierce exchanges, dialogue remains possible. Both countries must now capitalize on this moment to establish communication channels, address mutual grievances, and develop a framework to prevent future escalations.

As neighbours bound by faith, culture, and geography, Pakistan and Afghanistan have no choice but to coexist. Continued hostility will only serve the interests of external powers and push both nations toward economic and social decline. It is time for reason to prevail over rhetoric, and for diplomacy

to replace the drumbeat of war. If both sides commit sincerely to peace, this temporary truce could become the first step toward lasting stability not just for Pakistan and Afghanistan, but for the entire region.

He noted that according to the State Bank of Pakistan, bilateral trade stood at around USD 908 million in 2024–25, with exports to Turkiye at USD 264 million dollars and imports at USD 643 million. He added that Turkiye's global exports exceeded USD 261 billion while imports were

Pakistan seeks to increase its share in this trade with Turkiye's support. The LCCI President said Pakistan's exports to Turkiye are mainly textiles, while imports include machinery, iron and steel, chemicals, and plastic products. He emphasized that the Trade in Goods Agreement signed in 2022 offers a solid base to raise the bilateral trade volume to at least USD 5 billion. Ambassador Dr. Neziroglu congratulated the LCCI leadership and lauded the Chamber for its vital role in promoting business and industrial growth. He remarked that whenever he visits Lahore, he makes it a point to visit the LCCI, calling it a "school" that has produced two Prime Ministers, a Foreign Minister, and a Deputy Prime Minister of Pakistan. He commended the LCCI as one of the most active and dynamic chambers in the region. 

She also underscored the importance of establishing a uniform minimum age of marriage

across the country. Fauzia Viqar, Federal Ombudsperson for Protection against Harassment at the Workplace, chaired the session titled "Solution Strategies Development Session to Reduce Early Marriages to Enhance Gender Equality." She emphasized the importance of understanding laws that safeguard women's rights and raising awareness about them, noting that such

knowledge is vital for helping those in urgent need of protection for their fundamental rights.

Prof. Brigadier Dr. Mamoona Mushtaq, representing the Society of Obstetricians and Gynecologists of Pakistan, gave a detailed presentation on the health complications associated with early marriages. She discussed the root causes and stressed the need for effective implementation of legislation aimed at protecting girls' rights. Islamabad IT Park to boost digital growth

ISLAMABAD: The under-construction IT Park in Islamabad is set to facilitate technology transfer through industry-academia linkages, support technology commercialization, connect tertiary education with production, promote research and development, and enhance IT exports and industry competitiveness According to an official of the Ministry of IT, the landmark project is being developed with a \$76.3 million loan from South Korea, secured on highly concessional terms. He said the foundation stone of the IT Park in Chak Shahzad, Islamabad, was laid with South Korean assistance to realize Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's vision of a "Digital Pakistan." "The Islamabad IT Park will consist of a twelve-story building (including two basements and ten floors) with a total covered area of 66,893 square meters. Initially, it will provide office space for around 120 start-ups and small to medium enterprises, along with facilities such as testing laboratories, classrooms, an industry-academia linkage center, and an auditorium," he added. Built to international standards, the park will offer state-of-the-art facilities to attract global companies, enhance exports, and strengthen Pakistan's IT ecosystem. "Both Islamabad and Karachi IT Parks are being funded by South Korea, reflecting growing international confidence in Pakistan's technology sector," the official said. Despite initial challenges such as heavy rains, import restrictions, and economic pressures, the Islamabad IT Park has remained within its allocated budget of \$76.3 million, with an additional \$12.5 million provided through the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP). Most of the construction work is expected to be completed by December 31, 2025. Once operational, the park will serve as a hub for innovation, investment, and employmentmarking a major step forward in Pakistan's digital transformation journey.-DNA

Pakistan's poverty rate climbs again after steady decline

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's poverty rate has started to climb again after nearly two decades of decline, reflecting profound structural weaknesses in the economy. Poverty. which had fallen from 64.3 percent in 2001 to 21.9 percent in 2018, has risen to about 25.3 percent.

Shahid Rasheed Butt, former President of ICCI, said that the reversal is not only due to COVID-19 and floods but also to a fragile growth model unable to sustain long-term gains. He said poverty reduction relied heavily on informal employment and remittances from overseas workers, providing temporary relief without building resilience. Many households that had escaped poverty slipped back after economic shocks, exposing the weakness of income growth in low-wage sectors. Economic activity remains consumption-driven rather than based on investment or exports. keeping productivity low and volatility high, the World Bank said in its latest report. Human development indicators compound the problem. Nearly 40 percent of children under five suffer from stunting, while one in four prima-

ry-age children is out of school. The report warns that a poorly educated and unhealthy workforce limits future competitiveness. Access to clean water and sanitation also remains inadequate for millions of households, constraining both health and productivity, he said. Shahid Rasheed Butt noted that regional disparities remain stark. Rural poverty is more than twice that of urban areas, with Balochistan showing some of the worst deprivation. The Bank notes that poor urban management and weak infrastructure have prevented cities from serving as engines of growth. Fiscal policy has also aggravated inequality; indirect taxes disproportionately burden the poor, while subsidies benefit the wealthy. Despite the challenges, there is hope for change. The report calls for fairer taxation, targeted investments in human capital, and stronger safety nets. It emphasizes that the obstacle is not policy design but rather political will, entrenched elite interests, and weak governance, which can be overcome with concerted efforts. The government must review the World Bank's findings before finalizing its next poverty reduction strategy. The business leader cautions that without transparent implementation and stronger local governance, these measures may again fall short of reversing the current poverty trend.

Railways will not leave an inch of its land to anyone: Abbasi

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Railways Muhammad Hanif Abbasi on Thursday reaffirmed that Pakistan Railways will not leave an inch of its land to anyone, directing authorities concerned to further intensify the anti-encroachment campaign against land grabbers. Chairing a meeting to review the overall performance of the Multan Division, the minister reiterated his policy of zero tolerance against encroachments and emphasized the Railways' unwavering commitment to passenger facilitation.

"We will not take an inch of anyone else's land, but we will not leave an inch of railway land to anyone," said the minister.

According to the briefing, the train punctuality during the current fiscal year stood at 88 percent, compared



to 86 percent during the same period last year. Despite disruptions caused by recent floods, the division's overall performance remained satisfactory, said Divisional Superintendent (DS) Multan. The division's revenue increased by Rs. 77 million in the

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Australian High Commissioner a true friend of Pakistani hockey

S Australian High Commissioner Neil Hawkins concludes his diplomatic tenure in Pakistan, he leaves behind not only a legacy of diplomatic engagement but also a deep personal connection with Pakistan's national sport hockey. During his time in Islamabad, Mr. Hawkins distinguished himself as a sincere friend of Pakistan and an ardent supporter of reviving the country's once-glorious hockey tradition. Unlike most envoys who limit their engagements to official diplomacy, Neil Hawkins went beyond protocol. He took a keen interest in Pakistan's sporting culture, particularly field hockey a sport that once brought Pakistan global fame through Olympic and World Cup victories. Recognizing the decline of the game in recent years, he made genuine efforts to help Pakistan restore its past glory on the international stage.

Throughout his tenure, Mr. Hawkins met with numerous sports officials, hockey administrators, and young players. His aim was not just symbolic he wanted to create real impact by helping Pakistan develop the sport at the grassroots level. Understanding that true revival begins with youth engagement, he sought to channel his country's sporting expertise toward rebuilding Pakistan hockey from the ground up. One of his notable contributions was facilitating equipment support from Hockey Australia, including the distribution of hockey sticks and training kits to young players. These gestures reflected more than diplomatic courtesy they were acts of genuine friendship and encouragement for aspiring Pakistani athletes who often lack basic facilities. He also supported initiatives aimed at fostering school and club-level hockey, encouraging young players to stay connected with the sport. His efforts inspired optimism within the small but passionate community of hockey lovers in Pakistan. Unfortunately, however, the broader institutional support that was needed to sustain such initiatives was missing. Despite the High Commissioner's enthusiasm and sincere intentions, his efforts could not produce the desired results largely due to the indifference and internal disarray of the Pakistan Hockey Federation (PHF). Over the years, the PHF has been marred by administrative infighting, inconsistent policies, and lack of vision, all of which have severely hampered the sport's progress.

A glaring example of this mismanagement can be seen in the ongoing Sultan of Johor Cup in Malaysia, where Pakistan's junior hockey team failed to qualify for the final. Shockingly, nearly half the players selected for the "junior" team are actually senior players. This flawed approach relying on experienced players in a junior tournament not only undermines the purpose of youth development but also deprives genuine young talent of much-needed exposure.

When senior players eventually retire, Pakistan will face an inevitable vacuum of replacements, as the junior structure is not producing new

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stars. This short-sighted selection policy reflects the chronic issues within the federation a lack of planning, meritocracy, and commitment to nurturing the next generation. Adding to the woes is the growing disconnect between the Pakistan Sports Board (PSB) and the PHF. The two bodies, instead of working in coordination, often find themselves at odds over financial and administrative matters. This institutional discord has paralyzed many developmental programs and discouraged clubs and academies that once played a vital role in producing players.

The situation in Islamabad is particularly disheartening. The PSB's recent decision to increase ground fees has virtually driven hockey out of the capital. The Naseer Bunda Hockey Stadium, once bustling with local clubs and training sessions, now stands largely deserted. Most clubs simply cannot afford the inflated fees, leaving young players without a venue to practice or compete. This single decision has further alienated grassroots hockey and deprived the city's youth of a constructive sporting outlet.

Hockey, once a symbol of national pride, has been in free fall for years. The reasons are many lack of infrastructure, insufficient funding, outdated coaching methods, and internal politics within the PHF. The national team's inability to qualify for major international events like the Olympics and World Cup has further eroded public interest. While other nations have modernized their hockey systems through scientific training, youth academies, and sponsorships, Pakistan continues to rely on outdated structures. Even though the Prime Minister is the Chief Patron of the PHF, there has been little practical involvement from the top leadership. Successive governments have largely ignored the national sport, treating it as a relic of the past rather than a symbol worth reviving.

In this bleak scenario, Neil Hawkins stood out as a rare foreign envoy who truly cared. His engagement with Pakistan's hockey fraternity was driven by genuine affection rather than diplomatic formality. He believed in Pakistan's potential and often expressed confidence that the nation could reclaim its place among hockey's elite provided it reorganizes its domestic structure and restores professionalism. His tenure will also be remembered for promoting people-to-people ties between Pakistan and Australia through sports diplomacy. Hockey served as a bridge reflecting not just athletic cooperation but a shared passion for fair play and teamwork. As he departs Pakistan, Mr. Hawkins carries with him the respect and affection of many Pakistanis athletes, journalists, and ordinary citizens alike. His sincere efforts to promote goodwill and sportsmanship will be remembered long after his departure. However, his story also serves as a reminder and a challenge for Pakistan's sports authorities. If a foreign diplomat can recognize the potential of Pakistan hockey and attempt to revive it, why can't those entrusted with its future show the same dedication?

The decline of hockey is not inevitable it is the result of neglect and misplaced priorities. With serious reforms, transparent governance, and support from the state, the sport can still rise again. Neil Hawkins may be leaving, but his vision for Pakistan hockey a vision rooted in hope, hard work, and friendship must not be allowed to fade. For now, Pakistan bids farewell to a true friend who saw greatness where others saw decline and who believed that the green shirts could, one day, shine again.

Trump's Spotlight on Shahbaz

HE recent summit hosted by President Donald Trump, with Egypt's Prime Minister beside him, carried moments that went beyond protocol. When Trump extended an affectionate greeting to Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, it was more than a warm gesture-it symbolized a historic shift in U.S.-Pakistan relations. That moment showed how Islamabad's civilian leadership and its military command under Field Marshal Asim Munir had moved from the margins of suspicion to the heart of Washington's strategic calculus. This closeness did not emerge overnight. It had been cultivated in the months before America's devastating strike on Iran's nuclear facilities, when Pakistan's leadership first engaged with Trump in serious dialogue. Since then, Pakistan has become central in persuading the Muslim world and wealthy Arab capitals to support

What followed at the summit underscored the depth of this bond. While European leaders, presidents, and prime ministers from around the globe sat on the sidelines, Shehbaz Sharif was invited by Trump to take the podium and publicly offer praise. No other leader was given such a platform. Trump, clearly pleased, remarked that the true achievement of the summit was not only the signing of the Hamas-Israel agreement but the dawn of a new era of friendship, reconstruction, and hope for Gaza. In a further gesture, Trump mentioned Field Marshal Munir by name, praising his leadership and role in regional stability. It was a recognition that carried consequences far beyond the hall, signaling to the world that Pakistan was no longer merely a participant but an indispensable partner in shaping the future of the Middle East.

Trump's ambitious 21-point Gaza Peace Plan.

The political consequences at home are equally profound. A country that only recently teetered on the brink of economic collapse now finds itself under the protective shield of Washington's goodwill. Trump's personal embrace of Pakistan's leadership, combined with the IMF's readiness to release fresh funds and the global media's acknowledgment of reforms, all but ensures that Shehbaz Sharif's government will complete its five-year term. Bloomberg's recent report, which placed Pakistan as the second most improved emerging economy in terms of sovereign default risk, has become an anchor for this perception of stability. It suggests that regime change, once a lingering fear, is no longer an imminent threat.

For the opposition led by Imran Khan, this represents a near-terminal blow. PTI, once a movement with momentum, now appears fractured, riddled with blame games and leadership rifts. International recognition of government performance compounds the decline of PTI's appeal. The likelihood of Khan's return to power grows slimmer with each passing day, not only in this term but perhaps in the next electoral cycle as well. Continuity, not disruption, now defines the political horizon.

Pakistan's growth for FY25 was revised upward to 3.04% after industrial output rebounded, while third-quarter growth came in at 2.4%. These figures are encouraging but modest, reflecting stabilization rather than a boom. Inflation, which had once spiraled above 30%, cooled dramatically to just 4.1% by late 2024, allowing the State Bank to cut policy rates from a suffocating 22% down to 12%. This drop, however, owes as much to global commodity relief as it does to policy discipline.

Investment has shown some sparkle: the Special Investment Facilitation Council pushed foreign direct investment up by 16% in one month, IT exports rose 32%, and the Karachi Stock Exchange doubled in a single year. Exports rose by 10% to \$30.64 billion in FY2024, though a persistent trade deficit remains, fueled by costly imports of petroleum and machinery. Most recently, a \$1.2 billion IMF agreement reached in October 2025 has shored up liquidity, while the 2025–26 budget ambitiously targets 4.2% growth.

These data points reinforce Bloomberg's narrative to an extent. Inflation is under control, growth is stabilizing, investors are returning, and credit risk has narrowed. Yet deep challenges persist. Job creation remains weak, and official data is thin. Small and medium enterprises, which form the backbone of domestic employment, still face crushing costs from energy tariffs, taxation, and financing constraints. Structural reforms

in governance, energy, and taxation continue to lag. Pakistan's revival, while real, is fragile—dependent on external goodwill and vulnerable to global shocks. What makes the Bloomberg recognition consequen-

tial is its convergence with Trump's embrace. Together, they create a powerful narrative dividend: Pakistan is not only stable, but strategically indispensable. For Washington, Islamabad's role in rallying Muslim and Arab states behind the Gaza framework is invaluable. For Pakistan, the dividend is survival and the chance to thrive under international endorsement. IMF funds flow more smoothly, investors take notice, and international media highlight the recovery rather than the collapse. Confidence breeds confidence, and the government's legitimacy is strengthened at home. But overreliance on narrative is dangerous. Recognition from Bloomberg or praise from Trump cannot substitute for deep economic transformation. If oil prices spike, if U.S. interest rates rise, or if domestic reforms stall, the narrative could unravel quickly. Investors are patient only as long as reforms continue; corruption or complacency could break the cycle of confidence. Pakistan's future cannot rest solely on symbolic endorsements. It must be built on durable change that translates into jobs, thriving businesses, and improved living standards.

The outlook is both promising and precarious. If Pakistan can maintain fiscal prudence, expand exports, exploit its mineral wealth, and modernize its economy, this Bloomberg moment may be remembered as the beginning of a genuine turnaround. With Washington's backing, the country enjoys a rare window of stability that could last five to ten years, enough time to set the foundation for durable prosperity. But history offers harsh lessons: moments of reprieve squandered, opportunities lost to complacency or discord. The challenge now is not to mistake recognition for resolution. Trump's embrace and Bloomberg's endorsement are powerful signals of global confidence, but unless they are matched by tangible improvements in jobs, trade, and technology, they will remain fleeting headlines. Pakistan stands at a turning point, its reprieve fragile but full of possibility. Whether this moment becomes a renaissance or a relapse depends not on the applause abroad but on the reforms at home.

Even an Enemy must be Dignified

AS anyone ever described more simply the idea that even an enemy should reflect the moral values of a weether. the moral values of a worthy rival? History gives us a lasting example of grace and character in the famous meeting between Alexander the Great and King Porus. After their fierce battle, Alexander asked the defeated Porus how he wanted to be treated. Porus replied, "As a king would treat another king." Impressed by this noble response, Alexander spared his life and returned his kingdom. This moment between two strong and principled leaders reminds us of a truth often overlooked today - that rivalry's value lies not in trickery or deceit, but in the respect and honor with which it is pursued. In our own times, this spirit of chivalry seems lost. We have been unfortunate in our neighborhood, where we face not an honourable rival but one who disregards both the ethics of war and the principles of peaceful coexistence. The Holy Qur'an reminds us:

"And do not let the hatred of a people prevent you from being just. Be just; that is nearer to righteousness." (Surah Al-Ma'idah, 5:8).

This divine commandment lays down the foundation for a moral order in which even enmity does not absolve one of fairness and honour. Yet, when one examines the behaviour of our eastern neighbour, it is clear that the principle of justice has often been replaced by aggression, deceit, and hypocrisy. The events of May 2025 serve as a striking reminder. When tensions escalated into open conflict, India suffered a devastating defeat on the battlefield. Its confidence crumbled in the face of Pakistan's readiness and resilience. As the momentum shifted, the Indians that once flaunted its military dominance found itself appealing to international forums for a ceasefire—a scenario that exposed its vulnerabilities both morally and strategically.

The Qur'an states: "Indeed, Allah does not love the treacherous." (Surah Al-Anfal, 8:58).

And it further guides believers that, "If you fear treachery from a people, throw their treaty back at them in a just way. Indeed, Allah does not love the treacherous." Thus, when a neighbour chooses the path of deceit and covert aggression, Islam allows the believer to respond firmly and justly, but never unjustly. After being vanquished in open combat, India turned to its habitual practice of indirect warfare — covert operations, cross-border sabotage, and media manipulation. These are not the methods of a state that values honour; these are the tactics of those who strike from the shadows, fearful of open confrontation. It is said in a Hadith of the Holy Prophet Muhammad:

Pakistan, however, remains steadfast in its moral discipline. We neither resort to underhanded methods nor take pride in aggression. Our forbearance should never be mistaken for weakness, for we believe in the principle that peace is not the absence of strength, but the control of it.

Pakistan's response has therefore been firm, measured, and rooted in principle. We are a nation forged in struggle, guided by faith, and tempered by sacrifice. We seek peace because the Qur'an commands: "And if they incline to peace, then incline to it [also] and rely upon Allah." (Surah Al-Anfal, 8:61). But when our patience is mistaken for submission, and our gestures of peace for fear, we are reminded that Islam also enjoins us to defend ourselves with courage:

"Permission [to fight] has been given to those who are being wronged, because they have been wronged. And indeed, Allah is competent to give them victory." (Surah Al-Hajj, 22:39).

Thus, Pakistan reserves the right to respond in the language that the aggressor understands — with dignity, decisiveness, and determination. Our armed forces, guided by discipline and devotion, have demonstrat-

ed time and again that we seek neither war nor humiliation of others, but we will never compromise our sovereignty or honour. The wounds of May are still fresh, yet they remind us that our restraint, too, is a form of power. History bears witness that true greatness is not measured merely by victories, but by the values one upholds in conflict. Even in war, the Holy Prophet forbade the killing of non-combatants, the destruction of crops, and the violation of treaties. Such was the ethical code that Islam laid down more than fourteen centuries ago -acode that elevates human conduct even in the harshest of circumstances. Pakistan's struggle for peace and justice in the face of provocation stands within that same moral tradition.

Our message to the world and to our adversary is clear; Pakistan desires peace, but peace founded on justice and mutual respect. We shall neither initiate aggression nor tolerate humiliation. We shall respond, if compelled, with the calm courage that belongs to those who trust in Allah's promise:

"Indeed, with hardship comes ease." (Surah Ash-Sharh, 94:6). In the end, let us remember that victory without virtue is fleeting, and power without principle is perilous. The dialogue between Alexander and Porus still echoes through time because it elevates conflict into a contest of character. Let our own struggles be guided by the same spirit — to defend without hatred, to fight without cruelty, and to overcome without arrogance. For as the Prophet said: "The strong man is not the one who can overpower others, but the one who can control himself when angry." (Sahih al-Bukhari).

May our strength remain disciplined, our faith unwavering, and our cause just — so that when history writes of these times, it may record that Pakistan stood firm with honour, restrained in power, and righteous in purpose.

ISLAMABAD: Hami, in eastern part of northwest China's Xinjiang Uygur autonomous region, has long been a key hub on the ancient Silk Road and is known as the "gateway to the Western Regions." When Zhang Qian made his first diplomatic mission to the West in the Western Han Dynasty (202 BC-25 AD), Hami was an important stop. The Silk Road he pioneered not only fostered cultural exchanges across regions but also left behind a shared taste memory that has endured for millennia, turning "Hami" into a synonym for sweet melons.

Today, Hami's annual Melon Festival celebrates this heritage as a vibrant feast of sweetness. Interestingly, Khiva in Uzbekistan - another ancient Silk Road cultural crossroads - hosts a parallel melon festival. Together, these two transborder events resonate as a symbolic "sweet bond" connecting communities and industries.

This summer, in the melon fields of Huayuan township of Hami, workers of the Jiaxiang Fruit Planting Cooperative rushed to harvest, sort, and pack crates of fresh melons ready for shipment. "This year we've already exported 1,880 tons of Hami melons, with peak daily exports exceeding 80 tons," said Liu Ruixiang, head of the cooperative.

Hami's temperate continental climate, featuring abundant sunshine and large day-night temperature differences, gives the melons their exceptional sweetness. Strong photosynthesis during the day allows the fruit to accumulate nutrients, while the cool nights slow sugar consumption. The story of Hami melons is inseparable from the ancient Silk Road. Along this ancient route, grapes, pomegranates, and alfalfa from the West traveled eastward, while Hami melon cultivation techniques spread to Dunhuang in northwest China's Gansu province before reaching central China.

Today, Hami melons have become a

pillar industry driving local economic growth and improving livelihoods. International exchanges have also spurred advances in breeding. "We've been working with countries such as Tajikistan and Kyrgyzstan to share melon germplasm resources, advancing genetic improvement and variety development," said Zhang Yongbing, a researcher at the Hami Melon Research Center of the Xinjiang Academy of Agricultural Sciences. Central Asian countries are also testing thick-skinned varieties developed in China, he added. At the 19th Hami melon festival held recently, 270 varieties spanning ancient and modern times were showcased, drawing crowds of visitors, with popular varieties quickly selling out. Over the past three decades, Hami has transformed its melon from a single agricultural product into a cultural and economic symbol with global appeal. Since it was launched in 1993, the Hami melon festival has grown into the city's most festive "sweet celebration."

Cultural exchanges are adding even more vibrancy to Hami. In July this year, the 7th China Xinjiang International Ethnic Dance Festival set up a sub-venue in Hami, where the State Honored Song and Dance Ensemble of the Republic of Tajikistan "Lola" performed in resplendent traditional dress. "The warm response from the audience in Hami made us truly feel that art knows no borders," said head of the troupe.

The integration of culture and tourism continues to generate fruitful results. In the first half of this year, Hami welcomed 9.85 million visitors, up 16.46 percent year on year, with tourism revenue reaching 6.379 billion yuan, a 23.22 percent increase.

"The fruits here are just as sweet as those from my hometown," said Asadbek Bobojonov, deputy editor-in-chief of Silk Road News Network in Uzbekistan, who joined journalists from 10 countries including Kyrgyzstan and Pakistan on a field trip in June this year. In a 100-mu (about 667 hectares) melon farm in Huayuan township, he inquired closely about planting techniques and sales channels.

In Central Asia, melons are more than a fruit - they embody harvest abundance, traditions of hospitality, and national pride. Uzbekistan has been renowned for its melons since ancient times, and every August the melon festival in Khiva draws crowds of visitors.

Blue Jays bats come alive in 13-4 MLB playoff victory over Mariners

LOS ANGELES: The Toronto Blue Jays belted five home runs in a 13-4 victory over the Seattle Mariners on Wednesday to claw back to 2-1 in their Major League Baseball playoff series, George Springer, Andres Gimenez, Vladimir Guerrero Jr., Alejandro Kirk and Addison Barger homered for the Blue Jays, who were out-scored 13-4 and outhit 17-8 in dropping the first two games of the best-ofseven American League Championship Series at home. But their offense came alive in Seattle, where a five-run third inning included Gimenez's game-tying two-run home run and a two-run double from Daulton Varsho that put Toronto up 5-2. "We were ready since the first pitch," Gimenez said. "We were aggressive." The Mariners jumped to a 2-0 lead on Julio Rodriguez's two-run homer in the bottom of the first inning. But Toronto turned the tide in the third and their onslaught continued in the fourth as Springer blasted a pitch from Seattle starting pitcher George Kirby over the center field wall for a home run that put Toronto up 6-2. Springer's 22nd career postseason home run moved him into a tie with Bernie Williams for fourth most in the playoffs. Guerrero opened the fifth inning with a 406-foot blast

to center field off Kirby. Guerrero's shot was out of the reach of leaping Mariners outfielder Julio Rodriguez and spelled the end of the night for Kirby. "This is a (Blue Jays) team that has swung the bat well all year and they didn't miss much tonight," Mariners manager Dan Wilson said. "They were able to get to (Kirby).

"Our guys, we get ahead, that's what we do... but you still have to make good-quality pitches and there were some that caught a little bit of the plate." Ernie Clement added a run-scoring single off reliever Carlos Vargas as the Blue Jays pushed the lead to 8-2 and Kirk's three-run homer in the sixth inning swelled Toronto's lead to 12-2. - Agencies

The tender sought a nominal 50,000 metric tons but Algeria frequently purchases more than the vol umes initially sought. Initial estimates of the purchase price were around \$324 a ton cost and freight (c&f) included for larger Panamax shipments and around \$334 a ton c&f for smaller Handymax shipments. About 90,000 tons of the purchase was believed to involve US-origin durum with much of the rest believed to involve Canadian-origin of type 3 Canada western amber durum (No.3 CWAD). The tender sought ship-

ment in four periods: November 1-15, November 16-30, December 1-15 and December 16-31. Algeria does not disclose the results of its tenders and results reported are based on trader assessments. More detailed estimates of prices and volume are possible later.-APP

French PM survives no-confidence votes after making pension concession

PARIS: French Prime Minister Sebastien Lecornu survived two no-confidence votes in parliament on Thursday, winning crucial backing from the Socialist Party thanks to his pledge to suspend President Emmanuel Macron's contested pension reform The two motions presented by the hard-left France Unbowed and the far-right National Rally (RN) secured just 271 and 144 votes respectively - well short of the 289 votes needed to bring down Lecornu's days-old government. Lecornu's offer to mothball the pension reform until after the 2027 presidential election helped sway the Socialists, giving the government a lifeline in the deeply fragmented National Assembly.= Despite the reprieve, the motions underscored the fragility of Macron's administration midway through his final term. "A majority cobbled together through horse-trading managed today to save their positions, at the expense of the national interest," RN party president Jordan Bardella wrote on X. The French bond market remained steady after the back-to-back votes, with the government victory widely expected by investors. By putting the pension reform on the chopping block, Lecornu threatens to kill off one of Macron's main economic legacies at a time when France's public finances are in a perilous state, leaving the president with little in the way of domestic achievements after eight years in office. There are 265 lawmakers in parliament from parties that said they would vote to topple Lecornu, and only a handful of rebels from other groups joined their cause. If Lecornu had lost either vote, he and his ministers would have had to immediately resign, and Macron would have come under huge pressure to call a snap parliamentary election, plunging France deeper into crisis. But despite the outcome of Thursday's votes, Lecornu still faces weeks of arduous negotiations in parliament over passing a slimmed-down 2026 budget during which he could be toppled at any point.= "The French need to know that we are doing all this work... to give them a budget, because it is fundamental for the future of our country," said Yael Braun-Pivet, the president of the National Assembly and an ally of Macron. "I am pleased to see that today there is a majority in the National Assembly that is operating in this spirit: work, the search for compromise, the best possible effort," she added. After winning the pension conceshas awarded the prestigious sion, the Socialists on Wednesday set their sights on including a tax on billionaires in the 2026 budget, underlining just how weak Lecornu's hand is in the negotiations. POLITICAL KRYPTONITE France is in the midst of its worst political crisis in decades as a succession of minority governments seek to push deficit-reducing budgets through a truculent legislature split into three distinct ideological blocs. Reforming France's generous pension system has been political kryptonite ever since Socialist President Francois Mitterrand cut the retirement age to 60 from 65 in 1982. In France, the average effective retirement age is just 60.7, compared to the OECD average of 64.4. Macron's reform raised the statutory retirement age by two years to 64 by 2030. Although that only brings French policy into line with other European Union member states, it chips away at a cherished social benefit beloved by the left.-DNA

Lebanon's minister expects cabinet to sign fiscal gap law soon

WASHINGTON: Lebanon's cabinet is soon expected to approve and send to parliament a long-awaited law needed to restructure its debt burden, the country's economy minister said, adding that policymakers are in touch daily with the International Monetary Fund. Lebanon is struggling to emerge from a severe economic crisis following decades of profligate spending by ruling elites that sent the economy into a tailspin in late 2019, with depositors locked out of accounts as debt-laden banks shut down. Key to the fiscal and economic overhaul is a law on the distribution of financial losses between the state, the central bank, commercial banks and depositors - dubbed the "fiscal gap" law. Asked about progress on the law, Amer Bizat said the government's emphasis was on good legislation rather than speedy progress. "The idea is to present it, dis cuss in the cabinet, approve in the cabinet, and then send it over to the parliament," Bizat told Reuters on Tuesday on the sidelines of the annual meetings of the IMF and World Bank. He added that he expected these things to happen "soon." "It's more important that we get something right than we get something fast," he said. RELATIONS WITH BONDHOLDERS POSITIVE, MINISTER SAYS Declining to give details on the numbers being discussed, Bizat said the draft would follow three principles - depositors would get back their money over time with no haircut and that any solution would ensure the banking sector back to health. Furthermore, smaller deposits would get their money back faster than larger depositors, he added Bizat also said he was meeting with the IMF every day. Asked whether he would also meet bondholders on the sidelines of the meetings in Washington, Bizat declined to comment but said relations between authorities and those investors were "good, cordial and positive." Recent events in the region could bring big positive change for Lebanon, said Bizat, who previously was BlackRock's global head of emerging markets. "That change could potentially be very good, very positive for Lebanon," he said. "Let's not forget, we're in the middle of a war still ... but there's a possibility that the kind of changes that are happening, if stability, if security, comes back to the region, Lebanon could benefit enormously." The government is also expecting hundreds of investors to head to Beirut in November for a conference dubbed Beirut One, that Bizat hopes would help rekindle private investor engagement in the country. "There is a strong interest in imagining the day after," he said. "We know people are very realistic ... everybody knows that challenges are enormous, and the journey is still very, very long, but I really think people are saying it's okay to start imagining how things will be after."-DNA

UK charity group urges public to donate to 'save lives' in Gaza

LONDON: A group of 15 charities in the UK has appealed for donations from the British public for the people of Gaza to address "catastrophic levels of need." A ceasefire between Israel and Hamas, announced last week, has seen an increase in aid supplies into the Palestinian enclave, where much of the population faces the threat of famine. However, the 15 charities comprising the Disasters Emergency Comto meet demand. The DEC said it has begun to scale up operations in Gaza, with several of its members including the British Red Cross and Plan International UK - confirming that aid trucks have reached their destinations. The group, which raised more than £50 million (\$67.19 million) since launching the Middle East Humanitarian Appeal a year ago, has asked for further donations, saying £10 could provide blankets for two people, and £50 could feed five families for a week. "Your support could save lives," the DEC said on its website, adding that it is providing cash to residents to use as markets return, as well as handing out food, clean water and medical resources.-APP

Egypt sends 400 shipments of aid to Gaza as ceasefire holds

LONDON: The Egyptian Red Crescent sent more than 400 shipments containing about 9,700 tonnes of humanitarian and petroleum aid to Gaza on Wednesday. The convoy carried about 5,700 tonnes of food and flour, 1,400 tonnes of medical supplies, and 2,500 tonnes of petroleum products to support Palestinians in the enclave. The initiative, "Zad El-Ezza: From Egypt to Gaza," is now in its 50th day and is part of Cairo's efforts to provide relief to Palestinians. It has delivered thousands of tonnes of aid, including flour, baby formula, medical supplies, therapeutic drugs, personal care items and fuel.Egypt has collaborated with several countries, including Kuwait and the UAE, to deliver aid to Gaza. Aid shipments transit from the Egyptian side of the Rafah crossing to Karm Abu Salem, located at the southeasternmost point of Gaza. Last week, Egypt, along with Qatar, Turkiye and the US, signed on as guarantors of the Gaza ceasefire declaration in the Sinai city of Sharm El-Sheikh. The deal led to Israel and Hamas exchanging hostages and prisoners.—APP

Pak Naval chief strengthens ties with US counterparts

Consumers can choose their own power supplier

KARACHI: Karachi and other parts of the country will be able to choose their own electricity suppliers from January 2026 under the government's plan to introduce a competitive power market,. The National Assembly's Standing Committee on Power, chaired by MNA Muhammad Idrees, met to discuss the "Multi-Vendor Electricity Distribution Bill, 2025," tabled by MNA Shahida Rehmani. The committee, however, decided to defer consideration of the bill until February 2026 for further review. During the meeting, Re-

hmani cited Karachi's longstanding electricity issues, pointing to inefficiency and mounting losses under K-Electric's management. Power Division Secretary Dr Fakhr Alam Irfan said that beginning in January 2026, consumers in Karachi and across Pakistan will have the option to purchase electricity from any power company. He added that around 200 megawatts (MW) of electricity will be made available for bulk purchase in the initial phase. The open-market access will first be extended to consum ers using up to one megawatt of power, before expanding

to other categories. The committee was briefed that Pakistan's off-grid and net-metered solar capacity has surged to 18,000MW, creating challenges for grid stability as the government monitors the integration of renewable energy with the national grid.

15 killed, 8 injured as truck overturns on Swat expressway

ISLAMABAD: At least 15 people were killed and eight others injured when a truck carrying gypsies overturned in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's Malakand Division on Thursday.

According to details, rescue officials 1122 said the tragic incident occurred near the third tunnel on the Swat Expressway. The truck, en route from Bahrain and Swat, lost control and flipped over, killing 15 passengers on the spot and injuring several others, a private news channel reported.

Rescue 1122 teams and local police responded swiftly, transporting the deceased and injured to the District Headquarters Hospital in Batkhela.

Rescue officials reported that the death toll may rise, as four of the injured are in critical condition.

Magnitude 6.5 quake hits Indonesia's Papua: USGS

JAKARTA: A magnitude 6.5 earthquake struck the eastern Indonesian province of Papua on Thursday, the US Geological Survey said, but there was no tsunami warning and no immediate reports of damage.

The epicentre of the quake, which struck around 2:48 pm local time (0548 GMT), was about 200 kilometres (125 miles) from the city of Jayapura, at a depth of 35 kilometres, the USGS said. The Pacific Tsunami Warning Center in Hawaii said there was no threat of a tsunami from the quake.

Indonesia's Meteorology, Climatology and Geophysics Agency (BMKG) recorded the quake with a magnitude of 6.4 at a depth of 16 kilometres. The agency's earthquake and tsunami director Daryono, who goes by one name, said in a statement no aftershocks had vet been recorded.

Indonesia, a vast archipelagic nation, experiences frequent earthquakes due to its position on the Pacific "Ring of Fire". - Agencies

FinMin Aurangzeb briefs Saudi counterpart on PIA, airports' privatisation

Finance ministry says meeting between two leaders took place on sidelines of IMF-WB annual meetings

WASHINGTON: Federal Minister for Finance and Revenue Muhammad Aurangzeb met his Saudi counterpart Mohammed Al-Jadaan in Washington, DC and briefed him on the privatisation of Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) and key airports, said the finance ministry in a statement on Thursday. The finance ministry said that the meeting between Aurangzeb and his Saudi counterpart took place on the sidelines of the IMF-World Bank annual meetings in Washington, DC. Pakistan is moving ahead with plans to privatise its heavily indebted national carrier in an effort to raise funds and overhaul loss-making state-owned enterprises under the terms of its \$7 billion programme with

the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

Officials, in a recent briefing, told the Senate Standing Committee on Privatisation that the sale of PIA is expected to be completed by November 2025. During the meeting today, both sides reviewed the growing trade and investment relations between Pakistan and Saudi Arabia. The finance czar also underscored the government's commitment to ensuring transparency and efficiency in the privatisation process. "The minister highlighted Pakistan's resolve to attract strategic foreign investment through structural reforms and improved governance in state-owned enterprises," the statement added. Aurangzeb also sought Saudi support for infrastructure development projects, emphasising Pakistan's com-

mitment to fostering a deeper economic partnership with the kingdom. "The two ministers agreed that institutions such as the International Finance Corporation (IFC) and the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA) could play a vital role in mobilising private sector investments in Pakistan," it added. This week, Aurangzeb also met Sultan Abdulrahman Al-Marshad, CEO of the Saudi Fund for Development (SFD), and reaffirmed the strategic partnership between Pakistan and the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. One dead, dozens injured in Peru anti-crime protests

capital on Wednesday, said President Jose Jeri, whose accession days ago has failed to stamp out angry protests against the country's political class. The Ombudsman's Office said 102 people were injured, including 24 civilians and 78 police, updating earlier tolls. Youth-led demonstrations brought thousands of Peruvians, frustrated by the authorities' failure to resolve a worsening crime crisis, onto the streets in Lima and several other cities.

Some protesters tried to breach the security barrier around Congress as night fell, an AFP correspondent said. Others in the crowd also hurled stones and lit fireworks. Police in riot gear responded with tear gas. "I regret the death of 32-year-old citizen Eduardo Ruiz Sanz," Jeri said on social media platform X, without

Coordinator, an NGO, said the man may have been shot by a plainclothes police officer. AFP images showed the blood-covered face of a police officer who had been hit by a stone. Jeri also said the "peaceful demonstration" had been infiltrated by criminals seeking to "cause chaos." The South American country has been rocked by protests for weeks, and lawmakers voted on Friday to impeach then-president Dina Boluarte, who critics blamed for a surge in crime and accused of corruption. "I think there is general discontent because nothing has been done," 49-year-old freelancer Amanda Meza told AFP while marching toward Congress. "There's no security from the state," she said, adding that cases of extortion and contract killings "have grown massively in Peru." Jeri, a right-wing politician who had served as leader of Congress, became interim president until elections in April. Wednesday's protests were called by a youth-led collective, artists' groups and labor unions. Feminist groups also joined the calls to rally against the new president over sexual assault accusations. A complaint was lodged against Jeri last year, but prosecutors closed the case in August due to a lack of evidence. Boluarte's impeachment last week followed protests by bus companies, merchants and students over shakedowns by criminal gangs and attacks on those who refuse to pay protection money. Afghan man on trial in Germany

ASCHAFFENBURG: An Afghan man accused of a deadly knife attack on a group of toddlers in Germany went on trial Thursday, nine months after an incident that inflamed a heated pre-election debate on immigration. Germany was shocked by the stabbing spree that killed a two-year-old boy and a 41-year-old man who tried to protect the children and left three others wounded in the southern city of Aschaffenburg.

Five toddlers from a kindergarten class were in a public park, accompanied by two teachers, when the assailant attacked them with a kitchen knife. The suspect arrested at the scene of the January 22 attack has been only partially named, in line with usual practice by the German judiciary, as 28-year-old Enamullah O. He has a long history of mental illness and prosecutors said an expert assessment concluded his psychiatric state meant he was not criminally responsible.

The public prosecutor's office has previously said there was no indication the suspect acted out of extremist or terrorist motivation, and they were seeking to have him permanently confined to a psychiatric facility. - Agencies
