Asif issues stern warning to Taliban

Defence minister warns any terrorist attack or suicide bombing inside Pakistan to give Taliban rulers "bitter taste"

ISLAMABAD: Defence Minister Khawaia Asif on Wednesday issued a stern warning to the Afghan Taliban regime after days of talks in Istanbul between Pakistani and Afghan delegations ended without a breakthrough. In a post on X, the defence minister said that Pakistan had engaged in talks at the request of brotherly countries in an effort to give peace a chance, but "venomous statements" by certain Afghan officials clearly reflect the devious and splintered mindset of the Taliban regime. "We have borne your treachery and mockery for too long, but no more. Any terrorist attack or any suicide bombing inside Pakistan shall give you the bitter taste of such misadventures. Be assured and test our resolve and capabilities, if you wish so, at your own peril and doom," the defence czar posted on X.

Asif further added: "Let me assure them that Pakistan does not require to employ even a fraction of its full arsenal to completely obliterate the Taliban regime and push them back to the caves for hiding. If they wish so, the repeat of the scenes of their rout at Tora Bora with their tails between the legs would surely be a spectacle to watch for the people of the region." Defence czar's statement comes hours after Minister for Information and Broadcasting Attaullah Tarar confirmed early Wednesday morning that the fourday talks in Istanbul with the Afghan Taliban had ended without a breakthrough, despite Pakistan repeatedly presenting evidence-backed counterterrorism demands.

"The dialogue thus failed to bring about any workable solution," Tarar said in an X post after the four-day session ended. He further said Pakistan had long sought cooperation from Kabul against militants targeting the country. Tarar thanked Qatar, Turkiye, and other friendly nations "for their support and sincere efforts to bring about a peaceful solution to the problem of terrorism." The defence minister further accused the Taliban regime of blindly pushing Afghanistan into yet another conflict, just to retain its usurped rule and maintain the war economy that sustains them. "Despite fully knowing their inherent limitations and the hollowness of their war cries, they

Afghan Taliban-TTP nexus causes failure of **Istanbul talks: Experts**

PESHAWAR: Experts have attributed the failure of the recent Pakistan-Afghanistan peace talks in Istanbul to the close nexus between the Afghan Taliban regime and the banned Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP). Former Inspector General of Police and Home Secretary Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Syed Akhtar Ali Shah, told APP on Wednesday that the strong nexus between the Afghan Taliban region and the TTP-backed Fitna-ul-Khawarij were the main reason behind the breakdown of the latest round of peace negotiations held in Turkiye's Istanbul.

He said that under the Doha Peace Agreement, the Afghan Taliban had committed in writing that Afghan soil would not be used against any foreign country. However, he claimed that the Taliban later retracted from their commitment and facilitated cross-border infiltration of Fitna-ul-Khawarij militants to carry out attacks inside Pakistan.

Akhtar Ali Shah reiterated that Pakistan had repeatedly engaged with the Afghan Taliban government over persistent cross-border terrorism orchestrated by Indian-backed terror groups such as Fitna-al-Khawarij and Fitna-al-Hindustan, but Kabul had failed to act against terrorist outfits operating from its soil. He said that after days of border clashes and strikes on Gul Bahadur terror camps inside Afghanistan, Islamabad and Kabul had initiated dialogue in Doha Qatar, which resulted in a temporary ceasefire and an agreement to meet again in Istan-



A delegation of Bangladesh has visited the Federal Tax Ombudsman (FTO) Secretariat to study Pakistan's Ombudsman model and explore avenues of cooperation in establishing a similar institution in Bangladesh The visit marked an important milestone in strengthening regional collaboration on governance, accountability, and taxpayer facilitation, a news release said on Wednesday. Upon arrival, the delegation was received by Federal Tax Ombudsman Dr Asif Mahmood Jah along with FTO Registrar Khalid Javed, and Advisor (Legal) to the FTO and Executive Secretary OIC Ombudsman Association (OICOA) Almas Ali Jovindah, The visiting delegation included Bangladesh's State

(Special Assistant) Dr Anisuzzaman Chowdhury and High Commissioner of Bangladesh to Pakistan Iqbal Hussain Khan, Dr Asif highlighted the pivotal role of the FTO in promoting taxpayer confidence and ensuring administrative justice in Pakistan. He outlined the FTO's achievements, emphasizing its contribution to transparency, fair taxation, and citizen facilitation. He stated that the FTO has facilitated recoveries exceeding Rs 23 billion for taxpayers, with most complaints resolved within 34 days, reflecting efficiency and credibility. Jovindah delivered a detailed presentation on the evolution, jurisdiction, and operational framework of the Ombudsman system, explaining that access to justice has increasingly be-

come a privilege, and that Ombudsman remains a blessing for citizens seeking cost-free, swift, and impartial redress. The FTO briefed the delegation on the historical foundations of the Ombudsman institution, tracing its roots to the era of Hazrat Umar (RA). when public officials were held accountable to the people. The concept was later refined during the Ottoman Empire, institutionalized in Sweden, and endorsed through a United Nations resolution in 2014, which led to the establishment of Ombudsman offices in more than 140 countries. The training featured sessions on women's rights, access to justice, psychosocial well-be-


ing, and women's role in peace building. Amna Durrani, Director Programmes at KPCSW, discussed the challenges women face

\$250m approved for glacial melt adaptation plan

proved \$250 million for Glaciers to Farms-a flagship adaptation program led by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) to build resilient water and agriculture systems for vulnerable communities in glacier-dependent regions of Central Asia, the South Caucasus, and Pakistan. GCF's funding will be provided mostly as grants and invested alongside \$3.25 billion from ADB over the next decade in a series of projects identified by the countries covered by the program, according to ADB press statement received here on Wednesday. By investing in efficient irrigation, water storage, and watershed management, the projects will help improve agricultural productivity even as accelerated glacial melt increases the frequency of droughts or floods. "Rapid glacial retreat is one of the most complex development challenges faced by our region," said ADB Director for Agriculture, Food, Nature, and Rural Development Yasmin Siddiqi. "We need practical, scalable, and science-based solutions to help communities adapt. With catalytic support from GCF, Glaciers to Farms will help move the region beyond fragmented projects and towards systemic, longterm resilience that protects lives and livelihoods now and for future generations," Siddiqi added. Glaciers to Farms covers nine ADB developing member countries: Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Kazakhstan, the Kyrgyz Republic, Pakistan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan-which all rely on glacier and snow-fed rivers for agriculture, domestic water, and electricity gener-Accelerated glacial melt threatens these ecosystem ser-

vices and livelihoods, presenting a serious challenge in these countries where about one in four jobs are in river basins-the Naryn and Pyanj in Central Asia, the Kura in the South Caucasus, and the Swat in Pakistancovering roughly 27 million hectares. About 13 million people, including farmers and vulnerable populations in fragile mountain regions, will benefit directly from the program. It will support climate and glacier assessments that will inform national development plans and investment pipelines. The program will also strengthen monitoring and early warning systems to help communities manage the impacts of hazards such as glacial lake outburst floods and prolonged droughts. In addition to agricultural systems, Glaciers to Farms will also support adaptive social protection schemes and health services for vulnerable communities affected by water shortages and extreme heat stress. The program will also strengthen local banks' capacity to support agricultural businesses, especially those led by women. "The Glaciers to Farms program is the kind of large-scale, innovative, and collaborative effort that will help countries in Central and West Asia strengthen adaptation planning and cooperation to manage climate impacts on glacier-fed water systems," said GCF Director of Eastern Europe, Central Asia and the Middle East Region Department Thomas Eriksson. "This program sets a transformative benchmark by improving data, coordination, and financing readiness for long-term resilience in the region's water and food systems," Eriksson added. GCF, the world's largest climate fund, approved its concessional funding for Glaciers to Farms at its 43rd Board Meeting on 29 October. In 2024, GCF-funded glacier risk assessments helped to form the scientific and technical basis for the program.-APP

Science, Technology driving sustainable food futures

The Durand Line and its deadly legacy

NCE the creation of Pakistan in 1947, the border shared with Afghanistan, known as the Durand Line, has been one of the most contentious frontiers in South Asia. The two nations have long been divided not just by geography, but by politics, ethnicity, and historical mistrust. Afghanistan was the only country to oppose Pakistan's admission to the United Nations, arguing that the Durand Line, drawn during British rule in 1893, unfairly divided the Pashtun tribes. This dispute laid the foundation for decades of tension and sporadic conflict that continue to shape relations between the two neighbours today. In the decades following independence, Pakistan's western border remained porous and largely ungoverned. The Soviet invasion of Afghanistan in 1979 changed everything. Millions of Afghan refugees fled into Pakistan, and Islamabad became a key staging ground for the anti-Soviet jihad. During this time, Pakistan supported Afghan mujahideen groups, hoping to maintain influence over its western neighbour. When the Soviet Union withdrew, Islamabad's strategic calculus shifted again, and it sought a friendly government in Kabul that would prevent India from gaining a foothold there. This led to Islamabad's backing of the Taliban movement in the 1990s, a relationship that would later come back to haunt both countries

After the U.S.-led invasion of Afghanistan in 2001, Pakistan became a key ally in the "war on terror," even as militant groups began using the rugged tribal regions as bases to attack both U.S. and Pakistani forces. Many Taliban fighters retreated into Pakistan's borderlands, while splinter groups such as the Tehrik-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) emerged and began attacking Pakistani targets, accusing Islamabad of betraying Islam by siding with the West. From 2007 onward, the TTP carried out bombings, assassinations, and ambushes that killed thousands of Pakistanis. Pakistan responded with large-scale military operations, such as Zarb-e-Azb (2014) and Radd-ul-Fasaad (2017) which drove many militants across the border into Afghanistan

After the Taliban returned to power in Kabul in August 2021, Pakistan initially hoped for improved security cooperation. It expected that the new Taliban government would curb the TTP, which shares ideological and tribal ties with Afghan Taliban fighters. However, those hopes quickly faded. The TTP not only found refuge inside Afghanistan but also intensified attacks inside Pakistan, launching deadly cross-border assaults on military posts and convoys. Afghan border guards, too, occasionally exchanged fire with Pakistani forces over fencing disputes and territorial patrols. Throughout 2023 and 2024, the border saw repeated skirmishes. Afghan forces fired on Pakistani troops, constructing new fences; Pakistan retaliated with artillery strikes. Each side accused the other of aggression, but both stopped short of full-scale confrontation. By mid-2025, however, violence had reached alarming levels. Afghan-based militants carried

out coordinated raids into North Waziristan, Bajaur, and Orakzai, killing dozens of Pakistani soldiers. Islamabad warned Kabul that if it failed to rein in the TTP, Pakistan would act unilaterally. The breaking point appears to have come in early October 2025. Following an ambush that left eleven Pakistani soldiers embraced Shadat near the Afghan border, Islamabad reportedly launched a series of retaliatory airstrikes. On the night of October 9-10, explosions shook Kabul. Regional media and intelligence sources claimed Pakistan had targeted senior TTP figures, possibly including the group's leader, Noor Wali Mehsud. While Islamabad has not officially confirmed the operation, most analysts believe it was a calculated strike aimed at sending a clear message to the Taliban: Pakistan will no longer tolerate militants using Afghan soil as a sanctuary.

The incident is significant not only for its scale but also for its symbolism. Never before has Pakistan been accused of striking targets in the Afghan capital itself. It signals a profound shift in strategyfrom border containment to direct intervention. Diplomatically, for Afghanistan, the situation is equally perilous. Any escalation with Pakistan could isolate Kabul diplomatically at a time when it desperately seeks international recognition and economic support. Border violence could also strengthen hardline elements within the Taliban who favour a more confrontational stance toward Pakistan, weakening moderate voices that advocate cooperation. Moreover, if cross-border strikes become routine, Afghanistan could face further destabilization, as rival factions use the conflict to expand their influence. Regionally, the growing hostility threatens to undo efforts by neighbouring countries such as China, Iran, and the Gulf states to promote trade and stability in South and Central Asia. Both Pakistan and Afghanistan are critical to major infrastructure projects, including the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) and various energy pipelines. Continued violence along their border could jeopardize these projects, discourage investment, and push the region toward renewed instability.

At a press briefing following the incident, Director General of Inter-Services Public Relations (DG ISPR), Lt. Gen. Ahmed Sharif Chaudhry, clarified Pakistan's position on the reported strikes and the broader security situation. He reiterated that Pakistan "has no aggressive designs" against Afghanistan and views it as a "brotherly, Islamic neighbor." However, he warned that Islamabad "cannot and will not allow any terrorist group to use Afghan soil against Pakistan." The DG ISPR said that Pakistan had repeatedly provided evidence to the Afghan interim government about the presence of TTP sanctuaries inside Afghanistan and that Islamabad had exercised "maximum restraint" despite continuous provocations. He emphasized that any measures taken by Pakistan were purely in self-defense, intended to safeguard its citizens and protect its territorial integrity. "Our patience should not be mistaken for weakness," he added, underscoring that Pakistan's security forces would respond firmly to any threat emanating from across the border. To conclude, Pakistan's recent actions and the firm statements from the DG ISPR reflect a decisive shift in Islamabad's security policy toward Afghanistan. As he reaffirmed, in the press conference, that while Pakistan continues to view Afghanistan as a brotherly nation, it cannot compromise on its sovereignty or security. The general underscored that Pakistan has repeatedly shared concrete evidence with Kabul about the presence and movement of terrorist groups operating from Afghan soil, warning that tolerance has limits.

Afghanistan's Water Gamble Could Backfire

Any attempt to stop the Kabul River flows may not only harm Pakistan's crops, but also choke Afghanistan's own food supply and trade lifelines. Unfortunately, no formal water-sharing agreement exists between Pakistan and Afghanistan, despite more than two decades of sporadic dialogue. HE Kabul River is more than just a geographical feature; it is a lifeline that sustains millions of lives on both sides of the Durand Line. From the green valleys of Kunar and Nangarhar to the fertile plains of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Punjab, and down to Sindh and parts of Balochistan, this river represents centuries of ecological interdependence and human connectivity. Today, this vital artery risks becoming a source of friction rather than friendship, as Afghan Taliban's so called interim government plans dams and water projects in a deeply nefarious collaboration with Pakistan's arch-rival India, who has already unleashed water hostility since May this year, threaten to disrupt the natural balance that underpins livelihoods in both countries.

Recent reports of Afghanistan's intent to construct major reservoirs on the Kabul and Kunar rivers have raised serious concerns in Islamabad. Experts warn that such projects could reduce Pakistan's annual inflow by nearly 3 million acrefeet (MAF) - a 16 percent drop in an already water-stressed system. This shortfall would come at the most critical juncture of the agricultural calendar, the early Kharif season, when Tarbela Dam reaches its dead level and crops in Sindh and southern Puniab await sowing.

But the consequences of this reduction would not stop at Pakistan's borders. Afghanistan itself stands to suffer, perhaps even more deeply. Nearly 80 percent of Afghanistan's essential food imports including wheat, flour, rice, pulses, and vegetables originate from Pakistan. Any disruption to Pakistan's agricultural output would inevitably drive up prices and reduce supplies flowing to Afghan markets. In other words, every drop withheld upstream risks becoming a meal lost downstream, on both sides.

No one disputes Afghanistan's sovereign right to develop and manage its natural resources. However, the notion that damming the Kabul River will grant Afghanistan economic independence is a dangerous illusion. Large-scale hydropower and irrigation projects require vast sums of money, technical expertise, and long-term maintenance – capacities that remain limited under the current interim setup. Experts doubt whether such projects can materialize in the near future without massive external support.

That external support, unfortunately, is coming from a problematic direction. India's recent pledge of one billion dollars in "assistance" to Afghanistan, supposedly for infrastructure and water projects, carries political undertones. History shows that New Delhi has long weaponized water diplomacy, manipulating the Jhelum and Chenab flows in violation of the Indus Waters Treaty. To imagine that its interest in Afghan dam-building is purely benevolent would be naïve. Rather, it fits into a broader strategy of encircling Pakistan and sowing discord in the region. Afghanistan must ask itself: will it allow itself to become a pawn in someone else's hydro political game?

Pakistan has consistently respected Afghanistan's legitimate riparian rights on the Chitral-Kunar system. It has never unilaterally diverted upstream flows, even though technically it could have explored such measures within its territory. This restraint stems from a recognition that water disputes must never override the bonds of culture, faith, and fraternity that link the two nations.

Unfortunately, no formal water-sharing agreement exists between Pakistan and Afghanistan, despite more than two decades of sporadic dialogue. One reason has been the international community's non-recognition of the Taliban-led interim government, making formal treaty negotiations diplomatically complex. However, this should not prevent informal, technical, and confidence-building mechanisms from taking shape. Shared hydrology requires shared management, not unilateral decisions.

The Kabul River should be treated as a shared ecological asset, and not a political tool. A joint commission, scientific data exchange, and seasonal coordination could prevent misunderstandings and ensure equitable use. This is not about one country's domination over another; it is about survival

in an era of accelerating climate stress. Afghanistan's growing population and its need for irrigation are genuine. So too are Pakistan's concerns about food security. But regional peace cannot survive without environmental peace. When rivers become weapons, they bring neither prosperity nor power, only drought, distrust, and displacement. Consider what happens if Pakistan's early Kharif crops fail because of reduced Kabul River inflows. Wheat and cotton yields would plummet, flour mills would slow down, and prices in Peshawar and Quetta which are considered the gateways for Afghan trade, would skyrocket. Obviously, truck convoys carrying food to Jalalabad and Kabul would thin out. For ordinary Afghan families, already burdened by poverty and inflation, this would mean less bread on the table and higher costs of survival.

Thus, harming Pakistan's water security is not just an unfriendly act, it is self-defeating. The people of Afghanistan, who have always shared Pakistan's soil, markets, hospitals, and hearts, would be the first to feel the ripple effect of water aggression. So, Pakistan's approach remains clear: dialogue over dispute, and construction of trust over confrontation. It is already investing in massive domestic storage projects such as Diamer-Bhasha and Dasu dams to reduce dependence on transboundary flows. But no dam can store goodwill, that must be built through mutual understanding and respect. The Taliban leadership must realize that stability does not come from concrete and cement, but from cooperation and compassion. Water can be a weapon or a bridge, the choice is theirs. By engaging constructively with Pakistan, Afghanistan can ensure that the Kabul River remains what it has always been: a symbol of life, not leverage.

Both Pakistan and Afghanistan are bound by geography, faith, and fate. The Kabul River does not recognize borders; it rather recognizes only gravity. Its flow teaches a profound lesson: when one side blocks the current, both banks suffer. So, it is time for wisdom to prevail over resentment, and for diplomacy to replace hostility. The interim Taliban government should not let Indian influence drag it into a water war that benefits no one.

The shared rivers of our region must continue to flow not just with water, but with goodwill, trust, and hope for a peaceful, interdependent future. Let the rivers flow, and, at the same time, let the brotherhood and friendship grow. Eschew the path of hostility either on ground, or involving the water.

The Search for Trust Across the Durand Line

ISTORY bears undeniable testimony that Pakistan has stood by Afghanistan through every trial—be it war or peace, turmoil or transition. The bond between the two nations, tied by geography, faith, and centuries of shared heritage, has endured countless tests. Yet, among the many lessons history offers, one truth remains constant; while Pakistan has repeatedly extended its hand in friendship and fraternity, Afghanistan's internal discord has too often undermined the path to lasting stability. When the Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan in 24 December 1979, it was Pakistan that became the frontline state defending not only its own sovereignty but also the freedom of its Muslim neighbour. Pakistan opened its borders to nearly four million Afghan refugees, offering them shelter, education, and dignity-an unprecedented act of generosity in modern times. Despite its own economic hardships, Pakistan bore this burden with patience and brotherhood, driven by Islamic compassion rather than political gain. The UNHCR has repeatedly described this as one of the largest and longest-running humanitarian operations in history.

Even after the Soviet completed his withdrawal in 15 February 1989, when the world abandoned Afghanistan, Pakistan remained steadfast. It continued to support the Afghan people in rebuilding their war-torn land, facilitating dialogue among rival factions and hosting successive rounds of peace talks. Pakistan's role was not driven by ambition but by a sincere desire for regional peace-because an unstable Afghanistan has always meant an insecure Pakistan. Afghanistan's greatest tragedy, however, lies not only in external aggression but in internal division. During the 1990s, when Afghanistan was consumed by civil war, Pakistan made tireless efforts to bring the warring Afghan factions together. In a symbolic gesture of reconciliation, Pakistan facilitated a meeting of Afghan leaders in Makkah, where they vowed before Allah to end hostilities and restore peace in their homeland. Yet, upon returning home, many of those solemn commitments were broken, and the nation once again slipped into strife. This failure to uphold even agreements made in the holiest of places remains a reflection of Afghanistan's chronic disunity, where tribal interests and personal ambitions have too often overshadowed the collective good. The tragic pattern has persisted into the present. Decades later, after the U.S. invasion and the subsequent withdrawal of foreign forces, Pakistan once again demonstrated its commitment to peace by facilitating the Doha Agreement between the Taliban and the United States in 29 February 2020-a landmark accord that paved the way for an end to two decades of bloodshed. Pakistan's constructive diplomacy was acknowledged globally, including by Washington itself.

Yet despite these efforts, the spirit of cooperation remains elusive. The recent round of Pakistan-Afghanistan talks held in Istanbul, following earlier sessions in Qatar, once again highlighted the stark gap between goodwill and ground realities. Media reports confirm that the Istanbul negotiations ended without a definitive outcome.

This has been revealed through media reports that the discussions-spread over three grueling days and nearly fifty hours-were marked by clear obstruction and a defensive posture from the Afghan side. Mediators from Qatar and Turkey, who had invested considerable diplomatic capital to bridge differences, were visibly taken aback by the Afghan delegation's uncooperative attitude. On several occasions, members of the Afghan delegation reportedly used provocative language, avoided direct answers, and withdrew from commitments at the last moment.

Pakistani delegates presented time-stamped evidence of cross-border militant movement, including sanctuaries and command links. Instead of addressing the evidence. Afghan representatives resorted to procedural diversions, legalistic excuses, and repeated consultations with Kabul that stalled progress. Even when a draft agreement was finalised thrice during the final session, and the Pakistani delegation pressed the Afghan side to confirm their consent-reminding them that in Islam a commitment made three times is binding—they initially agreed, only to renege after consulting Kabul by phone. The mediators, both Qatari and Turkish, were reportedly shocked, one exclaiming, "May Allah help and forgive these people."

There is no other opinion on this matter that Indian

agents, allegedly operating under the guise of advisors within Kabul's circles, influenced or pressured Afghan interlocutors to withdraw from commitments reached in Istanbul. Such claims-if true-would suggest a deeper and more troubling dimension to the impasse; that certain external actors are intent upon perpetuating discord between Islamabad and Kabul for their own strategic ends. These accusations, voiced strongly in Pakistani quarters, led many in Islamabad to conclude that elements within the Afghan leadership are being steered by interests inimical to regional stability.

Whether this allegation will be substantiated publicly or remain part of the private diplomatic ledger, its effect has been to deepen mistrust. Yet even amid these grave suspicions, Pakistan's official posture has been measured. Islamabad has reiterated that it will continue to seek an amicable resolution through dialogue and diplomacy; at the same time, the leadership has made plain that all options remain under consideration if Afghan soil continues to be used as a launchpad for attacks against Pakistani citizens and security forces.

At the same time, Pakistan remains committed to a peaceful, negotiated resolution. Islamabad's approach is guided not by hostility but by the belief that Afghanistan's prosperity is intertwined with its own. Both nations share deep ethnic, cultural, and linguistic bonds that transcend political boundaries. From trade routes to water resources, their destinies are inseparable.

The lesson of that Makkah meeting decades ago-and of the recent Istanbul talks—is the same; peace cannot be built upon empty promises or rhetorical gestures. It demands sincerity, unity, and honouring one's word. Pakistan, despite suffering over \$150 billion in economic losses and more than 80,000 lives to terrorism, continues to demonstrate patience, goodwill, and faith in dialogue.

As history once again tests this brotherly relationship, one prayer continues to echo across Pakistan; May Allah bless Afghanistan with wisdom and unity, and may He reward Pakistan for its steadfastness. For peace between these two nations is not merely a regional necessity-it is a sacred obligation rooted in shared faith and destiny.

The Indus River system, he added, contributes about 96 percent of the country's total water supply, with nearly 78 percent originating outside Pakistan's borders. Pakistan, he said, possesses the world's fourth-largest aquifer and ranks fourth globally in groundwater use, extracting around 65 cubic kilometers annually against a recharge rate of only 55 cubic kilometers. He revealed that around 70 percent of Pakistan's urban nonulation and

pend on unsafe drinking water sources, with about 60 million people exposed to arsenic contamination.

Over 4.5 million hectares of land have been affected by waterlogging and salinity, while cities such as Lahore are losing up to three feet of groundwater annually. Nazam Maqbool identified the absence of a binding national groundwater law, overlapping institutional responsibilities, and weak inter-provincial coordination as major governance challenges. Electricity subsidies, he noted, have encouraged over-pumping, while tariff recovery covers only 24 percent of operational costs. Punjab's average water tariff of US\$0.12 per cubic meter, he said, remains far below the global average of US\$2.36.

Sudan govt accuses RSF of attacking civilians in mosques

But those talks have reached an impasse, an official close to the negotiations said, adding that their proposals are facing "continued obstructionism" from the army-aligned government

PORT SUDAN: Sudan's army-aligned government accused paramilitaries on Wednesday of attacking civilians in mosques during their recent takeover of the western city of El-Fasher, where satellite images show evidence of "continuing mass killing," Yale researchers say. The capture of El-Fasher on Sunday after an 18-month siege marked by starvation and bombardment has solidified the Rapid Support Forces' (RSF) control over Darfur, sparking fears of ethnically motivated violence reminiscent of the region's darkest days. El-Fasher was the last of Darfur's five state capitals to fall to the paramilitaries, led by General Mohammad Hamdan Dagalo, who have been at war with the regular army for more than two years. "More than 2,000 civilians were killed during the militia's invasion of El-Fasher, targeting volunteers in mosques and the Red Crescent," Mona Nour Al-Daem, humanitarian aid officer for the army-aligned government, said Wednesday at a press conference in Port Sudan. She added that the Adre border pass between Sudan and Chad has been "used to introduce weapons and equipment for the militias." An analysis of satellite images by Yale's Humanitarian Research Lab released Tuesday night "corroborates evidence of continuing mass killing in the past 48 hours since RSF took control." "These mass killing events include corroboration of alleged executions around Saudi Hospital and a previously unreported potential mass killing at an RSF detention site at the former Children's Hospital in eastern El-Fasher," the group said, adding there was also ongoing "systematic killing" at one location outside the city. El-Fasher had been the last holdout in Darfur of army chief Abdel Fattah Al-Burhan's forces, and its fall has left the paramilitaries in control of a vast region covering a third of Sudan, with fighting now concentrated in the Kordofan region. Since the city was captured by the RSF - descended from the Janjaweed militias accused of genocide in Darfur two decades ago - the group has again been accused of carrying out atrocities against civilians, with brutal videos circulating on social media. The United Nations has warned of "ethnically motivated violations and atrocities" while the African Union condemned "escalating violence" and "alleged war crimes." "Civilians being targeted based on their ethnicity underscore the brutality of the Rapid Support Force," the EU's foreign policy chief Kaja Kallas said in a statement Wednesday. Since Sunday, more than 33,000 people have fled El-Fasher for the town of Tawila, about 70 kilometers (40 miles) to the west, which has already welcomed more than 650,000 displaced people, the UN says. Around 177,000 people remain in El-Fasher, which had a population of more than one million before the war, according to the latest figures from the world body. Satellite-based communications with El-Fasher remain cut off — though not for the RSF, which controls the Starlink network there — as are access routes to the city despite calls for humanitarian corridors. Sudan's long-running war has killed tens of thousands of people, displaced millions and triggered the world's largest displacement and hunger crisis, with both sides accused of widespread atrocities. The UN's World Food Programme (WFP) said Wednesday that its two top staff in Sudan had been "designated as persona non grata" and given three days to leave the country by the foreign ministry. WFP and senior UN officials were engaging with Sudanese authorities to protest the decision, which came "at a pivotal time," it said, noting humanitarian needs "have never been greater." The socalled Quad group - comprising the United States, Egypt, the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia - has held talks over several months toward securing a truce. But those talks have reached an impasse, an official close to the negotiations said, adding that their proposals are facing "continued obstructionism" from the army-aligned government.-Agencies

Pakistan Customs foils major silver smuggling attempts

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Customs has foiled major silver smuggling attempts across multiple regions to curtail the illegal trade.

In a series of coordinated enforcement operations under the Chief Collectorate of Customs (Enforcement), Islamabad, field formations in Quetta, Karachi, and Gadani have successfully intercepted and seized large quantities of smuggled silver and vehicles being used for illegal transport, said a release issued here on Wednesday Acting on credible intelligence, the Collectorate of Customs (Enforcement) Quetta intercepted a Toyota Axio (Reg. No. AWQ-240) in Yaroo area, recovering: 40 Fine (999.9) Silver Bricks of 39,996 grams (approx. 40 kg), 36 Silver Biscuits (999 purity) of 9,000 grams (9 kg), Vehicle (Toyota Axio) valued at PKR 6 million. The total tentative value of the seizure stands at PKR 26.76 million. The goods and vehicle have been taken into custody, and further investigation is underway. In two separate but consecutive intelligence-based operations, the Collectorate of Customs (Enforcement) Karachi successfully foiled major smuggling attempts at Mochko Check Post, RCD Highway- recovering a total of 45 kilograms of smuggled silver valued at over PKR 21 million.-APP.

CDNS achieves Rs 350b savings inflows

Kordofan GENEVA: The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies said Tuesday it was "horrified" after five Sudanese Red Crescent volunteers were killed while on duty in Bara, North Kordofan state. Three other volunteers are missing following Monday's attack, the IFRC said. The oil-rich Kordofan region has been a major battleground in Sudan's civil war between the regular army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces. The RSF claimed Saturday to have regained control of Bara, a strategic city on a key crossroads to the Darfur region. United Nations agencies have voiced alarm about the reported level of violence in the city. \$250m funding to boost glacierfed agri under **ADB** project

ISLAMABAD: The Green Climate Fund (GCF) has approved \$250 million for Glaciers to Farms, a major adaptation plan led by the Asian Development Bank (ADB). A statement issued by the ADB said the plan aims to help communities in glacier-dependent regions, including Pakistan, Central Asia and the South Caucasus, cope with the growing impacts of climate change. The funding, mostly in grants, will complement \$3.25 billion from ADB over the next decade. It will support projects in nine countries, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyz Republic, Pakistan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan, all of which rely on glacier-fed rivers for farming, drinking water, and electricity.

By improving irrigation, water storage, and watershed management, the plan will help farmers maintain their crops even as glacial melt increases the risk of droughts and floods, particularly in Pakistan's northern mountain regions.

"Rapid glacial retreat is one of the most complex challenges our region faces," ADB Director Yasmin Siddiqi said. "With support from GCF, Glaciers to Farms will help communities move from short-term fixes to long-term solutions that protect lives and livelihoods today and for the future," she added.

Deadliest police operation in Brazil **kills 132**

BRASILIA: The deadliest police operation in Brazil's history killed at least 132 people, officials said on Wednesday, after Rio de Janeiro residents lined a street with dozens of corpses collected overnight, a week ahead of global climate events in the city. The tally from the Rio public defender's office was more than double the death toll released on Tuesday, when state authorities reported at least 64 dead, including four police officers. The raids were targeting a major drug gang, the state government said.

Rio Governor Claudio Castro said the initial tally had only counted bodies processed in the public morgue. Penha residents who went looking for lost relatives had collected many of the corpses from a forested area behind their neighborhood, according to people at the scene, where more than 70 of the bodies were lined up in the middle of the street. "I just want to take my son out of here and bury him," said Taua Brito.

Sialkot police start operation against Afghan nationals

SIALKOT: In a campaign to send back Afghan nationals, Sialkot Police on Wednesday made an announcement through loud speakers in mosques that nobody would provide shelter, rented houses etc., to Afghan nationals. According to spokesman for the police, DPO Faisal Shehzad initiated a comprehensive campaign to ousted Afghan nationals from the district Sialkot. In this regard, he said that the police officials used loud speakers of Masajids to inform the people to out Afghan Nationals from their houses. He said that police would take stern action against all those who would provide shelter to Afghan Nationals or rented out their

houses to them. - APP

ISLAMABAD: In a high-level roundtable discussion conducted by the Institute of Regional Studies (IRS), Islamabad, the Iranian Ambassador to Pakistan, Dr Reza Amiri Moghaddam, reiterated Iran's willingness to an open and constructive diplomacy on nuclear issue. Ambassador Amiri denounced the aggressive posture of the US and labelled it as a clear violation of international law and UN norms. He further elaborated that re-imposition of sanctions were politically motivated which undermined the credibility of international agreements. Criticizing the UNSC, Amb Amiri denounced the forum for failing to prevent unilateral actions and overlooking

Iran's verified compliance record. He clarified that under Article 26 of the JCPOA, Iran retained the right to respond proportionally to violations by other signatories. Despite this, he once again emphasized that Iran's nuclear program was entirely peaceful and consistent with the postulates of the NPT. Amb Amiri also appreciated Pakistan's consistent support and highlighted the need for stronger cooperation in energv, trade and connectivity projects.

In his keynote address, Ambassador Khalid Mahmood, former envoy to Iran, provided a strategic assessment of the snapback sanctions and their broader implications for global non-proliferation norms. He observed that the JCPOA (2015), once hailed as a model of cooperative diplomacy, collapsed due to unilateral actions and the breakdown of trust. Ambassador Mahmood explained that the Cairo understanding was an attempt to reestablish limited monitoring and inspection under the UN framework, but the triggering of snapback mechanism undermined its progress. He warned that sanctions might insinuate further instability through their secondary effects on regional states like Syria, Yemen and Lebanon.

Jauhar Saleem highlighted that Pakistan's relationship with Iran stood the test of time and that recent 12-day conflict between Iran and Israel demonstrated its significance. He mentioned that the failure of JCPOA eroded the trust in global commitments and disproportionately impacted the ordinary citizens. Amb Jauhar noted that sanctions disrupted South Asian trade flows, approximately 70-80 percent of which was dependent on maritime routes. He Stressed that Pakistan always advocated for a balanced and cooperative approach that avoided zero-sum rivalries and promoted inclusive regional growth through the platforms like CPEC and BRI.

Professor, faculty of World studies University of Tehran Dr Tohid Asadi analyzed that the sanctions obstructed Iran's access to global markets, technology and capital, and affected the regional supply chains and energy routes. Dr Asadi was of the view that Tehran's foreign policy now prioritizes geo-economic integration with regional partners in which Pakistan holds the special place. He stressed that Tehran-Islamabad relationship is now evolving beyond security concerns to include connectivity, trade corridors and energy collaboration.

Jamaica's strongestever storm. Hurricane Melissa, turns to Cuba

Cuban authorities say some 500,000 people ordered to move to higher ground ahead of hurricane

JAMAICA: Hurricane Melissa churned toward Cuba's second-largest city with the force of a powerful Category 4 storm on Tuesday, hours after making landfall in neighboring Jamaica as the strongest-ever cyclone on record to hit that Caribbean island nation.

Melissa roared ashore near Jamaica's southwestern town of New Hope, packing sustained winds of up to 185 mph (295 kph), according to the US National Hurricane Center, well above the minimum 157 mph (252 kph) wind speed of a Category 5 storm, the highest level on the Saffir-Simpson wind scale. In southwestern Jamaica, the parish of St Elizabeth was left "underwater," an official said, with more than 500,000 residents without power.

"The reports that we have had so far would include damage to hospitals, significant damage to residential property, housing and commercial property as well, and damage to our road infrastructure," Jamaica's Prime Minister Andrew Holness said on CNN after the storm had passed.

Holness said the government had not received any confirmed storm-related fatalities, but given the strength of the hurricane and the extent of the damage, "we are expecting that there would be some loss of life." Melissa's winds subsided to 145mph (233kph), the NHC said, as the storm drifted past the mountainous island.

to halt Senate election in KP

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court on Wednesday set aside the Peshawar High Court's order in the Shibli Faraz case and directed the High Court to decide the pending petition after hearing all parties. The apex court also rejected a plea to stop the Senate election. A five-member constitutional bench headed by Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan heard the appeal filed by Senator Shibli Faraz against the Peshawar High Court's decision to indefinitely adjourn proceedings on his petition challenging the Election Commission's notification that de-seated him. Barrister Gohar, representing Shibli Faraz, argued that since the Election Commission had de-seated his client, the court should issue a stay order and suspend polling for the vacant Senate seat.

Justice Hasan Azhar Rizvi asked how many seats were up for election, and Barrister Gohar replied that polling was being held for only one. The bench observed that the court would not interfere in the election process and dismissed the request to halt the polling. Counsel for the Election Commission contended that the petitioners must surrender before seeking relief. Justice Muhammad Ali Mazhar asked whether the Peshawar High Court had ruled on the case's maintainability, to which Barrister Gohar replied that it had not been dismissed. Justice Jamal Mandokhail remarked that the matter related to fundamental rights, while Additional Attorney General Amir Rehman argued that such rights were linked to punishment, noting that the petitioners had been convicted by an anti-terrorism court.

Justice Hasan Azhar Rizvi observed that the High Court should have issued a brief order instead of writing a 31page judgment. The Supreme Court then set aside the Peshawar High Court's decision, disposed of the appeal, and directed the High Court to hear both sides and decide the pending petition on merit. - APP

SC rejects plea Pakistan pushes for ending US economic embargo on Cuba

UNITED NATIONS: Pakistan has renewed it's call for an end to the American economic embargo against Cuba, a demand the UN General Assembly has made annually since 1992, as the Caribbean region braces for devastation by Hurricane Melissa. "Such measures - including the extraterritorial application of domestic laws - contravene international law, including the humanitarian and human rights obligations," Ambassador Asim Iftikhar Ahmad, permanent representative of Pakistan to the United Nations, told the 193-member Assembly, which began debating the issue on Tuesday. The General Assembly has repeatedly debated the severe impact of the embargo on the Cuban people, highlighting its negative effects on daily life, human rights, and economic development, and calling on the US to terminate blockade of the country. But the Assembly action has no legal power as only the U.S. Congress can lift the embargo. In his remarks, Ambassador Asim Ahmad said that Pakistan "stands in solidarity" with Cuba in its sovereign right to pursue their chosen path of development and to ensure access to essential goods such as food, medicine, and technology without restriction.

"The impact that the economic, financial and commercial embargo has had on Cuba and its people is deeply concerning," the Pakistani envoy said. Pakistan, he said, believes that international cooperation must rest on the pillars of sovereign equality, mutual respect, and non-interference in the internal affairs of States.

"Resort to unilateral economic measures stands in stark contradiction to these principles, particularly the selective application of such measures on developing countries, driven by political considerations." In this regard, he cited the Secretary-General's report which points to the severe burdens on Cuba's development trajectory that the embargo had placed. "The restrictions have significantly constrained the country's ability to engage in trade, access foreign investment, conduct financial and banking transactions and import essential goods and services,"the report said.

South Korea gifts Donald Trump replica of ancient golden crown

GYEONGJU: US President Donald Trump may be facing "no kings" protests back home, but in South Korea officials had the perfect gift for the monarch-loving magnate - a replica golden crown. Trump met South Korean counterpart Lee Jae Myung on Wednesday, part of a visit in which he is expected to hold tense trade talks with China's Xi Jinping. And capping a lavish welcome ceremony in the historic capital Gyeongju, Trump was presented with a replica of a crown worn by the kings of Silla, the dynasty that ruled from 57 BC to 935 AD. The gift was a replica of "the largest and most extravagant of the existing gold crowns" from the Silla period, Trump was told. It represented "the divine connection between heavenly and earthly leadership". Seoul's presidential office said the headgear symbolises "peace, coexistence, and shared prosperity on the peninsula - values that mirror the Silla dynasty's long era of stability". Trump has made no secret of his love of monarchies the world over. Americans rallied across the country this month in opposition to what organisers call Trump's "king-like" presidency and erosion of democratic norms in the United States. Trump mocked the rallies on social media, sharing AI-generated posts showing himself wearing a crown while flying a fighter jet emblazoned with the words "King Trump" dumping faeces on protesters. - APP
