Pak, Iran Pledge to strengthen ties for global peace

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif on Friday reaffirmed Pakistan's unwavering commitment to strengthening brotherly ties with the Islamic Republic of Iran, underscoring the shared vision of both countries for global peace, regional stability, and unity of the Muslim Ummah. Trump says 'open' to considering lifting **Iran sanctions**

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump said Thursday that Iran has asked for heavy US sanctions against Tehran to be lifted - and that he is open to having a discussion about it. "Frankly, Iran has been asking if the sanctions could be lifted. Iran has got very heavy US sanctions, and it makes it really hard," Trump said during a dinner with Central Asian leaders. "I'm open to hearing that, and we'll see what happens, but I would be open to it."

Western countries, including the United States, have long accused Iran of seeking to acquire atomic weapons, while Iran insists its nuclear program is for peaceful purposes. Tehran has been reeling under years of international sanctions, especially after the United States in 2018 withdrew from an international nuclear accord with Tehran and reimposed tough punitive measures. In mid-June, Israel launched an unprecedented bombing campaign against Iran, triggering a war which saw the United States

New title is being considered under proposed amendment to Article 243 of Constitution

ISLAMABAD: The introduction of a new designation named "Commander of Defence Forces" (CDF) is under consideration in the proposed 27th Constitutional Amendment as part of key defence reforms,.. The new title is being considered under the proposed amendment to Article 243, aimed at ensuring greater coordination and unified command among the three armed services. The move is said to have been inspired by lessons drawn from recent Pakistan-India war scenarios and the evolving nature of modern warfare that demands an integrated operational response. Although the official draft of the 27th Constitutional Amend-

ment has not surfaced, its main points have come to light, including the proposal to tweak Article 243. Article 243 states that "The Federal Government shall have control and command of the Armed Forces" and "the Supreme Command of the Armed Forces shall vest in the President", among other things. Defence Minister Khawaja Asif recently said that consultations were underway for amendments to the law that governs armed forces. "Consultations on amending Article 243 are ongoing [...] defence requirements have changed," the minister told Geo News on November 5. the Charter of Democracy (CoD) signed between the

PESHAWAR: Governor Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Faisal Karim Kundi has said that the province continues to face serious challenges from India-backed terrorists and cross-border aggression. He said that due to its proximity and shared borders with Afghanistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa remains heavily affected by such threats. There seems to be no alternative to intelligence-based operations for the complete eradication of terrorism," he emphasized. The Governor was speaking to participants of the 27th National Security Workshop from the National Defence University (NDU) during their study visit to the Governor's House, Peshawar on Friday. Railways to invest Rs 100b in upgrading 18 branch lines

LAHORE:Pakistan Railways (PR) plans to spend approximately Rs. 100 billion on rehabilitation of 19 branch lines across its network to ensure a safe and reliable journey for passengers and enhance inter-provincial connectivity and urban rail transport According to documents available with Wealth Pakistan, the department plans to spend Rs. 98.58 billion on upgradation of 19 branch lines across the four provinces with a total length of 2,479 kilometres. Out of this allocation, Rs. 44.411 billion will be spent in Punjab, Rs. 35.955 billion in Sindh, and Rs. 17.217 billion in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP). Under the plan, eight branch lines will be rehabilitat ed in Punjab, including 78km Shahdara-Narowal with an estimated cost of Rs. 3.909 million, 62km Narowal-Sialkot line with a spending of Rs. 3,705 million, 370km Raiwind-Kasur-Pakpattan line with an allocation of Rs. 10,709 million. 220km Qila Sheikhupura-Jaranwala-Shorkot line at a cost of Rs. 5,669 million, 147km Shorkot-Jhang-Sargodha line with an estimated cost of Rs. 7,351 million, 167km Sargodha-Malikwal-Lalamusa line with a cost of Rs. 6,432 million, 68km Chak Jhumra-Shahinabad line with a cost of Rs.



Weekly inflation down by 0.59 pc

ISLAMABAD: The weekly inflation, measured by the Sensitive Price Indicator (SPI), decreased by 0.59 percent for the combined consumption group during the week ended on November 6, 2025, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported on Friday. According to the PBS data, the SPI for the week under review was recorded at 333.55 points, down from 335.53 points last week. On a year-on-year basis, the SPI increased by 4.18 percent.


The weekly SPI with base year 2015-16=100 covers 17 urban centres and 51 essential items for all expenditure groups The SPI for the lowest consumption group (up to Rs17,732) decreased by 1.04 percent, falling to 327.73 points from 331.18 points last week. The SPI for

consumption groups of Rs17,733-22,888; Rs22,889-29,517; Rs29,518-44,175; and above Rs44,175 also fell by 0.93 percent, 0.74 percent, 0.66 percent, and 0.44 percent, respectively. During the week, out of 51 items, prices of 18 (35.29%) items increased, 12 (23.53%) items decreased, and 21 (41.18%) items remained unchanged. The major commodities registering an increase during the week included eggs (2.40%), bananas (2.32%), firewood (1.61%), diesel (1.12%), beef (0.93%), tea prepared (0.92%), petrol (0.91%), bread (0.55%), wheat flour (0.34%), powdered milk (0.31%), and cooking oil 5-litre tin (0.21%). Items showing a decline in prices included tomatoes (37.93%), onions (4.88%), garlic (3.23%), pulse gram (1.58%), chicken (0.68%), sugar (0.64%), gur (0.60%), pulse masoor (0.55%), and LPG (0.15%). On a year-on-year basis, major increases were observed in the prices of ladies sandal (55.62%), sugar (43.67%), gas charges for Q1 (29.85%), wheat flour (19.50%), gur (18.88%), firewood (14.25%), beef (14.09%), vegetable ghee 2.5kg (11.53%), onions (11.22%), vegetable ghee 1kg (9.79%), and diesel (9.29%). Commodities witnessing a year-on-year decline included garlic (33.54%), pulse gram (29.82%), electricity charges for Q1 (26.26%), potatoes (22.32%), tomatoes (19.69%), tea (17.79%), pulse mash (15.52%), chicken (15.16%), LPG (9.14%), and pulse masoor (4.95%).-APP

on "Psychological & Strategic Layers of Air & Aerospace Power" on 23rd October 2025. The event brought together senior practitioners and scholars to discuss how doctrine, leadership, and emerging technologies such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), space systems, and Electronic Warfare (EW) are redefining the balance of power in South Asia. Air power, he concluded, remains remarkably cost-effective through its decisive effects rather than its material value. The second kevnote speaker, Air Marshal Faroog Habib (Retd), former Director CASS, examined the psychological mechanisms that influence public opinion and political decisionmaking in contemporary warfare, drawing lessons for doctrine, training,

and leadership in a multidomain environment. 

Peace with Israel would open new path for Lebanon

N 2000, after 22 years of occupation, Israel withdrew from southern Lebanon. Following this swift withdrawal, Israel's proxy, the South Lebanese Army, collapsed and let the Iran-backed group, Hezbollah, take control of its territories. It was hence Hezbollah, not the Lebanese state, that took over. Israel's unilateral withdrawal, ordered by Prime Minister Ehud Barak, ended a very costly presence with no significant gains. During its occupation, Israel lost about 1,000 men and the financial cost was in the billions of dollars. Barak wanted to do the same in Gaza and, in October of the same year, the Second Intifada started. It was Ariel Sharon who in 2005 disengaged Israel from Gaza, with Hamas taking over. In both theaters, Israel's unilateral withdrawal reduced the intensity of conflict but left Hezbollah and Hamas in real control.

In Lebanon, despite a few skirmishes, Hezbollah and Israel respected certain rules of engagement, such as the UN-demarcated Blue Line, as well as ensuring any retaliation was proportional and localized. This lasted until 2006, when Hezbollah followed Hamas and decided to join the war, and then again in 2023. Without going back through all the events, the Israeli withdrawal empowered Hezbollah from the start. Indeed, Hezbollah was the instrument that pushed the Israelis out, giving the group a savior and hero status, which subsequently put it above the Lebanese state and every other sovereign institution. Meanwhile, the Shebaa Farms, from which Israel did not withdraw and which also involves Syria, gave Hezbollah the technicality it needed to stay armed and claim there were still occupied Lebanese lands and that it was the only deterrent against Israel.

In a way, Israel has chosen its enemies. In 1982, it chose Hezbollah over the Palestinian and Arab resistance, and it also chose again in Gaza when it cornered Yasser Arafat in 2004. Yet, just as in 2006, it has been capable, when its enemies cross the red line, of inflicting a heavy toll. In 2024, the offensive was different, more reminiscent of 1982, when it expelled the Palestine Liberation Organization. It was no longer about punishment for crossing a red line, but the much more strategic decision of destroying Hezbollah. Following the heavy losses Hezbollah endured and its weakened state, this allowed a new leadership in Lebanon to potentially fill this vacuum and put forward a plan for Hezbollah's disarmament, something many Lebanese look forward to. It is time to end the role of a proxy that should never have been above the state and should never have had the power to make decisions of war and peace.



is no choice but to negotiate with Israel using diplomatic language is important. There is indeed no way of regaining Lebanese sovereignty without the state holding the files of any remaining occupied territory. Hezbollah had a clear agenda not to solve any pending border issues, as it validated its status as a resistance force. It abused this position to control the entire country. Hence, if Aoun is capable of taking over this file and negotiating a solution for all pending territorial disputes, whether in the Mediterranean or the Shebaa Farms, this removes all the cards that Hezbollah gained in 2000 and puts the state back in the decision-making seat. The same should be done with Syria. If this process is successful, then instead of selecting its enemy, Israel will be able to have relations with Lebanon similar to those it has with Jordan or Egypt. Moreover, as Syria's new leadership has openly stated its willingness to negotiate with Israel, and with the fact that Damascus' control over Lebanon no longer exists, this opens another huge opportunity for Lebanon to bring things to a settlement and achieve peace. This is achievable peace, not a temporary truce. Both Israel and Lebanon should be keen to seize this opportunity. Aoun also stated his commitment to the Mechanism Committee, established in

2024. This Lebanese military body currently coordinates with Israel on border security and territorial issues and it operates under UN mediation. Morgan Ortagus, the deputy US special envoy to the Middle East, mentioned the possibility of including civilians in the Mechanism Committee. The important thing is to initiate these negotiations and not have any Hezbollah-linked military or civilian personnel involved. The Lebanese state has a historic opportunity to seize the decision of peace or war. It is time the state took full responsibility for these files and that the army became the only defender of the country's borders. It is time to end the role of a proxy that should never have had the power to make decisions of war and peace. We do not know how long these negotiations might take and the Lebanese state needs to regain its decision-making on many other files. Therefore, it is also extremely important that the disarmament of Hezbollah is not linked to these negotiations. Indeed, we can expect very tough negotiations from the Israeli side and Tel Aviv will certainly not make easy concessions to Lebanon. As a starter, it will probably remind everyone that the decapitation of Hezbollah allowed the Lebanese president to push forward with the reconquering of sovereignty. As a result, Hezbollah no longer presents a deterrent or offers any advantage. It is finally being seen for what it is: an agent of destruction representing foreign interests on Lebanese soil. Hence, its disarmament needs to take place regardless of any border dispute with Israel. Aoun will need regional and international support to conclude these negotiations successfully and to encourage both sides to finalize an agreement as quickly as possible. This potential peace agreement would be a huge achievement and a steppingstone toward Lebanon fully regaining its sovereignty. Aoun's declaration showed courage. Let us hope it will be achieved. This would mean a new path for Lebanon, one that - for the first time in a very long while - would allow the country to regain agency. It is filled with opportunity and prosperity.

vice, I have seen times when doing one's duty was reward enough. Today, in much of the world around us, the act itself feels incomplete unless someone is watching. In this culture of constant display, strength has become noisy and has overpowered humility, once a defining attribute of men of excellence. While in a profession built on speed, power and precision, modesty seems almost out of place, yet within the Pakistan Air Force it remains one of its defining virtues. Behind the roar of jet engines lies a way of life that values modesty after success and reflection after victory. Greed, ostentatious living and false projection have quietly crept into our social fabric. A growing distance now separates those in authority from the people they serve. Much of this behaviour is a residue of the colonial mindset, where power was meant to be displayed rather than shared. Over time, this attitude has filtered into our institutions, creating competition where there should have been collective purpose. There are, however, examples within our own system that show a different way, where confidence grows from competence and modesty gives strength its credibility. The Pakistan Air Force stands among them. Despite belonging to a profession driven by precision and speed, it has preserved a culture of restraint and respect. This balance between excellence and humility has kept it close to its people and true to its mission. From the first day at the academy, every cadet is reminded that arrogance kills and overconfidence blinds. Flying requires confidence, yet it leaves no room for arrogance. When a crew chief salutes a pilot before taxiing out, the gesture carries a weight of history and a silent understanding that it could be his last. It embodies friendship, trust and the knowledge that skill alone does not control fate. In close air combat, survival

who keeps him safe, and that real mastery begins with humility before that truth.

The same humility is seen on the ground. It is not uncommon for a base commander to sit with technicians under the wing of an aircraft being repaired in the evening, discussing a snag or sharing a cup of tea. Principal staff officers still dine at the airmen's mess, a quiet tradition reminding everyone that respect flows both ways. During the 1965 war, when Indian aircraft attacked a base as one of ours was taxiing out, the crew chief threw himself over the pilot to shield him from strafing. He survived only by seconds, but his instinct said everything about comradeship and selflessness. Perhaps that is why, after Marka-e-Haq, the Pakistan Air Force quietly began reviewing lessons, identifying weaknesses and preparing to overcome deficiencies. This habit of turning honest effort and the quality of one's work. from success to self-examination keeps the organisation sharp and united.

In national life, noise too often counts for more than results. We have begun to judge leadership by visibility rather than delivery. From politics to public offices, image often overshadows performance. In such an environment, modesty is mistaken for weakness and self-promotion passes for power. The Air Force shows otherwise: real strength is often silent. Few stories show this better than that of Air Marshal Nur Khan. During the war, he flew an unarmed aircraft into enemy territory and never spoke of it again. The service remembered him even though he never mentioned what he had done.

Even in the face of personal attacks – accusations of "communism," threats to his safety, and attempts to question his loyalty - he never lost his calm. His reply was always the same: "My loyalty rests with New York and the United States - not with any foreign power.

When asked whether he would visit Israel after his victory - as every other mayoral candidate promised - Mamdani's answer shocked the establishment. "Why should I?" he said. "My duty is to the people of New York - to every Jew, Muslim, Christian, and atheist who calls this city home. My allegiance is to America.

His words, honest and unvarnished, unleashed a storm. Traditional media branded him anti-Israel, while social media – the new voice of conscience – hailed him as a patriot unafraid to speak truth to power. For the first time, a mainstream U.S. politician publicly rejected the unspoken rule that loyalty to Israel was a test of American legitimacy. In many ways, Zohran Mamdani is the mirror America needed. His victory exposed the fault lines between old-

ation. He represented the immigrant who built this nation yet was too long kept away from leading it. He reminded America that New York — the city that welcomed Italians. Irish, Jews, Puerto Ricans, Dominicans, Pakistanis, and Bangladeshis – owes its greatness to its diversity.

During his victory speech, his voice carried both gratitude and defiance: "New York was built by immigrants, and today, it is led by one." That line alone set the tone for a new political age. Trump, a master of populist energy, recognized in Mamdani a younger reflection of his own political magnetism - only directed by conscience rather than ego. In the weeks following the election, the White House reportedly tried to assess how to handle the new mayor who refused to be co-opted. Mamdani, however, made his position clear: "I will cooperate with Washington if Washington cooperates with New York's people. My loyalty is to my voters, not to the corridors of power.'

He stood unshaken even when both Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi mocked him publicly for his promise to honor international warrants for their arrest should they enter New York. Netanyahu had sneered, "He'll never be mayor," and Modi dismissed him as irrelevant. Yet, the ballots proved otherwise

For decades, America's unquestioned alignment with Israel - despite global condemnation of its actions in Gaza - was seen as untouchable. But Mamdani's stance has torn that veil. His refusal to visit Israel, his insistence on compassion for both Jews and Palestinians, and his commitment to New York's multicultural reality have forced the nation to rethink where its moral compass truly points. Political analysts across U.S. networks now call Zohran Mamdani "the Obama of a new era." Like Barack Oba-

ma's 2008 rise, Mamdani's victory carries symbolic power – proof that the American dream, though battered, still breathes. He may not seek the presidency soon, but many already whisper that history has found its next great contender. If an African-American from Chicago could rise to the presidency in 2008, why not a South Asian from Queens in the decade ahead? His journey embodies the American ideal – not of inherited privilege, but of earned respect. In an age of polarization, Mamdani offers something rare:

a unifying moral vision that transcends political lines. He speaks not as a partisan but as a citizen-leader who loves his city more than his career. His victory reminds America that greatness lies not in dominance but in decency – not in fear. but in faith. As the confetti of his triumph settles over the streets of New York, one truth rings clear: the son of immigrants has rekindled the immigrant spirit of America. And if his light continues to rise, he may yet illuminate the path to a better nation – one where every child, regardless of origin, can dream not just of belonging, but of leading.

Pakistan backs US-drafted resolution on lifting sanctions

UNITED NATIONS: With Pakistan supporting, the UN Security Council Thursday adopted a draft resolution to remove Syrian President Ahmed al-Sharaa and Interior Minister Anas Khattab from the Da'esh and Al-Qaeda sanctions list. The US-drafted resolution received 14 votes in favour to none against, with China abstaining.

Sharaa was named transitional president after leading an offensive that ousted Bashar al-Assad in December 2024, ending 13 years of devastating civil war.

He was under UN sanctions as the leader of the Islamist group Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS), which was formerly linked to al-Qaeda. The US removed HTS from a list of foreign terror groups in July.

The 15-member Council's vote came ahead of Sharaaa's visit to the White House on Monday and talks with President Donald Trump. United States Ambassador to the UN Mike Waltz welcomed the adoption of the resolution, saying, "With the adoption of this text, the Council is sending a strong political signal that recognizes Syria is in a new era," he said. "The delisting of President al-Sharaa and Interior Minister Khattab should help give the Syrian people the greatest chance. But China's Ambassador to the UN Fu Cong

argued that the resolution failed to address the "the legitimate concerns of all parties". "The sponsor did not fully heed the views of all members and forced the Council to take action even when there were huge differences among Council members in an attempt to serve its own political agenda," said Fu, referring to the US.

"China stands ready to work with the international community to continue to play a constructive role in achieving security, stability, and development in Syria at an early date, he added. Russia's UN Ambassador Vassily Nebenzia emphasized that the "resolution reaffirms the Security Council's commitment to the sovereignty, independence, unity and territorial integrity of the Syrian Arab Republic." "We expect that these fundamental principles will be adhered to by all members of the international community, including

Israel, which continues to play by its own

rules and occupy part of Syria's sovereign territory, including the Golan Heights," he said. Pakistan's UN Ambassador Asim Iftikhar Ahmad also welcomed the resolution, praising its adoption as step on Syria's journey ahead - presenting "immense opportunities", as well as challenges.

The Pakistani envoy expressed hope the Government would continue to centralize its authority and address security challenges, ultimately helping Syria to emerge as one of the world's strong and prosperous nations. Pakistan, he said, had always emphasized upon the need for providing sanctions relief to allow for Syria's reconstruction and reintegration with the international community, while also facilitating sustained dialogue and engagement.

"The Syrian people have suffered for more than a decade of conflict, chaos and civil war," he told the Security Council. "Today's vote is a welcome step by this Council to signal the support of the international community towards helping the Syrian people transition into a new phase of their political journey through a Syrian-led and Syrian-owned political process.

Ambassador Asim Ahmad warned of the terrorist threat, noting the presence of foreign terrorist fighters continues to threaten security in the country. "We hope that the Syrian authorities will extend and consolidate centralized authority and stabilize the situation across the country by taking measures necessary to address the security concerns." Syria hailed the UN Security Council's decision to remove President al-Sharaa and Interior Minister Khattab from the sanctions list, calling it further proof of Damascus's growing diplomatic legitimacy. In a statement on X, Foreign Minister Asaad al-Shaibani said: "Once again and not for the last time, Syrian diplomacy reaffirms its active presence and its ability to make steady progress in removing obstacles and paving the way toward a more open and stable Syrian future."

In addition, some high court judges - particularly from the Balochistan High Court and Sindh High Court - are also being considered for elevation to the new court. Three killed in new US strike on alleged drug boat

WASHINGTON: US forces on Thursday struck another alleged drug trafficking boat in the Caribbean, killing three people, Pentagon chief Pete Hegseth said, bringing the death toll from Washington's controversial anti-narcotics campaign to at least 70. The United States began carrying out such strikes - which experts say amount to extrajudicial killings even if they target known traffickers in early September, taking aim at vessels in the Caribbean and eastern Pacific. The US strikes have destroyed at least 18 vessels so far - 17 boats and a semi-submersible - but Washington has yet to make public any concrete evidence that its targets were smuggling narcotics or posed a threat to the Unit-

ed States. Hegseth released

aerial footage on X of the

latest strike, which he said

took place in international

waters like the previous

strikes and targeted "a ves-

sel operated by a Designat-

ed Terrorist Organization."

The video showed a boat

traveling through the water before exploding into flames. "Three male narco-terrorists - who were aboard the vessel - were killed," Hegseth said, without any further identifying information. "To all narco-terrorists who threaten our homeland: if you want to stay alive, stop trafficking drugs. If you keep trafficking deadly drugs - we will kill you," he wrote.

Like some previous videos released by the US government, a section of the boat is obfuscated for unspecified reasons. President Donald Trump's administration has built up significant forces in Latin America, in what it says is its campaign to stamp out drug trafficking.

So far it has deployed six Navy ships in the Caribbean, sent F-35 stealth warplanes to Puerto Rico, and ordered the USS Gerald R Ford carrier strike group to the region. The governments and families of those killed in the US strikes have said many of the dead were civilians - primarily fishermen.

Venezuela's Nicolas Maduro has repeatedly accused Trump of seeking to oust him. US bombers have also conducted shows of force Venezuela, flying over the Caribbean Sea off the country's coast on at least four occasions

since mid-October. Maduro - who has been indicted on drug charges in the United States - insists there is no drug cultivation in his country, which he says is used as a trafficking route for Colombian cocaine against its will.

The Trump administration has said in a notice to Congress that the United States is engaged in "armed conflict" with Latin American drug cartels, describing them as terrorist groups as part of its justification for the strikes. The United Nations has asked the United States to cease its campaign, with rights chief Volker Turk saying the killings have taken place "in circumstances that find no justification in international law." - Agencies

PARID: DFrench biathlete Iulia Simon has been handed a six-month competition ban by the French Ski Federation (FFS), but the 29-year-old will be able to compete in next year's Milano Cortina Winter Olympics, the sports body said on Thursday. Simon, who won the overall World Cup title in 2023 and holds 10 world championship gold medals, was also fined 30,000 euros (\$34,986.00) by the FFS National Disciplinary Committee. The decision follows her credit card fraud and theft conviction last month. Simon was sentenced to a threesuspended prison term and fined 15,000 euros (\$17,493.00). The ban prohibits her from participating in competitions or training sessions organised or authorised by the FFS or IBU.

Doha summit ends with call to turn social pledges into action

UNITED NATIONS: The Second World Summit for Social Development concluded in Doha on Thursday with calls for countries to move swiftly from commitments to implementation, ensuring that the Doha Political Declaration delivers measurable progress on poverty reduction, decent

work and social inclusion. Speaking at the closing press conference in Doha, President of the UN General Assembly Annalena Baerbock said the summit marked a "deliberate shift" from identifying gaps to acting on proven solutions.

"Copenhagen taught us 30 years ago that social development and inclusion are essential for strong societies," she said. "We promised to leave no one behind. Social development is not a 'nice to have' nor an act of charity. It is in the self-interest of every country." She warned that hunger and poverty today are not caused by scarcity, but by conflict, inequality and political failures, stressing: "One of the biggest problems is not money as such. It is rather how it is invested."

More than 40 Heads of State and Government, over 230 ministers and senior officials, and nearly 14,000 attendees took part in the Summit. Pakistan was represented by President Asif Ali Zardari.

Alongside the formal plenary and roundtable discussions, more than 250 "solution sessions" were held to exchange practical approaches to expanding social protection, improving access to healthcare and education, and supporting work that provides dignity. Deputy Secretary General Amina Mohammed said the outcome reflects the urgency expressed by civil society, trade unions, community leaders, businesses and youth representatives throughout the week.

"The message has been clear: people expect us to deliver answers, not simply declarations," she said. "The Doha Political Declaration is not a document for the shelves. It is a commitment to place people at the centre of sustainable development.

She emphasized that implementation must now focus on accelerating poverty reduction, creating real jobs and ensuring no one is left behind. "We have opened the door in Doha. Now we must walk through it together." Ambassador Alya Ahmed Saif

Al-Thani of Qatar said hosting the Summit reflects her country's conviction that equality, dignity and inclusion are essential to peace and prosperity. "Investing in people is the most sustained investment a nation can make," she said, noting Qatar's social spending at home and international development partnerships abroad.

She stressed that the priority now is to ensure that commitments move off the page and into policy, supported by international

cooperation and innovative financing. "The outcomes of this Summit provide a strong foundation," she said. "What matters most now is implementation."

Regional economic commissions said they will assist countries in translating commitments into practical measures. - Agencies

Delay and Detention **Certificates** binding on all port operators

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court of Pakistan, in a significant judgment, has ruled that all port and airport operators - including terminal operators - are legally bound to honor Delay and Detention Certificates and refund demurrage charges to the concerned importers or exporters. According to the written judgment approved for reporting, the decision was authored by Justice Muhammad Shafi Siddiqui in an appeal filed by Shaheen Airport Services (SAPS) against M/s Yasir Traders, Arms and Ammunition Dealers & Importers, Peshawar. The court held that under Section 14A(2) of the Customs Act, 1969, if a Customs officer not below the rank of Assistant Collector - issues a Delay and Detention Certificate confirming that the delay did not occur due to any fault of the importer, the terminal operators are mandatorily required to "entertain" and act upon such certificates. The judgment clarified that the term "entertain" does not merely mean to receive the certificate but to process it and provide an effective outcome, ensuring that demurrage or detention charges are refunded accordingly. Justice Siddiqui further observed that any refusal by a port or terminal operator to comply with such certificates constitutes a violation of law and may attract penalties or punishment under Section 156(1)(7A) of the Customs Act.-APP

Cameroon's Biya sworn in for 8th term

YAOUNDÉ: Paul Biya, who has been president of Cameroon for 43 years, was sworn in on Thursday for an eighth term, after a contested election that sparked mass protests and subsequent repression in which several demonstrators died.

92-year-old Biya, the world's oldest head of state, won the October 12 with 53.7 percent of the vote, according to official results, against 35.2 per cent for his main challenger, former government minister Issa Tchiroma Bakary. He was sworn in at a ceremony in parliament in Yaounde for a new seven-year term at the helm of the central African country. "I will spare no effort to continue to be worthy of this trust," Biya told the gathering attended by local political figures but no foreign leaders. "I fully understand the gravity of the situation our country is going through. I understand the number and severity of the challenges we face and I understand the depth of frustrations and the scale of expectations," he continued. Tchiroma, a former Biya ally turned opposition figure, stirred unexpected enthusiasm among young voters eager for change and continues to insist he is the true winner of the ballot.-APP

Pak-Türkiye, pledge techdriven disaster cooperation

The seminar, "Azerbaijan-Pakistan Friendship: The Fifth Anniversary of Victory Day," was held. The event celebrated Azerbaijan's victory over Armenia in the 2020 conflict and underscored the long-standing friendship between Pakistan and Azerbaijan. Among the speakers were former Acting Foreign Secretary Ambassador Naela Chohan, former Director of the Foreign Service

veer Awan, Research . Speakers noted that formal diplomatic relations between Pakistan and Azerbaijan were established in 1991, following Azerbaijan's independence from the Soviet Union. However, they highlighted that the people of both countries share centuries-old cultural, spiritual, and linguistic connections that go beyond politics or diplomacy. The panelists reiterated Pakistan's consistent support for Azerbaijan, especially during the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict and in response to Armenian aggression. They recalled that Pakistan had raised its voice at international forums in support of Azerbaijan's position, including during the Khojaly massacre. Similarly, Azerbaijan has continuously backed Pakistan's stance on the Kashmir issue. Reflecting on the 2020 war, speakers said that

renewed hostilities began in September that year and continued for 44 days, concluding in November with Azerbaijan's military success. They described the victory as a demonstration of the unity and resilience of the Azerbaijani people. The commemoration, they said, was a tribute to those who lost their lives defending their homeland. Participants stressed that remembering such national sacrifices is vital for strengthening unity and national resolve. They emphasized the importance of countering global silence on ongoing conflicts in Kashmir, Palestine, Gaza, and other occupied territories, urging stronger and more coordinated international advocacy for oppressed communities. The speakers affirmed that Pakistan and Azerbaijan share a deep sense of broth-

erhood founded on faith, solidarity, and mutual trust. Pakistan, they said, has extended unwavering support to Azerbaijan without seeking any strategic or economic gain. They also underlined the need to expand cooperation in multiple sectors, including education, trade, culture, and defense, to further enhance bilateral relations. Both nations, they concluded, should continue to work closely in regional and global platforms to promote peace, development, and shared prosperity. The seminar concluded with a joint reaffirmation of friendship between the two countries and a commitment to further strengthening ties through cultural and academic exchanges, defense collaboration, and people-to-people contact.-APP

Nancy Pelosi says she is stepping down WASHINGTON: Nancy Pelosi,

a towering figure in US politics and the first woman to serve as speaker of the House of Representatives, announced on Thursday that she will step down at the next election. Admired as a master strategist with a no-nonsense leadership style that delivered consistently for her party, the 85-yearold Democrat shepherded historic legislation through Congress as she navigated



America's bitter partisan divide. In later years, she became a key foe of President Donald Trump, twice leading his impeachment and stunning Washington in 2020 when images of her ripping up his speech to Congress were beamed on live television around the world. "I want you, my fellow San Franciscans, to be the first to know I will not be seeking reelection to Congress," she said in a video statement pointedly aimed at her hometown constituents, "With a grateful heart, I look forward to my final year of service as your proud representative." Pelosi-whose term ends in January 2027 - was the first woman to lead a major political party in the US Congress. Despite entering political office later in life, she quickly rose through the ranks to become a darling of liberal West Coast politics and, eventually, one of the most powerful women in US history. She is in her 19th term and has represented her San Francisco-area district for 38 years. But her fame centers especially on her renowned skills at the national level, leading her party for two decades. As House speaker for eight years, she was second in line to the presidency, after the vice president, including during Trump's chaotic first term. She was revered for her ability to corral her often fractious caucus through difficult votes, including Barack Obama's signature Affordable Care Act and Joe Biden's infrastructure programs.—DNA

PIA clarifies

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) has issued a clarification regarding the Lahore-Jeddah flight that made an unscheduled landing in Karachi early Thursday morning, emphasizing that the decision was taken purely as a precautionary measure after the pilot noticed cracks in the aircraft's windshield during flight. According to a PIA spokesperson, the pilot observed the windshield cracks at an altitude of approximately 34,000 feet, most likely caused by wind shear. "The situation was handled professionally and with utmost caution," the airline said in its statement. PIA confirmed that the pilot did not report any bird strike, and no emergency was declared at any point during the flight. The aircraft landed safely at Jinnah International Airport, Karachi, at 07:06 a.m. "All passengers and crew members are safe," the spokesperson assured, adding that standard safety procedures were followed throughout. The airline further stated that arrangements were being made for the onward journey of passengers to Jeddah after a thorough technical inspection of the aircraft. The clarification came amid reports circulating on social media suggesting an emergency landing, which the airline has categorically denied, reiterating that it was a precautionary landing taken in the interest of passenger safety._APP

IHC serves show-cause to Customs' officials

ISLAMABAD: A division bench of the Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Thursday issued a show-cause notice to the Collector Customs and Member Legal Customs for contempt of court in a case related to the vehicle seized by Customs from a citizen in Islamabad being used by the Commissioner Inland Revenue in Karachi. The court also sought an inquiry report along with an affidavit from the Collector Customs on the order to remove the original number plate of the vehicle and install a fake one.-APP

China tech transfer driving Pakistan economic development

BEIJING: China's accelerated technology transfer is driving Pakistan's rapid economic development and significantly enhancing its synthetic national power. In recent years, technology transfers in multiple fields such as energy, industry, agriculture and information technology have yielded remarkable results. This was stated by Prof. Cheng Xizhong, Senior Research Fellow at the Charhar Institute, a non-governmental Chinese think-tank on diplomacy and international studies based in Beijing. Talking to APP, he said that in the energy sector, China has transferred technologies in clean energy such as solar, wind and nuclear power to Pakistan, yielding positive results in multiple aspects. Particularly, with the construction of Pakistan's nuclear power projects as the carriers, China National Nuclear Corporation (CNNC) has promoted the development of local supporting industries and supported the improvement of manufacturing capabilities of local enterprises. For instance, in the construction of the Karachi Nuclear Power Plant (KANUPP), a number of technological innovations have been implemented, driving the technological upgrading of relevant local industries.

Prof Cheng said that relying on the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), Pakistan has established the cross-border carbon sink trading platform, introduced leading Chinese photovoltaic enterprises to build industrial parks, driven the development of the local new energy equipment manufacturing industrial chain, and created more than 200,000 green jobs. With the transfer of China's solar energy technology, the

installation cost of solar power generation systems in Pakistan has dropped significantly, making solar energy a more economically viable energy option and benefiting the general public, he added. About the industrial sector, he said that during the construction of the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), Chinese enterprises have established industrial parks in Pakistan, helping the country improve industrial production efficiency. For instance, Pakistan's automotive industry is introducing Chinese electric vehicle technology to set up electric vehicle manufacturing plants. Highlighting technology transfer in the agricultural sector, he said that China has helped Pakistan improve agricultural production efficiency. Chinese experts have promoted Pakistan's agricultural development through technical guidance, variety improvement and other methods, ensuring food security and driving rural economic growth. He said that China has transferred technologies in information technology sectors such as artificial intelligence and telecommunications to Pakistan, boosting the development of Pakistan's digital economy. Chinese enterprises including Huawei and ZTE have played a crucial role in expanding Pakistan's digital communications, improving digital access to millions of Pakistanis. Additionally, by transferring AI technologies, promoting research cooperation, and supporting AI-driven startups, China has helped Pakistan's young generation establish a foothold in this revolutionary field and enhanced Pakistan's technological exports, he added.

UN chief admits world has 'failed' on 1.5°C limit

ISTANBU: UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said that the world has failed to prevent global temperatures from breaching the critical 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 degrees Fahrenheit) threshold, warning a temporary overshoot is now inevitable. "The hard truth is that we have failed to ensure we remain below 1.5 degrees," Guterres told leaders at the Belem Climate Summit in Brazil. "Science now tells us that a temporary overshoot beyond the 1.5 limit - starting at the latest in the early 2030s - is inevitable." The UN chief warned even temporary breaching would have "dramatic consequences," exposing billions to unlivable conditions. Guterres said the World Meteorological Organization confirmed emissions reached another record high last year and continued rising in 2025. Current national climate plans would lead to above 2.0 degrees of warming even if fully implemented, he said, calling this outcome "moral failure - and deadly negligence." Despite acknowledging clean energy progress, with renewables overtaking coal as the world's largest electricity source and investors pouring \$2 trillion into clean energy in 2024, Guterres said the obstacle is "political courage," noting that scientists say it is still possible to keep the 1.5-degree goal "within reach." "Too many leaders remain captive to these entrenched interests," he said, noting fossil fuels still receive vast subsidies and political support while companies spend billions on lobbying, "deceiving the public, and obstructing progress." Guterres urged countries to accelerate fossil fuel phase-out, reach net zero by 2050, and achieve sustained net-negative emissions to pull temperatures back below 1.5°C before the century's end. He demanded that developed countries mobilize \$300 billion annually and demonstrate a "clear and credible path" to reaching \$1.3 trillion yearly in climate finance for developing countries by 2035, as agreed at COP 29 in Azerbaijan's capital Baku. "Let us be clear: the 1.5°C limit is a red line for humanity," Guterres said. "No one can bargain with physics. But we can choose to lead - or be led to ruin." The two-day summit in Brazil's northern city brings together heads of state and government, ministers, and leaders of international organizations to discuss urgent climate change issues and commitments. The summit is part of the official events of the UN Climate Change Conference (COP30), which will take place from Nov. 10 to 21.-APP

UK grandmother leaves Indonesia death row to return home

DENPASAR: Two British drug convicts including a grandmother on death row left a Bali jail on Thursday, as part of a deal to send them home on humanitarian grounds. Indonesia has some of the world's toughest drug laws, but has moved to release more than half a dozen high-profile detainees in the last year, including a Filipina mother on death row. Lindsay Sandiford, 69, was sentenced to death on the tourist island of Bali in 2013 after she was convicted of trafficking drugs. She will be repatriated along with Shahab Shahabadi, 36, who was serving a life sentence for drug offences after his arrest in 2014. Both were presented before the media in a handover ceremony at Kerobokan jail, with Sandiford covering her face. I Nyoman Gede Surya Mataram, an official from Indonesia's law and human rights ministry, said their "detention will be moved to the United Kingdom" under the bilateral deal. "For Lindsay and Shahab, after we hand (them) over to the United Kingdom government, (they) are fully responsible for the legal decision that will be given there but still respecting our legal decision." Nyoman added that both prisoners are due to take off on a Qatar Airways flight after midnight to London via a transit in Doha. - Health problems - Sandiford wound up behind bars in Indonesia after customs officers found cocaine worth an estimated \$2.14 million hidden in a false bottom in her suitcase when she landed in Bali in 2012. Sandiford admitted the offences but said she had agreed to carry the narcotics after a drug syndicate threatened to kill her son. The repatriation comes after Indonesia's senior law and human rights minister, Yusril Ihza Mahendra, signed a deal with British foreign minister Yvette Cooper last month for the transfer of Sandiford and Shahabadi. Both prisoners are suffering from severe health problems.-APP

Mexico's Sheinbaum steps up cartel fight

MEXICO CITY: cold-blooded murder of a crusading Mexican mayor, who hunted drug traffickers from a helicopter, has put pressure on President Claudia Sheinbaum to step up her fight against the country's notorious cartels. Outraged by the killing of Carlos Manzo, the 40-year-old mayor of the city of Uruapan in Michoacan state, dozens of protesters set fire to public buildings over two days of demonstrations across the region. Manzo, who shot to fame chasing gang members from the air in a cowboy hat, was gunned down at a public event Saturday marking Mexico's Day of the Dead. In just over a year as mayor in the country's avocado-growing heartland, he became known as the "Mexican Bukele" after El Salvador's popular gang-busting president Nayib Bukele. His death stoked anger towards regional authorities, accused of failing to support him in the fight against the region's myriad cartels._APP

US president says Kazakhstan to join Abraham Accords

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump said on Thursday that Kazakhstan will join the Abraham Accords to have normalised relations between Israel and Muslim-majority nations The announcement came after Trump said he had held a call with Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Kazakhstan's President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev. "We will soon announce a Signing Ceremony to make it official, and there are many more Countries trying to join this club of STRENGTH," Trump wrote on Truth Social. The Kazakh government said in a statement that the matter was in the final stage of negotiations. "Our anticipated accession to the Abraham Accords represents a natural and logical continuation of Kazakhstan's foreign policy course – grounded in dialogue, mutual respect, and regional stability," it added. Kazakhstan already has full diplomatic relations and economic ties with Israel, meaning the move would be largely symbolic, something Secretary of State Marco Rubio pushed back against on Thursday. "It's an enhanced relationship beyond just diplomatic relations," he said. "It is... with all the other countries that are part of the accord. You're now creating a partnership that brings special and unique economic development on all sorts of issues that they can work on together." Trump met with Tokayev alongside four other Central Asian leaders from Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan at the White House on Thursday as the US seeks to gain influence in a region long dominated by Russia and increasingly courted by China.—APP



Trump says expects int'l stabilization force in Gaza **'very soon'**

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump said Thursday he expects a US-coordinated international stabilization force to be on the ground in Gaza "very soon," following two years of war in the territory between Israel and Hamas. The multinational force - likely to include troops from Egypt, Qatar, Turkey and the United Arab Emirates - is part of Trump's post-war governance plan for Gaza.

The plan helped lead to a fragile ceasefire between Israel and the Palestinian militant group on October 10, but the humanitarian crisis in Gaza has not abated.

"It's going to be very soon. And Gaza is working out very well," Trump said at a White House function with Central Asian leaders.

"You haven't been hearing too much about problems, and I'll tell you, we've had countries that have volunteered if there's a problem with Hamas." The force is supposed to train and support vetted Palestinian police in the Gaza Strip, with backing from Egypt and Jordan. It also will be tasked with securing border areas and preventing weapons smuggling to Hamas, which triggered the conflict with its October 7, 2023 attack on Israel.

On Wednesday, the United States circulated a draft UN Security Council resolution to partner nations aimed at shoring up Trump's plan, including by greenlighting the international force. Washington's UN envoy Mike Waltz shared the draft with the 10 elected Security Council members and several regional partners - Egypt, Qatar, the United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia and Turkey - a spokesperson for the US mission said in a statement. A vote has not vet been scheduled. According to diplomatic sources, several countries have indicated their willingness to participate in the force, but insist on a Security Council mandate before actually deploying troops into the Palestinian territory. - Agencies

Rwanda, Pakistan strengthen trade ties through virtual business forum

Envoy highlights Rwanda's investment potential, calls for stronger South-South cooperation

ISLAMABAD, Rwanda's High Commissioner to Pakistan, Harerimana Fatou, reaffirmed her country's readiness to support all private-sector ventures between Pakistan and Rwanda during a virtual business meeting jointly organized by the Rwanda High Commission in Pakistan and the Rwanda Development Board (RDB). Participants from the Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FPCCI), Rwanda's Private Sector Federation (PSF), Rwanda Development Board, and Pakistan's Trade Development Authority (TDAP) exchanged views on emerging opportunities and practical steps to expand bilateral trade.

The High Commissioner welcomed dignitaries including the Director General (Africa) from Pakistan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, DG Africa from Rwanda, the Director of TDAP, officials from MINICOM, RDB, and members of the diplomatic and business community.

In her remarks, the envoy described the meeting as "another important step toward strengthening and fostering our partnership in trade and commerce between two friendly countries." He said that the High Commission's new mission focuses on creating direct linkages between entrepreneurs, investors, and policymakers of both nations.

"The idea behind organizing this meeting in collaboration with RRDB is to create an excellent platform to share information, explore new areas of cooperation, and build sustainable business partnerships that will drive mutual growth and prosperity," she stated.

Highlighting Rwanda's potential, she said the country offers a business-friendly environment, modern infrastructure, political stability, and consistent GDP growth, making it a gateway to East Africa. "Rwanda is emerging as a regional hub for trade and investment, and we welcome Pakistani investors to explore opportunities in our growing market," he added. The High Commissioner also noted Pakistan's strengths, describing it as a "large and dynamic country with a population of 250 million, skilled workforce, and expanding industrial base." She said both sides can collaborate in agriculture, information technology, artificial intelligence, pharmaceuticals, healthcare,



textiles, and tourism. Expressing optimism about the outcome of the meeting, she said, "I am confident that today's discussions will serve as a bridge connecting our business communities to share experiences and establish concrete ventures that will yield tangible results.' Concluding her address, the envoy extended heartfelt appreciation to the organizers, partners, and participants for making the event successful. "Let us continue to build strong business linkages that enhance trade and commerce between Rwanda and Pakistan and usher in a new era of collaboration," he said. Pakistani envoy in Rwanda is H.E. Mr. Naeem Ullah Khan in his address stated that Pakistan greatly values its ties with Rwanda and is keen to invite Rwandan companies to invest in Pakistan, and Pakistani companies to explore business opportunities in Rwanda. He emphasized that the Pakistani mission in Kigali is actively assisting both Pakistani and Rwandan businessmen to build contacts, explore investment prospects, and deepen bilateral economic cooperation. The Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FPCCI) President Atif Ikram Sheikh said that Pakistan attaches great importance to its relations with Rwanda, a fast-growing African economy with immense potential for bilateral trade and investment. He made these remarks while addressing a Pakistan-Rwanda Virtual Business Meeting, organized by the High Commission of Rwanda in Islamabad. Pakistan pushes India to end **Indus Water Treaty suspension**

UNITED NATIONS: A senior Pakistani diplomat voiced great concern in the UN Security Council on Thursday over the deliberate weaponization of shared natural resources, citing in this regard the unilateral suspension of the 1960 Indus Waters Treaty by India earlier this year, as he called for New Delhi's early return to compliance to the pact. "Such acts do not just harm one country; they weaken con-

fidence in international water law and set a precedent for resource-based and driven coercion elsewhere," Ambassador Asim Iftikhar, permanent representative of Pakistan to the UN, said, while highlighting the crucial issue in the 15-member Council. India suspended the major, World Bank-mediated treaty governing water sharing of six rivers in the Indus basin between the two countries after the Pahalgam incident in April. In a wide-ranging discussion on climate and security, the Pakistan envoy called India's unilateral action a "textbook example" of deliberate weaponization of shared natural resources.

"For more than six decades," Ambassador Asim Ahmad said, "This Treaty has stood as a model of cooperation, ensuring equitable and predictable sharing of the Indus Basin's waters between Pakistan and India, even in times of war. "India's unlawful unilateral decision to suspend this framework undermines the letter and spirit of the Treaty, threatens ecosystems, disrupts data-sharing, and endangers the lives of millions who depend on the Indus river water system for food and energy security, for their survival," he added. "This

should be of grave concern for every member of this Council and for the international community as a whole." Pointing out that no provision of the Indus Waters Treaty permits unilateral suspension or modification, the Pakistani envoy said, "The Court of Arbitration's 2025 award reaffirmed the continuing validity of the Treaty and its dispute-settlement mechanisms, upholding Pakistan's position that all issues must be resolved within its legal framework.

"We therefore expect full respect for the Treaty and an early return to compliance and normal functioning through the established channels". The Council's debate coincided with International Day for Preventing the Exploitation of the Environment in War and Armed Conflict.

In order to address the environmental impacts of armed conflict and climate driven security risks, Ambassador Asim Ahmad called for focusing on prevention and early resolution of conflicts. Environmental considerations could be integrated into UN peace operations and political missions, where relevant, he said, referring to Pakistan's work in this field in peacekeeping missions. "These actions should be embedded in planning, budgeting, and mandate design." The Pakistani envoy also underscored the need for upholding international law, especially international humanitarian law, including the obligations for parties to distinguish between civilian and military objectives, to take care to spare civilians, and to avoid methods of warfare expected to cause widespread, long-term, and severe damage to the natural environment. In addition, he called for promoting coherence in the UN system, with greater coordination among UN Country Teams as well as with relevant regional and international bodies.

EU states on edge over migrant burdensharing

BRUSSELS: Which EU countries face the most pressure from migration? The question is proving deeply divisive as capitals scramble to agree by yearend how to redistribute at least 30,000 asylum seekers across the bloc.

The 27-nation European Union adopted a sweeping policies in 2024, soon to come into force. A key element is a new "solidarity" system for managing asylum seekers, aimed at easing the burden on frontline countries such as Spain, Greece and Italy. The idea is broadly speak-

ing to sort member states into different categories:

- Those deemed by Brussels to be under "migratory pressure", based on criteria such as the number of irregular arrivals and sea rescue operations. - Other countries, which will be required to either take in a share of asylum seekers from countries under pressure, or provide them with financial support amounting to 20,000 euros (\$23,000) per person. There the trouble begins: how to decide who qualifies as "under pressure".

"You can see in the political rhetoric that everyone feels that they are under migratory pressure," said a source within the European Commission, which is tasked with sorting countries into categories. Member states are lobbying hard to influence the methodology used. - Agencies

US set for travel chaos

WASHINGTON: Travelers across the United States prepared on Thursday for potential chaos ahead of widespread flight cancellations ordered by authorities due to the federal government shutdown. On Friday, airlines will begin implementing a 10-percent reduction in flights in 40 high-traffic areas of the country, complying with a Federal Aviation Administration order made on safety grounds. The shutdown has left tens of thousands of air traffic controllers, airport security staff and others without pay, causing personnel shortages. On Thursday, more than 4,000 flights were delayed, with 96 cancellations, according to the tracking service FlightAware, with travelers facing long lines at security checkpoints.

Major airports were impacted, with travelers at Boston and Newark airports facing average delays of more than two hours, and those at Chicago's O'Hare and Washington's Reagan National more than an hour. Authorities said they wanted to act before an accident occurred. "We're not going to wait for a safety problem to truly manifest itself, when the early indicators are telling us we can take action today to prevent things from deteriorating," said FAA Administrator Bryan Bedford. The measures come as the country enters its busiest travel time of the year, with the Thanksgiving holiday just weeks away. The new cancellations could affect thousands of flights every day. Flight reductions will begin at four percent on Friday and rise to 10 percent, media outlets reported. Flight reductions are set to hit some of the country's busiest airports, including in Atlanta, Newark, Denver, Chicago, Houston and Los Angeles. Implementing the order on short notice will be a challenge for airlines, which operate complex networks that rely on many moving parts and personnel.

United Airlines and Delta, two of the country's largest carriers, have said they are complying with the order but that it would not affect their international routes. United added that "hubto-hub" flying would also not be affected, indicating cancellations might hit more local routes. Federal agencies across the United States have been grinding to a halt since Congress failed to approve funding past September 30, with some 1.4 million federal workers, from air traffic controllers to park wardens, still on enforced leave or working without pay. Many in highstress aviation-related jobs are now calling in sick and potentially working second jobs in order to pay their bills, US Transportation Secretary Sean Duffy said on Wednesday. – APP

SIC chief Sahibzada Hamid Raza arrested in Faisalabad cases linked to vandalism

PTI's ally was wanted in multiple during to May 9 violent protests

FAISALABAD: Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC) Chairman Sahibzada Hamid Raza was arrested by Islamabad police early Friday morning and later handed over to Faisalabad police. He was subsequently shifted to Faisalabad Central Jail.

Sources said Raza was wanted in several cases related to vandalism and violent protests against state institutions and had already been convicted by an anti-terrorism court. He had been sentenced in connection with the May 9 riots but had been absconding since then, they added. Police said Raza was presented before a court, which ordered his transfer to Faisalabad Central Jail. A special anti-terrorism court (ATC) in Faisalabad had convicted Raza along with several Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leaders including Omar Ayub, Shibli Faraz, Zartaj Gul in connection with a case registered in the aftermath of the May 9, 2023, violence at the Civil Lines Police Station.

The convicts were handed up to 45 years of imprisonment in several cases linked to the violent protests.

The May 9, 2023, events refer to the violent protests that broke out in several parts of the country following the arrest of the PTI founder and saw attacks on public properties and military installations, including Corps Commander House Lahore, also known as Jinnah House. The riots were triggered by the arrest of ex-premier Khan from the premises of the Islamabad High Court (IHC) in a graft case. Several PTI leaders and workers were released on bail after their arrests, while many still remain behind bars. - DNA

US influencers falsely associate Mamdani with **Islamic State group**

WASHINGTON: DUS right-wing influencers falsely linked New York's mayor-elect Zohran Mamdani to the militant Islamic State (IS) group, amplifying a fabricated statement that garnered millions of views on social media, researchers said on Thursday. Mamdani – the first Muslim and South Asian elected to lead America's largest city secured a decisive victory this week in the face of fierce attacks on his policy proposals and religious background.

A slew of anti-Mamdani accounts on the Elon Musk-owned platform X have circulated a statement purportedly from IS titled "Operation Manhattan Project", which alluded to an attack in New York City on Election Day against what it called "American aggression". Among the influencers who linked the fake communique to Mamdani was Laura Loomer, a conservative influencer who has Trump's ear.

'The Muslims can't think of a better way for the Muslims to celebrate the victory of a Muslim mayoral candidate today than by committing an ISIS (Islamic State) attack

in NYC," Loomer wrote in a post on X that racked up more than 200,000 views. Other conservative accounts cited the purported statement to falsely claim that the militant group had endorsed Mamdani as mayor. The posts collectively amassed millions of views across the platform.

The purported letter, which displayed the logo of the IS-affiliated Amaq News Agency, was fabricated, according to multiple researchers including the disinformation watchdog NewsGuard.

Meili Criezis, an American University academic, told the watchdog that the supposed communique did not bear the hallmarks of other statements that emanated from Amaq. "Amaq is used [by the IS] to share news and claim responsibility for attacks," Criezis said. "It doesn't make threats like what is stated in the screenshot."

The Information Epidemiology Lab, another research group, also said the circulated communique "sharply" diverged from established IS "media practices in language, style, formatting, and distribution". The fabricated statement appeared to first surface on the far-right message board 4chan, a known haven for conspiracy theories.
