Pakistan to keep borders closed until Kabul gives assurance on counterterrorism, says spokesperson Andrabi

ISLAMABAD: Foreign Office Spokesperson Tahir Hussain Andrabi on Friday said that the Taliban regime's lack of cooperation may be behind the delay in the visit of a high-level Turkiye delegation - scheduled to arrive in Islamabad last month to discuss tensions between Pakistan and Afghanistan Taliban regime. The planned visit was first disclosed earlier this month by Turkiye President Recep Tayyip Erdogan during his meeting with Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif in Baku last month.

Turkiye Ambassador to Pakistan Dr Irfan Neziroglu, who had played an active role in facilitating the Istanbul trilateral talks on Afghanistan, had told the delegation visiting Pakistan will also be accompanied by the Turkish intelligence chief and important ministers. During his weekly briefing, the FO spokesperson said the delay in the visit may also be due to scheduling issues. Andrabi said Pakistan will keep its border with Afghanistan closed until firm assurances are provided by Kabul that terrorists and violent elements will not enter Pakistan. He said that the cross-border terrorism is not limited to TTP or TTA militants, adding that Afghan nationals are also involved in serious crimes inside Pakistan.

"The border closure should be understood in this broader security context," Andrabi added. On the reopening of the Torkham and Chaman border crossings with Afghanistan

Pakistan closed the Torkham and Chaman borders with Afghanistan on October 12 after the Afghan Taliban, in association with their affiliated militants, attacked multiple Pakistan Armed Forces posts along the border. The border clashes between forces from the two countries began on the night between October 11 and 12 after the Afghan Taliban and militants launched unprovoked attacks against Pakistan's border posts. The resulting clashes led to the killing of over 200 Taliban and affiliated militants, while 23 Pakistani soldiers were martyred defending the motherland. Pakistan also conducted "precision strikes" deep inside Afghanistan, targeting terrorists in Kandahar province and Kabul. A temporary 48-hour ceasefire was announced on October 15 at Afghanistan's request. The two sides eventually reached an official ceasefire agreement on October 19 in Qatar in talks mediated by Doha and Turkiye. Under the deal, terrorism from Afghanistan on Pakistani soil will stop immediately with Islamabad and Kabul agreeing to establish mechanisms to consolidate lasting peace and stability between the two countries. The two sides then held further talks in Turkiye which collapsed after Pakistan refused to accept the Taliban delegation's "illogical" arguments and refusal to address Islamabad's concerns regarding cross-border terrorism.

ISLAMA BAD: Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) Director General (DG) Lieutenant General Ahmed Sharif Chaudhry has hit out at Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) jailed founder Imran Khan for "propagating anti-military and anti-state narrative". "The headquarters of the Chief of Defence Forces has been inaugurated," the ISPR chief said hours after the Ministry of Defence issued an official notification for the appointment of Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir as the Chief of Defence Forces (CDF).

The ISPR chief said today's briefing was aimed at outlining internal national security challenges, saying that nothing is above the state of Pakistan. Without naming anyone, Lt Gen Chaudry referred to jailed PTI founder Imran Khan saying: "His ego and desires have grown to such an extent that he says if not me, then nothing." Vladimir Putin, Narendra Modi agree to expand trade

Russian president challenges US pressure on India not to buy Russian fuel in an Interview to Indian media

NEW DELSHI: Russian President Vladimir Putin and Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi agreed on Friday to expand and diversify trade beyond oil and defence despite Western pressure on New Delhi to scale back its decades-old close ties with Moscow. India, the world's top buyer of Russian arms and seaborne oil, has rolled out the red carpet for Putin during his twoday state visit, his first to New Delhi since Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022. The trip coincides with New Delhi's talks

with the US on a trade deal to cut punitive tariffs imposed by President Donald Trump on its goods over India's purchases of Russian oil. Russia has said it wants to import more Indian goods in an effort to grow trade to \$100 billion by 2030. It has so far been skewed in Moscow's favour due to New Delhi's energy imports. Describing India's enduring partnership with Russia as "a guiding star", Modi said: "Based on mutual respect and deep trust, these relations have always stood the test of time." "[...] we have agreed on an economic cooperation programme for the period up to 2030. This will make our trade and investment more diversified, balanced, and sustainable," he told reporters, with Putin by his side. Modi, who warmly embraced Putin on the airport tarmac when he arrived on Thursday, also reiterated India's support for a peaceful resolution to the war in Ukraine. Putin said Russia would continue

Defence ministry notifies Field **Marshal as CDF**

ISLAMABAD: The Ministry of Defence on Friday issued an official notification for the appointment of Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir as the Chief of Defence Forces (CDF). The notification was issued a day after President Asif Ali Zardari approved the appointment on the advice of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif. "President Asif Ali Zardari approved the appointment of Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir as COAS concurrently as CDF for five years," read a statement issued by the President House on Thursday. This marks a significant development in the country's military leadership, with Field Marshal Munir taking charge of the newly established position of CDF. Separately, the defence ministry issued another notification extending the service of Air Chief Marshal Zaheer Ahmad Babar Sidhu, the Chief of the Pakistan Air Force (PAF) by two years. The extension will come into effect once his ongoing five-year term concludes in March 2026. While approving the two summaries, the president extended "best wishes to the COAS, concurrently the Chief of Defence Forces" and the PAF chief for their successful tenures, according to a statement issued by the Pres-

Netherlands to expand trade, investment coop: Envoy

LAHORE: Ambassador of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, Robert-Jan Siegert, has said that while the bilateral trade relations between Pakistan and the Netherlands are strong and continue to grow, there is still a "little bit of catching up to do" to further enhance cooperation, particularly in areas of trade and investment He emphasized, both sides should work together to make the business environment easier and more attractive for foreign investors by addressing existing challenges. He was talking to business community during his visit to Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry (LCCI) here Friday. He was accompanied by Honorary Consul Asma Hamid, Deputy Head of Mission, Hajo Provo Kluit and First Secretary Alexander Akerboom. LCCI President Faheem-ur-Rehman Saigol accorded a warm welcome to the Ambassador, while members of LCCI Executive Committee including Amir Ali, Karamat Ali Awan, Waqas Aslam, and Malik Ahmad Amin were also present. LCCI President Faheem-ur-Rehman Saigol said that Pakistan considers the Netherlands as an important economy and a key trading partner in Europe. According to the ITC World Trade Map, global imports of the Netherlands exceed 635 billion dollars while exports are above 722 billion dollars. The Netherlands is the third largest export destination for Pakistan in Europe after the UK and Germany, and stands fourth among the top European import markets for Pakistan. He informed that overall bilateral trade

during 2024-25 stood around 1.9 billion dollars. Pakistan's exports to the Netherlands amounted to 1.49 billion dollars whereas imports were recorded at 420 million dollars in the same period. Pakistan mainly exports home textiles, hosiery, rice, and woven fabrics, while its key imports from the Netherlands include petroleum oils, malt extracts, iron & steel scrap, medical appliances, and dairy products. He stressed the need to diversify product lines and explore new avenues of cooperation including information technology, tourism, pharmaceuticals, renewable energy, processed food, and automotive production. He also highlighted that the Netherlands could help modernize Pakistan's agriculture through advanced techniques and technology transfer. First Secretary Alexander Akerboom said that more than 50 Dutch companies are already active in the Pakistani market and are looking to further expand. He cited successful joint ventures as models of future cooperation, especially in livestock, agri-food technology, and halal-based exports. He mentioned that Dutch expertise in high-tech agriculture and greenhouse farming can greatly help Pakistan increase crop yields and reduce production costs. He said the Netherlands, despite its small size, is the second largest exporter of agri-food globally due to its innovative farming methods. He shared examples such as the potato project in Punjab that successfully reduced

fertilizer costs by 30 percent and increased yield by the same proportion. He also referred to recent initiatives like the International Cotton Accelerator, launched in Lahore, which aims to promote organic cotton and strengthen Pakistan's textile-based economy. He stressed that Pakistan needs climate-resilient seeds and advanced water management solutions to cope with growing challenges like floods and drought. The Ambassador said that Pakistan offers a great market, but foreign investors also compare opportunities globally. Therefore, simplification of regulatory procedures, improved ease of doing business, and reforms beyond special economic zones are crucial to attract more Dutch investment. He said both sides should join hands to advocate business-friendly reforms He invited LCCI and its members to actively participate in the EU-Pakistan Business Forum scheduled for April 28-29 in Islamabad, where companies and institutions from all EU states will explore avenues for deeper trade cooperation. LCCI President Faheem-ur-Rehman Saigol reiterated LCCI's commitment to working closely with the Netherlands Embassy to identify new tradable goods, enhance B2B linkages, encourage exchange of business delegations, and strengthen the already cordial relations between the two nations. He assured full support from the platform of LCCI for all initiatives aimed at promoting bilateral

KP okays

PESHAWAR: The Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa on Friday notified important amendments to the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Civil Servants (Appointment, Promotion and Transfer) Rules, 1989, allowing special recruitment of the son or widow of civil servants martyred in terrorist incidents The amendments have been made under Section 26 of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Civil Servants Act, 1973, on the directions of Chief Minister Khyber Pakhtunkhwa through a notification issued by the Establishment Department. According to the newly inserted Rule 10 (3A), if a civil servant is martyred during service due to an act of terrorism as defined in the Anti-Terrorism Act, 1997, the appointing authority will be empowered to directly appoint one child of the martyr to a government post. If the child is underage, the widow of the martyred employee will be eligible for the appointment instead. The appointment may be made in Basic Pay Scales (BPS) 3 to 11 in Provincial cadre posts and BPS 3 to 12 in District cadre posts, provided that the candidate meets the minimum qualification required for the post. In case of two widows, preference will be given to the elder widow. The appointment will be subject to the availability of vacancies. If multiple vacancies in different pay scales are available and the candidate qualifies for more than one post-APP

Ghotki-Kandhkot bridge to be opened by 2027: Murad

Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah has announced that the Ghotki-Kandhkot Road and Bridge Project connecting Sindh, Punjab, and Balochistan, on which the halted work has been resumed, will be inaugurated in June He took this decision while presiding over the 49th PPP Policy Board meeting, in which he revised timelines of the project, construction progress, cost escalations, and security

The meeting, held at the Chief Minister's House, was attended by Health Minister Dr Azra Pechuho, Irrigation Minister Jam Khan Shoro, Works & Services Minister Ali Hassan Zardari, Special Assistant to CM for Investment Sved Qasim Naveed. Chief Secretary Asif Hyder Shah, PSCM Agha Wasif, Chairman P&D Najam Shah, MPA Ghulam Qadir Chandio, DR Sarosh Lodhi, and other members of the Board. The Chief Minister was briefed on the project's implementation history, cost, and the findings of the Technical Committee.

Ghotki-Kandhkot Bridge Project was initiated by the Works & Services Department, with the Concession Agreement signed in May 2018. The initial hydraulic design was approved by the Indus River Commission (IRC) for a three-kilometre bridge length, and construction began in August 2020. Following the devastating 2022 floods, the IRC, observed that bridges constructed bank-to-bank were resilient and allowed floodwaters to pass smoothly, while those not bank-to-bank caused pressure on flood protection embankments and increased lag times. Therefore, the IRC mandated that all future bridges over the River Indus be constructed bank-to-bank. Consequently, the Ghotki-Kandhkot Bridge length increased from three km to 12.2 km, requiring maior revisions in scope, timeline, and cost, and amended

agreements were signed in

The project cost stands at

Rs32 billion, with scheduled substantial completion in June 2029. The Sindh government shall ensure safe law & order at the project site for

early completion by June 2027. Despite adverse security challenges in the katcha area, construction has progressed steadily. As of November 2025, segments one and two are nearing completion, while segments three and four have significant work done on piling, shaft construction, and transom installation. Overall progress is 54 per cent in piling, 49 per cent in shafts, and 47 per cent in transoms. Financial close with leading commercial and Islamic banks will be achieved by early December 2025. Chief Minister Murad Ali Shah reaffirmed the bridge's strategic importance, describing it as "a vital lifeline that will open new economic corridors for upper Sindh."—APP

Thousands of liters of substandard milk seized in KP

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Food Safety and Halal Food Authority on Friday unearthed a major network involved in producing fake and substandard milk seizing thousands of liters of hazardous milk, machinery and raw material during operations in Mardan

Director General of the KP Food Authority, Wasif Saeed said that individuals involved in manufacturing adulterated and

unsafe milk deserve no leniency and would face the strictest legal action under the Food Safety Act. According to the Authority's spokesperson, the Mardan Food Safety team raided a house in the Saro Shah area of Takht Bhai. where a milk production unit was operating. Thousands of liters of adulterated milk recovered and destroyed on the spot. The team also seized raw materials used in the preparation of fake milk along with the machinery. Similarly, in Kohat, the Food Safety officials carried out inspections in local markets and tested multiple samples through the mobile food testing laboratory. During the crackdown, the team recovered 1,000 liters of substandard milk from a dairy shop and a supply tanker. The milk was destroyed, the tanker was taken into government custody and the shop concerned was sealed._APP

AJK govt restored public trust, claims Rathore

MUZAFFARABAD: Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) Prime Minister, Faisal Mumtaz Rathore has said that restoring the trust of the people was a major achievement his government. Addressing a massive public gathering at Abbaspur Friday, Faisal Mumtaz Rathore said that since he took the reins of the government his focus was primarily been on resolving public issues. He highlighted his special connection with Abbaspur, noting that his father won elections due to strong support from the area. Regarding the rehabilitation of Kashmiri refugees, the PM said that property rights would be granted to refugees of 1965 and 1971. On the occasion, the PM announced a slew of development projects including the establishment of Basic Health Units (BHUs) in all three union councils of Abbaspur, a town committee in Mandhol, and a police station in Sahar Chowki. He announced the elevation of Abbaspur's Town Committee to a municipal committee. He also announced setting up of first aid posts along the LoC, construction of roads such as the Tetri Note-Abbaspur road, and upgrading of educational institutions. He assured that Abbaspur Tehsil Hospital would receive necessary support and announced a grant of Rs. 5 lakh for the Abbaspur Press Club. The Prime Minister said that his government has addressed key issues, including issuance of health cards, the scheduling of the Bank of AJK, electricity and other issues in an effective and timely manner. Describing the current eight-month government as a "trailer" for the upcoming five-year term, he expressed the optimism that the PPP would return to power in the next elections. The PPP, he said, believes in inclusivity with no tribal discrimination. He expressed gratitude to Pakistan for its continued support to the people of Azad Kashmir Kashmir particularly the provision of affordable electricity and subsidized flour. Elite capture intensifies economic pressure on masses

ISLAMABAD: A prominent business leader has warned that Pakistan's economic stress, worsened by elite capture of public resources, threatens social stability, especially as inflation, unemployment, and poverty erode the resilience of the masses. This should invoke a sense of urgency and shared responsibility among policymakers and citizens. Shahid Rashid Butt, former president of the Islamabad Chamber of Commerce, said that recent findings from the World Inequality Database show that the top 10% income group receives about 43% of national income. In comparison, the bottom 50% receive only 13%. Such concentration of wealth restricts broad-based consumption, limits domestic savings, and undermines the long-term development of a skilled workforce. He highlighted that nearly 40 percent of children face stunting, and over 25 million remain out of school, underscoring the need for increased investment in health and education. This should motivate civil society and

policymakers to prioritize social services for a more equitable future. Shahid Rasheed Butt noted the growing outflow of skilled youth as both legal and undocumented migration accelerates. Employers report challenges in retaining experienced workers, while small manufacturers cite high input costs and increased taxes as reasons for scaling back operations. Official data for the last fiscal year shows weak industrial output and limited export growth despite repeated policy pledges to support industry. Small businesses and labour representatives dissent from the current policy direction, saving repeated increases in indirect taxes have raised living costs without strengthening service delivery or regulatory performance. They argue that a rollback of elite benefits, greater transparency in public spending, and reforms in judicial and regulatory institutions must accompany revenue measures. Mr Butt stressed that reducing elite influence over economic policymaking, such as implementing transparency measures and anti-corruption

reforms, is crucial for rebuilding confidence in public institutions and ensuring equitable growth. Fiscal decisions in the upcoming budget cycle should include tax redesign targeting wealth concentration, increased allocations to the social sector, and measures to restore investor and consumer confidence, thereby addressing economic

disparities and promoting stability. Pakistan's economic direction cannot stabilise without a clear break from the preferential treatment enjoyed by influential individuals. The gap between policy intent and implementation widens when institutions lack autonomy and when resource allocation reflects elite interests rather than national priorities. Decision-making must shift towards evidence-based planning, more vigorous regulatory enforcement, expanded job creation, increased productivity, and protection of the vulnerable. Investment in human development, transparent budgeting, and predictable regulations are essential for regaining public trust and preventing deeper social and economic fragmentation.

CDA explores AFD support for Islamabad water sector reforms

Development Authority (CDA) and Chief Commissioner Islamabad Muhammad Ali Randhawa on Friday held a meeting with a delegation of the French Development Agency (AFD) to discuss potential cooperation in reforms and improvement projects in the water sector Discussions centred on institutional capacity-building of the Islamabad Water Agency and technical assistance for upgrading water supply systems across the capital. Randhawa told the delegation that CDA was prioritizing modern and sustainable solutions to ensure uninterrupted access to clean and

said efforts were underway to equip the Islamabad Water Agency with advanced technology, improved HR systems and modernized operational tools. Measures were also being taken to curb water wastage, reduce line losses and encourage conservation, he added. Officials briefed the delegation that the first phase of reforms would focus on modernizing the institutional and administrative structure of the water agency. This would include digitization, financial strengthening and rehabilitation of key infrastructure such as the Simly Dam treatment plants, transmission mains and service reservoirs. The

water-metering system in Islamabad also came under discussion. The AFD delegation said a detailed feasibility study would be initiated to assess the technical and financial aspects of proposed water projects. At the conclusion of the meeting, both sides reaffirmed their commitment to utilising AFD's expertise and technical support for reforms in Islamabad's water sector. Tarar defends FBR's authority to seek bank data

ISLAMABAD: Law Minister Azam Nazeer Tarar Friday robustly defended the Federal Board of Revenue's (FBR) legal authority to obtain and communicate bank information to taxpayers, telling the Senate that such inquiries were fully protected by law and consistent with global anti-money laundering regimes Responding to a calling-attention notice moved by Senator Asad Qasim regarding FBR text messages sent to filers revealing their bank balances and transaction amounts, Tarar said financial scrutiny was an integral part of tax regulation. "You cannot say FBR should not ask questions," he asserted. "Banks are legally bound to provide information, and worldwide, tax evasion is now treated as a predicate offence under AML frameworks." He said modern compliance mechanisms required transparency between taxpayers and regulators. "If someone has five crore rupees in their account but has not declared it, and FBR sends a reminder, there should be no objection," he maintained Earlier, Minister for Parliamentary Affairs Dr Tariq Fazal Chaudhry confirmed that the FBR had issued messages to both filers and non-filers where discrepancies were detected between declared income and bank data. He cited Section 165A of the Income Tax Ordinance, which authorises banks to share deposit information, along with provisions granting FBR access to data from FIA, the State Bank, National Database and Registration Authority and utilities. Dismissing allegations of privacy breaches, he said: "If my account information is sent, it comes only to me. There is no broadcast of anyone's data." Despite the government's stance that the legal framework was clear, the House later decided to refer the matter to the concerned standing committee for further examination in view of the sensitivities surrounding data protection and taxpayer privacy.-DNA

ISLAMABAD :A high-level special meeting chaired by Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi and Federal Minister for Overseas Pakistanis Chaudhry Salik Hussain has decided to intens fy action against passengers attempting to travel abroad using fake documents. The government has approved measures to make the protector issuance system fully foolproof, while reforms in the immigration process have also been finalised to facilitate passengers. The two federal ministers have directed all departments to submit final recommendations within seven days. A strict crackdown has been ordered against elements and agent networks involved in the fake visa business. Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi announced that to curb il-

legal immigration, an AI-based mobile application will be launched as a pilot project in Islamabad starting January. "Through this AI app, authorities will be able to determine in advance who is eligible to travel and who is not," he said. Naqvi added that after the ts of deported individual cancelled, the government will ensure they do not obtain new visas. He also confirmed that a uniform international driving licence will now be issued by the National Police Bureau. "We are adopting zero tolerance against fake visas and the agent mafia," he emphasized. "Pakistan is in contact with other countries to improve the global ranking of the green passport. People using illegal means abroad damage the country's reputation." He said the overall objective of immigration reforms is to provide convenience to citizens and enhance Pakistan's in-

ternational image. Federal Minister Salik Hussain said that a transparent protector system is the need of the hour. He stressed that individuals traveling on labour visas must possess authentic documents. "The Ministry of Overseas Pakistanis will extend full peration to the Ministry of Inter or in improving the protector and immigration systems," he assured.

The meeting reviewed ongoing actions against illegal migrants and individuals traveling with incomplete documentation. Detailed discussions were held on e-driving licences, protector stamps, and immigration-related matters. Climate experts stress immediate collective action to preserve tomorrow

ISLAMABAD: Climate experts on Friday warned that climate change is now a fast-growing crisis, stressing that rising temperatures and extreme weather show the planet is under serious threat, urging immediate united action to prevent further damage and protect a safe future for coming generations Climate expert Usman Abbasi while speaking exclusive with PTV news warned that climate change is accelerating at an alarming pace, with rising temperatures, extreme weather events and dwindling natural resources threatening the balance of our planet. He emphasized that these challenges cannot be addressed by individual efforts alone and call for united, collective action from governments, communities, and industries worldwide. Climate experts cautioned that if these trends will continue unchecked, the consequences will be disastrous for ecosystems, economies, and communities worldwide, adding, floods, droughts, heatwaves and resource shortages are becoming increasingly frequent, highlighting the urgent need for immediate and coordinated measures to mitigate further damage. He emphasized the world must act now to prevent irreversible damage and secure a safer, more sustainable future for generations to come. Experts urged strong policies, mass awareness campaigns, and initiatives like constructing mini dams and water reserves to protect resources and build resilience against the climate crisis. Responding to a query, he said it is predicted that by 2040, Pakistan will face an 80% water shortfall and stressed the urgent need for policy-making, community mobilization, and the construction of mini dams rather than relying solely on large projects. He also urged people to avoid burning garbage and to plant more trees to protect the environment and conserve resources.—DNA



In comparison, there are only 55 countries where improvements have been recorded in some area. This gap itself shows the depth of this crisis. Moreover, in 2009, the number of countries that can be called "liberal democracies" worldwide was historically the highest, but by 2022 their number had shrunk to just 32.

A major reason for this political decline is the rise of populism, which has caused the most damage to public trust in democratic institutions. Populist leaders have transformed public deprivation and despair into emotional slogans and described institutions, the media and the judiciary as "elite", which has the result that democratic structures are weakened from within. Whether it's the attack on Capitol Hill in the US, questions about the impartiality of institutions in India, or the growing influence of nationalist parties in Europe—they're all manifestations of the same global trend.

N every age of conflict, nations have understood that the strength of an army does not rest merely in the number of its battalions or the size of its armoury, but in the excellence of its equipment, the discipline of its ranks, and above all, the determination that beats within the hearts of its soldiers. War requires tools that deter aggression and answer it with resolute force, yet history testifies that even the most formidable machinery is powerless without the spirit that guides it. Pakistan learned this lesson not in comfort but in fire, when in 1971 it faced a trial greater than its material capacities.

There is no denying that Pakistan entered the war of 1971 under conditions far less favourable than those of its adversary. Politically, the country was grappling with internal discord, strained governance, and the tragic anxieties emerging in East Pakistan. India, in contrast, enjoyed greater political coherence and international support. Economically as well, Pakistan was more limited in resources, while India, with a larger industrial base and greater financial resilience, possessed a comparative advantage. In matters of defence, India had the benefit of numerical superiority, larger stockpiles, and extensive backing from global partners. In external affairs too, New Delhi benefited from significant diplomatic alignments, particularly its strategic treaty with the Soviet Union, whereas Pakistan's position was more fragile, dependent on distant alliances and insufficiently supported by its immediate region.

Yet, despite this disparity, the Pakistani nation did not lose heart. The limitations in political stability, economic strength or diplomatic support did not diminish its resolve. When India launched its offensive, the Pakistan Armed Forces met it with the courage of a people determined not to let context of regional disputes and military their homeland be overrun by aggression. In those days when military hardware was unevenly balanced and the diplomatic climate seemed unfriendly, it was the indomitable courage of Pakistani soldiers that became the country's true shield.

Among the shining names of that difficult period, the example of Major Shabbir Sharif stands in eternal brilliance. He was a young officer who understood that courage is not measured by the strength of the arms one carries, but by the strength of the conviction one defends. On December 6, 1971, during some of the fiercest clashes of the conflict, he led his men with an unmatched spirit. Under ground, repelled repeated assaults and inflicted decisive losses on the opposing forces. Things are moving towards improvement, and Pakistan will now soar to greater heights from here," he told journalists during an informal conversation at the Awain-e-Sadar in Islamabad. The establishment of new military title follows President Zardari's assent on November 15 to the Pakistan Army, Air Force, and Navy (Amendment) Bills 2025, after their approval by parliament. Under the amended provisions, Article 243, which governs the powers and responsibilities of a Field Marshal, will also apply to any General promoted to the rank. The federal government may authorise the Vice Chief of Army Staff or Deputy Chief of Army Staff to exercise the powers of the COAS under written orders issued on the recommendation of the Chief of Defence Forces (CDF). The legislation further stipulates that once the first notification for the dual office of COAS and CDF is issued, the incumbent COAS' tenure will be considered to have recommenced from the date of that notification. The federal government will determine the specific duties and responsibilities of the CDF, which will include multi-domain integration, restructuring, and ensuring jointness across the armed forces. A significant structural change introduced under the amendment is the abolition of the post of Chairman Joint Chiefs of Staff Committee (CJCSC), which will now be replaced by the Command-er of the National Strategic Command. The prime minister may appoint the Commander from among serving Pakistan Army generals for a three-year term,

After 15 years, Dutch anti-blackface group declares victory

AMSTERDAM: Cherished Christmas tradition for some, profoundly insulting for others, the Dutch character "Black Pete", a servant who helps Santa Claus distribute presents, has divided opinion in The Netherlands for decades. Until recently, Santa's arrival on the eve of Saint Nicolas Day (December 5) - a major Yuletide celebration for the Dutch - was marked by many people dressing up as Black Pete, complete with blacked-out faces and often afro wigs, creole earrings and make-up to plump out lips.

Stung by the caricature that harks back to Dutch colonial times, Jerry Afriyie founded the "Kick Out Black Pete" (KOZP) movement in 2010 to fight racism and is now wrapping up with the battle won. "Around this time of the year, you would pass hundreds of Black Petes (Zwarte Piet in Dutch),

hundreds of white people in blackface.

Today, it is different," he told AFP. "Even small children are correcting

me. When I say 'Zwarte Piet', they say 'Piet,' added the 44-year-old poet in an interview in Amsterdam. In 2010, Afriyie's foundation "Nederlands Wordt Beter" ("The Netherlands is improving") set three objectives.

They wanted Dutch colonial history, heavily dependent on slavery, taught in schools, an annual commemoration for the victims and Black Pete to get the boot. KOZP activists organised peaceful protests whenever Santa came to town with Black Petes in tow. Some were pelted with eggs or even fireworks by Black Pete backers.

The movement hit global headlines, tarnishing the country's reputation for tolerance, and reached new heights amid the 2020 "Black Lives Matter" protests. Then Prime Minister Mark Rutte - who had said for years that "Black Pete is just black" - urged the

tradition to end. Afriyie explained that Black Pete was a figment of the imagination of Jan Schenkman, who popularised the story of Santa Claus in the Netherlands. Black Pete is "actually a black servant. He (Schenkman) himself said it. It's a black servant serving a white master," said Afriyie.

"And I think that in 2025, it's uncalled for." The movement's goal was to "de-normalise" Black Pete and the blackface tradition, said Afriyie. "It was as normal as Dutch pancakes.

And we felt like, hey, this is not normal. It's hurting people. A lot of children feel insecure," he said.

KOZP has been so successful in p ing organisers - often municipal officials - to make the Santa arrival inclusive that it held no protests this year. According to an Ipsos survey, the percentage of Dutch wanting to maintain the tradition has dropped to 38 percent, compared to 65 percent in 2016. – **Agencies**

US Supreme Court allows texas to use Trumpbacked voting map

WASHINGTON: The US Supreme Court on Thursday allowed Texas to use redrawn congressional districts for the 2026 midterm elections, boosting the hopes of President Donald Trump's Republicans to retain control of the House of Representatives. The push by Texas -which carves out five more Republican-friendly districts and came at the behest of Trump - kicked off a series of similar efforts in states around the country. The decision by the conservative-dominated high court stayed a lower ruling which had said the redrawn maps had incorrectly used race to set district lines.

"Texas needs certainty on which map will govern the 2026 midterm elections, so I will not delay the Court's order," Justice Samuel Alito, one of six conservatives on the bench, wrote in his concurring opinion.

The three liberal justices all dissented with the order, which was unsigned. "The District Court conducted a nineday hearing...And after considering all the evidence, it held that the answer was clear. Texas largely divided its citizens along racial lines to create its new pro-Republican House map," Justice Elena Kagan wrote in her dissent.

While the ruling is technically only a temporary halt to the lower court ruling, with a candidate filing deadline next week in Texas, it effectively ensures the Republican-favored map will be in effect for the 2026 midterms. - APP

Oil refinery shutdown could cost Serbia for years

BELGRADE: The fallout from the shutdown of Serbia's only oil refinery could last years, experts told AFP, putting thousands of jobs and the state's budget at risk - as well as exposing the country to further sanctions. The Petroleum Industry of Serbia's (NIS) refinery has been unable to receive crude oil since October 9 after its Russian majority owners were swept up in US sanctions over Moscow's invasion of Ukraine. Washington is demanding a complete exit of Russian shareholders, but talks over its potential sale have dragged on, forcing the company to shut the refinery on Tuesday. "Any reduction in its activity would have a substantial impact on overall economic activity," Dejan Soskic, an economics professor and former central bank governor, told AFP. The closure could shrink economic growth for years, he warned. The loss of the refinery, which provided 80 percent of Serbia's fuel needs, also means a massive increase in imports to fill the gap. Hungarian energy firm MOL agreed last month to increase oil shipments to Serbia, but experts have warned that relying on fuel imports is costly and unfeasible in the long term. Serbian President Aleksandar Vucic said the company could continue accessing the country's payment systems until at least the end of the week to pay wages and settle with suppliers. Beyond this period, the situation is less clear. - Agencies

PSB Gets Interim Relief from PHC against KP Government

A two-member bench comprising Justice Waqar Ahmad and Justice Khurshid Iqbal heard the petition filed by the Pakistan Sports Board challenging the KP government's action. PSB's legal advisor. Saif ur Rehman. appeared before the court and presented arguments.

Hope's resistance keeps West Indies alive in New Zealand Test

CHRISTCHURCH: A sparkling century by Shai Hope ably supported by Justin Greaves had the West Indies 212-4 at stumps on Friday and clinging to the remote chance they can save the first Test against New Zealand in Christchurch.

Hope was 116 not out and Greaves 55 with the pair putting on 140 for the fifth wicket after the West Indies were in dire straits at 72-4. New Zealand need six more wickets with the new ball six overs away while the West Indies, set a mammoth 531-run target, need a further 319 runs. The tourists' cause was helped by injuries to New Zealand's pace ranks which have forced captain Tom Latham to be creative with how he managed his bowlers. A side strain sidelined seamer Nathan Smith for the remainder of the Test and lead bowler Matt Henry was restricted

to 11 overs because of a hamstring issue. That brought off-spinner Michael Bracewell and part-timer Rachin Ravindra into the attack earlier and longer than expected. But that takes nothing away from the stubborn performance of Hope, who is enjoying a purple patch despite battling an eye infection, with 56 in the first innings and coming to New Zealand off a century against India. He played briskly with 15 fours and one six and the delight was evident when he raised his bat after driving Rayindra to the covers for a single to bring up his century. Greaves played his support role admirably, offering two faint edges but both fell well short of the slip cordon.

After the West Indies went to lunch at 11-0, New Zealand dominated the second session with four wickets. Jacob Duffy removed John Campbell for 15 in the second over after lunch with a seaming delivery that clipped the edge of the bat and Bracewell held the catch diving in front of first slip. At the start of his next over Duffy had Tagenarine Chanderpaul caught behind for six. Right-arm spinner Bracewell picked up an easy wicket when he accounted for Alick Athanaze (five). A gentle longhop which should have been despatched to the boundary went instead to Zak Foulkes at mid-on. Henry made a brief return to the attack to removed captain Roston Chase for four. - Agencies

Donald Trump set for soccer – or football – diplomacy at World Cup draw

WASHINGTON: Donald Trump still seems unsure whether to call it soccer or football. But the US president's aim is truer when using the world's favorite sport to score diplomatic goals. Trump will try to do so again on Friday when he meets the leaders of 2026 World Cup co-hosts Canada and Mexico at the tournament's draw in Washington. As the first World Cup hosted by three

countries simultaneously, it should be a golden opportunity to show North American unity, with the three leaders reportedly set to take part in a ceremonial draw.

But Trump's aggressive stance towards his allies on trade, migration and drug-trafficking since his return to power means they will have thorny issues to tackle on the sidelines of the gala event.

For Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum it will be her first meeting with Trump. She told reporters they would discuss bilateral trade during the "small meeting" before the draw, in which the 48 qualifying teams

are divided into 12 World Cup groups. Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney has visited the White House twice but it will be his first encounter with Trump since briefly meeting in South Korea in November, after Trump suspended trade talks in a bizarre row over an anti-tariff ad. They will have a "brief meeting during their time together at the Kennedy Center," the venue for the tournament draw, Carney's office told AFP Thursday, adding that he Trump has slapped steep tariffs on exports

He has threatened further punishment if they fail to curb cross-border migration and drug trafficking - and irked Sheinbaum by saying he would be "OK" with airstrikes on Mexico to tackle traffickers. Canada meanwhile was outraged by Trump's calls earlier this year for it to

become the 51st US state.

Yet the three countries now find themselves hosting the world's biggest sporting event together, having launched their joint bid in 2017 during Trump's first term in the White House. He has unashamedly seized on the World Cup to score political and diplomatic points - even though the golf fan's knowledge of the beautiful game mainly comes from his son Barron, 19.

The US president has struck up a close friendship with FIFA boss Gianni Infantino, who also has close ties with a number of authoritarian leaders including Russia's Vladimir Putin. Trump dangled the carrot of the chance to compete at the 2026 World Cup as a possible "incentive" for Russia - banned from international football since the 2022 invasion of Ukraine - to end the war. Infantino is set to play to Trump's love of flattery when he presents a new FIFA "peace prize" on Friday that the US leader is widely expected to win.

Trump has hosted Infantino several times at the White House - as he did Portuguese superstar Ronaldo at a dinner for visiting Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman in November. But Trump's football diplomacy has also risked colliding with his domestic priority of a massive crackdown on immigration. Trump recently unveiled a special fast-track visa process for people with World Cup tickets, but Secretary of State Marco Rubio warned that a ticket would not guarantee admission to the United States. More recently, Trump responded to an Afghan national allegedly shooting two National Guard members in Washington by slapping a freeze on all asylum decisions from 19 countries. They include World Cup participants Haiti and Iran. Trump has also caused jitters at FIFA and in foreign capitals by threatening to move World Cup matches from Democratic-run cities where he has launched anti-crime and immigrant operations. - Agencies

Section 3 of the MPO 1960, commonly known as 3-MPO, empowers the government to direct the arrest and detention of a person to prevent him from "acting in any manner prejudicial to public safety or the maintenance of public order".

Taiwan says China deploys warships in 'military operations'

TAIPEI: Taiwan said Friday that China had deployed warships for "military operations" stretching hundreds of kilometers from the Yellow Sea to the South China Sea, posing a "threat" to the region. Beijing, which claims self-ruled Taiwan as part of its territory, neither confirmed nor denied the maneuvers. Taiwan's defense ministry and other security agencies were monitoring China's activities and had a "complete grasp of the situation," presidential office spokeswoman Karen Kuo told reporters. She did not say how many Chinese ships were involved in the deployment, but a security source told AFP the number was "significant." The source spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to the media. The operations were not limited to the Taiwan Strait, but extended from the southern Yellow Sea, to the East China Sea near the disputed Diaovu Islands and on into the South China Sea and even the Western Pacific, Kuo said.—APP

Italy to open Europe's first marine sanctuary for dolphins

ROME: The Mediterranean's first sanctuary for dolphins that have lived in captivity will open off Italy next year, as demand for re-homing rises with the closure of marine parks across Europe. "We must develop a new model for managing dolphins in a natural but supervised environment," Carmelo Fanizza, head of the San Paolo Dolphin Refuge, told AFP. Located off the coast of Taranto in the southern Italian region of Puglia, the sanctuary still needs a final green light from the government. But the site will be ready by the end of this month and the first dolphins are expected to arrive "no later than May or June 2026," Fanizza said. Animal rights concerns have driven countries such as Canada and France to ban the capture of dolphins, porpoises and whales, while growing numbers of marine parks are shutting. That has created a burning question: what to do with the cetaceans, which can live for decades and have mostly only known life in captivity, so cannot be released into the wild? The San Paolo Dolphin Refuge got permission from the Italian government in 2023 to use a seven-hectare (2.5-acre) area in the Gulf of Taranto, near the island of San Paolo. The spot is "sheltered and protected from the sea, winds and prevailing ocean currents," said Fanizza, brushing off concerns the site was near the industrial coastal city of Taranto.-APP

Belarus eager to expand presence on Brazilian market

MINSK: A business meeting titled as "Brazil: The way to success on the Latin American market" organized by the business school 21st Century Consult took place in Minsk. Deputy Director of the National Center for Marketing Yevgeny Rusak was one of the key speakers. He talked about opportunities for Belarus to export to the Brazilian market, the press service of the National Center for Marketing told BelTA.

Chaos erupts at Indian airports as country's largest airline cancels flights

NEW DELHI: Chaos gripped major Indian airports Friday as passengers of the country's biggest airline, IndiGo, scrambled to cope up with widespread flight disruptions and cancelations triggered by newly enforced rules limiting working hours for crew and pilots. Scenes of frustration played out as passengers slept on airport floors, queued for hours at customer service counters and waited without clear communication from the airline. Friday was the fourth straight day of disruptions as the low cost carrier struggles with new regulations that mandate longer rest periods and limit night flying hours to address concerns about fatigue and safety. The first phase of the rules came into effect in July while the second phase kicked in November. IndiGo struggled to adapt its rosters in time, resulting in widespread cancelations and disruptions. On Thursday, more than 300 IndiGo flights were grounded while several hundreds delayed. A passenger advisory from the Delhi airport Friday stated that all domestic IndiGo flights will remain canceled until midnight. Other major airlines, including Air India, have not faced similar issues so far. IndiGo operates around 2,300 flights daily and controls nearly 65 percent of India's domestic aviation market. Senior citizen Sajal Bose was scheduled to travel with his wife Senjuti Bose early Friday from Kolkata to New Delhi to attend a friend's silver jubilee celebration. His flight was canceled an hour before the scheduled take off. Bose told The Associated Press he was now taking a nine-hour train ride to the city Bagdogra, where he plans to get a flight to New Delhi on another airline. "Its very irresponsible and complete negligence. Very difficult for older people like us," he said. In an internal email to employees this week, seen by The Associated Press, IndiGo CEO Pieter Elbers apologized, and cited technology glitches, schedule changes, adverse weather conditions, heightened congestion and the implementation of the new rules as the reasons for flight disruptions. The Civil Aviation Ministry said in a statement that the disruptions arose primarily through misjudgment and planning gaps as the airline implemented phase two of the new rules, and that the airline acknowledged that the effect on crew strength exceeded their expectations.—DNA

Iran launches massive missiles during naval

TEHRAN: Iran launched massive missiles in the Sea of Oman and near the strategic Strait of Hormuz during the second day of a naval drill, state TV reported Friday. The report said the paramilitary Revolutionary Guard launched the missiles from the depth of Iran's mainland, hitting targets in the Oman Sea and neighboring area near Strait of Hormuz in a drill that began on Thursday. It identified the missiles as cruise Qadr-110, Qadr-380 and Ghadir that have a range of up to 2,000 kilometers (1,250 miles.) It said the Guard also launch a ballistic missile identified as 303, without elaborating. TV footage showed the missiles' launch and hitting their targets. The drill is the second one following the Israel-Iran war in June that killed nearly 1,100 people in Iran, including military commanders and nuclear scientists. Missile attacks by Iran killed 28 in Israel. Since the end of the war, Iran has increasingly insisted that it is ready to counter any future Israeli attack. Iran launched its first naval drill in the area in August. Iran's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard is mainly in charge of operations in the Arabian Gulf and its narrow mouth, the Strait of Hormuz. The national navy is in charge of Sea of Oman and beyond.-APP

PRA uncover major tax evasion by housing societies

LAHORE: A large number of housing societies, builders and farmhouses across Punjab have been found non-tax compliant. Significant manipulation in the sales records of several major hotels, food chains and restaurants was also uncovered This was disclosed in a meeting chaired by Punjab Revenue Authority (PRA) Chairman Moazzam Iqbal Sipra here on Friday. The Chairman directed the Commissioner Lahore Division to issue immediate notices for registration and tax payments to all defaulters. It was further informed that vigilance teams have compiled bill records, after which enforcement actions will be initiated. More than 100 farmhouses in the provincial capital alone were identified as

The price of the Euro decreased by 10 paisa to close at Rs 327.07, from the previous day's close of Rs 327.17, according to the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP). The Japanese Yen went up by 01 pasia to close at Rs 1.81, whereas the exchange rate of the British Pound witnessed an increase of Rs0.27 and closed at Rs 374.39 compared to the previous day's Rs 374.12.—APP

Spain, Morocco sign 14 cooperation deals MADRID: Spain signed 14 cooperation deals with Morocco

in Madrid on Thursday, strengthening ties with the EU's North African neighbor. Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez hosted his Moroccan counterpart Aziz Akhannouch for talks in Madrid before presiding over the signing of 14 agreements. These included cooperation in education, sport, agriculture, fishing, and natural disasters, according to a statement from Sanchez's office. A joint declaration reaffirmed "both countries' desire to strengthen political dialogue," the statement added. Sanchez also urged both countries to seize the "economic, cultural and social opportunities" offered by the 2030 football World Cup, which Spain and Morocco will host alongside Portugal. The statement made no mention of Western Sahara. Morocco is seeking to manage its airspace, controlled by Spain from the Atlantic archipelago of the Canary Islands. Immigration is another major topic of common interest. Morocco is a key EU partner in managing irregular migration, as it shares the bloc's only land border with Africa at the Spanish exclaves of Ceuta and Melilla. Moroccan Trade Minister Ryad Mezzour had told El Mundo newspaper that his country was "making every effort" to combat illegal immigration.—DNA

Lebanon president says country does not want war with Israel

BEIRUT: Lebanese President Joseph Aoun urged a United Nations Security Council delegation on Friday to pressure Israel to respect a year-old ceasefire and to support his army's efforts to disarm Hezbollah. Despite a November 2024 ceasefire that was supposed to end more than a year of hostilities between Israel and the Iran-backed militant group, Israel has kept up strikes on Lebanon and has also maintained troops in five south Lebanon areas it deems strategic. Aoun "stressed the need to pressure the Israeli side to implement the ceasefire and withdraw, and expressed his hope for pressure from the delegation," according to a statement from the presidency. He also noted "Lebanon's commitment to implementing international resolutions" and asked the envoys to support the Lebanese army's efforts to disarm non-government groups. The Lebanese government ordered its military to fully disarm Hezbollah in August, and the army expects to complete the first phase of its plan by the end of the year. The UN delegation visited Damascus on Thursday and after its meeting with Aoun was due to inspect the border area in southern Lebanon on Saturday, accompanied by US envoy Morgan Ortagus. The visit comes as Lebanese and Israeli civilian representatives held their first direct talks in decades. On Thursday, Information Minister Paul Morcos quoted Aoun calling the initial negotiations "positive" and stressing "the need for the language of negotiation - not the language of war - to prevail." That same day, Israel struck four southern Lebanese towns, saying it was targeting Hezbollah infrastructure including weapons depots to stop the group from rearming. UN peacekeepers called the strikes "clear violations of Security Council resolution 1701," which ended the 2006 war between Hezbollah and Israel. The peacekeepers also said their vehicles were fired on by six men on three mopeds near Bint Jbeil on Thursday. There were no injuries in the incident. "Attacks on peacekeepers are unacceptable and serious violations of resolution 1701," the international force added. Hezbollah refuses to disarm but has not responded to Israeli attacks since the ceasefire.-APP

Shahzad Akbar declared proclaimed offender

Islamabad court also issues arrest warrant over repeated non-appearance in controversial statements case

ISLAMABAD: A district and sessions court in the feder al capital declared former prime minister Imran Khan's adviser on interior and accountability Shahzad Akbar a proclaimed offender. The court, in its written order, also directed to issue arrest warrant for Akbar, citing his failure to appear before the court despite multiple summons in a case pertaining to his alleged controversial statements on social media. Meanwhile, challan of case against him has also been submitted to the court.

The court's decree comes a day after Pakistan formally commenced the extradition process for Akbar, residing in the United Kingdom since April 2022, with Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi submitting the relevant documents in a meeting with UK High Commissioner Jane Marriott. During the meeting, Naqvi said that he "fully believed" in freedom of expression but no country can allow slander and defamation of the state and institutions from abroad.

HRCP condemns attack on Aurat march activists

KARACHI: The Human Rights Commission of Pakistan (HRCP) on Friday condemned police action against Aurat March activists in Karachi a day earlier, calling on authorities to respect people's access to civic spaces. On Thursday, a rights activist was 'briefly detained' from outside the Karachi Press Club (KPC), ahead of a press conference by Aurat March over the alleged abduction of two Baloch girls. The organisers said classical dancer and human rights activist Sheema Kermani was also manhandled by police, while other women participants were also "mistreated" by female officers on their way to the press club. Journalist Zofeen Ebrahim was also barred from attending the press conference, which was eventually held at the KPC. In a post on social media platform X today, the HRCP said it condemned the police obstruction of Aurat March's scheduled press conference and the brief detention and manhandling

ISLAMABAD: The Shariat Appellate Bench of the Supreme Court has issued notices to all bar councils, including the Islamabad Bar Council, in appeals challenging the fixation of court fees at Rs 15,000 in civil cases. The court also directed the Attorney General for Pakistan and the provincial Advocates General to appear in person at the next hearing. A five-member Appellate Bench headed by Justice Shahid Waheed heard the case on Friday. The bench made it clear that the matter is being taken very seriously and no further adjournments will be granted. The hearing was adjourned till 2 February. During the proceedings, the court observed that several appeals have been filed against the decision to set the court fee at Rs 15,000, and that the issue is closely linked with public rights. Justice Aqeel Abbasi remarked that a large number of people in the country are poor and unable to afford the costs of accessing justice. He said providing justice is the fundamental responsibility of the state and it cannot be treated as a source of revenue. - Agencies

Naqvi unveils AI-based app to curb illegal immigration

Interior ministry moves to tighten checks on forged documents and agent mafias

ISLAMABAD: Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi on Friday announced the launch of an artificial intelligence-based application as a pilot project to curb illegal immigration and clamp down on fake travel documents.

He was speaking while co-chairing a meeting with Federal Minister for Overseas Pakistanis Chaudhry Salik Hussain, where the two reviewed "immigration reforms" aimed at facilitating citizens and improving the country's image at the international level.

Imaan, husband file distrust petition against judge

ISLAMABAD: Lawyer Imaan Mazari and her husband Advocate Hadi Ali Chattha on Friday filed a application in the Islamabad High Court (IHC), expressing distrust in Judge Muhammad Afzal Majoka and seeking transfer of controversial tweets case to another court.

The plea argues that transparency requirements are not being met in the trial, therefore, the case should be transferred to another court. The said case against the lawyer couple relates to a first information report (FIR), registered by the National Cybercrime Investigation Agency, accusing the couple of inciting divisions on linguistic grounds through

social media posts. The FIR, registered against the couple, invoked Sections 9, 10, 11, and 26 of the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act (Peca), 2016. During the hearing of the case at district and sessions court in Islamabad today, lawyer Mazari said: "Hand me seven years in prison, I am ready [for it]" — a remark which drew no response from Judge Majoka.

Sindh dengue death toll nears 40

KARACHI: A seven-year-old girl died of dengue in Hyderabad, taking the death toll to 39 in Sindh this year, sources within the provincial health department said on Friday. At least 173 more cases have also been reported during the last 24 hours, the health department confirmed.

In an alarming situation, dengue cases are on the rise in Sindh, with Karachi being the most affected. A total of 1,984 tests were conducted in public and private laboratories during the past 24 hours. Out of 173 new cases, 117 were reported in Karachi, and 56 individuals tested positive for the virus in Hyderabad. As many as 21 new dengue patients were admitted to government hospitals across the province, while 25 new patients were admitted to private hospitals.

With these admissions, the total number of hospitalised dengue patients in the province has reached 48. The rising cases reflect a pattern seen in recent years, as Sindh reported a total of 2,704 dengue cases in 2024. and 2,880 in 2023. – APP

Govt preparing stricter regulatory framework for used car imports

Only vehicles meeting safety and environmental standards will be allowed to enter Pakistan, says PM's aide

ISLAMABAD: In a bid to protect local industry and manufacturing, the government is working on new legislation and a stricter regulatory framework to control used car imports, The News reported on Friday.

The plan was discussed on Thursday at a detailed meeting between Special Assistant to the Prime Minister on Industries and Production Haroon Akhtar Khan and a delegation of the auto industry to review key challenges facing the sector. Secretary Industries Saif Anjum and Engineering Development Board CEO Hammad Mansoor also attended. Industry representatives, including members of the Pakistan Auto Manufacturers Association, told the meeting that tax reforms and tighter controls on used car imports were critical to stabilising domestic production.

They warned that liberal import policies were eroding the

local industry's hard-won gains, weakening vendor networks and discouraging fresh investment. Khan said the auto industry plays a vital role in Pakistan's large-scale manufacturing sector and assured the delegation that their concerns were fully understood at the highest level.

He said that on the prime minister's directives, new laws and regulations were being introduced to deal comprehensively with issues related to used vehicle imports.

"Only those used vehicles that meet safety and environmental standards will be allowed to enter Pakistan," Khan emphasised. He said increased competition would help improve efficiency and steer the sector toward low-cost and competitive local manufacturing, while ensuring consumer protection through better regulatory oversight. Secretary Industries Anium said key safeguards on commercial imports would remain in place. Three years of overseas residency and at least one year of registration of the vehicle in the owner's name would continue to be mandatory for import eligibility.

Islamabad court issues non-bailable arrest warrant for Gandapur, again

ISLAMABAD: A district and sessions court in Islamabad on Friday issued non-bailable arrest warrant against former Khyber Pakhtunkhwa chief minister Ali Amin Gandapur in connection with an audio leak case. The court has directed the police to arrest Gandapur and produce him before the court. Additional Sessions Judge Nasr Minallah Baloch presided over the hearing. Gandapur, who was a provincial minister in KP back then, was charged under the illegal arms and anti-drugs laws after illicit arms and a bottle of liquor were allegedly recovered from his car.

US slashes work permit validity period for foreign nationals to work in the US," the agency said.

WASHINGTON: The United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) on Thursday announced changes that sharply reduced the maximum validity period for employment authorisation documents (EADs) for several categories of foreign nationals, citing security concerns and legislation signed earlier this year. The move, the latest in a sweeping immigration crackdown by the administration of US President Donald Trump, took place just two days after it halted immigration applications for citizens from 19 nations. Under the new rules, the maximum validity period

for initial and renewal EADs has been shortened from five years to 18 months for categories including refugees, asylum seekers, those granted withholding of deportation or removal, and applicants with pending adjustment-of-status or relief applications. Additional categories, including those paroled as refugees, granted temporary protected status (TPS) or under entrepreneur parole, will see the validity of their work permit reduced to one year or the end date of their authorised parole or TPS period, whichever is shorter. These changes apply to applications pending or filed on or

after Dec 5, 2025, or Jul 22, 2025, depending on the cate-

gory. "The reduced maximum validity periods will result in

more frequent vetting of aliens who apply for authorisation

The agency added that after the attack on National Guard service members in Washington earlier this month, "it's even more clear that USCIS must conduct frequent vetting of aliens". USCIS Director Joseph Edlow linked the change directly to safety concerns. "Reducing the maximum validity period for employment authorisation will ensure that those seeking to work in the US do not threaten public safety or promote harmful anti-American ideologies," he said.

US Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem said on Thursday the US plans to expand the number of countries covered by its travel ban to more than 30. After a meeting with Trump on Monday, she said she recommended a full travel ban on "every damn country that's been flooding our nation with killers, leeches, and entitlement junkies.

All asylum cases on hold: Earlier this week, the Trump administration has imposed the most sweeping internal freeze on immigration benefits in decades, ordering US-CIS to halt all asylum adjudications and suspend a wide range of applications from nationals of 19 "high-risk" countries, while reopening thousands of previously approved cases for fresh security screening. The directive, issued to USCIS field offices, followed a series of violent incidents involving Afghan nationals admitted under earlier programmes. Those cases prompted the White House to conclude that vetting procedures between 2021 and 2024 were "dangerously insufficient", triggering a system-wide overhaul of immigration screening.
