#### Pak, Egypt move to boost trade with 250-firm white list

DPM holds joint presser with Egypt FM, who expresses solidarity with Pakistan after recent terror attacks

ISLAMABAD: Deputy Prime Minister (DPM) Ishaq Dar said on Sunday that Pakistan would provide Egypt with a list of 250 business enterprises, selected through a transparent mechanism for inclusion in Egypt's "white list," as both countries decided to enhance bilateral relations.

In a joint presser alongside Egyptian Foreign Minister Dr Badr Ahmed Mohamed Abdelatty, Dar said another list of 250 additional firms will be prepared within six months, bringing the total to 500. Dar, who also holds the portfolio of foreign affairs, said that both countries have also decided to establish a Pakistan-Egypt Business Council, a move aimed at giving institutional shape to bilateral trade cooperation.

To address rising visa-related complaints, he said, both governments have finalised a new facilitation mechanism to streamline travel and business movement between the two countries. The DPM said the political consultations between the two sides will be held in Pakistan during the first quarter of 2026, adding that the forum will hold its first meeting in Cairo in the second quarter of 2026.

He added that, for the first time since 2010, Pakistan and Egypt have agreed to convene the Joint Ministerial Commission in 2026. Egypt's foreign minister expressed deep condolences and solidarity with Pakistan over the recent terrorist attacks in the country, reaffirming that Cairo stands firmly with Islamabad in its fight against terrorism.

The two leaders also held a bilateral meeting before the joint press conference. Dar welcomed the positive momentum in relations between Pakistan and Egypt, noting that Islamabad holds its bilateral ties with Cairo in high regard. The DPM said the Egyptian foreign minister's presence reflected the close and cooperative relationship between the two countries. He added that the visit demonstrated their shared commitment to deepening bilateral cooperation across political, economic, exchanged views on key issues of mutual interest.

#### President calls for stronger Pakistan Egypt ties

ISLAMABAD: Dr Badr Ahmed Mohamed Abdelatty, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Emigration and Expatriates of Egypt, called on President Asif Ali Zardari, at Aiwan e Sadr today. The President said Pakistan values its longstanding ties with Egypt, which are rooted in shared faith and mutual respect, and looks forward to advancing the relationship in a more structured and forward-looking direction. 

NADRA confirms identity of Nov 24 attackers

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan on Saturday strongly rejected what it called a "baseless and misguided" statement issued by the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) regarding the recently adopted 27th Constitutional Amendment. In a sharply worded response, the Foreign Office said Pakistan viewed with "deep concern" the ungrounded and misplaced apprehensions expressed on behalf of the High Commissioner, emphasizing that constitutional matters fall strictly within the purview of Pakistan's elected representatives.

"Like all parliamentary democracies, all legislation as well as any amendment to the Constitution remain the exclusive domain of the elected representatives of the people of Pakistan," the statement said. "Democracy and democratic methods form the bedrock of civil and political rights, and The Foreign Office stressed that the amendment was passed by a two-thirds majority in Parliament after following all constitutional procedures. It underlined that Pakistan remains fully committed to safeguarding human rights, human dignity, fundamental freedoms and the rule of law, as guaranteed by the Constitution of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan. While acknowledging the importance Pakistan attaches to the work of the High Commissioner for Human Rights, the statement expressed regret that "Pakistan's views and ground realities were not reflected" in the OHCHR's remarks. Islamabad urged the High Commissioner to show respect for Pakistan's sovereign parliamentary decisions and to refrain from issuing comments that "reflect political bias and misinformation." The government maintained that external commentary on purely domestic constitutional processes is unwarranted and does not contribute to constructive engagement.

ISLAMABAD: The federal government is expected to replace Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) Governor Faisal Karim Kundi, with at least six prominent names under active consideration for the key constitutional office, official sources disclosed on Friday. The move comes amid rising security concerns in the province and increasing friction between the provincial government and the Governor House. According to reliable political and administrative sources, the shortlisted names include former KP chief minister Pervez Khattak, former ANP chief minister Amir Haider Khan Hoti, and three retired senior military officers - Lt Gen (R) Tariq Khan, Lt Gen (R) Ghaur, and Lt Gen (R) Khalid.

#### Finland again decides to close Embassy in Pakistan

The Ambassador added that while Finland reopened missions in Manila, Islamabad and Doha, the Doha mission was prioritized due to the FIFA World Cup, as Finland wanted to ensure the presence of a resident consul ahead of the global event. "At the moment we are functioning from a temporary location at the Serena Business Complex," he had told this newspaper. "The idea was that in about a year's time we would return to the old premises and resume routine operations, including visa issuance."

It now appears that Finland's latest strategic recalibration has superseded those earlier plans.

Diplomatic sources point out that one underlying issue influencing Finland's decision is the absence of a Pakistani embassy in Helsinki. Finland has long encouraged Pakistan to open a resident mission to strengthen political, economic and trade ties. However, Pakistan opted to cover Finland through its mission in Sweden.

Under Finland's revised diplomatic strategy, embassies in Islamabad, Kabul and Yangon will all be closed next year. According to the Ministry, the closures reflect "operational and strategic considerations," including complex political conditions in host countries and relatively limited

commercial interaction with Finland. The Ministry emphasized that the foreign service periodically reassesses its global footprint to ensure alignment with evolving foreign-policy priorities. The latest review was guided by two major considerations: security assessments and the export-promotion goals of Team Finland, the country's international trade and investment support framework. The objective, it said, is to concentrate diplomatic and commercial resources in regions where Finland sees greater long-term strategic and economic value. Foreign Minister Elina Valtonen underscored the

rationale behind the changes. "Our operating environment is changing rapidly. The adjustments will help us build a stronger and more competitive Finland and manage our external relations in accordance with our priorities," she said. While withdrawing from South Asia and parts of Southeast Asia, Finland is expanding its footprint in areas of strategic interest. Earlier this year, it opened a Consulate General in Houston, one of the United States' key centres for energy, innovation and global trade. The Ministry is also preparing to establish new commercial offices in 2026 in countries where Business Finland has previously been active-another signal of Finland's intent to prioritize economic diplomacy.

The closure of the Islamabad embassy marks a setback in Finland-Pakistan diplomatic engagement, which had only recently gained momentum following the reopening in 2022. With both countries lacking resident ambassadors in each other's capitals, the relationship is now likely to depend heavily on regional missions and virtual diplomacy unless policy decisions evolve on either side.

Finland's Ambassador is hosting his National Day reception in Islamabad on December 4, 2025 – an event that is expected to be his last major diplomatic gathering before the embassy winds down its operations in the coming months.

# Quality marble best resilient to severe climatic conditions: Malik

LAHORE: SAARC Chamber of Commerce and Industry's former president Iftikhar Ali Malik has said that use of quality marble in the infrastructural development can effectively offset the impact of diverse and severe climatic conditions on buildings.

Talking to a delegation of marble importers and traders here Sunday, he said that Pakistan is exposed to harsh summers, heavy monsoon rains, smog/dust, and fluctuating temperature, however, premium marble provides a stable and resilient surface that can endure these challenges without losing its structural integrity. Its natural density and low porosity help prevent cracks, stains, and erosion, ensuring that floors, walls, and exterior facades maintain their original form and finish for decades, he observed.

Malik was of the view that impact of quality marble on the lifespan of constructed buildings is particularly significant, as it directly contributes to reducing long-term renovation costs, making it a cost-effective investment for homeowners, builders, and commercial developers. Its lasting strength adds to the overall structural reliability of the building, enhancing safety and sustainability.\_

# FM announces major shift to export-led economic model

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Finance and Revenue Senator Muhammad Aurangzeb, in a wide-ranging press conference in Islamabad. has underscored the Government's decisive shift toward an inclusive, private-sector-driven and export-led growth model, highlighting the recent abolition of the Export Development Surcharge (EDS) as a key demonstration of this commitment. He noted that the Government's earlier decision to eliminate the decades-old levy, alongside reforms to strengthen the Export Development Fund's governance, reflects a clear policy direction aimed at boosting competitiveness, empowering exporters, and laying the foundations for sustainable economic expansion. The Minister stated that in line with the Prime Minister's directive to place the private sector at the centre of Pakistan's economic expansion, the Government had accepted recommendations to overhaul the EDF's governance structure. He noted that the Prime Minister had gone beyond the private sector's proposal by approving the complete abolition of the Export Development Surcharge introduced in 1991 ending the 0.25% levy that exporters had paid for decades. The matter has already been summarised for Cabinet approval, after which its implementation will

al, after which its implementation will begin immediately. He emphasized that this step reflect-



ed the Government's resolve to empower exporters, improve competitiveness, and channel resources and decision-making authority toward the private sector to realise Pakistan's export potential.

Senator Aurangzeb reiterated that the Government's medium-term economic vision rests on moving from stabilisation to durable, broad-based and inclusive growth led by exports, remittances, productivity and private investment. He stated that recent months had shown clear signs of momentum in domestic economic activity, noting that from July to October, cement production rose by 16 percent, fertiliser by 9 percent, petroleum by 4 percent, automobiles by 31 percent, and mobile phone manufacturing by 26 percent. Large-scale manufacturing grew by 4.1 percent year-on-year in the first quarter, reflecting a positive shift compared to the contraction recorded last year. He emphasised that the challenge ahead was to sustain this trajectory while

ensuring that Pakistan does not return to the boom-and-bust cycles driven by external sector pressures. The Minister highlighted that export performance had strengthened, with overall exports rising 5 percent and IT services exports growing by over 20 percent year-on-year. He stressed that the IT sector had recorded back-to-back monthly highs in September and October, establishing itself as a critical pillar of the "new economy," alongside emerging sectors such as minerals and mining. He noted that

the \$3.5 billion Reko Diq-related syndication, led by IFC and now financially closed following the resolution of procedural delays, represents a transformational investment that will generate an estimated \$2.8-\$2.9 billion in annual exports once production commences. The Minister reported that remittances had also shown robust strength, reaching \$38 billion last year and expected to surpass \$41 billion this year, providing a sizeable buffer to the current account. He added that the Government was managing imports carefully under a reformed tariff regime designed to support industrial competitiveness by prioritising raw materials and intermediate goods while gradually phasing out long-standing protectionism. This transition, he emphasised, will be phased over four to five years to enable domestic industries to become internationally competitive. Senator Aurangzeb underscored that

structural reforms remained central to the Government's agenda. He confirmed that the new Tax Policy Office—now operational under the Finance Division-had conducted its first advisory board meeting and would henceforth be responsible for preparing tax policy and the national budget. The objective, he said, was to bring consistency, analytical rigour, and private-sector input into the policy-making process while allowing FBR to focus on enforcement, compliance and technology-driven administration. He noted that work on pension, debt, SOE reform, the digital economy, taxation, energy, and rightsizing was proceeding as committed earlier.

On public finance, the Minister reported that Pakistan's domestic debt stock had stabilised for the first time in nine years, and debt servicing costs had begun to decline with the reduction in the policy rate. He confirmed that Pakistan's inaugural Panda Bond supported by credit enhancement from ADB and AIIB and approved by China's central bank, would be issued before December or, at the latest, before the Chinese New Year, helping diversify Pakistan's funding base and reduce borrowing costs. The Minister announced that the 11th NFC Award process would begin next week, with Chief Ministers and provincial finance teams joining deliberations. He emphasised that revenue, expenditure and governance reforms require constructive federal-provincial engagement and expressed confidence that the meeting would be held in a spirit of "Pakistan First," following the consensus approach demonstrated during the National Fiscal Pact. Responding to questions about the sugar sector and commodity governance, the Minister stated that durable reform required a full transition away from government involvement-from import and processing to trading and regulation. He emphasised that persistent distortions cannot be eliminated without structural changes and that the Government remained committed to deregulation and transparency.

# Fashion industry can generate billions in export revenues

LAHORE: Pakistan Furniture Council (PFC) Chief Executive Officer Mian Kashif Ashfaq has said that fashion industries generate billions in export revenues for countries which excel in branding, craftsmanship and trend-setting He was addressing the Ist International Design Conference 2025 with a theme of 'Fashion and Global Trade' organised by Pakistan Institute of Fashion and Design (PIFD) here Sunday. Mian Kashif said, design and fashion spur economic growth, strengthen national branding, and enable countries to integrate more effectively into global value chains. He said, sustainability has further increased the importance of thoughtful design, asserting that eco-friendly materials, circular fashion concepts, and minimal-waste production are becoming essential components of international trade standards. Italy, France and China have proved that strong

design eco-systems can elevate their global market share. For emerging economies, he said, investment in design education, digital tools, and creative talent opens doors to high-value exports and new trade opportunities, he added. PFC chief said, design and fashion play a pivotal role in shaping global trade by driving innovation, value-addition and cultural exchange. This demand pushes industries – from textiles and apparel to furniture, accessories and even technology - to adopt creative design philosophy that enhances product appeal and competitiveness in international markets, he added. With e-commerce accelerating global reach, well-designed products travel faster across markets, capturing new consumer segments. Earlier in her welcome address, PIFD Vice Chancellor Prof Hina Tayyaba Khalil said that today's conference brings together thinkers and practitioners who understand that fashion is more than creativity - it is a global business eco-system. From supply chain networks and international sourcing to sustainability mandates, digital retail, export competitiveness and cross cultural design exchange, fashion operates at the intersection of innovation, economics and diplomacy. "As Pakistan continues to strengthen its footprint in global textile and apparel markets, the conversation we initiate here today carry exceptional relevance and strategic importance. ## New industrial estate to be setup near Ring Road

RAWALPINDI: Punjab Provincial Minister for Industries and Commerce, Chaudhry Shafay Hussain has said that industrialists were playing a pivotal role in the economic development of the country's economy and their genuine issues were being resolved on a priority basis. He also made a formal announcement to establish a new industrial estate near Rawalpindi Ring Road. The minister further assured that issues facing the traders and business community would be addressed as government's top priority He said this during his visit to the Rawalpindi Chamber of Commerce and Industry (RCCI) on Saturday, where he held a detailed meeting with RCCI President Usman Shaukat, Group Leader Sohail Altaf, and a large number of industrialists. The meeting featured an open discussion on challenges being faced by the industrial sector, which received

big appreciation from the meeting participants. The minister said that, in line with the vision of CM Maryam Nawaz Sharif, the process of industrialization in the province has been significantly accelerated. For the first time, industrial units are being set up in Bahawalpur Industrial Estate, while construction of 10 new factories has already begun in Quaid-e-Azam Business Park, Sheikhupura. He highlighted that on the CM's directions, a Garment City was also being established in Quaid-e-Azam Business Park to promote the textile sector. He added that several new in-



dustrial estates are being developed across Punjab to further provide vast investment opportunities in the available in Special Economic Zones (SEZs). He urged businessmen to fully avail the incentives and facilities being offered in these zones. Chaudhry Shafay Hussain revealed that the Punjab Chief Minister has approved a major program for the improvement of infrastructure in small industrial estates, which will commence next month. "The Chief Minister will soon hold meetings with representatives of all chambers of commerce and industry across the province", he informed. The minister said that plots in industrial estates that were allotted but on which industrial units were not established as per policy, were being permanently cancelled. He criticized previous governments for doing nothing to improve industrial infrastructure, whereas the current government has undertaken remarkable work in this regard.

PESHAWAR: Standing before Bab-e-Khyber at Jamrud tehsil of Khyber district, the iconic gate marking the entrance to the historic Khyber Pass, 12-year-old Ibrahim Khan beams with pride as he visits the site with grandfather on Sunday "Seeing Bab-e-Khyber was always my dream," he told APP as his eyes sparkling after watching the historic monument with national flag hoisting on top. Dressed in traditional Shalwar Qameez with woollen sweater and Chitrali Chugha by her grandfather, young Ibrahim said, "My Baba Jan brought me here today, and it's even more beautiful than I imagined, with the national flag hoisting sky-high on top of Bab-e-Khyber gate-a gateway to historic Khyber Pass." For visitors like Ibrahim, the Khyber Pass is not merely a rugged road rather it is a living museum without walls. As high in the rugged folds of the Safed Koh mountain range where icy winds whisper tales of emperors, warriors, and wandering caravans, Khyber Pass passes between

Pakistan and Afghanistan that still defines its importance in geopolitics besides unfolding history and primitive civilizations.

A symbol of Pakistan's glori-

ous past, the Khyber Pass remains a place where geography and history collide, and where every stone seems to echo with the footsteps of monarchs, invaders, and explorers who traversed it over the past 3,000 years.

Stretching 53 kilometers, the pass has served as a vital

Stretching 53 kilometers, the pass has served as a vital artery for trade, migration, and conquest. From Alexander the Great to the Mongols, from Persian kings to British colonial forces, this narrow ribbon of land has witnessed the rise and fall of world-changing empires.

world-changing empires. "This historic pass has seen more history than most modern cities in South Asia. Being a gateway to subcontinent, Khyber pass continues to shape the history, civilizations and geopolitics of the region due to its strategic significance in all eras," said Dr. Bakhtzada Khan, Assistant Director of Archaeology

and Museums in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

"It is not just a route but a palimpsest of empires, each era leaving behind cultural, political, and military imprints." He said how the British constructed the Khyber Railway in the early 20th century-an engineering marvel designed for military logistics. Even Winston Churchill, then a young British officer, once served here and wrote about the pass's strategic importance. At over 1,000 meters above sea level sits Landi Kotal, just seven kilometers from the Afghan border. Once a bustling stop for armies and traders, this dignified town has long served as a gateway between South and Central Asia.

"From Aryans to Mughals, every ruler who marched into the subcontinent passed through Landi Kotal via the Khyber Pass," explains Dr. Bakhtzada.

#### FIA offloads two for fake passport stamps

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) Immigration unit at Islamabad International Airport foiled an attempt by two passengers to travel abroad using fake passport stamps, officials said on Saturday.

An FIA official told on Sunday that the passengers, identified as Ameen Khan and Habibullah, were offloaded from an international flight bound for Malaysia. The spokesperson said the two men belonged to Peshawar and Buner.

He said FIA immigration officers detected that the passengers' passports carried fake departure stamps as well as forged Malaysian arrival stamps, indicating an attempt to falsify their travel history. The official said both passengers were handed over to the FIA Anti-Human Trafficking Circle Islamabad for further legal action. More arrests and legal proceedings are expected as the investigation continues.—APP

# Islamabad's key infrastructure projects enter final phase

ISLAMABAD: Three major infrastructure projects in the federal capital the T-Chowk Flyover, Shaheen Chowk Underpass, and Faizabad Interchange remodeling have entered their final stages, with construction work progressing at an accelerated pace.

Federal Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi on Sunday visited all three sites to review ongoing development activities. During the inspection, he expressed satisfaction with the pace and quality of work, directing authorities to ensure timely completion using all

available resources. To further ease traffic flow at Faizabad, the minister instructed that Loop 1 and Loop 2 be expanded to three lanes. He also ordered the installation of landscaping and lighting along both sides of the projects to enhance their visual appeal The minister noted that the completion of these initiatives will significantly improve traffic movement, reduce congestion, and facilitate daily commuters. He added that the T-Chowk Flyover, in particular, will benefit travelers from the twin cities and Punjab. Chairman CDA Muhammad Ali Randhawa briefed the minister on the progress, stating that nearly 80 percent of the T-Chowk Flyover has been completed and is expected to open for traffic in early December. All pile caps and girder casting for the flyover are finished, while 75 percent of the protective walls are in place. At Shaheen Chowk, all 70 girders for the underpass have been launched with remaining structural work nearing completion. Ramp 1 and Ramp 2 of the project are already fully built. Progress at the Faizabad Interchange also remains steady, with pole foundations and RCC walls completed and asphalt work currently underway. The visit was attended by CDA members, the Deputy Commissioner, Additional Deputy Commissioner, and other senior officials.

#### Railways builds 176 new residential units for employees

ISLAMABAD: In an effort to improve the living facilities for its staff, the Pakistan Railways (PR) has built 176 new residential units across the country, costing Rs118.382 million. According to documents available with Wealth Pakistan, the department has renovated 608 residential units in 13 divisions across the country in last three years.

Out of 608 residential units, 65 units are located in Karachi Division, 11 in Sukkur, 10 in Quetta, 24 in Multan, 17 in Lahore, 77 workshops in Mughalpura, 30 in DGM/HQ, 130 at the Pakistan Railways Academy Walton, Lahore, 82 in Rawalpindi Division, 150 in Peshawar Division, 10 at the Pakistan Railways Carriage Factory, Islamabad, while two quarters have been repaired at the Risalpur Locomotive Factory.

Talking to Wealth Pakistan, Director General Planning at the Ministry of Railways, Kamran Waseem, said the Pakistan Railways has created a safer and more sustainable living environment for its workforce. He said timely repairs and structural assessments have helped prevent potential hazards He said surveys are regularly conducted and special repairs are undertaken within available resources. Eviction notices are issued when structures are declared unsafe, and affected families are relocated to suitable quarters. He said the department is also working to ensure transparency and fairness in the allotment process, particularly for those displaced from the condemned units. "These efforts reflect the PR's broader commitment to institutional reforms, improved service delivery, and long-term stability," he said. Waseem said the improvement in employees' living conditions has enhanced efficiency, reduced operational stress, and improved service delivery. He said the department has also begun implementing stricter monitoring mechanisms to identify structural issues at an early stage to reduce future repair costs.—APP

### Over 309,000 power theft cases detected

ISLAMABAD: Power distribution companies across the country intensified their crackdown on electricity theft, registering 309,757 First Information Reports (FIRs) and arresting 129,117 individuals during a two-year campaign from January 2022 to December 2024. The crackdown uncovered 501 million units of stolen electricity, resulting in detection bills worth Rs 19,651 million. However, only Rs 11,361 million has been recovered, leaving a gap of more than Rs 8.29 billion. The figures, covering the two-year campaign, show a national recovery rate of just 57.81 percent. According to official figures, Punjab led with 252,307 First Information Reports (FIRs) registered against power pilferage, resulting in 115,577 arrests. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa followed with 40,112 FIRs and 11,012 arrests, while Sindh recorded 16,688 FIRs and 2,319 arrests. Balochistan reported 650 cases with 209 arrests during the two-year period. Officials confirmed that the recovered amount is deposited into the DISCOs' revenue accounts without allocation under any specific head. LESCO filed 171,178 FIRs and arrested 50,123 suspects over the theft of 187 million kWh units. The company issued detection bills worth Rs 7.06 billion, recovering Rs 4.03 billion - a 57.08 percent recovery rate. GEPCO and FESCO reported strong results, achieving recoveries of 94.62 percent and 79.69 percent respectively, while IESCO recorded a recovery rate of 87.66 percent of its billed amount. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa recorded one of the poorest outcomes, managing to recover just 22.31 percent of its billed amount. Peshawar Electric Supply Company (PESCO) reported that while it booked electricity theft cases amounting to Rs 3.15 billion, the utility managed to recover only Rs 690 million – reflecting a recovery rate of just 21.84 percent. Tribal Areas Electric Supply Company (TESCO) registered 264 FIRs in power theft cases, leading to the arrest of 24 individuals. The utility reported a modest recovery rate of 60.49 percent.-APP

#### Dengue situation in Islamabad remains stable

ISLAMABAD: The dengue situation in Islamabad has remained steady for several days, with the district administration reporting only one new patient in the last 24 hours. While, rural areas continued to show zero cases, and one case was confirmed from the urban side of the city. According to the administration, the improvement is the result of coordinated planning, strict monitoring and timely action across the capital. Officials said these steps have helped stabilize dengue trends and limit the spread of the virus. As part of the ongoing anti-dengue drive, teams conducted fogging at 772 locations and carried out spray operations at 35 residential sites. Inspectors also visited 22,438 spots across the city in a single day to check for larvae, stagnant water and possible breeding points. Health officials confirmed that five dengue patients are currently admitted in different hospitals. Their condition is stable and they are receiving uninterrupted medical care. During recent inspections, no larvae were detected in open areas, according to the field teams. However, larvae were found at 10 points categorized as commercial hotspots.

#### Weak audit system major driver of poverty

ISLAMABAD :One of the major reasons behind rising corruption in Pakistan is the weakness of the audit system. The mechanism for monitoring funds allocated to federal and provincial departments is almost nonexistent. Central and provincial institutions are facing a performance crisis, driven in part by the limited operational independence of the Auditor General. Internal audit systems within departments are also nearly absent, giving officers and staff a free hand to misuse public resources. Well known business leader and former president of the Islamabad Chamber of Commerce, Shahid Rashid Butt, said the audit and accountability framework in the country has been deliberately weakened. This, he said, allows the bureaucracy to openly abuse its authority, undermining both the protection of public resources and public trust. As a result, trillions of rupees at the federal and provincial levels fall prey to corruption every year.

He said the Public Finance Management Act has been reduced to a formality, as no department is willing to appoint a chief internal auditor. Due to the absence of internal checks, irregularities are detected only after financial damage has occurred, while enforcement of penalties is also negligible.


The exhibition provided an informative and encouraging environment, boosting students' confidence and promoting scientific and creative activities. Officials described the event as well-organised, commendable and memorable.

#### Pak-Afghan tensions flare up again

RELATIONS between Pakistan and Afghanistan have once again entered a turbulent phase, marked by sharp diplomatic exchanges and increasing mistrust. The latest spark came from the press conference of DG ISPR Lt. Gen. Ahmed Sharif Chaudhry, who issued an unambiguous and firm response to the recent statements by the Afghan Taliban government.

The Afghan authorities had claimed that the armed militants operating against Pakistan were their "guests," a justification that drew a stinging rebuttal from Pakistan's military spokesperson. The DG ISPR declared such remarks "unacceptable and against all principles of responsible statehood," reminding Kabul that no sovereign nation can allow its soil to be used for exporting terrorism to a neighbour. During the presser, DG ISPR also referred to individuals running anti-Pakistan campaigns from foreign soil. He cited examples of social media influencers, political activists, and exiled operatives who, according to Pakistan, are inciting violence, misinformation, and instability. He reiterated that Pakistan would pursue these elements through legal, diplomatic, and international channels.

pursue these elements through legal, applomatic, and international channels. While the Taliban government's position is difficult to justify, Pakistan must also confront some uncomfortable truths. The current situation is not divorced from history. It is no secret who supported, created, and facilitated the Taliban during various phases of the Afghan conflict. The policy decisions of the past continue to cast shadows today. It was not long ago that former ISI chief Lt. Gen. Faiz Hameed made a headline-grabbing visit to Kabul soon after the Taliban took over, projecting an impression that Pakistan enjoyed decisive influence in the new Afghan setup and that Kabul would closely align with Islamabad's expectations. The narrative did not translate into reality. Instead, the Taliban have charted their own independent course, often at odds with Pakistan's strategic interests.

Another factor that may be fuelling Kabul's recent posture is Pakistan's ongoing repatriation policy for undocumented Afghans. The mass exodus-though legally justified-has caused anxiety and resentment within Afghanistan's political and social circles. There is no second opinion that undocumented individuals must return to their homeland; no country can indefinitely host millions without documentation or security clearance. However, the modalities of the process require sensitivity and coordination. A more careful approach, with consultations and structured engagement with Afghan authorities, could help reduce misunderstandings. Pakistan's principled security concerns vis--vis Afghanistan are valid. Yet, the long-term stability of Pakistan's western frontier also depends on introspection. Islamabad must address policy inconsistencies, curb internal political exploitation of Afghan issues, and ensure that security and border management strategies evolve in line with changing ground realities. Pakistan and Afghanistan share geography, history, and cultural linkages that cannot be erased. Escalating tensions will only embolden hostile forces and destabilise the region. Both sides must lower rhetoric and revive structured talks.



HE 2025 G-20 Summit in South Africa will be remembered not only for the historic decisions taken, but equally for the loud, symbolic silence created by the absence of President Donald Trump and the United States' high-level delegation. It was a vacuum that everyone felt, a political absence that lowered the temperature of the event, diminished its traditional stature, and yet, paradoxically, empowered the rest of the world to move forward without waiting for Washington's approval. A gathering once shaped, dominated, and animated by American leadership unfolded without it — and the world did not stop. In fact, it moved with surprising confidence and determination, proving for the first time in decades that global cooperation no longer revolves around a single pole of power.

Trump's official explanation for skipping the summit was both extraordinary and controversial. He alleged that South Africa was maltreating, harassing and killing its white population of Britain, France, Europe, and the United States origin," and that the U.S. would therefore boycott the gathering in protest.

This justification stunned diplomats. The South African president and prime minister engaged in frantic outreach to convince Washington to participate at its traditional strength, but their efforts came to nothing. The United States remained absent, and the G-20 moved on. That moment alone signaled a shift: the world's most influential economies were no longer willing to freeze or dilute their agenda because America chose not to show up.

In that vacuum, the G-20 delivered several major breakthroughs. Africa achieved its long-awaited elevation as a permanent force within the grouping. Its seat was strengthened with new mandates for development, debt restructuring, and large-scale infrastructure support — recognition that Africa is no longer a peripheral player but a central actor in the global economy. The summit also adopted the Global Debt Relief Framework 2.0, a comprehensive mechanism in which China, the United States (from the working-level side), and Europe aligned on a unified system for restructuring debt for developing nations. For the first time, the world's largest creditors agreed on the principles of transparency, fair burden-sharing, and predictable timelines — a milestone that benefited dozens of struggling economies.

One of the most transformative decisions was the adoption of a global AI and digital governance pact. The world finally agreed on a shared code of conduct for artificial intelligence development, data transparency, cybersecurity protocols, and cross-border data flows. This was an agenda point expected to be heavily influenced by the United States, yet its absence did not hinder progress. The pact revealed a deeper truth: the world's technological future no longer depends solely on Silicon Valley's

blessing. Beijing, Brussels, Pretoria, New Delhi, and Brasılia demonstrated their ability to shape norms that will define the digital age.

Yet the most ambitious and visionary outcome was the creation of a \$120 billion Green Energy Transition Fund. The summit also produced a roadmap to reduce global tariffs – a direct counterpoint to Donald Trump's aggressive tariff wars. Leaders agreed that escalating tariffs undermine supply chains, inflate consumer prices, suffocate export markets, and weaken global economic stability. By committing to reduce trade barriers and revive the core principles of the World Trade Organization, the G-20 openly challenged the direction of U.S. trade policy and reaffirmed that globalization, though evolving, is far from dead.

Food security emerged as another defining pillar. The G-20 endorsed a multi-continental fertilizer and grain corridor network that would ensure developing nations have the ability not only to access essential agricultural inputs but also to build their own production capacity. The initiative aims to strengthen local seed development, introduce climate-resilient crops, and reduce dependency on vulnerable supply chains. It was a reminder that global hunger is not caused by scarcity, but by inequity, mismanagement, and geopolitics — and that collective action remains the only antidote.

Pandemic preparedness also received unprecedented attention. The G-20 agreed on a universal pathogen-sharing system, vaccine production guarantees for countries that cannot afford them, and the creation of global emergency stockpiles. COVID-19 had exposed the brutal reality that the world was divided between vaccine "haves" and "have-nots." This summit promised not to repeat that inequality, committing to a global health shield that can activate instantly in the face of new threats.

Even tax justice — long a contentious issue — saw real progress. The G-20 endorsed a crackdown on tax evasion and illicit financial flows, expanding automatic exchange of banking data and creating stronger digital taxation systems capable of identifying hidden wealth and offshore transfers. It was a direct strike against corruption, financial secrecy, and the long-standing loopholes that have drained developing nations of trillions. What is extraordinary is that these decisions, perhaps some

of the most consequential in G-20 history, were made in the absence of the United States. Washington's non-participation deprived the summit of its traditional weight, but it also gave the rest of the world a rare freedom — a chance to act without American vetoes, delays, or political bargaining. For the first time, the G-20 showed that global governance can continue even when America chooses not to lead.

This absence also reflects a deeper American decline. The United States has already withdrawn from key UN bodies, distanced itself from multilateral structures, and ceded leadership of global organizations to rising powers such as China and India. Across Europe and beyond, intellectuals are questioning the legitimacy of veto powers at the UN Security Council, arguing that one nation should not be allowed to overturn a resolution supported by nearly 200 states. The principle of unilateral veto is increasingly viewed as anti-democratic and incompatible with a modern, multipolar world. If that power is eventually dissolved, the United States — which relies heavily on the veto to protect its geopolitical interests — would suffer the greatest strategic loss.

Economists across Europe are also sounding alarms about the U.S. dollar. They note that gold prices have nearly doubled since Trump intensified tariffs, a sign that global confidence in the dollar as a reserve currency is eroding. History teaches that such erosion is initially slow and subtle — as with the British pound — until one day it becomes sudden and irreversible. A reserve currency survives on three pillars: military strength, predictable governance rooted in rule of law, and a robust, stable economy. Today, America's economic dominance is shrinking, its global leadership is receding, its institutional predictability is weakening, and its geopolitical influence is being challenged by China, India, Russia, and an increasingly assertive Global South.

The South Africa G-20 Summit was therefore more than a diplomatic event; it was a mirror held up to the United States. It is a wake-up call for a nation that once led the free world with confidence but is now drifting into isolation, controversy, and self-inflicted decline. If the United States hopes to restore its leadership, stabilize its currency, and reclaim its global relevance, it must reverse its inward retreat, rebuild alliances, re-enter global institutions, and embrace cooperation instead of confrontation. Only then can it regain the trust of a world that, for the first time, has shown it can move forward without America — and perhaps, if necessary, beyond it.

#### The World's Credibility at Stake: Confronting Terror Without Favour

ERRORISM, in every guise and in every corner of the world, stands as a repudiation of our shared humanity. No civilisation, no religion, and no moral code sanctions the taking of innocent lives. To link this evil to any faith is to misread both history and reality. Terrorism has neither a single home nor a single face; it is an affliction that has struck schools in Pakistan, concerts in Europe, shopping centres in America, habitat in Gaza and public spaces in Africa and Asia alike. The pain it inflicts is universal, and so must be the condemnation it receives.

Pakistan's experience with terrorism has been particularly acute. Over the last two decades, the country has lost more than seventy thousand lives-civilians and security personnel alike-and has suffered economic losses estimated in hundreds of billions of dollars. Development in many regions delayed by years. No city, whether Lahore, Karachi, Quetta, Peshawar, or smaller towns of the north and south, has been immune from the violence of extremist groups. This sustained assault reflects a deliberate and calculated strategy to weaken Pakistan from within and malign it internationally. Pakistan has consistently presented evidence to the global community about the origins of these attacks. It has pointed to the presence of organised groups operating from Afghan territory. Pakistan has repeatedly underscored that while Afghan soil is the immediate launchpad, the direction and financing of many attacks come from networks linked to India. Numerous dossiers, containing details of funding channels, communication intercepts, and the identity of handlers, have been shared with international institutions. Yet, while sympathetic statements have been issued in response, concrete action against the perpetrators or their sponsors has remained largely absent. Diplomatic caution, geopolitical alliances, and economic interests have too often overshadowed moral responsibility.

The pattern becomes even clearer when major events take place in Pakistan. Whenever foreign sports teams visit—cricket tours being the most visible example—terrorist attempts emerge with suspicious coordination. These attacks are intended not only to cause casualties but to erode Pakistan's image and deter international engagement. It is no coincidence that such attempts spike when Pakistan

is making diplomatic or economic progress. Years of such manipulation have revealed a strategic intent; to keep Paki-

stan unstable, isolated, and under pressure. In response, Pakistan has taken difficult internal steps, including the repatriation of Afghans living illegally within its borders. This was not an impulsive decision but one rooted in national security concerns and the international principle that undocumented residents must eventually regularise their status or return home. Many attacks in recent years involved individuals who crossed the border unlawfully or used refugee movement as a cover. While Pakistan acted firmly but lawfully, India exploited this moment of regional tension to escalate disinformation campaigns and support anti-Pakistan activities through covert channels. Instead of addressing the root causes, the international

system largely confined itself to verbal regrets. It is within this broader climate of instability that another deeply troubling development has emerged. Reports indicate that Afghanistan has attacked a Chinese camp operating in Tajikistan, reportedly killing three Chinese nationals. Disturbingly, the attack is said to have been carried out using a drone-an escalation that mirrors the increasingly sophisticated tactics employed across the region. It should be recalled that India, in collaboration with Israel, had used drone technology to strike Pakistan in May 2025. The replication of such methods by non-state and quasi-state actors represents a dangerous evolution in regional proxy warfare. When countries or groups normalise the use of drones for cross-border militancy, they invite an uncontrollable cycle of escalation that threatens the entire region's stability.

The consequences of global inaction are now becoming increasingly evident outside our region as well. When the United States withdrew from Afghanistan, it left behind vast quantities of military equipment—ranging from rifles and night-vision devices to armoured vehicles—which fell into the hands of various groups. This surplus of sophisticated weaponry has strengthened extremist elements across the region and beyond.

Just days ago, an Afghan national allegedly carried out an attack outside the White House—one of the most heavily

protected locations in the world. Two security personnel were injured over there. For decades, Western capitals viewed terrorism as a distant threat unfolding in faraway lands. But when violence strikes at the doorstep of the most powerful governments, it becomes an unwelcome reminder that terrorism knows no boundaries. In response, Washington has now announced a review of policies concerning Afghan arrivals and enhanced scrutiny of their backgrounds—the same measures that Pakistan has adopted for Afghans living illegally in its country.

This incident illustrates an undeniable truth;instability

cannot be contained within geographical borders. If the international community continues to dismiss Pakistan's concerns while reacting only when violence reaches major Western cities, the global fight against terrorism will remain fragmented and ineffective. Terrorism is not an issue for selective vigilance; it requires collective responsibility and uniform action grounded in justice, not geopolitics.

What the world needs is a serious, structured, and enforceable agenda on counterterrorism. There must be an international conversation—one grounded in transparency—about proxy warfare, state-sponsored militancy, and the financial networks that sustain extremist groups. Nations that use terrorism as an instrument of foreign policy must be named, confronted, and sanctioned. The existing framework, centred mainly on statements and symbolic gestures, has proven insufficient. Without accountability, the cycle of violence will persist.

Pakistan's stance has remained principled and consistent. It condemns terrorism in every form, whether committed in the West or the East, by individuals or by organised networks. It has cooperated with global counterterrorism initiatives, shared intelligence, and offered support wherever needed. Its sacrifices are not abstract statistics; they are millions of shattered families, thousands of orphaned children, and generations traumatised by instability.

The world must now recognise that Pakistan's fight is part of a larger struggle in which every nation has a stake. Terrorism anywhere is a threat everywhere. Only through honesty, unity, and collective resolve can the global community hope to secure a peaceful and stable future.

For the NA-18 by-poll, officers already posted in the same area were appointed, fully in accordance with the Elections Act, 2017. The Commission noted that these appointments were made well before polling day and no objections were raised by any party until after the results were announced. "Raising accusations only after losing the election is unjustified," the ECP stated. Addressing further allegations, the Commission said that if any Returning Officer had refused to accept an application, the concerned party should have approached the ECP, but no such complaint was filed. Similarly, no formal request for stopping consolidation or initiating a recount was made either to the RO or the Commission

within the stipulated time.

#### Thousands protest in Philippines against flood control fraud

MANILA: Thousands marched in the Philippine capital on Sunday, demanding jail time for scores of officials, lawmakers and construction firm owners accused of pocketing billions of taxpayer dollars in a sweeping corruption scandal. Rage over so-called ghost flood-control projects has been mounting for months in the archipelago country of 116 million, where entire towns have been buried in floodwaters

driven by powerful typhoons in recent months. President Ferdinand Marcos has seen friend and foe alike, including a congressman cousin, swept up in the scandal since he made the widespread fraud the centrepiece of a July national address. On Sunday, marchers faced with barbed wire-wrapped barricades blocking their route to the presidential palace chanted "Police! Protectors of the corrupt!" as riot police pounded on their shields in response. The protesters, who had gathered earlier at Manila's Luneta Park, carried a large effigy that merged Marcos and his chief political rival, Vice President Sara Duterte, into a two-headed crocodile representing corruption. About 10 kilometres (six miles) away, another group of demonstrators called for corrupt officials to be "put in jail now" as they marched along the thoroughfare known as EDSA, site of the People Power Movement that helped oust Marcos's father from power in 1986. According to official crowd-size estimates, fewer than 10,000 people took to the streets, while more than 17,000 police officers were deployed. - Agencie

From Page 01 Officials said that more than 100 suspects have been questioned so far as part of the inquiry. The development comes nearly a week after three FC personnel were martyred, and as many terrorists were killed when security forces foiled an attack on the FC Headquarters in Peshawar. Meanwhile, the investigators have also obtained CCTV footage showing the attackers' movement from Rehman Baba graveyard to the FC Headquarters. They revealed that the suicide bombers did not carry any mobile phones on the day of the attack, making the investigation more challenging. The blasts, which targeted the Federal Constabulary Headquarters on 24 November, resulted in significant casualties and prompted a wide-scale security review in the area. # Kyrgyz leader aims to shore up power in vote with no opp

Without strong parties, both voters and MPs struggle to organise or meaningfully advance different visions for the country's future in any sustainable way

Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan, Nov 30 (AFP/AP-P):Kyrgyzstan votes Sunday in a snap parliamentary election, a contest with no formal parties or organised opposition that is set to cement the power of President Sadyr Japarov. The landlocked Central Asian country was once seen as the most democratic in the region, but Japarov has been criticised for backsliding since he came to power after a revolution in 2020. Here are five things to know about the country and the vote: Surrounded by highly authoritarian regimes, Kyrgyzstan has gone through three revolutions -2005, 2010 and 2020 - since the collapse of the Soviet Union. Japarov is seeking to end that cycle by boosting his control over politics and society. "From now on, you will only see coups in your dreams,' he said in early November. He boasted he was "confident" he could win 90 percent of the vote in presidential elections scheduled for 2027. Several NGOs have

denounced a deterioration in freedom of expression and the press under his rule. Days ahead of Sunday's election, 10 of his opponents were arrested, adding to a long list of politicians and journalists the state has accused of plotting coups.

Officially there are 329 political parties registered in the country. But Japaney

registered in the country. But Japarov has changed the electoral system to weaken the role of parties, meaning only one will participate in the vote down from 16 in 2020. The estimated 4.3 million voters will choose 90 MPs from 467 candidates with at least 30 seats reserved for women. "Where there are no strong parties, people vote by district, based on the personalities of individual candidates," Emil Dzhuraev, a professor at the OSCE Academy in Bishkek, told AFP. "Naturally, this does not lead to any political development." Without strong parties, both voters and MPs struggle to organise or meaningfully advance different visions for the country's future in any sustainable way. "This leads to the further strengthening of executive power," Around two-thirds Dzhuraev said. of Kyrgyzstan's seven million people are under 35, with no living memory of when the country was part of the Soviet Union. But ties with former colonial power Russia remain strong, even as the country has forged its own distinct national identity. Russian is an official language and Bishkek is a close ally of Moscow. Remittances from hundreds of thousands of Kyrgyz labour migrants in Russia make up around a quarter of Kyrgyzstan's GDP, according to the World Bank. And dozens of Kyrgyz have been killed after getting recruited by Moscow to fight in Ukraine, local media have reported based on publicly available data. Landlocked Kyrgyzstan is one of the world's most mountainous countries, sit-

ting at an average altitude of 2,630 metres

(8,628 feet). High glaciers give it vital wa-

ter reserves, a rarity in Central Asia, which is predominantly a desert region thousands of miles from the sea. But climate change is hitting the region hard, triggering water shortages that hobble the vast Toktogul hydro power plant and lead to electricity shortages. The energy crisis has been a theme of the election campaign, with the president accusing his opponents of manipulating the population over the extent of the problem.

Major powers including the European Union United States

cluding the European Union, United States, Russia and China all compete for influence in the strategic Central Asian region. China is investing heavily to advance its New Silk Road initiative, a massive transport and infrastructure project to boost land routes between Asia and Europe.

Beijing is now the top trading partner and though it is boosting the economy, increasing numbers of Chinese businesses and visitors are a source of discontent for some.—Agencies

## Israel says killed four coming out of Gaza tunnels

JERUSALEM: The Israeli army said on Sunday it had killed four Palestinian militants coming out of tunnels in Rafah in the southern Gaza Strip Dozens of Hamas fighters are holed up in southern Gaza's tunnels, underneath areas controlled by the Israeli military. Israeli troops continue operating in the eastern Rafah area, the military said in a statement. Overnight "four terrorists who exited underground infrastructure in the area were identified. Guided by the Israeli Air Force, the troops eliminated the terrorists," it said. "IDF (Israeli army) troops in the Southern Command remain deployed in accordance with the ceasefire agreement and will continue to operate to remove any immediate threat. On Friday, Israel's military said more than 30 fighters who had attempted to flee the tunnels had been killed. Multiple sources said on Thursday that negotiations were underway regarding the fate of the fighters still in south Gaza's tunnel network. On Wednesday, Hamas called on mediating countries to pressure Israel to allow safe passage - the first time the Islamist group had publicly acknowledged the situation. The US-brokered ceasefire between Israel and Hamas, with Egypt, Turkiye and Qatar as mediators, entered into force on October 10. Under its terms, the Israeli army withdrew behind the so-called Yellow Line within the Gaza Strip, a boundary marked on the surface with yellow concrete blocks. The Hamas militants are in tunnels located on the Israeli-controlled side of the Yellow Line. A prominent Hamas member in Gaza said that the group estimated their number to be between 60 and 80. The ceasefire remains fragile, with Israel and Hamas accusing each other of violating the terms, while the Gaza Strip remains in a deep humanitarian crisis. The Gaza war was sparked by Hamas's October 7, 2023 attack on Israel, which resulted in the deaths of 1,221 people. Israel's realiatory assault on Gaza has killed at least 70 100 neonle according to figures from the territory's health ministry that the UN considers reliable The ministry says that since the ceasefire came into effect, 354 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli fire.—APP

# Indonesia, Thailand race to find missing

PADANG: Indonesian and Thai authorities raced on Sunday to clear debris and find hundreds of people still missing after devastating floods and landslides that killed at least 480 people across Southeast Asia. Heavy monsoon rain overwhelmed swaths of Indonesia, Thailand and Malaysia this week, leaving thousands of people stranded without shelter or critical supplies. At least two cities on Indonesia's worst-affected Sumatra island were still unreachable on Sunday, and authorities said they had deployed two warships from Jakarta to deliver aid. "There are two cities that require full attention due to being isolated, namely Central Tapanuli and Sibolga," National Disaster agency head Suharvanto said in a statement. The ships were expected in Sibolga on Monday, he said. The death toll in Indonesia rose to 316, while 289 were still missing, according to the latest figures from the disaster authority. In Sungai Nyalo village, about 100 kilometers (62 miles) from West Sumatra's capital Padang, floodwaters had mostly receded on Sunday, leaving homes, vehicles and crops coated in thick grey mud. Authorities had not yet begun clearing roads, residents told AFP, and no outside assistance had arrived. "Most villagers chose to stay; they didn't want to leave their houses behind," said Idris, 55, who, like many Indonesians, goes by one name. Across the island toward the north coast, an endangered Sumatran elephant lay buried in thick mud and debris near damaged buildings in Meureudu town. In Thailand, where at least 162 people were killed in one of the worst floods in a decade, authorities continued to deliver aid and clear the damage. Relief measures rolled out by the Thai government include compensation of up to two million baht (\$62,000) for households that lost family members.-Agencies

# Malaysia PM faces electoral setback

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysian Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim's allies were trounced in a regional election, results showed on Sunday, a grim first electoral test for the leader after three years in office. Anwar's Pakatan Harapan coalition won just one of the 20 seats it contested in Sabah, down from the seven it held previously in the eastern state on Borneo island. "The Sabah election outcome shows Anwar's coalition lost badly," said Lee Kuok Tiung, an associate professor and political analyst at Universiti Malaysia. Saturday's election was the first of a series of regional polls that will test Anwar's support ahead of national elections due by early 2028 in the Southeast Asian nation. Despite PH's setback, Gabungan Rakyat Sabah – a coalition of state-based parties aligned with Anwar's ruling bloc – retained control of Sabah, one of Malaysia's largest and poorest states. GRS faced pressure over its ties to Anwar's coalition as sentiment grows for greater state autonomy. Anwar congratulated GRS leader Hajjiji Noor on his reappointment as Sabah chief minister, saying the federal government "fully respects the strong and clear message" of the state's voters. "They are demanding real change after being faced with injustice and neglect by almost all parties," Anwar said on social media on Sunday. He did not address the drubbing his PH allies had taken. His office declined to comment. Lee said Sabah voters valued regional-based parties, greater autonomy and improvements to basic water, electricity and road infrastructure. Anwar needs to understand local sentiment and review the government's progress on earlier promises, he said. A minister from Sabah resigned from Anwar's cabinet this month after a Sabah court ruled in October that the federal government had unlawfully failed to honor an agreement it reached with the state more than 50 years ago. Under the agreement, Sabah was entitled to 40 percent of federal revenue derived from the state. Anwar said on Sunday his administration has worked to resolve Sabah's claims and would continue to assist the state. Anwar was appointed prime minister in November 2022 after joining forces with some opposing parties to form a government after an election that resulted in a hung parliament.-DNA

# Australia arrests dozens in coal port protest

SYDNEY: Australian police said Sunday they had arrested dozens of people during climate protests that claim to have halted two cargo ships at one of the world's biggest coal export ports. A total 32 people were arrested and charged with "marine-related" offenses on Saturday and early Sunday at the Port of Newcastle, a major deepwater gateway north of Sydney, police said. Several activists engaged in "unsafe practices" on the water during the protests, New South Wales state police said, warning that they had a "zero-tolerance" approach to threats to public safety or the safe passage of vessels. Organizers Rising Tide said the weekend protests, in which flotillas of kayaks entered shipping channels, had forced two coal ships to turn around instead of entering the port. Nearly 100

people in 50 kayaks entered the shipping channel again on Sunday, it said. Greenpeace said activists climbed the side of coal ship Yangze 16 on Sunday and displayed a banner reading: "Phase out coal and gas." Police landed in a helicopter on the ship's deck in the early afternoon and detained two activists after the seven-hour action, the environmental group said. "As the world's third-largest fossil fuel exporter, Australia plays an outsized role in the climate crisis," said Joe Rafalowicz, climate activist at Greenpeace Australia Pacific. He urged the center-left government of Prime Minister Anthony Albanese to set a timeline to phase out goal and gas and stop approving new fossil fuel projects. Greenpeace "stands with all peaceful climate defenders who are advocating for real climate action at the Blockade, and all around Australia," Rafalowicz said. A spokesperson for the Port of Newcastle said shipping schedules continued over the weekend with the final vessel leaving in the afternoon, "Vessel operations will continue tomorrow as scheduled," the spokesperson said. Australia's parliament approved new environmental laws Thursday requiring large carbon-emitting projects to disclose their greenhouse gas emissions as well as pollution reduction goals. But the Climate Council NGO expressed concern that the laws did not require the government to consider a project's climate pollution when assessing whether to greenlight it. Despite heavy investment in the renewable sector, Australia remains dependent on its fossil fuel economy for growth.-Agencies

# High-level forum on Pakistan diplomatic relations held

ISLAMABAD: A high-profile event focusing on Pakistan's foreign relations, particularly with China and the United States, was held, attending by Chinese Consul General Zhao Shiren, foreign affairs expert Muhammad Mehdi, former National Security Advisor Gen Nasser Janjua, Safdar Ali Khan, and other distinguished participants and organized by chairman Sarzameen forum Safdar khan. Speakers emphasized the need for Pakistan to base its foreign policy decisions on national interest rather than emotions, according to a report carried by Gwadar Pro on Sunday. Speaking at the event, Chinese Consul General Zhao said he was honored to reflect on the "unique and time-tested" China-Pakistan friendship. He described the relationship as rooted in shared ancient civilizations and strengthened over 74 years of diplomatic ties. He noted that high-level engagement between the two countries has increased significantly this year, including Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's visit to China and the signing of an action plan that outlines 63 areas of cooperation from now until 2029. Highlighting a decade of CPEC progress, he said the project has brought \$25.93 billion in investment, created 261,000 jobs, built

510 km of expressways, added over 8,000 MW of electricity, and expanded the power transmission network by 886 km. Projects like the Orange Line Metro, Haier-Ruba Economic Zone, Quaid-e-Azam Solar Park, and Chashma Nuclear Power Plant have delivered direct benefits to millions. He said CPEC is now entering a "high-quality" second phase focusing on five corridors-Growth, Livelihood, Innovation, Green, and Open. Phase 2 aims to boost industrial, agricultural, and mining cooperation, promote new sectors such as IT, AI, and digital economy, and strengthen business-to-business linkages. The Consul General added that developments under China's 15th Five-Year Plan and ongoing modernization will create new opportunities aligned with Pakistan's "Uraan Pakistan" vision, generating skilled jobs and empowering youth. He emphasized that in a rapidly changing global environment, the China-Pakistan partnership remains a pillar of stability. By supporting global development, security, and cultural initiatives, both countries continue to contribute to regional peace and global economic recovery. Concluding his remarks, he reaffirmed China's firm support for Pakistan's development, investments, and long-term prosperity, expressing confidence that both nations will continue building a "community of shared future" for peace and progress. Addressing the gathering, Muhammad Mehdi highlighted that Pakistan's relations with both the US and China are shaped by long histories-marked by cooperation, challenges, and shifting policies. He noted that although the United States supported Pakistan during its early years, it later imposed sanctions. These developments, he said, deeply influenced Pakistan's strategic thinking. He pointed out that in the aftermath of the 2019 Balakot crisis, China took a clearer position supporting Pakistan's sovereignty. The speaker added that it is possible for Pakistan to maintain strong ties with both the US and China, but it must make decisions with clarity and realism rather than relying on symbolic gestures or political rhetoric. Discussing CPEC, he said it remains the strongest economic partnership between the two countries, but delays in implementation have limited the benefits felt by the public. He stressed that more important than announce ing "CPEC Phase 2" is ensuring that ordinary Pakistanis see real improvements in their daily lives.-Agencies

on Saturday, while a hospital said that Israeli fire killed two Palestinian children in the territory's south. The toll has continued to rise after the latest ceasefire took effect on Oct. 10. Israel still carries out strikes in response to what it has called violations of the truce, and bodies from earlier in the war are being recovered from the rubble. Staff at Nasser Hospital, which received the bodies of the children in southern Gaza, said the brothers, ages 8 and 11, died when an Israeli drone struck close to a school sheltering displaced people in the town of Beni Suhaila. Israel's military said it killed two people who crossed into an Israeli-controlled area, "conducted suspicious activities," and approached troops. The statement did not mention children. The military said it also killed another person in a separate but similar incident in the south. At least 352 Palestinians have been killed across the territory since the ceasefire between Israel and Hamas took effect on Oct. 10, according to Gaza's Health Ministry. Hamas again urged mediators on Saturday to pressure Israel to stop what it called ceasefire violations in Gaza. A US blueprint outlining the future of Gaza, which has been devastated by more than two years of war, is still in the early stages. The plan to secure and govern the territory authorizes an international stabilization force to provide security, approves a transitional authority, and envisions a possible future path to an independent Palestinian state. Israeli forces have pushed forward on a number of other fronts in the region in recent weeks. In the Israeli-occupied West Bank, Israeli soldiers were accused by Palestinians of executing two men on Thursday after footage aired by two Arab television stations showed troops shooting the men after they appeared to surrender. \_APP

# Prominent activist arrested as hundreds protest in Tunisia

TUNIS: A prominent Tunisian activist was arrested on Saturday as hundreds protested in the capital against the curtailing of freedoms, an AFP journalist and lawyers said. The protest in Tunis came a day after a mass appeal trial saw some 40 public figures, mainly critics of President Kais Saied, handed hefty sentences over plotting against the state. Poet and political figure Chaima Issa, who was handed a 20-year sentence during the trial on Friday, was arrested during the rally, lawyers and

witnesses said. "We were marching in the protest when a group of plainclothes officers grabbed her and pushed her inside a vehicle," Issa's lawyer, Samir Dilou, told AFP. "They could have arrested her the day of the verdict at her home," Dilou added. "She wasn't going anywhere. If she wanted to go on the run, why would she be demonstrating?" The protest, called by Tunisia's leading women rights groups the Association of Democratic Women (ATFD) and Aswat Nissa, denounced what many see as a growing clampdown on dissent and rights defenders in Tunisia. "This protest comes amid the authorities' systematic suppression of free speech and the free voices of activists, journalists and others," said Nadia Benhamed, a senior member of the ATFD. "We reject the suppression of freedoms," she added. "Freedom of expression and thought is our right." Tunisia emerged as the only democracy of the Arab Spring. But since Saied staged a sweeping power grab in 2021, rights groups have criticized a maor rollback on freedoms. Dozens of Saied critics have been prosecuted or jailed, including on terrorism-related charges and under a law the president enacted in 2022 to prohibit "spreading false news.'

ing false news."
"We won't give up on our gains and on our freedoms," said Manel Othmani, another protester and activist.
"We can't surrender the freedom of speech we've gained since 2011."—APP

#### **FIA offloads** two for fake passport stamps

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) Immigration unit at Islamabad International Airport foiled an attempt by two passengers to travel abroad using fake passport stamps, officials said on Saturday. An FIA official told APP on Sunday that the passengers, identified as Ameen Khan and Habibullah, were offloaded from an international flight bound for Malaysia. The spokesperson said the two men belonged to Peshawar and Buner.

He said FIA immigration officers detected that the passengers' passports carried fake departure stamps as well as forged Malaysian arrival stamps, indicating an attempt to falsify their travel history. The official said both passengers were handed over to the FIA Anti-Human Trafficking Circle Islamabad for further legal action. More arrests and legal proceedings are expected as the investigation continues. – APP

#### Four killed, 10 wounded in California shooting: US police

LOS ANGELES: Four people were killed and 10 wounded in a shooting at a family gathering in California on Saturday night, US police said, calling it a "targeted incident." The shooting took place inside a banquet hall in Stockton, northeast of San Francisco, just before 6:00 pm, San Joaquin County Sheriff's office spokesperson Heather Brent told reporters in a news briefing.

The victims, who range from "juveniles to adults," were taken to local hospitals, Brent said, adding that information on the shooting confirmed at this time is that there was a banquet hall where a family was celebrating. We have 14 victims of this shooting. Four of those are deceased," Brent "Early indications suggest that this may be a targeted incident. Investigators are exploring all possibilities at this time.'

The sheriff's office said in a post on social media that detectives were "working to determine the circumstances leading up to this tragedy." "We are urging anyone with information, video footage, or who may have witnessed any part of this incident to contact the San Joaquin County Sheriff's Office immediately," it said. No suspect has been identified so far. California Governor Gavin Newsom had been briefed on the shooting, his office said in a post on social media. - APP

#### Russian drone strike kills one

KYIV: A Russian drone attack has killed one person and wounded 11 on the outskirts of the Ukrainian capital, the regional governor said Sunday. Mykola Kalashnyk, the Kyiv regional governor, reported "another enemy drone attack" and said rescuers were evacuating residents of a high-rise building and firefighting was ongoing. "Unfortunately, as a result of the enemy attack on Vyshgorod, one person was killed and 11 were wounded. Among them is one child," Kalashnyk wrote on Telegram. The latest attack follows a Russian drone and missile attack on Friday night that killed three people and left hundreds of thousands across Ukraine without power. A team of Ukrainian nego-

tiators was headed to the United States on Saturday for talks on a US plan to end the war, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said. Washington's original proposal - drafted without input from Ukraine's European allies - would have seen Kyiv withdraw from its eastern Donetsk region and the United States de facto recognise the Donetsk, Crimea and Lugansk regions as Russian. - APP

#### FBR misses Nov revenue target with Rs143bn tax shortfall

Downward-revised tax collection target from Rs14,130bn to Rs13,979bn, agreed with IMF, might face major deficit

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Bureau of Revenue (FBR) is facing a shortfall of Rs143 billion in achieving its desired target for November with sluggish economic activities, closure of industrial units and hike in tax rates doubling the revenue shortfall. The FBR highups are hopeful that the revenue collection might cross the Rs900 billion mark for November 2025. In the first four months (July-October) period, FBR had faced a shortfall on an average in the range of Rs68 billion on a per-month basis; however, in the fifth month (November 2025) this gap widened to Rs143 billion, according to provisional revenue figures available till 4:25 pm on Saturday, indicating that the shortfall started piling up after each passing month. The possibility of achieving the FBR's annual target of Rs14,130 billion seems impossible. Even the downward-revised tax collection target from Rs14,130 billion to Rs13,979 billion, agreed with the IMF, might face a major shortfall, keeping in view the existing pace of collection in the first five months of the current fiscal year. In recent days, the government's top functionaries, includ-

ing SIFC's National Coordinator Lt Gen Sarfraz Ahmed and Governor State Bank of Pakistan Jameel Ahmed, have publicly conceded that the flawed growth model, comprising higher taxation rates for the formal sector, was unsustainable and needed to be changed.

Everyone concedes that it is necessary to slash tax rates, but they are unable to ascertain how to do it in a sustained manner in the context of the IMF programme. Pakistan and the IMF have envisaged a tax collection target of Rs6.49 trillion by the end of December 2025. The FBR's tax collection hovered around Rs4.7 trillion in the first five months of the current fiscal year. In order to materialise the July-December target, the FBR will have to fetch Rs1.756 trillion in December 2025 to achieve the desired results.

According to the provisional tax collection figures, the FBR's net tax collection stands at Rs4.727 trillion after paying refunds of Rs0.254 trillion. The gross collection stood at Rs5.04 trillion. The FBR has collected income tax of Rs2.231 trillion, sales tax Rs1.875 trillion, federal excise duty of Rs0.326 trillion, and customs duty of Rs0.547 trillion in the first five months of the current fiscal year. In November 2025, the FBR's gross collection stands at Rs0.995 trillion, out of which refunds were paid amounting to Rs0.48 trillion, so the net collection hovers at Rs0.892 trillion. The FBR's tax collection target stands at Rs1.035 trillion, so the shortfall touched the level of Rs0.143 trillion.

#### Sri Lanka cyclone deaths rise to 159, major flood hits capital

About a third of country remains without electricity, running water; storm destroys over 20,000 homes

COLOMBO: Sri Lankan authorities battled rising floodwaters in parts of the capital on Sunday after a powerful cyclone left a trail of destruction, killing at least 159 people across the country. The death toll had reached 159, with another 203 people missing, the DMC ring a week of heavy rains brought on by Cyclone Ditwah, which move away from Sri Lanka on Saturday. "Although the cyclone has left us, heavy rains upstream are now flooding low-lying areas along the banks of the Kelani River," a DMC official said. President Anura Kumara Dissanayake declared a state of emergency on Saturday to deal with the aftermath of the cyclone and appealed for international aid. India was the first to respond, sending relief supplies and two helicopters with crew to carry out rescue missions. Japan said it will send a team to assess immediate needs and pledged further assistance. While the rains have subsided across the island, several roads in the worst-affected central province remained inaccessible, the DMC said. The extreme weather system has destroyed more than 20,000 homes and sent 122,000 people into state-run temporary shelters. Another 833,000 people required assistance after being displaced by the floods. Troops from the army, navy, and air force have been deployed alongside civilian workers and volunteers to assist with the relief effort. Officials reported that about a third of the country remains without electricity or running water due to collapsed power lines and inundated water purification facilities. Internet connections have also been disrupted. The cyclone has become Sri Lanka's deadliest natural disaster since 2017, when flooding and landslides claimed more than 200 lives and displaced hundreds of thousands. - DNA

ed States under the Biden administration's "Operation Allies Welcome" programme has been arrested after allegedly posting a TikTok video suggesting he was constructing a bomb intended for the Fort Worth area in Texas, according to a report by Fox News, citing the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS). Court documents show that the suspect, identified as Mohammad Dawood Alokozay, has been charged at the state level with making a terrorist threat. \Alokozay was taken into custody on Tuesday, a day before the shooting in Washington DC, by the Texas Department of Public Safety and an FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force in a coordinated law enforcement effort, the report said.

The report noted that Rahmanullah Lakanwal, the gunman who shot two National Guard members earlier this week, also entered the country through the same resettlement programme. The resettlement program was set up by Biden after the US military withdrawal from Afghanistan in August 2021, which led to the rapid collapse of the Afghan government and the

country's takeover by the Taliban. Following the attack, US President Donald Trump said his administration will "permanently pause" migration from all "Third World Countries", following an attack near the White House he attributed to Biden-era immigration vetting failures.

#### **Information minister lambasts Imran Khan's sisters**

ISLAMABAD: Information Minister Attaullah Tarar has slammed Pakistan Tehreeke-Insaf (PTI) founding chairman Imran Khan's sisters for "harming" the country's reputation by appearing on Indian media platforms. Addressing a press conference

in Lahore on Sunday, the information minister alleged that these appearances were being used to spread "propaganda" against Pakistan. "Why did they [Imran's sisters] not raise the Kashmir issue or Marka-e-Haq when speaking to Indian channels... they appeared on Indian channels to defame the country... propaganda is being spread today on Indian

and Afghan media," he said. "I wish Noreen Niazi had

talked about the seven planes that were shot down. In-

stead, she goes there and cries for a person facing a

£190 million corruption case," Tarar added.

The information minister further said that Imran's sisters "should be ashamed" for giving interviews on Indian platforms that, according to him, work against Pakistan's interests. He also targeted senior PTI leadership, claiming that close family members of the party's founder had actively participated in what he described as anti-Pakistan narratives abroad. The minister further accused the PTI of attempting to weaken national institutions through misinformation and political agitation.

KP issues: Speaking about governance in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP), the info minister said the provincial government had failed to curb non-custom-paid vehicles, illegal mining and drug trafficking. He accused the KP government of protecting "drug cartels" and claimed that billions in potential tax revenue were being lost.

'The pockets of those in power in KP are being filled," he said, adding that the tobacco sector could generate significant revenue if taxed properly. Tarar also linked the issue to criminal networks and political influence. "One reason is the political-terror-crime nexus," he added. He said the security forces responded strongly to recent cross-border attacks, stating: "When there was infiltration from Afghanistan, our army gave a full response.
